Dungarvan's Roads To Be Re-Dug For €1.5m Broadband Project

Many of Dungarvan's roads are to be re-dug to facilitate the laying of a publicly owned 1.5 million euro broadband network around the town.

Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Town Council heard that a new state of the art

CLLRS WARN AGAINST FLATS FOR WALTON PARK 'PROPOSAL'

Any potential plans to engage in a land swap, involving a private company developing a Marina in Dungarvan in return for Town Council property in Walton Park to build some form of commercial, residential or retail development would be

strongly opposed, two Labour Councillors have warned.

Cllr. Billy Kyne raised the issue at a meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, having been approached by a number of people who expressed concerns about a private consortium's plans for a Marina development.

"It's open knowledge around the town, that there is a planned submission from one of the potential developers that involves land in Walton's Park being exchanged with the Town Council to get the marina development off the ground," Cllr. Kyne said.

Apparently, the developer – who has remained unnamed – proposes to offset his spend on developing the marina through the construction of a retail, commercial or other form of development on part of Walton's Park.

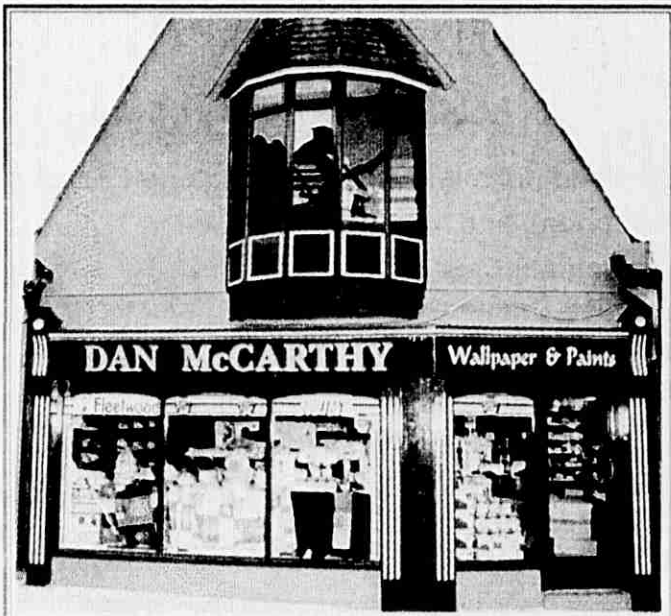

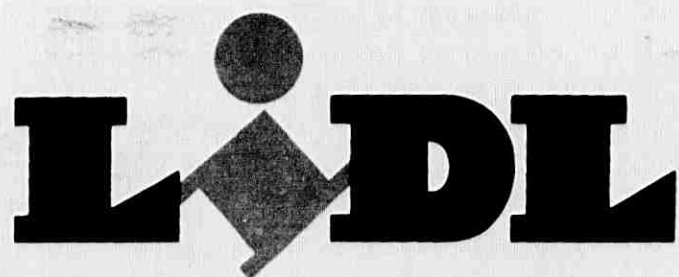

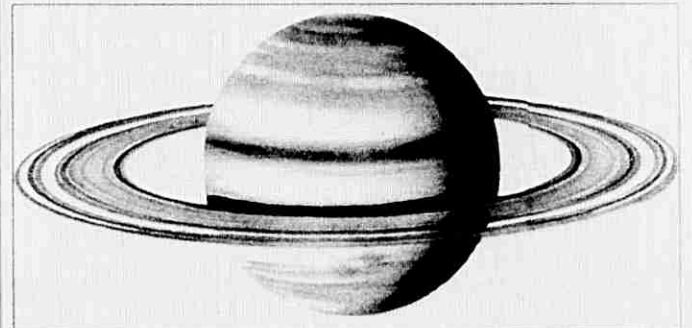

THE SOLAR SYSTEM

The Sun, and everything in its orbit, make up the Solar System. Scientists believe that the Solar System began to form at the edge of the Milky Way Galaxy about 10 billion years ago, after Big Bang. As well as the Sun, planets and moons, the Solar System contains lumps of ice and rock and vast clouds of dust. All of these are held together by the force of the Sun's gravity.

Jupiter could hold over 1,000-planet earths. Jupiter is the biggest planet in the Solar System. It is over 1,000 times larger than earth. It is made mainly of gas, but its mass is so large its gravity acts like a giant vacuum cleaner, sucking lumps of rock, such as asteroids, into its atmosphere.

Comets Are Like Dirty Snowballs in Space

Comets are lumps of ice mixed with dust and grit that orbit the Sun. They are ‘space litter’ left over from when the Solar System formed. A cloud of glowing gas surrounds the solid part of a comet. When a comet's orbit takes it near the Sun so that it begins to melt, gas and dust stream out to form the comet's tail. This is why comets were once known as: hairy stars.” Comets have vast orbits and some can only be seen from planet earth every few thousand years. Most are named after the astronomers who discovered them, such as the Hale-Bopp Comet, which came into view from Earth between 1995 and 1997.

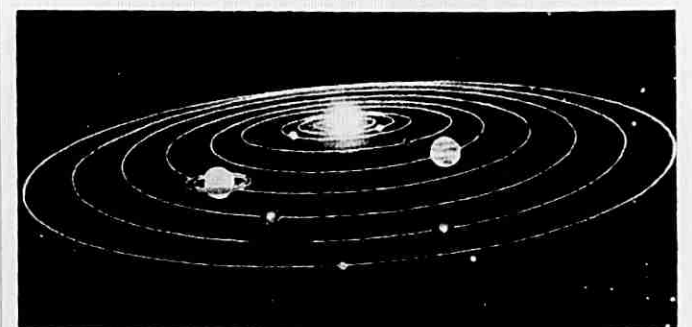


The Earth Is One of Nine Planets That Orbit The Sun

All the planets in the Solar System travel in the same direction but at different speeds. The four closest planets to the Sun are small and rocky. They are Earth, Mars, Mercury and Venus. The planets further away are made of ice, gas and liquids. They are Jupiter, Saturn, and Neptune.

There May Be A Mystery Planet X

Some scientists believe there is a tenth planet still to be discovered in our Solar System. They believe Planet X is bigger than Pluto and that its gravity affects Uranus and Neptune, but it may be too far away for us to detect even with the most powerful



Did You Know?

- ★ In 1987, the space probe Pioneer 10 became the first man-made object to leave the solar system.
- ★ When the Italian astronomer Galileo looked at Jupiter in 1610, it was the first time a planet had been studied through a telescope.
- ★ Io. One of Jupiter's sixteen moons, is the most volcanic body in the solar system, throwing up lava spouts 140km high.
- ★ On Mars, there is a volcano over twice the height of Everest.
- ★ There is a picture of Halley's Comet on the Bayeux Tapestry, because it appeared in 1066.
- ★ Mercury is the fastest-moving planet in the solar system, and was named after the ancient Roman messenger of the gods.

"I'm not saying it's going to happen," Cllr. Kyne added. "But I would say, that if any plans to exchange council owned property is involved in any of the submissions it would not find easy agreement from me."

County Manager, Donal Connolly was approached before the July meeting of the Town Council by a consortium, who re-floated the idea of building a Marina, probably in the inner harbour.

In order to comply with the public procurement procedure, it was decided to advertise for submissions from any interested developers, and hire an advisory body to make recommendations on the suitability of these plans.

But, ultimately, the decision to accept or reject a proposal will rest with the Town Council, Mr. Connolly said on Monday.

"I can assure you, that there is nothing underhand going on behind the scenes involving the council," he added.

The proposed Marina is believed to involve upwards of one hundred berths possibly in a joint development between the Town Council and the developer, with the developer to

manage the day to day running of the marina. It is now being openly speculated that the Marina will be developed near the Pond, and involve the widening of the road near to that location.

However, Town Mayor, Paddy Power (Lab) confirmed that speculation has been growing about one of the developers plans, and said the plans involved the construction of flats on part of Walton's Park.

But, he said the Town Council hasn't been formally approached about this plan.

The County Manager, also reiterated that it is up to the elected members to decide on the winning submission - if any - and it's hoped that the advertisement for interested developers will attract a number of different proposals. An advisory group to the council will examine these plans suitability.

"Nothing has been decided as yet," Mr. Connolly said.

Speaking after the meeting to the Dungarvan Leader, Cllr. Kyne agreed that no concrete proposal has come in yet. But, he said his point in making his comments was to give advance warning that he would not easily accept any exchange of land involving Walton's Park.

"If submissions should come in involving an exchange of

land in other areas of the town then well and good - that can be looked at in due time. But, from the feedback I'm getting about these potential proposals I

couldn't envisage any of the submissions which involves Walton's Park as part of the development strategy getting my backing," he said.

closed over the summer to allow work on the Sewerage Scheme to proceed, resulting in widespread traffic snarl-ups and backlogs.

According to County Manager, Donal Connolly some overlapping road works including Mitchell Street will be examined for the possibility of carrying out the works side by side. But, it's understood that a standing contract with KN Network Services to lay the broadband infrastructure will see separate contractors and separate works on Dungarvan's roads.

PUBLIC ACCESS

Briefing Dungarvan Town Council on the planned broadband network, Thomas Byrne, Director of the South East Regional Authority said the network will connect up the towns Industrial Estates and Business Parks.

Ninety-percent of the funding will come from the National Development Plan, with the remainder coming from the Local Authority, and the system will then be publicly owned.

A management company will then be set up to market the network in the South Eastern cities and towns involved with the aim of attracting a telecom company to lease out the network.

Dungarvan Town Council would receive ten percent of the money gained from this lease, Mr. Byrne told the members.

The infrastructure will also provide enough capacity to meet internet and telecommunications demands for the next twenty years, and according to Mr. Byrne it will enhance the attractiveness of the Region for inward industrial investment and enterprise development.

The project will start in the next few weeks, and continue for around twenty-seven weeks, costing a total of 1.5 million euros.

CONCERNS

Speaking at Monday's Town Council meeting, Deputy John Deasy, (FG), asked whether there was any possibility of the broadband infrastructure being laid at the same time as the Sewerage works currently ongoing around the town.

"We'll be digging up the same streets for a second time in a short space of time," Deputy Deasy said.

