Lismore To Lose Recycling Contract If Dungarvan **Facility Goes Ahead** publicly noted as yet.

2,900 TONNES OF WASTE DESTINED FOR ADVANCE FACTORY

Sam Shire's Recycling Plant in Lismore will lose its contract with Waterford County Council if the local authority is successful in its application for a waste license for a new recycling facility in Shandon.

Sam Shire has a six monthly contract with the council, which will not be renewed if the local authority successfully sites a new recycling facility in the 1.3 million Advance Factory in Dungarvan. The decision will effectively mean the vast majority of the 2,900 tonnes of waste currently recycled in Lismore will instead be recycled at the Dungarvan plant.

Lismore currently recycles 1,600 tonnes of domestic

waste collected from kerbside recycling, 500 tonnes of glass and 700 tonnes of commercial waste. Some of this commercial waste may be accounted for by the recycling of pallets, which Dungarvan will not handle, but the exact percentage that this accounts for has not been

The proposed location of the recycling facility at Shandon caused a storm of protest at a recent meeting of Dungarvan Town Council with a number of members voicing strong opposition to the move. A notice of intention to locate the facility was passed on the outgoing Mayor Nuala Ryan's (FF) casting vote, after the vote was left tied.

The application, made under the Waste Management Act 1996, seeks to develop the facility for the segregation of household waste collected across the **CONTINUED ON PAGE 23**







Waterford County Sees Diversification Of Religion

Over five thousand people in Co. Waterford stated they are of no religion or a religion other than Catholic, the 2002 Census of Population results show.

Waterford County and City are listed separately on the census, and show that the County's population stands at 56,952 while Waterford City has a population of 44,594.

In the classification of religions stated on the Census forms, the County's population is made up of 51,878 Catholics; 1,584 Church of Ireland; 183 of another Christian Religion; 99

Presbyterian; 73 Muslim/Islamic; 55 Orthodox; 108 Methodist; 436 of other stated religions; 1,449 of no religion and a further 1,087 who did not state a religion.

Meanwhile, Munster's population officially now stands at 1.1 million people, of which around 53,458 are either of no religion or stated no religion on their census forms. Just short of one million of people living in Munster said they are Catholic and there are now 3,683 practising Muslims, confirming Islam's place as one of Ireland's quickest growing religions.





Cajun coated steaks

A HOT cajun coating is ideal for kebabs or spread over tasty steaks and chops.

Ingredients:

Serves 2-4 2-4 beef, lamb or pork steaks/chops

- 1 x 15ml sp oil
- 2 x 5ml sp black peppercorns, crushed
- 2 x 5ml sp paprika
- 1 x 5ml sp dried thyme
- 1 x 5ml sp dried oregano 1 x 21/2ml sp cayenne
- pepper 1 clove garlic, crushed

Method:

IN a bowl, mix together all the ingredients, except the meat.

Spread the mixture on to both sides of the meat. Grill or barbecue according to the chart below. This recipe is also ideal for

kebabs.

Serve with jacket potatoes and salad.

Note:

This mixture is hot. For a milder result spread on to four chops or steaks rather than two.



A VEGETARIAN feast mushroom and pea korma

Ingredients:

Serves 4

3 x 15ml sp vegetable oil 1 large onion, chopped 2cm square of ginger, chopped

3 plump cloves garlic 1/2 x 5ml sp turmeric

1/2 x 5ml sp chilli powder 2 x 15ml sp ground

almonds 115ml sour cream

115ml water 350g assorted mushrooms

120g green peas 1/2 x 5ml sp salt 1 x 15ml sp garam

1 x chopped coriander 1/2 x 15ml sp chopped mint

Method:

masala

HEAT the oil in a heavybottomed 20-23cm pan and sauté the onion very gently over a low to medium heat for about 15 minutes, stirring to prevent sticking, and adding a

minutes until onions are soft and golden.

Meanwhile blend the ginger and the garlic in a food processor for 30 to 60 seconds until puréed. Add the purée to the onions, stir in and sauté for five minutes. Add the turmeric and stir for a minute.

Add chilli powder and sauté for another minute, continuously stirring. Add almonds, sour cream and water and bring to the boil. Turn down the heat and simmer for 2-3 minutes until the mixture thickens. Add the mushrooms and cook for five minutes before adding the peas, and then continue to simmer until they are cooked. Bring to the boil, sprinkle on the garam masala, coriander and mint, cover, turn heat down to low for a couple of minutes, then turn off the heat and keep the pan covered until

ready to serve.

Mouth-watering savoury scones

HASSLE-free gourmet savoury scones - they melt in the mouth!

