LANDFILL SITE —

Judgment In Favour



Saturday 10 - 5 p.m.

Almost two years to the day since a member of the Lickey Concern Group sought a judicial review in the High Court challenging the decision of Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly to continue his "search selection process" for a massive landfill site in the western end of the county, Mr. Justice Daniel Herbert has handed down judgment in favour of the county manag-

That judgment which runs to forty seven pages was delivered by Justice Herbert last Wednesday, and on the

that the end of the line has been reached by the Lickey Concern Group in its vigorous campaign of opposition to the siting of the proposed landfill at Garrynagree, six miles outside Dungarvan and about one mile off the main N25 route at Pulla.

However there's absolutely no guarantee that that will be the case. The High Court decision is now being carefully studied by Lawyers for the Lickey Concern Group and it may well be that an already protracted saga will run some more.

A challenge against the face of things would suggest High Court ruling could be made to the Supreme Court, but that would inevitably involve the opponents of the County Council proposal to further very substantial costs.

However, at the end of the day not even that uninviting prospect may not be sufficient to deter them, and it's a brave pundit who would say at this stage that the contentious and hugely controversial issue is at an end.

Not unexpectedly the High Court decision has been given a very warm welcome by county manager Donal Connolly.





ANIMAL WORLD

HOW DO FISH BREATHE UNDERWATER?

Like all animals, fish need to breathe oxygen in order to live. That is why they have gills — two openings, one either side of the head, and through which a fish can absorb the oxygen in the water. When its gills are closed, the fish takes in water through its mouth. As the water flows over the gills, the oxygen filters through the thin membranes and is absorbed by the blood vessels. Then the water flows out through the open gills, taking the carbon dioxide with it. Fish open and close their gills to much the same rhythm as animals on land breathe in and out.



Protection for the gills

The bony layer which covers the gill is called the 'operculum.' It protects the delicate filaments of the gills.

HOW DO MAMMALS BREATHE UNDERWATER

Whales and dolphins have a respiratory system similar to other animals. They have lungs and so can breathe in oxygen in the air. That is why they have to come out of the water at regular intervals and breathe in through the nostrils which are at the side of the head. Dolphins often breathe in oxygen during their characteristic leaps and jumps.


HOW MANY WAYS CAN FISH SWIM?

Fish move about in horizontal ripples (from side to side), using both the body and the fins. The movement of the tail helps the fish to go forward. The eel contracts and then releases its muscles, going along in a series of winding, curving movements. By changing the direction of the contractions, it can also move backwards

Marine Mammals swim rapidly using the vertical movement of their tails, which give them a powerful push forward. The ray swims by 'waving' its wide pectoral fins.

IS THE OCTOPUS INTELLIGENT?

The octopus is a highly developed mollusc which can change its behaviour as it learns from experience. In a marine aquarium an octopus will show that it recognises the person who brings it food. Many tests have proved the ability of the octopus to recognise shapes to follow a pre-set course. It is a solitary animal which lives in coral reefs and among rocks near to the coast. Acute eyesight and a wonderful ability to disguise itself are two means of defence for the octopus. The third and most famous is to squirt inky fluid, to confuse an enemy's sense of direction.



HOW DOES AN OCTOPUS SWIM

Like most squid and the cuttlefish, an octopus, when it wants to swim, fills an internal muscular cavity with water. It empties this cavity by forcing the water out through a small opening called a spout. With each jet of water, the octopus goes forward or backward, according to the direction of the spout. The more strongly and rapid the jets of water, the faster the animal.

Judgment In Favour Of County Manager

on behalf of Mr. Connolly by Bance Nolan P.R. Ltd., it was pointed out that in view of the Judicial Review proceedings initiated by the Lickey Concern Group activist Ann Hogan the County Manager gave an undertaking to the High Court that he would not apply to the Environmental Protection Agency for a waste licence in respect of the Garrynagree site pending the determination of the legal proceedings.


"The county and city's existing landfills in Dungarvan, Tramore and Kilbarry have only a very limited lifespan left, with the Dungarvan facility set to close on June 30th next", the statement says.

"In these circumstances", it continues, "Waterford County Council is now anxious to proceed with a resolution of the county's waste management problem at the earliest

opportunity".

In fact county engineer, John O'Flynn, confirmed last Friday that the Council's probable next step will be an application to the EPA for the waste licence which would clear another major hurdle in bringing the Garrynagree project to finality.

However while disappointment is steamrolling through the Lickey Concern Group and all of its determined and



motivated members, they insist that Mr. Justice Herbert's judgment hasn't touched on any of the environmental issues relating to the site and the river Lickey which bounds it to the south and south west.

