## Council "Test The Water" For Marina Development

**MARINA ON ITS OWN PROBABLY A NON-STARTER SAYS TOWN CLERK**

Dungarvan Town Council is to invite proposals for the development of a marina this week, in what may be the first significant advance in the local authority's harbour plans for over ten years.

However, Town Clerk, Brian White has revealed that the development of a marina on its own may not be financially viable for private sector developers.

The Town Council is advertising for proposals for the design, construction and maintenance of a marina, with the capacity to accommodate existing harbour users and visitors, and which would cater for future demand.

The process has been described as a "testing of the waters" for private sector interest.

Plans for a marina have been

shelved on a number of occasions in the past decade. But, interest was sparked again, when a private sector developer proposed its go-ahead.

The developer, who has re-

mained unnamed since his meeting with the County Manager, Donal Connolly some months ago, is said to have personal connections with Dungarvan. (continued on pg. 4)

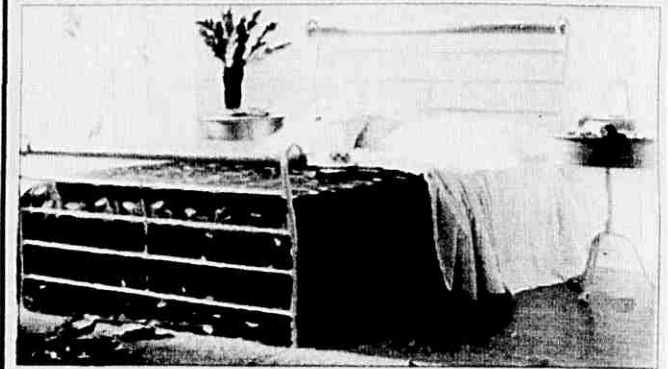

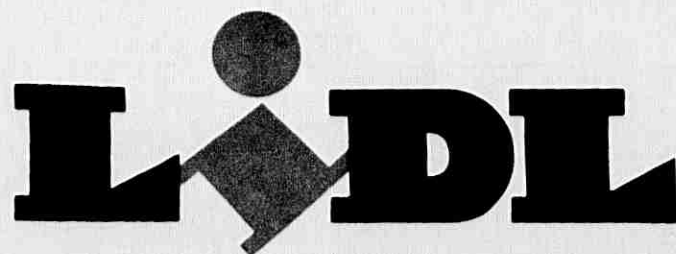

## Neil and Joan Hurley Runners Up In Quality Milk Awards

Local farming partnership, Neil and Joan Hurley of Ballyetra, Dungarvan, have picked up prize money of 1,500 along with a trophy and certificate for their achievements as runner-up in the All-Ireland Pfizer Quality Milk Awards 2003.

Neil and Joan attended an exclusive awards ceremony at the O'Reilly Hall, University College Dublin, where Noel Treacy, TD, Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture and Food, presented the awards which also included certificates for their veterinary surgeon, Pat Morrissey at Riverside Veterinary Clinic, and their Co-op, Glanbia Agribusiness.

"This is the first time we've entered the award but it's always been a dream of ours", said Neil. "Quality milk is not down to chance, it's about having the know-how and the experience."

During the last five years, the Hurleys have made many improvements to their farm, including building a slotted unit, a cosy feed system, a maternity calving area, and upgrading the cubicle housing and the milking machine.

"Each year we have a routine vaccination programme for leptospirosis and salmonella, and we continue with a closed herd policy", said Neil. "In the last five years we have reduced our SCC counts from 142,000 to 98,000, achieved by acting on information from our detailed milk recording data."

This year sees the Quality Milk Award celebrating its 20th anniversary, of which Chair of Judges, Damien Barrett, MVB, CertCHP, said: "To find farmers with such a strong vision for the future along with a focused approach towards the importance of herd health and hygiene, is a welcome attitude."

Neil explained that the trick is keeping his cows in top condition: "It's about managing them better with close monitoring.

We've improved our protein, we feed grass as much as possible and try to put the cows out into grazing as early as January", he said.

When there is a need for antibiotic treatment, the Hurley's use Excenel RTU for foul in the foot, as it works effectively with the benefits of zero milk withdrawal. They also opt for leading mastitis therapies Tetra-Delta, Pirsue or Synulox LC if faced with an outbreak.

While the developer lives in England where he runs a large earth moving contracting company, it's believed he wishes to retire to live in Abbeyside.

**SPECULATION  
OVER  
LAND-SWAP**

Speculation has surrounded his plans for a marina, including that it would be located in the inner harbour close to the Causeway. It's also thought that the developer's plans had in-

cluded a proposed land-swap deal for the development of apartments on Walton's Park.

Speaking yesterday, Town Clerk, Brian White, said there is clear evidence from a number of expert bodies that a marina on its own is "probably a non-starter."

"Most marina's are ancillary to other developments - shore based developments. We're letting it wide open to the private sector or consortiums to put their proposals to us and come back to us, and we'll consider whatever they submit."

However, he said there is no commitment to go ahead with any development if a suitable proposal is not found.

**ACID TEST**

Meanwhile, the submissions phase has been described as an acid test for the marina by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Indp).

"We've been talking about a marina in Dungarvan for the past ten years," he said. "But we haven't gotten any further along the road. It's time now we test the waters for private sector interest in this project."

"I would welcome (the start of the submissions process) for the simple reason that there has been quite a bit of confusion about what's planned. People are talking about developments on Walton's Park, when they should be talking about the development of a Marina," he said.

Mr. White, meanwhile, said he wouldn't underestimate the difficulties of developing a marina.

"We're at a very early stage. Nothing is ruled in or out at the moment. But, at least we're going the route of seeking proposals and we're aware that at least one developer out there is interested and will advance a submission."

However, a series of public consultation phases have to be undertaken before any proposal can go ahead. An Environmental Impact Statement would have to be drawn up, and a license from the Department of the Marine must be granted.

"I wouldn't underestimate the technical difficulties in getting this off the ground," he said.

**PRIVATE  
SECTOR**

But, he added that a private sector development is the only way the Dungarvan Town Council can proceed.

"The local authority simply hasn't the funds to dredge the harbour, and build a marina."

The Town Council has already engaged the services of a leading marine consultant, Kirk McClure, from Belfast, who has been involved in the development of marina's in Dunmore East and Cork.

Mr. McClure will select the proposal, if any, which is best suited to Dungarvan Harbour, Mr. White said.

The submissions process is expected to conclude in around two months time. After the consultant rules on the best proposal it is then likely to be passed onto the members of Dungarvan Town Council, to deliberate on whether to advance with their plans or not.

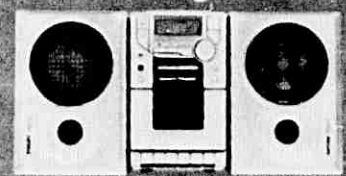

### Cllr. Blasts Vexatious Appeals Lodged For Greedy Purposes

Dungarvan Town Councillor, and one of the areas leading architects, Damien Dillon, has blasted the current planning appeals process. An Bord Pleanála, and the "mercenary nature" of some appeals, in a hard hitting letter to Minister, Martin Cullen.

Cllr. Dillon was writing in support of Minister Cullen's proposed setting up of a National Infrastructure Board to fast-track projects of vital national importance.

And, in the letter, Cllr. Dillon has claimed the board will only be criticised by those whose aim it is to "hamper progress

for their own selfish purposes or greed."

He also poured scorn on An Bord Pleanála's recent claims that they are doing 80% of appeals within the statutory time frame of 18 weeks.

"The vast majority of applications are for trussed out toilets, or one off houses in the country or simple commercial/industrial extensions," he argues.

"A first year planning student would be capable of reading the file in about 10 minutes; have a grasp of the content - if he had to go to Donegal to see the site, he could do that in a day, and report by the following day..." he stated.

He went on to call for some important private sector developments - such as the shopping complex development in Dungarvan - to be included in the fast-track process.

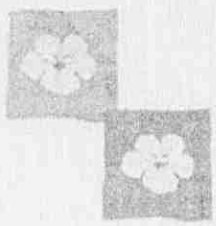
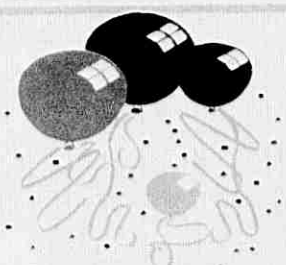

# COOKERY CORNER

## Chilli chicken loaf

TRY this as a delicious starter for your next dinner party.

Preparation: 30 mins  
Cooking: 1 hour 15 mins  
Chilling: Overnight

Ingredients  
(Serves 6)

- 6 whole chicken breasts – boned, skinned and cut into 4
- olive oil
- 2 onions, sliced and separated into rings
- 2 tomatoes, peeled and sliced
- 3 tbsps pimento, chopped
- 12 pepper corns
- 1 tspn salt
- 1 cup dry white wine
- Dressing:
- 50ml reserved liquid from chicken
- 50ml olive oil
- 25ml vinegar
- 1 tspn tomato juice
- 1/4 tspn salt
- pinch cayenne pepper
- Garnish:
- fresh coriander
- black olives
- 2 hard boiled eggs, sliced

