High Court Review Sought Into Multi Million Shopping Centre Go-Ahead

A local resident, Collette O'Connell, of 4, Davis Street, Dungarvan, has applied for a Judicial Review by the High Court into An Bord Pleanala's decision to grant planning permission for the construction of a multi-million euro shopping centre on a site formerly owned by Glanbia.

The application, lodged by don, Co. Cork, was dated the 9th of July and was lodged with the High Court on Friday last.

> The application seeks to quash An Bord Pleanala's decision in May to grant permission for the demolition of five habitable houses on O'-Connell Street, and for the construction of a range of facilities including an anchor shopping store, apartments, restaurants, and a multiscreen Cineplex.

Ms. O'Connell is making the application on a numbers of grounds including that An Bord Pleanala's decision was made contrary to the requirements of the Planning and Development Acts 2000 to

She also contends that An Bord Pleanala's decision was contrary to the requirements of two listed Council directives, and contrary to fair procedures, and/or natural justice. Ms. O'Connell will say the respondent (An Bord Pleanala) failed to notify the National Roads Authority (NRA) of the proposal by the developers to significantly increase the volume of traffic entering onto a national road and to place a roundabout on the N25 contrary to regulations. And, that the respondent imposed a condition on the developers to pay half the cost of the roundabout without consulting with the NRA about funding the cost of the remainder.

Ms. O'Connell will also say the respondent was unaware of the complete planning history of the site, and accordingly a decision was made without due consideration of all the relevant facts.

She will rely as well on the grounds, that the Environmental Impact Statement was defective in that it did not deal with all the likely significant effects on the environment, and contrary to planning directives mitigation measures were not proposed.

The application to seek a judicial review is to come before the High Court on the 28th of July, and will include six sworn and lengthy exhibits, listed as exhibits A to

Put a cast-iron pot over a flame to become hot and preheat the oven to 300°F/150°C/gas mark

Rub the pork all over with a little fat or oil. Add the dripping to the

hot-pot, allow to smoke slightly and put in the pork loin. Turn and burn the meat for several minutes until the skin turns gold. Lift on to a plate.

Tip off most of the fat and discard, pour in the Pernod and wine. Allow to bubble together, using a whisk to pick up the brown bits at the bottom of the pot. Return pork to the pot and tuck the fennel, tomatoes, garlic, bay and thyme sprigs around it. Spoon over some of the meat juices, and sprinkle with fennel

Put pieces of lemon peel among the vegetables and squeeze lemon juice over everything. Bring the pot up to a



moderate heat, put on the lid and place in the oven. Cook for 2-21/2 hours, turning the meat once during this time.

Serve the pork carved into thick slices, with the vegetables around it, plenty of juices and plain boiled potatoes.

Cinnamon cream with oranges

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 10 mins

A SPICY, fruity summer dessert with rich cream.

INGREDIENTS (Serves 5-6)

450ml double cream 450 milk

100g caster sugar

1 tsp cinnamon

2-3 tsp powdered gelatin

5-6 oranges, peeled, pith removed

2 tblsp caster sugar

Fresh mint to decorate

For the cinnamon cream, bring the cream, milk, sugar and cinnamon to the boil, then remove from the heat. Mix the gelatin with two to three tablespoons of water and warm gently until dissolved.

Add to the cinnamon cream and mix. Divide the mixture among size one ramekins and leave in the fridge overnight to set.

Segment the oranges and place on a baking tray. Sprinkle with caster sugar and place under a very hot grill for three to four minutes until caramelised.

To serve, dip the base of each ramekin in hot water and turn out putting onto a plate.

Arrange the orange segments around and decorate with mint.



LIAM LYNCH COMMEMORATION

ON KNOCKMAELDOWNS ON SUNDAY JULY 27th

On July 27th at 3pm on the slopes of the Knockmealdown mountains over looking the vil-lages of Newcastle and Goatenbridge and the scenic Suir Valley, General Liam Lynch Commander in Chief of Irish Republicans forces will be commemorated. Lynch was fatally wounded there in April 1923. A monument worthy of such a prominent leader marks the place where he fell. The Executive of the Liam Lynch memorial have organised the 80th anniversary ceremonies. The President of the Irish Bardic Federation John J. Hassett will deliver the oration. Mr. Paddy Power will mark the bi centernary of Robert Emmett with a short tribute to his role in Irish history.

Liam Lynch a native of Angelsboro County Limerick was a leading activist and military leader in the co ordinated comprehensive, cultural, political and physical force movements, that forced the British Empire to call a truce and negotiate terms of settlement with the Irish people dur-ing the later half of 1921. In the Treaty that emerged and the divisions that arose, Liam Lynch emerged as a mediator. His prime objective was to preserve national unity. He pursued this role which almost alienated him from the more impetuous members, who occupied the Four Courts, an action he opposed.

It is ironic that the attack on the Four Courts by Free State forces led to the Civil War, that immediately followed. Lynch was not in the Four Courts. For his counter part Ml. Collins then battling with elements within the Free State Government, the attack on the Four Courts trapped him also into a difficult position. Tragically both men of greatness, fell in their prime of life. On different sides in a conflict that both did their best to avoid. The political power seekers on both sides, much more than the military men, that created the crisis, that led to civil war and Lynch and Collins deaths.

It is right that on a Mid Summer Sunday July 27th next, that people across the age spectrum will gather to proudly remember a chieftain of the Irish nation, who died defending the Irish Republic, not as an armchair General in a safe bunker, but in the front line of action. As a man of principal, motivated by patriotism and driven by his love of national freedom, Lynch died with generous words to all fellow Irish people. He was a man of faith and belief in God who had a duty to fulfil and he did it without fear or favour. Time, history and proper research into his role in the making of the new Ireland of his time, will give him due credit for his major contribution that revisionists historians and sham nationalists, conspire to prevent through their propaganda.

CHILDCARE COSTS AFFECTING FAMILIES IN DUNGARVAN AREA SAYS LABOUR COUNCILLOR

Childcare costs are continuing to undermine people's ability to participate in the workforce. That's a claim made by Dungarvan area Labour Party Councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair.

