HALTING SITE LOCATION MORE ADVANCED THAN MEMBERS AWARE SAYS KYNE

County Manager, Donal Connolly failed to rule out Dungarvan as a possible location for a transient halting site, and confirmed that the County Council is actively seeking to establish a site for transients in the county.

meeting of Waterford County Council, Mr. Connolly said the council hasn't purchased a site as yet, and the matter would be

subject to a public consultation phase before a location is agreed on.

Early 2005 Deadline For Opening Of Multi-Million Euro Shopping Centre

MAJOR CINEMA OPERATOR BEING LINED UP TO RUN CINEPLEX

Dungarvan's new multi-million euro shopping centre will be open to the public by March 2005 at the latest, according to Managing Director of developers Clancy Construction, Billy Clancy.

Mr. Clancy said the developers are pushing to have the anchor store and 75% of the shopping centres commercial retail outlets opened by September of next year, but currently a 2005 deadline is looking more likely.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Mr. Clancy said they also are in discussion with a number of major cinema chains about the operation of the proposed new Cineplex.

"We're hoping to start work on the Cineplex early in 2004 and we're hopeful of having the Cineplex completed by sometime early in 2005."

While, he was unwilling to disclose the names of the operators interested at this stage, he said there are "a lot of possibilities, and there's a lot of interest out there."

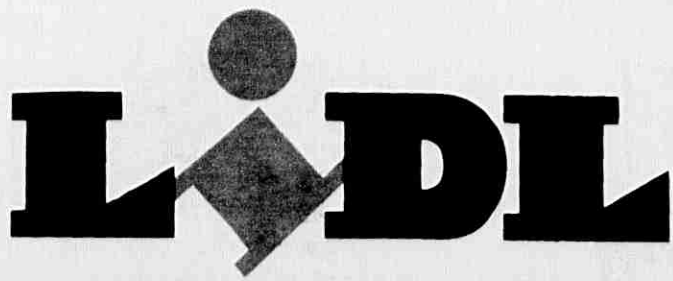

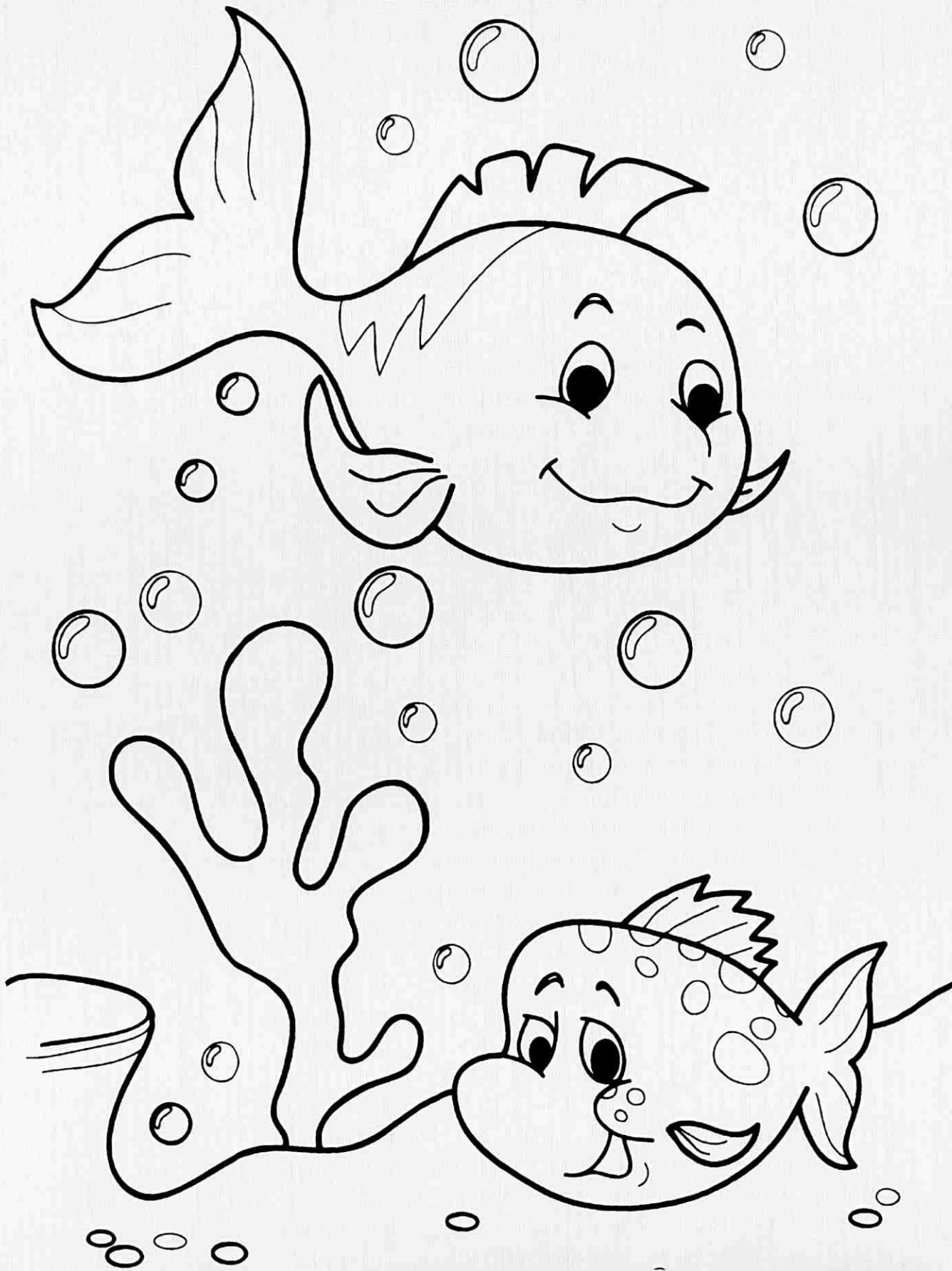

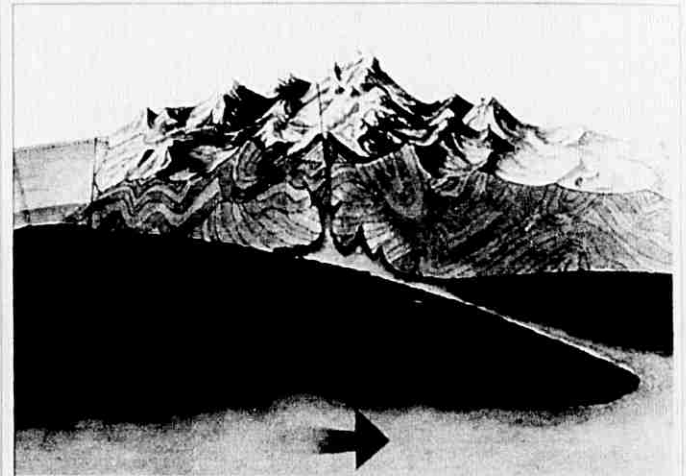

The Continents

The Earth's surface is divided into about 20 pieces, or plates, like the panels of a football. Scientists call them tectonic plates. These plates are constantly moving and rearranging themselves, and as they move they carry the continents of land and ocean floors with them. Movements in the Earth's plates shape the continents, build up or destroy mountains, and cause earthquakes and volcanoes.

Africa And South America Were Once Joined

In the 1960s, scientists realised that the continents are moving around the surface of the planet. This is known as 'continental drift'. For over 300 years, scientists had noticed that the shapes of some continents, such as the West Coast of Africa and the east coast of South America, would fit together like pieces of a jigsaw. This suggested they had once been joined together as part of a larger continent.



The Land Beneath Your Feet Is Moving

The movement of the earth's plates means that the continents are still drifting slowly apart. North America is about 10m (30 ft) further away from Europe than it was when it was first discovered around 500 years ago, and the Atlantic Ocean gets wider by a few centimetres (inches) every year. Millions of years from now, North America may break away from South America, and Australia may drift further northwards. A map of the world in the future might look as strange to us as a map of the world from millions of years ago.

There Was Once Only One Super-Continent

Scientists now believe that there were once very different continents scattered around the globe.

Slowly, they moved together until, around 300 million years ago, they joined together to form a vast super continent which scientists call Pangaea, or 'all land'. Then, around 100 million years later, this continent began to break up into the continents we have today. This explains why scientists have found parts of the same ancient mountain ranges, and fossils of the same animals, scattered on different continents, and why Europe once had a very different climate-because it was once in the Tropics.

Did You Know?

If the ice at the polar caps was to melt, the oceans would rise by nearly 100 metres (330ft).

The levels of the oceans were so much lower 15,000 years ago that the first Native Americans were able to walk from Siberia into North America.

The seas contain 60,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 water molecules!

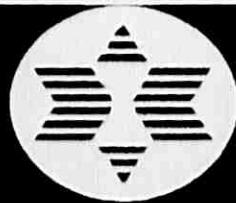
In the 1700s, scientists called Neptunists claimed that the entire earth had once been covered by a thick, soupy ocean.

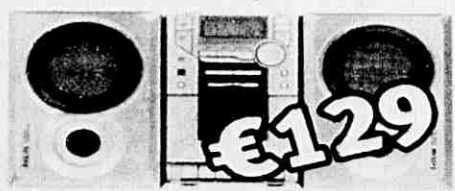

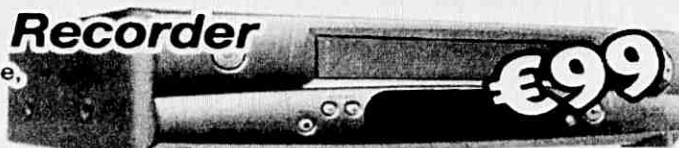

A LECTURE BY MICHAEL SMITH

Once again Dungarvan Museum Society kick off their lecture season with what promises to be yet another big attraction. This time they have engaged

best selling author Michael Smith to deliver a slide show and lecture about one of Ireland's heroes, the legendary Kerryman Tom Crean.

Michael Smith is the author of 'An Unsung Hero', the best-selling biography of Tom Crean. He has since written a children's version of Crean's story, which is published on the 15th October and entitled 'Ice Man'. The above extract comes from this new book which is expected to grab the attention of children everywhere. Michael is also the author of 'I Am Just Going Outside', the biography of Captain Oates and is currently working on another book in the same area.

Michael Smith has a long-standing interest in Polar exploration and gave up a 30-year career as a business and political journalist in London to write his book about Tom Crean. He was formerly



Political Correspondent and Industrial Editor of the Guardian and Business Editor of The Observer.

