Fierce Battle Over Location Of Plyons Decided In Elderly Brothers Favour

KEVIN KIRRANE

Ballyneety brothers, Frankie and Monnie Drummy were yesterday (Tuesday) celebrating the successful conclusion of a three year planning battle they had waged against the location of two ESB Plyons near their house.

Frankie, 52, who cares for his 68-year-old invalid brother, Monnie, claimed that the two steel pylons at the bottom of their garden were destroying their lives.

One of the pylons was located less than 70 yards from their front door, while the other is a little more than 100 yards away.

On Monday last, An Bord Pleanala ruled in their favour, saying the ESB must either remove the structures or apply for a retention

"It has been three and a half years of living hell through the actions of Waterford County Council, the ESB, and this developer," Frank said on Tuesday last.



HOW DOES A PLANT BEGIN LIFE?

Which are the Largest Plants?


Trees are the largest plants. The Sequoia, for instance, has impressive dimensions, with a diameter measuring up to 9m. The largest sequoia, 11m in diameter and 83m tall, is called the General sherman and is in the National Sequoia Park in the USA. This tree is believed to be more than 2000 years old. The Australian Eucalyptus, with a height of 130-140, is the tallest tree of all. The tree with the largest trunk, up to 10m in diameter, is the Baolbab. The spread of its foliage can reach up to 80m in circumference.



GIGANTIC LEAVES AND FLOWERS

The largest flowers in the world are those of the Rafflesia Arnoldii, (or'Stinking Corpse'lily) a water lily without either stem or leaves and which grows, attached to other green plants, in the forests of Southeast Asia. Its gigantic flowers, red and white, have a diameter of about 90cm and can weigh up to 10kg!

The leaves of the Raffia Palm, a palm tree native to Madagascar in Africa, can reach up to 20m in lenght. The gigantic water lily the Queen Victora grows in Central America. Its htick, strong leaves can be up to 2m in diameter.



HOW WHEN WHAT WHY What are the smallest plants?

In Canada, a White Cedar tree has grown only 10cm in 155 years! The smallest flowering plants in the world are the Rootless Duckweed, foundmostly in Australia, and the Swamp Duckweed of Brazil. Both plants are similar to ordinary duckweed, but their flowers measure less than one millimetre in diameter.



10 metres away from the ESB's 38KV power lines in Ballyneety in January 2000.

According to Waterford County Council, this didn't come to their attention for another eight months, when, in September of 2000, construction had commenced and a warning notice was served on the applicant.

The development ceased, a statement issued by the local authority on Monday said, "however, the applicant submitted a letter of undertaking from the ESB dated June 1999, indicating that the overhead line would be diverted to a safe distance from the dwelling if the need arose.'

"This matter was verified with the ESB, and indeed a letter was submitted direct to the council by the ESB on the 1st of February confirming this was the case."

However, according to Waterford County Council's own planning file, the local authority was aware four months earlier in October of 2000 that the dwelling was to be constructed several metres away from its permitted location.

Despite this, the county council lifted its enforcement notice in February 2001 - allowing construction on the house to proceed and adjudicating that the changed location did not "material change"

The assurance from the ESB, meanwhile, was given to a separate landowner for the site several metres to the south and west, and not to the new developer.

PERMISSION LED TO **POWERLINE CHANGE**

With construction of the dwelling located close to the ESB powerlines granted, the ESB found it necessary to seek agreement with the adjoining landowners for the diversion of the line onto their land, and away from the new dwelling.

This, the ESB revealed was "strenuously objected" to by the landowners, and the "only option" left was the construction of two massive steel pylons on either side of the new dwelling.

But, it emerged that the two pylons were placed "immediately south" of the home of Frank and Monnie Drummy, whose house ad-Director of Services, Denis McCarthy acknowledged in February 2002.

Throughout last year, the two brothers - one of whom is a chronic asthmatic - endured a lengthy planning battle with the local authority and the ESB - which they feared would lead them, "to an early grave.'

Having contacted the Ombudsman, the development was finally adjudged to warrant a third party adjudication by An Bord Pleanala, to decide whether or not the pylons constituted development - with Waterford County Council and the ESB contesting the brothers claims throughout.

This week, An Bord Pleanala issued a determination that the erection of the two steel masts constituted development and not exempted development.

Waterford County Council will therefore contact the ESB advising that the masts joins that of the new dweller, must either be removed or an application made for the retention of these structures, the local authorities statement on Monday said.

"If an application for retention is made, this will allow any person who so wishes to make a submission or observation on the file. Any such submissions or observation will be taken into consideration when making a decision."

It's implication on the new dwelling has not been confirmed as yet, but its believed that if agreement with the adjoining landholders on a diversion of the powerline can not be agreed the house would again be in breach of a condition in its planning permission.





Delicious pasta with chicken and leeks

TASTY pasta with moist chicken pieces and a subtle leek flavour sauce.

