No Realistic Prospect Of Decentralisation

The decentralisation programme, which may inject new impetus into Dungarvan's retail, housing and other commercial sectors remains stalled while consultations take place with the staff involved, Minister Charlie McCreevy has revealed.

Dungarvan is widely believed to be among the frontrunners bidding for a lucrative Government Department or Agency. However, the destinations for Departments have still to be published three years after the programme was first announced.

Speaking recently, Minister McCreevy said a wide range of important issues must be first taken into consideration, and all involved con-

Minister McCreevy, who was responding to a Dail Question from Deputy Brian O'Shea, said that given these wide-ranging considerations, it isn't possible for him to state at this time when the Government will be in a position to make a decision on the issue of decentralisation.

Deputy O'Shea said the reply appeared to signal that there is no realistic prospect of decentralisation to Dungarvan or Waterford.

However, a spokesperson for Minister for Environment and Local Government, Martin Cullen said that decentralisation "is something that we're very much in favour of, and pushing for."

"We feel that in the context of County Waterford and Dungarvan, it is something that we would definitely see as beneficial", he said.

wouldn't like to speculate on which towns may or may not benefit, he said Minister Cullen has publicly gone on the record as saying Dungarvan is ideally positioned to benefit from Decentralisa-

In terms of services, he continued, and of the size and scale of the town, "it would be a good candidate for it, and we would see it as the key place in County Waterford for decentralisation."

Minister Cullen also previously praised Dungarvan Town Council's submission for a Department, although the spokesperson said it's an issue that will be dealt with by the Department of Fi-

Dungarvan pre community development project was given Full Community Development status in January 2002. This would enable the development worker to become full time with the project, and funding would be significantly increased. To date groups and initiatives working under the CDP are as follows Womens Support Group, Young Womens Group, Drop in for the Elderly, Keep Fit Class-Computer Courses, Women's Educational Group, Spirit Free Playgroup, Mother and Toddler Group, all of the groups are community based.

Dungarvan **Oyster Farm** Awarded **Funding Under NDP**

Minister of State at the Department of Communications, Marine and Natural Resources, John Browne, announced that Dungarvan's Green Oysters Ltd is included under a third round of successful aquaculture applications.

Green Oysters Ltd were awarded a total aid of eur89,100, including eur11,138 in state aid. The remainder is made up from EU (FIFG) aid of eur77,962.

The aid is part of the package of eur31.74 million nationwide, made available to support the development of the Irish aquaculture industry (in both the BMW and the SE regions) under the Aquaculture measure of the NDP.

Minister Browne said; "Aquaculture is a sustainable industry which is playing an important role in the development of our coastal and peripheral communities. The grant aid provided will assist the sector to achieve its development potential."

Preheat the grill. Drain chicken pieces and courgettes, keeping marinade. Peel tomatoes and cut in half, removing seeds.

Thread tomato, courgettes and chicken onto skewers. Place on grill rack and brush with marinade. Sprinkle with a little more paprika. Grill for 20 mins or until chicken is cooked. (Lower heat after five minutes and turn skewers regularly.)

INGREDIENTS (Serves 6)

- 3 carrots, peeled and sliced 1 cauliflower, divided into florets
- 225g small broccoli florets
- 75g frozen peas

Sauce

- 40g butter
- 40g plain flour
- 450 ml semi-skimmed milk
- 100g haif-fat double Gloucester, coarsely grated
- 2 tspns Dijon mustard
- 1/4 tspn salt

black pepper

METHOD

Cook carrots in boiling water for 3 minutes.

Add cauliflower, broccoli and peas. Cook for 3-5 minutes or until vegetables are just tender. Drain well. Put vegetables in a large flameproof dish, cover and keep warm.

Melt the butter for the sauce in a pan. Add flour and cook, stirring for 1 minute. Remove from heat and gradually stir in milk. Return to heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in three-quarters of the cheese, the mustard and seasoning.

Pour sauce over the vegetables and stir to coat. Sprinkle over remaining cheese. Grill under a medium heat for 5 minutes or until cheese is bubbling. Serve immediately.



Over Half A Million To Be Spent On 23 Rural Road Improvement Projects In Dungarvan Area

Dungarvan area Labour County Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair has welcomed the fact that the local authority will this year spend over 582,968 Euro on 23 improvement projects on community roads in outlying rural parts of Dungarvan, Abbeyside/Ballinroad and the Kilgobnet/Colligan/Kilbrien areas.

Pointing out that this work some of which is already in hand - will be carried out in addition to ordinary maintenance of all roads in the area, Cllr. Ó

ue to be the case that local authorities and their staff be provided with adequate resources to guarantee that local roads in communities throughout the county are in sufficient

Some of the roads involved in the 2003 list of budgeted work in these parts of the Dungarvan Electoral Area have, in Cllr. O Céilleachair's view, been in need of attention for a time and have had cases for their attention put before the Council preadds that there is plenty of work needed on other local roads in the locality, besides those marked out for 2003.

All said, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair has welcomed the fact that 2003 will see 416,256 Euro spent on 13 road strengthening jobs centred on townlands in rural Dungarvan and the Kilgobnet/Colligan/Kilbrien area. A further 131,712 Euro of the Dungarvan Electoral Area 2003 budget will be spent on 8 surface dressing jobs on townAbbeyside/Ballinroad, rural Dungarvan-Brickey Valley, Kilgobnet, Kilbrien and Cappagh-Modeligo-Colligan areas. Another 35,000 Euro has been made available in 2003 for two "discretionary improvement" jobs in Kilgobnet/Kilbrien, featuring the approach to Coolnasmear National School and the removal of a bend in the road at Kilnafrehan.

Relating information on the works concerned, as outlined to him by the local authority, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said:

The strengthening works are to be carried out eight locations: at Glenbeg and Ballintaylor and Ballinacoush in the Dungarvan Rural/Brickey Valley area, at Lackendarra, Bohadoon and Coolnasmear in the Kilbrien/Kilgobnet area, at Shandon in Dungarvan and at Carrowgarrif in the Colligan

"Surface dressing, in each case involving in or around 1,000 to 1,500 metres of road, is to be carried out in 13 instances: at Clonea and Garranbane in the Ballinroad district, at Knockateemore in Abbeyside, at Ballinamuck, Strike's Hill, Ballintaylor and Ballyduff in rural Dungarvan, at Kilgobnet, Coolnasmear, Scart Bridge and the Mauma Road in the Kilgobnet/Kilbrien areas, at the Whitechurch

Road near Cappagh and at Vicarstown in that part of Modeligo in the Dungarvan Electoral Area.'

