Three armed and masked men made off with over 70,000 euros from Lismore's Bank of Ireland branch on Friday last after breaking-in, and holding up a number of employees with a sawn-off shotgun and an axe.

Two of the raiders accessed the bank at 4.05pm through a window at the New Street side of the building. The raiders apparently cut through a heavy security grill, which normally seals off the window in an audacious daylight break-in at the bank, which is virtually straight across the road from the local Garda station.

Two of the men then held up a number of terrified staff, who were tallying up the days takings at the time, and stole a sum of money. The Bank was closed to customers at the time, and no shots were fired and no injuries occurred during the raid.

A third man stood watch by the window throughout the raid, and was armed with a handgun.

The three men then made their getaway back out onto New Street, where a maroon coloured Mazda 626 registration 92-D-28309 was waiting, and sped off on the main Lismore/Ballyduff road

How Do Plants Defend Themselves?

Fixed to the ground or to other plants, a plant cannot flee from danger. So to defend itself from animals, it has various means of protection. Some are covered with thorns, like the rose, many grasses, and the Acacia tree in the tropical grasslands. Others plants can cause irritation, like the nettle, which stings on contact with the tiny, little needles that cover its leaves. The shy Mimosa curls up as soon as anything touches it. The Stone Plant disguises itself among the stones of the African desert.

Too Much Water

The leaves of some tropical plants have a special 'drain', like a gutter, so that the leaf can pour away a surplus of water after a lot of rain.



Defence Against the Cold


To defend them selves against the cold, some flowers, like the Sunflower, turns its corolla, following the course of the Sun. In this way, the flower takes full advantage of the maximum warmth from the rays of the Sun.

Are Plants Sensitive?

Plants, like animals, react to stimuli in their surroundings with movements called tropisms. Some flowers close at night and re-open at dawn.

The roots of plants always grow towards the bottom, sensitive to the force of gravity, whilst the shoots always grow in the direction of water or particular substances in the ground which they need.

Climbing plants are sensitive to contact. They cling to every possible thing that they touch.



How When What Why How did the Sunflower get its name?

The Sunflower is a plant, which is widespread throughout the world and famous for its peculiar behaviour, from which it gets its name. During the day, its bloom is always tuned towards the Sun. Like all tropism phenomena, (turning towards a stimulus) the movement of the Sunflower is controlled by a hormone, a substance produced by the plant and which can stimulate or stop growth. This hormone is mainly in the part which is in the shade, and which grows more quickly than the part in the Sun, where there is less hormone. The Sunflower tries to balance this distribution by constantly bending its stem towards the Sun.

While some reports earlier in the week quoted Garda sources as saying the men were likely to have been in the immediate vicinity of the Bank for as long as two or three days in an effort to remove the security grill, Gardai dismissed this on Tuesday, saying that the claims were exaggerated.

However, Superintendent, Mick Blake acknowledged that the security grill was cut through.

Meanwhile, Lismore based Councillor, Willie McDonnell (FG), who has been a customer of the local Bank of Ireland branch for the past 40 years, said it was "amazing" that the raiders knew the location of the safe, and that the raid took place across from the Garda barracks.

"The genuine public are the losers in this situation not the banks," he added. "The bank itself, I presume, is insured against the loss."

"I do feel very sorry for the staff after the ordeal they went through, and I know

Minister Michael McDowell, responding to a written request from Deputy John Deasy (FG) for clarification on the matter, said there are no plans at present under consideration for the closure of Ballyduff Garda Sta-

The Ballyduff Station is in the Fermoy district, and residents of Ballyduff raised concerns that the station may be one of those mentioned in the Strategic Management Review of the Gardai, which recommends the closure of a number of small rural Garda stations.

Ballyduff Community Council Chairman, Pat Kenny, welcomed the assurance.

"I am pleased to hear it is not being closed," he said. "It is only open a couple of hours a week, but still and all, it is a great benefit to the communi-

Follow this authentic Swiss recepie and give your friends a meal to remember.

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

I large clove of garlic

250ml of dry white wine 300g of Swiss Emmen-

thal cheese, grated 300g of Swiss Gruyère cheese, grated

Juice from half a lemon

1 tbsp of cornflour 60ml kirsch

Pepper

Nutmeg

Peel the garlic and rub vigorously on the inside of

Pour the wine into the saucepan and bring to the boil. Once the wine has boiled, turn heat down to simmer and add cheese and lemon juice. Stir continuously to prevent lumps from


Dissolve the cornflour in the kirsch and stir until smooth - add this to the cheese mixture.