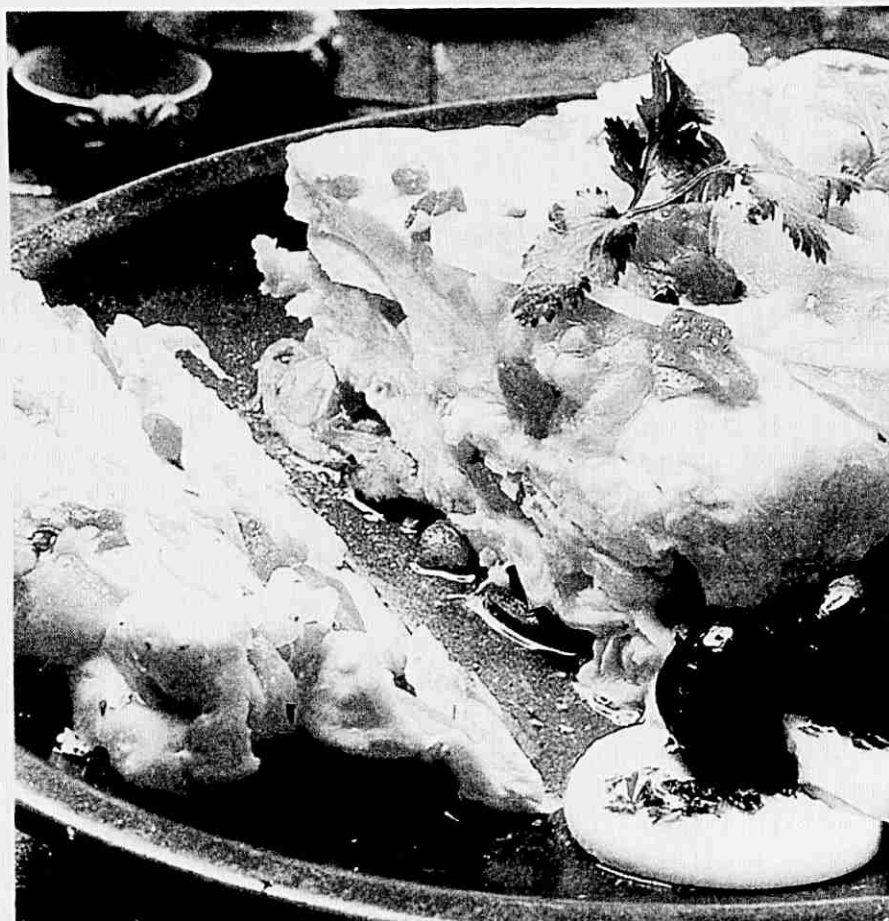
SET oven temperature to 160C. Brush a 7 1/2 cup capacity loaf tin with olive oil. Arrange one third of the chicken in a layer on the bottom of the tin. Place one third of the onion rings, tomato slices, pimento, pepper-corns and salt over the chicken.

Repeat layering until all ingredients are used, ending with a layer of tomatoes. Pour in the wine. Cover loaf tin with foil and cook in the preheated oven for one hour.

Remove foil and cook a further 15 minutes. Cool the chicken quickly in the tin by standing in iced water. When cool, place in the refrigerator and chill over night. Pour off excess liquid and reserve half

cup for the dressing and return the chicken to the refrigerator until ready to serve. Make up the dressing by combining all the ingredients and chill until ready to serve.

To serve: Unmould chicken on to a platter. Serve with dressing separately and garnish it with fresh coriander, black olives and sliced hard boiled egg



## Dice with carrots and yoghurt

CARROTS and yoghurt may seem unlikely bedfellows but this dish makes an tasty change.

Preparation: 15 mins  
Cooking: 20 mins

- Ingredients  
(Serves 4)
- 500g carrots
- Salt and black pepper
- 1 tbspn flour
- 2 tbspn olive oil
- 250 ml natural yogurt
- 1 tbspn chopped mint

PEEL or scrape the carrots and wash them. Cut them, crossways into 1 cm thick slices. Bring a pan of salted water to the boil and cook the car-

rots for about 10 minutes until nearly tender. Drain in a colander, then spread carrots on kitchen paper to dry thoroughly. Toss the carrots in seasoned flour, shaking off any surplus. Heat the oil in a heavy-based pan and fry the carrots over moderate heat until golden brown. Season to taste with salt and ground black pepper. Put the yogurt in a separate pan over low heat, and let it warm through. Do not let it reach boiling point or it will curdle. Spoon the carrots into a hot serving dish, pour over the yogurt and sprinkle with mint.

## Damson apple tansy: a cool idea

THIS dessert can be prepared well ahead of the meal – indeed it needs to be! – therefore, it makes a good dinner party choice.

Preparation: 15 mins  
Cooking: 40 mins  
Chilling: 1 hour

- Ingredients  
(Serves 4)
- 125g damsons
- 125g cooking apples
- 50 g unsalted butter
- 75g caster sugar
- 2 egg yolks
- 4 tbsps fresh bread crumbs
- 125 ml double cream
- 1 tbspn lemon juice
- WASH damsons. Peel and thinly slice the apples.

Melt butter in a saucepan with a little cold water. Cover and boil fruit over low heat until soft, stirring. Remove from heat and rub fruit through a coarse sieve. Return puree to pan and stir in sugar. Take pan off heat and blend in beaten egg yolks and bread crumbs. Stir over low heat until quite thick, then leave to cool. Whisk the cream lightly and fold into the cooled puree. Sharpen to taste with lemon juice. Spoon the mixture into serving glasses and chill for one hour.

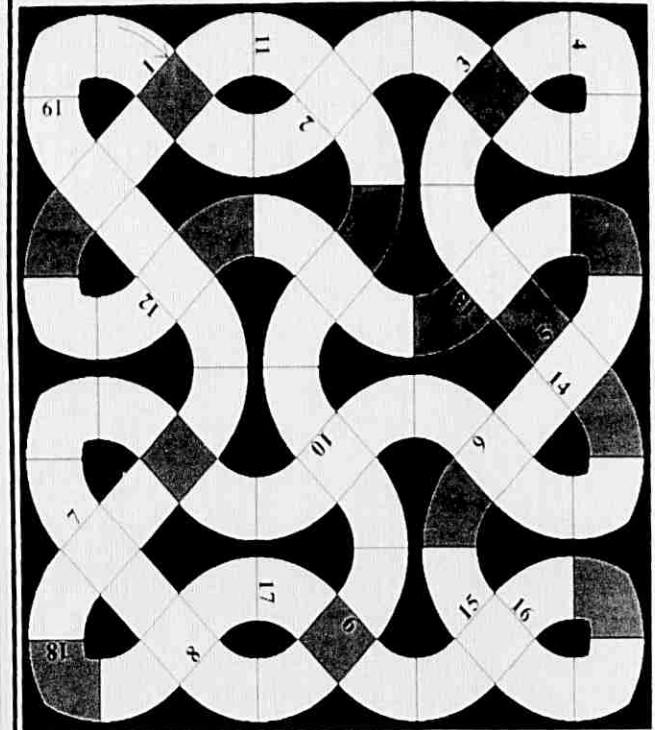

## Moist and fruity summer cake

A MOIST, light, fruity cake to get your taste buds tingling with summer berries.

- Ingredients:
- Serves 8-10
- 275g self-raising flour
- 65g plain flour
- 1/4 x 5ml sp bicarbonate of soda
- 65g cocoa
- 100g butter
- 175g sugar
- 75g jam, any flavour
- 90ml hot water
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 x 15ml sp jam (extra)

Method:  
Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/ Gas Mark 4. Grease a 23cm tin, line with greaseproof paper, then grease the paper. Sift the flours, bicarbonate of

in the centre. Place the butter, sugar, jam and water in a small pan. Stir over a low heat until the butter has melted and sugar has dissolved. Remove from the heat and add to the dry ingredients in the mixing bowl, along with the eggs. Stir with a wooden spoon until just combined. Do not overbeat. Pour mixture into prepared tin, smoothing the surface. Bake for 35 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean when inserted into the middle of the cake. Leave cake to stand in tin for 15 minutes before turning out to cool on a wire rack. Heat extra jam in a small pan and brush it over the cake. Serve with whipped cream.



# Waterford County Childcare Committee

## CHILDMINDING AREA NETWORK

The Childminding Area Network has been specifically set up for all childminders in Co. Waterford by Waterford County Childcare Committee. All childminders, whether working from their own home or the parent's home, and all those interested in becoming a childminder can participate. Meetings take place in the Kilmacthomas, Suir, Dungarvan, Lismore and Tramore areas and all childminders are invited to attend. The meetings are facilitated by Rosemarie Cusack, the Childminding Advisory Officer for Waterford County Childcare Committee. This is a free service and all childminding training programmes are part subsidised by Waterford County Childcare Committee.

At the last session of meetings held during October a demonstration on practical play ideas for children took place and childminders were actively involved in making everything from monsters to birds! The evening was very enjoyable as well as providing an opportunity to meet other childminders and get information on a range of important topics effecting childminders.

The next session of meetings will concentrate on Childminding Training taking place during 2004. An important initiative being launched by the Department of Justice, Equality & Law Reform in January 2004 includes the Childminding Quality Awareness Programme and Childminding Development Grants, information on these will be available for all childminders attending. During the tea and coffee break there will be an opportunity for discussion on childminding issues and feedback will be provided on topics of interest that were highlighted by childminders attending the previous meetings. The evening will finish with a play activity for children that childminders may find enjoyable and useful for their childcare service. Being a member of a network means childminders can avail of the support, information and advice on all aspects of childminding available from the Waterford County Childcare Committee. Childminding area networks are friendly and relaxed meetings where discussion on all issues relating to childminding can take place.

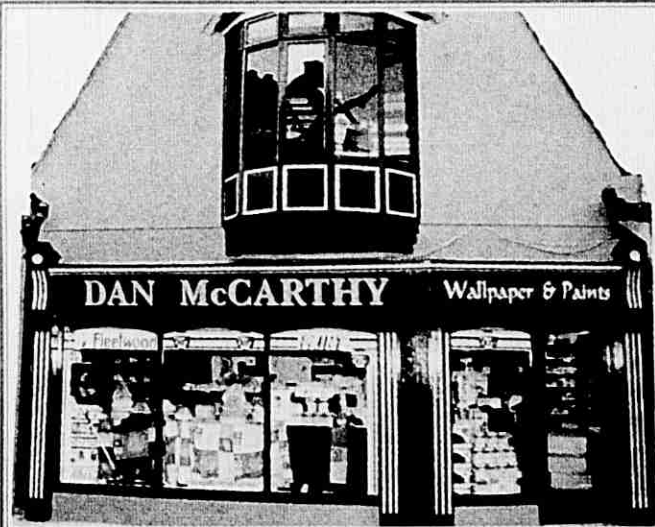

### BLUSHING

Mark Twain once said, "Man is the only animal that blushes or needs to". Why do we blush? Blushing, although very annoying is a normal response when feeling embarrassed, angry, guilty or experiencing some other strong emotion. If you are a "blusher", you've probably been told by others to calm down and think about something else when it occurs. But what can one do to avoid or minimise blushing?

1. Look for a pattern. What situations are causing it? Make a list of when it occurs. It may be associated with the fact that you're not feeling comfortable or are feeling self-conscious when in the company of others. Others have recommended joining a Drama Club.

3. Cut out caffeine, drink lots of water and eat lots of fruit and vegetables. Staying away from alcohol and not eating spicy food are all common suggestions for keeping the blush at bay.

