Suspected Drugs Overdose Results In 21 Year Old's Death

A 21 year-old Kilmacthomas man tragically died from a suspected drugs overdose in Abbeyside in the early hours of Sunday morning last.

John Mansfield, an apprentice welder with Radleys Engineering, was originally from Currabaha West Kilmacthomas, but had been living at a rented apartment at 4, The Grove, Abbeyside for some

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His semi-conscious body was found by medical personnel after the ambulance control centre was alerted to an incident at the flat by a caller at around 3.15am.

Immediate medical aid was provided including mouth to mouth resuscitation, but despite the best efforts of Dr. Hasbrook and other medical personnel, Mr. Mansfield never regained consiousness and was pronounced dead.

A second person was in the flat at the time, but refused to be taken to Waterford Regional Hospital for examination. He is said to be in good health.

The dead mans body was later removed to Waterford Regional Hospital where on Monday afternoon last, a post mortem and toxicology examinations were carried out to establish the precise cause of his



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


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

The four businesses on O'-Connell Street, who fear they will be 'landlocked' by a section of the multi-million euros development on the former Glanbia site, have been refused leave to appeal against it to An Bord Pleanala.

In a shock decision, An Bord Pleanala ruled on Monday, that the grouped application was submitted too late for inclusion in the appeals process.

However, while in May of this year, the anchor store and 75% of the retail units to be developed by Clancy Construction were given the go-ahead, Mr. Houlihane was unhappy with the conditions put on the O'Connell Street aspect of the

These conditions included a refusal to allow demolition of Lenhihanes bakery.

"But," Mr. Houlihane said, "all the development going back along Lenihanes Yard and all of Block A can be developed. So, if my planning application is now refused by An Bord Pleanala, it goes back to the development which was already granted, and the buildings go there anyway.'

"But we want to do things right. If you look at Lenihanes Bakery, there's an obvious break in the streetscape. We want to have the street level all the way along.'

If the plans get permission he also foresees it as being an important link to the shopping complex, which he said is important to all traders on O'Con-

However, the most contentous aspect of the development will see shops in Block A eliminating access from the shopping centre to some businesses on O'Connell Street.

The traders, who now have no personal recourse to An Bord Pleanala, had argued that the development would prevent them from reaping the benefits of future retail opportunites at the back of their premises.

However, Mr. Houlihane ruled out any compromise agreement, and insisted they had a chance to buy into the site two and a half years ago. Mr. Houlihane, who is now the largest property holder on O'-Connell Street, said he had to buy an access onto the site.

"I had no right of access from Lenihanes Bakery," he said. " I had to go to Billy Clancy and buy into it. You're not automatically entitled to trade on to somebody else's property"

If An Bord Pleanala uphold planning permission for the development, the developers hope to have it constructed by early 2005 in time with the opening of the anchor store.



Arrange the individual rolls in a buttered 16cm square tin.

Cover the tin with oiled clingfilm and leave the rolls to rise for around 30 minutes.

In this time, preheat the oven to 220°C/450°F/gas mark 7.

After the rolls have risen, bake them for 20 minutes or until the rolls are golden brown.





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


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ENFO & ECO-UNESCO YOUNG ENVIRONMENTALIST AWARD

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

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Handy guide to proper pruning

AS a rule, trees grow perfectly well without intervention from people.

However, if you want to keep your trees healthy and producing lots of flowers and fruit, or just to keep them in shape, they will need a little attention.

Of course, you can prune trees at any time to remove dead, damaged or diseased tissue, but usually it is a job best done in the dormant season - after the leaves have fallen and before the new buds burst.

Trees should not require much work to keep them in shape.

Established trees may need a trim if they cast too much shade - cut off the bottom branches to lift the crown and let in more light, or trim the top.

Remember, big jobs - usually those requiring a chainsaw - are best left to a tree sur-

A chainsaw can do a lot of damage, not only to the tree, but to the person carrying out the work.

Trees are generally big, and they are continuously under attack from some of the smallest organisms - fungal, bacterial or viral microbes.

When you prune, you wound, and incorrect pruning can have a severe effect on trees. To avoid unnecessary injury and maintain healthy trees, it is essential to prune proper-

Always use sharp tools and make clean cuts. Be careful with all the tools you use always think of safety first!