He says his contacts with parents throughout communities in west Waterford on the issue bears out the accuracy of the III Irish Congress of Trade Unions (ICTU) estimation that the average industrial working parent spends up to a quarter of their income on childcare. Cllr. O Ceilleachair says that if regions like Dungarvan and west Waterford are to prosper in productive economic terms, those influencing society must be more conscious of the need to ease what he says is a burden on many young families.

Reacting to a recent study by the Economic and Social Research Institute (ERSI) on what they have found to be soaring childcare costs, Cllr. O Ceilleachair said:

"I know women, in particular, in the localities I represent who have had to contemplate giving up their jobs and stay in the home due to the cost of childcare being a heavy expense on top of all the other cost of liv-

ing considerations. The fact that rising childcare costs, one'd many such women may not appear on the official labour statistics when returning to the home could actually mean that the unemployment rate is higher than formally recognised among females. If it were men - rather than women - who were the principal losers due to

The fact that we have a social partnership model and that local authorities - through such things as the Waterford County Childcare Iniative - are also increasing their focus on such areas allows society the potential to devote more resources to helping people out. 

Follow these top tips on how to make a gardener's paradise out of barely enough space to swing a

But they do have their advantages - because they are surrounded by houses, they are sheltered from harsh wind and rain. 

Plant Madonna lilies

This is the ideal time to plant Lilium condidum, the Madonna lily. It differs from almost all other lilies in making quite a lot of new growth in late summer, and it should be planted before this starts. Another peculiarity is that the bulbs grow practically on the surface. You should plant them 20cm apart and only cover them with 5cm of soil. After a while they will probably work themselves out until they show; make no attempt to cover them again. This lily prefers a sunny position and reasonably good, but not freshly manured, ground.

ift daffodils and bulbous irises Daffodils and narcissi, also the various

bulbous irises, will now have completed their growth and may be lifted and cleaned off if they are overgrown or you need the ground for something else. Otherwise leave them undisturbed for another year. They do not gain anything by annual lifting and drying, as do tulips and hyacinths. If you do lift them, get them replanted as soon as possible and certainly before the end of Sept.

Cut back helianthemums

Sun roses tend to get rather straggly if left to their own devices, but if cut back a little each year at about this time they can be kept quite neat and tidy. You can do the work with a large pair of scissors or garden shears.





WHICH PLANTS LIVE IN WATER

Some plants live completely under the water. Some float on the surface. Others grow in the water of ponds or on the banks of rivers and are partly covered by water. The plant Elodea (pondweed) has a long, strong underwater root which is anchored to the waterbed. The stem and the leaves, which are on the surface, are thin, so that they are able to resist the wind without being "uprooted"! The Water Lily floats on water. The floating leaves have the stomata on the upper part exposed to the air.

WATER PLANTS

The flower of the Water Lily closes during the night and opens out at dawn. The water Chestnut has floating leaves. Its spiny fruit looks rather like the seedcase of a horse chestnut. The Water Buttercup (or Water Crowfoot) has yellow flowers and long, pointed leaves.

THE WATER LILY

This plant flourishes near pools and lakes. The Fanwort grows around Swamps. It has sausage-like flowers on a stalk which can be up to 2.5m long.



THINGS TO DO

Want to see a plant breathing underwater? Put a water-plant in a jar full of water. Place a piece of card on top, then, holding the card in place upturn the vase. Place the whole thing in a basin full of water. Slide out the cardboard carefully and put the basin and the


jar in full sunlight. After a while, you will see lots of bubbles in the vase. These are bubbles of oxygen produced by the plant.

FACTS AND FIGURES

There are at least 4000 species of red seaweed, 1500 species of brown seaweed and 6000 green seaweed. Some seaweeds of the Pacific Ocean grow a good 45 cm each day, reaching approx. 60m in length. Green and brown seaweed's live at depths of no more than 25m, because they need sunlight Red seaweed can live with very little light at depths more than 100m.

WHAT ARE SEAWEEDS?

Seaweeds are very simple plant organisms, which live in the sea and in fresh water. Some seaweed are microscopic. These, together with tiny little water creatures called plankton, are food for fish. Many-celled seaweeds are anchored to the depths by a rhizoid, which is like a



small, climbing root. Some species are sprinkled with small "blisters' full of air, so they can remain upright in the water

Red and brown seaweed's live in salt water, green seaweed mostly in fresh water.



Growing Fears Over Gaeltacht's **Future Status**

Fears for An Rinn's designation as a Gaeltacht are mounting due to a growing number of housing developments in the area, and the perceived danger to its status from a possible influx of non-lrish speakers.

Concerns first arose following Eamon O Cuiv's recommendation in 2000 that areas with a population of less than ten percent speaking Irish on a daily basis would no longer be designated as a Gaeltacht

This led to further worries over claims that the zoning for housing had been increased per acre in an amended Action Area Plan for Ring-Helvick-Old Parish – which was adopted by Waterford County Council in

At the time, some residents said the zoning would allow housing estates to be formed where they never existed be-

In the plan, environmental planners - CAAS said the area is not in any immediate danger of losing its designation, but warns against over-develop-

It goes on to state that, "largescale development to accommodate non-Irish speakers

Gaeltacht designation."

The controversy over the Action Area Plan arose following claims that zoning for housing per acre had been increased from the original recommendation made by the plans architects - CAAS Environmental Services Ltd.

INAPPROPRITATE TO COMMENT ON ZONING CLAIMS

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Helen O'Keeffe of CAAS, said it would be "inappropriate" for her to disclose the zoning originally recommended by her environmental

Describing the original zoning as part of a discussion draft, she said; "The public representatives made the decision that the zoning in the draft should not go into the public domain at that time. So it would be inappropriate for me to comment on

Council officials and the elected representatives examined the discussion drafts, and could result in the loss of Ms. O'Keeffe said she believed

that it was entirely fair for the final say on the zoning to lay with the public representatives.

