Fianna Fail Count Cost After Disastrous Showing

Fine Gael missed out on a majority on Waterford County Council by just a single seat as Fianna Fail took a battering in a near disastrous showing in the local elections - incurring seat losses or a downturn of first preference share in almost all electoral areas.

The count, which went into the early hours of Sunday night and continued for the Dungarvan Electoral Area with a Sunday afternoon recount, saw elation for Sinn Fein - who made an historic breakthrough - and for Fine Gael who gained three seats on the council.

But there was despair for a number of long-serving Fianna Fail candidates.





Establishment of Dungarvan Town Commissioners.

This week our notes are again taken from a talk given by William Fraher to mark the centenary of Dungarvan Urban Council in 1999.

The 1916 Rising

On Monday 15 May 1916 the Urban district Council passed the following resolu-

Unhappy and tragic occurrences in Dublin: -

Resolution passed regretting the recent and tragic occurrences that occurred in Dublin, tendering to the citizens our sympathy on the destruction of same and respectfully begs on his majesty's ministers the necessity of mercy in dealing with the rank and file who in the main were unanimous of their position etc.

19 June 1916: - We the Dungarvan Urban District Council protest in the strongest manner against the Partition of Ireland at the instigation of Lloyd George and that we demand the fulfilment of the Home Rule Bill for which the flower of Ireland's sons are presently shedding their blood for in France.

Like most of the other councils the Dungarvan Urban District were not behind the revolutionaries at first, but at the meeting on 19 June the Urban District Council passed

the following resolution: -That we the members of the Dungarvan Urban District Council ask the traders of the town to close their shops during office of high mass tomorrow as a mark of respect to the memory of our fellow countrymen who have been executed in Dublin and elsewhere in Ireland.

EU Sends First Warning On Superdump

Commission **Concerned About Effects On Rare Species**

By Kevin Kirrane

has issued Ireland with its first written warning about Waterford County Council's plans to site a 'Superdump' at Garrynagree, the Lickey Concern

The warning - a Letter of Formal Notice - is the first stage of legal proceedings which can be activated by the commission if it considers EU laws to have been broken.

Although the letter has not been made public, the Lickey Concern Group - which has spearheaded opposition to the landfill - say they were formally notified of the "apparently substantial written text" by the commission.

It's believed the warning centres on fears that several environmental directives are not being respected in relation to the siting of the proposed superdump, and is based on much of the environmental information collected by the Concern

The landfill is proposed to be sited next to an EU designated Special Area of Conservation a designation put in place to protect the habitat of a rare species of shellfish which live

> As is normal practice, the commission has invited Ireland to submit its observations on the issues raised," a statement from the Concern Group says.

> After a time for response has lapsed they can then issue a final written warning which would "clearly and definitely" set out the reasons why it considers EU law to have been bro-

It can also call on Ireland to comply with the directives within a specified period of time - usually two months.



Features liven up your garden

YOU'VE seen all the TV gardening make-over programmes and now it's time to add a new lease of life to your

But its easier said than done if you



aren't an experienced gardener, but here are a few ideas to get you in the mood.

■ Patios. Think about building a patio at the back of your house - it

garden. The careful selection of the right type of brick or paving stone can make all the difference to the look you want to

achieve. There is a patio to suit every garden, from crazy paving to geometrically designed patterns of red brick, so make sure that it blends in with your home and surroundings.

■ Barbecues. A popular garden feature is a solid brick barbecue - perfect for entertaining during the warmer months of the year. Make sure that it is in a good position before you fix it in place.

■ Paths. Make your garden a little more exciting with a path.

Be as creative as you dare, using a combination of colours and types of brick, block or paving stone, thinking all the time about blending in with the surroundings.

You could be daring and have a twisting winding path which circles your garden, or a opt for the more formal look with a straight path.

Borders. Build up your borders. Raised beds will give your garden more depth and make it easier for you to look after your plants.

Other features. Features are a simple and easy way to enhance the look of your garden and are often relatively easy to maintain. Timber arches, walls, seat, benches

and water-features are all becoming more popular all over the country and give an added focal point to the garden.

If you don't want to try anything too permanent. Test out the theory by buying a set of table and chairs which you can collapse and put away during the winter.

This week in the garden

Any shrubs that flowered during May or early June can be pruned, but this is not to say that pruning is always necessary. Much depends on the purpose for which the shrub is being grown and the amount of space that you can spare for it.

Take pink pipings

Now is the time to propagate pinks by cuttings. Select healthy looking, non-flowering shoots 10 to 13 cm long and pull them out at a joint.

