Alleged CIRA Men Held **Following Raid On Suspected Training Camp**

Nine men were still being held for questioning yesterday (Tuesday) following the discovery of a suspected dissident republican training camp at an extremely remote

area of the Comeragh Mountains.

The men, aged between their late teens and early fifties, were arrested on Sunday afternoon at Knocknaree of Clonmel.

Five of those arrested are from Waterford, two from Wexford, and two from Limerick. One of the Waterford men is said to be from Dungarvan and another from Stradbally.

Gardai are questioning all nine men under Section 30 of the Offences Against the State Act on suspicion of being members of an illegal paramilitary group calling itself the Continuity IRA.

A ten-year-old boy, who is believed to be the son of one of the nine men, was also in the area at the time.

It follows on from the raid of a suspected Dissident Republican training camp and firing range at Knocknaree near Ballymacarbry.

The operation was carried out by Gardai from the Kilkenny/Waterford Division and heavily armed members

- roughly seven miles south of the Emergency Response Unit, and was the result of months of surveillance on the men.

> Two rifles, two shotguns and a large quantity of ammunition, and what Gardai have described as paramilitary paraphernalia were seized in the raid.

It is understood, the men had been practicing along a cleared roadway in the middle of a dense forest, and were firing on targets mounted on trees up to 120 yards away. Gardai also found balaclavas, and tripods for mounting the firearms.

The firearms are said to include a sawn off shotgun and an "under and over" type shotgun.

No firearms were discharged although it's believed two of the men tried to flee the scene on foot.







HOW DOES A PLANT BEGIN LIFE?

Indeed each seed, there is an embryo plant and a precious food store, ready for the first phase of the plant's life cycle. When conditions are right – when the ground is sufficiently warm and moist – the seed germinates. It sends out its mains root, with other, smaller roots branching off. Then the first leaves appear. The plant is now complete and can continue to grow, feeding itself by using the sunlight.



If There Is No Water...

If a seeds disperses into dry surroundings, it does not die. Instead the seed stays in the ground for up to a year until there is contact with water. Then it begins to germinate. Once the plant has germinated, the seed withers, because it is no longer required to feed the new plant.

How When What Why

When an insect lands on a flower searching for nectar, tiny grains of pollen stick to its feet or wings. So, when the insect flies to another flower, it deposits a little of this pollen on the stigma of the plant. Pollination is also carried out by the wind, or birds, like the Hummingbird.

Things To Do

Do you know how flowers can grow, even without soil? Put an Amaryllis bulb in a jar of water, so that the underside of the bulb is underwater. Place the jar in a shady place. Then, when the first leaves appear, put the jar in the light. You will see the bulb sending out roots and before a long flower will appear. The food necessary for the plant is in the bulb.

How Can A Plant Reproduce Without Seeds?

Some plants develop from bulbs or tubers — underground stems which can draw up the food necessary for new shoots. The part of the potato plant which we eat is the tuber. This tuber would have supplied food to the new shoots so that a new potato plant would grow.

Bulbs are made up of layers of leaves These leaves protect the cells from which the new plant will develop.

Bananas do not grow from seeds. The roots of a new plant grow on a rhizome, an underground stem which grows horizontally, and nourishes the plant in the same way as a bulb or tuber.

Some plants such as strawberries produce shoots which grow sideways, called runners. On contact with the soil, these runners develop roots, giving life to a new plant. When the plant begins to grow, the runner withers and dies.





THE homemade version of this tasty, famous and extremely healthy Italian soup is a delicious revelation.

Ingredients:

Serves 4 I large leek, thinly sliced

2 carrots, chopped

1 zucchini, thinly sliced

100g whole green beans, halved

2 celery sticks, thinly sliced

3 x 15ml sp olive oil

1.75 litres of vegetable stock or water

500g chopped tomatoes

1 x 15ml sp chopped fresh thyme or 1/2 x 5ml sp dried thyme

400g can cannellini beans

250g small pasta shapes

Salt

Ground black pepper

Chopped fresh parsley

Finely grated parmesan cheese

Method:

In a large saucepan, place the olive oil, leek, carrots, zucchini, green beans and celery.

Heat until sizzling. Cover, lower heat and cook for 15 minutes, shaking the pan occasionally.

Add the stock or water, tomatoes, herbs and seasoning.

Top with double cream then second sponge.

Dust with icing sugar.

Serve cool with fresh strawberries on the side for a rich and succulent treat.



High Court Application Into Shopping Centre Development Dismissed

against the applicant as well.

Ms. O'Connell was seeking the Judicial Review on a number of grounds including that An Bord Pleanala's decision was contrary to fair procedures and/or natural justice.

However, the High Court heard Ms. O'Connell did not properly serve some or all of the notice parties to the application.

The notice parties were listed as Lavine Ltd, Shane Houlihane, Dungarvan Town Council and two prior objectors to the development, Proinnsias Breathnach and An Taisce.

Under strict legal rules, the notice parties must be properly notified, and Ms. O'Connell's failure to do so resulted in the applications dismissal.

Clancy Constructions Managing Director, Billy Clancy, described the decision as a "huge relief".

"There will be up to 350 jobs created," he said, " and it would be very wrong if a tiny minority of objectors could deny Dungarvan those jobs."

LAST LEGAL HURDLE CLEARED

The decision effectively puts paid to the last legal and planning obstacle to the shopping centre going ahead. And, it now leaves the way clear for the developers to finally proceed after a costly two-year on again off again planning saga.

The development had already been subject to two appeals to An Bord Pleanala – the first of which saw permission overturned, and resulted in a radical overhaul of the developers plans.

