## Ballymac' Company, Pinewood Healthcare Announces 150 Jobs

Minister for Health and Children, Micheal Martin announced the creation of an additional 150 jobs at the Pinewood Healthcare manufacturing facility at Ballymacarby. Of the 150 jobs, many of which will be at a highly skilled graduate level, 65 have already been created since the start of the year.

The remaining 85 will be filled over the coming 18 months.

The announcement is a central element of a 19 million

investment programme by Pinewood Healthcare, the largest Irish-owned pharmaceutical company in the country. In addition to the creation of 150 jobs, the expansion will comprise some additional 14,000 sq ft at the company's manufacturing facility which will increase the company's capacity for the production of medicinal products in oral and topical formulations from a current 30 million packs per annum to over 65 million.

Commenting, Minister Martin

said: "Pinewood's investment announcement is not only an important one for Waterford, but also for Ireland Inc. Pinewood Healthcare has succeeded in building a major Irish-owned pharmaceutical company that has made its mark in both national and international markets - in what can be correctly described as a highly competitive sector. In the process they have succeeded in creating sustainable employment for over 285 people."

## Relieved Brothers Celebrate An Bord Pleanala Ruling

An Bord Pleanala has ruled that two ESB pylons must be removed from close to the Ballyneety home of brothers, Frank and Maurice Drummy.

Frank (52) and his invalid brother Maurice (67) have been forced to fight a mammoth battle with the ESB since the semi-state company moved two pylons from their original locations and re-erected them close to their home at Bal-

lyneety Cross near Dungarvan. Frank told the Dungarvan Leader that the concerns they expressed in March 2001 have been vindicated. And, the

brothers are now demanding answers as to why the two pylons were allowed to be erected there.

"We haven't had any answers

as yet from either Waterford County Council or the ESB," he said.

"Both bodies decided to contest this every step of the way. But both bodies haven't given us any answers why. They will have to give those answers now."

SAGA

The saga began in 1999 when permission was granted for the erection of a private dwelling on lands adjoining the Drummy's.

When work commenced on the house, it was found to be in breach of planning as it had been erected too close to the power line.

The council issued an enforcement order on the applicant, ruling that construction of the dwelling should be halted.

This order was later lifted when the applicant produced a letter from the ESB stating that they would move the power line.

