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
High Court Review Into "Superdump" Hearing Adjourned

An Bord Pleanala's Oral Hearing into the proposed location of a "superdump" near a Special Area of Conservation at Garrynagree will not now commence until late January at the earliest, it has emerged.

journment in Dublin's High Court of Judicial Review proceedings taken by an Old Parish farmer into the way An Bord Pleanala planned to conduct its Oral Hearing.

Tomas O Mathuna, from Sean Pobail, Dun Garbhan, had been granted leave last November to seek orders in Judicial Review proceedings to direct the Bord to conduct the Oral Hearing simultaneously through Irish and English.

The challenge arose following Waterford County Council's application to build a landfill on a site that straddles the border between the Gaeltacht and the townlands outside it.

However, when Mr. O Mathuna's solicitor asked the Bord for confirmation that it would be conducting the Hearing on a bilingual basis, and that facilities to allow this would be provided, An Bord Pleanala refused to make the facilities available.

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Open 6 Days Mon. to Fri. 9 to 6 Saturday 10 - 5 p.m. This, he claimed was a breach of his constitutional rights, and he further complained that none of the materials relevant to the Oral Hearing had been translated into Irish - in particular the Environmental Impact Statement

His complaint also stated that the Government breached its obligations to Irish Speakers under the constitution as neither the Planning and Development Act of 2000 or the 13 related Statutory Instruments, have been translated into Irish.


Meanwhile, the High Court granted him a stay, which restrained An Bord Pleanala from commencing with the Oral Hearing until the Court had concluded with its Judicial Review.

In the High Court recently, the Justices adjourned the matter to the 26th of January.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Denis McCarthy said the Local Authority views the matter as being between An Bord Pleanala and what he called "some of the objectors to the landfill" who sought the review.

The adjournment effectively delays the start of the Oral Hearing until late January at the very earliest, when over one hundred residents of the surrounding area, along with a number of groups will oppose the siting of the landfill at Garrynagree.

The Hearing was originally set to commence on the 2nd of December and run for two weeks with all those who made submissions to An Bord Pleanala entitled to speak.

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

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


The Department of the Environment is now awaiting a tender proposal for the construction of the new Ardmore Fire Station, Minister Martin Cullen has said.

In answer to a parliamentary question from Deputy John Deasy, Minister Cullen said on receipt on of the tender proposal, a decision will be issued as soon as possible.

"Waterford County Council's proposal for a new fire station at Ardmore, at an estimated cost of 775,000 is due to proceed to construction stage under the fire services capital programme."

"An initial recoupment of 90,400 euros to the County Council to meet expenditure already incurred on the project in respect of site acquisition cost, fees, etc, has recently been sanctioned by my Department," the Environment Minister said.

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

POLLINATION AND SEEDS

All plants must reproduce themselves in order for the species to survive. There are several ways in which plants do this. Simple plants reproduce by splitting themselves in two. Other plants, such as fungi, send out spores which float away on the air, to eventually settle and grow. Some plants have roots or stems that divide to reproduce. Most flowering plants produce seeds that will grow into new plants.

MOST FLOWERS HAVE THE SAME STRUCTURE



Although flowers vary hugely in colour, shape and size, most have the same basic structure. Outside the petals there are small green leaves, called sepals, which protected the flower when it was in bud. The petals of the flower can very in number according to the species. In the centre of the petals are a number

of small stalks, called stamens, which produce pollen.
Right in the centre of the flower are the carpels, the reproductive part of the plant. The lower part of the carpel is the ovule, which develops into seeds when the flower has been pollinated.

SOME PLANTS USE INSECTS FOR POLLINATION

Flowers attract insects with their bright colours and scent. Insects pollinate plants as they feed on a sugary liquid, called nectar, produced inside the flower. Nectar is an important source of energy for many insects. The insect visit's one flower and picks up the pollen on its body and the pollen is transferred to the carpel of another plant when the insect visits it.

POLLEN CAN BE SPREAD BY WIND OR WATER

Many plants, such as grasses, rely upon the wind as a means of pollination. Some water plants rely on the water to carry the pollen to other plants.

Because this is a more random procedure than insect pollination, these plants usually produce a large amount of pollen.

STRAWBERRIES REPRODUCE WITHOUT SEEDS

Some plants, such as the strawberry, put out stems called runners, at the end of which are small plantlets. These plantlets take root and eventually become a separate plant.
THE LARGEST SEED

THE LARGEST SEED TAKES TEN YEARS TO GROW

The Largest seed is that of the coco de mer palm that grows in the Seychelle Islands. It takes ten years to mature and may weigh up to 18 kg (40 lb). It is sometimes called the double coconut because it looks like

two coconuts joined together.

COCONUTS FLOAT ON THE SEA TO A NEW HOME

Many seeds are distributed by birds or animals. The animal eats the fruit and then deposit the seeds in their droppings. Some plants have seeds with hooks that cling onto an animal's fur, to travel to anew home. As the animal brushes against an object the seed drops off. Some seeds can be carried to new areas by water. Coconuts, for example, often grow near the sea. The coconut falls from the tree into the water and then floats to another place where it grows into a new tree.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Some flowers smell like rotting flesh, to attract the flies they need to carry their pollen.
- An Australian mammal called the honey possum lives on the pollen and nectar of flowers.
- The flowers of some orchids look and smell like female bees
 they have no trouble attracting bees to pollinate them!
- An ancient Oriental lotus seed preserved in a peat bog near Tokyo successfully sprouted into a flower 2,000 years later.
- In Greek myths, there is a land of 'lotus eaters' who live on the fruit of the lotus trees. Any strangers who eat this fruit forget about their home.
- The seeds of coconut trees can spread from one island to another – by floating across the sea in coconuts!



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The Garden Messenger theme for January 2004 is

"Colour your balcony or terrace" with winter flowering species and varieties of Erica

For unrivalled ability to put on a show of colour, whatever the weather, winter flowering heathers or Ericas are definite 'must haves'. The sight of beautiful, bell-shaped flowers covered in frost and set-off by dwarf conifers or dogwoods provides a wonderful lift to the spirit on a winter's day. The ability of some Ericas to flower right through from January to April means you get a wonderful return on your gardening investment with a long flowering period just when it's most needed.

Erica, or Heath, is a huge genus of over 700 species. These heather-like plants are popularly known as 'heathers', even though botanically heather is a slightly different plant. Added to this, most winter and spring flowering Ericas of European origin are happy to grow in an alkaline soil, even though their name indicates that they won't tolerate lime. Ericas thrive in pots and containers too,

which makes them a brilliant choice for patio, terrace or balcony gardening.

With these basics covered, we can get down to some detail about these plants and how they can bring colour and a sense of warmth and homeliness into your life however small your garden. Ericas are really useful when planting up a border specifically for colour at this time of year. Erica carnea, also known as Alpine heath or Winter heath is a great starting point. These are fully hardy and the range of colours offered by the cultivars means there is a wonderful choice. Each of the following varieties flowers in late winter or early spring. 'December Red', for example, opens pink and deepens to purplish pink, 'Golden Starlet' produces delicate white flowers. 'King George', producing deep pink flowers is one of the earliest to bloom in winter. 'Myretoun Ruby' can

look fantastic with its deep, rose pink flowers and 'Eileen Porter' will actually flower all winter. And it isn't just the flowers that bring beauty to the garden - the foliage can be dark golden, as in the case of 'Ann Sparkes', or yellow turning to orange in cold weather - 'Barry Sellers'. 'Golden Starlet' has lime-green foliage that develops into an attractive yellow in summer.

As a small, spreading shrub, most garden species and varieties achieve a spread of somewhere between 25 and 50cm (but do confirm this when you buy). This means everyone has the potential to enjoy the benefits of Erica. Whether in pots on the patio, or planted as part of a winter border, the pleasures of these plants are self-evident. Quick to establish and easy to maintain, there is no excuse for looking out at bare ground, hard paving or





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

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beef pot roast

AN easy dish made with a lean and economical cut of beef.

The meat is given long, slow cooking for maximum flavour and tenderness. Ingredients:

Serves 4

1 x 15ml sp sunflower oil

1.25kg lean topside beef

3 onions, peeled and sliced

2 cloves garlic, chopped 300ml hot beef stock

2 x 5ml sp mushroom ketchup

1/2 x 5ml sp Worcestershire sauce

1 bay leaf

1 thyme sprig

1/4 x 5ml sp salt

black pepper

parsley sprig to garnish

Method: PREHEAT the oven to 140°C/ 275°F/gas mark 1. Heat the oil in a flame-proof casserole dish. Add the

meat and brown on all sides. Transfer the cooked meat to a plate. Add the onions and garlic to the casserole dish and sauté until softened. Blend the beef stock with the mushroom ketchup and Worcestershire sauce. Stir the mixture into the sautéed

onion and garlic. Add the bay leaf, thyme sprig, salt and black pepper.

Heat the liquid until simmering and then add the meat. Cover the casserole with foil and a tight-fitting lid.

Cook very gently for three hours or until the meat is tender when tested with a

ter, cover with foil and leave to stand for 10 minutes.