INGREDIENTS:

(Serves 2)

- 175g dried cavatappi (corkscrew pasta)
- 2 x 15ml sp sesame seeds
- 175g ieeks
- 175g skinned chicken breast fillet
- 2 x 15ml sp olive oil
- 1 x 5ml sp ginger purée
- 2 x 15ml sp chopped fresh coriander
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper Coriander leaves, to garnish

METHOD:

BRING a large saucepan of salted water to the boil, add the cavatappi and cook according to packet instructions (about 15 minutes).


Put sesame seeds in a frying pan and dry-fry for two minutes until toasted. Watch them carefully as they burn easily. Remove from the heat and set aside. Trim and thinly slice the leeks. Cut the chicken into 1cm slices.

When the pasta is half-cooked, heat the olive oil in a large frying pan.

Add the ginger purée and chicken and cook for five minutes, stirring occasionally.

Add the leeks and cook for one minute, stirring. Cover the pan with a tight-fitting lid and cook for three minutes.

Drain the pasta and immediately add it to the frying



pan with the chopped coriander and sesame seeds. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Toss well to mix, garnish and serve at once. This dish goes well with a sparkling, dry white wine.

cake - in a jar!

Ingredients:

- 1 x 5ml sp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 x 5ml sp baking powder
- 2 cups apple sauce
- 2/3 cup shortening
- 2 x 5ml sp ground cloves
- 2 x 5ml sp baking soda 2/3 cup water
- 2 2/3 cup granulated
- 2/3 cup nuts, chopped, optional
- 11/2 x 5ml sp salt
- 3 1/3 cup all-purpose flour, sifted
- 4 large eggs

Method:

Sterilise eight 12oz jars, lids and rings by boiling for 10 minutes. Remove the jars and allow to air-dry and cool, then grease them with shortening. Leave the lids and rings in the hot water until ready to use.

Cream together the

shortening and sugar. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, until the mixture is light and fluffy. Add the apple sauce and water, then set aside. In another bowl, sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and cloves. Blend the dry ingredients into the apple sauce mixture. Fold in the nuts. Pour batter into the jars, filling them about half

Bake in a preheated 325°F oven for 35-40 minutes or until a cocktail stick inserted deep into the centre of each cake comes out clean.

Remove jars from the oven, place a lid then a ring on top and screw down tightly. Set aside the jars to cool. When the jars have sealed, the lids won't move when you press down on them. Store the jars in a cool, dry place. They should keep for about a year.

LOOKING for something a bit out of the ordinary? Try this scrummy recipe for bacon and onion muffins!

INGREDIENTS: 6 servings

- 225g bacon, diced
- 1/3 cup milk
- 1/2 x 5ml sp salt
- 3 x 5ml sp baking powder
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 large eggs, slightly beaten
- 1/2 x 5ml sp baking soda
- 2 x 1/4 cup unbleached flour, sifted
- 1 sesame seeds

METHOD:

Fry the bacon until crisp in a large frying pan. Remove with a slotted spoon and drain on sheets of kitchen

roll. Sauté the onion in one tablespoon of bacon dripping until tender (do not brown). Set aside to cool.

Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt in a large mixing bowl.

Combine the eggs, milk and sour cream in a small bowl, and blend well. Add all at once to dry ingredients, stirring just enough to moisten.

Stir in the bacon and sautéed onion. Spoon the batter into greased 21/2-inch muffin-pan cups, filling two-thirds full. Sprinkle with sesame seeds. Bake in a 375°F oven for 18 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. Serve hot with homemade jelly or jam.



UDARAS MAY HAVE TO AXE

Udarás na Gaeltachta may be forced to cease it's grants schemes for small fishermen due to the application of an EU fisheries directive in relation to the size of the Irish

The authority's Ring/Old Parish elected Board member, Cllr. Fiachra O Céilleachair who was prominent in recently successful efforts to get a reprieve until the end of December for the grants - says the loss of such an assistance package in the future would be a blow for what has been one of the traditional industries in

Cllr. O Céilleachair says the Udarás grants for marine punts, pot haulers and outboard engines for fisheries purposes have been of vital assistance to small fishermen operating from Heilbhic and Baile na nGall over the years. Cllr. O Céilleachair says the Udarás should be enabled to continue that positive role and that the Dept. of Marine and Natural Resources should seek a derogation from regulations deriving from the re-organisation of the EU Common Fisheries Policy agreed on the 20th of December 2002 last.

Officials of Udarás na Gaeltachta recently informed Board members that they had received advice from Bord Iascaigh Mhara (BIM) that the

authority's fishing grants should be abolished due to EU Ruling 13 (2) 2371/2002. Under that regulation, according to the BIM assessment, the state's continuation of such subvention schemes would lead to a sanction of a 3% reduction in the national fishing fleet coming into play.

Expressing his disappointment at this turn of events, Cllr. O Céilleachair said:

"The fishing industry is being subjected to such restrictive practices as a result of our Government acceding to an EU common policy skewed against Irish interests in general, and in particular against those of small fishermen such as my constituents in Ring."

