





NEW FISHERIES DEAL CONDEMNED BY COUNCILLOR

Ring/Old Parish Udarás na Gaeltachta member Cllr. Fiachra O Céilleachair has rejected last week's claim by Marine Minister Dermot Ahern TD that the latest EU fisheries agreement reached in Luxembourg was a "success" and suggested, instead, that it could be seen as a sell out of the fishing industry.

Cllr. O Céilleachair says that fishermen throughout Co. Waterford will not see the downsizing by two-thirds of the protected Irish fishing zone as a "success". Cllr. O Ceilleachair says it's a pity that Minister Ahern could did not wait until he was in the Chair of the EU Fisheries Council from 1st January 2004 onwards, to agree any long-term proposals on the "Irish Box".

Clarifying his remarks, Cllr.

"The Irish Box as we previously knew it is no more. It has been reduced to one third of its previous size under this new arrangement, whilst our east and northwest coasts have been completely excluded and are now opened-up to the full EU fleet."

"An area responsible for 70% of domestic fishing has been vastly reduced and Irish fishermen now face the prospect of competing vigorously with foreign trawlers in waters that were previously their own. Furthermore, fishermen operating in the northwest and the east are fearful that they will not be given a licence to fish in the new protected zone, as they may not have a recent track record in the area."

"In fact Minister Dermot

Ahern's description of the latest outcome as 'successfully securing a new Irish Conservation Box' is in complete contradiction to an earlier statement from him when he expressed determination to secure 'necessary improvements' to the proposals that led to this agreement." "Whilst the Minister attempts to sell this shoddy deal, he knows it may be the death knell for Irish fishing. The Spanish government's militancy in their calls for the Box's entire abolition should have been met with steadfast determination on the Irish government's part to preserve the Box and defend the Irish legal position.

"The Labour Party has called on Minister Ahern to match Spain's reported determination to seek the entire abolition of the Box in the Courts by lodging a similar appeal to preserve it."

The Minister may well have sold-out the fishing industry. His attempts to make it sound like good news is an appalling derogation of his duty to protect Irish fishermen in my view".



Muriel Bowen

Muriel Bowen was born in Clonea Castle near Dungarvan in 1926. John K. Bowen and Nancy (nee Ryan of Ballyslateen House in Tipperary) leave your details into Dungar- moved to Clonea Castle follow-

ing their marriage in 1920. The Conservatives in the 1955 Gen-Bowen family originated in Co. Cork and her father's branch of the family settled around the Kinsale area.

John Kingston Bowen (b.1888-d.1944) was appointed County Waterford Surveyor in 1915. He was particularly responsible for upgrading the road system for County Waterford. He repaired the Road Bridge at Ballyvoile after it was severely damaged by the I.R.A. in 1922. In 1936 John K. Bowen purchased Ballinaparka House near Villierstown. His widow sold the house in 1949 to the Marquess of Conying-

Muriel was educated at the Sacred Heart Convent, Mount Annville and at Trinity College,

In 1954 she wrote 'Irish Hunting' illustrated by Lionel Edwards. In the introduction she gives her address as 8 Ailesbury Road, Dublin. The book jacket states that she was then on the staff of the Daily Express, London. She became interested in politics and was an unsuccessful candidate for the eral Election.

Muriel Bowen worked for the Horse and Hound and the Sunday Times. She was also a successful show rider, winning 8 All-England titles in show classes, including the Cob Championship at the Royal International Horse Shows of 1979 and 1980. She was a respected equestrian journalist and died in August 2000.



SKIN CARE from teens to forties

A look at care and treatment for common age-related skin problems.

Everyone's skin is different. Add in the changes that occur with age and sun exposure and it's easy to see why proper skin care needs to be customised to meet the ever-changing conditions of your skin.

As the body's largest organ, the skin serves as our first line of defence in protecting ourselves from the elements. Unfortunately, as the most visible organ, it is easy to observe the daily wear and tear that our skin endures. That is why it is so crucial to take good care of our skin. Age specific, comprehensive skin care regimens play a major role in enhancing the quality and health of our skin so that it can protect and beautify us.

