Work On €11m Sewerage Scheme Set To Commence

KEVIN KIRRANE

Construction on the Dungarvan and Environs Sewerage Scheme is to commence within three weeks, following the signing of the contract for work on an eurl1 million collection and delivery system.

Contracted firm, Roadbridge Ltd of Limerick, are expected to begin construction on the 28th of April, and complete work on the project in two years time.

The colossal engineering operation will include the

laying of 16km of gravity sewers, 20km of rising mains, the construction of a number of pumping stations, and hundreds of manholes, and sewer chambers.

The collection system is then to link with Dungarvan Wastewater Treatment Plant, at Ballinacourty, which begins construction later this year.

Project Director, Fintan McGivern, of Pettits said the scheme will eliminate the discharge of untreated wastewater to Dungarvan harbour.

He added that it will also "provide sewerage infrastructure to meet the future development needs of the

According to ? of Roadbridge, the construction phase will also create employment in the area, as well as business opportunities for local firms.

"We benefit as much by employing people from the local community, as the community does. So it's something we always try to do."

REDRESSES INFRASTRURAL IMBALANCE

Speaking at the contract signing, Dungarvan Town Mayor, Nuala Ryan said the scheme would re-dress the infrastructural imbalance the town has had with other large urban areas. And, it will increase Dungarvan's attractiveness as a location for developers, investors and

industries alike.

"Now, is an opportune time to use the improvement in Dungarvan's infrastructure to renew our efforts to promote Dungarvan as a location for inward investment, particularly to secure tenants for the IBAL Advance Factory, and the new IDA sites at Lisfennel," Mayor Ryan said.

The collection and delivery system is the first phase in a eur30 million scheme. Once completed it will divert sewerage from Dungarvan via a new rising main constructed on the old railway line, to the wastewater treatment plant on the former Quigley Magnesite lands at Ballinacourty.

According to Mayor Ryan, the current unsustainable practice of pumping an increasing volume of untreated effluent into the harbour adjacent Abbeyside beach will CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

Deputies Clash Over Radiotherapy Unit

West Waterford's two Dail representatives clashed over availability of Radiotherapy and the leaked findings of the Expert Review Group, at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

In a heated debate, Deputy Ollie Wilkinson (FF) accused Deputy John Deasy (FG) of about-turns, while Deputy Deasy described the Fianna Fail TD as "scoring political points off the backs of sick people."

The debate started with the suspension of Standing Orders to allow Cllr. Nora Flynn, (FG), to raise a motion calling on Waterford County Council join with Waterford City Council in raising it's concerns with the Government.

Cllr. Tom Higgins, (FG), who is also a local GP, said the full infrastructure needed to accommodate the unit, including specialists, are at the Waterford Regional Hospital.

However, he believed that the expert review group is made up of doctors from the teaching hospitals, which the leaked reports indicated, would receive the radiotherapy units.

"Radiotherapy in Ireland is in an abysmal position. An expert group, a couple of

years back, reported that there should be 44 units around the country. At the moment there are only ten,"

"There is not one of us here whose families have not been touched by cancer."

HEATED DEBATE

However, the meeting quickly became heated when Deputy Ollie Wilkinson (FF) indicated that the debate proved all councillors had now woken up to what's happening.







Is It Only Birds That Fly?

The flying squirrel has a thin membrane of skin attached to each side of its body, between the front and rear legs and covered with fur. When this rodent jumps from one tree to another, it opens out its limbs, rather like a parachute, and is able to glide up more than 400m, using its tail both as a rudder and as a brake.

A flying fish jumps out of the water by a strong flip of its tail and it can remain on the air for up to 10m, using its wide pectoral fins which it can open out like wings.

The tree frog makes long jumps between trees and glides for a few metres, by means of a membrane of skin which joins up its "fingers."

How Does The Bat Fly?



The bat is the only mammal which can really fly like a bird. The structures of the sectors of its wings allow the bat to fly, although at a slow speed, but with remarkable powers of movement. The wings are formed by one thin layer of skin without fur and which joins the top claws to either side of the body.

The bat is a nocturnal animal. During the day it stays with its wings folded, hanging upside down from the branches of trees or inside caves or attics.

In Which Part of the World do Mammals Live?
Mammals can adapt to every type of climate, from the polar circles to the equator, and so they are widespread throughout the world. Thick skins, hibernation, migration and the ability to collect food are only a few of the ways in which mammals cope with the different conditions of the places where they live.

What Are Mammals Like?

Mammals are warm-blooded animals, which means they have a constant body temperature. All mammals are covered with hair of different thicknesses and give birth to living young which feed on milk produced by the mammary glands of the female. A mammal has a well-developed brain and takes care of its young for a long time. The only mammal which lays eggs are the platypus and the spiny-coated echidna, but both suckle their young.

