Levels of crime in Cappoquin have escalated to an alarming degree according to some locals, with instances of break-ins, burnt out cars, reckless driving and vandalism said to be increasing in and around the town.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, one local man said a public meeting has already been held in response to growing crime in the area.

"Some people, particularly business people, the elderly and people living in isolated areas are living in constant which have allegedly ocfear as a result of all this going on," the man said.

The local man, who asked to remain nameless because he feared his young family would be subjected to intimidation, is part of a local committee on crime and listed a catalogue of offences,

curred in the town.

In the most serious of these incidents so far, a local businessman was assaulted and warned that he would be put into a coffin. Others say they were intimidated from going to the public meeting on **CONTINUED ON PAGE 5**

An Bord Pleanala **Overturn Permission** For Glencairn Quarry

AN TAISCE FILE EUROPEAN COMPLAINT OVER "UNMINUTED" MEETING

An Bord Pleanala has overturned planning permission for the proposed intensification and extension of a quarry at Glencairn, Lismore, and in a further twist to the eight month long saga, one of the party's to that appeal, An Taisce, has issued a formal complaint to the European Commission about the manner in which permission was granted.

Waterford County Council granted permission to David Kelly Partnership of Nelson House, Youghal, for the intensification of the existing small-scale quarry and to increase the area of the quarry to around five hectares. The installation of crushing facilities, weighbridge, sanitary, welfare facilities and a small office were also included in the permission, all subject to a number of conditions.

However, last Wednesday, An Bord Pleanala overturned this decision, stating amongst other reasons that part of the quarry is contained in a designated Special Area of Conservation and is located along the highly scenic banks of the River Blackwater.

"It is further considered that the proposed development would be visually obtrusive in this scenic location, would seriously injure the landscape and visual amenities of the area and conflict with the provisions of the development plan", Bord Pleanala states in its findings.

It was also not satisfied that the proposed development would not give rise to pollution to the River Blackwater seriously injuring the ecology of "one of the foremost angling rivers in Ireland

In a statement, An Taisce welcomed this decision, but states it is now submitting a complaint to the European Commission on the circumstances in which the County

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Local Opposition Expressed To Minister Cullen's New Bill

The publication by the Government of a Bill proposing to empower City and County Managers to impose refuse charges regardless of Councillors has been strongly condemned by Labour Councillor Fiachra O Céilleachair.

The "Protection of the Environment Bill", as presented by Waterford Environment & Local Government Minister Martin Cullen, proposes to transfer to City and County Managers the "power to make charges for waste services" and leaves at their discretion the imposition of charges up to 600 Euro per household per year. Up to now, this power belonged to the elected local authorities. Dungarvan area Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair says it is an attack on local democracy and an attempt by the authorities to renege on their obligation to fund public

Expressing disappointment at the move, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said: "At the Dail Environment Committee today (30/1/03), Labour's Environment & Local Government spokesperson Eamon Gilmore TD questioned Minister Martin Cullen in detail about his

new Bill. The Minister stated In addition, they will have to due to the power being left to that the Bill was based on the 'polluter pays principle'. He bemoaned the fact that the local authorities were not charging the full cost of collection and he revealed that the average household cost per collection is 11 Euro. This means that a household whose refuse is collected once per week will face an annual charge of 11 Euro x 52, which equals 572 Euro.

- Avoid "off the record" comments, if you say something it is likely to be printed.
- Maintain your sense of humour, let the reporter see you as a real human being.

In their complaint to the European Commission, An Taisce says a planners report drawn up by an assistant planner recommended refusal on the 9th of

However, the complaint states When the applicant became aware that refusal was recommended by Waterford County Council, an extension of time was sought and the applicant was able to secure the intervention of the Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly, to personally visit the site on 14th May, 2002.

The Council's Senior Planner. Director of Services, Denis Mc-Carthy also surveyed the site. On the following day, an interoffice County Council memo had then applied for permission was issued by Mr. McCarthy stating that he and Mr. Connolly had met with the operator, TJ Lomasney

The memo states: "We discussed in detail the existing and proposed operations on the site and subsequently formed the view that planning permission could be granted for a limited period for this development.'

An Tasice said the contents of this memo indicate that the entire assessment of this planning application was granted without "appropriate assessment"

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, County Manager Donal Connolly said it was an application for intensification at an existing quarry at Glencairn. The council had previously issued a warning notice as the operators had increased the volume of their operations without permission first. The operators for intensification and extension of the quarry.

"I had a look with (Director of Services) Denis McCarthy at the quarry and decided to grant permission subject to twelve conditions," he said

(The conditions) were to limit its visual impact on the Ballyduff road, and to prevent the leaching of water back into the River Blackwater." he said

Mr. Connolly confirmed that a planning officer had recommended the application be refused. A recommendation for refusal occurs in the case of around 10% of applications to the council.

Mr. Connolly said: "Occasionally, I would have a look at a site, not just where a refusal is recommended, but there are cases occasionally where I feel it is necessary to look at the

He said the decision to overturn the recommendation to refuse was made, and he was happy at the time that it was the correct decision to make.

"But An Bord Pleanala decided to refuse permission and we've got to accept that", Mr. Connolly added.

Commenting on An Taisce's complaint to the European Commission, Mr. Connolly said "that's something we'll have deal with at the time.

No Funding **Available Boatcove Ardmore**

Minister for Communications, Marine and Natural Resources, Dermot Ahern scotched hopes that funding would be made available for an extension of the pier at Ardmore this year.

