



# **Fragic Farm Accident Claims Life Of Ballymac' Teenager**

gathered for the burial of a young teenager whose tragic death as the result of a farm accident over the weekend, shocked the local community in Ballymacarbry. Fifteen-year-old, Shane Gleeson, who was a popular student at Clonmel High School and a talented all-round sportsman, was laid to rest at St. Helena's Church in the Nire Valley yesterday (Tuesday).

The tragedy occurred when Shane was transporting a circular feeder on his parents farm in Lyre West, Ballymacarbry.

He was attempting to secure the feeder on the transport box at the back of the tractor when the feeder fell back on him killing him instantly.

His body was discovered by huge crowd of mourners his eight-year-old brother, Conor, who immediately alerted his father to the accident.

His remains were later removed to Waterford Regional Hospital where a post mortem was carried out.

Shane was a talented member of the Fourmilewater club, Nire football club, and excelled as a soccer player with Pinewood.

Just that day, he had planned to line out for Pinewood Rangers. His club mates had already taken to the field, and were waiting for Shane, when they learned of the tragic news.

Shane was also a member of a number of teams from Clonmel High School.





### MAGNIFICENT WHALES

There are about 80 species of whales, among which are the largest creature to have inhabited Earth. They appear to be very intelligent, social creatures who communicate with each other with a complicated system of sounds. Although whales live in the sea they are mammals, not fish. This means that they are warm blooded and give birth to live young who feed on their mother's milk. The young are born tail first so that they do not drown.

DIFFERENT KIND OF WHALES

Right whales are named by whalers because they were the 'right' whales to catch for their oil. There are three types of right whale: the Greenland right whale, the black right whales and the pygmy right whales. All right whales are rare because they have been over hunted. The largest of the toothed

whales are the sperm whales.

They can grow

up to 17m (56ft) in

length. There are also two sperm whales, the pygmy sperm whale and the dwarf sperm whale, that are among the smallest of the toothed whales.

One very unusual looking whale is the narwhal. The male narwhal has an enlarged tooth that grows straight out to form a spiral tusk about 3m (10ft) long.



The black and white killer whale is the most dangerous of all the whales. As well as fish, they will eat seals, penguins and even dolphins and porpoises to which they are closely related. The killer whale is the largest member of

of behaviour, the general feeling is that the Councils policy of removing the troublesome tenants is beginning to pay dividends from the point of view that these areas are now becoming more settled and peaceful."

Cllr Geoghegan went on to say that "without a doubt there is still quite an amount of work to be done in this regard, but the Council is certainly moving in the right direction. We must send out a clear signal that Dungarvan Town Council is not a soft touch, and will take the appropriate action when it comes to this type of behaviour. People are entitled to live peacefully in areas where they will be able to raise their families without fear of drugs and continuous drink-fuelled violence etc, going on the neighbournood.

Speaking to the Dungarvan leader after the meeting Cllr Geoghegan went on to say that "over the past 5 years Dungarvan Town Council made some progress on the housing list due to the fact a substantial number of houses were constructed at a substantial cost, but the reality is that the housing list which last year stood at 180 applicants is still too long. All approved applicants for housing go through a waiting period of a 2 to 3 years before being housed -(in some cases this is much longer), and having waited so long, it's particularly galling when a tiny minority of tenants can behave in such an appalling manner, thereby making life hell for the overwhelming majority of law-abiding householders.

Cllr Geoghegan concluded by saying that "the Council officials, I believe, have the full support of the Council members when dealing with this problem, and by keeping in constant contact with various residents groups, and by working closely with the gardai also, these types of situations can be prevented from developing into long-term problems. We must continue with this no-nonsense, get-tough approach.

# **Bord Pleanala Settle In Landfill Hearing High Court Case**

An Bord Pleanala made an undertaking to the High Court to provide complete bilingual translation of what's said during the Oral Hearing into the proposed Garrynagree Superdump.

The planning appeals board together with the Attorney General agreed to the measures on the steps of the High Court last Thurs-

The Oral Hearing had been scheduled to begin last December. but due to the legal action, Mr. Justice Neill put a stay preventing the hearing from take place pending the outcome of legal proceed-

As that case has now been disposed of, the stay preventing the hearing's go-ahead has been lifted and the Bord is expected to announce a new date for the hearing in the next week or two.

The hearing, itself, is not expected to start for the next month at least, a spokesperson from the Bord confirmed.

#### UNDERTAKING

The undertaking to hold the hearing on a bilingual basis was made prior to the start of the High Court Challenge taken by an Old Parish based farmer, Tomas O Mathuna.

Mr. O Mathuna's case centered on Bord Pleanala's written refusal to hold the hearing on a bilingual

He said this infringed on his constitutional rights.

In recognising Mr. O Mathuna's

constitutional rights to have his side of the proceedings heard entirely in Irish, the Bord also undertook to ensure that Mr. O Mathuna would not be put at a disadvantage compared to anyone who participated in the hearing through English.

As part of the same legal action, Mr. O Mathuna also sought an order compelling the State to provide the public with an Irish translation of the Planning and Development Acts 2000 and 2002 as required under the constitution and as recently affirmed by the Supreme Court.

The Attorney General agreed in court to comply with this order. The Attorney General also agreed that the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government would make an Irish translation of the various Statutory Instruments listed in the legal application and would make these available to the public.

Mr. O Mathuna was shown a draft copy of the translated acts. Subsequently, Mr. O Mathuna was also awarded his full costs.

#### DELIGHT AT OUTCOME

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Mr. O Mathuna said he was delighted with the outcome of

"It's what we were seeking." he

said vesterday (Tuesday).

Explaining why he took the challenge, he said: "Part of the proposed dump site is in the Gaeltacht and for that reason we wanted it to be held bilingually. An Bord Pleanala said this has nothing to do with the Gaeltacht, as they said it will only be on a small part of the Gaeltacht. And for that reason it would not have an affect on the Gaeltacht. So we decided to take a stand against that, and that's what started this whole thing."