Joe Brennan, a member of the Council's engineering staff said that while they sought a contract with the sewerage contractors - Roadbridge - the insurance risks from archaeological findings apparently would have resulted in a higher

contract price than with a separate firm.

The contracted firm, KN Network Services, will also work on the same type of network system in Waterford City and Clonmel, Mr. Byrne added, and have a fixed term and fixed price contract signed for the three areas.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan questioned the impact of the new technology on Casey's Cablevision, which has been providing internet, and other telecommunications infrastructure in the town for many years.

"I assumed that the new infrastructure would have been a happy marriage - so to speak - between the two companies," Cllr. O'Riordan said, going on to question whether the new ducting could be carried by Casey's.

The County Manager replied that: "Casey's have been doing an excellent job for the town, and they will continue to provide that service. But this is a different concept. Also, I think it had to be taken into consideration that the other towns in the South East will have this technology, and there is a danger that when it comes to attracting new businesses and supporting the existing ones we would be left behind without this technology."

The broadband cables, will be laid two and a half feet below the surface, and the route will go from Grattan Square, Bridge Street and Davitts Quay, connecting to the Shandon, and the industrial estates through the Youghal Road, the Spring, and the bypass road.

BOHADOON SOUTH ROAD STRENGTHENING REQUESTED

Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) has requested that road strengthening works be carried out in Bohadon South near Coolnasmea under the 2004 Roadworks Programme, the last meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

While major strengthening works can't be carried out before next year, Cllr. Ryan called for the potholes in the area to be filled in, in the meantime.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said he will be discussing plans for strengthening the road with the area engineer with a view towards including it in the roadwork's programme, and agreed to fill the potholes in the area in the interim.

Cllr. Ryan told the Dungarvan Leader that this was completed later on that day.

Kenny Rallies Grassroots Support Before Next Election

On Friday last, Fine Gael leader, Enda Kenny visited Dungarvan – the 41st constituency out of forty-two he has visited since he came to office a year and a half ago.

His visit came against a backdrop of the declining popularity of his leadership of the opposition with twice as many people saying they are dissatisfied with his performance as they were at the last opinion polls.

The party he leads is also stuttering, and has failed to recover the support it lost before the decimation of a year and a half ago, and remains static at 21 to 23%.

His visit to Dungarvan was part of an effort to stem the decline in his personal standings, and to help build momentum for the parties challenge in next years Local and European Elections – elections which are ultimately expected to decide the future of his leadership.

Mr. Kenny started off his tour of the area in Stradbally, where he met with farmers and representatives from the IFA and the ICMSA at Durrow Creamery.

Liam Brazil, the manager at Durrow Creamery, is running for Fine Gael in the County Council elections, and he and Mr. Kenny oversaw the meeting, which was attended by around 60 to 70 members of the farming community with matters raised ranging from the future of farm families to the outcome of the WTO talks in Mexico.

Following the meeting, Mr. Kenny, together with Deputy John Deasy, Senator Maurice Cummins and Cllr. Damien Geoghegan arrived in Dungarvan just over an hour later, where they met with local fishermen.

Shortly afterwards they took a boat trip on the Dungarvan Charter Sailing Vessel, the Avoca, and Mr. Kenny viewed

the proposed location for a marina. Mr. Kenny was also informed about the success of the Dungarvan Oyster farm by Jim Harty, and Dungarvan Harbours potential from an aqua-culture standpoint.

The future potential of Ring harbour – the location of a proposed pier development – was also discussed before the Fine Gael leader continued on his hectic schedule to Ring College, where Mr. Kenny – a fluent Irish speaker – discussed educational issues with the principal and staff of the Gaeltacht college.

Dungarvan's tremendous potential was again highlighted on Mr. Kenny's return to the town, where he viewed plans for the development of the 35 acre former Glanbia site. He also met with representatives of Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce, before attending the party's social function at Crotty's Pub in Leamybrien.

"What we tried to do is try to

show him as much of the area as we could in one day," Deputy Deasy said afterwards. "I think anyone who comes to Dungarvan can see the tremendous potential. You can see that the mooring situation is after maxing itself out in the Quay, and that there is potential there if a developer with suitable plans comes along."

"We haven't got one penny from the Government when it comes to developing a marina, so I think it is worthwhile lobbying leaders, whoever they maybe about the situation we find ourselves in."

Deputy Deasy has apparently had a number of spat with his party leader, but he said that he has always got on well with Mr. Kenny.

"What I think is terribly false in Irish politics, are people who pretend they don't have different opinions, and I'll never do that," he said. "I'll tell people to their face exactly what I feel."

Deputy Deasy said Enda

Kenny has accepted that, "and that is the reason I still have my job." He added that a lot of the reported rifts between the two are "blown out of proportion."

Asked about his reaction to the latest poll findings which saw a growing dissatisfaction with Mr. Kenny as leader, Deputy Deasy said it must be very disappointing for him.

"The fact that his dissatisfaction rating almost doubled from the last time is something that he is going to have to work on."

"He is there a year and a half, and that has got to improve. There is no point putting a gloss on it. Irish politics is very much leader centric, and you don't want a situation where your dissatisfaction is so high going into an election, which is what we will do next year."

However, Deputy Deasy said the party is reorganising from the Grassroots up, and is working towards the local elections.

The party will also hold its convention in the forthcoming

Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Caramel lamb with a redcurrant sauce

CARAMELISED lamb chops with sweet redcurrant sauce and sharp minty green beans.

Ingredients:

Serves 4
4 thick lamb chump chops
Salt and pepper
50g granulated sugar
1 x 15ml sp cooking oil
Butter
1 medium onion, thinly sliced
100g mushrooms, thinly sliced
1 x 15ml sp flour
2 x 15ml sp red wine vinegar
2 x 15ml sp redcurrant jelly
210ml lamb stock
1 or 2 fresh sprigs rosemary
Dash of Worcestershire sauce
25g butter (to fry beans)
200g green beans
1 x 15ml sp mint sauce

Method:

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6.

Season chops with salt and pepper and coat with sugar. Heat oil in a frying pan, add chops and fry for five minutes, turning halfway through until golden. Remove chops and place on a greased baking tray. Bake for about 12-15 minutes.

Meanwhile, melt a knob of butter in the pan and fry the onion and mushrooms until softened. Add the flour to the pan and cook for one or two minutes. Increase the heat, add red wine vinegar and boil to reduce.

Add the redcurrant jelly, stock, rosemary and Worcestershire sauce, and bring to the boil. Cook until thickened and season



to taste with salt and pepper.

For the minty green beans, heat the butter in a frying pan, add the green beans and mint sauce. Fry for 2-3 minutes then season with

salt and pepper.

To serve, spoon the minty green beans into the centre of four plates, place a lamb chop on top and spoon the sauce over the top.

Healthy hake with beetroot

HEALTHY, low fat, fast food. A tasty meal which won't pile on the pounds.

Ingredients: Serves 4

250g cooked beetroot, cut into matchsticks
Fine strips from one orange
Juice of one orange
4 hake fillets, approx 100g each
30ml fresh, chopped herbs, dill, chervil and tarragon
Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method:

Pop the beetroot strips into a pan with the orange strips and half the orange juice.

Heat gently for eight to 10 minutes or until piping hot, stirring frequently.

Arrange hake on a grill rack, and sprinkle with the remaining orange juice.

Cook for 3-4 minutes or until the fish is cooked through.

Divide the beetroot between four warmed plates.

Carefully arrange the hake on top and sprinkle with herbs and seasoning.



Meringues and whipped cream

WHO can resist a light, sugary snack that melts in the mouth?

Ingredients: Makes 6

3 medium egg whites
180g caster sugar
FOR THE FILLING:
450ml double cream
50g icing sugar, sifted
1/4 x 5ml sp vanilla extract

Method:

Preheat the oven to 110°C/225°F/Gas Mark 4. Line a baking tray with baking parchment.

Whisk the egg whites with an electric whisk until they are stiff - this will take about five minutes.

Check that the egg whites are stiff enough by turning the bowl upside down. If the egg whites stay in the bowl, then it's the right time to add the sugar. The mixture should be stiff and glossy. With the whisks running, add the sugar a tablespoon at a time, making sure that all the sugar is absorbed before adding more.

Using two dessert spoons, spoon the meringue mixture on to the prepared baking sheets - there should be about 12 mounds of meringue in total. Bake in the oven for 1 1/2 hours, or until dry and crisp. Turn off the oven and leave meringues to cool in the oven.

Lightly whip the cream, and fold in the icing sugar and vanilla extract. Spoon the flavoured cream on to the flat surface of the six meringues. Top each with a plain meringue. Serve in paper cases.

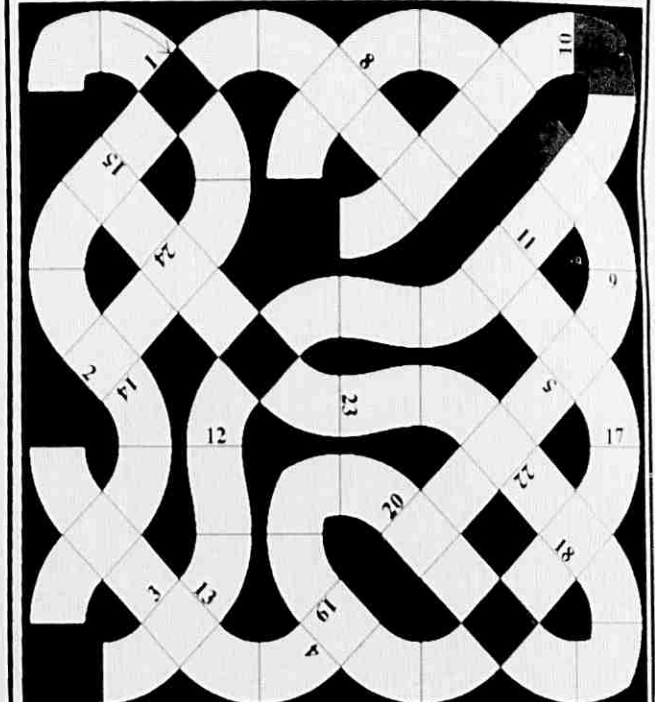

VEC Childcare Crisis will decimate educational opportunities for adults in Waterford

VECs throughout the country had no prior warning when the Department of Education and Science cut back their childcare support funding by 37% in mid-July. This support funding in County Waterford consists of provision of a creche and subsidised childcare to VTOS students. VTOS is a return to education initiative for in the main, adults who left school early. Co Waterford VEC has 100 students taking up its full complement of places in three centres in Kilmacthomas and Dungarvan. These include Start Your Own Business programmes, Business, Art, Craft and Design and Adult Foundation Courses from Waterford Institute of Technology.

