Oral Hearing Sought Into Garrynagree 'Superdump'

OBJECTORS EXAMINING LEGAL IMPLICATIONS OF NEW LANDFILL REPORT

An Bord Pleanala are expected to decide whether or not to grant an oral hearing into Waterford County Council's planned 'superdump' at Garrynagree within the next four weeks, it has emerged.

A spokesperson for An Bord Pleanala has confirmed that over one hundred objections were made against the local authorities plans, including by the Lickey Concern Group, An Taisce, the Southern Regional

Fisheries Board, the Irish Peatland Conservation Council and the National Roads Authority.

All the other submissions are from private individuals both resident within the area, or with an interest in the areas preservation. And, at least one submission calls for an oral hearing - which could add months onto the deliberation

However, Heritage Officer with An Taisce, Ian Lumley,

to An Bord Pleanala by Waterford County Council has left the process open to legal chal-

The local authority circulated a report to An Bord Pleanala finally recognising the River Lickey's status as a Special Area of Conservation (SAC) just a day before the close of submissions - denying objectors a chance to examine it.

"What Waterford County Council have tried to do is retrospectively regularise the situation," Mr. Lumley said. "If it was any other person or group, it would be ruled invalid even if it was just two minutes late." **CONTINUED ON PAGE 58**


WHERE DO WE GET NUTS FROM?

Councillor Sees Role For Local Authority In Policing

A member of Waterford County Council says a package of policing reforms announced at the end of July by Justice Minister Michael McDowell require clarification as regards the role envisaged for local authorities in recognised co-operation with the Gárda Síochána.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair says he shares the Labour Party's contention that policing liaison committees should be formally established at local authority level, to contribute to the drawing up of policing plans at a local level and to monitor their implementation.

However, says Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, despite what Minister McDowell has referred to as a "proposal for enhanced cooperation between the Police and Local Authorities", no detail has appeared on the role of the new structures.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says he shares his party's concerns that the type of committees the Minister has in mind may be confined to providing a mere forum for discussion and co-operation instead of a radical new structure that would bring increased interaction between communities and policing plans.

Urging that the potential of such forums be enhanced, Cllr. O Céilleachair said:

"No one is saying that primary operational matters be taken out of the hands of the Gárdai nor that policing is generally deficient. Rather, this is an opportunity to emulate the kind of established interactive partnerships that have been a



feature of local democracy throughout continental Europe and have also been effective in the UK. It is a method of further resourcing the Gárdai to succeed in their aim – on our behalf – to maintain safer communities."

"There are already lines of communication between those in local authorities and the Gárdai. Instead of mere recognition of that, one could see great potential in an active planning body in the community reporting back to it's elected representatives. As issues to do with law and order and the demand for extra resources for the Gárdai are among those frequently raised with local representatives, I'm sure the inclusion of such an item as a matter of course on the agenda of local authority meetings would be a positive development."

"I hope the Minister takes on board the Labour Party's policy in this respect".



Cinnamon cream with oranges

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 10 mins

A SPICY, fruity summer dessert with rich cream.

INGREDIENTS

(Serves 5-6)

450ml double cream

450 milk

100g caster sugar

1 tsp cinnamon

2-3 tsp powdered gelatin

5-6 oranges, peeled, pith removed

2 tblsp caster sugar

Fresh mint to decorate

For the cinnamon cream, bring the cream, milk, sugar and cinnamon to the boil, then remove from the heat.

Mix the gelatin with two to three tablespoons of water and warm gently until dissolved.

Add to the cinnamon cream and mix. Divide the mixture among size one ramekins and leave in the fridge overnight to set. Segment the oranges and place on a baking tray. Sprinkle with caster sugar and place under a very hot grill for three to four minutes until caramelised.

To serve, dip the base of each ramekin in hot water and turn out putting onto a plate.

Arrange the orange segments around and decorate with mint.

Approval Given For New Recycling Facility

Dungarvan Town Council has granted approval for the fitting out of the eur1.3 advance factory at Shandon as a dry recycling facility to handle waste

from the countywide kerbside collections.

At its recent meeting, members voted to approve County Manager Donal Connolly's recommendation by five votes to three, which subject to approval of a waste license, clears the way to operate the facility as a recycling plant.

With its operation, the contract with Samshire in Lismore will cease, and the 2,900 tonnes of waste currently recycled there each year will instead be dealt with in Dungarvan.

According to Mr. Connolly, ten jobs will be created - mainly in operational and management roles - and the plant will be almost entirely automated with none of the waste to be sorted by hand.

The vote saw a trio of Labour Councillors row behind the proposal - a significant shift in position from when the proposal first came before the council.

Both Cllr. Billy Kyne, who voiced serious doubts about the proposal at that first meeting and Cllr. Lar Hart, who voted against it at the June meeting, voted in favour of the proposal, leaving Cllr. Teresa Wright as the lone Labour member to voice opposition.

WRONG LOCATION

Cllr. Wright said she still be-

lieved the Advance Factory was wage on par with those of the wrong location for the recycling facility as it is near a residential estate, and proposed that more time be given to make a decision, and that the option of siting the facility on a green field site be examined.

Deputy John Deasy (FG), who has also remained steadfastly against the location of the recycling plant in the Advance Factory, seconded the amend-

Before supporting the proposal. Cllr. Hart asked for a number of guarantees to be given, including on the operation of the plant, employment numbers and on security of employment.

Echoing these comments, Cllr. Kyne said Cllr. Wright raised many valid points, and initially he had his reservations.

"But on balance, I believe the issues causing concern can be addressed", while the town needs the creation of the "decent" jobs the plant could create. He said he would give the recycling plant his support if three main points of concern were taken on board.

These points included an assurance that the jobs will be local, high quality, and that the Local Authority workers.

He also called for a "three strikes and your out" clause to be written into the contract of the company, and for guarantees that the facility would be beneficial to local businesses, and due recognition given to the plant's role in attracting other businesses to the town. "If these points are taken on board, then I'll give it my support."

However, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) argued that his points were more "aspirational than realistic," while Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Inpd) supported Cllr. Kyne's comments, arguing that the facility would be almost noiseless and lead to job creation.

County Manager, Mr. Connolly, giving the assurances - although he said specifics on wages would have to be dealt with between unions and the company - added that the problems at Lismore would not crop up at the new facility, as the building would be owned by the council and they could terminate the contract if it was run badly.