"Ireland, despite having 16% of EU fishing waters, is allocated just 4% of the allowable catches. I don't think Irish agriculture would stand for a similar situation in their sector. Similarly, the choice of either scrapping grants or cutting the fleet may not be one so easily put in the case of farming. It should be no different in the case of fishing."

"I am encouraged by the cross party concern among members of the Udarás on this issue and our determination to find a way to protect these grants. I hope such efforts meet with success."







Growing buds may take several weeks to appear but good sized plants can be produced within a

The growing season is April to October and plants should stand in 25mm of rainwater - as tap water contains chemicals which can kill the plants.



This week In The Garden

Sow stocks for the greenhouse

Make sowings of both Beauty of Nice and Brompton stocks for flowering in pots in the greenhouse. The Beauty of Nice will bloom from Christmas until February or March, while the Brompton stocks will follow on in late spring.

Sow very thinly in well drained trays filled with John Innes seed compost or equivalent and germinate in a frame, shading until the seedlings appear. Prick off or pot the seedlings separately as soon as they have two true leaves each.

Pot freesias for early flowering

Provided the corms are ripened, the earlier freesias can be potted the better. The beginning of August is usu ally about as soon as you can buy the corms, so if you want a supply of flowers for Christmas pot up some now in 13cm pots. You can place six corms in one pot. Sow in a peat-based compost. Bury the corms 2.5cm deep and stand the pots in a frame. Water moderately and shade from direct sunlight.

Pot Lachenalias

Lachenalias for winter flowering in the greenhouse should also be potted or placed in hanging baskets, a delightful method of growing these beautiful South African bulbs. The method of culture in pots is the same as for freesias.

If you are going to grow them in hanging baskets, the basket must be well-lined with moss and then some of the bulbs placed at the bottom and around the sides of the basket, as well as on top. Hang the baskets up in a cool place for the time being and water them moderately.

In figures released under the Freedom of Information Act to the Sunday Times, it emerged that Deputy Wilkinson (FF) received a Dail salary of 74,000 last year, plus Dail Expenses of

eur64,458. On top of these, taxpayers paid out a further 38,868 euros to Deputy Wilkinson in combined allowances and expenses for his county council seat bringing his total to €177,326 for the year.

Deputy Wilkinson was the tenth highest earner of Dail expenses, and received the highest expenses of the four Waterford Deputies.

Deputy John Deasy (FG), meanwhile, was in receipt of a Dail salary of 74,000 euros. and claimed expenses of 44,472.08 euros for his Dail seat, and further expenses and allowances for his county council seat of 27,235. This brought Deputy Deasy's total to 145,707.08.

However, this figure does not include the expenses and allowances Deputy Deasy earned for his Town Council seat, which would bring his total up by an estimated three or four thousand last year.

Labour Deputy, Brian O'Shea was in 61st place of Dail earners, receiving 55,889.48 on top of his annual Dail salary. As Deputy O'Shea is over ten years in the Dail he also receives a 4,500 euros bonus payment on his annual salary, bringing his total to 134,389.48

He said he received a number of separate grants of 8,800 euros each as a first time Deputy. These included expenses for extra secretarial help on top of the ordinary secretarial expenses, which are paid for by the state. He also received an 8,800 euros grant for the setting up, renting and equipping of a constituency office.

Other expenses Deputies can claim are travelling expenses to

Dublin which vary depending on where they live, and attendance at Leinster Houses although this does not necessarily mean sitting in the Leinster House Chambers or taking



part in Debates. According to recent reports, Deputies are regarded as attending as long as they occupy their Dail Of-

Next year's local elections

will mark the end of the dual Minister Martin Cullen mandate, and Deputy Wilkinson stepped down from his Waterford County Council seat at the July monthly meeting. Speculation still surrounds Deputy Deasy's Council seat, which he could occupy until the council is dissolved next year. It's unclear whether Deputy Wilkinson will benefit from an early retirement bonus payment, but both Deasy and Wilkinson will receive compensation for the loss of their lucrative Dual mandate next

'Ambitious' Target Date For Sewerage Scheme Start

A wide range of local sewerage scheme developments were announced last week in a 4.5 billion euros investment in the nations waste water services infrastructure.

However, Minister for Local Government and Environment, Martin Cullen, admitted that the constructions start dates for many of the schemes including a start of next year on the West Waterford Sewerage Scheme are "ambitious"

The West Waterford project, costing an estimated eur45 million, would provide wastewater treatment facilities for Ardmore, Tallow, Stradbally, Cappoquin, Dunmore East, Kilmacthomas and Ballyduff/Kilmeaden.

Minister Martin Cullen said the start date of next year is ambitious; "because of the detailed planning process to be gone through, and completed before work can begin on the ground."

"I will be urging the council to ensure all necessary resources are brought to bear to get the individual schemes started on schedule.