Michael Smith has contributed to a wide variety of publications in Ireland, including the Irish Times Ireland on Sunday and History Ireland, he has appeared on television and radio and lectured throughout the country on the history of Polar exploration. Many people will be familiar with his work. His stories of the Antarctic are absolutely captivating. At Smith's recent lecture in Cork the doors had to be closed because the place was packed to the rafters. Dungarvan Museum Society are thrilled that Michael has made the time in his very busy schedule to visit and deliver what promises to be one of the most interesting lectures to be held in Dungarvan.

Radiotherapy Report A Disgrace

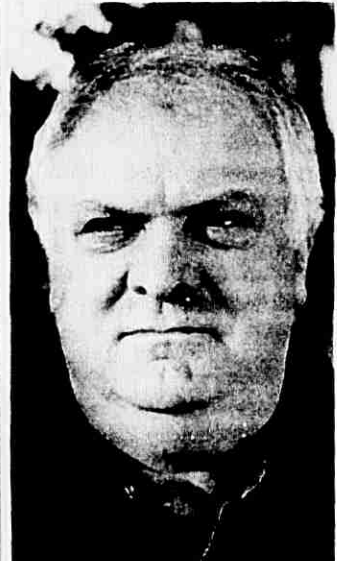
Sinn Fein Local Election Candidate for the Dungarvan area in next years Elections Brendan Mansfield has described the Report on the provision of Cancer Treatment Facilities in the Republic of Ireland as a total disgrace as the South East has been ignored.

Meanscoil San Nioclas Officially Opened

Minister for Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs, Eamon O Cuiv, officially opened Meanscoil San Nioclas at a ceremony attended by in excess of two hundred past and present pupils, parents and dignitaries.

The opening ceremony started with the planting of a tree on the school grounds. The four foot high sapling, came from a cutting from a tree on the grave of Dr. Piaras de hIndeberg C.I. - one of the founders of the first "through Irish" institutions in the Gaeltacht, and after whom, the old Meanscoil hall is named.

Minister O Cuiv, and other dignitaries, then walked through a guard of honour formed by pupils of the Meanscoil to the new building. A solemn procession was formed, and forty-four candles - symbolic of the forty-four years of the Meanscoil's existence - were lit.

Guests were welcomed by Marie Nic Craith - Bean an Ti - who told of the schools formation, and of the opening of the Meanscoil's doors for the first time in 1959 to 33 students, and gave a short synopsis of the schools history.

Very Rev. William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Very Rev. William Beare, Dean of Waterford and Lismore, and the Very Rev. Edmund Cullinane PP, An Rinn then performed the blessing.

Following a short religious ceremony, Minister O Cuiv praised the work of the teachers, and all those connected to Meanscoil San Nioclas throughout the years, and spoke of how small schools often prove to be more effective

units than their larger counterparts.

He went on to acknowledge the difficulties that teaching through the medium of Irish can present, and of his hope that the new Irish Language Bill, which he is introducing, will help to ease that burden.

Principal, Aine O Ceallaigh, Uas, then spoke of her happiness with the work Meanscoil San Nioclas is achieving, and of how with the new development, it is intended to use Halla de hIndeberg as a residence for experts in many areas who will provide teaching for both young and old through the medium of Irish.

Following the ceremony, a representative of the Waterford Institute of Technology made a presentation of a beautiful piece of artwork in recognition of the contribution Meanscoil San Nioclas has given to education and the Irish language in its 44 years.

However, for many, the highlight of the official opening was the performance of a dramatic poem illustrated in Choric speaking.

Garda Numbers In West Waterford Kept Under Review

- MINISTER MCDOWELL

Minister for Justice, Equality and Law Reform, Michael McDowell, has informed members of Waterford County Council that Garda staffing numbers in West Waterford will be kept under review.

In a letter to Waterford County Council on foot of concerns raised about the levels of Gardai in the area, Minister McDowell informed members that it is the responsibility of the Divisional Officer to allocate personnel within a Division as he/she sees fit.

"...when additional personnel next become available, the needs of Dungarvan District will be fully considered within the overall context of the needs of Garda divisions throughout the country," he said.

However, while concerns have been expressed over the drop in the number of Gardai stationed across all the West Waterford stations over the last twenty years, Minister McDowell said that since 1997 Garda numbers in the Waterford/Kilkenny Division have risen by 38 or 12.45%.

According to his report, the personnel strengths of Tallow and Lismore Garda stations at all ranks in September 2003 were 2 and 3 respectively. The personnel strength of Dungarvan District, meanwhile, was 48 at all ranks.

His letter also stated that the District Detective Unit and Divisional Traffic Unit patrol the area.

"Garda personnel assigned to Dungarvan District, together with overall policing arrangements and operational strategy, are continually monitored and reviewed. Such monitoring ensures that optimum use is made of Garda resources, and the best possible Garda service is provided to the General Public."

Minister McDowell's letter coincided with Superintendent, Mick Blake's attendance at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council.

Supt. Blake told the council that the recent crime spree across West Waterford was not committed by locals.

Detailing a number of robberies by one gang, which struck at businesses in Dungarvan, Tallow, Lismore, Castlebar, Milstreet and Cork City within days of each other, Supt. Blake said the locations were random.

"Where ever they are they do jobs. That's the way it is. There is no local input," he said.

COOKERY CORNER

The takeaway dish that's easy to make

CREATE a taste of the Orient in your own kitchen – Chinese-style chicken with ginger and garlic that's quick and easy to make and refreshingly different.

Preparation and cooking time: 20-25 mins

- Ingredients**
(Serves 4-6)
500g chicken fillets or 2 large chicken breasts, boned
2 tbsps oil
2 crushed cloves garlic
1 tspn fresh crushed root ginger
2 medium onions, thickly sliced
3 celery stalks, sliced
125g ham steak, cut into cubes
2 tspns cornflour
1/2 cup water
1 tbspn soy sauce
1 tbspn black bean sauce

REMOVE the skin from the chicken and cut the meat into strips 5cm by

2cm.
Heat the oil in a wok or frying pan, adding the garlic, ginger and chicken pieces, until the chicken turns white.
Add the onion, celery and ham and continue tossing the mixture for one minute.
In a small bowl, mix the cornflour and water into a smooth paste.
Add to the pan or wok with the soy sauce and black bean sauce.
Cook until the sauce boils and thickens, stirring constantly.
Lower the heat and leave the pan or wok standing until the chicken is cooked through – this should only take about one minute.
It is now ready to serve with your choice of rice and Chinese accompaniments.

If you have room afterwards, ice cream or sorbet will bring the meal to a refreshing close.



The flan that's a giant Jaffa cake!

THIS flan is simply a very large Jaffa cake, and it's just as nice.

Preparation time: 2 hours
Cooking time: 5-10 mins

- Ingredients**
(Serves 6-8)
375ml orange juice
1 packet orange jelly, cut into cubes
275g plain chocolate, broken up
350ml double cream
25cm ready made flan base
Pouring cream as an accompaniment

Pour 150ml of boiling water over the jelly.

Stir until jelly dissolves, then add all of the orange juice. Pour into a 23cm shallow dish lined with cling film and place in the fridge to set.
Melt all of the chocolate with half of the cream in a bowl set above a pan of simmering water. Allow to cool.
Whip the rest of the cream and fold into the chocolate. Chill for a few minutes until it has reached a spreading consistency.

Turn out the set jelly and place on to the flan base. Spread the chocolate mixture over the jelly, making a domed cover.

Leave to set in a fridge for a minimum of 30 minutes. Serve with lashings of pouring cream.

Spicy carrot and cucumber relish

A GREAT and versatile relish which can be enjoyed with summer salads, vegetarian dishes, barbecues – and even hot winter meals of meat and veg.

Preparation time: 10 mins

- Ingredients**
(Serves 4)
1 large peeled carrot
Half a cucumber, peeled or unpeeled
Half a red chilli, very finely diced
3 tbsps cider vinegar
1 tbspn honey
1 tbspn dark soy sauce
Using a cheese grater, coarsely grate all of the

carrot and cucumber. Mix together in a small serving bowl.
Combine the honey with the soy sauce, cider vinegar and half chilli in a small bowl and mix vigorously.
Pour the mixture in with the carrot and cucumber, and stir – making sure it is thoroughly mixed in. Leave to marinate while you prepare the rest of the meal.
Serve as a side dish or as a relish to accompany meats.
This relish is easy to make in larger quantities for parties or barbecues, and makes a delightful alternative to the ones you can buy in the shops.

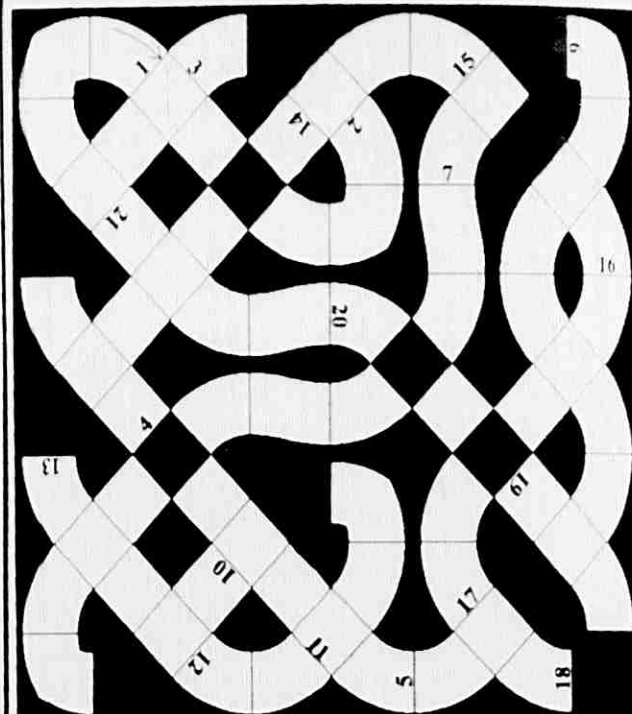

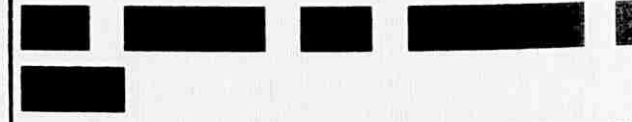

SURVEY ON TRAFFIC CALMING SOUGHT

A comprehensive survey to ascertain traffic calming necessities throughout the urban area of Dungarvan is required according to a local Councillor.