RESIDENTS NOT CONSULTED

Throughout the course of the workers there be provided a debate, however, the fate of the

residents in the newly constructed social and affordable house were not even mentioned, according to Cllr. Wright.

"They'll practically be living beside a recycling plant," she said, "I couldn't see that happening if this was a private estate we were talking about to be perfectly honest."

She went on to say that the people in the residential estates hadn't even been consulted on

Mr. Connolly strongly rejected this claim, saying that the plans went through the proper consultation phase, and submissions were invited from the public. One submission was made by a local resident, asking for assurances on a number of points including that composting would be not part of the plans. Mr. Connolly assured the council that composting will not dealt with at the

Cllr. O'Riordan, meanwhile, claimed Cllr. Wright was being "a bit sensational" when saying that it would be in the middle of a housing estate, and said the houses nearest the plant would be private.

While, Mr. Connolly said that

In a show of hands, Deputy John Deasy, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (both FG), and Cllr. Wright (Lab) voted for more time to be given to deciding on the location of the facility. Mayor Paddy Power, Cllr. Lar Hart, Cllr. Billy Kyne (all Lab), Cllr. Damien Dillon and Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (both Indp) voted in favour of locating the facility at the Advance Factory and the proposal was declared carried 5-3. Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) was absent.

PICTURES AT AN **EXHIBITION**

Just imagine a resurrected Mussorgsky, over on a tour of the Déise country, far from his native Russia, and strolling along Davitt's Quay. Spotting the sign An Leabharlann and being naturally inquisitive, he enters and much to his delight he sees Dungarvan Camera Club's Annual Exhibition. Not needing the works of his deceased friend Hartmann to stimulate him once again, he instantly becomes absorbed in the almost -100 pictures on display, and while simultaneously listening to Abha Móire na nDéise and Sliabh Geal gCua playing unobtrusively in the background, is immediately inspired to compose a personal survey of favourites among the displayed exhibits, and having once more the ingenious idea of linking the musical vignettes with a Promenade theme, representing his own involvement, just as he had already done back in 1874. This time he would need no Maurice Ravel to make his original work the world-famous composition it is today.

The numerous pictures are a delight to behold, despite the fact that I appeared to be going, unusually, anti-clockwise to view them.

'That's because we're creative!' said a lady named Karen. The first six pictures by Eugene Burke were right from the bottom of the Red Sea, his Friends having a certain aura about it. Maura Curran's, Discus Thrower - a dramatic graphic image, was hanging beside an excellent new angle on Cahir Castle. Meanwhile Richard Cutbill's Study of Gannets - Plate 2 was so well executed that many thought this was a layered image generated on a computer. No so!

Honeycomb in Oz, by Karen Dempsey had everyone guessing once more - was this image manipulated or not, while her Inside the Spire was the picture hundreds of professionals around the country would like to have taken. Winter, a superb landscape in delicate sepialike shades of brown was just one of a selection from around the world by well-travelled Donal Fenton - a member from far away Gleanntán Araglin Aoibhinn. Mary Flavin's Comeragh Mountains was so sharp from front to back; you thought you were right at the spot!

Eileen Hyland - computer whizkid, who designed and churned out all the necessary printed matter for the occasion - displayed an excellent six-picture panorama of Dungarvan from Abbey side. Possibly the first ever such panoramic view of the area to be seen, it should be snapped up quickly as a conversation piece by some viewer or business establishment. Yes, practically all the pictures are for sale. A purchase application form is available from the ever-helpful library assis-

The panel by Club Chairman, David Ind. was something to be proud of, notably his Elenor and View over Ballinvella. Here's a guy with a 'seeing eye' and the knowledge to capture his subjects with professionalism. The Work House Door by Sean O'Brien of Portlaw. was one of the few manipulated images, depicting the Famine era, included skulls which we discovered were originally only about 5cm high. His Le Luí na Gréine Heilbhic and Cart Wheel at Lyre literally jumped off the exhibition stand with their vivid reds. The contrejour seascape Whiting Bay, by Jane O'Loughlin, was superbly achieved as was her Cunnigar - like creatures on a distant planet! Jenny Power travelled up to one of my favourite places, Stradbally Cove, to capture one of her images entitled Resting and then headed in the opposite direction to 'bag' one of the glassless windows at Dromana Gate.

A lion-like face, bearing a smug expression, with Marino Casino in the background, was one of the images exhibited by Shara Smith.

Past-Club-Cathaoirleach, Liam Suipéil's Cúram - a recent club competition winner, graced the stands along with other fine landscapes and seascapes with delightful names like Sean 'is Nua - the well-observed juxtaposition of two buildings - and Ar Maidin sa Chois.

Eamonn Terry's Puffin on Great Saltee, complete with a beakfull of sand-eels, was just one of a great series of bird pictures from the same island.


Next to catch the eye was watercolour-like Reflections, on the River Bride, by Mary Tobin which has already sold like hot buns at her

National Roads Authority Chief Honoured by Dungarvan Town Council

Last Friday evening in the Council Chambers of the Waterford County Civic Offices, the Chief Executive of the National Roads Authority, Mr. Michael Tobin, a native of Dungarvan, was accorded a Civic Reception by the Dungarvan Town Council in recognition of his exemplary service to his country and his appointment to the prestigious position of head of the NRA.

Among those in attendance were the Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Paddy Power, the Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Billy Kyne, their fellow Councillors Michael O'Riordan, Lar Hart, Nuala Ryan, Damien Dillon, and Damien Geoghegan. Also present were Mr. Tobin's wife Maura, their son Andrew and Rosemary Martin; Michael's sister Ann Power and her husband Kevin; his brother Paddy and his wife Mary, and many members of the extended Tobin family; Mr. Donal Con-nolly, Co. Manager, Acting Town Clerk, Mr. Joe O'Flaherty, Head of Finance, Mr. Paul Clerkin, Senior Roads Engi-

Last Friday evening in the neers, Mr Eamonn Mansfield and Mr.

Vincent O'Connor, former Senior Roads Engineer, Mr. Tom Lineen, Very Rev. N. Canon O'Mahony, P.P., and colleagues of Mr. Tobin from the NRA. Mr. Tom Keith, acted as MC throughout.

In his address to the Council, the Mayor, Cllr. Paddy Power said that he was 'pleased and proud' to welcome Mr. Tobin to the Council Chamber, to acknowledge not only the work he had done as a senior civil servant, but the quiet, courteous, effective and efficient manner in which he had always discharged 'his considerable responsibilities'.