In The Desert

The camel is very well adapted to live in the desert, due to the considerable quantity of fat in its hump and on which it can live when there is little food and water. Its large feet stop the camel from slipping on the sand.



And On The Snow

Among the freezing landscape of the arctic plain (tundra) lives the musk ox. To find food, it digs in the snow and ice with its hoofs, searching for moss, lichens and roots.

for the South East Cancer Association to put forward a candidate at the last General Election.

"The silence from all political parties was absolutely amazing. I didn't get one supporter from any political party, any Dail candidate or any aspiring candidate,"he said.

Deputy Wilkinson added that he was in Dublin about a fortnight ago at a National Cancer march. But, he didn't see any other elected representatives from the West Waterford region.

However, after protests by Labour councillors that Cllr. Ger Barron attended, Deputy Wilkinson made it clear that his criticism was directed at another "West Waterford Deputy".

"Over the past fortnight, its simply pathetic to hear the wrangling that's gone on, on radio about marches, and about who walked and who didn't walk", Deputy Wilkinson continued.

"Twelve months ago, I said this matter transcended politics, and I say it again today."

He also said he has raised the matter with (Minister for Health) Micheal Martin on so many occasions that it's at the stage "where he doesn't want to see me coming". "But, I'd urge caution that

we wait now, at this stage, least. And I'm actually for the Minister's final comment.

PATHETIC EXCUSES

However, Deputy John Deasy (FG), rising the temperature of the debate several notches higher, said it was a "bad sign of an individual who comes in here and tries to politicise this issue."

Aiming his comments directly at Deputy Wilkinson, he said he and most others are tired of his "pathetic ex-

He added; "I think you've lowered yourself to such an extent I didn't think was conceivable.

"Scoring political points off the backs of sick people - it's disgusting, and it's reprehensible."





Pork pot with fennel, garlic and tomatoes

Ingredients: Serves 4

1.5kg boned, rolled and tied loin of pork, rind intact

Salt and pepper

2-3 x 15ml sp dripping

2 x 15ml sp Pernod

100ml white wine

2 large bulbs fennel, quartered

12 medium tomatoes, halved

16-plus cloves garlic, unpeeled and

bruised with back of knife 2-3 bay leaves

1 or 2 sprigs thyme

Sprinkle fennel seeds

3-4 pieces lemon peel, no pith

Juice of 1 lemon

Method:

Put a cast-iron pot over a flame to become hot and preheat the oven to 300°F/150°C/gas mark 2.

Rub the pork all over with a little fat or oil. Add the dripping to the hot-pot, allow to smoke slightly and put in the pork loin. Turn and burn the meat for several minutes until the skin turns gold. Lift on to a

Tip off most of the fat and discard, pour in the Pernod and wine. Allow to bubble together, using a whisk to pick up the brown bits at the bottom of the pot. Return pork to the pot and tuck the fennel, tomatoes, garlic, bay and thyme



sprigs around it. Spoon over some of the meat juices, and sprinkle with fennel seed. Put pieces of lemon peel among the vegetables and squeeze lemon juice over everything. Bring the pot up to a moderate

heat, put on the lid and place in the oven. Cook for 2-21/2 hours, turning the meat once during this time. Serve the pork carved into thick slices, with the vegetables around it, plenty of juices and plain boiled potatoes.

April's Garden Messengers are....

Rhododendron & Azalea

reds -spring flowering Rhododendrons and Azaleas can bring them all to the garden. If you're serious about putting a real 'wow factor' into your garden, then look no fur- They are very hardy evergreen shrubs, tolerate full ther than Rhododendrons and Azaleas.From flower, but forbig bursts of flowers, the choice is greatest in spring.

Rhododendrons and Azaleas are part of the very free flowersame family of plants. Azaleas ry of smaller-leaved, generally smaller and of pure white more 'twiggy' shrubs within the Rhododendron family. This is made up of 500-900 species (depending on classification) and is accordingly very diverse. The history of these plants is complex and fascinating, but all that the practical gardener really needs to know is what they need to thrive and put on that really spectacular display of colour.

Acid soil is a must with nearly all of these shrubs, but if you lack this, containers and raised beds can work just as well in providing the necessary conditions. Ideal soils are moist, humus-rich, acid, with good drainage. All Rhododendrons and Azaleas are surface rooting, which means that when planted, soil should just cover the root ball. Maintenance is limited and easy. Cut off dead flowers and stalks soon after flowering as this will stimulate new growth. Otherwise, prune lightly to maintain the desired shape.

