"Superdump" Hearing To Be Delayed By **Judicial Review**

OLD PARISH FARMER SEEKS BILINGUAL ORAL HEARING

A High Court Challenge into the way in which An Bord Pleanala planned to conduct the Oral Hearing into the location of a "superdump" near the River Lickey at Garrynagree, is set to delay the start of the planning board's proceedings.

Tomas O Mathuna, from Sean Phobail, Dun Garbhan, was granted leave on Monday last by Justice O'Neill to seek, in judicial review proceedings, orders directing the Bord to conduct the oral hearing simulatenously through Irish and

Mr. O Mathuna also secured a stay restraining the oral hearing from proceeding on December

Council for Mr. O Mathuna said the application arose from a proposal by Waterford County Council to build a landfill site straddling the border between the Gaeltacht and the townlands outside the Gaeltacht.

Subsequently, Joe Noonan, solicitor for Mr. O Mathuna, asked An Bord Pleanala to confirm it would run the oral

hearing on a bilingual basis.

tion that simultaneous translation facilities would be provided. The Planning Board refused to make these facilities available.

In the High Court, Mr. O Mathuna's council argued that his constitutional rights, as held under Article 8 of the Constitution, had been breached by An Bord Pleanala's refusal.

Mr. O Mathuna also complained that none of the materials relevant to the Oral Hearing especially the Environmental Impact Statement had been translated into Irish.

Traders Reject 'Meanest Town **In Ireland' Claims**

Claims in a national radio programme that Dungarvan is the "meanest town in Ireland" after the Chamber of Commerce pulled out from their involvement in the erection of Christmas Lights in the town, were strongly refuted by a number of traders.

The Chamber of Commerce due to dwindling contributions, and the trader said; "I don't and spiralling insurance costs. But traders say many businesses in the town have continuosly contributed towards the cost of the lights, and fear they're all being tarred with the same







PYLON SAGA SET TO CONTINUE **ESB To Apply For Retention**

The ESB is set to make an application for the retention of a pair of massive steel plyons located close to the home of two elderly brothers in Ballyneety

in the coming days.
Frankie, 52, and his 68 yearold invalid brother, Monnie, have endured a three year battle against the ESB and Waterford County Council over the structures - a battle which they say has been seriously detrimental to their health

Despite winning a landmark victory against the ESB in August, the Drummy's must now await the outcome of the expected retention application before deciding on their next step. On the 4th of November, the

council sent a warning notice to the ESB giving them four weeks to either remove the structures or apply for reten-

The ESB did make a retention application shortly afterwards although this has been ruled invalid.

However, it is expected that the ESB will re-apply shortly.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Frank Drummy said this entire situation could have been avoided if either Waterford County Council or the ESB officials had listened to the concerns they were expressing as far back as 2000.

Instead, he claimed both bodies bullied on with illegal developments at Ballyneety.

90ml hot water

2 eggs, lightly beaten 1 x 15ml sp jam (extra)

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180'C/350'F/ Gas Mark 4. Grease a 23cm tin, line with greaseproof paper, then grease the paper. Sift the flours, bicarbonate of soda and cocoa in a large mixing bowl. Make a well in the centre.

Place the butter, sugar, jam and water in a small pan. Stir over a low heat until the butter has melted and sugar has dissolved. Remove from the heat and add to the dry ingredients and the eggs. Stir with a wooden spoon until just combined. Do not overbeat.

Pour mixture into prepared tin, smoothing the surface. Bake for 35 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean when inserted into the middle of the cake.

Leave cake to stand in tin for 15 minutes before turning out to cool on a wire rack. Heat extra jam in a small pan and brush it over the cake.

Serve with whipped cream.







MUSEUM NOTES

19th century Churches of Waterford continued

Cappoquin Church: This was built on land leased from Sir John Keane of Cappoquin House. The lease dated 13th June 1819 is made out to John Healy Esq. and Michael Kerrissy "for the use of the parishioners for ever, at one shilling rent per year, if ever demanded". The building was completed in 1822 during the term of the Rev. John Walsh (resigned 1849). In 1856 the Rev. Michael Spratt erected the surrounding wall and iron railings. In 1872 the floor of the church was tiled and benches were installed. This was during the pastorate of Rev. Patrick Power who was the author of a 3-volume work "Catechism; Doctrinal, Moral, Historical and Liturgical". Father Power was a native of Cappoquin. Patrick Denn schoolmaster and poet is buried by the north boundary wall. The memorial tablet is in-scribed: "The religious works written by him in the Irish language met with general approval and are proofs of his learning as an Irish Scholar and his zeal and piety as a sincere Christian. His holy life was closed by a happy death on 5th July 1828. Aged 72. Erected by Rev. P. Power". The exterior of the church has been modernized but it still retains its fine altar surround.



