€52m Hotel Development **Proposed** For Clonea

Dublin based developers, Greenbirch Ltd, have lodged a re-freshed planning application for a multi-million euros hotel and hundreds of holiday homes on an 80,000 sq m site at Ballinclamper in Clonea.

Greenbirch plan to build a 4/5 star; eighty bedroom hotel, close to the seafront, along with around 126 terraced and

detached homes.

The hotel alone would cost close to twelve million euros to develop, and would create over one hundred jobs, and a further 43 jobs on a part-time basis, developers say.

The revised planning application from Greenbirch reduced the density of houses by 40 from the initial plans lodged (CONTINUED ON PAGE 12)

Crackdown On Litter Louts Promised

NAME AND SHAME CAMPAIGN NOT RULED OUT

New enforcement officers to be recruited by Waterford someone had left a bag of what County Council will see a toughening of the local authority's stance on litter louts in the next twelve months.

According to County Manager, Donal Connolly, who was speaking at the council's January meeting, a visible increase in prosecutions taken against those flouting the litter laws will be evident in the next year.

He also didn't rule out the launch of a name and shame campaign.

The issue was raised following the illegal dumping of recyclables at a car park servicing the popular tourist strand of Whiting Bay.

Cllr. Geraldine Veale (FG)

said that for the sake of paying culties in implementing these the 1.50 euros recycling charge, fines. appeared to be household waste in the car park.

The bag later split, she said, and the rubbish spilled out onto the popular strand.

"It's terrible in this day and age to think people are still dumping rubbish in any space they can find," she said.

Cllr. Pat Daly (FF) raising similar concerns about illegal dumping, and asked the council to implement a name and shame campaign for litter louts, and that the fines for those caught be increased.

Mr. Connolly replied that consideration can be given to increasing the on-the-spot fines, but admitted that there are diffi-

"Certainly we could have a name and shame campaign. I don't see any difficulty with that," he said.

He said that the Department of the Environment will also pay for the recruitment of an enforcement officer, which will give the council far greater powers to deal with those who flout the laws. While complimenting the litter wardens, he said they are being stretched at the moment.

Earlier in the meeting, Mr. Connolly thanked the majority of the public who co-operate with the council's recycling scheme.

However, while the county is "at the forefront" of waste man-

agement in the country, he said there are always those who will engage in indiscriminate dumping.

"There is the danger that these people will take away from our reputation as a litter free county.

Mr. Connolly warned they will be prosecuted in the next twelve months







Knockboy Church part 1

The earliest detailed account of Knockboy appears in John O'-Donovan's Ordnance Survey Let-

ters (1841). O'Donovan noted that "some of the natives are impressed with the idea that the present old church in ruins is the original erection of the saint himself, but they could not impress me with the same notion, nor could I remove theirs by any arguments I could make use of, because tradition is the strangest evidence to them"

O'Donovan measured the building and noted the side walls about 9ft high 'cemented with lime and mortar'. The West gable is surrounded with a belfry consisting of two pointed arches formed of cut stone in rather a neat style and contains two narrow pointed windows placed one over the other, the lower at the height of 6ft 7 inches from the present level of the ground on the outside and measuring 3ft 7inches in height and 7* inches in width and the other about 2 ft over it O'Donovan measured the door on the south wall.

On the outside it was 6ft 3inches high and 3ft 8inches in width. There is a holy water font near it on the south wall is a small window formed out of cut stone but its top is destroyed The east window is pointed on the outside 5 ft 8 inches in height and 11* inches in width widening to 8ft 3 inches by 6ft 4 inches on the inside there is on the north wall a narrow round-headed window formed of cut stone, 4 ft 1 inch in height and 6inches in width.

The dangerous condition of the pier at Helvick Head, has been raised by Sinn Fein. Local Election Candidate, Brendan Mansfield, was contacted by local Cumann Chairperson Deaglan O'Reagan, about the matter.

Serious structural damage has appeared at the Pier after recent bad weather. Mr. Mansfield said, that he doubts the pier can stand anymore battering from the sea and has called for Waterford County Council to carry out immediate repair work at the pier.

Co. Manager Confident Of Decentralisation Success

County Manager, Donal Connolly has met, on a number of occasions, leading figures within the Government Agency to decentralise to Dungaryan.

Mr. Connolly said he is confident the 200 to 300 staff of the Ordinance Survey of Ireland will be relocated to Dungarvan in a relatively short time span.

Mr. Connolly, who was speaking on WLR FM on Saturday last, said he is aware some members of the OSI had visited Dungarvan, and said those he had met in the OSI had given an enthusiastic response to the proposed move.

"I'm confident that we will see decentralisation work in Dungarvan, and that it will happen in a short period of time."

Mr. Connolly said the influx of Civil Servants to the town is his main hope for the area in the next year. The decentralisation plans could see an injection of up to 10 million euros into the local economy, according to Government figures.

"We're fortunate in Dungarvan in that we have a good housing stock to deal with the kind of demand this involves," Mr. Connolly said.

Labour Party Representative Expresses Concern for Those Suffering Domestic Violence

Dungarvan area Labour Party Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair has expressed concern at the publication last week of Gárda figures estimating that less than one in ten incidents of domestic violence from 2002 resulted in a conviction

The recently published Gárda Annual Report cites a drop of almost 50% in convictions in comparisons between 2002 and the previous year of 2001. The fall was recorded despite a rise in the number of reported incidents within that period. The Annual Report also shows that the amount of arrests for domestic violence fell by 13% in that time and that 23% less people were charged with the offence in 2002 than was the case in 2001

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair portrayed the rise in such incidents as disturbing and added that changes about to be introduced in relation to the payment of social welfare rent allowance could impact negatively on those who suffer in these situations.

Applicants will now have to prove they have lived in rented accommodation for six months before being eligible.

This is something, according to Cllr. O Céilleachair, which could make it more difficult for victims of abuse to access new accommodation. Those who require emergency accommodation, in Cllr. O Céilleachair's view, deserve better.

The figures show that in 91% of cases the offenders were male. Correspondingly, 92% of the complainants were women.