Cllr Mary Greene, Chairperson County Waterford VEC expressed her dismay following this announcement at the July meeting of the VEC in Dungarvan. However at the time the VEC CEO Paddy Lavelle expressed hope of locating funding elsewhere. However hopes were dashed at this month's meeting of the VEC when the CEO announced that no other funding was available. The Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform charged with funding childcare refuse in this case as they say they will not fund as a matter of policy as the Department of Education and Science have stopped.

Childcare workers have been put on protective notice and the jobs of teachers put in jeopardy by this action. However worse still the VEC's most vulnerable clients may be forced out of their educational programmes according to Cllr Greene. Nine out of ten students in VTOS depend on childcare being provided by the VEC. County Waterford VEC will be forced to cut all childcare provision in October. As it is the VEC already have been informed that they will not be able to recoup all the expenditure they

have incurred so far this year.

The sums involved are relatively paltry declared Mary Greene. Six million euro will fund the whole scheme nationally, a small sum compared with the vast sums already spent on Tribunals.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

GARDEN MESSENGER

The Garden Messenger theme for September 2003 is 'Delicate shapes' with Perovskia, Pennisetum, Miscanthus and Dwarf Bamboo

If you are looking to add style and impact to your garden then get into grasses. Bringing texture, colour and change through the seasons, their delicate shapes can be used to great effect. In late summer and early autumn many grasses produce wonderful flowerheads, doubling their height and contrasting to perfection with their slender leaves.

For a haze of inflorescence Perovskia 'Blue Spire' is an ideal option. This upright shrublet produces an abundance of purple-blue flowerheads in panicles up to 30cm long. The silver-grey woody stems of the plant not only set off the flowers beautifully, but when the flowers die back the stems add interest throughout winter too - so wait until spring before pruning. Perovskia 'Blue Spire' is fully hardy and can grow to a height and spread of approximately 1 metre.

Other grasses to look out for to bring delicate shapes to the garden include members of the Miscanthus and Pennisetum families. There are all sorts of

growth to choose from which can be used to complement other plants in an existing border, to use as a specimen plant or to create an eye-catching border showcasing different grasses together. Pennisetum orientale produces long spikelet flowerheads creating a soft mound in mid to late summer. The flowerheads have a pinky hue which look fabulous in the late summer sun. This plant can look great on border edges cascading onto the lawn or path. For a grass with a more stately growth habit and tall feathery inflorescence, consider Miscanthus sinensis 'Silver Feather' which grows to a height of up to 2.5 metres. 'Silver Feather' flowers in early and mid autumn. There's an added bonus too, as you can cut the flowerheads of Miscanthus and Pennisetum for fresh and dried arrangements indoors.

When looking at grasses don't miss out on the options presented by Dwarf bamboos. Their ornamental

foliage evokes images of the artistic beauty of Japanese calligraphy with its linear shapes and angles. The Pleioblastus family is made up of around 20 evergreen woody bamboos. A spectacular example is Pleioblastus auricomus which has almost luminous green striped foliage. This plant grows to a height and spread of approximately 1.5 metres. For the smaller garden there's the Pygmy bamboo (Pleioblastus pygmaeus) which is a quite compact plant with mid green leaves growing to an approximate height of 40cm and spread of 1 metre.

Dwarf bamboos can work very well in pots and containers - their woody canes and evergreen foliage make them a super plant for adding structure and year round interest to a patio, balcony or garden. Additionally, as some bamboos can be very vigorous, growing them in pots can mean that you can keep them in check and enjoy them too!

The entry for the tournament is 5 euro for both adults and underage and this is to be paid to the appointed secretary of each division once the league begins. Top class prizes will be on offer which will be presented at a function in the Community Centre just before the Christmas break-up. All Are Welcome To Participate.

Membership Fees

Due to the ever increasing cost of insurance, the club have been forced to increase the cost of membership in order to meet the payment of our annual public liability policy. At a recent club committee meeting it was agreed to set fees of E20 for adult members and 10 for under 18 members. In order to participate in any club activity, i.e. coaching, leagues etc., it is compulsory to be a member of the club. This is purely for insurance purposes. Anybody who is actively involved in other sports will agree that the stated fees are still very reasonable. As stated above, anybody who wants to play in the upcoming league must be paid up by the 31st of September.

Coaching

The club are presently setting up a new coaching structure under the leadership of Christy Slattery, from the Templeberry club in North Tipperary. Christy is the top coach in the country and is currently a coaching tutor for Racquetball with the N.C.T.C. As a coach he has coached the Irish Junior team to 4th place in the World Junior Championships on two separate occasions. He has also served as the National Junior Development officer for many years. As a player, he is a multi National Open Doubles champion as well as a European team gold medallist. He has represented Ireland on many occasions in places like Bolivia, Mexico, America and Canada.

Club coaching will now be

held on a Friday night. Players will be graded into groups of 8 and sessions will last for one hour at a time. If our young players want to develop their skills in the games, then it would be very advisable for them to attend this coaching.

The first stint of coaching will last for 4 weeks starting on the first week of October. For anyone who wants to participate in these coaching sessions, there is a charge of 10.50 per session and it must be paid up in full before the 30th of September to Pat Keane.

In order to comply with the National Code of Ethics for children set down by the National Sports Council, it is compulsory to provide supervision during these sessions at all time. All players who are joining the coaching sessions must have a parent to do 1 hour of supervision over the 4 weeks. This is a compulsory ruling. A rota will be drawn up and if a parent cannot make the session on a given night, it will be up to them to provide a substitute supervisor.

TOUGHER LITTER LAWS

Minister Gallagher has announced the commencement of Part 4 of the Protection of the Environment Act 2003 dealing with litter. This builds on various sections of the Litter Pollution Act 1997. The new provisions, which come into effect on 1 October 2003:

- increase the fine for summary conviction for litter offences from 1,904 to 3,000, which is the upper limit of fine for offences heard in the District Court; the maximum daily fine for continuing offences also increases to 600 - more than a fourfold increase on the previous level of fine,
- introduce conviction on indictment for litter offences, with a maximum fine of 130,000 and 10,000 per day for continuing offences,
- widen local authority powers to make local byelaws, and
- impose greater restrictions on advertising materials in public places, including a ban on the placement of advertising flyers on vehicles.

How to prepare a speech

For many people the thought of delivering a speech in front of an audience is absolutely nerve-racking. However, here are some steps to make your task easier.

1. Know your subject. Be clear

what your speech will be about. If your subject is very broad, select three or four main points which will give your audience a better insight and understanding of your subject matter. You can expand on your main points using examples, stories or anecdotes. If you merely state a fact and then continue, most of your audience will miss the point. You should make a point, say it again in different words, illustrate the point, and then state it once more in order to be clearly understood.

2. Know your audience. If your audience is unfamiliar with your subject matter, you should beware of using technical jargon which will be meaningless to them. In addition, your introduction should familiarise them with your subject matter.

3. How long will you have to talk? - This is important as you will need to determine how much time you want to focus on specific parts of your speech.

4. Like any good story, your talk needs a beginning, a body and an ending. Try to create an interesting opening sentence

that captures your audience's attention. Then devise an ending. With a good start and a good finish, you can easily fill in the body of the speech.

5. Take notes if you think you will need them. Write a brief speech outline on 3 x 5 cards, which can be referred to if needed.

6. Preparation. Practise your talk until you are comfortable with it.

7. Presenting Your Talk. Before presenting your talk, take a few deep breaths to calm yourself. Remember, feelings of nervousness are normal, and will disappear as you get into your speech. Make eye contact with your audience if possible. If this is difficult, pick a point at the wall opposite you (just barely above the audience's heads) and focus on it.

8. Evaluation. It is normal to evaluate yourself after delivering a speech. Everyone does it. Just congratulate yourself on having delivered your speech. Note the things you did well, and the things you want to improve. Then try and avoid your mistakes the next time

Waterford County Council Snippets

Superintendent To Be Asked To Attend Council Meeting

A contentious motion to invite the District Superintendent to a meeting of Waterford County Council to discuss the recent increase in crime in West Waterford was passed despite Fine Gael opposition.

Fine Gael Justice Spokesman, Deputy John Deasy said the motion was from the same people who were "bleating on" about crime, but whose party in Government was doing nothing to address the situation.

He said there has been a halving of the Garda compliment across West Waterford, and nationwide recruitment levels are only covering the number of Gardai retiring from the force

each year.

Deputy Deasy argued that bringing in Superintendent Mick Blake to address the council would be a waste of the Supt's time.

"People are sick and tired of listening to Fianna Fail Councillors bleating on, and doing nothing," he said.

The motion to invite Supt Blake to a meeting of the council was made by Cllr. James Tobin (FF), who said there have been at least ten robberies in the area in the last two months.

He proposed a meeting with the Superintendent to discuss how many Gardai they are down in the area, and how

many new Gardai he thinks they need.

Cllr. Willie MacDonnell, (FG) supporting the motion, asked what is gone wrong in the present day, when with the Celtic Tiger economy the Gardai have less resources and facing greater crime, than in times when the country was "cash strapped" and there was very little crime.

"All those Gardai who were here at the time were paid", he said. "Now, with the Celtic Tiger, it is terrible to think that the people in power can not place a Garda in a local station. It is a disgrace."

"People are really up in arms about the amount of crime, and the situation is getting far worse, because even if these people are caught, they know they will be out again in two months or one month."

Cllr. Nora Flynn (FG) argued that what mustn't be forgotten are the false promises of extra Gardai before the last election, and said Fianna Fail were "yobbing on".