Most people will only need to use a pair of secateurs for all the pruning jobs they will

They can be used to slice though shoots about 1.5-2cm thick and there are a number of types to choose from.

Bypass secateurs work with a scissor-like action to give a cleaner cut, if you keep them clean and sharp, that is.

Anvil secateurs are usually just as effective, if a bit cheaper and they have one sharp blade that presses down on a flattened base. For bigger jobs long-handed loppers are

essential as they offer greater leverage to tackle thicker branches, between 2.5-4cm

If you have tall trees to prune, use longreach pruners. They remove the need for ladders, which can cause a lot of damage themselves to trees. Finally, a pruning saw is useful for smaller branches, which should always be cut off close to the trunk. Remember, always make a small cut on the underside of the branch being removed a little further away from the trunk than

This ensures that when the branch is cut, it will not 'rip' a strip off the trunk.

Never leave a stump that will die back, or cut flush with the trunk. Always leave a small 'collar' at the base of the branch that will encourage bark to grow over the wound.

Research shows that dressing a tree wound with chemicals is not usually necessary.

Keep your tree healthy and it will be able to take care of its wounds on its own, and everyone will be able to see the reward of all your hard work. Keep them healthy: Follow the pruning tips and give your trees some tender loving care.

This week in the garden

Some gardeners take culinary peas, plant them outside to mature and are very successful at it. To have any chance whatso-ever you must choose a sheltered spot with well drained soil. To improve your chances further, choose the hardiest variety of pea you can such as Pilot Improved or Meteor.

Dig up seakale for forcing

The top growth of the plant should have died back by now and this means the ideal time has arrived to lift the roots for forcing. Dig them up carefully and cut off the side sprouts of the root bundle and leave in a sheltered position outside for planting in March. Face the central roots against a wall and cover them with sand until only the crown is visible.

Christmas rhubarb

If you start your roots at once in a 21°C greenhouse you should get good sticks in time for Christmas. Strong roots should be lifted and left in the open for a few days. If the weather is frosty it will actually improve the growth of the plant later on. Plant in the greenhouse, in deep soil close together, cover them with bin liners so they are in complete darkness, water moderately and try to maintain a temperature range of 13-24°C.

Tidy herbaceous borders

Most herbaceous perennials will have finished flowering and the borders should be made ready for winter. Cut off all of dead or dying leaves and stems but leave all the evergreen leaves alone. Give the ground a dusting of bone meal and prick the surface of the ground with a fork, being careful not to disturb plants or bulbs in the process.

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CHILDCARE SEMINAR **Changing Attitudes**

The afternoon was devoted to workshops on all the topics including an additional workshop by Trocaire on the use of the WATOTO pack, which has been produced in response to the growing need for educational materials which reflect the

wider world.

All participants received an information pack from their respective Childcare Committee with relevant information including copies of all presentations made on the day, the Barnardos Publication and the WATOTO pack. Feedback from the participants was excellent and many identified the value they got from the days' seminar in terms of this being their first opportunity to look at diversity and the changing environments for children in such a positive way. Comments included: 'marvellous opportunity to learn so much about difference in such a positive way', 'great to have the chance to meet other childcare practitioners with the same concerns', 'fabulous to get more ideas and practical tips on how best to ensure a fully inclusive environment in my centre'.

Natural Wonders of the World



Around the world are natural wonders that have become landmarks and tourist attractions. Many are record breaking natural features, such as the tallest mountain or the highest waterfall. Others are unusual or spectacular Landforms that have been created by the weather, or by movements in the Earth's crust.


Movements In The Earth's Crust Formed Ayers Rock

Wind-blown sands have shaped Ayres Rock, in the Australian outback. Movements in the Earth's crust formed a red sandstone hill about 500 million years ago. Aboriginal people call the rock Uluru and for them every cliff, boulder and cave has sacred meaning.

It Took Six Million Years For The Colorado River To Form The Grand Canyon

Over millions of years, rivers can carve canyons thousands of metres (feet) deep through solid rock. The Grand Canyon in Arizona, USA is the worlds longest land gorge.

It stretches for 450 km (280 mi) and is 1.6 km (1 mi) deep. Its walls have been described as a cross-section through time, as each layer of rock is older than the one above it. The oldest rocks, at the foot of the Canyon, are at least 2 billion years old.



DID YOU KNOW?