Ingredients:

Serves 8

450g self-raising flour 1 x 5ml sp baking powder Pinch of salt

1/2 x 5ml sp mustard powder 2 x 15ml sp fresh chopped dil 180g butter

2 medium eggs, beaten 120ml milk

Method:

PREHEAT the oven to 230°C/450°F/gas mark 8. Sift the flour baking powder, salt and mustard powder, then stir in dill. Rub in the butter. Add the eggs and enough milk to form a soft dough.

Knead lightly on a floured surface and roll to 2cm thick-

Using a 7.5cm plain cutter, cut out eight rounds (roll trimmings again as necessary). Arrange on a baking sheet. Bake for 12 minutes or until the scones are golden and

Leave to cool on a wire rack before splitting. The scones can be served as sandwich type bites (with a top and base) or open, with the fillings on display. Try filling the scones with mayonnaise, a little salad and smoked trout, peppered mackerel or finely shredded smoked chicken breasts.



Planning Notice For LIDL Supermarket Withers

German based supermarket chain, LIDL, have missed the deadline for lodging a planning application with Dungarvan Town Council for a proposed discount food store at Fairlane.

LIDL Ireland GmbH had two weeks to lodge an application with the local authority. However, while the planning notice was published towards the end of May, Town Council officials have confirmed that an application was not lodged within the two-week deadline, and that the notice has now withered.

LIDL were expected to apply for full planning permission to erect a discount food store and dock leveller measuring 1293.4 m (gross floor area). The store is proposed to have connection to all existing services and to include associated site development works. A new vehicular entrance car park and both free-standing and building mounted signs are also included in the proposal for a site at Fairlane.

The exact location of the site proposed is as yet unconfirmed, but is believed to be on the Clancy Construction site.

The withering of the planning notice was described as not being much of an obstacle by Town Council Officer Joe O'Flaherty, who said the discount chain can simply re-advertise the notice.

Kathleen & May Return Scuttled By Berthing Problems

A repeat visit to Dungarvan Harbour by the historic schooner, The Kathleen & May, has effectively been scuttled due to berthing problems.

Last summer thousands flocked to see the turn of the last century vessel cruise into the harbour, and the crew were accorded a Civic Reception by Mayor Nuala Ryan.

The local authority also made a contribution towards the running cost of the restored cargo vessel

However, while the Kathleen & May will not be putting in a repeat performance at Dungarvan, people will be able to see the schooners arrival in Youghal between the 14th and 29th of July.

Youghal Town Clerk, Liam Ryan, who is also Secretary of the Kathleen & May Society, said that as the boat is unable to visit Dungarvan, he is inviting the Mayor of Dungarvan, Paddy Power, and members of the Town Council to attend the Youghal arrival.

He also offered Dungarvan Town Council the possibility of exclusive sponsorship of the vessel at port at a cost of 500 euros

Dungarvan Town Council will discuss the issue of providing some contribution towards the vessels costs at a meeting of the protocol committee.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

The Garden Messenger theme for July is

'The beauty of blue

with Hydrangea macrophylla 'Blaumeise', Buddleja and Lavendula species

Cool blue! Calming, peaceful and with the gift of drawing out borders to make them appear deeper and more spacious, blue is a must in any garden. Contemporary and traditional, blue has never been out of fashion. And at this time of the year, blue is there to complement the sky (some days, anyway!).

Establish plants which bear blue flowers to create a special place in the garden - somewhere for quiet reflection after a busy day or as a place to take time out before going to work in the mornings.

One of the classic blue shrubs (in more acid soils) is the Hydrangea macrophylla, or common hydrangea. This has become almost a signature plant of gardens in this country, and it's easy to see why. Hardy and requiring little maintenance, it delivers year after year. over a long flowering period from midsummer to late autumn. Hydrangea macrophylla is in fact divided into two categories. The most frequently encountered are the 'mopheads' or 'Hortensias'. These are the ones producing big,

confident, dome-shaped blooms. 'Blue Bonnet' or 'Goliath' are ex-

If you are looking for something more unusual, the 'Lacecap' hydrangeas provide an exciting alternative. The flowers of the lacecap hydrangeas are quite different from those of the mopheads. They are made up of two parts - an outer ring of showy florets and a central arrangement of small fertile flowers. Hydrangea 'Blaumeise' is a wonderful lacecap to look out for. Also known as 'Blue tit' or 'Blue sky' it produces exceptionally deep blue coloured flowers set against dark green leaves.