So what can be done to help our skin as it ages through the teenage and adult years? The natural ageing process causes skin looseness and diminished elasticity. However, most ageing changes – fine lines and wrinkles, pigmentation irregularities – all signal damage from accumulated sun exposure, a condition known as photoageing. The technology to protect skin and prevent the visible signs of ageing is a rapidly developing science and steps need to be taken early in age to achieve optimum results.

Teenage Years

From as early as age 9 for some children, a rise in hormones causes an increase in the skin's oil production, which can lead to acne and blemishes when skin cells, dirt and oil become trapped in pores. Proper skin care is the first step to keeping the skin clear. Use of gentle cleansers and light moisturisers containing poly hydroxyacids (PHA's), like gluconolactone – the patented ingredient found in NeoStrata skin care products, can keep the skin clean and clear by removing dirt and oils and can help cleanse clogged pores. Daily use of SPF15 sunscreens are recommended – to make your routine easy, apply a facial moisturiser with SPF15 every morning.

If acne becomes a problem, certain products can help treat the condition. Products that contain alpha or poly hydroxyacids (AHA's or PHA's) can be used adjunctively with anti-acne products to cleanse pores and help prevent breakouts. Acne treatment products, such as those that contain salicylic acid or prescription treatments are also helpful.

Thirties

During the late twenties and early thirties, signs of premature ageing from previous sun exposure may surface. This is the time to take skin care to the next level, including a comprehensive regimen of cleansing, moisturising, exfoliating and occasional professional facials (including glycolic acid treatments). AHA's and PHA's, when used properly and regularly, can help diminish the signs of premature ageing, by gently removing the most superficial layers of the skin and revealing healthier, younger-looking skin.

Forties

The dryness and ageing skin imperfections noticed during the thirties are often exacerbated during this next decade. Counteracting the drying forces of nature, as well as photoageing and other environmental factors, becomes crucial. 

It is very popular among holidaymakers, day-trippers and people skiing in France.



Gardai Attempting To Track Source Of Lismore Oil Spill

Gardai and Waterford County Council are attempting to track the lorry believed to be responsible for the latest major oil spillage in the County, which Fire Officers in Lismore described as "quite dangerous."

Sub-Officer with Lismore Fire Brigade, Martin Landers, said they were notified about the oil spillage at the Ballyduff junction on the bridge at Lismore at around 3.45 pm on Thursday last.

A second 50-metre stretch of road at the entrance to Lismore Golf Club was also affected, and is believed to have come from the same source.

A number of minor incidents occurred on both stretches of road, but no accident occurred as the result of the spillage.

Sub-officer, Martin Landers, said Cappoquin Fire Brigade gave assistance at the scene, while Gardai and County Council officials were also in attendance.

The road was cleared of oil by around 6.30pm, and Gardai are said to be attempting to track the source of the spillage in an attempt to charge them with the cost of the clean-up operation.





Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Pots will clear up your clutter!

PLANTS are beautiful and natural, but they do take up a lot of space - so what's the alternative? You can be a spot-on gardener, but it's incredibly difficult to achieve a balance between lots of luscious looking plants and a large clutter-free patio.

The answer is planting your vegetation in pots, but a mass of pots can still get out of hand.

Planting in containers becomes compulsive, and before you know it there's no room left for you to sit down, relax and enjoy your plants. Try out some of these cheap and yet still stylish ideas to help you reclaim your patio.

Move plants off ground level and display them on tiered stands or shelves.

This frees up floor space and displays plants nearer to eye level, which means they can be viewed to their full advantage.

A step-ladder is a simple and yet effective container stand.

Plants can be viewed from ground level right the way up above headheight and they are easier to maintain because they are concentrated into a smaller area.

