Fine Gael Cllr. Calls For Withdrawal From Council Pact

Increase in Service Charges and Commercial Rates Predicted

Local service charges are set to increase dramatically following the scale of the cutbacks announced in Minister, Charlie McCreevy's Book of Estimates. Fine Gael Town Councillor, Damien Geoghegan has claimed. Controversially, he has also called on his party colleagues on Waterford County Council, to withdraw from the voting pact they entered into with Fianna Fail.

The Dungarvan-based councillor stated, that "local authorities, such as Dungarvan Town Council and Waterford County Council, are

already finding it extremely difficult to balance the books, and the revelation by the Minister that the Local Government Fund will not even get an inflation increase in 2003 is going to compound the problem further."

He said this is a reduction of 5%, in real terms, and claimed, "any local authority member or City/County Manager, will confirm that an increase in Local Service Charges are imminent."

"It has been pointed out on many occasions to the Town Council, that the charges for both the refuse and recycling

Planning Underway To Replace Antiquated Wards

The South Eastern Health Board has received Departmental approval for the establishment of a project team to examine proposals to replace older accommodation at St. Vincent's District Hos-

pital in Dungarvan.

Replying to a parliamentary question from Labour Deputy, Brian O'Shea, Minister Micheal Martin said modern accommodation is being examined for the site and the planning process for this development has commenced.

The proposal would see the replacement of long-stay wards in St. Vincent's Hospital, many of which, date from pre-famine times, and have been described as antiquated and Dickensian.

In total, the Minister said, 153 geriatric beds are available in the Health Boards area. And currently those patients who are awaiting a place in these institutions, are being accommodated in acute hospital beds, contract-

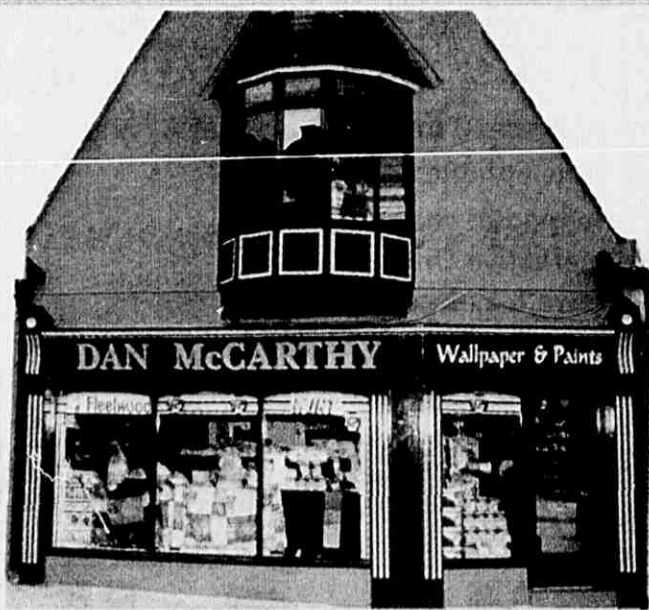

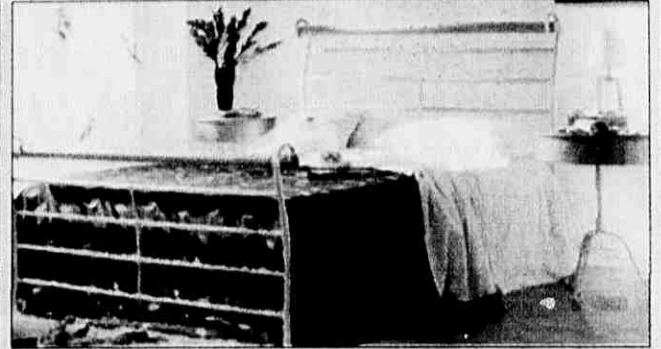

**Graveyard
Improvements
in Gaeltacht**

The graveyard at Hack-ettstown, An Sean Phobal, is to receive funding for its clean-up and improvement, according to local community leader, Seamus O Domhnaill. He said that over the years the graveyard has been neglected and the object of much criticism. But, following representations made to Waterford County Council, Mr. O Domhnaill has been informed by the local authority, that €800 will be made available towards cleaning up the area.

A further €1,000 is to be made available to carry out improvements to Reilig a'tSle.

Seamus also welcomed the fact that three more local authority houses are almost completed in Sean Phobal, one being a four bedroom house, the first of its size for Co. Waterford.

This brings to fourteen the number of houses built in the area in recent years. "Representations were made to the County Council in 1994 regarding the housing situation in Sean Phobal. At that stage it was hoped that 10 houses would be built and it is very gratifying to see that this target has been exceeded", he said.

"Following the visit of Junior Minister, Mary Coughlan, to the area in November of last year, CLCG an tSean Phobal was allocated a grant of €70,000 towards improvement of the GAA complex. Well done to all concerned for a job well done, the facilities available are on par with anything available in the county", Mr. O Domhnaill added.

Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Orange glazed lamb

MINI loin steaks in a tangy Seville orange glaze are a delightfully different alternative to plain meat on a barbecue.

Ingredients:

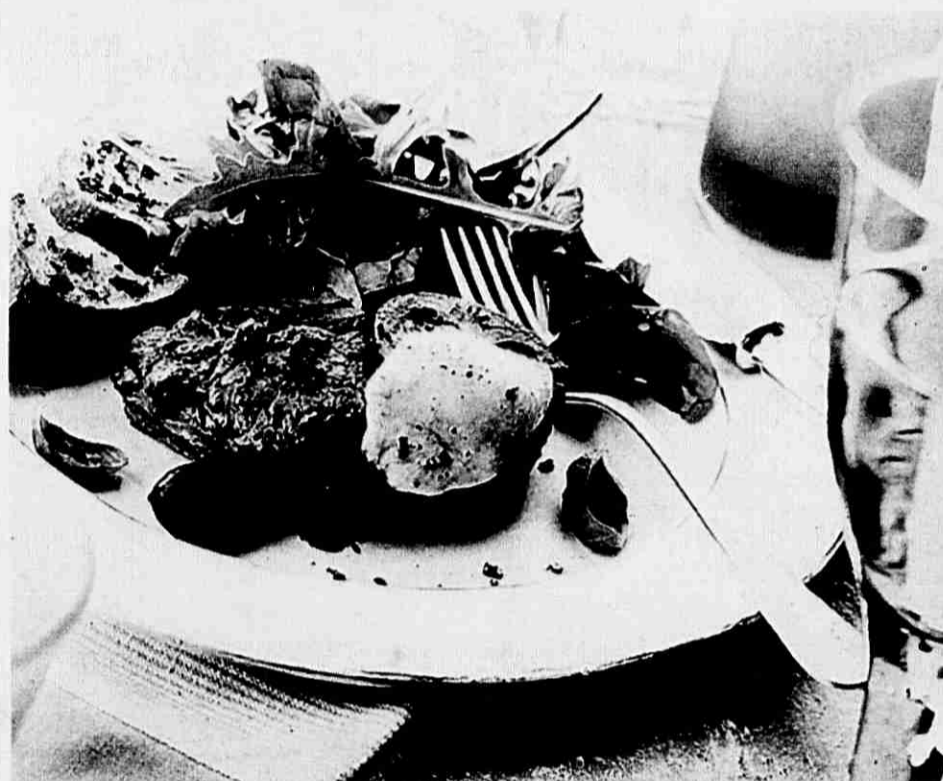
- Serves 2
- 6-8 lamb mini loin steaks
- 2 x 15ml sp (Seville) orange marmalade
- Pinch ground ginger

Method:

CHOOSE which cut or type of steak you would like to glaze, and then place under a pre-heated grill or barbecue, heated to the correct cooking temperature.

Cook the steaks for the time allocated to each side according to the table below.

About one minute before the end of the cooking time, brush the marmalade glaze over the steaks and sprinkle with the ground ginger to taste. Continue cooking the glazed steaks for the remaining cooking time. Serve immediately with



fresh mixed salad, coleslaw and your choice of crusty white bread or garlic bread.

TIP: Try using alternative simple glazes such as redcurrant sauce and mint jelly.

Lamb leg steaks	1-2cm	4-6 minutes
Mini loin steaks	1cm	2-3 minutes
Skewered lamb escalopes/leg steaks	1-2cm	4-6 minutes
Lamb butterfly steaks/loin steaks	1-2cm	4-6 minutes
Lamb rosettes/shoulder steaks	2cm+	6-10 minutes

Old-fashioned hot potato soup

THIS soup will make your mind wander back to a child hood land of home-cooked meals...