Waterford County Council submitted its application for funding to the Department of the Marine in 2001.

However, in a written reply to Deputy John Deasy, the Minister said no funding is available in 2003 for these

He states: "The question of funding works at Ardmore Boat Cove in the post-2003 period will be considered in the context of the funding available and overall national priorities."

Continuing he states that the very limited funds allocated to Marine Tourism in 2003 are already fully committed to a small number of flagship projects.

The low levels of funding designated this year also proved a blow to Dungarvan Town Council's plans for a Marina. The Town Council applied for funding for a feasibility study to examine the potential for a marina at Dungarvan Harbour under the Marine Tourism Grant Scheme of the National Development Plan.

However, with the "major adjustments in marine spending for 2003", Minister Ahern said the very limited funds are already fully committed to a small number of flagship projects.

"The reduction in funding means that there will be no funds available for any additional marine infrastructure projects under the NDP Marine Tourism Grant scheme in 2003."

crime itself A series of further incidents. were also listed, including multiple break-ins at two premises - a guesthouse near the River Blackwater; and at the Boathouse on the Cappoquin-Lismore road, which was the venue for the public meeting. Both have been broken into three times in recent months.

A further robbery was apparently attempted at the local Coop, where a number of men with gold cutters, saws and Stanley knives were said to have used ladders to scale one of the walls around the premises, and allegedly attempted to steal sachets worth eur450.

A high number of larcenies have occurred at the local supermarket also, and in one such incident, money from the lotto machine was taken.

Locals say four boats and a pontoon were released from their moorings on the River Blackwater, while the Fire Service was called out to retrieve a car dumped in the river at an area known as "the Couples". Another car was burnt out and left on a bridge on the Tourin

Some boats and even driveways, the local man says, including his own, have been used as toilets.

"The guards are doing what they can", he says. "But these people seem to be untouchable. They seem to know the law inside out. I've talked to many people about this, and it's fair to say a lot of people feel afraid to walk out the road.'

People in the town have already held a meeting to discuss the issue and a number of public representatives were invited. However, he says, "Most, of our local representatives seem to want to keep their heads down on this'

One of the representatives who attended that meeting, Fine Gael Spokesperson for Justice, Deputy John Deasy agreed that there is a major problem with crime in the

"I have received a lengthy list of alleged crimes said to have been committed in the Cappoquin area, and I have forwarded this list to Superintendent," he said.

"I would hope that the Superintendent takes the grievous concerns of the people of Cappoquin extremely seriously.'

He added: "People in and around the town have reached the end of their tether and we need some positive action to be taken. And taken immediately.

"I have spoken at length with Superintendent Blake and expressed the concerns, expressed to me.'

He continued: "It is the case that the Gardai have been frustrated by people not being prepared to forward information."

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader on Monday last, Superintendent Michael Blake said the Gardai have conducted a review of policing to examine ways policing can be improved in West Waterford in general, and Cappoquin in particular.

He said special patrols are in place and these patrols are continuing.

'The Gardai are actively investigating a number of crimes in the area and we're hopeful that sufficient evidence will be advanced to bring these matters to a successful conclusion."

I met with spokespeople following a public meeting in Cappoquin town along with Garda Michael Murphy, and advised them that any suspicious activity should be reported immediately. I am acutely aware of the effects criminality can have on a community and I can assure the people of the area that all of our existing resources will to be used to investigate these matters," he said.

"We do need the help of the community and if any person is in the possession of any information they should contact the Gardai in Cappoquin at 058-54244 or Dungaryan Gardai at 058-42370

Meanwhile, the Gardai are making significant progress in their investigations into two large robberies in Cappoquin, one involving the robbery of around eur25,000 and the other of over eur3,000.


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The taste of Mexico

This MEXICAN STIR FRY is a really versatile dish as you can eat it with pasta and salad, pasta and vegetables or in fajitas.

Whichever way you choose to eat this dish, it's one that's sure to get your tastebuds tingling with delight.

Ingredients:

Serves 2

225g lean beef, lamb or pork steaks, cut into thin strips.

2x15ml sp tomato ketchup

1x15ml sp chilli sauce

1x10ml sp lime juice

1x15ml sp fresh mint, chopped.

Method

In a large non-stick wok or saucepan, dry fry the meat until it is browned.

Add the remaining ingredients and cook for 1-2 minutes. Stir the meat into a mixed herb salad with fresh chillies, pasta and lime segments.

Stir the meat into any cooked pasta of your choice. Serve with grilled wedges of courgette, aubergine, tomatoes and peppers or salad.

When the meat has browned, stir fry vegetables before adding the sauce.

Suitable vegetables include: chillies, peppers, spring onions, carrots, baby corn and broccoli

Remember to add crunchy vegetables first Serve the stir fry in fajitas, tacos or with rice.

TIP: A side dish of spicy potato wedges makes the perfict accompanient.



