

FIRST SOD TURNED ON **HISTORIC DAY FOR TOWN**

A 12.3 million euro Wastewater Treatment Plant for Dungarvan took a significant step towards becoming reality last week with the turning of the first sod for the plant and the signing off on contracts with the consortium, ABV.

The ceremonial function was carried out by County Mayor, Ciaran O Riain and Mayor of Dungarvan, Paddy Power on part of the site formerly occupied by Quigley Magnesite at Ballinacourty

The plant will be constructed and operated by ABV, which comprises Ascon Ltd, Bowen

Water Technology Ltd and world leaders in water and wastewater treatment Veolia Water UK Plc.

Speaking at the formal signing of contracts, Mayor of Dungarvan, Paddy Power said he was pleased that the commencement of construction will mean the disposal of sewerage into the harbour will cease in the near future.

Outlining the number of new developments both in housing and on the industrial front which have taken place in recent years, Mayor Power said to sustain this growth the proper infrastructure must be provided.

Legal opinion is to be sought on a Lismore Town Councillor's continued presence on the local authority after her decision to join Fianna Fail. Cllr.

Helen O'Sullivan was co-opted

as a non-party representative in place of the late Dick Canning. But last month's announcement that she had joined Fianna Fail saw her position on the Town Council come under renewed pressure.

A number of councillors called on Cllr. O'Sullivan to abide by a written commitment given to the council in February of last year, and stand

Cllr. John Campion, the sole remaining Independent councillor, said Cllr. O'Sullivan signed a statement prior to her co-option, in which said she would be known as a non-party representative.

CALLS FOR O'SULLIVAN

As that is no longer the case, he said she should stand-down. Cllr. John Heneghan (FG) said when the rules of the council - the standing orders - were agreed they attempted to ensure that if a non-party vacancy arose, a non-party representa-

tive should fill that place.

He said they poured over the Standing Orders to ensure they avoided a situation where someone joined a political party once they were co-opted to the council. Cllr. Heneghan

went on to call for Waterford County Council to seek legal opinion on whether Cllr. O'Sullivan could retain her place.

LEGAL OPINION


The rules governing the issue were said to be vague. But, Paul Clerkin of Waterford County Council, said in his own interpretation they stipulated the candidate must be non-party at the time of the cooption - not for the term of the council. But, Mr. Clerkin agreed to seek legal opinion, which he said should be forthcoming relatively soon.





Growing Number of Penalty Points Issued

The number of penalty points issued to drivers in the Waterford County Council area continues to grow, new figures released by the Department of Transport reveal.

A total of 1,493 drivers in the county have now received penalty points with one driver on 8 points - just four away from disqualification.

Nine of the county's motorists are on six points, one hundred and two on four points and 1, 381 have received two penalty points since the systems inception.

The majority of the offences were for speed with 1,473 motorists in the county issued points for this offence. One hundred and twenty-three drivers failed to wear a front seat safety belt; nine drove without a front seat safety belt on their child and nine with no back-seat safety belt on their child.

Minister, Seamus Brennan, said he will be introducing a range of further safety measures over the coming months and is confident they will have a significant impact on bringing about safer and more responsible driving behaviour. These will include extending the penalty points system to include careless driving from 1st June.






FANTASTIC FISH

Gardai Appeal For Information On Robbery

Gardai have issued an appeal to anyone who saw any suspicious activity in the Kilcooney Woods close to Mahon Falls in the days prior to last weeks attempted robbery of an AIB branch in Carrick to contact them immediately.

A red jeep used in the attempted robbery was abandoned and hidden among trees in the Kilcooney Woods area. It was originally stolen in Dungaryan

At a few minutes to five on Thursday last a jeep reversed into the door of the AIB Bank in Carrick on Suir. Two people jumped from the rear of the jeep, and attached a battering ram to the rear of the jeep. The door was then smashed open.

The two raiders then entered the bank while a third remained in the vehicle.

A Garda who was in the vicinity at the time approached the jeep, but was held off at gun-point. But the robbery was aborted after a minute and a half and the raiders left emptyhanded.

Gardai said one of the men was armed with a hand-gun and another with a sledge-hammer

They made their getaway out the Dungarvan road, before

turning off it and heading towards Kilmacthomas. Two Garda vehicles gave chase, but lost sight of the vehicle.

Later on Thursday night, the jeep was located by Gardai searching the Kilconney Woods area - a few miles on the Carrick side of Mahon Falls. It was abandoned a few hundred yards down the forrestery roadway opposite a well-known picnic site in the area, where it was hidden amongst the trees.