Last month, there were calls from Women's Rights Groups for Ireland to follow Britain's lead and equip Gárdaí attending domestic violence calls with Polaroid cameras. In such circumstances, police are immediately able to record injuries and other evidence proving that a crime occurred and thereby reducing the need to rely on witness statements.

There is concern that a significant amount of domestic violence cases fail because witnesses, mainly women, retract their statements or refuse to testify - perhaps because of intimidation

Appeals Lodged **Against Ardmore Aparthotel**

A number of appeals have been submitted against the proposed development of an "aparthotel" on the site of the existing Cliff House Hotel in Ardmore.

Waterford County Council had granted conditional planning permission to John Foley, Kilrush, Dungarvan, for the demolition of the present hotel, and its replacement with the aparthotel and holiday homes. The development would also include an underground car park, while the building itself would consist of a central section two storeys over road level extending down to four storeys on the seaside.

However, Patrick and Joan Dwyer, Siobhan Lincoln, Eileen Colbert, John Brabazon, John L. King and Richard and Mary Lincoln, have all submitted appeals seeking to overturn planning permission. A decision from An Bord Pleanala on the appeals is likely to be made within the next month or two.



The signs were removed in the sparsely populated rural areas of Walsh's Cross and Tour Cross. The situation has seen local householders bombarded with queries from lost motorists

at all hours of the night.

Highlighting the issue, Gary O'Halloran, an independent local candidate in the forthcoming elections, said some elderly residents are distressed at having to open their doors to strangers in the late hours.

They are very concerned about who they are opening their doors to," he said.

And, Mr. O'Halloran pointed to the last splurge of signpost robberies five or six years ago as a clue to where the signs

'We don't want to see Clashmore and Aglish deleted from the map either," Mr. O'Halloran added. " We need as many tourists as we can get.'





ESB Apply For Retention Of Ballyneety Pylons

The ESB has lodged a planning application with Waterford County Council seeking the retention of two massive steel pylons at the centre of a dispute in Ballyneety, Dungarvan.

The two masts, which feed the main Kilmacthomas 38 kV line (the back-up Waterford-Tramore line) were constructed close to the home of two elderly brothers in Ballyneety.

Despite winning a landmark An Bord Pleanala appeal against the County Council planning department and the Electricity Supply Board, the retention application looks set to force Monnie and Frankie Drummy into a prolonged fight against the masts they claim are ruining their lives and their health.

The ESB already lodged one incomplete retention application, and lodged a second application in December.

A spokesperson for the ESB said the line is a vital part of their South Eastern infrastructure.

"If the application is refused our design people will have to look at different routes or under-grounding the line."

However, he said the ESB doesn't favour the undergrounding of their cables due to the added cost factor, which includes the cost of laying and maintenance of an underground power-line.

Oliver Coffey To Fight Election Campaign In Dungarvan Area

Oliver Coffey is to contest the 2004 Local Elections in the Dungarvan Electoral Area as he plots his return to Waterford County Council after fives years in the political wilderness.

Mr. Coffey, from Shanbally, Leamybrien, was a Fine Gael local representative in the Kilmacthomas Electoral area from 1979 until the contentious loss of his seat in '99.

He said the decision to run in the Dungarvan area, was partly motivated by the boundary changes when 2,000 voters were moved into Dungarvan, including Mr. Coffey's strongholds of Ballinroad, Clonea, Ballinacourty, Kilgobnet, Coolnasmear and Kilbrien.

However, the reason also has to do with his anger at the party machines vote management strategy which, he maintains cost him his seat.

LOSS OF SEAT

In the run-up to the '99 elections, the Kilmacthomas area was reduced from five to three seats, and Mr. Coffey was selected as the sole Fine Gael candidate in October of '98. But, a month before the election, a second candidate was added to the party ticket breaking an agreement Mr. Coffey obtained that assured him of the sole nomination.

"We both secured close on 1,000 votes and when the other candidate was eliminated, his transfers went all over the place, and I lost the seat by 47 votes," he told the Dungarvan Leader.

"I felt very annoyed at the time. I had been given an undertaking by the National Executive that I was to be the only candidate. But it didn't most ir opposit plans halting 1997.


INTERVENING YEARS

In the five years, Mr. Coffey has been involved with the Waterford Community Forum, and was elected vice chairperson, following his nomination to the forum from the Comeragh Community Development Group – a group he helped found.

He has also been a member of one of Waterford County Council's Strategic Policy Committees.

In November of last year, he put his name forward at Fine Gael's Selection Convention, and was selected as one of five Fine Gael candidates to fight the elections in the Dungarvan

Mr. Coffey said he is confident of being elected back to the local authority he chaired in 1995, and where some view his most important impact was his opposition against the council's plans to build two transient halting sites in the county in 1997.





A banyan has many trunks, and can develop into a one-tree forest! The largest example, in Sri Lanka, has over 350 main trunks.

Deciduous Trees Lose Their Leaves In Winter

Many trees are deciduous – they lose their leaves in winter. In autumn, the leaves wither and fall. The fallen leaves are replaced by new leaves that grow each spring. This does not happen with evergreens which, as their name suggests, keep their leaves throughout the winter months.

Woodland Trees Are Home To Many Creatures

In a wood there are thousands of creatures.

Some live underground, some live on the woodland floor and some live in the trees. Birds nest in tree branches, and in holes in trunks.

Squirrels also nest in holes in trees. The leaves and bark are home to numerous caterpillars and insects. Even dead trees are full of life, for they are home to beetles and other mini-beasts, slugs, worms, small mammals and birds.

The Tallest Trees Are Redwoods

The Coastal Redwoods of California, USA, are the tallest trees in the world. They can be as high as 83 m (272 ft) or more and one in the Humboldt Redwoods State Park in California is over 111 m (364 ft) high!

Rings Tell A Tree's Age

A cross-section of a tree shows alternate light and dark rings of wood. The light rings are the tree's summer growth each year and the dark rings are winter growth. By counting these pairs of rings, scientists can calculate the age of the tree. The width of the rings are also an indication of the weather – narrow rings indicate poor conditions and wider rings denote good weather. Nowaday, scientists use a more accurate method of dating trees, called carbon dating, which measures radioactivity.

