Multi Million Euro Shopping Complex Addresses Concerns

Managing Director of Clancy Construction, Billy Clancy is confident that new plans for a multi million euro shopping complex on the Glanbia site has addressed An Bord Pleanála's concerns and that Dunnes Stores will remain on as anchor tenants.

The developers recently lodged a renewed planning bid for the €60 million first phase development and have completely re-designed its urban structure, building layout and increased road access.

"We've spent the last ten months working on the design, the layout, the access and the roads. So, I am confident that it will be successful," Mr. Clancy said.

If the development goes ahead, three hundred new jobs will be created in the first phase alone, and the leakage of millions of euros of spending power, lost to

cities and larger towns will be halted, he said.

"If it doesn't go through, it will be a very bad day for Dungarvan. Its not just the shopping centre that would be lost, the development of the remainder of the site is dependant on this going ahead," he added.

"I don't know of any town that can afford to lose that kind of investment."

One of the initial appellants to the original plans, Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce, have already backed the new plans and at a recent briefing with the developers, members of the Town Council also came out in support.

But, the retailers body, RGDATA, is expected to make another appeal, with some describing this move as inevitable. Mr. Clancy also said that he was aware

RGDATA were "making some noises".

However, concerns that Dunnes Stores was about to pull out appear to be unfounded. Mr. Clancy said he is hopeful that Dunnes Stores will remain on board as anchor tenants at the shopping centre and plans to re-activate an agreement with the major retail group.

Meanwhile, Cllr. Billy Kyne has welcomed the new submission from Clancy Construction describing it as having many positive elements.

However, he believed it is almost inevitable that RGDATA will object again.

He said: "In a town, where I am aware that significant businesses did not object, and went out publicly to say so, I would call, in the interests of transparency and

Senseless Vandalism At Abbeyside AFC Clubhouse

Thousands of euros worth of damage has been caused to the clubhouse of local soccer club, Abbeyside AFC, in an act of wanton vandalism over the weekend.

The clubhouse, located at Stucco Lane, was broken into and the inside of the building extensively damaged at approximately 9 o'clock on Saturday night.

The vandals left behind a trail of destruction, with doors, windows, shower fittings, tiles and ceilings all destroyed in the mind-

less rampage.

Shocked officials were called to the scene on Sunday morning to view the aftermath and all expressed their revulsion at the damage. Gardai are pursuing an investigation into the incident.

Abbeyside AFC cater for seven underage teams and

in recent years have undertaken an impressive revamp of the playing area and their changing facilities.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Chairman, Joe O'Riordan described the incident as a "major blow to the club."

"But, it's symptomatic of today's society", he said. "It's ironic that people who work with young people and give of their time freely, should feel the brunt of this mindless act."

allowed to be buried within the confines of the church graveyard. The country is littered with long forgotten small fields that bare mute testimony to another stressful period in our history. A heart-broken father would carry the little bundle to such a location and a stone, which was normally taken from the family plot, or holding was placed on the grave.

Dual Mandate May End After Next Local Elections

Dual Deputies, John Deasy and Ollie Wilkinson, may be prevented from serving on

Dungarvan Town Council and Waterford County Council, in less than two years time.

Under the new Local Government proposals, sitting TDs would be precluded from serving as local representatives after the 2004 Local Elections.

Fine Gael TD, John Deasy currently serves on both Dungarvan Town and Waterford County Councils, while Deputy Wilkinson has served as a County Councillor for the past sixteen years.

Proposals to end the dual mandate were put forward first by former Minister for the Environment, Noel Dempsey, but were dropped before the general election following opposition from Independents, who supported the Government, and some Fianna Fail backbenchers.

Opposition to the changes are expected again, with concerns already voiced over proposals to direct elect Mayors, but some political analysts believe Minister Martin Cullen, will get the support needed to end the dual mandate.

WHAT IS AN EARTHQUAKE?

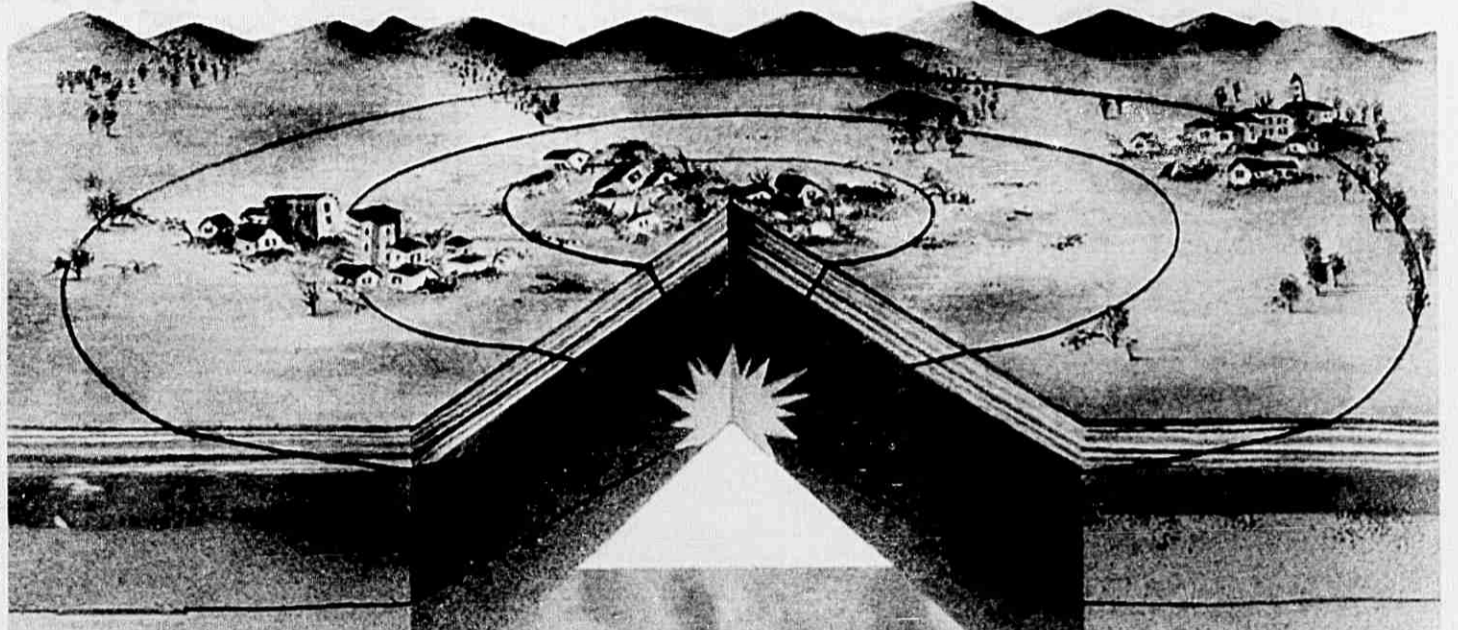
The tectonic plates which comprise the Earth's Crust are in continuous movement. They press one against the other, or they move apart, sometimes moving in opposite directions. As they rub against each other, this slows down their movement causing an accumulation of an enormous amount of energy. When the two plates finally move, this energy is suddenly released and shakes with enormous vibrations (seismic waves). These vibrations shake the Earth's surface, causing an earthquake. The intensity of the earthquake can be great enough to destroy an entire city, causing death and injury to many victims.