Inspector Tadg Browne of Carrick Gardai appealed for anyone in the vicinity of the AlB Bank prior to the robbery who saw any vehicles or suspicious movements in the half-hour prior to the attempted robbery to contact the Gardai.

Also if anyone saw anything of a suspicious nature in the Kilcooney Woods area in the days up to and including the day of the robbery itself they also appeal for people to contact them.

"We believe there was some amount of planning that went into it. We believe that there would have been some activity in the days prior to it in the Kilcooney Woods area," Inspector Browne said.



NO, not kebabs - but a delicious Turkish dish, often served wrapped in thin savoury pancakes.

Method:

Alternate chunks of turkey breast meat, marinated in Italian salad dressing with chunks of red and green pepper, onions, and whole mushrooms.

Brush with barbecue sauce and serve with additional barbecue sauce or mustard sauce. You might like to try alternating the turkey chunks with sausage meat or something similar.

HULA HULA TURKEY KABOBS

Ingredients:

(Makes 6 Kabobs)

2 tenderloin turkey steaks or breasts, cut into 2-inch slices

2 ripe nectarines, cut into 4 wedges

1 pineapple, peeled, cored, quartered, cut into 1.5-inch pieces

2 kiwis, quartered with peel Marinade:

1 x 15ml sp grated lime peel 1/4 cup fresh lime juice

1 x 15ml sp curry powder 1/2 x 5ml sp salt

1/2 x 5ml sp coarsely ground pepper

1 x 15ml sp olive/vegetable

Method:

On six kabob skewers, alternate three pieces of turkey meat with two nectarine wedges, two slices of kiwi, and two pineapple pieces.

In a small bowl, stir together remaining marinade ingredients. Place kabobs in 13" x 9" baking dish, brush with marinade. After 15 minutes, remove from baking dish and grill, turning once, 12 to 15 minutes on each side, or until browned on the outside and no longer pink in middle.


Loosen the skin around 1 lime, sliced into 8 with the turkey breast. Tuck the lime slices, garlic cloves and ginger root under the skin.

> Brush the turkey with oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Grill for 11/2 to 2

Meanwhile, in a medium 1/2 x 5ml sp coarsely saucepan, combine all the mango glaze ingredients, except the cilantro. Cook FOR THE MANGO GLAZE: over a medium heat, stirring occasionally, until the sauce is thickened (this takes about 20 to 25 minutes).

Stir in the cilantro. Brush 2 x 5ml sp grated lime peel over the turkey while grilling





Top tips to liven up your salads

As any scan of the fruit and veg section of your local supermarket will tell you, salad is no longer just a case of lettuce, cucumber and tomatoes.

Now, it is a far more exotic affair - with red chard, coriander, mizuna and a host of other ingredients making their way into

This is all very good news for the gardener, as there are no limits to the kind of salad you can grow.

After all, it's cheap, takes up little space and is well suited to the English climate.

but they are easy to grow from seed. A square metre of garden should be enough to provide all the leafy salad you need. Preparing your garden:

Mark off one metre square of garden, and surround it with a gravel board to keep the salad garden separate from the other

Dig the boards deep into the soil so they do not blow over in the wind, as they are also there for weather protection.

Now it is time to add the seeds. You should vary the proportions depending on your tastes, although remember to keep the same types of seeds next to each other.

You should start with a good foundation of bulky lettuce - the most essential ingredient for any salad.

Little Gem and Mini Green are the best sort to use if you are growing in a small patch. Hearted lettuces are the best kind if you want maximum colour and taste, but these do take

longer to grow. Spinach is an ideal crop in spring or autumn, while summer is the best time to grow beetroot.

The hotter months can also see the successful harvesting of pak choi and mizuna which can add spice to your salads. American land cress, chicory and peppery rocket are excellent ways to liven up your salad garden, and are straightforward to grow.

If it's colour you're after, red lettuce, red chicory and kale are all interesting additions to any salad garden and they taste great too. For adding an unbeatable aroma to your salad, basil, mint and cinnamon are all

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Plant out and stake sweetpeas

Sweetpeas raised in the greenhouse in January will be ready for planting out, provided they are hardened off properly. They will look very well trained on screens, pergolas or arches as well as clambering up a tripod in a herbaceous border. Those planted last month should be well established and now is the time to provide each with a cane.

Push firmly into the soil and create a tripod effect for a good show later. Reduce the number of shoots to one per plant, choosing the sturdiest, and lead towards its cane with soft string. Pinch out the tips of the March-grown plants.

Prune evergreens

Hardy evergreen shrubs grown primarily for their foliage, either in hedge form or topiary, can be pruned at this time, especially if hard cutting back is required.

Lighter trimming can be safely carried out in summer but severe pruning should be avoided then.