Ingredients:

- Serves 6
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1 large onion
- 6 medium potatoes, diced
- 2 carrots, diced
- 3 cups water
- 2 x 15ml sp chicken soup base or 2 bouillon cubes
- Ground black pepper
- 3 x 15ml sp all-purpose flour
- 3 cups milk
- 1 x 15ml sp dried parsley
- 1/4 x 5ml sp dried thyme

Method:

In a large stock pot, melt the butter, add the onions

and cook over a medium heat until the onions are translucent.

While the onions are cooking, place the potatoes, carrots, water and chicken soup base in another pot and bring to the boil. Cook until tender, about 10 minutes. Do not overcook. Season with ground black pepper to taste. Add the flour to the cooked onions to make a paste. Gradually add the milk and stir well. Cook over a low heat, stirring constantly until warmed through. Add the potato and carrot mixture. Stir in the parsley and thyme and heat through. Serve hot with crusty bread.

TIP: Try making the soup using broccoli or cauliflower instead.

Moist and fruity cake

A light, fruity cake to get your taste buds tingling.

Ingredients:

- Serves 8-10
- 275g self-raising flour
- 65g plain flour
- 1/4 x 5ml sp bicarbonate of soda
- 65g cocoa
- 100g butter
- 175g sugar
- 75g jam, any flavour
- 90ml hot water
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 x 15ml sp jam (extra)

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/ Gas Mark 4. Grease a 23cm tin, line with greaseproof paper, then grease the paper. Sift the flours, bicarbonate of soda and cocoa in a large mixing

bowl. Make a well in the centre.

Place the butter, sugar, jam and water in a small pan. Stir over a low heat until the butter has melted and sugar has dissolved. Remove from the heat and add to the dry ingredients and the eggs. Stir with a wooden spoon until just combined. Do not overbeat.

Pour mixture into prepared tin, smoothing the surface. Bake for 35 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean when inserted into the middle of the cake.

Leave cake to stand in tin for 15 minutes before turning out to cool on a wire rack. Heat extra jam in a small pan and brush it over the cake. Serve with whipped cream.

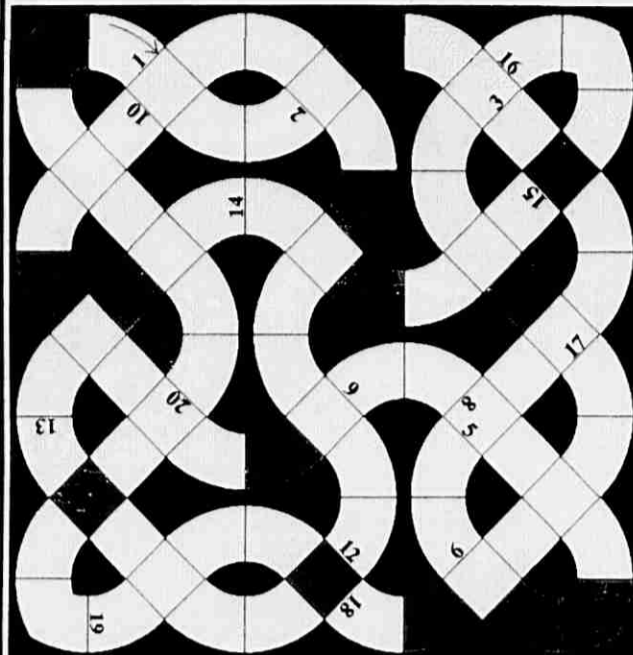

Health Tips From Remedies

Pau D'Arco

Traditional Use: Immune system, fungus, virus, parasite. It is a popular remedy for candida and yeast infections. Pau D'Arco Bark comes from a tree that makes its habitat predominantly in Argentina and Brazil. The trees grow as tall as 30 meters, and are also known by the names tahebo or lapacho.

Unlike other trees in the area, Pau D'Arco does not develop fungus growth. The tree bark was one of the major plants used to promote health and immunity among the Incas, and its use has continued among the Callaway tribe of Indians in South America. Pau D'Arco contains a chemical called lapachol, which may provide nutritional support to the immune system. Besides lapachol, Pau D'Arco contains at least 20 other active constituents. It has clearly demonstrated broad clinical applications against a large number of disease caused by micro-organisms which explains its wide array of uses in herbal medicine. Its action seems to come from increasing oxygen supply at the local level, destroying bacteria, viruses (e.g. herpes), fungi (e.g. candida) and parasites.

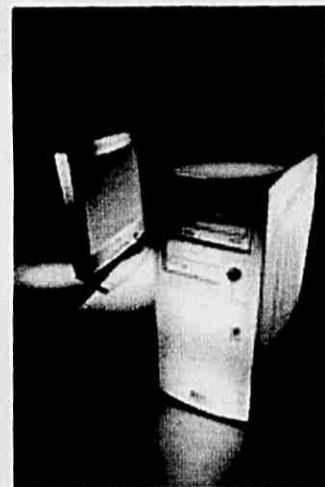

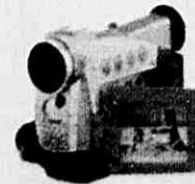

How Did The Oceans Form?

The earth began as a cloud of dust and hot, shining gas. When our planet began to cool, its surface solidified, surrounded by clouds of water vapour. When the vapour condensed (changed into liquid) and began to fall like rain, seas and oceans formed in the hollows of the earth's surface. Oceans are huge expanses of water which separate the earth's continents. The largest ocean is the Pacific Ocean, second the Atlantic Ocean and third largest the Indian Ocean. Seas are smaller expanses of water, almost always flowing either into oceans or from seas.

Why are the seas salty?

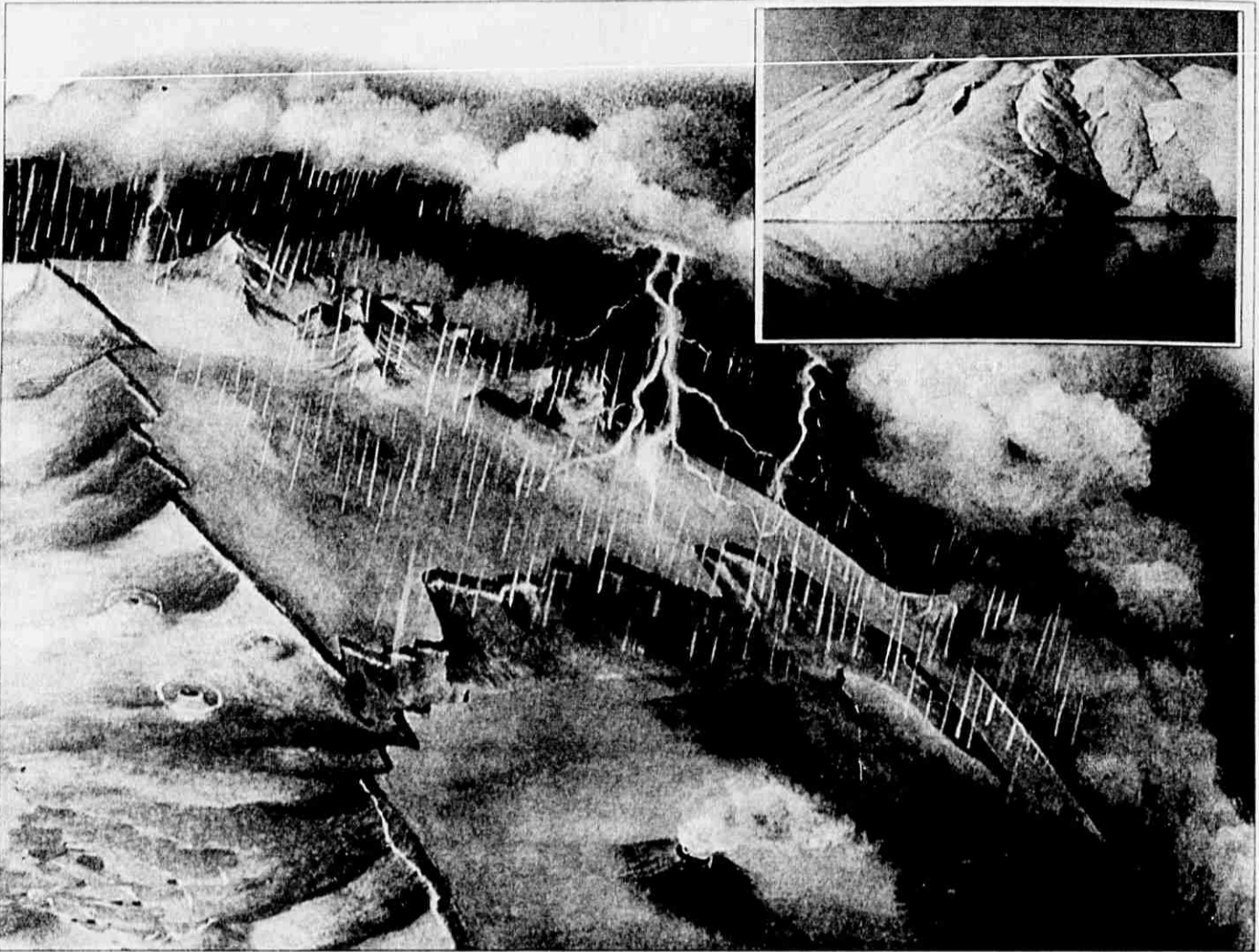
The waters of the seas and the oceans are always salty, because they are rich in mineral salts and especially sodium chloride, which is the salt used in cooking.

