Council Looking At Dungarvan As Transient Site Option

The Dungarvan area is being looked at as a location for a transient halting site along with areas in the west and east of the county, Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Town Council heard. But, County Manager, Donal Connolly was told to look outside the urban area rather "than have this prospect visited" upon the town.

Raising the issue, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan detailed a number of illegal traveller encampments, which have continued almost unchecked, despite recent government legislation giving power to local authorities to clamp down on roadside camps.

Recently travellers have camped on the grounds of Abbeyside church, another group near Kilrush, while in a further instance, the Fine

Gael councillor said a group of travellers were moved on from the Advance factory grounds, but have moved back there again.

Cllr Geoghegan said he wasn't surprised that a tenant could not be secured for the factory when this is happening and said the council is "pussy footing" around the issue.

"The laws don't seem to be operated here", Cllr. Geoghegan said.

However, County Manager, Donal Connolly said the law dictates that accommodation must be available for transients before they can be enforced. In Dungarvan's case, he said, the council's Shandon halting site is full and transients cannot be accommodated there.

He said Waterford County Council is looking at three

sites around the county for a transient site; one in the west of county, one in the Dungarvan area and another in the east of the county, with the eventual recommendation for the site to be put before a meeting of the traveller accommodation subcommittee, Mr. Connolly said.

However, agreement on a location, satisfying both the settled community and the traveller community, has proven a difficulty.

"Obviously many in the settled community would be happier if this is sited in a remote area. But we have to satisfy both sides, and look

Frustration And Concern Over School Funding Delays

Significant delays are now hitting a number of school building projects throughout Waterford, although many of the projects were placed on a pre-election building programme list.

One such school, Knockanore NS, was hopeful of an early start to necessary refurbishment work to the fifty-seven year old structure, and the provision of additional permanent accommodation. But, last month the Department of Education, said this work will not now be carried

out in the "foreseeable future".

The decision has caused considerable upset, and left the schools plans for its future development in limbo, Principal, Eleanor Ronayne said.

It also means that teachers in the Knockanore National School building will continue working in overcrowded conditions, which currently sees the schools full-time resource teacher working from the staff room, and the schools learning support teacher and secretary sharing

one very small room.

Necessary facilities are also lacking, with no general-purpose room, library, learning support room or even a proper storage facility for staff and the 84 pupils attending the school, Ms. Ronayne said.

Less than six months ago, these problems looked like they were about to be assigned to the past.

The Board of Management entered the lengthy application and approval process three years ago and applied

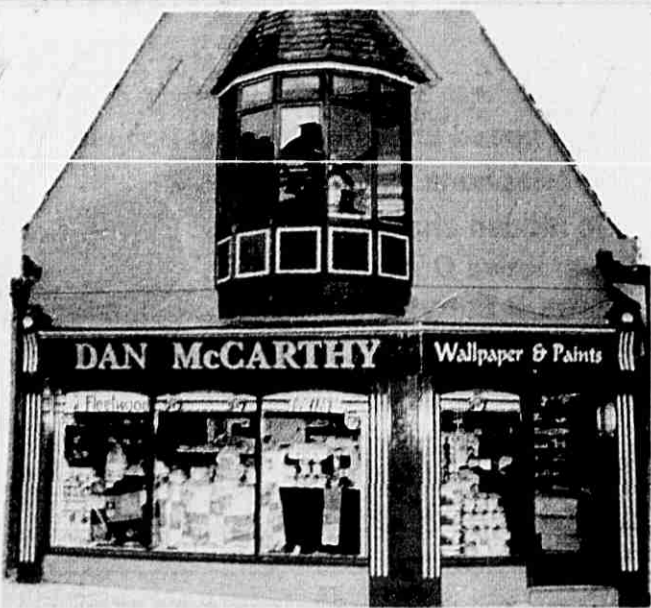

Affane Graveyard Receives Funding Towards Up-keep

A committee overseeing work on the historic graveyard at Affane, is to receive funding towards the cost of its improvement and maintenance.

Deputy John Deasy, who has backed the clean-up of the graveyard and pushed for the funding, was informed that the council is prepared to pay a grant to the sum of €1,500.

The funding follows on from the efforts of Fr. Hubbard, Tom Fitzgerald and the late Michael Byrne, who undertook the task of clearing the graveyard largely unaided for many years. However, the graveyard has again become overgrown and the funding will go towards its improvement, subject to what the council feels is the satisfactory completion of the work.

The Council's Strategic Policy Committee, which Deputy Deasy chaired, introduced a policy on the maintenance of graveyards earlier this year allowing for the funding.

He said: "It's nice to see that policy implemented. The whole idea behind it is that the worst affected graveyards will be tended to."

Minister Examining More Information On Fire Stations

Minister Martin Cullen is examining information Waterford County Council has sent to his Department on Lismore and Ardmore Fire Stations after being heavily criticised in two local authorities and in the Dail itself.

According to Deputy Deasy, who raised the matter in the Dail, Minister Cullen an-

nounced the provision of a Fire Station for Ardmore in a local newspaper in 2001. However, the October meeting of Waterford County Council learned that a Fire Station was only now "being considered" for inclusion in the Fire Services Capital Programme.

A number of Lismore Town Councillors also criticised the

scant details provided on the future of Lismore's Fire Station.

Minister Cullen in a written reply to Deputy Deasy said that further correspondence in relation to the fire service has been submitted to his Department by Waterford County Council on November 1 and is at present under examination.

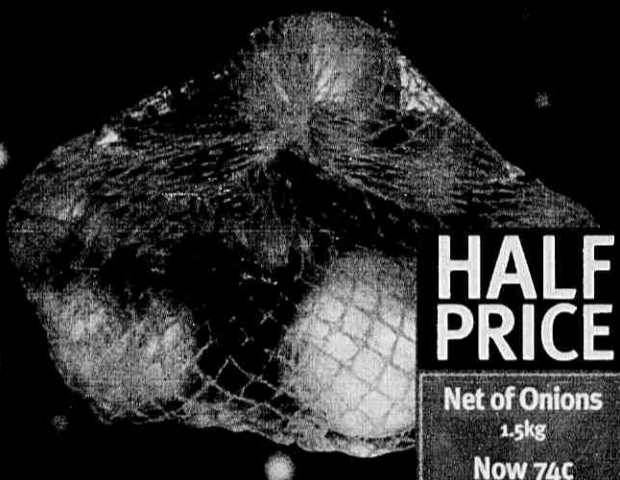

Intense Lobbying For Government Department

Dungarvan is one of 134 towns and cities lobbying for a decentralised Government Department or agency, with two or three submissions arriving in the Department of Finance each week.

The Government has come under renewed pressure to decentralise its offices and transfer 10,000 public service jobs to provincial locations. But, although the programme for decentralisation was announced three years ago, the locations for a department have not yet been confirmed.

Intense lobbying for the lucrative departments, expected to significantly boost the economy of the towns and cities selected, has seen a number of towns join the race with some local authorities hiring consultants to present their cases. In Cork alone, a total of 18 towns have submitted applications for a department.

Dungarvan Town Council has identified a location for a Government department on the Glanbia site, and County Manager, Donal Connolly reaffirmed the council's commitment to push for a department at a recent local authority meeting.

€1.055m Towards Waste Recycling Facilities

Waterford County Council has welcomed a grant allocation of eur1.055 million from the Department of the Environment and Local Government for waste recycling facilities in the county. Minister Martin Cullen TD approved the funding which is provided for in the National Development Plan.

"These initial grant allocations are directed primarily at recycling infrastructure that will be visible at local level, helping to raise awareness and allowing the general public to make a more significant contribution to our national recycling effort," the Minister stated. "These facilities are the basic building blocks of an integrated waste management infrastructure. We must harness public goodwill and support for waste recycling and make it as easy as possible for the individual householder to make a contribution."