Ms. O'Connell along with a small number of other groups and individuals was a party to both appeals, and on two other occasions objected to Dungarvan Town Council at the initial planning stage.

She was also recently involved in unsuccessful High Court and Supreme Court challenges against the construction of a Gas Fired Power Station on the same site.

Last weeks High Court decision, meanwhile, is understood to have exhausted the last possible legal avenue open to objectors of the shopping centre.

REACTION

Welcoming the news, County Manager, Donal Connolly said; "At long last the way is now clear for this project to proceed. It is extremely good news for Dungarvan and the county as a whole."

Speaking at last Thursdays meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, Mr. Connolly said there had been a danger that the application would result in a protracted case with a potential to last for months.

An Bord Pleanala were seeking an adjournment of the application hearing at the High Court, and if this was granted the application was not expected to be heard until October. Mr. Connolly said the application could have resulted in an injunction preventing work on the site in the interim.

"Thankfully", he told Tuesdays Irish Examiner, "this is the end of the road for the objectors, and the way is now clear."

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) also unreservedly welcomed the High Courts decision, which he said now allows the project to continue without further legal challenge.

"I think everybody in the town appreciates that it will take some time to develop the site, but I'm sure they will support its development over that time."

"It's then up to the local authority to make sure the development is completed with the minimum disruption possible to the public."

He added that it; "...will also hopefully contribute to the creation of major employment in a town that still needs it."



Alleged CIRA Men Held

An area of woodland has been sealed off since Sunday, and a technical examination was still underway yesterday morning. A number of cars belonging to the men were also searched.

The men are being held under Section 30 of the Offences Against the State Act, which allows Gardai to hold them for questioning without charge for a period of up to 72 hours.

At the time of going to press Tuesday (yesterday), the men were still being detained at Garda stations in Waterford, Tramore, Clonmel, Cahir and Thomastown. Gardai will decide whether or not to apply for a warrant from the District Court to hold them for a further 24 hours for more questioning.

Once the period of detention runs out, they will either be charged at Dublin's Special Criminal Court, or released with files sent to the DPP.

Approach From Private Consortium Re-floats Marina Plans

An approach by a private consortium, proposing to develop a marina in the inner harbour, has provided fresh hope that the addition of new maritime infrastructure could become a reality in Dungarvan.

Last Thursday's meeting of Dungarvan Town Council heard that a private developer – reportedly an English based consortium – has expressed an interest in developing the marina.

The proposal is for a joint venture with the Town Council, but County Manager, Donal Connolly said under public procurement rules, the local authority can only proceed by inviting proposals from other private developers.

"Following receipt of proposals," Mr. Connolly informed the members, "it will be a matter for the Council to decide on which proposal, if any, is best suited to the development of a marina in Dungarvan."

Mr. Connolly said the marina would have around 60 to 70 berths, and he recommended that the council raise the necessary resources so it would have a measure of control in it.

LONG RUNNING CAMPAIGN

The proposal by the private consortium is the latest re-emergence of plans to build a marina in Dungarvan. Six years ago, Malone O'Regan was commissioned to carry out a feasibility study, and due to problems with dredging, recommended that the marina be built in the outer harbour between the Lookout and the Cunnigar.

However, according to Mr. Connolly, this location has proven unpopular, and the inner harbour is seen as an ideal location - although he acknowledged that problems with dredging would still have to be dealt with, and wasn't ruling out any workable location.

Depending on the shape of the proposal eventually accepted it is expected that the winning developer will manage the day to day running of the marina, Mr. Connolly said.

SÓCIALIST REPUBLIC OF DUNGARVAN However, the proposal to build

a marina, called into question the future position of sailors who already have berthing rights in the harbour. Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab) raising the concerns, asked what would it mean to the ordinary small sailors who have had berths there for the past 30 to 40 years.

She later added that if she had a berth there she wouldn't want to be forced to another location by a private marina.

Deputy Deasy (FG) described putting conditions and restrictions on who the berths should go to and where the marina should be located on a private developer before seeing any plans, as the wrong approach.

"This isn't the Socialist Republic of Dungarvan," he said.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Indp), meanwhile, supported the proposal, saying it is the first

time a private developer has shown an interest in developing a marina in Dungarvan.

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) paid credit to the Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club for putting in place a pontoon, which he said has been successful against all the odds. He called for the expertise of the Harbour Sailing Club to be utilised in any effort to develop a marina.

He also poured scorn on the idea of a major investor coming in to develop the marina, and questioned whether it would be financially viable for a private company.

These responses, according to Deputy Deasy, amounted to "negative vibes," adding that he couldn't believe Cllr. Kyne's comment about the possibilities of investors not being interested.

He said the approach by a private developer "blows that one out of the water."

Responding, Cllr. Kyne said he was fully supportive of the idea, but "we have to be realistic about the difficulties," and again called for the expertise of the Harbour Sailing Club to be used.

Concluding the debate. Mr. Connolly said he would not like to give the impression that putting together the condition to develop a marina is going to be easy. But, he assured the members that he would consult with the various interests.

Deputy Deasy proposed that the council proceed to the drawing up of the necessary brief to enable them to advertise for proposals under a public private partnership agreement.

Seconding the proposal, Cllr. Kyne continued the seafaring puns, which had surfaced throughout the debate, recognising that "we'll sink or swim together on this one." The proposal was passed unanimously.



built in the year 1948. Older residents of Abbeyside will remember the open space area behind the Murphy Place houses. This area was behind the backs of the Murphy Place houses and fronted the Scouts

The Fenian Place houses were constructed on this open space by the Urban Council in

The open space area was known simply by Abbeyside residents as 'The Dump'. But despite the ordinariness of its title it was an area of significant social importance for the people of Abbeyside. The surface of 'The Dump' was bereft of grass and was in fact one of hard caked mud with many a sizeable stone protruding through the surface. It was on this concrete like surface that many of the young people of Abbeyside learned the skills of hurling. Other games played in the Dump were 'pitch and toss' and 'throwing the horse shoes' as well as a game of 'Brag' or 'Poker'. Young boys also set up frames there in order to trap songbirds, which could be sold for a shilling.