Facts and Figures

● As well as being the largest ocean, the Pacific is also the deepest. Challenger Deep in the Marianna Trench reaches a depth of 1103m.

The most extensive sea is the South China Sea, covering an area of 3,447,000 square kilometres.

In the Pacific Ocean is the point furthest from any land, a distance of 2575km.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

PINUS mugo varieties

It's amazing the difference the right plant in a pot or container can make to a bare doorstep, patio or any area of hard landscaping. Plants can do more than simply soften the look of concrete, paving or decking. A small cluster of two or three containers or pots with plants which work well together can completely alter a hard landscaped area for the good. Varieties of the dwarf mountain pine (Pinus mugo) provide some excellent options for planting in pots and containers. They offer a range of shapes, sizes, colours and textures. With names like 'Gnom', 'Mops' and 'Humpy' some of the Pinus mugo varieties sound like distant cousins of Snow Whites Seven Dwarfs! As their names suggest these plants can bring lots of character to a patio or balcony. The varieties 'Mops' and 'Gnom' are both rounded dwarf shrubs with lush green

needle-shaped leaves. Of the two varieties, 'Mops' has mid-green foliage whereas 'Gnom' is dark green in colour. Other varieties include 'Ophir' and 'Winter Gold'. Both these plants have golden-yellow foliage in winter. 'Ophir' is a compact and rounded variety whilst 'Winter Gold' is a bush with a more spreading growth habit. These dwarf varieties work well in pots and containers and are also suitable for small gardens and popular for use in rockeries. Being evergreen these plants bring the bonus of colour and structure throughout the year. Dwarf mountain pines are fully hardy and generally do well in most soils. Site them in a sunny position. The slow growing dwarf varieties require little maintenance. Dwarf mountain pines can work particularly well when a few are planted together or

when pots or containers are positioned in a small group. These plants are versatile and can also be used to make attractive arrangements in combination with other plants such as heathers, dwarf spruces and firs. You can also put together a themed arrangement perhaps by using Pinus mugo 'Mops' with a Japanese maple (Acer palmatum) and maybe some dwarf bamboos to create a patio planting with a Japanese feel. Planting in pots and containers is a very effective way of creating a garden area on a patio or balcony. Among the many advantages that container gardening has, one of the biggest is its mobility. There's a lot of fun to be had making and remaking an exciting patio or balcony container garden. And if you need to move house, all you have to do is put the plants in the van along with everything else!



DUNGARVAN TOWN COUNCIL SNIPPETS

Deputy Says Council Is A Powerless Body

County Manager, Donal Connolly said the provision of lighting on a busy stretch of roadway from the N25 to Tourmore will be looked at in the context of the council's next estimates meeting. But, Deputy Deasy claimed that the council's failure to move on a proposal to have the lights introduced into the lighting programme "exposes the lack of power in this council".

Mr. Connolly said it had been agreed that the "developers" of the Burgery land would provide the lighting. "Now as that development does not look like it's going ahead, we'll have to review the situation again".

Raising the issue, Mayor Nuala Ryan said she had been contacted by a member of the Gardai twice about the lack of lighting there. According to the Mayor, the locally based Garda said that there is a danger

someone will be killed there unless lighting is erected.

Deputy John Deasy proposed that money should be set aside in the lighting programme for their provision, adding that: "I think we've all heard from a lot of people who've said that this needs to be done".

The Fine Gael TD urged his fellow councillors to take action and not leave it to the administrators to make a decision.

When the County Manager said he would look at the stretch of road again, but couldn't give an assurance they would be able to put it in the programme.

Deputy Deasy continued: "I put down a proposal, but I feel that you're totally ignoring them all the time".

Again the County Manager said he would look into it but couldn't just

put things "willy nilly" into the estimates, until he looked at the implications for the council from the Government's book of estimates.

He also rejected the Deputy's contention that he was refusing the elected members proposals.

However, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) seconded the proposal, and Deputy Deasy once again called for it to be introduced.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said the council has to look at the budget before committing itself to individual projects. Cllr. Billy Kyne also suggested that the council get costing's for the public lights so the councillors could examine them at the estimates meeting.

But, Deputy Deasy claimed: "this exposes that the elected members don't have any power here. It's left up to the authorities to make the decisions at the end of the day."

He added: "if you don't agree with the proposal you can vote against it. But you're failing to do anything. This just exposes the lack of power within this council."

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan made a counterproposal that the council not make a decision on the matter until the estimates and costings are received from the ESB.

Eventually it was decided to leave a move on the lighting until the next estimates meeting.

Progress On Housing Welcomed

Cllr. Billy Kyne welcomed the continued improvements in the number of local authority houses built this year and commended the work of Housing Officer, Joe O'Flaherty. Dungarvan Town Council was allocated 110 starts for the period of 2000-2003 and is well ahead in using its four-year allocation.

Cllr. Kyne also asked about the position of the first time buyer's grant for the thirty affordable houses in Shandon.

County Manager, Donal Connolly said he has looked into the matter and confirmed that the position for affordable house buyers in Shandon remains the same.

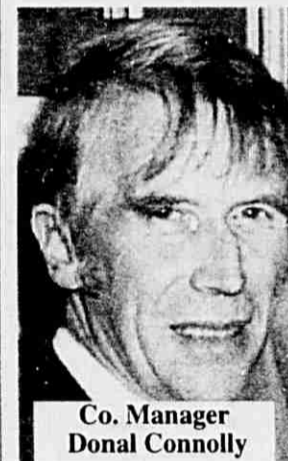
Meanwhile, the council's housing progress report states that council constructed two houses in Kilrush Park, and purchased 21 houses on the open market in 2001.

This year the council has constructed and let 40 houses in Shandon and are currently constructing a further phase of 37 houses in Shandon. Construction of 19 houses at Powers Brewery has also commenced with a joint venture, 'turnkey development' with developer Andy Halley. Proposals for infill housing (2-3) are also being considered for TJ Murphy Place and a report on the matter will be brought to council at a later date.

Mr. Connolly said, in his report, that the council has a sufficient land bank at Shandon for significant extra housing and expect that further land will become available when the impacts of Part V of the Planning and Development Act come into play next year.

No Estimates Meeting Until Next Year

A debate on the level of charges and rates for Dungarvan will not take place until January as the figures for the Council's main source of income, the Local Government Fund, are only being made known in the Government's Book of Estimates.

As a result the council's budget periods to cover next year have been extended from the 25th of November 2002 to the 15th of January 2003.

The Town Council fixed a date of January 13th, which is also the day of Waterford County Council's estimates meeting.

County Manager Donal Connolly assured the council that only the first meeting of the Town Council had to meet within these dates, and further meetings can take place after it.

CREDIT UNION ACCESS SHOULD BE OPENED

Cllr. Damien Dillon has called for the access way from Main Street to Scanlon's Yard to be opened to the public.

The Independent councillor said providing access close to Grattan Square into Scanlon's Yard would help attract people to park their cars in the council's car park and he called on the Credit Union to open the access way to the public.

Town Clerk, Brian White said the Credit Union was in full agreement that this must be implemented but said they first wish to deal with security issues and have asked to council to wait for the moment.