In a press release the Lickey Group says that the judgment "has been overtaken by events on the environmental front".

The press release, signed by Tomas O'Mahony and A. J. O'Donnell, points out that in recent months the Irish authorities have decided to designate the river Lickey as a "Special Area of Conservation (SAC)" on the basis of the rare and protected species

living in and around the river.

"This designated"; the press release goes on, "represents a serious and significant change in the circumstances on which the decision to site the landfill at Garrynagree was based".

It goes on to state that the Lickey Concern Group actually welcomes the judgment of Mr. Justice Herbert on the basis that Waterford County Council should now be able to shift its attention and focus more acutely on the serious implications of the "Special Area Conservation" designation of the river Lickery

ey.

"The group is particularly encouraged by reports that Waterford County Council's proposed route for the new Dungarvan bypass was designed to avoid a proposed SAC, even at a reported additional cost of nine million euro", the press release adds.

It concludes that the Lickey Concern Group trusts that this heralds a new era of heightened environmental awareness within the County Council which will ultimately and quickly lead to the recognition that a landfill cannot be situated next to such an important, international protected river.

One suspects, strongly, that the last has not been heard of this vexed issue yet. Not by a long way.

Ingredients:

Serves 2 50g fresh ground coconut

4 eggs

100g sugar

284ml cream 20g gelatine



Method:

BREAK the egg yolks into a bowl. Add the Cocoribe liqueur and 50g of sugar. Whisk over a bowl of hot water. Melt the gelatine separately, then add to the egg-yolk mixture. Place in the fridge. Beat the egg whites until stiff. Beat the cream in a separate bowl. When the egg yolks are cold, fold in half the egg whites, then half the whipped cream, then the rest of the egg whites and the

Lightly grease two round moulds with oil, fill to the top and place back in the fridge. Poach the rhubarb with the sugar and a small amount of water for 30 minutes, cool, then purée in the blender.

In a separate bowl, whisk the leftover cream, add the sour cream and whisk



together until stiff. To serve: First pour the rhubarb mixture on to large white plates and smooth out into a round. Then spoon the half-whipped cream into the middle of the plate, and, with a tooth-pick, move out and around the plate to create the spider-web effect. Tip out the mousse in the centre. Top it off with a heaped spoon of whipped cream, garnish with mint and two marshmallows on each mousse. Add a few peach slices (see picture). Serve very cold, with

Pinch of salt 225g smooth peanut butter 1/2 tsp pure vanilla extract Method:

Preheat oven to 170°C/300°F/gas mark 4. Lightly grease a baking sheet (or use a nonstick one).

Mix together the peanut butter and vegetable oil. Beat the mixture until smooth and then mix in the maple syrup and vanilla

In a bowl, stir together the wholewheat flour and the salt. Add this to the almond butter mixture and mix until just about combined.

Cover the cookie dough with cling film and refrigerate for ten minutes. Roll the dough into 2cm balls.

Place them on the greased baking sheet and flatten with a

Bake the cookies in a preheated oven for about 25 minutes, or until the bottoms are lightly browned.

Cool for two or three minutes on the baking sheet, and then transfer to a cooling rack. TOP TIP: Try making the cookies with other nut butters, such as such as almond, for delicious variations on the original recipe.



Chelidonium

USES: Common warts, Verrucae.

This herb has been used traditionally for the treatment of warts. The juice of the plant is simply applied to the affected area of the

HOW IT WORKS: Warts are caused by an infection of the skin by the human papilloma virus. This infection causes cells in the skin

to multiply, giving rise to the characteristic lump seen. Verrucae are simply common warts found on the feet.

Chelidonium contains alkaloids with anti-viral activity. One of these, Benzophenanthridine, has been shown to possess the ability to

damage and kill wart viruses. Another, known as Chelidonine, slows down the proliferation of infected skin cells.

Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS)

The following are answers to frequently asked questions. These answers are based on the latest guidance as of 30th April 2003 which are subject to review and updating on an ongoing basis.

What is SARS?

SARS is the term being used to describe a serious respiratory illness which has recently been reported in parts of East and South East Asia and which is now being reported from other countries in the world.

What are the Signs & Symptoms of SARS?

In general, SARS begins with a fever greater than 100.4 F [>38.0 C]. Other symptoms may include headache, an overall feeling of discomfort, and body aches. Some people also experience mild respiratory symptoms. After 2 to 7 days, SARS patients may develop a dry cough and have trouble breathing.

What are the differences between Suspect and Probable Cases?

