Local Toy Store Badly Gutted In New Years **Eve Blaze**

Extensive damage has been caused to The World of Wonder Toy Store, in Kilrush Industrial Estate in Dungarvan, after a fire gutted the premises on New Years Eve night.

The World of Wonder store suffered considerable damage in the blaze while stock in the premises at the time was also gutted.

An investigation into the cause of the fire is underway and an estimate of the losses involved is currently being

In the County Manager's report on the financial status of Waterford County Council, Mr. Connolly said this level of increase compares favourably with the charges being levied by other local authorities.

He also states that while recycling is clearly very successful, the provision of recycling is expensive and will cost Waterford County Council an estimated eur910,000 this year.

Opposition to an increase

increase in the collection of in the charges is likely to be councillors and may also come from Independent Cllr. Betty Twomey at next Friday's estimates meeting.

However, a pact between Fianna Fail and Fine Gael will be the decisive factor. Dungarvan Town Councillor, Damien Geoghegan (Fine Gael) publicly called for his colleagues on the County Council to break from the pact in recent weeks. However, it remains unconfirmed whether Fine Gael will do so.

Meanwhile, the County Manager's report reveals that road transport and safety accounts for the largest share of the council's rev-

enue expenditure with 36% of its 2002 expenditure made in this area. It also reveals that the largest income share the council takes in is from the Local Government Fund (28%), which has increased by eurl.4 million this year.

However, the Co. Manager's report estimates a eur4.9 million increase in the council's expenditure, including a 33% increase in expenditure on Environmental Protection, a 16.2% increase on Miscellaneous Services, and a 15.6% increase on Water Supply and Sewerage.

In conclusion, Mr. Connolly stated that the budget is the minimum necessary to provide a proper service and represents a significant reduction on the amounts of money individual sections feel are necessary to provide the type of service they would wish.



DUNGARVAN MUSEUM NOTES

St. Brigid's Well Brewery

The Museum recently acquired a copy of a sale poster for the Brewery and Lodge in Dungarvan which is dated 1917. The following newspaper cutting gives some interesting details:-

On Thursday at the Courthouse, Messrs. Thomas Walsh & Sonput up for sale for the Trustees of the Marquis of Waterford the fee - simple interest in St. Brigid's Well Brewery, where for years the Dower family brewed their famous ales and beer. The Courthouse was crowded when the sale began.

Lot 1, consisting of St. Brigid's Well Brewery with the machinery therein and stables etc.--. The bidding opened by Mr. Thomas Power, Chairman Co. Coun-

cil at £500, Mr. H. D. Keane Solicitor, Waterford, bid £510, Mr. Power £515, Mr. Keane £520 and Mr. Power £525.

The Auctioneer then put up Lot 3 consisting of 10 acres of the marsh. The only bid given was £200 by Mr. Thomas Power.

The Auctioneer then put up Lots 1 and 3 together...and they were then knocked down amidst applause to Mr. Thomas Power at £740.

Brewery Lodge. This charming residence with its tennis court, coach house, gardens etc. was next put up for sale - Mr. J. R. Dower offered £800, while Mr. N. Morrisey J. P. £900 and Mr. E. A. Ryan solicitor £920. Mr. Dower then bid £1,610... the Lot was

knocked down to him for Dr. J. C. Hackett, who received hearty congratulations on his purchase.





SPICIOS UP SXIALITE A

INTRODUCE a little Continental variety into a well known meal with this delicious recipe.

Ingredients:

(Serves 2)

2 lean beef, lamb or pork steaks For the beef steak:

> 2 x 15ml sp cranberry sauce 50g Camembert cheese

For the lamb steak:

2 x 15ml sp tomato relish
Pinch of chilli powder (for each steak)
1 x 15ml sp fresh mint, chopped

For the pork steak:

50g Gruyère cheese 50g lean bacon rashers

Method:

Grill one side of the steaks, according to the chart on the right.


Turn over the steak, then grill for half the cooking time.

For the beef and lamb steak, spread over the cranberry sauce or tomato relish and top with remaining ingredients.

For the pork steak, place the cheese on top of the steak and grill the bacon separately on the grill pan. Grill the steaks for the remaining time.

Cut the cooked bacon strips and sprinkle over the pork steak.

Serve the steaks with a mixed green salad, asparagus and new potatoes.



GRILLING CHART: timings for each side

Beef steaks

(sirloin or rump) thickness 2cm, rare - 3 minutes, medium - 4 minutes, well done - 6 minutes

Pork steaks

(loin, leg) thickness 1-2cm, 6-8 minutes

Lamb steaks

(leg, chump) thickness 1-2cm, 4-6 minutes

Carrot Magic

A DELICIOUS sweet and sour dish that goes well with roast chicken.

Ingredients: (Serves 4)

25g unsalted butter 2 shallots and 2 garlic cloves, finely diced

- 2 x 15ml sp orange juice
- 1 x 15ml sp raisins 1 x 15ml sp cider vinegar
- 1 x 15ml sp vegetable oil grated zest of half an
- orange and 1 lemon
- 2 x 15ml sp black treacle 1 x 15ml sp tomato ketchup
- 1 x 5ml sp English mustard
- 1 x 5ml sp Worcestershire
- sauce
- 1 x 5ml sp Tabasco
- 1/4 x 5ml sp soft thyme leaves
- 1 x 15ml sp snipped chives
- 1 x 15ml sp flat-leaf parsley

1 x 15ml sp toasted flaked almonds

Method:

Melt the butter in a pan and add the shallots and garlic. Cook over a medium heat for 6 mins.

