Grants **Awarded** To Local **Initiatives**

A number of local and countywide environment initiatives have been awarded grants under the 2002 Local Environment Partnership Fund. Objection Lodged Against Cloneety

A local resident has lodged an objection against the development of over 70 houses, apartments and a community centre at Cloneety, Dungarvan it has emerged.

Proposed by Hollycourt Development the social and affordable housing project was granted permission by Dungarvan Town Council last week, but has already

encountered a number of setbacks.

The Co. Cork based developers, had hoped to put together the housing package with the aid of Cluid and Dungarvan Care of the Aged. But, County Manager Donal Connolly recently revealed that Cluid were now unlikely to become involved. A second social housing agency has since been con-

tacted but their involvement

remains unconfirmed.

The housing project includes 28, three bedroom, 28, two bedroom semi-detached houses, 22 bungalows and 26 apartments with associated common areas in a two storey building, and a community centre incorporating a hall, crèche and ancillary facilities.



Piparella - Environmental Play for Children

As part of the Local Environment Partnership Fund, Waterford County Council have funded five free performances of an environmental play for children called "Piparella". Notices have been sent to all primary schools giving details of dates and times.

PHOCINE DISTEMPER VIRUS (PDV) AMONG SEALS
The first case of the Phocine Distemper Virus (PDV) has been

confirmed, following tissue analysis, in a seal found on the Aran Islands County Galway.

The virus attacks the respiratory and immune system of seals and causes severely matted eves, runny noses and pneumonia.

and causes severely matted eyes, runny noses and pneumonia. This virus does not pose any threat to humans but cats and dogs can be affected by it.

At this time of year in particular, heavy seas can increase seal mortality and lead to a higher incidence of seals being washed ashore. Even at the best of times, seals should not be approached because they can be quite viscous and if they bite they can cause infections such as Sealer's Finger Disease.

Scientists agree that the distemper virus does not pose a threat to humans and since most dogs have been vaccinated against it, the threat to them is limited. However, the virus will cause illness in dogs that have not been vaccinated and for this reason members of the public are being asked to keep all dogs away from sick seals or carcasses.

If a member of the Public comes across sick or dying seal they should contact their local authority, who will arrange for it to be safely disposed of. Waterford County Council can be contacted on 058-22000 at any time.

The Phocine Distemper Virus represents a natural phenomenon among seals which, though obviously distressing to the public, is something which must necessarily take its course. Moreover, the phenomenon does not represent a danger to humans. Under existing arrangements, local authorities have the responsibility for the disposal of animal carcasses, including seals.

The Department of the Environment and Local Government has been in contact with its counterparts in Northern Ireland and the UK, and it has been agreed that any information on developments in our respective waters will be shared by those authorities. Moreover, the Department has been in contact with Professor Brian Sheehan of the Veterinary College of University College, Dublin. Some weeks ago Professor Sheehan carried out a post mortem on a seal found on the Galway coast and furnished the Department with its findings, which indicated at that time that the seal in question did not have PDV.

The most recent development is that a researcher working with the Department of Zoology at University College, Galway, forwarded tissues from two seals found near Inismore. County Galway, to the Department of Agriculture in Northern Ireland. Following laboratory tests, it has been confirmed that tissues from one of these animals was found to contain PDV.

The Minister has arranged that conservation rangers, regional management and research officials of his Department will continue to monitor and advise on incidences of seal strandings and mortality on our coastline. The Department will also continue to liaise with international experts on the subject.

While it should be emphasized that there has only been one confirmed report of PDV in Irish waters to date, the Minister has asked for members of the public to be vigilant and to report any sightings of dead or unwell seals to officials of his Department (01- 6472404, 01-6472408 and 01-6472410) or their local authority.

The Marie Keating Foundation, launched in April 2001, has been established primarily to provide Breast Cancer Information & Awareness free of charge for the general public throughout Ireland. The Foundation has set up three Mobile Units in the Eastern, Western and Southern regions of Ireland. These units travel countrywide, staffed by a registered nurse who will provide Information and Awareness about breast cancer.

This is not a breast screening service.

Breast cancer is a common and serious condition. In Ireland approximately 1,700 women are diagnosed with breast cancer every year. Some 650 die from the disease annually. The risk of developing breast cancer increased with age and breast cancer is the most common killing cancer in women. Breast cancer is rare in women under thirty and occurs most frequently in later life. Men can also develop breast cancer but it is one hundred times less common than in women. The earlier a cancer is diagnosed and treated, the greater the chance of a cure.