Garden Plant out and stake sweetpeas

Sweetpeas raised in the greenhouse in January will be ready for planting out, provided they are hardened off properly. They will look very well trained on screens, pergolas or arches as well as clambering up a tripod in a herbaceous border. Those planted last month should be well established and now is the time to provide each with a cane. Push firmly into the soil and create a tripod effect for a good show later.

Reduce the number of shoots to one per plant, choosing the sturdiest, and lead towards its cane with string or raffia. Pinch out the tips of the March-grown plants.

Prune evergreens

Hardy evergreen shrubs grown primarily for their foliage, either in hedge form or topiary. can be pruned at this time, especially if hard cutting back is required. Lighter trimming can be safely carried out in summer but severe pruning should be avoided then.

Worn-out laurel hedges can be revitalised by cutting back to within a foot of the ground at this time of year. The stumps will look awful at first but with a little luck and some warm, showery weather they will soon be a forest of healthy new shoots.

Sow parsley

Nothing beats herbs from the garden, and parsley is a useful addition to any kitchen. Pouring hot water into the drills first is said to help germination. Sow some in a shadier spot, as plants can suffer in a hot summer.

Dungarvan's existing sewerage scheme conveys the towns sewage to a pumping station at Stokes Field adjacent to Abbeyside Church, from where it is pumped into the harbour. The new scheme will redirect all waste water from the town via a new rising main constructed on the old Railway line to a state of the art waste water treatment plant to be constructed on the former Quigley Magnesite lands at Ballinacourty. New sewers will also be laid in the Clonea/Ballinacourty area to service existing premises and open up additional lands for development

Speaking at the contract signing, Cllr. Nuala Ryan, Dungarvan Town Mayor stated that the sewerage scheme and treatment plant would correct the infrastructural imbalance between Dungarvan and other towns in the region and should be used to promote inward investment and to secure tenants for the IBAL Advance Factory and the new IDA sites at Lisfennel.

Whisperings From **Ballinacourty Point**

A discussion took place recently concerning a road in Ballinacourty that boasts of the fact that four people living there are the holders of All-Ireland medals in various disciplines. Think about it and we will name the road and the people involved next week.

Improvements

In 1837 Dungarvan had 1,570 houses. On the west of the town there were still many cabins. Then there was the fishing settlement of Boreenatra, which was between the Catholic and Protestant churches and stretched to the sea. In 1837 when a new county jail was to be built, it was suggested that it be built in Dungarvan at Shandon near where Fraher's Field is nowadays. This was rejected and the jail was built in Waterford.

The new Market Street was later renamed Mulgrave Street as a tribute to the Earl of Mulgrave, Lord Lieutenant from 1835 to 1839. This name did not last long and the name Main Street was used instead but later changed to Parnell

In Abbeyside the approach road to the ferry at the castleend was replaced in importance by what is now known as Sexton Street but was known originally as Bridge Street. The old approach road to the ferry landing place at 'Cul an tSailin', which is still in use, had been known as Bothar Mor (Main Road).

Local Sewerage Scheme

Work on the construction of the Dungarvan and Environs Sewerage Scheme is set to commence in the next few weeks following the signing of the contract between Waterford County Council and Roadbridge Ltd., Ballysheedy, Co. Limerick. The work to be carried out under this contract which is valued at almost 11 million euro, includes the construction of 16km of gravity sewers and 20km of rising mains, the construction of 350 manholes and 300 sewer chambers. Six pumping stations will be constructed, three existing pumping stations will be modified and one existing pumping station will be decommissioned. The site works will include lifting 3.1km of existing rail track.

Abbeyside Reference Archive

EXTRACT

This week we take an interesting extract from Egan's, Waterford Guide 1894.

The Abbey, situated at the Abbeyside of the river, was founded by the McGrath family, in which work they were aided by the O'Brien's, Cummeragh. The Community brought here were the Eremites of St. Augustin or Austin Friars. The Gothic tower, 60 feet high, is sprung with considerate elegance and airiness, and gives an idea of its being a building of importance when all its parts were together. The ancient tombstone of Donald McGrath, in a low window, 1400, attests the antiquity of the place, and gives some glimpse into the history of its pious founders. bears the letters "Donald McGrath. McGrath's were chieftains in West Waterford from earliest times. The word comes from craith, Irish to weave, that is MacCraith, "son of the weaver". They lived at Tallow (Glenaboy) and at Lismore. Sleady Castle was built by Philip McGrath. The Gothic arch of the tower now forms the entrance to the Roman Catholic Chapel, which was built upon the site in 1820. The old tower of the abbey is utilised as a belfry for the new building, and thus though changed in its ecclesiastical office it performs a still more useful function than when of old it stood aloft as the chief adornment to the church of the Eremites. One could imagine that the sleeping memories of ages should float upon the cadence of a bell located in so time-honoured a situa-

The Science of Farming and Food

SUCKLERS

DECIDE NOW FOR 2005

The breeding decisions you make in Spring 2003 will determine the quality of finishing cattle you sell in Spring 2005 or the weanlings you sell in Autumn 2004

What has been the biggest driver of change in beef breeding? In the last five years there has been one outstanding force for change: live exports to Europe. It gave us a clear indication of what continental European markets demand. The live trade rewarded quality. It also helped beef finishers to understand what continental European markets want in terms of finished

We should not forget the messages and the lessons we learned over the last few years. The breeding season is now moving into full swing. Think carefully about the breeding decisions you are going to make.