Worn-out laurel hedges can be revitalised by cutting back to within a foot of the ground at this time of year.

The stumps will look awful at first but with a little luck and some warm, showery weather they will soon be a forest of healthy new shoots.


Sow parsley

Nothing beats fresh herbs from the garden, and parsley is useful in any kitchen. Soaking the seed before sowing and pouring hot water into the drills first is said to help germination. Sow some in a shadier spot, as plants can suffer in a hot summer. Remove greasebands from trees

Remove and burn greasebands from around the main trunk or branches of apples, pears and other fruit trees.

Outdoor peaches

The young fruit on outdoor peaches and nectarines should now be the size of marbles and should be thinned by reducing the number of fruits per cluster so they have room to swell. Don't complete thinning until after a natural fall which can reduce the number of fruits.

This was followed with a polished performance of "A Nightingale Sang in Berkley Square", and finally the band concluded with an original suite for brass band, "Little Suite For Brass". On Sunday, March 28th at the ner at the N.I.B.A. "Champions of Ireland contest in Belfast last October where the band took 1st place in its section.

> With bands from across Cork, Limerick and Waterford competing on the day there was plenty of music to enjoy and lots of anxious players waiting to hear the results and adjudicators comments. The Dungarvan Brass Band scored very well and with 91 marks out of a possible 100, the adjudicator Lt. Col. 

WALTON LECTURE

Plaque and Lecture to Commemorate Abbeyside's **Prof. Walton**

On Friday 23rd April next, side can claim to be the birththe National Committee for Science and Engineering Commemorative Plaques, in association with Dungarvan Town Council will unveil a plaque at his birthplace in Abbeyside to commemorate the centenary of the birth of the late Professor Ernest T. S. Walton, the renowned Irish Physicist and our only Nobel Laureate in science. The unveiling will be carried out by Professor Walton's son, Prof. Philip Walton, Department of Physics, NUI, Galway, who, together with the members of this distinguished committee will be accorded a Civic Welcome by the Mayor and members of the Council in the Waterford County Civic Offices.

Later that evening a talk entitled 'E.T.S. Walton - The Man and his Work' will be given in Lawlors Hotel by Dr E. C. Finch, Department of Physics, University of Dublin, Trinity College, who knew Prof. Walton and was in fact that last member of Trinity College staff to be appointed by him.

Relatively few places in the world can boast of a favoured son or daughter winning a Nobel Prize, but in this country, only Dungarvan / Abbeyplace of a Nobel prizewinner in

Ernest Thomas Sinton Walton, who, with Sir John Cockcroft, won the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1951 was born in Epworth Cottage, the residence of the Methodist Minister, in Strandside South on 6th October, 1903.

Outside of being a brilliant physicist, E.T.S. Walton was a most interesting and unassuming man. He spent the first two years of his life here before moving with his family to live in several towns around the country as his father was given a succession of appointments.

Dr. Eric Finch, a Fellow of the Institute of Physics and a man who has first hand knowledge of Professor Walton, is well placed to tell some of the life-story of this quiet, unassuming and modest scholar, who will rank as perhaps the finest Irish scientist since the great Sir Robert Boyle of Lismore in the late Seventeenth Century

It promises to be a most interesting evening and an invitation is extended to all who would like to attend the illustrated lecture which will commence at 7.30pm.

LATE EDWARD (NED) POWER



With feelings of great personal sadness and regret we write on the passing of Ned Power, Mount Odell, at Waterford Regional Hospital on Thursday, 25th March after a period of ill health. Only weeks earlier, Ned and family had celebrated his 90th birthday.

A native of the Brickey Valley, Ned has spent many years in England and returned home where he became a household name throughout the canine world for his Odell longtails who graced virtually every track in this country.

We extend to wife Patricia, daughters Margaret and Noreen, sons Hugh and James, daughter-in-law Anne, grandchildren Eddie, Matthew, Jamie, Mark, sister Nonie, sisters-in-law Eileen, Mary and Kathleen, his nephew, nieces, other relatives especially the Sheridan family, Shandon our heartfelt sympathies at this time.

Born in 1914 in Mapstown to Margaret and James Power, Ned grew up in a sporting atmosphere with his father very much to the fore in the foundation of the famed Brickey Rangers, A club whose colours Ned wore on many an occasion. The club won a County Junior Football title in 1941 and four years later the same outfit completed a historic double in the same grade for hurling and football. A man renowned for his prowess on the playing field, he also saw action with Dungarvan and won Senior Football medals in 1937 and 1938.