HOW DID THE MOUNTAINS BEGIN?

plates called tectonic plates, which is together-rather like pieces in a jigsaw puzzle. Tectonic plates are in constant movement, because they rest on the magma underneath. These plates slide one against the other, they collide, they move apart. These movements, as well as causing earthquakes, volcanic eruptions and the Continental Drift (separation of the continents), also led to the formation of mountain chains. When two plates press one against the other, the Earth's Crust is pushed up towards the top and forms mountain chains in 'folds'. But when the Crust breaks along cracks or 'fault lines', great blocks of rock are thrown up and form mountain chains in 'blocks'.

WHO WHAT WHEN HOW

How is the height of a mountain measured?

To measure the height (or altitude) of a mountain, we take the surface of the sea as a point of reference. When we say, for example, that the mountain K2 is 8616 m a.s.l. (above sea level) we refer to the distance between the top of the mountain and the surface of the sea.

WHAT IS A VALLEY?

A valley is a thin basin situated between the base of mountains. Valleys are formed by erosion (or wearing away) caused by ice and course of water. The shape of a valley depends on how is begun.

A glacier valley is formed by the slow advance of a glacier and is formed like a letter U - steep sides and a fallat base.

A river valley is excavated by the course of a river or waterfall. Its shape is like a letter V - sloping sides and a narrow

Baked potato treats

Preparation: 20 mins Cooking: 60-90 mins

EVERYONE love eating outdoors on Bonfire Night and tucking into some tasty spuds is the perfect

Everything can be prepared well in advance no worries about things running a little late and spoiling. Some of today's children can be quite fussy eaters, so here are four tasty topping recipes that are suitable for vegetarians too!

INGREDIENTS (Serves

Four baking potatoes Toppings

Tahini and chive topping Juice of 1/2 lemon 3 tablespoons tahin

1/2 tsp yeast extract, dissolved in a little water 3 tablespoons water 15g/ 1/2 oz chives,

chopped salt and pepper Low fat fromage frais with

herbs 200g/ 7oz low-fat fromage

a handful of fresh herbs.

e.g. basil and parsley, chopped salt and pepper

Tomato salsa 225g/ 8oz ripe tomatoes, skinned and chopped

1/4 red onion, finely chopped 15g/ 1/2 oz fresh coriander, finely chopped

salt and pepper Apple and hazelnut coleslaw 1 dessert apple, peeled and grated

50g/ 2oz cabbage, finely shredded

1 shallot, chopped 15g/ 1/2 oz chopped roast

hazelnuts 30ml/2tbsp ready made

vegan mayonnaise 1 teaspoon hazelnut oil

METHOD Cook the four baking potatoes in a preheated oven at 200°C/ 400°F/ Gas mark 6 for about 1 - 1 1/2 hours

until tender. Alternatively. cook microwave oven.

Mix all the ingredients of your chosen topping together thoroughly (use a blender or food processor for the tahini and chive topping) and serve with the piping hot potatoes.



Patatas Bravas

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 10 mins

THIS is a really fantastic serve as the nights begin to close in.

Not only is it very warming on a cold night, but potatoes and parsley are a good source of vitamin C which will help keep colds at bay during the winter months.

It is also suitable for vegetarians.

INGREDIENTS (Serves 4 as a side dish)

1 tablespoon groundnut

675g /11/2 lb cooked cubed potatoes

1 onion, finely chopped

1 teaspoon chilli powder quick and easy dish to 2-3 tablespoons tomato purée

> 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, to garnish

METHOD

Heat the oil in a non stick frying pan and gently fry the potatoes, onion and chilli powder together for about 10 minutes or until all the vegetables are golden.

Stir in the tomato purée and heat through.

Serve the potatoes as a side dish, garnished with chopped parsley.

Peanut brittle

Preparation: 1 hour

SWEET-making is often only attempted on Bonfire Night with toffee - try this instead.

INGREDIENTS

12 oz loaf or cube sugar 1/4 pint water

1/2 lb golden syrup 2 level tspns powdered glucose

1 oz butter

3 oz browned peanuts 1/2 tspn lemon essence 2 tspns bicarbonate of

soda

METHOD Dissolve the sugar in water, together with syrup and glucose, in a large, heavy-based saucepan set over a low heat.

Bring to boil and boil gently until thermometer registers 30F.

Add the butter, warmed nuts (rub off skins first) and lemon essence then heat until butter is just melted.

Stir in bicarbonate of soda - mixture will now froth rapidly for a few minutes. Pour it quickly on to an oiled large clean non stick baking tray, and leave to cool.

When cold, break brittle into pieces.

Store in an airtight container in single layers between grease proof paper.



Know Your Rights

OUESTION

What are the charges for private and semi-private accommodation in public hospitals?

