Legal Action Threatened Over Alleged 'Incitement To Hatred'

A former member of Waterford County Council is threatening to take legal action against Fine Gael Justice Spokesperson, Deputy John Deasy, for alleged incitement to hatred.

Garry O'Halloran, a former Fine Gael County Councillor, said he would take legal action over remarks Deputy Deasy made on local radio in relation to a group of trader/travellers.

In the course of an interview on WLR FM, Deputy Deasy was asked whether he would support the use of the army in such cases where large convoys of caravans

converged on a town. Deputy Deasy said in reply

that he would not rule out the use of the Army in certain circumstances.

But, Mr. O'Halloran, who is a member of the Southern Travellers Justice Group, said the Army had no role to play in such matters.

"It makes them appear that they are dealing with a serious subversive organisation," Mr. O'Halloran told the Irish Times.

Mr. O'Halloran is said to be taking the case under the Incitement to Hatred Act

However, speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Deputy Deasy said he would not be retracting anything.





Government Decentralisation Plan On 'The Road To Nowhere' Says Senator

Dungarvan is a prime location for decentralisation, according to Senator Maurice Cummins (FG), who has demanded that the Government honour their promise to Co. Waterford and city.

"When the Tanaiste committed decentralised jobs to Ballinasloe after the closure of Square D Plant without any reference to any Government strategy or criteria, surely the same could be done for Dungarvan and Waterford who are eminently qualified and in a state of readiness for decentralisation," he said.

"Eighteen thousand civil servants have expressed an interest in taking up the option to transfer out of Dublin to locations throughout the country, but the Government seems incapable of making a decision on the matter three and a half years after they made the decentralisation pledge in December 1999," Senator Cummins added.

Abbeyside Pattern On The Brink Of Collapse

A lack of financial resources and manpower has left this year's Abbeyside Pattern teetering on the brink of collapse, it has emerged.

The Pattern, which holds the distinction of being Ireland's longest running Community Festival, will not be held this year, unless the people and businesses in the locality rally to the Committees assistance, Chairman of the Pattern Committee, Charmian O'Brien told the Dungarvan Leader.

The Pattern's change of venue from the Pond to Walton's Park in the last few years has seen an the number of participants to its many events. Ironically, however, it has also coincided with a drop in the Pattern's financial

At present, funding of just 700 euros has been secured not enough to cover insurance costs of over 1,000 euros - and far from the 3,000 to 4,000 euros needed to run the festival

'At this stage, we're half thinking why bother," Charmi-an said. "But, then the other half is saying don't let it die either. This year has been exceptionally hard. We're getting no resulted in a cur600 loss, while church gate collections and

Easter raffles have received support well short of hoped for levels. This year, the Pattern's main sponsor Murphy's Brewery is also pulling back their level of funding, although Charmian said, "they won't let

The organisers say the Pattern Queen will still go-ahead on the 18th of July in Minnies as it is a qualifier for the Waterford Area Finals of the Rose of Tralee But, without support the Bank Holiday weekend in August earmarked for the Pattern will be a blank space on the Abbeyside calendar.

whose primary function would be as a "specially en-gineered landfill, including placement into lined discrete cells, which are capped and isolated from one another and the environment.'

The landfill would operate two activities - the Disposal and Recovery of Waste. The recovery section of the notice allows for the "use of any waste principally as a fuel or other means to generate energy" - a description believed to mirror the requirements for a Thermal Treatment Plant included in the Regional Waste Management Strategy. It would also allow its use as a recycling facility.
CONTRADICTORY

MESSAGES

The River Lickeys "imminent" designation as an SAC follows on from the discovery of a rare species of shellfish. But, the decision to continue to waste license stage was contrasted by Deputy Ollie Wilkinson (FF) with the 6-8 million euro routing of the proposed Dungarvan Bypass away from the Killarney Fern. The fern is also expected to be "immi-

tolerated.