"The Superintendent might be delighted with our backing. But what is the use of meeting him.

He wants more Gardai but they're not available. The Fianna Fail councillors should stop yobbing on here, and put pressure on the Government to provide the resources for the Superintendent," she said.

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) said the failure by the Government to provide extra resources for the Gardai shouldn't surprise anyone, as they had failed to deliver on all of their pre-election promises.

He asked that a detailed analysis be carried out into the crime problem in the area, as he believed full details would better serve the council in lobbying TD's and the Minister for Justice.

Cllr. Tobin's motion was seconded by Cllr. MacDonnell who despite opposition from his own party said he stood over his support as "any talk is better than no talk."

The motion was opposed by Deputy Deasy, and the rest of his party colleagues, but on a show of hands, the motion to invite Superintendent Blake to discuss the crime problem in West Waterford was passed on a 13-7 majority.

Kevin Wilkinson Co-Opted Onto County Council

The seat vacated by Deputy Ollie Wilkinson at the July meeting of Waterford County Council has been filled by his 32-year-old son with the unanimous agreement of the elected representatives.

Kevin Wilkinson was co-opted to fill the casual absence, which arose due to Deputy Ollie Wilkinson's resignation as a councillor in the Lismore Electoral Area.

The new councillor was welcomed by Fine Gael party whip, Cllr. John Carey, Labour whip Cllr. Billy Kyne, and by various members of Fianna Fail. Members of the Lismore Electoral Area, including Cllr James Tobin, Nora Flynn and Willie MacDonnell also welcomed Cllr. Kevin Wilkinson to the council.

Cllr. Wilkinson thanked his proposer, Cllr. Tobin, and his second Cllr. Tom Cronin, and the other members of Fianna Fail, and the council, as well as his family in the course of his short opening address.

Lismore Receiving Funding At The Expense of Other Towns Claim Cllrs.

Local councillors complained that Lismore is receiving funding for works at the expense of other towns in the area, after works which councillors weren't aware of were completed recently.

Cllr. Nora Flynn (FG) said she hadn't been informed of the new works on the Lismore monument until it had taken place, adding that it took place without proper public consultation.

The monument had historically been a meeting place for the towns residents, and seating was providing around the monument. However, with the railing off of the monument, the seating has been removed.

Cllr. Flynn said this work was carried out on a very sensitive issue without consulting with the area's local county councillors, and warned that the town "while lovely from a Tidy Towns point of view was becoming like an English village."

Cllr. Willie MacDonnell (FG) said he had discussed the development with members of the Tidy Towns Committee and they are quite happy with the new railings.

"But, I understand the concerns, and I too would like to be informed before work starts on something like this."

He added that huge money is being "pumped" into Lismore, at the expense of places like Tallow and Cappoquin, while he along with other councillors implied that the County Engineer was responsible for this funding.

However, replying to the implied accusations, Mr. O'Flynn said he was not from Lismore, but that his mother is from Lismore. "There's a slight difference," he retorted.

He said the issue was discussed with the National Road Safety officer, and it was found that seats in the middle of a busy street were too dangerous.

Also, he added, that if the monument was protected by a railing the chances of it being damaged by a truck - like has happened to historic monuments in other areas - would be minimised.

Mr. O'Flynn went on to argue that the work was known about and was discussed at a meeting of Lismore Town Council, and written about in a local newspaper.

Cllr. Flynn, however, said it is the county councillors and not the town councillors who draw up the budget, and called on Mr. O'Flynn to report back on items discussed by the Town Council to the County.

"Ridiculous" Decision To Grant Permission For Caravan Site

The decision to grant planning permission for the development of a "touring van" facility in Knockanore, was described as "the most ridiculous one I have ever seen", by Cllr. James Tobin.

The permission was for the construction of 40 touring van parking bays, pitches, and other facilities. But while permission was granted in 1999, the development is only starting now under a different owner whose name is not known by the council. Cllr. Tobin said it was ridiculous to grant permission for a 40 caravan facility near a village with a population of just 300 people.

He also questioned what it was meant by "touring" caravans, and how long a period of time would it take before the caravans were judged to be static and told to move on.

The decision was opposed by the local councillors who were in office at that time, Cllr. Nora Flynn (FG) said, while Cllr. Willie MacDonnell (FG) said the councillors were given assurances but never foresaw a situation where there would be 30/40 caravans moving into a small area.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy, said three of the caravans there at the moment were being used by a group whose name they can't get at the moment, while two others are being used by the contractors.

"The original person who got permission sold the site, and we have checked the land registry to find out the name of the group or person, but we have not gotten a name as yet", he said.

Clonea Realignment May Remove Forecourt Of Popular Shop

County Engineer, John O'Flynn confirmed that the Clonea Road realignment may have to be re-examined to avoid taking away a significant portion of land from either Gordan's Shop or the Clonea Strand Hotel.

The assurance was made on foot of concerns aired by Cllr. Tom Higgins (FG) who said that despite the fact that Gordan's is visited by thousands of people each summer, the planned realignment would remove "the forecourt of this fine shop."

He was also concerned that a stretch of road at the Ballinroad crossroads would result in the formation of an unofficial halting site for transients.

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) added that the Gold Coast road is also in need of immediate work, as it is in dangerous condition, and agreed that the Ballinroad Cross area could see an influx of transients as it is laid out in the plans.

Mr. O'Flynn said the plans will be looked at in an effort to minimise the impact on both the hotel and Gordan's.

"The Gold Coast Road is not being forgotten about," he added, "and it will be started after the Clonea road is finished."

However, neither road will begin until after the new sewerage system is in place to avoid digging up the roads again to lay new sewers. Currently the realignment is only at the beginning of the planning stage, he said.

Hedge-cutting Can Resume On Country Roads

Hedge-cutting can resume on country roads, County Engineer, John O'Flynn informed the council, but the local authority does not have funds to carry out any hedge cutting of their own.

Mr. O'Flynn told the members that the period from April to the 1st of September during which hedge-cutting is prohibited has now passed, and the council shall be notifying landowners of their obligation to cut their hedges. Prosecutions can arise from failure to comply with this obligation, he said.

However, the council budget for cutting hedges has already been spent, and unless a safety problem arises, Mr. O'Flynn didn't foresee any more hedge-cutting being carried out by the council for the remainder of the year.

County Mayor, Ciaran O Riain (FF) said the problem is year round, and that the growth in hedges is particularly bad during the months where cutting them back is prohibited. "It has gone to the stage where people's lives are at stake on some of these roads," he said.

Agreeing, Cllr. Nora Flynn (FG) asked that farmers and other landholders be allowed to cut back their hedges during the April to September period on safety grounds.

The public are aware of proposals to develop a marina in the inner harbour based on studies and reports prepared for the Council by Malone O'Regan Consulting Engineers, Waterford.

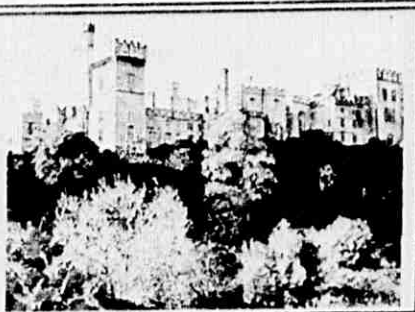
Subsequent to these studies and reports, an application was made to the Department of the various feasibility studies necessary to proceed with a marina development.

STRATEGIC REVIEW STOPPED IN ITS TRACKS

It will come as no surprise that the proposals of the Strategic Review Committee were blown clean out of the water at the end September meeting of the Waterford County Board. The vote was 45 to 32. Lest there be any confusion, this vote was not on the actual proposals. It was a vote, as far as I understand it to call a special convention to discuss the proposals.

On the face of it you might say, it went to a vote, democratic decision - it was defeated. But how democratic was it. 46 out of 48 clubs voted. Almost 2/3, it was 29 or thirty of the clubs in Waterford voted for a special convention to discuss the proposals. It was defeated because the vast majority of officers (there were a few exceptions) from the 3 boards voted against. You don't expect "Turkeys to vote for Christmas", some of the board officers received support from delegates of clubs to which they belong. The fact remains that almost two thirds of the clubs in the county want the proposal discussed at special convention. They are to be denied. To club players, members, supporters, etc I would say 'Ask your club delegates what way they voted and why'. After all they are voting in your name. It is your entitlement to know. To the clubs who voted against, that is of course your entitlement, we have missed an opportunity to introduce reform and will have to live with the consequences. I did not agree with every single aspect of the proposals but there was much of a positive nature in them and that at least merited full discussion.

Writing in last weeks Leader on the subject of 'Mascots' (another example of GAA paranoia) 'Commentator' suggested that if not satisfied with a regulation, clubs can always table the motion to have it removed. Is he for real? You have a better chance of getting Bin Laden to tea at the White House than getting a motion to reform through the Labyrinth of committees and minefields of bye laws that 'protect' the GAA.

DISABILITY AWARENESS

DEPRESSION

What is Depression and what causes it?

Depression is a hidden disability, the causes are not clear, however it is a serious disability that can affect a person's quality of life, both physically and mentally. People can get depression due to experiencing a traumatic event (such as the death of a loved one), hormonal changes in the person, having to deal with another illness (disability) or substance abuse. Sometimes there is no apparent reason for the depression; it can be brought on by environmental, psychological and genetic factors.

Symptoms of Depression

- Anxiety, anger, undue worry, irritability and agitation
- Indifference and pessimism
- Prolonged sadness or unexplained crying
- Changes in sleep patterns and appetite
- Lethargy and loss of energy, feelings of guilt and worthlessness
- Unexplained aches and pains
- Social withdrawal, unable to concentrate

It is critical to get a medical diagnosis, only a professional medical opinion will determine if you have the symptoms of depression.