This is known as taking a 'piping'. Insert these pipings firmly, 5 cm deep and about 10 cm apart each way, in sandy soil, preferably in a frame, but failing this in a shady border outdoors and keep well watered. They should be well rooted and ready for planting out by the end of September.

Sow French Beans

Make a sowing of French beans in a sheltered place outdoors. Sow the seeds singly about 15 cm apart in drills 5 cm deep. Plant two drills about 23 to 30 cm apart, then an alleyway about 75 cm wide, then another couple of rows and so on. Stop cutting asparagus

It is most unwise to cut asparagus after the third week in June. Allow the plants to make foliage now so that new crowns may be formed for next year. Give the bed a small dressing of any good compound fertiliser.

Spray apples against Codling Moth

If in previous years grubs have been found feeding inside apples during July and August it is probable that the codling moth is responsible, and steps should be taken now to prevent further damage.

They can be controlled by placing pheromone traps containing a sheet of sticky paper in the trees.



BEAKS, FEET AND EGGS

A bird does not have any teeth. It uses its beak for catching and cutting up its food. Birds' beaks are different shapes depending on what type of foot they eat. Birds with long, thin bills use them for probing. Birds with short, strong beaks, such as finches, are usually nut eaters. Beaks that are flattened tend to be used for dabbling through mud. Birds of prey, such as the bald eagle, have strong, hooked beaks for tearing at flesh. Wading birds, such as the avocet have long beaks to probe mud on river beds and beaches. A hummingbird's long beak is ideal for reaching right into tube-shaped flowers. The tucan's colourful beak plays an important part in attracting a mate. The beak is about as long as the toucan's body, but it is not heavy because it is hollow.



COMING IN TO LAND

As it comes to land a bird spreads its tail feathers to act as an air break. It then stretches its legs forwards towards the ground or a perch. Once landed it closes it tail feathers to help it to balance.

EGGS LARGE AND SMALL

The ostrich lays the biggest egg of all. They are creamy white, measure about 20cm (8in) long, up to 15cm (6in) in diameter, and weigh about 1kg (2.2lb). If you wanted to boil one for breakfast it would take about 40 minutes

The smallest bird is the bee hummingbird of South America. It measures just 57mm (2in) from the tip to its beak to the end of its tail - and half of that is the bill and the tail! Hummingbirds lay the smallest eggs, just 1cm

I always felt since I started campaigning ten weeks ago that things were going well for me, and I was very confident of taking a seat," he said.

But I was overwhelmed with the actual vote that I got in town - almost two quotas. I was absolutely delighted that we managed to hold onto our two seats on the Town Council and for me to go on and gain a seat on the county council.'

COMFORTABLE

His first count of 776 mainly came from the urban area, though he picked up over one hundred more votes in the hin-

'It was quite comfortable at the finish - I couldn't have predicted at the outset that it would be comfortable. But, I always felt, I would take it."

Damien Geoghegan had an opportunity to take the seat vacated in November by Deputy John Deasy, but turned it down, opting instead to face the electorate. Cllr. Geoghegan says he always felt this option would give the party the best chance to claim three seats.

While Fine Gael achieved this, there was disappointment for Geraldine Veale who was unable to hold onto the seat she was co-opted to.

Instead, it was newcomer to the political limelight, Pat Nugent a former Glanbia em-



ployee and standing for election for the first-time - who polled extremely well; he received 656 first preferences and took the third Fine Gael seat.

NAIL-BITING FINISH

The count continued until 2am on Sunday morning resulting in a nail-biting finish for the two Labour candidates, Teresa Wright and Fiachra O Ceilleachair who were locked together on 844 votes apiece after the 14th count. However, with the distribution of Cllr. Geoghegan's surplus of 46 on the 15th count, Cllr. Wright edged eight votes clear of her fellow party candidate. Cllr. O Ceilleachair called a recount resulting in the count being adand resuming again on Sunday afternoon.

Upon resumption, a number of slight changes were made, but in the end, Cllr. Wright's ability to attract transfers across the political divide was the decisive factor that helped her secure a county council seat - four votes ahead of Cllr. O Ceilleachair.

NORA FLYNN TRIUMPHS **Lismore Electoral Area**

Fine Gael's strong showing was also visibly evident in the Lismore Electoral



Area, where Cappoquin publican Nora Flynn took a massive 1,012 first preferences - more than fifty ahead of nearest rival

Her performance proved a vindication for Flynn following the reversal she suffered at the hands of her near neighbour, Cathy McGrath, when the local party machine choose McGrath over her at the party's first selection convention.

However, all that was a distant memory for Flynn as she was hoisted onto the shoulders of delighted supporters after her comfortable election on the third count.


