AUTHORITIES PUSHING AHEAD WITH PLANS FOR WATERFORD INCINERATOR?

has expressed disappointment at Waterford Environment Minister Martin Cullen's welcome for An Bord Pleanála's decision

A Dungarvan Area Councillor to proceed the construction of the country's first municipal waste incinerator in county Meath.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair

Minister intends to deliver a thermal treatment facility as the centrepiece of waste managment in the Waterford city and county area. This, according to the Labour Councillor, is an expensive and unnecessary option and one that is laced with uncertainty in terms of risks to public health and the environment and agriculture of the surrounding countryside to a municipal waste incinerator.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says he's committed to the "rethink, recycle and reuse" approach - one that places minimum dependence on landfill.

What Cllr. Ó Céilleachair refers to as the "powers that be' in administrative and political circles are not, in his view, so committed and want what he sees as "the easy way out".

Outlining his reaction to the latest developments, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said:


'As my party's Environment Spokesperson, Eamon Gilmore TD has clearly stated, the Labour Party feels that incineration is the wrong strategy to deal with what is a severe waste problem. In fact, research shows that not enough is known about the harmful effects to our health of disposing our waste through incineration. This Bord Pleanala decision has been taken for the simple reason that little or no recycling infrastructure is available throughout the country. Indeed, as recent research shows, most of the small amount of waste collected for such purposes in Ireland is actually shipped-off outside the State.'

"There may be a doubt about Fianna Fáil in Government delivering on a motorway from Waterford to Dublin, decentralised Government jobs for Dungarvan or on much needed radiotherapy services for Waterford and the south east.

Quality of Water Supply Causing Serious Frustration

A recent major interruption to the Ring/Helvick Water Supply and ongoing problems with water pressure and discolouration is causing serious frustration in the Gaeltacht area.

The interruption to the supplies of almost 600 people in Ring, Helvick and Maoil a Choirne last month triggered the latest controversy over the quality of the supply, and has led to renewed calls for a new water source to be

The problem occurred following routine cleaning of intakes at the Ring/Helvick water supply scheme on Thursday and Friday, 13th and 14th of February respectively.

On the following Saturday, a customer reported to the water caretaker that there was no flow of water in the area and the caretaker discovered the system had become air-locked, preventing the free-flow of water.

A spokesperson from Waterford County Council said in order to conserve water, the supply was turned off on the Saturday and Sunday nights. During Sunday night, the air lock was fully cleared, and normal supply restored.

However, two major breaks occurred in the pipeline on the following Monday, leaving consumers in the Maoil a Choirne area, in particular, without a supply. In order to build up enough

pressure to trace the leaks, water had to be shut off to the different "legs" of the scheme for a time.

Waterford County Council staff worked overnight to locate these leaks, and both were repaired by mid-morning on Tuesday, 18th of February, at which point the supply was fully restored", the spokesperson said.

Waterford County Council has already set aside one million euros for the sourcing of a new supply, and has applied for a further three million euros from the Department of the Environment towards the project.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab), said the problem has arisen because the water source is in mountainous boggy terrain, incapable of dealing with the numbers of housing developments over the years. The adoption of the Ring/Old Parish Area Action Plan, providing for the zoning of more land for housing has also increased concerns.

"Over the past twenty years, most people have had problems with the quantity and quality of the water supply," Cllr. O Ceil-

He said he accepted the council's explanation for the four-day break, but added that the public in the area should not have to put up with a substandard supply.

"I don't think it is acceptable that the people of Ring, Maoil a Choirne and Helvick have had to put up with a substandard supply

for the past twenty years. It should be taken as a priority that the Department of the Environment provide funding towards

The problems encountered by householders in the area have included a lack of water pressure, especially during summer, affecting guesthouses for tourists and houses catering for students in Ring College.

On some occasions water pressure has been so low, that householders did not have enough water to flush their toilets, according to Cllr. O Ceilleachair. Local residents are also concerned about discolouration, with the water turning brown or yel-

One local resident, Joel Mahon, also raised the possible implications of water charges being implemented on a supply he describes as substandard.

Will our rates be reduced whenever our water turns brown or yellow at times," Mr. Mahon said, "or whenever there are particles floating in it? Or whenever the supply itself is cut off completely, as it is quite often."

"In the Ring/Helvick area at the moment, there is a drive for development and many new houses are being built. What could this do to an already frail and aged water supply?" Mr. Mahon asked.

A spokesperson for Waterford County Council said a proposed new water supply for Ring is included in the Government's

Water Service's Investment for 2002-2004

"A preliminary report has been prepared by the Council's Consultants and this report, together with the Council's recommendations have been forwarded to the Department of the Environment and Local Government for assessment and decision.

"This report examines deficiencies in the existing scheme, and makes proposals for what is effectively a new scheme, which will include new groundwater sources, additional reservoirs, storage and replacement and upsizing of existing mains."

It also recommends the amalgamation of the Old Parish, Robert's Cross, and Leigh Cross Schemes with the proposed new system. The estimated cost of the proposals is in excess of eur3 million.

"The problems with the existing scheme, which includes vulnerability of sources of pollution, inadequate storage, and old pipelines susceptible to breakage will be addressed. Adequate pressure and fire flow to vulnerable areas will also be provided for," the spokesperson said.

"On acceptance of the Preliminary Report by the Department, the council will hopefully be in a position to proceed with contract documents, appointment of contractors, and construction of the scheme, subject to the necessary approvals from the Department.

Third Level Fees And The Student Loan/ Graduate Tax: Bad Idea

A Chara,

Many of your readers are parents of sons and daughters who are either presently in third level education or have become familiar with talk of CAO forms and the like, as members of the household will shortly be facing into the Leaving Certificate examinations.