Deputy Deasy said the issue didn't have to do with travellers, and wouldn't describe the people as travellers, but as traders, some of whom have houses in Limer-

Mr. O'Halloran, who served as a Fine Gael County Councillor in the previous council, initiated an unsuccessful case against Cllr. John Flannery in 1999 who compared Travellers to "pedigree dogs" who preferred to lie in the sun rather than take FAS training coursnently" included in an SAC.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Deputy Wilkinson said that there seems to be a major contradiction between

"I cannot understand how one development can go ahead, and the other can't. I fail to understand the logic of

The issue was initially raised after Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) repeated his call for the Council's Executive to make its own submission to the National Roads Authority, outlining the concerns, Cllr. Kyne claims the executive privately hold about the preferred route.

"I know one local landowner who said members of the executive told him they had reservations about the route,' Cllr. Kyne added.

But, Mr. Connolly denied that he had told anyone anything. He said he didn't have a particular view on the bypass and as it isn't an area he is qualified to speak on, he would not be publicly airing

Deputy Wilkinson highlighted the apparent contradiction in approaches between the Lickey and the Dungarvan Bypass, and questioned how the Garrynagree landfill could proceed close to a proposed SAC but the bypass had to be routed away from another at an added cost of millions of

"There is a contradiction here that needs to be cleared up", he said.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy said no confirmation of the Rivers SAC status has been received as yet by the council. Until it is either granted or refused, he said, it is a hypothetical situation, but he is confident that even if it is granted it would not have an impact on the future of the proposed landfill.





€52 Million Hotel And Holiday Home Development Proposed For Clonea The plans, which are available at the offices of Waterlord County Co

Dublin based developers, Greenbirch Ltd, are proposing to develop an 80,000 square metre site at Ballinclamper in Clonea into a multi-million euro hotel and holiday home development.

The developers are planning to construct a 4/5 Star Hotel on the site, along with 166 terraced and detached houses.

The plans, which were submitted by architects, McGrane & Partners, on behalf of the Greenbirch, are for a site bordered by Bronte House on the east, and the old Railway Lines to the north of the site.

If permission is granted to proceed, the hotel would face onto the beach, and Waterford County Council owned land lying between the hotel and the beach is planned for development into a public amenity

The developers say the new Hotel would cost in the region of 12 million euros to construct, and claim the new facility would create around 110 fulltime jobs, and a further 43 jobs on a part-time basis.

To the rear of the hotel, Kevin Gevers of McGrane & Partners said one hundred and sixty-six

"holiday homes" are proposed to be constructed at a cost they estimate of approximately 40 million euros. The houses are planned to include detached and terraced housing, and would be connected to the main sewerage scheme under con-

struction in Ballinacourty. REACTION

Speaking at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, Director of Services, Denis McCarthy assured members that a development would not be allowed go ahead on the site until the Dungarvan and Environ's Sewerage Scheme is completed.

The site is zoned for intensive tourism uses ever since Waterford County Council passed the Land Use Study Plan last year.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) said people in the Ballinclamper area had been aware since last years decision, that the development of a hotel could be expected out of the intensive





Minister Cullen's **Bill Another Blow** To Democracy - MANSFIELD

Speaking on the Protection of the Environment Bill 2003, Sinn Fein Spokesperson Brendan Mansfield slammed plans by the Government to introduce service charges. The West Waterford Sinn Fein spokesperson was also highly critical of provisions in the bill, which lessen the powers of local authorities.

"This is yet another Bill from Minister Cullen and yet another blow to democracy. People should remember that this is not the first bill that Minister Cullen has brought before the Dail which has sought to diminish the powers of local authorities.'

"Though there are some measures contained in this Bill that are to be welcomed they are simply window dressing for the Ministers real intention of diminishing by degree the autonomy of local authorities and for his planned imposition of service charges.'

Mr. Mansfield stated that he was particularly concerned that the Minister is attempting to persuade us that the imposition of service charges provided for in this bill is based on the 'polluter pays principle'.