"As head of the National Roads Authority," he said, "he has control of a budget that few other public servants can claim and *1.25 Billion must be regarded as a considerable sum to disburse around the country.

"We have seen how the national road network has improved out of all proportion since the inception of the National Roads Authority in Janu-

ary, 1994," he continued, "and while you would be the last to take credit for this, it is widely accepted that under your guidance and direction, we have got value for money and a road system of which we can begin to be proud."

He traced Michael's career through the Civil Service from the Combined Purchasing Section where he started, through his years in the Planning Appeals Section to Roads Administration, a move which was to dictate where he would serve in later years.

That, said the Mayor, was before the General Election of 1973 when the Fine Gael / Labour Coalition came to power and he was seconded to the new Minister's Office where he would serve in a variety of roles until the next General Election in 1977.

"His years with Minister for Local Government, Jimmy Tully were never dull," continued the Mayor, "and Michael travelled with him, not only all over the country, but internationally as well.

"There were many trips to countries all over the world, but one of the most memorable has to have been his attendance at the Sunningdale Conference in 1973 which produced the Sunningdale Agreement and eventually the short-lived Northern Power-Sharing Executive."

His appointment as Chief Executive of the NRA in January 1994 saw him start with a budget of £200 million which has grown since to *1.25 Billion annually, reflecting successive governments recognition of the importance of roads infrastructure in the development of the country.

Seconding the motion, Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Billy Kyne also congratulated Mr. Tobin on reaching the top of his profession and for the 'skill and integrity' he brought to it.

"Michael represents the public in a unique way," he said.
"He must give them value for money, counter-balance the vested interests and try to weigh them in favour of the public good."

"No one said it would be

to easy," he said, "but with the tendency of people to suggest that if all else fails, they could blame it on the NRA, it must seem an impossible task."

He recalled Mr. Tobin's days

He recalled Mr. Tobin's days as a sportsman and reminded him of the marathon three game series between Abbeyside and Dungarvan, which ended in Dungarvan's eventual victory over Abbeyside.

"In the town Hall that night," he recalled, "the Royal Aces played 'A Hard Day's Night' for the Dungarvan team, but in my view it was an even harder day's night for Abbeyside."

Co. Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly also paid tribute to the exemplary manner in which Mr. Tobin carried out all his official duties and his stewardship of the NRA.

"This is a very fitting tribute to Michael for the honour he has brought to his family, to Dungarvan and the county," he said, "by reaching the 'highest office in one of the most influential state bodies we have the NRA'.

He said he had known Michael as far back as their schooldays in the CBS in Dungarvan and also encountered him later when he found him 'a most approachable Civil Servant, very helpful and deeply interested in ensuring that money was well invested and spent wisely in the public good'.

He thanked Michael for all he had done as an 'excellent public official of the highest integrity' and for showing the public servant in the best possible light. He also wished him many more happy years with his family and many more visits to Dungarvan.

The Mayor then presented Mr. Tobin with a specially commissioned scroll acknowledging his exemplary achievements and Cllr. Nuala Ryan presented Mrs. Tobin with a bouquet of flowers.

In reply, Michael Tobin thanked the Mayor and the members of the Council for the honour they had bestowed on him. He said he was conscious of the fact that a Civic Reception was the highest honour they had available to them and linked the recipient in the annals of the town with all of those others who had received the honour.

"I feel extremely proud, but also humbled, bearing in mind the calibre of person already given this honour," he said. "I am proud of the achieve-

"I am proud of the achievements of the NRA," he continued, "even if we cannot meet all the needs of the Local Authorities in the time scale they would wish for.

"I'm particularly proud of the way the Authority has responded to the challenge to deliver on the increased investment provided for in the National Development Plan. That plan involves an unprecedented level of investment in roads, far beyond anything we had been used to."

He said that they had now reached a stage where they had a shelf of projects ready to go to tender as the funds allow, something they did not have in the past.

"We have also reached a stage where we can see long, continuous stretches of road coming into operation," he added. "That is very satisfying in itself, but more so for the benefits it brings to road users generally and in making areas of the country more attractive for industries to locate here."

He traced his roots in the town and district, recalling scenes and people of his childhood, especially his years at school and the Street Leagues which provided hours of enjoyment, playing hurling and football.

He also recalled his entry to the Civil Service and his years as Ministerial Advisor in the 'Seventies, a period which shaped his life and eventually brought him to the top of his profession and its eventual acknowledgement by the Town Council.

The Science of Farming and Food

Improving Grass Productivity by Reseeding Reseeded pastures are significantly more productive than old pastures.

An extra 2-3 t DM / hectare/ year can be yielded from new pastures over what is possible to achieve from old neglected pastures. Digestibility of silage can be 2 - 3 units higher in resceded pastures. In grazing land reseeded pastures have excellent growth in early spring and late autumn. They have excellent regrowth potential in April and the most commonly used new varieties are very leafy in mid summer when old pastures tend to get stemmy and deteriorate in quality. Reseeding alone presents the ideal opportunity to rid the fields of weeds and also, if required, to level

Reseeding costs 200-250 per acre so it is important to get it right. Kildalton Observations on Reseeding Methods

Conventional:

1. Slower method of reseeding.

All trash buried giving good level field. 3. Very even & fast establishment.

4. Huge germination of weeds post sowing.

5. Stones brought to surface. One-pass:

1. Fast method of reseeding - one-pass cultivation and sow Slow forward speed and good tines essential.

3. Very accurate and uniform seed distribution

4. Small population of weeds post sowing.

5. Can graze reseed with heavier stock.

One-pass +grubber: 1. Extra machine and cultivation takes time. 2. Grubber will bring up stones and clods.

Rolling of ground necessary pre-sowing (uneven + open).

4. No difference in germination / establishment over the one-pass

5. Huge germination of annual weeds etc., post sowing.

Choosing Grass Varieties

Farmers should carefully choose the grass varieties they include in their grass seed mixtures. Some varieties are more persistent, easier to manage and give more milk and meat - Teagasc research. The varieties that bestow such benefits to you are "late heading varieties". Don't be fooled by sales talk, look up the Department of Agriculture "Grass Varieties Recommended list 2003" and choose your own. If you are going to graze early and late in the year don't include more than 25-30% Tetraploids (late) in the mix - neither should they be sown in heavy soils, but they have merit in dry, drought-prone soils. Give your Teagase adviser a call and s/he will help with this "match-making" job.