ANSWER

Since the 1st August, 2002 the daily rates in respect of private and semi-private accommodation are as follows:

Hospital Category	Private Accommodation	Semi-private Accommodation	Day-Care	
Health Board Regional Hospitals Voluntary & Joint Board Teaching Hospitals	€301.97	€236.12	€216.83	
Health Board County Hospitals Voluntary & Non-Teaching Hospitals	€250.57	€202.39	€179.89	
Health Board District Hospitals	€155.79	€132.32	€115.64	

These charges are additional to the public hospital statutory in-patient charge which is €36 a day (subject to a maximum of €360 i.e. 10 days in any 12 month period). If you are in two or more hospitals in the course of the year and your stay exceeds 10 days in hospital you should bring this to the attention of the last hospital you attend.

It is important to make clear to the hospital whether you are opting for public or private care. Everyone is entitled to public in-patient and out-patient services regardless of their income but subject to the statutory charges mentioned above.

There are a number of groups who do not have to pay the statutory charges including medical card holders, women receiving maternity services, children up to the age of 6 weeks, children suffering from prescribed longterm illnesses, children referred from health clinics and school examinations and people receiving treatment for long-term infectious diseases. In cases of undue hardship a Health Board may provide the service free of charge.


Many appliances now have an energy rating. A rating being the most efficient. These may cost a little more but the extra paid may be saved over its lifetime in energy.


New Pre-School Play Group





Membership fee is €12.70. WILLIAM VINCENT WALLACE (1812-1865)

William Wallace was born in Waterford on 11 March 1812. His father was a Scottish bandmaster. William himself showed a keen interest in music at a very early age. At sixteen he was organist in Thurles Cathedral. He moved to Dublin and worked as a violinist. He met and married a Miss Kelly from Blackrock and then gave up music. They emigrated to Australia, where he tried sheep farming in the bush for a time. He separated from his wife and they never met again. Wallace then explored Tasmania and New Zealand. He nearly lost his life on a whaling expedition in this area. India, Nepal, Kashmir, South America and Mexico were his next destinations. He made considerable sums of money from concerts whilst travelling in these areas.

Wallace invested his savings in piano and tobacco factories in America. However he lost heavily when these firms went bankrupt. In 1844 he married a Miss Stoepel, who was a pianist, in New York. They went to live in London in 1845. He had some success with a series of concerts. However his real success came when his opera Maritana was received with great enthusiasm at a

production in Drury Lane Theatre in 1845. He made visits to Germany and America with his production. He had even greater success with Lurline when it was performed at Covent Garden in 1860. He wrote many more operas and piano music. He retired to France in 1864 due to serious ill health. He died at the Château de Bagen in the Pyrenees on 12 October 1865. A bronze bust of him is placed on the Mall in Waterford to commemorate him.



Hepatitis C and HIV Compensation Tribunal (Amendment) Act, 2002

Michéal Martin T.D. Minister for Health and Children has appointed 9 October 2002 to be the establishment day for the purposes of the Hepatitis C Compensation Tribunal (Amendment) Act, 2002.

Under the amending legislation the following persons may apply for compensation:

- (a) A person who has been diagnosed positive for HIV as a result of receiving a relevant blood product within the State (Section 4.1. (f) of the Act)
- (b) Children or any spouse of a person referred to in paragraph (a) who have themselves been diagnosed positive for HIV (Section 4.1 (g) of the Act)
- (c) Dependants of a person who
 (1) has been diagnosed positive for HIV as a result of receiving a relevant blood product within the State

(2) is the child or spouse of a person referred to in paragraph (1) and who were themselves diagnosed positive for HIV

AND where that person has died as a result of having contracted HIV or where HIV was a significant contributory factor to the cause of death (Section 4.1 (j) of the Act)

- (d) Any person who is responsible for the care of a person who has been diagnosed positive for HIV resulting from the use of a relevant blood product within the State and/or for the care of the children and/or spouse of such persons who have themselves been diagnosed positive for HIV and who has incurred or will incur financial loss or expenses as a direct result of providing such care arising from the person being cared for having contracted HIV (Section 4.1 (i) of the Act).
- (e) Any person who is married to or has for a continuous period of not less than three years lived with a person who has been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C resulting from the use of Human Immunoglobulin Anti-D, a blood transfusion or blood product and/or HIV resulting from the use of a relevant blood product, in respect of the loss of consortium of the person, including impairment of sexual relations with the person arising from the risk of transmission of Hepatitis C or HIV (Section 4.1 (h) of the Act).

The Tribunal accepts applications from or on behalf of those persons who are coinfected with Hepatitis C and HIV where the co-infection arose within the scope of the Hepatitis C Compensation Tribunal Act 1997 as amended.