Recent speculation about the re-introduction of third level fees is bound to be of concern. Indeed, third level and prospective third level students themselves among your readership in Dungarvan and west Waterford will also be aware of the student loan/graduate tax idea being floated by the present Education Minister Noel Dempsey TD.

The Government tells your readers that it wants a fair and equitable education system, but in my view appear powerless to make it happen. Minister Dempsey tells your readers that he wants to look after students but, in my view, he seems intent on financially crippling them either through the re-introduction of third level tuition fees or the establishment of a new system of student loans/graduate taxes.

There are genuine fears among students and their families that the burden of fees could force them out of their college courses. There would also be the contemplation of the risk of cutting study time and miss some lectures in order to take up part-time work as an effort to make up for a shortfall their parents would not have planned for in the context of tuition fees not being there for the last few years.

The reality now for ordinary PAYE workers, like many of your readers, is that they are

being forced to pick up the tab for what I see as economic bungling by the Government over the last five years. The average working family trying to put their children through college are already struggling to meet the costs this involves. Now, it seems to me, the Taoiseach and his Government are intent on making them pay even more. What of statefunded third level education being a fundamental right, as much as the right to free primary and secondary education? Sadly, it appears to me that it is the hard pressed students and PAYE families that are being penalised again for seeking the most basic right the right to an education.

In conclusion, recent praise from official circles for the Australian system of student loans/graduate taxes should

elicit a dubious reaction from your readers. Such a system, I would argue, will not work in Ireland. It is clear that in Australia many people emigrate rather than pay-off the substantial debt and graduate tax accrued in university. Ireland would be particularly vulnerable to this, and we risk losing many skilled workers in key industries should such a system be introduced.

I hope that the questions I have raised above will be asked by your readers as this debate continues.

HENRY WINDSOR VILLIERS STUART (1827-1895)

He was son of Henry Villiers Stuart (1803 1874) Lord Stuart de Decies. Henry Windsor had an unusual variety of careers, in the army, the church and politics. He was a cadet in Prince Liechtenstein's Regiment (the Regiment of Light House) of the Austrian Imperial Army 1844 1846. He was an ensign in the 20th British regiment 1846 1847. He was appointed Vicar of Bulkington, Warwickshire in 1852 and Napton in 1855. He resigned Holy Orders in 1871 in order to stand for Parliament as M. P. for Co. Waterford 1873,1874, and 1880, 1885.

In 1865 Henry Windsor married Mary, second daughter of Ven. Ambrose Power Archdeacon of Lismore and son of Sir John Power 1st Bt. Of Kilfane, Co. Kilkenny.

In 1874/75 Henry Windsor vacated his seat in Parliament in order to pursue his claim to his father's title Lord Stuart de Decies. He was unsuccessful in this claim, as the validity of his parent's marriage could not be proved. After the battle of Tek el Kebir in 1882 Henry Windsor was commissioned by the government to visit

Egypt and to report on the condition of the people. He was the author of a number of books including - Nile Gleanings 1879, Egypt after the War 1883, Funeral Tent of an Egyptian Queen 1882, * Ad-

ventures amongst the Equatorial Forests and Rivers of South America 1891. A copy of this work is in the Dungarvan Museum Collection.

In 1882 he introduced the Labourer's Cottages and Allotments (Ireland) Bill which was passed on 18 August 1882. He tried to establish an agricultural College in Ring. This was unsuccessful but the shell of the building developed into Colaiste na Rinne. He was a member of the Waterford Historical and Archaeological Society. He drowned on 12 October 1895 aged 65 after falling from his boat on the river Blackwater.

Waterford Student Enterprise Awards

An enterprise competition for all secondary students in Waterford City and County to learn how to set up a business from an initial idea through to selling the product or service to customers.

The basic objective of the competition is for students to learn all the stages involved in running their own business. Idea generation, market research, testing/modifying, production/sourcing, marketing, selling, keeping accounts and report writing.

At the start of September 2002, 424 students began searching for ideas to set up their own business. From school finals, thirty businesses qualified to participate in each Western and Eastern final concluding with twenty teams in the county final. Two teams have now qualified to the All-Ireland finals to be held in May.

Waterford has a very high standard, and this was reflected last year when a business from St.Declan's Community College won the senior category in the All-Ireland final.

The 2003 Waterford Student Enterprise Awards were held at the Clonea Strand Hotel on the 7th March. A total of 1,250.00 euro was awarded in prize money. The Waterford Student Enterprise Awards are jointly funded by both the County and City Enterprise Boards.

Cooking: Approx 12 mins plus marinating time

Try this different way with lamb cutlets.

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 2) 4-6 British lamb cutlets

1 small courgette, quartered 12 small aubergine, cut into large pieces

1 yellow pepper, seeded and cut into 4 pieces 2 tomatoes, halved

Spread the topping over the fruit and bake in a pre-heated oven 160C gas 3 for 45 minutes. Serve with cream or ice cream.







Topiary is an exciting design feature that can bring grace, elegance and even humour to the smallest plot. The tradition of clipping plants regularly to create all manner of shapes and effects is an ancient one, with living examples such as those at Levens Hall in the Lake District being over 300 years old. Today topiary is finding a new home in domestic gardens all over the country. One of the biggest strengths of topiary is its

versatility. Topiary can be used to highlight features of interest in the garden. If you want to draw attention to a piece of statuary, a water feature or frame a gateway; topiary can be the ideal way of achieving this. It provides year round structure which will

look wonderful with a crisp covering of winter snow. A wide range of shapes can be created, from geometric cubes, spheres and pyramids to imaginative birds or animals. Curvy shapes can communicate a sense of movement and flow. The plants which are used tend to be evergreen, so there is the added bonus of foliage in winter.