Niagara Falls Fist Formed 12,000 Years Ago A waterfall is a vertical drop of rock over which a river falls. Waterfalls form when rivers pass over hard rock, then over a layer of softer rock. As the softer rock wears away, a vertical face of hard rock is left behind. Spray from Victoria Falls on the river Zambezi, in Africa, reaches heights of 500m (1,650 ft). In the rainy season, the water flows at the rate of 550 million litres (120 million gal) a minute, over the rock faces. At Niagara Falls on the US-Canadian border, water falls at 80 km (50 mi) an hour, wearing away about a metre (3ft) of rock every year. The falls are now 11 km (7 mi further upriver than they were when they first formed about 12,000 years ago. The world's highest waterfall is Angel Falls in Venezuela, which have a total drop of 979m (3,212 ft).

Danú To Kick Off Irish Tour **KEVIN KIRRANE** When long time lead singer Ciaran O Gealbhain decided

to quit Danu, many would be forgiven for thinking Ireland's top Traditional Music group would struggle to survive. Instead, this month, having returned from a hectic tour of America, they have launched their strongest album to date, and have just kicked off a tour of Ireland.

Even leading music critics, Ita Kelly and Art Hisler, were confounded, reputedly remarking when they met the band; "I don't know how you do it. When somebody leaves there's always someone just as good, if not better, to replace them."

Danu's new lead singer, is also the bands first female member - Muireann Nic Amhloidh - a 24 year old native of the Dun Chaoin, Co. Kerry, and a distinctive voice on The Road Less Travelled.

"People were nervous at first about recording this album," Donnchadh Gough - Bodhran and Uilleann piper on the new ablum, said. "Now that it's out there, it's getting a great reception. They all thought - what's Danu going to be like without Ciaran?

If the album is anything to go by the answer, unquestionably, is a remarkable mixture of traditional airs, striking melodies, and a sound far removed from the Diddley Eye music with which all Traditional Groups are unfairly la-

But, the key to a smooth transition between lead singers, and from the number of line-up changes in the past - the number of which would have finished just about any other group long before - is that they can't be compared, Donnchadh told the Dungarvan Leader.

"We couldn't replace Ciaran with a male singer," he said. "There are no guys out there who can sing like him for a start. But, with Muireann, she's a female singer. You can't

compare them."

"Muireann is just an exception," he added. "She's just a brilliant singer, and a brilliant whistle player"

Muireann joined the group through Oisin MacCauley, who sings backing vocals and plays fiddle. She joined the group as they were recording The Road Less Travelled.

Donnchadh said: "She came in on a Monday, and we rehearsed for about two weeks, and had the album recorded in Ring. The whole thing was done and dusted in about four weeks, which I think was fairly remarkable."

She was also part of the band's American tour, and received a tremendous reception.

"Obviously, she's brought a whole new thing to the band. She's great on stage, and she gets the audience buzzing."

Stateside, Donnchadh said, people had tears streaming down their faces when she performed County Down - a haunting track from the great singer/songwriter Tommy

Danu classify themselves as a touring band, with the average day in America consisting of early starts and six or seven hour bus journeys from venue to venue.

Organising tours virtually as they go has become a way of life for the band on the road.

It wasn't always so successful to begin with. At the start, having to pay managers, and tour organisers, almost saw the band become bankrupt.

Now they organise everything from hotel rooms to stage lighting themselves. They've played the Hollywood Bowl, topped the bill at the world famous Winnipeg Festival (playing in front of 25,000 people), and played in Scandanavia, France, the UK, to name but a few.

They have been honoured by the BBC as best folk band, amongst a veritable treasure trove of awards to date.

This phenomnal growth arose out of the Oireachtas, which was held in Dungarvan in 1994. Donnchadh, Donal Clancy, Benny MacCarthy, and Daire Bracken, hit it off at the festival, and were invited to a festival in France. They later met Tom and Eamonn Doorley in Dublin, and the band has continued to evolve ever since.

This year, Donal Clancy, has returned to the fold after a few years absence, and his guitar playing greatly compliments a number of tracks on the new album.

Having sold over forty thousand copies of their last album - All Things Considered (the hardest album to record to date taking over a year to lay down, Donnchadh said) - the band expect their new album to eclipse even that.

it's suspected Mr. Mansfield died as the result of taking a number of ecstasy tablets.

His body was removed yesterday (Tuesday) from Waterford Regional Hospital to Newtown Parish Church, and his burial took place earlier today (Wednesday).