This idea is great for exploring a theme - maybe your garden is crying out for a herb garden but you just don't have the space. Try erecting shelves on two or three levels against the wall of your house or shed. Paint the shelves in a bright and cheerful colour and then add plants to match - in complementary colours. Pansies are ideal for this with and they will provide some much welcome colour thoughout the winter months... The very latest in the "hanging" category is not baskets but pots! Pot holders, which can be screwed to the wall, range from the virtually invisible to the outstandingly obvious and beautiful. An alternative to building spacesaving shelves is to organise your containers effectively.

Small groups of pots, which can be sorted by colour or plant type or container style, are much easier to maintain and catch the eye. So get busy now and start organising those plants and reclaiming your patio!

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Protect your outdoor chrysanthemums

If any of the early-flowering border chrysanthemums are still flowering well, it will be advisable to rig up a temporary shelter over them. Drive a few strong stakes, about 1.5m in length, into the bed at convenient points, and join them across the top with horizontal bars nailed or tied in position. Throw some sacking over them on frosty nights, making it secure at the corners with string. It does not take much to keep off light frosts capable of ruining the flowers and buds.

Pot on cinerarias and stocks

Cinerarias sown during the third week in June are likely to be in need of a move into larger containers. Give them 13cm pots and the same compost as before, but a little coarser in texture. You can keep them in a frame for a few weeks if you close it early in the afternoon and cover with sacks on cold nights, but they will soon be moved into the

Pot a final batch of freesias

This is the time to make a last potting of freesias to flower in the spring. Place six corms in a 13cm pot in John Innes No.1 or a peat-based potting compost. Bury the corms 2.5cm deep then stand the pots in a frame. Water moderately, shade from direct sunshine and protect from frost.

Plant spring cabbage

Plant as many spring cabbage seedlings as possible. If you made an August sowing and there are seedlings left after the middle of October, do not move them until February.

Complete earthing up of late celery and leeks

Complete earthing of celery as soon as possible. Sometimes rust appears on the leaves. Prompt removal of affected plants, followed by spraying with Bordeaux mixture, will keep it in check. Leeks should also be earthed up for the last time. The longer the length of fully blanched stem obtained, the better.

Up to fifty personal injury claims are slapped on Waterford County Council a year, with some of the claims lodged as long as eighteen months after the alleged injuries were sustained, it has emerged.

Speaking at the July meeting of Waterford County Council, Paul Clerkin, Head of Finance, admitted that the spiralling cost of insurance is a "cause of major concern" for local authorities as well as businesses.

gather their claim. Roads and footpaths have tended to be the biggest areas of concern we have, and anywhere there is any indent in a footpath, there is a potential claim there.

DUNGARVAN TOWN COUNCIL

Mr. Clerkin's comments prompted a notice of motion at last Monday nights meeting of Dungarvan Town Council calling for officials to keep members of the council informed of all aspects of any insurance

In proposing the motion, Cllr. Geoghegan stated that; "Everybody is aware how expensive insurance has become over the formed as to the number of claims or the nature of any claims that are taken against the council in a given period."

"The present situation I feel is totally unsatisfactory, whereby as members of the town council, we don't know the extent of the situation regarding insurance claims, we don't know the nature and background to these claims, and therefore we can't make any judgements as to whether we may have a problem in this regard in Dungarvan, as they do in other towns."

In other towns such as Tralee, he added, the Town Council has gone down the route of printing the names of any person making a claim for damages against the council.

"Yet," he said, "in Dungarvan,

the members aren't kept informed of the situation - this has to be rectified immediate-

It was later pointed out by past number of years...yet as Cllr. Michael O'Riordan that council members we are not in- the majority of cases appear to be settled outside court, which Cllr. Geoghegan argued was an example of people seeing public liability as an easy way to make money.

However, the dangers from a legal point of view, in members of the council, and the media being made aware of an ongoing case before it has been dealt with in court, were highlighted by Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab).

There is a danger there, that if some information got out while a case was ongoing, that it could have legal repercussions," he said.