Blend orange juice, raisins, vinegar and oil until smooth. Add to saucepan with citrus zest, treacle, ketchup, mustard, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco and salt. Bring to the boil and simmer for 10 minutes.

Place carrots and onions on baking tray and pour sauce over them. Bake in a preheated oven at 175°C/350°F/gas mark 4 for about 45 minutes. Turn and baste every 10 mins. Just before serving, toss with the herbs and almonds.

Bailey's Cake

SMOOTH and tasty cheese- to line the base and sides of a cake made with creamy coffee liqueur. to line the base and sides of a 23cm flan tin, pressing down with the back of a spoon. Chill.

Ingredients: (Serves 6-8)

Base:

250g plain chocolate
Hobnobs, crushed
50g unsalted butter, melted

Filling:

200ml Bailey's Irish Cream 11.7g sachet gelatine 300g full-fat cream cheese 50g good quality plain

chocolate, melted 200ml double cream

Decoration:

150ml double cream chocolate coffee beans

Method:

Stir together the crushed bis- tre. Do cuits and melted butter and use beans.

23cm flan tin, pressing down with the back of a spoon. Chill. Meanwhile, warm the Bailey's, then remove from the heat and

add gelatine, stirring until dissolved.

Beat the cream cheese, melted chocolate and Bailey's mixture together until smooth.

Spoon into the prepared biscuit case and chill until set.

To decorate:

Whip the double cream and pipe around the rim and centre. Dot with chocolate coffee beans



"Minister Ahern, no doubt, will come back to me and point out that he may have won recognition in Brussels for the longstanding Irish record on conservation in the Celtic Sea off Co. Waterford and that we in the south east may seem to have escaped the worst of the cutbacks in total allowable catches. There are still major difficulties, however, and the situation pertaining before talk of the recent CFP proposals still needs to be addressed. Whilst urging the Minister - at this eritical juncture – to build on

fishing communities in local conservation and stock recovery plans and in the commercial development of new species, I have also asked him to signal our dissatisfaction with what I see as an underutilisation of the expansive fishing grounds that we have. 


WHY DOES THE WIND BLOW?

hen the air becomes heated up by the sun, it becomes lighter and rises up high. Cold air, being heavier, descends lower. These movements of hot and cold air which take place in the atmosphere are continuous. When the hot air rises, cold air descends lower and takes the place of the hot air and this begins to form wind. Weather experts study carefully the formation of winds and predict weather conditions in different parts of the world. They use satellite images which show the earth's surface as covered by masses of cloud in constant movement.

What Is A Tropical Cyclone?


A tropical cyclone is a violent storm which forms on oceans in tropical regions. Water vapour and hot air rising up rapidly from the sea forms

a whirlwind of dense cloud which spins around a centre called the 'eye' of the cyclone and which moves at high speed. If the cyclone reaches the land, it causes rain, violent winds and blows high waves, destroying everything in its part.

Thousands Mourn Death Of Barry Brothers



Thousands gathered in Lismore and Ballyduff to mourn the sad passing of two of the county's leading members of the GAA and farming communities, brothers John and David Barry, whose sad passing occurred in Bon Sucours Hospital in Cork within hours of each other last

John Barry, 76, of Glencairn, Lismore who had been admitted to hospital on St. Stephen's Day, died on New Years Eve night, and his brother, David, 72, of Glencairn, Tallow who had been lowed by what was one of admitted as a patient on Monday last week, passed away unexpectedly some hours later in the early hours of New Year's Day.

A member of one of West Waterford's best known farming families, John, was a former Chairman of Waterford Foods. He guided the giant Dungarvan based dairy Co-op through difficult times and oversaw its eventual merger with Avonmore Carthage's Cemetery in the Foods to form Glanbia PLC.

At the time of his death, he was national President of ICOS, and Chairman of the Waterford Leader Partnership. He was also a former Chairman of Waterford IFA and last year was honoured by the organisation for his important contribution to it over the last thirty years. He was also closely associated with other agriculture related companies, and nationwide was recognised as one of the most esteemed members of the agricultural community

The removal of John's remains took place from the local hospital mortuary to St Cartages Church Lismore last Thursday evening fol-

the biggest funeral corteges ever seen in the area. The attendance included Dail Deputies, Senators, local Town and County Councillors, as well as many leading figures of the Irish agricultural industry, together with senior members of the Glanbia management.

Following the celebration of Requiem Mass last Friday, he was buried in St. presence of another vast concourse.

Like his brother, David was also very prominent in the farming community and his association with the local Ballyduff GAA club as a player, selector and administrator embraced an entire generation. He was Chairman of the Ballyduff GAA Club for eight years and at the time of his death served as its President.

In his own playing days David was a top class hurler and in later years went on to serve the club just as well off the field as he had done on it. He was very much a part of the clubs hurling glory days when the County Senior Hurling Championship title was won and last year (2002) he was a senior hurling selector.