Before that time the front of The Dump along Sarsfield Street contained chicken houses owned by Maggie Donnelly who was also proprietor of a shop near the Old School situated in the Pond which was demolished recently.

These chicken houses were separated from the street by a conventional clay ditch. Behind the chicken houses were a number of garden plots. One plot was owned by Mrs. Hughes who married Christy Power and they opened a shop opposite the scout's den.

At the Pond side of the Dump the houses were owned by Needhams, Michael Maher (his sister was Mona Maher who Alice Organ. Mahers house was on the site where Cosgraves now live.

When the Murphy Place house were constructed all three of the a fore mentioned families were accommodated in the new estate. Across the road on the Scouts Den side lived Cathie Beathy, Mary Ellen Keohan and Minie Beathy. In the scouts field adjacent to 'The Den', Mary Ellen Keohan kept a pony presumably for pleasure purposes.

Famine and Fever

The Famine victims did not always die of starvation but of one of the fevers. There is also the fact, of course, that malnutrition debilitated a person and opened the way for mortal in-

The population dropped in most cases due, not only to deaths but also to emigration. The population figures for 1851 should be compared to that of 1841.

In the latter year there were 8,625 people (3,989 males and 4, 636 females) in the town which fell to 6,311 (846 males and 3,465 females) in 1851. This was a drop of 28%, the largest in all the urban areas of the County Waterford. This fall in population took place in the main town. However in the Abbeyside part of the town there was only a drop of 7 people in the population figures between 1841 and 1851

The surprising discovery is that there was an increase of 3.9% in the population of the rural portion of the Dungarvan and Abbeyside areas. The population in this rural area in 1841 was 4,696 and this rose to

4,883 in 1851. It is not clear why this happened but there must have been more food available there among the farmers and their workers. It is true, of course, that the unhygienic nature of much of urban households then was a major cause of the spread of infection. However, the stability and increase in the rural population around Dungarvan were not reflected in the rest of rural County Waterford.

from about 150g/day on sheep grazed pastures to about 200 g/day on after grass - ie. 1.0 to 1.4 kg/week. On grass shorter than 8-9cms gains will be substantially reduced.

Where lambs are not already accustomed to meal feeding, the finishing period will be prolonged by a further 7-10 days --- the time taken to build up to 500g/day.

- Ensure sufficient grass (8-9cms). Make the most of aftergrass, high clover pastures and pastures not grazed by lambs preweaning.
- The response to meal feeding is about 5kg meal/kg liveweight gain and is higher where there is short grass
- Energy ingredients are more important than protein
- Supplementing the ration with minerals/vitamins will negate the need to give oral mineral drenches.

As in most years there are some complaint concerning the wide variability in lamb slaughter weights ---not alone between producers but also within the supplies of individuals. This need not be so. By operating a good drafting procedure it is possible to have over 90% of lambs falling within a specific weight range.

(1) Along with price know the factory weight range and penal-

- (2) Estimate likely KO% ---- Unweaned lambs 48%
 - ---- Weaned lambs on grass early summer 45%
 - ---- Weaned lambs on grass late summer 43% ---- Lambs fed meals 1-2 units higher
- (3) Target top half of acceptable carcass weight range say 18 21 kg. Average carcass weight is then 19.5 kg
- (4) Average liveweight is then 19.5 divided by 45% for early summer lambs which is 43 kg
- (5) To limit carcass weight range to a 3 kg Spread (18 21 kg) the liveweight range should be no more than the 3 kg multiplied by 1.33 or just 4 kg. Lambs should be selected within the range 43kg ± 2kg or 41 to 45 kg liveweight.

In practice lambs should also be handled to ensure adequate finish. Select female lambs 1.5 -2 kg lighter.

Forestry

Summer work on your plantation

Many people believe that summer time is a period of relaxation for forest owners. This is not the case in reality. The summer months, though busy for most farmers is an important period for farm forest owners for numerous reasons.

- 1. Shaping: It is important for forest owners of broadleaves to ensure that appropriate shaping of their crops is undertaken at the right times. Although shaping can be undertaken in mid winter, the optimum period for shaping of Ash, Sycamore and Beech is in fact July and August. (Oak is still best shaped in mid winter). The main aim is to ensure that the crop has approximately 60% high quality and straight stemmed, grade 1 and 2 trees that could make the final crop. The age at which trees should be shaped varies depending on species, but in general, trees between 3-4 years should be shaped to remove any forks that may be present to ensure a single leader. Heavy side branches, over half the thickness of the main stem should also be removed. Ideally, no more that 30-40% of the growing area should be removed, so that the tree makes a rapid recovers and seals all open cuts preventing
- 2. Foliar analysis of broadleaves: Where the owner suspects hat the trees are growing poorly, now is the time to take foliar analysis, by collecting growing leaves and getting these analysed at a forest laboratory. If there are any nutritional problems, appropriate applications of fertilisers can be applied.
- 3. Vegetation Control: Though much of the growing season has passed, wet conditions have prevented many forest owners from undertaking appropriate vegetation control by spraying. Now is the time to ensure all work in undertaken, so that young seedling in particular will not be smothered by the heavy grasses and weeds. Furthermore, as this vegetation starts to die back, its weight will simply bend or break the forest seedling, reducing crop viability. Manual or chemical control may be necessary, and by simply walking your plantation, you will be able to inform your forest manager of this need.