However, according to one local resident who contacted the Dungarvan Leader following the publication of a series of photographs detailing development of housing in the area, the original action plan was supported by the vast majority of people living in a rural Gaeltacht area.

The local resident contends that an amendment to the action plan, which he claims increased residential zoning effectively "diluted" the entire document; "and the results can be seen in the photographs with numerous private housing estates in progress at present in the rezoned areas.

INCREASED POPULATION

According to the 2002 Census, the Ring Gaeltacht has seen an increase in population of 91 people between 1996 and 2002. However, this period does not fully take into the account the impact of the Action Area Plan, which is understood

to only have come into force in 2002. The number of Gaeltacht speakers as a percentage of the total population of the area is also the second highest in the country - but the key area of speaking Irish on a daily basis is one of the lowest percentages in the country standing just above the Gaeltachts in Meath and Mayo.

While the percentage of the Irish speakers remains well above the cut off limit, the Gaeltachts small population base - the lowest of all eight Gaeltachts at 1,388 - leaves it at greatest danger to dips in its percentage arising from "largescale development"



The Science of Farming and Food

TILLAGE: Maize

Maize crops are quite variable with the early sown crops under plastic cover being 'waist high on the first of July', exceeding the traditional benchmark of 'knee high' for that date. Mid April to early May sown crops without plastic cover have very little between them in growth stage as the April sowings were subjected to a prolonged period of wet weather until early May.

Weed control has been less that satisfactory in many situations, the primary reason being that post emergence weed control was a considerable period of time after planting so as not to put any further stress on the maize crop. Consequently weeds were at an advanced stage with a subsequent drop off in the level of control achieved. Scutch levels have being increasing in maize fields and realistically the most effective method of control is treatment with glyphosate 2-3 weeks pre ploughing.

SETASIDE MANAGEMENT

(i) Green cover must be cut at least once during from the 16th July to 15th August 2003 to a height of 10 cm (4 inches) or less. The cuttings must be left on the land and turning or baling of the cuttings is not permitted.

(ii) Grass cover established on setaside land and treated with herbicides to reduce herbage production must have the treated herbage, including any re-growth, topped and managed in accordance with the conditions specified in relation to green cover at (i) above.

(iii) Ploughing of setaside land is permitted from 16 July to prepare land for sowing of crops for harvesting not earlier than 15 May 2004

GRAIN ASSURANCE

The Irish Grain Assurance Scheme (IGAS) has established minimum standards for growing, handling, storage and transport of grain. This aims to ensure that grain produced and processed by members of the Scheme meets these standards.

Assured ingredients are an essential link in the traceability chain and allow positive promotion of native grain and enhance the image of the Irish grain sector. Non assured grain will have limited markets. More of the grain markets, and especially exports to the North, either in bulk or as compound feeds must be

Milk protein content was increased relative to last year by an average of 0.05%. This increase continued into June (see below). However average milk protein content fell in mid June, but still remained ahead of last year. Average and pre-grazing covers have tended to be higher than necessary on the Monitor Farms during June. This has led to extended rotations and a decline in grass quality.

SUPERMARKET LAMB PRICES-PART OF CONSUMER RIP OFF -IFA

In a survey of retail lamb prices in the main supermarket groups, the Irish Farmers' Association has found that supermarkets are taking margins as high as 100% on retail over wholesale prices.

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman Michael Looby has said this survey proves that the pricing practices of the powerful supermarket groups are totally unacceptable and geared at achieving the maximum possible margin for

"It also proves that the powerful supermarkets have jumped on the consumer price rip off that is now so apparent across so many sectors in Ireland".

Mr. Looby said the high price, high profit practices of the supermarkets was turning off consumers in the consumption of a natural high quality meat such

Mr. Looby pointed out that farmers are currently receiving 3.64/kg carcase weight for lamb from the meat factories. The factories slaughter and

process the carcase and lamb cuts for sale to the supermarkets. He said typical wholesale prices charged by the factories to the supermarkets are 10.00/kg for loin chops,

5.00/kg for legs. Based on the IFA survey, supermarkets are charging consumers over double the wholesale price, with an average loin chop price of 19.50/kg and an average lamb leg price of 11.20/kg.

Mr. Looby said this is an extraordinarily high price mark up, and even taking account of the retail trim, waste and packaging, cannot be justified. He said clearly the supermarkets are into taking as much as they can get off consumers for lamb

The Waterford IFA Sheep farmer's leader said the excessively high prices being charged by the supermarkets are damaging lamb consumption among consumers. He said the supermarkets could well afford to sell lamb at retail prices of at least 30% lower and still make a very good margin. Mr. Looby said, "lower retail prices would seriously boost consumption and benefit both consumers and producers".

The IFA lamb price survey was carried out on June 30th and July 1st at 13 locations across the country from the West, the Midlands and the Dublin area.

€141 MILLION BANK RIP-OFF OF FARMERS

Dutch farmers have access to credit at less than half the cost paid by Irish farmers. European Central Bank figures show business interest rates at 3.3 per cent in Holland compared to 7.7 per cent in Ireland.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of the ICMSA said that this is official confirmation of a massive and unbelievable rip-off of farmers and business generally by Irish banks. The European Central Bank figures are in agreement with similar figures released by Eurostat, the official agency for statistics within

"It is unbelievable that this wide gap in interest rates is allowed to operate despite the introduction of the Euro. What is our Central Bank of Ireland doing? The Central Bank of Ireland is represented on the Board of the European Central Bank at the highest level. What are the Government Departments doing about this? It would seem that the Competition Authority is more concerned to abolish the Groceries Order than to do the real business of bringing real competition to bear in Irish markets generally," said Mr

ICMSA has formally written to the Central Bank to urge them to take action on these unsustainable interest rates being charged by Irish banks. In the meantime ICMSA advice to farmers is to shop around and that lower rates are available from banks than the normal rates automatically applied by banks.

Last week we got a present of a nice book for the archive. It's "Strattens' Dublin, Cork and South of Ireland" published by Stratten and Stratten, London 1892.