However, the Department of Environment has been the subject of scathing criticism recently over the delays in getting the project off the ground. Deputy Brian O'Shea (Lab) expressed concerns that the Department was engaged in "stalling tactics" over the allocation.

Other schemes with "ambitious" start dates of next year include Ring/Helvick Water Supply Schemes and the West Waterford Water Supply Strategic Review.

Three other schemes are listed to start in 2005 including the Ardmore Water Supply Scheme.

"I regard it as a top priority to deliver the water and sewerage infrastructure Waterford needs for continued economic growth, to support industrial expansion, and job creation, and to promote development opportunities that will benefit all in the community," Minister Cullen said in the course of his announcement.

Meanwhile, Director of Service with Waterford County Council told WLR FM on Thursday that some of the funding is for previously announced projects, but a number of schemes in the county will now benefit from this investment.

"There's a whole lot of new schemes about to enter the equation. Ballinacourty/Deelish water supply, Dunmore East Water Supply and the Helvick water supply are in areas where we have very serious problems at the moment, particularly where we have weather that we're having at the moment."

'Everyone of them", he added, "has constraints as a consequence on development, whether that be on local authority housing or private housing. And, our planning department is screaming for new infrastructure be put in so we can proceed on developments in an orderly manner."

Safety Council Concerned At Dramatic Rise In **Motorcycle Fatalities**

A dramatic rise in the number of motorcycle users being killed on Irish roads in 2003 has prompted the National Safety Council to issue an appeal to all motorcyclists - if you haven't already done so, complete an approved motorcycle rider training course.

Tragically, two people in County Waterford have lost their lives in motorcycle fatalities up to August 14th.

"The mild weather we have experienced since the beginning of the year has seen many bikers take to the roads earlier and more frequently," Chief Executive of the National Safety Council, Pat Costello said.

"This coupled with the fact that relatively low numbers of motorcyclists have received any formal training, our own research indicates that as many as seven out of ten motorcyclists have not received any formal training, could explain the rise in fatalities."

"Therefore our advice is simple, no matter what your age, or level of experience, if you haven't already done so, complete an approved motorcycle rider-training course without delay," he concluded.

"Most students appear to have gained enough points for their first or second choices," he

"The majority of the Applied Leaving Certificate students gained distinctions," he said, and most of these students will be transferring on to one of the nine Post Leaving Certificate Courses here."

He said these include Accountancy, Information Processing and Beauty Therapy courses

'The Vocational Leaving Certificate students also did very well," he added, "with many achieving enough points to go on to do the third level courses of their choice. Many will go to IT's around the country, other inird level courses, and to the Post Leaving Certificate cours-

Mr. Buckley went on to thank the parents and teachers for their commitment throughout the year, and to the students for their application to their studies.

The top performing day school in County Waterford last year - Meanscoil San Nioclas which was ranked very high nationwide on the numbers of students from the school which went on to third level education in a study conducted by the Sunday Independent, said they were very pleased with this years results.

Principal Aine O Ceillaigh. said students at the school on average got 400 points, with a number getting over 500 points.

The school, which teaches its subjects through Irish, and moved into its new state of the art building in April, says the emphasis it places on a small student-teacher ratio has been a crucial aspect of its success.

Ard Scoil na nDeise Principal, Margaret O'Brien, also expressed her delighted with the results achieved by the school's Leaving Certificate students.

"We are delighted with the results," she said. "I think they almost exceeded our expectations in fact, and I'm very pleased

Little Nellie Centenary Weekend in Dungarvan

This weekend sees a very special event taking place in Dungarvan, Nellie Organ, Little Nellie of Holy God, was born in Waterford City on August 24th, 1903. On Saturday evening next, precisely 100 years later, Nellie's birthday will be celebrated at a special Mass in St. Mary's Parish Church. This Mass will be a joyful remembrance of this saintly daughter of Dungarvan. Nellie was instrumental in Pope Pius X's decree Quam Singulari, which reduced the age at which children were able to receive Holy Communion. In recognition of this, it is hoped that many of this year's First Communion Children attend this Mass.

The offertory of the Mass will include items of particular significance to Little Nellie. At Communion time there will be a special rendition of "My First Communion Day". This hymn was composed in honour of Nellie Organ, and sung on December 6th 1907, when she made her First Communion aged just four years old. Following the Mass a commemorative plaque will be unveiled in the porch of St. Mary's Church. This is particularly appropriate, as Nellie's father, William Organ, who lived in Davis St, was a sacristan in St. Mary's. Many local people well remember William taking up the collection at this porch, wearing his dark overcoat and



with his cap folded on the table in front of him. William Organ died on Christmas Day, 1943 and he is buried in Abbeyside Churchyard.