The Tribunal continues to accept applications from or on behalf of those persons entitled to claim compensation under the Hepatitis C Compensation Tribunal Act, 1997 as amended.

Teagasc National Dairy Conference

theme of this year's Teagasc National Dairy Conference, which will be held once again at the Gleneagle Hotel, Killarney on Thursday November 21st. With over 1300 farmers attending last year it is anticipated that this year's conference will once again be the most important Teagasc dairy event of the year.

Future farm viability will be discussed in the context of an E.U. mid term review of CAP. new environmental regulations and a new W.T.O round. The Minister for Agriculture, Mr. Joe Walsh will open the conference. His comments on the progress of the mid term review will be eagerly awaited. Future entitlements to premia will be determined by any agreement to these proposals. Perhaps the most fundamental questions are what base year will be used for future premia and secondly, is it a farmer taking land or the owner of the land, will have the right to premia?

Dairy industry views will be presented by John Maloney, Chief Executive, Glanbia and Martien Van den Hoven, Group President of Campina, a Dutch based multi-national processor.

'Countdown to Reform' is the They will discuss how we could achieve a higher milk price by concentrating on value added products. While these topics have often been discussed in the past (with little subsequent progress) the difference this time round is that value added products may represent the only way to higher milk price into the future.

Campina have led the way in developments in branding to maximize milk price. Glanbia have embarked on a similar strategy and John Moloney's assessment of prospects should be interesting.

Coping with environmental regulations at farm level will be addressed, with papers on cost effective environmental investment and on the implications and management of lower nitrogen input systems. Seán Regan, Teagasc environment specialist will outline the costs and benefits of various slurry storage options. He will comment on recent developments such as reed beds and give the pros and cons for their use in different farm situations.

Dr. James Humphreys will discuss his recent experiments at Solohead Research Station where he has examined a range

of nitrogen inputs for differing stocking rates. He will also outline how he had successfully established clover in swards without ploughing. With nitrate restrictions looming, these talks should be of major interest to intensive dairy farmers.

Dr. John Roche from Dexcel in New Zealand will present the latest findings in grassland management, which may be relevant to Ireland. Dr. Roche, a native of Kerry, is now a senior researcher in New Zealand. He has worked in research in Moorepark, Australia and New Zealand over the years and is in a strong position to give guidance to Irish dairy farmers.

Recent lessons in grassland management from Irish monitor farms, will be covered by Billy Kelleher, Dairygold Monitor Farm Co-Ordinator and Robert Shannon, monitor farmer, West Cork. Robert Shannon is this year's winner of the Teagasc Protein 350 Competition. Having reached a protein percentage of 3.6% and a yield of over 1600 gals per cow, Robert's farming system should be of interest to all

Seamus Crosse. Moorepark and Tom O'Dwyer, Teagasc Kildalton, will outline the path ahead for dairy farmers in terms of opportunities and obstacles. With much pes-simism in the air, these papers will take an objective view of where dairy farming is headed over the next six to eight years.

The Conference again this year includes an optional social programme for accompanying partners and Conference participants. Discussion groups have an opportunity to use the Conference as a central part of their annual social outing. There is the option of visiting an eighty cow, financially efficient dairy farm on the day following the conference.

Early booking is recommended to ensure a place at the Conference. The conference fee (which is tax deductible is 35 for Teagasc clients and 50 for non-clients. Booking forms are available through your local Teagasc office or phone Betty McElligott at Teagasc Tralee at (066) 7125077.



Silage Analysis

For some, silage cutting was three weeks late while for others it took three weeks to cut. Either way early indications are that silage quality is well back. Silages appear to be lower in energy, lower in protein and as a consequence intakes will be lower. Such shortfalls in quality will have to be balanced over the Winter. In order to do this it is more critical this year than ever to get your silage analysed. If you are interested in getting it tested contact your local Teagasc office.

Feeding Strategies

One of the rules of thumb that we often use is that to finish cattle economically you will need at least a 70DMD silage plus 5.5 kg of concentrate if the animal is to gain 1kg/day.

So what if your silage quality is below this? Chances are that many silages will be <65 DMD this year. This adds significantly to costs, every 5 unit drop in DMD will have to be supplemented with an extra 1.5kg of concentrate. Over a 150 day feeding period this would amount to an extra 225 kgs of meal/head (€36) just to compensate for poor silage.

Where silage quality is moderate why not consider an all concentrale 90- 100 day finishing period. Animals for example that are due to be finished in December/January could be housed and gradually built up to ad-lib concentrates over a 3 week period. Animals on this type of regime from work carried out in Grange have better killout % and lower levels of carcass fat. Performance is more predictable, it will reduce labour, interest charges and slurry requirements but more importantly it eliminates having to incorporate poor quality roughage into the finishing diet.