Hypocentre And Epicentre

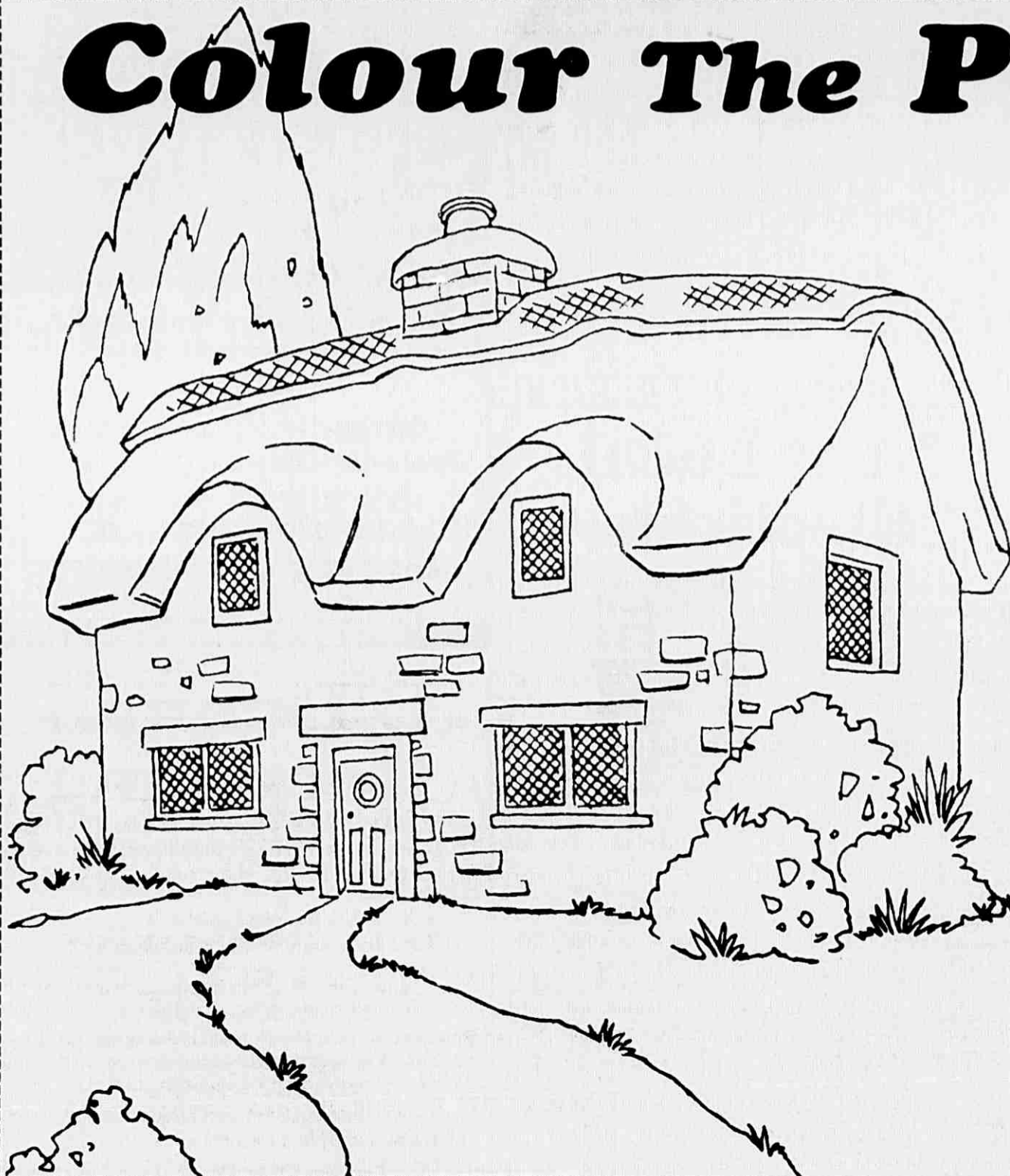
The point at which the seismic wave originates is called the hypocentre, or focus, and is below ground. The epicentre is the point in the Earth's surface which corresponds to the focus.

Where Do Earthquakes Happen?

Most earthquakes occur along the edges of the tectonic plates and around the fault lines - that is, along the breaks of the Earth's Crust. These areas which we call 'seismic zones' are Japan, Central Asia, Southeast Europe and the U.S.A. (especially California).

openness, that the inevitable objection should bare the names of the specific businesses objecting."

He also called on the County Manager, Donal Connolly to "seek by way of further information, the name of the RGDATA objectors when they come in."

While the deadline for submissions is the 27th of November under recent legislation further objections can be lodged by people deemed to be adjacent landowners, he said.

"The 27th of November is an important day, but it won't necessarily be the end of the appeals process."

But, he urged people to consider the benefits, including the financial input for the town and the developments potential to create jobs. "Hopefully, the long drawn

out delay on the Glanbia site is starting to come to an end."

Meanwhile, Town Clerk, Brian White said that as far as it is possible to say at this stage, the development appears to meet An Bord Pleanala requirements. The council's planners, designers and a number of consultants will view the application in detail, before permission is granted, and any submissions will be taken into account, he continued.

"We've sent the plans to the relevant statutory bodies as well and we're awaiting their response. But we're hopeful of making a decision in the eight week period." As of today (Tuesday) no submissions objecting to the development have been lodged with Dungarvan Town Council, Town Clerk Brian White confirmed.

COOKERY CORNER

Glazed ham steaks

Preparation: 20 mins
Cooking: 10-15 mins

A QUICK to make meal that is definitely worth the 'lack' of effort. Ham steaks in a peachy sauce, nice with rice or fresh vegetables.

Ingredients
(Serves 4)

- 4 ham steaks, about 1cm thick
- 1 tspn dry mustard
- 2 tblspns brown sugar
- 2 tblspns honey
- 1/2 tspn ground ginger
- 425g can peach halves.

PREHEAT the grill and remove all of the excess fat from the ham steaks. Slash the remaining fat at 1cm intervals otherwise the edges will curl up while cooking.

Mix together the dry mustard and brown sugar with the honey and ginger and add 2 tblspns of peach syrup from the can of peach halves. You can discard of the rest of the syrup as it is no longer needed.

Place the ham steaks on a grilling rack and cook, basting with the peach, mustard, ginger and honey syrup mixture every few minutes.

Allow at least 5 minutes cooking time for each side of the ham steak - but it is down to personal judgement as to when they are cooked properly.

Serve on a decorative platter garnished with peach halves.



Banana and rum Yoghurt Cream

Preparation: 35 mins
Cooking: n/a

AFTER bananas, the main ingredient is natural yoghurt. Great if you have a sweet tooth but enjoy a meal packed with natural goodness.

Ingredients
(Serves 4-6)

- 350g bananas, mashed
- Juice of a lemon
- 4 tblspns rum
- 100g icing sugar
- 300ml plain yoghurt
- 60ml double cream, lightly whipped
- 50g plain chocolate

Take the banana and mix and mash it in with the lemon juice and rum.

Stir in all of the icing sugar and yoghurt and then gently fold in all of the double cream.

Spoon the mixture into separate serving bowls and chill in a fridge for a minimum of 30 minutes.

For decoration when chilled, remove it from the fridge and use a cheese grater to create chocolate curls on top of the cream yogurt.

Spicy Carrott & Cucumber Relish

Preparation: 10 mins
Cooking: n/a

A GREAT and versatile relish which can be enjoyed with hot winter meals, meats and vegetables - as well as salads and vegetarian dishes.

Ingredients
(Serves 4)

- 1/2 cucumber
 - 1 large peeled carrot
 - Half a red chilli, finely diced
 - 3 tblspns cider vinegar
 - 1 tblspn honey
 - 1 tblspn dark soy sauce
- Using a cheese grater, coarsely grate all of the carrot

and cucumber.

Mix together in a small serving bowl.

Combine the honey with the soy sauce, cider vinegar and half chilli in a small bowl and mix vigorously.

Pour the mixture in with the carrot and cucumber, and stir - making sure it is thoroughly mixed in.

Leave to marinate while you prepare the rest of the meal.

Serve as a side dish or as meats.