Meanwhile, Superintendent, Mick Blake, issued a public warning about the health dangers of ecstasy use, and other drugs, and said they need to be more graphically highlighted.

"People need to be educated properly of the inherent dangers of drugs and that need is greater now than at any other time in the past," he told the Irish Ex-

Supt. Blake had said at a previous meeting of Waterford County Council that recent drug seizures in the town were an indication of the level of drugs available.

In the past eighteen months alone, gardai have seized quantities of drugs with a street value of more than eur300,000. with one seizure alone accounting for 250,000 euros worth of an illegal substance.

It's also estimated that 100 drug seizures of varying types and quantities take place each year in the area.

Gardai described the death as a tragedy waiting to happen given the continuing upwards spiral of drug related offences

Drugs Seized Bad News For First Time **Buyers In Contribution** Scheme — CLLR. DILLON

Dungarvan Town Councillor, Damien Dillon, has strongly criticised the proposed new Development Contribution Scheme, as draconian and repressive to first time buyers.

Dismissing cliams that the charges will be absorbed by developers as "disingenuous if not downright dishonest," he said, it comes on top of the phasing out of the First Time Buyers Grant and reducing mortgage interest tax relief.

He argued that the introduction of the scheme is camouflaged taxation designed not to offend the electorate by wrapping it up in "harmless lan-guage" in the Planning Development Act 2000.

"This is not stealth but is downright banditry," Cllr. Dillon claimed.

The development charges are designed to contribute towards Local Authority services including water, roads, and other amenities.

But, while he said he understands these services must be paid for, the Independant candidate in next years local elections, questioned why the burden must be so heavy on first time buyers at the most critical time in a young couples life.

"These changes are to the detriment of our youth, attempting to get onto a very difficult and expensive property ladder. Nor does the perpetra-tor seem to understand the simple economics that if our youngsters cannot afford houses of their own, they will end up on an already overburdened

Speaking about his position when it comes to voting on the charges, Cllr. Dillon said he does not shirk from hard decisions; "but I have great difficulty with this one.

"I understand that the Government's argument is that there should be a strenthening of the Local Authorities powers, and they see this as giving power to Local Authorities. But in doing this, they are conveniently divesting themselves of the financial burden of providing the services.'

He also argued that paying the amount up front shows how "stupid the notion" is.

"...most people barely have

the deposit to buy or to commence building, and they want to take that away first and destroy the capability of borrow-

Instead, he suggested exempting first time buyers from the levy, considerably reducing the amounts being targeted, and drawing up a framework where payments should not have to be paid up front.

"There have been Public Notices in the newspapers explaining the proposal in detail. It is important that we respond to that invitation," he said.

Kinsalebeg Realignment To Start In 2005

A dangerous section of road between Piltown Cross and Youghal Bridge - the scene of a number of fatal accidents in recent years - will be straightened in major realignment work to commence sometime in 2005, it has emerged.

Waterford County Council authorised the start of the compulsory purchase order phase on Monday last, which will see the acquistion of land in Ticknock, Shanacoole and Pil-

According to Cllr. Tom Cronin (FF), who previously described the road as a glorified boreen, the local authority hope work will begin early in 2005, and if difficulties with landowners aren't encountered it could commence even soon-

The project had been down the list of the National Road Authorities priorities, but following a meeting at the opening of the Youghal Bypass between Minister, Seamus Brennan, Deputy Ollie Wilkinson, and Cllr. Tom Cronin, the project is now to be advanced.

DEATH TRAP TO BE FINALLY ADDRESSED

When we met Minister Brennan, we highlighted how, with the new Youghal Bypass, people will be travelling faster when they encounter the narrow strip of road between the new bypass and Piltown Cross," Cllr. Cronin said.

We drove Minister Brennan on the road, and he agreed that it is a recipe for disaster."

It's estimated that over the past twenty years a large number of accidents and two deaths have occurred each year on the stretch of road. In the past, the Gardai also highlighted the need for the dangers on the road to be addressed.

"The Minister was appalled by the level of accidents that have occurred there," Cllr. Cronin said.

"Minister Brennan gave us a committment that he would try to push this onto the next stage, and we are delighted now that he has stood by it, and that Waterford County Council today, (Monday), has signed off on the complusory purchase order


SPORT

DAIRYING: Profit, profitability or cash flow?