HOW DO I DECIDE?

Before you decide on breeding policy set some overall criteria on what you are aiming for. If you are selling suckler-bred weanlings, what market are you aiming at? The target should be clear in this case. Produce weanlings that are capable of getting into the highest price market outlets. These outlets may be local domestic markets or for live export. We don't know what the export trade will be like in Autumn 2004. Keep your options open. The European live trade for weanlings requires animals

- good muscle development and overall conformation.
- good growth potential
- some degree of uniformity and consistency

You need to use a continental sire that combines strong muscling with good growth potential.

The market sends fuzzier messages to suckler producers who are finishing their own stock. If you are participating in an industry scheme or partnership the market specification for carcase conformation, fatscore and carcase weight are probably clear. Unfortunately, there are few such schemes. You should use the same basic principles as the weanling producer. Breed cattle that at a minimum are suitable for all good commercial markets. Your best suckler stock should be suitable for the best-priced European markets available

MATERNALLY TESTED SIRES

Al has not always been the flavour of the month on suckler farms. Some farms have had good success and value AI for the quality of calves produced. Many successful Al users use Al in autumn or winter calving herds when handling is easier.

Heat detection and handling issues are often a put off. Don't write Al off your agenda totally. The modern suckler cow is becoming a beefier type cow as the dairy influence progressively diminishes. We need to choose beef sires that can produce daughters with good maternal traits. Your own stock bull can be the wrong animal for that job. Most stock bulls have been bred as terminal sires with little thought given to sire maternal traits. Consider using maternally tested Al sires on some cows if you want to keep good maternal genes in your replacements.

Maternally tested Al sires available include: Charolais sires (Aboukir and Indompte); Limousin (Epson, Cactus, Hymour and Ulysses). The Simmental sires (Hurtig and Panzer) are also regarded as having good maternal traits.

IFA SAYS IRISH EU COMMISSIONER MUST PROTECT THE IMPORTANT LIVE EXPORT TRADE

mittee Chairman Derek Deane, said this week that Ireland's EU Commissioner David Byrne must guarantee the full protection of the important live cattle export trade out of Ireland in his forthcoming proposals on animal transport

Mr. Deane said farmers are extremely concerned that Commissioner Byrne will give in to the animal rights activists who want to severely restrict the trade based on non- scientific emotional grounds.

Mr. Deane said, "proposals relating to the welfare of animals during transport must be based on sound scientific data and facts. Arguments to restrict or limit the live trade based on perception or pressure from animal rights lobbyists cannot be accepted by Commissioner Byrne"

The IFA Livestock leader said, Teagasc in Grange, Co. Meath have pioneered major scientific work on animal transport. "Teagasc proved that the transport of animals from Ireland to Spain had no adverse effects on animal welfare based on scientific measurements"

ICMSA FULLY BACKS FARM SAFETY PLAN

ICMSA will fully support the Farm Safety Plan announced by Minister Noel Treacy. The Association will play its role to ensure that the targets in the Plan are met, particularly in relation to children. Pat O'Rourke, President, ICMSA said that the targets will not be easily achieved and will require constant reminding to farmers of the dangers involved.

"ICMSA will continue to be actively involved with the Health and Safety Authority through the Farm Safety Action Group. The many aspects of the Farm Safety Programme launched will all add to making us aware of the dangers at farm level, however constant reminder of farm safety will also help to improve awareness," said Mr O'Rourke.

"It is encouraging to note that farm deaths have fallen by 50% for the year 2002 as compared with 2001 when 24 deaths were recorded on farms. Mr O'Rourke also welcomed the announcement that health and safety training for farmers is to be increased and that the training programme is to be expanded to include all age groups. ICMSA continues to ensure that all communication to its members carries the message 'Farm Safety is Your Responsibility'

Meanwhile John Quigley Regional Officer with ICMSA advises farmers to examine the hazards on farms and take action to avoid accidents on their farms. Also be mindful of the risk to children on farms especially those visiting who are not from a farming background.