The allocations are focused on projects that are underway or capable of early delivery and the Minister said he hopes to announce a further round of allocations to private companies shortly.

"While the private sector plays a significant role in waste management, local authorities are central to progress; they must take the lead and drive the waste agenda at local and regional level. I expect local authorities to intensify their delivery of the regional waste management plans, including improved public education and awareness, the steady roll-out of segregated collection services, and necessary infrastructure."

The allocation is the first round in the controversial South East Regional Waste Management Plan, which includes the provision of an incinerator somewhere in the region.

In the meantime, other substantive projects, both public and private, are going through the relevant planning and permitting processes, and he expects to be in a position to announce a third

round of grant allocations early next year.

Welcoming the allocation, County Manager, Donal Connolly, said that it was an endorsement of Waterford County Council's work to date on waste reduction and recycling.

"I think it's reasonable for the Council to view this as a vote of confidence from the

Minister in the work we have done with programmes such as kerbside collections which sees us gather separated domestic waste from outside homes right across the country."

The allocation will see eur154,000 going towards a Civic Amenity facility in Dungarvan, and another eur127,000 spent on a com-

posting facility. A further eur220,000 is earmarked for a civic amenity facility in Lismore with eur105,000 allocated for a composting facility in the heritage town. Another, eur136,000 will be spent on extra bring banks at various locations around the county and eur184,000 used for a civic amenity facility in Tramore.

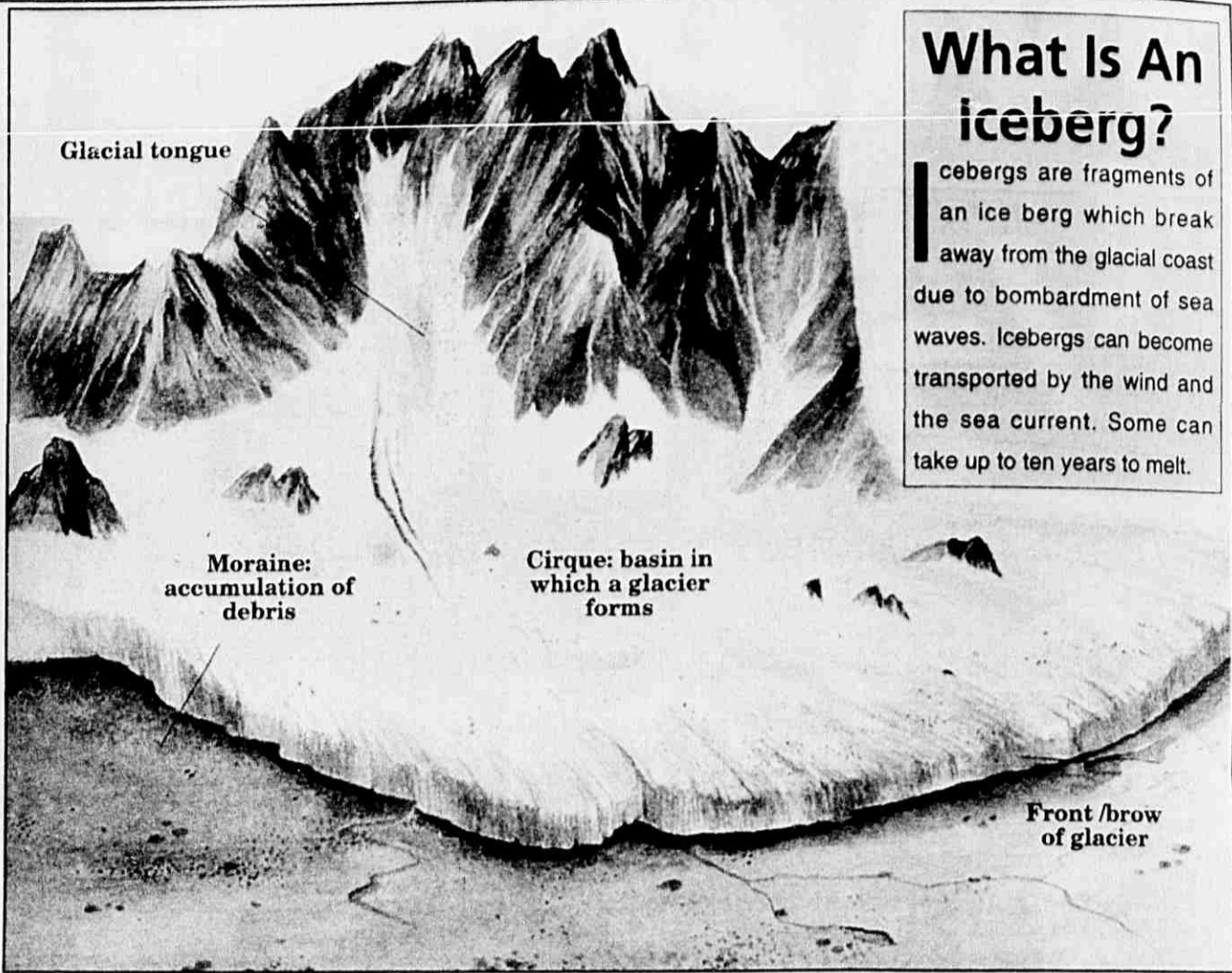

WHAT IS A GLACIER?

Glaciers cover more than one tenth of the Earth's surface. Glaciers are enormous masses of compressed ice and form in cold zones, at the North and South Poles and on high mountains, where they quantity of snow which accumulates in a year is more than the amount which melts in the heat from the Sun. Mountain glaciers can cause great erosion. Their slow movements down towards the base of the mountain claws away at the rocks and when they meet cracks, they form deep crevasses, hollowing out wide valleys and depositing debris downhill.

- Glaciers cover almost 14 million square kilometres of the Earth's surface.
- The 'fastest-moving' ice is the Columbia Glacier in Alaska which moves about 20m per day. Alpine glaciers 'travel' about 50m in one year.
- The widest glacier (478m) is in the Antarctic.
- An Alpine glacier forms in a time scale which can be from 2 to 20 years.



What Is An Iceberg?

Icebergs are fragments of an ice berg which break away from the glacial coast due to bombardment of sea waves. Icebergs can become transported by the wind and the sea current. Some can take up to ten years to melt.

Educational Psychologists Places Left Unfilled

Minister Noel Dempsey has conceded that two posts for educational psychologists in Waterford City and County, have been left unfilled for three years, against the advice of a Government approved development plan.

In a parliamentary reply to Deputy Brian O'Shea, the Minister stated that the development plan, approved in 1999, envisaged five educational psychologists would be needed to provide a service to schools in Waterford.

At present, a senior psychologist and two basic grade psychologists are assigned to the Waterford area, under the overall management of the Regional Director for the National Educational Psychological

Service (NEPS) in the South East. The psychologists plus a clerical officer are based in the NEPS Regional Headquarters in Waterford City.

The Minister said recruitment to NEPS is on-going and his Department is currently offering employment to successful candidates from the most recent competition for educational psychologists.

"Subject to the availability of suitably trained psychologists, it is hoped to reach the full complement for the Waterford area before the end of the five year expansion programme."

Deputy Brian O'Shea said he will continue to pursue full provision of education psychologists for the area until there is a satisfactory conclusion.

COOKERY CORNER

Chinese Style Chicken

Preparation and cooking:
20-25 mins

A TASTE of the orient in your own kitchen. Quick, easy and refreshingly different.