It is vital though that animals are built up on ad-lib meals gradually and once ad-lib, that feed is kept in front of them at all times and that they have access to some roughage in the form of straw or silage.

For animals that are not destined to be finished until March they too can be intensively finished but for the initial 50-60 days after housing they can be fed silage ad-lib only or with up to 2kg of meal. Then build up in the last 100 days to all meal. Straights

Where straights can be bought and handled they represent the best value. Energy feeds such as Barley, Wheat, Citrus pulp and Soya hulls and protein sources such as Distillers grains and Rapeseed currently represent good value.

DAIRYING Rules for Dry Cow Therapy

Billy Meaney, Teagasc, Moorepark advises dairy farmers to follow these rules at drying-off:

Select cows for drying-off

- Always clean teats with cotton wool soaked in methylated spirits before infusing dry cow products
- Read label instructions ensure product is for use in dry cows
- Infuse dry cow product infuse all quarters
- Massage into udder
- Teat dip or spray
- Keep accurate records of drying-off and expected calving dates.

The annual report from Bord Bia records a decline of almost 40 per cent in Irish beef exports for 2001 as, one after the other, the entire beef business collapsed like a house of cards.

But the situation was not half as bad as it could have been. The Bord Bia report points out that the measures taken by the EU after the BSE crisis on the Continent towards the end of 2000 and the emergency measures introduced by the Commission, with the co-operation of the Council, as a result of foot-and-mouth, removed an estimated 28 per cent of Irish beef production. A 65 per cent increase in sales to the UK resulted in overall Irish beef exports to the EU increasing by 10 per cent last year on 2000

However, on the Continent itself, reduced consumption of beef was 13 per cent below pre-BSE levels, resulting in a decline of more than 40 per cent in Irish exports to there. Within this overall picture, exports to Holland held up well, with sales to the retail sector increasing by nearly 10 per cent. On the other hand, lower sales of hone-in beef resulted in overall exports to Holland falling by more than 10 per cent. Reduced import requirements in key markets such as France, Italy and Scandinavia led to a difficult market environment for Irish beef. Overall, for the year, export volumes were 55,000 tonnes compared to 255,000 tonnes

We also have the farm income figures for last year, just published by Teagasc in its farm management survey of nearly 1,200 farmers representing a total of 120,000 fulltime and part-time farmers. For all farmers, these show an income rise of 17 per cent last year - and average incomes have exceeded the incomes of the heady days of 1995 (at least in nominal terms)

Mr Looby said the Department Area Aid Unit claim a lot of these files are now processed and payment can be made. However the Department is saying the next run of ewe premium payments will not be until November.

The Waterford IFA sheep farmers' leader said in view of the fact that the reason for nonpayment relates to problems in the Department no further delays are acceptable. He called for the immediate payment of the Rural World Premium to all eligible sheep farmers.

In addition, Mr Looby called for the National Envelope of €1.22/ewe to be paid out without further delay.

BOVINE TO AND BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION SCHEMES 2002/2003 HARDSHIP GRANT

- The 2002/2003 Hardship Grant eligibility period will commence on 1 November 2002. It is designed to alleviate the costs difficulty of some owner/keepers whose holdings are restricted on foot of a herd re-test and where animals are retained and fed during periods of restriction. Potentially eligible owner/keepers must meet certain conditions including requirements that they (i) must not have any income from milk sales, and (ii) must not have any off farm income. The Grant may provide eligible owner/keepers with a payment of up to €253.95 per month for a period not exceeding 4 months within the period 1 November 2002 to 30 April 2003.
- 2. The specific eligibility criteria attaching to the Hardship Grant are outlined in the terms and conditions document which will accompany the application form ER97 Potentially eligible owner/keepers will be issued with the terms and conditions document, important notice and application form ER 97 by the District Veterinary Office. Supplies of the relevant documentation will also be available at District Veterinary Offices.
- 3. The onus is on potentially eligible owner/keepers whose holdings are or may be restricted at a re-test at 1 November 2002 or during the period 1 November 2002 to 30 April 2003 to ensure that they obtain and familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions document and application form ER 97.

The onus is on owner/keeper to apply for a Hardship

Owner/Keepers who received Hardship Grant payments in respect of a previous cycle of the Hardship Grant Scheme can qualify for a Hardship Grant during the current eligibility period November 2002 to 30 April 2003 provided they meet all the eligibility criteria for 2002/2003 Hardship Grant.