Mr. O Mathuna, who took the case as an individual, is a member of the environmental campaign group who will oppose the siting of the Superdump near a Special Area of Protection during the Oral Hearing.

The Old Parish farmer claimed the superdump will have a huge affect on the Gaeltacht and the

people living there.
"People in the Gaeltacht want to make their issues known in Irish," he said. "They wanted to be accommodated in that but they were refused. For us that was a bridge too far."

He also said that the case was a "huge risk" financially, but felt strongly about the case.

"We feel we have been pushed around hither and tither. We decided now is the time to take a

"We're delighted it worked out," he added.

#### **ANTI-DUMP CANDIDATES**

Meanwhile, two more candidates for the local elections are to contest under the anti-Superdump/Incineration-Independent umbrella.

Speaking at a protest meeting, Clashmore's Gary O'Halloran realed that the farming leader, John Cashman - a candidate in the Lismore Electoral Area - and Stradbally environmentalist, Roisin O'Shea - a candidate in the Kilmacthomas Electoral Area - are to join the independent grouping that includes three candidates in Youghal and two in the Dungarvan Electoral

Mr. O'Halloran has also claimed that a recent communication from the Dept. of Environment which he says confirms that "super-dumps" will be accepting waste from any part of the country is proof of his claim that Garrynagree landfill will become the "ashtray of Ireland" with incinera-





# BANK OF IRELAND ADVISES CUSTOMERS TO ACTIVELY MANAGE THEIR MORTGAGE

"The vast majority of Irish mortgage holders do not actively manage their mortgage, a practice which could potentially save customers a significant amount of money and also reduce the term of their mortgage," according to Carmel Hutchinson, Financial Advisor Bank of Ireland Dungarvan. Figures released by Bank of Ireland, last December show that only one third of homeowners took decisive action regarding their mortgage in the past 3 years.

Personal mortgage management products available to variable rate mortgage customers range from simple solutions, such as lump sum repayment, term reduction or fixed overpayment to the more sophisticated, such as index linking, which allows the customer to increase their monthly repayments by a percentage of their choice on an annual basis.

The most popular mortgage management option exercised by Bank of Ireland customers is Term Reduction, with most people choosing to knock 5 years off the term of their loan. Carmel Hutchinson explains: "A €150,000 loan over 20 years would mean a monthly repayment of €876.83 (APR 3.6%). If a customer opted to reduce this term to 15 years, the monthly repayments would increase to €1078.90, an in-

crease of €202.07 per month (assuming an APR of 3.6%). However, over the entire term of the mortgage, the savings on interest payments would represent €16,200 and of course the customer has the benefit of the loan being fully paid 5 years early."

A customer making a lump sum payment of €1,000 on a €150,000, 20-year mortgage will save €1,048 euro in interest repayments and reduce the term by 3 months. A fixed overpayment of €50 euro per month on the same mortgage will save the customer €5,083 in interest repayments and reduce the term of the mortgage by 19 months. A customer that chooses to increase their monthly repayment by 1% each year (index linking) will result in €5,669 in interest—reduction and 28 months in term reduction.

The Bank of Ireland figures further reveal that younger people are much more likely to actively manage their mortgage, with half of the customers availing of mortgage management options being first time buyers. Trading up buyers accounted for 25% and equity release and investors made up the balance (19% and 6% respectively).

Married people were found to be twice as likely to avail of accelerated repayment options compared to single people showing that where financial management is concerned, two heads may be better than

Although only a small proportion do so, customers can also avail of flexible repayment options - products designed to allow them pay their mortgage when and how they wish. Of the 5% of homeowners that choose to avail of a flexible option, 3% opted for a 'Mortgage Break' - where the customer can take a break of up to three consecutive months off their repayments, ideal for those taking a career break or having a baby. 2% opted for the 'Omit Month' - which allows customers defer their repayments for one or two months during the calendar year, most popular at Christmas and during the summer holidays.

Commenting on the concept of mortgage management, Carmel Hutchinson said: "Bank of Ireland would encourage all mortgage customers to actively manage their mortgage. Obviously, this will depend on the capacity of each individual customer to repay more and what type of mortgage they have. There are more options open to those with a variable rate mortgage but there are still options for those on a fixed rate."


# Build your own nature reserve

ASIMPLE pond can add a new dimension to your garden and all it takes is a little bit of cash and a determined effort. It can be a home to wildlife, a nature reserve in miniature attracting frogs, newts, toads and dragonflies. And can also make an attractive environment for the array of beautiful plants that thrive in bogs and on water margins. Building a pond

THE first step is to choose a site - and this is more important than you may think.

An open, sunny location is best, as far away from leaf-fall as possible but close to a hose or water supply.

Then choose a shape - whether you prefer curves or straight lines, you should avoid having areas of the pond that are too narrow as they stop the water from circulating



properly. Building a pond inevitably takes some digging whether you use a ready-moulded pond or form your own shape with a PVC or butyl rubber liner, you'll have to go down around 3ft in the centre.

This ensures the pond is deep enough to have its own selfsustaining environment and will be less susceptible to becoming stagnant and lifeless. Ponds that are too small or too shallow are less likely to thrive.

Leave a ledge around 12 to 18 inches deep and a similar width around the edge of the pond.

This is for your shallow-water plants.

Ready moulded linings have the advantage of strength and longevity - but they cost more and are more difficult to fit. If you are using one, be careful to fill in any spaces between the liner and the soil, preferably with sand.

If you are using a PVC or butyl rubber liner, choose one with a guarantee of at least ten years.

You don't want to be re-lining your pond too often. It is important to make sure there is no danger from sharp stones, so before you fit the liner cover the bottom of your pond with sand and line the sides with wet newspaper.

