Several tonnes of household waste was dumped on a border site in the past few weeks and Monaghan County Council indicated the waste had originated from Waterford and Cork.

However, a spokesperson from Waterford County Council said: "Despite public belief we can categorically confirm that none of the waste, not one piece of the waste discovered, came from the County."

It's understood a trawl through the waste by Monaghan County Council retrieved information that the waste came from Waterford City. A truck from Waterford City was also impounded at the illegal landfill.

Councillor Brands Surgeon A Liar At Council Meeting

Eleven Fine Gael and Labour Councillors walked out on a meeting of Waterford County Council after the Fianna Fail Mayor refused to suspend Cllr. Tom Cronin for allegations about a member of the Expert Group on Radiotherapy.

Cllr. Cronin caused uproar by accusing Gordon Watson - a surgical oncologist with Waterford Regional Hospital - of lying when answering a question put to him at the council's February meeting.

His comments were strongly repudiated by Fine Gael and Labour members, while a number of his own party colleagues scrambled to distance themselves from the allegation of lying.

At the February meeting, Mr. Watson, the SEHB's sole representative on the Expert Radiotherapy Group, was critical of the failure to provide a radiotherapy unit in Waterford. Towards the end of that debate, Cllr. Cronin asked Mr. Watson about the levels of radiotherapy care.

Cllr. Cronin said he asked Mr.

Watson: "Are you saying there are cancer patients in the South Eastern Health Board area who should be getting radiotherapy treatment who aren't getting

Mr. Watson emphatically replied that this was the case.

Cllr. Cronin - Fianna Fail's representative on the South Eastern Health Board - subsequently took the matter up at Health Board level and, at a meeting, was told by officials that there was no record of there being such people in the region.

"I am calling Dr. Watson a liar," he said, "and I'm calling on him to stop playing politics with cancer patients in the south east region".

His allegations were greeted by verbal protest from Fine Gael and Labour members at what they called his "disgraceful" words. When County Mayor, Ciaran O Riain (FF) called on Cllr. Cronin to withdraw his remarks, Cllr. Cronin instead repeated his allegations.

However, he was strongly

criticised for what Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) described as his "reprehensible" comments.


Lismore Castle Gardens are set in seven acres within the 17th century outer defensive walls and have spectacular views of the castle and the surrounding countryside.

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
The ESB has lodged a planning appeal against Waterford County Council's refusal to allow the power giant retain the two massive pylons close to the home of Ballyneety brothers Frank and Monnie Drummy.

A spokesperson from An Bord Pleanala confirmed the ESB lodged an first party appeal on the 27th of February last.

The move is the latest in a protracted planning wrangle over the siting of the pylons. Already Frank and Monnie Drummy has won landmark victories over Waterford County Council and the ESB at the planning appeals board stage over whether the pylons were classed as development or exempted development. Following that ruling An Bord Pleanala stated the ESB must either apply for retention or

remove the pylons. However, Waterford County Council ruled against ESB's retention application earlier this year.

Contacted by the Dungarvan Leader, Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) said she is disappointed that the ESB has chosen to appeal Waterford County Council's decision.

She said she didn't believe the pylons should have been put there in the first place; " They should have been put underground."

"Personally speaking I can't understand why they have taken this decision to lodge an appeal. I think the decision by Waterford County Council to refuse the retention application was the right one."

Labour lost one of its' three seats in the Dungarvan Electoral Area in 1999, but only by a margin of 44 votes on the last count.

There are some 13,199 regis-Electoral Area, which includes Dungarvan Urban and Rural. Abbeyside and Ballinroad, Colligan, Kilbrien and Kilgobnet, Ring and Old Parish, Ardmore and Grange, Clashmore and Kinsalebeg and parts of Aglish and Ballinameela. 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
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ASSURANCES SOUGHT ON PUBLIC LIGHTING IN SEAPARK

Assurances have been sought from Dungarvan Town Council regarding the ongoing reliability of public lighting at Abbeyside's Seapark estate, following a breakdown in the system last week

The Labour Party's Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair said it was disappointing that so many of the 138 households in the town's biggest estate were left in pitch darkness during a week in which many children were off school in mid term breaks and were traversing through the locality off the Clonea and Lands End Roads.

Although the ESB were consulted immediately about the breakdown by the Town Council, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said it was frustrating for him to receive initial news that between 5 and 10 days had to be allowed for such situations to be addressed.