### RNLI Dungarvan Bay Sponsored Swim on Sunday

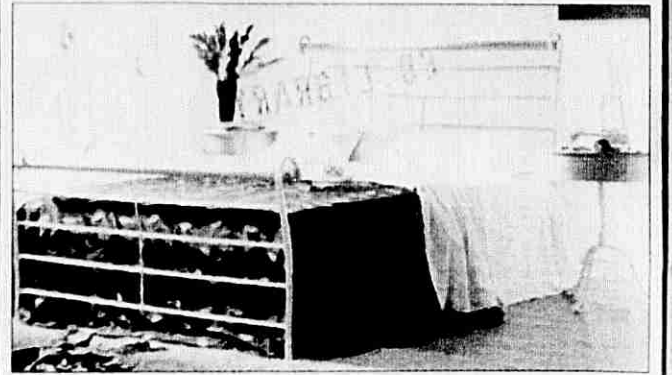

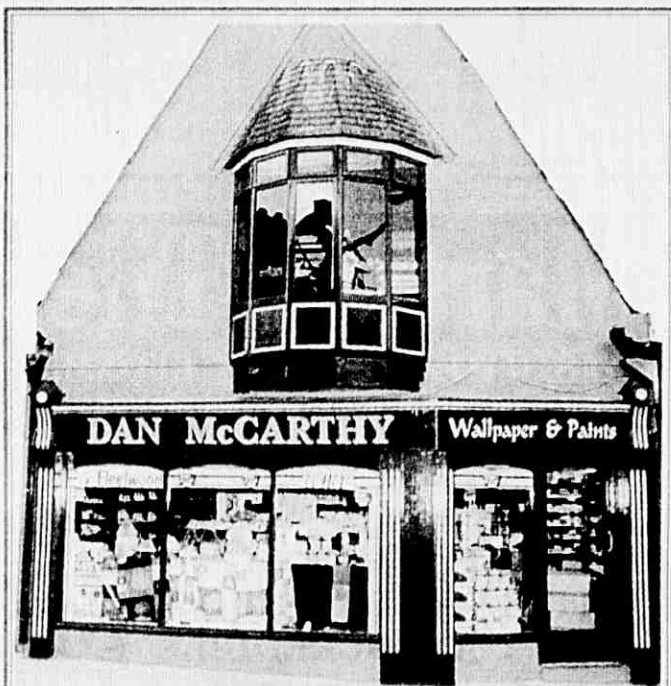

The Old Market House Arts Centre, Lower Main St., Dungarvan, is currently exhibiting "Running of the Deer" by Seamus Kelly.

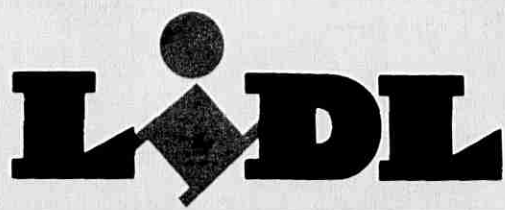
On display in the upstairs gallery are the works of Arthur Maderson and Eve Smith.

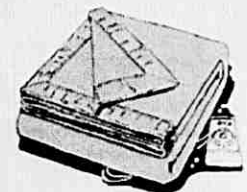

# Design Will Avoid, Reduce and Remedy Impacts — Says Expert

## ORAL HEARING INTO GARRYNAGREE LANDFILL CONCLUDES

A hydrogeologist who is an expert in the design of landfills, said the design features in the Garrynagree landfill are incorporated to avoid, reduce and remedy all likely impacts from the proposed development in terms of emissions to waters, air and soil.

Dan Keohane of Fehily Timoney and Company has worked on a number of Environmental Impact Statements and waste license applications for landfills, and was giving evidence to the Oral Hearing into the Garrynagree landfill recently.

The Oral Hearing concluded with closing submissions from Fehily Timoney & Company and the Lickey Concern Group on Wednesday last.

### MEASURES IN PLACE

Mr. Keohane, a graduate in Applied Geophysics has been part of the design team on five landfills in four counties, said one of the main considerations of the landfill was the management of surface water run-off from the site.

These measures will include the diversion of the stream running through the site, the provision of cut-off drains to collect all potentially contaminated run-off from the earthworks areas, provision of settlement ponds and storage ponds (six in total), and the provision of silt fences within the cut off drains to filter water before reaching the settlement ponds.

"It is intended that the surface water management infrastructure be installed and commis-

sioned prior to the main earthworks at the site. Once the screening embankments are constructed they will be vegetated with grass, shrubs and trees to stabilise them and prevent erosion of soil," he said.

Monitoring surface water quality is proposed for the lifetime of the facility and for the aftercare period in accordance with EPA guidelines, he said.

### NO AFFECTS ON FARMING

Meanwhile, Brendan Fehily of Fehily Timoney contended the landfill will have no adverse effects on local farming. Vermin, pests, flies, and wind-blown litter will also be strictly controlled within the landfill site and will not impact on the surrounding areas, he said.

He said local water supplies

will not be affected because of the stringent containment measures and the naturally occurring protection afforded by the site.

During the proceedings concerns were raised about siltation of the Lickey, contamination of the area, leachate management, proliferation of vermin, flies, birds and litter, odour, dangers of persistent fog in the vicinity of the site and adverse affects on farming.

The affects of traffic were also discussed during the oral hearing.

Inspector Michael Walsh, who visited a number of homes to closest to the landfill site on Thursday evening last, will complete a report on the hearing, and a decision is not expected for over a month at the very least.