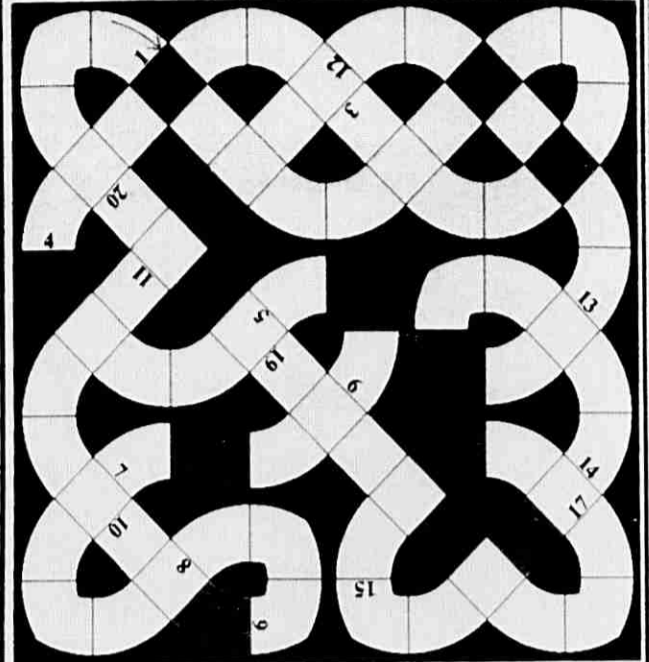

MICHAEL CAVANAGH PRIZES FOR LITERATURE 2003

Michael Cavanagh, writer, journalist and revolutionary was born in Cappoquin in 1822 and died in Washington, D.C., U.S.A. in 1900. He earned distinction as a biographer (Thomas Francis Meagher), poet and writer of fine prose with a deep affection for the Irish language and its literature both ancient and modern. The Michael Cavanagh Society was founded at Cappoquin in May 2000 in order to honour his memory and to raise historical awareness in the town and its hinterland as well as helping to conserve the ancient graveyard at Old Affane.

Membership of the Society, which is open to all, is drawn from Ireland, England, Australia and the United States. In June 2001, Tom Overlander, a Texas lawyer and a relative of Michael Cavanagh donated the beautiful memorial which stands in the Square at Cappoquin. It consists of a bronze bust by the sculptor Eamonn Doherty supported by 3 engraved limestone pillars, which were carved by Brendan Crowe of Thomas St., Dublin.

The Society inaugurated the Michael Cavanagh Prizes in 2002. The entry was of a very high standard with pupils of St. Augustine's School, Dungarvan and the Presentation School, Lismore carrying off the honours. Ciara Lemon won first prize for her poem *The Seed of Greed* and second prize went to Maria O'Connor for another poem *It's All Over*. Third prize was shared by Ashling McGrath, Ailin Walsh and Karen Moynihan for their prose works: *The Hero*, *Hidden Depths* and *Gun-Running on the Waterford Coast in the 1920s*.

The format for the Prizes in 2003 is as follows: There will

be a Junior and Senior section and 2 separate prizes for poetry and prose. The prose may be fiction or non-fiction. The common theme for the prizes will be "cherishing the past" and entries may be in Irish or English. A student may submit entries for both prizes in their section.

Junior section - This will be open to students in the Junior Certificate cycle i.e. aged 12 to 15. There will be a prize of €100 for poetry and €100 for prose with a minimum requirement of 10 lines in poetry and 250 words in prose.

Senior section - This will be open to students in the Senior Cycle i.e. preparing for the Leaving Certificate i.e. 16 to 19 years. There will be a prize of €150 for poetry and €150 for prose with a minimum requirement of 20 lines in poetry and 500 words in prose.

To enter for the prizes a student must be attending a second level school in West Waterford or be normally resident in West Waterford while attending a second level school elsewhere. Entries should be forwarded by the student's teacher and sent to A. Kiely, Michael Cavanagh Prizes, Green St., Cappoquin, Co. Waterford. The closing date for receipt of entries is Friday 31st January 2003 with results due for St. Patrick's Day 2003 and the presentation of the prizes to take place in the summer of 2003.



Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Healthy Herb Is A Border Beauty

A POPULAR bedding plant often paraded in the the borders of royal parks and stately gardens, the salvia, or sage, offers many different varieties.

The best known is the common sage.

Used in Britain's kitchens for centuries, it is hard to imagine Christmas dinner without sage and onion stuffing.

Sage also has a long history of medicinal use and has been credited with curing anything from colds to snakebites.

In fact the name salvia comes from the Latin 'salvare', meaning 'to heal'.

The soft greyish-green leaves are a common sight in kitchens, but it is usually the purple-leaved varieties – still suitable for cooking –

that are used as decorative border plants.

The purple varieties can grow to a considerable size, bushing out and taking over large parts of the border if they are allowed to grow unhindered.

But it looks spectacular when it is covered in its spikes of lavender flowers – which can reach waist height.

Salvia should be given a light trim after flowering to stop older plants showing their woody bases.

It prefers a sunny position with a light sandy soil, where it will remain perfectly hardy and will produce kitchen-worthy produce every year.

For a sage that flowers all the way through to autumn, choose *Salvia uliginosa*.

Its purpley-blue flowers are

at their best during autumn. The flowers will be presented on long stems at eye level and can be kept tidy with a few strategically-placed support sticks.

It likes a moist soil, but not too cold a position in winter.

A border of mixed sages can look stunning although it is important to choose varieties that will work together. To soften the effect of some of the brighter sages, use *salvia argentea*.

It flowers only once every two years and has large leaves covered in thousands of fine silvery hairs when the flowers are absent.

It multiplies best in gravelly areas, but you can cultivate the seeds yourself in pots of gritty compost.

Ideally they should be planted under cover in late

January in an environment of about 18 deg centigrade.

The plant should be quite big by May and should be out in the garden by then.

Alternatively you can plant them in late February, but expect the plants to be a lot smaller.

The advantage of planting later is that the smaller plants will be better for taking cuttings in June.

Plant it with a trowel, giving plenty of room for the roots and firm-in the soil quite hard around them. Water liberally if the soil is dry.

Some varieties such as *S. patens* originate from hot climates and will not survive outdoors during the winter. They should be dug up as soon as their foliage is blackened by frost, usually in early October.

The dead growth should be removed just above the tubers, which can then be stored in trays or boxes packed with dry moss peat to protect them.

Are You Farming Safely ?

The most important aspect of farming is to have a good healthy lifestyle and to preserve the health and safety of farmers themselves and their families. Health and safety should be on top of every farmer's list of priorities. However this is obviously not the case because farm accidents continue to rise and pose frightening statistics. As the well-known farm safety advertisement suggests, most of these accidents are not caused by accident but by carelessness and not having a proper safety routine. Between 20 and 30 people are killed in farm accidents and thousands are injured every year.

Safety statement

By law, every farmer should have a safety statement for his or her farm. Teagasc are now running courses to help farmers to complete their own safety statements. There is a standard procedure for checking out the risks on farms. A few hours spent on this task could protect lives or avoid serious injury and should not be postponed. Farmers who have carried out this check say that it gives themselves and their families a life long awareness of the health and safety features of farming. Unfortunately, most farmers do not carry out a proper safety check on their farm and this is costing lives and thousands of injuries every year. A visit to a cross-section of farmers clearly shows that there are many risks which probably escape the attention of those working on the farm. It may be an unprotected slurry tank or emptying slurry by the removal of slats inside a building. Or it might be unprotected belts and PTO shafts or defective machinery and slippery surfaces. This list is endless which can be seen from a sample checklist which has been carried out on different groups of farms. Farms by their nature have many safety hazards. Contact your Teagasc advisor now and carry out a hazard check and make any necessary changes to reduce or eliminate risks.

Very high fatalities

The Health and Safety Authority (HSA) maintain records of the numbers of fatal accidents that occur in the land based sector each year. The figures are variable from year to year from a high of 35 people killed in 1991 to a low of 13 people killed in 1996 and back up to 25 killed in 1998.

Farms continue to be the most common site for fatal accidents in the workplace with an average of 22 people killed in farm accidents each year. In fact fatalities on farms account for about 38% of fatalities in all workplaces

Another disturbing feature from this table is the number of children killed on Irish farms each year. Over the past 10 years an average of over 5 children are killed on farms each year.

Dangers to health

Dangers from chemicals, disinfectants and herbicides are very often overlooked. All these products should be used strictly in accordance with instructions. Even some seemingly harmless products such as certain types of teat dip/sprays can cause serious allergies and a breakdown of the farmer's immune system. This can result in "unidentified" illnesses which most farmers are not aware of. Teat sprayers which atomise the teat disinfectant can result in farmers inhaling the disinfectant which can be harmful. Small plant type sprayers are a much greater source of danger than the proper commercial type.