Trees Help Prevent Soil Erosion

Trees Provide Us With Lots Of Useful Things

Apart from various types of timber used in all manner of building and construction, trees also yield many other products useful to humans. Trees provide us with a wide variety of edible fruits. Rubber and cork also come from trees, as do a range of products used in medicines.

The roots of trees help to hold the soil together. Where large areas of trees have been cut down, the soil is eroded – it is washed away by water, or blown away by the wind.

AS a group of plants heathers are remarkable because there are species and cultivars available to provide colour and interest throughout the year.

Several species are grown for their Daboecia and Erica. golden foliage which turns a deep burnt orange in winter, while others Calluna Vulgaris, but it contains a flower for a longer period during the summer, autumn or winter. Flowers come in a variety of colours - the most common being white and purple - but there are also shades of pink, red, blue and

yellow. Occasionally flowers can be bicoloured and those with double flowers may be dried for winter decoration. Heathers can vary from tree-heaths up to 20 feet to dwarf forms which provide excellent ground cover.

Heathers should be pruned lightly after flowering every year to keep the plants bushy and

Propagate species by seed in spring or by soft wood cuttings, division or layering in summer. Seed that is collected cannot be relied on to come true and so this means all cultivars can only be propagated through cuttings.

This week in the garden

Order seeds and seed potatoes

The very first task of January should be to compile a list of all the seeds you will need over the coming months. Get these ordered without delay. Many seeds cannot be sown after March or April. Later on producers are inundated with orders and even the biggest companies get bogged

Set potato seeds in shallow trays as soon as they arrive, eyed ends up, and place them in a light, frost-proof room.

Bring shrubs and roses in pots to the green-

Roses well established in pots should be brought into the greenhouse now. Give them a light airy place preferably above ground level not too far from the glass.

Water the soil regularly and spray them every morning with a little lukewarm water. All the roses must be pruned and previous year's growth shortened to within an inch of the older wood.

Prune climbers in the greenhouse

Several permanent climbers commonly grown in the greenhouse should have been pruned by now. These include plumbago capenis and the passion flower.

The plumbago is pruned by cutting last year's growth back to 23cm. This also applies to fully developed plants. With young plants, some shoots may be left unpruned. The passion flower must have all weak shoots removed and last year's growth cut back to around two buds each. Start early peaches, nectarines and apricots

In a heated greenhouse it is possible to have ripe peaches, nectarines and apricots throughout the summer. If you want ripe fruits in June now is the time to start.

In his book on the IRA, Pat Coogan states that Ned was a member of the Army Council, IRA in 1927. He and his family suffered for their allegiance as he endured several terms of imprisonment up to the forties when he was interned without trial for the duration of the 2nd World War. On his release in 1945 he was active in the reorganisation of the Republican movement in which work he was ably assisted by Clonmel man Mickesy Conway who later became a member of the Cistercian Community in Mellifont Abbey under the name of Brother Maol Mhuire.

Emma taught school in her beloved Grange and during her time she travelled widely. She was proud of the fact that she read and spoke Irish fluently. She was a valued member of the Liam Lynch Memorial committee and contributed generously to many Irish Ireland causes. Her colleagues on the Memorial committee mourn the loss of a free spirit. May she rest in peace.

Late Mr. James Gibbs

It is with deep and sincere regret we record the passing of Mr. James (Jimmy) Gibbs, Ballypatrick, Clonmel. Born in Ballypatrick, the eight generation of a family that gave so much service to the public, the farming community in particular to whom outstanding service at all times was provided from repairing house hold goods to shoeing horses, repairing and even at times manufacturing farm machinery when the necessity arose. Much of the repair work took place in an era where people knew and respected the value of money, and greatly appreciated the incalculable contribution the Gibbs families rendered to the community. Jimmy received his early education in Kilcash N.S., from there he went to Clonmel Technical Institute where he acquired his basic machinist training. While there he excelled and his talents were quickly recognised. Later on in life, a well known engineering teacher was retiring and at a function in Annie Keohan's was asked the question could he remember some outstanding students. Without even thinking the instant reply was young Jim Gibbs from Ballypatrick was the best student that ever passed through the doors of the Tech. No one could ever compare with Gibbs from Ballypatrick. His excellent scholastic achievements and incredible probing brain were legendary in the Technical school and his time in the school had survived the

After finishing school he went to work in the forge with his father and other members of the family. One thing he loved during his career was variety. When World War 2 broke out he joined the Army where he served as a Mechanic. After a short time there his father passed away and Jimmy returned to Bally-patrick where he worked again in the forge workshop. Soon after he took over the running of the family pub here he revitalised business.

His next move was undoubtedly his best and certainly the most important one of his life when he married the lovely Mai Hanly from County Laois, they had a family of four. Like their clan, they were a most successful and talented family. Jimmy's love of variety continued as for a few years he ran a mobile cinema which consisted of a van and the usual equipment for showing films which he took from Ballypatrick to Dunmore East, Portlaw, Kilsheelan, Clogheen, Ballymacarbry and the Nire Valley generally taking in six nights per week. Those films ran for ninety minutes and as he was able to get top quality films he had full houses on all nights.

He will always be remembered for his generosity for if a young patron arrived to see the film and did not have the full admission fee or perhaps no money, Jimmy never refused admission. His next move in life was as a Diesel and Petrol Mechanic in his own garage where he was most successful. While Jimmy was fully occupied in his own business, his wife Mai was running a most popular and successful dancing business first with an open air platform and later on using a roofed marquee together with the family bar. He then moved into Electrical and Plumbing business.

In spite of Jimmy's brilliant intellect, he always loved the simple things that life had to offer. Nothing gave him more pleasure than a good long chat. To be in his company and to listen to him talk and reminisce with vast amount to knowledge especially of local variety was a treat in itself. He always had time for the mug of tea irrespective of the urgency of the breakdown, time meant nothing to Jimmy, he was a natural tonic in itself. He took a great interest in every fact of life including sport and politics. Nature and animals were very close to his heart as he loved all animals great and small.

His health over the past few years was not great, yet he never complained being thankful for a good long life for the most of his eighty odd years.