Saturday evening's event concludes with a short (20 minute) video depicting the Life of Little Nellie. This video will be shown in the Assembly Hall of the CBS Secondary School, ad-

jacent to St. Mary's Church. In conjunction with Saturday's Mass, a very special Exhibition on the Little Nellie will be held in Dungarvan Museum. Opening on Friday 22nd August, the exhibition will run for a week until Saturday 30th August. We have many interesting exhibits on show. Among the items are a tooth of Nellie's, the bed in which she died, a fragment from her original coffin, Nellie's shoes and several toys and ornaments with which she played. Also on display will be a large selection of images and photographs that relate to Nellie's life and her impact after she died. Chief among these is a unique series of 18 glass negatives depicting Nellie's life. These images were processed in Paris shortly after Nellie's death in 1908 and teatured in a French book published at that time. These images are of superb quality and have lain dormant for much of the last 80 years only now being available for viewing to a wider audience.

Composting Clinic

Composting is a natural process....so natural, it happens everyday around you. Organic materials rot or biodegrade naturally into a brown/black crumbly material that can be used in your garden as a soil improver/natural fertiliser. The 'breakdown gang' of insects, worms, fungi, bacteria and micro-organisms break down the materials placed in the compost bin. High temperatures of between 60∞ - 70∞c help to break down the materials further. When composting, it is important to get the correct mixture of brown material (approx 2/3) and green material (approx 1/3) to place in your compost bin. Brown materials are usually dry and include eggshells, sawdust and wood shavings, cardboard, dry leaves, straw and hair. Brown materials are slow to rot and are rich in carbon. Green materials are usually moist and include green leaves, grass cuttings, vegetable and fruit peelings, tea bags, and flowers. Green

materials act as a natural activator and help to speed up the composting process.

This brown/green mix usually gives the best results. But ... as with most things, getting the correct mix comes with experience!

The Science of Farming and Food

DAIRY: GRASS, GRASS AND MORE: v Building up grass surplus.

v August is your last chance to grow most grass this year.

v Many farms have too much grass after a great July

v If you have far too much grass either bring in cattle to graze it or make some round bales

Most farmers need an average farm cover of 900-1100 kgs DM/Ha; so, taking out paddocks should not leave you below this

Otherwise, you won't have enough grass in Sept/October.

v If you are not grazing out paddocks well enough you must top:

- Because, this and the next rotation will be 30-40 days long which will result in the dung pad area having 4000-5000 kgs Dm of grass on them - a huge amount.

The result will be that they will be poorly grazed out.

v Regardless of having too much grass now, you must use Nitro-

Don't skip paddocks, you will have little or no grass in 4-6 weeks time.

 Stick by your nitrogen requirement for your stocking rate. v The following nitrogen guidelines are suggested for early to mid August application:

Very low stocking rate: 13 units CAN/acre.

Medium stocking rate: 20 units CAN/acre.

- Highish stocking rate: 30 units CAN/acre.

v Did you notice that it is suggested to apply it in early to mid Au-

There is much more growth early in August than late in August.

- The last application of N goes on in early to mid September. - Every acre on the farm should get its nitrogen on the one day

It will be time saving, more convenient, will definitely grow more grass than if delayed to late August (10-15% more), and it

won't affect the animals. Rotation Lane:

v You are now on the 3rd last rotation.

So, you must set yourself up for next spring.

- Because the fields you will graze first next spring will be dry ones near the farmyard

- So, they will be the paddocks that should be grazed first in this

v The rotation length in August would want to be 20 days early in the month going to 30 days at month's end.

- If shorter you must take steps to lengthen.

- Feed baled silage that was cut off paddocks earlier in year; this will result in no loss in milk or protein (Moorepark) if quality was

- Or, feed meal, pulp, for a few weeks.

v If having to top paddocks, remember the rotation length will have to be increased by 3-4 days if you are to have enough grass at the next grazing.

BEEF: SUCKLER REPLACEMENTS / BREEDING

Spring calving herds should have the stock bull removed at this stage in order to avoid late calves and an extended calving period. Prepare now for getting cows scanned once at least 30 days has elapsed since service of the last cow.

This is a good time to identify potential breeding heifers from this years weanlings. A heifer of good size with a good weight for age (+280 kg at 7 months) indicates her dam had a good milk supply which is a trait that is well transmitted to her daughters. Good milk yield and the ability to calve easily are essential traits for a commercial suckler cow. Cross bred heifers have the advantage of hybrid vigour which assists milk yield and fertility which can be further enhanced where heifers are bred from sires with good maternal traits. Early born heifers can be calved down at 2 years and later born animals can be calved at 2.5 years in Autumn. Is it possible to separate heifers for future breeding (with their dams) from the main herd and keep them in an area where they can be exposed to more handling to leave them easier to manage as in-calf heifers/cows.