Sift the flour baking powder, salt and mustard powder, then stir in dill. Rub in

Add the eggs and enough milk to form a soft dough. Knead lightly on a floured surface and roll to 2cm thickness.

Using a 7.5cm plain cutter, cut out eight rounds (roll trimmings again as necessary).

Arrange on a baking sheet. Bake for 12 minutes or until the scones are golden and risen. Leave to cool on a wire rack before splitting.

The scones can be served as sandwich type bites (with a top and base) or open, with the fillings on display.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

The Greenest Grass at Home

AGOOD lawn takes years of care and nurturing to achieve. With plenty of time and the right sort of attention, almost any garden can have a lawn fit to bowl on.

But it is far more than simply a case of weed, feed and mow. Here are a few tips on how to cope with everyday lawn problems.

Drought

Symptoms - Yellowish brown patches develop through the lawn and in extreme cases the whole area may become discoloured. The damage usually occurs in late spring or summer. The problem is caused by dry weather and inadequate watering. Free-draining sandy soils are most at risk.

Control - Water regularly in the early evening providing enough water for deep penetration. To improve drought resistance feed regularly and leave cut grass on the lawn if drought conditions are forecast. Allow the grass to grow fairly long and avoid mowing too closely.

Cats and dogs

Symptoms - Lawns and other grassed areas are dug up, fouled or scorched with

Control - Areas visited consistently by cats should Repellent substances based on pepper-dust, naphthalene or aluminium ammonium sulphate are available but these often fail to give more than temporary protection.

Dollar spot

Symptoms - Small strawcoloured patches appear in the autumn. At first they are small but the patches join together to form larger patches. They darken with age. The disease appears mainly in mild damp weather and is caused by the fungus sclerotinia homeocarpa.

Control - Improve soil aeration and remove thatch. Treat the area with a suitable by gelatinous lichens and

fungicide such as benomyl, algae which are particularly carbendazim or thiophanatemethyl.

Symptoms - Brown patches appear in the lawn in midsummer and maggots are sometimes visible. The probbe regularly watered and net- lem is caused by the larvae ed damp sections. Control - Soak affected areas of the lawn with water and cover with sacking or black plastic sheeting for a day to bring the leatherjackets to the surface. They can then be removed and killed. Use carbaryl against newly hatched larvae in mid-autumn. Problems are worse following a wet autumn.

Algae and gelatinous lichens

Symptoms – Slippery areas of green or greenish-black form on the surface of the lawn. The problem is caused


common on poorly drained

Control - Try to improve the drainage and also aerate the lawn. Prune back any trees or shrubs which overhang the area creating shadstandard lawn care products that contain dichlorophen.

Red thread

Symptoms - Tiny pale pink and red threads of fungus develop on small patches of grass. These later become bleached. The problem is caused by the fungus Corticium fuciforme which is common after heavy rain. It is also troublesome when the soil is nitrogen deficient or poorly aerated.

Control - Improve turf maintenance by aerating, scarifying and feeding as necessary. Fungicides should not be necessary on a wellkept lawn but where the problem is severe use benomyl, thiophanate-methyl or carbendazim.



€200, 000 For Durrow **Cross Improvement Works**

KEVIN KIRRANE

Minister Martin Cullen has announced that an additional 200,000 euros will be provided towards improvement works on the R675 Clonea road towards Durrow Cross.

The funding is believed to be on-top of the 400,000 euros allocated to Waterford County Council for its roadworks scheme at the start of the year. The funding will go towards the limited realignment of the R675, which County Engineer, John O'Flynn previously said may involve the use of Compulsory Purchase Orders for some land purchases, but will avoid housing in the area.

A further 180,000 euros will be provided to enable design work to commence on signposting Regional Roads around the county.

Minister Cullen said this grant is being made available under the Regional Roads Signposting Programme - which commenced this year. This is in line with the commitment in the Programme for Government to put in place a new 5-year plan to ensure that non-national roads are properly signposted.

"Non-national roads are of vital importance to Waterford," said the Minister. "They facilitate improved industrial and tourism development. Funding for these projects represents continuing advancement for Waterford infrastructure and its future development."