Bank Of Ireland Responds To Abbeyside ATM Request

The Bank of Ireland has provided the most positive response so far to the council's request for a ATM machine to be provided in Abbeyside, according to Cllr. Damien Geoghegan.

Manager at the bank, John O'Driscoll, said the request, which was originally proposed by Cllr. Geoghegan, has been passed onto their IT section.

"I am now advised that as part of our on-going commitment to expand the existing ATM network, we are actively looking at key sites including sites in Abbeyside", he said in a letter to the Town Council.

"I cannot provide you with a precise timescale in relation to this exercise but I would hope to see matters progressed over the next few months," Mr. O'Driscoll states.

The Ulster Bank previously responded to the proposal saying they are interested in locating to Abbeyside but would need assistance from the local authority in suggesting a suitable location.

Twinning With French Town Looks Unlikely

Dungarvan Town Council are looking increasingly unlikely to move on a proposal from Saint Quay Portrieux, to twin with them.

Town Clerk, Brian White, said the French town is still anxious to twin with Dungarvan. But, he said it is an extremely difficult location to get to and suggested that "perhaps it's not the best town to twin with".

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said the location was a non-runner as there is very poor road infrastructure and other types of transport infrastructure to the town are also poor.

A decision on the twinning will now be left to a later date and it will go back to the Town Twinning Committee.

LOCAL UTILITIES INFRASTRUCTURE

The old Waterford Railway line extending from Dungarvan UDC Boundary at Duckspool to Clonea Cross and beyond provides opportunity for a pedestrian/cycle amenity walk thereby reinforcing the link between Dungarvan, Clonea, Ballinroad and Ballinacourty. The opportunity to develop this linear path could be undertaken in conjunction with the proposed sewer along this route according to the Dungarvan Environs Landuse Study Plan 2002 made by Waterford County Council on the 14th of October. The new plan is a variation of the 1999 plan. The updated plan points out that local public transport services in Dungarvan are confined to taxis. The Environs Study envisages the encouragement and use of public bus transport to link the existing outlying settlements, e.g. Ballinroad with the town centre.

ABBEYSIDE RECYCLING PROGRAMME

Last week we stated that Celine Horner, Environment Education Officer, was very satisfied with the operation of the recycling collection in the Abbeyside area. This week is the Recycling Collection in the Town Council area. Again, we are reminded that the items presentable for recycling include - Cardboard, Newsprint, Magazines, Clean Milk Cartons, Clean Tetrapack, Drink Cans, Food Tins, Plastic Bottles, Plastic Containers, Plastic Bags and Wrappers. ABBEYSIDE CHURCH IN 1781

The members of the Established Church of Ireland comprised practically all the landowners at this time and all those who provided the legal and civil administration, yet it was an odd situation. The churches that the established church had taken from the Catholics were very often by this time in a ruinous condition. For example, in 1781 there were 94 churches in the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore of which only 21 were in repair. The old Friary Church in Abbeyside and also the churches of Kilrush and Colligan come to mind. The age of the buildings was one cause of this but most of them were neglected because there were no congregations to fill them.

**CATTLE: Winter Feeding**

Overwintering cattle is a costly business. Apart from Winter feed which can be 8 to 10 times more expensive than grazed grass, there are the costs associated with getting the feed to cattle (silos, meal stores, feeding machinery) and the cost of housing and slurry disposal. The cost per kg live weight gain on silage and meal diets varies from €1.50 to €1.80. A daily liveweight gain of 1.0 kg per day gives a carcass gain of about 0.60 kg for Friesians and up to 0.7 kg for Continental breeds. At a beef price of €2.52 kg (90p/lb), 0.6 kg of carcass is worth €1.50 - just about enough to cover feed costs at the more economical end of the scale. Obviously the margin over feed in Winter is going to be very tight even on efficient units. The main elements of a cost control programme are:

- (i) A short overwintering period. Aim to have good housing weights coming off grass in Autumn, 560 kg to 580 kg for 1.5 year old Continental steers, about 50 kg lower for non-Continental. Get other cattle out to grass as early as possible taking account of location and soil type.
- (ii) High animal performance. With only a small price rise likely between the start and end of the Winter finishing period, a high carcass gain is necessary to cover production costs. Where silage quality is low, an all concentrate diet produces a more cost effective and predictable performance.
- (iii) Quality rations at competitive prices. Rations containing cereals, pulps and distillers grains are high in energy which is the most critical constituent of a finishing ration. Corn gluten and soya hulls are somewhat lower in energy but are acceptable up to about 25% inclusion rates depending on cost. Straights and mixes of these ingredients, where they can be handled provide the best value for money.

Weanlings and Store Cattle

A daily live weight gain of 0.6 to 0.8 kg per day is needed over the Winter to keep weanlings and stores on target for 24 month or under 30 month finishing as appropriate. Extra concentrates will be required in many cases because of lower silage quality and lower housing weights especially on weanlings. In many cases the silage generally available to weanlings is of low to moderate quality and consequently they are not reaching target turnout weights i.e. about 400 kg for Continental steer yearlings. With good quality silage feed 1 kg concentrates per day increasing up to 3 kg/day as silage quality disimproves.

Suckler Cows

Moderate to low quality silage fed to appetite will maintain dry suckler cows in fit condition. Cows in good condition at housing can be allowed lose about 0.5 of a condition score (35 kg in body-weight), thus saving about 0.75 tonnes silage per cow. Thin cows should be built up to a body condition score of 2.5 at calving in Spring. Good quality straw supplemented with 2-3 kg concentrates per day will maintain dry suckler cows over the winter. The concentrates should have at least 15% crude protein and in addition the cows should get 100 grams per day of a high phosphorus balanced mineral/vitamin supplement. Dry cows on silage diets should get 100 grams per day of a low calcium pre-calver mineral supplement in the last month before calving. Autumn calvers need 1-3 kg concentrates per day depending on silage quality.

The application dates for the 2003 ewe premium are from Wednesday 4th December to Friday January 3rd next. Retention ends on April 13th, 2003. The value of the premium for 2003 will be exactly the same as this year. If you are keeping hoggets, do your sums on that basis.

FARMING LEADER

FRENCH URGES GROWERS TO DELIVER BEET TO FILL NATIONAL SUGAR QUOTA

The Chairman of IFA's Sugar Beet Section Willie French, has called on all beet growers to make every possible effort to harvest all sugar beet in order to fill the national sugar quota. "Growers have a responsibility to ensure as far as possible that all beet is delivered as contract beet" said Mr. French.

At a meeting with Irish Sugar last week, the Sugar Beet Section sought an easing of the 90% delivery performance clause for genuine growers with a good delivery record. "This was rejected by the company who estimate that there is enough beet to fill the national sugar quota of 192,200 tonnes and also to bring all growers' deliveries to 90% or over" said Mr. French.

DEVINE CRITICISES NEW TB TESTING CHARGES

Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman, James Devine has said that it is an outrageous move by the Government to impose additional costs on top of a sector that already has a critical low income base. Mr. Devine said now that farmers are fully paying for TB testing, Government levies in this area should be abolished rather than increased. He said the Government are using livestock farmers as a soft target to collect money.

INDUSTRY MUST BE UNITED ON DAIRY INCOMES WHEN MEETING WITH FISCHLER -DILLON

IFA President John Dillon has recently announced that the long awaited meeting with Commissioner Fischler, to be led by Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh and IFA and to include dairy co-op Chairmen and Chief Executives had been arranged for Friday 29th November 2002.

In preparation for the meeting, the National Dairy Committee will meet on Monday 25th November, and co-op Chairmen and Chief Executives, IFA and De-

partment of Agriculture representatives will be meeting on Tuesday 26th November in Dublin. "I want us all with a solid position, concentrating absolutely on dairy farmers' incomes, and the EU policy measures required to allow them recover in 2003," John Dillon said.

"The average 182,000 litre (40,000 gals) producer has lost 10,000 in 2002, as a result of price cuts and increased costs. Dairy farmers cannot live through another year like that

in 2003," he added.

"I expect industry to forcefully demand that the Commission would provide support measures at a level allowing to maintain, as an absolute minimum, a floor producer price of 28c/litre (£1.00/gallon). I also want the Chairmen and Chief Executives of our co-ops to fight with us for the Commission to stop stifling the current market recovery, so that farmers may look forward to price increases in 2003," he concluded.