4. A blush typically starts from below the neck and works its way up. However, certain measures can make the blush less apparent. Firstly wear bright colours, because the difference in contrast will make the blush less noticeable. If you're wearing white and you blush, everyone is going to know; if you wear red it's not nearly as noticeable. Women can wear a scarf or turtleneck jumper to hide a blush.

5. Cosmetics - special cosmetics are available to reduce facial redness. Ask your beautician / pharmacy for advice.

# Chronicles of Historic Local Family Launched

Waterford County Council has published a new and revised edition of the "Memoirs of the Lives and Characters Of the Illustrious Family of the Boyles."

Edited by County Librarian, Donald Brady, the book, first published in 1737, chronicles events in the Boyle family history.

The book was officially launched in Lismore Branch Library by renowned writer Anthony Summers, author of a number of internationally acclaimed books such as "Godless - The Secret Lives Of Marilyn Monroe" and "The Arrogance of Power - The Secret World Of Richard Nixon."

Introduced by Peter Carey,

Director of Services at Waterford County Council, a series of speakers paid tribute to the work of Donald Brady for his role in advancing learning and the appreciation of history.

Lismore Town Mayor, Mark Khan, spoke of the "tourism potential and value" of promoting to prominence the Boyle family and their association with Lismore.

He went on to commend Mr. Brady for doing so with this publication.

Mr. Summers, meanwhile, spoke eloquently of the importance of historical rediscovery, of the importance of hearing contemporaneously what these "ancient Lord's" believed and perceived, of gaining a fuller

appreciation of our historical legacy.

Mr. Summers described it as a "marvellous book for dipping into," and dubbed Mr. Brady, as a "secret agent of history."

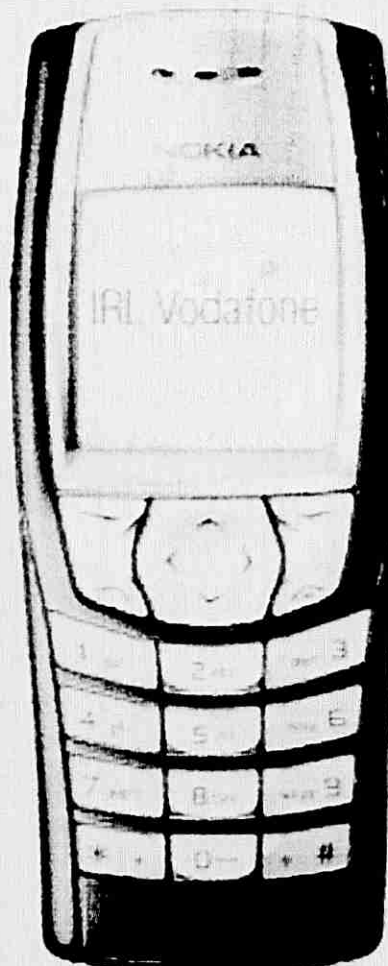
He went on to credit Mr. Brady for his role in keeping alive works that otherwise would be forgotten, and lost to the collective memory.

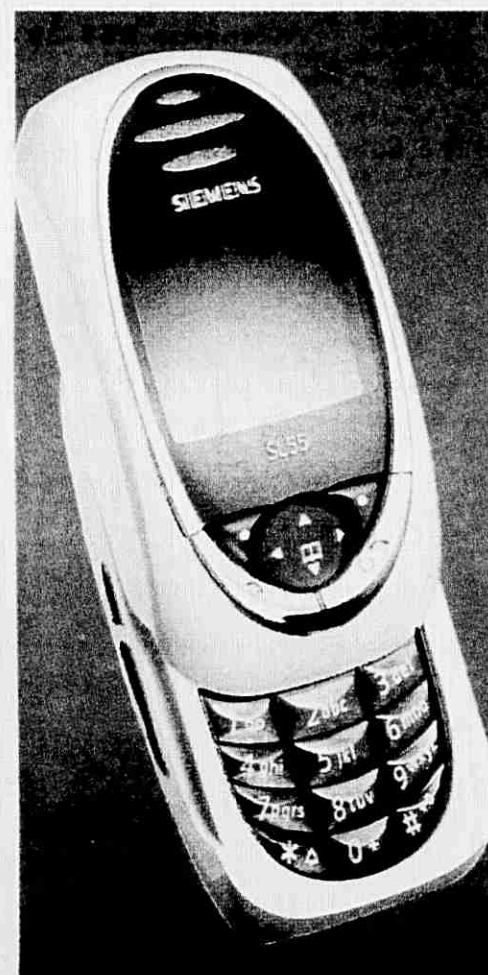

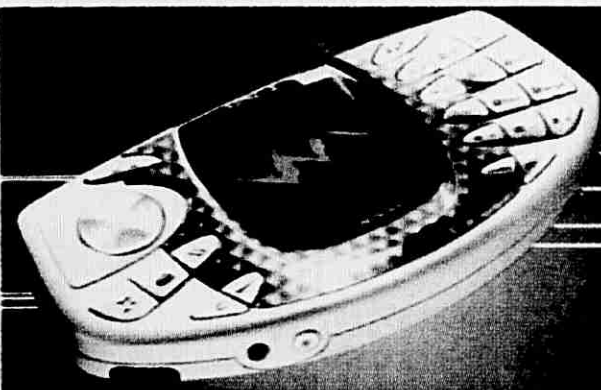

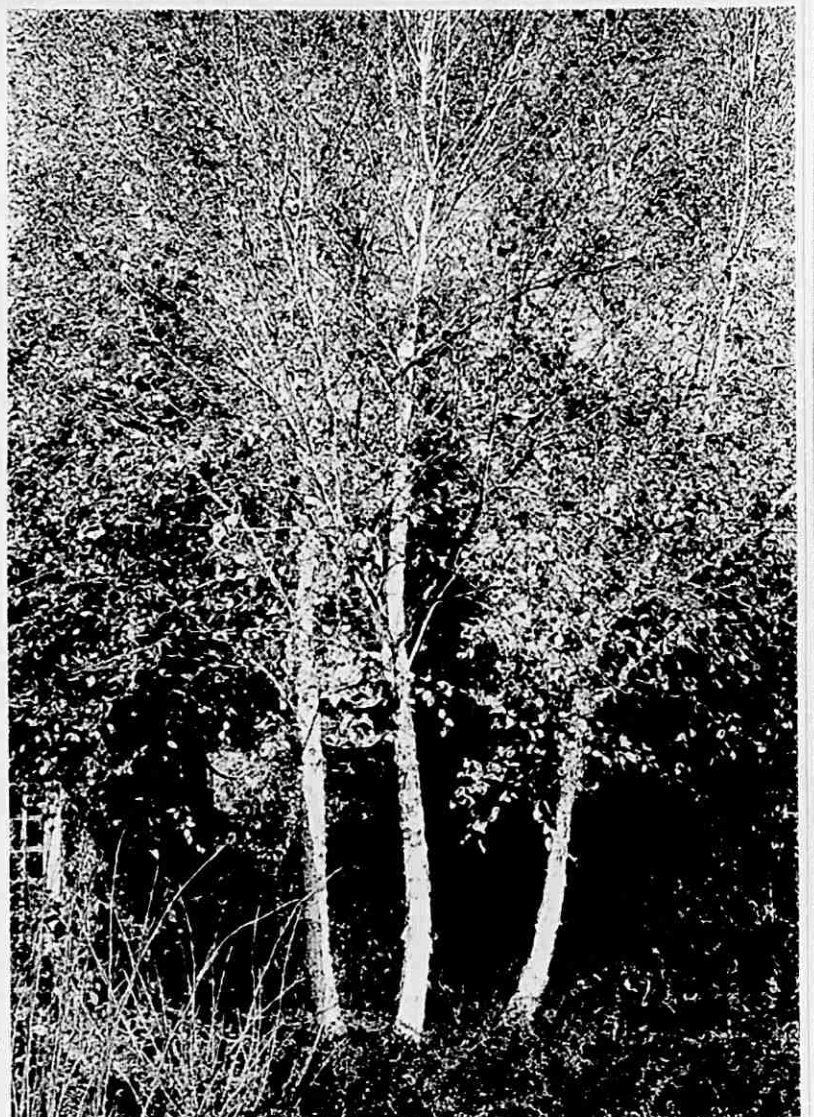
#### The Garden Messenger theme for November 2003 is

# 'BARK BRINGS BEAUTY AND TEXTURE'

If you're looking to add an exciting plant dimension to your garden this autumn, trees with ornamental bark could be the answer. Providing the perfect contrast to autumn leaf colour or bare winter branches, bark also brings added value in the form of fascinating textures. The right trees can transform a garden into something very special. They provide focal points in lawns or borders, frame gateways and entrances into other areas and their shape and size influence the tone of the garden – formal, graceful, naturalistic. And remember that with soil still warm and plant growth almost at a standstill, autumn is a great time for planting trees. Just as with other features like leaf colour or form, there is a wonderful choice of decorative barks. Of course, all trees have bark – it provides a protective layer for the growing tissues of the trees. Certain trees, however, produce

bark with particularly attractive colours, or unusual textures. Choose from the following selection to achieve a wonderful variety of effects: Birches (*Betula*) generally display wonderful bark. Attractive colour, fine, almost papery texture, and some compact garden cultivars make them a great choice. Look out for these varieties of Silver birch: 'Purpurea' which has purple-tinged bark, dark purple leaves and achieves a height and spread at maturity of 10m and 3m respectively. 'Tristis', with its white bark, is great where space is limited, with slender branches growing outwards from the central stem. Maples (*Acer*) are justly popular for their foliage, but some are equally interesting for their bark. Find a place in your garden for the Paper-bark maple (*Acer griseum*). Its wonderful bark is orangy-brown in colour which peels attractively. Added to fabulous autumn colour, this tree is a great choice as a

specimen tree for small gardens. It's also slow growing, with a spreading growth habit. Ideal as a centre-piece in a lawn, it achieves a height and spread of 10m. Pere David's maple (*Acer Davidii*) is a bigger tree – achieving a height and spread at maturity of 15m - so needs more space. The bark is streaked green and white. The Snake-bark maple (*Acer rufinerve*) is another good option, the bark of its young shoots has a bluish tinge, its branches are green and white striped. This tree has an elegant, arching growth habit and achieves a height and spread of 10m. These trees are all hardy and have no special soil or site requirements. Trees can set the tone in the garden. Their size and longevity serve to establish a basic framework for the garden over the long term. As they grow they will provide shade from summer sun and it's a wonderful thing to watch them mature. This selection offers the added benefit of the beauty and texture of bark.