Suspect SARS cases have fever, respiratory illness, and recent travel to an affected area with community transmission of SARS and/or contact with a suspect SARS patient. Probable cases meet the criteria for suspect case and also have chest x-ray evidence of pneumonia or respiratory distress syndrome.

What is the Incubation Period?

The incubation period for SARS is typically 2 to 7 days; however, isolated reports have suggested an incubation period as long as 10 days.

How long is a person with SARS infectious to others?

Information to date suggests that people are most likely to be infectious when they have symptoms, such as fever or cough. However, it is not known how long before or after their symptoms begin that patie nts with SARS might be able to transmit the disease to others.

How is SARS spread?

The primary way that SARS appears to spread is by close person-to-person contact. Most cases of SARS have involved people who cared for or lived with someone with SARS, or had direct contact with infectious material (for example, respiratory secretions) from a person who has SARS. Potential ways in which SARS can be spread include touching the skin of other people or objects that are contaminated with infectious droplets and then touching your eye(s), nose, or mouth. This can happen when someone who is sick with SARS coughs or sneezes droplets onto themselves, other people, or nearby surfaces. It also is possible that SARS can be spread more broadly through the air or by other ways that are currently not known.

What is the risk to the general public?

The risk of developing SARS to anyone who has not been to the affected parts of the world is extremely low. It is important however that we keep watch in order to identify any possible cases of this illness.

Is there a Vaccine for SARS?

There is no vaccine at present. It will be some years before a vaccine can be developed.

What can I do to protect myself?

The best advice is to be aware of the symptoms of this illness, particularly if you have recently travelled to affected areas as defined by WHO (listed on health alert) and seek medical advice should you develop them within 10 days of your return.

Where should I not travel to?

The Department of Health & Children have issued the following travel advisory.

As of 30th April 2003 the Department of Health & Children strongly advises individuals not to travel to SARS-affected areas:

- China
- Hong Kong
- Singapore

Passengers intending to transit through Airports in the affected areas should consider using an alternative route where possible.

This advice is being reviewed regularly and may change.

What if I must travel to one of the areas covered in the Department of Health & Children travel advisory?

As a first step it is important to be aware of the signs and symptoms of the disease as outlined above. If you develop any of the signs or symptoms you must seek medical attention immediately. If you become a suspect or probable case of SARS be aware that you may be quarantined.

As with all infectious illnesses, the first line of defence is careful hand hygiene. As a general rule, it is good practice to wash hands frequently with soap and water; if hands are not visibly soiled, alcohol-based hand rubs may be used as an alternative.

As of this time there is no evidence to support the routine use of masks while in public places.

What if I have recently returned from a country where cases of SARS have been reported?

You should monitor your own health for 10 days following your return. If you develop any of the symptoms outlined above you should seek medical attention urgently. To help your health-care provider make a diagnosis, tell him/her about any foreign travel you have recently had and/or whether you were in contact with someone who had these symptoms.

What if I have been in contact with a suspect or probable case?

If it has been determined that you are a contact of a SARS case you will be managed in accordance with guidance available at www.doh.ie

What do I do if I have been in contact with a person who themselves were in contact with a SARS case?

Contacts who are showing no signs of symptoms are not considered to pose a threat and no further precautions are necessary.

CLEMATIS SPECIES

Climbers must be high on the list of 'good friends' to gardeners, along with ladybirds, robins and sunny summer Sunday afternoons! Look at just a sample of the things they can do: they can increase available growing room, especially useful where space is limited; mask boring or unsightly fences, tanks or walls; bring colour and in some cases scent right to your door or window. Among the climbing plants, clematis is a firm favourite. In the nineteenth century exciting specimens, new to the West, were brought to this country by the Victorian plant collectors. They soon gained popularity and caught the imagination of the gardeners of the day. Today, there-are so many to choose from, each offering different characteristics. Sometimes categorised into early, mid and late flowering species, the species and varieties on offer at nurseries and garden centres all produce beautiful displays of flowers.