Just a few hours after John was buried on Friday, the removal of David's remains took place to St. Michael's Church, Ballyduff. Thousands of people attended in a remarkable tribute to the deceased whose coffin was draped in the red and white colours of Ballyduff GAA Club, while club members formed a Guard of Honour.

The Church was packed to capacity for the Requiem Mass last Saturday morning with hundreds having to stand outside.

On its final journey to St. Michael's Cemetery the coffin was again draped in the GAA clubs colours with club members again providing the Guard of Honour.

A TRIBUTE TO DENNIS MACKINTOSH

A cloud of sadness descended on the joyful season of Christmas with the news that our dear friend and esteemed colleague Dennis Mackintosh, Vice President of Lismore C.C. and a Vice President of the Munster Cricket Union had passed away, surrounded by and cared for by his family at his home in Tallow on Christmas Eve.

In the 9 years that Dennis was associated with Lismore C.C. he did more for the club and its well being than others achieved in a lifetime. He was not a great cricketer and he did not regard himself as such. But he was something much more valuable to the club - he was a great organiser and a doer. He quickly became the centre around which the club revolved. No task was too small for Dennis to tackle, be it preparing the pitch, organising teams and fixtures, scoring or making tea and many other such tasks. When he became involved originally the club was struggling to survive and the role of Dennis in assuring its survival was immeasurable. The successes of the club in recent years attest to his work. He served for 8 years as Secretary and Representative to the Munster Cricket Union until ill health necessitated he take things easier for the past 2002 season. Mind you, to use the words "take things easier" was misleading in Dennis' case as this was not too readily apparent as his enthusiasm and involvement was still impressive. He never gave in to his illness until the last while, he looked to and planned for the future.

The only things that annoyed Dennis were the inability to get a team together to fulfil a fixture, the failure of players to turn up on the day and players not upholding the spirit and standards of the game.

Dennis was born in Scotland and was always very proud of his roots. The family moved to Essex when he was young and he maintained strong ties with his Essex home all his life. He always wore his pride and loved meeting famous Essex players such as Graham Gooch, Derek Pringle, John Stephenson and other Internationals such as Robin Smith (England), John Bracewell (New Zealand) and Malcolm Marshall (West Indies) when they played at the Mardyke. He served his Country in the Royal Marines and in the early 1970's moved to Tallow, the hometown of his wife Helen.

In addition to his involvement with the club, he was deeply involved in community issues in Tallow. Indeed he helped out at the local National School up to the time of his death.

The regard and esteem in which Dennis was held was attested at the large turnout at his funeral service held at St. Carthages Cathedral in Lismore led by the Very Rev. Beare, Dean of Lismore, assisted by Fr. Farrell P.P. of Tallow. It really was a lovely and touching service. Club members Winston Boyle and David Ind read prayers, Ian Mackintosh played a tribute to his father on the part of his family and David Ind also said a few words on behalf of the club concluding with the following most appropriate words of the Scottish Robert Burns - Epitaph On My Own Friend And My Fathers Friend, Wm. Muir in Tarbalton Mill -

> An honest man here lies at rest As e'er God with his image blest The friend of man, the friend of truth The friend of age, and guide of youth Few hearts like his, with virtue warm'd Few heads with knowledge so informed If there's another world, he lived in bliss If there is none, he made the best of this.

DAIRYING - Calf Rearing Outdoors

There are two reasons why this topic is receiving renewed attention at farm level. The first reason is the whole labour issue regarding the rearing of calves indoors. The second issue is the health issue associated with rearing calves indoors.

With the emphasis now on compact calving of cows in the February, March period, dairy farmers face a major increase in the length of the working day from mid February onwards. Calf rearing, particularly poor calf rearing systems add greatly to the labour problems at this time.

A good, well-organised calf rearing system should be a priority for any dairy farmer, and this does not mean that you go and put up an expensive calf house. Individually feeding calves with buckets is not on, any more. Indeed it is a recipe for working longer days, particularly if you are going to do it twice a day.

What to do - What should the farmer do? He / she should take a good look at the system. Look at the whole layout of the yard. If he/she is seriously interested in reducing the labour requirement in calf rearing, a look should be taken at what is involved in rearing calves outdoors. I have been on farms where this is the practice and the proof of the pudding is that I have yet to meet a farmer who has abandoned the practice.

First of all if you are interested in looking at it this spring, I would suggest that you should visit a farmer who is rearing his/her calves outside for two to three years. Have a look at what is required and how he/she is able to successfully adopt the practice.

Site selection

The most important criterion is the site. The site must be sheltered. Old haggards surrounded by ditches with blackthorn hedges are an ideal starting point. It is important also that calves are trained from the start to drink through a teat.. The calf is typically reared indoors for the first ten days drinking from a teat all the time. At the end of the 10 days or when the bunch is large enough, perhaps 10 to 15 days, the calves are given access to the enclosed open area, such as a haggard, fed once a day from a 45 gallon drum with teats. The calves at this stage have access back to the house. Access to the house is needed to get shelter from the worst of the weather.

The next step is to get these calves to grass. Again the site is important. Shelter is vital. A blackthorn hedge again makes an ideal shelter and the calves are left off into this field, fed once a day from a nipple bar feeder. These nipple bar feeders are on wheels and can be brought to the calf paddock and the calves are fed in 5 to 10 minutes. The calves drink approximately 1 gallon each. Ideally, the field should have 3 to 4 inches of grass on it. This means that it should have been closed from the previous mid-October.