**JUNIOR PAGE**  
**Shaping the Landscape**

Rivers, seas and ice and the weather are constantly shaping and changing our landscape. Without water, Planet Earth would be jagged and cratered like the Moon. Rivers and streams, and glaciers of ice, slowly carve out valleys and plains.  
Wind and water shape rocks, cliffs and dunes.



**WIND AND RAIN SHAPE ROCKS**  
The rocks on the Earth's surface are constantly being worn away and shaped by water, ice and wind. Wind piles sand into dunes, or blasts it at rocks, slowly wearing them away into shapes like sculptures. The sun heats up rocks so that the minerals inside them expand, then at night they cool down and contract. Different minerals expand and contract at different rates, causing the rocks to crack and crumble. Minerals can also be worn from rock by rain. As rain falls, it absorbs gases from the air, which make it into a weak acid which eats away at a rock surface. Water can also seep into cracks in a rock then freeze and expand, forcing the rock to split open.

**THE NORWEGIAN FJORDS WERE MADE BY GLACIERS IN THE LAST ICE AGE**  
Glaciers are rivers of ice that form when snow builds up and slowly presses down into solid ice. Some form as ice sheets and others as valley glaciers. When glaciers form in Mountain valleys, the weight of the ice can make them slide slowly downhill. Some can flow up to 100m (300 ft) a year. As the ice carries bits of stone and rock with it, it wears away deep valleys and bowls in mountainsides, and builds up mounds of rock called moraines. In the last ice age, ice carried huge boulders from Norway 800 km (500 mi) to the east coast of England

**RIVERS SHAPE VALLEYS AND PLAINS**  
As rivers and streams slowly wind through the landscape, they wear away solid rock to form deep valleys, and carry mud and silt which they build up into plains and deltas. A delta forms when a river slows down as it flows into the sea. It deposits mud and silt as swampy land, where grasses take root. In Bangladesh, millions of people live on the river Ganges.

**WAVES SHAPE THE COASTLINE**  
Coastal landscapes change quickly as waves and sea water wear away rock to create cliffs, and build up or wash away crumble, they can leave pillars of rock called stacks.

- DID YOU KNOW?**
- Niagara Falls was originally at Lewiston, N.Y., but has gradually moved 11km (7 mi) further upstream, by eroding the gorge it flows into.
  - The Mississippi River washes over 600 million tonnes of rock and mud into the Gulf of Mexico each year.
  - One of the fastest glaciers on record was the Bruarjokull Glacier in Iceland, which slid its enormous bulk along at 125 m (410 ft) a day for two months.
  - Over 45,000 billion tonnes of salt are dissolved in our oceans.
  - Greenland's glaciers can be over 3,000m (1,000ft) thick move over 40m (130ft) a year, and produce 40,000 icebergs annually.
  - The Grand Canyon is growing one metre deeper every 6,000 years, as the Colorado River erodes it.

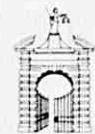

**Tillage: Full Decoupling**

With the decision made that Ireland will opt for full decoupling from 1st January 2005, the intervening period should be used to maximise efficiency levels and to establish production costs. This will enable a clear and informed decision to be made about the future direction of your farm from 2005 onwards.

It is important to remember that under full decoupling, the average farm payment established during the reference period, which in most cases will be the years 2000 to 2002, will continue to be paid once the average number of hectares that gave rise to the payment are maintained. To this end, with full decoupling it will not be necessary to grow crops on those hectares and so each farmer will have to assess the profitability of continuing his current enterprise, diversifying into other enterprises or leaving the land fallow.

For a tillage farm that has no forage area, each entitlement will be worth 383 before modulation (first 5,000 exempt for all) and the national reserve allocation (up to 3%). Each hectare of cereals, setaside, linseed, oilseeds, protein crops and maize (with an adjustment for the overshoot of the base area in 2002), claimed for arable aid in the reference period will give rise to one entitlement.

Each year, in order to claim an entitlement or get paid on it, an 'eligible hectare' will be required. This meaning of eligible has nothing to do with eligible as we know it in terms of eligible land. Under this new definition of 'eligible' in order to claim an entitlement the following may be used forage or arable land, including sugar beet. It does not include permanent crops, potatoes, fruit, vegetables or forestry.

In order to activate entitlements in 2005, they must be accompanied by an 'eligible hectare'. However it is not necessary to activate all entitlements in 2005, once you activate at least one you will hold onto all your entitlements but only get paid in that year for those accompanied by an 'eligible hectare'. For those wishing to sell entitlements they must activate at least 80% first. Over a three year period, entitlements not used will be recouped so once 100% of available entitlements are claimed at least one year in three, all will be maintained.

**Set-aside for 2004 harvest**

The Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr Joe Walsh TD, has announced that the set-aside limit for the 2003/2004 crop year (2004 harvest), under the Arable Area payments scheme, will be 25% (inclusive of the obligatory rate of 10%).

The Minister said that the 25% set-aside limit would ensure that all producers have sufficient flexibility in the management and operation of their farms in the coming year. A higher limit of 40% had applied for the 2003 harvest year owing to the particular difficulties being experienced by cereal growers at the time.

The 10% set-aside rate is obligatory for producers claiming Arable Aid on more than 15.13 hectares, but all producers irrespective of size may set aside up to 25% of their land next year.

**Dairying: Grassland reminder**

- All farmers should be more than halfway through their last rotation now.
- Each day delay in closing after October 12th will result in 13 kg DM/Ha less grass in early March next.
- Grass yield next spring will be increased by 0.6 kg DM/Ha for every extra 1 kg DM/Ha left on the paddock in early November.
- Aim to leave an average farm cover of 450 kg DM/Ha on the farm at closing.

Dairy farmers should complete a spring grass budget before the end of the year. This will help you decide on turnout dates, silage closing dates and meal feeding levels for the spring.

**Temporary leasing milk quota?**

It makes sense to let unused quota in the 03/04 quota year. You will receive 4 cent/ litre payment from the co-op but lose out on a coupled payment of 1.21 cent/ litre.

Dairy farmers who wish to qualify for the de-coupled entitlements cannot temporary lease their quota to the co-op in the 2004/05 quota year.

De-coupled entitlements will be based on quota held (owned, temporary leased onto the farm, and private leased onto the farm) on March 31st 2005.

In addition to holding the quota on this date, the quota holder must also qualify as a producer i.e. would need to supply some milk in the 2004/05 milk quota year.

# FARMING LEADER

## IFA TARGETS CAPACITY BUILDING ON FARMS IN PRE-BUDGET SUBMISSION

Launching IFA's Pre-Budget Submission recently, IFA President, John Dillon said IFA is looking to Government to support capacity building on farms to meet demands for greater scale and competitiveness post the Fischler reform of the CAP.

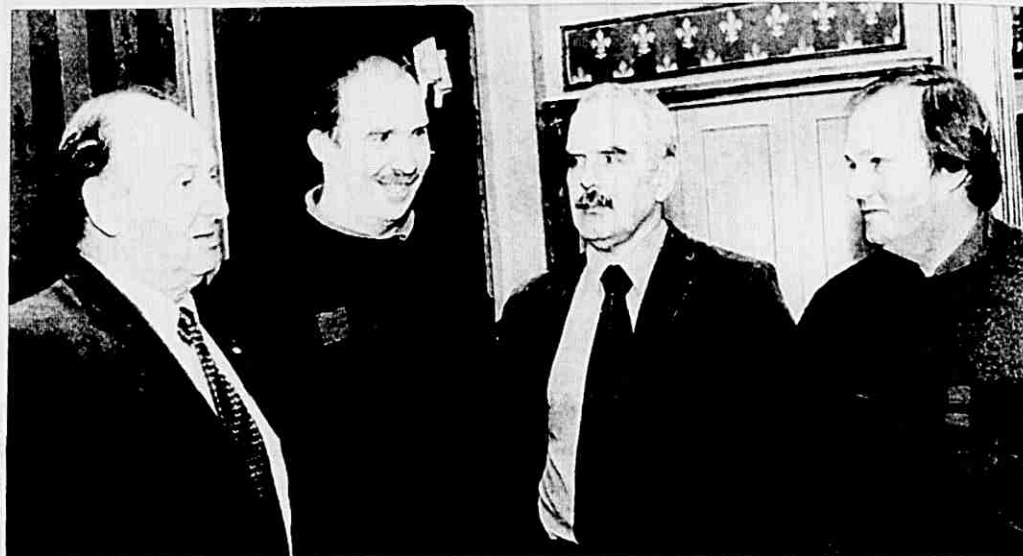
In advance of a meeting tomorrow morning (Friday) with Finance Minister Charlie McCreevy, on IFA's 2004 Budget submission, John Dillon said: "It is clear that for Irish farmers to remain viable post CAP Reform II, they must scale up production and this can only be achieved at a reasonable cost. Fundamental to this is land availability and land price. This is one area the Government must facilitate and encourage for the national good. In industry it is called capacity building and IDA job creation. There is no such provision for farmers who want to expand and develop."

He said: "The next few years we will see the most radical policy shift for agriculture in the history of the European Union. Decoupling of farmer income supports from production will accelerate structural change in agriculture. It is essential for the country to sustain a strong core of full time farmers with the capacity and scale to continue farming in the difficult environment ahead."

"Secure longer term land leases would provide safeguards for both the landowner and the lessee. In the long term, as a nation, we must harness land as a productive resource and avoid unduly dwelling on the owner and asset issue, which can best be separated in a leasing programme. Government must implement policies which support farmers in meeting the demands for greater competitiveness in these changing circumstances."

The IFA President continued: "The Income Tax Codes provide a means to incentivise land leasing on a medium to long term basis as an effective and realistic option to allow farmers improve competitiveness and secure long-term viability." IFA is proposing that the age restriction of 55 years should be removed from the existing tax relief on rental income from farm land provided land is leased for productive farming and would augment the viability of the lessee's holding. Furthermore, IFA has proposed that the amount of the relief should be increased to €10,000 for leases of 5 years or greater.