Mr. Mansfield said that this was a dubious claim designed to distract us from the fact that the economic policies pursued by this Government along with its refusal to reform the financing of Local Government has left us with cash starved local authorities. An individual citizen is not the polluter who should be paying. It should be remembered that household waste accounts for less than 10 percent of all solid waste. There is unwillingness on the part of this Government to make the main producers of waste pay their fair share.

Mr. Mansfield was deeply critical of the Minister for absenting himself from the Dail Chamber during the debate on the premise that he had to meet with City and County Man-

agers.
"This shows what the Minister's priorities are. He is not interested in hearing the voices of elected representatives at local level, and he's not interested in hearing the voices of the elected representatives at national level. Minister Cullen has once again demonstrated his disregard for democracy," Mr. Mansfield concluded.







Soft fruits can be really hardy

SUCCULENT and juicy, with a delicate skin and gentle double curve, peaches, nectarines and apricots have all these things in essential. common - so where do they

The one main physical difference is that apricots are a lot smaller than peaches and nectarines.

Also, there are noticeable differences in skin texture. Nectarines are smooth and shiny, peaches are furry and apricots fall somewhere in the middle.

Apricots have been grown in Britain for the last 400 years, although not widely until the last century.

There are three main points to consider in the culture of apricots: the flowers appear in early spring - and are therefore very susceptible to frost damage; many fruits may fall if the trees are dry at the roots; and fruit set may be patchy unless the flowers are hand-pollinated because there are few pollinating insects about when the flowers open in spring.

Soils that apricots relish in have a pH a little about neutral on the alkaline side. Good drainage is

The nectarine is in fact the smooth-skinned form of the melt-in-the-mouth peach. Technically it is a mutation, or bud sport, which arose more than 2,000 years ago. As a bush tree, the nectarine has not proved popular in Europe, as it is said to be somewhat less hardy.

Far from being tender subjects, peaches are hardy enough to succeed in the open almost anywhere except the really cold regions, such as northern Scotland.


They need no special soil requirements, but the soil must be of normal garden fertility and adequately drained.

Nectarines should be grown and cultured in the same way as peaches.

Recommended varieties of peaches include Duke of York, Peregrine and Rochester. Varieties of nectarines that are recommended include Early

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

PRUNE FLOWER SHRUBS Any shrubs that flowered during May or

early June can be pruned, but this is not to say that pruning is always necessary. Much depends on the purpose for which the shrub is being grown and the amount of space that you can spare for it.

TAKE PINK PIPINGS

Now is the time to propagate pinks by cuttings. Select healthy looking, nonflowering shoots 10 to 13cm long and pull them out at a joint.

This is known as taking a 'piping'. Insert these pipings firmly, 5cm deep and about 10cm apart each way, in sandy soil, preferably in a frame, but failing this in a shady border outdoors and keep well watered. They should be well rooted and ready for planting out by the end of September.

SOW FRENCH BEANS

Make a sowing of French beans in a sheltered place outdoors. Sow the seeds singly abut 15 cm apart in drills 5 cm deep. An economical method is to have two drills about 23 to 30 cm apart, then an alleyway about 75 cm wide, then another couple of rows and so on.

STOP CUTTING ASPARAGUS

It is most unwise to cut asparagus after the third week in June. Allow the plants to make foliage now so that new crowns may be formed for next year. Give the bed a small dressing of any good compound fertiliser.





What Are Trees?

A tree is a plant which has a trunk protected by bark. Most trees can grow to a height of several metres. Their foliage is made up of leaves of many different shapes and sizes - Large and spreading, like the Oak, the Plane Tree and the Chestnut, needle-shaped in Conifers, such as the Pine, the fir and the cypress. Some species of trees, which we call 'evergreens' do not lose their leaves. Instead they change their foliage a little at a time in rotation. Deciduous trees lose all their leaves once each year, at the start of the coldest or driest season. Trees usually develop roots at the base of the trunk. How when what why



What Is The Bark?

The trunks of trees are protected by bark, a dense layer of dead cells the outermost part of the bark is cork. The bark protects the tree against insects, parasites and sharp changes in temperature. there are also distinctive patterns in the bark of each tree, and from one species to another.