Cullen Approves €1.5m Go-ahead For Local Sewerage Schemes

Minister for the Environment, Martin Cullen, has approved funding for new sewerage treatment plants at Aghlish, Villierstown, Clashmore, Piltown and Tallow as part of the Serviced Land Initiative.

The decision will enable new housing development needs to proceed in each of the respective areas, the Minister said.

Under the proposed schemes a total of 172.5 acres will be opened up for new housing and a further 1,000 sites will be serviced by the treatment plants.

Costing an estimated €1.5m the scheme will improve the service to these villages, which are currently serviced by septic tanks.

Minister Cullen said: "I am delighted to be able to give the go-ahead to these schemes. They are urgently needed to ensure housing development in these areas can proceed in line with the County Development Plan."

"Just as importantly, these schemes also allow us to put in place vital development without adversely affecting our environment, particularly, for example, the River Blackwater, which is a resource to be treasured."

One hundred and fifty new housing sites will be serviced in Aghlish; 175 in Villierstown; 175 in Clashmore; 90 in Piltown and a further 400 in Tallow.

Work on the project is expected to get underway before the end of the year and should be complete in 2003.

collections are not covering the cost of providing the service," he said.

"I believe the scale of the increases sought by the County Manager, both this year, and into the future, will remove the last fiction that local charges are solely for the provision of refuse or services".

"In effect, this constitutes a poll tax", he claimed. "Direct taxation - irrespective of income - is being introduced by the back door."

He went on to say, that when Household rates were abolished by Fianna Fail in 1977, "in similar style to the con-job they pulled on the electorate in the last general election, the finances of local authorities were decimated, and this in turn led to the imposition of service charges, job cuts and decreased services throughout the eighties and nineties."

Without a proper system of financing local authorities, councillors will be faced with drastic increases in service charges at every estimates meeting, he said.

"The question, I believe is a simple one. Do we want to continue with the pretence that councillors actually have a real say in how local authorities are financed or do we introduce a fair and equitable system that gives local authorities proper funding?"

He added that the Government approach, to resolve its gross mismanagement of the country's finances, targets those waiting for a home, and for that reason, he predicts that significant increased local taxes in all areas will occur.

WITHDRAWAL FROM VOTING PACT

While Fine Gael entered into a voting pact with Fianna Fail at County level, following the 1999 local

elections, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan has now called on his Waterford County Council colleagues to withdraw from this agreement.

"As a party, we need to begin considering, not if we are going to continue our pact with Fianna Fail in the County Council, but when we take leave of them. They have, through their cutbacks and so-called adjustments in spending, shown that commitment to Local Government is non-existent in Fianna Fail".

PROJECT SMILE, LISMORE 2002

To Each Householder and Parishioner

Good work has been done in the literature field in Lismore in recent years. It is now felt the photographic inheritance should get attention, accordingly Project SMILE (Snaps, Momentums and Immemorial of Lismore and Environs) had been set up following an inaugural meeting at Lismore Hotel on Friday April 19, followed up since by some preliminary action. Lismore has a tradition of photography - if a bit gapped - going back to the 1840's, thanks to the pioneer Francis Currey. The idea is to initially form an archive of available photos from which a large format book of approx. 800 representative photos will be compiled. The geographic reach will include Lismore's natural and traditional parish (Catholic and Protestant) town lands. Ambitious? Lismore has fame and greatness belying its size; its claim to importance is authenticated by the extent of its recovered and maintained heritage which must include the photographic to be all-inclusive. Project SMILE is a recovery operation. Tragically, much of the photographic heritage gets lost or wantonly destroyed. Statistical fact: Lismore loses one irreplaceable old photo a week. A local archive, initially at least under the auspices of the editors, could halt this. A photographic archive is a powerful link in the overall commemorative process; ancestral memory is more durably enshrined in a photo than in a gravestone. Fact! All photos are unique in themselves. Proust said a broken plate can be replaced as beautiful as a palace. Magic is the seeming banal. All photos hence, are welcome and can be archived, be they striated, torn, sepia or whatever.

What To Do: Select photos (be generous for your own sake!) number then simply and give details if necessary on accompanying large (A4) sheets, read left from right and back row to front row if people, even objects etc., give any extra details you wish e.g. John Denton, died Leeds 1948, if you can coax Lismore connected photos from ex-Lismoreians do so, for their good, put photos in large self-addressed envelope and await collection or deliver to anyone of the four co-editors namely, Evelyn Walsh, Paddy Vaughan, Tommy Keating, Johnny Ryan.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question

I am currently receiving a Mobility Allowance from the Health Board. I am also hoping to buy an adapted car and have applied to the Health Board for a Motorised Transport Grant. If I get the grant will I continue to receive the Mobility Allowance?

Answer

Up until recently you would have continued to receive the Mobility Allowance. However, this has now changed. Mobility Allowance is paid monthly by the Health Board to a person with a severe disability who is unable to walk and would benefit from a change of surroundings. You must satisfy a means test and must be aged between 16 and 66 when applying. The maximum payment is 126.00 Euro per month.

The Motorised Transport Grant is paid by the Health Board to a person between the ages of 17 and 65 with a severe disability, towards the purchase or adaptation of a car where such an adapted car is essential for the person to obtain or retain employment. Self-employed persons who meet the criteria may also be eligible. In exceptional circumstances, it may be paid to a person with a severe disability living in a very isolated area, even though they may not be in employment.

The person must hold a full driving licence and must satisfy a means test. In certain circumstances someone else may be approached to drive for the person with the disability where he/she is not physically or medically capable of driving.

Up to 75% of the actual cost may be granted. The maximum grant available is 4,370 Euro.

Since 1 July, 2002 if you are receiving a Mobility Allowance and receive a Motorised Transport Grant you will no longer be paid the Mobility Allowance as the payment of a Motorised Transport Grant is subject to the condition that the health Board will not be called upon at any future date to contribute towards the running costs of the vehicle. You will not be eligible for the Mobility Allowance again until three years after the date of payment of the Motorised Transport Grant.

MONEYMATTERS

PREVENT THE COLD FROM GETTING IN

Now that the warm weather has finally left it may be time to look around your home to see if you can cut down on your energy expenditure. The following points may be helpful:

Close off any unused fire places while leaving a small space to keep the chimney aired.

Have chimney and gas fires cleaned regularly.

Use heavy lined curtains over ill-fitting doorways and movable soft foam snakes.

Close your curtains before the outside temperature drops in the evenings. Ensure your curtains do not hang over radiators. This will draw the heat out the window.

Insulate your attic but be sure to follow all safety procedure when doing this.

Repair cracked panes and replace missing putting on windows.

Insulate your attic water tank and pipes.

Check your doors, if you can see daylight around the doors when it is closed you may need to reset the hinges. Use draft excluders, around doors not forgetting to include the letterbox of course!

Keep you Bin Men Smiling!

At the moment the Council is assessing how best to expand bin collection routes in order to provide the best possible service to the greatest number of people. In order for bin collections to run as smoothly as possible there are a few small things that we might all do to speed up collections and to keep the bin men smiling.

Remember no extra boxes or bins left out with your bin will be collected. This is to ensure the health and safety of the refuse collection crews.

Put your bins out beside your neighbours. Collection efficiency would be hugely increased if bins were left out in pairs, as the two could be lifted simultaneously.

Leave your bin at the kerb side of the footpath, with the handles facing the road. Some people go to great lengths to face the handles of their bin into the wall or hedge, which means they have to be dragged out and turned. Again, if bins were left near the kerb with handles facing the road, collection efficiency would increase.

People who live on rural / semi-rural routes and have splayed entrances should leave the bin out where it is visible to the driver on approach. Often, people leave the bin behind the wing wall on the approach side, where it is invisible to the driver until it's passed it. This can lead to excessive screeching of breaks.

A Home for Bottle Banks

The Council currently has 40 bottle banks spread out throughout the county. It is hoped to increase to approximately 52, which will mean reaching the ideal ratio of one for every 1,000 people. If you know of an area that requires a bottle bank please write stating the suggested location to the Environment Section, Waterford County Council.