When we look back on his long life we realise Jimmy Gibbs showed us how to lead a very contented one. To his wife Mai, family and brother we extend our sympathy.

Late Mr. Tom Beresford 1921-2003



Tommy Beresford was a much loved figure here among the people with whom he lived and worked for the greater part of his life and it was with great sadness we learned of his passing on December 1st, 2003.

Tommy died peacefully in the wonderful care of the Ward sister and staff at the Sacred Heart Unit of St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan where he had been a patient for a short time.

In the days that followed, the book of memories were thrown open and the life of this true gentleman was recalled. Tommy Beresford was one of seven children and a member of an old and respected farming family in this area. Educated at Ballycurrane National School, (Tommy was the last surviving member of his class of seven), subsequently at CBS, Youghal. Throughout the years he has contributed his skills and talents to our local football teams and even helped Aglish to victory on one occasion. He left school at an early age, to farm with relatives at Ballinaclash, at a time when farming was very labour intensive, but for Tommy, a man with a great Tommy joined them during the

love of the soil, it was a labour of love. He had a genuine love for animals and dogs in particular, in the latter years of his life Tommy enjoyed nothing better than his daily walk with his ca-nine friend, Ben along the river walk to Ballyheeney.

In 1952, Tommy's career took a major turn when he left the land to work in the construction industry in England. During the next ten years, Tommy lent his many skills and talents to the building trade over there. However, his pride in his roots and his love for Clashmore were forever apparent and he returned to the fold in 1962 when he bought Jack McGrath's pub and renamed it 'The Rising Sun' after his favourite 'local' in England. Tommy had found his true vocation and so began a wonderful family business, which has continued for 41 years. Never a man to seek the lime-

light he went about his business in a quiet and unassuming manner. He ran his business with respect and discipline, but he was never afraid to call a spade a spade. Materialistic things were not important to him, over the years he saw many great changes in the village and in the trade. "It's hard to do big things in small places" was just one of Tommy' great sayings how right he proved to be over the years, Tommy retained the old character and welcome in the Rising Sun. The Ring Board has always been a feature here and a popular game in Winter. It was also the first pub in the village to have a dartboard. "A man's pound is his own", was another one of Tommy's great sayings, Tommy always maintained warmth and welcome for everyone at the Rising Sun. Fishermen recall times when

fishing season on the river Blackwater, when Tommy was sure to bring along a few small bottles, to quench their thirst.

Tommy Beresford was indeed one of the few great characters of our time. His great wit, his wonderful sense of humour, endeared him to all. His quick sharp mind never bore ill feeling just created an encyclopedia of fond memories. He loved to travel, among the places he visited during his life was Colorado where he traced the Beresford family roots. He was a well read man and this came across in his conversation. He up dated himself daily with the Examiner and enjoyed nothing better than a gathering of patrons for a good conversation on anything but religion or politics! A talented accordion player, Tommy liked nothing better than to join in on a sing song in the bar.

The high esteem and popularity which Tommy enjoyed was testified by the huge and respective crowds which came to pay their final respects to this remarkable man who was dearly loved as he lay in repose at home in the Rising Sun. These sentiments were to be seen in abundance during the funeral when his family and dearest and long life friends shouldered his coffin from his home on his final journey to the church, a journey made so often by this man of deep religious faith.

His funeral Mass was celebrated by Fr. Maurice O'Gorman assisted by Fr. Billy Meehan. Rosari O'Brien read the explanation as the gifts of the Cork Examiner and reading glasses, trowel and wood plane, accordian and a music tape (Tommy's hits - compiled for him some years ago by his friends, Gillian and Patricia Keogh), his passport and a souvenir plate of Colorado, a fishing net, spirit measures, a tray and a whiskey glasses, a spire hook, straw and hay, all symbols of Tommy's life were taken to the altar at the beginning of Mass by family members and friends.

Richard and Mary Dee sang the responsorial psalm. Family members and friends shared the reading of the bidding prayers and the Clashmore choir accompanied Tom Beresford (nephew) in the Communion hymn. The final and very fitting tribute was paid to Tommy by his old friend Fr. Billy Meehan, at the end of Mass before he was taken to his final resting place in the Beresford family plot in the adjoining cemetery. May the Good Lord whom you deeply loved watch over you and as you sleep here Tommy.

A dearly loved and respected husband and father, we pray that the wonderful memories of you will sustain Mai, Colette and John also your daughter-in-law Michelle and grandchildren Miriam and Tiarnan and brothers John and Nicholas and all your familyand neighbours through the lonely and sad times without you. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Can you please give details on the new rates for hospital charges that were announce with the estimates for 2004?

From January 2004 the charge for attending Accident and Emergency has increased from €40 to €45. If you are a medical card holder or have a letter of referral from your doctor you do not have to pay this charge.

The charge for in -patient services in a public ward has also increased from €40 to €45 a day (subject to a maximum of €450, i.e. 10 days, in any 12 month period). If you stay in two or more hospitals in the course of the year and your stay exceeds 10 days in hospital you should bring this to the attention of the last hospital you attend.

Everyone is entitled to public in-patient services regardless of their income but subject to the statutory charge mentioned above. There are a number of groups who do not have to pay the statutory charge such as medical card holders, women receiving maternity services, children up to the age of 6 weeks and children suffering from prescribed long-term illnesses. In cases of undue hardship a Health Board may provide the service free of charge.

The charges for private and semi-private accommodation in public hospitals have also increased by between 15% to 20%. The new daily rates are:

A member of Waterford County Council has said the nationwide extension of a programme, whereby motorists can report both those who drive dangerously or those who may litter from cars, could prove a useful aid to those who police

the roads and the environment. Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair was speaking about the "Traffic Watch" scheme, which for the past two years has been piloted in Co. Waterford and the south-

fact that up to 8,000 calls - a significant quantity of them in relation to Co. Waterford were received by the advertised "hotline" since its' launch must do some good as regards reducing reckless driving on roads.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair added, however, that the delivery of previously stated Government promises to recruit 2,000 extra Gárdaí and the development of a specific traffic corps would also be of benefit to public safety if it came about.