If the site does not have shelter in the form of good hedge, then access to an open shed will be necessary to protect calves from the worst of the weather.

Health problems

The other major area where outdoor calf rearing should be considered is where you are having continuing health problems with a calf house. I would assume here that the required ventilation parameters are being met in the design of a house. However, problems can exist even in the best designed calf nouses, particularly as calf numbers build up. These problems usually manifest themselves as virus pneumonia and obviously this will lead to vet bills. If, despite your best efforts, health problems persist, then a serious look should be given to looking at an outdoor calf rearing system.

I have no doubt that outdoor calf rearing will grow in popularity. Given the right site, good management and nutrition practices, the desired weight gain of approx. 0.5 kg to 0.6 kg/day can be achieved with a large reduction in labour input.

REPS AND THE ENVIRONMENT

Planning for 2003

As the New Year dawns it is time to take stock and plan ahead for 2003. A major priority is to bring REPS records up to date. Stock numbers and fertiliser application are the most contentious. It must be stressed that the plan cannot be adjusted retrospectively to take account of over-stocking and over-application. All documents such as invoices relevant to the records should be retained. Records for each year can be required for inspection throughout the period of the plan.

Consult the REPS plan and draw up a schedule of the fertilisers required in 2003. When listing requirements take into account any stocks carried over from last year. If your planner has specified specific compounds for particular crops stay with these as far as possible. If you switch compounds you will have to work out the total nitrogen (N) and phosphorus (P) content to ensure the maximum amounts specified in the plan are not exceeded. If you are changing your cropping regime it is wise to consult your planner. Farmers who have completed REPS 1 contracts and joined REPS 2000 should be aware of the new lower P application limits specified for grassland. In most instances this will involve a change from traditional compounds such as 10-10-20 to the new high N low P fertilisers like 24-2.5-10. In some plans zero P will be specified for all or part of the farm in which a compound like 20-0-15 may be appropriate. It will be extremely important to talk to your supplier on time to ensure availability of the required com-

FARMING LEADER

Outlook for Irish Agriculture 2003

Con Lucey, Chief Economist, IFA

The year gone by has been a most difficult one for IFA and for farmers. Product prices for the main products, milk, cattle, pigs and grain are all unacceptably low. The summer weather was extremely bad, which increased costs and depressed production. At EU policy level, the substantial changes to the CAP contained in the Commission's mid-term review have added to uncertainty amongst farmers about the future. At year-end the cut-backs in public expenditure threaten a number of schemes of importance to farmers. The bottom-line is that national farm income is down by about 9%, and in real terms (that is adjusted for inflation) is down by about 13% in 2002. Thus farmers are not entering 2003 from a position of prosperity or in a mood of confidence.

Much of the policy agenda for the coming year, both at EU and national level, is already well signalled, and I will outline the main issues. Before that I will comment on the main factors that impacted on farm income in 2002.

Review of Agriculture and Farm Income in 2002

IFA's estimate is that national farm income fell by 9% - 10% in money terms in 2002, equivalent to a real decline, after inflation, of 13% - 14%. The main factor was low product prices. Milk prices were down by close to 8%, lamb prices by 15%, pig prices by 12%, and grain prices by 13%. Cattle prices remained low, although slightly above the 2001 level.

Output volume was also down; in cattle due to earlier marketing, in sheep due to lower breeding flock, and in milk and tillage crops due to the poor weather conditions. The weather also resulted in some increase in the volume of feed purchased.

On the positive side, there was a major increase in direct payments to farmers, from 1,380m in 2002 to about 1,615m in 2003. This was helped by the final increase in the CAP Reform beef premia, the 80% advance payment, the full ewe premium payment in 2002, and a carryover of disadvantaged areas payments in mountain areas.

A cause of concern however is that for the sectors that have been subject to CAP reform in the past decade, beef, cereals and sheep, Irish farmers are now in the unacceptable situation that product prices have been pushed down to levels far below the cost of production. This means that a substantial part of the CAP direct payments are being transferred either to input suppliers, processors or consumers. In 2002, the 235m extra direct payments failed to offset the effects of the price: cost squeeze on farmers, and farmers' living standards fell sharply.

OUTLOOK FOR 2003 2003 Book of Estimates and Budget

While IFA recognises that the Government needed to get the public finances back under control, the decisions contained in the 2003 Book of Estimates and Budget involved disproportionate cuts in agriculture. In relation to some important schemes, such as REPS and onfarm investment, IFA considers that the low uptake of these schemes in 2001 and 2002 due to exceptional factors (Foot and Mouth, bad weather conditions. income pressures) was unfairly used by the Government to provide a low allocation for 2003. Also, the increased levies and charges on farmers are a further erosion of farm income. A number of taxation changes in the budget are negative for agriculture due to its capital intensive nature (CGT changes, machinery depreciation, stamp duty), while other tax changes will increase costs (VAT and diesel excise).