Top Earner In Town **Council Earned Over €11,000 Last Year**

Labour Councillor, Teresa Wright topped the Dungarvan Town Council earning list for 2002 to 2003 after receiving over 11,000 euros, it has emerged in figures released by the Town Council on Tuesday

Despite reports that the top earner in the Town Council received just over 7,000, this is before the once off representative payment made to all members - except the three dual Town and County members - is taken into account.

Town Councillors received representational payments for the first time under the Local Government 2001 Act, and received a once-off payment of eur3, 853.00 from an entitlement back dated from May 2000 to 31st of December 2001.

This is on top of a representational payment of 3,033.00 euros councillors are entitled to annually.

However, Cllr. Teresa Wright's higher allowance payment can be explained by the fact that she served as Town Mayor for six months of last year. She was also the second lowest claimant of expenses last year, having claimed just 389.22 euros.

Deputy John Deasy, meanwhile, didn't claim any expenses last year, while the top claimant in the Town Council was his Fine Gael party colleague Cllr. Damien Geoghegan





SHEEP: Timing for the Ram Effect

The ram effect is frequently mentioned at this time of year but often it is not well understood. It is a natural method for bringing ewes into heat at the start of the breeding season.

Ewes are seasonal breeders and shortening day length hours triggers their season. Mid-September is the typical start of the breeding season but this will vary with breed and different years. The length of this season is 5-6 months for adult ewes.

The purpose of the ram effect is to get as many ewes as possible mated at the start of the season. Its main benefit is for someone who lambs between the main season i.e. March and early lamb

Rams produce chemical substances called pheromones, which helps trigger the start of the season. This occurs where ewes have not had sight, sound and smell of rams for at least four weeks beforehand. If they mixed, the ewe flock would be less sensitive to this stimulus.

When the ram is introduced (day 0) some ewes will show a silent heat, the remainder will show a silent heat about 6 days later (day 6). The first real heat will occur 17 days after ram introduction when 30-40% of ewes should be mated. Around day 23 the remainder of the flock should be mated.

The ideal situation would be to use a vasectomised ram for the first week (day 0-7). Introduce fertile rams at day 16 and expect up to 80% of ewes to go in lamb over the next 10 days (day 16-26).

With sponging, a ewe:ram ratio of 8:1 is normal, with natural mating 40-50 ewes per ram is practical. A ewe:ram ratio of 20:1 with the ram effect should be adequate as most mating will occur over an 8-day period.

This year

The real benefits of ram effect are to synchronise late January/early February lambings. If vasectomised rams (teaser) were introduced today, peak mating would occur on the 12th and 18th of September. This would coincide with lambing in the first week of February.

Some farmer's claim that the ram effect works well for late February/early March lambing. Although these ewes will be mated during the natural breeding season, it may be bringing forward some slow breeders that normally lamb to the second or third service. It cost nothing and may be worth trying.

Some alternatives to teaser rams that were suggested include putting rams in the next field or in a trailer in the field with ewes. The ram effect certainly works with ewe lambs. These are slower to come in heat and will works well where mating is in early October. This would require teaser rams to be introduced on September 15th

Table 1: Sequence of events for ram effect

Day

- Keep rams away from ewe flock for at least 28 days
- Introduce vasectomised (teaser) rams. Some ewes show silent heat
- Some ewes show silent heat
- Remove vasectomised rams. Introduce fertile rams
- Approximately 30-40% ewes mated

Remainder of ewes mated **DAIRYING: Dealing with cash flow problems**

Cash flow has been squeezed on many dairy farms due to lower milk prices and higher costs. As a result the cash surpluses that would normally occur around now are very low or non-existent. The main warning sign of a cash flow problem is an increase in the bank overdraft or trading account balances. Other signs are a slippage in term loan or lease repayments.

Do not ignore the problem. Take action and seek advice.

Work out a simple cash flow budget for the next few months. Include all likely receipts (farm and other) and all farm payments. Factor in a figure for family living expenses. Don't forget taxation payments due in Nov. Estimate the resultant cash surplus or deficit.

Postpone any expenditure (farm or other) that isn't absolutely necessary

List out everything that you owe - farm/ personal loans, merchant credit, overdraft - and find out the relevant interest rate for each. Could all the various different loans be restructured into one loan over a suitable term?