Commenting on the success of the "Traffic Watch" scheme, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said:

"In addition to the ordinary operation of the Gárdaí and the introduction of the penalty points system, it seems that some 500 motorists were cautioned and dozens have been brought before the courts and prosecuted as a result of the Traffic Watch" scheme.'

"There have been bans and Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said the endorsements for drink driving under this scheme where motorists reported others driving dangerously. There were also

prosecutions for aggressive and reckless driving. Fines have ranged up to 300 Euro. Since the scheme was launched in the south-east two years ago, road deaths have been cut from an average of 80 to 54.'

Stradbally Notes

DRUGS AWARENESS MEETING

A drugs Awareness meeting will be held later this month, organised by Chairman Tom Hickey of Stradbally Tourism & Enterprise Group. The evening presented by the Drugs Awareness Programme from Waterford City will discuss the rise of the use of drugs in rural communities especially amongst the young, and is intended to help parents, families and friends to understand and recognise the problem. The meeting will be open to everyone and the date will be announced shortly.

STRADBALLY SEWAGE

The case brought to the EU against Waterford County Council and Ireland for raw sewage being discharged into Stradbally Cove is now moving to the next stage. The initial submission made in 2002 by Róisín O' Shea, Brian Corry and Tom Hickey was accepted by the European Commission and registered as complaint no; 2002/5289 SG(2002) A/11264. The case was made that Waterford County Council breached the Bathing Water Directive by discharging raw sewage into the river and sea at Stradbally Cove where hundreds of families bring their young children to swim during the Summer months, and that the sewage was a serious health risk. As a result of tests taken by the complainants The South Eastern health Board recommended that signs be erected warning people not to bathe, paddle or wash utensils in the river at the Cove.

While many commitments have been made by the Government during the last four years to remedy the situation at the Cove and install a sewage treatment facility, nothing has been done to date. Róisín O' Shea and Paul Walsh have been working on the second part of the submission and Róisín will be heading to Brussels for a meeting with DG Environment in the first week of February. The EU Commission understand that Waterford County Council have not issued new planning permission for any house to attach to the existing sewer pipes since the action was lodged, and the situation will continue to be monitored.

Any further planning permissions granted would of course be attached to the case as new evidence to support breach of the relevant directive. If the case is upheld by the European Courts then Ireland will face a significant fine. Ireland can commit to installing a sewage treatment plant this year in Stradbally which may help avoid the full fine.

DISABILITY AWARENESS

Ankylosing Spondylitis

What is Ankylosing Spondylitis?

Ankylosing means fusing together. Spondylitis indicates inflammation of the vertebrae. Ankylosing Spondylitis is a painful, progressive, rheumatic disability, it mainly affects the spine, but it can also affect other joints, tendons and ligaments. Inflammation occurs at the site where certain ligaments or tendons attach to bone (enthesis). This is followed by some erosion of bone at the site of the attachment (enthesopathy). As the inflammation subsides, a healing process takes place and new bone develops. Movement becomes restricted where bone replaces the elastic tissue of ligaments or tendons. Repetition of this inflammatory process leads to further bone formation and the individual bones, which make up the backbone, the vertebrae, can fuse together. The pelvis is commonly affected first. The lower back, chest wall and neck may also become involved at different times.

What are the symptoms of AS?

The symptoms of AS include the following:

- Joint Pain (usually beginning in the lower end of the spine in a joint known as the sacroiliac joint) the pain is gradual over weeks or months, rather than hours or
- Stiffness in the spine especially early in the morning
- Persistent pain-for more than three months
- Feeling better after exercise, and feeling worse after
- Weight loss, especially in the early stages
- Fatigue
- Feeling feverish and experiencing night sweats

AS can affect other joints in the body causing pain and swelling in the hips, knees and ankles. AS is a unpredictable disability and is subject to remission and relapse. The cause of AS is not known, but research into the disability has shown that over 90% of people with the disability all share the same genetic cell marker - Human Leucocyte Antigen B27 (HLA-B27). However, not every person possessing this gene will develop the condition.

What is the Treatment and Outlook for Ankylosing Spondylitis?

The main objectives of treatment are to relieve pain and to limit the extent of joint damage thereby maintaining the maximum level of movement in affected joints. Most people with AS take non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, these reduce the inflammation and relieve pain and stiffness. Exercise is very important, and adequate back support when sitting down. AS usually affects people between the ages of 15 and 35, and it usually affects men. It is not possible to prevent AS, but early diagnosis can limit the extent of joint damage, and can limit the extent of permanent disability.

Cattle: Are Your Cattle Performing to Target

At this stage, about half way through the winter feeding period, it is appropriate to do "a mid term review" of cattle performance. When you are looking at your own cattle every day it is difficult to detect changes in weight gain or body condition over time and farmers often become concerned, having put two to three months feed into a group of cattle, in case they are not going to meet the expected sale date. The most important factor influencing performance is the intake and quality of feed, especially energy intake, in the case of finishing cattle. Anything that interferes with this will reduce performance. Finishing cattle on conventional diets of silage and concentrates should have an average gain over the feeding period of 1.0 kg per day. In the early part of the feeding period gain should be better, perhaps about 1.25 kg per day and as the cattle come near finishing they tend to gain at a slower rate probably in the region of 0.8 kg per day. If gain falls significantly below this level a high proportion of daily feed intake goes towards body maintenance and the value of daily carcase gain is not adequate to meet daily feed costs. Cattle on high concentrate diets or on all-concentrate diets will normally have a more consistent performance than on silage based diets and should average at about 1.3 kg per day over a feeding period of 2 - 3 months.