IFA National Livestock Com- Mr. Deane said it is only with animal transport were not based proper scientific data such as the Teagasc work that Commissioner Byrne can make decisions about important issues such as journey times, stocking densities etc.

Mr. Deane said the recommendations contained in the EU Scientific Committee report on on scientific analysis and could not be relied upon by Commissioner Byrne. "If implemented, these flawed recommendations, would close down the live export trade out of Ireland".

The IFA Livestock leader said Commissioner Byrne and the Irish Government must take account of the importance of the live export trade to Ireland particularly in terms of price competition and market outlets. In addition he said, "Commissioner Byrne must take account of Ireland 's unique peripheral location and guarantee future access to the European live cattle market for Irish farmers"

Crime and punishment in the prosecution of food/feed laws

When Commissioner David Byrne spoke at a veterinary conference early this month, there was an Irish slant to his detailed account of the current state of food law throughout the European Union - not because the Commissioner is Irish but because he was speaking in Ireland to an Irish audience. And also, we suspect, because he is personally aware of the superstrict approach we have in Ireland to food safety.

In fact, he spoke of his admiration for the situation here, especially as regards the determination with which the authorities have used domestic legislation to prosecute and punish, by means of the criminal justice system, people who have committed what he called terrible food safety crimes. And (we also suspect) that in the eyes of the Commissioner who was thrown in at the deep end when he got the Health and Consumer Protection portfolios, with all the food scares that beset the Union right from the very start of his term of office - there is no such thing as a food safety crime that is anything less than terrible.

If the Commissioner didn't admire our situation here, he would be very inclined to say so because he has a reputation for being outspoken when it comes to such "terrible" breaches of health and hygiene regulations. On this occasion, he also paid tribute to the Irish

veterinary authorities - he was speaking at the annual general meeting of the VOA, the Veterinary Officers Association of Ireland - for their "assiduous tackling" of problems at the animal feed end of the business, whether they were illegal use of growth promoters or abuses of the ban on the use of meat-andbone meal. The vets were in the front line, he told them, and they were performing a true public service.

Broadening his comments, he contrasted the general situation in the Union to what was happening in Ireland (where, he said, the legislative regime, from enforcement through to prosecution, is one of the toughest around). He described the system in the EU as "patchy and fragmented," and lacking overall coherency and synergy. Specifically, he mentioned that the responsibilities of Member States and the Commission were not set out with sufficient clarity and precision. In addition, our trading partners, especially developing countries, don't always understand our requirements.

He is proposing to put matters on a sound footing by improving the efficiency of Member State control services through a better definition of tasks, harmonisation of the role of control services and integration of controls across the entire food

and feed chain. All this is in keeping with the farm-to-fork principle which Irish farmers and the Irish agricultural industry have been hearing so much about in justification of the scrupulous and uncompromising system of traceability that is often the bane of their lives.

The proposals will also define enforcement measures, including sanctions and penalties, to address cases of non-compliance with laws. "Experience has brought it home to me that we need to augment the current system of sanctions for failure to comply with EU food and feed laws," he said.

Obviously looking to the success of the Irish enthusiasm for dealing with such matters, he said there were wider lessons to be learned from this approach throughout the Union and on into an enlarged Union of 25 states from April of next year. Convinced that criminal sanctions will have a strong deterrent effect, as they do in Ireland, these sanctions will be aimed at ensuring that the punishment fits the crime.

Interestingly, the Commissioner is anxious that no encroachment be made on the sovereignty of any Member State, even in matters that can have such far-reaching effects as disregard for food/feed laws. The actual prosecution of such offenders will be a matter for each Member State and not for the Union itself.

Organ Music In The Cathedral

Seasonal Organ music will be played in St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore on Saturday 19th April next, the day between Good Friday and Easter, 4:00pm. Jan Van Putten, Organist and Choirmaster of Lismore Cathedral, has made up an interesting programme of organ music for Lent and Easter that reflects different religious traditions and different

The German Lutheran tradition will be represented by 17th and 18th Century composers such as Samuel Scheidt, Johann Sebastian Bach and his cousin Johann Gottfried Walther. They based many of their compositions on tunes that originated in the German Lutheran Church but over the centuries became common property of most Christian churches. Bach, who towers over all, will also be represented with his Fantasia and Fugue in C minor, cornerstones of this recital. The Lismore organ is, despite it's small size, very well suited for music from the Renaissance and Baroque eras.

Roman Catholic organ music for the church year is mainly based on Georgian chant. This tradition is represented by a jubilant verses to the hymn 'Pange Lingua' by the French early composer Jean Titelouze and a meditative chorale prelude to the Lenten hymn 'Audi, benigne conditor' by the Flemish 20th Century composer Flor Peeters.