Suitable stir fry cuts Beef - Sirloin, rump, topside, flashy steaks. Lamb - Leg steaks. Pork - Loin, Leg steaks

Make the most of the sweet

Indian spiced chicken kebabs

Deliciously spicy Indianstyle kebabs which are incredibly versatile, ideal for barbecuing or grilling. winter, spring, summer or autumn

Ingredients:

4 free range chicken breasts, skinned 8-10 cardamon pods 2x15ml sp sunflower oil 1/2x5ml sp ground turmeric 1/2x5ml sp ground cumin 1x5ml sp garam masala 1x5ml sp ground ginger, crushed juice of 1/2 lemon

Method

Cut the chicken into 3cm chunks and place in a bowl Snip open the cordamon pods and crush the seeds with a pestle and mortar (or put them in the base of

a mug and bash them with the end of a knife). Add to the bowl the remaining ingredients and a good grinding of salt. Stir well, cover and refrigerate for at least two hours. If you have time to prepare this in advance, leave it in the fridge for 12 hours. Once the flavours have penetrated the meat, thread the chicken on to small bamboo skewers and grill for about 10minutes, turning once, until cooked through

Serve the kebabs immediately with plain boiled rice, a mixed green salad and puppadoms on the side. TIP: Soak wooden skewers for an hour before grilling or barbecuing to prevent burning.

taste of cooked pineapple. perfectly coated in a rich, gooey caramel sauce. Ingredients: Serves 4 25g unsalted butter 1 medium fresh pineapple. peeled, cored and cut into rings, or 16 rings tinned

pineapple in natural juice 25g light brown sugar or granulated sugar 2x15ml sp fresh orange juice Vanilla ice-cream Method Gently melt the butter on a frying pan and saute the pineapple rings on both sides until they are golden brown. Increase the heat and add

the light brown sugar, which

will immediately start the caramelising process. Evenly coat the pineapple all over with the caramel sauce

Add the orange juice - this will lift the caramelised sugar from the base of the pan and create a thick coating of caramel on the pineapple.

Cook for just one minute and remove the pineapple from the heat.

Serve immediately with vanilla ice-cream, preferably made with dairy cream and milk, not vegetable fat. TIP: For a truly topical and boozy taste, use white rum instead of orange juice. This dessert dish works just as well using fresh bananas instead of pineapple.




Some members of the council who complained the loudest about the overruns or unscheduled works, were themselves attempting to bully major spending on such further items at one of our recent meetings!

That is only a brief resume of my thinking and rational in agreeing the estimates as renegotiated. In that regard, we managed to convince the administrators to reduce the in-



creased bin charge they were seeking by 50% and the recycling by 25%. I could get no movement on the 8.5% increase on the rates. Indeed one of my colleagues was contemplating 10% to help defray some of the other increases!

Broad Beans Still so Popular

for centuries.

They have large seeds white of green, depending on variety — and will grow in almost any soil.

Broad beans like moisture and an open, but not exposed position. They are also limelovers and enjoy plenty of light and spring sunshine.

The annual vegetable is classified into three groups - longpod, windsor (latesowing longpod) and dwarf. All but dwarf grow 3ft o more high

Longpods are very long — 15 inches or more — each carrying seven to ten kidney beans. They are the hardiest and the best for early cropping and top yields.

Windsor varieties have

Broad beans are one of the shorter pods, making them oldest vegetables - they the broadest of the broad have been grown in Ireland beans - with four to seven round beans in each pod.

They are regarded as the best for flavour, but they are not hardy enough for autumn sowing and take a long time to mature.

Dwarf varieties, by definition, make the smallest and shortest plants - no more than 18 inches high. They are best for growing under cloches.

The two out of doors sowing periods are early to midwinter (November to December) for an early crop; and early to late spring (February to April) for a main crop harvest.

The main reason for winter sowing is to avoid attacks of black bean aphid. Only longpod beans are suitable for sowing in both periods.

If you are going to sow your beans under glass, they can be sown in a slightly heated greenhouse now (early February) or in a unheated greenhouse in the first week of March.

Some gardeners may find it easier to sow broad beans in individual cells indoors and then move them to an unheated greenhouse once they have germinated.

Seedlings can be hardened off in early April, gradually accustoming them to the full exposure by the second or third week in April. They can

be planted out as soon as Outdoor crops may succeed they are ready. Plant them in in warmer areas, but cloches double rows 23cm (9in) alare probably necessary until lowing 90cm (3ft) between each pair of rows and don't colder regions. Don't sow forget to give the plants some general support.

By the second week in June bean plants should have about three clusters of pods each.

Pinch out the tip of each plant when they are in full flower to obtain better-filled pods and to avoid infestation with black fly.

Broad beans must be picked while pods are still green and before the skins of the seeds begin to get tough.

Pests that bother broad bean crops include slugs, bean fly maggots, aphids, anthracnose of dwarf bean, black root rot and rhizoctonia.



WHICH PLANETS HAVE BEEN EXPLORED?


he only heavenly body which has been directly explored by man is the moon. Other explorations have been made by space probes - without passengers, controlled from earth, and capable of covering great distances and even reaching places far from the solar system. The equipment on board these space probes give control stations data and images on the chemical and physical characteristics of the heavenly bodies. Some space probes have landed on surfaces of planets or satellites. The russian space probe Venere has landed on Mars and in 1997 the space probe Pathfinder put the robot explorer Sojourner on Mars. Other space probes have transmitted detailed data and images of all planets in the solar system.


Can a space probe leave the solar system?

The US space probe Pioneer 10 was launched in 1972. After having gone beyond the orbit of Neptune, it is now directed towards Proxima Centurai, towards the edge of the solar system. Proxima Centurai is the star nearest to us. Pioneer 10 will reach it in about 26,000 years. Pioneer 10 was overtaken in 1998 by the space probe Voyager 1, after having gone near Saturn. Voyager 1 is now the space probe furthest from earth at a distance of 0.4 billion kilometres!