Assessing Gain Obviously, the best way to measure performance is to weigh the cattle at the start and during the finishing period. Even with a weighing scales, one has to be cautious in drawing conclusions from weighings in the short term. Differences in gut full can cause significant variation in liveweight gain which is not part of animal performance. Where weighing is not done it is worthwhile now to take some time to get an assessment of thrive. Ideally, a few farmers with similar stock visiting each others farms and assessing weight and condition would be better than a farmer trying to assess his own stock. It will be necessary to let a pen or more of cattle into an open yard to do a proper assessment and to put them through a crush to handle them for degree of finish. Condition scoring will probably tell you more in relation to thrive

than estimating weight. Under Performance

If cattle are considered to be underperforming you should go through a check list of possible causes. The first is feed, silage digestibility and silage intake could be factors. Make sure that the appropriate level of supplementation is being fed in relation to silage quality. For high silage quality (72% DMD) which is rare this year, feed about 5.5 kg concentrate per day to 600 kg steers and increase concentrate level by about 1 kg per day for every 3 units reduction in DMD. See that cattle get ad lib access to fresh silage daily and that feeding space is adequate. Next, examine the housing and environmental conditions. A 600 kg animal needs 2.3 m_ (25 ft_) lying area. Overcrowding will result in lower performance and an increase in dirty hides. Poor ventilation can have similar effects. Make sure cattle have adequate clean drinking water. Cattle on high concentrate diets will under perform if short of water. Finally, the health status of the stock should not be neglected. Young cattle (up to 2 years of age) could benefit from a worm dose at housing if they had been subjected to a high larval worm challenge at pasture. Treat stock for fluke and lice. Mineral and vitamin deficiencies can also be the cause of poor thrive especially on diets consisting of by-products, roots and moist grain. Acidosis due to the too rapid build up of starchy concentrates in the diet will cause loss of intake, scouring and even rumen damage in severe cases and result in a period of interrupted growth.



FARMING LEADER

NO SMOKE WITHOUT FARM INCOME FIGURES

Consolation used to be a cigar called after a Shakespearean play, but it would be politically incorrect these days to suggest that smoking such a weed would provide comfort to the average EU farmer - who was better off in 2003, we are told, by a mere 1 per cent increase in income.

Not that average EU figures are any consolation if your own situation is worse than the Union average. In such circumstances, the average EU farmer could be forgiven for turning to drink as well as smoking.

Sometimes, though, a look at the broader picture is of more than passing interest. And the latest figures on farm incomes throughout the EU are of particular interest because they refer to the last complete year when the Union had 15 countries (before it became the EU-25) and the last complete year before the changes prompted by the Fischler reform of the CAP began to creep in. The 2003 farm incomes are interesting, therefore, as a snapshot of the end of an era and will be looked at again and again in against which the fortunes of a bright new future will be meas-

The figures, released last month by Eurostat, the Statistical Office of the European Communities, were the first estimates for the year. They referred to "agricultural workers" (in effect, farmers, because so many farms are oneperson operations these days) and showed an income rise of 0.9 per cent on 2002. In the Euro-zone, agricultural income per 'worker' fell by 0.5 per cent.

Eurostat summarised the farming year with a little headline: "Lower output volumes for crops due to the heat wave, lower producer prices for animal production." There were falls in the output value of pigs (down 6.2 per cent) and of milk (down 3.1 per cent). The heat wave (or drought, depending on your perspective) in the summer was the main reason why the volume of crops output fell by 6.3 per cent. For cereals - which are the second most important farm product,

years to come as a yardstick tainly not in Ireland - the overall output volume dropped by 10.6 per cent, but this was compared to a year when the Union's harvest almost reached a record level).

At the same time, the average EU producer price for cereals was 7.5 per cent higher than in 2002. A decline in wine production of 10 per cent also helped to keep EU farm incomes down.

Averages are misleading, not to mention frustrating (sic). Across the EU, they ranged over a huge spread, from a drop of 14.2 per cent (in Germany) to a rise of 20.5 per cent (in the UK). Somewhere around the upper middle of the range is Ireland, with a drop of 0.6 per cent on 2002.

The report also makes comparisons with figures relating to a composite average taken over the years 1994, 1995 and 1996; this group of years is known as '1995' for statistical purposes. In this section of the figures, Ireland comes out 4 points ahead of '1995'. Nine of the 15 Member States recorded better incomes

'1995'. Portugal led the way with a 30 per cent improvement, Finland had 23 per cent and Sweden 20 per cent. At the other end of the scale, Germany dropped just under 20 per cent, the Netherlands 18.7 per cent and the UK 15.4 per cent.

Information from seven of the ten Accession Countries shows that the real agricultural income per worker in 2003 declined in all seven, with the worst effected being Hungary (down 21.3 per cent), Slovenia (down 20.9 per cent) and Lithuania (down 10 per cent). In Slovakia, the figure was down 6.8 per cent, in Latvia 6.1 per cent, in the Czech Republic 3 per cent and in Estonia 2.2 per cent.

PS. None of the above should be confused with the type of farm income data produced by the Central Statistics Office which, incidentally, shows that overall farm income in Ireland for 2002 increased by 2.2 per cent. You'd need a long cigar to figure out the difference between the CSO and Eurostat re-

Mickey Wilson Hillwalker and Adventurer

It was with a great sense of sadness that all-club members and the entire community learned of the passing of one of our most loyal and longest serving club members, Mickey Wilson, whose death occurred on Monday, 15th Dec. 2003 at Greenhill Nursing Home, Carrick-on-Suir.

From the moment Mickey joined the club, shortly after it's foundation in 1995, her commitment, enthusiasm and her willingness to involve herself totally in all club affairs set her apart and she touched everyone with her energy, kindness and her unique personality.

Whilst Mickey gave so much of her time to the administration of the club, she was first and foremost "a Hiker", who had a great love for the outdoors, and was happiest walking her beloved Comeragh Mountains and the surrounding countryside. She liked nothing better than the challenge of being able to walk "shoulder to shoulder" with those many years her junior and was fearless in the face of even the most dangerous mountain terrain. Never one to travel the easy path, Mickey was known to take "the odd tumble", however her single-minded determination ensured that she simply picked herself up, dusted herself down and set about the next challenge. Mickey also loved to take part in club outing to the many walking festivals throughout the country. My favourite and treasured memory is of a glorious weekend on the Aran Islands, with Mickey to the fore front of all activities. It was not unusual to find Mickey take the odd detour from the agreed route in search of some local storyteller, or place of interest, and while there may have been occasions when she became "temporarily displaced" from the main group, Mickey would invariably find an alternative route that allowed her rejoin the main party. At the end of a long day on the mountains, when most of the group were anxious to seek out the comfort of the nearest hostelry to quench their thirst, Mickey would produce her famous bag of "cookies", where a refusal to accept was met with a disapproving shake of the head.