"No doubt the communities in the townlands concerned will welcome such progress".



Bank Of Ireland Delivers On Promise And Launches Three New ATM's In Waterford

Bank of Ireland today launched the third new ATM for Waterford in Supervalu, Cappoquin. 100 new ATM's are now operational in retail outlets around the country as part of this ongoing investment by Bank of Ireland in its expanding ATM infrastructure.

Speaking at the official opening, Martina McGrath, Manager. Bank of Ireland, Lismore said: "It gives me great pleasure to launch this ATM in Supervalu, which will provide customers in this community with ATM access from the convenience of their local store. Deed of Bravery Presented After Heroic Rescue

presented a deed of bravery to Ms. Siobhan O'Connell for her exceptional courage in risking her own life to rescue a swimmer who was in difficulty.

Just under two years ago, Ms. O'Connell's bravery in rescuing John Kavanagh, who was swimming with his son, Ross at Ballydwane Cove, Stradbally, averted what could have been a tragic loss of life.

John Kavanagh was some time in the water when he found himself out of his depth and, due to a rip tide, unable to swim back towards shore.

On hearing the screams, Ms. Siobhan O'Connell swam out

Waterford County Council to John and Ross, and found another man entered the water, them both panicking. Mr. Kavanagh appeared to be in particular difficulty.

While she was unable to reach them due to the currents, she talked to them in an effort to calm them down.

She explained exactly what she was going to do, and asked them to trust her. When she reached John Kavanagh and got him into a "carry" position, Ms. O'Connell began to swim towards the shore with Ross Kavanagh swimming at her side.

With the strong currents, and the weight of John Kavanagh, her progress was very slow.

As they approached the shore,

and assisted Ms. O'Connell in bringing the man to safety.

When they reached shore, a doctor treated Mr. Kavanagh for exhaustion after his thirtyminute ordeal in the water. He was later taken to Waterford Regional Hospital by ambulance, and thankfully made a full recovery. Ms. O'Connell also required treatment by her own doctor after the incident.

Ms. Siobhan O'Connell was awarded a silver medal for her heroic rescue, and the certificate of bravery was presented on Monday last at the Civic Offices in Dungarvan.

Sweet and easy guide to melon

MELONS are one of the easiest and most popular plants to grow in a cool greenhouse or cold frame.

Melons are a tropical member of the cucumber family. They need shelter and a small amount of warmth to grow. If you don't have a greenhouse or don't have space in it, sow the seeds in early

April into peat compost in 7.5cm peat pots. Put the pots indoors on a sunny windowsill. Set them out in rich soil, still in the pots, at the end of April in the south or about one month later in the north.

Each plant will need about two square metres of growing space.

as too much water can lead to stem canker. Ventilate as best you can without causing draughts, and shade during very hot days in case of leaf scorch.

Spraying the plants with clear water last thing at night and first thing in the morning will keep the red spider mite away.

by their short bulging stems. It is the female plants that become the

To encourage the plants to set, dab a male flower on to the females, then pick off all but four fruits on each plant and pinch out any sub-laterals with no fruit. Set the growing fruits on up turned pots to keep them clean and discourage rot, and keep the ground moist as the fruits swell. A top tip when watering the plants during the summer is to sink a clay pot near to the plant which can be frequently filled with water. Cantaloupe melons are the best fruits for growing this way. Sweetheart is the most tolerant to the cold.

To tell when a melon is ripe for cutting, press the fruit gently at the end opposite to the stem; if the fruit gives to this pressure it is ripe. Also, look for signs of a crack on the fruit near the stalk,

deep coloured skin and a rich, honey smell. Greenhouse melons can be grown in the same way as outdoor varieties, but the seedlings should be cultivated in the greenhouse rather than in a frame.

When they are strong enough plant them out into a rich soil (sandy if you are growing water melons) and treat the same as cantaloupes

Plant out pansies

Violas and pansies, both seedlings and rooted cuttings, can be planted out now if they have been properly hardened off. Best suited to cool, semi-shade, they can thrive equally well in full sunlight although they are likely to finish flowering sooner. For fine flowers, work some manure into the soil and water generously.

Prune forsythia

To retain a fairly small specimen, or to train it against a wall, this is the time to prune back. The best way is to cut back as many as possible of the flowering branches to younger stems or new shoots just starting to show. For wall specimens, any small lateral branches that cannot be easily tied back should be severely cut back.

Sow grass seeds

This is usually the most favourable time for sowing grass seed, but wait a little longer if the ground is sticky. Rake the surface of the ground so that it is level and scatter the seed at the rate of around 25-55gm per square metre. Fertilise the roses

Give all your roses a dressing of Tonk's fertiliser. It will provide them with most of the food they require throughout the summer. You can purchase this fertiliser ready for use. or if you prefer you can make it yourself. Ingredients are: 12 parts of super phosphate of lime, 10 parts of nitrate of potash, 2 parts of sulphate of magnesium, 1 part sulphate of iron, 8 parts of gypsum. Mix it all together thoroughly and crush up to a fine powder. You should use 110g per square metre.