Labour Party representative Fiachra O Ceilleachair says previous requests have been met with a response that the matter was an ongoing issue on the Town Council's traffic management agenda. Cllr. O Ceilleachair says, however, that the regularity with which questions on the topic are raised with him in estates and streets in Dungarvan and Abbeyside leads him to restate the merits of conducting the detailed exercise - one that should in his opinion involve consultation with local householders.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair pointed out that among the best instances of safety measures undertaken in recent years had been the installation of ramps on Fr. Twomey's road in the vicinity of Springfield estate and the brick platforming adjacent to Ardcoil na nDeise in the town.

Repeating his case, Cllr. O Ceilleachair said that the safety of children playing in residential areas and the tendency among some motorists toward inappropriate speed in such districts could be addressed in several ways.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair, in previous communication to the Town Council, has cited vari-

eties of ramps (inc. platforming), additional signage (inc. speed limiting), rumble strips, pedestrian crossings, flashing lights, kerbing and pavement widening, painted lines and

surface colours, route realignment, railings and "fried egg" studs as options that could be considered in parts of the town where there's a case for traffic calming.

Future of Dungarvan's Christmas Lights in Doubt

The future of the Christmas lights in Dungarvan has been thrown into doubt following the withdrawal of the Chamber of Commerce from the project.

Dungarvan and West Waterford Chamber of Commerce have written to the County Manager informing him that they will not be in a position to help Dungarvan Town Council to organise the Christmas lights this year.

The erection and maintenance of the Christmas lights has been funded by a combination of funding from Dungarvan Town Council and voluntary contributions from local businesses.

Last year the Chamber of Commerce met with the County Manager to express its concern at a serious fall off in funding for the lights. This was mainly due to a reduction in voluntary contributions from local businesses. The shortage of funds resulted in the embarrassing situation where the Christmas lights were still up in March as both the Dungarvan Town Council and the Chamber of Commerce searched desperately for somewhere to store them.

"Holly Wood" Comes To Tallow

Leading Charitable Fundraiser Pays First Visit To Tallow

One of Australia's foremost charitable fundraisers, and social diarists, "Holly Wood", made an eight-day visit to Tallow recently, where he met, amongst others, Deputy Ollie Wilkinson, and performer Tessa Quinlan-Mundin.

Holly Wood - a num de plume for Robin Howard Pulham - has already been awarded the Centenary Medal at a presentation made by the then Prime Minister, John Howard, and the Citizen of the Year Award in Perth for his charitable works. He also works as Socialist Diarist for the Sunday Times - Australia's top national Sunday newspaper.

His tragic upbringing in foster care, which will be detailed in his forthcoming autobiography 'One Clean Boy' proved to be the catalyst for his charitable work on behalf of children. At the age of fourteen, Holly attempted to take his life. When his attempt failed - though he still has the marks on wrist - he said, "no more", and began the process of turning his life around, and helping others through the times of despair, he himself had endured.

It was due to his fundraising on behalf of children that he ultimately chose Tallow as the town to visit. His visit was facilitated through his friendship with performer Tessa Quinlan-Mundin who, in recent years, has returned from Perth to her birthplace to live.

Mrs. Quinlan-Mundin has committed herself to restor-

ing her family's homestead at Willow Cottage at the bottom of Tallow hill, and to opening the weaving workshop where her relatives had built up a renowned basket weaving business. Some of their craftsmanship has gone to the White House, and to Buckingham Palace as well as to stores on 5th Avenue.

"That's why I wanted to keep it up," she told the Dungarvan Leader. "There's so much history in the place."

She now intends opening the workshop for former customers of her two brothers to view.

Mrs. Quinlan-Mundin - a graduate of the Guildhall School of Music - moved first to England, where she was attached to the BBC. Later she went to Perth, where she sang at Workmen's Clubs, and in theatre's around the city. She also appeared on Australian television in its earlier days. Back in Ireland, she appeared on RTE's Open House, and the National Treasures series.

She met Holly Wood about thirty years ago, and was a model for some of his charitable bashes, together with a number of famous stars including Honor Blackman, Graeme Blundell, Richard Todd, Arthur Lowe and Sammy Davis jr.

The money raised has gone to many worthwhile causes including the Variety Toy Bank that he started for women's refugees.

"We put toys in women's refuges for children taken from backgrounds of domestic violence. When a child gets taken to the refuge, usu-

ally by the child's mother, they have a beautiful toy waiting for them there."

The toy bank has been a huge success, and Holly said they're celebrating ten years of the Toy Bank this year.

Some of his most successful work has been as a fundraiser for the Crippled Children Society, which helps children suffering from Muscular Sclerosis and Muscular Dystrophy.

"We used to put on fashion parades, and lunches with speakers, and have movie previews," he recounted. "Along the way I've met a lot of fantastic people, and I've made a lot of good friends... Tessa being one of them."

His latest venture involves the development of low cost wheelchairs for the crippled victims in Cambodia - a legacy of thousands of landmines lain throughout the country. Using an innovative idea, Holly is involved in constructing low cost wheelchairs made of plastic garden chairs at a small cost of \$200 Aust. - less than €100.

In his work for the Sunday Times, Holly, has also met a number of the world's highest profile people, among them former US President, Bill Clinton, and the former Mayor of New York, Rudy Guillian, and many others.

"Perth is a city where we don't get all the stars," he said. "But we do get our fair share."

At the moment, Holly is concluding his autobiography - "One Clean Boy" - which he will launch in Ireland next year.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Lovely to have, simple to grow

CLEMATIS are arguably the most popular climbers for gardeners of all ability levels – but why? Probably because they are easy to grow and suited to almost any climate and location. Of all the climbers they offer the longest flowering period, with species and hybrids that bloom in virtually every month of the year. Many also have silvery clustered seedheads which appear after flowering. Clematis ranges from herbaceous plants and sprawling shrubs to better-known climbers. It also offers a wide variety of colour and flower forms ranging from sprays of ivory coloured bells to exotic-looking golden lanterns. The climber can be grown to suit almost any garden location, but it is ideal for camouflaging unsightly buildings, fences and walls or for scrambling over old trees and new

arbours. It adds colour and interest to otherwise dull features. When using clematis to clothe a trellis ensure that the support structure is strong and sound before planting. Similarly, when growing clematis through old trees, the branches must be robust enough to bear the considerable weight. Most climbing species should be planted in part-shade or in the sun provided that the roots are cool and shaded. They should be planted on the shaded side of the host tree or wall. The herbaceous species thrive in a sunny location. Most clematis love rich, fertile and well-

drained soil, especially if it is neutral or slightly alkaline. Clematis need to be planted at a depth of about two feet to encour-

age buds to develop below ground. If the plant catches clematis wilt, cut the plant back and healthy shoots will grow back.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Lift gladioli
All gladiolus corms will be better out of the ground now. Dig them up carefully with a fork, cut the leaves off just above the corms and place the latter in shallow boxes, in which they can be stored in any dry, cool but frost-proof place. Remove any small corms and keep these for growing on a reserve bed. They may not flower next year, but they can be fattened up for the following season. Pull off and throw away the old, shrivelled corms that stick to the bottoms of new ones.
Stop feeding chrysanthemums
If feeding is carried on too long, buds tend to decay in the centre. From now on supply chrysanthemums with plain water only.
Lift and store turnips
Lift a good supply of turnips of reasonable size and store them in a frost-proof place for the winter. They will keep quite well in a heap in any dry shed or outhouse, but fare all the better for a light covering of dry sand or ashes. Cut off the tops first. If you leave some roots in the ground they will supply a useful crop of turnip tops in late winter and spring.
Aerate the lawn
A garden fork or a hollow-tined aerator can be used to advantage at this time of year to relieve compaction on lawns – particularly those which have been used for games.
Prepare rose beds
Get all new rose beds prepared in October. The ideal time for planting roses is in November and it is good if the ground can have a few weeks to settle between digging and planting.

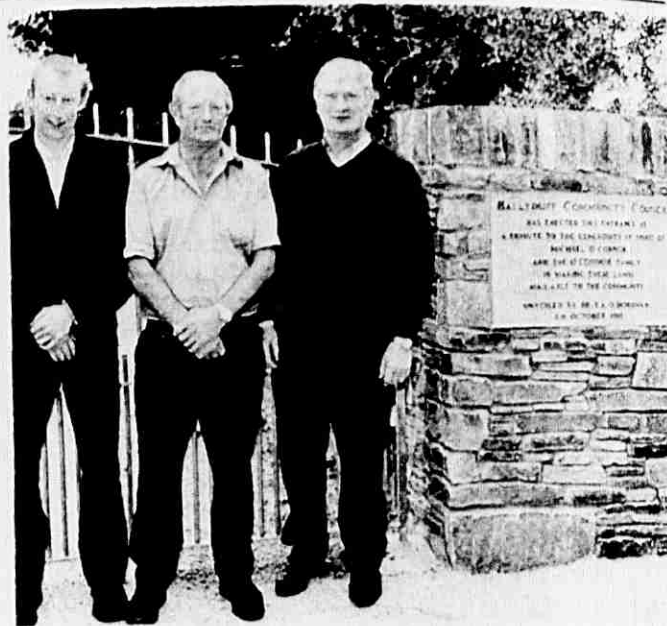

Taisteal Tuaithe na nDéise - Waterford Rural Transport New community bus service in Kilrossanty, Mahonbridge, Stradbally area

On Saturday last Waterford Rural Transport commenced the last of ten pilot bus services. Available to people from the Kilrossanty, Mahonbridge,

Stradbally area, the service will run each Saturday and is operated by local operator Tom Riordan. The bus travels from Kilrossanty (9.30 am) and trav-

els via Mahonbridge (9.45am), McGraths Cross (9.55am), Faha (10.00am), Durrow (10.10am), and Stradbally (10.25am) to Dungarvan. The

return time from Dungarvan is 1.45 pm, which gives passengers three hours in Dungarvan.

All services are aimed at alleviating the problems of people in rural areas who experience difficulty in accessing services due to a lack of transport and are open to everyone. The service is absolutely free for passengers holding the Department of Social and Family Affairs Free Travel or Companion Passes. Children under 12 accompanied by an Adult also travel free, while students pay a 2.00 return fare. All other passengers pay a 4.00 return fare.