The Estimates and Budget decisions send a negative signal from Government to IFA and farmers, and diminished the case for IFA's participation in a new National Partnership

CAP Mid-term Review

The proposals from Commissioner Fischler last July went far beyond a review of the CAP and would involve a major reform, particularly the plan to 'modulate" direct payments, i.e. cut them by 20%, and to 'decouple" direct payments, i.e. break the link between the payment and the level of production on farms. However, the EU Summit decisions in October on the funding of the CAP after 2006 remove the case for an early reform of CAP. IFA's position has been that the Agenda 2000 decisions should have been allowed to run their full course, and indeed it made no sense for the EU to be planning further cuts to the CAP at least until the WTO negotiations were concluded in a few years time.

While there continues to be some uncertainty about the timetable, it is now likely that modulation is off the agenda until 2006 or 2007. Fischler is still battling to have his decoupling proposals kept in the table, but the Council of Ministers are more likely to defer this as well. The Council of Ministers will have to make up their mind early in the new year on the CAP review because the EU is obliged to set out its stall in detail in the WTO by the end of March (see later).

Also, it must not be forgotten that the Agenda 2000 decisions to cut milk support prices by 15% in the 2005 – 07 period, with some limited compensation, is facing us. There is a case that it could be deferred for a further period which would make sense in CAP budget terms, but that would require a new decision by the Council of Ministers.

WTO Negotiations

The EU countries are amongst the 140 countries worldwide that are members of the World Trade Organisation. Over a year ago a new round of WTO negotiations was launched at Doha. The EU negotiates as a unit and the negotiations are led by the Commission on behalf of the member states. The terms of reference are to continue the process of reducing protection and support for agriculture. All three "pillars" of support are subject to negotiation: import tariffs, export subsidies and internal supports, and also what are termed "nontrade concerns" which includes issues such as animal welfare, the environment and use of artificial growth promoters.

All the participants in the WTO are required to put forward their general proposals to achieve the Doha objectives by 31 March next. A positive development from our perspective is that the recent US Farm Act is highly supportive of their own farmers, and this should mean that the WTO negotiations will be slow and difficult. Also, the EU approach is far from unified; between the Fischler view that we should rush for decoupled direct payments and phase down price supports, and the French Government view that further reform should be gradual and that farm incomes are an important consideration in deciding future CAP policy. However, we must also be aware that there is pressure on the EU both from the underdeveloped countries and from the food exporting countries such as Australia and New Zealand to gain greater access to the EU food market, and to phase out EU export subsidies.

The present deadline is that the WTO negotiations on agriculture would be completed by January 2005, but that seems unlikely to be met. Any new agreement would be subsequently phased in over a period of 5 or 6 years. An important milestone will be the "mid-term review" of the WTO negotiations which will take place in Mexico in September 2003.

EU Enlargement

It is decided that ten countries of Central and Eastern Europe will become members of the EU from May 2004, assuming that their peoples vote in favour of membership. As regards the extension of the CAP to the new members, the accession negotiations are due to be completed by the end of 2002. Most of the big decisions are already made. The new members will have to accept supply management (quotas, premium quotas and base areas) based on recent historic production levels. They will benefit from full CAP price supports on entry, and the direct payments will be phased in, starting at 25% in 2004, 40% by 2007 and reaching parity with the EU level in 2013

The CAP budget for the EU of 25 has recently been agreed by the EU Summit. It will increase from about 43 billion in 2004 to 45.7bn in 2007 to 48.6bn by 2013, and about 5bn of the 2013 total is allocated for direct payments in the 10 new states. At least there is now reasonable certainty about the funding of CAP for the next decade. While the budget is tight, the challenge is to devise a CAP structure that can provide reasonable support to farmers through a combination of market prices and direct payments within this budget.

BOVINE DISEASES (LEVIES) REGULATIONS 2002 (S.I. No. 596 of 2002)

The Minister for Agriculture and Food has made Regulations entitled as above, which come into effect on 1st January 2003.

The Regulations provide for an increase in the rates of the diseases levies. The new rates are as follows:-

MILK: 1 cent per gallon of milk received for processing

CATTLE: €5.08 per bovine animal slaughtered or exported live.

As you will be aware this is the European Year of People with Disabilities and also the Special Olympics Games will be held in Ireland this Summer. The Olympics to be held in Ireland this Summer will be the World's largest sporting event in 2003. Waterford City will be hosting Jamaica: Tramore host the Philippines: Dungarvan will host the Bahamas: Rathgormac/Carrick on Suir will host Slovakia:

One million athletes in nearly 160 countries train and compete in 25 Olympic-type Summer and Winter Sports. Founded in 1968 by Eunice Kennedy Shriver. Special Olympics gives people with a Learning Disability continued opportunities to participate in a year-round sports training and competition Programme.

The most bizarre aspect of all this is the deafening silence of our elected politicians. If they think that they or their loved ones are impervious from ever needing any of these services. They would be well advised to reflect on the neglect in this sector. As Disability does not recognise Status, Race, Age, or Creed. Some of these Politicians have not even got the courtesy to acknowledge correspondence from the disability office. Even though you and I as taxpayers pay for their secretarial expenses.

DUNGARVAN WINE CLUB NOTES>

Annual Classic Tasting And Meal!

Friday November 8th saw our fifth Classic Tasting and like last year the location was the Mill Restaurant. A lot of thought went into the Menu Choice and an equal amount of thought went into the Wine Choice. We tried to create an ensemble of matching flavours in the food with the different styles of wine.