This was built in 1825 under the direction of Rev. Michael O'Donnell P.P. a nephew of Bishop James O'Donnell of St. John's Newfoundland. A tombstone records Lieut. Sarsfield of the Kerry Militia. The church was demolished in recent years and replaced by a modern structure. Near the ruined Church of Ireland is Prospect Hall, an interesting house pos-

sibly delay to the late 17th century. In the early 18th century it was owned by the Barnard family of Dublin. Stephen Barnard embellished the house in the mid 18th century. He was M.P. for Bandon 1727 57. Nearby is Monatray House rebuilt in 1830's as a summerhouse by Percy Smith of Headborough. It is referred to in 1786 as Snugborough the seat of Wm. Smith. Another interesting house is Woodbine Hill. In the late 18th century the house was owned by William Henry Coughlan. In 1793 the Roches acquired the property. One of the family was the noted miniature painter

Hill in 1847. Piltown Mill:

A mill recorded here in the Civil Survey 1654. In the 19th century the mill was owned by a Quaker, Peter Moore Fisher. He had a shop a bakery shop in Youghal called "The Piltown Mills Bakery", and a shop in Dungarvan which featured in the food riots during the Famine. Piltown Mill was attacked by a mob in 1846

Sampson Too good Roche (b.1757) who died at Woodbine



Why Does the Kangaroo Have a Pouch? The female kangaroo has a pouch on her stomach, because, unlike other mammals, she cannot carry her babies inside her until they are fully developed. So, after the birth, the tiny kangaroo, as yet without fur, blind and only 3cm long, climbs up the mother's body until it reaches her pouch. Here, suckled by the mother kangaroo's mammary glands, it grows until, seven months later, it can leave the mother.

Where do marsupials live?

Most marsupials (animals with pouches) live in australia, because they remained isolated here following the sub-division of the Pangea. Some species are spread throughout Guinea, and the Opossum lives mainly in North America.

Which Animals Have Pouches?


There are many marsupials - more than 270 species! The young of the koala bear, when they leave the pouch, scramble up the back of the mother, living attached to her among the branches of



trees. The Tasmanian Devil is a meat-eating marsupial which hunts at night. It is also a very fine swimmer. The opossum is not really a true marsupial, but has a sort of double fold of skin around the mammary glands. When the young are big enough they are brought up in a nest. The wombat digs a long tunnel to build an underground lair. Its pouch is turned inwards, so that it does not get filled with loose

In What Ways Do Animals Disguise Themselves? Some animals can disguise themselves to blend in with the surroundings where they live, taking on shapes and colours to prevent them being seen by predators. The leaf insect and some stick insects, like the cicada take on the shape and the colour of leaves, a branch or a bush, so that they are not seen by insecteating animals. The ermine and the hare, to escape their predators, change the colour of their coat during the winter, becoming as white as the snowy landscape. The down feathers of jays, woodcocks and pheasants are the same colours as the undergrowth. Another type of disguise is that of the viceroy butterfly. To avoid being eaten, it takes on the colours of the monarch butterfly, which has a sour taste and so it is left alone by the birds. How does the Chameleon Change Colour?

The skin of the chameleon is rich in pigment (colour) cells and so it can change colour because of the light, the temperature of its surroundings or the mood of the animal. When the colour of the chameleon's skin adapts to its surroundings, it can become invisible, not only to its predators, but also to its prey. If the animal is disturbed or if it wants to escape an intruder it becomes dark, to

A Ballysaggart GAA club spokesman; said the entire parish was devastated by the tragic death: "When you speak about the Clancy family you are automatically speaking about Ballysaggart GAA. Kieran's father, Michael, was one of our greatest ever players, and Kieran was following in a long and proud family tradition when his life was taken."

Chairman of the Waterford County Board, Paddy Joe Ryan said; "The Clancy family are intrinsically linked with the GAA and, today, everyone in the association in our county is deeply saddened at Kieran's tragic death.

"Kieran was a fine sportsman, an equally fine player, and I cannot even try to imagine the loss he is to his parents, his brothers, sister, and all of Waterford GAA."



He said that according to some reports decentralisation could be put back by ten years because of Fianna Fail's fears about losing support in areas where Departments had been promised, and now cannot be delivered.

Duckspool Roundabout **Nothing More** Than A **Building Site**



A roundabout less than 50 metres from a secondary school is a serious health and safety concern, according to Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab).

Expressing serious concerns about the condition of the Duckspool roundabout, Cllr. Kyne said slabs of concrete, kerbing and broken palates are lying in the rubble on a road children walk to school on.

Cllr. Kyne gave an invitation to the Council's Engineers to go out to the site with him, and then say it's acceptable, "and if it is, that's not acceptable to me."

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab) shared Cllr. Kyne's concerns, and asked for clarification on the timeframe for the completion of the roundabout, and also called for lighting along the whole road from the coast road to the Waterford road at the Burgery.

With a number of commercial developments in the immediate area, he queried whether commercial levies could fund these works.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham (FF) said he couldn't understand how the roundabout could be changed three times, but still isn't right. He said there is no need for a roundabout there in any case.

Co. Engineer, John O'Flynn said the resurfacing contract has been awarded, and the work should start during the Easter holidays. Once resurfacing is in place, he said, the "whole thing will look a lot better than it presently does."

As for collecting development levies, the major development at the burgery, which received permission on condition the developer finishes the roadway, has remained held up, Mr. O'Flynn said.



Loan Raised To Cover Landfill Rehabilitation Costs

The restoration and rehabilitation of Dungarvan Landfill will cost eur2.2 million over the next two years, according to a report from Waterford County Council.

Head of Finance, Paul Clerkin requested that the loan be raised to finance works at Dungarvan and Tramore, and to provide civic amenity and composting sites around the county.

According to Mr. Clerkin the cost of landfill rehabilitation will double from 2003 to 2004, rising from 720,000 to 1,48m euros in Dungarvan alone. In Tramore, the costs will also double, rising from 750,000 euros to 1.4 m over the same one-year period.

The loan will also be used to provide 312,000 euros towards civic amenity, and composting sites, in Dungarvan, Lismore and

The loans will be repayable over a 20-year period, with an annual repayment of eur305, 000.

Two Councillors To Sit On Joint **Oireachtas** Committee

Fine Gael Cllr. John Carey and Fianna Fail's Geoff Power will be involved in the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Europe. Waterford County Council was invited to appoint two council-


Fine Gael Co. Mayor, Cllr. Lola O'Sullivan ruled out the move, adding that it was a single meeting, and two members were stipulated for the post.

The Science of Farming and Food

SHEEP: Target Lamb Growth Rate

In well-managed flocks the following lamb growth targets should be readily achieved from grass alone.