## Large Increase In Planning Applications

Waterford County Council dealt with a large increase in planning applications last year, according to the local authorities annual report.

Over five hundred applications more than the previous two years were lodged in 2003. Sixty percent were granted planning permission, and just over 9.2% or 162 applications refused.

The council also investigated 213 unauthorised developments, and issued enforcement notices to 95, and warning notices to 63. However, no injunctions were sought.

Despite the heavier workload the percentage of decisions appealed to An Bord Pleanála fell, and the percentage of decisions overturned by the Bord also fell from 44% in 2002 to 29%.

# COOKERY CORNER

## Hickory Barbecue Burger

These fantastic burgers with all of the trimmings a perfect speedy supper. They would also work very well on the barbecue. When char-grilling make sure you let them cook through properly to avoid them sticking to the hot bars.

Serves 4

- 1 small red or white onion
- 550 g/1 1/4 lb lean minced beef, well chilled (good quality)
- 2 tbsp chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 4 tbsp smoky barbecue sauce
- extra virgin olive oil (pump & spray), for cooking
- 3 tbsp mayonnaise
- 1 tsp Dijon mustard
- 4 floury white buns, halved
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- shredded soft lettuce and tomato slices, to serve

1 Cut the onion in half and finely chop one half, then cut the other half into thin slices and reserve. Place the finely chopped onion in a bowl with the minced beef, parsley and three tablespoons of the barbecue sauce. Season with plenty of pepper. Mix well to combine, then divide into four and, using your hands, shape into firm oblong patties. Place on a flat plate, cover with plastic film and chill for at least 5 minutes or up to 24 hours is fine, until ready to cook.

2 Heat a griddle pan. Spray each burger with a little oil and add to the heated griddle pan. Sear the burgers over a high heat to seal (don't be tempted to move them too quick as they stick to the bars to start with) then reduce the heat and cook for 4-5 minutes on each side or until lightly charred and cooked through; leave them a minute or two longer if you like your burger well done. Place the remaining tablespoon of barbecue sauce in a small bowl and mix



in the mayonnaise and Dijon mustard. Set aside.

3 Remove the burgers from the griddle pan and leave to rest. In the same pan, lightly toast the cut side of the buns. Place onto plates spread over the tangy mayonnaise and add some lettuce, tomato slices and reserved onion slices. Place the burgers on top and smear the tops of the rolls with the remaining tangy mayonnaise. Enjoy.

## Smoky Barbecue Fingerlickin' Rib

These have to be the perfect barbecue food but they also work well under the grill. I like to serve mine with some buttered corn cobs and crispy potato skins - just make sure you have plenty of napkins and finger bowls on hand for those sticky fingers. Try to get your ribs from a good pork butcher, ask for meaty ones and make sure they don't cut them into individual ribs as this reduces their succulence.

Serves 4-6

- 200 ml/7 fl oz barbecue sauce
- 100 ml/4 fl oz hotshot marinade & sauce
- 4 tbsp dry sherry, such as Amontillado
- 1 1/2 tsp chopped fresh rosemary
- 1.75 kg/4 lb pork spare ribs, (still joined)
- 2 spring onions, finely chopped

1 Place the barbecue sauce in a large plastic container that has a lid. Stir in the hotshot marinade, sherry and rosemary, then add the ribs, turning to coat. Put on the lid and chill for at least 2 and up to 24 hours is best, turning the container occasionally.

2 Place ribs in a large, deep pan - you may have to cut the rib racks in half to get them to fit. Pour over the barbecue mixture and then add enough water to completely cover the ribs. Bring to a simmer, then cover and simmer gently for 45 minutes to 1 hour until completely tender. Remove the ribs from the heat and allow the ribs to cool in the marinade, then either use immediately or chill until ready to cook.