Upon arrival members were greeted with bubbly from the world famous New Zealand Winery, Cloudy Bay. This wine was called Pelorus Vintage 1996. It went down a treat with the canopies of smoked salmon, volovents, cheese and home made pate. This wine is quite old but it showed wonderful complexity and yeasty, biscuity aromas so typical of champagne, and being from a warmer climate than champagne, it gave much better fruit intensity, thus making it a lovely treat to kick off the evening.

When everyone was seated the waitresses dutifully went about taking orders for the starters which consisted of the Mill combination starter platter. Included in this were tiger prawns, smoked salmon, goats cheese, cajun chicken, spicy beef and calamari all topped off with salad and dressing. Whilst this was being served we started on the first wine of the night. This was Baron de L Pouilly Jame 50 Euro/bottle. This is unquestionably one of the finest white wines to come from the Loire Valley in Northern France. Made from Sauvignon Blanc it had fantastic green fruit aromas with great zesty fruit flavours of gooseberry and lime topped off with mind boggling acidity when combined made for

a brilliantly balanced wine.

After this wonderful start to the night we needed a little breather so we poured the red wines out while the main course orders were being taken. Another favourite of mine was served at this time - salmon, tomato and basil soup served in a baby cup so as not to fill us up too much. It has great flavours and really made us look forward to the main courses.

The red wines for the night were from Bordeaux in France and the Barossa Valley in Australia. Ch. Beau Sife 1997 35 Euro from St. Estephe in Bordeaux was an excellently structured wine which started off quite slowly but when duly aired and decanted it was immense. Great fruit flavours of blackcurrants, cedar, mint and spice levelled off with mouth filling tannins and correctly balanced acidity left an excellent impression with me. The other red wine was Peter Lehman the Barossa Mentor 1993 40 Euro. At nearly ten years old, this was fantastic. Whilst showing a small bit of bottle age, it still had it all in abundance. Made from an unusual blend of Cabernet Sauvignon, Malbec, Shiraz and Cabernet franc it had lovely sweet, ripe fruit flavours and well balanced structure mainly from the Malbec grape which gives good tannins and aging potential. It finished with smooth, spicy flavours which lasted forever. A great wine but hard to say which was better as it would be unfair as both red wines were complimented by a choice of fillet steak, John Dory, tilapia, chicken stuffed with smoke salmon and a pasta dish. I myself went for the John Dory as I had kept some of the Pouilly Jame (white wine) and they married together very well.

Like previous tastings everyone was bloated so we went for a light ten year old tawney port called Warres Otima served in 500ml bottles. This was served to coincide with our desserts which consisted of a warm chocolate fudge cake, winter berry pie and a selection of Irish farmhouse cheeses. Again like the above wines it worked extremely well especially with the fudge cake and cheeses.

Well by now everyone was full to the gills and had just room for some tea and coffee. There was a quick raffle also. A special thanks to the girls Anna, Sue and Nic for the wonderful service they provided.

I then spoke thanking all

the staff at the Mill for another fabulous meal and also the great service. A special mention to head chef Keith who slaved throughout the night to keep us all happy. Finally, I thanked all the members without whom it wouldn't be possible to have great evenings like this.

So if you like wine and are interested in participating in evenings like this why not come along on the 14th of January and join Dungarvan Wine Club. Membership is

now being taken in Wine World on Main Street. The venue this year for our monthly meetings will be Dungarvan Sailing Club, opposite the L & N Car Park. 

What is a Deep Vein Thrombosis?

A blood vessel returns blood from the tissues of the body back to the heart; these blood vessels are called veins. The body has two systems of veins, one is called a superficial system and the other is a deep system. The superficial system is made up of veins that are near to the skin; these are veins that can be seen on the back of the hand or arm. The deep system is comprised of veins within the muscles of the body and small communication veins connect the two systems. A deep vein thrombosis is a condition wherein a blood clot (thrombus) forms in a vein of the deep system, this is a very serious problem, especially if a piece of the clot in the deep vein thrombosis breaks off, it can travel through the deep veins back to the heart, and eventually be pumped by the heart into the arteries of the lung. If this happens, the condition is called pulmonary embolism, the blood clot is called an embolus, and the process of breaking off and travelling to the lungs is called embolism. A deep vein thrombosis can occur anywhere in the body, but are most frequently found in the deep veins of the legs, thighs and pelvis.

What causes a deep vein thrombosis?

There are several factors that may cause deep vein thrombosis; these are injury to the vein, and slowing of blood flow. The most common cause of injury to a vein is trauma to the leg, such as occurs with broken bones, severe muscle injury, or surgery. And immobilisation is the most common cause of slow blood flow in a vein; prolonged sitting can cause this, especially with crossed legs in a car, train or aeroplane. There are further conditions that can increase the tendency for blood to clot: these can include certain drugs, pregnancy, cancer, inflammatory bowel disease (Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis), and certain blood conditions. There are also inherited conditions that can cause blood clots such as deficiencies of certain blood components, defective blood clotting factors and defects in enzymes caused by certain vitamin deficiencies that lead to an increase of homocysteine, a compound that increases the tendency for the blood to clot.

What are the symptoms of a deep vein thrombosis?