ICMSA SEEKS GUARENTEED IRISH ASSURANCES FROM SUPPLIERS OF **FEILE BIA OUTLETS**

New arrangements on sourcing Irish beef under the Feile Bia label must be put in place. Denis Carroll, Chairperson, Kerry ICMSA said that legally binding contracts must be demanded by Feile Bia hotels and restaurants from their suppliers. This is in a bid to identify rogue traders of beef who are selling imported beef as Irish produce and conning both farmers and consumers according to Mr Carroll.

"I am particularly pleased that already representatives of the Irish Hotels Federation have reacted very positively to our proposals that beef suppliers to Feile Bia outlets will have to give legally binding supply contracts verifying that the beef is Irish. ICMSA has sought these changes with Bord Bia who are responsible for the operation of Feile Bia at national level. I am convinced that if this system is put in place the abuse of the present system will be eradicated," said Mr Car-

ICMSA TO MEET WITH DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE ON **VAT REBATE FOR FARMERS**

"The Department of Finance must undertake a review of the VAT rebate to farmers, with a view to increasing the level of rebate in Budget 2004". This was stated by Mr. Mike Doody, Chairperson of ICMSA's Taxation Committee.

"I have been in contact with the Department of Finance with regard to arranging a meeting on this issue. ICMSA believes that the current VAT rebate of 4.3 per cent is too low given the decline in the price of agricultural outputs and the accompanying rise in input prices since March 2001 when this rate became operational. The increase in the VAT rate from 12.5 per cent to 13.5 per cent in Budget 2003 should also be taken into account", said

"The Government has provided a commitment in the Sustaining Progress Agreement, to provide full transparency to ICMSA, with regard to the data and methodology used in the calculation for the VAT flat rate rebate due to farmers not registered for VAT", continued Mr. Doody.

"The Department have indicated to me that they will arrange a meeting on this issue with ICMSA as soon as possible. The relevant officials from the Revenue Commissioners and the Central Statistics Office, who have an important role in preparing the relevant data in respect of the scheme will also be in attendance"

Concluding, Mr. Doody said that he was encouraged by the Department of Finances movement on this issue and reiterated ICMSA's commitment to strive to increase the rate of VAT rebate and reducing the VAT rates in Budget 2004.

IFA TO DNA TEST HOTEL AND RESTAURANT BEEF AND LAMB TO ESTABLISH ORIGIN AND REASSURE CONSUMERS

Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman, Tom Leahy has announced that IFA is to undertake a programme of random testing on the origin of beef being offered to Irish consumers and tourists in hotels, restaurants and catering establishments.

Commencing immediately and continuing over the coming months IFA will take random samples from these establishments and have them DNA tested for origin with IdentiGEN laboratories, a Trinity College based company specialising in genetic identification. Mr. Leahy said IFA met with IdentiGEN in Dublin this week and put in place the arrangements for this testing programme. He said the results of the IFA tests will be published in the interests of full transparency.

Mr. Leahy said the testing programme will include a programme in County Kerry where there is particular concern among local beef and lamb producers about the level of imported product being used by the large tourist sector in the county

The Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman said Kerry IFA met with the Irish Hotels Federation in Killarney recently to highlight its concerns about the level of imports and the resistance among some outlets in the county to supporting An Bord Bia's, Feile Bia initiative, supporting quality Irish food.

"We will be seeking a commitment from tourist industry representatives that they fully support Irish produce and IFA will be seeking to work with the Irish hotel and restaurant sector to ensure that Irish consumers and tourists know what they are eating and are offered the best of Irish beef when they dine out."



Disability Awareness Accessibility Part 2

ment (June 2002) has a commitment to 'include provision for rights of assessment, provision, appeals and enforcement'. The Waterford Disability Network of PwDI, is of the view that there should be a statutory right to an independent assessment of need leading to a Statement of Need, as outlined in the Strategy for Equality.

Accessibility Part 2 Information Accessibility

The legislation should include:

- The provision of all information, for example, paper based, web based, telephone based, e-Govt products and services available to the public in accessible formats and language that is appropriate and readily understood by disabled users, including mainstream and specific services, therapeutic interventions, rehabilitation, impairment, advocacy, needs assessment etc. This should include information in a variety of different formats including, ISL and Braille.
- Information on conditions, treatments, prognosis and available services.
- Reference to and build upon the provisions for disability access laid out in the Communications Regulations Act 2001, and World Wide Web Consortium's Web Access Initiative Guidelines.
- A provision that publishers should make information accessible to individuals for their personal use without infringing copyright laws. Sanctions should be specified where access is not granted and for abusing information made accessible in this way.

Public **Procurement** and Tendering

All public bodies should be required to purchase only accessible goods, services and information technology products and services. This should include accessible venues for meetings and conferences and a refusal to award contracts to bodies that discriminate against people with disabilities. There should also be an obligation to re-tender in the absence of a tender being received from an accessible body, with an emphasis placed on awarding conacts to the body most v to become accessible or by requiring the implementation of

Physical Accessibility

Public and private bodies providing services to the public, including the following, should be required to be fully accessible, within specified time-

- Access to transport (air, sea, road and rail)
- Access to public buildings and public services
- Access to private services provided to the public
- · Access to the built and external environment

given to accessibility requirements in licensing criteria regarding transport, public houses and hotels and to incentives (financial or fiscal) that can be provided to support accessibili-

Voting

The legislation should include access to civic and political structures and mechanisms, including electoral systems so that all people with disabilities, including people in institutional settings, can be supported to

Consideration should be first language of deaf people and the rights of deaf people to receive services through ISL, and via lip speakers, note takers and speed text operators. This includes consideration to the recognition of ISL as an official language of the State so that it gains parity of recognition and treatment to spoken Irish (this could be achieved through a proposal in the legislation for a Constitutional amendment).