To calculate the size of liner you need, measure the length and width of the pond at the widest places and add twice the maximum depth, plus an extra two feet. If your pond is 6ft by 6ft and 3ft deep, your liner will need to measure 14ft square. Spread it over the pond, pushing it in at the middle and leaving an even overlap on each side.

Hold the edges down with bricks or rocks and gradually fill it from the centre with a hose. The water is heavy and will stretch and mould the liner until it fits perfectly into the hole. Once it is full you can trim the liner around the edges so there is an overlap of just a few inches. Put stones or slabs around the edge of the pond - and you are ready to add your plants.

# THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

#### Stop early-flowering chrysanthemums

From time to time during this month the growing tips of rooted cuttings should be pinched out.

The ideal moment is when the cuttings are well rooted, growing freely and about six-inches high.

This should only be done to those plants being grown specifically to produce a lot of flowers, the objective being to produce a number of sprays or branches on each. With this in mind, the plants should be stopped again in June. Plants intended for individual flowers, perhaps for display purposes, use a different method and they should not be stopped now.

#### Sow french beans under glass

For a supply of tender fresh young beans in July, sow now in seed boxes or pots to get an early start.

Sowing in post has the added benefit of avoiding any root disturbance later.

Place one seed in each pot, cover with a little soil and put to germinate in a greenhouse or heated frame.

The ideal temperature is about 13C but no harm will be

done if it falls a little below this occasionally. Frost will kill the bean, however, so don't be too anxious to

harden off until late May. Place early tomatoes in final pots

Tomatoes from a January sowing should be ready for final potting. Alternatively, they can be grown in boxes or planted directly into a border of compost prepared on staging or even on the ground if the greenhouse is a light one with low walls or glass to ground level.

Choose a suitable peat-free compost.

#### Thin out overgrown water plants

Pond maintenance can include thinning out some of the more overgrown water plants, but to avoid this problem in future try less invasive types such as water iris and marsh marigold.

# **Extended Town Boundary Would** Give Town More Political Clout

A Fianna Fail Town Councillor called for the Dungarvan's town boundary to be extended in a bid to strengthen the town's political clout, and to enfranchise rate payers who live outside the present boundary.

Cllr. Damien Dillon put forward a notice of motion calling on the council to request the Minister for the Environment, Martin Cullen to alter and extend the boundary to encompass various estates built and/or being built or planned in the towns environs.

Cllr. Dillon listed five reasons for suggesting the change to the boundary including that there maybe businesses who investigated setting up in Dungarvan who decided not to do so because the 7,000 people inside the boundary is not sufficient; politically the town would carry more clout if it were perceived bigger; and it would enfranchise business people outside the town boundary.

He said: "The growth around the town is important from the planning perspective, in that, we are looking down the road at a new by-pass. This should be located sufficiently far out, this time, so that it does not become so surrounded by development that it ends up as a through-pass as has happened already to the

"Lets learn from the mistake." he said.

However, his proposal met significant opposition, and his comregarding "disenfranchised" rate payers were described as electioneering.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) quipped that there "must be an election coming" while Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) said, "the last people to be concerned that all rate payers have a vote were the unionists" referring to the practice of Gerrymandering.

Any request would also have to be delayed until the end of the year at the earliest as the Minister no longer has the power to extend the boundary under a recent Local Government Act, and the Boundary Commission which oversees that function has not yet

He agreed that things were currently "in limbo" regarding the extension of the Town Boundary.

He went on to say that Dungarvan is "not choked" for land on which to develop. "If that became the case we would have to use CPO's. When making submissions to any body, for example the IDA, he said the council always includes the population for the greater Dungarvan area.

"I would not see the need for the boundary to be extended at

the moment," he said.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Indp) meanwhile stated that if the motion came before the council a few years ago he would have supported it, but he argued that the council has been stripped of its powers. Water services and other services have been given over to the County Council in any case he said, and in a controversial comment, he argued that the Town Council is in danger of being put out of business in ten years time if the current trend continues.

However, Cllr. Dillon's party colleague, Cllr. Nuala Ryan said the Town Boundary in some areas is dictated by whether you live on one side of the road or the other. In some areas, people on one side of the road are paying Town Council waste charges and on the other they're paying County Council charges.

She said this situation was "lu-

This argument was rejected by Cllr. Kyne who said no matter where they put the boundary that problem was going to happen. He said if a motion for a boundary extension was put forward it must be based on "very serious points." But he disagreed with Cllr. O'Riordan's argument that the Town Council had "no muscle".

"The only time we don't have







# Community Bus Services Continue for 2004

The rural bus services in County Waterford, established under the National Rural Transport Initiative, will continue operating in 2004, the final year of a two-year pilot project. Results from the operation of the services will form part of a national evaluation of the 34 projects established throughout the country. This evaluation will in turn be considered by the Department of Transport when developing its programme of services for 2005.

#### **OPERATION OF THE SERVICES TO DATE**

Waterford Rural Transport Task Group, chaired by Cllr. Mary Green, carried out an evaluation in January of the operation of the project in 2003. The Task Group decided to continue all services set up in 2003, bar one. The discontinued service, which operated on Saturdays to Dungarvan from the Modeligo, Ballinamult and Tooraneena area, failed to attract enough passengers to justify continuing into 2004. A service on the same route which runs on Wednesdays will be continued.

Waterford Rural Transport are currently operating twelve services as follows;

All services are aimed at alleviating the problems of people in rural areas who experience difficulty in accessing services due to a lack of transport and are open to everyone. The service is absolutely free for passengers holding the Department of Social and Family Affairs Free Travel or Companion Passes. Children under 12 accompanied by an Adult also travel free, while students pay a €2.00 return fare. All other passengers

#### pay a €4.00 return fare. Where people are unable to get to our buses, we will collect and return them to their homes

Speaking on the continuation the project, James O Donoghue, Rural Transport Coordinator said While many towns and villages are serviced by Public Transport, there are large areas, particularly in the North and West of the County where until the introduction of our services, there was little or no alternatives for people who do not have their own means of transport. Equally for many people the distance to the nearest bus stop was a problem. What makes our service different is that we can offer a door-to-door service to our passengers. Where people are unable to get to our buses, we will collect and return them to their homes.