The most common symptoms of a deep vein thrombosis in the leg is swelling, pain and tenderness and redness especially at the back of the leg below the knee. These symptoms are caused by the accumulation of blood that is unable to get past the clot in the vein and the resulting leakage of fluid from the blood into the muscle.

How is deep vein thrombosis diagnosed?

A medical professional may be able to diagnose superficial thrombophlebitis, based on the history of symptoms and by examining the vein near the surface of the skin. To diagnose deep vein thrombosis, the medical professional may choose to do an Ultrasound or a Venograghy (a dye is injected and an X-ray procedure creates an image of the veins in the legs and feet, possibly revealing clots.

The outlook for deep vein thrombosis is that with treatment, the blood clot stabilises and attaches firmly to the wall of the vein. The risk of the clot dislodging and travelling to the lungs therefore decreases over time. It is vital that a diagnosis is made by a medical professional; if you would like any further information relating to deep vein thrombosis, please contact the office. STRANDSIDE NORTH ROAD CLOSURE



G.A.A. NOTES

Refereeing

It is a topic that got quite an airing at all conventions when the various speakers tried to impress delegates about the acute shortage of referees in both divisions and at county level. It was pointed out (by one of the referees) that a number on the panel at the present time are reaching the veteran stage and for whom the clock is beginning to tick.

But far greater emphasis was placed on the reasons why so many young referees are reluctant to serve because of the amount of abuse hurled at referees day in and day out by people on the sideline. The problem was highlighted in a big way by county bord na n-og at their annual convention. It was stated that 'referee Abuse' is the prime reason why the campaign recruitment for new referees was a failure.

I think that the bottom line in all this, is that no one seems very anxious to address the problem in a positive manner. On the rare occasions when a referee does report incidents of abuse delegates have a record of wanting to remain silent when it comes to proposing appropriate penalties and it is almost invariably left to the board officers to move suspensions.

There is another aspect to the whole business and this does not let referees blameless in the matter. I think it is fair to say that in nine cases out of ten, referees do not report incidents of abuse and in those circumstances nothing can be done.

I am writing this because I feel that now is the time before a ball is kicked or struck, for referees in both divisions, to get together and plan a policy of reporting every incidence of abuse and then put it up to the members on all boards to show if they are serious about stamping out this major problem that looks like getting worse if nothing is done.

I cannot recall having heard any reports of abuse dealt with at county board last year and I am certain that referees were abused on many occasions during the season.

Tom Drummy R.I.P.

At the time of writing these notes I learned of the death of Tom Drummy who was very much a legend in the Eire Og club since its reformation in 1967. He was the chief organiser with Rev. Fr. Sexton O.S.A. when the club was reformed and he took the office of chairman, a position which he held until the club dissolved two years ago. In their first year in the championship Tom played a leading role as a player when they won the junior hurling county championship (1968) by beating Griffith Place following their victory over Clashmore in the Western final. They subsequently won divisional honours in junior football, but were beaten in a replay by Butlerstown in the county final.

Earlier I can recall seeing Tom playing a lead role also when assisting Kilgobnet to win the county junior hurling championship in 1961 when he played wing back with his brother Jim playing on the other wing.

He continued playing until he reached the veteran stage and after that he managed the Eire Og teams as organiser and selector until they went out of existence.

He did a stint as board representative and was a member of the Western board disciplinary committee for several years.

In retirement he took the position of caretaker at Fraher field and his diligence and attention to duty in this post made him well known and respected by the huge crowds attending games over the eleven years in which he held the position. All his life, Tom Drummy was a true blue G.A.A. man and a popular personality with all who knew him. To his wife Nellie and family we extend our very sincere sympathy. Ar dheis De go raibh a anam.

Mickey Landers R.I.P.

Because of his lifetime of association with Gaelic games, Mickey Landers became a local legend and while very many of the great players who were his team mates in the forties and early fifties have gone before him, there are very few people around and who are involved with hurling and football who will not have known or heard about this Gaelic all rounder.

His playing career brought him very much into prominence when he played as goalkeeper for Dungarvan when they achieved their famous four titles in a row in senior football 1945 to 1948. Years earlier, in 1941 Mickey had won a senior county hurling medal with Dungarvan who defeated Mount Sion in Lismore. He also won county championships at minor level with Dungarvan and played a leading role with Old Parish when they won their first junior football county final in 1949. He played junior hurling in the same season with Abbeyside and was a member of the village team when they won their first junior hurling county championship in 1950. He played at centre half back. In later years he trained Abbeyside after they had attained senior status.

He wore the county colours in both codes and played in goal for the football team and was a defender in hurling. His final outing with the county hurlers was in 1947 when he played wing back against Dublin in the league in Croke Park.

Long before Mickey inherited the pub from his aunt, the place had won a G.A.A. identity and as far back as 1885 when the first ever hurling intercounty match was played in the Shandon field, an account of the game between Carrickbeg (Waterford) and Togher Street (Cork), Maggie Landers Pub was mentioned and readers told that the finest whiskey at 2 pence a glass was on sale there. It could also be said that in G.A.A. language the establishment became something of an institution, as it was frequented so much by G.A.A. people from here, there and everywhere. It was a meeting place for the post match 'post mortems' etc.