RESEEDING

Reseeding jobs should be completed by late August and this is especially important to facilitate a good clover establishment. The present dry spell may have allowed some of the "wet spots" that have developed on dry land in recent years to dry out so that some subsoiling and levelling can be done. In most cases the surrounding land and subsoil are dry and a small amount of work will solve the problem provided there is not an underlying

drainage problem. EXTENSIFICATION

The third date for extensification has been announced by the Department of Agriculture as Sunday 20th July 2003. Now we know the first three dates for 2003, these being 19th January, 27th April and the 20th July. While this year it is not necessary to return any form to the Department of Agriculture it is important that you look at your figures for yourself to see if extensification

The Department of Agriculture and Food reminded all and availability, provision of farmers and transporters of livestock that farm animals are at risk of suffering from heat stress during hot summer weather. This particularly applies to pigs and poultry, while either housed or during trans-

All those in charge of animals on-farm or during transport are legally obliged to ensure that all necessary measures are taken to prevent any unnecessary suffering. To minimise stress during high climatic temperatures, preventative steps should be taken to ensure that the animals can cope. These include: increased frequency of inspection of animal behaviour, reduction in stocking density, provision of adequate ventila-

tion, increased water supply additional cooling mechanisms and shade from the sun.

Additional stand-by arrangements should be made with the abattoir to allow for increased cull rates to reduce stocking densities and to minimise queuing times on arrival.

It is a legal offence to cause or allow unnecessary suffering of animals, both on-farm and during transport.

The Department emphasised the importance of farmers and transporters anticipating difficulties which might arise as a result of prolonged periods of high temperature and making the necessary contingencies, as well as ensuring immediate remedial action should difficulties become apparent.

CAP Unfairly Blamed for Problems in Developing Countries

fecting the long-term future of Irish agriculture will be made at the Ministerial meeting of the World Trade Organisation (WTO) taking place in Cancun, Mexico, in September. The WTO consists of over 140 countries including the EU which negotiates as a single block. The agreed WTO objective is to continue the process started in 1993 of reducing protection and support for agriculture worldwide. If a new world trade round is agreed it will be phased-in over the 2006 to 2012 period.

IFA has recently launched its report on "the CAP, Developing Country Issues and Globalisation" to challenge the critics of the EU agriculture policy who tend to blame the CAP for many of the problems of the developing countries of the world. The central conclusion of the report is that these critics are ignoring the facts both in Europe and in the developing countries. The EU has substantially reformed the CAP to take into account cultural products from develop-

The recent reform of CAP agreed by the Council of Ministers in Luxembourg is part of a series of reforms started by MacSharry in 1992 and continued by Agenda 2000; all these policy changes have been driven by the GATT/WTO agenda.

The main thrust of CAP reform has been a switch from price supports to direct payments, and following the Luxembourg agreement 60% of the direct payments will be fully decoupled from production. EU export refunds which accounted for 37% of the CAP budget in 1990 now account for only 8% of the budget. Earlier this year the EU put forward a compre-

The next major decisions af- hensive offer on agriculture in the WTO negotiations, including an offer to reduce its import tariffs by an average of 36% in the new world trade round. This offer has been made possible by the Agenda 2000 and Luxembourg reforms, and goes a very long way to meet the interests of the developing countries.

The alternative to the EU strategy is the "globalisation" strategy of the Cairns group (Australia, New Zealand, Canada and a number of South American countries) and the US to some extent, which would be extremely negative for both the developing countries and the

Some critics are also failing to acknowledge that the major factors preventing development in many of the developing countries are not trade issues but internal problems, including conflict, disease pandemics, and undemocratic and corrupt government

The EU is by far the largest importer of agricultural products world trade pressures, and the from developing countries, im-EU is the main market for agri- porting more that the US, Canada, Japan, Australia and New Zealand combined. Over 70% of the agricultural exports from the 49 least developed countries go to the EU market.

The EU offer on agriculture in the WTO

.The main elements of the EU offer to the WTO are as follows, including a general commitment on "special and differential treat-

ment for developing countries": Market access 'Everything but arms": The EU is offering total full and free ac-cess to all imports from the 49 least developed countries (LDC's). The EU has already implemented this from 2001 for all but three products, and it will be phased-in for these products during the new round. The EU

is proposing that all other developed countries do likewise.

Market access - general tariff reduction: the EU is offering an average tariff cut of 36%. When combined with the 36% cut under the Uruguay round, the EU will have cut its tariffs by almost 60% by 2012.

The EU is offering to cut the budget expenditure on export refunds by 45%, provided that all forms of export subsidies including US export credits are treated equally, and to phase out export refunds for certain prod-

Food aid: The EU position is that food aid should not be used as a form of export subsidy, but only for well recognised emergencies, and preferably in grant form as it can depress prices and production in recipient countries.