Another great choice if you're looking for blue flowering shrubs is the buddleja. Ideal in a border, the arching stems, tipped with clusters of flowers of varying shapes and colours (depending on species and variety) are, like the hydrangea, a classic sight in the summer garden. 'Black Knight' and 'Empire Blue' are examples of Buddleja davidii

bearing flowers with blue and purple hues which are very attractive to butterflies. 'Lochinch' and 'West Hill' are other examples of bluish buddleja.

Lavender is a shade in its own right, and fields of the plant shimmering under a hot sun are an image to take home from Mediterranean holidays. Bring some of that romance into your garden with one of the hardy lavenders grown in this country. Lavenders will bring fragrance and colour to shrub borders or rock gardens. They can also be used to form a low hedge, perhaps around a vegetable area.

Three very different shrubs, all with the potential to bring the beauty of blue into the garden. As with many shrubs, none of these require much maintenance and will thrive in most garden soils (though for best blues from your hydrangeas your soil needs to tend towards acid). Blue can be bold or it can be demure. Either way it is always the height of

The contract for the Mechanical & Electrical element of the Dungarvan & Environs Sewerage Scheme Collection and Delivery System has been awarded to Bowen Water Technology Limited, Kilkenny. The scope of the work includes:

- Replacement of foul and storm pumps in the existing pump stations with new submersible pumps plus associated controls, electric pipeworks etc

The contract is valued at just over €1.4 m and will be carried out in tandem with the civil works contract which is already underway.

The third and final contract for this scheme for the design, build and operation (DBO) of wastewater treatment plants at Ballinacourty and Ballinagoul will be awarded later this year.



What Is A Rain Forest?

Nowhere else on Earth do plants grow so vigorously as in the hot and damp regions near the Equator, in the tropical rain forests. Each one is a very complex ecosystem (or nature community). More than half the total of living organisms on Earth live in the rain forests! Here, the tallest trees grow to more than 50 metres high and their branches extend all aroundfor tens of metres. Closer to the ground. other trees thickly woven together form the undergrowth of the forest. Between the undergrowth and the ground, climbing plants, creepers, trees and bushes often make the for-



Life in The Trees

Lots of mammals, which live in the rain forests, have adapted to life in the trees.

They move from one plant to another in search of food.

HOW WHEN WHAT WHY

Why do some sloths have a bluish haze?

In the thick fur of some species of sloth live colonies of blue algae, which the animal finds useful as a disguise in the forest among the leaves and the mosses. The 'micro-climate', which is created by the sloth's fur, is ideal for the growth of

In the equatorial rain forest the average rainfall is 1500-1400mm every year. The temperature swings between 25°C and 35°C.

In on hectare (100sq.m) of rain forest, it is possible to find between 80 and 299 different species of plants The Amozon rain forest covers a large part of the equatorial zone of South America (around 6 million square


Which Plants grow in The Rain forest?


The Mangrove grows in the water salt marshes at the mouth of rivers. Its roots descend from the branches to the water, creating wonderful arched structures, homes for tropical fish and birds. Epiphytes are plants which grow2 on branches of other

trees. Their roots hang free and absorb the moisture in the air.

The orchid belongs to this plant family, as well as bromeliads, which includes the pineapple. In the lower layer of the rain forest we find the habitat of

ferns, which give shade and humidity.

DAIRYING

July is the month to kick-start the reseeding process on the farm. Often reseeding is carried out too late. Late reseeds are more prone to weed problems and clover (if sown) often establishes poorly. These problems can be avoided (weather permitting) by reseeding in August and not September or later. Take the opportunity to begin reseeding in late July / early August. Spray the crop of grass about 5-8 days before grazing or cutting with e.g. Roundup. After the crop is removed, the field will be ready for reseeding. Cutting is better than grazing as the paddock will have a cleaner surface to work with.

Reseeding can be carried out successfully by traditional ploughing and tilling or by shallow surface tilling with a power harrow or rotospike. These minimal cultivation techniques can be used where stones are a problem or where land terrain is difficult. If considering this technique, some lime (about 1-2 tons/acre) should be spread. This is because decaying thrash releases

organic acids that may inhibit the grass seed germinating. Choice of variety is important. Recent research at Moorepark has shown large differences in milk production from different grass varieties. Later heading varieties produce grass of higher quality. Cows eat more of this grass and therefore produce more milk and milk of higher protein content. Later heading varieties

are also easier to manage particularly in mid season.

The vast majority (75%+) of the mix should contain any of or a mix of the following varieties: Portstewart, Gilford, Tyrone, Umbria, Denver, Cancan, Cornwall or Twystar. Some tetraploids can be included in the mix e.g. Navan, Millennium, Orion, Condesa, Delphin, Elgon, Abercraigs, Mammout or Sarsfield. Tetraploids are more open in nature and should not make up more than 25% of the mix. The grass seed mix should contain very little tetraploid varieties if heavy land is being reseeded. .

