Black Day For Crystal

Last Thursday proved to be a black day in Waterford Crystal's long history as it was announced that two hundred and thirty-four jobs were to be cut at its plants in Kilbarry and Dungarvan.

Management at Waterford Crystal made the announcement after what union officials described as a "tense" meeting with employees and union representatives on Thursday morning. The cuts would mean around 100 contract staff in Dungarvan would be let go.

The ATGWU, who represent the bulk of Waterford Crystal's 1,600 employees, held meetings with employees on Friday and Monday morning, and union repre-



Sir Richard Musgrave 1757-1818

Sir Richard was the author of one of the most successful early works published on the 1798 Rebellion. He was son of Christopher Musgrave of Tourin House and Susannah Ussher of Ballintaylor House. Aged 21 Sir Richard was elected MP for the borough of Lismore. He was appointed receiver of the Customs in Dublin. In 1782 he married Deborah, daughter of Sir

He was appointed High Sheriff of Co. Waterford in 1786.In dividual in Ireland". Before the Rebellion was suppressed on the Present Situation of Public Affairs in London" and in 1796 "Considerations on the Present State of England and France". In 1797 the arrival of a new Catholic Bishop of Waterford Thomas Hussey, the collapse of agricultural prices and the activities of the United Irishmen in Co. Waterford alarmed Sir Richard. In the spring of 1797 Bishop Hussey published a pastoral letter criticizing Government policies towards Catholics and referring to the Church of Ireland as a "small sect" of political trimmers. Later that year

Sir Richard contacted the Government about what he perceived to be the treacherous activities of the Bishop and their impact on the peasantry. There was a drop in grain prices after the harvest in 1797, which affected the small tillage farmers in the lower Blackwater area. Farmers were unable to meet tithe demands and an oath-bound tithe strike began. Sir Richard stated that oaths were taken declaring loyalty to the French Convention. Before the Rebellion was suppressed he published (under a pseudonym) attacks on people such as the Earl of Moira & the Duke of Leinster, he defended the army's role, and felt Government & Magistrates were in no way responsible for causing rebellion. Later in 1798 he published a pamphlet: - "To the Magistrates, Militia, and Yeomanry of Ireland". The following year he published: - "A Concise Account of the Material, Events and Atrocities, which occurred in the late Rebellion". His authorship was kept "a profound secret For I should be assassinated if it were known, as I attack with great virulence the abominations of popery". (To be continued in next week's issue).



CREDIT CARDS

Credit Cards have become a part of everyday life in Ireland. From paying for petrol, groceries, to entertainment. Paying for goods or services with your credit card may be cost effective, convenient and secure. It has become increasingly popular for Irish people to use their card when abroad. If you wish to use your credit card while on holiday, please bear the following in mind.

Obtain a PIN number for your card from your bank, which then can be used for the purpose of withdrawing cash. If your account is in credit withdrawing local currency may be cheaper than exchanging cash or buying travellers cheques.

Ask about the availability of cash dispensing machines in the area you are visiting.

If you wish to shop online:

Only shop on well known sites or ones that have been personally recommended to you. Check that there are security systems in place so that you know that it is a safe environment to transmit your credit card details. Secure sites will have a padlock symbol on the bottom right hand corner. Find out the currency of payment and rate of exchange. Enquire if there are any delivery or VAT or Customs Duty applicable.

Special Olympics Host Town Committees win Tower Hotel Excellence Award for June

The Tower Hotel Waterford Excellence Award for June has been presented to the four Special Olympics Host Town Committees in Waterford city and county in recognition of their huge input to the success of the 2003 Special Olympics World Summer Games.

The Bahamian team was billeted in Dungarvan in the run up to the Games; the Slovakian team stayed in Clonea-Power, Carrick-on-Suir and Rathgormack; the Filipino delegation was accommodated in Tramore while the Jamaican team and their mentors prepared in Waterford. The four locations were among 177 cities, towns and villages selected in November 2001 as official Special Olympics Host Towns.

Presenting the June award to representatives from each of the four Special Olympics Host Town Committees at a special lunch in Tower Hotel Waterford, Paul McDaid of the Tower Hotel Group said that the spirit of collective effort and volunteerism evident in the various centres where Special Olympians stayed prior to the Games was one of the most heartening aspects of the entire event.

"There was a lot of talk about spirits being raised and a new dawn breaking for Ireland during the Special Olympics but for me one of the strongest things to come out of the Games was the rebirth of community spirit in so many locations as people pulled together to ensure that no effort would be spared to ensure a warm welcome for all of the visiting athletes, their supporters, families and coaches.

"The logistical challenge posed to so many communities by having significant numbers of people from diverse backgrounds and cultures living among them for a week or so was very considerable yet in location after location, people rose to the challenge and pulled out all the stops to make sure that their visitors would long hold fond memories of their stay. In many of the tv and radio interviews with athletes during the Games they recalled with fondness how they had been so well received in their respective Host Towns," Mr McDaid continued.

"Here in Waterford, there were four Host Towns and the city and county welcomed delegations from countries as diverse as Slovakia, Bahamas, Jamaica and the Phillipines. In each of the four locations involved, the Special Olympics Host Town Committees harnessed the tremendous goodwill that existed among their communities and created the warmest of welcomes for their visitors who were also facilitated in terms of training and leisure activities."

The award was made on the recommendation of the judging panel, consisting of Peter Doyle, Editor, Waterford News & Star; Paddy Gallagher, Editor, Waterford Today; Liz Reddy, News Editor, WLR fm; Damien Tiernan, South East Correspondent, RTÉ

and Kieran Walsh, Editor, The Munster Express.

The Tower Hotel Waterford Excellence Awards are designed to recognise excellence and achievement in six categories: Politics and Public Affairs; Business; Sport; Education; Arts, Culture and the Media and the Voluntary and Community sector.

In addition to the 12 monthly awards, the hotel will host an annual awards dinner at which an

overall winner will be named and the year's achievements recalled in a video presentation. said the equation with job losses doesn't add up.