IFA is also demanding the reinstatement of Capital Gains Tax "roll-over" relief and a reduction in stamp duty on land swaps as an aid to the consolidation of farm holdings. IFA is also looking to Government to honour those commitments on vital farm schemes given during negotiations on Sustaining Progress in the upcoming 2004 Book of Estimates. In particular, Mr. Dillon said IFA is focussing on adequate resourcing of the new Farm Waste Management Schemes and REPS.

**DIRECT IRISH DAIRY BOARD SHAREHOLDING FOR FARMERS AND CUT THE PRICE OF QUOTA - ICMSA**

Dairy farmers being given access to direct shareholding in the Irish Dairy Board and the price of milk quota being halved are among proposals put

forward by Pat O'Rourke, President ICMSA at the Association's fifty-second AGM in Limerick ON Friday last.

"The new reality following the Mid Term Review is that farmers must get greater return from the marketplace and there must be a reduction in the cost of farming. I am convinced that centralised marketing is vital for Irish dairy farmers but I also want to see dairy farmers directly benefiting both in terms of the income generated

by the Irish Dairy Board and the wealth of the IDB Co-op. If farmers are given direct share holding in the Irish Dairy Board as distinct from their co-op holding the share holding this would give value back to farmers. I am equally convinced that the Irish Dairy Board can adopt to any new structures at co-op level that are put in place. A directly farmer-owned dairy marketing body is as important as farmer-owned processing co-ops.

Mary played a very active roll in Ballyduff Community for many years and was always at the forefront of such organizations as Muintir Na Tire, Community Council, I.C.A. and the Choir, to mention but a few. Her dedication and tireless hard work contributed greatly to the development of St. Michael's Hall, and in so doing she helped ensure our community now has a solid base for community involvement and interaction. Mary's loss will be felt deeply by her family and many friends to whom we extend our sympathies. She also served many terms as P.R.O. in various local organizations. The following article which we reprint here, was written by Mary in August 2002 and included in our festival programme at that time. It is a fitting tribute to a wonderful woman who always had the better interests of Ballyduff at heart. Ar dheis De go raibh a anam dilis.

### Ballyduff of Yesteryear

#### -By Mary Hyland

1927 up to 2002 is some gap to fill, but having been asked by a young friend to recall a few memories from my youth and age group in days gone by, I decided to give it a try.

Well firstly there were large families in every house, 10 or twelve children was no surprise. In my short road where only three children live today, there were three houses with up to thirty five children walking to school in Ballyduff each day. The old school which was built in 1902 was divided into a girls school and a boys school and our teacher was the formidable Mrs. Prior.

A treat in those far off days could be as simple as a sweet from Mary Crotty's shop or a

current bun from Mike Noonan's Bakery. The village had at least one bakery and many shops. I can recall the first time I and a friend Peggy Troy saw tomatoes in Chris O'Neill's shop window, we bought one of these new fancy fruits and thought the taste was horrible!

Christmas was a wonderful time when we were delighted to receive six pence or perhaps an orange and a sweet in our stockings before heading out in early morning darkness to attend mass in Ballyduff. Christmas morning generally had six masses and it was not unusual to stay in church for two or three of these masses. Then off home for breakfast of steak and onions and of course the festive goose for dinner later in the day.

Amusement was made and centered on the home and neighbors and practically every house had a musician of some sort. Card playing featured in every home, and we were no exception with the Fennesseys and many others joining us. My mother would bake while we played, and sometimes she would slip outside for a draw of her duddin. Some women smoked a pipe in those days, but discreetly of course! Everyone was encouraged to play cards properly from an early age, and I feel sad that more young people don't take the game up today. Perhaps we seasoned players should go easier on the younger players and encourage them more.

Thrashing dances were always looked forward to, as were stage and cross road dancing which were held in Coolisheal and at the top of Tooradoo road to name but a few. Of course Bennett's Hall in Ballysaggart was a big favorite with all in the area. Dances were from eight to ten p.m. and cost 6 pence, while a Cinderella Dance to two a.m. cost two shillings. I can still recall walking excitedly up to the hall while hearing the sound of Jim Bennett's band playing "Moonlight in Mayo".

Wakes and funerals were another way of meeting people. The traditional "Wake" is now long gone, but I think it served a real purpose in its time, and helped people deal with grief and loss in a distinctly Irish way.

While all the young people here today look with amusement at the old machinery and butter making, these things were part of everyday life for my generation. Every farmer had a separator and butter churn. I recall my mother selling our butter to a butter-buyer in Ferry Lane in Lismore and using this money to pay for necessary shopping. Turkey money and egg money were another great way of meeting any bills which needed to be paid.

Another feature which has disappeared from the countryside is the traveling shop. In our area Jack Guinevan with his horse and covered wagon traveled on his rounds and in later years Pat Hyland's van. traveled all the roads with groceries, vegetables and confectionery. Five pounds would buy all the weeks groceries from the van and of course it was a great way of getting news and meeting someone in what could otherwise be a week without outside company.

Emigration played a big part in the lives of the people and I was no exception. In my youth an uncle visited us from St. Louis and I made up my mind that one day I too would go there. In 1949 as a young Irish girl and as green as the grass I hit off with little formal education and worked as a house maid for a wealthy but pleasant family. However my

heart was always in Ballyduff and I returned home in 1954. I was met in Cobh by my brother Dave who had traveled there by car with a man by the name of James Hyland, and the rest as they say is history!

While we were not wealthy in my childhood we were in fact very rich in many other ways, everyone was happy and looked out for everyone else. We Prayed, Played, Cried and Laughed together, friend and friend, neighbor and neighbor. Progress is good and we live in a different world now, times are much better but do people appreciate what they have? In some ways I think things may have gone a little overboard but that's just my opinion. There is a lot of happiness in country life and I think that is something we should all appreciate and be thankful for.

This development is financed by public money - your money. This is a crime against all of us. Anybody with information should contact the local gardai who are investigating.

**The Farce Continues** — I wont pretend to be a great follower of football but if I was I would be none too happy. I lived for fifteen years in a county where hurling was the poor relation or as that great hurling man from Lavey, Tom Magill once said "we are treated like rats in the house". While that degree of disparity does not exist towards football in Waterford the football fraternity here have cause for grievance. They may never reach parity of esteem but they are entitled to equality of treatment. Because our football championship has run late the Waterford football champions have been denied the right to compete in the Munster Club. The usual excuses will be offered but we've heard it all before and are fed up to the teeth of this farce. How is it that the four counties who competed in the hurling and football All-Ireland finals have all completed their fixtures in time yet we cant. Is it in the psyche? Have we a second rate mentality always happy to be second rate?

People are probably fed up listening to me complaining - Im fed up listening to myself - but we have such a propensity for shooting ourselves in the foot in this county that it's hard to stay quiet and ignore it. Why for example is the senior hurling final played the same day as the Western Intermediate final. Many hurling folk in the west would like to see both. Why can you not have a junior or intermediate curtain raiser to a senior championship game? They do elsewhere but here because they are run by separate boards it cant be done? Why do the Western u21 hurling champions, Tallow in this case, have to wait for months to play a county final. Competitions run by separate boards with no coordination is a lot of the cause. Why can we not have a small match programme for senior championship games? Why are intercounty players cosseted and prevented from playing with their clubs. Why should Ballygunner or Mt. Sion have to play Munster club championship the day after a county final. This is bad planning or no planning - no more excuses. Why can we not have neutral linesmen at a Western Intermediate Final. In a match of this importance it is not good enough to have linesmen from the participating clubs. Neutral clubs should have been asked to supply same. The bottom line is we have inadequate structures or an inept organisation - probably both as they go hand in hand. The ironic thing about it is if you get any board member on his own he (there are no shes) will agree with all this but when you attempt to introduce reform they close ranks and circle the wagons. You see they know they have an inbuilt veto and if this fails the bye law rabbit can be pulled magically from the G.A.A. hat to thwart reforming upstarts. When the Strategic Review Committee produced a report it was blown out of the water. The majority of clubs, almost two thirds, to their credit supported it or elements of it but because each board member has a vote equal to any individual club the motion was defeated and the report binned. # KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

## QUESTION

I am dissatisfied with the quality of work I had done in my garden by landscapers and will have to pay for someone else to finish the job properly. I have asked the company to compensate me for the additional expense I will be incurring but I have been refused. Could you give me some information about the Small Claims Procedure as I intend pursuing the issue?

## ANSWER

The Small Claims Procedure is for dealing with claims under Euro1,269.74 within the District Court Structure. The aim is to provide an inexpensive, fast and easy way for consumers to resolve disputes without the need to employ a solicitor.

Anyone who has purchased goods or services for private use from someone selling them in the course of business may take a Small Claims Court action. Claims can be made for faulty goods or bad workmanship. Claims can also be made for minor damage to property and for the non-return of rent deposits.

Claims cannot be made for debts, personal injuries or breach of leasing agreements.

To make a claim you need to complete a special application form, which can be obtained from the Small Claims Registrar at your local District Court office where you can get assistance in completing the form. The completed form with the fee (Euro9) should be lodged with the Small Claims Registrar. A copy of the form is sent to the person against whom you are making the claim by the Registrar, who also keeps a copy.

If within 15 days of receiving your application, the other party does not reply to it, your claim will be automatically treated as undisputed and the District Court will make an Order in your favour for the amount claimed is disputed the Registrar will contact you and let you have a copy of the reasons why the other party is disputing your claim.

If you win your case, the other party will be allowed about four weeks to pay the amount to the Court. But both parties to the case have the right to appeal an Order of the District Court to the Circuit Court where the Judge in question may decide on the subject of costs.

We will be visiting LISMORE and ARDMORE in the next few weeks.