We are now halfway through the milk production season. Liners need to be changed. Old liners lead to increased liner slip. Liner slips are not good for your pocket. If liners are not changed, milk yield will be reduced by 6% for the rest of the year. Somatic Cell Count (SCC) will also increase, which can lower your milk cheque

SUCKLERS

Doeing Suckler Calves

The months of July and August are often the preferred months for dosing spring born suckler calves against stomach worms and hoose. Recent research from the UK showed an 8 kg difference in liveweight at the end of the grazing season between spring born suckled calves that were dosed in middle of the summer, compared to calves that received no treatment. This 8 kg advantage was still there the following spring when they were turned out to grass.

Apart from having a beneficial impact on liveweight, a mid summer dose to suckler calves is important also to protect them from hoose. A severe outbreak of hoose can seriously damage the lungs of the calf leading either to a poor life time performance or even death. Also, weanlings that have suffered damaged lungs are more prone to pneumonia than weanlings with healthy lungs.

FARMS FAIL ON SAFETY

Statistics compiled by Health and Safety Authority inspectors, following recent farm visits, provide plenty of cause for worry in relation to safety. Nearly half of the farms visited were issued with either prohibition or improvement notices.

On just four per cent of farms was there an up-to-date safety statement. In addition, 21 per cent of PTO shafts and 15 per cent of slurry facilities on the farms visited were dangerous. As a sector, agriculture cannot improve on its appalling safety record unless improvements are made and safety is taken seriously.

FARM GRANT STANDARD COSTING INCREASE LONG OVERDUE -IFA

CONSUMERS **SHOULD** INSIST ON IRISH SALMON

-ISGA reacts to UK salmon report

The Irish Salmon Growers' Association has recently welcomed the Food Safety Authority of Ireland's reassurance that consumers faced no threat following reports of extremely low levels of contamination from Sellafield of UK salmon in British stores.

Farmed salmon from the Republic of Ireland is reared only on the West Coast of the country and fed from sustainable fish stocks caught mainly by the Donegal fleet and is therefore in no danger of any such contamination, even at these non-threatening levels.

ISGA Executive Secretary, Richie Flynn said, "Consumers should be fully aware of the origin of all of their food, particularly fresh produce such as fish. The ISGA once again calls on the Government to introduce fully transparent labeling regulations for retail outlets to assist consumers in making an informed decision on the origin of their fish purchases."

IFA CALLS ON FINANCIAL SERVICES **REGULATOR TO** INVESTIGATE FARM OVERDRAFT INTEREST RATES

Waterford IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Paddy Power, has called on the newly established Financial Services Regulator to immediately investigate massive bank margins on overdraft interest rates charged to farmers and small businesses.

He said: "The recent cut in interest rates from the European Central Bank has brought euribor rates down to 2.15%, however most banks continue to charge farmers and small businesses overdraft rates of over 8%, which is almost four times the Euribor rate. This level of bank margin is totally unjustified and should be immediately slashed to more competitive rates which pass on the benefits of the current low interest rate environment to farmers.

Mr. Power confirmed that IFA has written to Liam O'Reilly, Chief Executive of the Financial Services Regulator, to demand an immediate investigation into bank margins on farmer overdrafts and action to force greater competition at this end of the lending market.

Mr. Power said that while farmers have seen greater competition in other sectors of the lending market, overdraft rates remain exorbitantly high.

ICMSA ANALYSIS OF THE FARM COUNCIL

ICMSA analysis of the Farm Council Agreement announced indicates that enormous losses will be suffered at individual farm level, at dairy sector level and to the national economy. Mr. Pat O'Rourke President, ICMSA said that if milk price is cut by 21 percent and compensation is only offered at 59 percent, there will be enormous losses suffered by dairy farmers. In addition, Mr. O'Rourke said, that Minister Joe Walsh will have to make provision for the losses that calf and weanling producers will suffer. The slaughter premium on its own, said Mr. O'Rourke, will not be sufficient to address the losses of calf and weanling producers.



Mr. O'Rourke said, that taking account of the level of losses suffered by dairy farmers, the cut in market support, further losses due to intervention ceilings and the loss due to a drop in calf and weanling prices, dairy farmers face a cut of over 30 per cent in their incomes.

The Sam Shire recycling facility has been a source of some controversy over its condition, and has been operating over its capacity for some time. At a previous meeting of Lismore Town Council the facility was described as being akin to a

Cllr. John Campion (Ind) said the Dungarvan facility would be a fully automated clean operation, and he claimed that comparisons between the two are unfair. Director of Services, John O'Flynn said the Advance Factory has a larger floor space, and would not be recycling pallets - blamed for some of the problems encountered at Lismore.