Public lighting, where it exists according to Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, is a service that requires regular attention and review. Whereas lighting returned to the Glendine Drive end of Seapark on the second night of the breakdown, the Avenue, Finnesterre and Abbots Close areas remained affected into the following weekend. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says, upon restoration, that methodologies should be developed to ensure no further losses of supply.

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


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

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Repair the lawn after cold winter

The long winter has finally drawn to a close and spring is here, so it's time to look at preparing the lawn for summer.

Here are some easy ways to produce lush, green grass without spending countless weekends doing it!

In early spring, set your lawnmower a notch lower than normal to remove surface debris and any damaged grass.

If you have bare spots, over-seed the area with the correct type of grass.

As the weather gets warmer, raise ing every fortnight, than a splash the cutting height of your mower so that you'll be cutting no more than a third of the grass blade at one time.

This will produce a healthier lawn because taller grass promotes longer roots that need less water, which is important during a long dry summer.

If you want a lawn that will make your neighbours green with envy, follow these guidelines:

1) Choose the right grasses The right grass for your garden will depend on the climate, conditions, and soil.

Talk to your garden centre expert about the best choices.

You'll find various seed mixtures

with some suitable for damp shady areas; others for dry, sunny ones; some slow growing

low-maintenance' blends and other mixtures with wildflower seed added - in fact something for everyone!

Water appropriately It's better to give the lawn a good soak to encourage root growth rather than watering fre-

There are not set rules about how often to water, but it is better to give the lawn a good soak every week

3) Fertilise Apply a nitrogen fertiliser in late spring and summer and be sure to water thoroughly.

Always remember to follow the application rates and directions given on product labels.

You will be able to tell if you have fertilised correctly or not by the colour.

Healthy lawns are a light, 'meadow green' colour. If your lawn is a deep bluey-green you have over fertilised, your grass will be prone to disease and drought. 4) Mow properly

Mow regularly so the grass doesn't grow too long and weeds

don't have a chance to set seed. Mow it when it reaches about one third taller than its optimum height.

Leave the clippings on the lawn. 'Grasscycling' is really free fertiliser, helping lawns grow greener and denser, and doesn't cause thatch buildup, which are last year's woody roots and stems, not grass clippings. 5) Weed

Weeds, such as daisies, plantains and dandelions, or low-spreading trefoils, that lie flat and are missed by the mower, are a real problem. Rosette-forming broadleaved weeds are easily dealt with using a selective lawn weedkiller or old kitchen knife to dig out all the offending plant.

Trefoilds, which grow out from a central root, can also be gathered up and twisted until the whole plant lifts out.

This week in the garden

Sow rose trees and shrubs

This is a very good time to sow roses - and any other trees and shrubs which may be available. Roses are rather temperamental and to get one good rose plant out of 100 seeds is good going. All should be sown outdoors in a sheltered border of finely prepared soil without manure. Scatter seeds evenly into holes around a centimetre deep and press the soil down firmly on top of them. Many of the seeds may not germinate in the first year so be patient and make sure you plant them in a place which will not be needed later on in the season. Sow herbs

Many herbs including thyme, sage and marjoram can be raised from seed sown in a frame or unheated greenhouse. They should be treated in the same way as normal rock plants or herbaceous perennials.

Plant mint

Now is the time to set about planting a new bed of mint for the kitchen. Lift some old plants or buy some new roots, divide them up and spread them evenly and thinly over the selected site. The site should be reasonably open with about four centimetres deep of finely broken soil.

Sow aubergines

It is possible to sow aubergines under glass now in a peat seed compost. Aubergines need to be germinated at between 16°c and 18°c.

Pot early tomatoes and make further sowings Tomatoes from a January sowing should be ready to pot by now. They need to be transferred into 13cm pots full of potting compost. Pot them firmly and shade them for at least a day or two while they settle and the roots begin to establish. New plants sown now should be ready for planting

outdoors in June. Sow them as usual and germinate them at a temperature of no less than 16°c.






THE JURASSIC PERIOD

During the Jurassic period, some 195 to 135 millions years ago, many large dinosaurs flourished. Jungles were lush and the seas were plentiful. Dinosaurs were the dominant creatures of land, sea and even the sky throughout this period. The name Jurassic comes from the type of rock in which dinosaur records have been found, which is the same as the limestone rock of the Jura mountains on the French-Swiss border.