BALLYDUFF DRAMA

Presents

Eclipsed

"Eclipsed" is a social document as well as a powerful dramatic piece and its subject matter is timeless – how society treats its unwanted members, those who have behaved differently. The play picks away at a scab to reveal the awful reality beneath the hypocrisies that were spread across Irish Society not too many years ago. "Eclipsed" concentrates on the lives of the 'imprisoned' women, those fallen women who broke the rules of society and the sexual morals of the time, of their incarceration in the "penitent" laundries and their struggle for a little freedom and their longing to see their children again. For these young girls and women, the laundries were at once their refuge and their prison. Separated from their children they lived a spartan and loveless existence.

The Magdalene was ironically called after the prostitute Mary the Magdalene who serves her Jesus loyally and was rewarded with his forgiveness and love. No such rewards existed for the penitents in this play by Patricia Burke-Brogan. Ms. Brogan paints a canvas filled with vivid portraits that reveal the full tragedy not only of the penitents but also of the emotional price paid by their children and keepers.

The Magdalene Laundries continued to thrive into the 1970's, when Irish society finally said "no". While the unjust situation prevailing in the harsh world of the convent ends too late to bring light into the eclipsed lives of the 'socially immoral' (as they were called at the time) there are also sufficient moments of countervailing humour and warmth.

Nellie Nora (Frances Foley), Cathy (Louise Howard), Mandy (Kate Canning) and Brigid (Enda Ormonde) emerge as strongly differentiated personalities despite the look-alike dull brown washerwoman dresses they all wear. While the lighter scenes are skilfully crafted to provide warmth and humanity, the play ultimately derives its strength from the more painful confrontations.

The play is directed by Ger Canning, who hopes to tell it as it was, though she says it is difficult to remain impartial on this subject. It gives her a sour feeling from having studied a piece of Irish history that people rarely talk about and a slice of Irish culture many would rather not remember.

This is a story about women; it is a story about judgment and is a story about Ireland. It is for any one with compassion in their hearts and the condition of women in their minds. Eclipsed contains a great dramatic force and a cry of horror for a life that slips away without a chance of being lived.

Shed a tear and share a smile at this production in Ballyduff on October 31st, November 1st and 2nd. Spare a thought for the 30,000 Irish women who passed through the Magdalene Laundries. Do not miss the compelling performance. Book now on 058/60456.

developments go-ahead, which they hoped would alleviate the local residents concerns.

However, the appeal, lodged by a Cloneety resident on Wednesday last, has cited 14 grounds for his objection.

Included in the extensive appeal, is the pedestrian access, which, according to the objector, was established for the residents of Cloneety Terrace only.

"This passageway was never made a public roadway by the Local Authority..." it states, adding that the passageway "will undoubtedly create a 'ratrun' between the development proposed and the public road-

"The passageway will become a location for vandalism, unsocial behaviour activity and culminate in the creation of nuisance by way of abandoned refuse", it contends.

It also states that there is a total failure to provide safe boundaries and will result in trespass. It contends that the development would be "injurious to amenity in the area" and that the access would result in a traffic hazard and states that it would reduce the value of the appellants property.

Reacting to the news, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan said the objection did not come as a surprise but that the concerns of the residents had been taken on

"While it's not surprising that an objection has been lodged it has to be borne in mind that permission has been granted with 39 conditions attached, which should alleviate any concerns that local residents may have.

"I think it is important that when granting permissions that the legitimate concerns of people in the locality are taken on board, and I believe the council has done so," Cllr. Geoghegan

However, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan is critical of the developers, saying that without the involvement of Cluid, they may not go ahead with the original application. He said different plans for another social housing agency, or private housing could be envisaged in a move similar to the sale of the Burgery land in lots.

They cleared all the hurdles with the good will of the council. Now they're saying that they mightn't be in a position to go-ahead with it."

"I think we have to look at our planning laws to see is there some clause we can put in to stop this from happening,' Cllr. O'Riordan said.

Town Clerk, Brian White, speaking yesterday, said changes to the proposed development would require the developers to re-submit a planning application.



"RING A LINK" TO CONNECT COMMUNITIES

A new transport link that will improve the regular links between communities in the Clonmel area was launched on Saturday last. "Ring A Link" is the new bus service that will pick you up from your own door and bring you to where you want to go. Part of the Rural Transport Initiative, "Ring A Link" has been up and running in the Tipperary Town area for some time past and this is proving to be an outstanding success.

Now the service has been extended to the Clonmel area. On two days each week. Friday and Saturday, the "Ring A Link" mini bus service is at your call. It works on a pre booking system, on a first come first served basis. If you need a lift ring Lo Call number 1890 42 41 41.