"where people are unable to get to our buses, we will collect and return them to their homes"

Speaking on the launch of the final pilot route for 2003, James O'Donoghue, Rural Transport Co-ordinator said "While many towns and villages are serviced by Public Transport, there are large areas, particularly in the North and West of the County where until the introduction of our services, there was little or no alternatives for people who do not have their own means of transport. Equally for many people the distance to the nearest bus stop was a problem. What makes our service different is that we can offer a door-to-door service to our passengers. Where people are unable to get to our bus, we will collect and return them to their homes.

"USE IT OR LOSE IT "

We are delighted with the response so far from the public. Our services are flexible and will be closely monitored to see what best suits the communities being served. In fact some of our schedules are currently being altered to better suit the needs of passengers and I would ask all passengers to check with us at 058 20845 or contact their bus driver for details.

The success and continuation of these pilot services will be judged on the numbers of people using them, and I would appeal to everyone to use, and encourage the use of, this unique service for rural communities. At the end of this year the Rural Transport Task Group will be evaluating all services and making decisions on which services will be continued into 2004. It is for communities, in the final analysis a case of use it or lose it ". For further information contact:

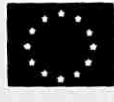

Ardmore 'Aparthotel' Gets Conditional Go-Ahead

Waterford County Council has granted conditional permission to John Foley, Dungarvan, for the demolition of the Cliff House Hotel in Ardmore, and its replacement with what developers are calling an 'Aparthotel' and Holiday Homes.

The complex will consist of 7 one bedroom, 30 two bedroom and 1 three bedroom units along with 2 double storey houses on the existing car-park.

A bar, restaurant, kitchen and associated storage facilities are also planned for the site. According to the plans, drawn up by McGrane & Partners of Dundrum, the development will see the provision of 70 surface car parking spaces, and an underground car park.

CLIFF HOTEL EARMARKED FOR DEMOLITION

The building itself consists of a central section two storeys above road level, and which extends two storeys into the cliff face. The building will have a small block on each end, which is planned to be a single storey above road level.

However, the local authority has placed twenty-five conditions on the developments go-ahead. In one of the most contentious of these conditions, it states that the applicant cannot occupy the proposed bar, restaurant or 46 bedspaces until such a time as the proposed Ardmore Treatment Plant is

constructed and operational, and the new or improved Ardmore Water Supply Scheme is implemented.

The planning authority has also ordered that six car parking spaces on the Cliff Road, and 11 spaces on the upper road be scrapped, and that a viewing area be provided at these locations instead.

Speaking at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair asked whether this would result in the facility being left half occupied, and he also warned that an appeal to An Bord Pleanála from residents is likely to follow.

The proposed development

has met stiff local opposition on a number of issues including what they say will be its intrusion on the view, and concerns about the levels of traffic on the steep narrow road leading up to the hotel.

According to Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) people are also disappointed that the Cliff House Hotel isn't being refurbished and used again for tourism.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy, said that as the proposed new Aparthotel has a greater capacity than the existing Cliff Hotel, a number of facilities have to be left unoccupied until improved sewerage and drainage facilities are provided in the town.

Early 2005 Deadline For Opening Of Multi-Million Euro Shopping Centre

Dunnes Stores will definitely be the anchor tenant at the shopping centre, and that the developers will hand over the shell months in advance of the opening date for a complete fitting out.

"We're pushing to achieve an 2004 construction finish," he said, "but it's difficult to predict. Construction progress is under review on an ongoing basis, and we will be having a final review of progress in March."

According to Mr. Clancy, the shell of the anchor store building will be handed over to Dunnes Stores for fitting out about four or five months in advance of the final opening date. If construction work is on target for a September '04 opening date, the anchor store will be handed over for fitting out in June of next year.

However, despite speculation that the anchor store would open initially on its own, Mr. Clancy said 75% of the commercial retail outlets will be completed by the time the anchor store opens.

"The remaining 25% of retail outlets will be opened around six months later," he added.

The speed with which the shopping centre development will be opened also depends on the rate of demolition work on the site.

"Some of the buildings have been quite difficult," he said. "There are some very tall buildings on the site, which

are difficult to demolish, and obviously due to safety we have to take it slowly."

So far, however, he says he is pleased with the progress, which has been made on the site.

"We have been making some serious progress. We have a very good team of workers on the site, and we have a very good management team on the site as well. Overall, I'm very pleased with the progress we have been making."

However, it has also emerged that work on the pedestrian entrance at O'Connell Street is

now unlikely to be part of the same development. Shane Houlihan from the Pike, Dungarvan, has reapplied for planning permission for a pedestrian walkway through part of No's 6,7,8 O'Connell Street, and for the construction of apartments and retail outlets on the site. It's understood that the entrance will be opened, but it remains unconfirmed when this will be done.

But, Mr. Clancy said the vehicular access from O'Connell Street will be opened in time for the shopping centre's 2004/05 deadline, while Dun-

garvan Town Council recently stated that the roundabout and entrance on the N25 near Dungarvan Industrial Estate will be completed by mid to late summer next year.

The multi-million euro complex is expected to create hundreds of jobs in this first phase alone, and is part of a 60 million euro investment in the town. Once all the phases are up-and-running, including the development of a business park, and the location of other businesses on the site, the total investment is likely to surpass 300 million euros.

SPECULATION INCREASES OVER TRANSIENT HALTING SITE FOR DUNGARVAN

"It doesn't fall under planning at this time," he said.

Labour Councillor, Billy Kyne, had sought to raise the matter under planning during the last meeting of the local authority, and asked whether the County Manager intended to purchase a property on the N25 adjacent to Dungarvan for a transient halting site.

Mr. Connolly replied that the county council hasn't in recent times acquired any property which would require public consultation, but he confirmed that the search is ongoing.

According to the County Manager's report released at the end of last year, the County Council intends to identify

three possible locations for transient halting sites - one in the east, west and centre of the county.

But, when pressed by Cllr. Kyne, who said he understood a property had been earmarked for a transient halting site near Dungarvan, Mr. Connolly sharply reiterated that the council has not acquired any property, and that as yet it is not a planning matter.

Speculation is increasing, meanwhile, that Waterford County Council is seriously considering a site near Ring Cross as a location for a controversial transient halting site.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Cllr. Kyne said he believed that a possible location for

a transient halting site is further advanced than the elected members of the council are aware.

He said he considers Dungarvan has more than adequately provided traveller facilities in the past, and that is now up to towns such as Tramore, Lismore and Waterford City to provide these sites.

"Why should we get another halting site in Dungarvan when we already provide halting facilities. Why should we be lumbered with another one?" he asked.

"It's been my consistent position that Dungarvan has more than adequately provided halting facilities. It's time now for the other areas to come on board."

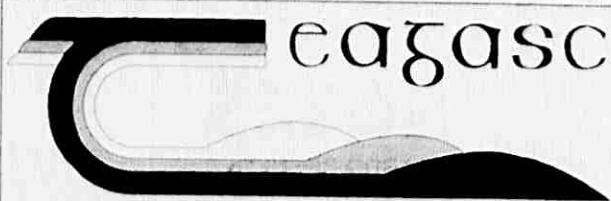

Sucklers

Buying Calves/Weanlings

Although the Fischler proposals aren't likely to come into being until 2005 the potential effects need to be considered if you are buying autumn born drop calves or weanlings currently. Without being accused of trying to talk down the price of cattle. As the current proposals stand and full decoupling is introduced male calves born after the 1st March 2003 although qualifying for both 9 & 21 month premia they will not collect the €80 slaughter premium. This is because they will not be out of retention until 2005 at which stage the slaughter premium would no longer exist. Male calves born after 1st May 2003 which therefore includes Autumn born drop calves will only be eligible for the first stage (9mth) premia.

When selling through the mart it is important that all animals in a group are equal in terms of their premia eligibility. If they are not bids may be made on the basis of the animal(s) in the group that have the least number of premia due.

Weaning Procedures that Maintain Performance

The timing of weaning and the procedure used can have a substantial effect on cow condition, weaning performance and weaning health. The objectives should be (a) to maintain weaning growth rates at an acceptable level for the rest of the grazing season (over 0.75 kg/day), (b) to minimise stress and risk of diseases at weaning, (c) to maintain cow condition in order to reduce the requirement for winter feed. Here, I am mainly concerned with weanlings that will be weaned and overwintered on the farm of origin. Generally, there will be fewer problems with home-reared weanlings in a closed herd than with purchased weanlings. The main concern will be to maintain performance during and after weaning.

When to Wean

The timing of weaning will depend on a number of factors - age of calf, cow condition, grass supply and quality, culling intentions. Where phased weaning is convenient, wean the older calves and calves on cows intended for culling first as well as those on thinner cows and first calves. Since the suckler cow is only required to provide enough milk to rear a good calf, ideally the calf should be seven to eight months old at weaning but it may not be practical to continue suckling beyond November for late Spring born calves. Thus a May born calf will only be 6 months old at weaning in November and would only be 230 - 250 kg at that stage. These lighter weanlings need special treatment as a combination of younger weaning age and being bullied in a group by heavier comrades will result in poor growth rates and failure to reach performance targets.

Weaning Procedure

Phased weaning as is practised by Dr. Michael Drennan at Grange, reduces disturbance and stress at weaning. The cows and calves are put into a well fenced field of good grass. Cows are removed gradually at about weekly intervals. For example, remove 20% - 30% of the cows (culls and thinner cows) in week one and continue this procedure each week until weaning is complete. Cows can be housed or taken to a well fenced area out of any contact with the calves. In this system only a small number of calves are disturbed at any one time and the presence of some cows in the herd has a calming effect on those being weaned. When it comes to the final group of calves to be weaned, the first ones are completely settled. Another weaning method that can be suitable is separating cows and calves on either side of an electric fence - up to 3 strands of mains fencer is needed. This works best where calves are creep grazing and the creep gate is replaced with a stock proof gate at weaning. On heavy wet soils considerable poaching can occur on either side of the electric fence. The least suitable method is taking a bunch of calves away from the cows and putting them in a new field. They will always attempt to get back to the place where they were separated from the cows.

It is a big advantage to have calves eating meal before weaning. When grass is good and cows have adequate milk the quantity of meal needed is small but if they are trained to eat meal once weaned they will quickly increase consumption up to an appropriate level of about 1.5kg per day.

Cow Condition

Body condition is a priority on cows for culling. Some may be adequately finished at weaning but many will require some further feeding prior to slaughter. The margin on cull cow finishing is usually small and there appears to be little prospect of substantial price rises. Where grass is good, feeding about 3 kg meal per day should give a daily liveweight gain of 1 kg and this is a better approach than allowing a cow to remain in store condition up to housing.