Many plants will respond well to regular clipping, but Buxus, or box, is one of the most popular. Its dense growth habit and evergreen leaves make it ideally suited for this purpose. Plants don't have to be long-established specimens growing in the ground; container plants are popular subjects for topiary too. You can be as reserved or flamboyant as you want with box, establishing symmetrical hedging, perhaps for framing a feature or lining a path, or you can really let yourself go with a riot of shapes and an imaginative layout. Fertile, well drained soils are ideal for box, but they will do well in most situations provided the soil isn't waterlogged. Garden centres and florists now sell ready shaped plants in containers which you can trim to keep in shape. Alternatively, choose from the range of readymade wire shapes that are available and create your own. Clip or prune in late spring. Taxus, or yew also responds well to this usage and most species tolerate urban pollution, dry soils and exposure. Clip or prune yew in summer and early autumn. (Please note, parts of yew are poisonous). If you're opting to grow topiary specimens in containers,

remember pots and planters play a role in complementing the planting too. At the same time, why not look at the wide range of dwarf and ornamental conifers that

work so well alongside shaped plants? Topiary offers so many ways of making more of the garden. Plants which are suited to it can thrive in the range

of soil and climatic conditions commonly encountered in this country and it requires only a little maintenance in the form of occasional clipping.



Maritime Extracts

Last week a man gave us a number of items for our maritime section. One of the items I found very interesting was "Mermaid", journal of the Friends of Merseyside Maritime Museum, Tall Ships souvenir edition, Spring 1984, Issue No. 9. The following is just an extract from perspectives on De Wadden by M.K. Stammers.

'Many of these were owned not in Liverpool but in the small ports abounds the Irish Sea. Among the chief of these were Connah's Quay (on the Dee); Barrow, where Fishers whose ships still trade up the Mersey once owned as many as 60 schooners; Forthmadog, and Arklow - De Wadden's home port. Fifty years ago the same sort of little sailing ship could still be seen lying at the anchor, waiting for the tide; but with some differences; there were fewer of them.

Pioneer

Road transport and powered vessels were taking away their business; they had fewer sails and almost all of them had auxiliary engines. This made them less dependent on the wind and cut out the need for costly tugs. Most would have been aging sailing ships which had the engine fitted as an afterthought in the struggle to compete and keep trading. The De Wadden was different. She was the most modern of the fleet; true she had sails, a lot of canvas in fact on three lofty masts and a long bowsprit, but she also had a powerful diesel engine fitted from the time she was built in the Netherlands in 1917. That engine was her main source of motive power not her sails, and so she was in her day very much a pioneer ship. She was

the coaster in transition and, as such, the bridge between the sailing schooner and modern diesel vessels.

She has an importance beyond her local connections which we value so much. This is because she fills an important gap. The Maritime Trust have the Kathleen and May at St. Katherine's Dock, London, as an example of the last of the wooden coasting topsail schooners (lets not forget, incidentally, that she was actually built in the North West at Connah's Quay). The Uister Folk and Transport Museum have the Result, a steel topsail; schooner built at Carrickfergus of more modern design, and with good fortune we shall have the De Wadden, last of the sailers, first of the motor coast-

Footnote from M.J. Heighton

In December of last year the Museum organised a survey of De Wadden in a shipyard in Renfrew, and I stayed in Dunoon for three days to meet the owner, our surveyors, and of course, De Wadden herself. And I got to know her quite well. I got to know her at 6 o' clock in the morning, in the middle of the day, and at midnight! I peered and poked around her fo'cs'sle, bridges, and engine rooms. I watched the drivers going over side to visually inspect her hull before docking, and I saw her lined up on the skip ready to be eased out of the water. She is old, she is rusty, and she needs a great deal of attention. But without doubt she's the ship for us. However, we will need every penny we can get in order to acquire her and carry out the repairs necessary to make her seaworthy and to get her looking at her best'

PARLIAMENTARY BOROUGH

In 1831 a report on the borough of Dungarvan revealed some interesting facts about it. There were 1,182 houses in town and a population of 8,931 at that time. The manor included the town in itself, Abbeyside, Kilrush parish and parts of Colligan, Kilgobnet, Ring and Whitechurch and Ballinroad as well as Ballymullally, Canty and Knockmahon. It was 4046.9 ha in area.

The chapter of James 1 had fallen into disuse in the town by this and the Duke of Devonshire appointed a senschal to administer both town and manor. In the town just about 200 householders had the right to vote, which was 2% of the population. In the rural part of the manor only 241 had the franchise. The voters, with the exception of 157 forty-shilling freeholders in the manor, had the right to vote in County Parliamentary elections also. The election of an MP for the borough was held in the town but for the county seats the voters had to travel to Waterford city and this imposed some hardship on them. The report also states that the land or gardens of the town houses were very small. The townspeople fished or else had "other precarious occupations" but it is not stated what these were.

HOW MANY ANIMALS ARE THERE?

There are about two million living species in the animal kingdom and all have some features in common. All animals are multi-celled organisms, they can move the whole or part of the body, swallow food, get rid of their own waste material and they can reproduce. The variety of animals is amazing - sponges, bees, snakes, elephants, butterflies, parrots ... some flying, some walking, others swimming, crawling, jumping . . Vertebrates, including fish, reptiles, amphibians, mammals and birds, represent only 1.1% of all species of animals, whilst arthropods, a class

which includes insects, crustaceans and arachnids, has the most species - over one million!

VERTEBRATES

This classification divides animals into two large groups - those with a spine or backbone (vertebrates) and those without a spine (invertebrates).

FACTS AND FIGURES

There are over 9000 known species of birds.


Reptiles comprise one of the largest groups of animals, with over 600 species. snakes, tortoises and crocodiles belong to this group.

There are about 42000 species of amphibians. Frogs, toads, newts and salamanders are all amphibians.

There are more than 23000 species of fish in many shapes and sizes. There are about 4600 species in the group of mammals, from the huge elephants to the tiny dormouse.