Mickey also loved to involve herself in the administration of club affairs and her collection of photographs of all club outings and social occasions is a step by step guided tour of the club's history, and she was also a valued member of the George Harney Comeragh Crossing organising committee. At club meetings she was a rock of common sense, whose drive, vision and character allowed her make a considerable contribution to the development of the club.

In 2000, the club honoured Mickey by presenting her with honorary life membership and she took great pleasure in having it on display for all who visited her during her time at Greenhills. Her outgoing personality enabled her to connect with all who came in contact with her and is her legacy to us that sustains us in our loss.

In attempting to rationalise the whole circular cycle of life, it could be argued that a life, for what ever length of time is nothing more than an extension of the four seasons, in the sense that in springtime life explodes onto the landscape and we follow it's progress of flowering and full bloom through summer and autumn, to fade away in wintertime and for the whole process to begin again. The inspiration and charismatic nature of Mickey Wilson dominated the landscape of all club activities over the past eight years and I like to think that in the period of time that she was with us, she too was in full bloom.

The club wishes to offer its condolences to Sandy, Mary, Joey, Chuckie, Teresa, Patti, Michael, grandchildren and her extended family on their sad loss. On Sat. 20th Dec 2003, club members gathered to pay their final respects and to lay to rest a truly generous and remarkable woman.

When the divisional Bord sat down last Wednesday evening it was discovered that not all results from the 2002 championships were phoned in after the match. Therefore final league tables were not available to help with the gradings. The gradings are not set in stone, until the full Bord meets.

On the night of the meetings clubs will have the chance to voice their opinion if they think they are in the wrong division. It is important that clubs have the number of players they are selecting from, when they attend the meeting.

Under 16 Hurling.

At the first delegate meeting of the year, any transfer of players between clubs must be ratified at the meeting. Transfer forms are now available from the acting divisional secretary. Clubs have been told that transfer forms will only be given out to club secretaries and to no other personnel within the club.

Clubs have also been told that all transfer forms must be in order for transfers to go through and that all transfer forms must be returned 1 to the acting divisional secretary on or before Tuesday January 21

New Secretary.

When the new Divisional Bord meets on January 27 one of the items on the agenda will be to elect a new divisional secretary. At the Annual Convention held on November 20th in Lawlors Hotel, the outgoing secretary agreed to stay on until January

Clubs now have had two months to come up with somebody to take over as secretary. Some names have been mentioned as to who might take over but noting is definite yet. Clubs have been asked to get nominations for the position in to the acting secretary before Friday January 23. Primary Schools GAA

JOHN KEANE

There is an article on John Keane of Waterford in the book HURLINGS TOP TWENTY by Colm Keane. In it he states that John



Keane was an extraordinary hurler. With a massive physique, he towered at the heart of defence bringing vision and leadership to the hurlers he played with. Friends, club - mates and opponents describe the sort of rare intelligence, skill and ability to take control that is only seen in great exponents of the game. AS a centre back he dominated play. Switched to centre- forward he could still determine the outcome of games, as he did later on in the famous 1948 All- Ireland final.

Born in Waterford in 1917, the story of John Keanes rise to hurling prominence began as a teenager in the grim 1930's. A naturally talented and skilfull hurler, he played for Mount Sion as their dominance in Waterford hurling was about to begin. He became a central part in the club's many championship victories and in 1934 he helped bring All-Ireland Junior honours to his native county. By the following year he was a regular in the senior side. By 1937, just into his twenties, the finished article was about to be revealed in a contest with fellow Munster contenders, Limerick

In 1938, with John Keane a dominant force at the heart of defence. Waterford surprisingly cruised through the Munster semi-final by defeating Cork at Dungarvan. The victory over Cork was followed by a Munster final triumph over Clare, which secured for Waterford their first ever Munster senior hurling title. In the subsequent All- Ireland semi-final against Galway, Keane once again produced a massive performance.

Waterford's historic 1938 All-Ireland final appearance against Dublin was about to take place.

In that All- Ireland, beaten by a couple of points, I must say that it was the occasion that caught hold of them. But even there, Keane was the dominant force at centre-back. He was a great man in 1938 and continued to be a great man until the end of his career

come out in favour of opening the Stadium to other sports.

Some commentators who favour the removal of Rule 42 take a more narrow minded view and are quite bitter in their attitude.

Many of those take the line that those who are against opening up Croke Park are still living back in the "Ban" years.

Every intelligent commentator on this topic will concede that the Ban is long gong gone and forgotten and rightly so.

Today, soccer which is probably more popular than rugby is watched by everyone in the G.A.A. There are support clubs for British Premier soccer

teams all over Ireland. On weekends thousands of people, the majority of whom are G.A.A. people travel to England to see the games.

Celtic in the Scottish league are regarded by very many as an " Irish" side.

A huge percentage of G.A.A. players are also playing are also members of local soccer clubs. So where is the Ban and why refuse the use of Croke Park to the Irish Soccer team for the World Cop series?

Changing Rules and association policy and examining the perceived effects that such changes will have on the running of the association in future years is serious business and is

a matter on which the G.A.A. will have to move slowly.

Many aspects of the problem which seem to have been overlooked by some thoughtless commentators, have to be taken on board before our grounds are made available to all and

First of all, Rule 42 (which is the rule change being proposed and is before Congress, relates to all club grounds throughout the whole association. Croke Park is not named specifically in the rule.

Therefore opening Croke Park and not including club grounds, etc. to be used for other sports, is totally unsustainable.

Making club grounds avail-

able to other sports would result in turmoil in clubs. Clubs would experience great difficulty in retaining priority and control of their properties which have been developed by sacrifice and commitment of their members and most of all it must be remembered that while other sports can be played on G.A.A. grounds, hurling and football cannot be played on soccer or rugby grounds because of the measurement requirements. etc.

Clubs would have absolutely nothing to gain by it all and in time would completely lose their identity.