Ingredients

- (Serves 4-6)
- 500g chicken fillets or 2 large chicken breasts, boned
- 2 tblspns oil
- 2 crushed cloves garlic
- 1 tspn fresh crushed root ginger
- 2 medium onions thickly sliced
- 3 celery stalks, sliced
- 125g ham steak cut into cubes
- 2 tspns cornflour
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 tblspn soy sauce
- 1 tblspns black bean sauce

REMOVE the skin from the chicken and cut into strips 5cm by 2cm.

Heat oil in a wok or frying pan adding garlic, ginger and chicken pieces until chicken turns white.

Add onion, celery and ham and continue tossing for one minute. In small bowl mix cornflour and water into paste.

Add to pan with soy sauce and black bean sauce. Cook until sauce boils and thickens, stirring constantly.

Lower the heat and leave the pan standing until the chicken is cooked through (approximately one minute). It is now ready to serve.



Warm Apple Tart

Preparation: 15-20 mins
Cooking: 15-20 mins

TRADITIONAL apple tart turned wild with a sweet accompaniment. Great after a hot winter meal.

Ingredients

- (Serves 6)
- 250g puff pastry sheets – defrosted
- 180g sugar
- 8 large Coxes Pippin apples – cored and thinly sliced
- 150ml hot water
- 6 scoops of vanilla ice-cream

Preheat the oven to 220°C. Place the puff pastry on to a lightly floured surface and roll out to about 2mm thick. Use a saucer to cut out six cir-

cles from the pastry. Prick the pastry surface with a fork and sprinkle with sugar. Place on a baking tray.

Arrange the apple slices evenly on top of the pastry and sprinkle with sugar. Bake in the oven for about 15-20 mins.

While cooking, put the rest of the sugar in a bowl and moisten with a little water. Cook over a medium heat swirling constantly to stop it burning, until sugar turns golden brown. Remove the pan from the heat and add the hot water. Return to heat and continue to stir.

Serve apple tart with scoop of ice-cream and swirls of cooled caramel sauce.

Jaffa cake pudding

Preparation: 2 hours
Cooking: 5-10 mins

SIMPLY a very large Jaffa cake, and just as nice.

Ingredients

- (Serves 6-8)
- 375ml orange juice
- 1 packet orange jelly, cut into cubes
- 275g plain chocolate, broken up
- 350ml double cream
- 25cm ready made flan base
- Pouring cream as an accompaniment
- Pour 150ml of boiling water over jelly.
- Stir until jelly dissolves then add all of the orange juice.

Pour into a 23cm shallow dish lined with cling film and place in the fridge to set.

Melt all of the chocolate with half of the cream in a bowl set above a pan of simmering water. Cool.

Whip the rest of the cream and fold into the chocolate, chill for a few minutes to a spreading consistency.

Turn out the set jelly and place on the flan base.

Spread the chocolate mixture over the jelly making a domed cover.

Leave to set in a fridge for a minimum of 30 minutes.

Serve with lashings of pouring cream.

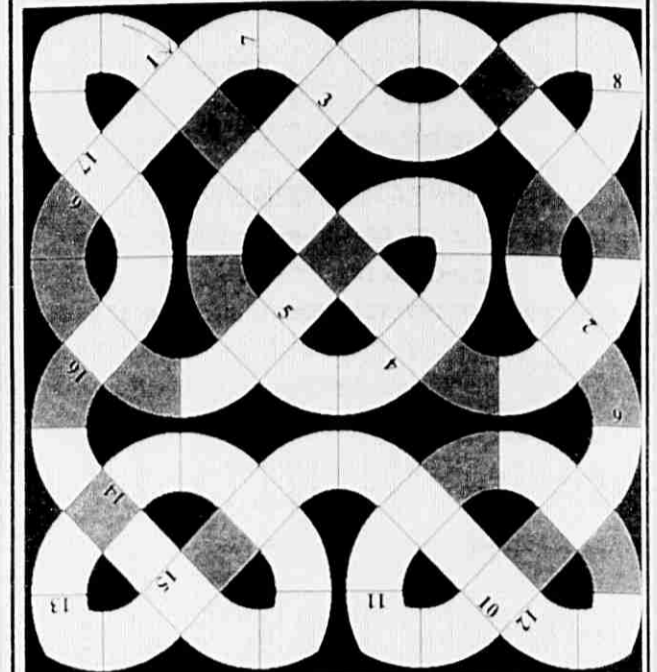

Council Looking At Dungarvan As Transient Site Option

at the services and needs of the travelling community as well," he said.

But, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan argued that is not just an issue about traveller's accommodation or the laws on moving on travellers. "All the laws are failing us", he claimed adding that people are fed up with the situation.

According to a number of councillors, Litter and Parking laws in particular are not being enforced on travellers.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said the full force of litter and parking laws are being borne down on the settled community. "But these same laws are not being enforced on travellers."

"These people seem to be untouchable," he added.

Labour Councillor, Billy Kyne opposed any move towards locating a transient halting site in the Dungarvan urban area, saying the local council has been one of the most progressive on the issue of traveller accommodation and were one of the first to provide a permanent halting site.

Now, he said, Waterford County Council must look at the county as a whole before turning their attention to

Dungarvan. He said the town should not be the ones to have the prospect of a transient halting site visited upon them.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan also said a transient site should not be located in the Dungarvan area, claiming that people saw the condition of Shandon Halting site before it was cleaned up. "You can't blame people for not wanting a transient site when you see that. Because a tran-

sient site would be far worse."

Cllr. Teresa Wright said this comment was unfair to the many decent people living in the permanent halting site. She said they have practically been living on a building site for a number of years and a great deal of progress has now been made on the condition of the site. She called for another meeting of the traveller accommodation sub-committee, which has

not met for two years, to discuss the issue of illegal encampments and transient halting sites in detail.

In the Council's progress report, which includes a number of local authority housing projects, the County Manager said refurbishment on the permanent Shandon halting site is now complete on eight bays. An additional four houses, approved by the council, are expected to begin construction next year.

for the necessary building works. In March of 2000, a surveyor examined the building and approved the school to move onto the design stage.

Finally, six weeks before the general election, the school was placed on the Department's list of schools at the architectural planning stage.

However, when no further progress was made in the following months, concerns began to rise that the process had ground to a halt.

Just last month, those fears were realised. According to Ms. Ronayne, the school was informed that Minister Noel

Dempsey's Department would not be in a financial position to start the building project in "the foreseeable future". Essential maintenance on the building will, however, be carried out.

Ms Ronayne said this decision has caused concern and upset, as they had been expecting to move onto the next stage in the building process.

She also said the ambiguity of the letter from the Department of Education and the phrase "foreseeable future" has caused considerable frustration among the Board of Management members. Without a date to work towards, she said, it is impossible to properly plan for the schools future.

"We don't know where we stand anymore," Ms. Ronayne said.

When contacted, press officer for Minister Martin Cullen, Dan Pender said the Minister was aware of the problems and raised the matter with Minister for Education Noel Dempsey. At this time, he said, the schools request for funding can't be granted, but the Minister will continue working with a view towards a satisfactory outcome for the school.

The Dungarvan Leader contacted the Department of Education for comments, but an official spokesperson was unavailable to comment on Knockanore NS at the time of going to press.

Brussels – a winter delight

Brussels sprouts are typical cool-season brassicas – hardy cultivars survive temperatures of -10 deg centigrade – and they taste much better after having been touched by frost.

If they are sown in succession, Brussels sprouts provide a constant crop from early autumn through to late spring.

They are, of course, an essential part of the Christmas menu – and in late December stocks in supermarkets and greengrocers are always in short supply.

As with all vegetables, a degree of planning is essential if you want a home-grown supply available in season.

If you do have Brussels

growing in your vegetable plot, there are steps you can take to make sure you enjoy them at their best.