Remove the bay leaf and thyme from the cooking liquid and skim the fat from the surface.

Bring to the boil and boil until reduced by two-thirds. Slice the meat and pour over the gravy.

Garnish with the parsley sprig and serve immediately.



Satisfying potato soup with barley

TRY this great winter warmer, a thick, satisfying soup that makes a fine main fry gently for four minutes course for a family supper.

Ingredients

2 large potatoes, peeled and

120g small white musrooms,

1 large mild onion, thinly sliced

120 g pearl barley, soaked overnight 2 carrots, scraped and diced

30g butter 1 1/2 litres beef stock 250ml creamy milk

Freshly ground black pepper Finely choipped fresh parsley or dill, to garnish

Method

MELT the butter in a saucepan in which the soup

will be cooked. Add the mushrooms and onion and until the onion is soft and golden, but not brown. Drain the barley in a sieve

and add it to the pan together with the diced carrots. Pour in the stock and bring to the boil.

Reduce the heat and simmer for 20 minutes or until the barley and carrots have softened.

Add the potatoes and continue to cook gently for 15 minutes longer until they too are soft, but not mushy. Add the milk.

The soup should be rather thick. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Bring the soup to the boil and sprinkle ewith parsley or dill and serve.


Method

DIVIDE the oranges into segments. Arrange the segments and other prepared fruit on a large serving plate. Garnish

with mint. Cover the plate with cling film and chill until required. For the dip, put cheese

into a mixing bowl. Beat with an electric mixer or soft and fluffy. Beat in the voghurt, lime rind and marmalade until smooth and blended. Chop ginger and stir into the mixture. Spoon the dip into a bowl. Cover with clingfilm and chill for one hour. Garnish with lemon rind and serve with the fruit. TIP: To save time you could try using ready-prepared fruit. Large supermarkets now sell orange and grapefruit segments, mango and papaya slices and pineapple chunks. You can also use peeled kiwi fruit and hulled strawberries.

CEREMONY TO REMEMBER CAPTAIN TOM DONOHUE AND THE "KERLOGUE" 1943 AT ABBEYSIDE 28TH DECEMBER 2003

Present: Mrs. Monica O'Sullivan, Deerpark Road, Lismore, niece. Mr. Jim Lynch, Ballylemon, nephew. Mr. Julian Walton Mr. Sean Cullinane, Strandside South, Merchant Navy. Fr. PJ Breen, Mr. Richard Power, Dr. Jim Stacey, Mr. Tom MacHugh RNLI, and a number of other interested Abbeysiders. Dr. Jim Stacey welcomed the gathering.

He siad that Captain Tom Donohue, and many others like him in the Merchant Navy were very brave men, and performed a vital service for Irish people in the war years.

They carried goods from Spain, Portugal, the USA, and UK to Ireland in very dangerous times. He said 149 men lost their lives in the Merchant Navy and they are remembered on the Seamen's Memorial at City Quay in Dublin. Even in-shore fishermen were at risk from the war, as three Helvic men were killed when a mine caught in their nets exploded in May 1945. They were N. Cuddihy, J. Griffin (Senior) and J. Griffin (junior). The St. Patrick en route from Rosslare to Fishguard, was sunk in June 1941, and local people, the late Tommy Keating and Mrs. Ann Allridge had travelled in her the previous March. He said that Tom Donohue was Master of the "Kerlogue", owned by Staffords of Wexford. On a previous voyage in October 1943 under Captain Desmond Fortune, she had been attacked by Polish airmen in the RAF, and four crew members including the captain were injured by gunfire. Julian outlined the story of the rescue by the "Kerlogue" of over 160 German sailors in the Bay of Biscay on 29th December 1943. (See account in the Leader before Christmas). He said that Captain Donohue, was a war hero because of saving life, and not, as is usually the case, for causing loss of life. He could have chosen to sail past, but instead took the risky course of leaving the neutral corridor and entering waters swarming with German and British planes, submarines, and warships. He brought to mind the visit by former German cadets to Abbeyside in 1994, when German survivors returned to pay their respects in the little graveyard by the Clogchas. Fr. Breen read appropriate prayers.

Saturday last's meeting for both sections began at 7 o'clock and finished at nine thirty. As this was the last meeting for both sections before the new year it was decided that as a treat a video would be looked at. Shortly after seven all patrols with their new cub members for the night headed off to the chipper. Large bags of chips, huge burgers and bottles of coke were ordered and eaten in double quick time. LOCAL HISTORY

Canon Power in his book 'The Place Names of Decies' states that the strand referred to is a piece of shingly beach between the Causeway and the Old Hospital (The Cattle Mart, is directly opposite the hospital mentioned on the other side of the river). In ancient times "Thiar na Trá" extended from the Pond back up the river. In modern times Strandside North is the name for the road from Minnies to the old hospital.

Marian Place - The houses half - way out between Minnies and the Old Hospital, were the first built in Abbeyside by the O'Brien firm and are called Marian Place. They were built in 1954, the church's Marian Year. Traditionally Strandside North was called Old Hospital Road after the only building on the Abbeyside Bank of the river. It seems more likely that this old hospital road led Northward to a ford across the river and that the hospital was 'the Christian Brothers' school at Shandon, during the Cholera Epidemic, of the 1830's.



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

Dairying: Dry cow rations

The most important considerations when formulating a dry cow ration are the energy content and the mineral content.

 The energy content is the single most important factor. The purpose of most dry cow rations is to provide an extra energy source to improve cow condition.

 The mineral content is important to ensure that the necessary trace elements are provided to the growing calf, minerals are laid down for the following lactation and that the calcium content does not induce milk fever around calving time.

Simple home mixes suitable for feeding to dry cows are presented in the following table. Approx. 120 grams/day of dry cow mineral should also be fed per cow.

Ingredient	Ration 1	Ration 2
Rolled Barley	33%	20%
Citrus pulp	33%	34%
Distillers	34%	23%
Corn gluten		23%

Crude protein %	14.3%	14.8%

Frequently asked questions

Can I feed maize silage to dry cows?

Yes. However, unlike grass silage, maize silage usually has a very low protein and mineral content. When feeding maize silage to dry cows, protein and dry cow mineral supplements are necessary. Consult with your adviser for more details.

Can I feed dairy ration to dry cows?

No. The calcium content of such diets is usually high. This can precipitate a milk fever problem particularly in mature cows around calving time.

Will meal feeding before calving increase the size of the calf and calving difficulty?

No. Despite the widely held belief that meal feeding increases calving difficulty, analysis of the research available shows that meal feeding does not increase calf size and calving difficulty. Where meal feeding increases condition score excessively (above 3.5), calving difficulty can occur.

Can I feed straight pulp to dry cows?

No. Pulp is high in calcium, increasing the risk of milk fever. Avoid feeding straight pulp within 6-8 weeks of calving.

Do dry cows need a protein supplement?

Not usually. Where silage crude protein is 12% or greater there is no need for a protein supplement but below 12% crude protein a protein supplement will be needed.

Is there any advantage in feeding straw to dry cows?

No. Studies at Hillsborough and Moorepark have clearly shown that there was no relationship between pre-calving intake and post-calving performance as a result of feeding straw. Straw may however be included in the diet of fat dry cows to help prevent them becoming over fat at calving.

Will feeding a high protein meal pre-calving increase milk protein content?

No. Research at Moorepark and elsewhere has found no evidence to support this theory.

Cattle: Cattle: High Concentrate Feeding

Very high rates of gain can be achieved where concentrates are fed to appetite over a relatively short period (60 - 80 days). Low quality silage is not a suitable diet for finishing. An all concentrate diet is less costly per kg of carcass gain, usually ensures consistently high performance, better grading and savings on labour, feeding costs and slurry handling. It may also free up housing in Spring as cattle are finished earlier.

Introduce cattle to high concentrate diets gradually. With heavy cattle, start at 2kg per day and increase the rate by 1.5kg every four days. Above 3.5kg, feed twice daily. Above 9.0kg, feed three times daily. After a further 4 days provide meal ad lib but observe stock regularly for signs of over-eating sickness.

- Provide an adequate supply of clean drinking water.
- Once on ad lib, keep meal in front of stock at all times.
- Feed minerals / vitamins at 100g. per day or get a special formulation for high concentrate feeding as the level in regular cattle rations is too high.
- Provide a long roughage (straw, hay, baled silage) ad lib. **Alternative Forages**

The two main alternatives to grass silage are maize silage and nigri quality maize sliage 30% DM) is superior to the best grass silage (74% DMD). Similarly, good wholecrop silage (starch over 20%, DM over 35%) comes close to good maize silage in feeding value for finishing cattle. The intake of good quality maize and wholecrop silage is 25% - 30% better than well-preserved good grass silage, resulting in about 15% better animal gain. Alternatively, less concentrates can be fed, i.e., about 1.5kg less concentrates per day than with high quality grass silage. Both maize and wholecrop are low in protein and therefore an additional protein supplement will be necessary to bring the total crude protein in the diet dry matter up to 12% - 14%. For example, where 5.0kg rolled barley is being fed with high quality grass silage, good maize silage should be supplemented with 2.5kg rolled barley plus 1.0kg rapeseed or 0.8kg soyabean meal. Not all maize or wholecrop silage will be of high quality so check out the feeding value at the start of feeding.