Paving the way for a new look

Attractive, practicable and easy-to-maintain, hard landscaping is one of the best ways to get the most from your garden and enhance the appearance of your

What's more, a luxurious patio, splendid path or fabulous feature needn't cost the earth and can easily be created over a weekend if you are willing to work hard. Whatever type of landscaping project captures your imagination, don't forget to include at least one circle or curve. Popular with today's designers and homeowners alike, circles and curves can really make a difference to your patio and are perfect for winding paths through the garden or even framing a

On the market these days you can find ready-to-lay packs of half-circle paving, ideal for framing a pond or creating a path - and an excellent short cut for those whose slab-laying skills aren't up to much.

They are usually include all of the different segments you might need to create a half-circle about 3m in diameter. Don't forget that the landscaping materials you use should complement the style of your home.

So if you want to maintain a traditional look, go for the grey/green colouring and a deep pattern.

This type of paving looks best when laid

in an apparent random pattern or edged with brindle coloured block paving to give an interesting panelled effect. For older style properties, choose paving with an aged and weathered effect.

Pond features are extremely desirable and can be easily constructed over a weekend - if Charlie Dimock can do it, so can you!. You will need some sand, a pond liner, a large pond pump, a pond If you have any old and unwanted

protecting the pond liner from any sharp stones that seek to puncture your efforts.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN Dig and store Jerusalem artichokes, parsnips, horseradish and salsify

Jerusalem Artichokes will have finished their growth so it is safe to cut off the tops and dig up the tubers with a fork. Store the bigger tubers the same way you would potatoes and put the smaller ones aside in a dry room or shed for planting later. Parsnips and horseradish are perfectly fine if left in the cold all winter - but you may find it hard to eat them if you can't dig them up because the ground is frozen! Dig a few now and store them for eating later. Cut off the tops and cover them in some dry sand or soil in a dry room or shed. The salsify should be dug and stored in the same way as the parsnips and horseradish, but if you want the plant to flower in spring it is perfectly OK to leave it planted throughout winter.

Cut back deciduous hedges

All deciduous hedges such as hawthorn, blackthorn, myrobalan plum, sweet briar, beech and tamarisk can be pruned in November. This is also a good time to do any hand cutting you think may be necessary to keep plant growth within bounds. The base of the hawthorn or sweet briar sometimes gets a bit bare, but this can be rectified by pinning the longer shoots into position.

Plant deciduous trees, shrubs and climbers

Planting cannot take place when the ground is very wet or frozen. Otherwise this is the perfect time to plant trees, shrubs, roses and climbers when lifted from open ground. Replanting should be taken care of as soon after the leaves have dropped as possible. However, if you have little time to spare, the planting of several plants can be spread over a period. If you cannot finish by the first or second week into December, postpone planting until early February. Make the hole deep enough to cover all the roots with 10 cms of soil and wide enough to fit them in a perfectly natural manner.

Since this SPC began work in 2000 it has benefited from presentations delivered by such diverse groups as Focus Ireland, the Heritage Council, Dúchas and Dungarvan

These presentations by external experts are in addition to presentations made on various

issues, by staff of Waterford Co. Council. The Committee has also visited facilities such Paudie Coffey (Chairperson), as the Arts Centre, Museum and the SHY Project in Waterford city, which provides community facilities catering for all age

The Committee has considered major strategies and plans such as, Waterford Co. Council Corporate Plan 2000 – 2004, Housing Strategy, Homeless Strategy, Library Development Plan, and Arts Plan. However, of more relevance to the general public is the wide variety of practical policies, which benefit and involve the community. Among the foremost of these is the Committees' review of The SPC is serviced by Peter playground facilities which has

gramme being put in place for the provision of playgrounds throughout the county. Already, playgrounds have been provided in Tramore and Portlaw and negotiations are progressing for provision of facilities in Cappoquin, Tallow and Ardmore.

A grants scheme for maintenance and upkeep of old graveyards was put in train by the SPC. Following adoption of the "Cemetery Improvement and Maintenance Scheme" by the Council, no less than 14 applications for grant assistance were processed during the first six months alone.