According to a statement issued by the PR company, Bance Nolan Ltd on behalf of Waterford County Council, the principal activity at the new facility will involve

recyclable materials including cardboard, paper, metals, plastics and textiles.

"In addition," the statement continues, "the materials recovery facility would provide for the recycling or reclamation of organic substances through composting.

PURCHASE OF ADVANCE **FACTORY**

The local authority will also purchase the factory from IBAL and franchise the operation out to a private firm. The Advance Factory is still owned by the Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) consortium - the group which provided the facility

Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Denis McCarthy said the proposed development at Shandon would represent a "further positive step" towards ensuring that the maximum possible amount of household and commercial waste in the county is recycled or reclaimed.

"The household recycling initiative we began in November 2001 has been very successful at diverting waste from landfill and the next logical step is for the council to develop its own recovery facility through which this waste can be recovered or reclaimed."

The application to the Environmental Protection Agency is very much an initial step in this process but is nonetheless an important move towards building sustainable environmental practice in Co. Waterford," he

It is intended that Dungarvan Town and Waterford County Councils provide the project jointly, and that the building and equipment would then be leased to a private operator who will operate the facility and source markets on behalf of the two local authorities.

Dungarvan Town Council will recoup some 17,000 in rates each year from the private operator, and according to the County Manager 20 full-time positions would be created.

RESERVATIONS REMAIN

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Deputy John Deasy (FG) said he still has reservations regarding the facilities proposed location as well as increased traffic especially at the ring road, and on the manner in which it was presented to the council.

What left a bad taste in the mouth of the councillors who voted against the proposal was the suggestion that we were being anti-recycling. We weren't," he said. "We all support recycling in this county, but we do have reservations about the location, the traffic and manner this was presented."

Referring to Co. Manager, Donal Cornolly's explanation that councillors were first informed about the recycling facility at the housing committee as a "matter of courtesy," Deputy Deasy argued that it should have been a matter of obligation to explain to councillors about the

facility and its implications. He also contended that when it was raised "plans were already in motion".

Five Historic Buoys Restored As Monuments

A total of five historic buoys, which had been consigned to Ballinamuck dump, and were in various stages of disrepair, have been restored and placed as roadside monu-

The idea of restoring the buoys was first publicly floated by Deputy John Deasy (FG), who cited Dungarvan's long maritime history and "the lack of monuments to show it up" as a reason why the buoys should be restored.

The buoys are believed to have been purchased around 113 years ago by the town. Deputy Deasy described the buoys as "antiquities" and suggested that they be used as monuments to the boats, which sank around the coast during the two World Wars.

Two buoys have been placed at the Strandside South roundabout, while three others will be placed at the Youghal Road.

"They look fantastic," Deputy Deasy told the Dungarvan Leader. "Five have been located around the town, and the remaining four are in the Council Yard. All of them have been taken out of the dump."

Deputy Deasy said Dungarvan has a rich maritime history, but has very few monuments to commemorate this fact.

Referring to his suggestion that they commemorate the ships lost at sea, he added that; "If people like them, and you never know with these things, then maybe we could spend a small bit of money and act on it."



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION! understand that if someone dies his/her spouse can continue to receive his/her social welfare payment for a number of weeks afterwards. How long will the payment continue for and what should the spouse do to continue to receive the payment?

ANSWER: If your spouse/partner dies while getting a social welfare payment, the same rate of payment will continue for six weeks provided your late spouse/partner was getting one of the following payments and it included a payment for you: Retirement Pension, Old Age (Contributory/Non-

Contributory) Pension or Pre-Retirement Allowance Unemployment Benefit/Assistance or Supplementary Welfare

Allowance
Disability Benefit/Allowance, Invalidity Pension, Blind

Pension, Injury Benefit or Unemployability supplement. Alternatively, if you are getting Carer's Allowance/Benefit, Retirement Pension, Old Age (Contributory/Non-Contributory) Pension or Blind Pension and your spouse was getting one of the payments listed above, you will be paid six weeks of whatever payment he/she was receiving plus your own payment. From June 2003 this six-week payment after death will be extended to most of the remaining social welfare payments such as Unemployment Benefit/Assistance and Invalidity Pension.