Here are a few examples to consider in your garden. Clematis montana is an early flowering species with a wide choice of varieties. All are very vigorous. They bear masses of flowers in late spring or early summer. 'Grandiflora' produces white

flowers, 8-10cm across and dark green leaves. Those of 'Pink Perfection' are 5-7cm across, rounded, fragrant and pink,. The mid-season clematis produce bigger flowers. 'Bees' Jubilee' bears pink flowers which are 10-12cm across. This plant is quite compact, achieving a maximum height of 2.5m and will do better in partial shade. 'Nelly Moser' is loved by many gardeners. The pinkishmauve flowers are a delight and make a real impression at 12-16cm across. For a profuse show of smaller flowers in mid-late summer, consider the species that are classified as late flowering. Examples include 'Perle d'Azur', which produces beautiful blue flowers in abundance, or 'Alba Luxurians' with its delicate, green-tipped white flowers, 5-7cm

Because of their very vigorous growth habit, the early flowering clematis are particularly well-suited for growing over unsightly garden features. Some form of support is necessary for clematis to enable them to climb. Use either a wire framework or a wooden trellis. They need fertile, humus rich soils with good drainage. Semi-shade or full sun suits them; ideally the base of the plant and its roots should be in shade. Many clematis encountered in this country are fully hardy, but do check this, especially if you are in a frost prone area. Clematis has earned a place in our hearts as a classic garden plant. The choice of species and varieties is so wide that it would be great fun to establish your own collection at home. With their space-saving growth habit and knack of covering things you'd rather not look at, there's no good reason not to!

Udaras Board member Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair has welcomed the move. According to a written reply to a question Cllr. O Ceilleachair placed on the agenda of the April monthly meeting of the Udaras held in Ring last week, the Munster Regional Manager of the authority Eamon O Neachtain confirmed that 120,000 Euro is being made available for the project - with construction set for later this year. It is understood that plans for the facility at lands owned by the Udaras

at Barra na Stuaic, Old Parish, are to be submitted for the attention of Waterford County Council's planning department before the end of this month.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair, who feels this development will boost the Udaras's task of being the state authority for the economic and social development of Irish language speaking communities such as Ring and Old Parish, said:

"We spent 20 years lobbying to have an Udaras Board member directly elected for the Waterford Gaeltacht. In the election for that, I got a strong mandate to campaign for an

Udaras office in the locality on a par with other areas around the country. Previous plans envisaged the Udaras having a portakabin facility available for community usage on it's site at Old Parish. Upon re-examination of that, the Udaras is now committed to building a permanent structure at Barra na Stuaic in Old Parish and will continue with in the intention of developing business units for local enterprise at the same location.'

"It's also pleasing that Udaras will continue with ownership of lands at Baile na nGall in Ring, which will be retained principally for enterprise purposes and form - the development of which will form part of it's 2004 capital programme.

I'm also pleased that the Udaras - through it's community development programme will continue to work with local groups Comhairle Pobail na Rinne and Coiste Forbartha na tSeana Phobail on questions of common interest. I'm further assured that the Udaras's commitment to the ongoing development of facilities and services at Ionad Pobail na Rinne, in Maoil a' Choirne in Ring, will be an active and strategic one. At a time of economic pressures for state agencies, it's important that the Udaras continue to play a positive role in Ring and Old Parish."





BALLINACOURTY/ **DEELISH** WATER SUPPLY

The existing Ballinacourty/Deelish Water Supply scheme has insufficient capacity to meet current and future demand, or to provide an adequate firefighting capability. It has insufficient treatment capacity which has difficulty meeting the required water quality standards.

A Preliminary Report setting out proposals for a new scheme was forwarded to DoELG for approval last month. The proposals involve providing a new groundwater source supplying a new 2000 cubic metre storage reservoir, as well as upgrading some 11 kilometres of distribution mains. The initial work involved is in trial drilling and testing to establish the new source. The estimated overall cost is 3.4 m

It is expected that DoELG approval will be received this year to the Preliminary Report proposals and that Contract documents can then be prepared for the initial trial drilling and well development phase with a view to seeking tenders for same in 2004. Progress on the remainder of the work is contingent on the success of the initial phase.

John Risbill of Boreenatra and George Thompson, Main Street, were building ships in 1824. All that remains of the sailing ships are the large rings that were used to warp out the ship until its sails were filled with the wind. At that time two sail-makers also were at work, David Mulcahy of Abbeyside and Nicholas Mulcahy of Clubbert's Lane. In 1846 Barnabas Cochrane of Devonshire Square is listed as building sailing ships in the town.

The exports from the local port were principally corn, cattle and butter. Imports consisted of timber, culm and coal. It was

There appears to have been easier by far to import culm the roads for any heavywheeled transport.

In 1832 the pier at Ballinacourty was built on the property of Thomas Wyse to shelter and dock fishing boats. This work was subsided by a grant from the Fishery Board as well as by public subscription.



The Science of Farming and Food

CATTLE: 1. Care of the Newly Purchased Bull

The farmer buying a young bull should be aware that the bull comes from a farm where he was very well fed - up to 10 kgs concentrates per day so that he will look his best at time of sale. The bull is usually about 12 months old. They are generally kept in individual pens, groomed and walked fairly frequently.