The Conifer


The conifer is the only member of the larch family which is evergreen. Its leaves are covered with a dense covering and they are in the form of a needle to reduce evaporation and exposure to the cold to the minimum.

Broad-Leaved Trees

Many broad-Leaved trees are deciduous.

Some tropical broad-leaved trees keep their leaves all the year round.

What is the job of the roots.



The roots absorb water from the soil, storing nutriments to feed the leaves. side roots spreading out from the main root increase absorption. Roots also keep the tree firmly in the ground.

Some roots conserve food as they grow and develop into root vegetables, such as the carrot. In some plants, the roots spread out into the water or the air. The roots of the Banyan Tree grow down from its branches, lengthening to the ground to form pillars.

Things To Do

Each tree bark has a distinctive appearance, just like a person's fingerprint. To make a bark-rubbing, place a sheet of greaseproof or kitchen paper against part of a tree trunk where the bark can be seen clearly. Rub the paper with a wax pencil, keeping the paper flat, and you will get an 'imprint' of the bark. Do the same with other trees, then stick the rubbings on a piece of paper, with the name of the tree to which each bark-rubbing belongs.

Outer Bypass To Cost €50 Million For 1% Traffic Reduction Per Year

Council members expressed outrage that an extra eur9 million will be needed to reroute the proposed Outer Bypass to avoid the endangered Killarney Fern.

Why all the worry about an extra eur9 million, but no hassle at all about the total costs of this tremendous project? If an extra 9 million leaves members aghast, why do councillors calmly accept the total project costs which start at eur50 million and go up from there?

I would urge councillors to look at the traffic figures generated by the NRA planners before this scheme advances further. I am told by the planners at Tramore House

that I am the only person who has requested current and projected road traffic figures.

OVER 100 CARS REDUCED TO CLEAR.

What is clear is that at least 50% of the N25 traffic through Dungarvan is purely local. The Outer Bypass will start by ignoring half the problem.

If the Bypass is built, it will only reduce traffic growth at the Park Hotel roundabout by 22% in the far off year of 2025. In other words, the Outer Bypass will reduce traffic growth by 1% per year. On the other hand, if the Outer Bypass is not built, traffic numbers will slowly build from their present total of about 16,000 a day to 20,000 in a quarter of a century.

Now that's hardly an argument for spending eur50 million. Couldn't that money be better spent on incentives to car poolers, local buses, day care centres close to home or work? Surely there are plenty of other ways to reduce traffic build-up by less than 1% per

year over 25 years.

Might not Dungarvan be better served by a rail station tying the town to Rosslare, Waterford and Cork? The astronomical sums being thrown at the Outer Bypass might very well rebuild a huge segment of the Southern Section of the Rail system rather than a mere 13.1 Kilometre bypass of an existing bypass.

Is this a realistic option? We don't

know because the Council is pressing ahead without studying the actual costs or possible benefits of alternatives to the Outer Bypass. Before the Council commits to

this expensive, destructive and useless road, I ask that other options be properly studied. A committee report could serve as a guide to further action. This committee's terms of reference should be to examine Dungarvan's transportation possibilities, rather than just pressing blindly for a single solution that, according to the NRA's figures, won't do much to reduce traffic.

Waterford County Council's Inter-community Litter Challenge for 2003 continued last week, with judging taking place in the bottom half of the 1st round of the village section. Here's how the ties went:

Stradbally (74) beat Clashmore (65)

This victory for Stradbally was far from convincing. The areas around the church and the church car park were littered, as was the road in front of the boys' school. The green area and the streets in the centre of the village, however, were very good, apart from gum on the path in front of the shop.

Clashmore was a mixed

bag; the new housing estate was in excellent condition but the green area by the stream was badly littered. The road past the school towards Aglish was also badly littered, as was the area opposite the Catholic Church.