But, County Manager, Donal Connolly said there is "no great secret about the cases going to court," adding that he would have no problem with keeping members informed.



EARTHQUAKES

When the earth's plates collide together or pull apart, we feel the movement as earthquakes. Most earth quakes happen along the edges of tectonic plates. In a small quake, the plates move just a fraction, but a major earthquake can shake the ground so violently that buildings collapse and many people may be injured or killed. There can be after-shocks for days, or months, after a major earthquake.

TIDAL WAVES ARE CAUSED BY EARTHQUAKES UNDER THE SEA

When an earthquake shakes land under the sea, the vibrations it causes can set off tidal waves called tsunamis. Tsunamis can cross oceans and flood land far away from the earthquake's epicentre. They can travel at speeds of several hundred kilometres (miles) an hour and when they reach shallow water near a coastline, they can build up waves 30m (90ft) high, which flood the land causing havoc and destruction. A tsunami that hit the coast of Bengal in 1873 killed 200,000 people.



MOVEMENTS IN THE EARTH'S CRUST CAUSE EARTHQUAKES

Earthquakes are also caused by movements in the Earth's crust, making rocks crack into blocks and slide past each other. These cracks are called faults. One famous fault is the San Andreas Fault in California, USA.

THE PACIFIC OCEAN IS SURROUNDED BY A RING OF FIRE

The zone around the Pacific Ocean is known as the 'Ring of Fire' because most of the world's earthquakes and volcanoes happen here, where several of the Earth's tectonic plates meet.

SCIENTISTS PREDICT WHEN EARTHQUAKES WILL HAPPEN

For thousands of years, people have tried to predict when earthquakes will happen. They looked for signs in nature, such as animals behaving strangely. The ancient Chinese were the first to invent instruments to detect earthquakes. Today scientists use satellites to detect hotspots on the earth's surface where earthquakes or volcanoes may happen. They use seismographs and seismometers to detect and measure vibrations made by earthquakes.

Did You Know?

In 1935, the scientist Charles F. Richter (1900-1985) worked out a scale for measuring the energy released during earthquakes. On the Richter scale, earthquakes are measured in magnitudes, with each one 30 times greater than the last. Another scale of measurement, the Mercalli scale, is based on the effects of earthquakes. A Mercalli Ill earthquake rattles windows, while the top of the scale, Mercalli XII, destroys whole areas.

"Hoax and deliberate fires could cost lives," he warned. 'We're already seeing kids carrying tyres around for bonfires. What happens in some cases is that one group burns the tyres and rubber gathered by another group. Then the first group calls out the fire brigade to put it out, and sets the other group's materials alight."

'It's a fairly common occurrence countrywide," he said.

However, the cost of the callouts, estimated at between 500 to 1,000 euros will fall on the local authority to pay, and Assistant CFO O'Brien also warned that had a fire which endangered people's lives oc-

curred at the same time, the occurrence and, said they were consequences could have been tragio

> He said a house fire occurred in Stradbally at 10.22 pm the same night, which required the Dungarvan Brigade to attend in back up to the Kilmacthomas Brigade.

> 'It would have been extremely serious, if the brigade was diverted to a tree fire which in all probability was set alight deliberately," he said.

> The fire occurred in the upstairs bedroom of a house in Stradbally, and the female occupant evacuated the house when the fire alarm went off.

"It was another example of a fire alarm saving a persons life," the Assistant CFO said. "It should also act as a remainder to people to regularly check their fire alarms."



CONCERNS OVER PROPOSED BARNAKILL MAST



The proposal to construct another telecommunications mast at Barnakill, Kilrossanty, is causing a great deal of concern, according to Cllr.

A number of masts are already in the area, and Cllr. Cunningham (FF) asked the council to take a stringent line on the O2 plans.

Cllr. Cunningham's comments were echoed by Cllr. Ger Barron (Lab), who said the application is for an area on the Comeragh Mountains in a small beautiful rural area. There is also a cross on the mountain near

Cunningham where the telecommunications mast is proposed to go, and Cllr. Barron argued that the mast would take away from the simple beauty of the cross.