New liners give 4-6% more milk

A nice little bonus! As well, there will be less mastitis. Your liners, like yourself, have a lot of milkings done this year to date- 2000-2500 cow milkings; 330 hours of constant work; 1,200,000 collapses. Is it any wonder they become weak, worn with distorted lips resulting in more liner slip, which in turn allows air in. This can cause air blasts, spread of infection from one teat to the next and results in a 4-6% loss of milk. Liners should be changed twice per year or every 2500 milkings. If each cup milks 10 cows/milking, then it milks 20 cows per day. Therefore, in that situation a farmer should change his liners every 125 days $(2500 \div 20)$

Beef

Weanling Management Spring born suckler weanlings can put on 100 kgs plus from August to October given the right conditions. Cows with a good milk supply combined with quality grass provides the cheapest option. Creep grazing and trough fed creep meals is next cheapest. Creep feeders are ideal for starting weanlings on meals but stronger calves can build up to high intakes very quickly and may also exclude smaller calves that need the meals most. Place troughs or creep feeders in the adjoining field or paddock to attract the calves on to fresh grass. Troughs will provide greater control over meal intake and ensure that all calves get access to meal. Build up to 1 - 1_ kg per head per day and a barley / pulp / distillers mix is suitable. Feeding up to 90 kg over two months will add at least 20 kg liveweight and should not cost over 15 per head - margin will be best with bull weanlings.

Finishing Cattle on Autumn Grass.

Performance of finishing cattle on autumn grass without concentrates is poor even in situations when grass is plentiful. Feeding meals can ensure earlier finish and can also improve confirmation score by up to 0.5 units and gives a good financial margin in most situations.

Earlier finishing off grass in autumn offers many advantages: sale before 30 months at better selling price; avoiding an expensive indoor finishing period which is not justified in the absence of additional premium or a higher selling price; improved extensification prospects with earlier sale of animals especially if over two years and greater availability of autumn grass for other stock which can delay the onset of expensive indoor feeding.

Target Grain

ADG should be approximately 1.0 kg / day. Grange trials over 90 days from mid August achieved 1 kg ADG where grass was scarce with 5kg concentrates or with 2.5 kg concentrates where grass was plentiful. A plentiful grass supply plus 5 kg concentrates achieved 1.1 kg ADG while

ad lib concentrates (12.5 kg to 635 kg bullocks) achieved 1.4 kg ADG.

Performance on steers in autumn 2002 could be expected to exceed above grains where performance to date was poor and / or where the

feeding period is shorter (60 days). Economics and Feed Conversion Efficiency Assuming a beef price of €2.38 / kg and a feed cost of 170 / t then a FCE of 14 kg concentrate per kg carcass gain or better is required to cover meal costs excluding any conformation advantage to meal fed animals - improved grading from O to R could be worth 30 per head for animals that would otherwise be

Scarce Grass

• 11.2 kg concentrate per kg carcass gain @ 5kg / head / day.

Adequate Grass

9.6 kg concentrates per kg carcass gain @ 2.5kg / head / day. 12.3 kg concentrates per kg carcass gain @ 5kg / head / day.

Ad Lib Concentrates 15.5 kg concentrates per kg carcass gain @12.5kg / head / day. Recommendation

Feed 2.5kg / head with adequate grass or 5kg if grass is scarce. Exceeding 2.5 kg meals when grass supply and quality are adequate or the feeding of ad lib meals will not be justified unless meals are very cheap (<€150/t) or beef selling price is significantly higher or that it is imperative to ensure earlier finish to achieve other cost savings or extra extensi fication payments.



TRADERS TRYING TO DAMPEN GRAIN PRICES

— HARRINGTON

IFA National Grain Committee Chairman, Paddy Harrington, recently has said that a number of key grain merchants and traders were conspiring to seriously undermine native grain prices at a time of buoyant EU and world prices by refusing to quote for green grain.

Mr. Harrington said "there has been a major attempt by a number of leading buyers to drag down the price paid for dried grain in the last number of days. Dried barley continues to trade at €118 to €120/t collected ex store, however a number of traders have attempted to talk down the price to €114 - €115/t. There is no justification for this price as new crop dried wheat is trading forward at €130 to €132/t, collected ex store, for harvest. Many merchants have privately acknowledged that the price of green barley will settle around €97 to €100/t with wheat trading €10/t over barley.

The Chairman said, "the move by the EU Cereals Management Committee to suspend the weekly tender and intervention sales procedure indefinitely only had a temporary dampening effect on the market on Friday, but by Monday grain prices had surged ahead on the LIFFE, MATIF and Chicago Board of Trade Futures. Export licenses, which had been previously issued for 2M tonnes of wheat, at a zero refund, can still be used. Additional consignments for shipment will, for the present, need to take whatever rate is applicable on the day of export.'

The IFA man said, "It is becoming increasingly evident that the EU Commission's Cereals Management Committee is incapable of managing the EU cereals market properly. For the last two harvests, they have blocked EU cereal farmers from benefiting from high world grain prices by removing the €10 import tariff in 2001on grain coming from the Black Sea / Baltics.

Continuing Mr. Harrington said, "With the German harvest now 75% complete, wheat crop estimates are at 19M tonnes, down 1.8 million tonnes on 2002. The German barley harvest has been estimated at 9.7 million tonnes compared to last year's harvest of almost 11 million tonnes. Their overall harvest estimate has been revised downwards by 5 million tonnes on 2002. In addition, the MATIF maize futures rose by as much as €5 on Monday on the back of forecasts for further hot weather over the coming days. There is concern that if the extremely hot weather continues, then the maize crop in South France will be adversely affected.

Concluding the IFA man said, 'Grain merchants should come forward immediately with realistic on

account prices for grain. World and EU grain supplies are extremely tight. Unless grain farmers receive realistic prices for their produce, they will quit production. Wheat prices are still €7 to €9/t below early September 2001 levels.

EUROPEAN POTATO MARKETS HEADING FOR MAJOR DEFICIT - IFA

Drought conditions since May and June in Central and parts of Eastern Europe are having a major impact on potato yields. Germany, which produces over 20% of the total EU - 15 crop are forecasting a reduction of up to 30% in yields due to stagnant growing conditions.