"Osama Bin Laden, SARS, the Iraq war will be forgotten again," he said. "These are all snapshots in time, and the relationship between the euro and dollar will improve."

He said the cuts shouldn't be taken in response to shortterm affects.

The company cited falling sales in the United States as the reason for cutting manufacturing costs to the tune of 18 million euros.

The measures will mean 129 temporary employees will not have their contracts renewed, and 105 voluntary redundancies will be sought from permanent staff. The company will seek the redundancies from manufacturing, management and support staff at Kilbarry and Dungarvan. A number of craft workers and semi-skilled workers are proposed to be let go along with 100 contract workers from the Dungarvan plant's 500 strong workforce.

PAY FREEZE A pay freeze will also be implemented, Chief Executive of Waterford Crystal, John Foley said.

The pay freeze would stop workers from receiving salary increases promised under a national pay deal - a move that would save the company eur5 million euros - and Mr. Foley warned unions he would fight for the measure, even if it meant going to the Labour Court.

Commenting on the job

cuts, Mr. Foley said; "I ex- O'Shea described the jobs pect we will be able to achieve our targets through voluntary redundancies, redeployment and a range of operational efficiency initiatives. Given these measures, combined with the power of the Waterford brand, we are poised to extract full value from future growth in our major markets.

Mr. Foley said the measures would ensure Waterford Crystal has a firm competitive platform, and the steps will allow them to compete with cheaper out-sourced products. "Currently we can source nearly 50% of the product at up to 30% less than we have been able to they can re-enter the workproduce it here in our Irish plants," he claimed. "The steps we are taking today will allow us to compete, and we are committed to keeping our operations on a competitive footing."

The company is said to be set to invest 10.5 million to discuss the way forward euros to replace a tank furnace in Kilbarry - believed to guarantee that plants future for the next ten years - and reportedly a further eur5 million will be invested in other facilities.

That is why we must ensure that those workers who were laid off today receive immediate retraining so that force at the earliest possible opportunity.'

Deputy O'Shea said he would be calling on Mary Harney to come to Waterford over the next few days to meet with company management, trade unions, and staff for Waterford Crystal, and for those who lost their jobs.

Meanwhile, commenting on the job losses, Sinn Fein spokesperson in Dungarvan, Brendan Mansfield, said they show the failure of the Government's PD led economic strategy, and the need for new thinking.

"The response of the Tanaiste and Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment, Mary Harney, to the daily toll of job losses is a mantra that each factory closure of workforce cut is 'devastating'. This has now become meaningless," he

"Workers and their families do not have to be told how grievous a blow it is to lose employment. What they want to hear from the Tanaiste and her Government colleagues is how lost jobs will be replaced and how sustainable employment will be put in place in the future.

LOSSES

The job losses are the latest in a number of cuts at Waterford Crystal recently. In April, ninety-four mainly ontract employees were let go, and last month all but 100 staff were laid off for a week as economic uncertainty caused by the Iraqi war coupled with poor exchange rates damaged the companies business in the US - the companies biggest market. The company later closed two of its plants in Stoke-on-Trent with the loss of 1,058 jobs.

Negotiations between Company Management and Unions Representatives were on-going yesterday (Tuesday), and agreement is not expected to be reached for another two to four weeks.

Clirs. Were **Paid Over** €800,000 **Last Year**

Waterford County Council paid out over 800,000 euros to its twenty-three elected representatives last year, according to the local authorities 2002 Annual Report.

Each member of the council is paid at a statutory rate of 11,000 euros per annum by way of a repre-sentational payment - which came to a total of 260,547.61 euros for the 23 members.

The payment was made for the first time last year having been in-troduced under the 2001 Local Au-

The initial payment, the annual report states, included a once-off amount of up to eur15,420 in respect of this entitlement which ran May 2000 to the 31st of December 2001. The total payment for representational payment in arrears totalled eur352,479.00.

In addition, Councillors receive an "Annual Allowance" which is also paid monthly in arrears. The purpose of this allowance is to reimburse Councillors for the expenses they incur in attending meetings on behalf of their constituents. Payand varies from Councillor to Councillor, dependant on the distance travelled from home to base.

Councillors are also entitled to claim expenses for attendance at conferences, and a further annual allowance is payable to Chairpersons of Strategic Policy Commit-

A total of curl 10,486.05 was paid out to councillors as part of the Annual Allowance, eur88,901.78 paid for the Attendance at Conferences, and eur18,199.32 paid out to the Chairs of the Strategic Policy Committees. A further total of eur23,571.62 was paid in respect of the Cathaoirleach's/ Mayor's allowance for 2002.

Driver Escapes Serious Injury After Lorry Shorted ESB Supply

The ESB are appealing to drivers of articulated vehicles to exercise due care around ESB poles and stays after an artic lorry collided with a stay, and shorted power in Dungarvan for around an hour.

A spokesperson for the ESB said the accident, which could have ended in tragic circumstances, occurred at the IDA Industrial Estate in Dungarvan, at around three o'clock on Friday afternoon.

The artic collided with a metal stay holding an ESB pole in place, and dragged the stay causing the pole to break, causing what the spokesperson said was a "dangerous electrical flash over."

The 10,000 v/w electrical line shorted and as a result power was cut to in excess of 500 customers in the Dungarvan area. ESB crews were mobilised and power was restored within an hour.

"We would regard it as quite a dangerous situation to happen," the spokesperson said. "And we would appeal to drivers of articulated vehicles to exercise due caution around electrical lines, poles and stays. Luckily in this situation nobody was seriously injured, but as I said, it was quite a dangerous situation."