When he emigrated, he lined out at full back for Warwickshire when they took the Birmingham Hurling Championship in some style. Ned over the years saw action locally with Eire Og, Abbeyside and the Nire. When working in Cork in the late 40's. he threw in his lot with St. Finbarr's. This brought him into action against the likes of Jack Lynch and the Cloyne Maestro Christy Ring. Some time later he tried out with Cork side Kilmurray. All in all, Ned gave outstanding service to the G.A.A over his playing days.

Ned was also a much admired and skilful boxer, who took part in many bouts in the Town Hall, when capacity crowds were present to see the local stars in action. Ned was an athlete par excellence, a noted sprinter he graced the many local meetings and scored tremendous victories over much acclaimed opponents. Sporting wise Ned followed Spurs, played for seven GAA clubs, boxed, was an athlete, a road bowler and epitomised everything that was good in sport. Yet there is still a glorious chapter to highlight.

Ned Power is synonymous with greyhound racing. In 1980 when he returned home, he set up kennels in Mount Odell and as they say 'the rest is history!' Odell Tawny won thirteen races, her offspring won countless stakes, and events. Who will forget the blinding early pace of

Odell Supreme and the finishing kick of Odell King. What about Odell Yankee who took the Ryan Puppy Cup in Cork in 1985. Odell Supreme took the Guinness Stakes in Cork and Waterford Crystal in 1986. King was the victor of the Kantogher Coop Laurels in 1988. Track record holder Odell Supreme who rep-

Track record holder Odell Supreme who represented Ireland in the Anglo Irish International in 1986, the 'black' won both legs at Wimbeldon and Shelbourne Park. Those of us who were privileged to be in attendance on many a wonderful night could only marvel at Ned and Patricia's enthusiasm and their truly wonderful dogs who have written themselves. the Brickey Valley and the Power family into Greyhound folklore. HONOURING ERNEST WALTON

Many tributes have been passed recently to Prof. Ernest Walton, winner of Ireland's only Nobel Prize in a scientific discipline (Physics 1951). However, many people felt the tributes are both inadequate and belated. To help rectify the situation ,the Mayor of Dungarvan and Abbeyside Cllr. Patrick Power in conjunction with Dungarvan Town Council are unveiling a commemorative plaque to the late Professor E.T.S. Walton at Strandside South, Abbeyside, on Friday 23rd.April 2004 at 3.30p.m. The plaque will be unveiled by his son Professor Philip Walton, Physics Department, N.U.I. Galway. The event is being organized in conjunction with the National Committee for Science and Engineering Commemorative Plaques.

The ceremony will be preceded by a Civic Welcome for the Walton Family and members of the Plaques Committee in the County Civic Offices, Dungarvan at 2.30p.m.

Prof. Walton was born in the house where the plaque is to be erected. Walton Park on the Causeway has been named in his

However, one cannot help feelings of regret that Ernest Waltons magnificent achievement was not used to better advantage by Ireland and that in his own country he is only now getting his full due. Another fitting way to make amends would be for Ireland to join (albeit belatedly) the European Research organizations CERN and ESO. When the large Hadron Collider starts operating at CERN in 2007, it will be over a million times more powerful than the accelerator built by Cockcroft and Walton in 1931-32. Irish Scientists should be part of this adventure.

SEWERAGE SCHEME -- PROGRESS TO DATE

The Foul Sewers on Duckspool are all complete. This sewer has not been handed over yet as it can only be made live after the completion of the treatment plant. The Surface Water Sewers in Sarsfield Street and Coolagh Road are complete apart from the outfall structure which is programmed to be completed within the next six weeks.

RISING MAINS

Twin Mains from Shandon PS to Ballinacourty Treatment Plant apart from a 200m gap at the Glendine Bridge - these mains

- from the west end of the Causeway to the point where the disused railway line meets the Clonea Road, and
- 2) from the point of the connection to the Treatment Plant o a point on the Clonea Road approximately 50m short of the closure where the disused railway line meets the Clonea Road.

The closure at the Clonea Road/disused railway line intersection was made in late March, leaving only the section between Davitt's Quay and the Causeway to be completed. SHEEP

Management at grass - Meals to ewes - Why?

If there is adequate grass (5-6cms) there is little advantage in feeding meals to ewes. However, if there is less than 5cms grass, ewe milk yield will suffer and hence lamb growth rate. The question - why is there inadequate grass?

Meals to lambs - Why?

There is an extra cost involved. Lambs fed an average of 0.25 kg from 5 weeks to sale at 130 days will consume about 25kg at a cost of about 5/lamb or 7-8/ewe. On short grass (4-5cms) the response to meal feeding is about 4-6 to 1. It drops to 7-10 to 1 when there is good grass available (6cms).