If you are getting a social welfare payment that included a payment for your late spouse/partner, you will continue to receive the same rate of payment for six weeks after his/her death. The six-week payment is normally paid in a lump sum by cheque. To apply for it you should write to the section of the Department of Social and Family Affairs who issue the social welfare payment as soon as possible following the death. You should enclose the death certificate (if available) or a death notice from a newspaper and, if applicable, the payment book. Further information on bereavement is available in the new booklet entitled 'Bereavement' published jointly by Comhairle and the Department of Social and Family Affairs which is available along with other information from the Citizens

TELEPHONE BILLS

Telephone bills can be a major source of worry, If you are in debt you may have to consider getting rid of your telephone altogether to cut down on you expenses. You may, however, have a number of reasons that make it essential for you to have a telephone. In this case it is important to keep it short and if at all possible make it during the cheap rate period.

People are often horrified to receive a large phone bill. There can be several reasons for this. Usually someone close to home is the cause. Teenage children love to talk on the phone to their friends. Even the babysitter may have a boyfriend abroad! Calls to mobile phones, and chat lines can also be very expensive. If you cannot control the use of your phone, you can always have the phone disconnected, and an arrangement made to get incoming calls only. If you feel that disconnection is a bit extreme, you can request an itemised bill, so that you can trace just who is making all those calls from your house! It pays not to ignore a telephone bill even if you cannot afford it. In order to recoup the money owed, legal action may be brought against you by the telephone company. If legal proceedings are brought against you, you may also have to pay legal costs. As with all creditors once you fall into arrears it is important to contact them immediately to explain your situation. We were saddened to hear of the recent deaths of long standing Museum Society members Bridie Whittle and Paddy Walsh and we extend our sympathy to the relatives of both. Paddy Walsh had in the last year or two donated material to the Museum archive on the pub in Grattan Square. Below we give a brief history of Paddy Foley's pub including part of an interview Paddy Walsh gave Tom Tobin. Paddy also compiled a history of Kilnafrehan in 1999.

Paddy Foley's, Grattan Square Griffith's Valuation 1851

records that the house was vacant and it was owned by Charles Hudson and valued at £26. In the sale brochure for the Devonshire Estate in Dungarvan dated 1861. Paddy Foley's Pub and the adjoining 2 houses were sold in one lot. The tenants are described as the 'Reps of John Hudson'. The buildings were leased in 1824 by the 6th Duke of Devonshire to John Hudson Seneschal, for the lives of the lessee, John Hudson then aged 16 years and Alicia Hudson, then aged 10 years, eldest son and eldest daughter of the said lessee.

In 1909 Johanna Browne, widow assigned the premises to her niece Ellen Dunford (daughter of John Dunford of Kilnafrehan) in consideration of the love and affection bourne by the said Johanna Browne for the said Ellen and also in consideration of the services rendered for the past 17 years. The document was witnessed by Michael Halpin, Blacksmith, Bridge Street, and Daniel O'Leary, Law Clerk. John T. Hudson sold his Dungarvan properties in 1915. The sale brochure notes that Paddy Foley paid a yearly rent of £29-10-0.

Interview with Tom Tobin

'Paddy Foley, who made the pub famous, died in 1948, but his wife Ellen kept on the traditions with the assistance of her nephew, Paddy Walsh who became the owner in 1953. When they built the house now known as Paddy Foley's nobody would take it at a rent of £19 a year It could not be leased and for some time it appeared that it would remain vacant, at a time when all houses built by the Duke of Devonshire were being occupied.

There was a Mr Hudson who was his agent and I often heard my aunt and many other folk refer to him as the sheriff. I can remember my aunt saying that Mr. Hudson's sister lived in our house long before we came into it. At that time it was number 11. Now it is number 12 because a house further down was divided into two. As far as I can remember it was Mrs Kelly from Ballinacourty who took over my place, to set up the first public house on the corner. It is interesting to mention that at that time, one could go anywhere to set up a pub if you had a licence was attached to the person and not to a particular house. My grand-aunt, Joanna Dunford of Knockanee? moved in, agreeing to pay the high rent of £19 a year She married a man named Tom Browne, but sad to relate, he didn't live very long and the place became

widely known as Mrs Browne's pub. it was between 1911 &1913 that the place passed from Mrs Browne to my aunt, who married Paddy Foley in 1914. It wasn't long until the place became Paddy Foley's pub. The place did a tremendous business because it was on the corner of the Square close to the Post Office, and even more important it was close to the old fish-market at the corner. It became a favourite haunt of the sea traders. We used to bottle our own whiskey at one time. I remember the label used to say from 70 to 76 proof, but you can't get it anymore. I remember Mrs Foley telling me that around 1917-1919 Paddy Foley had the best whiskey on offer at twenty two shillings a gallon and only three shillings a bottle.