It's a beautiful old book in good condition and runs to about 330 pages. Abbeyside doesn't get a mention but Dungarvan is represented by Merrick & Ruddell, Irish Woollen Hall, Dungarvan and William Lawlor, Family Grocer, Tea and Wine Importer, O'Connell Street, Dungarvan.

While R. and F. Keane, Cappoquin Foundry, Co. Waterford have a full page devoted to their wares.

Another Iron Founder well represented is Benjamin Graham who supplied the lovely cast iron street names for Dungarvan and also the bollards on the Quay, some of which still bear his name and year of manufacture.

All in all this book is a most valuable addition to your archive and we thank the donor for thinking of us.

This Sunday evening Ann Allridge will be at the Parish Office minding the above book and all the other treasures.

OUR LOCALITY IN 1845

In those times the horse was the centre of transport on land. There were 8 blacksmiths in the town and one in Abbeyside as well as 4 saddlers, one tanner, 7 wheelwrights, 4 rope-makers but there was not one coach - maker in the town then.

In 1846 there were 2 spirit dealers and 48 public houses in Dungarvan and 6 public houses in Abbeyside. The importance of barrels for beer, spirits and other occupations is reflected in the number of coopers - 13 who were all living in the town.

The buttercrane was at the end of the Main Street at the Old Market house, which was under the supervision of Beresford Boate Esq. of Tournore. Here the farmers sold their butter, of course, Boate did not attend at the crane but employed some men to do so, while he kept most of the money charged and paid the men as little as possible.

There were three local butter merchants and an agent for Donnell & Appleby, an out of town butter merchant. This testifies to the importance of the dairy business in the farms in the surrounding countryside.

STRANGE INTERPRETATION

I think Mr. Callanan has missed the point completely. His interpretation of what I wrote after the Munster Final was strange to say the least. I did not take issue with the fact that Cork supporters living in Waterford would in all likelyhood be getting their tickets from sources in Waterford which would be in the section of stand or terrace designated for Waterford supporters. This "cross colouring" is normal. Many of our club supporters, members and indeed committee members are Cork supporters . 

Cost Of Promenade For Clonea Prohibiti

The cost of a promenade for Clonea is prohibitive and it is a project unlikely to be advanced for the next thirty years, according to County Engineer, John O'Flynn in answer to a request from Cllr. Tom Higgins (FG).

The request arose following a debate on the realignment of the road from the Coast Road at Clonea Cross to Clonea Hotel. The realignment, eventually approved by members of the council will

avoid housing in the area, Mr. O'Flynn said, but will require a compulsory purchase order being drawn up for the purchase of land in the area.

Cllr. Higgins said the realignment seemed like a reaction to the application for a new hotel in the area - a claim refuted by Mr. O'Flynn - and called for free carking to be provided at Clonea through the construction of a promenade.

He also claimed there was no access to the beach for the disabled and the elderly, and that if someone "dropped dead" on the beach, ambulances had no access to it.

Mr. O'Flynn replied that a promenade would cost somewhere between eur5 and 10 million, and is a project unlikely to happen for the next thirty years.

He also said the realignment would be limited, and they would be staying as close as possible to the existing road. The move to realign the road has "for years" been urged by the Gardai, he said. The Gardai, he added, have been concerned about road access for emergency

Willie MacDonnell (FG) said road signs were being blocked by growth, and some roads, which were ten metres wide, had closed to seven metres with the growth of hedges.

Landowners are prohibited from cutting their hedges during the nesting season, and at its recent meeting, Waterford County Council decided to call on the Department of Environment to allow roadside hedges to be cut back.

Cllr. Nora Flynn (FG) appealed for the measure to be taken, having highlighted the danger to human life. While saying she loved birds, she said human safety sudden be taken as the priority and called for the "ridiculous" regulation to be removed.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said he agreed with the views of the councillors, but warned that the council would be prosecuted if it cut hedges during the period of April to the end of August.

€58,000 "Golden" **Harvest Sculpture Turning Green**

A 20 ft sculpture, Golden Harvest, which was officially unveiled last November, is already looking shoddy and in need of a lick of paint, according to local councillor, Tom Cunningham (FF).

The sculpture cost in the region of €58,000 under the one per cent for art scheme, and was commissioned to mark the development of the N-25 realignment at Kilmacthomas.

However, according to Cllr. Cunningham, the sculpture, which depicts individual strands of wheat, "is in need of a lick of paint" and joked that "a bit manure" may help make it look a bit healthier.

Cllr. Cunningham said it looked nothing like it did when it was first installed near Mahon Bridge, and the golden sheafs appear to have turned green.

Replying, County Manager, Donal Connolly said the golden sheafs were made of copper, and in a similar way to other art features and copper-roofed churches, it had turned green, as a result of the weather.

However, Mr. Connolly said this process was "part of the artists concept".

"His concept was that it would be like the surrounding golden fields turning green." Clearly unimpressed by the concept, Cllr. Cunningham - a Stradbally based farmer - said that he had "never seen anything go like that in a field."

Insurance Increase And Overspending Sinks Council Deeper Into The Red

Waterford County Council's increasing insurance bill and overspending on projects, particularly on roads, has left the local authority with a deficit of just over a million euros.

According to the draft Annual Financial Statement 2002, drawn up by Chief Financial Officer, Paul Clerkin, the accounts show a deficit of over 350,000 euros on day to day operations, and with the transfer to reserves to finance capital projects of eur711, 908 this brings the overall deficit to eur1.062 million.

There was also an increase of eur709, 000 in monies owed to the Council at year end, which leaves a net deficit for the year of eur353, 000, the report says.

"This deficit occurred on Local Road Upkeep, Water Supply Maintenance - where a number of serious breaks occurred - an increase in callouts for the Fire Service and significant increases in insurance premiums," he said.

Mr. Clerkin said while the deficit looked extremely serious, it did not take into account the monies owed to Waterford County Council, which would substantially reduce the deficit, and give a truer picture of the local authorities financial position.