Paprika chicken kebab

Preparation: 240 mins Cooking: 20 mins

SPICE up tea time with this deliciously different chicken dish - ideal for winter evenings or summer barbecues. INGREDIENTS:

(serves 4)

- 1.5kg chicken pieces
- 2 onions, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup oil
- 1 tspn dried thyme
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 tspn paprika

freshly ground black pepper 4 small courgettes

4 small tomatoes

Remove skin and bone from the chicken pieces and cut into 2cm cubes. Place in bowl with onions, oil, thyme, crumbled bay leaf, paprika, salt and pepper.

Wash the courgettes, trim ends and cut into 1cm pieces. Add to marinade. Leave for three hours.

Preheat the grill. Drain chicken pieces and courgettes, keeping marinade. Peel tomatoes and cut in half, removing seeds. Thread tomato, courgettes and chicken onto skewers. Place on grill rack and brush with marinade. Sprinkle with a little more paprika. Grill for 20 mins or until chicken is cooked. (Lower heat after five minutes and turn skewers regularly.)



Delicious white chocolate treat

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 10 mins

CHOCOLATE mousse with chocolate sauce. Ideal with fruit or whipped cream.

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 6-8)

275g white chocolate

- 2 tblspns liquid glucose (available from chemists)
- 1 pint (600ml) double cream
- Topping:
- 100g plain chocolate
- 120ml double cream
- 15g butter

Break up the white chocolate and place in an ovenproof bowl with the liquid glucose and one tablespoon of water. Carefully heat the bowl over a pan of warm-hot water and stir until the chocolate has melted. Remove from heat.

Whip the cream until thickened and fold into the melted mixture.

Pour into serving dishes or wine glasses and put into the fridge until it sets.

For the topping: Carefully melt the plain chocolate with cream in a bowl using the same method as before. Cool the sauce and pour over mousse to serve. Ideal with seasonal fruits.

Cheesy-topped eldefeev

Preparation: 25 mins Cooking: 15 mins

INGREDIENTS

(Serves 6) 3 carrots, peeled and

sliced 1 cauliflower, divided into

florets 225g small broccoli florets

75g frozen peas Sauce

40g butter 40g plain flour

450 ml semi-skimmed milk 100g half-fat double

Gloucester, coarsely grat-

2 tspns Dijon mustard 1/4 tspn salt black pepper

Method

Cook carrots in boiling water for 3 minutes.

Add cauliflower, broccoli and peas. Cook for 3-5 minutes or until vegetables are just tender. Drain well. Put vegetables in a large flameproof dish, cover and keep warm.

Melt the butter for the sauce in a pan. Add flour and cook, stirring for 1 minute. Remove from heat and gradually stir in milk. Return to heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in three-quarters of the cheese, the mustard and seasoning.

Pour sauce over the vegetables and stir to coat.

Sprinkle over remaining cheese. Grill under a medium heat for 5 minutes or until cheese is bubbling. Serve immediately.





Cullen Announces Funding For Sewerage Schemes in Co. Waterford

Funding of over €260,000 will be provided for a number of small Sewerage and Water Schemes, provided that the Local Authority or Local Interests can raise 25% of the total

Making the announcement, Minister Martin Cullen said CLAR funding of €132,750 will be allocated for four small public water and sewerage schemes, and this funding will be matched by the Minister's Department on Small Public Water & Sewerage Schemes.

However, in line with the requirements for small public water and sewerage schemes generally, this funding is condi-

tional on the local authority or local interests contributing a quarter of the total cost. Local investment would bring the total funding for the schemes to eur354,000.

If the local funding is secured Lismore Sewerage Scheme, and water schemes in Ballyeaphy, Carrignagower and Monamon will be able to go-ahead.

Minister Cullen stated; "I am delighted that this significant funding has been made available for these schemes. This is another major step for areas of population decline in Waterford. CLAR is a key initiative that will assist in further rejuvenating parts of County Waterford."

CULLEN SHOULD **MOVE ON THE** RING WATER ISSUE SAYS COUNCILLOR O CEILLEACHAIR

Waterford Environment Minister Martin Cullen should move quicker to ensure that Waterford County Council can effect its' planned and long promised overhaul of the Ring Gaeltacht's water supply.

That's the firm view of that locality's Udaras na Gaeltachta representative Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who is encouraging the area's residents to write to the Minister to encourage him to act on reports submitted to his department - the latest of which was in February of this year. Cllr. O Ceilleachair claims that problems with quality and quantity of water are ongoing in Ring and that the basic quality of life in some households is being affected by the absence, poor pressure or dubious standard of public water supply.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair has repeated his prediction that frustrated local residents could end up suing the local authority due to the severe inconvenience.

Restating views on an issue he says has been a "millstone around Ring's neck" for too long, Cllr. O Ceilleachair said: "The local County Council crew, despite their best efforts in trying circumstances, cannot correct the problems that regularly arise from an old and poorly supplied system. Various patch up jobs and temporary measures have led to no significant improvement. The lack of notice about what the local authority deem to be necessary overnight cut offs of supply is also an ongoing source of annoyance."

'The County Council have described the necessary works to properly alleviate the situation, dependent on full departmental backing.

This has been so long in forthcoming that it does not reflect well on Martin Cullen. I'd urge swift action on this issue before local people put the skids under the authorities in the courts. It should not have to come to that."

This is shaded with a delivery and a timing that would do justice to Bob Hope and George Burns. Then, again there is a touch of the calculated lunacy of a Groucho Marx, and over it all in the side long glance from these hooded eyes and the puff of chipmunk cheeks, you see a remarkable resemblance to a youg Orson Wells.

Even so, Brendan Grace is very much his own man, a man who is genuinely funny in his own right.





Feed plants in growth

You should feed all plants that are making rapid growth as you were doing

in May and June. Remove grass box from lawn mower

During July and August, when the weather is hot, it is a good idea to remove the grass box from the lawn mower and let the tiny clippings fall on to the lawn. They will act as a mulch and protect roots from scorching.

Summer-prune wisterias

Wisterias that have filled their allotted space can be induced to flower freely year after year without making a lot of new growth by summer and winter pruning. Now is the time for the first of these operations. Shorten all side growths formed on the main branches to six leaves each.