SIR RICHARD MUSGRAVE 1757-1818 (CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS WEEK 25/07/03)

By mid July 1798 people were aware that Musgrave was gathering information for a history of the Rebellion. He was supported by several Church of Ireland Bishops, and was given access to court-martial reports and county-assize indictments. In the spring of

1801 the book was published as:- "Memoirs of

the different Rebellions in Ireland from the Arrival of the English with a Particular Detail of that which broke out on the 23 May 1798; the History of the Conspiracy which preceded it, and the Characters of the Principal actors in it." It was priced at £1-7-6 and according to Musgrave the 1,250 copies were sold out in 2 months. A second edition was produced later in the year. A third and cheaper edition appeared in 1802. Musgrave made some changes and additions to the second and third editions. David Dickson in a forward to a new edition of Musgrave's memoirs published in 1995 described the authors agenda: "The insurrection of 1798 had been in essence a Papist Rebellion aided of course by Protestant dupes and Presbyterian republicans ... Musgraves's message in its sectarian outspokenness was too astringent for many Protestants and it is essential to recognise that his work became the political bible for a party, not for the whole Protestant Community. The Irish administration seeking to maintain a delicate détente with the Catholic Bishops, Musgrave's charge of profound Catholic complicity in the rebellion and his unqualified defence of loyalist excesses were politically unwelcome. As a result the retiring Lord Lieutenant, Marques Cornwallis, demanded that Musgrave's dedication to him (which had appeared in the first edition) be removed. He thought the book "tended to revive the dreadful animosities which have so long distracted this county". While Musgrave's memoirs are undoubtedly biased it is now recognised by historians as an important source for the study of the period. It was ironic that Sir Richard's nephew and heir to the baroncy joined the Catholic Association in 1826 and became MP for Co. Waterford in the 1830's. Sir Richard did not get on with his wife Deborah and she decided it was time to end the marriage when one night while he was having a nightmare he cried out "You infernal papist rebel" and tried to choke her to death!

Musgrave died at his house in Holles Street. Dublin on 7 April 1818.



LYNCH HONOURED ON MOUNTAIN SIDE

Speaking at the commemoration to mark the 80th anniversary of the death of General Liam Lynch who was killed in action in

the Civil War at the Monument to his memory on the slopes of the Knockmealdown mountains. John J. Hassett, President of the Irish Bardic Federation called for a "national forum to examine a federal system of Government that would give meaningful powers to the regions to allow them control over local affairs". Mr. Hassett said, a new way forward for the whole of Ireland under a federal system of government may be a more acceptable and workable solution for all political parties. If Mr. Paisley, Mr. Trimble, Mr. Adams and Mr. Durkin are prepared to operate in a six county assembly as Ulster folk, they should have no objection to a federal parliament of a nine county Ulster. Mr. Hassett continuing, said, the challenge, the Irish nation and in particular the extended republican family face, is to achieve a unity of purpose, to combat the forces of revisionism, that is blighting pride in our country and its history. A relentless campaign of vilification, demonisation and character assassination continues against honourable people who make public their aspirations to have Ireland free of British occupation. He spoke warmly and admirably of our ancestors in this area who made their way over the rugged bogs and mountain to join in the celebration of Mass at the Mountouke Mass Rock and how they and their priests risked their lives in doing so. A poem by a Mass Rock Priest, Rev. Fr. Thomas Coursey who died as a Martyr for the faith in 1577 in the reign of Queen Elizabeth 1st, in the course of the poem he praises the people who frequented the Mass Rock in the Glen and then he claims that the men on the lookout fell asleep and woke when they saw the red coats coming up the hill, the man ran quickly and exchanged his clothes for the priests vestments. The priest escaped, but the watchman was hanged at the Mass Rock in his place. Fr. Halliney then asked the assembled congregation of many hundreds how many of you would be willing to swap your clothes for the vestments if you aw a Red Coat coming over Cnocian An Afrinn today. Fr. Coursey was beautified by Pope John 2 in 1992. Without the aid of amplification Fr. Paddy's strong and confident voice reached out across the assembled gathering seated around the Mass Rock and across the mountain stream which formed a little valley on the mountain side. Rev. Fr. Nugent Sean P.P. Clogheen/Burncourt a native of Newcastle and a member from the Cisterian Monastery at Mount Melleray concelebrated the Mass with Fr. Paddy, the altar was decorated with a mixture of wild and cultivated flowers brought along by members of the congregation. Fr. Paddy earlier led the congregation in a recital of the rosary

PRIEST RETIRES IN CARRICKBEG

Very. Rev. Fr. John Cahill CSSP retires this week after serving seventeen years in the parish of Carrickbeg/Windgap. Fr. John was born in Cork and educated at the Christian Brothers North Monastery which he left in 1941 to study for the Priesthood at the Holy Ghost Fathers Navitiate in Kilshane, arriving by train at imerick Junction station, due to a misunderstanding there was nobody to meet him at the station as it was war times and transport scarce, the station master told him the only way to get to Kilshone was to walk, a journey of eight miles. Fr. John set out on his walk not sure of his surroundings and not geared for walking, so as time went by he became tired and weary. Eventually, he said to himself if my destination is not around the next corner, I will go back home. Many people throughout Ireland and Nigeria and of course the parishioners of Carrickbeg and Windgap should offer thanks that the Novitiate was around the next corner.