'It's history now," she said on Monday about the party snub. "It's water under the bridge."

She added that: "We were hoping for two seats in Lismore. And to hold those two seats and for me to top the poll - its just out of this world. It's just sinking in now."

DOOCEY SECURES SECOND SEAT

Fianna Fail's hopes of capitalising on the perceived troubles within the Fine Gael camp by taking three of the four seats in the Lismore Electoral Area were quickly dashed.

Tallow's James Tobin polled strongly with a first preference of 851, but there was ment - and



for a time some concern - within the Wilkinson camp after his first count of 827 was well down on his father, Ollie Wilkinson's, result at the last election.

Bernard Leddy, who celebrated his poll-topping retention of his Lismore Town Council seat hours earlier, was edged out by Declan Doocey (FG) who attracted enough transfers from Cathy McGrath to take a seat on the sixth count.

SINN FEIN MAKE BREAKTHROUGH **Dungarvan Town Council**

Earlier, Sinn Fein had the first success of the day in Dungarvan Town Council with Brendan Mansfield securing a seat on the seventh count. Mansfield was lifted onto his supporters shoulders, and punched the air in delight at his history making achievement.

But, for the Dungarvan based architect, Damien Dillon - who joined Fianna Fail shortly before the election - the writing was on the wall early on.

Dillon made a brief appearance at the count early on Saturday, but the tallies confirmed by the first count put him out of the running for the final shake-up.

FINAL SHAKE-UP

That final shake-up was instead to involve two of his party colleagues, Ann Marie Rossiter - the Chamber of Commerce president - and Nuala Ryan as well as three Labour Councillors - Fiachra O Ceilleachair, Paddy Power and Lar Hart - who fought it out for three seats.

Upon elimination, and with Fred Forsey of Fine Gael poised one

Fred Forsey vote from the quota to take the fifth seat behind Teresa Wright, Hart just two votes behind Paddy Power - called for a recount.

However, on the following morning, Hart withdrew his request and the count resumed with the

three remaining seats filled Ryan, Rossiter and leachair.

longserving councillor and the outgoing Mayor of Dungarvan, Paddy Power and his colleague Lar Hart lose their seats - a result greeted with dismay by the Labour camp.

him over many years. "Obviously Cllr. O Ceilleachair's loss of his council seat is a major disappointment to him and to the party locally and nationally. I know that all these losses impact on the candidates and their families equally, but, over time, people will move on."

Some six thousand people marching in Clonmel on Saturday, 5th June brought the place to a standstill, as they marched through the town centre to demand the opening of the new wing at South Tipperary General Hospital. The state-of-the-art new facilities which cost 30 million euro to build include wards, operating theatres, and an intensive care unit. All those have been completed since March '03, but lie idle because the Government has not sanctioned an annual two million euro to pay staffing. Banna Chluain Meala led the huge crowd of people of all ages from Irishtown to the main guard where speeches were given by Dr. Paud O'Regan, G.P., Dr. Mike Quirke and Lily Carey who spoke on behalf of the patients at the hospital. The Mayor of Clonmel Ald Phil Prendergast, said the huge crowd had spoken with their feet. It was clear the people of South Tipperary no longer wanted hospital services divided between Clonmel and Cashel. Dr. O'Regan welcomed the great turnout. This was a serious situation, as everyone was well aware. The division of the acute hospital services passed a major risk for all of us. No-one at the march knew the day or the hour when they might get sick and they all had family members who had been sick if somehody developed complications, they risk from the divided hospital services.

FLOWER FESTIVAL IN LISMORE CATHEDRAL

Next weekend St. Carthage's Cathedral in Lismore will be the centre of a magnificent Flower Festival. The whole cathedral will be lecorated with flowers and the idea is that every decoration represents a Saint. The preparations have gone on for quite a while now, co-ordinated by Gwen Roe and many have accepted the challenge to contribute with their own floral creation.

The festival coincides with the Immrama Festival in Lismore and will start Friday at 2 p.m. The Cathedral will also be open on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and on Sunday from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. There will be plant and produce stalls, organised by Sally Perceval Maxwell and light refreshments will be available, supervised by Connie Dowd.

During the Festival, Cathedral organist Jan van Putten will present three short recitals of organ music, featuring music focusing on flowers, gardens and nature in general. Throughout the centuries composers have been inspired by living nature - the programme will contain music by Martin Peerson (The Primerose) and Girolamo Frescobaldi from (Flori Musicali) who were born in the 16th century but also a very recent composition called The Secret Rose by Eric Sweeney, Organist and Choirmaster of Christ Church Cathedral in Waterford. The organ recitals take place on Saturday at 3 p.m. and 4.30 p.m. and on Sunday at 4.00 p.m.