Waterford Rural Transport is examining ways of linking rural areas with Bus Eireann services. One possible route currently under review would link Rathgormack, Clonea Power and surrounding areas with Bus Eireann Services out of Carrick-on-Suir on Saturdays, allowing people to travel to either Clonmel or Waterford. A further route being looked at would link Stradbally, Bunmahon and surrounding areas with Bus Eireann services out of Kilmacthomas on Saturdays, allowing people to make a return journey from these areas to Waterford.

Waterford Rural Task Group was established by Waterford County Development Board and is supported by Waterford County Council. The Rural Transport Initiative is funded by the Department of Transport under the National Development Plan.

# **DUNGARVAN MUSEUM NOTES**

#### **History Of McGraths Castle**

(Continued from previous week)

The castle stood on one acre and the proprietor was 'Philip McCragh, Irish papist, of Curragh nesledy, deceased'. He also had 83 acres of land nearby called MacCraghs Land of Burgery. The 'census' of 1659 6 gives James Oldfield as owner of the Abbeyside lands, and the Books of Survey and Distribution note that by the late 17th century the lands of Abbeyside, consisting of 407 acres, were divided between Matthew Hoare (45 acres), John Nugent (120 acres), and Sir Richard Osborne (242 acres). The Osborne portion in-

cluded the castle. By the mid-18th century the castle was still in a good state of preservation and retained its Charles Smith writing in 1746 7 had little to say of it except in relation to the Augustinian Abbey: 'The persons who endowed it are said to have been the McGraths, by whom the adjacent castle, with some lands contiguous were given'. More important is the engraved plate of Dungarvan which Smith included in his book. The engraving depicts the south and east sides of Dungarvan sketched from Abbeyside. MacGrath's castle is also depicted, with its roof and two large chimneys on the east and west sides. The parapet remains but without its crenellations. We don't know if the castle was used as a residence at this period. John O'Donovan in his Ordnance Survey Letters of Co. Waterford (1841) 8 gives a more detailed description of the castle:

"It is a lofty square building measuring on the outside 38 feet from east to west and 31 feet 6 inches from north to south and its walls are well grouted and eight feet in thickness. It is six stories high and had two stone arches supporting two of its floors. The quoin stones are chiselled sand stones and all its windows are narrow and quadrangular and formed of chiselled sand stone. Its east side is destroyed to the ground, but the other sides are in good preservation and not less than 90 feet in height.'

The following entry appears in the minute book of Dungarvan U.D.C. for 1 May 1885:

"Ordered that the borough surveyor serve the necessary notice on the owners of the land at Abbeyside on which the old castle stands, to take down the portion of the wall at the top of the castle which is in danger of falling at any moment.

In 1907 Michael Beary the borough surveyor sent the following report to the Waterford and South-East of Ireland Archaeological Society journal: 9

"Mr E. O'Shea, a young classical student home on vacation, has discovered a date (12-18) cut on one of the quoins of north-east angle of the old Abbeyside Cas-

I do not know that it has been quoted or referred to by any of the historians yet. I walked round it twice before I found it, although the scoring is fairly sunk and figures 2 1/2" high. They were covered with a grey film or lichen, and not easily seen. The figures have the appearance of 14th-century script.

Fortunately several photographs of the castle were taken early this century by local photographers such as Edmond Keohan and Richard Edward Brenan. Our top photo shows the collapsed east side with the two vaulted ceilings exposed. A newspaper photo shows the west and south walls; on the top floor can be seen a

double ogee-headed window. To the right is a postcard view showing the north side and a section of the bawn wall (?) to the left. Another shows the south wall and

Friar's Walk. A postcard view by Keohan shows the ruins after the collapse of January 1916, with only the south wall left standing.

Fragments of the walls remained up until the early 1960s, but unfortunately these were removed and now there are no remains visible above ground.







# Sad Tragedy In The Nire Valley

district learned of the news of the tragic accident resulting in the death of 15 1/2 year old Shane Gleeson, Lyre West, Ballymacarbry. His death occurred on his parents farm as he was removing a circular feeder on the transport box of the tractor. The feeder was inclined to fall off, he came off the tractor to right the feeder and as he did so the feeder fell over on him killing him instantly. His father who was waiting for the feeder sent his younger brother, 8 year old Conor to find what the delay was, he found his brother

It was with deep regret the dead under the feeder. He went back to his father with the sad news. Help was quickly on the scene as was Rev. Fr. Patrick Condon, Fourmilewater, Newcastle. His remains were removed to the Regional Hospital, Waterford where a post mortem was carried out.

Shane was an up and coming sports person as a hurler with Fourmilewater underage, as a footballer with the Nire and an outstanding soccer player with Pinewood. He was a pupil of Clonmel High School where he played on the school team. On Saturday last his team mates on

the Pinewood team were togged out on the field awaiting Shane when they received the sad news which left them saddened and dumbfounded. On Sunday evening Shane's remains were removed from Condon's Funeral Parlour, Clonmel to his Parents Jim and Mary Gleeson's home at Lyre West, Ballymacarbry. On Tuesday morning at 10:00am his remains were removed to St. Helena's Parish Church in the Nire Valley. On arrival requiem Mass was celebrated and after Mass he was laid to rest in the family plot beside his infant sister Karen who predeceased him by some 19 and a half years.