"I've never seen people so against something in the area, as they are against this mast," he said.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy, said the planning authority has just received the application from O2, and that as it hasn't been processed yet, it is too early to comment. Meanwhile, County Manager, Donal Connolly said that it is the council's position that where possible it is preferable to co-locate masts on already existing ones.

Oral Hearing To Be Held Into "Superdump"

Director of Services, with Waterford County Council, Denis McCarthy has confirmed that An Bord Pleanala intend to hold an oral hearing into the proposed Lickey Valley "Superdump".

The oral hearing was requested by one of the objectors to the project, and according to Mr. McCarthy the decision to grant it is not unexpected, and Oral Hearings for landfills proposals are quite normal.

"No date has been set for the hearing," he added.

Ballinroad Affordable Houses Should **Be Built Up-Front**

Labour Cllr. Billy Kyne has called for the construction of a number of affordable and social houses to be built up front, rather than be left to come on stream sometime in 2005.

He said the developers, by leaving the affordable aspect of the development until 2005 were going against the spirit of the agreement. The housing development in Ballinroad is to include ten affordable hous-

es and six social houses. Director of Services, Peter Carey said the agreement pertained to affordable units throughout the development, so it would be impossible to build all these houses up-front. "We can't force the developers to frontload affordable houses," he said.

nineteenth century the custom of holding Eucharistic processions at Corpus Christi sixty days after Easter Sunday began. In June 1888 there was a press report of processions in various chapels in the area including Abbeyside. Later on these were succeeded by one great procession through the town of Dun-

The Parishioners of Abbeyside marched from the Pond and joined their counterparts in Dungarvan outside St. Mary's Parish Church. This custom lasted into the second half of the 20th. Century.

By 1894 the CYMS, the Catholic Young Men's Society, had become a part of Dungarvan life. The various branches throughout Irish towns provided a meeting place for young men where they could avoid the public houses.

In April a concert was held in the Town Hall to provide funds for the local branch. Before Christmas 1899 the parish priest of Dungarvan, Rev. Francis O'Brien appointed in 1894,

In the last two decades of the preached a typical sermon on the evils of excessive drinking, which was one that needed to be given.

In 1884 the Gaelic Athletic Association was founded in Thurles to revive Gaelic games, above all, hurling.

One of the earliest clubs founded was in Dungarvan. In Ryan are current elected mem-March 1886 one of the op Croke, visited Dungarvan. He praised the members for their support of Home Rule: "We will beat them out of the field of manly exercise as we will beat them out of the field of politics, he said in a public address.

More specifically he stated' it is a satisfaction to know that the time is coming when the old Parliament House will be open again." He also praised the GAA for promoting a game that kept fine big men from idling their time with their hands in their pockets lounging against a fence. He thus expressed neatly the dual aims of the GAA, one concerned with sport and the other with nationalist politics.

Roadside Signage/ Advertising

Clubs and organisations in the Abbeyside area are advised of new regulations regarding the erection of advertisements announcing any local event of a religious, cultural, educational, political, social, recreational or sporting character.

The regulations governing such advertisements are as follows: No such advertisement shall exceed 1.2 square metres

- (b) No such advertisement shall be exhibited more than 2.5 metres above ground level or be glued, pasted or other wise affixed to any structure other than an
- advertisement structure. No such advertisement shall be left in place, for more than seven days after the conclusion of the event or matter to which it relates

In the future signs advertising local events will be strictly regulated with conditions to include the following:

Applications to the Council to erect signage must be made at least three weeks in advance of the event.

Applications must be accompanied by maps showing the number and proposed location of signs

Signs must not cause a distraction to motorists Signs must not obscure any existing road signs. Signs must not create a risk of litter pollution. Signs must be securely fixed and maintained.

Signs shall not resemble statutory road signs. Community organisations should be aware that most of the signage on roadsides and poles is contrary to Planning and Environmental Legislation and hopefully the people of Abbeyside and environs will lead the way in respecting such legislation.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

If my employer sells his business, does the new employer have to employ me?