PHYLUM

Phylum is the term for a major group of animals. There are 35 phyla. The main ones are - Chordata (which includes verterbrates), Porifera (sponges), Molluscs (oysters, octopus), Coelenterata (jellyfish), Arthropods (insects, spiders, scorpions), Echinodermata (starfish, seaurchin).



Sponge, Coral and Sea-Anemone -Plants or Animals?

All animals must get food. But some sea creatures spend their lives anchored to rocks. The sea anemone, which looks like a flower, has small, stinging tentacles with which it poisons its prey before taking it into the body. And although it may seem quite still, the sea-anemone moves very, very slowly along a rock, thanks to the small suckers on the base of its body. Coral is a tiny sea creature with a soft body and tentacles. All around itself it makes a calcium shelter, which it never leaves. To capture its prey, it stretches out its stinging tentacles from inside its 'hideout.' Sponges live anchored to rocks or clasped to the shells of hermit crabs. They absorb nutriments by filtering water through their

The Science of Farming and Food CATTLE: Slage 2003

High yields of silage are essential to keep costs per tonne to a minimum. Grazing silage fields before closing in spring can reduce silage yield by up to 15% when cut in mid to late May. Reduction in silage yield is minimised by grazing and closing up silage fields on a phased basis so that only part of the silage area is grazed up to the latest recommended closing date of 10th April. Planning an early silage cut is important to ensure silage with a high DMD over 70 so that dependence on meals is minimised next winter. Silage closed by 10th April has 6 weeks growth up to 22nd May and 7 weeks up to 29th May which should be adequate to produce a good yield in a normal year. Most drystock farmers should be able to obtain all their silage requirements in one cut given their modest stocking rates and the higher cost of lower yielding second cuts.

90-110 units of N are required for silage depending on level of spring slurry application. Slurry application to silage fields should be completed by early March and should be avoided (until after cutting) if grass covers are good in February/March. Where silage fields are grazed in spring following early nitrogen application then assume that 1/3 of early N for grazing is still available for silage. 75 units of N should be adequate at closing on fields fertilised for early grazing that also receive a spring slurry application.

Financial Analysis

Area Aid 2003

Do you know how your drystock system is performing in financial terms? How do you compare with other drystock farmers? What percentage of your premia receipts are you retaining as farm profit? How can your system be modified to increase farm profit?

By completing the Teagasc Drystock Profit Monitor farm details you can obtain a detailed financial analysis on your output, premia, variable and fixed costs and farm profitability that will allow comparison with other drystock farmers. Obtain a set of input sheets from your local Teagasc drystock adviser and start to take a hard look at your financial strengths and weaknesses.

Monday 31st March '03 is the deadline for return of application forms by swiftpost to Area Aid unit or to local DAFRD office. The 2003 Area Aid application incorporates the only application for extensification premium and compensatory allowance payment in the disadvantaged areas. It is essential to apply for extensification and disadvantaged area payment in questions 2 and 3 in order to ensure payment. The stocking rate limit for special beef premium and suckler cow premium is 1.8 LU/ha for 2003. Check that net area declared in column 5 takes account of all deductions that should be made for ineligible areas such as roads, paths, buildings, farmyards, woods, scrub, ponds, lakes, sand, areas of bare rock, areas used for turf cutting or quarrying, areas fenced off and inaccessible and areas not available for animals under a REPS plan. Forage area must be available and accessible and should be appropriate in quality for the type of animals kept.

SOUTHEAST ICMSA NEWS

John Quigley Regional officer outlines below ICMSA's initial response from both the dairy and beef committees to the Fischler proposals.

ICMSA DAIRY COMMITTEE PROPOSALS ON MID-TERM REVIEW.

1. ICMSA General Position On Mid-Term Review Proposals on Dairy Sector: Agenda 2000 Agreement should be implemented as agreed up to 2007. Policy Changes Post Agenda 2000 should be examined in 2006. ICMSA is totally opposed to Mid-Term Review proposals on dairy. Mid-Term Review should be used to make minor adjustments to existing policy to increase farm incomes.

ICMSA Specific Proposals on the Fischler Mid-Term Review for the Dairy

(a) Milk Quota:

- Milk Quotas should be retained as a supply control

- EU Milk Quota should not be increased if market demand does not justify an increase.

(b) Butterfat Reference Level. - If milk quotas are increased, the increase should be distributed via a butterfat increase.

(c) Price Support Reductions. - ICMSA is totally opposed to any reduction in milk price sup-

(d) Milk Direct Payments:

- Full compensation must be paid for any reduction in milk price supports.

> Mr. Leahy pointed out that a 20% premium penalty amounts to a cut of 30/animal on the

special beef premium. For producers on the lower rate of extensification premium, the penalty increases to 38/animal. At the higher rate of extensification premium, the penalty will be 46/animal (a commercial producer with 100 cattle at the higher rate of extensification premium faces a penalty of 4,600).

The Livestock Chairman said the announcement from the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh last Friday on meat and bone meal means that farmers should not incur any of the costs associated with meat and bone meal disposal.



IFA BRINGING **FORWARD FINAL** DOCUMENT FOR **PARTNERSHIP**

Following a meeting of the IFA National Council in Dublin on Tuesday, 11 March, 2003, which approved further negotiations on the agriculture section of a new National Partnership Agreement, IFA President John Dillon said it was his firm belief that the preferred option of farmers was to be part of any new Partnership Agreement.

The IFA President said: "Partnership without farmers would be nothing more than a pay deal and there is now an opportunity for the Government to conclude and inclusive and balanced National Agreement before the March 26th deadline."

He was Vicar General of the Diocese from 1962-70 and with the death of Bishop Dalton in 1969. Fr. John was appointed Administrator of the Diocese until the appointment of Bishop Sheehan. The cross of ill health was trust upon his shoulders which saw him return to Ireland, Drogheda, Ballyboden and in 1997 he finally returned to his native and beloved Dungarvan.