Different types of Depression

There are different types of depression; the main types are as follows:

- **Mild Depression** - mild depression can be brought on by a distressing event, such as loss of a family member or friend, the loss of a job, the break-up of a relationship. This kind of depression will usually only last for a short time, and help from a qualified Counsellor can be very beneficial.
- **Severe Depression** - a person suffering from severe depression will have extreme symptoms, these can include hallucinations and even delusions, and medical treatment from a health professional is vital.
- **Bipolar Depression** - also known as manic depression, is a treatable medical disability, where the person's mood alternates between the extremity of depression and mania.
- **Dysthymia** - this is a mild depression, people with this kind of depression are often unaware they have the condition, they are able to go to work and manage their lives, but they can suffer from low self-esteem, they usually suffer from a poor appetite or overeat, the condition may come and go.
- **Postnatal Depression** - this kind of depression can start when a woman has given birth to a baby, it can happen immediately after the birth or can develop months later, it can affect the relationship between the mother and baby. Medical advice and treatment is recommended.

Antidepressant drugs are very effective, but it is important not to change or discontinue medication without talking to your doctor. Counselling can also be beneficial. Support groups meet on a regular basis and people can share their experiences (Aware - an organisation that support people with depression, they have local support groups that meet weekly). And stress management can be of help; this includes relaxation exercises, massage and aromatherapy. And complementary medicine is becoming very popular in the treatment of depression, it is important that you inform your doctor of any treatment you receive. (This article is to make people aware of different disabilities, and is information only; it is not a replacement for professional medical advice). We provide information, support and advocacy for people with disabilities, (Physical, Sensory, Learning, Mental and Emotional Health).

Tallow - Part 2.

(Continued from last week).

In 1604 Tallow was granted to Sir Richard Boyle, later Earl of Cork, who rebuilt the town again as an English plantation. A major factor in the growth of the town was an iron industry which Power states that Boyle had established by 1608. In 1613 the town received a royal charter of incorporation. Boyle, as Lord of the Manor, controlled the corporation and appointed the officers, such as the sovereign in 1632 and the recorder and town clerk in 1630. Tallow also became a legal centre and in Boyle's diary noted the holding of the first assizes there in 1618. It was presumably around this time that Boyle built a courthouse and prison in the town. Boyle also built a market house and by 1622 he was receiving the accounts of the fairs and markets held there. A variety of trades were being practised. In 1621 Boyle "compounded with Mr. Green of Tallagh to be the common beer and ale brewer for that town" while in 1622 he presented Lady Carew with a gift of "a pair of Tallagh knyves" indicating the existence of a cutlery manufacturer in the town. By 1622 Boyle's new town could be described as: a fair and handsome market town . . . consisting of about one hundred and fifty houses, all inhabited with English of several trades, where he hath likewise erected two iron mills, by which many people are set a work.

In the same year Boyle mustered his English tenantry before government officials at Tallow, and noted them as "all english well horsed and armed 720 ffoot and 215 horse". Although all of these tenants were not necessarily inhabitants of Tallow the references to 150

houses there suggests a population of 105 for "Tallow Towne", but this census clearly does not give total population figures. Although Tallow was apparently fortified in 1641 there is no evidence that it was attacked during the rebellion. The Civil Survey of 1654, however, refers to Tallow as "a town formerly incorporated" which may suggest that there had been a serious decline in the town's fortunes. If this were so then Tallow must have made a good recovery because Stanhope, writing between 1682 and 1685, described it as: a fair and Market town, well built and populous, scituate . . .

near the River Bride, by which it has the conveniency of importing and Exporting all sorts of goods by and from Youghall. In 1687 Cox described it as "a populous and flourishing towne of considerable trade by reason the river Bride is navigable up almost to Tallow bridge

Benchmarking Awards Should Not Punish Local Authorities

— Says Councillor

As local authorities take stock of resources and begin preparation of next year's Estimates, fears have been expressed that services could be affected through the costs of benchmarking having to be borne by the Council and not central Government.

Dungarvan area Labour Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair says those employed by local authorities should not be deprived of the pay and conditions they are entitled to. Problems will arise, however, says Cllr. O Ceilleachair, if the Dept. of Environment & Local Government continues to insist that the costs of the benchmarking process in 2004 will not be met by central funds but by Town, County and City Councils.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair says a situation must not be permitted to develop whereby local services

in the first instance, and the householder through increased charges, will be targetted to compensate for the lack of delivery from Government and central funds on agreements made through the social partnership process.

Stating his view on the subject, Cllr. O Ceilleachair said: "The partnership process was instrumental in underpinning economic growth over the last decade or so. Because of their participation in this strategy, public service employees deserve recognition and whatever benchmarking awards are due. It's disappointing to see Government, who should be able to plan for their role as holders of the purse strings in this process, begin to slide back from their role in this instance"

"I do not want to see less

roads being attended to, less grass in public areas being cut, less sewerage or water supply projects progressing or community groups receiving less support from local authorities due to resources having to be kept back to pay Council employees what is rightfully due to them from central funds. Equally, I would not like to see householders being hit for increased or new local taxes on things like refuse collection, pavement or public lighting provision"

"At this critical juncture in the calendar of local authorities, I'd be hoping that Councillors of all hues would be lobbying Government to live up to their responsibilities and not to make life even more difficult for Town, County and City Councils who are already operating with limited resources."

NOTICE

Message To Landowners/Occupiers

Owners or occupiers of land are obliged under the Roads Act 1993, to take all necessary care to ensure that trees, shrubs, hedges or any other vegetation on their land is not, or could not be a danger to those using a public road or to somebody carrying out maintenance or improvement work on the road.

Hedge Maintenance

Where labour is available the most friendly method of hedge maintenance is by hand tools: A reciprocation cutting bar is very suitable for hedges which are in good condition.

A flail cutter is suitable for hedge growth of not more than 2-3 years and has the added advantage of mulching the cut materials. A flail cutter should never be used on heavy, woody growth.

A circular saw should be used on heavy growth and is ideal for shaping up overgrown hedges.

The Best Time To Cut

Trim during Winter to fill slack periods of farm work.

Avoid disturbing nesting birds by not trimming during the period 1st March to 31st Au-

gust in any year. Section 46(b) of the Wildlife (Amendment) Act 2000 states that it shall be an offence for a person to cut, grub, burn or otherwise destroy during the period beginning on the 1st March and ending on the 31st day of August in any year any vegetation growing in any hedge or ditch.

Trimming can take place from September to February with minimum wildlife disturbance.

Where a landowner/occupier fails to meet his/her obligation under the Road Act 1993, a Notice will be served by Waterford County Council requiring him/her to take whatever remedial action is considered necessary to ensure public safety. Remedial action may range from felling to trimming, lopping of branches or preservation. It is an offence not to comply with the terms of such a Notice. If you have not already done so, it is in your own interest to attend to hedge trimming on public roads immediately.

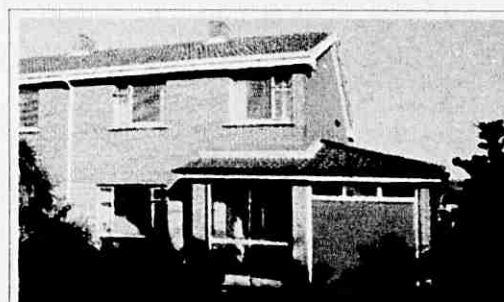

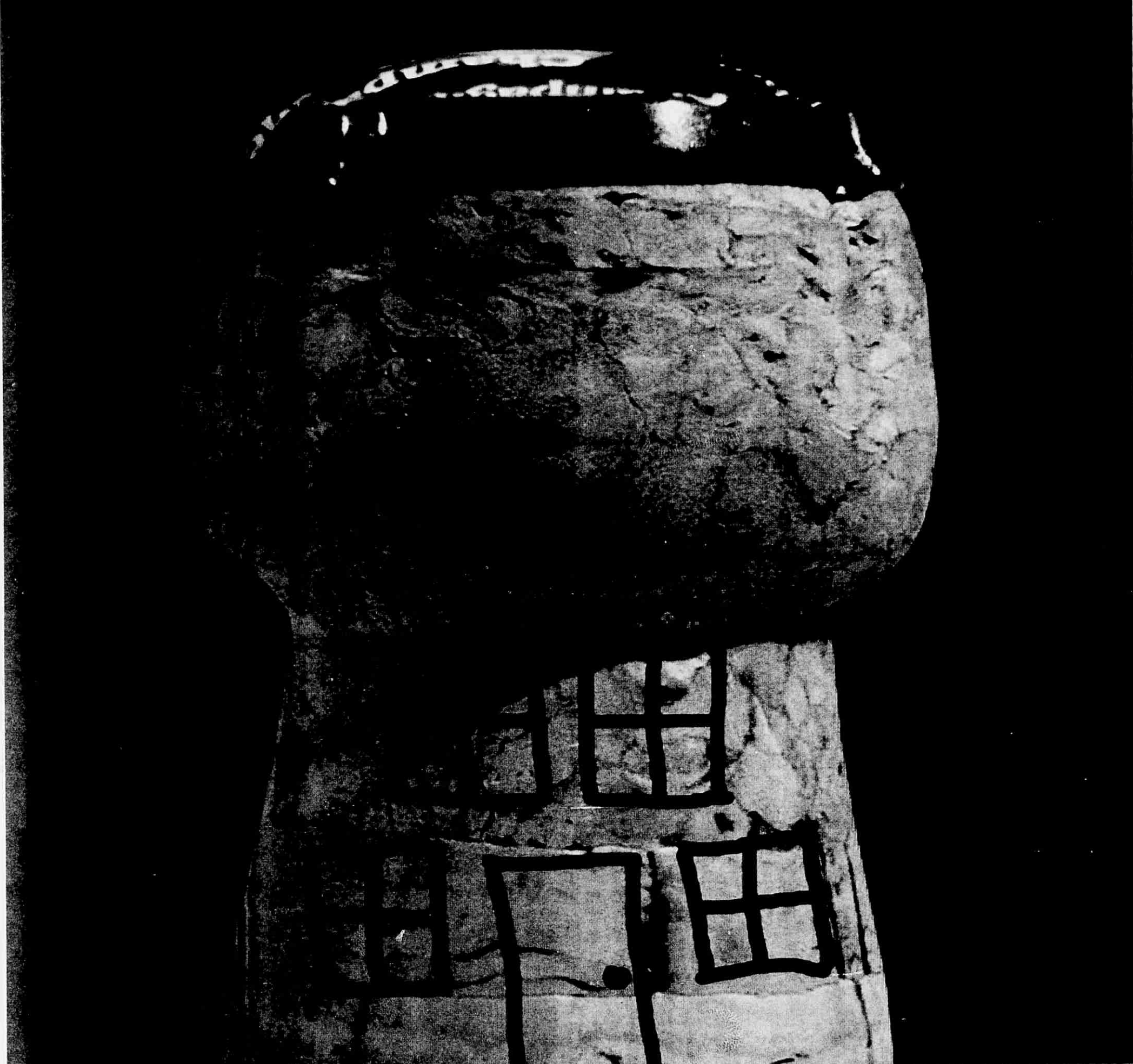

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

My child who is aged 3 has a disability. As the parent of a child with a disability what social welfare payments might I be entitled to?

