



Fianna Fail Double Council Representation Before Election

Fianna Fail has doubled its number of public representatives on Lismore Town Council before June's Local Election's in an increase described as being akin to the "miracle of the loaves and the fishes."

Following on from Cllr.
Bernard Leddy's defection from Labour to Fianna Fail two years ago, an Independent Councillor has announced her decision to also join the party ranks. Cllr. Helen O'Sullivan, who was co-opted onto Lismore Town Council as an Independent candidate last year, stated that joining Fianna Fail was her "best hope" for electoral success.

It means Fianna Fail is now the biggest party on the council despite Fine Gael receiving the largest mandate in the 1999

local elections. The party now has four representatives on the local authority – one more than Fine Gael.

In a statement read out at last Monday's meeting, Cllr. O'Sullivan said the decision came after she examined her options in the run up to the local elections.

"I have taken the decision to rejoin the Fianna Fail party, as and from 28th of February, and will be sitting as a Fianna Fail Councillor until the elections in which I will be putting myself forward as a Fianna Fail candidate."

"I have taken this decision - which was not made lightly - as I regard Fianna Fail as the political party which best represents my views and objectives and holds the best hope for my political future. I will continue to serve the best interests of the town and its people for as long as I am privileged to do so."

The announcement has been regarded as something of a surprise as O'Sullivan publicly stated in the past few months her intention not to run at all due to the new stringent requirements placed on Independent candidates.

However, following the statement, Cllr. John Heneghan (FG) looked for a ruling under Standing Orders on Cllr. O'Sullivan's position. He said an Independent candidate was co-opted after a long, painstaking and painful process – Cllr. O'Sullivan's co-option followed the vacancy left by Cllr. Canning's death.

"Co-opting a nominee from a political party is easy," Cllr. Heneghan said. "But the situa-

tion with an independent is different."

He said the matter was a technical one, and "wasn't personal." He also wasn't questioning Cllr. O'Sullivan's bona-fides as an independent. But, should Cllr. O'Sullivan resign, he said there would be problems with co-opting another Independent. The co-option process had also tried to avoid the situation, he said, of an Independent joining one of the political parties.

Cllr. Heneghan also acknowledged the matter was one for the electorate, but described it as being similar to the miracle of the loaves and the fishes. "Fianna Fail seems to be multiplying without an election."

Cllr. O'Sullivan defended her decision, saying as an Independent she felt "out on a limb". She said her only contact with the council was during the monthly meetings.

"Since being co-opted, I had decided not to go forward for the elections at all. But, I wanted to continue on serving as a Town Councillor, and I felt that this was my best hope.

markets, and will also be "useful for the whole proposal for decentralisation."

However, the most significant development for Dungarvan, Mr. Connolly said was the shopping centre development on the former Glanbia site.

He described it as: "One of the most significant developments in Dungarvan and the county. And I think it's going to be a major boost to the West Waterford area."

He explained that it will increase "very significantly" the catchment area for customers and shoppers.

"And, it will also stem the drain of money out of the town to other towns such as Waterford, Clonmel, Youghal, Cork and the major shopping multiples."

DECENTRALISATION

Going on to discuss decentralisation, Mr. Connolly said he was delighted that Ordnance Survey of Ireland is the body to decentralise to Dungarvan, and expressed his confidence about the process.

"Certainly from the meetings we have had with Dick Kirwan (Chief Executive of the OSI) we are very confident that that decentralisation will take place. I would hope that OSI will have a presence in Dungarvan by early 2005 at the latest. And certainly Dick Kirwan and his staff are committed to decentralisation."

However, he said that's not to understate the difficulties that are to be faced.

"There will obviously be staff members in the OSI as there are in other offices, who it won't suit to move to Dungarvan, and who will be reluctant to move to Dungarvan. But I have no doubt that decentralisation will take place."

He said the challenges in the future will include front-loading infrastructure, remaining competitive with other areas, the promotion of Dungarvan and County Waterford, and avoiding "unnecessary" objections to projects.

"I can assure you of the full support and co-operation of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Town Council in continuing the growth of Dun-

garvan. I do think we have challenges; I do think we must remain competitive and I ask for your support on those particular areas."

Following a light hearted localised version of the Six-One News starring the Bachelors In Trouble duo as two local correspondents; Friends First Chief Economist, Jim Power - a frequent contributor to Irish and UK media (and who found himself an unwitting contributor to the Bachelors Six One News special) detailed the future of the Global, European and Irish economies.