To ensure that the bull settles down in his new home and works effectively as soon as possible, it is essential that he be carefully managed during the first two to three months.

2. The Key Components in the Management of a Bull after Purchase are:

Housing - bulls should be kept in well-ventilated, straw-bedded pens with plenty of room for movement for the first 3 weeks. After that they can be moved to a bull pen or paddock

The buyer should ascertain from the breeder the bull's normal diet prior to sale. No big changes should take place in the diet other than reducing the amount fed usually about 3 to 4kgs / day concentrates plus hay or silage, depending on what he was used to. Most bulls purchased have no experience in sexual activity. It is important that in the 3 to 4 weeks prior to the start of the mating season a number of cows in heat should be introduced to the bull. The fertility of the bull can be checked in this way. Young bulls should be run with no more than 20 cows in 1st season. It is vitally important that the farmer keeps a strict watch on repeat matings as it is generally a measure of the fertility of the bull

3. Beware of the Bull!

This year there is a big emphasis put on farm safety. On average, 3 to 4 people are killed on Irish farms as a result of bull aggression per year. As well as a large number of serious injuries.

All bull owners should take the following precautions: Young children should not be allowed into a field where the bull is running with the herd.

The bull should have a nose ring and have a chain attached. The chain should be long enough to trail behind his front legs.

A safety sign warning of the bull's presence should be displayed on gates or other access points. Bulls known to be aggressive should never be allowed to run with the herd. When moving a bull it is important that two people are present. A tractor or other suitable farm vehicle should always be provided as a mobile sanctuary.

Grass Growth

Teagasc is measuring grass growth rate on two drystock farms in Co. Waterford. Farm 1 is a suckler beef farm in Stradbally which is 20 ft above sea level. Farm 2 is a suckler beef and sheep farm in Rathgormack which is 750 ft. above sea level. Both farms are in REPS and have a stocking rate of 1.88 lu/ha.

Grass growth is measured on each farm every 2 weeks. The results to date are shown in table 1.

SHEEP: Grassland Management Lamb performance to date is satisfactory and grass utilisation is good. However, May is the most difficult month to manage grass as growth rates can vary leading to large variations in supply. Last year the joint Farmer/Teagasc TET (Technology evaluation and Transfer) project showed that lamb growth declined in the 5-

10 week period to 283 (from 314) grams per day. Some comments:-

Set stocking: Ewes should have a continuous supply of grass, approximately 6cm in May and 6-8cm in June.

Rotational grazing: Paddocks graze down to 5cm in May and 6cm in June. Grazing tighter will lower lamb growth rate.

Creep grazing: Allow lambs to forward creep graze ahead of the ewes where there is a suitable paddock/field layout. Trials by Eugene Grennan, Teagasc, Athenry have shown that this increases weaning weights by 2-3kg at no extra feed cost.

Mixed grazing: Where grass gets soiled in wet weather consider moving ewes and lambs ahead of cattle so that lambs have access to clean grass. On all sheep farms move to the next paddock when grass is soiled.

Grass shortage:

Graze some of the silage /hay ground. May be considered if there was some winter feed carried over from the past winter. However, if there was no carry over this may not be an option unless the deficit can be made up with a later cut.

Feed creep to the lambs. However, remember that it will take about two weeks for lambs to consume a significant quantity. Apply 1-1- bags Nitrogen / acre if no nitrogen has been applied in the previous 4-6 weeks. Tighten up dry ewes or hoggets.

Surplus grass:

e

Surplus grass will lead to stemmy swards in June. This lowers grass digestibility and this seriously effects lamb growth rates. Options include: Take out some ground for hay /silage

Use hoggets/dry ewes or other non lactating animals to clean off under grazed fields while ewes and lambs move on. Forcing lactating ewes and lambs to remain back an extra day or two to graze off will result in later paddocks becoming stemmy.

ICMSA AND CPSU TO MEET ON ANIMAL **PROBLEMS**

The ongoing dispute between the Department of Agriculture and members of the CPSU is causing animal health and animal welfare problems. Pat O'Rourke, President ICMSA said that he has already called for a resolution of the dispute and that both sides should use the industrial relations mechanisms available.

However, there was now a pressing problem with regard to animal health and animal welfare issues and that these need to be addressed

A meeting will take place tomorrow between ICMSA and CPSU to explore how animal health and animal welfare issues can be addressed. Pat O'Rourke said that he appreciated the response of the Union and their General Secretary, Mr. Blair Horan to the ICMSA re-

Mr. O'Rourke said that he hoped that arrangements can be reached between CPSU and the Department to alleviate the growing problems encountered by farmers on animal welfare and disease.