Feeding meals to correct an insufficient grass supply can be considered a poor reason, as grass is far less expensive. Is it to sell lambs earlier?

In this case there may be several knock -on effects. There may be a higher price from earlier selling. With less lambs on the farm there should be more grass available to the ewes at mating time with the possibility of a higher lamb crop next year and a further possibility of not having to house as early for the coming winter. Maybe to save in worm dosing? One worm dose at a cost of 10-15cent per lamb ...is this a valid enough reason?

Is it because stocking rate is high and there is a big lamb crop? If this was the only reason, then less than 2% of farmers should be feeding creep to their lambs.

Another possibility... a reduction in work load as the lambs are not on the farm for as long?

The bottom line is to make sure that your reasons are valid (i.e. where do you recoup the 7-8/ewe) as it costs money to feed creep to lambs

Handling facilities

There is about a 4 week period from the end of lambing to the first worm dose, the first time that ewes and lambs have to be gathered this year. Again this is the time to ask: how good is your handling unit? Are the collecting yard, race, footbaths etc adequate? Are all the gates hanging? Is there some welding to be done? To be truthful, this is an area that leaves a lot to be desired on many farms. There is no use in complaining about the labour requirements of sheep if you have a substandard handling unit. Your Teagasc adviser has plans available and can direct you to where there are reasonably good ones located.

 Area Aid for maize may be negligible in 2004 as the national base area is likely to be surpassed.

- Site Choose a sheltered South facing field (warmest on farm) with medium to heavy soil type and good drainage. A soil pH of 6.1-6.8 is satisfactory. Altitudes greater than 100 m are not suit-
- Sowing Can proceed when soil temperatures are above 8°C. Drill 100-110,000 seeds/ha. Seed is usually packed in 50,000 seed/bag to sow 1.0-1.1 acres/pack (Pioneer varieties sold in bags with 80,000 seeds e.g. Justina, Benicia).

Sowing under complete cover plastic can proceed in early April otherwise delay sowing until after mid April.

Prepare a fine, firm seedbed 10-12cm (4-5 inches) deep similar to that for beet crops. Only roll after sowing under very dry soil con-

 Covering with plastic will increase DM yield by about 4 t/ha (1.5 t/acre) at a cost of about 300/ha. Complete cover plastic is best for early sowing but perforated (punch or pinhole) plastic is best for sowing after late April.

Recommendations

Fertilisers

Do an S4 Soil Test - Trace elements are important, particularly zinc and manganese. All or part of the P and K requirements can be supplied by slurry.

The nutrient requirement kg/ha (units/acre) for 15t/ha (6t/acre) dry matter maize crop are:

Consider placing 125-185 kg/ha (1-1.5 bags/acre) of Super Phosphate 16% P or Maize Starter (14.4%N; 16%P; 0K; 1%Cu; 2%Zn; 1%Mn) at sowing.

The list contains maize varieties that are considered most suitable for growing under Irish conditions without the use of plastic cover. Growers should give preference to the varieties listed unless there is compelling evidence that other varieties are more suited to their specific conditions.

MINISTER WALSH **ANNOUNCES** COMMENCEMENT OF PAYMENT OF OVER €50m IN 2004 **FORESTRY** PREMIA

The Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr Joe Walsh TD, today announced that payment of the 2004 Forestry Premia will begin this week.

Minister Walsh said that over 11,000 farmers and landowners are entitled to premia this year, representing 50m in total and an average payment of over 4,500. Over 38m will be paid to those eligible applicants who have already returned their relevant application forms. The remaining applicants will receive their premium when the appropriate application forms are submitted to the Department.

The Minister again stressed the commitment of his Department and the Government to the continued development of the Forestry Sector as evidenced by increased funding in 2004 including the provision of additional money for the forestry support schemes

The Minister said that the recent clarification of the Single Payment Entitlement in relation to land availability, together with the payment of the significant levels of the premium now available, should be a further encouragement to farmers and others to consider forestry as a long-term viable land use.

IFA Says Farmers Must Insist On Payment On The Day For Livestock

Committee Chairman Tom Leahy has said all farmers must insist on payment on the day for their livestock. "No farmer should sell cattle without demanding and obtaining payment on the day'

Mr. Leahy said when selling cattle to the meat factories payment on the day was essential. He said for younger livestock, farmers should sell in their local livestock mart where they can be guaranteed payment.

The Waterford IFA livestock leader said in recent times

NEW THINKING WILL LEAD

When you hear a Civil Servant talking of 'revolutionary change' you can safely assume that something pretty big is happening.