Be prepared for any meetings with creditors (people you owe money to) or the bank manager. Have your most recent set of farm accounts and cash flow budget available.

Some possible solutions to cash flow problems inclu

- Restructuring existing loans into one loan over a suitable term Look for a moratorium (loan repayment break) on either the total repayment or the capital portion only
- Negotiate a suitable repayment schedule with merchants which involves minimal interest charges
- On some farms, it may be possible to sell drystock or cull cows earlier than normal
- The Farm Assist Scheme may be an option for smaller dairy farmers on low incomes. Contact your local Teagasc office or the local Social Welfare office for further details.

GREEN WHEAT MOVES TO €110 TO €115/T AS COMPETITION INTENSIFIES

Waterford IFA Grain Committee Chairman Bill Shanahan has said that the competition for grain has intensified in the last number of days as merchants and traders alike realise that yields and grain supplies are way back on initial estimates.

Mr. Shanahan said "As the winter wheat harvest gets into full swing, in the North Midlands, East and North East wheat and barley yields, particularly on the heavier soils, are disappointing. Wheat will do well to average 3.4 to 3.6 t / acre. Wheat yields are varying from 2.5 to 4.4 t / acre.'

The Waterford Grain Chairman said "Many merchants are now realising that the grain is not there and they are anxiously canvassing growers who have grain to cut or in temporary storage to supply that grain to them.

Lismore has had its share of robberies in the last week, with one of the local banks being relieved of a sizeable amount of currency and on Saturday evening last at the Castle Farm venue Cappoquin Intermediate hurlers who dominated proceedings for most of the game and with sixty one minutes played led by five points, but when the final whistle blew which was four minutes later they found themselves two points adrift and being "robbed" by Lismore who showed great character coming back from the dead.

Even when most of us in the crowd thought time was up and the game was over "Check" Shanahan popped up to score two goals and Kieran O'Gorman put over a point between the sixty second and sixty fifth minute to rob the cornerstone side of a victory which on the run of play they deserved.But as the great Jimmy Greaves once said about soccer "It's a funny auld game", and the same can often be said about a hurling match.

This was one of the better performances from a Cappoquin side in recent times, which I have seen and they have often won games playing not half as good. Most credit for this goes down to the work trainer Jimmy Ryan is doing and it is a slow process but given time and the right attitude from all the players, Cappoquin seem to be on the right track. 

St. Mary's Church of Ireland Kinsalebeg

The earliest reference to this church occurs in the ecclesiastical taxation of 1302-6, where the church of 'Kynsale' was valued at 121.

The dedication to the Blessed Virgin Mary is recorded in 1470, although in 1841 O'-Donovan in noting St Bartholomew's well suggested that Bartholomew was the original patron of the parish. The church was noted as a perpetual vicarage in 1403 and in 1470 a papal indulgence was granted to aid the repair of the church; the text of this indulgence statgarvan. The Exhibition will be ed that the church was: 'Notable among the parish churches of at 5 p.m Normal Museum open- those parts, that therein there

were many magnates and notable parishioners, that it was decently and honourable built, and that it was provided with pavements and other ornaments'

This would suggest a church of some wealth and prestige, but yet it seems to have been a chapel of Dungarvan by 1537 possibly followed in the wake of the takeover of Kinsalebeg by the earls of Desmond around the middle of the 15th century. Canon Power located the medieval church just to the north of the modern church but no trace of it now survives.

A 17th century grave slab was recorded at the south-east angle of the present church. The Latin

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Some French friends of mine have decided to move from France to Ireland. Will they need an Irish driving licence or an international driving permit in order to be able to drive here?

ANSWER

No, they will not. If they already have a French driving licence they can use it in Ireland as long as it is still valid. Similarly, you can use your Irish driving licence in France. Holders of licences issued by a member state of the European Union or the European Economic Area may drive in Ireland as long as the licence they hold remains valid. If they are resident in Ireland they may subsequently exchange it for an Irish licence for the some vehicle classes without having to pass the driving test.

Holders of driving licences from certain other recognised countries may drive in Ireland for up to 12 months as long as their licence is still valid. Upon taking up permanent residence in Ireland they may exchange it for an Irish licence for the same vehicle classes without having to take the driving test. These countries are Australia, Gibraltar, Isle of Man, Japan, Jersey, South Africa, South Korea and Switzerland.