The New Year was greeted with news of approval for Clancy Construction's shopping complex, where work on site progressed rapidly throughout the year. On the jobs front, the year proved a mixed bag, with dismay and disappointment greeting the laying off of hundreds of employees at Waterford Crystal, while the announcement of a long-awaited decentralised department to Dungarvan came with the promise of millions of euros to be injected into the local economy. It was also to be a year of spiralling crime rates, warnings of a worsening waste crisis, the visit of the Bahamian Special Olympians and much more.








JANUARY

The New Year had a familiar ring to it as once again, Clancy Construction's proposed shopping complex was grabbing all the headlines. Dungarvan Town Council granted the complex planning permission. But it was only the second beginning of another year long saga for Billy Clancy and his team.

Eddie O'Sullivan's 34 years of exemplary service to Dungarvan as a Garda was marked with a tribute evening in Lawlors Hotel to mark his retirement from the force he joined in 1968. Sgt Leacy said Mr. O'Sullivan's was an example which any young aspiring Garda could well do to follow.

At the Old Market House Arts Centre a musical tribute was held in honour of Thomas Moore. Neil Hurley sang a rendi-


Donagh Berry from Ballyduff and a research scientist at Teagasc Moorepark, was awarded the Teagasc Young Researcher of the year award. Donagh's presentation of the results of his work on breeding and fertilising dairy cows won him the top prize.

Nugents Centra, Abbeyside took home the timely Christmas present of the National Excellence Ireland National Hygiene Mark. The presentation was made by Agriculture Minister, Joe Walsh

Also receiving an award for excellence this month was Olive O'Gorman, attention and kindness to guests at her Ballymaccarbry guesthouse saw her receiving a richly deserved National Title in the 2002 Bord failte Irish Welcome Awards

Extensive damage was caused to the World of Wonder Toy Store in Kilrush after a New Years Eve blaze gutted the popular premises.

A split labour vote secured a compromise refuse charge deal which saw the council approve an 8% increase on commercial rates and a 25 cent rise on each bag of recyclables. In Dungarvan householders were hit with a 50% collection hike. Janurary 9th was an historic day in the life of voctional edu-

cation in West Waterford as Colaiste Cathal Naofe (formerly known as Dungarvan Technical College) opened its doors for the first time.

Diarmuid Moloney, Colligan, Eoghan Moloney, Ballinacourty and Niamh Hallissey, Ballycoe, were the recipients of the GlaxoSmithkline scholarship awards.

A number of depopulated areas in West Waterford as well as the towns of Ardmore, Lismore and Cappoquin were included in the Clar programme in an attempt to halt the slide in population experienced in these areas. It was the first time parts of Waterford were included in the scheme.

A series of last day planning appeals against the grant of planning permission for a multi-million euro shopping complex in Dungarvan put the plans back several months. Managing Director of Clancy Construction, Billy Clancy expressed his dismay and disapointment about the move.

The completion of the world's tallest monument - the Millenium Spire in Dublin's O'Connell Street marked a towering achievement for Dungarvan based firm, Radley's Engineering. The final section of the 120 metre monument was slotted successfully into place in the last few weeks of January.

The quick action of Dungarvan's fire-fighters saved the Ard Scoil na Deise for serious damage after a curtain in the school hall caught fire. Two units of the bridage, facing instense heat and thick smoke, managed to bring the blaze under control.

Meanwhile, Tallow Fire Brigade saluted John Vicent Delaney on his excellent service to the county on his retirement. ACFO Des O'Brien praised John for being a perfect example of a dedicated firemen, and a credit to the Fire Service.

FEBRUARY

Levels of crime in Cappoquin had escalated to an alarming degree, with instances of break-ins, reckless driving, and vandalism said to be increasing around the town. One man, who contacted the Dungarvan Leader, said some business people, and the elderly were living in almost constant fear, of a group of "untouchables."

An Bord Pleanala overturned planning permission for the instensification of Glencairn Quarry, and in a further twist, An Taisce issued a formal complaint to the European Commission about the manner in which permission was granted. The quarry was situated in an area of special conservation.

Goalpost Ireland scored a major coup when it was awarded the prestigious County Enterprise Award. The Tallow based firm established by Sean and Frances Tobin is one of the most successful sporting equipment manufacturers.

An early commencent date for the start of work on the 30 million euros Dungarvan Sewerage Scheme was announced by Minister Martin Cullen. Minister Cullen was in Dungarvan for a range of events, including the opening the Glanbia Central Laboratory, Dungarvan Boxing Club, and the DAY centre at the old Youth Centre.

Dungarvan Town Council came to the rescue of the Christmas Lights after they had remained a full ten weeks

hanging over the streets of Dungarvan. The Christmas crises occurred after falling contributions and spiralling insurance costs meant no where could be found to store the lights.

The Right Reverand Peter F. Barrett was inducted, installed, and enthroned as the new Bishop of Lismore. Formely the Dean of Waterford, Bishop Barrett was consecrated in Christ Church Catedral.

A substantial new business park close to the Youghal Road in Dungarvan nears completion in a development hailed as a tremendous addition to the town. Deputy Wilkinson said the business park would enable Dungarvan look to the future with renewed confidence.



MARCH



President Mary McAlesse performed the honours in Stradbally as the village celebrated its remarkable achievement of securing Gold in the prestigious Entent Florale competition.

The upsurge in crime continued unabated in West Waterford. Two burglaries occurred on consecutive nights in two neighbouring villages. The thieves used similar modus operandai in removing safes though Gardai refused to speculate on a connection.

It was a new beginning for Dungarvan in terms of its musical future, as the founders of the Dungarvan Youth Brass Band reaped the rewards of their hard graft. In March, the Youth Brass Band was formed promising a bright future and an excellent outlet for the talents of the next generation of musical talent in the area.

Hospital staff, patients and the public at large were shocked at the actions of an anonymous caller to Waterford Regional Hospital claiming a bomb had been primed to detonate on the grounds. Patients, many on trolleys, were evacuated to the carpark, as an extensive search of the hospital got underway. Finally, after a number of fretful hours, the relieved staff and patients were allowed to return, as it was revealed the sick and vulnerable had been disrupted by the actions of an unscrupulous hoaxster.

Revered local writer, Mai O'Higgins launched a new volume of her poetry - The Things I Know About Flowers - at an official reception in the Civic Offices. The volume was launched by WLRFM's Nicola Beresford, who paid tribute to Dungarvan's best known songwriter. In attendence were legions of Mai's friends and fans.

As the coalition of two - George W. Bush and Tony Blair - marched the west closer to war with Iraq in their quest the rid Saddam of weapons of mass destruction through sustained aerial bombardment, Cappoquin students added their voices to those of the concerned. Forty Students at St. Anne's Post Primary took time out of their studies to unfurl a banner at the gates saying You Don't Free People By Bombing Them!



As it became ever clearer that Waterford was about to lose out on a much needed unit, a shouting match broke out between the two representatives, with Deputy Deasy claiming Deputy Wilkinson was scoring political points off the backs of sick people, and Deputy Wilkinson claiming the Fine Gael TD was double dealing inside and outside his party.

Waterford County Council presented a deed of bravery to Siobhan O'Connell for risking her own life in saving that of another. Sobhan rescued John Kavanagh after he got into difficulty at Ballydwane Cove - her quick thinking and bravery averting what could have been a tragedy.

MAY

A local man had a miraculous escape on his maiden voyage aboard the 32 ft Antaries. The boat was skippered by Tom Spratt from the Youghal Road, Dungarvan. After their boat capsized, the four sailors clung to their vessel for over eleven hours in the icy seas. The crew was rescued off the south coast of England when a man walking a dog heard them singing Happy Birthday as they desperately tried to keep their spirits up.

Almost two years to the day since a member of the Lickey Valley Concern Group sought a Judicial Review in the High Court challenging the landfill selection process, the Justice handed down a judgement in favour of Mr. Connolly. In a brief statement, Mr. Connolly expressed his hope that the countys waste management needs would be urgently addressed.

While one major project was at last showing some signs of progress, another, the bypass of Dungarvan, was showing signs of becoming snarled up amid concerns for a protected plant - the Killarney Fern. The fern was to be on everyone's lips after its discovery caused the need to select a route 6 million euros more expensive than another, more plausible route.

Deputy, John Deasy, refused to confirm or deny mounting speculation surrounding an apparent approach made to him by his opposite number in the Dail - Justice Minister Michael MacDowell - who rumours claimed had asked Deputy Deasy to join the Progressive Democrats.

Dungarvan area councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair was elected to the new governing body of the Labour Party following the national Delegate Conference in Killarney. Cllr. O Ceilleachair expressed his delight and honour at being selected.

A team from Ard Scoil na Deise won the Munster final of a debating competition organised by the National Forum on Europe. The team - Una Power, Sinead Crotty and Aoife Connors - were deemed to have delivered the most compelling vision for the future of Europe in a powerful presentation on how Europe would look in 2019.