THE FIRST BIRD

Archaeopteryx, the earliest known bird, was actually a link between reptiles and birds, for it had features belonging to both. Its body and jaw were like those of a reptile, but it bore feathers on its wings and tail. It could not fly off the ground like proper birds

but probably had the ability to fly from tree to tree if it launched itself from a high perch. The name Archaeopteryx comes from Greek words meaning 'ancient wing'. A feather belonging to Archaeopteryx was discov-



swimming reptiles. Some land levels had fallen by this time and the seas had invaded large areas. As a result many land-living reptiles such as the plesiosaurs returned to life in the water. Although they now lived in the sea, they came onto land to lay their eggs in holes in the sand, in the same way that some turtles do today. Ichthyosaurs continued to flourish, the largest being the

dolphin-like Shonisaurus which was 15m (49ft) long.

LARGE LAND ANIMALS

The only animals on Earth that were more than a metre long at this time were dinosaurs. There were small mammals, numerous insects and many other creatures, but it was the dinosaurs who ruled the land. Megalosaurus was 9m (29ft) long, the biggest of the meat eater, but it was not as big as plant eaters such as Allosaurus at 11m (36ft) or Diplodocus at 27m (88ft).

REPTILES THAT FLEW

Flying reptiles, such as the Pterodactyl and the Rhamphorhynchus, glided through the trees in the Jurassic period. Some were as small as a sparrow, others as big as an eagle.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The first dinosaurs lived in a world with just one giant continent.
- At the beginning of the age of dinosaurs, there were trees and ferns, but no flowers!
- Huge dinosaurs had giant holes in their skulls, to make them lighter to carry!
- The wings of the earliest 'bird', the Archaeopteryx, have been beautifully preserved as fossils.
- The 'Ostrich-mimic' dinosaur, Struthiomimus, looked like a scaly ostrich, and could run twice as fast as an Olympic sprinter.
- Not all dinosaurs were huge the Compsognathus ('Elegant Jaw') dinosaur was the size of a turkey!

Charges Will "Crucify" New Businesses

The new charges introduced under the recently passed development levies will "crucify" new businesses before they even get up and running, according to one Lismore Town Councillor.

Waterford County Council introduced the controversial increased levies on new developments, to raise funds for vital services. Included in the levies are charges for the provision of new parking spaces. However, the introduction of the same charges in towns of different size, and with different levels of business coming into town, "doesn't make sense," according to Cllr. John Heneghan.

Cllr. Heneghan argued comparing towns of the size of Tramore and Dungarvan with Lismore "is like chalk and cheese in terms of business. It seems totally inequitable to have the same rate across the county."

While Dungarvan's rates are different from Lismore's (as they were introduced by Dungarvan Town Council) Cllr. Heneghan said the car parking charges would crucify some businesses who want to set up in Lismore before they even open their doors.

Director of Services, John O'Flynn informed the members that the purpose of the scheme was to accumulate funds for vital infrastrutural projects.

NON-NATIONAL SPEED LIMIT **CHANGEOVER A CONCERN**

The speed limit changeover from miles to kilometres per hour will impact on County Waterford because of its lack of national roads, Cllr. John Campion (Indp) argued.

The speed limits will be set automatically at 80kph (50mph) on non-national roads. And a working group has been set up by Transport Minister Seamus Brennan to examined the best way to carry it out, the March meeting of Lismore Town Council heard.

Cllr. Campion gave the example of the Tallow to Midleton road as a fine road that will be subject to the new limits. He said with the new limits, and the lack of national roads "we'll not get anywhere anymore."

Director of Services with Waterford County Council, John O'Flynn said if a local authority want to vary the speed limit on a road or exempt a road they'll have to introduce by-laws. However, the current guidelines on implementing speed limits all refer to the present limits. These guidelines refer to specific limits that cannot be changed.

"I presume there would be an update of those guidelines to tell us where to post specific limits," Mr. O'Flynn said.

In May 1945 three fishermen were killed when their motor trawler came in contact with a mine. The disaster happened when the trawling net became entangled with the mine and was being pulled to the boat by two of the men. The men who died were: - John Griffin, aged 72, a widower from Knockenpower, Ring, his son John Griffin aged 41, and Nicholas Cuddihy aged 40, a single man of Ballingoul, Ring. The fourth crewmember, which survived, was Patrick Whelan aged 40, a married man from Helvick. Thomas Kelly was in a small boat nearby. He recalled that: -"smoke came out of the sea, which heaved over the boat with a dull booming sound.' Another eyewitness, John Terry stated that between 11.00 and 12.30., he noticed that the crew were having difficulty with the

"Suddenly there was a violent upheaval in the water, accompanied by a burst of smoke, followed by a terrific explosion. Our boat began to rock and I caught the side of the boat to keep myself from going overboard.