What is a gravitational sling-shot?


A space probe cannot carry large quantities of fuel. So, instead of using engines to change direction or to accelerate, the probe is directed nearer a planet. The force of gravity from this planet can then control the curved path of the probe and its speed. The operation is called "gravitational sling-shot."

Living on the moon would mean that we could use the resources of its subsurface, rich in minerals, to build scientific laboratories, launch bases and space observatories. The project to populate the moon may provide solutions to enable the growth of



food, electrical energy to provide protection from solar radiation and extremes of temperature and to remedy the lack of gravity. But the biggest problem will be the total lack of water. However, in 1966, the US lunar space probe Clementine sent back information that both poles of the moon are covered with a great mass of water in its solid state, confirmed two years later by the US lunar robot Prospector. This discovery has re-opened the door to the possibility of a lunar city.

What will a lunar city be like?

It will have solar panels for the production of electrical energy, laboratories, shops and areas for the landing and take off of space vehicles. One of the projects forecast for the lunar city (Escargot City 2050) are houses and buildings similar to the shells of snails. (Escargot is french for snail).

SOING FOR YOUR DRIVING TEST

In the fourth and final part of the Dungarvan Leaders four week series in conjunction with the West Waterford Driving Schools Association, we cover: the Driving Test Report.

Failure of your Driving Test

Failure of the test arises where you incur any of the following:- 1 or more grade three faults, 4 of the same grade two faults for a single aspect, 6 or more grade two faults under the same heading, or a total of 9 or more grade two faults overall. Up to a maximum of 4 grade two faults may be recorded for any single aspect.

Grading of Faults

Faults are graded as follows:- Grade 1 (Green) Minor, Grade 2 (Blue) More Serious, Grade 3 (Pink) Dangerous/Potentially Dangerous.

Grade 1 faults do not affect the test result. A combination of 3 or more unanswered or incorrectly answered questions on the rules of the road/checks, constitutes a grade 2 fault. (Checks cover doors, seat, seat-belts and mirrors, and for motorcyclists, the helmet adjustment).

Three or more hand signs not demonstrated or incorrectly demonstrated constitutes a grade 2 fault. Inability to demonstrate 3 or more Secondary Controls constitutes a grade 2 fault. (Secondary controls include temperature controls; fans; air vents; rear-window heater; wipers; windscreen washer; light switches and air conditioners where fitted. For HGV's it includes an exhaust brake/retarder where fitted. Not operating a secondary control as required during thee practical test can also constitute a fault. Inability to operate 1 or more HGV/PSV checks constitutes a grade 2 fault. (HGV/PSV checks covers power assisted braking and steering systems where fitted, and the special checks for buses - fuel shut-off valve, main switch, powered doors where fitted and the emergency exit, First Aid Kit, warning triangle, and the fire extinguisher).

Alighting includes securing the vehicle, and checking around before opening the door.

Preparing for your next Driving Test

In preparing for your next test you should pay particular attention to the items which have been marked. Further information on these and other aspects off the test are contained in the booklet entitled the Rules of the Road, which is available at Post Offices and some book shops, and in the leaflet, Preparing for your Driving Test, which is issued with the acknowledgement of your application.

Please Note: Cancellation of driving test appointments will only be accepted if notification is received in the Department at least ten working days in advance of the appointed date.

DISABILITY **AWARENESS OSTEOPOROSIS**

What is Osteoporosis?

Osteoporosis is a disability in which bones gradually become thinner and weaker, and this causes increased susceptibility to fractures of the hip, spine and wrist. The risk of Osteoporosis increases, as a person gets older, and it is more likely to affect women than men, this is due to hormonal reasons. Bone is a living tissue and in a healthy person it is constantly renewed. There are two types of cells in the bone, one is osteoclasts and the other is osteoblasts, the osteoclasts destroy the cells in the bone, and osteoblasts, make new bone. When a person gets older the osteoclasts work a lot harder and the osteoblasts become less active. This means that bone is being removed and not being replaced with new cells, which then leads to thinning of the bone and Osteoporosis.

Symptoms of Osteoporosis

There are usually no signs or symptoms with Osteoporosis; it is only after a person has broken a hip or wrist and has been taken into hospital that a diagnosis can be made. There are specialised tests called bone density tests which measure the bone density in various sites of the body, these tests can detect osteoporosis before a fracture occurs, predict a persons chances of fracturing a bone in the future, and determine the rate of bone loss if treatment is conducted at intervals of a year or more.

Osteoporosis can cause fractures in the hip, which can lead to the loss of mobility and independence, and Vertebral fractures can lead to the loss of height and the formation of a permanent curvature of the spine, known as 'dowagers hump'. The consequences of Osteoporosis can cause permanent disability.

Prevention and Treatment

To prevent Osteoporosis in later life, it is important to have a well balanced diet rich in calcium and vitamin D, to follow a routine of weight bearing exercise, to have a healthy lifestyle which includes no smoking or excessive alcohol intake, and to avail of the Bone density testing. If there is any reason for a person to suspect they may have Osteoporosis then it is important to get professional medical advice. There are a number of treatments such as hormone replacement therapy (HRT), which has been proven to have a positive effect on the prevention and treatment of Osteoporosis.

There is no cure for Osteoporosis, but professionally prescribed medications do improve the quality of life and with increased research into the disability, the future for treatment and prevention of osteoporosis is very good.