MAY

Clancy Construction's Shopping Complex finally appeared delivered for Dungarvan, when An Bord Pleanala upheld the grant of planning permission. Managing Director, Billy Clancy, said it was a long time coming, but it will be worth the wait.

More shopping opportunities appeared to be on the horizon as speculation mounted over the intention of cut-price retail outlet Lidl. The discount chain indentified Dungarvan as a possible location for a store, and within weeks issued a planning notice for a supermarket. A month later, it passed the deadline without any further progress.

A new handball court was opened on the grounds of St. Augustines College - the culmination of years of planning and hard work. Incumbent Town Mayor, Nuala Ryan, paid special tribute to the inspiration and motivation of Brother Spring, without whom handball would never have arrived and thrived at the College.

Ireland's leading timber frame producer, Century Homes announced their plans to recruit forty new employees in Dungarvan with a major new expansion of their plant at the IDA's Industrial Estate.

The new library headquarters was also celebrating news of a further investment in their premises. 1.3 million euros was allocated by Minister Martin Cullen towards the library's completion at the former Christian Brothers Monastery. Minister Cullen said that all the pieces of the jigsaw were now together for the project.

Kealan Patrick Burke, a native of Murphy Place, Abbeyside, was quickly becoming the areas own Thomas Harris - as his latest thriller - Ravenous Ghosts launched to widespead acclaim. His latest novel built on the success of his six previous titles and among the laurels he received, Mr. Burke's work was described as remarkable for its maturity and control.

A new page in the history books of the areas educational establishment was written in Lismore, with the official opening of the new state-of-the-art Blackwater Community School. Prinicipal Denis Ring addressing a large crowd at the opening ceremony described the facilities at the school as magnificant, summed up by its mission statement that Blackwater Community School is committed to Quality Education.



JUNE

With the local elections still a year away, Fianna Fail held their convention to select those going forward. All went as expected until the very last electoral area - Dungarvan. Cllr. Nuala Ryan, the incumbant Dungarvan Town Mayor, and elected to Waterford County Council in 1999, faced into the longest weekend of her political career after she failed to secure the required number of votes. Later in the month, Fianna Fail headquarters quickly added her to the ticket.


A forty-seven strong caravan convoy assembled on the Lookout on Davitts Quay in Dungarvan causing a number of public order offences and appeals for Garda re-enforcements to be provided. Compounding her troubles, Cllr. Ryan, Deputy Deasy, and WLR FM's Billy McCarthy were all threatened with legal action over alleged incitement to hatred from Clashmore solicter, Garry O'Halloran.



The summer months sparked a whole range of controversies with one of the most enduring being the debate over the use of the Advance Factory as a recycling facility. The proposal was first opposed by the majority of the Labour Party, but months later, through absentions the proposal was passed. It was back to troubled waters for the seaside village of Ardmore. Co. Waterford's top tourism destination once again failed to reach blue flag status for the quality of its water.

Trouble of a different kind had well and truly brewed over on the Causeway in Dungarvan. The Union Jack - which had been hoisted as part of Dungarvan Town Council's tidy towns efforts - was unceremoniously torn down and dumped in the harbour - prompting Cllr. Micheal O'Riordan to describe Abbeyside and Dungarvan people as a narrow minded race of people.

With the legal challenge overcome against Garrynagree



Landfill, Waterford County Council applied for a waste license and immediately encountered further controversy as the site they'd selected was designated a Special Area of Conservation.

The Abbeyside Pattern dogged by a lack of resources both financial and through a lack of manpower was on the verge of collapse. A number of businesses responded to the call and rescued the event for 2003.

Dublin based developers, Greenbirch unveiled plans to construct a 52 million euros hotel development on a 80,0000

square mere site at Ballinclamper, Clonea. The developers proposed a 4/5 star hotel on the site along with around 166 terraced houses.

Radio history was made by WLRFM when it moved to its new home in Ardkeen. It was the first purpose built broadcasting centre in the country since RTE opened the Montrose studios.

An exciting new musical show, A Celtic Dream opened to great applause at the Immrama Festival in Lismore. The



show combined some of the finest singers, musicians and dancers in Ireland, in what turned out to be an extravaganza for the town.

While Lismore was the destination for pure enjoyment, the route between Ardmore and Cashel was an excercise in endurance. The sixty mile trek was undertaken for charity, with the pilgrims arriving exhausted but elated in Ardmore 60 miles and 12 hours later.

Dungarvan revelled in a celebratory mood for the arrival of the Bahamian Special Olympians to town when they arrived in Grattan Square preceded by the Olympic Flame. While the Bahamians were greeted to the South East's balmy summer, the seventeen local members of the Irish team were given a right royal send-off to their host town.

Labour councillor, Paddy Power was unanimously elected the new Mayor of Dungarvan, and was universally welcomed by members of the council, right across the political spectrum.

In Cllr. Nuala Ryan's last task of Town Mayor, an official function was given to Chairman of the Revenue Commissioners and local man, Frank Daly.

JULY



The sole Labour member Lismore Town Council, and also the youngest representative, Cllr. Mark Khan was elected as the new town mayor at its Annual Meeting. Cllr. Khan replaced Cllr. John Campion as

Mayor, as the council headed into its last twelve months before the local elections.

Youghal based company, Blackwater Homes, signalled their intention to construct 170 residential units at Kilminnin North in Ballinroad. The application was for a 6.65 hectacre site.

A repeat visit to Dungarvan Harbour by the historic vessel, the Kathleen & May was effectively scuppered by berthing problems. While the summer before thousands flocked to see the vessel cruise into town, the organisers said they would not be putting on a repeat performance.

Upwards of a thousand people turned out in Gratten Square to welcome home the victorious athletes, coaches and administrators from the Special Olympics spectacular. Not appearing in the least tired, the Olympians cheered and waved to the crowd and later danced to Tina Turner's "Simply the Best".

Two representatives from the Suir electoral area snapped up the top two positions within Waterford County Council. Fianna Fail's Cllr. Ciaran O Riain and Fine Gael's Paudie Coffey were elected Mayor and Deputy Mayor respectively. Cllr. O Riain took up the reins as Mayor for the first time after almost fifty years on the local authority.

With the crime spree continuing in West Waterford, more alarming news came in the form of the declaration by Fianna Fail's James Tobin, that no replacement Gardai have been recruited in Tallow for six months previously. Added to that, all the West Waterford stations were down on manpower, and Lismore was without a sergeant for the past few months. Deputy, John Deasy, was capturing both national and local headlines by voting for the Government, and against his party's own position on a controversial Immigration Bill. The outspoken TD said the matter was a question of policy and not personality, but the move was seen as a sideswipe against the party's chief whip, Brendan Durkan.

The early weeks in July, saw Waterford County Council operate without Ballinamuck landfill. The landfill had closed down after thirty years in operation. Waste was transferred to Tramore, whose limited capacity was put under pressure, leading to increased fears about a waste crisis in the county. Patrick Morrissey recieved the Stronghold Veterinary Pet Care Award, after being nominated by pet owners for his highly professional and compassionate pet care.

Members of Waterford County Council paid tribute to Deputy Ollie Wilkinson, who retired from the local authority due to what he said was the workload placed on councillors and TD's. A member of the county council since 1986 he said his retirement was a day he sometimes thought would never come.

A local resident, Collette O'Connell launched an untimately unsuccessful bid for a High Court review into An Bord Pleanala's decision. Ms. O'Connell's application for a review was thrown out of court as she had not served proper notice. A 20ft sculpture, the Golden Harvest, which was unveiled to the public at Kilmacthomas, was described as shoddy and in need of a lick of paint by one councillor. Cllr. Tom Cunningham, who previously said public lighting was needed more urgently than this "art-thing" joked that the 58,000 sculture might need a bit of manure to make it look healtier.

The announcement that Waterford Crystal planned to cut 234



jobs, many of them in Dungarvan plant, proved to be a black day in the company's long history. Management made the announcement after a tense meeting with Union Officials, who said nothing had been agreed by them, and were treating the announcement as a proposal. company The intended also freezing the pay increases due to them under a social agreement.

An exhibition of

travel photos titled Journey by Dungarvan based photographer Robert Power opened in the Old Market House Arts Centre to great critical and public acclaim. The exhibition featured photos taken by Robert during his travels through Thailand, India, Nepal, Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, Sri Lanka and Australia.

Aisling Ahern, representiong Bridgie Terries, was the named as the 2003 Abbeyside Pattern Queen. Together with her first prize of eur250, she will go on to contest the area finals of the Rose of Tralee.

AUGUST

The Lickey Concern Group, along with a number of NGO's, and almost one hundred local residents lodged a submission opposing Waterford County Council's planned superdump. A spokesperson for the group said they planned to oppose Waterford County Council's proposal every step of the way. Widespread anger greeted the announcement that the Governments allocation towards childcare for single mothers who attend Waterford's VEC's successful VTOS scheme was to be cut. Concerns were growing that the cuts would result in the scheme's closure.