If not, plan ahead and make sure the ground is properly prepared for planting in the spring.

Harvesting
If you planted Brussels in early summer they should be ready for harvesting about now.

Their flavour is improved after they have been exposed to frost – so, depending upon the weather, it may be worth waiting so you can enjoy them at their best.

Pick the lowest sprouts first by snapping them off at the base. The upper sprouts will continue to develop.

Excessive frost can be troublesome and where winters are very severe, it is best to uproot the whole plants and hang them in a cool frost-free place.

The sprouts will remain fresh for several weeks.

Planting and care
A general base-dressing may be applied shortly before planting – since high nitrogen levels are needed.

Sow in succession from mid to late spring as the soil begins to warm up, starting with the early-maturing cultivars.

For a very early crop, sow in gentle heat under cover in early spring. Sow either in seed trays or in a seedbed for transplanting or in-situ in firm ground.

Most Brussels sprouts do not grow well in modules.

Thin out or transplant to the required spacing in early summer generally four to five weeks after sowing.

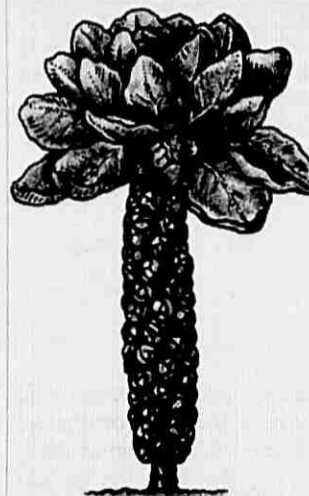
Plant dwarf cultivars about 18 inches apart and tall cultivars two feet apart. Brussels sprouts, with their slow rate of growth may be inter-cropped in the first months with fast maturing vegetables.

Keep beds weed-free. Since plants are widely spaced, extra watering is required only in very dry conditions.

A top dressing of a nitrogenous fertiliser or an organic liquid feed may be applied in late summer if the plants are not growing vigorously.

Your Brussels sprouts should be ready to harvest about 20 weeks after sowing.

MODERN hybrids have been developed to produce sprouts that are compact, uniform in size – and evenly spaced. The traditional varieties are likely to produce sprouts of variable quality and size – unevenly spread and fewer in quantity.

Commissioner Fischler Speaks Out On Cattle Prices

The statement that was probably enjoyed most by listeners to EU Commissioner Franz Fischler on his recent visit to Dublin was his remark about how the meat factories could guarantee to get more cattle.

It was an unscripted response to a question about the danger of a serious fall in the production of cattle after decoupling is introduced following the mid-term review of the CAP. The Commissioner was presented with a study, carried out on behalf of the meat factories by economic consultant Brendan Kearney, who concluded that the suckler cow herd could fall by between 40 per cent and 60 per cent as a result of decoupling. The argument being put forward by the factories is that a major reduction in raw material (cattle) would seriously affect their industry. The Commissioner was, we suspect, being a little mischievous when he responded with a statement that suggested that the factories would surely get all the cattle they needed if they paid a higher price. "Why should Irish farmers, if they get the same cheque from Brussels, not produce something?" he asked. "As long as Irish farmers get a good price for their cattle, there is an absolute guarantee that they will produce cattle."

The Commissioner dealt at length with decoupling, describing it as "completing the shift of our support from product to producer" through the introduction of single farm payments (rather than premiums paid on animals) linked to cross-compliance with environmental, animal welfare and food safety criteria. "With decoupling, we will give entrepreneurial freedom back to our farmers," he said. "In this sense, decoupling is good for farmers' incomes! As we are all aware, this is particularly important in Ireland. In my view, Irish farmers could take real advantage of this: with decoupled aid, they can produce what they think is best to make a profit, and deliver the high quality products that European consumers want."

He went on to deal with a criticism he has been hearing throughout Europe. "I sometimes hear the strange argument that we want to pay farmers for doing nothing," he continued. "The opposite is true. Honestly, who would seriously claim that keeping land in good heart - by keeping animals, managing land or cutting hay - and meeting the standards we ask from the farmers is doing nothing? Having been a farmer myself, I can assure you that my idea of doing nothing is a different one!"

The Agriculture and Rural Development Commissioner has been doing the rounds of all EU countries, selling both the idea and the details of the mid-term review. Ireland is towards the

end of his tour and by this stage he has it down to a fine art, identifying the main areas of contention in the country where he is speaking - they all have different worries - and reassuring all sides that the review is not a revolution but a well thought out strategy to preserve farm policy for the future, to safeguard farm incomes and to better respond to what consumers and taxpayers want. Acknowledging that the review proposals had not met with enthusiastic reaction here in Ireland, he honed in on the main

criticisms that had been voiced by the farm organisations and by agri-industry in this country, such as the effects of decoupling.

He also dealt with the vexed question of farm audits, saying he was aware that Irish farmers had been sceptical about these proposals. "We can discuss it," he said, before declaring: "We definitely do not want to put more bureaucratic burden on the farmers' shoulders or to invent new obstacles. On the contrary, the audit should integrate the countless existing checks -

and we want to compensate the farmers financially for the costs of such an audit."

Putting things further into context, Commissioner Fischler said decoupling remained an essential element in the need to promote sustainable agriculture. "Just as importantly, we will have to stick to our WTO obligations to cut trade distorting support. Without the option of decoupling, reducing our trade distorting support would mean to simply give up some of the direct payments!"

DAIRYING.

Prepare for 2003 breeding season Now

Can we improve cow fertility next year by the management we give our cows and replacements?

The answer is a definite "yes". Condition score (C.S.) at service greatly influences submission rate (3weeks) and pregnancy at 42 days. Table 1 shows that thin cows (C.S.2.5 or less) have a 15%-16% lower chance of being submitted for bulling and being incalf 42 days into the breeding season, compared with fit (C.S.3.0 and greater) cows. Unless management is exceptional thin cows at bulling will have been thin at calving, who in turn will have been thin at drying off.

Over 3.0	73%	66%

Fat cows at calving (C.S. of 3.5 or greater) will have fertility problems because of loosing too much weight between calving and bulling. Table 2 highlights the importance of not calving down cows too fat because of the possibility of loosing too much weight between calving and bulling. Cows that loose more than half a condition score or 25 Kgs + have a 20% lower pregnancy rate after 42 days of the breeding season.

0.5 and greater	41%	47%

Our target calving down C.S. is 3.25 and cows that are now fat must be prevented from becoming too fat.

It can be concluded that cows that are either too thin or too fat in November have reduced chances of going incalf next April-May.

ADVICE: Divide your cows up into three groups.

(a) thin cows (C.S.2.75 or less), (b) O.K cows (C.S.2.75-3.0) and (c) fat cows (3.25 C.S. or greater). The thin cows must be fed 2-3 Kg's of meal, depending on the quality of silage (20% D.M.). Twenty five Kg's of fresh silage with 3 kg's of straw would probably be better for rumen activity and fill.

Because, most farmers will complain about having three batches of cows around the farmyard in Winter, they have no grounds for complaining when fertility is poor next year. In a 50 cow herd the difference between good fertility and poor fertility may be, having 1 or 2 fat cows now and failing to manage them separately.

TILLAGE:

Set-aside: A Crop Option?

The gross margin of all crops have nose dived this year. The combination of reduced yield, higher costs and a lower grain price have resulted in average gross margins of around 150/ac or less for cereals. Is set-aside a realistic option for farmers? The max set-aside rate in 2003 is 40% of the total area (the max area in 2002 was 20%)

Table 1 outlines the potential returns.