One of the strange points about Paddy Foley's pub is that it is famous throughout West Waterford for the quality of its tea. We had such a good business in the tea trade that we never interfered with it and sold it straight from the chest. We did not blend here. That was done by Punch & Co. Cork. At one time we had a grocery attached to the bar, but that is gone for years now.'

DISABILITY AWARENESS

Mainstreaming - Part 1

The Programme for Government (June 2002) has a commitment to 'include provision for rights of assessment, provision, appeals and enforcement'. The Waterford Disability Network of PwDI, is of the view that there should be a statutory right to an independent assessment of need leading to a Statement of Need, as outlined in the Strategy for Equality.

Mainstreaming Part 1

Mainstreaming is an important mechanism for enabling people with disabilities to participate equally in society. In A Strategy for Equality the Commission recommended that the needs of people with disabilities should be met through mainstreaming.

Meeting the needs of people with disability through mainstreaming requires that a statutory basis be given to mainstreaming in the legislation to ensure that public bodies promote equality of participation in society and the active involvement of people with disabilities in mainstream activities. Mechanisms for achieving mainstreaming include establishing equality objectives, preparing disability strategies to meet these objectives, conducting impact assessments, and ensuring participation and monitoring outcomes for people with disabilities.

In some cases mainstreaming services may be either inadequate or it may be inappropriate to provide services to people with disabilities through mainstream services. Mainstreaming should, therefore, take account of diversity within the range of people with disabilities. Mainstreaming should also operate as part of a dual approach to disability equality through positive action and allowing for the provision of individualized services.

The legislation needs to recognize that by designing services for the services for the majority of the population the effect is to inadvertently discriminate against certain groups by neglecting to recogise, respond to and plan for their particular needs and circumstances.

In order to provide a framework for mainstreaming the DLCG recommends that the legisla: on provide:

- A statutory basis to mainstreaming in the legislation.
- A statutory duty placed on public bodies to promote equality for people with disabilities.
- The active involvement of people with disabilities in mainstreaming activities, including the formation and implementation of laws, policies, regulations, administrative provisions and in the provision of services.

There exists much international best practice on different aspects of equality mainstreaming, including Section 75 of the Northern Ireland Act 1988, and there is substantial experience in the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform in the field of gender mainstreaming.

91 Year Old **Widower Survives** Six Day Ordeal

A 91 year old widower survived for six days and five nights in a cornfield, was last night sitting in a hospital bed at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel sipping a cup of tea, and eating a cut of toast and a boiled egg. The Gardai, civil defence and many rescue teams from many places were involved in the search for Joseph (Joe) Waish, Caherclough, Lisronagh, Clonmel. All those were happy for finding what they feared would be a tragic loss, the mild weather played a part, no frost or rain at night, and the super instincts of a dog called Holly, this man would not have survived. Sgt. Kevin Bowen, Clonmel Garda Station said he could not believe what he saw, grown men crying when they saw him alive. So many people teamed together for the search. Farmers left crops standing in the fields, and people from the whole area were out looking for this man. I was in the next field said Sgt. Bowen when we got a call that 'Holly' handled by Noel Murphy had located him. My heart leapt. It's nothing short of a miracle that this man survived six days and five nights with no food or no water. He was a bit disorientated and dehydrated but was otherwise fine. The first question he asked was the dogs name. K9, a voluntary operation based in Midelton, Co. Cork, their front man and Holly, the dogs trainer, Mick McCarthy said it took the dog a Labrador/Collie cross just 10 minutes to find the missing man who suffers from Alzheimer's disease. It's the eighth time that the dog Holly was called on a search operation, and it was the first time someone was recovered alive.

200,000 Visitors Booked Up For The Fleadh

Over 200,000 people from all over the world have already booked their accommodation for Fleadh Cheoil na hEireann to be held in Clonmel this August. The organising committee for Fleadh Cheoit have sent out an urgent plea to householders in Clonmel and surrounding areas to put their dwellings at their disposal, so that demands for accommodation can be met. The committee require another seventy five houses to meet the list of names they have taken at the moment. The search is not only for houses but single rooms, double rooms, caravans and mobile homes. Hotels, bed and breakfasts and apartments are all completely booked up in Clonmel, with the Fleadh accommodation office having to book accommodation for people in Waterford, Kilkenny, Dungarvan and villages like Ballymacarbry, Ballyporeen, Clogheen, Ardfinnan and many other places. They expect another 100,000 to book that is the reason that houses are urgently needed. Householders in or around Clonmel can earn up to €600 per week.