ANSWER

The social welfare payments for which you may be eligible will depend on a number of factors including the severity of your child's disability and your own circumstances. However, you may be entitled to one or more of the following: Domiciliary Care Allowance is a means tested monthly allowance (euro188.90 disability) who lives at home. It is paid up to the age of 16. Only the child's means are taken into account for the means test. A reduced payment may be available for those normally resident in special schools, etc. and who go home at weekends or holidays.

Carer's Allowance is a weekly means tested allowance paid by the providing full-time care and attention to someone who requires such full-time care and will continue to require it for at least 12 months. If the person being cared for is under 16 years of age the Health Board must be paying a full-rate Domiciliary Care Allowance in respect of him/her.

Carer's Benefit is a PRSI based payment from the Department of Social and Family Affairs for people who leave employment (of 17 hours per week minimum) temporarily to look after someone in need of full time care and attention. Certain contribution conditions must be met and the benefit will be paid for up to 15 months. The carer may also qualify for Carer's Leave from work.

An annual Respite Care Grant of euro735 (euro1,470 if caring for two or more) is paid in June each year to carers in receipt of a Carer's Allowance/Benefit and to carers of children for whom Domiciliary Care Allowance is being paid.

If you are in receipt of Carer's Allowance you are eligible for a Free Travel Pass. You may also be eligible for benefits under the Household Benefits Package such as Electricity/ Gas Allowance, Free Television Licence and Telephone Allowance.

To Conserve Use of Energy

Use a timer on your immersion heater, which will switch off after a preset time. It is not cheaper to leave your immersion switched on all time!

Friggers Fun Opens Glass Extravaganza

Miroslav Havel, former Waterford Crystal designer, opened the 'Waterford Friggers' exhibition last Wednesday week 3rd September to a large appreciative audience at Waterford Museum of Treasures.

The idea for the "Waterford Friggers" exhibition came about because the Glass Society of Ireland/Contemporary Makers is holding its fourth biennial conference "Inspirational Awakening" in Waterford on 17th - 21st September 2003. The friggers exhibition was seen as a great opportunity to display the glass treasures of Waterford as one of the conference events.

Friggers or "end of day" glass is any item made by the glassworkers in their own time at the end of the day using up the remaining molten glass in the furnaces or using scraps of reject glass. Friggers were popular in many glassmaking regions of the world especially in the late 18th and 19th centuries, and included such objects as jugs, candlesticks, ship models, animal figures, tobacco pipes, rolling pins, bells, hats, witch balls, musical instruments and walking sticks.

Martin Dwyer, Eamonn Hartley and Una Parsons, organisers of the exhibition and members of the Glass Society of Ireland, promoted the event widely on local and national media. Posters around town asked "Have you got a frigger in your home?" and people could be heard talking and telling stories about their friggers.

The idea was to have a "Friggers Roadshow" where people were invited to bring their friggers along, have them reviewed and the best would be selected for the ex-

hibition. The roadshow was held in Doolley's Hotel on 26th August and there was a great response with people arriving throughout the day, each with a story to tell about their friggers. Noel Griffin, a retired Waterford Crystal cutter was the first to appear with a beautiful glass basket made by Joe Cretzan, a German blower who worked in Waterford Crystal in the 1950's. Then the suitcases of glass treasures started to turn up: swans, canes, jugs, love hearts, bowls, cats, balloons, a bar of chocolate and spock's ear to name but a few. Some craftsmen told stories on how they were made and others told of the family heirlooms handed down through generations.

Mrs Mary Boydell, President of the Glass Society of Ireland and recognised as a great authority on Irish Glass, was the selector. From the sixty-one pieces that arrived for the roadshow, thirty-seven were selected for this exhibition in Waterford Museum of Treasures.

According to Martin Dwyer who spoke at the opening, "We were amazed at the quality of glass that turned up and believe we have only unearthed the tip of the iceberg of Waterford friggers in the city. This may have to become an annual event!" He said we were making history in holding the first ever friggers exhibition and commented on the catalogue that Eamonn Hartley produced that documented each piece.

Eamonn Hartley, presented the prizes for his 'Swan in flight', Greg Sullivan for his 'Block of Cheese' and to Vivienne

Keane, for her cute 'Pink Pig' which she says has been in her family for over forty years.

Una Parsons, conference event manager thanked the exhibition sponsors including the Crafts Council of Ireland, Waterford Crystal, Waterford City Council, Doolley's Hotel and Waterford Museum of Treasures. She invited the people of Waterford to visit the exhibition and to take part in the upcoming glass conference events that we are privileged to be hosting in Waterford City. She said this exhibition would make an ideal school trip.

The "Inspirational Awakening" conference will bring highly acclaimed International and National artists, historians, collectors, architects and enthusiasts to Waterford to attend a programme that covers historical and contemporary glass topics and includes hands-on workshops, seminars, exhibitions and numerous other glass related events.

Australian Couple Visit Family Estate

Recently two visitors from Australia paid a visit to their family estate Glen Abbey House or 'Carey's Castle' as it is called locally. They were Max and Joyce Carey from Australia.

Max is a grandson of Edward Carey who with his brothers Dr. John and Langer Carey emigrated in 1841. Tradition has it that the three brothers rode away from the Castle on three white horses, their heartbroken mother waving goodbye to them from an upstairs window.

The Carey family connection with the Castle began in 1708 through the marriage of Mary Anne Carey of Ballymakie, Co. Waterford to Rodolphus Green of Kilmanahan Castle. The Castle passed through this marriage in 1749 to John Peter Carey of Careysville, Fermoy who partially rebuilt the castle. This John Peter Carey was father of Richard Carey, master of Clonmel's 'Free School' in Mary Street from 1778 until his death in 1821. This branch of the Carey family were very well known in Court circles in the 16th and 17th centuries. This came about through the marriage of William Carey to Mary Boleyn whose sister Anne became second wife of King Henry VIII only to lose her head. This made the Carey's first cousins to Queen Elizabeth I 1533 - 1603, Anne Boleyn's daughter. Although the old castle has lost much of its old splendour, it is still a charming place to visit, and remains a place of fondness in the heart of both locals and visitors alike. On the day of their visit Max and his charming wife Joyce were deeply touched that locals whose ancestors had lived many years ago in the Glenary Valley area, at the same period of history that the Carey family were in residence, would take time off to come and tell their stories of history and folklore which related to the Castle's antiquity. Many of those stories were passed down through generations and were now being re-told again at the gates of this ancient ruin, in true keeping with our Irish oral tradition. Thanks to An Coillte and its staff who gave a clean up of the area.

Sport was another one of his passions in life, he won a County Minor football title with Commericals in 1945, a game he often spoke of - how the team cycled to Ardinnan for the final against Arravale Rovers. He loved all sports particularly soccer and Gaelic, he was a regular at the All Ireland Hurling and football finals and he took a special interest whenever his beloved Tipperary were involved. Outside of sport he was a great family man, a much loved husband to his wife Marie of forty six years and a father to his children, to them he was utterly devoted.

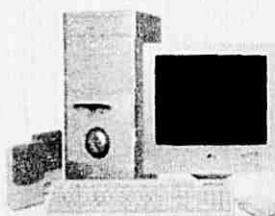

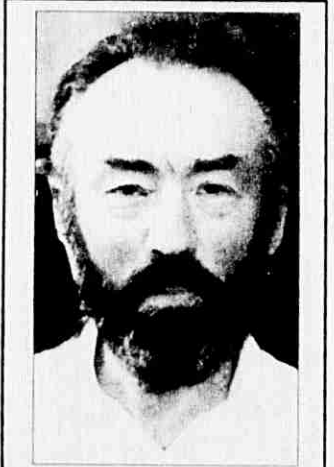

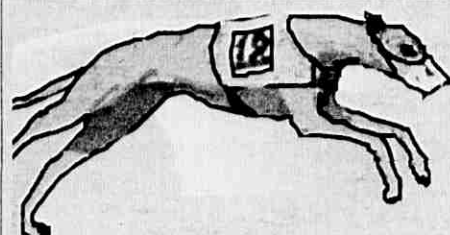

Holding a prominent early position behind Noan Lauren and On Stage Lucky the well build Cute Hawk picked up the lead off the penultimate bend before racing on for a well deserved four and a half lengths victory over a hampered On Stage Lucky.

A 300 yard dash was a terribly messy affair. Lucky Gloria and Boley Flash got themselves into an early barging match and then to make matters worse Debs Deal and Wilcox Hannah both did each other no favours near the second turn. While all of this was going on the Thomas Doyle owned Swallow Pop (Cool Performance-Full Of Info) 5/1 coasted into the lead on the rails to win out by four lengths from a hampered odds on favourite Saltee Tracker in 17.19.

The Autumn Kennels Syndicate owned Autumn Indigo (Airmount Rover-Fly Tess) came from last to first to capture the fourth event in 29.74. The early leader Mrs Kaydegawn was bundled out of the lead rounding the opening bend by the more experienced Perky Lady who led to the halfway mark from Bigwood Angel. Leading out of the second turn Greenview Linda was chased into the second last bend by Manahans Boyo. The latter was unlucky at this point in that he was clipped from behind. It was all Greenview Linda however from that point on as she won out by three lengths over Manahans Boyo.