Do you understand these three terms?

Profit is the income made from farming.

Profitability is the percentage of the total output retained as

 Net cash flow is the surplus cash available when all payments (including living expenses) have been made.

A lot of farmers are focussed on trying to increase their farm profit without looking at their level of profitability.

Profitability can be improved by increasing output (increased milk protein, reduced replacement rate etc) or by reducing costs.

The acquisition of milk quota will usually lead to increased profit but may not improve net cash flow over the medium term - while the loan is being repaid.

Therefore when assessing the viability of purchasing milk quota, you must get an accurate estimate of future cash flows. Teagasc has a computer programme available to carry out such an analysis - contact your local dairy advisor for further details.

Temporary leasing milk quota?

It makes sense to let unused quota in the 2003/04 quota year. You will receive 4 cent/ litre payment from the co-op but lose out on a coupled payment of 1.21 cent/ litre.

Dairy farmers who wish to qualify for the de-coupled entitlements cannot temporary lease their quota to the co-op in the 2004/05

De-coupled entitlements will be based on quota held (owned, temporary leased onto the farm, and private leased onto the farm) on March 31st 2005.

In addition to holding the quota on this date, the quota holder must also qualify as a producer i.e. would need to supply some milk in the 2004/05 milk quota year.

CATTLE: What Can You Get From Silage This Winter

Before answering the question on what performance can you expect to get from your silage, a more fundamental question is what do you need to get from silage and other feeds this winter. On a beef farm finishing cattle have the highest daily feed cost in winter, ranging from 1.50 to 1.80 per day on typical silage and meal diets. To cover these feed costs alone requires a liveweight gain of 1.0 kg per day and a carcase gain of 0.6 kg per day. Other costs such as interest, machinery, slurry handling and possibly labour, push costs of production over the market returns. Profits depend on capturing as much of the premia as possible which includes not giving too much of it away in the price paid for the animal as a weanling or store. Weanlings and store cattle that will go to grass next spring on your own farm should perform at 0.6 to 0.8 kg per day over the winter to keep them on target for 24 month or under 30 month finishing as appropriate. Spring calving suckler cows should be fed to body condition score. Cows in good condition now (score 3 or better) can be let lose condition whereas thin cows should be brought up to condition score 2.5 at calving.

Performance from Silage

The feeding value of silage is a function of intake and digestibility. A high intake and a high digestibility produces a high feeding value. Indeed, there is also a close relationship between digestibility and intake. A silage with a high digestibility provided it is well preserved, will also give a high intake. Stemmy forages are digested more slowly, the rate of passage through the gut is reduced with consequent reduction in intake. Because of these relationships we can make a direct link between digestibility and animal performance if we assume that the silage is well preserved where such silage is offered fresh and fully to appetite daily the performance expected is shown in the table.

Effect of Digestibility on Animal Performance Silage DMD % Liveweight Gain kg/day Finishing Cattle | Weanlings 70 65 0.4 0.2

These are guideline figures and there is substantial variation around these with different groups of animals. Furthermore, on commercial units, items like continuous access to feed and the condition of the feed offered can have an effect on intake and performance. Weight recording on farms have often found performance levels of about 10% below these shown in the table. It is prudent to err on the cautions side when setting concentration supolementation rates for silage.

Farm Business Course

Teagasc is running many different courses for farmers at various locations around county Waterford this autumn. It has proven quite difficult to attract farmers into the Teagasc Farm Business Course. This appears rather strange because training in understanding the financial management of a business should be basic to the running of any business. Furthermore in a business that is going through a period of great change for the industry it is even more important that everyone engaged in the industry has a clear understanding of the financial management of his/her business. One business course has already been completed in Dungarvan. Here are comments made by two farmers on this course. "Very informative and very helpful". "More farmers should try and do this interesting course. I intend to tell people about this course and encourage them to take part in a course like this"

The next course will be held in Teagasc Lismore 10.30 a.m. - 1.00 p.m. November 28th, December 5th, 12th, and 19th. The course will help participants to clearly understand their annual farm accounts and to make use of the information from these accounts to assess the health of the business

FARMING LEADER

Strong Christmas **Beef Trade** To Lift Cattle **Prices**

Strong market demand and tight finish cattle supplies between now and the end of the year will drive up cattle prices according to IFA Livestock Director Kevin Kinsella.