ANSWER

Yes, if the business continues to operate as before.

Under Statutory Instrument 131/2003 - European Communities (Protection of Employees on Transfer of Undertakings) Regulations 2003 - where a business is sold as a going concern the interests of existing employees are protected at the time of the changeover. This means that the new employer must honour your contract of employment, with the exception of pensions, but including rates of pay, hours of work, annual leave entitlements, continuous service and so on. Where only part of the business is sold the employees working in that part are protected in the same way as if the entire business was sold. Neither your previous or new employer can use the fact of the sale as a justification for dismissing you, unless there are valid economic, technical or organisational grounds justifying changes in the workforce. Dismissal on such grounds is redundancy and you might be entitled to a redundancy lump sum.

You could challenge, in an unfair dismissal claim, that the changes in the workforce are justified on any of these grounds. You can take a claim for unfair dismissal to either of the following.

FOREIGN LOTTERIES

We have all received promotional material regarding foreign lotteries and we are very tempted by the prizes on offer. However, before you proceed to hand over your credit card details and personal information perhaps you should take the following warning from the European Consumer Centre in Dublin into consideration.

The European Consumer Centre in Dublin has seen a huge increase in the past year of Irish consumers complaining about foreign lotteries.

With most of these lotteries you are told in the promotional material that you have won a major prize. To claim the prize however, you must submit personal details and very often credit card information. But if you read the small print it indicates that you have only entered into a prize draw and money will be debited from the credit card to pay for administration fees and lottery tickets.

The warning from the European Consumer Centre in Dublin is to be wary of these lotteries and consumers should note that:

Legitimate lottery operators do not ask for administration

Never provide personal identity information to an unknown third party.

In common with many of your readers in Dungarvan and throughout Co. Waterford, I welcome the waste awareness campaign entitled 'Race Against Waste' launched by Waterford Environment Minister Martin Cullen TD last week.

However, your readers should be asking themselves as to what contribution the Government itself is making for the provision of a recycling infrastructure to match?

The waste awareness campaign will certainly make individuals here in Waterford and other counties more conscious of their own responsibility to reduce waste and to recycle. Dungarvan Town and Waterford County and City Councils, through kerbside recycleable collections and other facilities, are enabled to assist this.

For instance, paper collected for recycling in the Republic of Ireland is sent to the Far East; plastic to the UK; Tetra Pak to Scotland and glass to Northern Ireland. I would ask your readers to consider that frightening advertisements calling on people to recycle more are pointless unless there is somewhere for the recycling to be done.

MARFAN SYNDROME

'Marfan Syndrome Awareness Campaign in Ireland': What is Marfan Syndrome?

Marfan Syndrome is an inherited condition that affects the connective tissue. The primary purpose of connective tissue is to hold the body together and provide a framework for growth and development. In Marfan syndrome, the connective tissue is defective and does not act as it should. Because connective tissue is found throughout the body, Marfan syndrome can affect many body systems, including the skeleton, eyes, heart and blood vessels, nervous system, skin and lungs. It can affect men, women and children and has been found among people of all races and ethnic backgrounds.

What are the characteristics of Marfan Syndrome?

Marfan syndrome affects different people in different ways; symptoms can vary from mild, to severe. In most cases, the symptoms progress as the person ages. The main symptoms of Marfan syndrome are as follows:

- Very tall in height, with a thin physique, disproportionately long limbs.
- Emphysema
- Asthma
- Short sighted
- Squinting
- Joint hypermobility or contractures and dislocations (double jointed)
- Crowded teeth
- Abnormally shaped narrow chest

What causes Marfan Syndrome?

Marfan Syndrome is caused by a defeat (mutation) in the gene that determines the structure of fibrillin, a protein that is an important part of connective tissue. A person with Marfan Syndrome is born with the disorder, even though it may not be diagnosed until later in life. Although everyone with Marfan Syndrome has a defect in the same gene, the mutation is specific to each family and not everyone experiences the same characteristics to the same degree.