He said for small localised economies such as Dungarvan the Global economy is of vital importance. While last year a presentation on the Global situation would have been downbeat, "thankfully, today, a year later, the story is quite different. The Global geo-political situation is pretty calm; the global economy is back on a recovery track; equity markets have continued to make reasonable returns; inflation is very well behaved and monetary conditions remain loose.

In a generally upbeat assessment, he added that the IT sector has also shown reasonably strong signs of recovery, and are re-investing. And, the opening up of China, and the accession of the Eastern European countries into the EU, will be looked back on as defining moments for the Global economy.

ECONOMY EXCELLING

Meanwhile, Mark Fitzgerald, Chief Executive of the Sherry Fitzgerald group – Ireland's largest property and Mortgage Advisors – said it is time for the Irish people to celebrate the "amazing job done in taking this country out of the 20th Century and into the 21st Century."

"Together, and with consistent economic policies of successive governments, we have delivered significant economic growth. And, I think we need to reflect on how successful that economic growth has been."

Despite the IT downturn and the Global recession of the last few years, he said; "The story is how well we've managed to excel in that context."

He went on to pay tribute to the construction industry, who he said are now building twenty times the amount of houses that were being built twenty years ago.

"It's a very very significant achievement and I think the construction industry, deserves great credit for increasing supply" which he said is bringing greater competition. He said huge strides are also being made in the quantity and quality of housing.

"My contention, is that we need to make more progress in that area, if we are to have a sustainable long term property market."

10 euros in year one. Thereafter, they're required to pay an annual maintenance fee of 2 euros. On registration users can decide the type of funeral service they want; for example whether they want a burial or cremation, and choose whether they wish a religious or secular service.

But, one Dungarvañ person has gone a step further, wishing for rather bizarre funeral arrangements.

Describing the funeral plans, Rachel said; "When he is brought down the aisle, he wants Gareth Gates to be played, (the Christmas hit "Spirit in the Sky"), and be brought to the Lookout. He wants to be put on a boat, and he wants the boat to be burned — he wants a Viking funeral,"

she explained.

Though up and running for no more than a matter of weeks, Rachel said the response to the new Website has been "unbelievable." She's already been featured on nine radio stations and other publications, and the website has received a number of hits since it's become known.

"It's really just a simple idea

that's never been done before in the world," she says.

The wishes are securely stored and a series of safe-guards are in place to prevent unauthorised alterations. The website, which is also covered by the Data Protection Act, can be logged on at www.myfuner-alwishes.com



for pastry: 100g softened butter

55g caster sugar 1 egg, beaten 140g plain flour 30g cocoa powder

Remove and leave to cool. Melt raspberry jam with 1 tblspn water. Sieve and use to brush flan top. Arrange raspberries decoratively.

1,200 of County's Drivers **Have Penalty Points**

Close to 1,200 of the county's motorists received at least two penalty points since the systems introduction, new figures from the Dept. of Transport reveal.

The figure is part of a nationwide total of 107,125 motorists who have committed some form of driving offence since the introduction of the penalty points system. The majority of

penalty points were issued for year. One hundred and ninetyspeeding offences.

Already, seven motorists in the county are halfway towards disqualification, fifty-six drivers have four points, and 1,108 have two penalty points.

It follows on from the release of figures by the South East Regional Authority showing Waterford had the second highest number of road accidents last our roads and streets.

two accidents occurred in the county; twelve people died arising from road accidents.

Transport Minister, Seamus Brennan said there is a need for a change in driver behaviour.

Mr. Conway called for compensatory increases in the schools capitation grant to "take account of the huge increases that we suffer".



How to reap the benefits of rot!

Thousands of years ago, our ancestors noticed that their crops grew better near piles of rotting manure and vegetation.

Making compost is a controlled version of this natural process. There is evidence that compost was used in the Akkadian Empire 1,000 years before Moses.

In the early 1900s, the world of agriculture was introduced to chemical fertilisers. For many farmers, the new the carbon:nitrogen ratio. 'scientific' methods replaced com- If you have too much carbon in post.

A book published in 1943, 'An Agricultural Testament', written by Sir Albert Howard jump-started organic methods in gardening and farming once again.