The term was used at the recent Teagasc conference on rural development, by one of the main speakers, Deirdre Carroll, Assistant Secretary of the Department of Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs. The reference was in the final paragraph of her contribution to the conference, a paragraph which hinted at some of the excitement that is to be found in the whole area of

rural development since the adoption of the recent Fischler CAP reforms.

These reforms have consolidated the position of rural development and, indeed, elevated it to a more exalted position in the pecking order for EU funding.

Ms Carroll's speech was an outline of the current situation in Ireland as regards rural development policy. But instead of concluding with a nice comfortable wrap-up statement, she stung her audience into forcing themselves to think

again about the current situation. I'll let you judge for yourself by reproducing the final sentence of that paragraph: "Existing policies and programmes (some of which have been described), while forming a solid basis will, no doubt, face healthy scrutiny in a period of almost revolutionary change in the area of rural development policy.

This is indicative of an official willingness - nay, an active eagerness - here in Ireland to embrace the change that is undoubtedly on the way in this entire area. Ms Carroll put it very well in context in her analysis that there was a 'new thinking', post Salzburg (a reference to the EU rural development conference in that city last November), because rural areas across Europe had evolved in a different way than expected when the original

CAP was designed. "While the modernisation of farm structures and income support for farmers have slowed down the exodus from farming, the attractiveness of some rural areas in terms of population and employment cannot be attributed to sectoral policy measures because these have occurred in off-farm sectors," she said. "Thus, the diversified rural areas which have been able to attract resources and reverse or slow down depopulation should be the models of reference for developing policies for rural areas.

Agriculture will, of course, continue to offer a significant contribution by responding to new developments in the areas of quality food production and other functions, leisure, environment, etc, that society is increasingly demanding of rural areas."

In outlining the general situation in Ireland, Ms Carroll said her department was currently analysing the likely impact of the proposed changes outlined by the Commission during February which, of course, now became the focus of detailed negotiation by national governments. "As a result of these developments, the Department is stepping up its involvement at EU level, most notably by participating in the EU Committees where the relevant discussions are taking place." In addition, Ireland is hosting two conferences towards the end of the Irish Presidency, one on territorial cohesion and the other on living conditions in rural Europe, based on a survey on quality of life in 28 countries.

She recalled that the Commission's Financial Perspectives for 2007-2013, published in February, indicated that the future rural development policy after 2006 would be focusing on three main objectives: increasing the competitiveness of agriculture through support for restructuring (for example, investment aids for young farmers, information and promotion measures); enhancing the environment and countryside through support for land management, including co-financing of rural development actions related to Natura 2000 nature protection sites (for example, agri-environment, forestry and Least Favoured Areas measures); and enhancing the quality of life in rural areas and promoting diversification of economic activities through measures targeting the farm sector and other rural sectors (for example, qualitative reorientation of production, food quality, village restoration).





€1 Million Flood Relief For Clonmel

The long awaited flood relief scheme for Clonmel will get underway this year, following a meeting between Minister of State at the office of Public Works, Tom Parlon and Clonmel Borough Council. Plans for the scheme, designed to prevent the disastrous flooding of recent years, are being revised by the O.P.W. and will be put on display in the coming weeks so that the public can make observations on them. The Minister said the first phase of the scheme, the development of a flood warning service which is being undertaken by the O.P.W.'s Engineering services, and cleaning and clearing of debris from streams and culverts in the towns, could be under way this year, and that funds of 1 million euro are available for it. South Tipperary and Waterford County Councils had been concerned that there could be contaminated material in the river bed, he said, there were also general concerns over archaeological and environmental issues involved in dredging the river, and he expressed fear that the height of the proposed walls would ruin the high amenity value of the river.





KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Can you please give the new rates of payment for Child Benefit?

ANSWER:

Child benefit is paid monthly by the Department of Social and Family Affairs for each qualified child normally living with you and being supported by you. The rate of Child Benefit increases each year from April. To qualify a child must be dependent on you and must also be:

Under age 16 or Aged, 16, 17 or 18 and attending full time education or a FAS Youthreach course or have a physical or mental disability.

The payment is generally made to the mother of the child. Where the parents are living separately it is paid to the parent with whom the child lives the majority of the time. If the child is not living with or being maintained by the parents, then it may be paid to the person who is caring for the child. From April 2004 the Child Benefit rates are as follows:

- 1 Child 131.60
- 2 Children 263.20
- 3 Children 428.50
- 4 Children 593.80
- 5 Children 759.10
- 6 Children 924.40
- 7 Children 1,089.70
- 8 Children 1,255.00

Child benefit claimants paid be electronic methods will receive the increased rate in full from April 2004. Those on book payment will receive the increased rate through a special payment in May, backdated to April.