Fr. John continued his studies at the Holy Ghost Father Kimmage Manor Dublin and University College, Dublin before being appointed to a teaching post in Rockwell College. He was ordained in 1950 and he volunteered to serve in the dioceses of Owerri in Nigeria, while there he worked closely with Holy Ghost colleague Fr. Michael Frawley. Fr. John returned to Ireland in 1969 as the Biafran War was raging in Nigeria and he took up a post of St. Mary's College, Rath-

mines. After twenty years teaching he was ready for a change and from 1971 to 1986 he served as a curate in Athy, Co. Kildare which was part of the Dublin Archdiosese. In the meantime his friend Fr. Frowley had been serving in Carrickbeg, Windgap and Fr. Cahill visited him there in 1986 the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore asked Fr. Frowley to be Parish Priest of Kilrossanty/Fews with a caveat that he got a fellow Holy Ghost Priest as a replacement in Carrickbeg, Fr. John was the obvious choice, he took up the offer and said it was one of the best decisions he ever made. Fr. John was a popular Curate in Carrickbeg, quiet, unassuming and modest. He had been an outstanding hurler, at a period when Cork hurling was at a peak he won two Harty Cup medals with North Mon in a team that starred many Cork hurling stars which included Con Murphy, in a game he marked Jack Lynch and he was a strong supporter of Cork

The people wish Fr. John a happy retirement in Rockwell College where he taught and prefected over fifty years ago.

CO. WATERFORD PRIEST PULLS NO PUNCHES Rev. Fr. Bernard Hahessy, a na-

tive of Scartlea in the parish of

Carrickbeg/Windgap has written a book titled In Defence of Catholic Teaching. The whole truth which he says will be of help to those who are confused or bewildered by constant changes in the church and widespread ignorance of Catholic teaching. Fr. Hahessy was educated at the Christian Brothers Secondary School, Carrick-On-Suir, cycling to and from daily before entering St. John's College, Waterford where he was ordained in 1952. He celebrated his Golden Jubilee last year and all his time in the priesthood has been in the south west of England, he has been Parish Priest of Saint Edward's Parish in Plymouth for the past sixteen years. Fr. Hahesy is convinced that many people today, not only church goers are searching for moral guidance as an anchor for their disordered lives. They are seeking the truth which will set them free, yet they are turning to all sorts of unreliable and even preposterous religions and philosophies which he believes will confuse them even more. He believes that he would have fallen down on his job as a priest if he did not make it clear to people how the traditional teaching of the Catholic Church could lead them out of darkness into the light of Christ, from ignorance to true knowledge; from sadness and despair, to hope and joy: from greed and selfishness into true love, harmony and peace. In short, the knowledge and love of God and of others would enable them to live life to the full, free from sorrow and Fr. Hahessy pulls no punches in

his book and his highly critical of the failure of what he calls 'liberal' priests and religious to teach the truths of the church and he accuses the secular media of endevouring to distort and even oppose church teaching. However, overall this is a very friendly book full of a genuine pastoral love for the reader and contains lots of interesting and amusing anecdotes. It is a delightful, informative yet uncompromising but consoling book. Fr. Hahessy pays regular visits to his family home in Scartlea and before entering the priesthood he hurled with St. Molleran's GAA Club in the Waterford Championships. However, it emerged that the Management Group is not a representative group of residents in the flats - although they look after the residents interests - but was appointed by the owners of the flats.

The owners, claimed by Deputy John Deasy (FG), to mainly hail from outside Dungarvan, benefited in their purchases under tax incentives, and Cllr. Wright pointed out that the people who "bought those flats can well afford to contribute towards the painting of the building."

"We have to put the skids under them to paint it as quickly as possible," she said.

Progress Ongoing On Roads **Around Town**

Progress is ongoing on roadworks around the town, a report from Town Engineer, Dan O'-Donovan informed the members of Dungarvan Town Council.

According to the report, footpaths in Pinewood, Congress Villas and Murphy Place are all ongoing, while repairs to the footpath at Bridge Street are half way through.

Also in progress at the moment are roadworks on the pedestrian crossing at Clonea and Seapark, pedestrian and cycle lights in Abbeyside, and the lining of roads around the

Most of this years surfacing and strengthening works have already been completed, including at Buttery Lane, N25/Abbeyside Lane, a section of concrete road by the Lookout, Hillview Drive, the public driveway to the rear of the Sports Centre; the pitch and putt club; Davitts Quay and at Silversprings.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG), who asked the Town Engineer to provide a progress report in July rather than later in the year, welcomed the reports findings, adding that he was happy that a lot more works were completed this year.

Deputy John Deasy, (FG), meanwhile, repeated his call for a roundabout to be located at the Davitts Quay junction on Bridge Street, but County Manager, Donal Connolly said it probably won't be started until 2004 at the earliest.

He said it was hoped to develop the roundabout in tandem with Clancy Construction's shopping centre development on the former Glanbia owned lands.

Affordable Housing **Development Destined For Abbeyside**

Dungarvan Town Council is to seek a eurl.7 million loan for the purchase of 12.7 acres off the Clonea Road in Abbeyside, which would be used for the development of social and affordable housing.

Members of the council unanimously sanctioned the County Manager to seek approval for the loan. The price would be around 150,000 euros per acre, which Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Indp) said seemed

However, County Manager, Donal Connolly said there would be around 10 to 12 houses per acre, and the deal worked out roughly equal to previous land acquisitions.