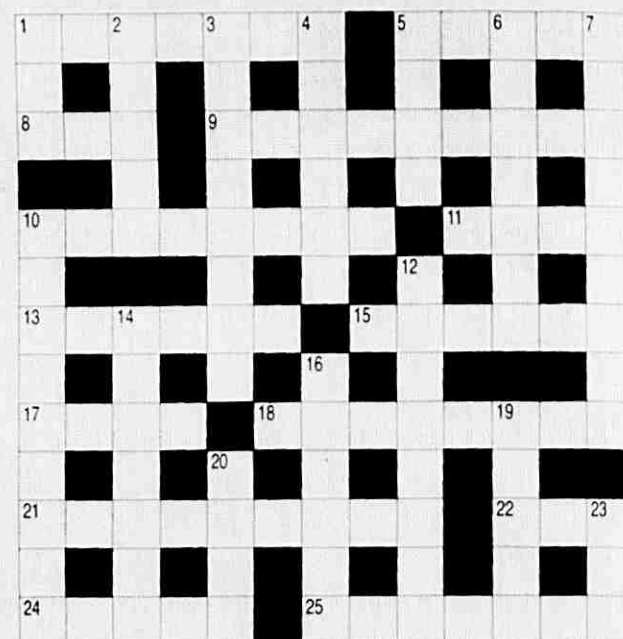
3 Preheat the grill. If chilled carefully scoop off the fat from the top of the barbecue mixture and discard. Drain off all the marinade and place in a pan, then reduce down to a sticky coating consistency, stirring occasionally - you'll need about 300 ml/1/2 pint in total.

4 Arrange the ribs on a grill rack and cook for about 10 minutes on each side, basting or painting the ribs with the reduced marinade. To serve, cut the ribs into singles and arrange on a large platter, scatter over the spring onions to serve.

# Last chance to hang a basket

NOTHING graces a terrace, porch or patio better than a hanging basket with a selection of summer flowers. And a hanging basket in full bloom is a sure sign that summer has arrived.



Baskets can be hung from trees, beams, eaves and frames of all kinds. And many a country railway station has won a best-kept competition on the strength of its hanging baskets. The great thing about hanging baskets is that they can be used to grow and display virtually any kind of flower, although geraniums, petunias, fuchsias and shamrock are among the more popular. But if your baskets aren't ready yet, you'd better get a move on. For best results hanging baskets should be prepared in the spring, dressing your flowers with plenty of fern, trailing plants, moss and foliage. Your basket should then be left in the greenhouse for about a month. Then, when summer is here and all danger of frost is past, they can be hung in the sunshine or shade and you can lap up the praise as visitors express their admiration for your colourful hanging baskets. But even if you did not plan ahead there is still time to get a beautiful display prepared for the height of summer provided you pick reasonably mature plants. Recommended plants include ivy-leaved geraniums, petunias, trailing lobelia, bedding begonias, nasturtiums, spider plants and bedding fuchsias - which grow up to three feet tall and make a particularly impressive centrepiece in a large basket. Once on display, remember hanging baskets are very thirsty and will need watering at least twice every day and regular dead-heading.

### This Week In The Garden

Plant Madonna lilies  
This is the ideal time to plant *Lilium condidum*, the Madonna lily. It differs from almost all other lilies in making quite a lot of new growth in late summer, and it should be planted before this starts. Another peculiarity is that the bulbs grow practically on the surface. You should plant them 20cm apart and only cover them with 5cm of soil. After a while they will probably work themselves out until they show; make no attempt to cover them again. This lily prefers a sunny position and reasonably good, but not freshly manured, ground. Lift daffodils and bulbous irises  
Daffodils and narcissi, also the various bulbous irises, will now have completed their growth and may be lifted and cleaned off if they are overgrown or you need the ground for something else. Otherwise leave them undisturbed for another year. They do not gain anything by annual lifting and drying, as do tulips and hyacinths. If you do lift them, get them replanted as soon as possible and certainly before the end of September.  
Cut back helianthemums  
Sun roses tend to get rather straggly if left to their own devices, but if cut back a little each year at about this time they can be kept quite neat and tidy. You can do the work with a large pair of scissors or garden shears. Start to feed chrysanthemums  
It is a mistake to begin to feed chrysanthemums of any type too early, but you can start now with safety. The more varied the feed the better. Give very small doses every five days or so mixed with plenty of water and used in place of the ordinary water. Liquid manure, made by steeping a small sack of cow, horse, or sheep droppings in a tub of water, can be varied with soot water and any good chemical fertiliser made for chrysanthemums and used as directed.