He also said insurance costs, which began to spiral two years ago, had not, as he had expected come down, and the local authorities premiums remain high.

Proposal To Introduce Legislation For 40% Female Local Election Candidates

Department of the Environment and Local Government to call for the introduction of legislation so that 40% of nominees standing at local elections are female.

The notice of motion was made following a recommendation made at a previous meeting of the council by Dr. Anne Marie McGauran of the NDP Gender Reform.

Cllr. Mary Green (FG) making a detailed proposal said Dr. McGauran's presentation to the council was sidetracked in the media by some of the comments made at the meeting.

However, comments apparently made by Cllr. Green on WLR FM prior to the meeting, angered some of the members when she said some of the members were inarticulate. Cllr. James Tobin (FF) called for the remarks to be withdrawn.


The issue was made all the more contentious through the fact that Fianna Fail had already held its selection convention at which Cllr. Nuala Ryan - the party's only female represenative railed to be nominated. Clir. Pat Daily (FF) pointed out that the party couldn't hold the convention again to adhere to the proposal.

Mayor Ciaran O Riain (FF) said there are no barriers to women putting their names forward but they did not do so.

"It's up to women themselves, to put their names forward or not," he said.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF), however, said that as she knew well, putting your name forward did not guarantee selection.

Due to the tenure of some of the speeches made, there was confusion over whether there was an amendment opposing the proposal. Cllr. Green went so far as to call for a roll-call vote while other councillors on the opposition benches called for a show of hands, only for Cllr. He said the collector had collected in areas where the council had never done, and appealed for the council to come to his assistance and those of his customers.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy said the council has bought a small waste truck to access the areas where the larger truck was unable to access, and said 500 new customers were taken on, but to provide a viable service 1000 customers were necessary. They are due to advertise this service in the local newspapers, and are hopeful of a good response.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I hope to start a course next September. Could you please tell me who is eligible for the Back to Education Allowance?

The Back to Education Allowance (BTEA) is paid by the Department of Social, and Family Affairs (DSFA to unemployed people, lone parents and people with disabilities who wish to do approved second or third level courses of education. To be eligible for the allowance you must be:

Aged 21 or over (24 or over for a postgraduate course) and for the previous 6 months have been receiving a social welfare payment such as Unemployment Assistance/Benefit or One-Parent Family Payment.

Aged 18 or over and for the previous 6 months have been receiving a disability payment such as Disability Allowance or Invalidity Pension (receiving a disability Benefit for 3 years)

Aged 18 to 20, out of formal education for 2 years and for the previous 6 months have been receiving One-Parent Family Payment or Unemployment Assistance/Benefit.

An adult dependant of someone who is eligible may qualify if a Qualified Adult Allowance is in payment. Periods spent on employment schemes, training courses and in prison may count towards the 6-month qualifying period.

Courses you can attend include full-time second level courses certified by the Department of Education and Science (DES) or approved by the Further Education and Training Awards Council (FETAC), such as the Leaving Certificate or a Post Leaving Certificate course, and full-time third level courses approved by DES for its maintenance grant schemes or courses which have Higher Education and Training Awards Council (HETAC) recognition.

When you have been accepted for a course you should apply to DSFA for the allowance on Form BTE 1. You will be paid the allowance instead of your social welfare payment at a rate equivalent to the maximum of your current social welfare payment. If you were previously getting an unemployment payment, the BTEA will not be paid during the summer period between academic years. Those who had been receiving other payments will continue to receive the BTEA during the summer. Further information is available from the Citizens Information Centre below.

DISABILITY DISABILITY Mainstreaming - Part 2

The Programme for Government (June 2002) has a commitment to 'include provision for rights of assessment, provision, appeals and enforcement'. The Waterford Disability Network of PwDI (People with Disabilities in Ireland) is of the view that there should be a statutory right to an independent assessment of need leading to a Statement of Need, as outlined in the Strategy for Equality.

Mainstreaming Part 2:

The Disability legislation should be implemented both through mainstreaming mechanisms and a statutory duty on public bodies to disability proof and promote equality for people with disabilities. This should cover all policies, plans and programmes of public bodies and would also include:

Σ Government Department and Statutory Agency Strategy Statements, Business Plans and Customer Action Plans required under the Public Service Management Act 1987. This should include monitoring and reporting requirements.

- Annual Reports of the Controller and Auditor-General
- Health Board Service Plans and Annual Reports
- Local government and City and County Development Board Strategies and Annual Reports
- Public procurement procedures and tendering, service agreements and contracts between public bodies and other providers, including Annual Reports of providers.

In addition, each public body should, as part of their overall strategy statement, develop a disability strategy for complying with the legislation and produce an annual progress report on progress in implementing the disability strategy. It is recommended that these annual progress reports will be submitted to the Equality Authority who will have the power to require public bodies to take action to comply with their obligations under disability legislation.

National Action Plans on Social Inclusion, which the Government has to submit to the EU every three years, should include a national strategy for complying with the disability legislation and a progress report on the status of implementation of the disability legislation.

In order to promote good practice a system of disability monitoring and disability awards for services provided by public and private bodies, voluntary and non-statutory agencies should also be introduced. This should be undertaken by the NDA as provided for in the National Disability Authority Act,

It is important that the legislation also specifies that positive action or individualized provision is still possible and may be necessary in order to equalize opportunities and participation. To be continued next week - Accessibility Part 1



It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mrs. Kathleen McMahon (nee Fitzpatrick), Abbey Road, Clonmel which sad event took place at Melview Nursing Home, Clonmel. In the late forties, she married Billy McMahon who was serving in Kickham Barracks at the time, and they initially lived with her mother in Cashel Road before they moved to a newly built housing estate at Abbey Road. They reared a family of twelve, seven boys and five girls. Recalling their childhood the family have happy recollection of walking up to the Holy Year Cross with their parents and the many picnics they had at Cary's Castle and in Russelstown. And with so many mouths to feed she was continuously cooking and baking, her delicious apple tarts barely out of the oven when they were devoured. Noted for her knitting skills, she was particularly adept in making Aran sweaters and cardigans which were always in demand.