I saw an object like a piece of stone come rushing towards us. We ... raced away. When the smoke cleared ... we went back and saw a man floating on the water with one hand grasping a piece of board. As we approached the man began to sink... we flung out a life buoy, and he grasped it. We got the boat alongside him and pulled him on board. He was Pat Whelan, and he was unconscious. Artificial respiration brought him around." That afternoon the Helvick lifeboat and local fishing boats searched the area for the two missing men. A newspaper report stated that:- "The remains of John Griffin, senior, were brought to his house... accompanied by nearly all the inhabitants of the neighbourhood. A pathetic figure was the 75 year old widowed mother of Niochlas Cuddihy, who was her sole support. Whelan's escape was almost miraculous... This is the

third occasion on which he has escaped from drowning. Some years ago he tripped over a rope on the deck of his boat when out fishing at night and fell into the sea, but was rescued. On another occasion he fell from Helvick pier." The wrecked boat belonged to the Sea Fisheries Association. The Griffins were purchasing it.

Dungarvan Schools Star In Munster Action In Final Of National Forum On Europe **Schools Debating Competition**

honours in the Munster Final of this year's National Forum on Europe public speaking competition for Transition Year students, held recently at the Park Hotel in

For the second year in a row, Ard Scoil na nDéise girls were declared Munster champions, earning them the prize of qualifying for the National Final in April. A team from St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan also put in an impressive performance and its student Robert Allen was judged best speaker from the floor at the event.

The Ard Scoil na nDéise girls, Maeve Simmons, Deborah Whelan and Mary Ryan, were coached by their teacher Mrs. Ann Stack, who had also coached the winning team last year. The St. Augustine's students, Gavin McMahon, Caroline Hayes and Aoife O'Neill, were coached by their teacher Frances Moynihan.

At the Final, the Dungarvan schools faced stiff opposition from Community School, Kinsale and Loreto Secondary, Youghal.

All the teams had brought supporters along, adding to the tension, and colour, of the

In the competition for most colourful supporters, it was a dead heat between St. Augustine's and Ard Scoil na nDéise's. The St. Augustine's supporters had brought along a gigantic plastic school banner. But they found themselves competing for attention with an equally gigantic teddy bear produced by the Ard Scoil na nDéise fans.

Once the fans had settled down, they listened with impressive attention to the often complex arguments about the EU.

The two teams had got to the Munster Final by excelling in the first round of the competition. This involved individual students writing a detailed letter on their vision for the future of Europe to Hector O hEochagáin of RTE's Only Fools Buy Horses fame. Ó hEochagáin will present the prizes at the National Final on 1st April in Dublin.

The teams were asked to argue for or against a particular interpretation of the draft Constitutional Treaty. The draft Treaty is probably the hottest item on the table of the current Irish EU Presidency. (The Treaty was drawn up last year by the Cona sort of temporary EU Assembly which has now been wound up having done the job it was set up to do). The proposition for debate ran:

"Even if the changes proposed in the draft Constitutional Treaty are adopted, the EU will still not be sufficiently democratic or close to its citizens. True or

False, said Ard Scoil na nDéise, who took the view that the EU would be closer to its citizens if the draft Treaty were agreed.

Ard Scoil's Maeve Simmons took issue with an argument made by Kinsale Community School. Kinsale's Hughes had complained that, because of the way Q.M.V. (Qualified Majority Voting) will work in the Council

of Ministers, if the draft Treaty goes through, countries with 60 per cent of the population will be able to push their policies

"Not so", insisted Maeve, "It is not as simple as that. There is a balancing factor. For a decision to be passed by Q.M.V., a majority of Member States would also have to vote in favour, so it is not all about size of population".

The Charter of Fundamental Rights - Part 2 of the draft Treaty - guarantees citizens' rights to healthcare and education" pointed out Ard Scoil's Whelan. She argued that "the guarantee of access to education contained in Article 14 of the Charter would prevent Governments from imposing third level

Ard Scoil's Mary Ryan looked into the future to see where she and her colleagues would be living and what they would be doing in ten years time, predicting that Maeve Simmons "will be running an N.G.O. in Ger-

St. Augustine's College argued the other way: that the EU would not be close enough to its citizens if the Treaty was agreed.

'The majority of citizens don't feel close to the EU", St. Augustine's Gavin McMahon maintained. "In Britain, more people voted in the Big Brother reality TV show than in the last European elections!