UNAUTHORISED **CHALLENGE GAMES** HAS TO STOP BEFORE SOMETHING HAPPENS

It appears that the pleas of Bord Officers are falling on deaf ears. In the western end of the county over the past few years there at every single delegate meeting there was a plea made to club delegates to stop playing unauthorised challenge games. It now appears that either the delegates are not listening to the Bord Officers, or they are not bringing the pleas back to their club meetings or else if they are, club selectors are not listening to their club officers.

Within the past two weeks the majority of the clubs in west Waterford have engaged in tour-nament and challenge games where no permission to play the games were obtained. For clubs that organises such games there could be serious consequences if a Bord was to act according to the GAA rulebook. The rulebook states that players who take part in an unauthorised game can be suspended for a number of weeks.

More importantly though is the rule about a player or players who may pick up an injury while playing in an unauthorised tournament or challenge game. If a player was to pick up a serious injury during an unauthorised game the GAA insurance will not cover that game. This would mean that a player who may be entitled to compensation following an injury in such a game could look elsewhere for the money he may be entitled to.

The first people the player would be entitled to get money from are the officers of the club

that organised the game. If compensation could not be got from the officers then the player would be entitled to work down along the line through committee members nad club selectors until he can get the compensation that he would be entitled to.

To get challenge games and tournaments authorised is very simple. Where the teams taking part in games are from the same division the divisional Bord must be informed in writing. Where the teams taking part are from different divisions but in the same county, the county Bord must be informed. If teams are from the same province as the club organising the game their provincial council must be informed, and if teams taking part are from a different province the Central Council must be informed. The only details needed are to name the teams taking part, where the game is been played as well as where and when the game is being played.

For challenge games there is no fee involved to get permission. However for tournaments. where teams are from the same county the fee is euro 12-70 and where teams are from outside the county the fee is euro25-40. The fee is only payable on, to the highest body.



First Half Supremacy By Deise Not Enough

Joe Deane's 23rd minute goal in this half was the killer blow and the one that sent us to the losers dressing room.





JOE & BRENDAN TO RUN IN WORLD GAMES

Next weekend is a red letter day once again for West Waterford athletic club when two of our athletes compete in the World Masters track and field masters championships, which are being held in Carolina, Puerto Rico in South America. The championships will run from July 1st through to 13th.

Talking to both men before their departure last weekend they both are looking forward to the challenge of the next week or so when they will compete against the best in the world at their chosen distances. Brendan will compete in both the 100 metres and the 200 metres over 45, his heats start on Friday 4th July with the 100 and the 200 are on Sunday 6th July. Joe will compete in the over 50 800 metres, his heat will take place on Saturday 5th July with the semi finals on the following day and all going well he will run the final on Tuesday 8th.

Joe is ranked 20th in the world going into these championships, but what a season he has had so far with a list of victories over the last few months, including Munster 1,500 metres indoors 1st, National 800, 400 and 200 metres indoors 1st in all three, Scottish 800 metres indoors 1st, British 800 metre indoor 1st, Munster 800 metres outdoors 1st, Leinster 800 metres outdoors 1st, British 800 meters outdoors 1st, and of course he is the reigning European 800 metres indoors champion.

Joe has only one more goal and that is to reach the final of the 800 metres in these world championships. His training has gone superbly well over the last 6 months with this race in mind, and as he says himself its all now in the lap of the gods.

Both men will, of course, have to run in extremely hot conditions as well as the very strong opposition at these championships where temperatures can reach over 35 degrees with humidity around 75% at this time of year. We wish both athletes the very best and how exciting the prospect that maybe, just maybe we might have a world track medallist in our club come next week.





In a second two bend dash Uifaile Rebel, Johns Junction and Snap Fade were right bang in contention rounding the first turn but keeping wide and out of trouble the Brian Barry owned and Ian Seymour trained Snap Fade (Mustang Jack-Honky Tonk Gal) 3/1 quickened the tempo close home to beat Johns Junction by a head in 16.66.

The Kevin Kennedy owned Smart Stone (Thorgil Tex-Stone Rose) 2/1 ran out a most convincing winner of the fourth event in 29.49. Making maximum use of his early pace Smart Stone had this contest in safe keeping a long way from home and while a rails seeking Skeard Rover got the better of Star Prince for the minor placings the runner up finished all of ten and a half lengths in arrears of Smart Stone.

In a competitive seventh race Giglis Storm took an absolute flyer from trap four to motor into a clear lead over Greenview Bonus (Bonus Prince-Greenview Beauty) but the latter running for County Wexford owner Eamon Furlong gradually reeled in the leader and in an exciting finish 3/1 shot Greenview Bonus stayed on strongly up the rails to shed her maiden tag by half a length in 29.54.