The SPC has instigated the provision of financial assistance for operations such as the Waterford & Suir Valley Railway. Commitment has also been given to by the Council to endeavour to assist with the provision of parking in the vicinity of the old railway station Kilmeaden, on the recommendation of the SPC. Similarly, financial assistance has been provided for the Museum Society and the SPC has now requested that a working group be set up to look at the implications and issues involved in establishing a County Museum facility.

The Disabled Persons' Grants (DPG) Scheme has been dramatically revamped by the Committee to reflect the Council's commitment to those most in need. Amendments include the application of means testing and priority to be given based on medical reports from the SEHB. The Council's Scheme of Letting Priorities (allocation of position on Housing List) is currently under review. An amended scheme is due to be recommended to the full Council in the near future. The amended scheme will allow for issues such as anti-social behaviour and previous history of significant rent arrears to be taken into account.

On the recommendation of the SPC the Council has adopted a policy for signage throughout the county. The policy aims to restore primacy to that native version of Irish placenames by showing Irish and English in equal prominence on all signposts in the county.

Chairperson of the SPC, Cllr. Paudie Coffey FG says that he is satisfied that the issues dealt with by this SPC are such that effective changes can be made. He goes on to state "The strength of the SPC system is that it gives Councillors an informed and broadly consulted view and ultimately Councillors can make decisions in the knowledge that adequate consultation and debate has taken place, among all the stakeholders and interested parties, prior to policy recommendation and adoption." He also stresses that although the SPC may recommend a policy for adoption, the final decision lies with the Council. "This approval of the Council is vital" he states "as Councillors are the members of the SPC who are held accountable by the electorate, given their mandate to decide policy on behalf of the people they represent." He does however

In order to consider whether Carey, Director of Services, resulted in a five year profeel that there is room for some improvement in order to deliver a more comprehensive, representative view. To this end he suggests that the issue of back up resources for Community representatives needs to be addressed.

Triona Foley, representing the Disadvantaged sector sums up the operation of the SPC as follows "There is always a fear of tensions either existing or surfacing when committees cross the divide between Statutory Bodies and Community groups. This has not been my experience of the SPC. There is a mutual respect between all parties and a determination to ensure that no one is either let down or put down. Each member is given equal opportunity to put forward the views of the sector which they represent and these views are given genuine consideration, not simply paid lip service.

Bearing in mind that the SPC meets only four times a year, the volume and variety of issues considered and progressed suggests a very effective and committed group.

Those entitled to make a claim under the Act include the following:-

- Anyone diagnosed with Hepatitis C or HIV which was caused by contaminated Anti-D or blood products,
- Spouses or carers of those infected may also have a claim
- Family members of a person who died mainly as a result of Hepatitis C or HIV, which was caused by contaminated Anti-D or blood products.

It should be stressed that time limits apply in making an application. The Tribunal will process all applications immediately and claims normally proceed to hearing/ settlement without delay.

ROCK FORMS AND FEATURES

All over the Earth rocks have formed different types of landscape from mountains and canyons to sand dunes and flat plains. These natural features form when rocks are made, or are worn away by water, wind or ice. For thousands of years, rocks have also been shaped by people as stone for buildings, tombs, statues and more. Columns Of Basalt Look Like Giant Stepping Stones The Giant's Causeway, on the coast of County Antrim, Northern Ireland, was formed about 60 million years ago. The continents of North America and Europe, which had been joined together, began to split apart. Lava poured up from the ocean floor, making a dark, igneous rock called basalt. As it cooled, the basalt shrank into thousands of six-sided columns, which wind and water have worn away to look like giant steps. Legend says that the columns were put there as stepping stones by a giant



SOME STALAGMITES ARE 10,000 YEARS OLD

Inside limestone caves, rainwater dissolves the mineral calcite, dripping from the ceiling and onto the ground to form stalactites (growing downwards) and stalagmites (growing upwards). Stalagmites can take 200 years to grow as thick as a finger. Some are 10,000 years old and measure several meters high.

FOSSILS ARE MILLIONS OF YEARS OLD

Fossils are the remains of animals or plants preserved in rocks for millions of years. They can be a whole skeleton, a single bone or a set of footprints. Many fossils can be found in limestone rock.