Internal supports: Commissioner Fischler has stated that the EU is putting 60% of its direct payments into the fully non trade-distorting "green box"

Globalisation is not the answer developed and developing countries need agricultural poli-

The objectives of agricultural policy in the EU include stable prices and supplies for consumers, food safety and traceability, reasonable incomes for family farmers, management of the natural environment, and retention of a viable rural economy. Developing countries require their own agricultural policies to develop their agrifood sectors from a low base of knowledge, capital and technology, including some protection from extremely low-price im-

The alternative outcome is globalisation, which would mean that agricultural policies would be abandoned and market forces and multinational trading companies would determined order to achieve a WTO deal.

where food is produced, what food is produced and how it is produced. IFA rejects globalisation for agriculture for a range of reasons

Primary producers in all regions of the world would lose as prices are forced down by multinational traders. The experience from the world coffee market illustrates this.

Two billion people in developing countries would be marginal to the world economy, as they would have not have the technology or capital to compete, and their current political influence would be overwhelmed by market forces.

The multifunctional role of agriculture in the EU, including its environmental, food quality and rural development roles, would be abandoned.

EU consumers would have to accept whatever standards of food safety was determined by major exporting countries or international scientific bodies, e.g. in relation to GMO's.

National governments and the EU would be handing over agri-food policy to multinational trading companies, whose interests are to maximise profits.

CONCLUDING COMMENT

Clearly the EU is in a strong bargaining position in the upcoming WTO ministerial meeting in Cancun, following the recent CAP reform decisions. The EU offer to the WTO is particularly sensitive to the objectives of the developing countries, many of which have strong historic links with EU countries.

IFA's position is that the EU negotiators should not concede any more that contained in the EU offer and the CAP reform outcome. Farmers in Ireland and the other EU countries should not have to pay twice in



DO YOU HAVE "A FRIGGER" IN YOUR HOME?

Everyone in Waterford has a frigger of some sort...on the sideboard, the mantelpiece, the closet or in his or her drawers! In the US they are called whimsies and in Scotland - whigmeleerie!

The Glass Society of Ireland is holding a major international conference in Waterford from 17th to 21st September. Many glass related events are taking place; workshops, tours, lectures and exhibitions. One of the exhibitions being organised by the local branch of the Society, the "Waterford Friggers", will be a display of friggers from the Waterford area.

Friggers or "end of day" glass was any item made by the glassworkers in their own time at the end of the day using up the remaining molten glass in the pots. Sometimes these were fun items, like walking sticks or animals made of glass. Sometimes they were items for the glassworker's own home; and sometimes they were for sale. In Waterford, in the furnace area, swans, fish and walking sticks were common and in the cold section, pyramids, cannon guns and special engraved pieces were produced.

Friggers were popular in many glassmaking regions of the world especially in the late 18th and 19th centuries, and included such objects as jugs, candlesticks, ship models, animal figures. tobacco pipes, rolling pins, bells, hats, witch balls, musical instruments and walking sticks.

In order to find the best of the friggers for the exhibition, that takes place 3rd - 21st September in Waterford Museum of Treasures at the Granary, a special "Waterford Friggers Roadshow vill be held in Dooley's Hotel on Tuesday 26th August. This wil be a fun day where everyone is invited to come along with their frigger and put it on show for the day. The selection process will be presided over by Mary Boydell, who is recognised as the Grande Dame of Irish Glass. There will be prizes for the most interesting pieces.

"We expect a great response from the people of Waterford and are hopeful of finding some really great glass gems," says Martin Dwyer, one of the organisers, who launched the event on Billy McCarthy's Deise AM programme on WLR last Thursday. To get the interest going, Billy asked the audience 'what is a frigger?' The phone lines were hopping with all sorts of responses!

So, dig out your frigger from the attic and come along to the great Friggers Roadshow. All invited to attend this fun day. It will be a great opportunity to view the treasures of glass in Waterford and learn as Mary gives snippets about their history.





OSTEOPOROSIS

WHAT IS OSTEOPOROSIS?

Osteoporosis is a disability in which bones gradually become thinner and weaker, and this causes increased susceptibility to fractures of the hip, spine and wrist. The risk of Osteoporosis increases, as a person gets older, and it is more likely to affect women than men, this is due to hormonal reasons. Bone is a living tissue and in a healthy person it is constantly renewed. There are two types of cells in the bone, one is osteoclasts and the other is osteoblasts, the osteoclasts destroy the cells in the bone, and osteoblasts, make new bone. When a person gets older the osteoclasts work a lot harder and the osteoblasts become less active. This means that bone is being removed and not being replaced with new cells, which then leads to thinning of the bone and Osteoporosis.

SYMPTOMS OF OSTEOPOROSIS

There are usually no signs or symptoms with Osteoporosis; it is only after a person has broken a hip or wrist and has been taken into hospital that a diagnosis can be made. There are specialized tests called bone density tests which measure the bone density in various sites of the body, these tests can detect osteoporosis before a fracture occurs, predict a persons chances of fracturing a bone in the future, and determine the rate of bone loss if treatment is conducted at intervals of a year or more.

Osteoporosis can cause fractures in the hip, which can lead to the loss of mobility and Independence, and Vertebral fractures can lead to the loss of height and the formation of a permanent curvature of the spine, known as 'dowagers hump'. The consequences of Osteoporosis can cause permanent disability.