Dungarvan Camera Club's Annual Exhibition opened at Dungarvan Library, where 92 stunning portraits and seascapes were unveiled to a packed and appreciative audience.

The earnings of all twenty-three members of Waterford County Council were revealed for the first time. Cllr. Lola O'Sullivan topped the pile with over 49,000 euros courtesy of her time as Mayor, while party colleague John Deasy, earned the lowest amount with 27,235 euros.

A number of sporting organisations were recompensed for their efforts. Among them Ballinameela GAA Club received eur20,000 towards the construction of a community centre. Eight men were arrested after armed members of the Rapid Response Unit swooped on a disident Republican terror training camp at Knocknaree - seven miles from Clonmel. A ten-year old boy, who was the son of one of the men, was

also in the area, but was brought home by Gardai. The men were firing on targets attached to trees when the Gardai swooped on the camp after a lenghty surveillance operation. The marina development, thought to be long dead in the water was dramatically refloated after Dungarvan Town Council was approached wih plans to develop a hundred berth marina by a private consortium.


NRA Chief Michael Tobin, a native of Dungarvan, was accorded a civic reception by Dungarvan Town Council in recognition of his exemplary service to his country, and his appointment to the prestigious position as head of the National Roads Authority.

The Good Salon Guide, hairdressing's answer to the hotel and restaurant guides, announced that H2O salon in Tallow, was awarded a coveted registered rating.

Local theatre company, Kilgobnet Players, brought the Hank Regan directed and penned play, 'What do you expect!' to Broadway, to a very warm response from the native New Yorkers, and Irish ex-pats. Actors from the play, and Mr. Regan were later to feature on RTE's Nationwide.

The long-awaited development of a new fire station in Ardmore finally progressed to the construction phase. The new station would cost eur700,000 to build.

Ballyneety brothers, Frank and Monnie Drummy, were cele-





brating victory over Waterford County Council and the ESB after An Bord Pleanala ruled in their favour about the location of two steel masts placed at the bottom of their garden. They said the masts were ruining their lives and health.

A series of events took place in Dungarvan to mark the centenary of little Nellie of Holy God. An exhibition of artefacts relating to Nellie Organ was held in Dungarvan Museum, and a centenary Mass was held in St. Mary's Parish Church.

Three armed and masked men made off with over 70,000 euros from Lismore's Bank of Ireland branch, after breaking in and holding up a number of employees with a sawn off shotgun, and an axe. The raiders accessed the bank through a window.

Members of the Dungarvan Hill Walking Club raised 11,300 euros for local organisations following the clubs 7th Annual George Harney Memorial Comergah Crossing and Challenge. The event attracted a record crowd, and helped raise much needed funds for the West Waterford Hospice, and the friends of St. Joseph's Hospital.

Ballyduff Gala and Vintage Festival proved a tremendous success with large crowds turning out to enjoy the many attractions. The biggest hit on the day was the accident car rescue enacted by Lismore Fire Brigade. Paddy Jim Feeney, meanwhile was elected the 2003 Baron of Ballyduff while Tom Byrne and Richard Higgins tied in the Culchie of the Year competition.

SEPTEMBER



Mindless vandals destroyed windows, ceilings and light fittings at the vacant eur1.3 million Advance Factory, once touted as the solution to Dungarvan's unemployment problems. The vandals left a clean up bill in excess of 10,000 euros.

An eight person delegation from Lismore met with Supt. Mick Blake in a bid to increase the number of Gardai stationed in the town and highlight the genuine fears of people in the area after a spate of robberies. It followed break-ins at Lismore and Tallow, the latter of which left a 62-year-old man requiring 5 stitches.

Tallow Health Centre, whose dilapidated condition was the subject of scathing criticism, secured funding for its refurbishment to the tune of over 400,000 euros. Cllr. James Tobin urged for the works to take place as quickly as possible.

Sinn Fein were setting their sights on capturing three seats on Waterford County Council and one on Dungarvan Town Council. Locally, Brendan Mansfield was tipped as their leading contender courtesy of his strong base in the town.

Toastmasters elected a new President. Winston Boyle formally handed over his chain of office to Michael Clarke.

News that many of Dungarvan's roads were to be re-dug shortly after work on the sewerage schemes was finished was greeted with dismay. The laying of cables for a 1.5 million broadband system required a number of roads to be redug in the town.

A potential land-swap involving a private company developing a marina in Dungarvan in return for Town Council property in Walton's Park to build commercial, residential or retail development was also met with stern opposition. A number of councillors said they would oppose any such deal.

Fine Gael leader, Enda Kenny visited a number of areas around the county, meeting a number of local councillors, and TD John Deasy, to be briefed on issues of particular local concern.

Waterford County Council denied as "scurrilous", claims from controversial council candidate Garry O'Halloran that incinerator ash would be dumped at the Lickey Valley landfill. Mr. O'Halloran claimed the Lickey Valley would become the ashtray of Ireland at his election rally in Youghal.

Deputy John Deasy resigned his seat on Waterford County Council. Deputy Deasy announced his resignation at Fine Gael's Co-option convention in Lawlors Hotel, where his replacement was named as Geraldine Veale from Kinsalebeg.

Lismore Castle joined the growing list of "fairytale castles" available to rent out as a wedding venue. Groups of up to twelve people can rent out the castle for 24,500 euros a week, for which they can have the use of the Duke's own private staff.



OCTOBER

A substanial quantity of ecstasy was seized and two men arrested as part of the ongoing crackdown on drug trafficking in West Waterford. Gardai seized a quantity of drugs with a street value of eur25,000.

The residents of Clashmore were once more looking for answers to the cause of what was described as a cancer cluster in the area, after testing on the high powered electricity lines and drinking water found them unaffected by radiation or radon. The report left the seven households affected dependent on the SEHB conducting investigations into the cause of the high rates of cancer.

Dungarvan musician, Brian Hughes was announced as one of just eight Waterford students to receive a TSB High Achiever Award. The prestigious award came after Brian was selected out of 35,000 students nationwide for his excellence.

Following hot on the heels of Fine Gael leader Enda Kenny to Dungarvan, Labour supremo Pat Rabitte met with local activists for a briefing, and a press conference. It came days after Socialist party leader, and former Labour member Joe Higgins was jailed for his part in the Anti bin charge protests. The largest ever seizure of cocaine in Dungarvan was made by Gardai. A quantity of cocaine was discovered when the Gardai stopped and searched a car at the Burgery.

One of Waterford County Council's longest sitting members, Willie MacDonnell caused shockwaves within Fine Gael, when he announced he would not be standing for election in the 2004 local elections.



Dungarvan based graphic design team Totem took second place in their category in the ninth annual IDEA awards held at the Burlington Hotel. Organised by the Graphic Design Business Association, the awards are recognised as one of the highest accolades in the graphic design industry.

Minister for Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs, Eamon O Cuiv officially opened Meanscoil San Nioclas at a ceremony attended by in excess of 200 past and present pupils, parents and dignataries. The highlight of the opening of the state of the art new building was the preformance of a dramatic poem illustrated by Choric speaking.

One of Australia's foremost charitable fundraisers and social diarists, "Holly Wood" made an eight day visit to Tallow meeting amongst others Deputy Ollie Wilkinson, and performer Tessa Quinlan Mundin. Holly Wood a num de plume for Robin Howard Pulham was a winner of the Centenary Medal presented by Australian Prime Minister John Howard.

Waterford County Council granted a conditional go-ahead to John Foley of Dungarvan for the demolition of the Cliff House Hotel, and its replacement with what developers called an aparthotel and holiday homes.



Akram Hanna became the latest candidate to join the race for Waterford County Council. Mr. Hanna, a native of Eygpt, announced that he would be fighting the election as an independent candidate.

A small number of trees were set ablaze in Dungarvan in what was suspected to be a lead up event to bonfire night. The Dungarvan branch of the ATGWU made a presentation to Johnny Duggan who served as Shop Steward at the Glue & Gelatine Factory in the 1950's. Johnny Duggan was home on holidays from the US and recalled how the Glue Factory, the Leather Factory and the Co-Op provided much employment in that era.

Fred Forsey Jnr was co-opted onto Dungarvan Town Council to fill the vacany created by the resignation of Deputy John Deasy. Deputy Deasy retired under the rules of the dual mandate.



Oisin Langan, a native of Abbeyside, and a sports broad-caster with RED FM in Cork, received the prestigious Sports Broadcaster of the Year Award ahead of such competition as Michael Corcoran of RTE and Paul Collins of Today FM. Meanwhile, locally based production company, Nemeton, was nominated for two Irish Film and Television Awards. Loachra Gael and the Health Squad both made the shortlists. The county council sent warning letters to the resident of an estate in Waterford City following the discovery of waste dumped illegally at a number of locations around the county. A number of black sacks of rubbish were dumped at Stradbally Cove and Knockcullen, Cappagh.



NOVEMBER



Paul and Marie Flynn, proprietors of the Tannery were the delighted recipients of the Jameson Restaurant of the Year Award. The award presentation was made at an awards bash in The Old Jameson Distillery in Dublin.