The mini bus will then collect you from your home and bring you where you want to go. There are two routes on this service, taking in Ballyporeen, Clogheen, Burncourt, Ballylooby, Castlegrace, Ardfinnan, Goatenbridge, Grange, Knocklofty and Newcastle. Councillor Mattie McGrath (FF) has described this new service as a "Lift for Rural Life", Councillor McGrath from Newcastle is Chairperson of the R. T. I. Working Group in South Tipperary and is appealing for public support for this "innovative, demand responsive service". Councillor McGrath stated "I am very excited about it because a lot of work was put into it".

He describes "Ring A Link" as a long overdue, good service for rural Ireland. The cost of the service is just 4 Euro. Bus passes are accepted and children under six travel free. This service was officially launched on Saturday evening last and made a tour of the area. It visited Grange, Ardfinnan, Clogheen, Ballyporeen and Burncourt before lunch in Ballylooby and afterwards it was on to Castlegrace, Goatenbridge and Newcastle, then to Four-Mile-Water, Kilmanahan and Clonmel.

LOCAL AQUACULTURE MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS C.L.A.M.S.

Last week we wrote that Bord Iascaigh Mhara intend to carry out a development and management plan for aquaculture in the bay but had not contacted the Harbour Master requesting permission to carry out a survey of the local harbour.

As distinct from National Aquaculture policy and development programmes, the concept of C.L.A.M.S. focused at the local bay level. It involves the formations of a local C.L.A.M.S group, in order to formulate an aquaculture development plan for the bay while incorporating and extending the successful concepts of single bay management to all farmed species. The following are some of the tangible outputs that will be produced by C.L.A.M.S. - 1) Integration of a series of codes of practice for current aquaculture operations and translation of those National codes to the specific circumstances of each bay 2) Expansion of the concept of Single Bay Management to species other than salmon 3) A development plan for aquiculture in the bay 4) Information on other activities in the bay 5) A local and national communication network with "bottom up" and "top down" dialogue capacity. What C.L.A.M.S. is not - It is not a licensing or regulatory process. It will never be used to grant a license. C.L.A.M.S. is not a policing mechanism for compliance with license conditions. Consultation - Meetings will be held with various parties who may not be in favour of aquaculture development. Though their comments will be heard, it is not going to be the policy to address all of their concerns in C.L.A.M.S.. It must be stressed that one of the main purposes of C.L.A.M.S. is to provide a framework for the development of the industry and not a document that lists all objections to it.

TREATMENT PLANT AT BALLINACOURTY

Foul drainage from Dungarvan and Abbeyside will be pumped from the proposed pumping station at Shandon to the new Wastewater Treatment Plant at Ballinacourty. The new treatment plant, due to commence construction in 2003, will provide better quality effluent discharge to receiving waters at the outfall off Ballinacourty point. Work on the new Treatment Plant will be completed in 2004. (Ref. Dungarvan Environs Draft Landuse Study Plan - Waterford County Council).

FOUL DRAINAGE

The consultants for the Dungarvan and Environs Sewerage Scheme (E.G. Pettit & Co.) have reviewed and reassessed the adequacy of the proposed Dungarvan and Environs Drainage Scheme in the light of the additional land bank areas identified. The up to date plan to the scheme for foul drainage and surface water drainage are as follows - Catchment - Strandside North Areas Included - Knockateemore Comments - New sewers are required to service this area. Catchment - Touranore/St. Augustines Areas Included - Touranore, Burgery and Duckspool Comments - New sewer to be constructed from N25 Road junction to pumping station at Duckspool. Surface water from future development can discharge to the bay via an existing drainage channel and outfall. Modification to the channel will be required. Run off rates will have to be restricted with attenuation measures provided.

FROM THE ARCHIVES . . .

This week we take a trip down memory lane and revisit one of Dungarvan's finest ever under-age victories. The year is 1964 and the occasion is the Under-16 County Hurling final where we faced the mighty Mount Sion in the decider. The following report on the match is taken from the local press as reported on September 5th of that year.

Mount Sion Mastered In Classic Final MOUNTSION 14

Those who stayed away from the Fraher field on Sunday last missed the hurling treat of the current championship year. Dungarvan fielding one of the most complete teams I have seen for many a year annexed the county juvenile title at the expense of Mount Sion after as splendid a decider as one could wish to see. It was a game that, despite the scoring disparity, had everything. It abounded in thrills for every minute of the sixty, and one could only marvel at times at the standard of the fare served up.

This was a decider par excellence, in which the brilliance of these Old Boro' under sixteen's manifested itself spectacularly. For the occasion the sun shone gloriously, and the hurling certainly matched the conditions under which the thrill-consuming battle was waged.