Dairying

Are Meals Needed?

- No if there is plenty of grass:
- *Will be rare if it is not planned.
- Yes, if grass is scarce and if animals are lighter than target weights.
- Spring calving cows should get 2 Kgs meal, more to high RBL cows.
- *Autumn calvers should get 6-8 kgs of meal, reduced to 3-4 Kgs if grass is available.
- *Dry cows need no meals but made graze out paddocks.
- *Meal feeding level is quota dependent.
- *Prepare to milk cows until mid December, instead of early November drying off - it is worth 0.6 c/litre (2p per gallon) extra profit over all your quota.
- Small weanlings need 1-2 Kgs.
- *It is too early to feed strong weanlings unless very short of grass.
- In calf Heifers may need 1 Kg if they are light (less than 430 kgs) and tight in grass.
- *It is easy to neglect them at this time.
- Beef cattle within 5-6 weeks of finishing should be fed 3-4 Kgs of meal with grass if it is scarce.
- If the two subsidies have been collected on the bullock there is no point in housing him because he will cost you 1.30 to 1.50 per day to carry him and he will only be putting on 1.10 per day in weight gain - not very economical!
- For most animals a cheap pulp, gluten, barley or distillers combination will do.
- Bulk buy beet pulp now for feeding to cows during March -May

BEET GROWERS ASK LAW SOCIETY PRESIDENT TO APPOINT ARBITRATOR IN IRISH SUGAR DISPUTE

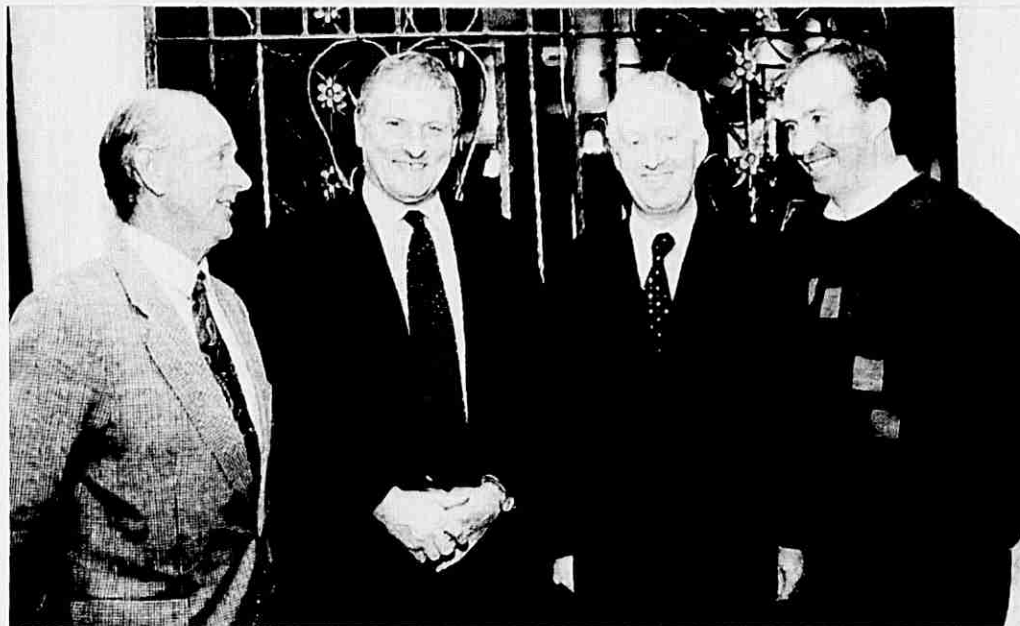
IFA President John Dillon reported to a delegation of affected Waterford beet growers from Tallow area, also including Waterford IFA Beet Representative, James Coughlan, that the solicitors for beet growers penalised by Irish Sugar for underdelivery in 2002 have written to the President of the Law Society, Ms. Geraldine Clarke asking her to select an arbitrator as provided under the sugar beet contract.

"This follows the refusal of Irish Sugar to agree on the selection of an arbitrator. The concerned growers had submitted three names believed to be suitable independent arbitrators to Irish Sugar, but the company has refused to accept any of these or to submit their own choice of arbitrators for the growers' approval."

"Irish Sugar still refuses to accept that there is a dispute between the concerned growers and the company, despite the fact that the growers have plainly rejected the company's penalties for underdelivery," said the IFA President.

Mr. Dillon said "Irish Sugar cannot be allowed to stall on their obligation to go to arbitration under the contract. The beet contract gives growers a right to arbitration in disputes with Irish Sugar. I am urging the President of the Law Society to put in an arbitrator as a matter of urgency to deal with this dispute between the growers involved and Irish Sugar."

"IFA remains totally opposed to bona fide growers being penalised by the company for a problem, which was outside their control and was caused by the exceptionally bad growing conditions of 2002."

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND FOOD NEWSLETTER

MORE BUSINESS WITH FARMERS BY MOBILE PHONE

Minister Joe Walsh TD said his Department is continuing to explore and implement systems to make greater use of mobile phone text messaging (SMS), in recognition of the almost universal use of mobile phones among our farmers (Ireland has the highest use of mobile phones and text messaging of any EU member state). In this regard, he hopes to introduce a facility whereby Area Aid applicants that are reporting 'no change' to their land parcels can do so using simple Text Messaging (SMS) from their mobile phones. In the REPS area, he said access already exists from the Internet to the Commonage maps required by REPS planners.

In addition farmers can now elect to have their payments electronically made directly to their bank accounts through the use of our Direct Credit facility. Farmer access to their Area Aid applications over the Internet has also been provided. A farmer can now view his or her Area Aid application online, and print down the relevant maps of their land parcels.

These projects are evidence of the Department's commitment to the provision of services to customers and it is just the beginning of an ambitious eGovernment programme. It is the intention to add more services through this channel. The Department's website now offers the option of registration for access to the Department's services (www.agriculture.gov.ie).

CAP REFORM TRANSITION PERIOD - IMPLICATIONS FOR DEPARTMENT

Minister Walsh said that the recently agreed reform of the CAP will undoubtedly mean changes within the administrative arrangements in his Department. However, the transition over the next two years from the present to the new payment system will be a major challenge where the Department will be required to administer the current schemes as well as establishing payment entitlements for each individual farmer under the new regime. The Minister said his priority now was to ensure a smooth transfer for farmers especially during a period where the Department will be heavily involved in the Irish Presidency.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF AGRICULTURE APPEALS OFFICE

Launching the first report of the Agriculture Appeals Office, Mr Joe Walsh TD said the independent office was set up in fulfilment of a commitment given by Government under the Programme of Prosperity and Fairness and repeated in the Protocol on Direct Payments to Farmers.

He said that as 2002 was the first year of operations for the Appeals Office, the numbers of Appeals which amounted to 518, was relatively low. However, this is also an indication of the high level of satisfaction among farmers relating to decisions on schemes made by his Department. To put that figure in context, he said his Department had some 650,000 scheme applications last year. While the number of Appeals may rise in the full year of 2003, the proportion of cases that have gone to Appeal stage is very small.

DAIRY INDUSTRY MUST ADDRESS OWN WEAKNESSES - MURPHY

IFA Dairy Chairman Michael Murphy has strongly criticized "the lack of engagement by dairy processors in serious debate on their own weaknesses to achieve the necessary restructuring of milk collection, processing, marketing and investment". He said "dairy farmers are angry at co-op leaders who see the future as cutting farmer numbers in half, while ignoring the need for major efficiencies and coordinated investment at processor level to return better milk prices".

Michael Murphy accused industry spokesmen of attempting to reduce the agenda for the future of the dairy industry to

the sole issue of farmer restructuring. "IFA rejects any attempts by the industry to solve all its problems by promoting fewer, bigger farmers who must run faster just to stand still," he said.

"Despite major opportunities in the Dairy Summit and at the ASA Conference in the last two weeks, there is very little evidence that the processing sector recognises its own shortcomings in its inefficient fragmented structure and low-value product mix," he added.

"With almost 80% of the national milk pool controlled by Glanbia, Dairygold, Kerry, Lakeland and Connacht Gold, there is a major onus on their

management teams to bring forward initiatives to maximize producer returns into the future, rather than plan for lower milk prices," he said.

"Our co-ops cannot absolve themselves from their responsibility to return viable milk prices to producers by taking cost and duplication out and by co-ordinating R&D, investment, processing and marketing," Michael Murphy said.

"I don't want to hear milk quota management proposals from processors until I have heard how they will set about co-operating with each-other to return better prices to farmers," he said.

"Milk producers have a legiti-

mate aspiration of a minimum income on par with the average industrial wage.

While this will involve farmers scaling up in the coming years, it will also require an industry capable of returning prices above basic commodity returns," he added.

"The Dairy Committee is currently developing new quota management proposals to allow for faster restructuring at reasonable cost," he said.

"However, producers will not carry the can for the inefficiencies and fragmentation of the dairy industry: we will play our part, but processors will have to pull their weight too," he concluded.

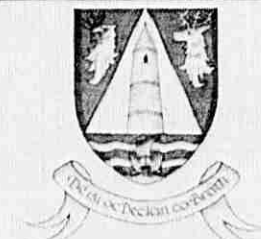

PRESENTATION ON HEALTHY EATING

On Thursday, 9th October, Ms Sheila Kelly, Food Advisor, Bord Bia gave a talk and cookery demonstration on food and nutrition to the transition year students in Blackwater Community School.

Included was a Power Point presentation on healthy food choices and dietary advice for young people. Throughout the afternoon Ms Kelly demonstrated quickly prepared nutritious dishes of appeal to young people. Mouth-watering dishes such as "Thai Pork Green Curry", "Beef Stir-Fry", "Mexican Chilli" and "Bacon and Potato Omelette" were prepared, cooked and presented.

Students were afforded the opportunity to sample some of the dishes and some of the lucky ones were delighted to take home some of the dishes which were raffled at the conclusion of the presentation.

The role played in the success of the presentation by Mr Michael McGrath of McGraths Victuallers, Lismore cannot be over stated. Mr McGrath displayed cuts of choice beef, lamb and pork, allowing the students an opportunity to view the very best of Irish meats. Blackwater Community School is deeply indebted to Mr McGrath for his unquestioning co-operation at short notice.