THE TAJ MAHAL IS BUILT FROM MARBLE

Marble is a metamorphic rock that forms when other rocks, mainly limestone, are changed by heat and pressure. It is easily carved and ranges in colour from white to pink, red, grey or green, but it is also easily damaged by pollution and acid rain. Some of the world's most beautiful buildings such as the Parthenon in Greece, and the Taj Mahal in India, are built from marble.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Finn MacCool, who legends say built the Giant's Causeway to get from Ireland to Scotland, used to get his ideas by sucking his thumb.
- The earth is made up of dense rocks, making it the heaviest planet in the solar system. The lightest planet is Saturn, which would float in water, if you could find a tank big enough.
- The world's largest stalagmite is found in Krasnohorska Cave, in the Czech Republic, and is a mighty 32m tall.
- The Great Stalactite in a cave at Pol an Lonain, Republic of Ireland, hangs down a tight fitting 6.2 meters.
- Until the 1750's Christian people believed that fossils were the remains of plants and animals drowned during the Great Flood.

A spokesperson for An Bord Pleanala said they hadn't been notified as yet.

Meanwhile County Manager, Donal Connolly expressed his disappointment about the further delay, but said the manner in which an oral hearing is conducted is for the Planning Board to decide.

The intervention was welcomed, however, by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, whose own submission was made in Irish. Cllr. O Ceilleachair said it would be against the spirit and letter of the constitution if people who wished to make their submissions through Irish weren't allowed to do so.

The judicial review is the second held in connection with the Garrynagree landfill. An earlier court challenge was taken by a local resident into the County Manager's decision to extend the landfill search to the west of the county, and was eventually judged in the council's favour this year after several months of deliberation.

Minister for Transport, Seamus Brennan, issued statistics on Monday last covering the first full year of the penalty points system, which show that 713 motorists in the Waterford County Council area received two or more penalty points.

The statistics show six hundred and ninety motorists received 2 penalty points, minor injuries declined by twenty-one motorists on 21; 10.7%.



Jerry was a native of Araglen, Co. Cork and as one of eleven children. Jerry loved people and thoroughly enjoyed chatting, debating and tracing with his many friends. Jerry never lost his sense of humour and always enjoyed a joke and a laugh. He was a very good neighbour and was always willing to lend a hand to anyone in need.

CATTLE: Control of Parasites at Housing

Internal parasites, namely stomach worms, hoose and liver fluke are diseases of the grazing animal. Infection is picked up from pasture contamination. Control therefore in summer has to concentrate on managing the pattern of grazing in order to avoid exposure to high levels of infection and implementing a strategic dosing programme that will suppress the rise in pasture contamination.

Housing Dose

Infection carries over from one season to another in two ways: (i) as overwintered larvae on pasture, (ii) within infected animals. Dosing at housing should rid stock of parasites thus removing the negative effects of infection on performance and preventing the carryover to the following grazing season. At this time of the year, it is possible for stomach worm larvae to alter the pattern of development within the digestive tract and become "arrested fourth stage larvae" often referred to as type II stomach worms. These can lodge in the gut wall over the winter and if large numbers are present they can cause late winter or spring scours. The severity of the spring scours is usually associated with animals under some stress due to underfeeding, other infections, overcrowding or pregnancy. To control type II stomach worms, it is necessary to use drugs that are effective. The white drenches and the avermectin injectables and pour-on's are effective against type II stomach worms but check with your veterinary supplier when purchasing drugs for dosing at housing.

Animals differ in their ability to resist hoose and stomach worms. Resistance increases as the animals get older. Young calves when put to grass have no resistance but can build up immunity quickly with low to moderate exposure. At this time of the year, late born calves and those subjected to stress will be the most at risk. It is advisable to dose all cattle coming off their first season at grass with a drug that is effective against type II stomach worms. Yearling cattle (Autumn born in 2001) and young stores (Spring born 2001), will have developed a reasonable level of resistance but in many cases these could benefit from a dose at housing although the performance and economic response is not as clear-cut as with the younger animals. It depends on the level of challenge prior to housing and the immune status of the cattle. In general, older cattle (over 2 years) have adequate resistance and do not need dosing if well fed and not under abnormal stress. Young bulls at the end of their first breeding season are likely to benefit from a worm dose at this time. Another category of animals that are likely to require worm dosing are the in-calf heifers especially if they are due to calve at two years of age. Sometimes the stress of pregnancy followed by lactation in immature heifers will reduce resistance and lead to severe scouring immediately after calving. In general, mature suckler cows do not need worm treatment but again some cows could need individual attention. Cows that are thin at calving e.g. those producing twin calves could benefit from worming. Some trials have shown that dosing mature dairy cows gives a worthwhile response in milk yield but note that high yielding dairy cows are under much more nutritional pressure that the typical suckler cow. However, it does strengthen the view that in the case of any animal where immunity is depressed there will be a need for worm treatment

FARM SAFETY: Asbestos

Asbestos can be a major problem on farms. It's fair to assume that you have asbestos on your farm. It's most likely to be found as corrugated sheets in roots. In this form it is generally a low risk material. Asbestos has been banned from use as a roofing material since April 2000. It can be found internally as sheets of asbestos cement. Some may also be found in lagging of boilers and heating pipes. In this form it is most dangerous.