REVIEW POLICY REGARDING CATTLE **PASSPORTS**

ICSA president John Deegan has called for the Department of Agriculture to review its policy regarding the withholding and personal collection of cattle passports where cases of TB and Brucellosis have been identified.

"I am calling on the Department to review its policy in two areas. Firstly farmers should not be expected to have to personally collect cattle

movement permits from their DVO's. This can take hours of time between travelling to and then queuing at their nearest DVO. In this age of modern technology surely a fax to the factory concerned should be sufficient. Secondly these farmers should not have their cattle passports confiscated. These passports are an essential part of day to day farming and they hold vital stock information especially for farmers applying for premia. The Department can through the CMMS ensure that animals moved illegally while herds are locked up will incur severe penalties," according to Mr Deegan.

"I am calling on the Department was to review its current system, especially in view of the ongoing difficulties due to clerical strike action", concluded Mr Deegan.

Waterford County Council provided bags, skips, gloves, staff and refreshments, whilst Coiste Maisithe na Rinne provided invaluable people power. 

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I have heard of people changing their name by Deed Poll. What does it mean?

ANSWER

A Deed Poll is a signed declaration by a person that binds him/her to a particular course of action from the date of signing. A Deed Poll for a change of name contains declaration that you are abandoning the use of your old name, that you will use your new name at all times and that you require everyone to use your new name.

The advantage of changing your name by Deed Poll is that a record of the change is kept for future identification. This can be attached to your birth certificate, is acceptable for most administrative procedures and provides an easy and inexpensive solution for most of the difficulties which may be encountered on changing your name.

You can get a solicitor to do the Deed Poll or you can do it yourself, in which case the only cost would be the 30 euro Stamp Duty. However, it is a complicated process and it may be advisable to use a solicitor. If you are doing it yourself guidance documentation for drawing up a declaration is available from the Deed Poll Section, Central Office, Four Courts, Dublin 7. Tel.: 01-8886000.

You will have to take the declaration to a Commissioner For Oaths or a practising solicitor for which there may be a small charge. You must then bring your documentation to the Four Courts where you will have to pay the Stamp Duty. You will have to collect the Deed Poll from the Four Courts a few weeks later.

Credit Records

Have you ever been turned down for a car loan or a credit card?

If so it makes good sense to check your credit record. The Irish Credit Bureau (ICB) was established in 1965 by the main banks and financial institutions and holds the credit records of approx. 2.7m people. Any Irish person who has had a mortgage, personal loan or hire-purchase agreement has a credit record.

Each time an ICB member grants a loan to a consomer, there is a stipulation in the small print that the payment history of that loan will be recorded by the ICB and will be available to other members. If the consumer then makes a further credit application from a different member their credit record can easily be checked. Therefore it is worth your while to maintain a good credit record through making the payments on time and sticking to the terms of credit agreements.

Under the Data Protection Act, people have the legal right to get a copy of any information held on computer about them. If you wish to see your Credit record you can request a copy by sending e6 to the Irish Credit Bureau, ICB House, Newstead, Clonskeagh, Dublin 14. If you find it difficult to decipher the different codes on your credit record a full explanation of how to read documents is on the Data Protection Commissioner's website: www.dataprivacy.ie

On April 12th 1867 a ship called 'Jacknell' left New York bound for Ireland. The men on board hoped to assist in a Fenian rising. These Fenian were captured as the waded ashore at Helvick outside Dungarvan. In this article we reproduce part of a book that recorded the exploits of the 'Jacknell' and her crew. The book is called 'The Dock And The Scaffold' and was published in Dublin by A. M. Sullivan, Abbey Street in 1868.

ST. MARY'S CHURCH OF IRELAND, DUNGARVAN Continued from last week

In reply to his lordship, the witness said the main gate was sometimes closed, but the small gate was always open, and if not open, it was capable of being opened at all times that he went there. The gate was there still, and if it were kept closed cattle could not go into the graveyard; but he never saw any cattle in the place except goats or a donkey. To reach the southern walk his practice was to enter by the small gate, and then cross over in front of the church.

Rev. James Williams said he was 73 years of age, a member of the Augustinian Order, and went to Dungarvan in February 1869. While he was in the habit of frequenting the graveyard for the purpose of exercise, taking a walk, or enjoying the sea air. He also used to say prayers in the place.