Two 'Romantic' composers have their own place in the religious spectre. Johannes Brahms was never religious in the strict sense of the word, but he composed some sacred music, reflecting a more ecumenical approach. Max Reger was a convinced Catholic, but most of his sacred organ works were based on Protestant chorales, most likely because he tried to emulate J.S. Bach in his organ compositions. Both composers are represented in Saturday's programme - Reger with two short preludes, one of them to the tune of 'Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring;.

All we want is our jobs guaranteed, and our current terms of employment kept in place, he remains hopeful that this industrial dispute can be resolved. The company who process animal hides announced that with regret they were laying off approximately 100 employees at the plant, this news was another blow on the employment front for Clonmel, South Tipperary and parts of North West Waterford. The firm said they had no choice but to take this course of action, they promise to review the situation in early May.





For the year 2003 the guidelines have been increased by between 4.5% and 5%. For example, for a single person living alone, aged less than 66, this means an increase of 6.00 and for the age group 66-69 years an increase of 7.00. Similarly, for a married couple the increases are 9.50 and 10.00 respectively.

Everyone aged 70 and over normally resident in Ireland is entitled to a Medical Card irrespective of income. This medical card is not means tested. SAVING TIPS FOR MOTORISTS

Are we all too dependent on our cars? Did you know that 25% of all car journeys are less than 2 miles? Walking or cycling for short journeys would make us much healthier and it would mean fewer cars on the roads and we would all be better off.

However, if you have to use your car you can save up to 13% on your fuel consumption by doing the following: Avoid high speeds, harsh acceleration or heavy breaking. Make sure your tyres are at the recommended pressure. Use a gear position suitable to road conditions.

Reduce periods of engine idling by switching off the engine when it is safe to do so.

After starting the engine, drive off immediately. Idling causes pollution and excessive fuel consumption.

Depress the accelerator gently away and change to a

higher gear in time.

Avoid over-revving the engine unnecessarily.

Ensure your car is properly maintained.

Check the fuel consumption and CO2 emissions label when choosing a new car - your choice will benefit the environment and your pocket.

DUNGARVAN WINE CLUB NOTES BY AONGHUS WALSH

South African Tasting

Tuesday, March 11th saw our South African tasting and as expected it didn't disappoint us. On display were 3 white wines and 4 red wines. As usual we tried a selection which we hadn't tried before so as to further broaden our horizons on tasting wine.

1st white wine up was Paul Cluver Weisser Riesling 2002, 13.45e. This wine was chosen because there is not a lot of Riesling grown in South Africa and many if not all of our members hadn't tasted one before. Another unusual note was that it is a Weisser Riesling from Austria as opposed to a Rhine Riesling from Germany which many people would be familiar with. On the nose it was very appetising with crisp green fruit aromas most notable were limes and grapefruits. This followed onto the palate which was very refreshing, dry and crisp with a good medium length! A good start, club verdict 70/100.

Next up was Boschendal Grande Cuvee Sauvignon blanc 2002, 13.95e. Again this was very different to standard Sauvignon. Mainly because it has been subjected to oak aging which is very unusual. Most Sauvignons wouldn't benefit from wood because of its light, crisp styles however this wine is a huge style with lovely variable flavours and high alcohol (14%) that it coped quite well with the addition of wood flavouring. This also added more complexity than one would expect and it was indeed worthy of our club verdict of 75/100. This wine has lovely fresh fruit flavours, good acidity balance and a nice crisp finish. The final white wine on the night was De Wetshof estate Bon Vallon Chardonnay Sur Lie 2002, 13.95e. We have all had chardonnay from South Africa but never a chardonnay Sur Lie which in French literally means on it's lee's (Lees being the fermented yeasts similar to the Champagne method and more obviously Muscadet Sur Lie). This gives the wine a lovely yeasty, nutty aromas combined with the wonderfully fresh fruit flavours of the chardonnay grape most notably lemons and passion fruits. However, there was one more trait which goes unmentioned on the label. It finishes with a burst of lemon sherbet fizz almost spritizer like which just added to this most complex wine. A great finish follows! A great wine at a good price and a real find. Club Verdict 85/100.

The 1st red wine was Graham Beck Pinno (Pinotage from South Africa) 2002, 11.75e. The inscription on the back says "A chunky red wine for princes and paupers, jesters and kings" in a short way, trying to say that this wine is great for everyone. However, in the real world it is not fit for everyone. It had a very burnt aroma of tasted oak and good fruit. However, I think it was overuse of oak chips as opposed to Oak barrels. Oak chips act like a tea bag and it is a cheaper alternative to aging in Oak Barrels. Either way it wasn't balanced with all aspects of this wine poorly made. Club verdict, 65/100.