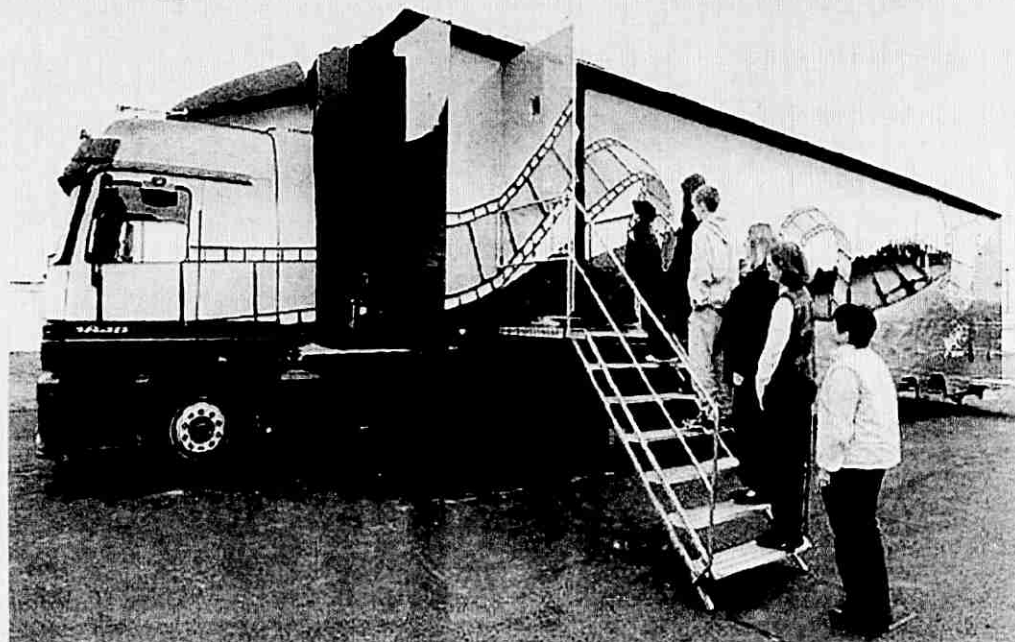

# MONEY MATTERS

## DEALING WITH FUEL BILLS

Major sources of debt and worry for many people are their fuel bills. During periods of cold weather very large bills can quickly develop. If you fall behind in your electricity bill you can be disconnected. Therefore it is important that you contact your local ESB Office as soon as your fall behind in your account.

Make an offer that you can afford so as to pay off the arrears i.e on a weekly or monthly fortnightly basis. Remember to allow for the fact that you will continue to use electricity and that there will soon be another bill. Do not make an offer that you are unable to keep. It is better to offer a small amount knowing that you will easily maintain it. You can write or telephone to make such an offer or call in person to the local office.

If you would like to organise payment of your ESB bill in advance why not avail of the Easy-Pay scheme? By using this scheme you can pay each week at your local ESB office and you will then have the worry of that particular bill dealt with in advance.

Perhaps you need to cut down on your electricity consumption-Make sure that you always switch off a light when you leave a room. Do not stick any old bulb in a socket when it needs replacing. Bathroom, bedrooms, and landings only need a small amount of light. Main areas such as living room and kitchen need the brightest light for comfort. Immersion heaters should also be watched carefully. You should check that it is properly lagged. It does not cost much to have this done and it will pay for itself within a few weeks. Check also that the thermostat is not set too high and is working properly.

### MAKE THE DIFFERENCE

Dear Sir, The Minister of State with special responsibility for Disabilities Mr Willie O' Dea is doing his utmost to get Irish families involved in the blame game, against one another. "If we provided an open cheque book for people with Disabilities they could technically demand all the money in next year's Budget and there would be nothing left for other pressing demands like cancer and heart patients", Mr O'Dea said. The Minister would do well to understand the definition of Disability as laid down by the United Nations and the World Health Organization before offending and making rash statements like that. The Minister would do well to reflect on what happened to his predecessor over not bringing in a Rights Based Disability Bill in 2001.

The Taoiseach promised last July that the government would implement rights-based legislation in November, but ever since a different government spokesman has chipped away at this promise. The Special Olympics are soon forgotten and the tremendous goodwill that was shown to people with special needs. The Government must remember that people with special needs have these needs every day of their lives and not for a week every couple of years.

The Government is negligent in not providing enough classroom assistants to children with special needs this year. It is a constitutional right of these children to receive an education up to 18yrs of age. Yet the Government turn a blind eye on their own neglect. There are children in every parish in Ireland who have not darkened the door of their local primary school. This is only one section of the Disability Spectrum where the State has failed to fulfil its obligations.

The Government can MAKE THE DIFFERENCE by introducing rights based legislation this year 2003.

- The borrower arranges an 'interest-only' loan from a lender. No capital will be repaid until the individual reaches retirement age, when some or all of the fund emerging from the pension plan is used to pay off the mortgage (subject to certain conditions-see below).

- The individual takes out a pension plan, either a personal pension (if self-employed) or a director's pension plan (if a company director).

Contributions invested in the pension plan qualify for tax relief (subject to certain conditions).

- A separate life assurance policy is taken out (ordinary term assurance cover for the term of the loan-pension term assurance is not appropriate), which is required in order to repay the loan, in the event of the borrower dying before the loan is repaid.

The advantage of this approach is that tax relief is in effect available on both the interest payments (because they can be offset against rental income for tax purposes) and the capital repayments (pension premium). The following example illustrates the tax-effectiveness of the arrangement.

### Example

The following example is once again based on a self-employed male, 45 next birthday non-smoker, with a €150,000 mortgage over 15 years (based on a retirement age of 60).

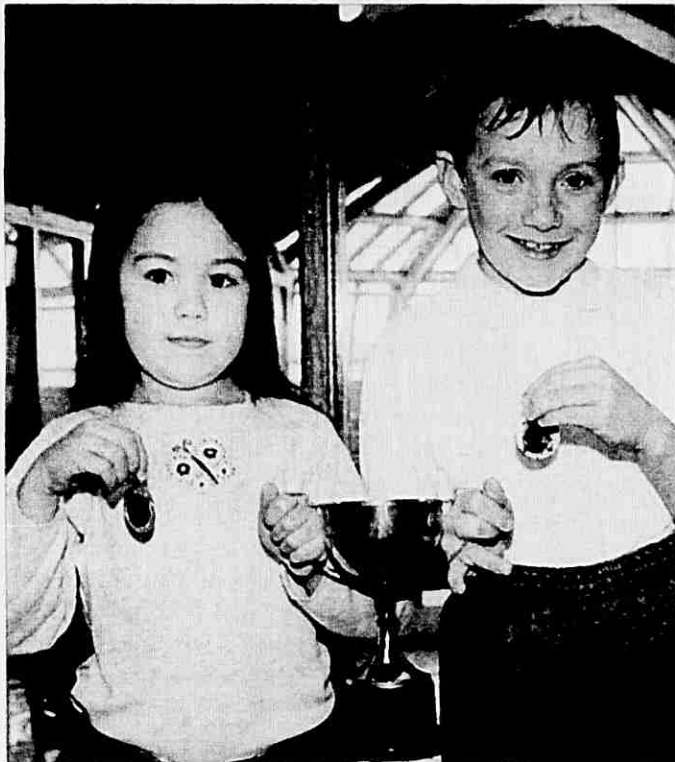

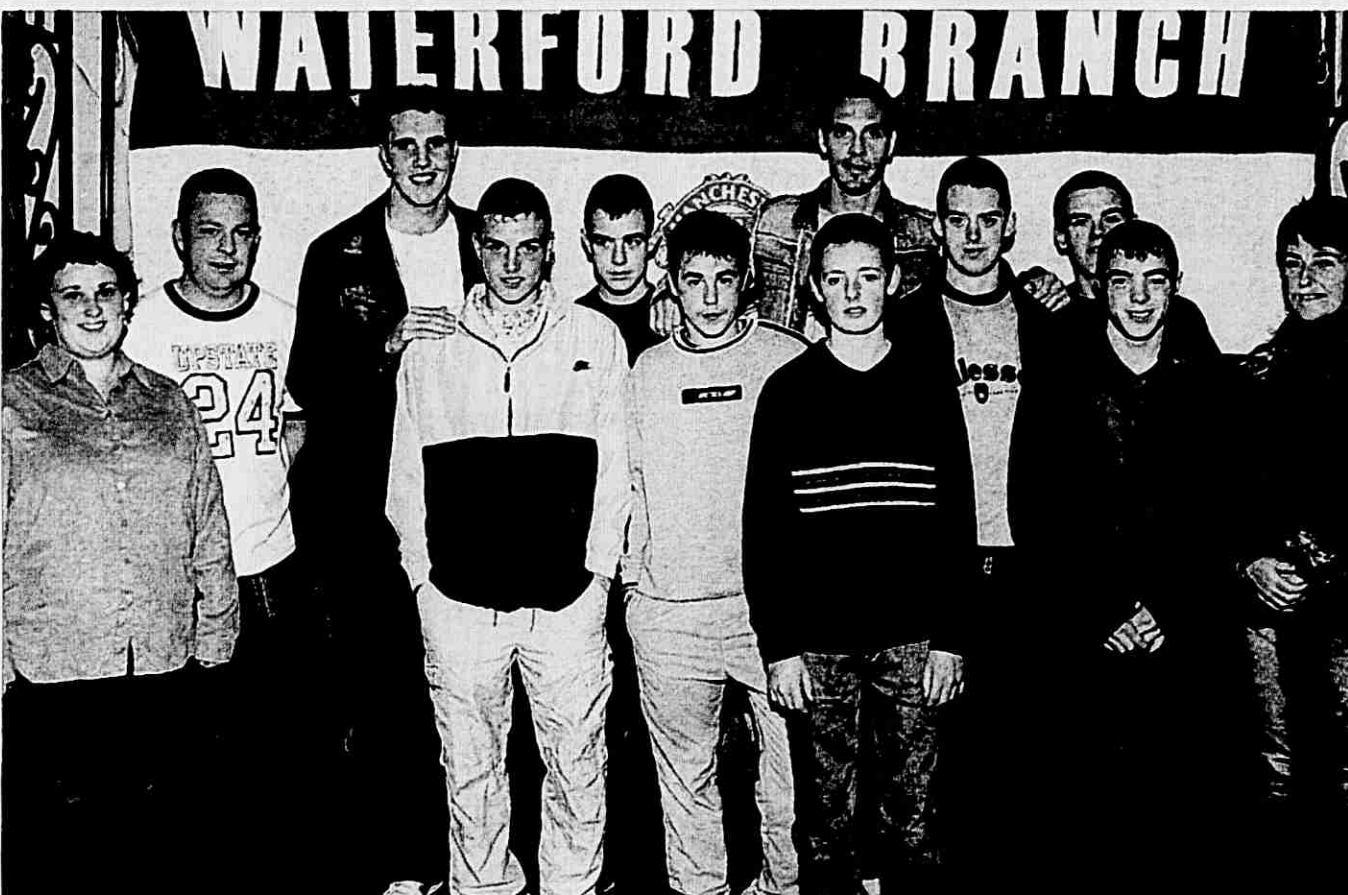

## DUNGARVAN DRAMATIC CLUB NEWS

With just a few weeks of rehearsal time left, things are 'hotting up' in the club. Garter Lane in Waterford City, The Cat club and Haulbowline in Cork are the three venues. If you don't get a chance to travel to any of these venues, don't despair as the play will be put on in Dungarvan later on November 20th, 21st and 22nd. It will be performed with another one act play 'Easy Stages'. This hilarious comedy, directed by Trisha Kiely has a cast of seven and goes behind the scenes at a production of Hamlet. Our opening night is, as usual, a charity night and this time is in aid of CHILDAID. Club member Patricia Mulcahy hopes to climb Kilimanjaro in Tanzania in order to raise money for this very worthwhile charity. So I'll hand you over to Patricia to fill you in on all of the details:

Last Summer, there was an advert in your local paper. An opportunity to climb to the base camp of Mount Everest and help those most affected by famine and poverty. This trip to Everest in Nepal was the first ever CHILDAID had undertaken.