The council also hope to employ the National Building Association again to design the overall layout of the develop-

Deputy Deasy (FG) supported the proposed acquisition of the site, as Abbeyside needs the development of social affordable housing. His comments were echoed by Cllr. O'Riordan (Indp) and all the other members of the council.

Meanwhile the Town Council will seek a further loan of eur110,000 for the development of a ring of broadband infrastructure connecting up the industrial estates in the town.

The overall cost of the development will cost in the region of eur1.268 million. But, ninety per cent of the cost will be granted by the Department of Communications, with the Town Council to provide the remainder.

Again, members of the Town Council unanimously passed the proposal.

Childcare Cuts **Criticised**

Restoration Of Marker Buoys elcomea

Deputy John Deasy (FG) welcomed the restoration of a number of marker buoys and their placement in different locations around the town.

Deputy Deasy, who spearheaded the restoration bid, thanked all those involved and described their restoration as both successful and cost effective.

The buoys had been consigned to landfill, but John Deasy were then moved to the Council yard for restoration, and later placed on the quay, Strandside, and a number of other locations around the town.





Minister Approves 12.5 Million Wastewater Treatment Plant Tender

Minister for the Environment, Martin Cullen, has approved a tender, worth an estimated eur12.5 million from ABV for the construction and operation of the Ballinacourty Wastewater Treatment Plant.

The approval is the second stage in the development of the overall Dungarvan and Environs Sewerage Scheme, and follows on from the start of the Collection and Delivery System, which has been ongoing around the town for a number of weeks.

The Wastewater Treatment Plant is to be located on the site of the former Quigley Magnesite Plant in Ballinacourty, and is expected to radically improve the quality of water in Dungarvan Harbour.

ABV, which is a consortium of three companies – Ascon, Bowenwater Technology, and Vivendi, will design and construct the plant, and will also run it for the next twenty years. The project will be funded under the National Development Plan (NDP).

"This clears the way for the work on the new plant to begin immediately and I will be asking Waterford County Council to ensure that the contract is signed and the contractor brought on site without delay," Minister Cullen said announcing his decision.

The overall scheme, including the Collection and Delivery system will cost almost eur30 million, and Minister Cullen predicted it will greatly improve environmental standards for local residents and visitors, and cater for the towns future developmental needs.

EXPANSION AT UDARAS FACTORY IN OLD PARISH

It's been confirmed that Udarás na Gaeltachta will be making a 150,000 Euro grant available to a wood products factory in Old Parish, towards an extension to it's production and storage facilities at a factory it leases from the authority at Barra na Stuaic.

Welcoming the move, which was agreed at the July monthly meeting of the Udarás Board in Ring last week, the authority's Waterford Gaeltacht member Fiachra O Céilleachair said it would consolidate 10 jobs and permit Troscán na nDéise Teoranta further develop. Cllr. O Céilleachair also confirmed that the Udarás will be issuing a separate research grant to the company, in order to assist it in identifying methods of dealing with surplus wood materials after production.

Congratulating the company on it's ongoing commitment to the Ring/Old Parish area, Cllr. O Céilleachair said: "Troscán na nDéise Teoranta have been manufacturing veneer type material suitable to the general furniture and fittings industry, mainly serving the Irish market. Since beginning production with Udarás assistance in Old Parish in 1999, Troscán na nDéise's returns have grown. Presently, the company is housed in Udarás na Gaeltachthe Priest's Cross. The new Udarás grant compliments the company's development plans and enables a further 108 square metres of factory space to be added to the facility, which will assist both production and storage requirements. I'm also pleased that the Udarás is to invest in the company research plan, additional to the 150,000 Euro for the factory expansion. I'm confident that the various requirements can be fulfilled in order for all of this development and release of monies to occur in the shorter term. I remain hopeful that the Udarás can attract other successful small enterprises to locate at lands owned by it at Barra na Stuaic in Old Parish and Baile na nGall in Ring.'



FUN WITH FARTLEK

As fun to run, as it is to say, a fartlek workout is a kind of informal interval session and a great way to incorporate speedwork into your routine when you want a change from the track. "Fartlek" is Swedish for "speed play" and consists of bursts of speed in the middle of a training run. After warming up, run at an easy training pace, throwing in bursts of speed for various distances throughout the run. Vary the speed and times of the speed sections, from as short as 15 seconds to as long as two or three minutes. Between these bursts, allow yourself enough recovery time to match roughly 2/3 of the effort time. The recovery pace, though, should be faster than the recovery jog you might do during intervals on the track; keep it moving at an easy training pace.



Joe Gough and Brendan Moran, Brendan got the day off to a great start with a superb win in the over 45 100 metres and a short time later was unlucky not to add another gold when narrowly beaten in the 200 meters having to settle for the silver, non the less a great achievement for Brendan. Joe Gough was once again in sparkling form and rounded off the day with a treble gold winning the 200, 400 and 800 meters over 50, addiding to the three gold's which he had already won during the indoor season at the same three events remarkable achievement indeed to win 200,400,and 800 at both indoor and outdoor in the same season,but of course he is the current European gold medallist and the world silver medallist over 800 meters, well done once again from all at the club.

THE RUNNERS RECOVERY

Returning to running after a brief layoff? A general rule of thumb is that it takes about two weeks of "retraining" to come back from every week in which you do no exercise. Go easy on yourself during this period. Don't let your ego convince you that you should immediately be able to run as you did before. If you've been off the roads for only a week or two, start at about half the distance you were running before the injury. You should be able to build back to your former level in two to four weeks.

DITCH THE STITCH

Every runner has experienced the dreaded side stitch, a sudden sharp pain in the side of the upper abdomen at the base of the ribs. The pain is caused by a spasm of the diaphragm, the muscle that controls your breathing.