Composting is 'the biological decomposition of organic material by bacteria and other organisms'. Bacteria are the main decomposers, but there are lots of others, including fungi, actinomycetes, worms and beetles. These mites decompose organic material by feeding on it. The result is compost or humus, a dark, nutrient-

rich soil conditioner, or 'black gold'. Any organic material can be used to make compost. This includes food waste, especially fruit and vegetable scraps, weeds, leaves and plant trimfood, air and water flow to organic digging through. 

This week in the garden

Sow sweet peas outdoors

Now is the latest possible time to make an outdoor sowing of sweet peas. The soil is much more likely to be in the right condition now for sowing than at any other time of the year. Sow the seeds 2.5cm deep and eight centimetres apart in rows around 25cm apart.

Bed out wallflowers, forget-me-nots and other spring bedding plants

Plant wallflowers, forget-me-nots, Canterbury bells, polyanthuses and double daisies in their flowering quarters now.

If soil and weather conditions look favourable do not delay as it has been left very late.

Sow cauliflower and broccoli in a frame

Seeds should now be sown in a frame if it was not possible to sow them in a greenhouse in February. Sow thinly. If you did plant in the greenhouse in rebruary, it is wise to plant now as well to ensure an even supply of plants for a longer period.

Sow spinach in a sheltered place

Summer spinach can be sown now for the first time in a sheltered border. The area should preferably have a southern aspect.

THE TRIASSIC PERIOD

The Triassic Period was the period between 248 and 213 million years ago. Scientists called it Triassic (from the Latin word trias, meaning 'in threes') because remains of the first dinosaur were found in a three layered system of

THE EARLIEST DINOSAURS

Towards the end of the Triassic period, some 200 million years ago, creatures developed that were quite different from their thecodont ancestors. These were the first dinosaurs. Among them were two small meat eaters, Herrerasuarus and Staurikosuarus. Both were about 2 or 3 m (6.5-9ft) long and walked upright but little is known about them because very few fossils exist from this peri-

DINOSAURS VERSUS MAMMALS

Many other animals, as well as dinosaurs, lived in the Triassic period. There were creatures both on land and in the water. The first mammals, warm blooded animals that feed their young with milk, appeared about the same time as the dinosaurs. But it seems that the dinosaurs were better adapted to the conditions at the time and thrived, whereas the earliest mammals soon died out. The situation remained unchanged until the dinosaurs became extinct at the end of the Cretaceous period, and the mammals then took over the land.

NOT ALL DINOSAURS WALKED UPRIGHT

Staurikosaurus, Herrarasaurus and many other early dinosaurs could walk upright. This was important for these plant eaters because they could reach high branches and they could also see around them. Other plant eaters walked on four legs but usually had long necks so



DID YOU KNOW?

- Dinosaurs ruled the earth for 160 millions years before becoming extinct.
- Dinosaurs can be divided into two groups, depending on whether their hip bone looks like a bird's or a rep-
- The discovery of dinosaur bones in the 1700's was ignored because the Christian Church said God would not allow any creatures to become extinct.
- The biggest dinosaur discovered is Seismosaurus. It reached 36m (118ft) tall, and weighed 80 tonnes. It wasn't' at all ferocious, it just munched quietly on
- Some scientists believe the biggest Brachiosaurus may have weighed 190 tonnes.
- Some dinosaurs swallowed stones to break up food in their stomachs.



Visitors from France

Since September the College has been co-ordinating a European Education Project under the Comenius Programme and last week we hosted visitors from St. Germain L. Herm in the Auvergne region of France. The two French teachers and their three students stayed with Mr. Dransfield, Mr. Kavanagh and students who visited France last November.

This is our second Comenius project and most of the communication between participants is carried out using the Internet, but a major difference has been the exchange of students for short visits to the other participating schools, allowing them to experience daily life with the families and at the schools in the other countries

Our visitors spent the day in the College on Friday, joining in the classes of the First Years who are engaged in this study of the seasonal changes in the flora and fauna across Europe. They visited the site in the College grounds where students are recording the growth of plants and activities of the fauna which are being compared with the records from France and Valencia in Spain.