There are two major health and safety problems with asbestos. The first one is that it can cause cancer. This results from damage to soft tissues of the lung from the inhalation of fibres, which have been released into the atmosphere when the asbestos is damaged. These fibres are so small that they escape the natural defences offered by your nose and throat. They lodge in the lungs and over time cancer develops. This type of cancer is incurable which is why there is so much public concern.

The second reason is that asbestos is fragile, which means, if you walk on it without the use of crawling boards or roof ladders you

will fall through it.

It is not safe to walk along the line of purlins, using the bolts as a guide line - This is not Safe.

Check if you have asbestos. If you have, where is it? There are two situations that can arise with asbestos in roofs.

1. Asbestos in Good Condition

Leave it alone, the release of fibres into the air is such that it poses a very low risk to health. If you have to carry out cleaning work, remember:

I. Use crawling boards or roof ladders II. Do not use power equipment III. Never use a wire brush to clean asbestos IV. Put up a sign "Fragile Roof"

2 Asbestos in Poor Condition or Building being Demolished Remove the contents of the building II. Use crawling boards/roof ladders III. Don't use power equipment IV. Keep the material damp V. Wear protective clothing VI. Lower sheets down one by one, don't throw them down from roof level VII. Use a vacuum cleaner, (type H) VIII. Gather all small pieces and bag IX. Seek

There is stringent legislation governing the disposal of asbestos.

Under no circumstances can "used" asbestos be given away or taken onto your farm

Asbestos can not be buried on your farm

Some local councils will accept it at their dump. If so, you will have to double wrap with 1000 gauge polythene

Otherwise, it must be disposed of by specialist contractors While awaiting disposal, put it on pallets and wrap it in polythene

I believe it is possible to claim tax relief for third level fees Can you please give the details?

Tax relief for third level tuition fees for approved courses is available to those who pay their own fees or pay on behalf of their spouse, their child or a person for whom they are the legal guardian. Relief is not available for administration or examination fees or for any part of the tuition fee that is paid for through a grant, scholarship, by an employer, etc. Tax relief for third level tuition fees is available for the following courses: Approved undergraduate and postgraduate courses (full-time & part-time) in both private and publicly funded third level colleges in the state.

Approved undergraduate and postgraduate courses (fulltime & part-time) in both privately and publicly funded third level colleges in any EU member state.

Approved undergraduate and postgraduate courses (fulltime & part-time) operated by colleges in any EU member state providing distance education in the state.

Postgraduate courses in certain private and publicly funded third level colleges in non-EU countries

Information technology and foreign language courses resulting in a certificate of competence (not just a certificate of attendance).

Tax relief, which is at the standard rate of income tax i.e. 20%, is only available where the net tuition fee is C315 or more. The maximum relief available for 2003 is 3,175e. Application forms (IT 31) are available from the Revenue Commissioner. Tel: LoCall 1890 306 706.

23rd ART & CRAFT **EXHIBITION**


The 23rd annual Dungarvan & District Soroptimist Club Art & Craft Exhibition in aid of local charities promises to live up to the expectations set in previous years.

The Gaelic Language was widely understood and spoken in the Dungarvan district in 1911, as the census of that year proves. Figures from various polling booths are as follows.> In Ring 87.4% of the population spoke it, in Ballymacart 80.7% in Ardmore rural 81.2%, Grange 75.9%, Grallagh 82.2 %, Mountstuart 82.3%, Carriglea 51.3%, Whitechurch 59.3%, Cappagh 55.2% Dungarvan 61.2% (Rural) and Dungarvan 64% (urban with Abbeyside), Colligan 60.1 %, Bohadoon 68.1%, Kilrossanty at Tinnasaggart 78.7%, Comeragh 53.5%, Mount Kennedy 59.7%, and Fox's Castle 45.2% and Clonea 57.7%

In 1901 in the previous census 74.4 % of the population of Dungarvan rural and urban (which included Abbeyside) had been able to speak the old language.