Mr Henry - That is not a custom of the people of Dungarvan to say prayers there. (Laughter.)

The Master of the Rolls- Do you suggest Mr. Swyane, turning the southern walls to cloisters? (Laughter.)

Mr. Swyane - I don't mean that, but I suggest that he used it in a way a person of his vocation would.

The witness, in the course of further evidence, said the graveyard was usually by the people for the purpose of walking and enjoying the scenery. He never saw any interments

taking place in the southern portion where people walked. At the time witness was in Dungarvan the Rev. Mr. Bain was a rector, and he and witness were on very good terms.

Thomas O'Grady, master mariner, who said he was 59 years of age, and a native of Dungarvan, also gave evidence of user.In cross-examination by Mr. Henry, the witness said this was a favourite resort of sea going people when in Dungarvan.In reply to his lordship the witness said his father, who was 96 years of age, was buried in this graveyard and in later times there would be funerals to the place about once a fortnight. The interments always took place in the centre portion, except when the remains were interred near the schoolhouse. Horses, hearses, or carriages did not enter the graveyard during funerals, but vehicles did not pass into the church door on Sundays with persons going to service there.

Mr. Robert Longan said for thirty-three years he was Petty Sessions Clerk in Dungarvan, and had used the graveyard in the same way as the other witness. He remembered the times the stiles, were built up and knocked down. He never saw a four-footed beast in the grave-yard.

John Flynn, a master mariner, gave corroborative evidence. More than fifty years ago an attempt was made to close the stiles, but the obstructions were knocked down twice, and after that they remained for use up to the present.

Mr. Swyane asked if it was not a fact when a Dungarvan man went abroad that he was asked if he knew how many trees were in the churchyard?.

Witness- That is so. When I was in America they asked me could I tell how many trees were in the graveyard of Dungarvan. (Laughter.) That was one of the tests to prove that I came to Dungarvan. (Laughter.)

Andrew Murphy said he was a fisherman, and had frequented the graveyard for recreation.

Mr. Michael Byrne, Poor Law Guardian, Dungarvan, having given corroborative evidence as to the use of the graveyard, was cross-examined by Mr. Brown, in reply to whom he denied that he was the leader of the inhabitants of Dungarvan in the matter, but he was principally one of the gentlemen who took steps in it. I think it was you suggested at the meeting of the Urban Council that they should march there in a body and pull down the railing? Yes.

DEGENERATIVE DISK DISEASE

What is Degenerative Disk Disease?

Degenerative Disk Disease is a back disorder that occurs because of wear and tear to the disks in the spine. Your spine or backbone, consists of the column of 33 bones, these bones are called vertebrae. The upper 24 vertebrae join together like links in a chain. In between each vertebra is an intervertebral disk, a band of cartilage that acts as a shock absorber between the vertebrae. The lower nine vertebrae are fused together in two groups, forming the sacrum and the coccyx. Degenerative Disk Disease means wear and tear changes in the disk, and is usually caused by osteoarthritis of the spine, this usually happens as a person gets older, but it can affect younger people and can cause chronic disability. In a healthy spine the disks act as cushions for the vertebrae, but in Degenerative Disk Disease the disks begin to erode, which causes them to lose their ability to act as a cushion, this alters the position of the vertebrae and the ligaments that connect them. In some cases, the loss of density can even cause the vertebrae to shift their positions, this is called segmental instability. And as the vertebrae shift and affect the other bones, the nerves can get caught or pinched and muscle spasms can occur.

What causes Degenerative Disk Disease?

Degeneration of the disks can be a result of the aging process, but it can also be the result of trauma, infection, or direct injury to the disk. It can also be inherited, and a person may find that one of their parents suffer from the same disability.

What are the symptoms of Degenerative Disk Disease? In Degenerative Disk Disease, lifting and twisting can aggravate pain. And while most of the pain is felt in the low back, there are cases where it can radiate down the back of the leg, this is due to trapped sciatic nerves. Pain is felt usually in the lower back, and can radiate around the hip area and into the legs, trapped nerves can also cause numbness and tingling in the legs and feet. The degree of pain can differ from person to person, and it can be a very debilitating disability. In the late stages of spinal degeneration, bony spurs from the degenerative process can cause a condition known as spinal stenosis. With spinal stenosis, the spinal canal becomes to small and presses on the nerve roots causing pain and nerve dysfunction in the legs.