**BIRDS OF PREY**

Birds that hunt and kill other creatures are known as birds of prey. They include eagles, hawks, buzzards, vultures and owls. Some birds of prey also feed on carrion – the decaying flesh of dead animals. All birds of prey have excellent eyesight to spot their prey, strong feet with sharp claws to seize it, and hooded beaks to tear flesh apart.

**ELEGANT EAGLES**

There are probably about sixty types of eagle around the world. The golden eagle lives in mountainous areas, whereas the bald eagle lives along sea coasts and rivers feeding mainly on fish. The snake eagle feeds, as its name suggests, mostly on snakes. Sea eagles and fish eagles live solely on fish.



Monkeys in the south American rainforests are prone to attack from the world’s largest eagle, the harpy eagle. Most eagles have large wings, but the harpy’s wings are quite short which makes it very agile. Monkeys are not the only prey for the harpy. It will also swoop to the ground to snatch up coatis, opossums and sloths. Another eagle that eats monkeys is the monkey-eating eagle, which lives in the Philippines.

**THE MAJESTIC CONDOR**

The condor, a member of the vulture family, is the largest and heaviest bird of South America and has a wing span of 3m. (9 ft.) and a weight of 10 kg (22 lb.). Its large wings help it to glide effortlessly up to heights of 2,000m. (6,600 ft.) using the thermals (rising air currents) that abound in the mountains. Like all birds of prey, the condor has excellent eyesight which it uses to spot prey from high above ground. Normally it feeds on dead and dying animals, but it will also attack live creatures such as lambs, deer and llamas.

**HUNTING WITH FALCONS**

Lanner falcons are fierce birds of prey that live and hunt in the sahara Desert. They are about 42 cm (16 ins) long with a wing span of 110 cm (44 ins) and live on birds, small animals and insects.

Peregrine falcons are the birds most used in the sport of falconry (the training of falcons to hunt for sport or exhibition). It has been a popular past-time since the Middle Ages, Falconry originated in India and eventually spread to Europe and North America, becoming particularly popular with royalty.

**DID YOU KNOW**

- When a peregrine falcon dives it reaches incredible speeds of 300 kpm (186 mph)!
- Perhaps the sparrowhawk should have been called the mousehawk – it eats about 290 mice each year!
- The secretary bird has quills dangling behind its ears that look like a secretary’s pens!
- The owl was first seen as wise by the ancient Greeks, who believed that the owl was the companion of Athena, goddess of wisdom!
- King Arthur’s magician Merlin used to carry an owl perched on his shoulder.
- Falconry began in Asia as long ago as 2000 BC.

# Relieved Brothers Celebrate An Bord Pleanala Ruling

But, in moving the power line, the ESB erected two pylons close to the Drummy home.

### OMBUDSMAN

Eventually, the Ombudsman took up their case, and called on the council to have An Bord Pleanala adjudicate on the matter.

"What we went through no-one will ever know. It has aged the two of us but particularly Maurice. He developed shingles because of the torment."

"We were put under stress and harassment everyday this went on," Frank claims.

When An Bord Pleanala first overruled Waterford County Council and said the pylons were development and not ex-

empted from the planning laws, the ESB applied for a retention order.

This was objected to on behalf of the Drummy brothers by solicitor, Paddy Gordon of JP Gordon & Co Solicitors, the Burgery, Dungarvan.