Target ADG (gms/day) and weights (kg) for twin reared lambs.

Age of lambs	ADG (gms/day)	Liveweight (kg)
0-5 weeks	300	15 kg
5-10 weeks	300	25.5kg
10-14 weeks	220	32 kg

Where the above targets are achieved in an all sheep system lambing in March and weaning 1.5 lambs, at least 50% of the lambs should be sold by the time the lambs average 20 weeks of age. In a mixed grazing situation at least 65% should be sold at 20 weeks.

During the pre-weaning period, lambs have the potential to gain 300 g/day (2.0 kg/week) from grass.

After weaning it is difficult to achieve more than 150 g/day (1.0 kg / week) without supplementation.

Poor growth rates pre-weaning take "twice as long" to rectify

The 2002 TET (Technology Evaluation and Transfer Project) farm results showed the 5-10 week and 10-14 week periods to be problem areas with regard to lamb thrive. Why?

Grass in April

One of the crunch periods for grass on March lambing intensive sheep farms is generally mid-April to early May. The grass that was there at turn-out is gone, regrowth is slow and fields are being taken out for hay/silage. How do we attempt to overcome this? The general system of applying nitrogen on these farms is first application mid-January to early February with the next applica-

tion after the first grazing. This interval of up to three months is way too long. Also, waiting until after the first grazing, when grass is already scarce, to apply nitrogen does not make much sense. A better option would be to apply a further application of about 30kg/Ha to the grazing ground about 6 weeks after the first application.

In Tom Nolans high output sheep system that operated at the Teagasc Research Centre, Athenry (ewes were stocked at 16/ha (6.5/ac) producing 1.75 lambs each, average lambing date 1st -10th March), first nitrogen was applied in mid-January. A second application is applied on the 1st March over the entire area. This means that some fields would have had two Nitrogen applications before a first grazing.

Ideal pastures heights for April are 5-6 cms where ewes are set stocked and not below 4cms in the case of rotational grazing. Where grass is 2cms less than target, expect

THINK SAFETY AND TAKE ACTION

Is there a guard on all PTO shafts?

Don't use machines with rotating shafts or rotating equipment until fixed guards are in place. Every year farm machinery operators are killed or seriously injured in accidents involving PTO shafts. Ensure the guard matches the shaft both in length and size. The shaft must be totally enclosed by the guard. Keep guards in good condition - clean and grease regularly. Make sure draw bar pins of trailed machines do not damage guards Loose clothing or long hair risks entanglement.

You won't smell killer gas

Decomposition of slurry in storage produces a mixture of dangerous gases including methane, carbon dioxide, ammonia and hydrogen sulphide. All are unpleasant, some are flammable and in particular, hydrogen sulphide is poisonous to humans and animals. Gases replace air, causing suffocation. Sense of smell is lost at high concentrations.

Agitation guidelines

Never agitate slurry in still air conditions. Remove stock from buildings above or adjacent to tanks. Open doors to provide a draught. Two people should be present. Keep children away. Never stand over slats or near tank access. Stay out of the building for the first hour. Avoid very vigorous agitation in confined spaces. Don't allow slurry to rise within a foot of slats. Avoid naked lights, as gas mixtures are highly flammable. Safety first!

YOUNG FARMERS TO BENEFIT FROM MILK

QUOTA CHANGES The 2003-2004 Restructuring Scheme, published recently, recognises the increasing size of producer quotas by increasing the priority category size bands upwards by about 10% and also by adjusting the distribution formula to give producers in the critical middle band a more favourable position than heretofore. The provision in this year's scheme which will have the greatest long-term impact

relates to new entrants. The Minister decided that from the 2003-2004 quota year a young person who farms at home, and forms a partnership with their parents that is registered as a Milk Production Partnership, and satisfies other criteria will qualify for a new entrant allocation while using the facilities at the home farm. This will, in particular, provide opportunities for young committed producers who possess the training and expertise to make a major contribution to the sector.

the changes introduced to the milk quota regime in Ireland since 2000 have been extremely successful in achieving the overall objective of putting quota definitively in the hands of active producers, at the lowest possible cost. In the last three years alone, about 460 million litres - about 105 million gallons of quota - have been redistributed under Milk Quota Restructuring Schemes. This is more than the total quantity of quota restructured

The Minister pointed out that in the previous ten years and almost 10% of the national quota. Nearly 90% of the restructured quota has gone to the small and medium scale categories of producers.

Joe Walsh said that notwithstanding the success of restructuring and the increase in the average size of quotas, it is widely acknowledged that milk producers need to further increase their scale in order to cope with the competitive challenges they will inevitably face in the coming years.

WALSH REASSURES FARMERS ON EARLY RETIREMENT SCHEME

The Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr Joe Walsh TD, has assured farmers that the Early Retirement Scheme will continue to be adequately funded. "We have provided 85 million for the Scheme in this year's Estimate," the Minister said, "and on current trends that will be more than adequate. I believe that the CAP Rural Development Plan contains adequate provision for the Scheme up to 2006."

Referring to uncertainty about the Scheme in the context of the Fischler proposals on CAP reform, Minister Walsh said that he was actively seeking clarification. "I raised the issue in the Council last week," he said, "and we have put our concerns to the Commission in writing. I have asked my officials to pursue it urgently. I have every confidence that we can clear the matter up in a satisfactory way."

MOST CO-OPS TO HOLD MARCH MILK PRICES

Milk Price Campaign, National Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy recently wel-comed the decision by Lakeland, Kerry, Dairygold, Wexford and Town of Monaghan to hold March milk Many other co-ops whose boards have not yet met are likely to decide to hold also. He expressed extreme disappointment at Glanbia's March 55c/l (1.97n/gal) milk price cut, which brings their price to a to milk at farmers' expense," he three-year low of 26.10c/l + VAT (93.46p/gal +VAT). He added that producers had been given the option to halve this cut by not contributing to the Glanbia 0.28c/l loan stock scheme.

"The suppliers to Glanbia, Dairygold, the West Cork coops and North Cork co-op, all of whom have suffered price cuts in 2003 after severe income losses in 2002, feel badly let down. They are entitled to demand that their co-ops now commit to holding milk prices for the rest of the year," Michael Murphy said.