Fixed costs include land maintenance, interest on loans, ESB & telephone etc. These costs have to be carried on the set-aside land even though no crop is sown. The option of a high rate of set-aside rate is more suited to farmers with low machinery costs or who are very reliant on contractors. Farmers who have high machinery costs will still incur a portion of these costs over the set-aside area such as machinery depreciation, machinery maintenance, and lease repayments.

Figures from the Tillage Monitor Farms from 2001 shows that average net margin from set-aside is 66 /ac.

The margin from set-aside can only be improved if the cuttings removed, after the 1st of September, are used to replace existing forage on the farm but the quality of this forage is normally poor.

IFA President Calls on Government to Interpret Regulations in Balanced Manner

Speaking at the IFA National Farm Forestry Conference recently, IFA President John Dillon expressed concern that "many farmers who wish to become involved in forestry are not being allowed to do so and are being deprived of a valuable tax-free income."

Mr Dillon recognised the need for regulation within the industry but called on the Government to "interpret the ever increasing regulations and environmental restrictions affecting forestry in a balanced manner and to consider the implications that they can have on rural incomes".

Mr Dillon also called on John Brown T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Communications, Marine and Natural Resources, who was also present, for his support on the establishment of an independent body with responsibility for the development and promotion of the Irish forest industry. Mr Dillon said "Such a body will be fundamental in aiding the Irish forest industry to develop

to its full potential and in securing maximum return on investment for Irish farmer foresters".

Continuing, Mr Dillon said "it is essential that the value of the

growing crop is recognised as well as that of the premium. Against this background IFA have set about addressing this topic and opening an informed debate in today's conference".

ABBEYSIDE TOPICS

Local History

The Oldfields, who took over the Towerhouse in Abbeyside, are recalled in a will of 1st October 1774. Margaret Murphy, formerly Oldfield, bequeathed one shilling and eleven pence each to nephews Robin and Dickson Oldfield, her grand-nephew William Hubberts and his wife Alicia Condon. Half the share in a fishing boat, which was hers, was to be sold for £10 and the money given to her cousin Pierce Fitzgerald of Kilmalough (Kilmaloo in Kinsalebeg?). Her clothes chest was bequeathed to Jane Collins, nee Whitehead of Dungarvan. All the rest was left to Mrs. Mary Power and Miss Ellen Ronayne of Dungarvan who were kind to her while she was ill. She states that Mrs. Mary Butler of Dungarvan owes her a 'note of £15'. This will is interesting in a particular way. This lady was of protestant stock whose ancestor was a Cromwellian officer, yet her own name and those of many of her family and friends were Catholic. By the second half of the 18th Century some of the settlers and planters descendants had intermarried with Catholics and adopted their religion. The landlords did not become Catholics but many of the others did, as seems to have happened to some of the Oldfield family. Her executors were Matthew Kennedy and Edmund Byrne of Dungarvan, hardly the surnames of settler families.

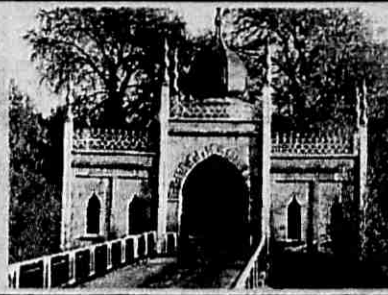

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION:

I was on certified sick leave from work for two months. Does absence on sick leave change my entitlements to annual leave?

ANSWER:

Annual leave entitlement is based on time worked. In this sense absence from work and in your case, absence due to certified sick leave, can reduce your entitlement to annual leave but it should not in your case.

Your rights in relation to holiday entitlement are set out in Organisation of Working Time Act, 1997. This Act provides for a basic annual leave entitlement of four weeks for each leave year with pro-rata entitlements for periods of employment of less than a year. (Your contract of employment may provide for more than the statutory four weeks). In order to qualify for four week annual leave an employee must have worked for the same employer for at least 1,365 hours during a leave year.

Sickness during the leave year will reduce the hours you worked and therefore may affect your entitlement to annual leave. However, if your working week is, for example 40 hours you will reach the required 1,365 working hours after just over 34 weeks working. Your absence, in this instance, would need to be 18 weeks or more before it affected your annual leave.

MONEYMATTERS

WHEN DOES CREDIT BECOME DEBT?

There are many debates regarding the above question, however, a simple explanation may be "when the credit cannot be paid". All too often it is assumed that when a person is in debt they have been reckless or bad managers.

The truth of it may be that now all credit commitments are by choice. Many daily services are supplied on credit such as mortgage, phone, gas, electricity, car etc. Budgeting for these services is very important as they arise on a regular basis and need to be planned for.

Whether you are living on a social welfare payment, low wage or on a large salary, a budget is necessary to maintain financial control, and to avoid debt. In drawing up a budget you can see where your money is going so that choices can be made about future spending. It can also give you an idea on how to repay those debts you may already have. In order to budget effectively, it is necessary to gather information about current spending. What is the usual amount of your ESB bill?, when is your TV licence, car insurance, car tax, mortgage due - What about Christmas, Confirmation or Communion Days. It may be a good idea to write down information about your budget over a few days. This will help to give you a clearer picture and enable you to leave nothing out.

Once you have your budget drawn up you can see where your money is going. Perhaps in your case you have more going out than coming in. Mark off items in your budget that cannot be changed so as to differentiate them from non-essential items. You may think that all your spending is essential but try to imagine for a few minutes the prospect of losing a vital service i.e. electricity supply or even your home if you do not cut back on your spending. Do not cut back your budget to the bone but set yourself realistic targets. A budget is an evolving item so try not to feel that it is set in stone. If your circumstances change for better or worse be sure to adjust it!!





Bonmahon And Tallow Health Centre Improvements

The South Eastern Health Board has responded to concerns of a number of councillors regarding the dilapidated state of the Health Centres at Bonmahon and Tallow. The council's representative, Cllr. Tom Higgins, raised the issue at Health Board level.

General Manager of Community Services, Dermot Halpin, said the SEHB has a capital development programme under the National Development Plan, which includes several capital projects in the Waterford Community Care area, including Tallow and Bonmahon.

"In respect of Tallow, the board proposes to completely upgrade and extend the current Health Centre and has secured Planning Permission. The project went to tender and an application for funding under the NDP rests with the Department of Health & Children - no decision has been issued as yet and the Board is not in a position to proceed until funding is allocated," he stated.

For Bonmahon, the Board is proposing to locate the Health Centre in a more suitable premises as the current building is not amenable to be adapted. "We have endeavoured, through the engagement of professional input, to be located to a suitable property in the area without success. We will continue our efforts", he said in a letter to the members.

He also said he would welcome a discussion with Waterford Co. Council on the availability of land in the area.

"I can indicate that the board will keep these projects under active review. If further progress is delayed consideration will be given to carrying out some decorative and minor remedial work in the interim."

Cllr. James Tobin welcomed the response on Tallow Health Centre.

STRADBALLY SOCCER CLUB LONG TERM LAND LEASE

Waterford County Council approved a 99 year lease of land to Stradbally AFC at its November meeting. The council gave its unanimous approval to the lease of land, in a move welcomed by local councillor, Ger Barron. Cllr. Barron described the club as one of the most impressive and forward thinking clubs in the county and proposed the section 183 motion, which will safeguard the future of the club.

Kilmac Fire Service Receives Welcome Boost

The Fire Service in Kilmac-thomas is to get a brand new Fire Station on a site which may also hold area offices, a library and some enterprise buildings.

Following enquires from Cllr. Ger Barron, the County Manager, Donal Connolly revealed the radical new plans to replace the present fire station, and breathe new life into the centre of the town.

The proposed move to the four acre former Flahavans site follows Cllr Barrons highlighting of conditions for fire-fighters in the Kilmac area. In recent weeks he revealed that fire-fighters are operating by handheld torches when attending serious accidents at night as the current station is too small for a stem light to be attached to the fire engine.