Over the past few years Fr. John who made friends so easily, loved to walk around the local environs and meet the locals, recalling of times past and sharing the Gospel message through the telling of his experiences in the Dark Continent of Africa. Fr. John Declan Gough

Dungarvan Wine Club Notes BY AONGHUS WALSH



Tuesday 11th February saw our second tasting of the year and up for scrutiny were the classic wines of France. Whilst it is almost impossible to cover all the regions producing wine, we did our best to have a broad cross-selection of wines and different regions.

The first wine up was Dorjan de la tour Viognier from Langeedo Vin de Pays D'oc 2000 8.95 euro. This was chosen because the Viognier grape is quite unusual and not often seen on the shelves especially for 8.95 euros. On the nose as expected, it was very fruity with floral, peachy aromas. These follow through onto the palate which is medium dry with good acidity Inter-mixed with fruit giving a medium good length in the mouth. A very good wine and fantastic value if you like Viognier.

Club verdict 75/100. Next up in the White Wine was Domaire du Closel Savennieres 2000 21.95 euros. From the loire valley in North Western France. This was chosen because it is the most famous White Wine in France to be made from Chenin blanc grape Vairety. Again like the first Wine it is quite unusual and is at the upper end of the price spectrum. This is also a wine that appreciates with bottle age and this one is still quite youthful. It had a pronounced nose of lemon citrus fruits and the much familiar nose of wet wool and damp spice which is sometimes associated with Chenin Blanc. On the palate is was much more straight-forward with wonderful green fruits and good mineral undertones it was held together perfectly with zippy acidity and a finish that lingered and lingered. A wonderful savennienes that will get better with Club verdict 85/100.

Next up for a change was a Rosé/Pink wine called Ch. de Sours Bordeaux Rose 2001 13.95 euro. This was a bit of a gamble as no one has tasted this wine before, myself included. However we didn't have to worry as this was everything Rosé should be. On the nose we had lovely strawberry aromas and vanilla which gave us a hint as to what lay ahead. The palate was very intense with beautiful strawberry flavours bursting out also there was a slight spritzer like effect which only added to this wine. Can't wait for the summer B-B-Q's

Club verdict 80/100

The first of Red Wines was Cairanne Votes du Fhone Villages 1999 14.96 euro. From the Rhone valley this wine consisted of a blend of Grenache and Syrah. Both of the grape varieties are hot and spicy so we knew what to expect. Classic style of dark spicy fruits with Chocholat and leather aromas on the nose. On the palate it was very mouth-filling with strong earthy tannins combined with good black fruits and good acidity left a warm peppery finish which was excellent.

Club verdict - an unusual 821/2/100 will explain shortly!

The next Red Wine was Melesan Les Vieilles Vignes Bordeaux 1999 13.95 euros. Vieilles Vignes literally means old vines. Older vines produce less grapes than young vines but they have much more fruit concentration.

This proved to be the case as it had a very fruity, brambly aroma much more so than standard Bordeaux.

On the palate it burst into life with power and restraint combined. Great fruit extract concentration with good structural tannins giving a nice mouth feel.

A very stylish finish which lasted for an eternity. Would suit any meat based dish. The reason number 3 got 82¹/2/100 was because we couldn't decide which wine was better No. 3/No. 4. So this Bordeaux marginally got the vote with a club verdict 85/100.

The final Red Wine before

the mystery wine was Domaine Tempier Bandol 1999 23.50 euro. This for me was the best wine of the night. From Provence in Southern France. It's mainly a blend of southern French Varieties mainly Mouverdre and Grenache. Heat, spice, baked fruit, raisins and summer pudding all abounded on the nose. On the palate it was very complex with firm tannins and deep dark summer fruits with spice and vanilla. As you can see from these descriptions it was extremely complex, also a sign of a good

If money wasn't an issue this was the star wine of the night without a doubt. However we do rate our wines on quality and also value for money and the Bordeaux Red was deemed to be better value than the Bandal and this gets the honour of our star wine on the night.


Club verdict 85/100.

Our final wine on the night was our mystery red kindly supplied by Clair Morrissey. On first inspection we knew we had tasted something simi-

previously in the tasting but was it Bordeaux, Rhone or Southern France? There certainly was heat and spice and dark fruits which hinted towards Southern France Langedeux area. But on my first impression I definitely got Cabernet Sauvignon Aromas of Bordeaux and combined with a good earthy, tannic structure I opted for Bordeaux as did a few others. However we shouldn't have trusted our first instincts because it was Ch de Louberg from Provence at 12.95 euro. A very good wine



Cllr. Tom Higgins, (FG), has claimed the Irish Government is sitting on the fence over the use of Shannon airport by the United States, and on the threatened war with Iraq in general.

Cllr. Higgins, who previously accused the US of treating ordinary Afghans like battery chickens being fed up for the slaughter in their overthrow of the Taliban regime last year, believed the various demonstrations around Ireland proved the Irish people's objection to a war, and to the use of Shannon as a stop-over by US

He also said the Taoiseach was cynical in claiming the demonstrations were in step with Government foreign policy.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab) was also critical of the US approach, arguing that the US say they need to wage war to instil democracy in Iraq, and yet in Venezuela they tried to undermine and overthrow the democratically elected President Chavez.

However, Deputy Ollie Wilkinson (FF) said he'd never heard so much rubbish, and that Ireland, "as proud members of the UN", will be guided by the UN Security Coun-

He also contrasted the Labour and Fine Gael stance on the situation when "we had invaders in this country".

"The Irish people are in safe hands," according to Deputy Wilkinson.

Cllr. Ciaran O Riain said he raised the matter two months ago, stating that there is never a just war.