PREVENTION AND TREATMENT

To prevent Osteoporosis in later life, it is important to have a well balanced diet rich in calcium and vitamin D, to follow a routine of weight bearing exercise, to have a healthy lifestyle which includes no smoking or excessive alcohol intake, and to avail of the Bone density testing. If there is any reason for a person to suspect they may have Osteoporosis then it is important to get professional medical advice. There are a number of treatments such as hormone replacement therapy (HRT), which has been proven to have a positive effect on the prevention and treatment of Osteoporosis.

There is no cure for Osteoporosis, but professionally prescribed medications do improve the quality of life and with increased research into the disability, the future for treatment and prevention of osteoporosis is very good.



When the actor Charles Connor died, Power was hired in his place and became a popular actor playing in England, Ireland and America. He was drowned on his way back from America in 1841 on the S.S. President. He

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Some French friends of mine have decided to move from France to Ireland. Will they need an Irish driving licence or an international driving permit in order to be able to drive here?

No, they will not. If they already have a French driving licence they can use it in Ireland as long as it is still valid. Similarly, you can use your Irish driving licence in France.

Holders of licences issued by a member state of the European Union or the European Economic Area may drive in Ireland as long as the licence they hold remains valid. If they are resident in Ireland they may subsequently exchange it for an Irish licence for the some vehicle classes without having to pass the driving test.

Holders of driving licences from certain other recognised countries may drive in Ireland for up to 12 months as long as their licence is still valid. Upon taking up permanent residence in Ireland they may exchange it for an Irish licence for the same vehicle classes without having to take the driving test. These countries are Australia, Gibraltar, Isle of Man, Japan, Jersey, South Africa, South Korea and Switzerland.

Holders of a driving licence from any other county may similarly drive in Ireland for up to 12 months, as long as their licence is valid, but they must pass a driving test before an Irish licence can be granted. Should they require a provisional licence it may be obtained from the appropriate regional licensing authority.

A temporary visitor to Ireland may legally drive here providing he or she holds a valid licence issued in his or her country of residence or an international driving permit. The holder of a licence for a vehicle with automatic transmission, for example the majority of American cars, may only drive automatic cars in Ireland.





HOLLOW TINING

The greens are being hollow tined from Monday the 18th of August. This operation is necessary to:

- 1. Remove the accumulation of dead grass leaves and roots that has occurred during the growing season
- To allow oxygen to penetrate deep into the rootzone which will result in healthier and deeper roots.
- 3. To allow rapid infiltration of water through the surface of the green
- 4. We are undertaking the operation at this time of year because –
- 5. The grass is growing rapidly and will heal over in a matter of 5 7 days
- As part of the operation we overseed the greens with Creeping Bentgrass which requires a high soil temperature for satisfactory germination and establishment.

There will be a slight deterioration in the roll of the ball for a few days after the hollow tining but the surface will be back at the present high standard in a very short period of time. The Club apologises for any inconvenience.

Hampered on her previous two bend outing the Hole In One Syndicate owned and Jimmy Frisby trained Sineads Ashling (Come On Ranger-Sineads Ivy) Sineads Ashling 3/1 took a flyer from trap two in the second race to make every yard of the running for a stylish one length victory over Ironmerchant in a speedy 16.26.

Less than two lengths separated the entire field over the winning line in the third race over the 550 yard trip. McCarthys Boy cut an early dash from trap five but the leader gave way near the penultimate bend to the Jennifer O'Donnell owned Mounttaylor Gate (Staplers Jo-Devon Melody). The only Irish senior man to set a National Outdoor Record in 2003, 26 year old West Waterford athlete Jamie Costin is also the country's top ranked male athlete this year currently holding 21st spot in the World 50km Walk lists. A vastly experienced athlete he has competed over 10,000m in the European (95) and World Junior Championships (96) as well as the full compliment of senior Championships over 50km in the Sydney Olympics in 2000, the World Championships in 2001 and last year's European Championships in 2002. Always prepares meticulously for his specialty 50km Walk events, he has spent January this year training in Florida along with Mark Carroll, Gareth Turnbull and Keith Kelly, and March at altitude in Mexico

The only Irish senior man to set a National Outdoor along with triple Olympic Walks Champion Robert Ko-Record in 2003, 26 year old West Waterford athlete Jamie rzeniowski from Poland.

He has also proved no slouch over the shorter distances having a B standard over 20km and currently ranked No.1 Irish man over 10,000m as well as winning the Cork City Sports 1-mile event this year. Jamie's hard training regime is now at the tapering stage as he prepares for yet another major championship, the World Athletic Games which start in Paris next Saturday 23rd August. Jamie will be competing in his specialty event, the grueling 50k walk, the race will start at 7.50 a.m. on the Wednesday morning 27th. Jamie will have a big Irish and family support in the French capital.