How is Marfan Syndrome diagnosed?

There is no specific laboratory test, such as a blood test or skin biopsy, to diagnose this disability. Medical professionals have to rely on observations and a complete medical history of the person such as:

- Information about any family member who may have the disability or who had an early, unexplained heart-
- A thorough physical examination, including an evaluation of the skeletal frame for the ratio of arm/leg size to trunk size
- An eye examination
- Heart tests such as and echocardiogram (a test that uses ultrasound waves to examine the heart and aorta

What treatments are available and what is the outlook of Marian Syndrome?

There is currently no cure for Marfan syndrome, but there is a range of treatments that can minimize and sometimes prevent complications. Early diagnosis and advances in medical technology have improved the quality of life for people with this disability. Early identification of risk factors, such as Aortic dilation allows medical professionals to intervene and prevent or delay complications. Advances being made by researchers provide hope for



They discovered that 60% of the waste was primarily paper, with approx. 40% being food. "As adults it is difficult to break our habits but the children adapted immediately" said Ms. Fitzgerald as she announced the remarkable achievements of the pupils. School Principal Anne Henneberry said that the target was to reduce waste going to landfill by 50%, but the pupils surpassed expectations achieving a 100% reduction on waste to landfill.

WHERE THE WASTE GOES

Shredded paper from the school is used for bedding with local greyhounds, cans and bottles are recycled, and food was collected by pupil David Claxton for the pigs at home, 'Claxton's pigs must be the best fed pigs in the County' said Ms. Henneberry. The project was supported by the Envi-ronment Department of Waterford County Council, who were represented at the ceremony by Sinéad Breathnach and Eilish Corr.



UNDER 21 FOOTBALL REPORT

In a lengthy report from the under 21 county selectors they gave a detailed account of the games played, the winning of the Munster final and the All Ireland semi-final game against Dublin in Thurles The report expressed disappointment that some games were not postponed before the Dublin match. The matter of their role as selectors was also mentioned in the full report.

The chairman, again complimented the selectors for having guided the team to an historic victory and delegates also spoke in praise of the team and management.

OTHER ITEMS

The chairman informed the delegates that two new mowers were being purchased for servicing Fraher field and Walsh Park. He said that Coisde Gnotha had decided that the minor camogie team who recently won the All Ireland title, will be paraded before the crowd at the county senior hurling final.

A new county crest was being recommended by the executive committee. This was being done on legal advice and the crest will now be registered. The board gave the proposal their unanimous approval.

The chairman informed the meeting that a letter had been received from the Nire juvenile club complaining that their under 14 football county final against De La Salle had been fixed for Walsh Park, whereas this was the year in which all football county finals should, according to bye law, be played at Western venues.

It was explained that because of the non availability of Fraher field for six months, County Bord na nOg had decided to notify all clubs that all county finals would this year, be played in Walsh Park and at Fraher field in the following year. It was decided that nothing could be done in this case but that in future the bye-laws should be adhered to.

MUNSTER CLUB FOOTBALL

The chairman informed the delegates that our new football champions will not take part in the Munster club football this year as we will not have our championship completed in time to play our scheduled first round match against the Cork champions on November 2nd. Cork did agree to put the game back to November 9th, but it could not be postponed beyond this as it would interfere with the provincial club programme.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

Public Liability Insurance premiums will increase by 20% in the new year. The other Insurances will remain unchanged.

Waterford's allocation from the Qualifiers are as follows—hurling 34, 000 euro (last year this figure was 16,000 euro). Football is 35,000 euro and was 38,000 last season. Our total from the two Qualifier competitions is 59,000 euro. (we played only 2 games, one in hurling and football).

It was to be noted that a player sent off, having received a direct Red Card, will stand suspended for a minimum of one month and will miss his next match-regardless of how long this is even if it goes out the suspension period.