The 2nd red wine was a huge improvement. Boschendal Lan-

noy 1999, 14.95e. This wine is a blend of Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot grapes. A wonderfully fruity nose of dark ripe fruits mainly blackcurrants and ripe plums. On the palate it was very fruity with great fruit extraction from the Cabernet and good soft tannins from the Merlot, everything was held together with good acidity and the finish was very impressive. A quality wine, club verdict 80/100.

The final red wine of the night was Paul Cluver Cabernet Sauvignon 1999, 18.50e. Again no coincidence that this was our star wine of the night because it was the most expensive. Generally as a rule the more you pay the better the quality! This had the classic Cabernet nose of blackcurrants, mint and vanilla nuances from clever use of oak. These follow through onto the palate which is very intense and quite complex. Although only 4 years old, this wine has plenty of time left and would make a perfect choice for that special dinner. It's perfectly balanced between fruit, tannins, structure and acidity and the finish went on forever. A superb wine. Clubs verdict, 85/100 star wine of the night.

The mystery wine was supplied by Janine Fay and much to everyone's amazement I got the wine right and the vintage correct. It was Meerlust Merlot 1997, 21.95. Although an expensive wine it did show some signs of tiredness being over 6 years old. The colour had faded to a brick red hue and the nose wasn't as pronounced as perhaps it should have been. I have tasted this wine before when in it's prime and there was no comparison between them. However, we can't really fault a good wine because it had just peaked in maturity. So the club gave it a healthy verdict of 75/100. Next club meeting is the 13th of May in the Sailing club when the fine wines of Chile will be put to the test.

REPORT ON RADIOTHERAPY SERVICES STILL NOT SUBMITTED TO MINISTER

"In the Minister's reply he stated
that 'the provision of additional
radiotherapy services will be
considered in the context of the
report of the Expert Working
Group. Following consideration of the Report, proposals
will be submitted to Government for consideration.'

Deputy O'Shea stated that, "stalling of the report must be ended and it should be submitted to the Minister forthwith. I am calling on Michael Martin to demand the completion of the report and that he publish it immediately."

Cholesterol and Heart Disease

What is Cholesterol?

Cholesterol is a fatty substance found in every cell in the body. Cholesterol has a bad reputation as a cause of heart disease but does have some essential functions. Your liver in sufficient quantities for your body's requirements produces cholesterol. It attaches to proteins in the bloodstream, which become known as lipoproteins. There are three main types:

Low-density lipoprotein (LDL) cholesterol; High-density lipoprotein (HDL) cholesterol & Triglycerides.

LDL cholesterol: This form is the 'bad cholesterol'. High levels of LDL in your blood can cause it to build upon the walls of the arteries, which can become narrower and can lead to heart disease. LDL's make up about two-thirds of the cholesterol in the blood.

HDL cholesterol: is known as the 'good cholesterol' because it helps to remove cholesterol from the walls.

Triglycerides:are stored in the fat cells of your body. We use these to provide energy. A high triglyceride level may accompany a high LDL level and this means a higher risk of coronary heart disease.

How is Cholesterol measured?

A simple blood test will give the information that is needed to know about your cholesterol level. The results will give the levels of total cholesterol, LDL, HDL and triglycerides.

Why is high cholesterol a health risk?

High cholesterol is a serious health risk because it can lead to coronary heart disease. Cardiovascular (heart) disease is the most common cause of death in Ireland. Risk factors for heart disease can be both modifiable (something can be done to reduce them) and non-modifiable. While not all risk factors for heart attacks can be changed, such as your age or family history there are many that can be modified.

The following is a list of risk factors that may affect you: High LDL cholesterol; Low HDL cholesterol; High blood pressure; Diabetes; Gender (male/female); Smoking; Family history of heart disease; Obesity; Post menopause; Low levels of physical activity; Raised blood glucose. Each risk factor will speed up the development of plaques on the walls of your arteries. It is important to identify risk factors and eliminate or modify as many as you can. Your doctor can make sure that these risk factors are treated and help you to a healthy heart lifestyle.

How does a high cholesterol level contribute to heart disease?

When too much cholesterol builds up on the walls of the arteries, plaques start to form and this causes the artery to narrow so the heart must work harder to pump blood around your body. Plaques limits the blood flow, and if they rupture, can form blood clots. In severe cases plaques can completely block an artery supplying the heart muscle or a major artery supplying the brain. This results in a heart attack or stroke.

What is the relationship between diet and cholesterol? Animal and dairy foods contain high levels of saturated fat, which raises the level of 'bad cholesterol' in your blood, so the more of these foods that you eat, the greater the risk of coronary heart disease. For this reason it is worth reducing the level of animal and dairy foods in your diet. By modifying your intake of fat, calories and carbohydrates the level of cholesterol in your blood can be reduced.