The Science of Farming and Food SHEEP: Feeding Pre Lambing

Silage and hay digestibility is lower than normal this year. They are also lower in protein.

Recommendations:

- Good silage start feeding 7 weeks out and build up to 0.7kg for twins.
- Poor silage start feeding 8-9 weeks out from lambing.
- Feed triplets 30% more and singles 30% less.
- Incorporate a sheep mineral mix
- No milk or inadequate in lambing ewes check protein in diet
- Ewes in poor condition increase meal feeding level and continue to feed after lambing
- Separate out thin and lame ewes and give them extra trough
- Ewes must have 45cm space to successfully eat their propor-

Early Flocks

Keep ewes milking for 5-7 weeks. Indoor ewes on silage require 1.2kg to 1.6kg depending on roughage quality. A trial at Teagasc, Knockbeg showed that early ewes could be fed an all-concentrate diet after lambing. Maximum level fed was 2.8kg/day so 1.6kg/day did not pose any risk of digestive upsets etc.

Make sure early lambs have every opportunity to eat creep. Locate the feeder near the ewe feeding area and keep a small amount of fresh creep available at all times. Coarse mixes, which are highly palatable, are best to encourage lambs to start eating. These more expensive rations can be phased out later if necessary.

Outdoors lambs can be weaned when eating over 0.25kg creep per day aver six weeks of age. This may be an option should grass get scarce in February or March.

Vaccinations

Don't forget 8:1 booster vaccine. Clostridial bacteria are widespread on farms and this vaccine is good insurance cover against a wide range of diseases

Ewes that never received a clostridial vaccine require two treatments separated by a short interval (usually 4-6 weeks). There is little antibody production until the second treatment is administered. Both shots must be given before the risk period.

A "booster" treatment is required 3-6 weeks before lambing in subsequent years. This boosts the level of antibodies in the ewes system and also gives protection to new born lambs via the

Labour Saving

Once a day feeding. Ewes in good condition and on good roughage need feeding only once a day. Have adequate trough space and separate out thin/lame/triplet ewes to feed twice daily. Straw feeding. Works fine provided adequate meal is fed and gradually introduced. Labour is saved because you are handling two materials, straw plus meal, rather than three, straw, meal and silage. Lambing. Now is the time to organise individual hurdles for pens, water supply and feed containers. Some fields can be temporarily divided to act as small holding pens.

Lambing Outdoors. If there is sufficient grass farm in early March some ewes could be turned out to lamb in late March. Repeat ewes and twins may be most suitable. This reduces the amount of work indoors and also gives more space in the shed.

DAIRYING: Workload Mounting Up

February/March is the peak work period on most spring calving dairy farms. It is a period in which many dairy farmers are over worked and often too tired to look after things properly. Teagasc surveys show that on average, dairy farmers work 12 hours per day in March, while some of them work up to 16 hours.

Work Routine

Due to the wide variety of very important tasks to be carried out at this time of the year very good planning and a good work routine is essential. Every dairy farmer should make a list of all the important tasks to be carried out making sure that the most important jobs receive priority attention. Someone has to take overall responsibility to ensure that nothing is neglected. Unfortunately it is the most important tasks that are usually neglected in the chaos of the spring rush.

Every farmer should carry a pocket notebook to take notes and remind themselves of the important tasks that have to be done. This notebook should also facilitate the recording of all the events, which are now necessary for farmers. The Irish Cattle Breeding Federation (ICBF) has produced a notebook for the purpose of recording important animal events. It also has facilities for recording other important events on the farm including fertiliser usage and grass covers. Every farmer should get one of these notebooks immediately. Contact ICBF or your co-op.

FARMING LEADER

It's A Quare Name, But Is HACCP Great Stuff?

It might be more user-friendly if we could pronounce the initials as an acronym, but even though HACCP lacks that certain ring to it, this resolutely unpronounceable collection of letters has still managed to become part of life in recent years in food production, in this country as well as throughout the European Union. Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point has been described by Agriculture Commissioner Franz Fischler as a logical and systematic approach to the control of foodborne hazards. The key point is that it is self-checking. It is operated by producers (under the supervision of the official services) and enables the producer to carefully analyse production processes, identify critical points where potential hazards may be controlled, and take the appropriate action.

It became a very familiar term to Irish food processors in June 2001 when the European Commission formally made Decision 2001/471/EC, which legally mandated HACCP in all meat and poultry plants throughout the Union. As recently as 1997, Commissioner Fischler was giving consideration to introducing the system to farms, but eventually it was decided that Codes of Good Practice were the better safety management instrument in farming. The Commission felt that the introduction of HACCP at farm level would be "over-ambitious and disproportionate.

The introduction of HACCP may have sent a shiver of annoyance through the processing end of the agricultural industry in the lead-up to the introduction of the new system and in its immediate aftermath, due to the inevitable extra bureaucracy and paperwork that this would entail, but as Dr. Declan Bolton of the Food Safety Department of Teagasc pointed out at the time, in the wake of BSE, E coli 0157 and foot-and-mouth disease, implementation of HACCP was "the best means of avoiding further adverse publicity and restoring consumer confidence, both at home and in international markets." Writing in a recent issue of Farm & Food, the Teagasc research and development digest, Dr Bolton said meat was an important agent of food-borne infection. Studies in one Irish beef factory found that 3.2 per cent of carcases were contaminated with E coli 0157, while there were corresponding figures of 2 per cent for salmonella and 16 per cent for listeria, he said.