The IFA man warned that dairy farmers had taken between 2.5 and 4.2c/l (9 to 15p/gal) price cuts in the last 18 the public service agenda.

Further to IFA's intensive months, which in combination with cost inflation had resulted in income losses of 10,000 to 15,000 for the average size producer.

"Dairy farmers can take no further cuts, and it is high time our industry stopped substituting systematic price cuts for a proper business strategy, Michael Murphy said.

"We will not allow co-ops to dodge the tough decisions on cutting costs and adding value concluded.

On the second week of July, Niamh Coffey and Triston Hickey will travel to Zootemeer in Holland as part of the Irish Senior Racquetball team who will be competing in the European Racquetball championship. They will spend 8 days in Holland where they will participate in the team championships and the individual singles and doubles championships.

When the cub set up in 1997, I don't think anybody would have believed that we'd have players making the Senior International grade in such a short period of time. When you consider that both players are only 17 years old, it makes their achievement even greater. Although both players have to spend a lot of time working on their own game, they also find the time to help with the day to day running of the local club. Niamh has been the secretary of the club for the past 2 years and she also spent a lot of her time coaching the younger players during the Wint Triston is also a member of the club committee and again his manner with the younger players and his ability to coach them the various skills of the game is an enormous asset to the club.

Although this is their first time to represent Ireland at this level, both players have already had the honour of donning the Irish jersey at Junior level. Niamh, a student at Ard Scoil na nDéise, travelled to Los Angeles, USA in December 1998 to participate in the World Junior Championships. Here she brought home the bronze medal in 12 + Under grade of Division 4 grade. Her results helped Ireland to fourth place overall behind the USA, Mexico and Canada. The following year, Triston who is a student at St. Augustine's College, travelled to the same city on the west coast of America to participate in the same championships. He went on to win bronze in the 14 + Under division 2 singles losing out to Mexico's Jesus Jasso in the semi final. Again Ireland finished in fourth place overall.

In the Clubs 6 year history to date we have won 26 All Ireland Junior titles of which Triston and Niamh have won 11 between them. Son of Richie and Rita Hickey, Triston has completed in 8 National Junior finals winning 6 and losing the other 2 to his good friend and rival from Templederry, Daniel Shanahan. His first medal for the club was back in '97 when he won the bronze medal in the Munster Under 13 finals in Fermoy.

Niamh is daughter of Jimmy and Deirdre Coffey, and she has

played in 9 National finals to date. Of them she has 5 victories and 4 silvers all of which she lost to Michelle Hogan from Templederry. Niamhs first medal for the club was also in 1997 in Fermoy where she took silver in the Under 11 Munster finals. She also has the distinction of being the youngest player ever to contest a Senior Open final. At the age of 14 she qualified for the ladies Open Singles final of the Munster Open only to lose out to Karen Grumbridge who was Ireland's number one at the time.

Even to date both players have had to endure a lot of cost while participating this season. So far they have had to travel to Moylagh in Co. Meath 4 times, Fermoy 3 times, Kilnamartyra near Macroom in Cork once, Rossmore once, Castlebar once, Arklow 4 times and Templederry once. In the next few weeks they must go to Arklow 3 more times and Kilkenny once plus any more training sessions that may be called. So as you can imagine it has been costly.

The trip to Holland will be partly funded by the Racquetball Association of Ireland and the local club hope to help in making up the deficit. Over the next few weeks, we will be having a fundraising draw coinciding with the Munster Council. Some top class prizes have already been sponsored for this. There are 5 players in total from Munster on this team. The other 3 are Joan Kennedy from Bolla, Helen Shanahan from Templederry and Liam Hughes from Fermoy who's mother Rose hails from nearby Tallow. Theyway the draw will work is that any money raised by the Touraneena players be returned to them. Likewise with the other players, whatever they raise will be returned to them.

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen

the death of Mrs. Selene Britton (nee Doherty), Oliver Plunkett Terrace, Clonmel which sad event took place recently was a quiet, inoffensive woman whose life revolved around her husband and family. Warm and kindhearted she was noted for her great neighbourliness. She was daughter of Albert and Agnes Doherty of Ballyclare, Co. Antrim. She was one of six children, three boys and three girls and came from a Protestant family. Following a twelve month correspondence between Selene Doherty and himself, she invited him to Ballyclare in County Antrim for a holiday and to meet her family. It was a memorable occasion for them both as they got engaged in the Summer of 1954. Subsequently she was invited to Clonmel, Selene decided to stay and she got employment locally. She continued her religious instruction in Clonmel with Sister Joachim and Rev. Fr. Michael Lane, she was confirmed in Waterford by Bishop Cohalan. In 1955 they were married by Fr. Lane in her husbands home place of Twomilebarris, Co. Tipperary. After some time in rented accommodation they got a new house in Ard Fatinna in 1958 and some years later they made a swoop for their present home in St. Oliver Plunketts Terrace. They reared nine children, seven girls and two boys. Extolling his wife's virtues, Eddie said that she was a lovely woman, a Christian in the true sense of the word, who never uttered a harsh word about anyone, always displaying concern for her family and neighbours. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I believe that the Child Benefit rates have increased. Can you please give the new rates of payment?

Child Benedit is paid monthly by the Department of Social and Family Affairs for each qualified child normally living with you and being supported by you. To qualify a child must be dependant on you and must also be:

Under age 16 or

Aged 16, 17 or 18 and attending full-time education or a Fas Youthreach course or have a physical or mental disability.

The payment is generally made to the mother of the child. Where the parents are living separately it is paid to the parent with whom the child lives the majority of the time. If the child is not living with or being maintained by the parents, then it may be paid to the person who is caring for the child. From April 2003 the Child Benefit rates are as follows:

- 1 Child 125.60
- 2 Children 251.20
- 3 Children 408.50 4 Children 565.80
- 5 Children 723.10
- 6 Children 880.40
- 7 Children 1037.70
- 8 Children 1195.00

Child Benefit claimants paid by electronic methods receive the increased rate in full from April 2003. Those on book payments will receive the increased rate through a special payment in May, backdated to April.