A new fire engine was also put on hold as it couldn't fit inside the doors of the station.

Mr. Connolly said the new Fire Station had been held up while the council attempted to acquire a suitable property. Agreement has now been reached for a site close to the Town Centre.

He revealed that the council is examining the possibility of building a library, branch area offices or even an enterprise building along with the Fire Station.

Owner Plans To Remove Tallow Gate Lodge To Cork

Waterford County Council is enforcing protected structures orders on a number properties around the county but is not providing the grants necessary for the owners to carry out this conservation, Cllr. Paudie Coffey said.

One structure causing controversy is Headborough Gate Lodge in Tallow, whose owner objects to the buildings inclusion on the record of protected structures.

According to Cllr. James Tobin, the early to mid-19th century gate lodge has no connection with Headborough House itself.

The owner of the lodge has stated to the council that its sale has been agreed, subject to the approval of planning permission for its removal to Cork. No application has been received to do this as yet.

However, a council circular has stated as this structure was the Gate Lodge for Headborough House its historical importance and relationship to its setting, "is of immense importance". As such, any application for its removal would not be recommended, it continues.

"It is the opinion of the local authority that this is an entirely adaptable building which can be put to a new use in its original setting and an application would be welcomed in his regard".

The owner has objected on the basis that she is not in a financial position to restore the lodge. As it is proposed to include the structure in its present condition, "the duty on the owner is to maintain it in its present state".

The conservation Grant Scheme was put in place to conserve protected structures and information regarding the scheme has been forwarded to the owner. However, Cllr. Paudie Coffey said the grants are not enough for the owners to carry out any conservation work on the property.

Other structures proposed to be included are Ballyphillip Tower House at Tallow, Mocollop, Ballyduff; Licky Bridge, Clashmore.

Action Plan For Irish Launched

Waterford County Council's 'Action Plan for Irish 2002-2005' was launched recently by the Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. Lola O'Sullivan.

The Action Plan sets out the council strategy for the promotion of the Irish Language both within the Council itself and in its dealings with the public. The plan aims to extend the use of Irish and the concept of bilingualism voluntarily in the affairs and the proceedings of the council - through signage, stationery, publications, correspondence and the spoken word.

Mayor O'Sullivan said she hoped that from now on, this plan would act as the main reference tool in terms of Irish in the Council.

"The Councillors have formally approved this plan and we now have an obligation as public representatives to give whatever support we can to our native language and to those who wish to do business in Irish with the council."

The County Manager, Donal Connolly, said that the council accepts that citizens have the right to do business with the council in Irish or English as they choose.

"Local authorities have a particular obligation to provide a service through Irish to the public in an effective and open manner, and I hope that this plan will assist us all in fostering an Irish atmosphere in the Council so that neither staff nor public will be afraid to use the language in their business dealings with one another."

The Action Plan was written by Maire Seosaimhin Breathnach, the council's Irish Language Officer. Maire Seosaimhin said that Waterford County Council has made significant progress to date in terms of bilingualism.

"However, we still have a lot to do and I hope that we can all work together to achieve the aims set out in this action plan."

Road Widening Ends In Channelling and Flooding

The council's attempt at road widening on a four to five mile stretch between Kilgobinet Church up to Culasnear School and another section between the Kilgobinet's New Line road to Bohadon Bridge has resulted in significant expenditure but an even worse situation for road users, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair informed the council.

The labour councillor said up until recently local people were able to pull into the side of the road on the grass margins to leave other cars pass. But, when the council attempted to widen the road by putting down gravel and removing the grass margins the local authorities efforts resulted in channelling and flooding.

In places a two foot drop exists between the road and gravel margins while outcrops of rock make it dangerous for drivers to pull in.

Flooding has also occurred, Cllr. O Ceilleachair said, as following the road widening the natural drainage provided by the grass margins and the removal of an old drain near Bohadon Bridge has caused an increase in surface water.

The result has left car drivers attempting to manoeuvre in the centre of the road with no opportunity to pull in to the side. He said he could see the council's case for widening the road, "but in actual fact this has made the situation worse." He called for correction work to level the road.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said he will investigate the matter.

East/ West Divide On Recycling Grants

An east/west divide was provoked in council chambers as the destinations for the Government funding on recycling waste were announced.

Cllr. Paudie Coffey and his area colleague, Cllr. Ger Barron were critical of the perceived West Waterford bias for the funds.

Cllr. Coffey (FG) said that the bulk of the funding is going to Dungarvan and Lismore towards "civic amenity centres", which are understood to include a recycling facility.

Already, a proposal for a recycling facility is included in Clancy Constructions planning application for a development on the Glanbia site.

The Dungarvan facility will divert an estimated 1,600 tonnes of waste from landfill per annum by 2008, while Lismore will divert 800 tonnes and Tramore 1,700.

County Manager, Donal Connolly felt the funding provided a reasonable spread over the entire county. He said extra bring banks to be introduced will drastically improve the quality of service that can be offered around the county.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy, said further composting facilities will also be introduced in three locations, Tramore, Dungarvan and Lismore. The facilities will provide in vessel composting units, and process garden waste deposited by the public. When processed, garden compost will then be made available back to the public.

Late Mr. Edward Larkin

It is with deep regret we record the death of Mr. Edward (Teddy) Larkin, River Court, Irishtown, Clonmel which occurred recently. His death in his eighty third year has removed one of the natures gentleman from the scene.

Quiet and assuming, he was noted for his good humour and his demise evokes nostalgic memories, too, for former colleagues of the Old Boot factory, where Teddy gave nigh on half a century of loyal service and who continued to value his friendship.

Born and reared in Upper Irishtown he was son of Tom and Eily Larkin, one of a family of two, his sister predeceasing him by seven years in England. He was educated at St. Mary's Primary school and as he finished school at the age of fourteen he began working in the Boot factory. The fact that he had the distinction of being the first employee engaged by the company when it opened in 1935, Teddy was number one on the books, that was a source of satisfaction to him. He used to love to reminisce about those early days starting out as a young boy in the Gashouse Bridge factory which was in later years burnt down, a tragic and traumatic occurrence, requiring the staff to transfer to the Nelson premises where he worked in the clicking room. The Boot factory was a big boost to the towns economy, employing as it did some hundreds of people. He was for a time a shop steward and later became a foreman, to him it was a shock when the company closed down in 1971 but undaunted the employees agreed to have a skeleton staff which included Teddy, keeping the machines oiled in readiness for a potential buyer who eventually surfaced in the name of Padmore and Barnes, Kilkenny who reopened the premises in 1972.

Married in 1942 to Kitty Callanan from Cashel Road, they reared seven children, five girls and two boys. His wife Kitty remembers her teenage years in the Girl Guides and the first occasion she met her husband who at the time was in the Boy Scouts. He was one of the founding members of the Credit Union, he acted on most of the committees over the years and was a director for a time. He was keen on gardening and vegetables. He was quite an exponent of the harmonica and he loved to play at parties.

A Eucharistic Minister at St. Oliver's Church for years despite his illness he celebrated his diamond wedding anniversary last February. After just a week in St. Joseph's Hospital he passed to his eternal reward.

His remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church, Irishtown where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Bobby Power C.C., St. Mary's.

On the following morning requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his immortal soul. The Celebrant was Rev. Fr. Bobby Power C.C. assisted by Rev. Fr. Parthlan O' Leary P.P., St. Oliver's. After Mass the funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel where he was laid to rest.