The incidence of salmonella in Irish pigs in one Irish pig plant was up to 60 per cent. In a small survey of Dublin butcher shops, pork products were found to have 9.9 per cent incidences of salmonella, 100 per cent of yersinia and 45 per cent of listeria. Listeria is also prevalent on retail lamb products with a reported incidence of up to 60 per cent.

HACCP is often considered to be a costly, unnecessary exercise, which involves a large amount of paperwork," Dr Bolton said. But he is adamant that the meat industry can achieve compliance with current food safety legislation through the development of effective HACCP systems which are neither expensive nor require large amounts of documentation. Teagasc has published slaughter documents for the beef, pork and lamb processing industries, providing the necessary information and detail to facilitate the implementation of HACCP on the slaughter floor in meat plants, from lairage to chilling.

At the end of last year, the Council of Agriculture Ministers agreed a regulation to set hygiene rules for food of animal origin. The measure was proposed by the Commission as part of its general hygiene package. David Byrne, Commissioner for Health and Consumer Protection, said the intention was that further simplification would become feasible in the longer term, with the implementation of the selfchecking HACCP system. n't need to stress how important "Sound effective hygiene rules but his point was well made safe food," he said.



New Principal Planning For The Future

West Waterford's new superschool, Blackwater Community College will open its doors to more than four hundred pupils next September, and the man whose responsibility it is, Denis Ring, plans to ensure the college will become a centre of learning for everyone in the local hinterland.

A physical education graduate Thomand College, Limerick, Denis began his teaching career at Mayfield Community School, then Milstreet Community School



and also spent time at Colaiste Criost Ri before taking up a teaching position at St. Colman's in 1986.

There, he excelled as both an academic and sporting figure, completing three geography textbooks and two masters' degrees in history and postgraduate studies in education management and sports psychology.

In the midst of coaching, teaching and further study, Denis also managed to publish a history of Macroom, which was launched by President Mary Robinson. He explains that it was during the writing of this book that he forged his first links with Lismore.

"Much of what I wrote drew comparisons with other towns and Lismore was one of them. Of course, living in Fermoy from a leisure and recreational point of view, we often visit the towers and Ballyrafter House. It's certainly one of the most attractive places in Munster", says Denis. While this is the first Principal appointment for the Macroom man, Denis asserts that much of his achievements at St. Colman's were directed towards a management role.

Involved in managing the hurling and football team, planning, discipline, the introduction of a new curriculum and co-ordinating transition year, Denis feels he is well equipped to cope with his new brief.

Given his sporting expertise, which includes management of the Cork Hurling team, Denis is equally determined to make Blackwater Community School a centre of sporting excellence. Stating that he would like to promote as many sports as possible in the school, from Gaelic games to volleyball, hockey, basketball and tennis, he assures students of a broad range of activities to choose from.

On the dramatic and musical front. Denis is also keen to ensure the school continues to maintain its strong theatrical traditions already established in the three amalgamating schools.

Looking to the years ahead, Denis makes no secret of his passions to develop Blackwater Community School, as a centre of learning which will generate a new heartbeat in the community which will become a magnet for all people in the local hinterland. Question

I have been on Unemployment Assistance for two years. Am I eligible for the Back to Work Allowance (BTWA) scheme operated by the Department of Social and Family Affairs?

Answer

Up to recently providing your weekly rate of Unemployment You will retain any secondary benefits, such as Fuel Assistance was above a certain level you would have qualified. Following a change in the eligibility criteria, however household income is less than 317.43 Euro per week. unless you have been unemployed for five years or more you are not eligible for the scheme.

Among those who are eligible for the BTWA and remain eligible following the change are those in receipt of Disability Allowance, Invalidity Pension, Blind Person's Pension, One Parent Family Payment, Unemployment Supplement, Pre-Retirement Allowance, Widow's/Widower's (Non Contributory) Pension, Deserted Wife's Benefit or Allowance, Prisoner's Wife's Allowance or Carer's Allowance for at least 15 months (12 months if you are aged 50 or over) and those in receipt of Disability Benefit for three years or more.

Previously, if you were aged 23 or over and were ployed for 15 months (12 months if aged 50 had an entitlement to Unemployment A weekly rate of at least 50.79 Euro (single person) or 78.72 Euro (if married or constituy) you were eligible for the BTWA scheme. As of January 2003 you must have been

unemployed for 5 years or more in order to be eligible. Under the Back To Work Allowance (BTWA) scheme you can work and retain a percentage of your social welfare payment. You will be paid 75% of your payment for the first year, 50% in the second year and

Allowance, for the three years provided that your gross (The BTWA and Family Income Supplement is not taken into account for the 317.43 Euro income limit). Your Rent/Mortgage Interest Supplement will also be paid on a reducing scale over 4 years: 75% in year 1, 50% in year 2. 25% in years 3 & 4. The BTWA is not subject to income tax or PRSI deductions.