Another threat to health of farmers and their families come from drinking un-pasteurised milk. Despite the fact that milk is an excellent food and contains a wonderful array of health giving properties, it can also contain organisms, which pose a danger to human health if not destroyed by pasteurisation. For the same reason, meat has to be properly cooked to destroy any harmful organisms.

Recent official surveys showed that 85% of dairy farmers and their families drink raw unpasteurised milk. Apart from the obvious potential risks from TB, Brucellosis, Leptospirosis, etc of which most farmers are aware there is now a more serious risk from E.Coli 0157. Traditionally raw milk did not pose the same threat to human health. Some new diseases have been introduced into dairy herds over the past few decades and children today haven't built up the same immunity as previous generations.

A survey reported in the Irish Veterinary Journal, found that 44% of farmers who had incidences of abortion in the previous year used their own raw milk.

It is understandable that farmers should want to use their own milk for convenience and economic reason. However, there is indisputable evidence that unless this milk is pasteurised, it is a health risk. There are home pasteurisers available through co-ops which pasteurises milk in 20 to 30 minutes. These pasteurisers have been successfully evaluated in Moorepark and if properly used, can provide you with safe healthy milk from your own farm. If not using a pasteuriser, buy pasteurised milk.

Dispute Unacceptable -DEASY

HALT IN PREMIA PAYMENTS DUE TO INTERNAL DEPARTMENT DISPUTE

IFA Deputy President Ruaidhri Deasy has said, "It is totally unacceptable that premia payments to farmers who have had livestock inspections are held up due to an internal dispute in the Department."

Mr Deasy said "Premia payments constitute a larger proportion of livestock farmers' incomes and any delay is totally unacceptable. Farmers are being held to ransom by these unjust actions. No other sector in society would tolerate having their pay cheques held up. For many livestock farmers these payments come but once a year."

The Deputy President said, "I am demanding that the Department pay out immediately all monies due to farmers. This can be done considering there will be a 20% balancing payment later on and any adjustments necessitated can be made retrospectively."

IFA SAYS USE OF CMMS FOR EXTENSIFICATION PREMIUM - A STEP FORWARD

IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman Derek Deane has said that the decision on of the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to use the CMMS (Cattle Movement Monitoring System) database to establish cattle numbers for Extensification Premium eligibility in 2003 is a step forward and will help reduce the burden of paper work for livestock farmers.

Mr Deane said this move must be the start of using technology and CMMS for all premium applications into the future.

The IFA livestock leader said the Minister's decision to continue using five census dates plays into the hands of the meat factories through negative downward pressure on cattle prices leading up to each census date.

Mr Deane said Minister Walsh must come forward with a solution to prevent 10,000 livestock farmers from a severe 18m income cut as a result of the Special Beef Premium Quota overrun.

The IFA livestock farmers' leader firmly pinned the Beef Premium problem on the bad decision agreed to by Minister Walsh in Luxembourg in June 2001 to cut the Irish National Quota by 47,000 premium rights.

Beef Industry can only go forward on the basis of Viable cattle prices -Dillon

IFA President John Dillon said that "it must be clear to everyone involved in the beef industry, including the Minister for Agriculture, that the industry can only go forward on the basis of profitability for the primary producer and the key to this is the price paid by the meat factories for cattle".

Mr. Dillon was responding to comments yesterday by the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh on this Autumn's dispute between the meat factories and livestock farmers.

Mr. Dillon said "the economic reality is that livestock farmers need a return to profitability. The prices paid by the Irish meat factories are the second lowest in Europe. Irish livestock farmers cannot survive when the meat factories set cattle prices at below the cost of production."

"That is how this Autumn's dispute erupted. Livestock farmers cannot and will not be price takers, if cattle prices are being forced below the cost of production".

Mr. Dillon stressed "Irish livestock farmers will respond to market demands and have shown they are capable of doing so. But they can only stay in business if they get a viable price for cattle. It is up to the meat factories to market our beef and return a viable price."

PARLIAMENTARY ELECTIONS

The landlords were the key players in the electoral game. The voters always did as their landlord bade them and elected the member that he favoured. Furthermore, the voting was public and landlords generally marched their voters to the poll. A list of some County Waterford landlords was drawn up in 1775 noting especially the income of each, which represented how many votes each could deliver. The landlords near Dungarvan on the list are as follows - 1) The Duke of Devonshire, inheritor of the Earl of Corks lands, also had much property in Dungarvan and had an annual income in the county of £8,000 a year. 2) John Odell of Mount Odell in Carriglea outside Dungarvan had £1,200 a year income. 3) John Coghlan Esq. of Carriglea, who called his estate by the English name of Grey Rock had £500 a year income. 4) George Boate Esq. of Duckspool, Abbeyside had £500 a year income.

5) Charles Humble Esq. of Cloncoskeran had £1,000 annually. He was the officer who led the storming of Quebec in 1759 when General Wolfe's army captured the town and wrested the province of Quebec from the French.

LABOURERS

The incomes of these people were in stark contrast to what most people had. Wherever a labourer received payment, he might receive one pound for forty days work. However, labourers very often were paid in kind. They worked seasonally for a farmer to earn the rent of a bit of ground to grow potatoes. Furthermore, Irish landlords were slow to invest in the land that they let at rent or leased to tenants. Generally the tenants made all the improvements on the farms at their own expense and the landlords seldom compensated them.

Late Mary T. Walsh



It is with sadness and regret that we record the passing of Miss Mary T. Walsh, Friary Street, Dungarvan, which took place on Sunday October 20th 2002. Youngest daughter of Hanna (nee Cullinan) and Tommy Walsh, she recently took up residence in Drum Hills Private Nursing Home where she celebrated her 87th birthday in the tender care of Joan O'Leary and staff, prior to which she lived all her life in the house where she was born in 1915 and witnessed many remarkable changes in the world and in her native town.

Mary often recalled watching as a little girl, the Black & Tans parading up Main Street from the barracks in King John's castle grounds to the railway station (where Glanbia shop now stands) as they left the town for the last time. Curfew was a word which held huge significance

for her, as during the occupation and emergency it had to be strictly observed and obeyed. She remembered food and fuel rationing and the distinct flavour of slow-cooked meat over a barrel of smouldering sawdust in the back yard.

A gifted knitter, for years Mary made beautiful hand-crafted jumpers and cardigans sporting dolls, ducks, teddy bears, rabbits and other child-centred animals and vehicles for the annual Augustinian Foreign Missions Sales of Work in the Friary Hall. A woman of deep religious faith she was grateful when her turquoise rosary was miraculously found and returned to her after less than a week in 1999. The beads, a First Communion gift from her Godmother, had been loved and cherished by her all the days of her life and she had lost them in the vicinity of the Friary Church.

A draper's assistant, she served her time in Lawn's of Grattan Square and worked in Cummins' Outfitters & Drapers in O'Connell Street, and later in the Capitol Cleaners. Past pupils of Colhiste Muire and the Mercy Convent will fondly remember Youla, Mary's little white pet poodle sitting in the dining room window. A deft and organised woman, Mary was equipped with keen insight and a rapier wit.

In her lifetime the town both in population and size expanded enormously and Davitt's Quay underwent a huge transformation from being a busy port with stone granaries, warehouses, and

cargo ships exporting timber and grain and importing coal, fertiliser and other goods from overseas. She often spoke of looking out the upstairs windows of her Uncle Doolan's thriving pub Walsh's The Quay House (now the Anchor), towards Abbeyside and seeing the harbour so full of boats that one could walk across to The Village from deck to deck, and of the beautiful cobbled yard to the rear where ponies and traps were stabled while their owners from the country attended to business in the town; and she was chuffed recently when the three-masted schooner The Kathleen & May docked for a weekend return visit.