Applications for Child Benefit should be made on Form CB1 within 6 months of the month when the child was born or became a member of the family or the family came to Ireland. Application for a child aged 16 or over is made on Form CB2. Claim forms are available from your local Social Welfare Office, Post Office or from the Child Benefit Section, Social Welfare Services Office, St. Plunkett Road, Letterkenny, Co. Donegal. DEALING WITH DEBT

Unless you pay cash for everything then you have debts. Debt is not a problem until you are unable to keep up with the payments necessary to cover the repayment. Debt can get out of control when something unforeseen happens and because of extra expense you find you are not able to meet your repayments or even pay your everyday bills.

Unforeseen events such as bereavement, illness, separation or family problems can cause financial problems and you may feel too embarrassed to contact your creditors and tell them that you are having problems meeting your repayments. This is what leads to debts getting out of control. Before you know it you will have letters arriving from creditors regarding missed payments. You may start borrowing money to pay bills and catch up with arrears (more debt). All this may lead to legal action.

The following steps will help you if you are having difficulties:-Don't panic

Make out a budget and stick to it.

Prioritise your expenses. Main priorities are Rent, Food, Heat, Light. See what expenses you can reduce.

Contact your creditors. Show them your budget and work out how much you can afford to pay them and stick to it. Most creditors are very understanding when they know you are having difficulties. If you do not contact them they think you just have not bothered to pay. If you fall behind with your rent or mortgage remember you could be evicted from your home.

Bills, letters and court forms will not go away if you just ignore them. The problems will get worse if you do nothing.

Always attend court hearings and bring a copy of your budget. Remember getting into Debt is easy, getting out of Debt is not so

It matters little, she feels, who has denied them proper food and medical supplies over the last twelve years, or why those meagre supplies have been completely denied to them over the last few weeks.

"These people are in danger of dying from hunger and thirst," she said this week. "The Western armies may be organising humanitarian aid, but we do not know when this will get to the people, as the primary task of the soldiers is to fight the war.

"The recognised aid agencies have appealed for funds and supplies," says Carole, "and it is up to us to again respond to a plea for help. Sending a container will be costly, so I am appealing to all of those people around the counties of Munster to come together, in the first instance, to hold a fundraising event to cover the cost of transport of the aid and then to collect food and the basic medical supplies which we can send.

She is at present reorganising her network under the name of VOW, Victims of War in preparation for the campaign.

"I have not yet finalised a route to Iraq," says Carole, "but in the meantime we should be getting our supplies together to avail of the first opportunity to

Need For More Urgency Regarding CCTV For Dungarvan

Brian O'Shea T.D. Labour Party Deputy for the Waterford constituency stated last night that the reply he received to a written Parliamentary Question regarding the proposals of the Minister for Justice, Quality and Law Reform, Michael Mc-Dowell T.D. to provide CCTV for Dungarvan was both vague and lacking urgency.

Minister McDowell replied that he had been informed by the Garda authorities that an application for the installation of a CCTV system in Dungarvan has been received by the CCTV Advisory Committee (that was established by the Garda Commissioner to evaluate applications for CCTV system). This application is at present under consideration and upon receipt of the Committee's recommendation, he expects to be in a position to decide on the matter.

Motor Neurone Disease

What is Motor Neuron Disease?

Motor Neuron Disease is the name given to a group of diseases in which the nerve cells (neurons) controlling the muscles that enable us to move around, speak, breathe and swallow fail to work normally. Motor neurons are the nerve cells along which the brain sends instructions, in the form of electrical impulses, to the muscles. Degeneration of the motor neurons leads to weakness and wasting of muscles. This generally occurs in arms or legs initially, some groups of muscles being affected more than others. Some people may develop weakness and wasting in the muscles supplying the face and throat, causing problems with speech and difficulty chewing and swallowing.

Motor Neurone disease is generally a steadily progressive disease, but the rate of progression can vary greatly for different people.

What are the symptoms of Motor Neurone Disease?

The first signs of this disability are often arm and leg weakness, muscle wasting and faint muscle rippling. These symptoms occur because muscles are no longer receiving the nutrient signals they need for growth and maintenance, a result of motor neurons dying. Motor Neurone Disease nerve degeneration may also cause muscle cramps and vague pains, or problems with speech and swallowing. Some people with the disease may lose some control over their emotional responses. They may laugh or cry much more easily than in the past. Eventually, all voluntary muscle action is affected.

How is Motor Neurone Disease diagnosed?

There is no specific test for diagnosing Motor Neurone Disease. However, several tests- including nerve conduction studies and electromyogram (EMG) - are used to measure how well and quickly the nerves are working. People showing the symptoms of this disability are usually referred to neurologists, who specialise in the nervous system. The cause of MND is unknown, although recent research has shown that around five to ten per cent of people diagnosed with MND show a definite genetic pat-

Treatment for Motor Neurone Disease

Motor Neurone Disease management involves physical, occupational, speech, respiratory and nutrition therapy. Exercise may help to maintain muscle strength and function, although it is recommended in moderation.

Although there is no cure for MND, recent clinical trials have shown that some drugs affect nerve cell activity and may increase the survival time for people with MND. Control Of Dogs

A person in charge of a dog shall not bring the dog onto Beaches/Strands governed by Bye-Laws enacted by Waterford County Council. Clonea Strand is one of the Beaches in County Waterford to which these Bye-Laws apply. The Bye-Laws apply to restricted periods during the tourist sea-son i.e. June, July and August between the hours of 11:00am and 7:00 pm. A person who is in breach of these Bye-Laws shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding 1,904.61e (£1,500).