Declan Hurley, Chairman Waterford IFA Potato Committee, said, "the potential drop in EU potato output of 4 to 5 million tonnes is extremely significant for potato growers in Ireland". He added, " this should mean a greater realignment between prices here and GB" This is already taking place with GB average farmgate prices currently running 25% above last season's level.

Potato futures markets in both London and Holland have rocketed on the back of an anticipated deficit of supplies later in the season. Dutch future prices for delivery in April 2004 are reaching in excess of 200/t, which is 2.5 times above last year's price.

Grower confidence in the market ahead in both GB and Europe is high with crop clearance well ahead of last season. This follows a difficult season in 2002, due to depressed prices caused by heavy

surpluses throughout Europe.
The Waterford IFA Potato Chairman said," with output estimates from GB and Europe been constantly revised down, growers here should now have greater confidence in taking a more long-term view of the market ahead" He added "this must include maintaining a stable market through strictly digging to order as we enter the month of August, which is traditionally a month of reduced demand"

The EU -15 potato harvest produced 46 million tonnes last season with 45 million tonnes needed to maintain market balance. Latest estimates suggest that this year's harvest could be in the region of 42 million tonnes or 3 million tonnes below equilibrium.

amh Prices Strengthen - IFA

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman Michael Looby has said lamb prices have strengthened this week (w/e 8/8/03) against a background of continuing scarce supplies and a major price rise in the UK.

Mr. Looby said UK lamb prices have increased by 9p/kg Stg .w. or 28.5c/kg (10p/lb) IR in the last week. UK lambs were making 122p/kg l.w. on Monday. This is the equivalent of €3.84/kg or 137p/lb IR including VAT.

Mr. Looby said the big jump in UK prices provided the Irish factories with a real potential to increase prices for the French market to Irish farmers.

The Waterford IFA Sheep farmer's leader said Irish prices have bounced back with €3.64/kg (130p/lb) available this week. Producers are getting €3.64/kg (130p/lb) base price and bonuses for top quality.

RECENT DEATHS

Patrick. J. (Paddy) Lynch (1920 -2003)

Prominent businessman and sportsman. Paddy Lynch, 'Tara', Tournore, Dungarvan, passed to his eternal reward on Tuesday 29th of July at Woodlock Nursing Home, Portlaw, removing from the stage of life, a man of vision and a corner stone of the locality for many decades.

He was predeceased by his wife, Patsy Stone, who passed away on December 13th, 1997, and he had been in failing health for some time before his death. For the past two years, he resided at Woodlock Nursing Home in Portlaw, where the good care of the nuns and staff along with the love and care of his family, ensured that his final days were comfortable ones.

Born on the 12th of April 1920, Paddy Lynch received his early education in Garranbane Primary School, before commencing his secondary education at Dungarvan CBS.

He remained at the CBS for a year before going to Rockwell College in Cashel where he completed his Intermediate Certificate and Leaving Certificate.

Paddy's grounding in Journalism arose from his time in London's world renowned Fleet Street where he carried out his apprenticeship in journalism and newspaper editing until the outbreak of World War 11 curtailed his term there.

He continued his involvement in Journalism, however, and took over his beloved Dungarvan Observer following the death of his mother in 1962. The Observer had been founded by his father in 1912, and Paddy Lynch remained at the helm of the newspaper up until 1997.

A very forward thinking man, Paddy purchased a site at Fairlane in Shandon from Paul I. Power in 1978, and preceded to move the Dungarvan Observer from their Bridge Street premises

to the new site – which now will be close to the heart of a new shopping centre development.

Paddy's sporting career was indicative of his life long love of every sport, from football to greyhounds. His first love in the sporting arena, however, was GAA where he excelled as a player for Kilrossanty at football, and indeed his coffin was draped in the club colours and members of the club shouldered him to the church gates.

He was on the winning senior football panel of the famous 4-ina-row side, and participated himself in the victories of 1950-1. He was also most proud of the famous Kilrossanty goal against Kill in 1951 where he had the intuition to spot and inform the umpire when the ball crossed the line, and was only then kicked back into play by the goalkeeper. That goal contributed hugely to Kilrossanty's success having won on the day on a scoreline of 1-1 to 1-0.

Paddy was also greatly involved in Dungarvan's hunting scene, and was a founder member of the Dungarvan Harriers in which he hunted for many years, and of which his son, James, later became a Master. In the years following he was a founding member of another club, which was to go on to be a institution in the locality – the Dungarvan Golf Club alongside his close friend, the late Jack Lynch.

Paddy Lynch's involvement in greyhounds brought many winners to the area, and his sponsorship of the Deise Cup for coursing was generous and much needed. In 1982, his own dog, Victoria Park, won the Stone Cup in the Dungarvan Coursing Club, and it was a source of great pride when his daughter, Ann, trained Cool Performance to victory in the Irish Derby in 2001.

His honour and integrity were mentioned frequently in Journalistic and Sporting Circles right up to his passing in Woodlock Nursing Home on Tuesday 29th of July, and his death marked the end of an era for the entire locality.

Deep sympathy is extended to his son, daughters, brother, sister and his many other relatives at this sad time.

Reposing at The Kiely Funeral Home on Wednesday and Thursday, many came to pay their respects and console the Lynch family on their cross of bereavement. Family Rosary was shared on Wednesday evening, while on Thursday, Rev, Fr. Martin Lynch, CC, led all in prayers before removal took place to St. Laurence's Church, Ballinroad. En-route, the funeral cortege paused in prayerful tribute at the Dungarvan Observer Offices.

In close proximity to Ballinroad Church, Paddy's remains, draped in the green and gold of Kilrossanty GAA Club, were shouldered by Club members to the Church Gate.

The funeral service was conducted by Fr. O'Doherty PP; assisted by Canon O'Mahony PP; Very Rev. Fr. MI Kennedy, PP; Very Rev. Fr. MI. Enright, PP; and Rev. Fr. Colin Fives OSA.

In the mid 18th century Sliabh gcua was famous for its poetry court or cfiirte filiochta in which Donncha Rua Mac Namara 1715-1810 was a leading light. Indeed it was Sean O Dálaigh of Lickoran, who published the Poets and Poetry of Munster, that ensured the fruits of the great cúirteanna filiochta were not lost. In Sliabh gCua the spirit and excitement of these gatherings was brought into modem times through the work of Dónal Ó Fearachair 1852-1929, Padraigh O Mileadha 1877-1947, Labhras O Cadhla 1889-1961 and Pádraig O Fiannúisa 1914-1990. Moreover, Padraig O Cadhla 1875-1948, in helping to found Ring College, played no small part in ensuring that Déise Irish is alive and being spoken today.