On Sunday evening relatives and friends gathered to recite the Rosary in Kiely's Funeral Home, where her body reposed. Following Rosary and prayers by Canon O'Connor on Monday, her remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church. On Tuesday the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass was offered by Canon O'Connor assisted by Canon O'Mahoney. The Lessons, Prayers of the Faithful and Offertory Presentation were shared by nephew Thomas Walsh, nieces Joan Clancy and Patricia Langan, grand-niece Ciara Langan, grand-nephews Oisín and Shane Langan and Neil Walsh. Extended family members Hugh O' Carroll and Brid Nielsen played beautiful music. Following Final Prayers, Mary was laid to rest in the Walsh family plot in the adjoining cemetery.

Predeceased by her brother Paddy, sisters Nora and Cora (Knox), brother-in-law Jack Alexander Knox, sister-in-law Babs Walsh (nee Devine), she is survived by her nephew Thomas Walsh, nieces Joan Clancy and Patricia Langan, grandnephews Brian and Neil Walsh, Shane and Oisín Langan, grand-nieces Blawin, Rayleen and Rosemary Clancy, Ciara Langan, great-grand niece Jane Maher Langan, nephew-in-law Pat, niece-in-law Katie, and a wide circle of relatives, friends and kind neighbours.

Sarah and Bernard Boras Celebrate Birth Of Baby Daughter

The birth of a baby daughter, Mary Celine on October 20th in Waterford Regional Hospital to Sarah and Bernard Boras of Lismore was announced yesterday.

Sarah Boras, formerly Sarah Scott, has strong family links with Lismore. She is grand-daughter of Lady Scott (formerly Gertrude Villiers Stuart of Dromana) an outstanding watercolour artist who had many exhibitions in the UK, India and Ireland; and daughter of the late Michael, and, Cherry Scott of Dar El Quas, Tangier, Morocco. They have recently settled in Lismore but they keep on their family home in Bosnia-Herzegovina, Bernard Boras's homeland.

They have one other daughter seven years old, Leonie, who attends the local school in Lismore. Sarah and Bernard Boras met one another whilst working on refugee relief in Bosnia during the war. Bernard rescued many fellow Croatians, clandestinely, out of Sarajevo when it was under siege by the Serbs.

In her relief work, Sarah was following on in the family tradition. Her grandmother, Gertrude Villiers-Stuart, worked in the East End of London, amongst the poor, then later married the Chief Justice of Bombay, Sir Basil Scott. Her mother, Cherry Scott, worked for Save the Children Fund in North Africa, and, earlier in Austria, Hungary, and Yugoslavia, during the Hungarian Revolution for Aid To Hungary.

Sadly a branch of the Villiers Stuarts, cousin to Sarah Boras and her twin sister Natasha Scott, is forced to auction the famous Villiers-Stuart archives which span over many centuries of Anglo-Irish history.

The memorial of Lismore, in front of the former Court House, was erected by the poor of Lismore in memory of the much-loved Ambrose Power of Glencairn, Archdeacon of Lismore Cathedral for over 40 years, and the great grandfather of Sarah Boras. His daughter Mary Power married Henry Villiers-Stuart MP, who fought on the issue of Catholic Emancipation, in Waterford, against Lord Beresford and won.

Frightening Experience For Public Over Halloween

Halloween celebrations in Lismore turned into a frightening experience, as roaming gangs engaged in intimidating behaviour, and left people too afraid to walk back to their homes.

Speaking at a recent meeting of Lismore Town Council, Cllr. John Madden said the gangs of youths had brought embarrassment onto the town and shame onto themselves.

The gangs, "who were roaming around the streets" on Halloween night defaced property in the town and acted "totally unacceptably" according to the councillor.

They also intimidated people by their behaviour with many having to be driven home as they were left too afraid to walk through the town.

The whole incident, Cllr. Madden went on to say, left him absolutely "appalled and disgusted".

"They shamed themselves, they embarrassed their families and they embarrassed the town of Lismore by their actions", he said.

Mayor of Lismore, Cllr. John Campion, said he was conscious of the town's image but added that he was "aware some eggs were thrown earlier in the day".

"We as adults should take some responsibility", he said.

He suggested that a supervised event, such as a bonfire, should be held in a controlled and organised environment, for the youth of the area.

"It is something that we're going to have to look at in the future," he said.

Labour Councillor Mark Khan agreed that a supervised event on Halloween night was necessary, but went on to say, that nobody could be happy with the defacement of property. "That kind of behaviour cannot be condoned."

Lismore Draft Landuse Study

The structured development of Lismore together with the conservation of its historic buildings, appear to be safeguarded under the town's landuse study.

Cllr. John Heneghan, said this plan was far superior to ones in the past and thanked Waterford County Council for consulting them from the beginning.

He believed in the past mistakes were made in building some houses and said a close eye will need to be kept on any major developments, to ensure they stick to the terms of their applications.

Cllr. Bernard Leddy also said it was important that on this occasion the town council had an input from the very beginning unlike previous plans.

However, he said, he had reservations about one area of residential zoning in a field behind the convent, an area prominent from the Cappoquin approach road.

Cllr. Leddy said he would not like to see the same thing happening in Lismore as occurred in Ardmore, where houses were built on the brow of the hill.

According to Cllr. Mark Khan, the plan re-enforces safeguards for the conservation of the town's character.

Cllr. Khan said hostel accommodation should be promoted in the plan, to "attract a different end of the market", and said renewable energy, wind turbines, should also be promoted.

The plan is on public display until early next month in Lismore Town Council offices and the library.

The Fianna Fail councillor suggested writing a letter expressing their condolences to Lismore Town Council in New South Wales, Australia.

Cllr. Leddy said the bombing in Bali caused futile loss of life and resulted in the suffering of many Australians.

While he wasn't aware at the time of the meeting whether people in Lismore NSW had died in the tragedy, he said the whole of Australia was united in grief after the bombing.

"I think we should share our grief with them".

Tribute Proposed For Famous Writer

The death of Richard Harris, recently, has sparked renewed efforts to honour the achievements of Lismore's most famous living writer/journalist, Derval Murphy.

Cllr. Bernard Leddy suggested Lismore Town Council pay tribute to the work of the world renowned travel writer, who "has brought the name of Lismore to millions of people around the world."

He believed that Limerick City Council will forever regret not awarding actor Richard Harris with the freedom of the city, and said Lismore should not let too much time pass.

A proposal was put forward before to honour Derval, but Cllr. Leddy said that nothing came of it.

Cllr. Davy Whelan said he had contacted her when the proposal was first made, and she was "willing to go along with whatever we planned". But, he said, there was no more movement on the issue.

Fire Station Site Identified

The prospect of a new fire station for the town may have moved "onto the first wrung of the ladder", as a site has been identified.

But, representations to the Minister for the Environment, Martin Cullen, on the issue, resulted in an insulting reply, according to one councillor.

Describing the letter variously as "rubbish", "gobbledygook" and an "insult", Cllr. John Heneghan said the Minister's failure to provide funding to replace the dilapidated fire station was compounded by the letter.

According to the councillor, in the letter, the Minister talks about progress on Ardmore, Tramore and funding for an extension to Cappoquin.

"I'm very happy for them if they are getting that, but what I'm concerned about is the state of Lismore Fire Station."

However, Cllr. Bernard Leddy, who turned to Minister Cullen for assistance when he defected from Labour to Fianna Fail, said funding was provided by way of priorities, ranked by Waterford County Council in order of needs.

"Has the priority within Waterford County Council on Lismore changed", he asked. "It's my understanding that Lismore had been ranked at the bottom

of the list."

Cllr. Heneghan responded that Minister is the "man who sends out the checks" but he had failed to deliver for the town.

Referring to an election leaflet sent to homes throughout Waterford, Cllr. Heneghan said: "that map Martin Cullen sent around the county with ticks on every area saying delivered, delivered, delivered; well he can remove the one from here, because he has failed to deliver for Lismore."

Cllr. Jimmy O'Gorman said that he believed the councillors should stand together "as a town council and leave party politics behind".

Town Clerk, Eric Flynn, who also works for the fire service, said the matter was now with the Chief Fire Officer, Tony McCarthy, and the County Manager Donal Connolly.

A site has been identified which is the "first wrung up the ladder" but still has to be approved by Mr. Connolly, according to the Town Clerk.