Speaking Carbury/Cadamstown IFA Branch meeting in Derrinturn, Co. Kildare this week Kevin Kinsella said Christmas demand from the retail trade in the UK and on the Continent will be strong for Irish beef. He said some factory outlets are contracting R grade cattle at €2.44/kg (87p/lb) rising to €2.63/kg (94p/lb) at the end of the year. They are contracting U grade stock at €2.52/kg (90p/lb) rising to €2.63/kg (94p/lb) by year end.

The IFA Livestock Director said cattle farmers are totally opposed to the Department of Agriculture's proposal to hand over beef carcase classification to factory operatives from January 1st 2004 in the move to mechanical classification. "It is set down clearly in the National Programme Sustaining Progress that the Department would introduce mechanical classification to replace the current graders as soon as possible".

Kevin Kinsella said IFA had secured an 80% solution to the special beef premium penalty caused by the restrictive 50 head beef premium penalty limit imposed in 2002. He said the solution negotiated by Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh means that farmers will get 80% of their full 2002 beef premium as part of their payment entitlements going forward on an annual basis. This is worth 6.4m per annum in payment entitlements.

Kevin Kinsella said IFA has a sustained campaign to protect live exports focused on changes to the radical proposals launched by EU Commissioner David Byrne earlier this year, which will restrict the trade.

The Irish Cattle and Sheep Farmers' Association has an nounced that its presidential election will take place at a meeting of the ICSA national executive committee on Thursday 4th of December. DECOUPLING MUST BE FOLLOWED BY TARGETED PROGRAMME TO UPGRADE SUCKLER HERD -GRAY

Waterford IFA Chairman, Harry Gray has said that the introduction of full decoupling would "eliminate much of the bureaucracy which has plagued livestock farmers and distorted the beef sector and instead allow farmers focus on getting viable margins from cattle production".

The Waterford IFA Chairman said "it is now critically important that all of the modulation funds collected from livestock farmers are kept within the livestock sector and used as a targeted payment to encourage structural reform and quality production".

"When fully implemented, the modulation fund for livestock should be worth €40m and this must be targeted through a beef breeding programme. This would provide an incentive worth up to €70 per suckler cow for producers.'

A dear friend of many people in Tallow passed away recently. lack Jones. He took us all by surprise. We knew he was ill but i seemed incomprehensible that he would depart this world so rapidly given his zest for life and enjoyment of all that's wholesome in this world. Until his final illness he was a vigorous animated person full of cheerfulness whose company it was always a joy to share. How could any of us imagine that a man who neither smoked nor drank would leave us so soon.

Jack was a great source of entertainment. To meet him on the street, meant a long, witty, animated conversation. He was so well read and so widely travelled that a chat with Jack was a very interesting, educational and rewarding experience. He had great qualities of mind and heart. His Christian faith, high standards and conviction of the dignity of every human person shone through his fascinating conversations. I never heard him speak in derogatory fashion about another person. Would that we all could emulate his glowing Christian charity.

Jack and his wife Mary came to Tallow a decade ago and took up residence on the Youghal Road. He was anxious to spend his retirement in the land of his wife Mary, a native of Limerick and chose Tallow because I presume he liked the air of tranquility which pervaded the place and the absence of that frenetic pace which distinguished bigger towns and cities. Tallow's laid-back relaxed atmosphere found a kindred spirit in Jack.

Tallow gave ample scope to him to indulge his great love of angling, with the River Bride within a short distance from his home. He spent many evenings on the banks of the Bride oblivious to the busy world nearby and its distractions. Of course he was a member of the local Angling Club and enthusiastic about all of its activities. Tallow Anglers didn't forget Jack on the evening of his removal because they formed a guard of honour as his remains were taken into the Church of the Immaculate Conception.

Jack was English, having been born in the heart of the Midlands, in Wolverhampton over 80 years ago. It is a measure of his patriotism that, after a distinguished academic career, he should enlist in his country's army. He saw service overseas in North Africa mainly.

When he left the Army he returned to his profession as a Civil Engineer and worked mainly in Zimbabwe, or Rhodesia as it was then known. Mary and himself spent over a quarter of a century in that warm sunny part of the continent.

Back in Ireland where Mary's close relatives lived he settled down to a contented life of ease and enjoyment. He had such Catholic tastes that everything was of interest to him and he loved all sport, with rod and line taking priority over all other sporting pastimes.