However, he said it should be taken into consideration just how dependent Ireland is on US industries, and the nation would be brought to its knees if all those industries were taken out.

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) said speakers should be cautious about linking war on Iraq to job creation, with the majority of American firms he deals with as a union representative offering conditions far above what's come before.

He credited British Prime Minister Tony CHr. Billy Blair for his visible willingness to lead from the front in restraining President George W Bush.

"It is with regret that I have to say our own leader is not showing a similar willingness to lead."

He said the draft policy would require the assistance of both the South Eastern Health Board and Waterford County Council, and would prioritise needs through means testing and by establishing Board, to streamline the scheme."

"The last thing I want to see," Cllr. Coffey said, "is a scheme running out of funds. We need to help the disabled. It's highly important, and we need to prioritise those most in need."

Deputy Wilkinson (FF) accepted it is right to prioritise and to means test, but again asked that the way schemes are run in other counties is also looked at.

Cllr. James Tobin (FF) supported Deputy Wilkinson, saying that one application was lodged last August for central heating, but no one has visited the house yet.

"Bye-laws Not A Stick To Beat Fishermen With"

County Engineer, John O'Flynn allayed the fears of the local fishing community saying the new draft Harbour Bye-laws would not be used as a stick to beat them with, or to prevent practices fisherman have engaged in for generations.

The bye-laws he said, were to be introduced mainly as a health and safety measure. The bye-laws give the harbour constable the power to remove and dispose of anything, including a vessel, deemed to be an obstruction to the harbour, prohibit shellfish storage boxes or pots or other articles being moored to buoys or any other place in a harbour. It also stops goods or containers, including fish boxes, from remaining on the quay for more than six hours, and range of further regulations.

If any of the provisions of the bye-laws are contravened, the he guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding eur1,269. Failure to pay will result in a penalty of eurl 26 for each day they fail to pay.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I recently lost my job and I am now receiving Unemployment Benefit from The Department of Social and Family Affairs. Is my social welfare payment taxable?

Like most social welfare payments, Unemployment Benefit (UB) is a taxable income and must be declared in addition to other sources of income of yourself or your spouse on any form from the Revenue Commissioners which require details of income to be stated. However the first e13 per week of UB is exempt from tax as well as any increases for child dependents.

For those who are in a short-time working arrangement the UB payable is not taxable. Short-time employment means employment in which, for the time being, a number of days is systematically worked in a working week which is less than the number of days which is normally worked in a working week.

If you make a claim for a tax refund, the taxable portion of UB paid since you became unemployed will be added to your pay and the appropriate refund will be made. When you resume employment advise the tax office of the name and address of your new employer. The tax office will notify your new employer of your earnings and net tax deducted up to the date you resume employment and both you and your employer will be issued with an amended Certificate of Tax Credits.

If you don't claim a tax refund, when you resume employment give your new employer your Form P45 Parts 2 and 3. Both yourself and your employer will be notified of your reduced tax credits and standard rate band.

Glaucoma (Open-angle): What is Glaucoma?

Glaucoma is a group of diseases that can cause damage to the eye's optic nerve and the result from this damage can cause blindness. The most common form of Glaucoma is called open-angle glaucoma, which gets its name because the angle that allows fluid to drain out of the anterior chamber is open. However, for unknown reasons, the fluid passes too slowly through the meshwork drain. As the fluid builds up, the pressure inside the eye rises. Unless the pressure at the front of the eye is controlled, it can damage the optic nerve and cause vision loss. Although anyone can get glaucoma, some people are at higher risks than others, these are usually people over the age of 40 years and people with a family history of glaucoma.

What are the symptoms of Glaucoma?

Open-angle glaucoma rarely shows symptoms at the beginning of the disease, vision stays normal and there is no pain. If the glaucoma remains untreated, the person may notice that although they can see things clearly in front of them, they may miss objects to the side and out of the corner of their eye. Without treatment, a person with glaucoma may find that they suddenly have no side vision. It may seem as though they are looking through a tunnel. Over time, the remaining forward vision may decrease until there is no vision left at all.

How can Glaucoma be detected?

Most people believe that they have glaucoma if the pressure in their eye is increased. This is not always true, although high pressure puts a person at risk of glaucoma, it does not automatically mean that they have the disease. Most people are diagnosed with glaucoma after receiving an eye test, there are several tests the Health Care Professional will carry out, these include the following:

Visual acuity - An eye chart test that measures how well a person can see at various distances.

Visual Field - This test measures a persons side vision (peripheral), it helps to show if there is any lost of vision to the side, which can be a sign of glaucoma.

Pupil dilation - This examination provides the Health Care Professional with a better view of the optic nerve to check for signs of damage.

Tonometry - This is a standard test that determines the fluid pressure inside the eye.

Prognosis and Prevention

Health).

With the correct preventative measures and the correct treatment the prognosis for glaucoma is excellent. Glaucoma can be treated, but early diagnosis is vital to protect a person's eyesight. There are various forms of treatment, which include medication, eye drops, laser surgery and conventional surgery. 
She said that the success in soccer was only one aspect of the achievements of the students at the school and



The halves were so different that one might describe the event as two matches of 35 minutes each. In the first half Waterford were absolutely diabolical and made look like amateurs by a rampant Dublin side who were obviously hell bent on beating Waterford and proving that the result of their meeting in Parnell Park in the league last year was no fluke.

Not within my memory in a national league game have a Waterford team trailed by 15 points at halftime and I cannot recall a time when we trailed by 10 points to no score after only 10 minutes.

Dublin's 'whirlwind' start bewildered and dazzled Waterford for whom nothing seemed to go right and left supporters in the 4.000 crowd wondering about what was happening

The Waterford line out which was published on Friday morning, showed goalkeeper Stephen Brennar dropped instead of Noel Kelly who is not likely to have happy memories of his county team debut. And the line out did not include Paul Flynn, Brian Greene and Brian Flannery as had been predicted. All were on the bench.