Anniversary of Soloheadbeg Ambush

The Soloheadbeg ambush of January 21st 1919 that began the Irish War of Independence 84 years ago was commemorated last Sunday January 26th 2003 at the ambush site. The ceremonies commenced with the assembly at Coffey's forge on the Tipperary/Cappawhite road and they paraded to the ambush site. The parade was headed by the Sean Tracey Pipers band from Moycarky. At 3pm the Ambush site ceremonies opened with a cultural contribution by the Irish Bardic Federation, a rendering by the band, the reading of the Proclamation, a decade of the rosary. Seamus Leahy, Clonmel, well known author and long time contributor to the now defunct Irish Press daily newspaper delivered the oration. When the ceremonies concluded at the Ambush site, all present made their way to Donohill for an evening of Irish culture, history and tales of by gone days. The men who made the quite West Tipperary townsland of Soloheadbeg special in Irish History and immortalised it and themselves nationally were Sean Tracey, Dan Breen, Seamus Robinson, Sean Hogan, Paddy

McCormack, Tadhg Crowe, Paddy O' Dwyer and Michael Ryan. They were all IRB and Irish Volunteer members and model citizens from respected families in their local community. They were all committed to an Independent Irish State free of any connections with England. Their action to challenge British rule and start a war for freedom was planned. Their regret always was that only two instead of the expected six policemen came as escorts with the Gelignite delivery to the local quary. The action of the ambushers was to assert that it was Irish not British empire authority would reign in Ireland. Their actions afterwards as well as at Soloheadbeg confirmed their bravery and soldierly qualities. Sean Tracey and Dan Breen became big men with Michael Collins when he invited them to Dublin to train his squad to combat the Dublin Castle terror agents of British rule in Ireland. Despite the winter climate of January, men and women came from a far annually to remember the men of Soloheadbeg. There too gathered the young men and women of today, to acknowl-

edge those of previous generation, who lifted the oppressive yoke of imperialism off the shoulders of our people. Soloheadbeg today is a motivating place name, to encourage us all to continue the good work to make our land a nation peaceful, united and prosperous. To remember the dead who served Ireland well, is commendable, responsible and promotes respect, support and responsibility among us all as citizens. As well as the eight men named who took part in the ambush waiting for the call for action close by were Maurice Crowe, Con Power, Arty Barlow, Sean O' Meara and Denny Lacy.

50th Anniversary of Rabbit Disease

This year 2003 marks the 50th Anniversary of the introduction into this county of the awful rabbit disease Myxomatosis, a highly infectious disease caused by a virus, leading to swelling of the mucous membranes and the formation of tumours similar to Myxomas. For many years the catching of rabbits by snare, trap, ferreting, shooting or netting or lamping was widely followed by many young and not so young men in rural Ireland. There, there was a never ending demand for rabbits in England. At the time the rabbit fetching three and nine pence each, at the time a work mans wage was fifteen shillings. Then came the Myxomatosis and in a short term the rabbit population was almost wiped out, at least ninety percent of the total rabbit population were exterminated. At the time the rabbit was regarded as an agricultural plague. However, nature will not be mastered or tamed and within five or six years the few remaining rabbits built up an immunity to the virus and slowly but surely they have made a comeback and are now almost as plentiful as ever. Large buyers of rabbits at the time were Knockmeal Coop Creamery, Ballinamult and all it's branches, O' Connors Cappoquin, Carrs Curraglas and Mallow.

RECYCLING AND WASTE REDUCTION DRIVE CONTINUES

With County Waterford continuing to lead the way nationally in terms of household waste recycling and reduction, Waterford County Council has passed a series of new bye-laws designed to further increase the uptake of the Council's successful door to door recycling scheme which was introduced in November 2001.

The Council say the byelaws are necessary to reduce the amount of reusable material going to landfill sites. The citizens of Abbeyside, Ballinroad, Garranbane and Ballinacourty have generally co-operated with the Councils initiatives to date and hopefully this support will be maintained and improved where necessary.

Fixed penalties of 31.74 euro (IR £25) will be imposed on householders who fail to separate recyclable waste and to present it for collection in an appropriately tagged transparent plastic bag approved by Waterford County Council.

Other provisions of the bye laws mean that Wheelie bins must be closed and not overflowing to avoid the danger of causing litter; Glass bottles and jars will not be collected in wheelie bins. These can be recycled at the bottle bank in The Causeway car Park; The burning of household waste is prohibited.

C.L.A.M.S.

The unique co-ordinated local Aquaculture Management Systems (C.L.A.M.S.) process is a nationwide initiative to manage the development of aquaculture in bays and inshore waters throughout Ireland at a local level. In each case, the plan fully integrates aquaculture interests with relevant national policies. Dungarvan Harbour is one of the areas involved although there will be no aquaculture development at Abbeyside or the northern side of the harbour.

The various C.L.A.M.S. plans formulated at local level must conform to certain general national policy guidelines including stocking densities per hectare, distance between farms etc.

If decisions are taken at a national level these are taken on board at the local level and the relevant changes are made to the C.L.A.M.S. document and any associated codes of practices etc.

SMITHS HISTORY

OF WATERFORD The parish is divided by the inlet on which the town is situated into East and West Dungarvan, of which the former comprises the more ancient parishes of Abbeyside and Ballinroad or Nugent's. On the south-east side of the channel the sea has made great encroachments. Limestone and large masses on conglomerate, or pudding stone, are found in abundance, of the former, considerable quantities are sent in boats from Ballinacourty to Bonmahon, Stradbally and other places along the coast. The finest view is obtained from the summit of Cushcam on the north-east, from which are seen the castle of Clonea, the ruins of a churc'n and a widely extended strand beyond which are the improvements of Clonkoskoran and in the distance the town of Dungarvan with its various towers as if rising from the sea. In the neighbourhood are Ballinacourty, the residence of R. Longan, Esq., commanding a fine view of the harbour and of the bay, bay view of R.B.H. Low, Esq., Duckspool of J.M. Galwey Esq., Tournore, of B. Boate Esq., Moonrudh of the Rev. S. Dickson vicar of the parish, a modern edifice and the Hermitage of W.H. Barron Esq. all situated on the south eastern side of the harbour and commanding fine marine views.