Understandably a huge crowd paid their final tributes and there were many former players in attendance at the funeral and burial where Dungarvan club organised an honour guard and the coffin was draped in the blue and white of the club. Now gone to his reward, Mickey Landers will be talked about for a time to come. Our sympathy is extended to his wife, Rita, son, Martin, daughters, Kay Wally and Margaret and the extended family.

Dave & John Barry R.I.P.

The Glencairn area was certainly hit with a wave of sadness when the brothers John and Dave Barry died with a few hours of each other at the Bon Savours Hospital, Cork last week. Both men were widely known and respected personalities and this was clearly in evidence at their respective funerals where massive crowds turned out to pay their final respects.

Dave was particularly known in G.A.A. circles he having a life long association with the Ballyduff club where he served as chairman for an eight year period and on retirement from this post last year was the unanimous choice as club President. In the fifties and sixties he played hurling and football with the club and was a playing member of the side which won the junior hurling and football double. He played intermediate hurling with the county in 1950 and was a playing colleague of the late Willie O'Donnell who played in goal during the same era.

Dave was a selector and trainer of the Ballyduff senior hurling team which won the championship in 1987. Also he was a top class hurley maker and his camans were in demand by clubs all over the west in days gone by.

His family involvement with the game was also well known, his son Dave having played full back for Lismore and winning senior county championship with them. The club paid him the traditional honours at his funeral and burial when the coffin was draped in the Ballyduff colours. Maurice Geary delivered a moving oration at the graveside and a huge guard of honour escorted the coffin on its final

To his wife Gretta and family we extend our deepest sympathy.

Our very sincere sympathy is also extended to Kay and the members of the Barry family of Glencairn, Lismore on the death of John Barry, brother of David. The family were involved and were well known supporters of the games in the county. Daughter Emer is currently a member of the county communications committee.







THE GERRARD SUPREME NOVICES HURDLE

Known as the Gloucestershire Hurdle until 1974 the Gerrard Supreme Novices Hurdle is the only race to have been divided at the Festival-no less than 24 times. Irish trained runners won the race on 33 occasions and Charlie Swan was aboard the JP M Mc Manus owned and Christy Roche trained Like A Butterfly when capturing the 2002 running of this race

THE IRISH INDEPENDENT ARKLE CHASE

First run in 1969 as the Cotswold Chase the race was named after the legendary Irish chaser Arkle who won the Gold Cup in 1964,1965 and 1966. Originally run on the Wednesday of the Festival the race was moved to Tuesday in 1980. In March 2002 Barry Geraghty steered the Jessica Harrington trained Moscow Flyer to victory and all going well this gelding will make a return visit to this venue in March to defend his crown

THE SMURFIT CHAMPION HURDLE

Established in 1927 with winning prize money of £365 the Smurfit Champion Hurdle has become the richest and most important race in British hurdling. Sponsored by the Smurfit Group since 1991 the race has been dominated in recent seasons by the great Istabraq who won the race in 1998, 1999, and 2000. The first horse to win three consecutive Champion Hurdles since See You Then obliged for trainer Nicky Henderson in 1985, 1986 and 1987. Going for his fourth victory in this Championship race Istabraq was pulled up injured in the 2002 running of this event as the outsider Hors La Loi swept to victory under Irish jockey Dean Gallagher. This French bred winner trained by James Fanshawe ran in the famous silks of wealthy owner Paul Green.

WELL BRED SORT

The recent gambled on winner of the Welsh Grant National Mini Sensation is certainly bred in the purple being a daughter of that fast race mare Minnortes Girl who won a host of valuable races over hurdles.

GOSSAMER RETIRED

The 2002 winner of the English 1,000 Guineas Gossamer has been retired to stud. This well bred daughter of Sadlers Wells is a full sister to Barathea

The Michael Hourican trained Beef Or Salmon is more than likely to contest the Gold Cup at Cheltenham rather than the Sun Alliance Novice Chase.

PAT EDDERY FAILS TO RIDE 100 WINNERS

Despite turning to the all weather circuit in a bid to ride one hundred winners during the 2002 flat season. Irish born jockey Pat Eddery failed by just one winner to reach his target.

After filling the runner up spot to the ageless Limestone Lad at Leopardstown over Christmas trainer Mouse Morris announced that his good money spinner over hurdles Boss Doyle has now been retired from racing.

A number of leading Bookmaker chains have suspended betting on the 2003 British Flat Riders championship. This action was taken after strong support came for Kieran Fal-Ion's biggest rivals. Richard Hughes, Seb Sanders and Daryll Holland have all been backed whereas the current champion Kieran Fallon has attracted little or no support. Kieran Fallon is currently away on holidays but I understand that he will return in time to start riding on the British all weather tracks in February.

NERVOUS OWNERS AND TRAINERS

There are a number of nervous owners and trainers on both sides of the Irish sea awaiting reports that a number of Irish and English trained winners tested positive with traces of the prohibitive substance Morphine in their system. There is nothing sinister about the find as it appears to have come from a batch of feed. When the Racing authorities in both countries announce their findings one can expect a number of compensation claims through the Courts.

GEORGE DUFFIELD HONOURED

George Duffield who has the distinction of being the oldest flat jockey in the weigh-room has been awarded the MBE in the New Years honours list. He has over 2,300 winners to his credit in a career spanning forty years with a high percentage of these winners coming courtesy of well known trainer Sir Mark Prescott.