It was celebration time too for Neil and Joan Hurley of Ballyetra, Dungarvan, who were awarded second place in the Pfizer Quality Milk Awards by Noel Treacy, Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture.

Renowned writer, Anthony Summers, launched a new and revised edition of memoirs of the Lives and Characters of the Illustrious Family of the Boyles. Edited by County Librarian Donald Brady, the book was first published in 1737 and chronicled the events in the Boyle family history. Mr. Summers dubbed Donald Brady as a secret agent of history. This month went down as one of the greatest in the annals of Dungarvan Brass Band. Both the Brass Band and their recently established Youth Band came away with a sizeable haul of trophies at the Regional Championships. The senior band took Best Intermediate and Best Overall Intermediate Band titles for the second year running - a feat never accomplished before.

Herlihys Supervalu, meanwhile, won two awards in the Cusine De France & Pierres "Food to Go" awards. The awards were for the best store in Co. Waterford and the best store in Munster.

Gardai arrested two males, and seized a significant quantity of drugs in two separate raids in the town. A haul of various dugs with an estimated street value of 35,000 euros and several thousands in cash were discovered.

A dangerous section of road between Piltown Cross and Youghal Bridge - the scene of a number of fatal accidents was said to have been given the go-ahead for re-alignment work commencing in 2005. Cllr. Tom Cronin welcomed the news and praised Minister Brennan for living up to a commitment given to him at the opening of the Youghal Bypass a year previously.

Labour Cllr. Billy Kyne called for a more pre-active and visible stance to be taken against those engaged in the drugs trade and other anti-social behaviour. He said anti-social behaviour mustn't be allowed to take root in any area of the town.

Fears that Dungarvan would be left in the dark over the Christmas period were abated when it was revealed that Clancy Construction, Century Homes and an anonymous donor agreed to contribute 50% of the cost of putting up the lights.

There was good news on the jobs front when it was revealed that i to i had tripled its workforce, and continued to go from strength to strength in the placement of English teachers

A number of award winners came together at the seventh annual environment awards at the Park Hotel. Ballyduff Upper were the winners of the tidiest village, Lismore topped the town category; Clashmore won the tidiest old burial ground, while Villierstown Church received the award for most improved.

Ninety jobs were announced in Youghal with the opening of a new state of the art Tesco store by Cork hurler Diarmuid O'Sullivan, accompainied by VIP for the day Michael McCarthy from Dungarvan. Mr. McCarthy won a VIP competition to attend the opening along with a champange and a limousine drive with his wife Una.

The County Council announced its intention to steam ahead with the Dungarvan to Waterford railway walk in a 30 mile long European Greenway Park for recreational walking and cycling. The development would involve an investment of 700,000 euros, and commence with work on the Dungarvan to Durrow section.

A High Court Challenge into the manner in which An Bord Pleanala proposed to conduct its oral hearing into the Garrynagree Landfill delayed the start of their proceedings. An Old Parish farmer, Tomas O Mathuna, sought for the hearing to be held on a bilingual basis.

Claims on a National Radio station that Dungarvan is the meanest town in Ireland after the Chamber of Commerce pulled the plug on their involvement in the erection of Christmas lights was strongly refuted by a number of traders. Traders feared they were all being tarred with the same

The saga surrounding the location of two massive pylons in Ballyneety looked set to continue with the news that the ESB had applied for retention. Two elderly brothers who fought a two and a half year battle against their siting close to their home, vowed to fight on.

Lismore Estates planned the addition of a gallery and exhibition space to Lismore Castle. The plans contained the removal of a number of partitioning walls and chimney stacks to form one exhibition space.

Padraid Tyers launched a new book - Sliabh gCua mOige. Published in Irish, it was launched by County Manager Donal Connolly at the Colaiste na Rinne.



AIB Bank honour Dungarvan man Garvan Curran for achieving the top award in the final examinations for the Association of Chartered Certified Accountants.

Gardai continued their crackdown on the driving infringements. It was announced that over 700 drivers had received penalty points since the system's inception just twelve months previously. Two of the drivers listed were already half way towards disqualification.

Longstanding Labour member, John Pratt, was selected to contest the Waterford County Council elections in the Lismore Electoral Area. Mr. Pratt's name was the sole nomination on the night, and his selection, and the night in general was said to one of great optimism for the upcoming Local Elections.

Meanwhile, Brendan Mansfield, Sinn Fein candidate in the local elections was elected to another high profile post, as his campaign showed signs of gathering real momentum. He was elected as Chairman of the ATGWU, and in his opening address stated that the Union had a young and vibrant membership, which augured well for its future.



At least twelve bank accounts were raided by a Romanian gang who used sophisticated miniaturised CCTV equipment to record people as they used an ATM machine in Dungarvan. The gang were caught red handed at the bank link on TF Meagher Street.

Lorna Jane Murray, from Dungarvan released a new twelve track CD featuring self penned songs. It followed the outstanding success of her debut CD last year. The proceeds of the album provided much needed funds for the Waterford -Lismore Hospitality Committee involved with Lourdes.

Local election candidate, Garry O'Halloran slammed the proposed increased development charges describing it as taxing the poor to pay the rich. He said the measure would increase an already overstretched housing list.

Lismore Town Councillor, Bernard Leddy was added onto the Fianna Fail ticket to fight the next local elections. He joined party colleagues Cllr. Kevin Wilkinson and James Tobin on

Chainsaws, consort saws, and weed eaters with a value of thousands were stolen by thieves who targeted a county council depot in Ballymaccarbry. They used special cutting equipment to force the locks.

Dungarvan was announced as one of the larger recipients of jobs under Decentralisation. Minister Charlie McCreevy announced that the 200 - 300 Civil Servants in the Ordanance Survey Agency of Ireland would be re-located to Dungarvan within the next three years. Opposition parties complained the massive decentralisation plans were a political gimmick to mask an uninspiring budget.

Waste Charge saw another increase in the county. Mayor Ciaran O Riain's casting vote was needed to bring in the hikes, which saw increases in wheelie bin charges, recycling, and commerical rates.

In Dungarvan, the local representatives put up strong opposition to the hikes. However, the biggest story of the day, was the argument which erupted between the County Manager, and Cllr. Teresa Wright over comments apparently made during an adjournment of the meeting. The County Manager subsequently apologised.

The Old Market House Arts Centre held its third Arts and Crafts exhibition, featuring a range of quality craft work from local and national artists. Together with original paintings, there was pottery, designer jewellery, woodcrafts, wicker work and many more Christmas items to choose from.

CAPPOQUIN NOTES

'Cappoquin's Finest Hour' - 26th May 1957, Sargent Cup Final

Cappoquin Take Sargent Cup From Mt. Sion in Epic Hurling Encounter

Cappoquin 4-9 Mount Sion 3-6. Referee: M. Pollard

These were the headlines from the 'Dungarvan Leader' following the Sargent Cup final. En route to the final Cappoquin overcame Dungarvan, Fourmilewater, Abbeyside and the Geraldines along the way. In an epic encounter that far outshone many a Munster championship tie, Cappoquin Senior Hurlers achieved what many shrewd hurling judges regarded as 'the impossible' when they defeated the best club side in the county, a great Mount Sion team (which would later go on to win nine senior hurling titles in a row). In the final of the Sargent cup hurling competition at Cappoquin.

Mount Sion, 'cock of the walk' in Waterford hurling for the past five or six years and holders of the Sargent cup since it's inception three years ago, were because of their great record, favourites of the game, but Cappoquin who were behind at the interval by 3-4 to 1-3, soon nullified any intention, the monastery men entertained as to the retention of the cup. Playing inspired hurling and encouraged by the huge following, the cornerstone men went into their work with a great heart and a 'shot in the arm' goal by Billy Conway in the third minute of the second half provided the necessary 'pep' Then the reaction was immediate and terrific, as the hurling, which up to then was good, by any standard became really super and Mount Sion, good team though they are, could only add two points to their interval tally amidst truly emotional scenes after the final whistle blew, grown men could be seen to cry when Captain Mickey O'Connor received the 'Sargent Cup'. What a game!

The only way to avoid this in the coming year is for clubs to bond together and insist on two fixture lists. The first one should

be a "master list", taking into account intercounty fixtures and working around these. The second list should be an "alternate" list. This should have clear and unequivocal alternative arrangements in the event of draws in either club championship or inter county championship. The only way to ensure this is for all the clubs to go to the county board en block and demand such an arrangement. It is surely in the interest of all clubs to have a clear and unambiguos list of fixtures. There is only power in unity.' Thats the lads opinion.



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
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

telegrams – John, Hugh and James, three sons killed in action within a period of only four years.

It is almost impossible today to imagine the anguish of parents at such a loss.

We have recently discovered that there was another family in Dungarvan similarly afflicted, with the dreadful loss of three sons. Our research began when we heard that a Mrs. Mary Power of Black Lane, Dungarvan, had been the recipient of three war telegrams.