Holders of a driving licence from any other county may similarly drive in Ireland for up to 12 months, as long as their licence is valid, but they must pass a driving test before an Irish licence can be granted. Should they require a provisional licence it may be obtained from the appropriate regional licensing authority.

A temporary visitor to Ireland may legally drive here providing he or she holds a valid licence issued in his or her country of residence or an international driving permit. The holder of a licence for a vehicle with automatic transmission, for example the majority of American cars, may only drive automatic cars in Ireland.

Questions Raided About New Masts Study

Unease has been expressed at confirmation by the Office of Public Works (OPW) that it has contracted consultants to look at publicly owned buildings in Waterford and other counties with a view to renting out space on them to telecommunications companies for masts.

Dungarvan area Labour Councillor Fiachra O Céilleachair says the announcement by OPW Junior Minister Tom Parlon TD that Dublin based mobile telecommunications consultancy firm Vilicom have been appointed as advisers to the Department on the subject should be greeted with caution.

Cllr. O Céilleachair says a previously similar deal entered into by the state with Esat/02 in respect of Gárda stations led to controversy in communities throughout Co. Waterford, with masts proposed in residential areas leading to planning disputes. Up to 1,800 buildings nationwide are owned and managed by the OPW and Cllr. O Céilleachair says clarification is required on what kind of locations for masts might be in mind.

Saying he was in favour of the "sensitive" locating of telecommunications facilities, Cllr. O Céilleachair said enough uncertainty existed about mobile phone masts to warrant restrictive conditions as to their placement in areas of adjacent residential density.

Cllr. O Céilleachair said whilst the state is anxious to avoid being cash strapped and various departments were looking at ways of raising revenue, a balance needed to be struck when it came to ensuring the general environmental wellbeing of communities.

Clir. O Céilleachair says local authorities in Co. Waterford have an audit of publicly owned buildings around the

county and should be conscious of where the placing of masts would not be desirable, including on aesthetic grounds. Co. Waterford and Ireland is big

enough, in Cllr. O Céilleachair's view, for enough places to be found for the necessary distribution of mobile phone and other masts without their location leading to controversy that could be avoided in the first place.

Cllr. O Céilleachair says he looks forward to more detailed information being forthcoming from the OPW than has been the case so far.



Teacher Breaks Links With School After 40 Years

School that goes back to the early fifties will be broken when the new term begins over a week from now. As both pupil and teacher Michael Forrestal has been part of the fabric of the school for more than forty years. But he is now enjoying a well earned rest, having retired from his secondary teaching post. He first walked through the school gates in 1953 having completed his primary education at the nearby S.S. Peter and Paul's, like so many generations of Clonmelians have done before and since. After sitting the leaving cert he went to U.C.D. where he graduated with degrees in Irish, History and English and he also took Latin for his Arts Degree. He entered the teaching profession at St. Paul's College in Raheny

A link with Clonmel High Dublin, but jumped at the opportunity when a post became vacant at the High School in his hometown and there began a career at the School that lasted 37 years. He recalls his arrival at the school in 1966 with fondness. He was training St. Mary's minor hurling team at the time and many of the team were surprised, to say the least, when they walked in to class on Monday morning to discover the identity of their new teacher. The first day only seems like yesterday and he finds it hard to believe that he won't be joining his former colleagues when the new-term starts. He was one of 30 pupils who sat the Leaving Cert in 1958. This year some 145 teenage boys took the exam in a school that now accomodates more than 700 students.



LATE MR. DECLAN DARGAN

It is with deep and sincere regret we extend our sympathy to the death of Mr. Declan Dargan, Elm Park, Clonmel who died recently. A man who had a simple philosophy on life which he loved and lived to the full. Belying the popular image of a devil-may-care, however, he was good natured, considerate and kindly person with exceptional talent in the culinary art. Though moving easily in large house party circles over the years, his brother said, he nonetheless liked to be referred to as the Poorman's Chef, always willing to accommodate people with modest means.