Most of the Fitzpatrick family had moved to Bolton in England with just Kathleen and her sister Ron remaining in Clonmel. Some fifteen years ago her brother Tony returned from England to look after their mother who lived in Collins Row, Old Bridge. Sadly Billy passed to his reward in 2002, having just two years previously had a wonderful fiftieth wedding anniversary celebration at Allens, Irishtown with Kathleen surrounded by all her family.

For the past five years Kathleen's health has been declining, but she never complained smiling and joking. Admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital she spent eight weeks there before being transferred to Melview Nursing Home, Clonmel where she died peacefully two weeks later with her family by her side.

Her remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish church, Irishtown where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. O' Brien C.C. One Step Away From History

On Sunday evening last Waterford and Kildare served up a thriller to all present at Walsh Park. Indeed many agreed that the first half was as exciting a contest as they had witnessed all year in any sporting discipline. Both sides traded scores, blocked, tackled and ran for all their worth.

It is fair to say that the final score did not do Kildare justice but a rock solid Waterford defence conceded only one point in the second moeity and ensured The Déise girls reached the Championship decider.

Waterford registered their first score in the second minute, a fine point from full forward Aine Lyng. Kildare's reply was swift with Susan O'-Carroll raising a white flag. From the resultant puck out goalkeeper Aisling O'Brien found Emma Hannon who fielded brilliantly passed to Lyng who coolly slipped over her second point. In the eighth minute Ciara Mooney pointed for Kildare and this was quickly followed by a Susan Carroll goal for The Lilywhites.

However the Waterford forwards were keeping the play well spread out with corner forwards Aine Breatnach and Kate Heneghan maintaining their po-

Waterford breezed into the Munster Senior Ladies Football final for the 17th consecutive season and it would be a brave person that would bet against them capturing the 11th title on the evidence of their demolition of both Kerry and Cork in the last 2 weeks. More importantly they have also qualified for the All Ireland quarter finals on Saturday 30th August.

This is a team progressing nicely on this occasion it was Cork who got the whirlwind start but Waterford recovered to hit the front on 12 minutes and were subsequently never in any danger, shooting a magnificent tally of 2-18. In the first attack of note in the 4th minute, Cork's corner forward Susan Power availed of a defensive angle to shoot the opening goal, a real tonic for the youthful 'Rebels'.

Two minutes later Aine Wall pointed a 35 metre free but Cork threatened again and Waterford keeper Sarah Hickey pulled off a magnificent point blank save 3 minutes later. Aine Wall landed another point before Waterford were awarded a penalty in the 12th minute which Aoife Murphy expertly converted. Cork's livewire attacker Breige Corkery paid the price for pulling Waterford defender Annlisa Crotty upfield on the 15th when Crotty shot a great point, although Corkery cancelled it out on 17 minutes as Waterford led 1-3 to 1-1.

Mary O'Donnell was turning in another magnificent performance at midfield and Mary O'Rourke twice availed of good possession to shoot points. Valerie Mulcahy replied for Cork but Waterford finished the half very strongly. A half a dozen good passes put Aoife Murphy through and she bagged their second goal. Martina O'Ryan pointed, Rebecca Hallahan landed another great long range effort before Annlisa Crotty again raced upfield to score a beauty and Waterford led 2-8 to 1-2 at the interval.

That second quarter saw Waterford's defence really came to terms with the Cork attack. This will be the first time in history that the runners-up in Munster and Leinster will have met in the All-Ireland senior hurling championship and it is expected that the meeting of Wexford and neighbours Waterford who will clash for their first time ever in championship, will attract a full house to the Kilkenny venue on the coming Saturday evening..

There are complaints about the game not being fixed for Thurles for accommodation reasons because Nolan Park in comparison to Semple;e Stadium has a minus 20,000 capacity and as a consequence the scramble for tickets will continue all this week.

The attendance will not compare with the 53,000 Munster final or the 48,000 Leinster final but it certainly will be big enough to fill the Kilkenny city venue.

For both counties this a "death or glory" event as defeat will end the losers interest in the championship until 2004. This will ensure a fight to a finish and a rip roaring contest.

Wexford defeated Offaly rather decisively in the Leinster semi-final and although decisively beaten by the All Ireland champions, Kilkenny in their provincial final, Wexford were in the game with a big chance with 9 minutes remaining and had been level with Kilkenny at the break.

In our meetings in the national league there has never been more than a score or two between our counties and it is not likely to be much different here. The Wexford county secretary Michael Kinsella stated on Friday evening last that and the few minor injuries picked up in the Leinster final will not keep and of the regulars off the team.

I have not heard of any injuries serious enough to keep any of the Waterford panel from being ready and available but at the same time I won't be surprised if the naming of the team is delayed. The Result?

The public perception of the contest is that Waterford got the opposition that they had hoped for in the draw. In other words the view of our supporters is that we have a better chance of defeating Wexford, than we would have had, if the draw had thrown up, Tipperary, Gal-

My own opinion is that a lot will depend on the line out and the sideline strategy. I believe that the movement of players from one position to another during the game, undermines their confidence and therefore there should be as little of this as possible.

I believe that we have the potential to beat Wexford and I expect that we will beat them if everything goes right for us. If we lose it will be a disappointment and a setback for us..

It is not anticipated that the attendance will be over 30,000 and therefore the ticket problem will not be as great as it was for the Munster final (when the talk about stand tickets overshadowed the talk about the game). The national average at 'qualifier' matches is 20,000

It was recently announced that over a 2 year period, a total of 3.7 million was collected from the sale of tickets by Website and Ticket Master. These tickets are made available through these outlets after counties demands are met and satisfied. They do not apply to All Ireland finals.

PERSONAL ACCIDENT SCHEME

Although the latest figures published show that the numbers have increased from 18,000 to 20,000 in the Scheme, the situation is still considered to be very unsatisfactry and a further and final appeal is made to all counties to encourage players to avail of the additionsal benefits that are on offer in the scheme..