It saddens me that we won't have the pleasure of meeting this warm vibrant cultured person again. William Howard Davies poetic words come to mind when I think of Jack. "What is this life if full of care, we have no time to stand and stare". Jack always had time for people and his bubbly, glowing character will be sadly missed here in Tallow.

It was entirely in character for Jack to donate his remains for medical research. This generosity of spirit, examplifies his nobility and care, care for others who would benefit from his last good

Time To Move Crohaun Mast?

A Waterford County Councillor has written to the Regulatory Affairs division of the Dept. of Communications, Marine & Natural Resources to establish if there is any possibility that what he has described as one of the most insensitively located telecommunications in the country can be moved.

Dungarvan area Labour representative Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair was referring to the structure sited since the mid 1990s at the side of Crohaun mountain in the Comeragh range. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says it has been protruding dramatically in the Co. Waterford skyline for long enough and that those regulating telecommunications would do well to look at the feasibilities of relocating it.

Cllr. O Céilleachair said it is remarkable that so many people continue to wonder how a set of planning circumstances arose whereby such a significant structure appeared in exposed land-scape away from the summit of a prominent upland. Adding comments on the subject, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said: "The mast lies east of the townland of Coolnasmearmountain on the border of the parishes of Kilbrien - in my Dungarvan electoral area - and

Kilrossanty. Travel the N25 from Lemybrien towards Dungarvan or stand on the bridges between Abbeyside and Dungarvan and one cannot help but be struck at the sight of something reminiscent of a missile launch site to the side of Crohaun. We all appreciate the importance of telecommunications transmission but as to whether something tangible can be learned at how matters have been dealt with in scenic locations in other counties is a question I look forward to having addressed by the Dept. of Communications, Marine & Natural Resources".

Vehicles Seriously Damaged After Lorry Sheds Load

Seven cars were damaged, a number of them seriously, on Wednesday morning last after a lorry lost part of its load of stones and boulders along a stretch of road in the West Waterford area. The incident occurred along the Ballyduff to Aglish road around seven o'clock in the morning.

The incident resulted in hundreds of euros worth of damage being caused to a number of vehicles. One car was a write-off after significant damage was caused to its engine. The wheels and undercarriages of three vehicles were also damaged, while the engines of three other vehicles were less seriously damaged.

An oil spillage also occurred as a result of the incident.

ACFO with Dungarvan Fire Brigade, Des O'Brien, said the oil spills and boulders were dispersed at lengthy distances apart along the road.

"The oil probably spread on the tyres of the cars," he said. A number of large stones had also been dragged along by the undercarriages of some vehicles.

The Fire Service were in attendence and dispersed the oil after a three hour operation.

Meanwhile, Gardai are following a definite line of enquiry in their attempts to track down the owner of the vehicle which caused the incident. If the vehicle is not discovered the local authority face a sizable bill for the extensive clean-up operation.




(A) Do our readers know where 'An Boithrin Caoch' (The Blind Road) is situated. Well, many of our readers know that is now named 'King Street', the street where Michael Carroll's Motors were located and which he sold on when he moved to new premises on the Waterford to Cork by-pass road. Some beautiful high quality houses have been constructed on the site which have added immensely to the ambience of the street. King Street Upper and King Street Lower was one street until the building of the railway in 1865 transected it. The turn from King Street into Sexton Street must have been constructed at the time the Railway was built.

(B) Cul a tSailin - 'The back of the (Sea) Pond". This is now known as 'Home Rule Street'. It is the street opposite Strandside South coming from Minnies direction.

(C) Bothar a' Choileara - 'Quarry Lane'. It was later called 'Humble Street' and it was a hollow green field opposite where Shears Street is now located. Some of the houses in T.J. Murphy Place are now built on the site. Shears Street was once known as 'Humble Street' after the local landlords the Humble-Nugents whose burial plot is in the 'Clogas'

(D) Slate Lane was the home of many of the old Abbeyside families. It was built opposite the quarry mentioned in (C) above. Again some of the houses in Murphy place are built on this site. For your information Shears Street is the street to Abbeyside School from the Shell Cottage.

Armed with these place names we hope our readers walk around 'The Village' will never be the same again as they heighten their powers of observation.