This Gaelic heritage will once more be celebrated at Éigse Sliabh gCua 2003, which takes place from Friday 15tH August to Sunday 17th August. This is the sixth year of this community festival, which has managed to survive on the voluntary efforts of the organising committee, the generous assistance of local clubs and organisations and in latter years a small but vital subvention from the Arts Grant Scheme of Waterford County Council.

Ciaráin O Riain, of Knockalisheen, the newly elected Mayor of County Waterford will open the Éigse on Friday at 8.15 p.m. in Touraneena Community Hall and at 8.30 p.m. Ben Guiry will deliver an illustrated lecture on the Comeragh Mountains. The Comeraghs like the Knockmealdowns are such a part of the fabric of Tipperary that their great beauty, environmental significance and the contribution of the people who have lived there tends to be taken for granted. Ben, who has some beautiful slides, will certainly cause his listeners to see the ancient mountain range in a new light.

On Saturday a literary and historical bus tour will leave Touraneena from in front of the church at 2.15 p.m. for a leisurely afternoon journey through the surrounding countryside. The route is usually a bit of a mystery but is often related directly to the particular theme of the Eigse and needless to say the couriers/guides have so far never disappointed.

On Saturday evening at 8.30 p.m., Maurice Hallahan, the well know dancing master and the person most associated with the Sliabh gCua set, will host a concert in 'Touraneena's Community Hall. It will feature a and music performed by the best of local artists. It will also include a short talk by the historian Brendan Kiely, on the athlete Thomas F. Dungarvan Town Council is to seek a euro 1.7 million loan for the purchase of 12.7 acres of land owned by Mr. Johnny Cashin off the Clonea Road in Abbeyside. The land would be used for the development of social and affordable housing. The books also contain an introductory chapter on the history and geography of the county, plus a colour map and photographs of some of the individuals profiled within.

Cork Journey's in America has 53 entries, including Sir Walter Raleigh, Anne Bonny, Charlie Chaplin and Boss Croker, while Dublin Journeys in America holds 49 profiles, among them Maureen O'Hara, Brendan Behan, Eamon Coghlan and

Together these constitute only the beginning of an enterprise that will soon see Waterford Journeys in America (to include Tyrone Power, Raymond Chandler, Mayor Daley and Buffalo Bill Cody) and Galway Journeys in America joining the first two titles on the shelves of Irish and American bookshops. Other counties planned to follow in the series are Tipperary, Kerry, Mayo and Donegal.

John Flynn was born in Waterford City in 1964 and grew up in the Abbeyside parish of Dungarvan. He holds a Ph.D. in sociology from NUI Maynooth, while his co-author Jerry Kelleher hails from Millstreet in north Cork, where he was born in 1967. The Sunday Tribune recently described their current efforts in the following way. These rather odd books... range from the slightly obvious to the truly bizarre. Given the novelty of the idea of this series, they are well prepared to take such a review as a compliment.

Seamus has been involved in Waterford Hot Rod Club Motor Racing for eight years and has been racing for four years. At the beginning Seamus was introduced to hot rod motor racing by his uncle when he used to go watch him racing. Within two years Seamus was involved in marshalling at hot rod motor meetings and in directing cars on and off the track. Basically there are six clubs involved in the hot rod scene - East Cork. North Cork, Carberry, Kerry, Waterford and the latest club to become involved i.e. North/ West (Sligo).

Seamus practises in the local club in the Pike, which is a hard surface track with a tarmacadam front straight with concrete on the two bends and the back straight.

Seamus has been fixing and repairing cars after a days racing since his initial involvement. Then he graduated to racing his uncle's car until he built a Fiat Uno himself 3 1/2 years ago.

The car was stripped out so there would be no extra weight and he installed a Roll Cage into it in case the car overturned. For safety reasons Seamus upgraded the springs and suspensions so that the car would handle properly on the track. The engine has to remain standard so that no driver has an advantage.

The engine has to be tuned properly and that is where the expertise is needed.

RACING CAREER.

Seamus had his first win on the track in the Pike in 1999 and was placed third in class one in the Winter Champifor onships 2001/2002/ 2002/2003. Willie Houlihan was quickest in his class. Seamus' ambition at this stage is to come one place better in the All Ireland Champi-

onship next year. The Pike will be hosting the All-Ireland Final next year and with his knowledge of the track it is a great opportunity for him

THE CLUB

The club at the Pike have 128 members at present and it is the largest club in racing in this

Seamus is assistant treasurer and he handicaps the cars for all the races. For two years he has positioned the new cars at the front and placed the quicker and more experienced drivers at the back. He hopes to see the

local club develop further and wants to enjoy the racing for as long as possible. His uncles James O'Shea who introduced him to the sport is still racing. Organ Recital in Lismore Cathedral

Music by Johann Pachelbel features in an organ recital by Cathedral Organist Jan van Putten in Lismore Cathedral, this Saturday at 4.30pm. Pachelbel was born 350 years ago in Nuremberg, Germany. We do not know his exact date of birth, but he was baptised on 1st September 1653, so it is assumed that he was born in August

Mainly as organist in Erfurt (1678 – 1690) and Nuremberg (from 1695 until his death in 1706) Pachelbel earned his great fame. He was a prolific composer. In Erfut he composed most of his organ chorales; his Nuremberg compositions show a greater variety and include, apart form organ music, music for harpsichord, chamber music, motets and sacred concertos.

Nowadays, he is particularly

remembered for his famous canon, which was scored for three violins's and keyboard. He enjoyed composing fugues and although a fugue can be very complex, the main attraction of his works is that they are clearly structured and unassuming; as such they can be easily understood by all.

Jan van Putten will play a wide selection from Pachelbel's organ music: his Prelude in D minor, two sets of variations – one to a sacred and one to a secular tune -, four organ chorales – each of a different structure -, four short Magnificat fugues and, finally, his joyful Ciacona in D min or.