This informative presentation will play a significant part in motivating our young people towards healthy food choices, re-assuring them that cooking healthy meals can be simple, interesting, nutritious and inexpensive. We thank Ms Sheila Kelly for a most enjoyable presentation, delivered with professionalism and expertise.

NATIONAL BREASTFEEDING AWARENESS WEEK

To mark national breastfeeding awareness week Public Health Nurse Nora Tobin gave an informal and informative talk at Dungarvan's breastfeeding support group, "Mother2Mother" last Tuesday at Dungarvan Youth Centre. Nora began by stating the statistics with regard to breastfeeding initiation rates, which, at 37% in Ireland is well below most other European countries. She listed England's rate at 71%, Norway at 98% and Greece at 99%. However, in Ireland there has been an increase since 1992 from 33%, which is, at least, encouraging. Nora mentioned how important continuing support is to breastfeeding mothers as the "drop-off" rate after leaving hospital is also high.

She also discussed how mother's expectations are often at odds with reality with regard to the care of newborns be they bottle or breastfed. Although breastfeeding can take more of the mother's time in the early stages, bottle fed babies can be demanding too. The rewards and benefits of breastfeeding though are so great that they more than compensate for the initial effort required. Health benefits for baby include less ear, intestinal and respiratory infections and lowered incidence of cot death. Asthma, eczema, and other allergies are also decreased as are incidence of diabetes, obesity and high blood pressure in later



life. Recent research is increasingly showing benefits in intellectual development with breastfed babies shown to have higher I.Q.'s than those bottle-fed. For mothers, breastfeeding lowers the incidence of breast and ovarian cancer and osteoporosis, helps mothers lose excess weight put on during pregnancy and the close skin to skin contact improves the mother-baby bond.

Nora went on to say that Minister Michael Martin has recently given assurances that the department of health intend to

tackle some of the social and economic issues surrounding Ireland's low breastfeeding rate. Allowing mother's lactation breaks on return to work is one of the measures currently before the senate.

Mothers present last Tuesday then had time to discuss any other queries with Nora over morning tea. The Mother2Mother group meets in the Youth centre every Tuesday morning at 10.30am. until 12.00 for coffee and chat and is open to anyone breastfeeding or wishing to learn more about it.

AGLISH TIDY TOWNS REPORT 2003

Overall Development Approach

Thank you for all the information sent with the entry form and for the map. It is gratifying to read the amount of support you have from both state agencies and the local community and the results of which are to be readily seen in Aglish. The village has now received a comparatively high mark in the competition which means that from now on it is going to be more difficult to get additional marks, a matter which will be very dependent on the identification of further projects to be carried out, including a three/five year implementation plan and attention to detail. Such a plan need not be elaborate or expensive and could be laid out in consultation with our local authority and the other agencies with whom you are in touch together, of course, with your local community. This approach has been successfully done in other centres leading to further success in the competition. In the event perhaps you would send a copy with your entry form next year so that the adjudicator can have sight of it.

The Built Environment

As last year your buildings: Church, School, Garda Station, Hall and Post Office looked extremely well. Commercial premises have also maintained a high level of presentation. Congratulations to all concerned. Your stone walls are being well looked after. Thatched roofs where presented are very nice indeed but corrugated roofs are still to be seen, in some cases in a rusted condition.

Landscaping

The landscaping at the Youghal entry to the village was noted. It is very nice indeed and creates a nice impression. Land-

scaping throughout the village is being well maintained. The area around the Church and School looks particularly well but the Cemetery with the Sacred Heart Grotto is somewhat overgrown and needs attention. Window boxes and hanging baskets add considerably to the overall ambience of the village and reflect a great credit on their providers.

Wildlife and Natural Amenities

Your comments under this heading are again noted. Comments made by the adjudicator under this heading last year are still applicable. Perhaps a project under this heading could be part of the suggested three/five plan.

Litter Control

The results of your Litter Patrol were to be seen in Aglish on adjudication day. The village was practically litter free. Congratulations to all concerned and particularly to the school children who have obviously been doing excellent work. There was not, for example, one piece of litter in the vicinity of the school which, in the best of centres, is most unusual.

Tidiness

The village looked very neat and tidy on adjudication day and reflects greatly the interest which your business community and your residents have in the preservation of their environment.

Residential Areas

In the main private residences are being well maintained as are their gardens which, being in full bloom on adjudication day, added greatly to the overall atmosphere of the village. Your comments regarding Bothar na Gerann Estate are noted, hopefully this problem will solve itself with goodwill on all sides. The involvement and interest of individual householders is absolutely essential if a

town or village is to progress in the Tidy Towns competition. In the main Aglish would appear to have that and they are to be congratulated on it.

Roads, Streets and Back Areas

Approach roads looked well again this year with evidence of trimming. Road surfaces and pathways are also being well maintained. The condition of approach roads is very important as they tend to set the tone for the rest of the village.

General Impression

The emphasis this year appears to be on maintenance and, this connection, well done to all concerned. The village is looking extremely well. As part of your planning try, for next year, to identify two or three projects which you might undertake and have ready for adjudication which can take place any time from the 1st of June. These could be under the heading of further landscape, Wildlife or

the enhancement of some houses or buildings which are perhaps not up to standard. In the meantime what you are doing is excellent and well done to all concerned.

Second Round Adjudication

The stream was a welcome element of the village on a hot sunny day. Maybe its amenity potential could be developed. The beautiful planting along by the stream regrettably lost its impact due to the tall weeds in the field behind. The sides of the roadside banks on the approaches had been reasonably cut but the tops also should be periodically trimmed. Some boundary walls and particularly timber fences were notably poorly maintained. On the other hand those who do extend their effort to the roadside are to be commended. A little litter was noted at the petrol pumps. The road signs were admired for their clarity. The grey paving is particularly commended.

EXPOSITION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

EUROSPAR CROSSING

The construction of a pedestrian crossing from the Poor Man's Seat footpath to EuroSpar Supermarket foot path is about to commence. This is welcome news as it is very difficult especially for older people to cross the road at this point.

LOCAL HISTORY

By 1892 the Franchise for parliamentary elections had been well extended but there was an anachronism in the restriction of the franchise for election as a Poor Law Guardian. It was calculated in that year that only 34 ratepayers in the town were eligible for election as Guardians, which illustrates how little the Poor Law system had changed from its original constitution throughout the 19th. Century.

In February 1883 there were 474 inmates in the Workhouse in Dungarvan who cost the ratepayers £30 each annually.

The first mention of a "magic lantern" in the town was when R.E. Brennan, the auctioneer and marriage registrar, gave a show to the children in the Workhouse in January 1887. The "magic lantern" was an optical device that threw pictures from a glass on to a screen in a dark room.

The frequent outbreak of fever in Dungarvan and Abbeyside added to the cares of the Poor Law Guardians. After Christmas in 1887 there was a typhus epidemic. These periodic epidemics were caused principally by the unsanitary condition of much of the houses due to lack of sewerage and clean water. This persisted until good housing and, above all, good sanitary conditions prevailed in the towns and cities of Ireland. Every so often there was liable to be an outbreak of some contagious fever or disease and in autumn 1899 it was stated it was still "a worrying factor".

SHANDON BRIDGE FOOTPATH

Work has commenced on this project which will make it safe for pedestrians to walk from the Bridge to Strandside South. Cllr Michael O'Riordan lobbied intensely for this project and must be delighted to see the results of his efforts bearing fruit.

Poetry

We have often heard that it's hard to sell books of poetry. Last week we saw a book which seems to prove the opposite. This book was first published in 1861 and we would not be surprised to learn that it is still in print. It's 'The Golde Treasury' of the best songs and lyrical poems in the English language selected and arranged by Francis Turner Palgrave.

The following gives some idea of its history.

Francis Turner Palgrave

Born: Great Yarmouth, 28th September 1824.

Died: South Kensington, 24th October 1897.

The Golden Treasury of the best Songs and Lyrical Poems in the English language was first published in 1861. In the World's Classics it was first published with additional poems, in 1907 and reprinted in 1908, 1909, 1910, 1911, 1912 and 1913. New edition 1914, reprinted 1914, 1916 (twice), 1917 (twice), 1918 (thrice), 1919 (twice), 1920 (twice), 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924, 1925, 1926. A new edition with poems by contemporary writers was published in 1928 and reprinted in 1928, 1929, 1930, 1931, 1933, 1935, 1936, 1938 and (with further additional poems bringing the book up to date of publication) in 1941. Reprinted 1943, 1944, 1947, 1948, 1950, 1952, 1954, 1955 and 1956.

This Sunday evening Sarah Mullarkey will be at the Parish Office minding our poetry corner and the other three corners as well. Visitors will be most welcome along.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am applying for a Fuel Allowance under the National Fuel Scheme. If I am eligible for it how much will I receive?

ANSWER

The National Fuel Scheme operated by the Department of Social and Family Affairs is intended to help people who are dependent on long term social welfare or health board payments as their sole income and who are unable to meet their heating needs.

Under the scheme people who qualify for the Fuel Allowance receive an extra Euro 9.00 per week. If you qualify for the basic Fuel Allowance you may also qualify for an extra Euro 3.90 per week for smokeless fuel, but only if you live in an area where there is a ban on smoky coal. The Euro 3.90 may also be payable to those receiving Disability Benefit or unemployment Benefit/Assistance for at least 13 weeks and to those receiving Family Income Supplement, who do not qualify for the basic allowance.

In order to qualify for the Fuel Allowance you must satisfy a means test. You and the members of your household cannot have more than Euro 50.79 per week in combined income or savings/capital of Euro 41,901.36 or more above the appropriate maximum Irish contributory pension rate in order to qualify. For example, someone without any savings receiving a Widow's or Widower's Contributory Pension of Euro 130.30 per week should qualify if his/her weekly income does not exceed Euro 130.30 plus Euro 50.79 i.e. Euro 181.09.

However, if you are already on a means tested payment you will not be subject to another means test for the Fuel Allowance. Where two or more people living in the same household would qualify for the allowance, only one allowance will be paid.

The allowance is paid for 29 weeks from the first week in October to late April.

If you think you are eligible you should apply immediately as the allowance will not be backdated if you apply after the start of the heating season. Application forms (NFS1) are available from any Post Office or your local Social Welfare Office.

MONEYMATTERS

A MONTHLY BUDGET PLAN

Do you wonder at the end of each month where your money has gone, what you spend it on and how come you never seem to have any money for saving? Perhaps it is time to do out a budget plan.