On Monday we went on a Field Trip along the Copper Coast stopping in a number of locations to study the marine life of the shoreline. This was

especially interesting for the French students as their College is situated about 1000metres above sea-level and 400 kilometres from the sea in the Massif Central. We are looking to

comparing our coast to that of Valencia when we meet there at Easter. A major part of this project is a comparison of local weather statistics and in the afternoon Paddy Power very kindly showed us around the Synoptic Weather Station in Carriglea which he runs for Met Eireann. Advantage should be taken of this extra grass especially if the weather continues to remain relatively dry. As usual the fields that will be closed in April for silage are ideal for taking a grazing from in March. This type of approach to getting cattle out early has worked extremely well on many farms throughout the county in recent years.

The number of stock that can be put out to graze and the earliest they can be turned out will depend on the amount of grass that is available on this part of the farm.

Certain groups of stock should get priority when it comes to deciding which stock should be turned out first. Replacement heifers make up a small proportion of any herd. Their demand on grass is minimal but the benefits gained due to increased liveweight gain are huge. A replacement heifer going to grass on 1st March instead of 1st of April would typically be 20 to 30 kg heavier at mating. With low body weights at mating being one of the main reasons for low conception rates in maiden heifers this extra live weight could be invaluable.

Store cattle going to grass that you want finished off the farm by early to mid summer might also be a priority group this year. With an over supply of cattle being forecasted by Bord Bia for the second half of the year it would be wise to consider having cattle ready for slaughter before big numbers of cattle come on to the market.

Heifers that you want finished this autumn off grass are another of group of stock that have a low demand for grass at this time of the year but benefit greatly from going to grass early. Also, yearling heifers spread over a large area have a minimal impact on under-foot conditions, even in the wettest of weather.

An extra 25 kg of liveweight gained by a heifer going to grass in early March means a sale date of at least one month earlier in the back end of the year. This could mean the difference between being finished off grass or having to house them for two months in the back end.

The sooner last years first time calvers get to grass the better. These are usually the group of cows in the poorest body condition at this time of the year and because of this they can be quite difficult to get back in calf.

These cows are among your most valuable as they are young cows, have the experience of mothering two calves and are only now beginning to milk to their full potential. Having to cull this type of cow due to infertility is a major loss to any suckler herd.

Area Aid Appointments

Area Aid forms have now been posted to most farmers. At this time of year Teagasc advisers in Co.Waterford assist 700 - 800 farmers to complete their area aid applications and all of this must be done within a three week period. It is vitally important if you want assistance that you contact your local Teagasc office now for an appointment. Do not wait until the area aid form arrives. Do it to-day. Investment Aid Schemes.

On January 1st 2004 a revised scheme of investment aid for farm waste management and a revised scheme for the improvement of dairy hygiene standards were introduced by the Department of Agriculture. The most important change is that the ceiling for eligibility was substantially raised to 450 income units thus the vast majority of farmers are now eligible for the new schemes.

Under these schemes investment in waste storage facilities, cattle housing, sheep housing, silage facilities, associated farmyard facilities, dairy/milking premises, milking machines and bulk milk tanks are all eligible for 40% grant

The maximum amount of investment eligible for grant aid under the Farm Waste Management Schemes is 75,000 per holding and 50,000 for the Dairy Hygiene Scheme. There is also a 20% grant available for mobile slurry equipment such as tankers and agitators. (maximum investment 11,000). Both of these schemes have created a lot of interest among farmers in the county. If you require any further information please contact your Teagasc advis-





Nuala would prefer a smaller development which she believes would be more suitable for the area. She has made suggestions that would improve the scale of the whole development.

The roundabout at the Glass Factory will have to be enlarged because it is dangerous and unable to cope with the heavy traffic using it.

THE NEW FEVER HOSPITAL

In 1869 the Poor Law Commissioners had written to Guardians recommending that they build a new Fever Hospital separate from the main Workhouse complex. On 26 June 1873 the Guardians decided to go ahead with the project. The Commissioners suggested that it should accommodate patients allowing 1,000 cubic feet for each, two bathrooms two nurses rooms, kitchen, laundry and detached dead-house.

The plan had to be postponed because of the cost factor and the strong opposition from the ratepayers. In October the Guardians finally agreed to proceed as the Commissioners had allowed them to reduce the cost of the building from £1, 6000 to £1,000. In January 1874 Denis McGrath and John Scanlan were appointed to build the new Fever Hospital at a cost 0 £1,390. The construction work Ballymacarbry: Michael was to take much longer than expected.