Summer-prune roses

Bush and standard roses of the large flowered type need a light summer pruning now the first flush of flowers is over. Cut stems that have flowered back to about two leaves. Then give the beds a dusting of any good compound flowergarden fertiliser and hoe this in.

Prick off and pot primulas

Greenhouse primulas sown in mid-June will need pricking off. Return them to the frame or greenhouse after potting and shade from strong, direct sunshine. Sow spring cabbage

Ridgeway Homes Submit The Old Pike **Further Information On** 90 New Ardmore Homes

Controversy Over Location Near Round Tower

Ridgeway Homes have submitted further information on their plans to construct ninety new houses at Farrangarrat, Ardmore, on a site some residents claim is part of a mass burial grave dating back to the siege of Ardmore Castle in the 1640's.

The proposed development is for a site of around 16 acres, which the County Wexford based developers have agreed to purchase for an undisclosed sum from Mr. Michael Ruane on condition of planning permission being secured.

The application already appears to have split the local community down the middle with a number of submissions Duchas had not been invited to

made for and against a development located within 150 metres of Ardmore's Round Tower.

Following Ridgeway's planning application, Waterford County Council sought further information, and this was provided last Friday

According to Niamh Doyle of Lennon, O'Keefe, Doyle - the architectural firm who drew up the plans - the information clarified a number of outstand-

ing issues ARCHEOLOGICAL IM-**PORTANCE**

The development has been subject to two separate appraisals by Duchas, focusing on its impact, and a complaint to Waterford County Council that be involved in pre-planning talks with the developers.

In his first report, Duchas' Development Officer, Prionsias De Batuin warned against the developers routing of sewerage works to the east of the site.

He said he was opposed to "any development at all" in this eastern field, which he said held earthworks of significant archaeological importance.

In his most recent report, however, Mr. De Batuin says "development per se" would be "inappropriate" in this field, but having visited the site, "we are not opposed to the proposal for a temporary pipeline"

He said his understanding was that the temporary pipeline would lay on the surface, and no excavation works would be necessary. The pipeline would be removed once Ardmore's Sewerage Facilities are upgrad-

In the further information provided by Ridgeway, the site is said to include the provision of a temporary effluent "treatment plant", and associated site development work, and it is unclear as yet whether this complies with Duchas' second assessment of a ground level

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Ms. Doyle said the plans for the sewerage pipeline have been looked at, but further designs still have to be completed and more details need to be clarified.

CONCERNS

The sewerage pipeline is just one of a number of concerns raised about the development. In its objection, An Taisce viewed the development as being out of scale, inappropriately located, and contrary to the proper sustainable development of Ardmore.

One local resident, meanwhile, who submitted an objection, said she was "alarmed" at the proposal, while another claimed "local knowledge" pointed to the site as being part of a mass burial grave dating from the siege of Ardmore Castle in the wars of the 1640's. Others say the development would run contrary to its zoning for sensitive residential de-

SUPPORT

However the development appears to have split the local community down the middle, with a number of people from the area taking the rare step at planning stage of making submissions in its favour

According to one resident's submission, the young people of Ardmore need the development, as it would provide affordable housing. Other residents say the development would create employment opportunities for tradesmen.

A separate petition lists around 24 names of residents in the locality who are in favour, while a third individual submission in favour of the development says it would improve entry to the village, and enable young couples from the area to buy affordable homes.

RESIDENTIAL ZONING

The housing is proposed to be located approximately 150 metres west of Ardmore's Round Tower and ecclesiastical centre. According to Duchas' most recent report, Mr. De Batuin states that he is satisfied that the amenity impact of the development can be mitigated through the use of appropriate, dense and high landscaping, especially on the Western and Southern boundaries of the development

The development is proposed to have two entry points - one along the Southern Boundary to serve the thirty houses on the most elevated area, and a second access from the northern boundary at the road at Cleary's

Ridgeways revised plans are available for inspection at the planning offices of Waterford County Council.



Why Do Some Plants Have Flowers?



Flowers contain the plant's reproductive organs which have a most important task – to generate seeds to give life to new plants. The male organs of the flower, the stamens, produce pollen, which is made up of tiny little grains of powder, usually yellow. These grains of pollen, carried by the wind, by water or by animals, become intercepted, by the pistil, the female part of the flower, and these reach the ovary. Seeds form when the pollen comes in contact with an ovule – that is, when an ovule has been fertilised.

The Pistil


At the top of the pistil there is the stigma, a sticky swelling which catches the pollen. Below this is the style, along which the pollen descends towards the ovary at the centre of the flower.

The Ovule

The ovule is inside the ovary. It is here that the fertilisation takes place to begin the development of new seeds. From this moment, the ovarly is transformed into a fruit.

HOW WHEN WHAT WHY Why are flowers perfumed?

Flowers are perfumed because their petals contain essential oils, widely used in the manufacture of perfume. The oil of the rose, violet and jasmine are the ones most widely used, for medicines and disinfectants, as well as perfume. A flower's perfume also attracts pollinating insects, such as bees and wasps. However, there are some flowers which have an unpleasant smell. For instance, the Stapelia, in order to be pollinated, attracts flies with a smell of bad meat.



Which Are The Plants Without Flowers?

Conifers reproduce by keeping their seeds in cones. These plants have male cones (the smaller ones) and female cones. The pine cone of the Conifer tree protects the little pines by its woody scales.

Ferns are reproduced by spores, microscopic cells which drop from the underside of the leaf. The spores germinate and develop into tiny, usually heart-shaped plants which contain the male and female cells ready to create a new plant.

Mosses reproduce by spores, too. These are contained in small capsules at the ends of steles, central tubes of the stems. Each spore can give life to a new plant.

While aimed at alleviating the problems of people in rural areas who experience social isolation and difficulty in accessing services due to a lack of transport, the service is open to everyone. Intending passengers will be asked to join Taistael's travel club, which is free of charge. Return journeys cost 4.00, and children under 12 accompanied by an adult travel free. Passengers can book a seat on the service by telephoning 058 20845, between 9am and 5 pm, Monday to Friday.