Diagnosis and Treatment of Degenerative Disk Disease
There are several tests that can be used to diagnose
Degenerative Disk Disease; these include x-rays, MRI
scan, CAT scan and tests that involve putting either dye or
electrodes into the effected area to get a better look at the

Treatment can vary from person to person, exercise and a healthy diet can help alleviate the pain, but as the degeneration progresses the focus is on management of chronic pain. Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory medications or other painkillers may be used to manage inflammation and pain, advice from a professional medical advisor should be sought for the correct diagnosis and treatment. Alternative pain management such as massage, acupuncture etc., may also help to alleviate the pain. In more severe cases of Degenerative Disk Disease treatment can involve an operation called a spinal fusion, this should only be considered when all other treatment has been exhausted. WATERFORD'S ONLY OTHER MUSTER **CAMOGIE TITLE WON IN 1945**

WATERFORD 3 – 9 CLARE 4 – 5 (AFTER EXTRA TIME)

"Nobody said it was easy but nobody said it would be this hard" Coldplay sang in their recent hit single "The Scientist. These words came to mind in Charleville at 4.00pm on Saturday last when a Waterford County Camogie team lifted a Provincial title.

Waterford has won a provincial title, the previous time was in 1945 when the Senior title was annexed. You can talk about famines, you can talk about droughts, you can even talk about permanent bridesmaids, but they were all banished when referee Eamon De Bruin blew the final whistle confirming a one point victory over The Banner after a monumental struggle.

County selector Colm Bonner told the media last week that they are treating the visit of Kerry with caution and that their concern is about Kerry's good form in the latter stages of the national league. In Waterford this is the traditional approach and is obviously designed to condition the panel and the public against over confidence.

Even though Waterford have been abysmal at times since winning the Munster championship last July, I must confess to feeling absolutely confident that we are going to win here and move on to meet Limerick in the provincial semi-final.

If this does not happen, then the result will be a bigger embarrassment than the result of our meeting with the Kingdom in the first round of the hurling championship back in 1993. They beat us by a goal (4-17 to 3-17) then when we were the reigning All Ireland under 21 champions

We now line out as Munster senior hurling champions and are facing the weakest team in the province who did not play in the championships at senior level for a few years and are now back hoping to make an overdue break through in the top flight.

Well done and good luck to them but the difference in standards cannot be overlooked and unless Waterford show a return to their worst form of this year in the league, Kerry are not going to win this one.

Maybe the students of the game who watched the team perform so erratically and in a lukewarm fashion since the Munster final last year will but about Waterford and how they will approach the game.

After winning the Munster final in July we' blew' the All Ireland semi-final against Clare in Croke Park. Ken McGrath commenting on that result said that the team ' froze' on the occasion. A strange comment after we had raced into a big early lead in the first half.

In the national league we were decisively beaten by Kilkenny in the first game. We were under strength. We scrope through against Laoise. We were again embarrassed by Dublin here in Fraher Field and we didn't win either against Galway in Pierce Stadium. We defeated Clare, but the result did not matter since we were both already out of contention for a place in the knock out stages of the league.

In the relegation competition we were well and truly hammered by Limerick but defeated Derry and Offaly.

We surely did not leave the stamp of champions on the post Munster final programme of matches and as a result, I suppose it is true to say that our profile has suffered and now on the return journey we look forward to a successful journey back through Munster to Croke

Anyway here we are again, taking one step at a time in the

It must be said that in practically every match that we have played since last July we have had to field without several of our top players because of sus-

pensions, Ken McGrath, John Mullane and Eoin Kelly and injuries to several others including Seamus Prendergast, Brian Flannery, Tony Browne, Andy Moloney, etc. Eoin Murphy was injured in our last game and will not be available to the selectors for this match. Otherwise his inclusion on the first fifteen would be certain.

How the team will line out or when the selection will be named are a matter of speculation and will likely remain so until mid week at least unless there is a change of policy with the selectors.

The goalkeeper job will certainly go to Stephen Brennar. Tom Feeney will be at full back with Brien Greene on one side and either Brian Flannery or David O'Brien filling the other. Declan Prendergast will be another option for the selectors here. In the half back line Fergal Hartley will probably occupy the centre berth with James Murray and probably Peter Queally on the wings.

Centre field will see team captain Tony Browne who captained the under 21 All Ireland winning side eleven years ago, partnered by Eoin McGrath.

Naming the six players to fill the attack or indeed attempting to show the shape of the attack will remain guesswork until the team is named.

When Kerry came to Walsh Park as rank outsiders for the opening round of the Munster championship in 1993, Waterford having won the under 21 hurling All Ireland in a replay the previous year.

Sean Kelly was then chairman of the Kerry county board and will travel here on Sunday as the first Kerry President of C.L.C.G.