Villierstown (72) beat Ardmore (57)

Villierstown was in good condition litter-wise. The road outside the school was moderately littered, but apart for that there was only minor litter in the rest of the village. The new housing estate was in particularly good condition. There is, however, a growing look of dilapidation in older parts of village.

Ardmore was let down by

the housing estate near the school, and by the area in front of the school. Throughout the village there was no evidence of an effort being made to keep the place litter free.

Ballymacarbry (66) beat Ballyduff Lower (49)

An easy victory for Ballymacarbry, but Aglish will provide stiffer opposition in the quarterfinals. The main road in Ballymacarbry was only lightly littered, but the area around the Hall was bad. The new housing estate was in suburb condition, by far the best seen by the judges this year, but some of the green areas elsewhere in the village need more attention. Ballyduff Lower was a big disappointment, with a number of instances of severe littering. The area under the trees between the bottle banks and the school is a disgrace, and the littering in some front gardens is almost as bad.

Aglish (83) beat Annestown (78)

This was a very good contest between two very good villages. Aglish was very good, only let down by a lack of effort on the housing estate. Annestown also looked very well in the sunshine, but litter on the approach road, gum on the footpaths and an untidy look here and there in the village gave victory to Aglish.

This week the first two quarterfinals take place in the towns section, with Cappoquin playing Kilmacthomas and Lismore playing Dunmore East.

Moussaka for cheats

A QUICK and easy recipe for a delicious spicy dish that even the most hard-nosed microwave dinner maniac could make

Ingredients:

Serves 4

450g lean lamb mince

1 onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, crushed

400g can ratatouille

2 x 15ml sp tomato ketchup

1 x 15ml sp tomato purée

1 x 15ml sp fresh mixed herbs, chopped, or

1 x 5ml sp dried mixed herbs

4 pitta breads

2 beef tomatoes, sliced

Method:

In a large non-stick frying pan, dry fry the lamb mince until browned. This will take four

Add the chopped onion and the crushed garlic and cook for a further one or two minutes to flavour the mince.

Add to the pan the tinned ratatouille, tomato ketchup, tomato purée and chopped dried or fresh mixed herbs.

Bring the filling mixture to the boil and cover. Simmer for five to six minutes. After simmering, fill the ready pitta breads with the hot mince mixture and tomato slices.

Serve the finished moussaka with a greek salad, extra pitta bread wedges and pitted olives on the side. TIPS: Try using baked beans instead of ratatouille. Always make sure you dry fry mince as it is healthier mince contains its own natural fats to cook in. Try using the small pitta breads which can be found in

any supermarket.

They are ideal for a miniature version of the meal, a handheld snack, or even appetisers at summer barbecues.



Heat the pitta breads before trying to split them. Give them 10 seconds in the microwave and they will come apart much more easily.

Mushroom and mint kebabs

A ZINGY yoghurt marinade adds succulence to this mushroom dish.

Ingredients: Serves 4 KEBABS:

20 large button mushrooms

150ml natural yoghurt 1 garlic clove, crushed

Juice of 1 lemon 1 x 15ml sp freshly

chopped mint 1 x 15ml sp paprika RICE:

50g butter

1 x 15ml sp olive oil 2-3 red peppers, diced 450g cooked weight, American long grain rice Salt and pepper

Method:

Divide the mushrooms on to four skewers, and place in a dish. Mix the yoghurt with the garlic,

lemon juice, mint and papri-

Pour over the mushrooms. then turn them until they are coated.

Cover the dish and refrigerate for at least two hours. To serve, grill kebabs for six to eight minutes, turning once, until tender.

While the mushrooms are cooking, heat the butter and the olive oil in a wok or large frying pan.

Add the red peppers and cook for a few minutes until tender.

Add the rice, increasing the heat to give a stir-fry finish. Cook for a few minutes and season with salt and pepper. Serve with the kebabs, garnished with fresh mint and lemon wedges.