He was son of Michael and Nellie Dargan, he was one of a family of fourteen; seven boys and seven girls. As a teenager holidaying in the late 60's in Dublin, he got the opportunity of joining his brother who was a chef in the Oyster Grill in Ranelagh, and stayed on to do his training there after which he got a job in the International Bray for the season. Moving subsequently to Scotland in the early 70's, he spent a couple of years there gaining invaluable experience. He returned to Ireland and was employed by the Travellers Friend Hotel in Castlebar and met local girl Nellie Patten at Blackfort. He married in 1976 and they moved some three years later to Clonmel and they resided in Baron Park. They reared three boys, he took up employment in the popular Ormonde Grill in Glandstone Street, one of the first restaurants of it's kind in the area, attached to the supermarket, he worked there for fourteen years till it's closure. Following that he started catering for parties everywhere, including weddings, funerals, christenings, confirmations and communions. And for two years he worked in Cahir in the Shamrock Lounge, Galtee Inn and Dan Cortigans. A family member remarked that he should have been a juggler the way he was able to keep going. He had not got a car, he did not need one, with so many people willing to pick him up any time night or day on the Cahir/Clonmel road.

The last two years of his life he spent as a night manager at Raheen House, Clonmel. Declan of course, was well known to have been an inveterate gambler and smoker, a subject of much banter in family circles. A great man to study form, he also loved to roll his own cigarettes and there was so many who were glad to do the need full when he lost the use of his right arm. In bad health for most of a year, he kept going without a complaint, looking on his illness as more of an inconvenience than anything else. A big blow to him was the death of his wife two and a half years ago. He had been hoping to attend his nephews wedding, but the Lord had for him other plans, and of course he would have loved to be at the Special Olympics where his son Johann, whom he was so proud of, was participating. Declan had requested that when he was gone that rather than mourn his death, his life would be celebrated, a friend promising that his wish would be honoured, which it was.

His remains were removed to S.S. Peter and Pauls Parish Church, Clonmel where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Colm O' Brien C.C. On the following morning requiem



It's D day for eight teams on Saturday as the quarter finals of the All Ireland Senior Ladies football takes place featuring double headers at Cusack Park, Ennis and Pearse Park, Longford. At the Clare venue Kerry and Laois get the action underway followed by Mayo and Waterford whilst in Longford it's Galway v Tyrone and Dublin v Monaghan.

It all adds up to the most keenly contested championship ever. Boosted by the back door system, that gives a second chance to the beaten provincial finalists, thus ensuring quarter finals for the first time. For Waterford the task couldn't be more difficult, a clash with the reigning All Ireland Champions Mayo. Mayo have been easily the best team around for the last 4 years, their second of 3 All Ireland titles, and defeat in the final speaks for itself. They have tons of experience and craft laced with good footballers who know how to win a big occasion. The key question is will they have the hunger or will all the success have taken the edge off their game. Saturday will provide the answer. In Denise Horan they have the games top keeper, and the free scoring of Cora Staunton are all household names, yet the key to the Mayo side is probably the Heffernan sisters, Marcella and Christina and they are the two who will have to be marked very closely if the Westerners challenge is to be derailed.

Mayo play a cute brand of possession football. They defend in number and hunt in packs and with the players of this game playing the winners of Galway and Tyrone in the semi final, they will see that tie as a virtual passport to the final, considering their record against the other 2 teams in recent times. Likewise their rivalry with Waterford will probably ensure there is no complacency. Rivalry is fierce and this battle is sure to be no place for the faint hearted. The stakes are high and defeat could spell the end for a number of players on both sides. Over the last couple of years, Waterford's performances have been littered with inconsistency. Brilliant one day, mediocre the next and that has been the situation again this year. Brilliant in the 1st round clash with Kerry, down a bit but adequate against Cork and doing everything but press home the advantage they enjoyed against Kerry in the Munster final on the scoreboard.

In that game, they kicked 19 wides, hit the crossbar twice, the post twice and threw the game away. All this in a year when they have done more shooting practice than ever before. Maybe there was a hint of complacency after hammering Cork and Kerry in the earlier rounds.

Complacency shouldn't be a problem on Saturday, they know exactly what they are up against. Neither showed fitness, they have had 72 sessions comprising of 18 matches and 54 training sessions since last February. Indeed sessions in Dunhill have been replaced by outdoor work at such venues as the Friary College, Bushy Park, Colligan, Clashmore, Ring, Ballymacarbry, Tramore and Walsh

Tallow in full flight may just survive, but not until they have survived a very tough encounter.


Stradbally v Portlaw At KIII