According to the Bye-Laws a person entering a park, open space, seashore or any other place used for outdoor recreational or sporting activities which is under the control of Waterford County Council shall keep the dog on a sufficiently strong chain or leash in accor-dance with the Control of Dogs Act, 1986. The Litter Pollution Act, 1997 deals with responsibility for removal and sanitary disposal of dog faeces from any public place. A number of boxes for the disposal of Dog Waste have been put up around

Extract From Speech By Cllr. Nuala Ryan

Dungarvan Town Mayor, Cllr. Nuala Ryan spoke at the Contract signing for the collection and delivery system of the Dungarvan and Environs Sewerage Scheme at Clonea Strand Hotel recently. The following is an extract from her address:

'As a child growing up in

Abbeyside it was customary for my friends and I to spend the long hot summer days swimming and splashing around in the sea between Abbeyside Church and the Cove at Land's End. Since those memorable days, Dungarvan Town Council developed a marine outfall to dispose of all of the Town's sewage at the deepest part of the channel, adjacent to Abbeyside beach. As the town has continued to grow so too has the volume of effluent being pumped into the harbour. The perception now is that the water in the area is not safe for swimming. On completion of the new Sewerage scheme, this practice will cease and the water quality in the area will be greatly enhanced. We can hope to see the return of swimmers to Abbeyside beach and who knows maybe long hot summer days as well!

Footpath For Strandside Roundabout

Independent Councillor Michael O' Riordan welcomes the news that a footpath will be constructed from the area in front of Jimmy Navin's House to Shandon Bridge and will connect with the convenient footpath already there. This section of roadway is used by lots of people for walking and jogging as well as those people from Abbeyside who frequent the Leisure Centre in the Park Hotel on a regular basis. Cllr. O' Riordan has received confirmation that the project will go ahead in the near future. Abbeyside people will welcome the news that the landscaping of the Strandside North roundabout will commence within a fortnight.

LOCAL AUTHORITY HOUSING

Development in the Parish of Abbeyside, Ballinroad and Garranbane continues at a breathtaking pace with the new estates in Strandside North, The Heritage, Tournore, Sallybrook and Ballinroad. However, one thing that is very obvious is that no land has been set aside for Local Authority Housing anywhere in the Parish. We hope this neglectful situation will be remedied in the not too distant future.

'The Clogas'

People frequently the graveyard will have noted that a pathway had been laid through the cemetery to the 'Clogas' and steps have been constructed which make it easy to enter the old burial ground. Inside the place is clean and tidy and hopefully 'sightseers' will help to keep the ground in this condition.

Improvements

Recently, Councillor Geoghegan requested that improvements be carried out on the area between Landsend and the back of Seapark and Redbridge. Mr. D O'Donovan, the Town Engineer said that he had examined the matter and will bring proposals forward in the context of the Road Works Programme.

Travelling

Up to 1816 Dungarvan was an isolated town and it remained thus to some extent until 1826. A person going to Waterford was better off to go by sea if goods were being transported. It was necessary to cross the Colligan River by ferry to Abbeyside or wade across at low tide from where the Quay ends near the castle before the bridge was built. The bridge remedied some of this difficulty in 1816. A journey to Cork was also difficult and it had to be by sea when a large quantity of goods was being transported. Otherwise the goods had to be carted on road by Knockmahon to Clashmore and then to the ferry point opposite Youghal or else in the roundabout route through Lismore. This was remedied after 1826 when the first Youghal bridge was completed.

In 1831 the road to Youghal over the Drum Fineen was built to join the new Youghal bridge. One of the distinguishing features of the N25 road to Dungarvan and Abbeyside from Waterford City were what were described in 1831 as the 'mile post of metal' that were erected that year while the road was being built. Most of these are no longer there but were removed during road widening. They were also placed on the N72 to Lismore and were quite unique. They are in place in some parts still on the N72.

Danielle Quinlivan now competing from her home base in Kanturk had the most incredible round on Carol Griffith's "Silver Prince" to win the Cork Tack Room

1-20m and near neighbour Shane Sweetnam produced the odds on favourite "Ballyhass" to win The Kedrah House Stud 4 year old championship judged this year by Ken Digby. Originally from Kilkenny but now living in Tramore John

Brennan won a great 1-05m final on his own "Nancy Spain"and Dearbhaile Byrne, Clonmel won the very competitive Spillane Trailer Services Young Riders Championship with "Mighty Barney". The Leisure and Sports Riders finals were held on Friday evening and set the standard for the week-end with Michelle Griffin, Dungarvan winning the Leisure Final on her own "Just Ben" and Anne Widger, Clonmel added her name to the role of honour when taking the Sports Riders Final with "Forest Witch" after a tremendous jump-off.

On Sunday the course included several new imaginative fences, which had the riders more concerned than the horses and it produced brilliant jumping. Barbara Maher's Cork Tack Room has supported the third class of the day the 1-20m final now for three years. 13 made it through to the jump-off and from second draw Tholm Keane gave it everything on Ronan Tynan's, "Errigal Flight" gelding "Vialli" shaving the angles he set 34.62 and put huge pressure on those following. His brother Stevie though, had the remarkably fast "Krafty Kate" and not to be outdone he just edged ahead in 34.32 to great cheers as this looked the winner but Danielle Quinlivan had other ideas. Having three in the jump-off she had already tried to beat the boys but with her last ride Carol Griffith's "Silver Prince" she rode the most amazing round. Taking every turn to perfection she then stood off the second last and took out a stride to the final

oxer which was exceptionally daring and won a brilliant final in 30.36 leaving everyone gasping

The following 1.30m Final attracted 23 top horses many having a warm-up for the international season ahead. The audience were treated to a feast as the class became more and more competitive. Richie Moloney from Warrington, Kilkenny who like all the others competing started their careers at Ballyrafter was first to set a fast target of 34.05 with Andrew Doogue's "Touched By Love". Clear rounds were the order of the day and a thrilling jump-off ensued. Derry Kingston based in Clonakilty had three forward, two for sponsor Joe O'Connell and his own Bucas Leading 5 year old "Ole Gunner" by "King's Master" who won the four year old title last year. Derry and "Kiltorcan Cliff" set the time of 45.90 but Shane Breen quickly reduced this to 40.87 with Terry Tracy's "Clover Field 11" by "Clover Fields" and this handsome bay stayed in top position. Skill 3 Catch and Kick for Scores

Three cones $(A,\,B,\,C)$ are placed on the 20m line, one in line with the centre of the goal posts, two cones placed 15m either side of it.

Player One stands with the first ball at Cone A and keeping within the rules, kicks it from outside the 20m line, to pass over the crossbar.