The "Back Lane" was officially St. David Street, and in the 1911 Census No. 6 was occupied by John and Mary, with Augustine and William. Michael was married with a son, James (who subsequently lost his life in the merchant Navy in W.W.2). Michael's entry in the Debt of Honour Register reads:

"Son of John and Mary Power of Dungarvan; husband of Margaret Power, Patrick Street, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford."

The official lists entitled "Soldiers Died in the Great war 1914 – 1919" gives the following details:

10897 Pte. William Power, Dungarvan: 2nd Btn. Royal Irish Regiment, killed in action 8.9.1914.

Regiment, killed in action 8.9.1914. 10899 Pte. Augustine Power, Dungarvan: 2nd Btn. Royal

Irish Regiment, Killed in action 24.5.1915.

5824 Pte. Michael Power, Dungarvan: 2nd Btn. Irish

Guards, died of wounds 23.10.1915.

It is apparent from the above that William and Augustine enlisted on the same day since their regimental numbers are almost consecutive, and Michael's number suggests that he was already serving as a regular soldier at the outbreak of the war.

We have been able to locate all three in the debt of Honour Register, and, sadly they are all the sons of John and Mary Power of David Street.

1. William was the first of the brothers to be killed in action; he fell on Tuesday, 8th September 1914, aged 26 years, and lies in the local cemetery or Orly-Sur-Morin with nine of his comrades; only five have actually been identified. All were killed in the capture of Orly by the 8th and 9th Infantry Brigades, and are buried near the entrance in a vault under the village war memorial.

2. Augustine died of wounds in Duhallow, Advanced Dressing Stations on Monday, 24th May 1915, aged only 23 years. He was with his unit of the 2nd Bt., Royal Irish Regiment in the St. Julien area, near Ypres, Belgium, when they were decimated by an artillery and gas attack.

3. Michael was the third and last of the Power brothers to die in the Great War.

He was with the 2nd Btn., Irish Guards in the Hohenzollern/Vermelles area, when he died of wounds sustained whilst improving a new line of trenches:

"...fixing wire and fuses till the moon grew and they had to wait for the dawn-mists to cloak their work; discovering and reconnoitring old German communication-trenches that ran to ever-new German Sniping-posts.....and losing in three days, by minewerfers, sniping, the fall of dug-outs and premature bursts of our own shells, 7 men killed and 18 wounded." (Rudyard Kipling's "Irish Guards)"

John and Mary Power had lost three sons in the space of a little over a year from the commencement of the Great War! The enormity of such a loss is beyond comprehension. Sadly, their sorrow would not end there.

Michael died, leaving behind his parents, wife Margaret, and son James who would have been about 3 years of age in 1915. It has not been possible to determine what happened to Margaret, but it seems that his grandparents raised James (Jimmy) to manhood, and he had them noted as his next of kin.

Jimmy became a merchant seaman, and subsequently married Ellen, the daughter of a fellow crew man on the "Kyle Ronan" – again, this is hearsay, we have been unable to check the facts. We do know that he died, aged 28 years, on Tuesday, 5th November 1940 when his ship the ss "Haig Rose" was lost at sea. He is commemorated on the Tower Hill Memorial in London, on Panel No. 54.


The Tower Hill Memorial commemorates men of the Merchant Navy and Fishing Fleets who died in both world wars, and who have no known grave. The WW1 section lists 12,000 men, and the WW2 extension bears almost 24,000 names.

All of this research has been done through the records of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission; and, as the Power name is very common in Dungarvan, we would appreciate cooperation (or contradiction) of the foregoing details from friends or family.

Locals In Fundraising Trek In Uganda

There was a sizable County Waterford contingent on a recent fund-raising trek to Uganda, thanks largely to the commitment and devotion of a Dungarvan man to the work of an Irish third world development agency.

Con Lane from Dungarvan is a seasoned Self Help trekker, having been on no less than six trips to Africa in support of the

And he has rallied an array of locals to the cause – with no less than eight volunteers from the county embarking on the most recent trek to the Pearl of Africa.

Con's recent trip to Uganda was in contrast to previous expeditions however, as he recounts that it was 'the first time I have been in Africa and have seen lots and lots of rain'.

No less than four volunteers flew out from Dungarvan to take part, with Con Lane being joined in the effort by Dr. Tom Higgins, Mary Spratt, and Michael Ryan from Kilgobnait,.

They travelled to see at first hand the work of Self Help, who have been involved in an array of rural development projects in Uganda since the late 1990's.

Con Lane says of Uganda: 'the potential of the country is mighty, as far as agriculture and tourism are concerned. The soil is brilliant and the moisture content is high because it doesn't get big droughts like in Ethiopia and Malawi, which I have visited previously'.

The north-eastern part of the country, where the Self Help projects in Soroti are based, is a much drier part of the country. The vegetation and crops don't grow as lush, hunger is a constant threat, and to add to the farmers' woes, the rebel activity has been stepped up in recent times.

'It gets dry and arid as you move closer to the borders with Sudan, Kenya, and Ethiopia. But west from Jinja to Entebbe and Kampala and on to the Congolese and Rwandan borders there is a stretch of fantastic land,' says Con, betraying his farming back-

ground.

He found most of the people of rural Uganda housed in conditions which were good by African standards. Their cattle, grasslands, and crops were all in great shape and the banana crops, in particular, impressed Con.

Uganda is a relatively young country, given that it is only free of its colonial past and then the oppressive regimes of Idi Amin and Obote for the past 20 years. Con found the emphasis being placed on free universal primary education in the country to be a very positive sign for the future.

'The standard of living is improving, from what we saw, though the current president, Museveni, seems to have put a lot of effort into improving the

area he is from and has forgotten the people in the north. But there are signs that are encouraging.'

Con is keenly aware of the controversy that has surrounded Irish aid for Uganda in the recent past but feels it is important that groups like Self Help continue to work for improvement in the country.

Self Help is non-political. They were asked to go in to help a bunch of farmers in the north-east of Uganda to better their prospects and that is all they are doing. They are helping 30,000 farmers with nothing to become self-sufficient just the same as Self Help is doing in Malawi, Ethiopia, and Eritrea. One and a half million people in those countries will stand up and say that's the case,' he says.

On a personal note, Con overcame his fear of water in Uganda. On a previous trip to Malawi he nearly drowned in a swimming pool when he unexpectedly found himself out of his depth. Only the quick reactions of fellow trekkers Dr Tom Higgins and Justin Spratt, who noticed his distress, saved him.

In Uganda he didn't want to be left out when the trekkers went white water rafting down the Nile, so he took on his fear and overcame it. 'I had a life jacket and I knew that if I held on to the rope I would be okay. It was exhilarating, absolutely brilliant!'

Dungarvan woman, Mary Spratt, initially found it hard to see why so many people were living below the poverty line in a country as rich and fertile as Uganda, when she visited the country last month to take part in the 2003 Self Help Development International trek to

As a former teacher, Mary was particularly interested in the educational system and the class room conditions in the

'It's a bit like what we would have had in Ireland 50 years ago. The teacher might have a book but no charts, and there were about 100 children per teacher. I had a great chat with some of the teachers and they were quite disheartened: they are devoted to their work and all the children get a primary education, but very few go on to achieve very much because the families are so poor,' she said.

She was appalled at the conditions she found in a health clinic at the village of Balit near the Sipi Falls, a short distance outside the country's capital, Kampala.

'I was horrified until some of the other trekkers who had travelled to Ethiopia and Eritrea told me that it was a wonderful thing to have a clinic, even though it was so basic. The staff there had a certain amount of drugs and there was even a child there being treated for malaria. I heard afterwards that he went home that evening,' says Mary.

She found the local people very warm and welcoming and very proud and dignified. Though they are poor they are not starving, growing crops such as aduki beans, corn, cassava, and bananas as staple crops.

When we met the farmers from the Self Help project in Soroti, I spoke to one lady who explained the project and told me what a difference it had made to their lives. The amount of security the assistance of Self Help gave them was unreal. I was very impressed, she says.

Self Help has been involved in promoting sustainable community based development projects in Uganda since the late 1990's. The Co. Carlow based organisation also has programmes in Ethiopia, Eritrea, Malawi and Kenya.

The Soroti development project is the latest undertaking by the Self Help group, which has already helped to bring about a remarkable change

in the circumstances and living standards of over 1.5 million people living in the East African countries of Ethiopia, Eritrea, Kenya, and Malawi.

But Self Help has much work

to do in Uganda. This is a land that knows dark and terrible secrets, and its people still know huge suffering: most families live on less than one euro per day, drought is a problem in parts of the north, there is no secure supply of food, military unrest is a constant, and upwards of 100,000 people have been displaced from their homes.

Trek leader Eleanor Shanley was shocked to find that so many people had been displaced, and even more shocked to discover that the refugee 'camps' where they live didn't even have the minimum of shelter.

'It is very sad to see,' she said. 'In one camp in Soroti there were 9000 people wandering around aimlessly, waiting to go home. They have been displaced from their homes for five months now. There is nothing for them to do except wait for their one meal per day. They get aid from food agencies, but there is little or no medical assistance and the spread of disease is apparent,' says the singer.