#### Late Mr. Andrew McGrath

It is with deep and sincere regret the district learned of the unexpected passing of Mr. Andrew (Andy) McGrath, Abbey Road, Clonmel. Andy had been active and in his usual good spirits at the time, which made his passing all the more poignant.

A native of Tipperary Town, he was one of four brothers, Richie is now the sole survivor of the McGrath family. Having completed his education and still in his teens, he moved to Clonmel and worked with farmers in the area. Subsequently employed by Suttons in Gladstone Street, he reconnected with the farming community as well as making contact with people from other backgrounds. It was to be a most satisfying period of his life especially working with the likes of Simon Molloy and Jackie Dunne, the three of them became great old pals over the years, enjoying each others company and developing a wonderful rapport with the customers. In the mid 60's he married Agnes McCabe from River Street and they had two children, John and Catherine. They resided for twenty years in Kickham Park followed by eight years in Irishtown before moving to Abbey Road in 2001.

Andy loved a joke, the banter, the craic and according to his son John, his conversation was invariably about sport which he had a great knowledge of whether it was soccer, hurling, the horses or whatever, he always had some telling comments to make. As John said, he knew all the players and the horses, and had something to say about each of them, having spent an hour every day studying form which also kept his mind so alert.

A decade or so ago his son John emigrated to New Mexico, but continued to come home twice or three times each year. And though Andy had never been to New Mexico he was nonetheless fascinated with the culture of the place, having received graphic accounts of that beautiful, scenic state with it's Spanish fiestas and Indian ceremonies, from his son who communicated with him frequently. Local history too, was an interest of Andy's, study of people and places having given him so much pleasure as he was forever tracking back families, his wife remarking that he seemed to know every-

A religious man he had a devotion to St. Anthony and got so much solace visiting the Friary church. Just ten years ago he began going on pilgrimages to Lourdes and had been to Italy with his wife, as well as having visited the Holy Land in 2000. On his travels he always looked forward to renewing friendships and he used to correspond with people and clerics alike. He loved company and when he went out walking around the environs of the town with his dog Sam, he was always on the look out for someone with whom he could chat. In recent years he so much enjoyed the Friary Day Care Centre in Irishtown where he used to meet with friends for a cup of tea or a game of bingo. Most relaxing for him was a social drink in Carey's with his friends, talking about sport and the latest news of the day of which he was well informed, the smoking ban being the big topic of conversation just before he died. But as he gleefully remarked he had given up the cigarettes two years ago

His remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church, Irishtown where they were blessed and received by Very Rev. Fr. Robert Power C.C. St. Mary's. On the following morning, requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Robert Power C.C. assisted by Rev. Fr. Billy Meehan P.P., Holy Family, Waterford and Rev. Fr. P. J. Fagan, St. Oliver's Clonmel. After Mass the funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel where he was laid to rest.

#### Late Mrs. Ethel O'Shea

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mrs. Ethel O'Shea (nee Hayes), Newtown Lower, Carrick-on-Suir. She died as was her wish, surrounded by her family in the serene and tranquil setting of her own home.

She was born in Chicago in 1919 to Daniel and Marie Hayes. The family returned to Doonbeg, Co. Clare in 1921, she was the eldest of 12 children, eight girls and four boys, six of whom sadly predeceased her.

A native Irish speaker, she was educated in Doonbeg National School, before attending

Colaiste Ide and Colasite Bhrigide for her secondary education where in her Junior Certificate exam she attained 1st place in Ireland, a feat that she also attained in her Leaving Certificate.

RECENT DEATHS

Having had many job offers she decided on teaching as her chosen profession, given her love of children.

She attended Mary Immaculate Training College in Limerick where she was awarded 1st class honours. Once she qualified in 1940 her first teaching post was at Cranny National School in Co. Clare, an arduous trip that she made by bicycle on a daily basis in all sorts of weather. She came to Carrick-on-Suir and taught in the Presentation Convent and also for at time in Portlaw. Whilst in Carrick-on-Suir she met her late husband John O'Shea, a native of Faugheen. They married in 1944 and together they purchased a bar and grocery at 38 Main Street, turning it into a thriving business. During this time in business their generosity and kindness shown to people in Carrick-on-Suir during hard times and widespread emigration is widely accepted. They went on to be the parents of seven children, one of whom died at a young

Having retired from business in 1969 they went on to build a new home in Newtown Lower, as she was by now Principal teacher of Newtown Upper National School She was never one to rest on her laurels, she immediately set about trying to cultivate community spirit in the surrounding areas, and by her leadership she set up a branch of the I.C.A. in Faugheen. She also helped set up Faugheen Sports Day in order to raise funds for the upkeep of the school.

Sadly in 1975 her beloved husband John passed to his reward following a long illness. As was her way she engrossed herself in work and helping people. She continued teaching at Newtown school until her retirement in 1985, where upon her life took on a new meaning. At 66 she learned to swim, believing you are never too old to learn a new skill. She joined the Apostolic Society and got great enjoyment in helping to make the vestments that would be sent out to the Foreign Missionaries. A deeply caring and religious person, she attended Mass each day and believed that the power of prayer could overcome any obstacle that life could throw at you. She always looked out for, and helped the needy in any way that she could. Her passing was a very moving and serene occasion, surrounded as she was by her family.

Her remains were waked at home for two nights before removal to Walshe's Funeral Home. As she was being removed from the house for the last time, both sides of the drive way were lined with people and Slievenamon was sung as the hearse pulled away. Following removal from Walshe's Funeral Home to St. Patrick's Church, Faugheen the remains were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Pat Cooney P.P., Carrick-on-Suir, Faugheen assisted by Rev.