TIP: Try adding tomatoes. peas or even a splash of tabasco sauce to liven

Strawberry and apricot soufflé

A FRESH fruity dessert for a summer dinner party. Ingredients:

Serves 6 500g fresh apricots 125ml unsweetened apple

1 x 5ml sp orange liqueur 1 x 5ml sp orange zest Vegetable oil spray

6 large egg whites 1/4 x 5ml sp cream of tartar until the whites are stiff but Pinch of salt 3/4 x 15ml sp fructose

COULIS:

350g fresh strawberries 2 x 15ml sp fructose

2 x 15ml sp unsweetened apple juice 2 x 5ml sp orange liqueur

Method:

Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/350°F /Gas Mark 4. Cook the apricots in the apple juice for about 15 minutes, until soft. Cool and brown. purée with the liqueur and the orange zest in a

blender. Spray eight 240g soufflé dishes with the vegetable spray, taking care to coat the inside of each dish so soufflés will rise. In the bowl of an electric mixer, combine the egg whites, cream of tartar and salt. Beat together until the whites form soft peaks. Add the fructose sugar and beat not dry. Fold the whites into the fruit purée.

Combine all coulis ingredients in a mixer and blend until smooth. Strain through a fine sieve. Stir in orange liqueur. Spoon one 5ml spoon of strawberry coulis into the bottom of each soufflé dish. Spoon the apricot mixture into the dishes and level with a spatula. Bake for 25-30 minutes, until risen and golden

Do not open the oven during baking. Serve at once.

QUESTION" Friends of ours recently purchased some self-assembly furniture. However, there were no instructions in English with the furniture and they were unable to assemble the furniture correctly. They have contacted the furniture shop but they are not satisfied with the response. What are they entitled to ?

ANSWER: Following recent legislation the furniture shop is liable for the inappropriate instructions and your friends are entitled to look to have the furniture repaired or replace if appropriate, or to look for a price reduction or a refund.

Aspects of the Sale of goods and Associated Guarantees" (Directive 99/44/EC) became law in Ireland in January 2003. Its purpose is to ensure consumer protection and strengthen confidence in cross-border shopping through a common set of minimum rules. These rules are valid no matter where the good are purchased in the EU.

The directive provides consumers with additional protection to that already provided by the Sale of Goods and supply of Services Act 1980 in Ireland.

The added protection includes:

Liability of retailers for statements made on the specific characteristics of the goods

The reduction of the price of the goods as a remedy open to consumers in certain circumstances

The liability of retailers in relation to incorrect installation of goods even when the goods are installed by the consumer following inappropriate instructions

The right to a written guarantee at the time of purchase with the details on how to make a claim under the warranty, the duration of the guarantee and the territorial scope.

Your friends should inform the furniture store of the change in legislation and of their rights under the legislation.

Well we did it! 60 Miles later, every sign post that was 13 miles and we're all still alive! DISABILITY AWARENESS

ADVOCACY

The Programme for Government (June 2002) has a commitment to 'include provision for rights of assessment, provision, appeals and enforcement'. The Waterford Disability Network of PwDI, is of the view that there should be a statutory right to an independent assessment of need leading to a Statement of Need, as outlined in the Strategy for Equality.

Part 1- Advocacy

The legislation should provide for the right to the full range and types of advocacy for all people with disabilities and in all settings. This should be provided through an independent advocacy agency that is located under the Disability Support Service, proposed above, who will be responsible for providing advocacy, advocacy training, support and monitoring of the service. Detailed guidelines should be drawn up through Ministerial regulations within an acceptable timeframe. All stakeholders, including people with disabilities, their families and carers should be consulted in the development of the advocacy services and in the drawing up of appropriate systems and processes.

The legislation should provide people with disabilities with the right to an advocacy service as laid out in the document Advocacy - A Rights Issue (Forum of People with Disabilities, 2001). The advocacy service should:


- Include the full range and types of advocacy for individuals and organizations, including self-advocacy, peer advocacy, carer advocacy, citizen advocated and specialist advocacy for people with disabilities who may require extra support for their voices to be heard.
- Assist people to access public services, to take a complaint to a service provider and advocacy to enable people to take a case through the courts.
- Be available to people with disabilities in community, residential, hospital and prison settings and covering the full range of disabilities, including mental health and intellectual disability.