However, Self Help has been working to change the grim outlook of these people. The County Carlow based organisation operates differently to many other development agencies by building capacity among local communities, empowering subsistence farmers, and giving them the wherewithal to become self-sufficient and, ultimately, to produce a surplus which can be sold for additional income.

It's an approach which has proven itself over the 20 years since Self Help was founded in response to the devastating Ethiopian famine of 1984, which claimed the lives of more than one million people

'It is a very sad situation at present, but the people whom we met were very motivated, were determined that the younger generations should get a proper education, and should be back on their farms as soon as the political situation allows', she said.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am about to become unemployed but should qualify for Unemployment Benefit. Will I get a payment for my 19 year old son who is in full-time education?

ANSWER

Yes you will, but not for the first six months.

Until recently, if you were receiving one of the follow short term social welfare payments.

Unemployment Benefit, Unemployment Assistance (for less than 15 months), Disability, Benefit, Injury Benefit, Health and Safety Benefit and Supplementary Welfare Allowance.

Payment of a Child Dependant Increase (CDI) would cease when the child turned 18 or on the following 30th June if the child was in full-time education. Since October 2003 payment will continue, if the child is in full-time education, until the child turns 22 or up to the end of the academic year after he/she reaches 22, providing you have been receiving your short-term social welfare payment for at least six months.

Periods spent on other social welfare payments may be used in calculation the required 26 weeks providing the interval between such payments does not exceed 13 weeks

Those getting a pension or long-term social welfare payment are paid a CDI for a child in full-time education up to the age 22. If a child turns 22 while in full-time education the payment continues until the end of the academic year. Further information is available from the Citizens Information Centre below.

BEWARE OF CHEAP CREDIT

If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is especially if it involves interest free credit.

Zero percent deals look unbeatable and are available on everything from goods to credit cards, but before you do the deal make sure you understand exactly what is involved.

Interest free deals will cover only a specified time, for instance, spread the payments over 1 year and pay no interest, but if you spread it over two years you will end up paying interest. Sometimes with these deals the monthly payment will be very manageable but you will end up making a substantial balloon payment at the end of the first year to clear the account. If you do not make this payment at the end of the year you end up spreading the payments over two years and this is where you get caught for interest. So make sure you check out the deal before you sign on the dotted line.

Credit card deals can also be riddled with similar pitfalls: especially the introductory offers that institutions use to lure customers. These offers look ideal on paper: they allow you to get off the credit card merry-go-round where most of your payments can be gobbled by interest charges. The problem arises that once you have made the switch, all the payments you make are automatically set against the transferred balance. The result is that interest is charged immediately on any new purchases you make with the card. The only way this offer could give you a chance is to cut up the new card as soon as you get it and keep make payments to this account without incurring more interest charges for new spending.

However, rather than switching to another credit card the best way to tackle your credit card debt is probably to give your card a "rest", especially during the pre-Christmas spending spree.

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
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
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JP To Keep The Ride

Waterford's minor footballers collected a first league point in the Munster football round robin championship when for a second year in a row they drew with Clare 1-5 to 0-8.





Waterford's juveniles took bronze at the National Inter County in pitch and putt by beating Cork on home ground. The gold went to Kerry, with the silver to Tipperary.







I suppose it is old news now and in many G.A.A. quarters it is a forgotten event. There was very little by which it will be remembered. One delegate commented afterwards that "we are indebted to the wise old men on the executive committee who fixed it for a Monday evening and did not waste a good Sunday on the affair". There was nothing that could be considered "Earth Shattering" in the meeting which lasted for approximately 3 hours.

Routine Business

When the delegates had been welcomed, the financial Report was presented by Maurice Fitzgerald on behalf of his firm of auditors.

A few questions that had little relevance to the financial state of affairs in the county, were answered to the satisfaction of everyone. county Treasurer thanked everyone who had helped in managing the finances, gatemen etc. etc. and the members of his own family.

Secretary's Report

As always this comprehensive account of what happened on the G.A.A. front in Waterford during the year was described in great detail by county secretary Seamus Grant

A few questions on certain topics in the report, were answered and Munster Council delegate Jimmy O'Gorman who came in at an early stage of the report made a strong address featuring the role of the club and the many problems being encountered in trying to keep clubs alive. He said the increasing intercounty activity was pushing clubs into the background and players and officials were being frustrated at not knowing when their next match would take place.

Guest Speakers

His Lordship Most Rev. Dr. William Lee, Patron of the Association in the county and Padraigh O Fainin, Honorary President, both addressed the Convention.

Chairman's Address In his very comprehensive ad-

dress, County Chairman P.S. O' Riain touched on every topic relating to board activities in 2003.

He spoke about the need to strike a proper balance between Club and County commitments pointing out that the club is the G.A.A.'s greatest asset. He called for a reduction in county panels from 30 to a more realistic figure of 23 and he also saw the need to curtail training for county panels, particularly during the summer months in order to allow the club championships to continue.

Referring to the proposed new structures for senior intercounty hurling and football, he said " I feel it is time to ask ourselves why the proposed structures are considered necessary. There have been no serious complaints at the manner in which the senior championships have been programmed over the past few years. Have not the massive increases in attendance at our intercounty games shown a huge increase in public interest and satisfaction with the way in which they are being organised and causing further problems with the running of club championships, which are already in need of help in most counties. I see the proposed changes as somewhat confusing for the public

Opening Our Grounds To Other Sports

This issue is the subject of a motion here tonight and is also listed for debate at other conventions around the country and while I am fully aware that many of our units throughout the Association feel that the time is ripe for the opening of Croke Park for other sports and other games for commercial reasons and also as a gesture of goodwill in a quickly changing world, I also know that many of our clubs and members feel very deeply, probably for traditional reasons, about changing our rules to lease out our stadium at headquarters. I feel it is of the utmost importance that a firm decision one way or another, the controversial issue and not having it visited on a year in and year out basis, as it is at the present time. I feel it to be in the interest of the whole Association that the controversial issue should now bee debated, decided and whatever the result should be, accepted by all shades of opinion and put to bed for once and for all.

Other Issues

The chairman was critical of the policy of allowing alcoholic drinks to be advertised by the Association and referring to the national football league he was very critical of the arrangement whereby Waterford footballers have to travel north to Derry, Down and Louth, etc for games before Easter.

Elections

With the exception of the County Secretary, Seamus Grant all the nominated officers were unopposed.

Timmy O'Keeffe, Clashmore allowed his name to stand for the post of county secretary and here the result of 119 to 35 votes showed a clear majority for Seamus Grant who was commencing his 34th, year in office.

Timmy was very gracious in defeat and warmly congratulated the Runai.

As reported in our previous issue, John Jackson replaced the retiring Paddy Dunphy as county P.R.O.

Emer Barry, who is the Lismore club P.R.O. and a member of the County Communications committee was nominated but did not stand.

Motions

About an hour was devoted to the motions the majority of these were referred back to county board.

Motion 1

This was sponsored by Tallow and called for the appointment of a full time county secretary, with details, etc. to be worked out by a committee.

The motion was moved by Liam Moroney who said that the workload was now so great, that it is impossible for an unpaid person to attend to everything that needs to be done. The motion was seconded and referred to the County Executive.

Motion 2

This asked that the G.A.C. be responsible for all adult competitions including under 21 in hurling and football. This to include competitions being run by Western and Eastern Boards.

The motion from Clashmore club was moved by Timmy O'-Keeffe and was overwhelmingly defeated. It was described as an attempt to circumvent the decision of the October meeting of the county board who had rejected the S.R.C. report;

Motion 3

This motion sought to give should now be taken to settle authority to Central Council to open up Croke Park to other sports on a commercial basis and as they see fit.

It was sponsored by Clashmore/Kinsalebeg club and was

debated at length. Some clubs spoke strongly in favour of the motion and several delegates referred to the "Ban, Rule 27" which was rescinded over 30 years ago. Several delegates spoke strongly against allowing other organisations into Croke Park. When a vote was taken 50 voted for the motion and nearly twice that number opposed the proposal. The county chairman stated that he would not be in favour of the motion.

Motion 4

This motion from the Erin's Own club asked that a special sub committee consisting of the Auditor, the county and the two Divisional Secretaries, by appointed to make recommendations on the distribution of match tickets to all groups who are entitled to tickets, to the April meeting of the County board.

As conventions do not have the right to set up sub committees and as the issue was one for the county board, the motion was referred to the body.

Other Motions

The remaining 14 motions on the agenda all related to championship structures, etc. they were referred to county board, but in all cases the sponsoring clubs were allowed to make a brief submission.

The message coming from all quarters showed very clearly that clubs were annoyed to the point of being angry with the delay in running the championships last year and that under no circumstances can there be a repeat this time round

The outstanding speaker at Convention, Patrick Dunphy, Tramore, spoke about the huge problems associated with keeping a junior club in business in these times when a proper programme of matches cannot be adhered to because of the interruptions created by intercounty activity.

2003 Awards

When these were announced at the end of convention, they were greeted with applause. probably as a signal that delegates were well pleased with their selections. The county chairman complimented the committee on having maintained silence on the matter until the envelope giving details, was opened.






































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
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