DISABILITY AWARENESS

DISABILITY BILL

The Employment Equality Act 1998 and the Equal Status Act 2000 were introduced to provide equal treatment and non-discrimination on grounds of disability. The Employment Equality Act was introduced to provide equal treatment of people with disabilities in the area of employment and training. The Equal Status Act provided equal treatment of people with disabilities in the area of goods, services and accommodation. The Disability Bill of 2001 was introduced to cover the remaining areas of accessibility of all buildings and services, transport services, access to social services, employment in the public service and genetic testing. Unfortunately the Disability Bill of 2001 in its present form failed within three days and was withdrawn by the Government under pressure from Disability Organisations. Because it was not Rights based and was not enforceable. The Waterford Network of People with Disabilities in Ireland (PWDL) would therefore like to see the new Disability Act which is presently being drafted. For this reason any Disabilities Act must have at its core the following thirteen guiding principals: This weeks article will cover the first three core principals; this will be continued over the next four weeks.

A comprehensive and mandatory "rights based" Bill

The Commission on the Status of People with Disabilities in Ireland in its Report made 402 Recommendations in connection with the status of people with disabilities. These recommendations emphasise throughout that the legal status of people with disabilities must be rights based and that this group must be granted legal protection in line with international human rights conventions. In particular, recommendation 9 provided that:

'A Disabilities Act should be introduced which sets out the rights of people with disabilities and means of redress for those whose rights are denied. The Act should outlaw all discrimination against People with disabilities and should require public and private bodies, employers and educators to make reasonable accommodation to meet their specific need'.

The United Nations Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights in its observations on Ireland's report on the implementation of the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights criticised the Disability Bill for not adopting a human rights based approach and at recommendation 25 'strongly recommend(ed) that (Ireland) adopt a human rights based approach in the Disability Bill'.

PWDL therefore take the view that nothing less than a rights based Act, with an opportunity for legal redress where those rights are not met, is acceptable. The Act must complement existing legislation such as Building Regulations, the Employment Equality Act, the Equal Status Act, and any future acts on disability, for example, the proposed Education for Persons with Disabilities Bill. Any new Act must not take away any existing rights in whatever form these may take.

Promotion of human dignity of persons with disabilities

The United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, Mary Robinson, commissioned a detailed study on Human Rights and Disability that was presented to the United Nations on 14th January 2002. This study indicated that a dramatic shift had taken place over the past two decades in regard to people with disabilities in which the position of this group was no longer viewed from a charity perspective but instead people with disabilities were to be seen as holders of human rights. Fundamental to a human rights perspective is the entitlement to be treated with dignity as a human person. PWDL therefore takes the view that any Disability Act must promote the human dignity of persons with disabilities. For this reason, the proposed Act must state that any measures required to be undertaken and obligations imposed by the Act must be fulfilled in a manner that most promotes the human dignity of persons with disabilities.

The right of people with disabilities to participate in the mainstream of society

People with disabilities must be afforded equal social, political, employment and appropriate educational rights, thereby enabling people with disabilities to contribute to the development of society and to enjoy full participation in the life of the community.

One of the country's oldest citizens, Rita Duffy, a native of Villierstown, passed away recently.

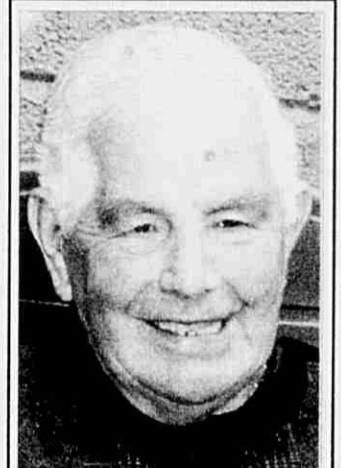

CO. BOARD MEETING

The final meeting of the outgoing county board took place at Lawlor's Hotel on Monday night of last week with P.J. Ryan, chairman presiding.

Michelle Power (football) and Peter Power, (Hurling) gave their annual reports to the delegates in which they each gave an update on school coaching and the splendid cooperation being received from school teachers, etc.

It being Peter's final report he thanked many of the personalities with whom he worked like, Rev. Bro. Grifey, Mount Sion, Rev. Brother J.L. Dormer, formerly of Lismore, C.B.S., Pat Moore. Coaching and Games Development, Ned Power, Tallow, etc. etc. Peter said that their help had been invaluable to him when he took the coaching job over 12 years ago,

The county chairman thanked him for his expert and very devoted service to the county, in the coaching sector and said that schools and clubs had benefited enormously from Peter's coaching. Tom Browne,

Ballinameela club and others also joined in the tributes.

Finance

The regular monthly financial update was deferred as the accounts were with the accountant in preparation for the annual convention.

Also because Tony is in hospital. The best wishes of all the delegates was sent to Tony who expects to be back in time for the convention.

Coisde Na Peil

A 20 point plan designed to improve football standards and administration, was submitted by the football committee and given county board approval.

Greg Fives who presented the report informed the meeting that one of the three county football selectors who had been appointed last year for a two year term, had retired. The Coisde were proposing that the number of selectors be increased to five. No objection was voiced.

S.R.C. Report

What is described as an interim report was submitted by the committee which was set up last year to look at the administration, champi-

onship and league structures and the general workings of the board in the county, was presented by Liam Moroney on behalf of the committee.

He gave an outline of all that was being proposed and he said that members of the S.R.C would be meeting with all the clubs to explain in detail to the members.

The restructuring of the administration would have all activities within the county under the control of three boards instead of six which operate at the present

The three boards, Adult, Minor and Juvenile would run all championships and leagues. The championship and leagues structures which are proposed, were also outlined.

S. O'Brien described as 'radical' the proposals to abolish the Divisional boards at adult and juvenile level. He said he found it extraordinary that absolutely no reasons were given as to why these boards should be abolished after serving the divisions satisfactorily for over 75 years.

Others also commented. Liam said that after they had visited the clubs, a special convention could take place around February to have the proposals debated and decisions taken.

Reports

The Munster Council report referred to the upcoming Munster championships and advised all county boards that all monies due to the council must be remitted before November 30th.

There was also an instruction regarding the issue of gear to referees in the county.

Mount Sion club were praised by Jimmy O'Gorman for having released their players for the Railway Cup despite the fact that they were scheduled to play in the Munster Club semi-final against Adare a week later.

The Central Council report on the Special Congress told of the decisions taken as a result of the S.R.C. motions. This included the decision that players under 16 and downwards cannot play more than two years above their age. As and from next year all underage championships up to minor grade must be played to a finish if the contestants are level at full time. This will not apply to finals.

All elected officers from club officials upwards will have their term of office limited to five years but may stand for re election again for one further term after a lapse

of five years County boards must adjust their Bye Laws accordingly and all clubs are notified to amend their club constitutions.

Also counties are instructed to amend their Bye Laws (Rule 59) to enlarge their management committee. Already all counties must have eight sub committees and this number is extended to eleven with the appointment/election of a County Finance Committee, an Information Technology Committee and a County Panel Finance Committee.

Progress Reports

All three boards gave an update on championship and league progress and when it was seen that the under 21 hurling championship is presently in arrears, it was agreed unanimously that from here on (this year only) if matches played on Saturday, end in a draw, the replay will take place on the following day.

At the conclusion of the meeting the county chairman thanked all clubs, board officers, field committees etc. etc. for their cooperation during this busy and historic year for Waterford.

Celebrations

On Friday of this week, Modeligo club will hold a Silver Jubilee function to celebrate 25 years of very active involvement as a dual club and by all accounts the event will be a big hit.

For a small rural club which is encircled by the more established units, Modeligo have not only survived, but have succeeded by winning championships in both codes. This has made it all worthwhile.

All Stars

At the City West hotel, Dublin on this Friday night, our eight nominees will sit impatiently around the banquet table for the announcement that will name the fifteen to go on to the elite list of hurling stars of 2002.

There are going to be disappointments because we are not going to get all eight named. Speculation around the county puts about half our number into strong contention. My prediction is that we will get two or possibly three All Stars on the night.

In the scheme, the adjudicators have never revealed how the selection process works and this is one reason why there is so much criticism when players who have performed outstandingly throughout the year, are omitted.

Classic Encounter Anticipated In Thurles As Mount Sion Take On Sixmilebridge in Munster Club Final

It is a case of all roads leading to Semple Stadium, Thurles on Sunday next for what promised to be an absolute thriller between the Waterford and Clare county champions in the 39th playing of the very prestigious Munster Club hurling final.

The Clare champions who will be favourites to take their 4th Munster Club title here, had Mount Sion as their opponents in the provincial final in 2000 when the Clare team decisively and deservedly won on a scoreline of 2-17 to 3-8.