Fr. Pat Fitzgerald P.P., St. Paul's

As her coffin was carried into the church by her sons and sons-in-law, a beautiful rendition of The Cuallain was played on the Clarinet by Harry Doherty. ### **ADDICTION CENTRES** CAN'T COPE

Aiseiri, the Cahir, Co. Tipperary based addiction treatment service cannot keep up with the demand for places given the increasing levels of drink and drug addiction among young people The founder of Aiseiri, Sister Eileen Fahey said young people in their twenties and thirties were engaged in abnormal levels of drinking and this was complicated by a mix of drugs such as hash and ecstasy and more serious drugs at the same time.

Sister Fahey, who founded Aiseiri, 21 years ago, said Aiseiri residential centres in Cahir, Wexford and Waterford cannot keep up with the demand for places. There is a much greater demand than we can respond to, we have a waiting list of over 6 weeks and there is a waiting list in each centre said Sister Eileen. She said those people on waiting lists were living in fear and anxiety and said addiction needed to be recognised much more as a reality by the Government. Addicts are swamped in active addiction, they are immersed in depression and their families are traumatised by their addiction she said. Sister Eileen said that Health Boards had improved significantly but the increase in addictions were there for all to see and there simply were not enough centres to keep up with demand from addicts who were ready to face their addictions and make a radical change in their lives. Up to ten years ago nearly all their patients were addicted to alcohol, today alcohol alone accounts for only 50% of the clients they take on their residential programmes.

#### 1986- THE YEAR OF THE SPUD

I came across some newspaper cuttings from the mid 80's during the week and they made for interesting reading .I was in exile those times and missed out on the most eventful and successful decade, at adult level ,in the clubs history. The foundations had been laid by Eamonn De Paor and others in the late 60's and throughout the 70's as under age western and county titles rolled in like Harleys at a Biker's convention. The quality coaching at under age level paid dividends, it always does, and skilful exciting hurling ,fluid and fast became the hallmark of Tallow, teams. As boys grew to men they would be asked to prove themselves on the bigger stage when promoted to senior status .They knew how to win county titles, they had been fed this diet from an early age and annexed their first senior title in 1980. The natural progression of years of carefully cultivated craft culminated in back to back titles in '84 and '85. Tal-

low had reached the zenith of its hurling power but who could have predicted their dramatic demise when as defending county champions they suffered the ignominy of relegation in '86. Some semblance of solace was at hand. The minor hurlers of '86 took on the mantle of standard bearers under the captaincy of Kieran Murphy. On an August Friday evening in Cappoquin they turned in a brilliant display of stickwork to regain the Western title in glorious fashion, defeating Lismore on a scoreline of 2-13 to 2-04. Lismore led by a single point at half time. Within 40 seconds of the restart, according to the reports of the day, Spud had bagged a goal and a point. (The Legend never managed that on his best day ever.) Tallow were rampant. A brace from David Henley, another point from Spud, before young Mark Geary (he could only be 15 at most at the time) sealed it with a goal. David Henley scored his fourth point and Dermie brought his total to three. Job done.

# **Optimism Over OSI Decentralisation**

County Manager, Donal Connolly confirmed that he is optimistic" that decentralisation will work and that steady progress is being made towards its implementation.

Mr. Connolly was answering a question from Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) at the April meeting of Local Authority. He said he has been in contact with senior officials in the Ordnance Survey of Ireland agency in the last twelve weeks, and while a lot of work must still be done, he's confident it will happen - although he didn't give any time-frame that he expected it to take place in.

Minister Charlie McCreevy previously said decentralisation will take place in January next year. His comments followed the publication of the Flynn Implementation Report into decentralisation.

The report, which is available from the Department of Finance, doesn't give any time-frames, but says the issue is a complex one. The implementation group also states it is happy that it will be successful in addressing the needs of the Civil Servants and of providing the full economic and social benefits to the towns and cities where agencies and departments will be located.

# **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

### QUESTION

A friend of mine from South Africa is living in Ireland. Can he vote in any elections here?

## **ANSWER**

Your friend can vote in local elections, such as the elections in June, and may be able to vote in other elections, depending on his citizenship.

First of all, in order to vote in an election in Ireland you must be registered to vote. A new Electoral Register is compiled each year by each local authority for its area and it is published on 1 November. You can inspect it in the local authority offices, public libraries, post offices and Garda stations

You have until 25 November to make a correction or to have your name included. However, if you miss the dead-line you can apply for inclusion in a Supplement to the Register up to 13 working days before polling day.

To be eligible to be included in the Register you must be at least 18 years of age when the day the Register comes into force on the 15 February. Also you must have been ordinarily resident in the state on 1 September in the year before it comes into force.

Not everybody in the Register is entitled to vote in every election. The right to vote is as follows:

Dáil elections (held every 5 years at least) - Irish and British citizens.

Local elections (held every 5 years) - no citizenship requirement

Presidential elections (held every 7 years) - Irish citizens European elections (held every 5 years) - all EU citizens. Further information is available from the Citizens Information Centre.

## WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?

Many people will be familiar with the above phrase; money comes in and goes out very quickly. Income is generally fixed but does the outflow seem to increase? If too much money is spent, your debts increase which leaves less for spending. Sound familiar?

Do you know exactly what you spend every week? The idea of a budget makes a lot of people shudder as they feel that it will be too restrictive and will take away some of the freedom and pleasure in their lives. Those who have an effective budget say that it puts them in control of their finances and allows them plan for future spending, Whatever type of budget you are responsible for, sit down with those concerned and determine which budget items are necessities, which are "luxuries", and what can be reduced or eliminated. Start to write down all that you spend every day, month (decide on categories i.e. groceries, stationery, hardware, car, rent, mortgage etc,,,,) The results maybe frightening but don't worry you are on the way to getting in control. Once you have a running total over a month or two you can get an average and adjust your spending accordingly. Set yourself a small target "when we have x amount of pounds saved, we will go out for a meal together" - you will enjoy it all the more, when you know that you can really afford it! As you get better at budgeting, don't be afraid to adjust it. If you are too hard on yourself or your family chances are that your budget will not last and it may lead you into a bigger financial crisis.