A budget plan is knowing how much income you have, how much you can spend and how much money, if any, will be left over. Many different systems can be used and you can find one to suit your needs. The following is an example of such a system.

If you are paid a fixed amount once a month there is a very easy way to budget your money. Get a supply of envelopes and label them with the names of all the bills etc you need to pay during the next month. For e.g., Rent/Mortgage, Food, ESB, Gas, Car Payment, Coal, School Costs, Satellite, Cable TV, Phone, Petrol etc. Then you place the amount needed to pay each expense into its envelope. When all the envelopes have the required amounts, the money left over, if any, is the money that you are free to spend on non-budgeted items or to put in a saving account.

As the time comes to pay each item, you get the money required from the proper envelope. At the end of the month any money left in an envelope could be redistributed along with the new month's income and you would be ready to start over. Using this system you will always know how much money you have available by simply looking into the envelopes. Any deviations from the "budgeted" amounts are quickly noted and corrections can be made.

This type of budgeting is very simple, but it is not practical for everyone. However, if you can even do it for one month perhaps it will show you where you are spending your money, where you can make savings etc. Then perhaps you should make out a budget on paper and stick to it.

Affane.

Affane was once a borough. The evidence for this claim is included in a list of towns and boroughs, which contributed to a subsidy being raised for the Scottish wars in 1300. A document of 1312 refers to Geoffrey MacTravene who was found guilty of killing Henry Sygyn "in the town of Athmethan in the house of Matthew the carpenter".

There was a church at Affane from the beginning of the 14th century. In 1565 Affane was the site of a battle fought between the Earls of Desmond and Ormond. The Census of Ireland 1659 returned a population of 104 for Affane. There are also references to a castle and a mill.

It is thought that the original settlement was situated between the church and the castle. The markets were held in the 19th and early 20th century in front of and to the east of the church.

The castle was situated just inside the east wall of Mount Rivers demesne, just behind the 19th century gate and lodge. Mount Rivers house was demolished in the 1990's. The ancient road Bothar na Naomh crossed the river at this point. The castle is marked on the 1st edition ordnance survey map. John O'Donovan described the building in 1841 as "rather a strong dwelling house than a military castle. Only parts of the east and west ends and fragments of the south wall remain ... it was 45 feet in length and 19 feet 7 inches in breadth. Its walls are 4 feet in thickness".

The Parish Church.

The first reference to this church is in the ecclesiastical taxation of 1302-6 when "Athmethan" was valued at £61-16s-

4d. By the 16th century it was one of the chapels of the mother church of Dungarvan. In 1537 the church of "Amene" was united along with Dungarvan to the Crown, having previously been held by Keynsham Abbey in England, (Dungarvan had granted to Keynsham in 1413). Charles Smith 1746 noted that the church was "in repair and constant service". Canon Power suggested that the old church was to the south of the 19th century Church of Ireland building. The ordnance

survey map marks the site of the ancient church in the field to the west of the present graveyard.

Over Six Hundred Drivers in County Penalised

Over six hundred motorists in County Waterford received penalty points since their introduction just under a year ago.

Since November 1st last year, 667 motorists in the county have received at least two penalty points, with nineteen of those receiving four, and one on 6 penalty points.

Penalty points are given for speeding, driving without insurance, and seat belt offences, but when the system extends to 60 breaches of the Road Traffic Act next year, the number of penalty points is likely to increase.

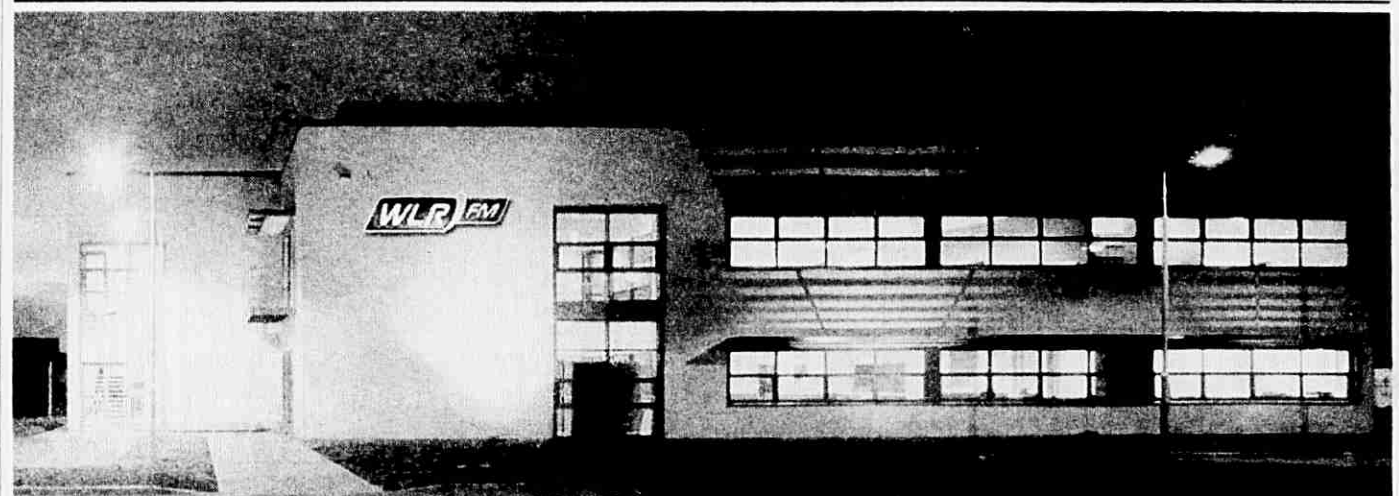
The introduction of penalty points has also coincided with a dramatic drop in the number of deaths on Irish roads.

PEDESTRIANS AND CYCLISTS — AN OBSERVATION

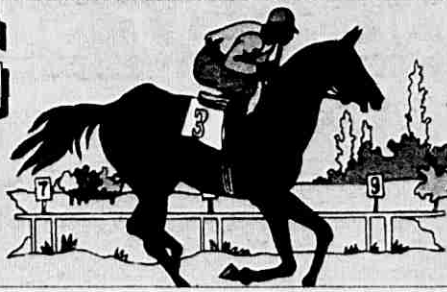

COURSE ETIQUETTE

EAST V. WEST SEMIS AT FRAHER FIELD ON SUNDAY

Two Attractive Hurling Semi-Finals In Prospect

Last year Mount Sion and Ballygunner clashed in the county final at Walsh Park and the prospects of seeing a repeat in three weeks time will be revealed when the programme listed for Fraher field on Sunday afternoon comes to a conclusion.

The three top senior hurling teams in the county, Mount Sion, Ballygunner and Lismore who provided ten of the fifteen players in our bid to retain the Munster title this year will be in action.

So will Fourmilewater who are more or less representing the other nine senior clubs and may feel justified in feeling insulted at not being named one of the top four.

The programme of the two county senior hurling semi-finals is unquestionably the most attractive one on the club scene so far this year and it will be certain to attract a mighty crowd to Fraher field.

The entire county management team will sit in the stand to monitor the talent on show and I will be surprised if one or two or maybe three new names do not appear on the county panel, the make up of which is due to be announced shortly.

In the opening game western challengers Fourmilewater will face the highly rated Ballygunner and while public perception of the gap in standards might show Ballygunner to be rated the odds on favourites, I believe that this will not be a David and Goliath affair and later on in this preview I will explain why I think so.

In the second match we should have a really splendid contest between two clubs, Mount Sion and Lismore who have contributed so very much to the club scene here in Waterford for a long time.

If there are decisions in both matches we will be ready for the county final on Sunday evening.

Mount Sion v. Lismore

They met recently and only a point separated them after a splendid contest in Leamybrien. Mount Sion, the county and Munster champions were without the services of Ken McGrath but also it was a game in which Lismore failed to take all the chances that presented themselves.

A final score of 2-14 to 2-13 showed how close the sides were at the finish after Lismore had failed to take a chance at goal with a very late free. It was quite a contest and a game that showed how close Lismore are to the champions.

Here in the 2003 county senior hurling championships Mt. Sion have so far done nothing

to expose themselves as county and Munster champions. It is fair to say that we have seen no comparison between them and the team which we cheered through Munster and on to the All Ireland semi-final in the Munster club championship.

Against Ardmore at Cappoquin in the first round they were lucky to survive by a single point. These are the only matches played by the reigning champions this year in our club championship.

Lismore on the other hand have come through to the semi-final the hard way and playing in the losers group, Sunday after Sunday in order to get another crack at Mount Sion, has been pretty rough on them, but to their credit there have been no complaints. They had to overcome Roanmore, Stradbally and finally, De La Salle to get back into the main stream of the championship.

As I have written about them before, they have no inhibitions about Mount Sion's record and regard themselves as being their equals in skill and standards.

Brendan Landers in goal is as good a net minder as there is in the county and Lismore have a solid enough defence with players of the calibre of

James O'Connor, Seamus Prendergast, Emmett Quann, Michael O'Sullivan, Patrick Fennessey and Billy Cunningham, David Howard and Eoin Bennett will likely field as partners in the middle of the field.

Lismore, when functioning properly, are as well served in attack as are Mount Sion. In fact if the full potential of their individual players like Dan

Shanahan, Dave Bennett and John Heneghan is fully realised they can beat the champions.

Having been given a rare fright by Lismore in the second round, Mount Sion will come to Dungarvan with all guns blazing and fiercely determined not to let the western challengers get quite so close on this occasion. They know that a close game towards the finish can favour Lismore as on this occasion I have no doubt but that Lismore will have far more support than Mount Sion.

So far this year, Mount Sion's 'big names' have not all lived up to their reputations and mediocre displays from some of their stars must be a source of worry to team manager Jim Greene and his co-selectors.

So far the champions have played just two matches and on each occasion they got by on a single point. Here in Fraher field on Sunday next there is a lot more at stake for them than there is for Lismore. Mount Sion are the county and provincial champions and defeat now would see them surrender both titles. So here, we might say the champions are fighting for their lives and can be depended upon to leave no stone unturned in a bid to overcome their western rivals and reach the county final once more.

On paper their team is loaded with hurling talent but if they go down here the profile of some of their stars could well take a nose dive.

Ian Regan who played in goal for the intermediate county team and might be considered a county team prospect will again guard the champions net.

Jamie O'Meara, Anthony Kir-

wan and Brian Flannery will be their fullback line and Tony Browne at centre half back will be flanked by John Cleere (who captained their team in the Munster final last year) and Brian Greene.