The Rural Transport Initiative, which is administered by Waterford County Council, is funded under the National Development Plan by the Department of Transport. At present some 270 new transport services are being provided throughout the country.

Speaking with regard to routes already in operation, James O'Donoghue, Rural Transport Co-ordinator said "We are delighted with the response so far from the public. Our services are flexible and will be closely monitored to see what best suits the communities being served. The success and continuation of the services will be judged on the numbers of people using them", he said.





Bold Steps To Tackle Litter

Recently Minister Cullen (Minister for the Environment, Heritage & Local Government) identified new steps to tackle the litter pollution problem in the country, specifically 'problem products' including chewing gum, Bank ATM receipts and polystyrene wrappers.

Environment Tax/Levy

Minister Cullen is in favour of the 'polluter pays' principle. This means that people who purchase or use certain products with a high ecological footprint (unsustainable impact on the environment) should pay extra for the correct disposal of the products. These products are expected to have a 5 - 10 cent levy placed on them. Monies that will be raised will be included in the Environment fund and used for environmental initiatives. CALF MANAGEMENT:

Keep Calves Thriving

High performance in calves at grass is hugely efficient in terms of cost of gain and impacts very positively on lifetime gain and on profitability. A deficit of just 25 kilos of liveweight in weanlings at housing will cost 30 to 40 either in extra feed costs or in lost sale value whenever the cattle are sold.

Whether in dairy beef or suckler situations there is no difficulty whatever in dropping 25 kilos or more of potential gain just through average rather than good grassland and animal management. There need not be anything obviously wrong, just small imperfections or oversights along the way.

Dairy Calves at Grass

A Grange trial by Gerry Keane found that calves grazed in a leader/follower situation weighed 50 kilos heavier than calves grazed in their own separate area throughout the grazing season. There was no recovery of this deficit later in life where the animals all received similar treatment. The reason for the extra gain is predominantly nutritional and relates to the quality of grass eaten as opposed to offered to calves.

Forcing calves to graze out paddocks to what would be considered normal levels for other cattle (6 cms) reduces digestibility, intake and performance. Leader/follower routines are rarely found on farms because the performance of the follower animals is reduced and that is not acceptable in either dairy cows or in

The benefits of the system to calves can be obtained by more liberal use of the topper, and possibly by utilising non pressured animals such as in calf heifers or dry cows to clean up.

It is very worthwhile putting effort into supplying bucket reared calves with a constant and liberal supply of good quality grass. They will never again put on weight as cheaply.

Well done Feb/March born male calves should weigh in excess of 250 kilos at housing.

Suckled Calves - Creep Graze

In mid-season, suckled calves are switching from milk to grass as the main source of nutrient. At the same time grass quality is falling off and it can be hard to maintain a supply of lush material for a cow herd. Forward creep grazing of calves is the answer. Merely lifting the wire to a suitable height and allowing calves to access the paddock in front of the cows dramatically improves the quality of material on offer. In this case the cows clean up very well and it becomes a win-win situation. This approach has the added benefit of reducing the cow-calf bond and lessening to some extent the distress suffered by calves at weaning time.

If it is desired to further increase calf performance by concentrate feeding, a trough in the forward creep area is a cheaper, more controlled and more efficient means of supplementation than the more commonly used creep feeder, where control is impossible and intake varies from calf to calf.

Parasite Control

Internal parasites are the other big factor in calf performance. With bucket reared calves a good routine is essential. It can be 3-weekly dosing, an avermectin programme or a bolus, done properly all are effective. Cost differences are more associated with convenience than efficacy.

Shop around for value. From July on hoose becomes a big issue. Hoose is less predictable than stomach worm, constant vigilance and prompt treat-

ment are the best remedy. Suckled calves are less exposed to stomach worm than are dairy bred animals and require less dosing. They should get a dose in July if not already treated. The hoose approach is the same as for dairy calves, watch carefully and treat quickly. In suckled weanlings hoose can lead to or be confused with virus pneumonia, if there is no response to a treatment call the vet.

DAIRYING: Autumn grazing:

To lengthen the grazing rotation in Autumn, extra grazing will have to be brought in on the 10th September.

- To do this the "3rd Cut Silage for Grazing" will need to have been closed up 42 days before 10th September.
- That means 25-29th July.
- The 2nd cut silage should be taken by this date and fertilised with 60-70 units of nitrogen. -Depending on stocking rate, 15-20% of the farm should be treat-
- If a 2nd cut is not being taken, then this area of ground should be topped very tightly and get 50-60 units of N on the 25th-29th July

Cost Savings:

These are needed to counteract the lower milk price.


- Plan to have grass for grazing in Nov/Dec (dry land) so that you need no silage or slurry storage for 2 months.
- No meals to cows -Unless very high yielding herd.
- No meals to calves -A little, to small ones. Opt for cheap doses for calves -Yellow or white.
- If stocking rate isn't too high, reduce nitrogen per round by 20-
- -Spread nitrogen once per month on the whole paddock ground.
- Don't cut any 2nd cut if you have enough silage. -Graze it. -Saves a lot of money.
- Use night rate electricity.
- Opt for longer-term loans if you are under some pressure on loan repayments.
- Collect all roof water/plate cooler water and re-use for cows to drink or wash down yards.

EU PROPOSALS ON ANIMAL TRANSPORT DETRIMENTAL TO IRELAND -Deane

IFA Convenes Meeting of Live Exporters

IFA National Livestock Com- would be extremely damaging proposed rules on the Transport of Live animals from EU will prove to be very detrimental to the important live export trade from Ireland to Europe. He said new stricter rules

mittee Chairman Derek Deane to Ireland and will severely resaid today (Wednesday) the strict our access to the EU single market for live cattle.