Cllr. O'Gorman said under the draft Lismore Development Plan, the site planned is in a zoning that will allow for houses. He asked would a buffer be necessary around the station.

Director of Services, John O'Flynn replied that a buffer would be required and that may result in the loss of a dozen or so houses destined for the site.

He claimed that while this form of accommodation must be registered some people are taking people in for a "quick buck" resulting in "grossly overcrowded living conditions."

He said that the accommodation must be controlled and managed up to the proper standards.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

My husband and I have been asked to rent out a room in our house to a friend of mine. Will the income from the rent be taxable?

ANSWER

Under the Rent a Room Relief scheme, where you rent a room (or rooms) in your principal private residence and the gross rent received, including sums arising for food, laundry or similar goods and services, does not exceed 7,620 euro (5,587 euro, £4,400) for the tax year 2001 this income will be exempt from income tax. Where more than one individual is entitled to the rent, the exemption limit is divided between the individuals concerned.

If your room rental comes within the scheme it does not affect your entitlement to mortgage interest relief or to capital gains tax exemption on selling your home.

This rental income is not liable to PRSI or the 2% Health Contribution but it must be included on your annual income tax return.

WHEN DOES CREDIT BECOME DEBT?

There are many debates regarding the above question, however, a simple explanation may be "when the credit cannot be paid". All too often it is assumed that when a person is in debt they have been reckless or bad managers.

The truth of it may be that now all credit commitments are by choice. Many daily services are supplied on credit such as mortgage, phone, gas, electricity, car etc. Budgeting for these services is very important as they arise on a regular basis and need to be planned for.

Whether you are living on a social welfare payment, low wage or on a large salary, a budget is necessary to maintain financial control, and to avoid debt. In drawing up a budget you can see where your money is going so that choices can be made about future spending. It can also give you an idea on how to repay those debts you may already have. In order to budget effectively, it is necessary to gather information about current spending. What is the usual amount of your ESB bill?, when is your TV licence, car insurance, car tax, mortgage due - What about Christmas, Confirmation or Communion Days. It may be a good idea to write down information about your budget over a few days. This will help to give you a clearer picture and enable you to leave nothing out.

Once you have your budget drawn up you can see where your money is going. Perhaps in your case you have more going out than coming in. Mark off items in your budget that cannot be changed so as to differentiate them from non-essential items. You may think that all your spending is essential but try to imagine for a few minutes the prospect of losing a vital service i.e. electricity supply or even your home if you do not cut back on your spending. Do not cut back your budget to the bone but set yourself realistic targets.

A budget is an evolving item so try not to feel that it is set in stone. If your circumstances change for better or worse be sure to adjust it!!

An updated history of Cappoquin Rowing Club has been written by Brendan Kiely. The book "The Old Dark Blue" was launched at The Boathouse Rowing Club recently by club patron, Sir Richard Keane. The publication builds on the original history by distinguished photojournalist, Tom Tobin and includes most of Tobin's original photographs plus some that are now being published for the first time. These will be of great interest to anyone who has visited the Tom Tobin exhibition at Dungarvan Museum.

The book is laid out in an anthology format and covers a wide range of subjects including Lismore Regatta, cock fighting, cot racing, a spectacular car crash, a murder in Hollywood and of course, the rowing ups and downs of a small club over 140 years.

It tells the stories of all those involved and does not neglect the role of the boathouse as a prime night spot in the days of the mineral bar. Speaking at the launch party, former IARU President, Michael Johnson said that down through the years, rowing has become an important part of the community which exists. He said this was certainly the case in Cappoquin.

Similar sentiments were expressed by former club member, John Walsh who said he was delighted to see people from all corners of Ireland present for the launch. He also paid tribute to Brendan Kiely for his efforts in updating the book.

"You couldn't have found a better person to compile an updated history of the club. Brendan set about the job with enthusiasm and I'm sure Cappoquin will be grateful to him for his efforts", said Mr. Walsh. In researching the book, Brendan said he had learnt the importance of leadership in the Cappoquin club spanning eight generations and cited the late Jim Brady and Dan Murray as two of the club's greatest leaders. The ceremonies concluded with Sir Richard Keane stepping up to officially launch the book and again paying tribute to its author.

"A book like this is great to have because otherwise the club's colourful history would be forgotten. Rowing is a wonderful amateur sport and its fantastic to see it still going strong here in Cappoquin," he said.

Rheumatoid Arthritis

What is Rheumatoid Arthritis?

Rheumatoid arthritis involves inflammation in the lining of the joint and/or other internal organs. Rheumatoid arthritis affects many different joints. It can be chronic, which means it lasts a long time, and can be a disease of flare-ups and remissions. It is a systemic disease that affects the entire body and is one of the most common forms of arthritis. It is characterized by the inflammation of the membrane lining the joint, which causes pain, stiffness, warmth, redness and swelling. The inflamed joint lining can invade and damage bone and cartilage. Inflammatory cells release enzymes that may digest bone and cartilage. The involved joint can lose its shape and alignment, resulting in pain and loss of movement. The onset of Rheumatoid arthritis is usually middle age, but it can affect young people, and it affects women more than men.

What are the Symptoms?

Symptoms include inflammation of joints, swelling, difficulty moving and pain. Other symptoms include:

- Σ Loss of appetite
- Σ Fever
- Σ Loss of energy
- Σ Anemia
- Σ Sometimes lumps of tissue under the skin
- Σ Can affect other parts of the body

What Causes it?

The cause of rheumatoid arthritis is not yet known, except that it is an autoimmune disease. The body's natural immune system does not operate as it should, resulting in the immune system attacking healthy joint tissue and causing inflammation and subsequently joint damage.

How is it Diagnosed?

It is important to diagnose it early because with the use of disease-modifying drugs, the condition can be controlled in many cases. Physicians diagnose Rheumatoid Arthritis based on the overall pattern of symptoms, medical history, physical exam, X-rays and lab tests including a test for rheumatoid factor. Rheumatoid factor is an antibody found in the blood, but the presence or absence of rheumatoid factor does not indicate that one has rheumatoid arthritis.

Treatment Options

Effective medication treatments exist for rheumatoid arthritis. Early treatment is critical; the treatment focuses on relieving pain, reducing inflammation, stopping or slowing joint damage, and improving patient function and well-being. In addition to medication, treatment most often involves some combination of exercise, rest, joint protection, and physical and occupational therapy. Surgery is available for joints that are damaged and painful. If you require any further information regarding Rheumatoid Arthritis, please contact this office. SIR HUBERT DE LA POER GOUGH

He was born at Gurteen in 1870 and educated at Eton and Sandhurst. Gough entered the British army and was commissioned in 1889. He saw service in India and also in the Boar War. In 1914 he returned to Ireland where he acted as brigadier-general commanding the 3rd Cavalry Brigade at the Curragh. The British army intended to send soldiers from the Curragh to Ulster in 1914 to disarm the UVF. However, Gough along with fifty seven other officers determined to resign rather than take part in this military operation. This became known as the 'Curragh mutiny'. The British government became very alarmed at the implications of this revolt and decided against the action. Gough was active in the First World War where he was promoted to lieutenant general. However in 1918 he was replaced and sent home. He retired in 1922. Gough died on 18 March 1963.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

On our trip down memory lane this week we recall what were for many the halcyon days of Underage Hurling in the town of Dungarvan. We take a glance back in time at the C.B.S. Street Leagues that were organised on an annual basis by the Christian Brothers. The Street Leagues provided in many cases, an opportunity for youngsters to pull on a jersey and boots for the first time, and do battle not just for your club but for the very Street in which you lived. We reproduce here an article that was first pub-

lished back in August 1994, on the occasion of the official opening of our playing grounds and clubhouse at Clogherane.

"DUNGARVAN HURLING ALL-IRELANDS—THE STREET LEAGUES"

Have no doubt it, but the C.B.S. Street League final of 1959 meant as much to the young lads that played in them as did the All-Ireland Senior Hurling Final of the same year to the Waterford hurlers that contested the McCarthy Cup with the black and amber of Kilkenny. The Street Leagues were right for their time. They were organised by the Christian Brothers who unquestionably did tremendous work for the promotion of the hurling locally. In those days of yore, youngsters did not have the same range of leisure activities to choose from as do today's youth, and so this attention to the juveniles of the locality attracted keen interest and the Street Leagues took on an importance all of their own.