FULL STRENGTH AND DETERMINED ARMAGH TAKE NOTHING FOR GRANTED

Armagh 2-21 Waterford 0-8

Armagh who won their first ever All Ireland football final when defeating mighty Kerry in a memorable game in Croke Park in September last, came to Walsh Park on Sunday fully determined to get back into a wining vein following their shock defeat by Tyrone in the Ulster championship five weeks ago.

Although meeting a county with a very poor football record, they came here at full strength and determined to take nothing for granted in their bid to get back into contention in the campaign to retain the Sam McGuire Cup.

In spite of the different standards, Waterford played some good football and fought courageously for the 70 minutes of the game which was enjoyed by the crowd many of whom saw several All stars, like Oisin and company in action for the first time.

PLAY

At the end of the first quarter Waterford trailed by just a single point (0-4 to 0-3) and the visiting champions, feeling their way so to speak, were finding it difficult to stamp their authority on the match.

Mark Power had opened for Waterford and our third point, judged to be one of the best in the game came from the boot of Gary Hurney who was to contribute half our total.

By halftime Waterford were 5 points behind, 0-11 to 0-6 and this was not too bad against the All Ireland champions in football.

SECOND HALF

It was not too long before Armagh stamped their superiority on the game and having asserted themselves sent in the points and goals in fairly rapid succession to win a handsome victory over Waterford who, though well beaten, chased every ball and never gave up the hunt.

The home team finished without Andy Hubbard who picked up a couple of yellows and a red card, giving away a penalty which resulted in a goal for the winners after Oisin McConville gave P. Houlihan no chance in the Waterford goal.





The standard was not nearly as good as on the previous Sunday at Semple Stadium in Thurles, but the tension, and excitement were every bit as intense as the teams battled to win a place in the Munster final against Clare/Cork on the last Sunday in June.

In a nail biting and nerve wrecking finish the crowd of almost 29,000 held their breath while the ebb and flow of the game moved perilously in both directions before referee Dicky Murphy whistled the game to a finish at a quarter to eight.

It was a match that will require much analysing before the line out for the Munster final is decided and I know that the video of the replay will be studied and analysed before the management team settle on the team which will line out to defend our title is decided.

Paul Flynn The Star

The input of man-of-thematch, Paul Flynn into this replay is something that will shine out in the records for as long as interest in hurling remains. His overall contribution

of 1-7 on Saturday added to the 3-3 on the previous Sunday is something that must surely win him an All star this time round. Perhaps the Ballygunner man's under pressure, equalising point from 110 yards in the drawn match against Limerick will be named as the outstanding score of the 2003 championships.

A Different Game

Those who believed that the replay would not match the drawn game in any respect, certainly got it right and from an early stage it was obvious that it was going to be a tight closely marked contest. The ball moved less freely and there was a lot of 'bunching' by players, obviously bent on restricting the movement of the opposition. This made it less exciting as a spectacle and so incomparable with the drawn game that there were, in some quarters, a down grading of the team's capabilities.

This is no harm at all as it will help in bringing our supporters back to earth in the run up to the Munster final against Cork in Thurles on June 29th.

The Game

Both teams made changes from the previous day, with Limerick dropping five of the side which started in the drawn match.

Waterford made two changes, bringing on Peter Queally and Eoin Murphy for Seamus Prendergast and Alan Kirwan.

Waterford lost its shape completely with changes all over. Ken McGrath was placed at full forward and Andy Moloney moved to right half forward and Eoin Kelly taking over at centre forward.

There was a change at midfield where Tony Browne was partnered by Peter Queally who was moved from the halfback line. There were switches too in the defence.

As on the previous day, Waterford played against the

breeze.

Limerick were first to score when Conor Fitzgerald pointed a free. A minute later Eoin Mc-Grath pointed from play before Eoin Foley and Brian Begley brought their total to 3 points, both from play. 