When making out the budget consider all your outstanding debts and make arrangements to pay them off gradually. If you need help in negotiating with your creditors, please contact our Service who may be able to negotiate for you. Finally, review your budget plan on a regular basis, if you find that you are not allowing enough money in a particular area adjust the figure, but try not to rob Peter to pay Paul, look instead at cost saving ideas. Remember, the rewards of budgeting are that you are in control of your money instead of it being in control of you!

## ANKYLOSING SPONDYLITIS

What is Ankylosing Spondylitis?

Ankylosing Spondylitis is a form of chronic inflammation of the spine and the sacroiliac joints. Ankylosing Spondylitis is a painful, progressive, rheumatic disability, it mainly affects the spine, but it can also affect other joints, tendons and ligaments. Inflammation occurs at the site where certain ligaments or tendons attach to bone (enthesis). This is followed by some erosion of bone at the site of the attachment (enthesopathy). Over time, chronic spinal inflammation can lead to a complete cementing together (fusion) of the vertebrae, a process called ankylosis.

What are the symptoms of AS?

The symptoms of AS include the following:

- Joint Pain (usually beginning in the lower end of the spine in a joint known as the sacroiliac joint) the pain is gradual over weeks or months, rather than hours or days
- Stiffness in the spine especially early in the morning
- Persistent pain-for more than three months
- Feeling better after exercise, and feeling worse after rest
- Weight loss, especially in the early stages
- Fatigue
- Feeling feverish and experiencing night sweats

AS can affect other joints in the body causing pain and swelling in the hips, knees and ankles. AS is a unpredictable disability and is subject to remission and relapse.

The cause of AS is not known, but research into the disability has shown that over 90% of people with the disability all share the same genetic cell marker – Human Leucocyte Antigen B27 (HLA-B27). However, not every person possessing this gene will develop the condition.

What is the Treatment and Outlook for Ankylosing Spondylitis?

The main objectives of treatment are to relieve pain and to limit the extent of joint damage thereby maintaining the maximum level of movement in affected joints. Most people with AS take non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, these reduce the inflammation and relieve pain and stiffness. Exercise is very important, and adequate back support when sitting down. AS usually affects people between the ages of 15 and 35, and it usually affects men. It is not possible to prevent AS, but early diagnosis can limit the extent of joint damage, and can limit the extent of permanent disability.

Paint manufacturers produce trade literature giving detailed instructions on correct painting procedures. This is available from paint suppliers. Paint manufacturers also provide a service to customers who need advice or encounter problems.

Look for paint with a brand name, a proper product information leaflet and a contact address and telephone number. This indicates willingness to give a good backup service. The quality of paint without a brand name or product information could be a bit

If the instructions are followed carefully satisfactory results will be obtained. Check the product information for details on the volume solids and the coverage rate. The volume solids should be about 60% for good quality oxide paint. It is not easy to apply the correct film thickness with paints that have low volume solids.

Generally, there should be no need to thin oil based paint with white spirit. This again will reduce the dried film thickness and thus the effectiveness of the paint. Be on the lookout to see that other "thinners" like diesel or paraffin are not used to thin the paint! Be wary of paint in 200 litre barrels. They are awkward to handle and the solids tend to settle out.

The coverage rate will indicate how much paint you will need and give an indication of how much the job will cost. Oxide paint has a coverage rate of 12-14 m2/litre. Allow for the corrugations when estimating the coverage area.

## Safety and Environment

Safety with painting should be a top priority. All the hazards are there: chemicals, fragile roofs, slips trips and falls, power tools, dust and noise, etc. Plug the rain water pipes and gullies - don't let washings, old paint or paint removal chemicals into the clean

## **Appropriate Colours**

The choice of colour for a farm building is not a matter for subjective preference but rather a function of good design. However, different individuals have different perceptions of colour. Colours and forms of new buildings should, as far as possible, harmonise with those of existing buildings on the farm and with those traditional in the area. Many farmyards have buildings painted with a range of different colours and shades. This situation should be resolved over time by using a suitable colour scheme that compliments without clashing.

## **Existing colours**

The first thing to check for when you look around a farmyard is to see how many different colours there are. Check for defective paint, peeling, fading, and different shades. There is a lot of money invested in the farm buildings and for a little bit more the life of the sheds could be lengthened and the farmyard turned into a more pleasant working environment.

## Colour minimises impact

Correct colour can minimise the impact of buildings on the landscape. Zinc and aluminium zinc alloy coated reflective roof cladding should be painted an appropriate colour to minimise the intrusive impact on the landscape. Dark colours reduce the apparent size of bulky buildings, whereas light or reflective colours magnify their apparent size. The dark roof colour should be extended to the upper gable, upper eaves and large doors. Appropriate roof colours are dark grey (blue grey or blue black), very dark green, dark brown and russet (traditional red-oxide colour). Fibre cement sheeting is available in these colours and also in the natural unpainted grey that weathers down to a darker shade over time. This can look particularly well through deciduous trees in winter and in contrast to or camouflaged by green foliage in summer. Red oxide is traditional in some areas and while it can draw attention to buildings it looks very well, particularly when used with white.

## What colours?

The trend in the choice of colour for new sheds varies from place to place, depending on the personal preferences and on the influence of the colours in the local landscape. In the early 90's there was a big preference for dark grey. Part of the reason for this was that the other options were not as available as they are today. Now the choice of colour for new sheds is not as biased in favour of one over others, although in general russet seems to be less favoured. There are dozens of shades of green. Medium or bright shades of green tend to clash with natural colours. The natural surroundings also change. In Ireland bright green or yellow-green predominates for several weeks after bud-break. The shade darkens progressively to dark green in July-August, to brown, yellow, orange or red in September/October and to greys, browns, blues (conifers) and blacks in winter. These shades cover a large part of the full spectrum. Colours of walls should always be lighter than colour of roofs. Use light colours on walls such as the natural colour of stone or concrete. Pointed blockwork, mass concrete or nap plaster finishes are ideal. A cement wash is a cheap way to restore colour to stained concrete. Traditional whitewash can look very well in older farmyards.