The seventh contest is easily described as the Eamon O'Connor owned Chevalair King the evens favourite made a quick exit from trap one to make all in 29.36. Leading early on from Hildun Breeze The strong running

Chevalair King an August 2000 son of Frisby Full and Miss United was not extended throughout to defeat Clemmas Express by four and a half lengths.

A 730 yard marathon produced an exciting finish. Determined Spice was installed as the evens favourite but after leading early on she dropped out of contention off the third bend. The Willie Brennan owned Ardera Amy (Larkhill Jo-Tenthill Flash) 5/2 coasted into a clear lead down the back stretch and while Carlotta made eye catching late headway "Ardera" held out by a short head in 42.21.

The Benny Fox success story continued in the third event as his Determined Hero (Jamaican Hero-Slight Problem) — shook off the back stretch challenge of the early paced Lounge Act before winning out by three lengths in 20.16. 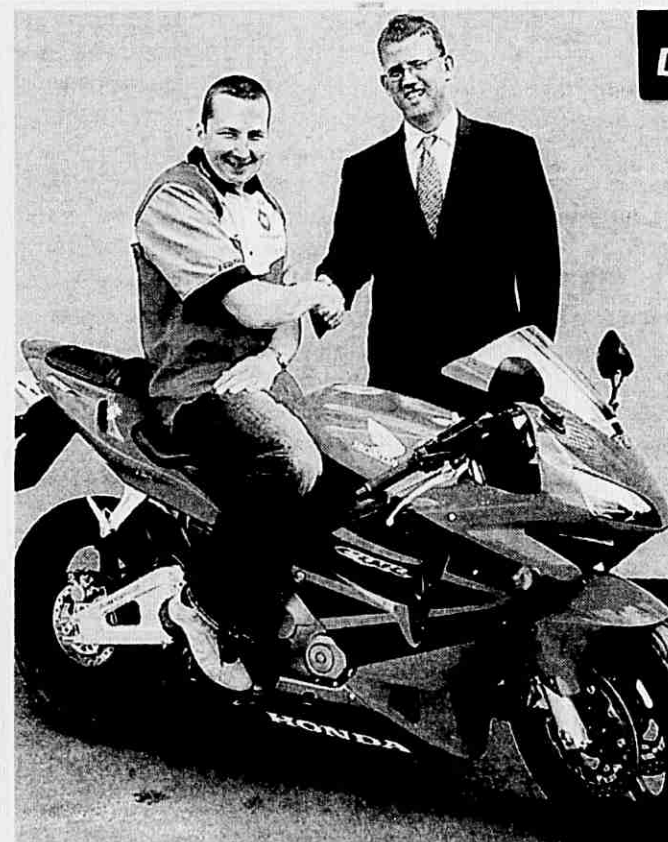

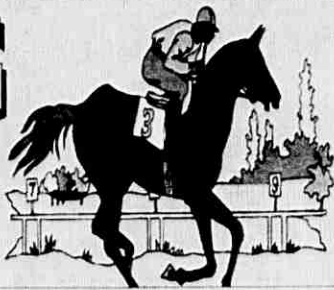

For the first time in history a football intercounty championship trophy was on display at a county board meeting. It is "Corn Casca" and by any standards as a Munster Final trophy, it does less than justice to the profile of an under 21 intercounty championship.

Referring to the wonderful victory the chairman congratulated everyone associated with this historic achievement. He said it was great to win the championship, but to win it in the manner in which it was won, was truly magnificent. He appealed to all clubs to show their total support in Semple Stadium on Sunday September 21st.

SH Team Management

As briefly reported last week, Justin McCarthy was reappointed for one more season and will be assisted by Nicky Cashin,

St. Kieran's College, Kilkenny, Seamie Hannon, outgoing selector and a further selector from east Waterford who was due to be named some days after the meeting.

While it had been rumoured that a 'high profile' assistant manager was to be appointed to Justin McCarthy, the name of Nicky Cashin surprised practically every delegate.

In Kilkenny the former Abbeyside clubman and county player has won himself a very high profile, he being the only non Kilkenny man to train a Kilkenny team to win an All-Ireland. Nicky trained their minor team to win the All Ireland last year.

Speaking after his appointment he said he was delighted to have been selected and was looking forward to the challenge that his appointment brought. He spoke about the high quality players on the Waterford panel and he felt that they are a group with great potential. He is looking forward to working with them.

The proposal to appoint them was given unanimous approval.

SF Manager;

The chairman informed the meeting that Coisde na Peil

were not yet in a position to make an announcement on this topic, but the matter is in hand and a proposal will be before the October meeting.

Munster Vice Chairman Nomination

Both Munster Council Representatives had their hats in the ring and it was this issue which brought such a very large attendance. The result saw Jimmy O'Gorman, (41 votes) defeat Tommy Hennessey (32 votes) for the nomination.

In accepting the result, Tommy Hennessey was gracious in defeat and warmly congratulated his colleague and promised him his total support when the election comes round in March next year.

Jimmy O'Gorman responding thanked the delegates who had voted for him and thanked Tommy for his promise of support. He said this contest would not interfere with their friendship and they would continue to work together for Waterford.

Strategic Review Report

The proposals had been circulated to all clubs and the two principal officers of the special sub committee, Liam Moroney and Timmy O'Keefe having

outlined what was involved, gave the reasons why the proposals should be supported. These proposals were for just one adult board in the county, one underage board (under 21 and minor) and one board in the county for juvenile championships, etc.

Seamus Quirke, former chairman of County Bord na nOg made an impassioned plea to have the proposals accepted.

S. O'Brien, proposed that the report be not accepted as in his opinion it would set the county back half a century and that within a short time the county would be in crisis. He said that it would be impossible to quantify the enormous work being done by the two divisional boards, and he was amazed to find that the committee report wanted these boards abolished. Eddie O'Shea, chairman Western Bord na nOg also strongly opposed the report and he gave a summary of the enormous work being done at divisional level in the juvenile board.

The report was defeated by 45 votes to 32.

Finance

A massive 250,000 euro was spent on training our eight

county teams this year. The details of each separate team were given in a comprehensive report by county treasurer Tony Morrissey to the meeting.

These expenses included travel, catering, purchase of players equipment, physio, etc. It also included the cost of jerseys and delegates were shocked to learn that a total of 23 sets of jerseys were swapped by county team players in both codes and all grades (this means that there are 690 'foreign' jerseys hanging in wardrobes throughout the county from this year alone).

Tony also listed the receipts from the various championships played so far this year. At the moment the account is approximately €65,000 in the red, but when National League and Qualifier money comes in and the remaining championship gate receipts are in hand, the county will end up in the 'black' at the end of the year.

The treasurer was complimented on the presentation of the report.

Munster Council Report

Tommy Hennessey gave details of the Munster club championship fixtures and said that Waterford had received a bye in both hurling and football.

He also informed the meeting that Greg Fives, Coisde na Peil, had been appointed as a Mun-

ster football selector for the Railway Cup.

Central Council Report

This report dealt with such matters as the national league groupings, i.e.

hurling, which will commence on February 22nd, 2004. Waterford, Kilkenny, Dublin, Galway, Laois, Clare.

Points earned in the league section will not carry forward to the play off section on this occasion. Winners of each division will have home advantage in two play-off matches.

Football

It will commence on February 1st. The following is our group.

Waterford, Kildare, Down, Derry, Louth, Tipperary, Wicklow, and Antrim.

National League Gates

The football league receipts amounted to €1,203,377. Hurling was much lower at €618,095.

Receipts for the 'Qualifier' matches will not be known until early October.

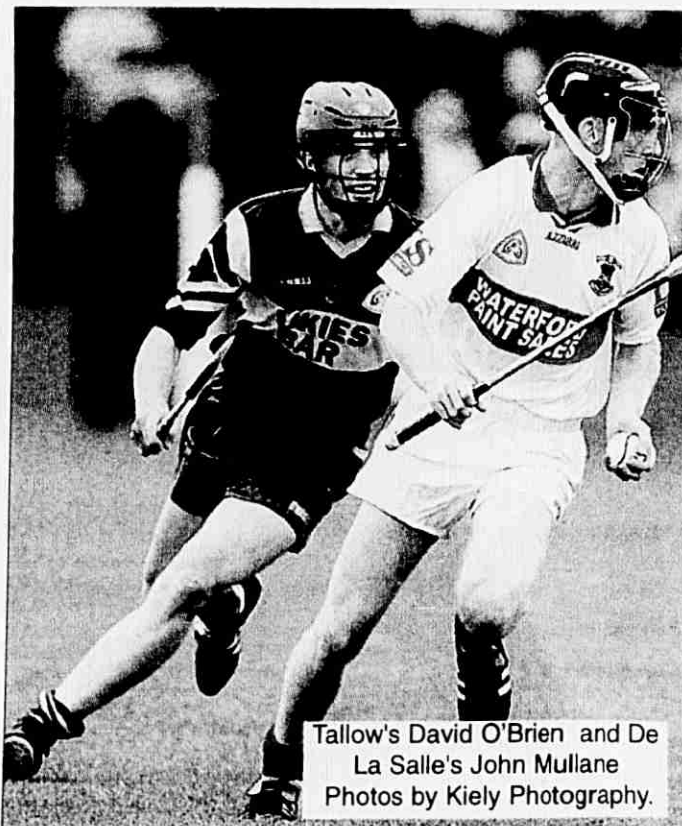
Central Council have set aside a figure of €250,000 to assist counties in defraying additional travel expenses.

ing then a couple of majors.

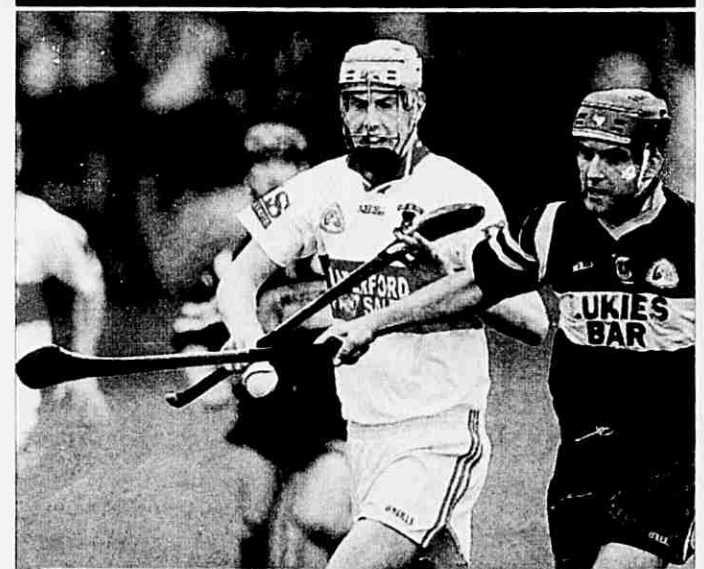
But the victory could not be taken from the city team, they were the better side over the hour.