The work on building the new fever hospital was still not completed by March 1875. Mc-Grath and Scanlan had broken their business partnership, leav-

work. It was finally completed in October 1875. This building was later adapted as St. Vincent's Hospital, which is now due to be replaced.



Transient Ischemic Attacks - TIAs What is a Transient Ischemic Attack (ITA)?

A Transient Ischemic Attack (ITA) is caused by a temporary reduction of oxygenated and glucose rich blood in the brain. Generally most episodes last only few seconds to a few minutes. A Transient Ischemic Attack is a transient (short-lived) stroke that lasts only a few minutes.

TIAs are most frequently caused by atherosclerotic cerebrovascular disease. This occurs when cholesterol plaque is deposited inside the major or minor arteries, which feed the brain. This plaque forms after the inner lining of an artery has been injured. The plaque causes narrowing of the blood vessels and reduced blood flow increased the pressure of the blood within the vessel and slows blood flow down. When circulation is slowed, blood platelets tend to clump at the area of injury or blockage. This, along with the deposition of cholesterol causing the atherosclerosis buildup creates a mass which protrudes into the artery hence further slowing down blood flow and eventually either the vessel closes to no longer allow blood flow at all or a blood clot or thrombosis is created. A plaque fragment can break off and be carried by through blood stream to lodge at a distant site in the brain. These are the two main causes of a TIA.

What are symptoms of a Transient Ischemic Attack? The signs and symptoms of a Transient Ischemic Attack are as follows:

- Numbness or weakness in the face, arm or leg especially on one side of the body.
- Confusion or difficulty in talking or understanding
- Trouble seeing in one or both eyes
- Difficulty with walking, dizziness or loss of balance and coordination.

What treatment is available for TIA?

Because there is no way to tell whether symptoms are from a TIA or an acute stroke, patients should assume that all stroke-like symptoms signal an emergency and should not wait to see if they go away. A prompt evaluation (within 60 minutes) is necessary to identify the cause of the TIA and determine appropriate therapy. High blood pressure must be treated and brought into normal levels. The most common medication used for the prevention and treatment of ITA is aspirin (in addition to its painrelieving ability, aspirin also inhibits the way platelets clump together, the presence of too many platelets at a narrowed site may further compromise the flow of blood to the brain). Depending on a patient's medical history and the results of a medical examination, the doctor may recommend drug therapy or surgery to reduce the risk of stroke in people who have had a TIA. People with atrial fibrillation (irregular beating of the heart) may be prescribed anticoagulants.

What is the prognosis of TIA?

The signs and symptoms of TIA are very similar to those of a stroke, with one important difference, that is they disappear completely within 24 hours. An individual may have one or more TIAs in the same day or they can be separated by days, weeks, months or even years, generally they will last no more than a few minutes.

The most important treatable factors linked to TIAs and stroke is high blood pressure, cigarette smoking, heart disease, carotid artery disease, diabetes and heavy use of alcohol. Medical help is available to reduce and eliminate these factors. Lifestyle changes such as eating a balanced diet, maintaining a healthy weight and exercising can reduce these factors.

Congratulations to Paddy Casey of Kilsteague who celebrated his 95th birthday at Dunphy's in Kill last Wednesday night. Music on the night was

grandchildren Richard and Brian, nieces and nephews and numerous friends, old and young. Paddy who is hale and healthy in mind and body said his good health was due to hard work and an odd whiskey. Paddy is the last of the old time blacksmiths who worked in the local forges, back in the 30's and 40's and in the late 50's. Paddy recalled for me the time he worked in the forge at Knockhauen. He said the forge was the focal point of the Parish in them days. People came to the forge with work horses from the local farms, horses were shod, bands fitted on Carts, gates made, ploughs and harrows mended, chisels sharpened for council men who worked in the local quarries at Kilmurrin and the Manacaun. Plenty of talk and news, from the forge, the news would spread if someone had passed away or a baby born, or someone emigrating to America. With the onslaught of modern machinery in the 50's and 60's the work lessened. Horses disappeared from the farms to be replaced by tractor and trailer. One by one the forges closed down, and with them went a way of life that is lost and gone forever. Paddy said he closed his forge in the late 50's and bought a tractor and lime spreader. He travelled the hills and vales of County Waterford spreading lime, no loader in those days, you rolled up your sleeves and filled the lime with a shovel. 

A large number of West Waterford AC runners participated in the event which is now well established on the local road racing scene.