Chamber of Commerce However, going on FAS's own Sceptical of FAS's Ability to Provide Staff to Companies as Part of Restrictions on Work Permit Programme

The Chambers of Commerce is sceptical of the ability of FAS to deliver staff in light of the announcement on Monday, 7th April, of changes in the work permit programme which will see substantial restrictions in the categories of staff which can be recruited from outside the European Economic Area.

Michael Colivet, President of Dungarvan & West Waterford Chamber of Commerce, made the following comments. "FAS and the Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment are confident there are sufficient personnel to fill vacancies in the wide range of occupational categories which have now been deemed ineligible for work permits over the next three months based on their analysis of job seekers registered with them. This is to be welcomed by any sane employers as it will save all the time, cost and hassle associated with trying to secure work permits.

track record we simply do not share their confidence to deliver the staff required in this new environment"

"If FAS are willing to stand over their analysis of the labour market, they should be willing to commit to a reasonable timeframe within which they will be able to supply employers with those categories of staff which are now subject to a blanket restriction on work permits for the next quarter. If they fail to meet this commitment, they should also be willing to provide business with some form of compensation, as ultimately business will be left to take the hit on their bottom line if they cannot get staff to fill a position and are prohibited from seeking a permit to recruit from elsewhere.

Michael Colivet added: "The Chamber of Commerce will also be seeking clarification in respect of both those applications for permits and applications for renewals which are already in the system and are still outstanding by the 9th April."

€200,000 boost for roads in Ring and Old Parish Waterford County Council

will this year spend over 200,000 euro in the Ring and Old Parish Gaeltacht's in strengthening and surface dressing roads in various townlands. This work will be carried out in addition to ordinary maintenance of all roads in the

Local Údarás na Gaeltachta representative and County Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair feels local authorities and their staff need more resources to ensure local roads in communities throughout the county are in good order. However, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair has welcomed the fact that this year's agenda of Council work in Ring and Old Parish will feature four strengthening projects involving 3,340 metres of road costing 153,632 euro and five surface dressing jobs on 6,400 metres of road in both areas at a cost of 50,176 euro.

Relating information on the works concerned, as outlined to him by the local authority, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said:

"The strengthening works are to be carried out a three locations in Old Parish: Réidh na gCloichín, Cill Chomáin and Cruabhaile. These are all jobs concerning over 1,000 metres of road in each case. Im pleased that the fourth project in question is attending to a section of road in Gort na Daiche in Ring.

"The night of the excitement at the Mardyke", 21st June 1976

Speaking of underage cricket, thoughts turn to youth teams of previous generations, the most successful of which was probably the under fifteen team of 1976; eleven local lads, coached by Eric Flynn, who fought their way through to a Munster semi-final on summer's evening almost 27 years

1976 was a long, hot, dry summer. The Munster U-15 league was played on weekday evenings after school. Lismore's success was based around a number of solid contributions; the opening batting of Gerard Foley, who hit an unbeaten century against Bandon, the controlled swing bowling of Dave Lee, the athletic wicket-keeping of Sean Willoughby, the terrifying fast bowling of Eamon Foley, and the all-round talents of captain Gerard Kennedy.

The performances of these individuals, and others, saw Lismore through to the semifinal. The draw was not a kind one, away to the highly fancied Wanderers, the favourites for the title. And so the sides met in a 25 over match at the Mardyke, the home of Munster cricket, on the 21st June 1976. The prize was a place in the final against Middleton College the following night. Wanderers were lead by Peter Dineen, the great white hope of Munster cricket. So confident were the Corkmen that even before a ball had been bowled they were openly discussing their travel arrangements for the final. Proud Cork parents turned up the watch their boys give a hammering to the country bumpkins. The Lismore lads, however, had other ideas.

Wanderers won the toss and batted first. Lismore had an early breakthrough with Kennedy removing one of the openers for five. The Corkmen then began to settle in, and it was the fourteenth over before Dave Lee removed the other opener, with the total on 43. This brought Peter Dineen to the crease, and he quickly began to make his presence felt. In the 17th over Kennedy bowled him a half-volley. Di-

neen went down on one knee and swept with a magnificent swing of the bat. The ball landed on the roof of the Mardyke pavilion, a massive hit by any standard. Next ball Kennedy ran in, slipped in his delivery stride and sent down a ball that bounced three times before reaching the waiting Dineen. Again he went down on one knee, again there was a magnificent swing of the bat, but this time there was no contact. The ball trickled on to hit middle stump. The bails fell, and the danger-man was gone. After some resistance from the tail. Wanderers were all out for 82; less than they'd hoped for, but they were still confident. Kennedy finished with 5 for 40, and Dave Lee took 3 for 18 off his 5 overs.

Lismore had recovered from the early losses of Joe Pollard and Sean Willoughby to reach 36 for 2 after 12 overs when things began to happen. In the 13th over Peter Dineen removed Gerard Foley for 18, and in his next over removed John Ryan, Dave Lee, Kevin Ryan and Kieran Fenton in four successive balls to leave Lismore reeling on 37 for 7. 46 were now needed off ten overs with Kennedy on 1 not out and only the tail left.

The Cork fielders again

began to crow, discussing the tactics they would employ in the final the following evening. The over rate fell, and the light began to fade. The batsmen began to find it difficult to see the ball, and the required run rate rose. Eamon Foley was run out, trying for a quick single to get Kennedy on strike, and 36 were needed off 6, with No 10 batsman John Geoghegan walking to the crease and the light fading fast. But if the batsmen found it difficult to see the ball, so too did the wicket keeper. 16 byes and 3 leg byes were run in those closing overs. Kennedy cut. pulled and drove. Geoghegan ran. Two over to go, seven needed. Two dot balls, then Kennedy cut the third ball for four. Three runs needed, nine balls to get them, and the Corkmen fell very quite. Two balls later, Kennedy pulled through square leg and the three runs were run. Victory belonged to Lismore. Kennedy finished with 26 not out, and was carried off the field shoulder high.

As it came to pass, Lismore narrowly lost the final to Middleton College the following evening. But in Lismore it is the story of the night of the excitement at the Mardyke which is still occasionally recounted.