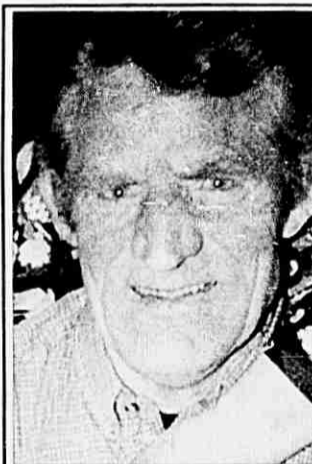

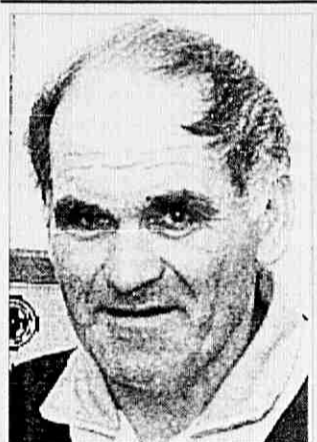

The Bord for the year is as follows: Chairman - Eddie O' Shea; Vice Chairman - Paddy O' Grady; Secretary: Thomas Keane; Assistant Secretary: Bridget Mernin; Treasurer: Jimmy McCarthy; Assistant Treasurer: Paddy Foley; Registrar: Seamus O' Brien; P.R.O.: Thomas Keane.

A number of limited guests were present at the meeting. Paddy Joe Ryan represented the county adult bord, Sea-

mus Quirke represented the County Bord na n-Og. Pat Grant the County Youth Officer was also present. There were apologies sent from Paddy Walsh of the Western Adult Bord and from County Developments officer John O' Leary. Addressing delegates County Adult Bord Chairman said that he was attending his eighth West Waterford Bord na n-Og convention. He complimented the Bord officers on the work being done in Bord na n-Og in trying to have flood lights up and running in Fraher Field in the New Year. He pointed out that once the lights would be up, games could be finished earlier in the year as more games could be played later into the evenings during the summer. Seamus Quirke also complimented the Bord on the work being done in West Waterford. He said it was no secret that the two Bords did not

agree on everything, but that once things were said and done, things were forgotten about. He went on to say that we need to have strong underage teams in Waterford, and that it was important that Western teams were able to compete with clubs from the East in hurling and that Eastern teams were able to compete with Western teams in football. He also told delegates that he did not wish to stand for re-election as County Bord na n-Og Chairman in 2003 as he intended to leave his name go forward for manager of the County Minor Hurling team again and that in the past year he found it hard to find time to give both jobs his full attention. Seamus O' Brien spoke on the strategic review committee recommendations. He urged all clubs to read the County recommendations very carefully when they are published as there is a number of important issues included. Seamus went on to talk about the National Strategic Review committee. He told delegates that all players from the age of ten up who wanted to switch clubs would now have to transfer properly. He also pointed out that players can now only play 2 years above their own grade up to under 16 and that in a championship game from now on if the game ends in a draw, extra time would have to be played except for in a final. Seamus also told delegates that the Bord would be meeting shortly to draw up a charter which would be sent out to all clubs.

Seven motions were before the meeting. Cappoquin/Affane G.A.A. club had four motions before the Bord. The first asked that no divisional games be played at the same time as the County Championship. It was agreed that this would be the case. Their second motion was about making the divisional under 14 and 16 hurling championships a knock out competition. It was agreed to make Division one knockout and that Divisions two and three remain league. The third motion asking that Wednesdays be left free for training night was withdrawn. The fourth motion from Cappoquin/Affane was about not playing games if a referee failed to show up. The Chairman said that if the situation regarding the lack of referees did not improve over the next few months that games would be played over two or three days per week rather than one. Ardmore's motion asking that Division three in under 14 hurling and football be made 11-a-side will be forwarded to the County Bord. Cois Bhride's first motion

asking that the Division 2 championship be made 13-a-side was not discussed and their motion about abolishing the Western Bord na n-Og was withdrawn. Under any other business, Pat Curran of Dungarvan asked that the first two weeks of August be left free of action as most families take their holidays at this time. Peter Power was wished well in his up coming retirements. Peter had been visiting Primary Schools for the last 13 years coaching the skills of hurling. He has also helped out coaching divisional and county underage teams in that time. The Chairman congratulated the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty club on their underage achievements in 2002. He pointed out that they won Divisional under 14 hurling and football championships and had an upcoming replay in the county final of the under 14 football championships. Divisional and County titles were also won at under 16 in hurling and football as well as winning divisional minor hurling and football titles and a county minor football title all in the 'A' grade. The meeting finished with the presentation of medals to all the winning teams.

NAOMH BRID RETAIN TITLE

The Division three final of the Cappoquin Chickens Under 16 hurling championship took place in Aghish on Saturday between Naomh Brid and Fourmilewater.

The game was a very close game between two very even sides. At the sound of Maurice Condon's full time whistle it was Naomh Brid who were in front by a single point, 0-6 to 1-2. Shane Troy was the scorer of the winning Naomh Brid point. After the game the new Bord Vice Chairman Paddy O' Grady was on hand to present Naomh Brid Captain Johnny Buckley with the Christian Brothers Lismore Cup.

John O'Leary has asked me to remind all clubs to fill in their club of the year forms and return them as soon as possible. All clubs that enter the competition are entered into a draw for a large cash prize. There are also cash prizes for the club from each County judged to be club of the year. The four provincial winners are then entered into a final where one club is picked as club of the year.

Icing On The Cake For Ardmore

It was a performance and a victory which put 'the icing on the cake' for Ardmore whose rise to hurling and football fame have won them an enviable place in the club records. Hot on the trail after winning the junior hurling county championship last year they have continued with an unbeaten team through this seasons intermediate championship and no one will dispute the fact that they have done it in the style of champions.

Ardmore are up where they always wanted to be and no club can go much further than achieving senior status in both hurling and football.

For Clonea the result was a bitter disappointment and the manner and suddenness with which it was brought about was absolutely shattering. Normal time was at an exciting end and Clonea, leading by 0-10 to 1-5, must have felt sure of winning this title. Ardmore were awarded a free about 30 metres out and close to the sideline. strike for a life saving goal but for some amazing reason he delayed taking the free and referee Tim Byrne cancelled it. The ball came outfield before being returned and shot to the Clonea net by Maurice O'Connor for Ardmore's golden goal in the 61st minute.

While the game itself did not compare with the junior county final, as a contest, one could not have asked for better as these two totally committed teams battled for all of the 64 minutes during which it was in progress and staged a tremendous finish to what was a splendid county intermediate hurling championship.

Ardmore had the use of the breeze in the opening half but it was Clonea who took early control of the game when Joe Murray and Martin Whelan each pointed from play and last year's underage hurler of the year, Fergal Fogarty pointed a free to leave the Eastern team 3 clear points in front by the 7th minute.

Ardmore had a few attacks repulsed before a combined effort involving a number of players saw Damien Lenane

through for a goal which was Ardmore's first score and it came just on the 15th minute. Up to this point despite great work by Seamus and Declan Prendergast as well as Wayne and Cathal Hennessey, Ardmore seemed to be getting nowhere and this score had a steadying effect on the team.

In the following 15 minutes each side had a point, Clonea from a pointed Jodey Power free and a similar score by Seamus Prendergast to leave the sides level Ardmore 1-1 and Clonea 0-4 at halftime.

SECOND HALF

In the opening minutes both Seamus Prendergast and Fergal Fogarty pointed frees before Ardmore 'keeper James O'Donnell brought off a wonderful save from Joe Murray. JUNIOR HURLING COUNTY FINAL

Geraldines Win Titanic Battle

GERALDINES 2-9 FENOR 1-9

I would have to research the records of many years to find a junior hurling final to compare with this titanic battle between two top class sides who showed total commitment over 90 minutes of exciting fare at Fraher field on Saturday last.