There is also the issue of transparency", Gavin continued. "The right of access to documents provided in the draft Treaty is very unclear"

Augustine's Hayes was unhappy about proposed changes to the Commission. "If only fifteen of the twenty five commissioners are going to have voting rights", she argued, "there will be occasions when decisions are made on serious matters - say fisheries policy - where Ireland will not have a vote"

"The accession of Greece in 1981 and of Spain and Portugal in 1986 suggest that there will not be large numbers of workers

coming to Ireland as some people predict", ", insisted St. Augustine's Aoife O'Neill.

'The judges were really impressed by the very high standard of all four teams' presentations", commented chairwoman of the adjudicating panel Mary Kelly, President of the National Women's Council of Ireland and a lecturer in Sociology at the University of Limerick. The other members of the adjudicating panel were Domhnall Mac-Domhnaill, National Executive, I.B.E.C. and Richard Holland, Deputy Secretary-General of the National Forum on Europe.

"We thought that Ard Scoil na nDéise's was the most coherently argued presentation", said Mary, commenting on the winners. Also, Ard Scoil set out so convincingly their vision of the future of Europe."

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

Eoin Wins 30:h - Niamh Wins 31st





Challenge and Tournament Games

Bord officers come and Bord officers go, however as bord officers come and go, the vast majority of the rules of the Gaelic Athletic Association remain the same. Rule 134 a rule relating to tournaments and challenge games is a rule that is in force and does not change when Bord Officers change.

Rule 134 in full reads

- a) All tournament and challenge games shall be sanctioned by the appropriate authority, which shall deal with any disciplinary matters arising
- b) An Inter-county tournament shall be limited to a maximum of four teams, except as otherwse permitted by Provincial or Central Council, sanction must be obtained from the Provincial Council where teams are from the same Province, and from the Central Council where teams are from more than one Province.
- c) An Inter-Club tournament shall be confined to a maximum of eight teams, and sanction must be obtained as follows: From a County Committee where teams are from within the
- From the various County Committees involved, where teams are from more than one County, and in such circumstances the sanction of the Provincial Council or Central Council, as appropriate, must be obtained.
- d) All applications for the sanction of tournaments Involving teams from outside a club's own County must come through and be recommended by the home County Committee.
- e) A fee of E40 for an Inter-County tournament and E20 for an Inter-Club tournament shall be paid with the application,

All of the above applies to both tournament and challenge games, however part 'E' is overlooked in the case of challenge

Clubs who take part In tournament and challenge games that have not been organised in accordance to rule 134 are not covered under Insurance. Therefore any player Injured In such an unauthorised game can only get any expenses incurred though injury In such a game by taking the officers of the organising club to court.

Players and clubs who take part in tournament and challenge games which are not properly sanctioned by the relevant committees can be dealt with under rule 136.

Rule 136 reads: "A Club organising an unauthorised tournament, or a player or team taking part in it, shall be liable to a minimum suspension of eight weeks.

Already this year the various Boards are aware of a number of challenge games played where permission from the relevant Boards was not obtained. If it continues some club will find that they will be serving a suspension.

A THINKING MAN'S GAME

Continuing from last week's tips from Prof. Aidan Moran's article in the GUI magazine, he suggests you build a cocoon of concentration as you reach your ball. Use the same routine every time; this helps you to focus on the present. Pick a specific target. The next shot is always the most important one. No matter what mistakes you have made on previous shots, you have to let go of such mistakes to play well. See the challenge in the shot, especially when you have a bad lie or your opponent has just landed his on the green. Use triggerwords to re-focus your mind; if you are thinking too far ahead or dwelling in the past try using phrases, e.g. "smooth swing" or "nice and easy" to re-focus your mind. Impressive Debut By Premier Cat

The graded variety of greyhound was well catered for on last Friday nights ten race card in Kilcohan Park. In the opening race of the session confined to unraced types the well bred King Bowser (Petes Boss-Sandy Penny) 2/1 obliged for Mullingar owner Teresa Mc McCarthy and local trainer Patricia O'Neill. Pans A Streak was sent off the _ favourite but it was Ballyguiry Bill who broke the line in front. Rounding the second bend however King Bowser who attracted his share of support picked up the lead on the wide outside and striding clear King Bowser pulled away to beat Ballyguiry Bill by four lengths in 29.37.