I expect to write on the topic again before congress. In the

meantime here is a full transcript of Rule 42; O.G 2003

"All property including grounds, Dressing rooms, club houses and Handball Alleys which are controlled by units of the Association shall be used only for the purpose of or in connection with the promotion of games controlled by the Association, or for such other purposes not in conflict with the aims and objects of the Association which may be sanctioned from time to time by Central Council.

Grounds controlled by the association may not be used for horse racing, greyhound racing or field games other than those sanctioned by Central Council".

ROBERT KORZENIOWSKI FOR **ALLROUNDER WINTER LEAGUE**

How would you like to meet a living legend a man regarded as the most successful and by many as the greatest racewalker of all time the great Polish champion of champions Robert Korzeniowski will be in Ireland on a short visit next week. He will be participating in the Allrounder Winter League on Wednesday night January 21st from the Sports Centre. During his visit to the Emerald Isle he will spend some days in the Costin household in Ballycreen, Ring. West Waterford Athletic Club's Olympian Jamie Costin is a close friend of the Polish star for some years now after they met for the first time at a training camp in Mexico and since then Robert has been very involved with the development of race walking in Ireland as he organises and operates training camps for elite race walkers in Mexico where the likes of Jamie, Gillian O'Sullivan, Robbie Heffernan and many other race walkers from all over Europe go and train with the great man before major competition.

So you might be asking the question what gives an athlete the right to be regarded as the greatest in his particular sport. Well you just have to look through the achievements of Korzeniowski at this most difficult and demanding of sports and therein lies the

The above are just the major highlights of a career unequalled by a long way in the sport of race walking. He is unbeaten over 50k since 1995 when he was 3rd that year in the World Championships. Robert is the only race walker to have achieved the 20k and the 50k double at a major championship when he achieved it in Sydney and set an Olympic record in the 20km walk on his way to recording the double.

But for all his achievements and his own career, his love of race walking goes even much deeper as he gives of his time and immense experience to all who wish to receive it. Speaking to Jamie Costin it's clear that Korzeniowski is an inspiration to all

upcoming race walkers all over the world. He is a member of the International Olympic Council and a member of the International Association of Athletic Federations. He also runs an athletics development programme and has regular training camps and sportsdays throughout his region around Krakaw which has a population of some 5 million people. He was the founder of the Krakow marathon and has his own walking race around Central Square in Krakow which starts with an elite race which is live on television with crowds up to 30,000 watching on the course, followed by a 5k race which attracts mass participation with over 5,000 people in the walk around this historic city. This is just a little outline as to the achievements of this national hero in Poland and the esteem which his country folk hold for him. It also has to be said that the contribution he gives back to athletics is awesome and he rightly deserves to be called one of the greats. With all this said he even is successful as a business man as he ran a chain of Robert Korzeniowski Sports Shops in Krakow and Warsaw and has now developed his own brand of sportswear called "Walker" (what else) the brand was officially launched last year. Remember where you heard the name first.

Robert now almost 36 years will be having his last race in the upcoming Olympic Games in Athens and is hoping to achieve his one last goal in an illustrious career by becoming the only man to win three Olympic titles at the same distance of 50k, that certainly would be an achievement which probably never ever again will be repeated by anyone.

Our hope for Wednesday night next 21st is that everyone involved in athletics and indeed anyone with an interest are invited to come along to the Allrounder Winter League and meet a living legend, bring the kids, bring your granny, everyone are welcome.

Robert is training at present for the Olympics and is walking over 100 miles a week. We are delighted that on Wednesday he will use the Winter League as his training for that day and talking to Jamie depending on the type of session he is doing he should be covering the course in about 36 to 38 minutes. So as he (walks) past you do give him some words of encouragement.

All at the club are excited about this visit and we again ask everyone to come along and give him a real West Waterford welcome. Finally our thanks to Jamie Costin for all his help in organising the visit to our club and incidentally reports are favourable on Jamie's own injury and it's hoped he will be back to light training in the next week or so as he continues his own preparation for Athens.

P.S. — A little birdie tells me that for those who come along to the Sports Centre on the night we might even have another little suprise visitor. More later?

BI-CENTENARY OF OBIAS KIRB



the day Tobias Kirby, son of David Kirby and Elizabeth Caplice, was baptised in Tallow.

This was the blessed day he became a child of our Heavenly Father, the day his future life in Christ dawned, leading him to become one of Ireland's most distinguished churchmen of the 19th Century. Fr. Farrell P.P. welcomed the congregation and the

How fitting it was to celebrate this key date in the life of Tobias. Born into the Christian family in the parish of Tallow and to follow his most interesting lifes journey thought to us by the principal celebrant of the Mass, Monsignor Michael Olden in his homily (Vicar General and great historian of the Diocese).

After some years in Tallow, the Kirby family settled in Arrundel Square in Waterford, where they knew Edmund Ignatius Rice. Tobais' vocation to the priesthood brought him to Rome. Monsignor Olden gave a graphic description of the position of the famous Irish College founded by another Waterford man, Fr. Luke Waddington in 1608. It was here that Tobias lived as Vice Rector to the future first Cardinal in Ireland, Paul Cullen and later as Rector from 1850-1891 and where he is honoured to this day. There is a very big room with rows upon rows of boxes of letters received by him, mainly from the Irish Hierarchy. These letters are the greatest source of information on the Church of Ireland, he was advisor to the Popes on the historical situation of Ireland in that century. All matters concerning the Church of Ire-

land were referred to him. He received all sets of simple requests from the people of Ireland for information, medals, papal blessings, relics, souvenirs, etc. He refused no one and never destroyed a single letter, all are there.

The parish of Tallow has reason to remember with gratitude and affection this great man. He could never forget the seed of Baptismal grace received in Tallow as it matured and flourished Tallow remained close to his heart. This was expressed in the precious gifts used by the Pope Leo XIII which he donated to the Parish (brought up in the offertory procession) and his concern for the needs of the people including the Carmelites.

This man whose students included future Cardinals,

Tuesday, the feast of the Epiphany marked the bi-centenary of and who moved among the 'greats' avoided the limelight. He remained to the end of his life a self effacing prayerful man.

His tomb can be visited in the Carpo Verado with the great ones, but he is buried with the poor students of the Irish college