At no time over the 90 minutes did one side go more than a score ahead of the other and having been level on the scoreboard on seven occasions in the normal time, they again came on level terms coming very close to full time in the 'extra time' when no decision had been reached at the end of the replay. The 'duck' was broken when substitute Brian Connery hit Geraldines second goal almost on the call of time.

To describe it as a shocking and bitter disappointment for Fenor who played their hearts out and did everything that any team could do and then lose was as agonising as one could imagine and it was of no consolation to them to know that they had sympathy all round as it was the kind of a contest that no one deserved to lose.

But to the victors go the spoils and hard luck stories, like those experienced by Geraldines over the past ten years, do not count in the record books. Geraldines are the county champions 2002 and if retaining this standard next year, they will be strong contenders for the intermediate title.

PLAY

Conditions were good with sunshine and a fair breeze

blowing into the road goal. Geraldines had first use of the breeze.

Pat O'Donovan pointed a first minute free and Eoin O'Neill equalised with a long distance point from a free in the 3rd. minute

Stephen Sullivan pointed from play as did Pat O'Donovan to keep the game level by the 9th. minute

Ger O'Donovan and Liam Power exchanged points to keep them level until Ger O'Donovan pointed two scores from frees to give the Western champions a two points lead by the 18th. minute. Owen O'Neill and Ger O'Donovan exchanged points before Fenor goal keeper Derek Gahan brought off a super save from Michael Murray. Owen O'Neill pointed a 31st. minute free to leave the half-time score at 0-6 to 0-5 in favour of Geraldines.

SECOND HALF

With the breeze to contend with, Geraldine supporters must have felt unhappy with their slender one point lead and their worries were compounded by the scoring of two very early second half points to give Fenor the lead in the 35th. minute.

Fenor pressure continued to mount but great defensive play by Alan Ronayne, Laurence Maher, Eamon Mernin and company was making scoring very difficult. Thomas Curran moved to midfield and Geraldines began to change shape but there was no evidence of panic

Ten scoreless minutes passed before the Geraldines hit back with two Pat O'Donovan scores. A pointed free in the 45th. minute was followed by a goal after a landing ball brushed off the hurley of Fenor fullback Stephen Burns and past the keeper for a goal and the lead again for the Western champions. Three minutes later Fenor hit back with a splendid goal scored by centre field player Liam Power to level the contest once more in the 50th minute.

With just five minutes of normal time remaining and the possibility of another draw becoming a reality, Ger O'Donovan pointed a free to put Geraldines back in the drivers seat and this lasted for 4 minutes until the very accurate Liam Power hit back with a splendid point under pressure to leave the tally at 1-8 apiece and time running out.

But it continued long enough to allow Fenor shoot three of the most costly wides that they have ever hit. Three near misses within 2 minutes and the county title on offer if just one had been a score.

That is how close Fenor went to winning and Geraldines to losing.

Referee Brian Power blew full time and the hope that the 'extra-time' rule after a replay would be waived, was expressed, even in the Press box.

EXTRA TIME

Five minutes into extra time Ger O'Donovan pointed

a free and Geraldines were 1-9 as against 1-8 for Fenor when halftime was whistled.

Everyone wondered what would happen in the second 10 minutes of extra time on the sticky sod and between two teams who were still going all out,

Eight minutes passed before Eoin O'Neill hit over the score that drew the game for the eighth time. Then came the match winner when substitute Brian Connery hit home the golden goal that decided the issue and brought the title back to the Geraldines after a lapse of 26 years.

The sound of the final whistle sent Geraldines players and supporters ecstatic and left a very gallant Fenor side devastated and drained.

It was no consolation to them that they shared in a mighty contest and one that will rank with the best that we have seen here for a very long time. Their defeat was the hard luck story of the entire championship.

Asked for a comment from Western Board secretary Anthony Walsh immediately after the game he said "the outpouring of emotion by the Geraldines team and supporters at the presentation of the Cup to team captain Laurence Maher by board chair-

man Paddy Joe Ryan clearly illustrated what all this meant to the Geraldines."

It was a victory in which every player played an important role and while they may have had their stars, this was unquestionably a team victory.

We sometimes overstate the roles played by the members who do the scoring and neglect to give due credit to the men who defended and stopped the other team from winning. If I did that here I would certainly be doing less than justice to goalkeeper Alan Ronayne who was brilliant on the day, To team captain Laurence Maher solid as a rock at full back and in between Thomas Curran and Tholm Keane who played their hearts out in defending their patch. In the half line, Eamon Mernin, Kieran Cotter and Stevie Keane did all that was expected of them in their line of defence.

In the middle Donnca Tobin and Raymond Connery held their own while stationed in the sector and afterwards when moved.

In attack Ger and Pat O'Donovan, Michael Murray, Paudie Landers, Alan Cullen and John Healy gave the game everything they knew and also played a role in this historic victory. Likewise the

substitutes, John Tobin and Brian Connery will go into the club's records for having played their part in bringing the club their second county junior hurling title.

Eastern champions Fenor who will disappointingly have to keep licking their wounds for another year tried every bit as hard as Geraldines, but on the day, things just did not work out. Dungarvan Rugby Club Notes

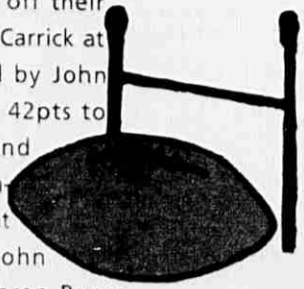

THE MEN OF YESTERYEAR "Running Sub 55 Minutes For 10 Miles In 1982"

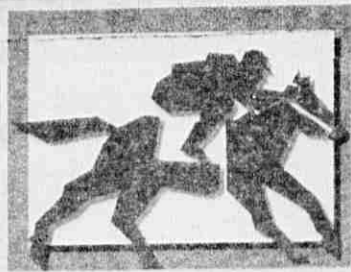

On the plus side High Chapparral, Hawk Wing, Milan and Black Sam Bellamy will all remain in training for the 2003 flat season.

novice chase and setting off to make every yard of the running this Glacial Storm gelding jumped very well up front and despite coming under pressure in the closing stages The Premier Cat dug deep on the stiff uphill climb to the finish to beat Boneyarrow. 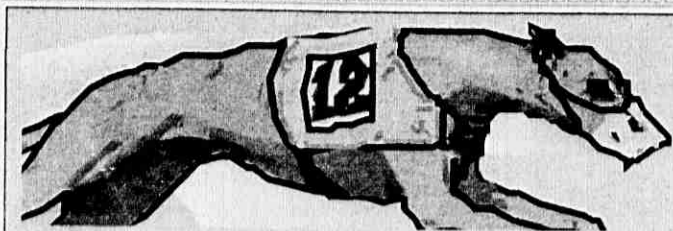

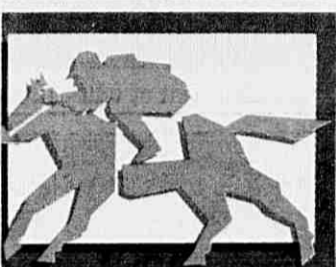

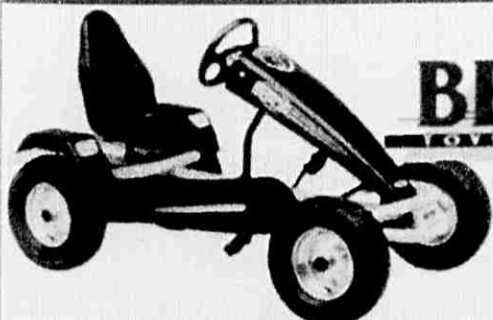