GREEK MASTERPIECE IN BALLYDUFF

The Ballyduff Drama Group's festival production "Antigone" goes on stage in St. Michael's Hall on Thursday the 13th of February and concludes it's three-night run on Saturday night. Once again this production breaks new territory for the group. For the first time they stage a Greek tragedy and one of the greatest plays in literature. Even though this play was written two and a half thousand years ago it's themes and issues are as relevant today as they were in Ancient Greece.

The play is set in Thebes and opens after a war between two brothers, Etecoles and Polyneices both of whom have lost their lives. Their uncle Creon becomes the new ruler and proceeds to give Etecoles a hero's funeral but refuses to allow the burial of Polyneices whom

he considers a traitor. Antigone, his sister defies his decree and performs the funeral rites for her brother. She is caught and sentenced to imprisonment in a cave, which will ultimately become her tomb. Her sister Ismere who has refused to get involved claims a shame in her guilt and begs for punishment. Matters are further complicated as Creon's son Haemon is engaged to Antigone and pleads for clemency. This plea is rejected and Haemon leaves home threatening to die with Antigone. As the situation is now getting out of hand the Kings advisers try to get Creon to change his mind. Eventually he does but it's too late. When he gets to the cave he finds his son clasping the dead Antigone. Haemon lunges at Creon with a sword and misses him

but kills himself instead. Further misery awaits Creon when he returns to the palace to discover that his wife has killed herself.

Creon like many leaders before and since - realises too late that his own pride has blinded him to reality and clouded his judgment. The play also looks at other issues that are still relevant including male chauvinism, individual conscience versus state laws and the role of powers outside man's control. Interesting also is the fact that Antigone is one of the first plays to have a female character as a hero in the full sense of the word and she is also probably the first "conscientious objector" in history.

Brendan Dunlea produces the play and he has gathered around him a highly acclaimed cast. Enda Ormonde and Stephanie O Flynn who recently starred "Eclipsed", play the key female roles. Creon, the main male role, is played by the regal looking Richie Walsh who carries a great deal of gravitas to the position. Kevin McCormack, John Stack, Sile Heneghan, David Keating and John Hurley play the other key roles. An integral part of Greek drama is the Chorus, consisting of 15 characters which adds greatly to the play's dramatic impact.



Those who feared that the high standard of the early years of this Award might not be maintained, have had their fears firmly laid to rest, for with the continued involvement of a huge number of young people from the West of the County in a wide range of sports and committed to high achievement, as well as the commitment of the Gardai led by Supt. Ml. Blake and Garda Eddie Fitzpatrick, JLO, the Award has become one of the most sought after accolades in Waterford Sport.

The Roll of Honour over the last ten years tells its own story and gives lie to the myths that young people are not as committed today as heretofore, or that the Gardai may not be projecting themselves in a positive enough light. This annual exercise in acknowledging achievement among youth and showing the caring face of the Gardai has been good for both and is set to continue long into the future.

It is, in the words of successive public representatives, a headline for other areas to emulate and the Dungarvan experience could well be a template to follow.

Supreme Court Challenge To Power Plant Gets Underway

A Supreme Court appeal by a small number of local residents against the proposed development of a €130 million gas fired power plant in Dungarvan got underway yesterday (Tues-

Dungarvan Energy Ltd, a consortium of Irish and International backers and Rolls Royce Power Ventures, received planning permission to build the power plant on a four-acre site formerly owned by Glanbia at Shandon, but a small number of local residents are challenging the development and the granting of an Integrated Pollution Control License by the EPA for

The high profile development was first proposed around three years ago and has already been subject to a number of appeals. The latest case follows on from the decision by the High Court, which found in favour of the EPA and the developers last

Its proposed, and believed to be agreed with ESB International, that the electricity generated by the natural gas fired plant will be diverted back into the national grid, and will be connected to the existing ESB station at Kildangan.

In a statement released following the High Court decision last year, Dungarvan Energy Ltd, said the funding of €130m

is already in place for the completion of this project.

It's also proposed that a natural gas pipeline will be extended from Ardfinnan to Dungarvan to power the plant. It's estimated that a gas turbined power plant would generate an income for Bord Gais of €20m, while natural gas would also be introduced to other businesses in the town.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Labour Cllr. Billy

Over Non-National **Roads Funding**


Labour Councillor Ger Barron has expressed disappointment at the level of funding granted to Waterford County Council in this year's Non-National roads grant allocations.

Cllr. Barron, says the 5% increase on last years allocation, is not even in line with ordinary inflation figures, and taking into account the hugely increased cost of the road surfacing material - Bitumen - the allocation will be significantly reduced on 2002.

As Bitumen is a by-product of oil and with the recent huge increase in oil prices and the very real threat of war in Iraq, Cllr. Barron is concerned that the upkeep of our county roads will be affected in the coming year. Another factor, adding to the problem is the damage done to many country roads by the recent heavy flooding, which in some cases almost swept away the road surface.

The Labour councillor said he is "particularly disappointed that Minister for the Environment, Martin Cullen, has not seen fit to give his own county a much more generous allocation, in view of the generous allocation given by the previous Minister (Noel Dempsey) to his own county which continues to attract generous furnding"

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
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
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
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