What was written about Waterford in the first half might be repeated in describing Dublin's performance in the second half when the managed to increase their halftime tally by a single point in the 38 minutes. and had just a single 'wide' as against 10 for Waterford. Waterford gave them the 'run around ' and made them look like third raters, but had left themselves with too much ground to make up.

The final result as well as the first half display was disappointing for the supporters who had hopes of our doing very well in the league.



John Mullane Suspended

The 12 weeks suspension imposed on county and De La Salle player, John Mullane by the G.A.C. came as a big disappointment to hurling supporters around the county after the announcement was made on Thursday last.

The suspension was imposed as a result of a referee's report of an incident which happened in a challenge match between Mullinavat and De La Salle on October 13th. at Mullinavat, Co. Kilkenny last year.

It will mean that he will miss the remainder of the national hurling league and the first round of the Munster championship against Kerry on May 11 th. Should Waterford survive this first test, Mullane will be back on the eve of the Waterford v Limerick Munster semi-final on June 12th.

He said that this was disgraceful as the policy denied the county the use of some of the best players in the grade.

N.F. League v Carlow

Generally speaking, Waterford and Carlow are counties of similar standards in football, a fact that is borne out by the results of recent meetings between the counties.

Last year, for instance after playing an exciting 0-8 all draw with Monaghan at Fraher field we travelled to Dr. Cullen Park and were very unlucky to lose by a single point which came in time added on. That score was 0-12 to 0-11.

Chris Brasher

It is with great regret that the world of athletics has learnt of the death of Chris Brasher CBE, President of London Marathon Limited. Chris was the co-founder of the first London Marathon in 1981 and it is to his unflagging energy and enthusiasm that the event owes its success It was after visiting New York in the late seventies that Chris decided London should also stage a big city Marathon. The inaugural event contributed to the Marathon boom, introducing to the man in the street the belief that he too could share the sense of achievement that covering the classical distance brings.

"Chris was one of those rare individuals that could make things happen,. "Without him the race would not have got off the ground. It is also worth remembering that the hundreds of millions of pounds raised for charity through the Marathon are directly attributable to him.

Chris Brasher was a multi-talented individual who worked in television and the written press after a successful career as an elite athlete. TOM'S PLANS

Trainer Tom Taffe intends sending his Cheltenham fourth placed Emotional Moment to contest a hurdle race at Aintree while Kicking King which also performed with distinction at the National Hunt festival will be put by until next season when he will go novice chasing.

IRISH PERFORM WITH DISTINCTION AT CHELTENHAM

Day One — The opening day of the 2003 Cheltenham Festival started in brilliant fashion for the Irish as the Edward O'Grady trained Back On Top 3/1 absolutely sluiced up in Gerard Wealth Management Supreme Novices hurdle under Norman Williamson. The Waterford owned Arch Stanton was a back straight casualty in this contest slipping up on the flat as the always well placed Back In Front kicked clear up the home stretch to record a cosy ten lengths victory over fellow Irish challenger Kicking King.

For many punters on both sides of the Irish sea the Paul Nicholls trained Azertyuop was the banker of the meeting and so it proved as this Ruby Walshe partnered 5/4 hot pot gave an exhibition of jumping up front to easily account for Impak.

Rhinestone Cowboy was our choice in the Grade 1 Smurfit Champion Hurdle but his jumping of the hurdles was sloppy to say the least and under the circumstances he did well to finish third. The much improved Roster Booster just loves this course and distance and given a supremely confident ride by Richard Johnson the Phillip Hobbs trained 9/2 shot sprinted up the hill to beat outsider Westlander ridden by Roddie Greene from Tipperary by an easy eleven lengths.

The second Irish victory of the first day came courtesy of the Christy Roche trained Youllneverwalkalone 7/1 who captured the William Hill National Hunt Chase over three miles. Barry Geraghty coaxed the often stubborn Youllneverwalkalone up in the dying strides to outstay Haut Cercy who had taken up the running off the home turn.

The Fulke Walwyn Kim Muir Handicap chase for amateur riders produced a surprise 33/1 winner in the shape of the Martin Pipe trained Royal Predica who obliged in the hands of Me S McHugh.

County Meath based Barry Geraghty teamed up with County Cork born trainer John Joe O'Neill to take the concluding Pertemps Final Handicap Hurdle on 6/1 favourite Inching Closer. In a thrilling finish Inching Closer had a short head to spare over Royal Emperor and Domnic Elsworth.

Day Two — The second day also opened with an Irish success as jockey Kieran Kelly rode his first ever festival winner guiding the Dessie Hughes trained 6/1 chance Hardy Eustace to victory in the Royal and Sun Alliance Novice Hurdle. Fellow Irish raider Pizzaro the winner of the 2002 running of the Festival Bumper was sent off the warm 2/1 favourite but he ran in snatches and was no match for the teak tough Hardy Eustace. It's a pity that Limestone Lad's stable mate Solerina picked up an injury prior to the Festival as she would certainly have taken all the beating in this race.

In the Royal and Sun Alliance Chase Richard Johnson who rides this course so well gave the Philip Hobbs trained One Night 15/2 a positive ride to make practically every yard of the running for a well deserved victory over the French raider Jair Du Cochet who came from well off the pace to take the runner up spot. Not for the first time French Jockeys came under scrutiny at this meeting and the general opinion is that they are streets behind their British and Irish counterparts.

The showcase event on day two was the Queen Mother Champion Chase. We had a ready made favourite here in the Jessica Harrington trained and Barry Geraghty ridden Moscow Flyer and the 7/4 favourite did not disappoint proving too strong for the Arthur Moore trained Native Upmanship. Latalomle and Seebald were alongside Moscow Flyer jumping the second last but both crumpled on landing. This was particular cruel luck on Portlaw jockey Vinnie Keane as he fell at the same fence on the same horse twelve months earlier. Moscow Flyer is a worthy champion however and is a credit to his shrewd trainer.