IFA have called a meeting of Commissioner David Byrne live exporters for Friday to discuss the new rules and to plan Ireland's strategy to defend the live export trade.

Mr. Deane said Commissioner

Byrne has not taken account of the scientific data and facts relating to animal transport and welfare in these new proposals. "They seem to be based on the arguments put forward by the animal rights lobbyists to restrict or limit the live trade based on perception and emotion rather than on real scientific facts relating to animal transport and welfare.

The IFA Livestock leader said the proposal to abolish staging posts and restrict transport to a maximum of nine hours followed by an eleven hour rest period with another nine hours travel and so on, makes no sense from an animal welfare perspective.

Mr. Deane said the proposals to insist that animals remain on the trucks for the entire journey including the resting period combined with much higher stocking densities will make tl he entire roll on/roll off transport operation from Ireland to Continental Europe financially unviable. "In other words, these proposals will put the roll on/roll off live export trade between Ireland and Europe out of business".

Mr. Deane said Teagasc in Grange, Co. Meath have pioneered major scientific work on animal welfare and transport, which proves that, the transport of animals over long distances has no adverse affect on animal welfare based on scientific measurements. In additional Teagasc concluded that there was no animal welfare advantage in transport animals at a higher stocking density from the current level.

Mr. Deane said the live export trade plays a crucial role in terms of price competition and market outlets for the Irish beef and livestock sector. He said with Irish cattle prices consistently at the lower end of the EU price league, price competition provided by the live export trade is essential to livestock

In conclusion, Mr. Deane said account will have to be taken of the sound scientific analys carried out by Teagasc as well as Ireland's unique peripheral location in any recommendations on animal transport. He said Irish farmers must have guaranteed access to the EU single market for live cattle.

It is true to say that the committee of twenty and 92 volunteers have gained valuable experience and expertise during the past year and one wonders if there is another nitch in the community where this valuable asset could be put to further use.

Is it possible that other suitable projects could be found whereby the energy that has been tapped into could be channelled in another direction to the benefit of the community at large.

THE FAMINE

In 1846 Famine Relief Committees were formed in every Parish in Ireland. Their function was to collect subscriptions to which the Central Relief Committee in Dublin Castle added approximately a similar amount. Then work was provided and the labourers paid anything from six pence a day for a young fellow to ten pence for a seasoned worker. With this they bought yellow meal or "Peel's brimstone", as it was nicknamed after the British Prime Minister, Sir Robert Peel.

There was no free food for people until the situation became desperate in early 1847.

On 26th March 1847 a committee in Abbeyside sent in a report, signed by Beresford Boate Esq. of Tournore, concerning £40 received from subscribers.

He stated that the population of the area was 4,000. On the 19th. December 1846 the "soup relief" that was provided for 1,500 was now given to a much larger number 'lately'. There were only three subscribers. The Quaker Committee granted £25 and a relief committee at 16 Sackville Street. Dublin, gave £15. The central relief committee then added £30.





Hassett To Speak at Liam Lynch Commemoration

On next Sunday 27th July at 3pm on the slopes of the Knockmealdown mountains over looking the villages of Newcastle and Goatenbridge and the scenic Suir Valley, General Liam Lynch Commander in Chief of Irish Republicans forces will be commemorated. Lynch was fatally wounded on

that mountain side in April 1923. A monument worthy of such a prominent leader marks the place where he fell. The Executive of the Liam Lynch Memorial have organised the 80th Anniversary ceremonies. The President of the Irish Bardic Federation John J. Has-

sett will deliver the oration. Mr.

Shanavine Church

Shanavine is the ancient parish church of the Parish of Kiltegan or Kiltgan. It is named after Egan or Agan, one of the immediate disciples of St. Patrick. This would date the establishment of the first Church on this site from the 5th Century A.D. Some experts, however, claim that the Church is named from a holy person called Tagan who was one of the seven companions of St. Fiach of Sletty. The church and parish were the subject of an ecclesiastical dispute and court case in 1260 when Archbishop McCarvaill of Cashel, claimed that Kiltegan belonged to Cashel Diocese and not to Waterford. The ecclesiastical courts found in favour of Waterford. In the papal taxation lists of 1290 and 1302, the church is called Kiltaga and the benefice was valued at £3 per year on which a papal tax of 6 shillings per year was levied.

In 1588 the records show that Kilegan was a prebend in the Diocese of Waterford and the prebendry in that year was Walter Daton, a clergyman. The tithes were held by the Bishop of Waterford. The vicar in 1588 was Rev. Roger McGrath. These were all clergy in the reformed church. The catholic or papist priest was Rev. Gorman. The registration of priests lists of 1704 show that Rev. William Bourke was parish priest of Kiltegan. He was aged 57 years and lived at Kilmore near Lisronagh. He had been ordained in 1670 by Archbishop Burgatt of Cashel at Lissine (near Moyne) about three miles north east of Thurles. (Bishop Burgatt spent some time in hiding there). Kiltegan parish was incorporated into the joint parishes of Powerstown/Lisronagh early in the 18th Century. The name Shanavine comes from the old Irish Seana bheinn or Seana bhoinn, which means the Old Steeple or the Old Gable.

To get to this cemetery one has to go through the farm yard of the late Michael Hallinan, who was a native of Aughavoulivane, Ballinamult. A family from Curtiswood, Ballymacarbry the Keatings, well known school teachers are laid to rest there. The last of them to be buried there was William Keating, N.T., he died on 22nd April 1929.

The marriage ceremony with Nuptial Mass and Papal blessing was solemnised by Very Rev. Fr. Edmund Tobin P.P., Fourmilewater/Newcastle assisted by Very Rev. Fr. Noel Boylan P.P. Cavan in the presence of a large number of the relatives and friends of the contracting parties. The Bridegroom given away in marriage by her father Michael looked beautiful and was attended by her sister Ciara Reilly as matron of honour, the best man was Keith Smith, brother of the groom. The readers were Marion and Ciara Smith and the prayers of the faithful were read by Neil Danagher, and the singers were Maggie Danagher and Barney Reilly. With the Church ceremonies over the entire party left for the Park Hotel, Dungarvan where a most enjoyable and musical time was had by all for several hours.