THE STREETS

Before the new Primary School was built in 1965 and more estates sprung up around the town, the contenders for The Street Leagues were Caseyville, Mitchell Street, Shandon, Loch Mor and The Square.

CASEYVILLE

Caseyville was a highly populated area youthwise in the 1950's and 60's and this was seen to good effect many times in The Street Leagues. For instance in 1959 they won the Under 10 and Under 14 leagues. Another occasion when Caseyville proved successful was in 1964 when they won the Paddy Lynch cup for the first time captained by Eddie Sheehan. The other members of this team which won the 5th and 6th Class League were; Pat McGrath

(R.I.P.), Sean O'Donnell, Richard McAllister, Christy Power, John Egan, Michael Daly, Francis Woods, Noel Fraher, Billy Kelly, David Dwyer (R.I.P.), Denis Moynihan, Paddy Tobin, Anselm Hayes, Seanie Flynn, Liam Egan, Patsy Hackett, Noel Sheehan and Michael Flynn. Thus many Street League Medals found their way to Caseyville, but it had to endure its most disappointing experience of all, when in 1966 it was involved in all three.

THE MITCHELLS

Drawn from Mitchell Street, Richard Terrace and adjacent streets such as Keating St, St. Thomas' Tce, St Brigid's Tce, Fitzgerald's Tce, The Mitchell's were dominant over a period of time and were the first winners of the Lynch Cup in 1962, with Michael Donnelly as captain. They went on to retain their title in 1963 with Connie Murphy at the helm, and that 1963 team were Pat Power, Michael Clancy, Aidan Barron, Brian Steele, John Clancy, Joe Cleary, Philip Duggan, Martin Sandford, Michael Donoghue, Nicky Kiely, Buddy Power, John Gough, Liam Sandford, Vinny O'Mahony, David Kiely, Michael Dunford, Michael Flynn, Liam Duggan and Jim Houlihan.

SHANDON, LOCH MOR AND THE SQUARE

Shandon consisted of those attending the school from the country areas plus O'Connell Street and Shandon itself. Shandon was always a team to be respected despite not having a great number to choose from. Shandon was well served over the years by such as the Rior-dans, the Sheridans, Lynchs, Moores, Dees, Meehans, Drummys, Flynns of Colligan, The Hickeys of Kilgobinet and many more.

Loch Mor and The Square

were not always a constant force in The Street Leagues, but Loch Mor gave one of its finest displays when winning the 1st and 2nd Class Final in 1966, while The Square often stopped more fancied opponents from reaching the final.

THE YEAR OF THE THREES

1966 will always be remembered by many as the year of the threes, Galway won their third All-Ireland Senior Football title in a row, Geoff Hurst scored three goals for England in The World Cup Final at Wembley and the mighty Caseyville were beaten in all three finals of The C.B.S. Street Leagues. Local-born businessman, John A. Mulcahy, donated sets of playing gear, boots and hurleys for the winners of each of the three finals. Thus the results were heart-breaking for the Caseyville boys who have as proud a record as anyone, in The Street Leagues.

Loch Mor won, in the blue and white jerseys, in the 1st and 2nd Class Final. The Mitchell's were victorious in the red and white jerseys, in the 3rd and 4th Class Final and in the highlight of the evening, Shandon, captained by Larry Sheridan, in the blue and gold jerseys (often referred to as the Tipp. Jerseys) won the 5th and 6th Class Final after a great match.

CHANGING TIMES

As in many sports's clubs and organisations, The Street Leagues fell on lean times and were not organised from 1969 to 1976. However, the arrival of Br. Seamus Whelan gave a new impetus to Primary School Hurling at the C.B.S. and the leagues enjoyed a new run from 1976 to 1984. The streets then taking part gives us an idea of the geographical changes in the Dungarvan area. Childers Estate and Western Bay/Springfield, which were built on land at Quanns and

The Spring respectively, gave the leagues a new look and they competed both with and against one another, depending on their yearly numbers. "The Country", formerly assisting Shandon, paraded teams of its own, with little difficulty. The "old" streets experienced mixed fortunes. The Mitchell's however survived, while Congress Villas had a large young population and they enjoyed many successes, while Caseyville once more won the Paddy Lynch cup in 1976, but their numbers dwindled thereafter.

LE DEANAI

Since 1984, hurling leagues in The Primary School are organised on an open team basis rather than as street leagues. The departure of the Christian Brothers from Dungarvan did not see a decline in hurling as some people predicted for a number of years beforehand. This is mainly due to the interest and the efforts of Pat Curran in the primary school, and Pat Collins at Secondary level. Both have worked hard for a good number of years, and many of the recent successes, at under-age level, can be accredited to them. The Dungarvan Club is also very fortunate in having a very active, and well organised, under-age committee, who foster strong, practical links with the local schools, while the pitches at Clogherane are a mecca for all age groups.

FOR THE HISTORY BOOKS?

Are The Street Leagues destined for the history books forever? Who knows what the future may bring, but the recent St Joseph's Primary School Hurling Leagues, while not matching The Street Leagues of olden times in atmosphere, still achieved the same aim. The promotion and nurturing of the ancient game of hurling, amongst the youngsters of Dungarvan!

The same two clubs have motions that are also very much alike and relating to the running of the under 21 championships.

Tallow club are asking that a Master fixtures plan be produced the beginning of the season by the County board.

The Cappoquin/Affane motions relate in the main, to the formula for running the championship.

They outlined in minute detail a plan for the running of special junior hurling championship. This is a proposal which requires further examination before commenting on it.

The same club go into great detail too, in explaining their proposals for the minor gradings. I will get back to these matters before the Convention.

CORRECTION

It seems that we all got it wrong last week about the formula for the Munster hurling championship 2003.

According to the formula in operation this year we understood that every county was guaranteed two games in the senior championships.

Following my announcement last week that if Waterford defeated Kerry and subsequently lost to Limerick, that we would be gone for the season. In this way it was a bad draw for us.

Following the newspaper version of the rule, Nicky Brennan who I suppose could be described as the chief architect of the formula, it was confirmed that we had misinterpreted the rule and that Waterford after beating Kerry? subsequently losing to Limerick, will in fact proceed through the 'Qualifier'. Last year there were five teams in Munster and now with Kerry in, there are six teams.

So at the end of the matter, this is a splendid draw for Waterford as we are likely to have more chances than we had expected...

The team news is that the panel are already back in training and they had a session under lights at the Clashmore grounds on Wednesday night last. The official panel has not been announced but now with the senior championships as well as most of the others completed, it must be 'make your mind up time' for the selectors.

An interesting little piece about the selectors is that Colm Bonner (who is a Waterford selectors will have his brother Conal Bonner plotting our downfall when he assumes the role of selector/coach of the Kerry senior hurling team, whom we play in the first round (probably in Walsh Park).

As of now our prime objective must be to beat Kerry. Nothing else matters or counts at this stage. Our supporters and I'm sure that the public at large believe that for the Munster champions, Kerry will be a 'push over'. We thought like that in 1993 when we had them in Walsh Park when they beat us by 4-13 to 3-13 and embarrassed us beyond description (maybe like Dublin did in the national league this year).

I know that it is a very long way off, but there should be no question about us losing to Kerry in round one next year. If, as Munster champions, we are not good enough to overcome, Kerry we should withdraw and let the other counties get on with the championships.

It will be a contest between first timers, as the new Tipperary champions are the winners in the Premier county for their first time and the Waterford champions, Mount Sion who have a national record of 32 county titles under their belts after defeating the reigning county and Munster club hurling champions, Ballygunner here last month.

On Sunday night last a keen Tipperary supporter told me to 'write' this one up as a match between Mount Sion and the Mullinahone parish, because that is what it is going to be.