A huge field assembled for the Coral Cup Handicap Hurdle in which the Watercork syndicate owned Emotional Moment ran a cracker to finish in fourth spot. The Tony Martin trained Xenophon was one of the best backed runners of the entire week and this 4/1 shot absolutely stormed up the hill to beat the Robbie Fowler owned Samon.

The well fancied Stormez appeared well on his way to victory in the Amateur Novices Chase but this Martin Pipe trained runner was caught close home by the John Joe O'Neill handled Sudden Shock who received a great ride from Irish Amateur Denis Cullen who acts as assistant trainer to Michael O Brien. One of the other Irish trained runners in this event the Willie Mullins trained Hedgehunter was traveling really well behind the leaders when blundering badly just before the turn into the home straight.

The Henry Daly trained Young Spartacus 16/1 overcame a long layoff to capture the Mildmay Of Flete Handicap Chase for Richard Johnson. Mick Fitzgerald produced Font Mart with a late flourish off the final burn but a game Young Spartacus dug deep on the run to the winning line to beat Fond Mart. Goguenard was right up with the leaders jumping the second last but having appeared to jump the fence ok jockey Warren Marston appeared to fall out the side door.

The Wetherbys Bumper was a real competitive affair but the punters latched on to the ex Paddy Mullins trained Liberman now campaigning out of the powerful Martin Pipe yard. Sent off the 2/1 favourite Tony McCoy had the David Johnson owned Liberman in the firing line throughout and this son of Standfort and Hail To You battled all the way to the winning line to credit the real McCoy with his first and only victory of the meeting.

Day Three — Barry Geraghty made a great start to the final session of a marvelous Festival of National Hunt racing by swooping late in the JCB Triumph Hurdle with the John Joe O'Neill trained Spectroscope obliging at odds of 20/1 this game winner just edging out the Tony McCoy ridden Well Chief.

That great old warrior Limestone Lad made a gallant effort to make every yard of the running in the Bonusprint Stayers Hurdle but he could never quiet beat off the persistent challenge of Iris's Gift but on the long run home to the winning line Thierry Doumen brought the JP McManus owned Baracouda 9/4 with a well timed run to beat Iris's Gift with Limestome Lad five lengths back in third. Liss A Paoraigh who was supplemented for this event was unable to go the early pace and failed to get in a blow at the leaders.

Patrickswell County Limerick trainer Michael Hourican endured a nightmare third day. His well touted Beef Or Salmon a relative novice over the larger obstacles crashed out at the third fence in the Tote Gold Cup while in the Hunter Chase fourteen year old Dorans Pride broke a leg after falling in the early stages and this great old servant to owner Tom Doran and trainer Michael Hourican had to be destroyed. In a distinguished career Dorans Pride won over £600,000 in win and place prize money.

The Irish bred Best Mate showed to all and sundry what a great horse he is by running away with the Gold Cup with Killarney rider Jim Culloty in the saddle. Trained by Henrietta Knight Best Mate slaughtered the best staying chasers around as he powered up the hill to easily account for 33/1 outsider Truckers Tavern with the Irish trained runner Harbour Pilot staying on gamely into third spot. Best Mate was the first horse to post back to back Gold Cup victories since the Raymond Guest owned and Dan Moore trained L'esgarcot scored back in the early 1970's. On this performance Best Mate could well register a hat trick of victories in 2004.

The Irish hunter chaser Sheltering ran well for a long way in the Christies Foxhunter Chase but he ran out of gas after three miles as the progressive six year old Kingscliff motored clear in the closing stages for an impressive victory for his amateur partner Mr R. Young.

The Christy Roche trained Risk Accessor ran a fine race to fill the runner up spot in the Grand Annual Chase behind the 8/1 winner Palarshan ridden by Mark Bradbourne for the Henry Daly yard.

That exciting mare La Landiere captured the Cathcart Chase for trainer Richard Phillips this Richard Johnson partnered eight year old justifying 5/4 favourtism.

The three day meeting ended as it had started with an Irish owned, trained and ridden winner coming up trumps. Trainer Jessica Harrington has certainly got a sweet tune out of Spirit Leader this year and she posted yet another big race victory in the County Handicap Hurdle at odds of 10/1. This victory for Spirit Leader sealed a great week for jockey Barry Geraghty as he was the leading rider at the fixture.

The Irish can feel proud of their efforts during the week as they won a total of six races.

Roll on Liverpool and Punchestown in what has been a great year

on the National Hunt front.

RACECOURSE MEDICS TO STRIKE

The eighty four members of the Racecourse Medical Officers Association have voted to strike and withdraw their services from the nations twenty seven tracks. The strike action is due to commence on April 6th which could impact on the Sunday fixture in Tramore.

BEST MATE TO TAKE SAME PATH

The runaway winner of this years Cheltenham Gold Cup Best Mate will take the same path over the next twelve months with a view to equaling the great Arkle's run of three in a row Gold Cups. He will compete in just two races which includes the King George VI Gold Cup at Kempton en route to the 2004 National Hunt Festival.

DAVIDS LAD SAGA CONTINUES

The High Court in Dublin will decide on Tuesday of this week whether or not the Tony Martin trained Davids Lad will take his place in this years Aintree Grand National.

TONY'S BREAK

Tony McCoy had a very poor Cheltenham by his own very high standards and matters were made even worse when he cracked his collar bone following a fall from Golden Alpha in the Grand Annual Challenge Cup on Thursday. The ever optimistic Tony expects to be fit enough to ride at the Aintree Grand National three day meeting.