Joe Hally was a brave man when he formed the Sub Zero Syndicate bringing together a group of Tipperary and Kilkenny enthusiasts and then he sent their first greyhound Premier Cat down to Portlaw in County Waterford to be trained by former Inter County net minder Jimmy Power. It all came to fruition last Friday night however as the well backed Premier Cat (Droopys Vieri-Kylies Sonia) 4/6 produced an explosive run from trap six to score in a healthy 16.34. Getting the better of Gallows Ruby Premier Cat bounded clear to defeat Gallows Ruby by six and a half lengths. The manner in which the winner stayed on into the pick up point suggests that he should also over four bends.

The Large and Little Syndicate owned and Jim Scully trained Bonny Boiler (Sonic Flight-Epic Queen) 4/1 defeated some better fancied opponents to take the third sprint race in 16.64. Taking control of matters shortly after the break Bonny Boiler kept on well on the run to the winning line to beat a running on Rickys Orange by one and a quarter lengths.

The fourth contest was a race of changing fortunes. Round Here cut an early dash from trap three but a slow starting Mandys Cheeky produced a nice blast of early pace to strike the front on the wide outside on the run to the second last bend. The Alan Jaggard owned Europa Appaloosa (Droopys Kewell-Ladys Storm) 3/1 was always on the premises however and taking the shortest route home Europa Appaloosa produced the superior finishing speed to beat Mandys Charlie by two and a quarter lengths in 29.60.

Track newcomer Dishtemper (Honcho Classic-Geruna Crafty) produced a battling display to capture the fifth race for the Sad-N-Blu-Lucy syndicate and trainer Jimmy Wade. Emerging best from a tightly packed group at the opening bend Dishtemper made the long break for home and while a slow starting Bonzi Snout who clipped the rails at the first bend made significant late headway Dishtemper 3/1 was gone beyond recall obliging by four lengths in 29.68.

The sixth race produced an exciting finish with victory going to the Pat O'Neill home bred Jamaican Gem (Jamaican Hero-Gallows Gem) in 29.92. Glenbrien Winsom set out to make the early running but the early leader gave way on the backstretch to Jamaican Gem. Polerone Tyson a moderate third on the backstretch finished well in the closing stages but Jamaican Gem held out by the minimum distance.

The photo finish equipment was also required to sort out the principals in the seventh event. The once raced Dainton Russian (Top Honcho-Quiet Walk 7/4 and Kittys Ruby 3/1 were in the firing line throughout and after a ding dong battle in the closing stages the Malcolm Sharp owned Dainton Russian emerged on top by a short head from Kittys Ruby in a best over 39.36

The eight race was run off over the six-bend trip of 730 yards. Keans Teacher was installed as the evens favourite but she lost her place off the first bend and was never seen with a chance thereafter. Meanwhile up front Blanko Passion led from Savana Twister but as this marathon wore on the Richard Monk owned and Michael Delahunty trained Andys Friend (Smooth Rumble-Park Away) 3/1 took over in the lead and lengthening her stride this Thurles sales purchase went on to beat Savana Twister by five lengths in 41.55.

Airmount Tina led for three quarters of the trip in the ninth contest but the whole field bunched over the final two bends and in the inevitable mad dash for the line the Alan O Neill and Dick Cullinane owned Top Expert (Top Honcho-Quare

Season) and the near six year old Sadlers Reply (Spiral Nikita-Sadlers Surprise) owned by Pauline Hennessy ran a perfect dead heat in 29.66. Both greyhounds went off at odds of 4/1.

Despite an unfavourable outside draw in the final race of the night the Raymond Patterson owned and Frances O'Donnell trained Geordie Legend (Top Honcho-Bang Bang) justified evens favourtism in 29.20 the fastest time of the night over the standard trip.. Gliding past the front running Alf Tupper out of the second bend a strong running Geordie Legend saw the standard trip out well to post her fourth race success. The winning margin here was one and a half lengths. The tenth race was named in honour of last Sunday nights Your A Star winner Chris Doran.

In the opening Micks Magic/Ashmore View 550 the Aidin Quilty owned and Jimmy Power trained Springmount Doll (Droopys Kewell-Springmount Dove) opened her account with ease with a polished front running performance to post an eye catching 29.97 success. Breaking smartly Springmount Doll had her rivals at full stretch from an early stage and despite a fine effort from Boher Max Springmount Doll won a shade cosily by four lengths.

In the Mustang Yank 525 a fast starting Noan Okee set out to make all the running from Loclar Minnie but despite an early buffeting the Matt and Jennifer O'Donnell owned The Other Arnie (Vintage Prince-The Other Joy) 3/1 produced a power packed performance from the rear of the field and despite taking the longest route home The Other Arnie came through to register a one and a quarter lengths win over Noan Okee in a best ever 28.96.