Foods that are high in saturated fats are: Red meat; Hard cheeses; Butter; Cream; Full-fat milk; Yogurt; Lard. It is recommended that you use polyunsaturated or monounsaturated fats in your diet instead as these will reduce the amount of cheesterol in your blood.

Foods that are high in polyunsaturated fats include vegetables and fish oils. Monounsaturated fat is found in olive oil. Steps to healthy eating: Reduce the amount of fat in your diet; Use vegetable oils instead of animal fats; Eat more fresh fruit and vegetables and exercise. dents had each compared a poem on the theme "found in a pocket



Three Is The Magic Number **For Jamie** Costin

ATHLETE BREAKS NATIONAL **RECORD, QUALIFIES FOR** WORLDS AND OLYMPICS

"Mind is everything. Muscle - pieces of rubber. All that I am, I am because of my mind." A rather useful runner called Paavo Nurmi said the above when reflecting on his career of great athletic endeavour.

But it's a comment which sits worthily on the shoulders of West Waterford's Jamie Costin, who pulled off a magnificent hat trick at the Naumburg Grand Prix in Germany early on Sunday morning.

The 25-year-old West Waterford athlete didn't just better his Irish 50-kilometre walk record last weekend. He obliterated it. Taking five minutes and six seconds off his previous national best, Jamie crossed the finishing line in sixth place with a time of 3 hrs 53 mins 58 secs, a time he could possibly have recorded at last year's European Championships had it not been for his disqualification.

Costin's tremendous performance also ensured his passage to the World Championships in Paris this August, but of even greater consequence was his achieving the qualifying standard for next year's Olympic Games in Athens.

To make the cut for his second Olympiad, well over a year in advance of the Games, is not only a magnificent achievement for Jamie, but offers the national champion the perfect preparation for his assault on both Paris and Athens.

Those that know Jamie Costin and those that have followed his progression as an elite Irish athlete will not be too surprised by another excellent performance in an event which is 'a minority sport within a minority sport' if you

His determination to succeed, his passion for his chosen discipline and the good humour which is always prevalent when in his company make him what he is and can only serve his continued betterment as an athlete.

And what pride and honour he has brought to his club, whose colours mean every scintilla as much as the green of his country which he wears with such distinction

A three and a half-week altitude training programme in Mexico offered little time for relaxation. This election was proceeded by intense canvassing by all the parties involved and hence the enormous interest.

Munster's only nominee Rory Kiely, Limerick, who was unsuccessful on the three previous occasions on which he stood, was elected without reaching the quota (106 in the sixth count with 103 votes. The motions which are of importance to all counties relate to discipline, and underage restrictions.

DISCIPLINE

This motion in the name of Central Council was the product of the Disciplinary Committee proposals. For most of the disciplinary code, it was mostly a 'tidying-up' operation, but it included the following "The suspension Category A, B, or C offences mens suspension at the level at which he was ordered off. In the case of a Category C offence it shall include the next game in the competition even if the the game is not played within the suspension period."

JUVENILE

The motions passed by the Strategic Review Committee in October at the Special congress was amended

The new rule now means that players under 12 years cannot play at under 16 level and players at under 14 years many not play at minor level

This motion was submitted by the Munster Council and moved by the chairman, Christy Cooney who told delegates that it is the first step in controlling underage competitions. This was accepted as a clear hint that the council will move to limit under 16 players from playing, under 21, etc. in the future.

Skeard Mover (Powerful Flash-Chief Poacher) at 6/4 was the best backed runner in race four and this jolly duly did the business with an easy 29.46 victory. Moving over to the rails from his trap six starting point Skeard Mover eased his way past the fast starting Jamaican Boy out of the second bend before motoring clear for an easy two and a half lengths victory over Divine Beauty. The winner is owned by Michael Flynn.

Fear No Factor a July 2000 son of Spiral Nikita and Droopys Lilian produced a career best two bend return when hacking up in an above average sprint for owners The Sharp Shooters Syndicate and trainer lan Seymour. A lightening break from trap five saw Fear No Factor in total command from the outset and with Anynamewilldo the only runner to muster any sort of a challenge it came as no surprise to see Fear No Factor triumph by four and a half lengths over the always well placed Anynamewilldo in a red hot 16.15.

In the sixth contest the Jacotia Van de Scheer owned and Ronnie Wuyts trained Vigorous Tex chose the scenic route throughout but it paid dividends as this 6/4 chance obliged in 29.31. Staying wide and out of trouble Vigorous Tex (Eyeman-Kilcaroon Trix) ran a close third down the back as Skilful Montana hit the front from the front running You Do it.