Here in Waterford only 18 of the 52 clubs are joined the scheme. Only 8 are in West Waterford.

Of the 32 counties we are by far the lowest. The figures for Munster are - Cork 3,512; Tipperary 808; Kerry 746; Limerick 524; Clare 214; Waterford 113.

Club Championships

The senior and many of the divisional championships are still 'on hold' as we continue in the All Ireland senior hurling series. If we win on Saturday in Nolan Park we will be in action again two weeks later so there will be no activity on the home front before August

The intermediate hurling and under 21 football versus Cork at the end of the month in Walsh Park are also causing problems with the senior fixtures.

The Western board met on Monday night to make the draws for their second rounds, but many of the divisional matches cannot be played until after the senior clubs have played their first rounds, so there is a 'knock-on' effect resulting from our intercounty programme.

PETER QUINN UNHAPPY





World Silver Medal For Joe Gough

In the words of Frank Greally (editor of the Irish Runner magazine) "competing for ones country at the highest level of an athletics competition be it European, Olympic or World Games is to enter into a theatre of dreams)." It is every athletes dream to some day compete for ones country at international level and wear your country's singlet and maybe even win a medal - it is the ultimate goal for many. Well that dream became a reality last weekend for one such dreamer, West Waterford's Joe Gough at the World Masters Athletic Championships, which were held over 1000 miles south of Florida in Carolina, Puerto Rico in Southern America. Joe entered that theatre and came out smiling with his and West Waterford's first major championship medal, a world silver in the over 50 Masters 800 metres, rounding off Joe's finest year in his long athletics career.

Joe's involvement in athletics stretches back over four decades, when like so many others he started competing at about age eleven, training in the company of greats like John Tracey and Tony Ryan at the Friary grounds in Dungarvan, which was situated out at the Spring. Then after a period Joe got very interested in boxing as the local club was quite strong in the town at that time. He recalls his first bout in the The-

on to become an All-Ireland Junior boxing champion. At this time in his career Joe was a member of the Garda Siochana, but decided to leave the force running and at vets level (over in 1980 and he became a Youth Development Officer in Waterford City, (a post he still fills) at the tender age of 35 he renewed his interest in athletics.

This was a historical day in an unusual way, as from that date in 1988 until the present he was never beaten over the 800 metres dis-

track Joe continued to progress competing at national and international level up until 1998 when an injury to his big toe threatened his running career. On professional examination Joe was told that he had osteoarthritis in the joint caused by wear and tear. Against the wishes of his doctor Joe went and had the toe operated on, inserting two screws into the joint, he has never looked back!

Following the injury it took Joe many months to regain full fitness both physically and mentally, but this recuperation time gave him time to reflect and he resumed his athletics with a whole new outlook, preparing much better for competition taking proper time to rest. looking after his diet better

His dedication, time effort and persistence has certainly paid off as this year at Munster level he won the 1,500 metres indoors at Nenagh and followed this with a brilliant treble at national level when he won the indoors 200, 400 and 800 titles. He subsequently went on to win the Scottish and British 800 metres indoors and

in the early hours of Sunday, March 9th last in San Sebastian, Spain he was crowned the European 800 metres champion beating the very fancied current European champion Perez Diaz and the European outdoor champion French man Yvoz Levasseur in the final. Joe's winning time was 2.07.89.

Following this excellent achievement Joe was honored by receiving the Park Hotel Sports Star of the Month for March and was also honoured by receiving the Imokilly People Sports Star Award. His form continued to improve after the Europeans and he recorded victories in the outdoors 800 metres at the Munster and Leinster Championships. Then the opportunity arose for Joe to compete in the British Masters outdoor championships in Derby in June. Again the Dungarvan man proved too strong for the best in Britain and he recorded another famous victo-

There was one more agenda on Joe's mind that was a crack at the World 800 metres championships in Puerto Rico, and with the help of the committee and his fellow club members at West Waterford his work colleagues in Waterford, the members of his own family and all his many well wishers and friends, a fund was set up to help Joe with the costs involved in travelling to South America for the championships and the response was terrific, to say the least.

Joe headed off to the Worlds a week in advance of his competition to acclimatise to the very hot and humid conditions in that part of the world. Joe's trip did not go too smoothly either as his bags went missing with all his gear and running shoes in them, but luckily enough within two days they were delivered to his hotel

Joe found conditions in Puerto Rico very humid and he certainly needed the week to find his feet and get used to the very hot weather there. Joe's heat was down for decision on Saturday 5th July, he ran in heat two taking a great second place in a time of 2.09.01 with Kevin Archer of Great Britain winning the heat in 2.07.86. As both Archer and Joe recorded two fastest times in the heats they got automatic entry into the final without having to run the semis. This meant Joe would be that little bit fresher going into the final on Sunday.

The final saw seven different countries represented. England, Ireland, Columbia, Portugal, Germany, Canada and Spain, and after a fast opening lap Carlos Loaiza of Columbia took the lead with 100 to go. Gough found himself slightly



boxed in on the bend with Cabral of Portugal and Archer of Britain (who won Joe's heat), making their move on the outside of Joe and had to come around in the second lane and put the pedal to the metal, passing Archer and Cabral as all four sprinted for the line, fortunately for the Columbian the line came soon enough to hold on for gold, with Gough taking a famous silver from Carbral bronze. The full results were as follows

Speaking to Joe after the event he was overwhelmed by the support he received from all quarters, and had much praise for his coaches in preparing him for the worlds, Dick Murphy of St Paul's, Hugh Parnell of Leevale A.C. Both men helped prepare his training program for the biggest test of his cereer and Derek Parker a senior coach from Glasgow who helped prepare Joe mentally for the challenge. But of course the hard work that Joe himself puts into his chosen sport is an example to all sports people. He now has his just rewards for all those long sessions on the track and all those lonely miles logged over many years. All involved in sport in general in Waterford are proud to once again salute another fine sporting achievement by a Waterford

TOURANEENA RACQUETBALL CLUB NEWS

Fouraneena Are Champions Of Europe

Two of the Waterford's finest young athlete's travelled to Zootemeer in Holland last week to represent Ireland in the European Racquetball Championships. Seventeen year olds Niamh Coffey and Triston Hickey were part of the 10 strong Irish team that went and defeated Europe's best and brought home both the senior men's and ladies team titles.