In that final Sixmile' were making it six victories on the trot for the Clare county champions. Ballygunner broke the sequence last year after taking the title.

Mount Sion, now being coached by Jim Greene who incidentally played at corner forward on the Mount Sion team when they won their one and only provincial title back in 1981, beating South Liberties, Limerick on a 3-9 to 1-4 scoreline, are playing in their 7th. Munster final and after winning in 1981 they were defeated in the finals of '66, '67, '75, '88, and 2000. They are playing in the Munster Club championship for the 14th time and this by any standards is a proud record.

Sixmilebridge won their first title in centenary year, 1984 when accounting for Patricks Well on a score of 4-10 to 2-6. They next won in 1995, defeating Eire Og, Nenagh by 2-18 to 1-7 and their last triumph was two years ago against Mount Sion. They have played in 7 Munster finals, and have lost on 4 occasions.

In the 14 years in which Sion have represented Waterford, they have so far played 26 Munster Club matches, this is a record not yet achieved by any other club.

But as we know only too well, records count for nothing in the heat of battle and in a situation where everything depends on how they perform on the day. Both clubs played their semi finals on the same day and while each was played at the same time, they were at different venues and therefore it would be impossible to make a comparison of standards.

A second hand report about the Sixmilebridge victory over Cork champions, Blackrock, tell of a sparkling display by the Clare county champions as veteran Christy Chaplin, county goalkeeper David Fitzgerald, Cyril Crowe, Nial Gilligan Bob Culbert and company brought their vast experience into play in a contest that went all the way 'to the wire' before a huge crowd at Cusack Park, Ennis.

Mount Sion have defeated Limerick county champions, Adare by 2-13 to 1-13 in the first round and then defeated Mullinahone by 2-12 to 0-15.

They won both matches deservedly but it must be said that the public generally were not over impressed and there was a feeling about that Mount Sion were that little bit lucky that both matches were in Walsh Park. There was also the feeling that coach/trainer Jim Greene was not all too pleased with the attitude of a number of players who seemed to question the referee's decisions.

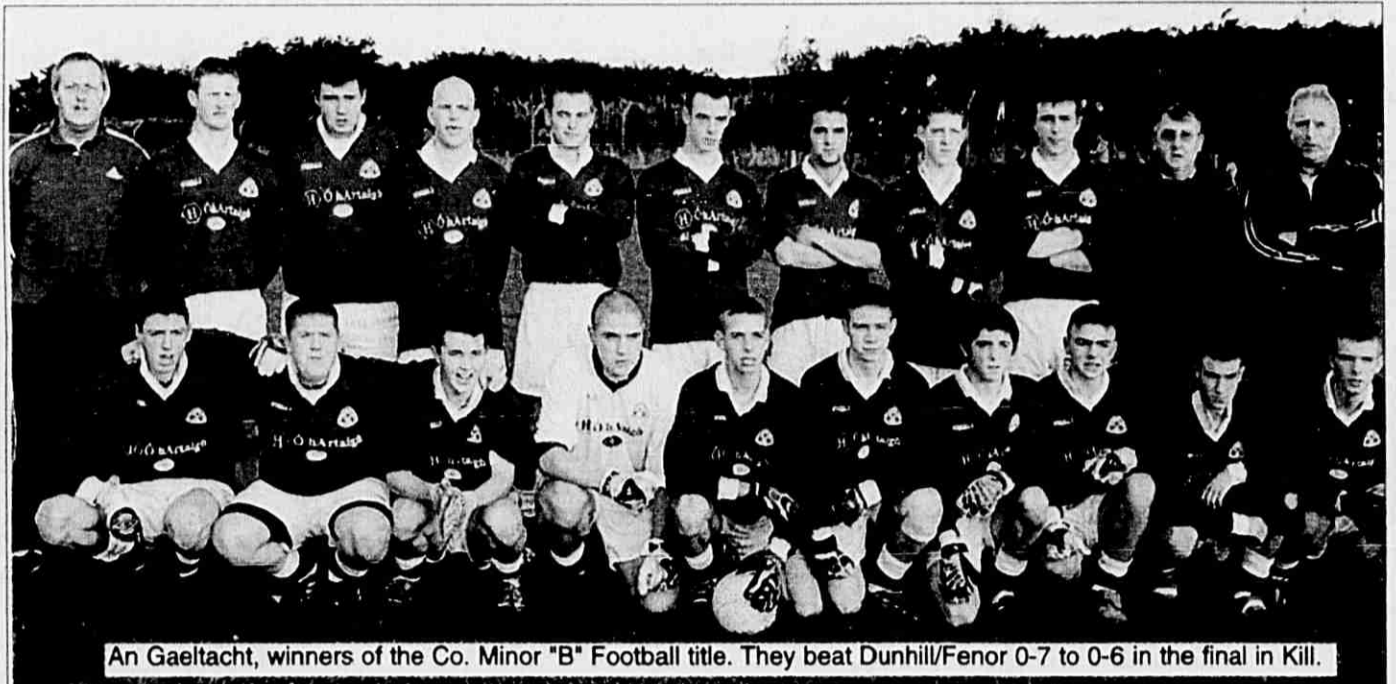
Thurles will be a much better pitch and the teams will not have to contend with unsatisfactory underfoot conditions so players on both sides can concentrate on the ball rather than on the sod.

Like Sixmilebridge, Mount Sion have their share of top class players and they should be able to match our friends in the matter of skill and team play, but they will certainly need to have All Star nominees Ken McGrath Eoin Kelly and company 'up' their game to a fair extent on the semi-final performance, if they are going to retain the Munster Club title for Waterford.

I would make Sixmilebridge slight favourites to repeat their 2000 victory over the Waterford champions, but with thousands travelling in support of Mount Sion and the 'Waterford roar' being heard to good effect, one never knows?

were on their knees and with their backs up against the wall when fighting to successfully defend a shaky

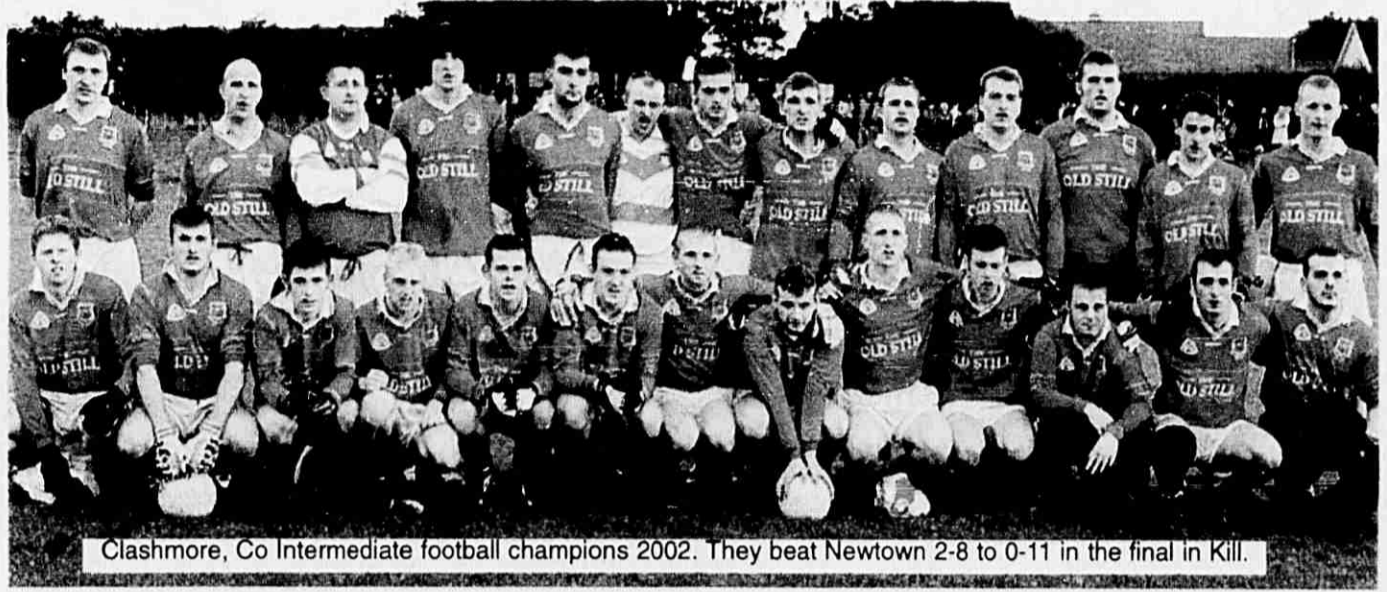
one point lead at the end of what must be described as one of the best under 21 "B" county finals played for a very long time. This was the second of the two finals and the crowd who departed after the first one, missed seeing something that is unlikely to be repeated for a long time to come.