It is likely that Eoin Kelly and Roy McGrath will represent them in the middle of the field. With scoring forwards like Ken McGrath, Michael White, Eoin McGrath, Sean Ryan, John Meaney, Pauric Fanning, Barry Browne, etc available for selection, they certainly must be looked upon as favourites to retain their winning sequence. I find it hard to go against Mount Sion here, but I have no doubt either but that Lismore are in there with a chance.

Fourmilewater v. Ballygunner

I suppose it will be regarded as a big shock if Fourmilewater win this one. People might not mind too much if this happened, but for a long time to come the same people would be asking about 'what happened to Ballygunner??'

The 'Gunnery' got over their first round engagement against Roanmore without much bother. The score was 0-16 to 0-5 and that result did expose the gap between the sides. Ballygunner were much better (and had to be) when taking on De La Salle in the second round. After a testing first half, the favourites pulled away to win comfortably and deservedly by 2-15 to 1-7.

Against Ballyduff East in the opening game played at Leamybrien, Fourmilewater, after a slow start played very well in the second half, but their best form that I have seen from them so far was against Ballyduff west whom they defeated by 0-20 to 1-8. I wonder how much better Ballygunner would have done against the same opposition? They have a very well balanced side, they have a fair share of good players and are tremendously fit. Having all these going for them, must mean something.

Their line up will include Eoin Wall, John Moore, Aiden Ryan, Justin Walsh, Liam Lawlor, Ian Walsh, Brian Wall, Aiden O'Gorman, David Ryan, Rory Rice, Shane Walsh, Ger Walsh, David Spellman, Tom Flynn, etc. and every man on this selection, relishing the chance to get into a county final, can be expected to give one hundred

per cent in this battle.

Looking at the Ballygunner line up one cannot but feel that they will survive here. Every one of their fifteen have inter-county experience in some of the adult grades Their line out is going to have Ray Whitty in goal, Alan Kirwan at fullback and he will be flanked by Niall O'Donnell and Rory O'Sullivan. Fergal Hartley, the club's first All Star will be at centre half back and he will have Stephen Frampton and Colin Kehoe on either side of him.

Tom Fives and Andy Moloney may be at centre field and in attack they have the dynamic Paul Flynn, Billy O'Sullivan, newcomer Fergal Flynn, Paul Foley, Mick Mahony, etc.

With that kind of talent it is very difficult to oppose them, but I will be surprised if Fourmilewater do not run them much closer than most followers expect.

Dungarvan and Clashmore are due to meet on next Saturday to contest the first game in the senior football relegation series.

The game will be played at the Ring venue and the winners will remain in senior ranks next year while the losers will play Kilmacthomas and here the losers will go down to intermediate next year.

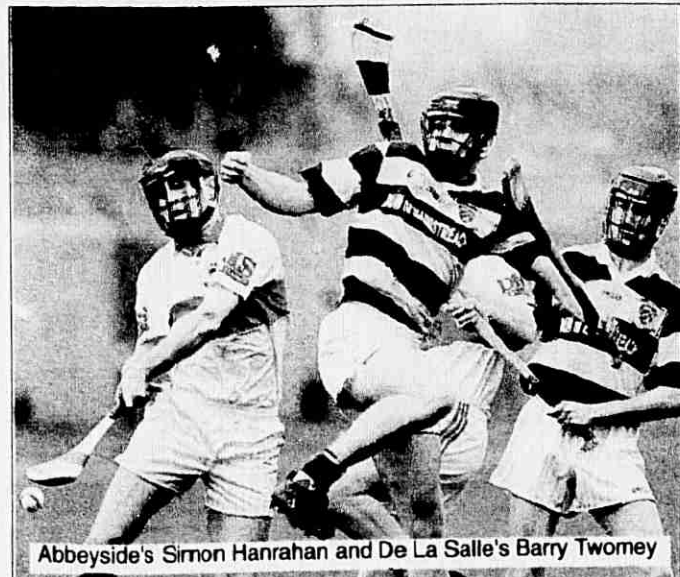

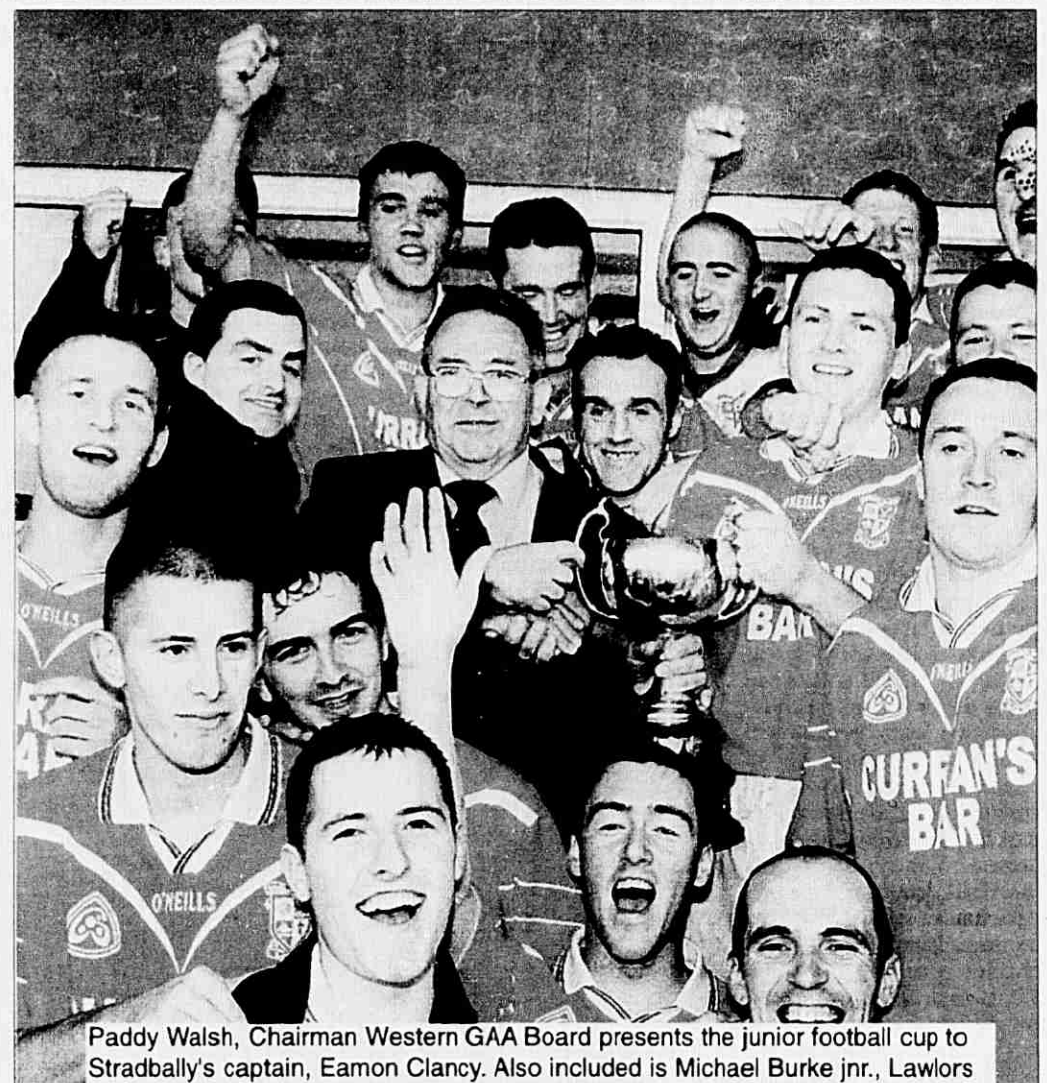
Already qualified for the senior county semi-final the "Reds" are now but one step away from winning a junior football title, having taken the Doocey Cup here on Sunday.

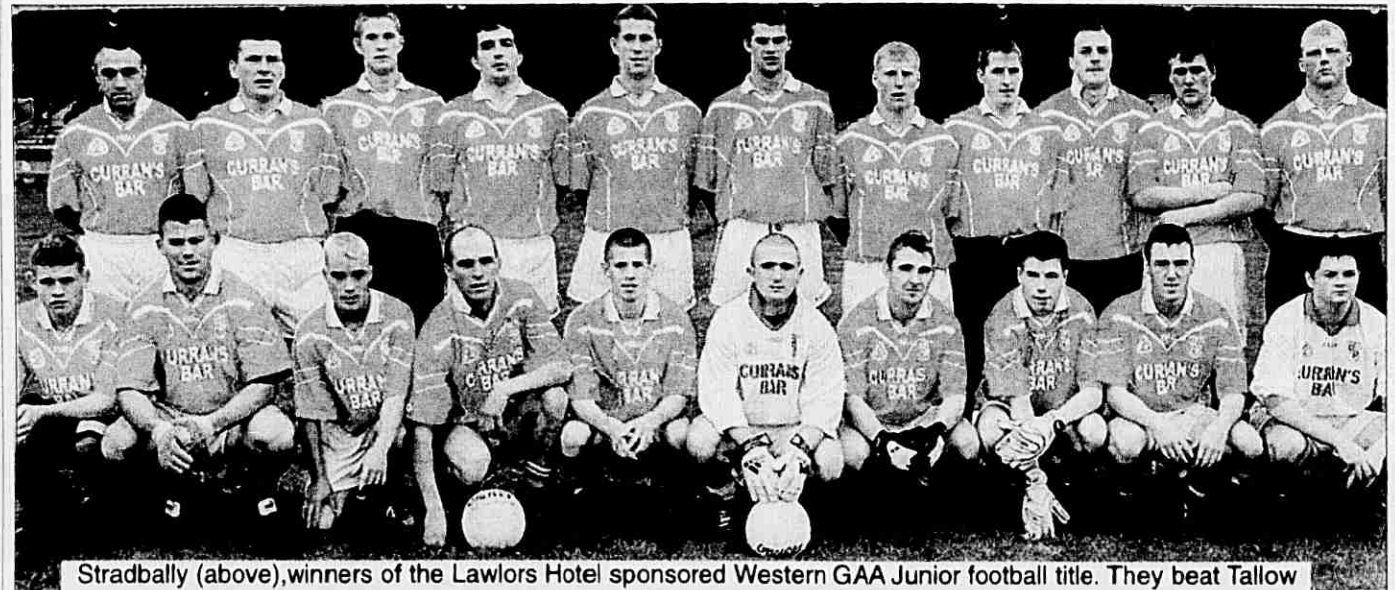