Doors, windows, fascias, bargeboards and plinths can be painted in brighter colours. Highlighting features such as windows and small doors in bright colours helps break the monotony of long walls. It is a pity that more attention is not paid to building detail such as roof overhangs, spaced boarding and flashing on corners and over sliding doors on new farm buildings. These can enhance appearance reducing the apparent height making the building appear "anchored" to the ground.

### **RULES CORNER**

The best thing to do if you are doubtful is to consult the rulebook; otherwise you may ask an experienced golfer - presuming, of course, that s/he knows the answer!

I have been asked to clarify one of the answers from a recent week's rules quiz. It appears to me that if your ball is in a water hazard and a stake is in your way you may remove it if it is movable (see definition of Obstructions). However if it is an immovable obstruction (as they are at Dungarvan G.C.) there is no relief under the rules. If your ball is near (but outside) a water hazard you may move a movable stake; if an immovable stake interferes with your stance or the area of your intended swing you may obtain relief from it by dropping the ball at the nearest point of relief. 

Exactly 50 years ago on May 6th 1954, Roger Bannister, with the help of pacers Chris Brasher and Chris Chataway and coach Franz Stampfl, created a new 'English Native, British National, British All-Comers, European, British Empire and world record' when he smashed the 4 minute mile barrier for the first time at Oxford's Iffley Road Track in a time of 3.59.4. How did he know he would not die?", a Frenchman later asked of Bannister after achieving a goal that, at the time, equaled scaling Everest or sailing alone around the world. Most people considered running four laps of the track in four minutes to be beyond the limits of human speed. Waterford Road Runners in association with Waterford A.C., West Waterford A.C. and St. Senan's A.C., are giving you the chance to go beyond your limit, to create your own personal mile record on May 6th on the tartan at the RSC Track. The first races of the night will be for the junior athletes (male and female), followed by senior athletes, grouped by ability, whether it's for a sub 10 or sub 5 minute mile. Runners of all abilities are welcome to give it a go.

The final race of the night will be for the faster runners, elite, if you will, that turn up for a go at a sub 4, or sub 4.10 minute mile. While the mile is rarely raced now, since the advent of the 1,500 metres, it still holds an almost magical appeal and the annals of Irish athletics are liberally sprinkled with the daring deeds of Delaney, Coughlan, Flynn, O'Sullivan and many others. So if you're as fast as Dawn Run or as slow as Delaney's Donkey, you're more than welcome to come along. Now is the time to dust off the racers and oil up those fast twitch fibres in readyness for battle. 



The easiest winner of the night was the Tom Colfer owned Thatswhatisay (Chart King-Toronto Katie) this 4/1 chance absolutely pulverizing the opposition in the third contest in a ca-

reer best 28.85. Flashing clear from trap six Thatswhatisay was in pole position throughout and with the opposition unable to muster a challenge between them it came as no surprise to see Thatswhatisay triumph by ten lengths over a slow starting Dessies Return.

The Alan Fox owned Best Climber goes from strength to strength and this versatile lady displayed too much early pace for the well backed Rathvilly Park in the early stages of the fourth contest and then had the stamina in the closing stages to hold the challenge of a fast finishing Bally Blue by a length and a half in a smashing 28.78. The Benny Fox owned Determined Pet adapted similar front running tactics in the concluding six bend marathon seeing off the early challenge of Erics Good Thing and Lady Norma before proving two and a half lengths to smart for the evens favourite Related Object in 40.98.

Coming into last Saturday nights fixture the John O'Riordan and Tony Rogers owned and Jim Walshe handled Mystery Night was unlucky not to have shed her maiden tag filling the runner up spot on no less than five occasions in the past so this lady deserved a break and yes folks it all came right in the a two bend sprint as Mystery Night (Spiral Nikita-Night In) 5/2 to 6/4 came out on top in the tightest of finishes. Silken Thomas went up very fast to the first bend but moved off hampering a number of the runners. ## **NEWCOMERS WELCOME**

We have noted with interest several cyclists who have taken up the sport in recent weeks. If you have been doing a bit of cycling on your own, we urge you to take the plunge and join one of our regular club spins. The Sunday Club spin is probably the spin most suited to beginners. It is estimated that you will save approximately 30% of energy by cycling in a group. This is primarily because you can shelter behind another cyclist, and you do not have to expend as much energy against air resistance. Come along and try it out! Lismore and back is a good initial goal to aim for. This is almost entirely a flat spin, with only a few short hills along the course, and is well within reach of beginners

## TIP FOR BEĞINNERS

Extend your spin distance by no more than 10%. If you currently cycle 10 miles, stretch this to 11, then 13 then 15 over on to Camphire, and back via a three or four week interval.

However, you must then consolidate. Do not increase the distance any further for about three weeks, after which the 10% rule can be applied again. In this manner you can stretch the distance that you can comfortably manage to about 20 miles. Try this schedule... 10, 11, 13, 15, 15, 15, 17, 19, 20.

## WICKLOW 200K

We have a team of seven con-

firmed members for Wicklow this year. Training this week should include a long endurance spin of approximately 80 miles. At this stage of the season, extend your time on the bike by about 20 minutes every week on your long spin. Get out for an hour before we meet at Kilrush if you are tied for time at the end of the spin. Add about five miles each week to

this long spin. Put in a few hills along the way. Take a break every third or fourth week, by cycling only a short regular spin, and you will benefit from the rest. We are intending to complete our training with a 100-mile tour to Fermoy and Cork about two weeks before the event