CHILDAID is a registered charity in Ireland and is supported by PDFORRA, the Defence Forces Representative Association. They do trojan work in Africa and funds raised go to street children's projects in the slums of Nairobi. Conditions in the slums are desperately basic, with over a million people living in abject poverty. Food is always a problem, with clean water and food, clothing, sanitation, shelter, education and training. CHILDAID do great work in the slums to support the poorest of the poor children. I answered the ad....

I had three months to raise 4,000e and 'do a bit of training'. I began with the fundraising. A friend suggested a duck race, plastic ones all numbered floating down a river and crossing a finish line. Thanks very much to the Dungarvan Drama club! They lent me the ducks, all five hundred!! I managed to off load two hundred (with a little help from my friends, thanks lads!) No easy task! I raised 1,000e. A good start.

Next came the brainchild of Kevin Bannon. 'The Paddies' to play 'al-fresco' in his local, Quills. Cappoquin Chickens gave me a great deal on food and Tony's take away in Abbeyside prepared and cooked the lot. The band were great, the weather sunny and Brian Dillon provided music once the band finished up. After the gig, punters had a whip round. I collected another 200e in a riding boot. Thanks Colette, Kevin, Martina and all the rest for your huge support. That still left me a bit short of the 4,000e I needed. At this stage I'd a month left and hadn't even started on the fitness side of it!

A race night! Minnies provided the venue and sponsored the hiring of the races. Nearly every business in Dungarvan bought a horse or jockey. Several others provided spot prizes. Even more

others sponsored each race. Thanks to Baumann's Jewellers, Deveraux Menswear, Eurospar, ABC Properties, Rossiters Butchers, Hallahans coaches, Signet, Coleman's Computers, Fitzgerald Insurance, Loanzone, Comeragh Oil, Herlihy's, Baths and Fires, the Anchor, Killian McGrath, Michael Carroll Motors, Dwane Tool Hire and Shandon Printing.

The night was a huge success and the remainder of the cash was in the bag. All that was left was the climb and no time left for training! No big deal...

In fact, it was not so difficult. The incline was gradual and altitude sickness didn't hit a single member of the group. 27 strangers headed off from Dublin on the 12th of November last year. By the end of three weeks walking and talking we knew each other fairly well. It was an unforgettable experience. The scenery was beautiful, the weather lovely during the day, freezing at night! When they tell you to bring a good sleeping bag, they mean it! Our guides even provided hot water bottles. The food wasn't all that great but it didn't matter. The locals were brilliant. We were enjoying ourselves. Don't get me wrong, it wasn't as easy as just that. The outdoor toilets were very unpleasant. A shed containing a plank over a hole, which was usually full to the brim, isn't for the faint hearted! The eight days without a shower can also add to the pong. Sleeping wasn't as easy as you'd imagine either. Considering that here is very little oxygen in the air and you've spent the day walking uphill (I can only describe it as similar to a Stairmaster...continually), you'd presume that sleep would be the most natural thing in the world. Not so! Falling asleep is easy enough. While asleep, once your body is relaxed and you are not puffing for air, a strange thing happens...the lack of oxygen causes a sensation similar to suffocating. I would wake with a start with only a couple of hours sleep and sit up gasping for air. It was uncomfortable to say the least. That was usually the end of my night. During the day it wasn't easy either. Every movement had you panting and sweating. Regardless, the trip was wonderful.

CHILDAID, on behalf of the African kids, benefitted hugely when you consider 27 people raised 108,000 between them! And this leads to the sequel...

Twice a year CHILDAID organises expiditions to Kilimanjaro in Tanzania. Kilimanjaro is the highest mountain in Africa. It's 5859m at the summit. I have committed to climbing the mountain with CHILDAID in March of 2004. Again I will be looking to the generosity of the townspeople to raise 4,000e. Already the Dungarvan Drama Club have come up trumps. They are running a production on the 20th and 22nd of November at 8:00pm in the Ard Scoil, Dungarvan. The drama club has generously promised to invest the opening nights profits in CHILDAID. I am extremely grateful. I would highly recommend attending. It will be a great evening's entertainment in aid of a very worthy cause.

Many other stories of the GAA in its early years as well as point-to-point racing and country life are told in prose and verse. ### 19TH CENTURY WATERFORD CHURCHES CONTINUED THE NIRE CHURCH

The old thatched chapel was situated in the townland of Tourin and was according to Canon Power known as 'Seipeal na hAd-hairce' - the chapel of the horn. The name came about because the chapel had no bell so parishioners were summoned to mass by blowing a horn. Canon Power dates this church to 1818 and another source dates it to 1793.

In 1849 it was destroyed by fire and mass was celebrated in local farm houses until the erection of the new church. The new building was planned by Rev. David Power and the P.P. Rev. E. Walsh. The site for the new church at Glenanore was given by a Mr. Aherne of Dungarvan. The architect was J.J. McCarthy. The church was built of sandstone ashlar. It has a high pitched roof, tower and lancet windows. The interior is plain with an open timber roof.

The foundation Stone was laid on 7 July 1859 by Dr. O'Brien, Bishop of Waterford. The building was completed in June 1862. The church was consecrated on 17 August 1862.

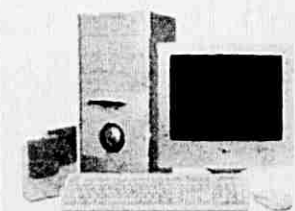

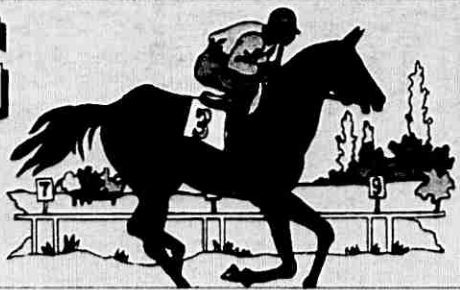

They must be challenged and progress or decline into decay through disuse. The effects of both starting training and stopping are immediate.

Beneficial effects are found almost on starting; however, any training gains are rapidly lost if the habit is not kept up. Some of the problems associated with lack of exercise include - (a) Diabetes (d) Back Pain (e) Obesity (f) Asthma.

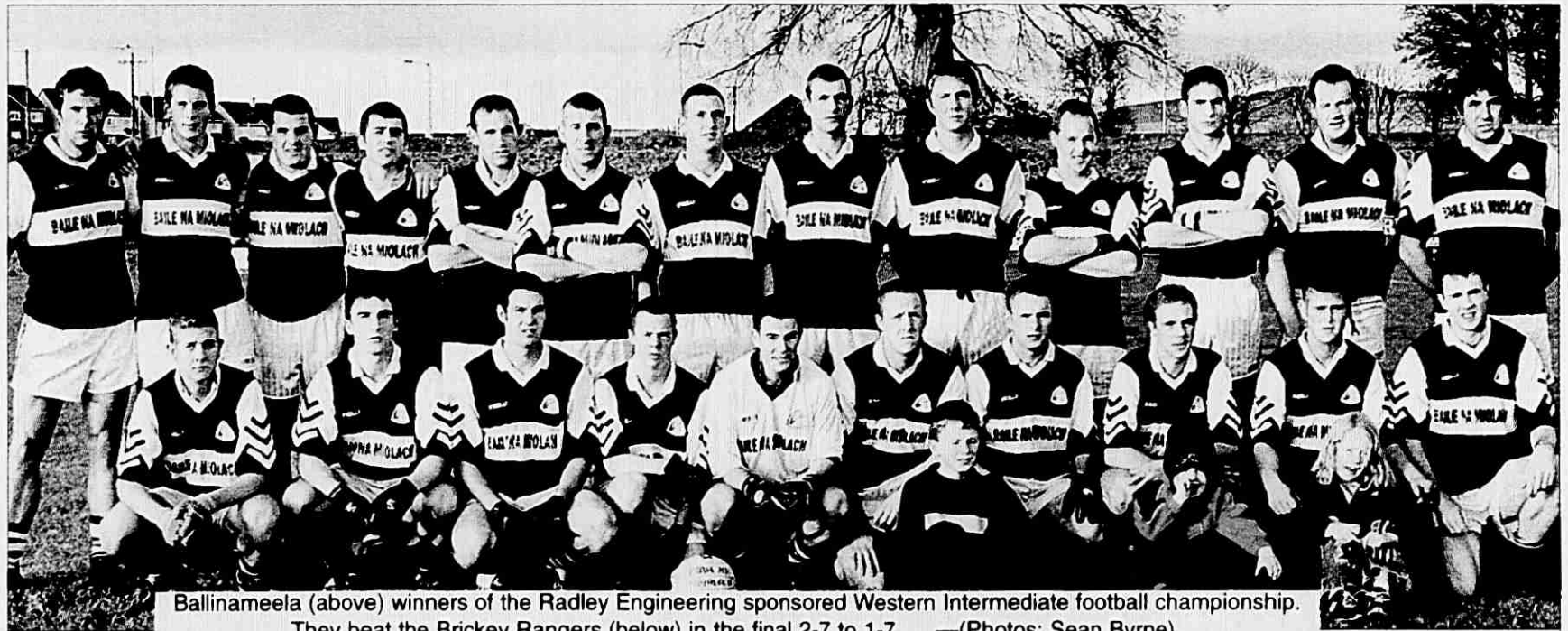

With the biggest turn out of athletes from any athletic club in the twenty four year history of the race, West Waterford took the capitol by storm last Bank Holiday Monday for the annual Dublin city marathon, a total of 46 members from our club faced the starting line and 26.2 miles later 46 had completed the full marathon distance with distinction. At present a full list of results are not at hand and when they are we will publish them. Our first athlete home on the day was Trevor Mason in a time of 2.54. Trevor then retains the Paddy Joe Delaney Memorial shield which

he also won last March when again he was the first club athlete to complete the Ballycotton 10. There were many great performances by quite a number of our athletes with many running to attain times and many more running to try and complete the distance and we even had one lady whose goal it was to try and complete the 26 plus miles without stopping once (and she did). To everyone very well done and to all the back room staff and the large travelling contingent thanks for your support and encouragement. Finally to our travelling physio Jean Brennan who made certain we were all in top shape on the morning of the race looking after all the last minute injuries and for looking after all those tired legs and bodies after the race. The club much appreciates you taking the time out of your busy schedule and coming with us to Dublin.