When a birth is registered, if it is a first child, the Department sends a partially completed application form to the mother requesting payment details. If it is a second or subsequent child the Child Benefit is automatically increased and the mother notified. In other cases, application for Child Benefit should be made on Form CB1 for children under 16 years of age and on From CB2 for a child aged 16 or over. MONEY MATTERS

BUYING A CAR

There are many ways to finance the purchase of a car and it pays to take some time out to study the different types. The following are some details of the different types of loans, etc available:

LEASING

Leasing (called consumer hire under the Consumer Credit Act) generally involves paying monthly instalments over a fixed period, say three or five years. At the end of this term however, you will still now own the car. You won't be able to sell it as it does not belong to you.

HIRE PURCHASE

A HP agreement involves paying monthly instalments over a fixed period, the difference is that when you make the final payment you will own the care and will be able to sell it. Remember you must keep up your payments or else the lender may threaten to seize the car in line with the terms of agreement.

BANK LOAN

There are basically two types of loan, a personal loan for a stated purpose (to buy the car) and a term loan that can be used for any purpose. If you take out a personal loan, you must use it to buy a car if that is the purpose stated in the agreement. If you spend the money on something else you may find yourself breaking one of the conditions of the loan. The major difference in using a bank loan is that the car will be yours from the day that you buy it.

Shop around when you are financing your car purchase as the Annual Percentage Rage (APR) may vary from lender to lender. Compare the deals offered. The lower the APR, the better the deal.

ABBEYSIDE CASTLE (Continued from last week)

The entrance lay by a doorway resembling a chimney and situated some few feet from the ground. The first floor was a huge piece of rough stonework, the greater portion of which has

now fallen away. In the debris caused by the collapse of the castle, a coin was found bearing the date 1138. The young lad that found it exchanged it for sweets and now it is not to be found. Possibly it will turn up in the future when the owner gets to know the value of it. Many of the Abbeyside and even the Dungarvan people have carried home pieces of oakwood found in the debris and these they will keep as souvenirs of this historic and imposing structure. A circular stairs led from the base to the top. This staircase has long since fallen away; there only remains the concave appearance to show where the staircase ran in the building. The portion that has now fallen

was apparently the best in preservation and viewed from the west side one got an indication of the massiveness of the structure. Some thirty years ago another portion of the castle collapsed. The breach came in the south gable and this wall or the remains of it is still standing. A huge mass of stones lay on the ground below and only after a considerable time were they removed. The castle stood in its own jagged but still attractive condition until the night of Tuesday 19th January when it collapsed. The day before Mr. John McGrath, Acting Engineer to the Urban Council, reported that the Castle was in a dangerous condition and his marvellous foresight is now well recognised. On the fol-

lowing night Mr. M. F. Lynch, V.S. who lives close by as well as others heard during the early part of the night a rumbling noise which compared to the rumbling of a train and in the morning he saw the cause of the rumblings in the ruins of the fine old castle Now all that stands of this notable structure is the south wall and this being unsupported will probably not long stand the devastating action of the elements.

I particularly welcome the money being allocated towards the restoration of the piers in Villierstown as this should alleviate the dangers to traffic that exist there.

Park, An Crompan and The Paddocks to name but a few.'

The Town Council has not been found wanting in its housing construction programme either. During the past year the council has completed 37 social houses, and 30 affordable houses at Shandon, and 19 social houses at Powers Brewery," Mayor Power added.

A further eighteen affordable houses are under construction at Shandon, and the council has recently acquired lands in Abbeyside in order to continue its ambitious housing programme.

With the expansion of Century Homes and the development of a 30 acre industrial park at Lisfennel he said: "If we are to sustain developments of this nature and to attract inward investment to the town and surrounding areas, it is imperative that the council has appropriate infrastructure in place including a modern and efficient wastewater treatment plant.'

"For far too long we have had to put up with untreated effluent being discharged into the harbour with significant adverse impact on water quality at Abbeyside Strand, Boreenatra and Western Bay. I am particularly pleased that the commencement of construction of the wastewater treatment plant means that this unacceptable practice of waste disposal will cease in the near future," he

The plant has been designed to treat wastewater generated by a population equivalent to 25,000 persons. It will be constructed in a modular form, enabling it to be expanded in the future. The contract also includes the construction of a

smaller wastewater treatment plant at Ballinagoul, Ring. HISTORIC DAY



Town Clerk, Eric Flynn also confirmed that he was satisfied that on the 12th of February 2003 when Cllr. O'Sullivan signed the co-option terms, she was a bona fide non-party representative.