The recital, starting at 4.30pm, will last approximately one hour. Admission is free and there will be a collection in aid of the Cathedral Restoration Fund

Two Good Victories for Lismore Cricketers

Lismore's good run of form continued over the last two weekends with a cup semi-final win followed by maximum points in a league game, aided in no small part by back-to-back centuries by Mubbin. On Bank Holiday Monday (4th August) Lismore travelled to Clonmel in the semi-final of the Munster Towns Cup and enjoyed their third victory of the season over the Suirsiders. Batting first, openers Mubbin and Seamus Brown got Lismore off to a steady start before Brown was bowled. Three more wickets fell before Mubbin found a solid partner in Gerard Kennedy, and together they brought the score up to 96 before Kennedy was out. Mubbin then went into overdrive and put up 75 for the 6th wicket with Andrew Malcolm. Mubbin's batting style was uncomplicated. Good balls were blocked, half-volleys were driven straight and hard, longhops and full tosses were put over the leg-side boundary. He was eventually caught for 117, which is certainly the highest score by a Lismore batsman in living memory. Paul Coolbear and William Rotte slogged some good runs in the closing overs to bring the total to 188 for 7 off the forty overs. This total

looked like it was more than enough, especially as Clonmel had been bowled out for 21 on the same pitch the previous week. Clonmel refused to lie down and die, however, and their batsmen dug in and made a fight of it. Mubbin and John Campion produced good economical opening spells without making a breakthrough. Change bowlers Seamus Brown and Andrew Malcolm got amongst the wickets, but some hard hitting from the Clonmel middle-order saw them requiring 72 from the last ten overs with four wickets in hand. Economical overs from Ger Murphy and William Rotte left the target at 43 from five overs with the opening bowlers to return. John Campion and Mubbin both bowled an over for just 2 runs, and the game was beyond Clonmel. The margin of victory in the end was only 14 runs, but Lismore had always been in control. They progress to play Tralee in the final, which is scheduled for August 31st in Middleton. It was a good allround performance from Lismore, who could afford to rest three of the regular top order on the day.

Last Sunday Lismore travelled to Bandon to play West Cork Rebels in MCU Division2, and came away with a narrow victory. On paper the odds did not favour Lismore, as the Rebels are top of the league and Lismore travelled with only three of their regular bowlers. Celtic **Times**

The first edition of Michael Cusacks weekly newspaper the Celtic Times appeared on 1 January 1887. It ran for just 54 issues. It was the first periodical devoted to gaelic games as well as the preservation and cultivation of the language, music, literature and pastimes of the "Celtic Race". The only known surviving issues are those covering the period 19

February 1887 to 31December of the same year. All surviving issue (some incomplete) are reproduced in a new publication called Celtic Times . It is a veritable treasure trove, a social history of the period and a fascinating insight into the state of our games in the late 19th century. I hope to delve into it over the coming weeks.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

My employer has told us that a number of employees may be made redundant. Can you please let me know what I am entitled to??

ANSWER

What you may be entitled to under legislation depends on how long you have worked for your employer and your normal weekly earnings. Earlier this year statutory redundancy payments were increased, however, you may negotiate a redundancy payment that exceeds the minimum entitlement.

Redundancy arises where an employee's job ceases to exist and he/she is not replaced for such reasons as a lack of work or the firm closes down. Employees with two years service should receive at least two weeks notice of redundancy, rising to eight weeks for those with at least 15 years service.

The Redundancy Payments Acts 1967-2003 oblige employers to pay redundant employees their "statutory redundancy entitlement". To be eligible you must be between the ages of 16 and 66, in continuous employment for at least two years with your employer and normally working at least 8 hours per week.

Since 25th May, 2003 the lump-sum redundancy payment is calculated as follows subject to a maximum week's pay of €508 per week:

Two weeks pay for each year of reckonable employment regardless of age

Plus an additional week's pay.

In calculating reckonable employment ordinary sick leave over and above 26 weeks, occupational injury over and above 52 weeks, maternity leave over and above 18 weeks and career breaks over 13 weeks in a 52 week period are excluded. There is no tax payable on the statutory redundancy lump sum.

ENERGY SAVING APPLIANCES

Good energy housekeeping is very important in this day and age.

Energy labelling of all new laundry and refrigeration products is now obligatory. When you are shopping for these new appliances you will find energy information labels on all these appliances. The energy label allows you to compare how energy efficient one model is against another. The range is from 'A' being the most efficient to 'G' being the least efficient. The more energy efficient the model you chose the more on-going savings in running costs you will enjoy. Modern appliances are designed to use less electricity than older models,. A lot of the newer washing machines and dishwashers have 'economy' programmes using less water and less electricity to heat. All of these things are worth considering when purchasing new appliances. Small things like using a timer switch on your immersion heater can make considerable savings to your energy bill. As the weather gets warmer remember to change the settings on your thermostats

Modern heating, systems incorporate thermostats which switch themselves off when the room is warm enough and timers that switch the heating on and off as per your settings. Don't open the windows and doors when a room gets too hot: turn down the heating thermostat instead. Remember with appliances that energy is wasted if you don't switch appliances off when they are not in use. Switch off the TV or stereo when you are finished using them. Don't leave them on standby.

RICHARD GARRICK

This was the stage name of Richard Thomas O'Brien who was born in Portlaw on 27 December 1878. His father James Edward O'Brien was a master tailor and had Lord Waterford as a customer. When Richard was 6 years old the family emigrated to North Adams, Massachusetts where Richards's father established a tailoring business. In 1898 Richard joined the army, serving in the 26th Regiment on Miagao during the Philippine war. He took part in the V.S.O. army shows during the Second World War where he took the stage name of David Garrick. In the early 1900's he directed about a dozen films for the Gaumant Company. He acted in a number of notable films including High Society (1956); East of Eden (1958); A Streetcar Named Desire (1951); and also stared in numerous stage productions.

He died on 21 August 1962 in Los Angeles and is buried in Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery.

SARCOIDOSIS What is Sarcoidosis?

Sarcoidosis is a disability that results from inflammation of tissues of the body. It can appear in almost any body organ, but most often starts in the lungs or lymph nodes. The cause of Sarcoidosis is unknown; the disability can appear suddenly and disappear just as quick. Or it can develop gradually and go on to produce symptoms that come and go, sometimes for a lifetime. As sarcoidosis progresses, small lumps, or granulomas, appear in the affected tissues. In the majority of cases, these granulomas clear up, either with or without treatment. In the few cases where the granulomas do not heal and disappear, the tissues tend to remain inflamed and become scarred (fibrotic).