Need For Sustainable Salmon **Fishery**

Labour Party Spokesperson Brian O'Shea T.D. has been informed by the Minister for Communications, Marine and Natural Resources, Dermot Ahern T.D. that should a regional fisheries board bring forward developed proposals for a local catchment based setaside scheme, he would be prepared to consider such a proposal provided that any matching funds required would come from within the existing allocations to the fisheries boards.

Minister Ahern further stated that his overriding objective is to preserve the salmon resource in its own right and for the coastal and rural communities that it helps to support. The economic goals for a sustainable commercial salmon fisher based on quality and value rather than volume, and also the development of salmon angling as an important tourism product, are both full compatible with the primary objective.

He has no plans to introduce a national set-aside scheme for commercial salmon fishermen. There is already a regime of measures including quotas and bag limits which are being implemented through the Central and Regional Fisheries Boards, the aim of which is to first and foremost allow adequate spawning stock into our rivers through the establishment of and adherence to, conservation limits leading to restoration of salmon stocks and a sustainable salmon fishery.

Deputy O'Shea has written to the Southern Fisheries Board seeking what proposals, if any, the Board has to introduce a local catchment based set-aside scheme.





But this did not take place and the filly was put under orders even though she was clearly planted at the start. The rest as they say is history. The tape went across and Thrills and Spills took no part and thanks to the starter's inefficiency those punters who backed Thrills And Spills got no run for their money and worse still no refund of those victories on their stake.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

"WALLIES OF THE WEEK AWAR

The Waterford County Board were awarded the "Wallies of the Week award" in PJ Cunningham's Irish Independent weekly awards column last Thursday. It would appear that we are the laughing stock of the country. I write this letter in relation to the farcical situation we find ourselves in this county in relation to a number of issues regarding GAA matters and our policy of one step forward followed by two steps

The first issue regards the county senior football champions, be it Tramore or Stradbally, not being allowed to represent our county in the Munster Championship. There appears to be a feeling in some quarters that this is the fault of the Munster Council who are penalising us for our late finish of our championship. Completely incorrect, the Munster Council are introducing more professional structures including new rules for a more professionally run championship. The main architects, I believe, of this situation are the County Board who have been unable to finish our championship within a reasonable time frame. They in turn blame

Waterford's participation in the Munster Hurling Championship yet counties such as Tyrone, Kilkenny and Cork to name just three, who have contested all-Ireland Finals this year, have their county championships done and dusted. As one wag put it, "why should we be playing county finals in September when the weather is too good". The whole farce is deeply unfair and insulting to the many players and managers and coaches who have been in some cases waiting months between championship matches.

breakthrough in Football with the excellent annexing of the Munster Under-21 Title and many people indicating that this will be a springboard for future football success. Not at all, we won't build on it with our present structures and mentality. How can we build on it and we can't even enter a club team with many of these Under-21 players included on the bigger stage in Munster. The hurling situation let, me not go there. While the first round was wisely set for April, it was four months later before it was actually played. We in this county I believe would be better to forget about the excuses and instead become a progressive and vibrant county led by strong leadership.

When such progressive recommendations are brought for discussion to our county such as the SRC recommendations, there is apprehension from certain quarters who feel why should we change things which have kept us in good stead for the past three quar-ters of a century. But time has moved on. Those who fear progressive change should not I believe be holding up change in structures in the county. Those who are fearing and holding up change should be deeply thanked for the excellent contribution they made to Waterford GAA over many years in the past and new people with fresh ideas brought on to decision making committees and boards.

This leads on to the issue of the existence of a Western and Eastern Board in a small county like Waterford. Seventy Five years ago this was very practical for transport reasons but not in this modern age. Now one can travel from Tallow to Passage in just over an hour. Yes the number of board members will be reduced in a joint body as opposed to the combined number of board members on Western and Eastern Boards but I am sure that for the good of their beloved game, board members will have no problem stepping down for betterment of Water-

The issuing of tickets to all patrons for championship and league matches should be introduced. Eamonn Murphy, a most professional former County Board Chairman attempted to introduce this in his tenure a number of years ago. Issuing of tickets would certainly be a professional approach.

Finally, the County Board will probably say that they will make an effort next year to finish championships on time but come next year, we will have the same old story! The programme at Sunday's Semi-Final match echoed this sentiment, "in future years that our championships will be so programmed as to make sure of an early finish". The same old story year after year!