After Rev. Fr. Noel Boylan P.P. had blessed the cake, the toast to the bride and bridegroom was appropriately honoured and felicitous speeches given by Rev. Fr. Boylan P.P. and many other guests. Later in the evening as the happy couple left on their honeymoon which is being spent in Barbados they were accorded a most congratulatory and enthusiastic send off accompanied by the best wishes of all present for a life of unclouded happiness in the years to come. The Bride comes from a fine, well loved and respected family, her father a native of Roscommon was a well known Coillte official in the district for many years. He is also Chairman of Fourmilewater Hurling Club. The Groom comes from fine Breffini stock

Patrick Power will mark the bicentenary of Robert Emmett with a short tribute to his role in Irish History. Liam Lynch a native of Angelsboro, Co. Limerick was a leading activist and military leader in the co-ordinated comprehensive, cultural, political and physical force movements, that forced the British Empire to call a truce and negotiate terms of settlement with the Irish people during the later half of 1921. In the Treaty that emerged and the divisions that arose, Liam Lynch emerged as a mediator. His prime objective B.I. was to preserve National Unity. He pursued this role which almost alienated him from the more impetuous members, who occupied the Four Courts an action he opposed. It is ironic that the attack on the Four Courts by Free State forces led to the Civil War, that immediately followed. Lynch was not in the Four Courts, for his counterpart Michael Collins, then battling with elements within the Free State Government, the attack on the Four Courts trapped him also into a difficult position. Tragically both men of greatness, fell in their prime of life, on different sides in a conflict that both did their best to avoid. The political power seekers on both sides, much more than the military men, created the crisis, that led to Civil War and Lynch and Collins deaths. It is right that on a mid summer Sunday, 27th July next that people across the age spectrum will gather to proudly remember a chieftain of the Irish Nation, who died defending the Irish Republic, not as an armchair General in a safe bunker, but in the front line of action. As a man of principal, motivated by patriotism and driven by his love of National Freedom, Lynch died with generous words to all fellow Irish people. He was a man of faith and belief in God who had a duty to fulfil and he did it without fear or favour. Time, history and proper research into his role in the making of the new Ireland of his time, will give him due credit for his major contribution that revisionists conspire to prevent through their propaganda.

Dr. McCarthy succeeds Councillor Michael Fitzgerald (FG). It is the first time that he has been elected to the chair of South Tipperary County Council since he was first returned to the County Council 25 years ago.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

OUESTION

I hope to start a course next September. Could you please tell me who is eligible for the Back to Education Allowance?

ANSWER

The Back to Education Allowance (BTEA) is paid by the Department of Social, and Family Affairs (DSFA to unemployed people, lone parents and people with disabilities who wish to do approved second or third level courses of education. To be eligible for the allowance you must be:

Aged 21 or over (24 or over for a postgraduate course) and for the previous 6 months have been receiving a social welfare payment such as Unemployment Assistance/Benefit or One-Parent Family Payment.

Aged 18 or over and for the previous 6 months have been receiving a disability payment such as Disability Allowance or Invalidity Pension (receiving a disability Benefit for 3 years)

Aged 18 to 20, out of formal education for 2 years and for the previous 6 months have been receiving One-Parent Family Payment or Unemployment Assistance/Benefit.

An adult dependant of someone who is eligible may qualify if a Qualified Adult Allowance is in payment. Periods spent on employment schemes, training courses and in prison may count towards the 6-month qualifying period.

Courses you can attend include full-time second level courses certified by the Department of Education and Science (DES) or approved by the Further Education and Training Awards Council (FETAC), such as the Leaving Certificate or a Post Leaving Certificate course, and full-time third level courses approved by DES for its maintenance grant schemes or courses which have Higher Education and Training Awards Council (HETAC) recognition.

When you have been accepted for a course you should apply to DSFA for the allowance on Form BTE 1. You will be paid the allowance instead of your social welfare payment at a rate equivalent to the maximum of your current social welfare payment. If you were previously getting an unemployment payment, the BTEA will not be paid during the summer period between academic years. Those who had been receiving other payments will continue to receive the BTEA during the summer.

Free Transport To Be Provided For Cappoquin Pupils

Pupils who formerly attended St. Anne's Secondary School in Cappoquin and are now educated at Lismore's Blackwater Community School are to receive free transport for the duration of their education, it has been announced.

Free transport was announced following a number of meetings between Deputy Ollie Wilkinson (FF) and the Minister of State at the Department of Education and Science, Sile de Valera.

Ms. De Valera confirmed in a letter to Deputy Wilkinson, that "existing Cappoquin pupils who were not paying school transport, and who would otherwise not have been eligible for transport to Cappoquin Post-Primary School will receive free school transport to Blackwater Community School for the duration of their education there."

However, for all new pupils to the new amalgamated school, the normal terms of the School Transport Scheme will apply.

The CEO of County Waterford Vocational Educational Community, Mr. Paddy Lavelle, has been notified of the position, Ms De Valera said.

Welcoming the announcement, Deputy Wilkinson said he was delighted that the issue has now been satisfactorily resolved.



These young players of today will be the back bone of your junior club tomorrow!!

We are all very proud of our Oscar Traynor team under the management of Liam Frazer, Joe Tobin with the help of Paddy Pollard. The finalists in the cup were the Limerick league and south Tipperary league, both of whom were in our qualifying group; and while South Tipp defeated us 5-0 on the day it was a much closer contest with limerick, they overcame us 2-1. With the first match of the cup set for mid-September, it is important that training gets underway shortly but I'll leave that with our managers to deal with.