Considering the abysmal weather that had been endured for the past month, the underfoot conditions were satisfactory and the overhead conditions could not have been better as the sides took the field for a 1 p.m. start.

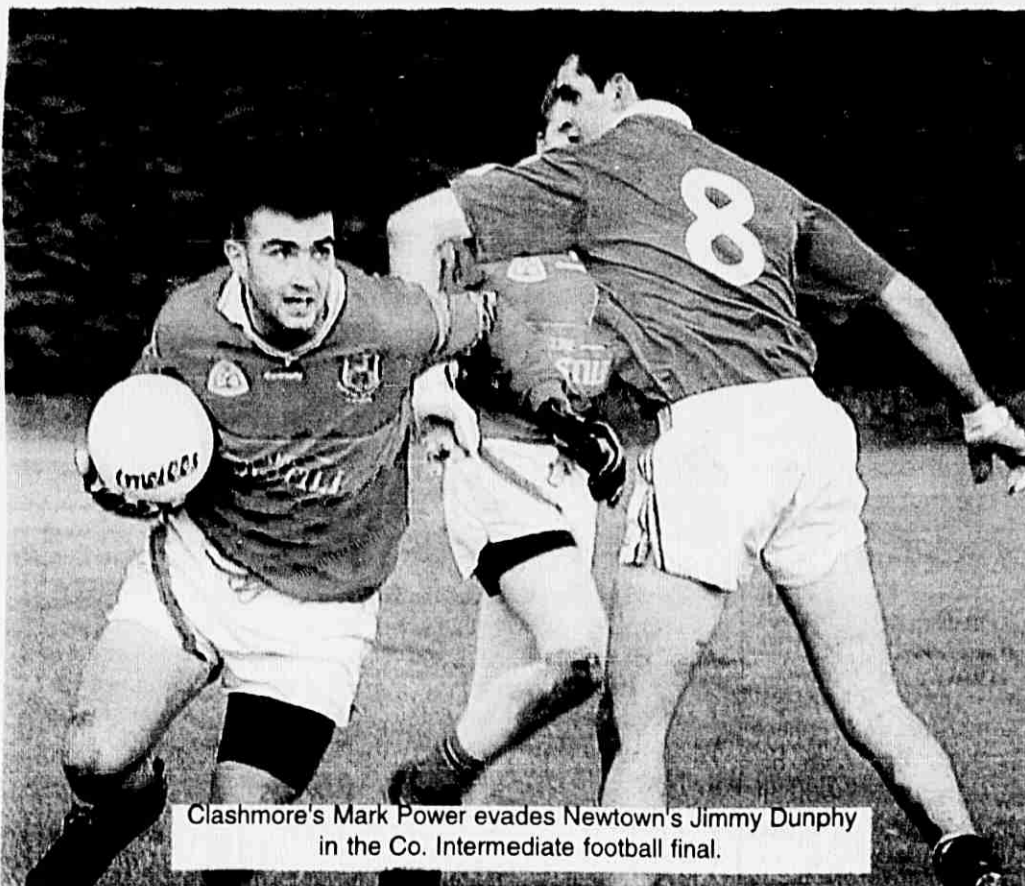

Dungarvan Hillwalking Club

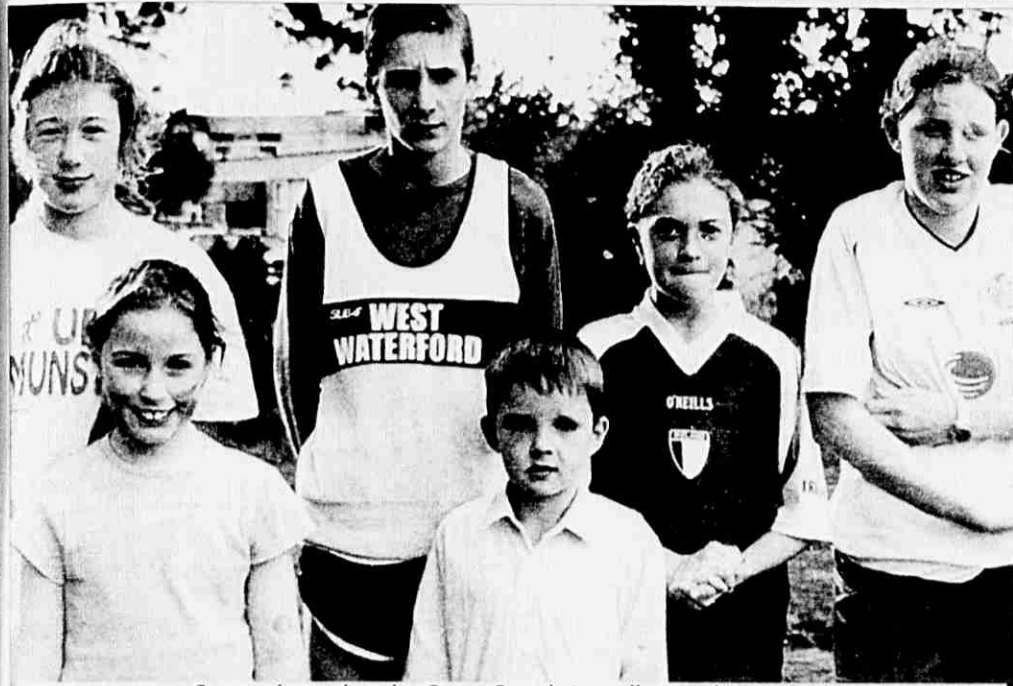

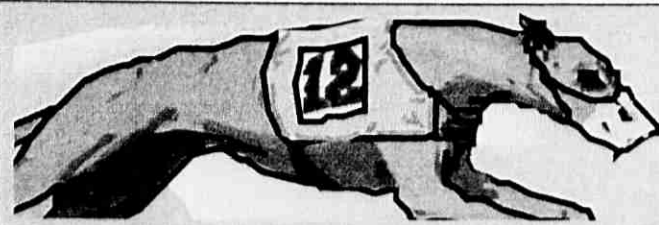

Membership for 2003 is now due. Membership fee is *12.70. New members are welcome. Luke Wadding (1588-1657)

Luke Wadding was born in Waterford on 16 October 1588. He completed his education in Lisbon and Coimbra and then entered the Franciscan Order. He was ordained at Vizeu in Portugal in 1613. In 1617 he was appointed president of the Irish College in Salamanca. The following year he went to Rome as theologian to the Spanish mission. He remained in Rome for the remainder of his life. It was he who founded the Irish Franciscan College of Saint Isidore (1625) and the Ludovician College for Irish secular clergy (1627). He always kept close links with Ireland and after the insurrection of 1641 it was his influence with the Vatican that secured support for the Catholic Confederation. Money, ships and arms were sent to Ireland. The Pope sent Rinuccini as nuncio to Ireland. Wadding was a prolific writer. He published 36 books in all. His works include Annales Minorum (1625-54), which is a history of the Franciscan order in eight volumes. This work won him international acclaim. His other great achievement was first critical edition of the entire works of Duns Scottus (1639). Wadding died in Rome on 18 November 1657.

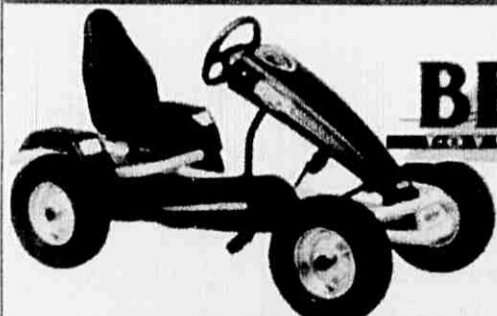

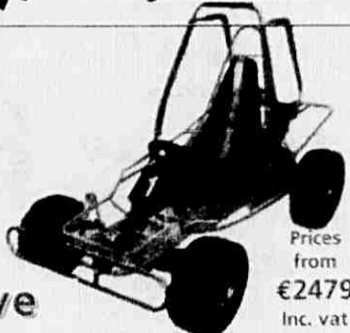