What are the symptoms of Sarcoidosis?

In pulmonary sarcoidosis, patients may have a dry cough (without sputum), shortness of breath, or mild chest pain. In those cases where symptoms do appear outside the lung, they can include a scaly rash, red bumps on the legs, fever, soreness of the eyes, and pain and swelling of the ankles. There can also be more general symptoms like fatigue, weakness, fever and weight loss. These symptoms are common in many other lung disabilities, so diagnosis may be very difficult.

How is Sarcoidosis diagnosed?

Sarcoidosis is initially diagnosed based on a physical examination, laboratory tests, pulmonary function studies, and a chest x-ray. When enlargement of lymph glands in the center of the lungs is seen on x-ray, sarcoidisis may be suspected. To confirm the diagnosis, a biopsy is usually performed on any of the affected organs or from material in a granuloma on the skin.


What treatment is available for Sarcoidosis?

There is not a specific cure for sarcoidosis, it has to run its course and in many cases this usually takes several months, most cases of this disability heal spontaneously and require no specific treatment. Although some people with sarcoidosis will find they recover within one year, other people with the disability will have serious long-term effects and it can damage the lungs, heart, eyes and other vital organs. For people with long-term sarcoidosis medication is usually prescribed for the more serious symptoms. Since it is not known what causes sarcoidosis, there is no known way to prevent its occurrence. Most people with sarcoidosis can lead a normal life, it is important that people with this disability do not smoke, and that they avoid exposure to dust and chemicals that can harm the lungs. A support group has been set up in the Dungarvan and the first meeting will be taking place on the 28th August, if you would like further information please contact our office. 



It will be quite a surprise if there is an upset here in Stradbally on Saturday evening.





Time is required for the blood and muscle to return to the alkaline range where the athlete performs best, also time is required for the glycogen stores to be replaced.

Therefore an easy day should generally follow the hard day to allow time for all this recharging, remember the easy day is just as important as the hard day.

Remember from the 8 mile mark on in the Ballycotton ten some year and you were beginning to feel the pinch, well add 3.1 miles more onto the Ballycotton ten and you have run the half marathon.

In other words, the advice ispace the distance-don't race it and you'll enjoy the whole occasion all the more.

Over the next few days select a reasonable finishing time for yourself which you believe, due to your training that you are capable of achievement, Divide this time into equal mile splits, write them on your hand on the morning of the race and stick to them religiously and avoid the early race temptation to leg it over the first half of the race.

In the latter part of the race if you are feeling good, by all

means give it a lash down Garranbane hill (11 miles approx) and the straight after Clonea Cross down to the finishing line at Scoil Gharbhain, We want to get you there in reasonable condition so use the head as well as the legs o.k.

The following are mistakes in training often with drastic consequences.

Following a race by a long run the next day gives severely sore muscles.

Two hard training days closely together is an invitation for injury, beware especially if there is a current threat of injury, it often takes one or two days later for the injury to reveal itself.

Doing your friend's workout or running pace rather than your own often leads to trouble-too much, too soon, too hard, stick to your own schedule

N.B. Rest the day before as well as the day after long runs, speedwork, and races. Famous saying "the calendar to success is dotted with too many tempting days off"

Having spent the past 4 weeks training at high altitude in the Pyrenees in France Jamie was unsure of what to expect having logged over 100 miles a week for the last number of weeks. "I'm absolutely delighted with that win," said the 26-year-old afterwards. "To win a National title is one of the highest accolades an athlete can achieve and you never tire of it. I've been out of the country training for over four months this year and its great to come back to Santry and win the title in front of my family and friends". Well done to Jamie he is now in great shape going into the world's in Paris in two weeks time.

John McGrath Manager For Youth Olympics

In the aftermath of Ireland's successful hosting of the Special Olympics it is easy to forget that many other Olympic events are happening this summer. The European Youth Olympics commenced in Paris on the 28th July last. These biannual Olympics are the most significant event for young athletes in Europe this year. This very important sporting occasion shines a spotlight on youth sports. A massive effort went into organising this international event with participation from 2,900 competitors, 48 countries, 700 volunteers and 2,500 contracted workers.

The preparations for Irelands involvement in this event have been in operation since January, when a training camp was held in Limerick. In May trials took place at which the cream of Irish youth athletics were selected to represent their country in France. The twenty Irish athletes competed in a wide range of sports including athletics, swimming, cycling, judo, gymnastics, and table tennis and for the first time a ladies soccer team.

Along with the dedication and talent of these athletes, it is the coaching and club structures that allow these young people to reach such a high standard. Friday 18th July the EY0 committee in Ireland organised a pre-games launch. This was basically a get togeth-

rest of the team, at which security was discussed and photos taken. In total a hundred individuals traveled to the Olympics on the 25th July. Tom Rafter, the Irish Chef de Mission and his Assistant Chef de Mission Billy Kennedy, who hails from Carrick-on-Suir, were working hard to insure everything and everyone was organised and co-ordinated. Managers, coaches, doctors, physiotherapists were also accompanying the twenty athletes to the competition. The main concern of this support team was to look after the athletes and make proceedings as easy as possible for them. The Irish competitors had to adjust quickly to the heat of the Parisian summer, with temperatures at 32°.

Among those involved in the Irish team was John McGrath from Cappoquin and Dermot Keyes, sports reporter for The Munster Express. Dermot and John are both members of West Waterford A.C. Dermot has been selected by Athletics Ireland to report on the Irish progress at these Olympics and John McGrath traveled as a team manager to Paris. After being involved in juvenile sport for the past twenty years, John was certainly up to the job. During the last eight years he has been a member of the National Juvenile Executive and has been on the Munster

er for all the athletes and the Cross-country Committee for four years. Presently John is also vice-chairman of West Waterford Athletic Club. Before this he was also involved with the Cappoquin/Ballinameela club. His last international trip was to Poland for the World Championships

Well done to John and to the Irish team who performed so well in these Olympics.

LANDFILL COULD PROVE 'DISASTROUS'

Meanwhile, the Irish Peatland Conservation Council claim that as the area has been designated SAC to protect a rare species of Pearl Mussel and salmon, a landfill shouldn't even have been considered.

Noreen McLouglin, Conservation Officer with the IPCC claims; "Even the slightest decline in water quality or increase in siltation in this river could prove disastrous for these two important species, as clean, unsilted water is essential for their survival." 