The Gaelic league had a daunting task ahead of it. If an Irish person wished to succeed

an life in these times, knowledge of the English language was essential. English was the language of commerce in Ireland, England, the USA and Australia where Irish people emigrated. The old language had become the badge of poverty. It had neither a modern vocabulary nor a developed literature and was dying quickly in spite of some of the figures that have been quoted.

Above all, many children reared in the early 1900s never heard Gaelic from parents who could speak it but were ashamed to do so.



Commentary On John's Gospel By Carrickbeg Priest

The Book Centre Waterford was a most appropriate setting for the launch of The Gospel of John by Rev. Fr. Michael Mullins, a native of Carrickbeg, Carrick-on-Suir. The book is dedicated with respect and gratitude to the staff and students of St. John's College, Waterford where Fr. Mullins served for 23 years from 1975 to 1998 as Professor of Scripture, Dean Bursar and President.

Fr. Mullins is a priest of the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore, and has lectured on Scripture and History in the Gregorian University Rome, St. Peters College Wexford, St. Kierans College, Kilkenny and in 1998 was appointed full time lecturer in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth. Brian Lynch representing the Columba Press, Publishers of the book, welcomed the distinguished gathering including two Bishops, many priests of the Diocese, members of the Mullins family, neighbours and friends of the author and said he was very pleased that Fr. Mullins had chosen Columba Press to publish his book.

The book was formally launched by the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Most Rev. Dr. William Lee who warmly congratulated Fr. Mullins on the tremendous task he had undertaken. In his address the Bishop said that the bible is not just a textbook of facts, figures and theological propositions, but a collection of books full of life giving stories leading us into the mystery of God and the wonder of salvation. The bible does far more than communicate items of information, it inspires, invites, challenges, supports and encourages us. St. John's Gospel stands out as one of the great treasures of biblical literature and is often referred to as the spiritual or mystical Gospel. Bishop Lee said that writing a commentary on John's Gospel is not only a serious academic and daunting task, but a reflection of ones own faith and spiritual understanding, and Michael Mullins states at several points in the book how reading St. John's Gospel he is challenged to look at himself as the reader, and he invites readers of the book to do the same. The Bishop concluded by saying that Michael Mullins has been studying and teaching St. John's Gospel during the last three decades and has spent the last two years committing the results of his work to paper and "I know that the book will undoubtedly touch the lives of its readers'

The Author Fr. Michael Mullins thanked his many priest colleagues, students and post graduates for their support and assistance in his efforts to write the book. He especially thanked the former bishop of the Diocese, Most Rev. Fr. Michael Russell, who encouraged him in his biblical studies as a young student and gave him the opportunity to study in Rome in 1971, and also Michael Neary, Archbishop of Tuam who wrote the foreword of the book. In addition, Fr. Mullins thanked Bishop Lee, Columba Press and the Book Centre, Waterford. He hoped the book would be a benefit to students in their studies, to those preaching the Gospel, to help people discover the doctrine of their faith and to general readers, particularly those involved in Bible study groups and those doing Lectio Divina. The book is currently available at all good book stores.



The elite fields for London, which takes place on April 18th, have now been announced and joining Carroll on the start line will be new world-record holder Paul Tergat of Kenya, one of 10 men in the race who have run the 26.2-mile distance under two hours, seven minutes. Carroll has a best of 2:10.54 from the New York marathon last November. That time also provided the Cork athlete with the A standard for Athens, and despite having to write off the entire 2003 season he remains confident of regaining his form in time for the Olympics.

"The Olympics will definitely take priority for me next year," said Carroll. "But the thing about a big city marathon is that you have to plan for it this far in advance. So, while I do definitely want to run in London, it is only a tentative plan, and a lot will depend on how well I am running in the weeks prior to the race."

A serious hip injury has forced Carroll out of hard training for much of the year, although he has been biking for over two hours a day in an effort to maintain cardiovascular fitness. "I think I have given the injury all the time it needs now to heal. And I hope to get back into the hard running by the start of next week."West Waterford will also be well represented also in London come April 18th with four of our athletes having got their entries accepted, Trevor Mason, Gerry Cantwell, Con Kelleher and James Veale will hopefully have the club vest on view in the English capital on the big day but of course it's a long road ahead and the serious training will start after Christmas for these four.