On Sunday only the dogs and cats will be left behind up there as the excited followers come here in their thousands believing that they can make history on successive Sundays by qualifying as first time county champions on one Sunday and qualifying for the prestigious Munster club final on the next Sunday. It would be a unique achievement,

but will it happen ??.

Mount Sion's coach/ trainer Jim Green (who holds a Munster Club medal) believes that the euphoria that has swamped the new Tipp. champions over the past few days will end here on Sunday.

He has already declared to all-comers that Mount Sion are geared to go the distance this time. I suppose if we did not know of Mount Sions record and present high standards we would regard this declaration of supreme confidence, as nothing more than boastful chatter

The Waterford county champions have reason for feeling that they are there with a chance of qualifying for their second Munster Club final since losing to Sixmile-bridge (2-17 to 3-8) in the 2000 final, but they would indeed be foolish to expect that their passage to the final will be achieved without having to survive an almighty battle against the Eoin Kelly and John Leahy and company led Mullinahone.

Having taken care of Adare, Mount Sion showed that they are in top form for this club championship, but I for one do not feel over enthusiastic about their prospects despite having a star studded line out which will include Ken McGrath, Eoin Kelly, Brian Flannery Tony Browne, recovering from an injury picked up against Adare, Eoin McGrath, Brian Greene, goal scorer Sean Ryan, etc.

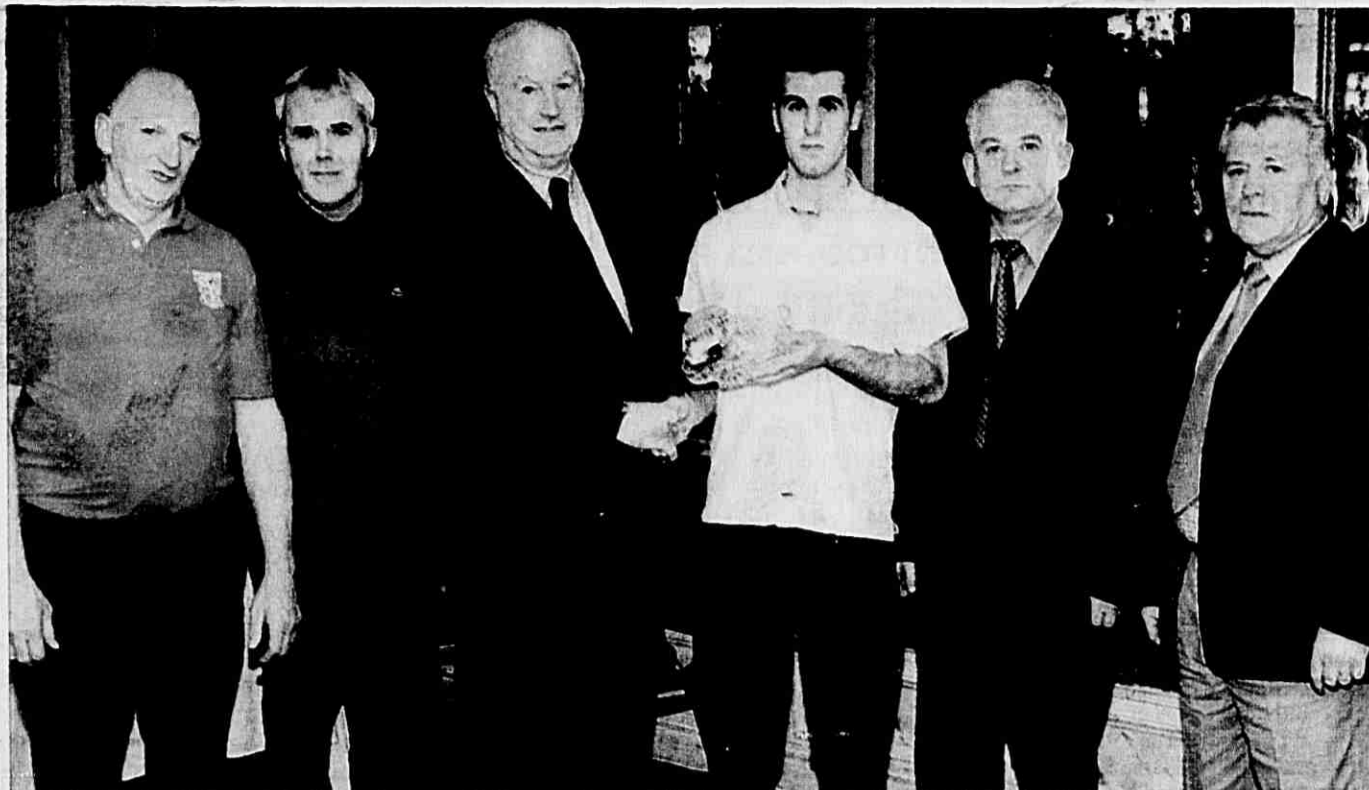
STRADBALLY V. NA DEISE

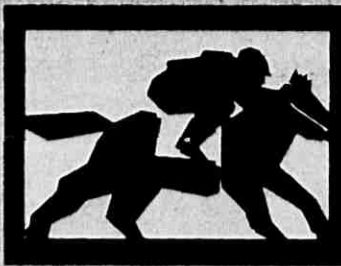

Dungarvan trainer John Kiely stated last week that the mare Liss A Pharaohigh who ran such a promising race behind Limestone Lad at Navan will remain over hurdles for the time being. It must be tempting to try this lady over fences but there are plenty of nice races around for the Dungarvan mare who appears best suited to a two and a half mile trip.

MELBOURNE CUP SUCCESS FOR MEDIA PUZZLE

The Michael Smurfit owned and Dermot Weld trained Media Puzzle took on the Aussies in their own back yard at Flemington last Wednesday as he powered clear in similar fashion to the other Weld winner Vintage Crop back in 1993 to a clear cut victory. Media Puzzle is a five year old and his four year old stable mate Vinnie Roe ran a fine race to finish in fourth spot. Dermot Weld hinted at the post race press interview that Vinnie Roe would return down under to contest next years event. These were two great performances by thoroughbreds who were forced to travel over 12,000 miles.

It was a poignant victory for the winning jockey Damain Oliver. His brother Jason was killed in a fall the previous week in Perth while his father Ray also suffered a similar fate back in the 1970's.

the Ferdy Murphy inquiry but one person who will be keeping a close eye on proceedings is East Cork amateur rider Davy Russell. Davy plans to turn professional in the near future and has landed the plum job of replacing the now retired Adrian Maguire as number one jockey to the Ferdy Murphy yard. One man disappointed by this move im sure is JP (John Paul) McNamara who proved a very capable understudy to Adrian Maguire. Ferdy Murphy stated that JP was still short of experience and that is the main reason he didn't get the job as number one rider in the yard. Come off it now Ferdy JP has ridden winners against all the top professionals in England for the past two years whereas Davy Russell has proven his mettle on the Point To Point fields and bumper races in Ireland. Did you know that trainer Dermot Weld is the only European trainer to have ever won the Melbourne Cup in Australia. While the victory of Media Puzzle has projected Dermot Weld on to the world platform one should not forget the numerous winners he sent out this year on home soil. His runners won over Euro 2 Million in prizemoney. He saddled 550 horses this year 64 of which were winners while 61 came second and 68 were third. His strike rate for having runners in the first three was an impressive 35%.

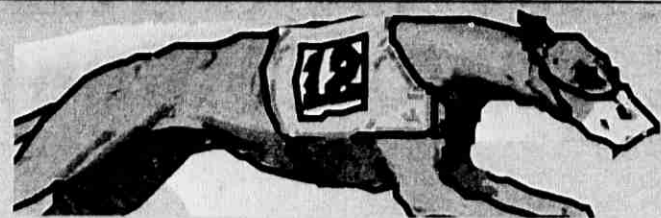

Savana Razor Drew First Blood

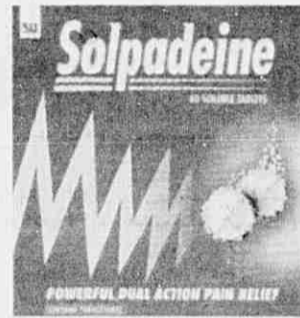