Lest the scoreline might deceptively tend to suggest that this was an unequal and one-sided affair, I hurriedly wish to emphasise that nothing could be further from the truth. Mt. Sion, in keeping with the club's great tradition, sent out a formidable side in quest of highest honours-a side that would have beaten any other opposition in the county on Sunday. But Dungarvan just weren't "any other opposition," and the monastery boys failed to a well nigh perfect hurling combination.

WITHOUT A FLAW

This was an old Boro' side without a flaw. They played a brand of hurling more mature than their years, and team trainer Bro. Looney must have felt mighty proud of his charges as he watched them carve out their superb victory. Yet, strangely enough, it was not until playing against a second-half breeze, that Dungarvan really asserted their undisputed authority. Throughout the opening half they dictated matters territorially, but the attack somehow failed to translate that advantage into scores, and their interval lead of 0-5 to 0-1 was far from a secure one. In fact the monastery forwards looked the more dangerous sextet in their somewhat sporadic raids, and thrice came within inches of notching what would have been morale-boosting goals for them.

But to my mind the real turning point of this game came within seconds of the half-time whistle. With the blues leading by four points, 'Sion attacked and a full-blooded drive by midfielder John Goulding was magnificently saved by star goalkeeper Michael Donnelly. That save was worth travelling many a mile to see, and it deprived 'Sion of a goal that would have been an invaluable asset to them in the second half.

AT THEIR VERY BEST

On the changeover, Dungarvan played hurling at it's very best. Their defence tightened up considerably, the midfielders assumed complete control, and the attack combined to knife its way past the 'Sion defence for well-taken scores. The monastery boys, to their credit, never gave up trying, but their cause was a lost one against a side that was now rampantly striding to victory.

THE SCORING

The game was only four minutes old when Francis Woods opened Dungarvan's account with a point. The blues then seemed to get well on top and a succession of minors by Sean Daly, Sean Flynn, Noel Rooney and Sean Franklin (free) gave them a deserved five point advantage. But towards the close of

the half, Mount Sion came much more into the picture and reduced their deficit with a point from a free. Then came that wonderful save by Donnelly in the Dungarvan goal, and the blues turned over still four points to the good. Just as in the opening half, Francis Woods had Dungarvan's first score of the second moiety—a point from over forty yards range. Then between the 4th and 20th minutes 'Sion's net fell four times, and the title was assured of a resting place in the Old Boro. Sean Franklin had the first, and six minutes later the same player cracked home another. In the 17th minute Woods raised the green flag, and Franklin completed the quartet of major scores in the 20th minute.

Five minutes from time the loser notched their only goal –and a good one it was, but Dungarvan finished with a flourish and scorer-in-chief Sean Franklin completed their tally when pointing in effortless fashion.

SUPERB GOALKEEPER

For the blues, Michael Donnelly gave a memorable exhibition between the posts. During the hour he brought off a few miraculous saves, and without doubt this is a youngster destined for the top in his net-minding profession.

The full backs were resolute in the extreme and gave Donnelly the proverbial acre of ground to work in. Murphy in particular looked the complete fullback, and his corner men, Johnny Egan and Thomas Dwyer never gave ground.

The half-line of Sean Daly, Timmy Healy and Michael Norris was an unbeatable one. Healy, in the number six berth, made defensive hurling look easy, whilst the long-striking Daly and the sure and stylish Norris backed him up to the hilt.

Dungarvan were on top for most of the hour at midfield. Hereabouts the highly skilled hurling of Tony Carlton and the industry of a tireless Kevin Fleming was too much for Mount Sion, and consequently the Old Boro forwards enjoyed a liberal supply of the ball.

NOTCHED 3-2

But if it did take the men up front some time to settle down to their best, they did lead the monastery defence a merry dance in the second half. Sean Franklin, top scorer with 3-2 to his credit, was the real hero, and many of his score were taken with an ease that must have baffled the opposition. Francis Woods at right-half was another prolific scorer that left his mark on this game, and Sean Flynn completed a dangerous half-line.


The full forward trio got little scope from a tough monastery inner-line of defence. However, Joe Walsh, Noel Rooney and Gerry Crowley played worthy parts in victory.

Mount Sion, having trounced all eastern opposition, lived up to all expectations, but simply had to concede best to a superior side. They battled right up to the end, however, and contributed largely to making this the classic it undoubtedly was.

Their stars were goalkeeper Pat O'Grady, defenders Wyse, Kelly and Kinsella; midfielder Fitzpatrick and forwards Pender, Bolger and Frisby.