There will also be an abundance of music during the religious services on Sunday. In the morning service, beginning at 11.30, St. Carthage's singers will contribute with the communion service by Charles Villiers Stanford in B flat and with John Rutters delightful "For the Beauty of the Earth". There will be a special closing service at 5 p.m., this service will offer an opportunity to hear the Cathedral Junior Choir, a group of young singers expertly trained by Cindy

Adults are expected to pay 3 euro and families 5 euro. Admission of children is free when accompanied by an adult.

This Flower Festival will contribute tremendously to all celebrations that will take place in Lismore during the weekend. 



There was a doubt about the venue and strong representations were made by the Limer-

Now that the euphoria of the ick county board and the county council to have the final played there, the first since the massive redevelopment programme which cost approximately ell million.

Both Waterford and Cork insisted on the game being played at Semple Stadium and the fixture has been greeted with great something special and adds a relief. Semple Stadium has a 50,000 plus capacity and geographically more accessible. No one wanted to again experience the nightmare that was Tipperary town after the league final.

Also, the atmosphere in Thurles on Munster final day is lot to the occasion.

Needless to mention, the game against Tipperary has been discussed, debated and analyzed over and over again.

The national media as a whole have praised the quality of the game and agreed that Waterford were the worthy winners. There seems to be general agreement among the 'experts' that the most praiseworthy aspect of their whole display was the manner in which the team as a whole showed such tremendous character when their backs were to the wall in the closing seven or eight minutes. The feeling seems to be that if this quality can be maintained as a part and parcel of our make-up, the future for Waterford hurling is really bright.

A popular comment relates to the team finishing without three of their outstanding players Paul Flynn, Ken McGrath and Tony Browne and still winning.

This was something unimaginable before Sunday.

A local lady who is a diehard supporter told me last week "when you are writing about the match now be sure not to make heroes put of a few of them because everyone of them 'burst their guts' trying

I know that the majority of supporters share the same feeling but it would be difficult not to mention the two young newcomers to Munster championship, Paul O'Brien, whose splendidly taken goal proved our winning score and Brian Wall who was thrown into the cauldron of Munster championship to replace the mighty Tony Browne at the last moment. Both players will remember this experience for the rest of their lives, regardless of what they may achieve later.

The game against Tipperary was so different from the clash with Clare that some are inclined to the view that this was not as good a game (obviously because we did not hammer Tipp in the same manner in which we disposed of the Banner county)

In the opinion of Justin Mc-Carthy this was a far more difficult match to win and he told WLR that this was a great game and a very difficult one to win and he said that it was as good a game as he had ever played in. He said all the players were magnificent.

Our old 'enemy' Ger Loughnane writing in the Daily Star believes that Waterford playing to their potential are as good as there is in the country at the present.

Ken Hogan of the Irish Independent paid glowing tribute to the quality of the hurling in the Deise county at the present time and Cyril Farrell on the "Sunday Game" programme believed that there is an All-Ireland in this team.

Of course the post match comment is given balance too and the need 'to keep our feet on the ground' is being emphasized by several and we hear some very well meaning supporters highlighting some of the imperfections that, if persevered with, can effect our progress. On top of the list here is the serious inaccuracy from play and from frees.

This is a matter that many people, not least among them

the management team, will reflect upon.

Against All-Ireland and eague double champions, Kilkenny we performed outstandingly and won by a single point. If I recall correctly we hit 16 wides in that game.

We defeated Cork also by a single point in another thriller and there we hit 16 wides again. And sixteen was the number of wides against Tipperary in the vital final match in the league when we drew to qualify. We defeated Tipperary in the semi-final in Cork ten days ago also by a single point, having hit 14 wides (as against 8 for Tipp). In our last 4 matches we shot a total of 60 wides from frees and from play and while it is a tribute to the team that despite all that, we got to the league final and are now in the Munster final, it must remain a worrying factor for the management team. Sometimes the cost of a single wide can be immeasurable.

The Winning Factor?

It is a truism that every tight game in all sports has a 'winning factor' and while this is seldom applied in a serious way to hurling and football, I have often thought (to myself) that we won, or lost, because of a certain aspect of the game. In some sections of the media the same thing is referred to as the 'turning point.' This description is not always accurate.

I have already written that the result of the game in Cork was an 18 man production as far as we were concerned, but at the same time I do believe that this game had a 'winning factor' and that was the superb performance by our defenceand particularly our halfback line in the dying minutes of the match. I'm sure that I will be even more convinced of this when I see the video.