Two All-Irelands Dublin who were defeated by Galway in last year's under 21

football All Ireland were also the runners-up in 1978 when going down to Kerry.

Following a training session at the Abbesside grounds on Sunday morning last, the selectors named their team and this shows but one change from the side which won the Munster final. The injury to team captain Nial Hennessey in the game against Nire on Saturday was found not to be serious and he was back in training on Sunday morning.

The selectors have shown remarkable consistency in deciding on their line out. The team which played Cork showed no change from the team which had beaten Clare and the side then showed just one change for the final.

Being very much in the dark

as far as Dublin's form is concerned, it is difficult to assess our prospects of winning. But there seems to be an air of great expectations and even confidence around the county. The majority of supporters to whom I have spoken, believe that if the lads play with the same 'fire' and determination then they must be as good as Dublin.

The Waterford squad are very well disciplined and this can be a factor and even make the difference between winning and losing. Whatever the result, the team have now made history. A win here will do more for football in the county than anything that has happened in about half a century.

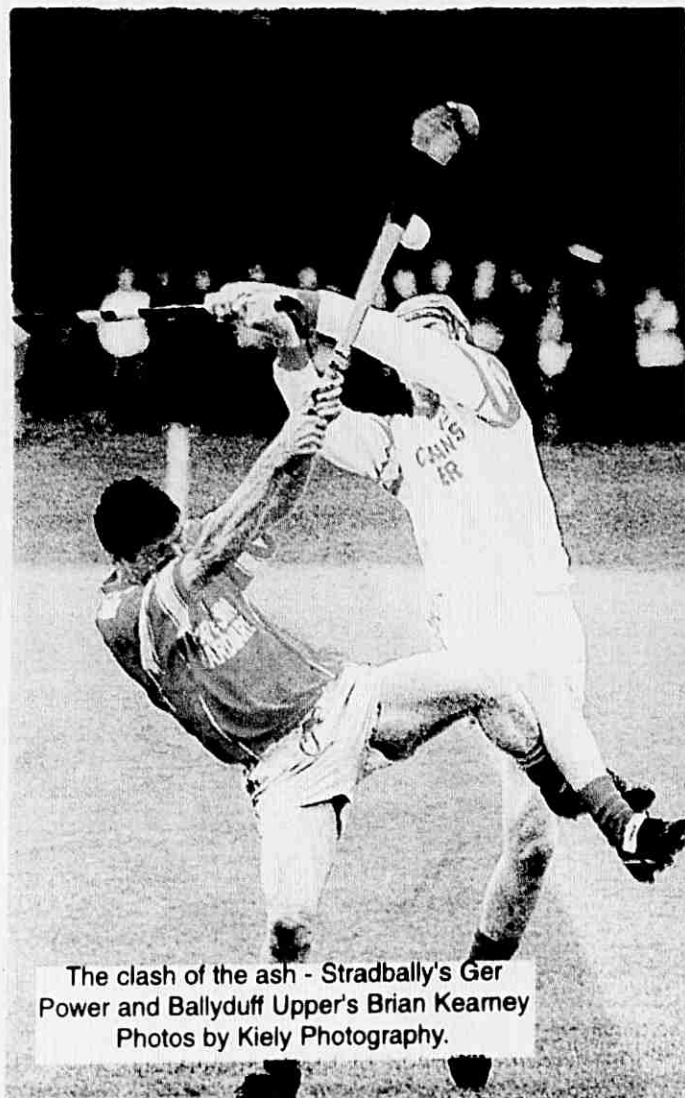

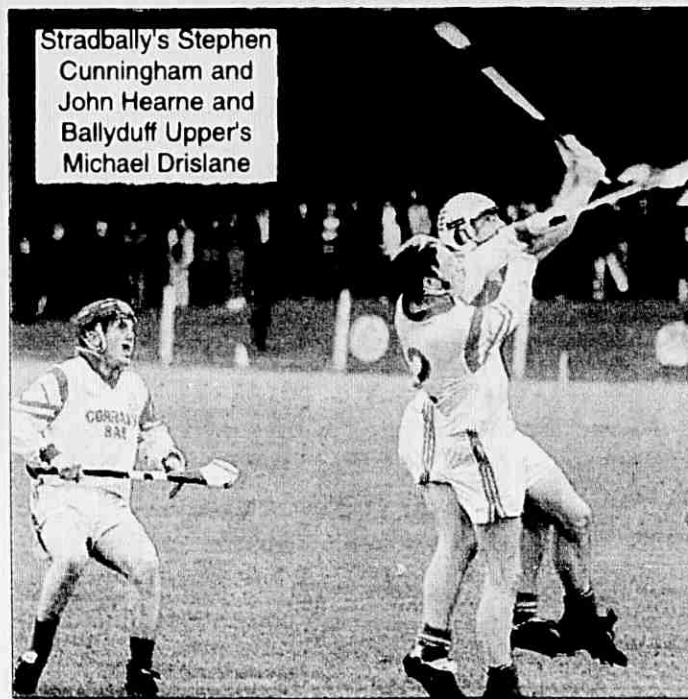

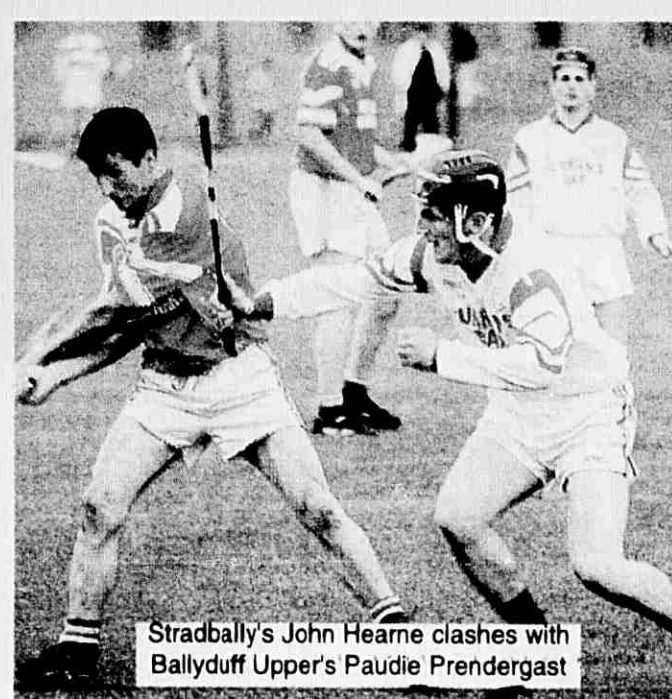

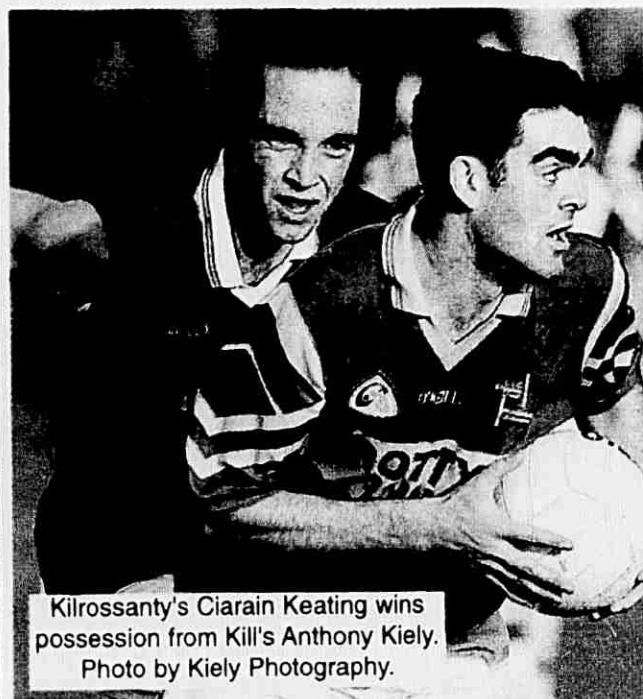


Ardmore's Cathal Hennessey under pressure from Nire's Michael Byrne

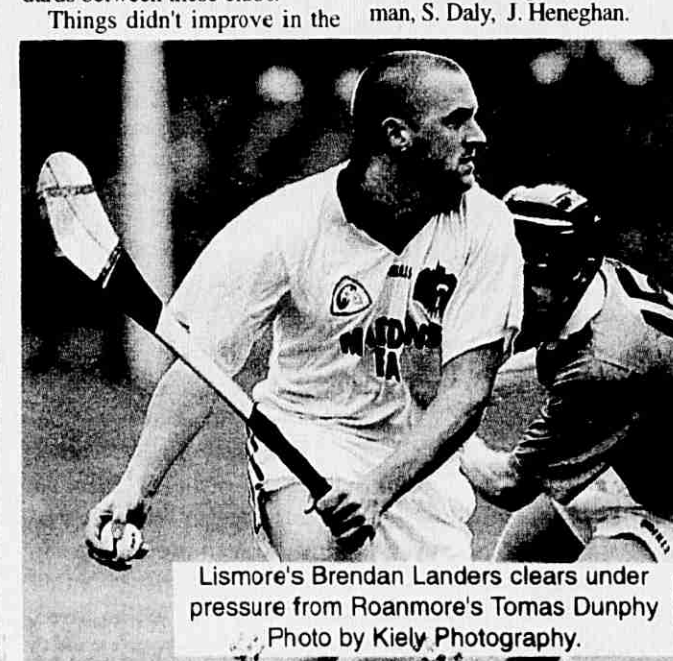