The race itself saw the Kenyan's dominating the event with Onesmus Kilonzo breaking free from a group of seven runners in the late stages of the race to take victory in a time of two hours 17 minutes and four seconds. The women's event was won by another Kenyan, Ruth Kudol, who set a new women's course record and became the first woman to run under two hours and 30 minutes in Dublin with a time of two hours 27 minutes and 22 seconds. Kilonzo finished ahead of compatriots Lezan Kimutai, David Kosgei and Charles Kiplagat and Scotland's Simon Pride who all finished within two minutes of Kilonzo to complete the top five. Kudol's time was more than five minutes better than the previous course record, set last year by Lidia Vassilevskaiaa of Russia. Both Kilonzo and Kudol were making their first appearance in the Dublin Marathon. Kudol was today running in only her fourth marathon. Earlier this year, she won the Madrid Marathon in 2:34.39. She took part and won her first marathon in Venice in 2000, in a time of 2:28.16. The following year, she finished second in Paris in what was then her personal best time of 2:27.54. Kudol, who comes from a family of eight near Nairobi and is a full-time runner, will take home more than £23,000 in prize money. As well as getting the winner's prize of £15,000 she won bonuses of £5,000 for running under two hours and 30 minutes and £3,000 for setting a new course record. She now has her sights set on making the Kenyan athletic team for the 2004 Athens Olympics. Kilonzo's previous marathon experience included a second place finish in the Beijing Marathon in October 2002

where he recorded his personal best of 2:13.13. Earlier this year, he won the Kenya Armed Forces 30 Kilometre run and then had an encouraging 13th place in the London Marathon in 2:13.54. The first Irish man home was Letterkenny's Gary Crosson, who finished 6th overall in a time of 2:20:27. His Letterkenny teammate Pauric McKinney finished 10th in 2:24:18, while veteran John Griffen, who won the race in 1988 and 89, ran a superb race to come in 11th, 3rd Irish man home, with a time of 2:24:20. Annette Kealy, running her debut marathon, was the first Irish woman home in a time of 2:43.

Outside of the Elite's Tony Mangan, finished in 4:02. Tony had already run almost 9 marathons before today's race. He ran 48 hours on a treadmill at the Marathon Expo over the weekend, breaking two Guinness Book of Records for the longest distance run on a treadmill in a 24h and 48h period. He ran 138.2 in 24h, and went on to run a total of 231.2 in the 48 hours. The race was run in perfect weather conditions with the sun out and the wind relatively light. Over 8,000 runners, joggers and walkers took part in the event, with more than 4,500 from overseas.

Waterford runner Liam Cuddihy has just completed his third adidas Dublin Marathon, taking 24 minutes off his 2001 finishing time, completing the course in an excellent 3.18.28.

Liam was running as part of the adidas/Irish Runner National Marathon team. Adidas, in association with Irish Runner magazine, advertised for runners who would be interested in being part of a team who would run all four races in the series, with particular focus on training for the Marathon. Each member of the team was fitness tested, given specific training advice and targets to meet by top coach Brendan O'Shea, as well as being provided with the latest in Adidas technical running apparel. Hundreds of runners applied to take part, and Liam was part of the final 12 selected for the team.

Liam runs with the West Waterford Club. He ran his first Marathon in 1993, finishing in 3:12:55, and returned to action in 2001 finishing in 3:42. He was hoping that training with the Irish Runner team, and Brendan O'Shea will help him to improve on both those times this year, but was happy to improve on his 2001 time.

The 2003 Adidas Dublin Marathon saw both participation and spectator numbers rise yet again, with over 8,000 runners, walkers and joggers taking part. Dubliners got out in force this year to support the runners, and there was a fantastic atmosphere around the course.

"The support from people really made a difference, when the going got tough out there, it was great to hear people cheering you along" said Cuddihy. "There has been a huge increase in both participation and spectator numbers for the marathon over the past few years" said Race Director Jim Aughney. "Our aim is to ensure this continues, and we are delighted that so many people responded to the Irish Runner Challenge"

The Irish Runner Challenge was the idea of Irish Runner Editor Frank Greally, who got together with Marathon sponsors Adidas to make it happen. "We knew there were a lot of runners out there who would like to make the leap to running the marathon, or perhaps to improve on their previous run, so we thought it would be nice to offer a team of runners the chance to get the support and training that could help them do this. We had a huge response to it, and all of the team met their individual targets, so we hope that we can expand on this for next years Marathon"

For now, Liam is going to take a few days to relax, and then he will start looking towards getting ready for Dublin 2004 the 25th anniversary of the race.

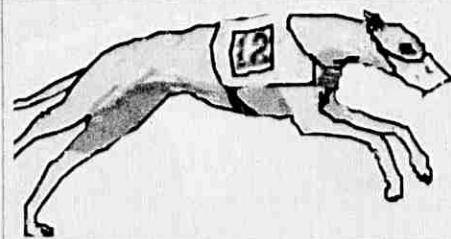

# Historic Victories For Dungarvan Brass Band

With the bandroom bulging with players, and the trophy cabinet now brimming with trophies, the month of October 2003 will go down in the annals of Dungarvan Brass Band as one of its busiest and most successful periods ever.

Trophies for both DBB and DYB at Regional Championships

Sunday, October 5th saw the I.A.B.C.B. South East Regional Championships take place in Mount Sion Hall, Waterford. Dungarvan Brass Band's own Chairman, William Dee, took over as Regional Secretary earlier this year, and thanks to his efforts increased the turnout from 7 bands last year to a record 15 bands this year. Bands came from far away as Limerick, Clare, Kildare and Dublin, but it was the Dungarvan Youth Band, under the baton of William Dee, that would start the day. Required only to play a march and hymn tune, the Youth Band gave a very creditable performance of "March" by Stuart Johnson and the traditional hymn "Abide With Me". The youth and ability of the band greatly impressed the adjudicator, Mr. Harry Kelly, and featured in the prize giving later on.

The senior band, Dungarvan Brass Band conducted by Brian Prendergast, led off the afternoon session with the march "Punchinello", followed by the classic "Nightingale Sang On Berkeley Square", the upbeat "It Don't Mean a Thing" finishing with "Rondo" by Malcolm Arnold. The band faced very stiff competition from nine other brass and concert bands, but was to finish the day with the Best Intermediate Brass Band and Best Overall Intermediate Band titles for the second year in a row, the first band ever to do so. As Mr. Kiely stated, Dungarvan had "performed well above that standard of the other bands in the section". It was a great day with both bands taking prizes, but also a historic one, as both bands and almost 60 members competed for the first time at the same contest. However, as great an achievement as this was, it was soon to be bettered.

#### BELFAST CHAMPIONS

On October 24th, the senior band began the long journey north to Belfast to compete for the first time in the North of Ireland Band Association "Championship

of Ireland" Contest. Taking in two weekends and over 50 bands, this is the largest contest in Ireland and is broadcast by the BBC. There is a very strong tradition of bands in Northern Ireland; and the combination of heavy government support, and comprehensive music coaching and tutoring in schools means that the standard of play, even from players of an early age, is extremely high. The challenge faced was a big one, and the band's expectations were realistic, with a place among the prizes considered at best an outside possibility. However all involved agreed the experience gained would benefit the band and provide a focus for increasing the standard of play. So it was with some trepidation, but with an eagerness to give it their best shot that the band entered the contest.

Unused to the style of contest it was a slightly nervous band that took the stage in the beautiful Ulster Hall, but soon settled to give a well crafted rendition of the testpiece for the contest, "Little Suite for Brass No. 1 (Opus 80)" by Malcolm Arnold. Once the contest was over, the band filed back into the hall to wait for the results. Traditionally a hard fought contest, the adjudication is usually very severe, and true to form, the adjudicator, the renowned English composer Goff Richards, while complimentary, pulled no punches and criticised bands on many issues. However, in his summation he announced that the winning band played "significantly better than the other competing bands and there could be no doubt of the result". And with that and for only the second time in 86 years a southern band, the Dungarvan Brass Band, was declared the 4th section Champion of Ireland Band. The band had competed at an international standard contest, and had not only held it's own but won. It is probably the greatest single victory in the band's history to date. The band must now wait through the formality of the objection period until November 22nd for the award of prizes, but the members are ecstatic with the result and eagerly await the prizes.

#### LARGE MEMBERSHIP

Contests, however, were not the band's only preoccupation in October. Once a year, volunteers from the senior band go to the local primary schools to play and

introduce the pupils to the instruments of a brass band. This year was no different and on the morning of October 10th, a quintet consisting of Neal O'Kennedy, Tara Lambden, Sean Di Fusco, John Dee and William Dee visited Whitechurch National School and Scoil Garbhain, where they received a great reception from pupils and staff alike. In the afternoon, an even larger group visited St. Mary's N.S. in Dungarvan to similar applause. It was a very successful day and the Open Night soon after added another 40 young beginners to bring the total number involved at various levels throughout the band to over 100. The Band would like to extend its thanks to the Principal and staff of the

various schools for allowing the opportunity to play and also to the members who took time off work, college and school to be there.

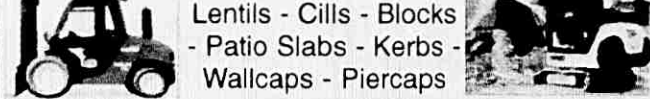