However, Cllr. Campion argued the terms required her to remain a non-party candi-

"Of course she should step down, and she should have been advised of that before she joined Fianna Fail.'

However, defending her position, Cllr. O'Sullivan said she took the decision to join Fianna Fail due to what she described as the discrimination towards non-party candidates. She said candidates were required to get number of noming members of the public - ironically a measure introduced by Fianna Fail.

Cllr. Davy Whelan (FG) said the late Dick Canning had fought hard to get the seat as an non-party representtive.

"It should remain Independent," he said.

When Cllr. Campion reiterated his call for Cllr. O'Sullivan to abide by the terms she had signed Cllr. O'Sullivan countered: "I should have the right to change my mind. I am sorry, but that's what happened anyway."

Legal advice on the issue is expected before the final meeting of Lismore Town Council next month.

Cllr. Leddy agreed that he signed the pledge but said he took the decision to defect because he was "put in solitary confinement by Brian O'Shea and his henchmen."

"I work very hard as a politician. And I'll be damned if I was going to allow them do that.



Enjoying an eleven points lead after Paul Flynn hit home an unstoppable free in the 33rd. minute, Waterford in the end were hard pushed to come off winners by 4 points after Limerick bored holes through our defense and scored 4 second half goals that narrowed the gap to a mere three points by the 87th. minute.

At halftime Waterford led by 1-12 to 0-4 and the wonder at this point was why we did not have a much bigger points score. After having enjoyed the lions share of the play.

This Sunday at Modeligo, Ardmore and Valley Rangers play the final of the Dungarvan Tyre Centre Cup (sponsored by Philip O'Flynn, Dungarvan).

Valley Rangers on the other hand have never won the Cup, being defeated twice. In 1995 as favourites they were surprisingly defeated by Brideview B at Lismore and in 2001 at Tallow, Lismore won by 1 gl to nil. So could it be 3rd time lucky for the Conna side?

Everyone associated with Valley in their long illustrious career would like to see this present side lift the Tyre Centre Cup. Valley have not had a good league campaign by their own standards. Yet they are in the Cup final on Sunday, play Brideview in the Bolger Cup Final and are still in the Liam Fitzgerald Cup also against Ardmore. Some clubs might say a good season, but Valley have had better league seasons finishing in the bottom half and were not consistent enough to challenge for league honours.

In their two league clashes Ardmore have held the upper hand, winning by 1 gl. to nil in Conna in November and winning by 5 gls to 1 gl last January in Ardmore. Those results will mean nothing on Sunday. A Cup final is totally different to any league encounter. We do not think anyone can contradict us as their record to date is just one league loss all season, and that away to Lismore. Ardmore are strong in all quarters. In D. Lenane an outstanding goalkeeper. Wayne Hennessy the O'-Donnell's, Jason Lenane all strong defenders.

Richie Hennessy at midfield, Anthony Aherne (at long last an overdue league medal) outstanding servant to Ardmore for years. Killian McCarthy, Johnny Hennessy, Clinton Hennessy, players who can score if given any freedom in or near the goal area. Valley have Billy Carr (Jnr), Alan Carr who gave a man of the match performance in their semi final win over Pinewood Rangers. Jim Lane at midfield, Shane Kearney, Terence Rumley, Gordon Bryan, the long serving Sean Twomey now playing a more attacking role than in former years. The long serving Brendan Hickey, Paudi Noonan, Damien Farrell and Colin Hogan.

So it all comes down to who will have their scoring boots on next Sunday. Form says it has to be Ardmore, but Valley know they must win this Cup and their supporters will give them all the vocal support needed. Ardmore too have wonderful supporters who really make their voices heard, so both sides will not be lacking in support.

2004 SUMMER SERIES





England in Belfast in May. There will also be a box off on the 30th of April in the National Stadium for team selection. This is the first time two Dungarvan boxers are wearing the green vest for Ireland in the same year.

David put a lot of hard work in the gym in the weeks leading up to this bout, he sparred in Clonmel and in St. Paul's and in our gym he sparred with Gary Collins and Jeremy O'Mahony. There was a great team effort and it's a pity that Killian Walsh was sick in bed and missed the final, but he can see it on video.

This was David's second time in the All Ireland's, the year before last he was beaten in the semi finals, this time he was determined to win. He put in the work and he got the results, an inspiration to the other young boxers in the club.

We must not forget our other contender in Dublin, Barry O'Neill, he put in a marvellous display and was beaten in the semi finals by eventual champion David Joyce, Athy. He'll be back next year, "just watch this space."

Plans are being made for a local tournament, more news next week. Also a report on the Dungarvan boxers that boxed in England recently on two separate shows, one in Blackpool and the other in Essex.