Having seen most of our teams in action during the past season I would like to complement all on your dress code, gone are the days of odd coloured socks and togs. A prime example of this neatness was the Dungarvan Tyre Centre Cup final where some of the supporters were seen to be wearing their team's colours

also. I would urge more teams to get relatives and friends to come out and support you, especially if you get to the final stages of a competition. It would be great to see more families come out and support our players. 
Ireland v. Canada

TASK FORCE TO LOOK AT CLUB SCENE

It is now being realised that the intense intercounty programme is leaving the club scene in a sorry state and it is good to see that measures to address the problem are in hand. At least this is what the Special Task Force which was last week set up by the President, Sean Kelly, are hoping to achieve.

Because the club scene has to be ignored in many counties who close shop while the county teams are still engaged, there is concern at the highest level and the special Task Force headed by Padraigh Duffy are asked and expected to have firm proposals ready for decision by Congress in Killarney next April.

Here entering the final ten days of July we have still not started the senior hurling championship and have played only one round of the senior football. Many other counties find themselves faced with a similar plight.

It is a situation that cannot continue if clubs are to survive.

The non-stop intercounty activity, which commences in January (McGrath Cup) is doing untold harm to the club scene and one way of easing the problem might be to commence the national leagues in October and have 3/4 games played in hurling and football before the winter break. This would certainly ease some of the pressure in the new year.

Every county in the association will look forward with interest to the recommendations of this committee.

Waterford would appear to have lost out on having a Croke Park date in the quarter final against Antrim on Sunday next.

The draw has Wexford playing Antrim and Tipperary meeting Offaly.

If Wexford survive and they likely will, they will play Cork in the semi-final. If Waterford were in the same situation, they would meet Kilkenny in the semi-final.

If Tipperary win on Sunday they will meet Kilkenny.

SENIOR HURLING QUALIFIER AT NOWLAN PARK

Rampant Wexford Push Waterford Out Of The Title Race Wexford 1-20 Wuterford 0-18



For Waterford hurlers the show is well and truly over for yet another year as Wexford hurlers came thundering back from a six points first half deficit to win a place in the All Ireland quarter finals with five points to spare and win deservedly in this qualifier match at the Kilkenny venue.

Having led the Leinster side a merry dance for 25 minutes and not flattered by a six points lead at this point, everything seemed to go awry as Wexford were allowed back into the game and draw level with Jacobs' point in the 35th. minute. The introduction of substitute Larry Murphy

at full forward and the switching of Paul Codd out to centre half forward were the moves that were to prove the killer blows to Waterford who for some reason did not seem capable of coping with this unexpected development

We led by a single point at halftime but the advantage lasted for less than a minute into the second half and only once did we lead in the second half after Dan Shanahan's 21st. minute point had us 0-15 to 1-11 in front before Paul Codd equalised in under 60 seconds.

We began well and seemed to play copybook hurling for 25

minutes. We certainly did have the measure of Wexford and might not have been flattered if our six points lead had been doubled.

But when things began to go wrong, very few players come out of the game with their reputations unruffled.

For some inexplicable reason we allowed our game to follow the pattern of the last four championship clashes where we raced into a healthy lead and then allowed ourselves to be caught and understandably, supporters have been asking why this situation continues to bedevil the county.

This game on Saturday showed that Wexford had more 'bottle' than Waterford and towards the finish they certainly played with more passion then we did. That was why they deserved to win.

What Now?

It looks sure that a few of the players will retire from intercounty duty and that when training resumes for the 2004 championship, several new faces will be seen on our line up. We will have to depend on the upcoming club championships to yield some new prospects. There will be vacancies in defence, midfield and in attack.

Manager

The situation about Justin McCarthy is unsure now that his two year term is completed. He did tell one journalist on Saturday evening that with

hurling in his blood, he will be involved in hurling next year. Justin didn't say where or with whom.

The Game

John Mullane who was forced to retire with an eye injury midway through the second half contributed 5 points from play and was a continuous threat to the Wexford defence, had our opening score in the first minute and Michael Jacob levelled for Wexford two minutes later.

Ken McGrath showing improvement on his last two games put Waterford back into the lead with a point from play in the 6th minute and Paul Flynn, who had a relatively quiet 70 minutes increased our lead from a free in the 7th minute. Paul Codd from a free and Eoin Murphy from play exchanged scores. Ken McGrath had the second of his 5 points in the 16th minute and the All-Star was back with another good score in the 18th minute. Adrian Fenlon raised a white flag for Wexford before John Mullane hit back with successive points in the 20th and 23rd minutes (0-8 to 0-3). Mullane supplied McGrath for our 9th point and the Deise were really flying at this stage with the crowd shouting them on.

The Wexford player who was subsequently awarded the "man of the match" trophy was still sitting in the dugout and at this point when Larry Murphy was introduced the direction of the game began to change. He came in at full forward and released Paul Codd for centre half forward on Fergal Hartley. Codd sent over three points in succession within a three minute strike. Then to help shatter our confidence Rory Jacob shot the only goal of the game after a defensive blunder almost on half time. It was level at 1-6 to 0-9 when Dave Bennett pointed to give us a narrow one point lead, 0-10 to 1-6 at the break.

Second Half

Paul Codd pointed two frees to give Wexford the lead within 3 minutes of the restart. Rory Jacob pointed from play and a splendid point from play by John Mullane in the 6th minute was cancelled out by an equally fine Larry Murphy point in the 8th minute of this half.

Ken McGrath and Michael Jordan exchanged points before points by Paul Flynn (free) and John Mullane brought the teams level in the 13th minute.

A free by Paul Flynn from 110 yards was wide but a Dan Shanahan point in the 21st. minute gave us the lead again. Codd brought them level in the 22nd minute and Michael Jacobs 23rd minute score gave the Leinster team the lead that they were to retain and build on and eventually run out deserving winners at the finish.

The introduction of Larry Murphy, the switching of Paul Codd to centre forward and the contribution of Rory Jacob were match winning factors for Wexford

The loss of John Mullane who missed the remaining 24 minutes of the game after suffering an eye injury was undoubtedly a factor in our defeat.