Going into the event, the mens team were the reigning champion thanks to their victory in Castlebar in 2001. This was Triston's first time representing his country at senior level and was the youngest member of the men's team. He is a six times National underage champion and he had also represented Ireland at junior level when playing in the World Junior Championships in Los Angeles in 1999. He was joined on the team by Anthony Butler (Clones), Stephen O'Loan (Belfast), Jimmy Gannon (Arklow) and Liam Hughes from Fermoy who is a grand son of James and Bridget McNamara from Tallow.

Their opening match was against the pre-tournament favourites, Germany. The Irish set themselves up well for overall honours when they recorded a 2-1 victory. Next up were their near neighbours England and again the Irish team were well on top winning out on a 3-0 scoreline. Belgium were next to bite the bullet on a similar scoreline which meant their 2-1 victory over the highly fancied Dutch team on their home turf secured the title for the boys in green for the second consecutive time.

The ladies team were quietly confident going out with what looked like a pretty good line-up on paper. Niamh probably became the youngest female ever to represent Ireland at racquetball and she was joined by former WIT student Elma Gibney from Meath, Tipperary duo Joan Kennedy (Dolla) and Helen Shanahan (Templederry) and Arklow's Susan Neary. After defeating the Dutch team in the semi-final, they faced the German's in the final encounter. With the scores drawn level at 1 game each, the pressure of winning the title was landed firmly on the shoulders of Niamh and Elma in the final game. Here we had the National under 18 and 21 championships respectively and following an outstanding performance, the double was achieved and both titles were heading home to the Emerald Isle

Again Niamh was making her debut at senior International level but like Triston she travelled to Los Angeles in 1998 as a Junior International player. Niamh is a 5 times National Junior Champion but she can overtake Triston's haul next season as she still has two more attempts to add to her impressive list in the upcoming under 17 and 18 age-

The Ladies Doubles Championships proved to be an unlucky one for Niamh and her partner Helen Shanahan. In all their matches they came to within a whisker of recording victory but it just wasn't to be as they lost out on some very narrow scorelines. On the plus side from an Irish point of view, the overall title was won by Elma Gibney and Susan Neary while the combination of Joan Kennedy and Carol Lynch (Belfast) took the bronze medals.

Next up was the individual singles. Niamh played her teammate Elma Gibney in the quarter final in what proved to be an outstanding game. Earlier in the season, the players came head to head in the National under 21 final and Elma recorded an 11-8 victory in the deciding tiebreaker. This times however on the bigger stage it was Niamh that ruled supreme on a replica scoreline. This moved her into the last 4 in Europe, which is an unreal achievement at such a young age. Here she met our National number 1, Joan Kennedy. It proved to be one of them games when things wouldn't go to plan for Niamh. On another day, Niamh could well have been challenging for the top European honour but it just wasn't to be. Full marks to her opponent Joan however, after securing the victory she went on to defeat Germany's Yvonne Kortez in the final.

Triston put up a brave performance in the men's singles and was just piped by his teammate Anthony Butler on an 11-9 scoreline in the tiebreaker. In the under 18 singles grade, Triston put together a few awesome performances to qualify for the final. His opponent was Michael Haverty from Caslebar who won through on the other side of the draw. It was the strangest game of the tournament. Triston lost the first game 15-14 and then went on to win the second 15-0 to set up a deciding tiebreaker decider. It was score for score right to the end but unluckily for Triston it was Michael that got the all-important winner. Triston's game was hampered by a shoulder injury but this does not take one bit from Michael's victory because on the day it was richly deserved.

The medal haul didn't stop here however for Triston. He partnered Liam Hughes in the Men's doubles grade and again reached the grand finale. After overcoming their Dutch opponents in the quarterfinals they faced the favourites from Germany in the semi. This duo included the six times European champion, Joachim Loof. The Irish duo were simply



awesome as they brushed aside their opponents with considerable ease. A scoreline of 15-6, 15-9 tells its own story. A Dutch pairing including Pascal Malta stood in their way of top honours. Despite giving it their all, it wasn't to be and they were beaten in straight games.

It meant that Triston brought his medal haul to 3 and Niamh took 2, which is simply an outstanding achievement. Both players have put in a lot of dedicated effort into the game since the formation of the club in 1997 and now they have received their just reward. Over the coming years they are both capable of dominating the senior National game and they can go on to achieve even higher honours at International level. Everybody associated with the Touraneena Racquetball club would like to congratulate both players on their outstanding performances and achievements and also wish them the very best in the fu-

Overall the Irish contingent dominated the Championships winning a total of 7 gold, 4 silver and 6 bronze

The rollerski's are slower and take a lot more energy to use than rollerblades, Phil told the Dungarvan Leader on Monday last.

Despite this, he travels up to 40 kilometres on an average day, and using the same equipment completed a mammoth 4,000kms trip from Vancouver to Halifax in Canada in aid of the Arthritis Society.

Arriving in Dungarvan just after 1 o'clock on Monday week last, before setting off again for Cork City the following morning, he has already spread his "Smoke Less, Exercise More" message on the Gerry Ryan show, and in a number of national media outlets.

Travelling down the east coast of Ireland, Phil, started his round Ireland bid in Belfast and travelled down the east coast before arriving in Dungarvan, and spending Monday night, at the Park Hotel.

"I always go on the secondary roads," he said. "And where I can't, I use the cycle lanes and the hard shoulders."

But, not trusting the road between Waterford and Dungarvan, he used more conventional transport into town, but vowed to "make up for it by doing 30-40 miles around Dungarvan."