A stitch will usually go away quickly after slowing down or stopping, but even on the run, you can often make it go away by bringing your breathing into careful control.

Concentrate on belly breathing, pushing your belly out when you breathe in and relaxing it as you breathe out. Take deep breaths on the intake, and exhale suddenly, even noisily. To get the diaphragm to contract in rhythm with your steps, try to inhale and exhale as you land on your left foot



MICK HAYES R.I.P.

Another link with the 1948 All Ireland senior hurling champions was broken on Sunday morning last when Mick Hayes of Butlerstown passed to his eternal reward. The hurling records of the Deise will list the popular Butlerstown man as one of our all-time greats.

Having won a county junior hurling championship after defeating Abbeyside in 1946, he quickly gained recognition at senior level and partnered Johnnie O'Connor at midfield in the 1948 All Ireland final when Waterford took their first McCarthy Cup after defeating Dublin by 6-7 to 4-2. Having played on several Railway Cup teams with Munster, he starred on two winning teams when playing among many of the all time greats of the province including Mick Mackey, Christy Ring, Jackie Power and John Mackey, Limerick, Jack Lynch and Jim Young, Cork, etc. He played on the team which defeated Connaght by 3-10 to 4-8 in the 1946 Railway Cup final and was again at centrefield in 1948 when Munster regained the Railway Cup after beating Leinster by 3-5 to 2-5.

In his heyday, Mick Hayes had Waterford stars, including John Keane, Jackie Good, Vin Baston, Andy Fleming, Eddie Daly and company listed among his colleagues on

In retirement, he always remained a loyal Waterford supporter and rarely missed a game when the county team was in action.

A few of his old colleagues were in attendance when he was given a traditional GAA burial on Tuesday. May he rest in peace.

A NEW SENIOR HURLING TEAM MANAGER

Following a very long discussion on the subject, it was decided on the proposition of Tommy Hennessy that a five man committee (Task Force) be set up to interview likely and suitable candidates for the position.

This was debated at length before it was agreed that the number of the task force would be six.

This will comprise the county chairman, P.S. O Riain, secretary Seamus Grant, treasurer Tony Morrissey, vice/chairman Pat Flynn, with Jimmy O'Gorman Munster Council and John Quinn, Mount

Their remit is to interview suitable people, including the outgoing manager Justin McCarthy and to have a recommendation ready for the next board meeting which will be held at the end of this month or at the start of September.

The chairman thought that the office of chairman should be represented on this selection committee and this was agreed. The county chairman will now be a member of the senior hurling selection committee, but this will not be a permanent arrangement since it is not a

At the start of this discussion, many delegates were not in favour of moving so quickly on the appointment as it was not on the agenda and as Greg Fives pointed out, clubs did not have the opportunity of discussing the matter. Jimmy O'Gorman felt that the new management team should be in place before the club hurling championship

DELAYED START

The delayed start to the commencement of the senior hurling championship was well discussed and a very large number of delegates expressed their disappointment that a round or two could not have been played before the hurling intercounty programme began. The frustration of not knowing when they were playing championship was suffered by all the clubs involved.

Liam Moroney, Tallow said his club had played 7 senior hurling league matches and these did not include even one weekend game, as all were played on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Greg Fives, who opened the discussion, Tony Coffey, Pat Fennell Liam Moroney, Jim Hennessy, Paddy Fitzgerald Declan O'Meara, Declan Kiely, John Lyons, etc. were among those who contributed to the debate.

SENIOR HURLING REPORT

Justin McCarthy in his final report of the season stated that the county hurling panel had played a total of 21 matches over the season. Of the 21 matches, 11 were won, 9 were lost and one was drawn. He said that luck was not on their side on a few occasions, but the commitment and dedication of the players was excellent. He said that the county panel included players of a very high quality and he felt that success could not be denied them for much longer.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP REPORT

Greg Fives spoke about the problems associated with the fixing of he Munster intermediate hurling final against Cork.

He told the meeting that Cork were pressing for Thurles and we wanted Clonmel. Cashel was fixed by the Munster Council and while the Cashel Club were to be congratulated on the preparation of the ground, it was not the most suitable venue.

He said that the atrocious conditions allied to the fact that Waterford had to play with 14 players for almost 55 minutes, made it extremely difficult for them to win. He said that the panel of players were totally committed and the response to training was splendid.

During this report the matter of the subs on the senior hurling team bench was referred to. It was pointed out that ten of that 15 substitutes could not be played and they being eligible, should be made available to the intermediate county selectors.

Paddy Fitzgerald complained about the treatment of dual players at minor level and said that talented dual players should be allowed to play both codes.

GOLF CLASSIC SUCCESS

Justin Spratt of the West Waterford Golf Club and Chairman of the GAA Golf Classic Committee was in attendance to present a cheque for a figure in excess of 20,000 euro to the county board. These were the proceeds of the recent classic and Justin thanked the clubs who had responded and taken part in what was not just a successful, but also a very enjoyable competition.

The county chairman in thanking Justin and his hard working committee also thanked the clubs and individuals, etc. that had participated and expressed disappointment that a number of clubs (in the East) had not taken part. He asked if these clubs would now forward a subscription to the treasurer.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Treasurer Tony Morrissey said that as no senior championship games had been played since their last meeting, there was little to report except the worrying situation about the huge cost of training our intercounty teams.

He said we are still involved in the under 21 football championship and when our interest in the intercounty scene eventually ends, he will present a detailed report to the board, probably at the September meeting. He was asked to include in his report the cost of providing jerseys to the various teams (more than a dozen sets must have been swapped this season) and the amount paid in fines for breaches of match regulations, etc.