### RETENTION REFUSED

That retention application was refused by Waterford County Council but was appealed earlier this year by the ESB.

However, An Bord Pleanala upheld the council's decision on Monday and refused the ESB permission to retain the pylons.

In its ruling, An Bord Pleanala said the retention of the masts, by reasons of their construction and height and

proximity to adjoining properties and adjoining public road would be detrimental to the visual amenities of the area and would seriously injure the residential amenities of the adjoining property.

They said that retention of the proposed development would therefore be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area.

They also say the retention of two number 38 kV steel mast structures in the proposed location would materially contravene two conditions in previous planning permissions for development on the adjoining site and would, therefore, be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area.

# Cappagh-Man Publishes His Memoirs Down Under

'The man with no Swag' memoirs of an Irish immigrant, has just been published in Australia. The book was written by Michael Quinlan who was born at Ballinacourty in Cappagh, the co-author and publisher of the book is award winning author Kathleen Lewis who is his sister in law.

Michael Quinlan would have no objections to me saying that he came from a privileged background.

Quinlans were large landowners in Ballinacourty Cappagh and Michael was used to the attention of servants growing up. He nevertheless, worked hard on the farm along with his brothers

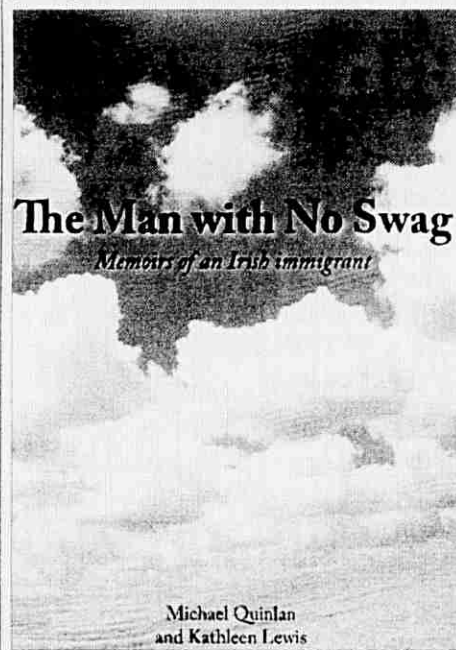
up until his parents died, both within a few months of each other, and in 1947 Michael decided that he had enough of farm life. He sold his cycle in Dungarvan for ten shillings and took the train to Dublin. On arrival in the capital the twenty-year old realised that he had little or no money and he also had no place to stay. Thus began a journey that would take him to England, Wales, France, Australia, South America and Japan. Michael struck out for England and ventured into a world that was patching itself together after WW2. The second leg of his journey would take him to France. Here in this strange country he would learn what it was to be a tramp, he had no means of communicating with those that he met, indeed, no one was interested in the plight of the Irishman. Starving and penniless he remembered the great faith that his mother had in Lourdes water and so the young Dungarvan-man decided to walk over 400 kilometres from Marseilles to Lourdes. It was his belief at that time that prayers were the only solution to his problems. It was a bone weary traveller that finally arrived at his destination. He had survived his journey by living off tomatoes which he was forced to steal from lorries along the roads. In Lourdes he stayed for some time, praying for the miracle that never came. He says 'I had no sins in my soul and no money in my pocket, I knew no one so I headed back to Marseilles' another 400 kilometres.

This was not the end of Quinlans walking in France, Marseilles once again proved useless for him. His original idea of working the ships from this port yet again yielded no dividends. One can quite easily imagine the state the twenty-year-old young man was in, he had walked 800 km on little or no food, his clothes were in an awful condition, the 'pain of hunger was unbearable' he said, nevertheless his only hope for survival was to foot it 750 km to Paris with his home on his back.

Against all the odds, Michael eventually ended up in Western Australia, here he started a new life married, raised a family and became a very successful businessman. It was however, not the end of his travels.

Michael Quinlan's book is written with humour and there is no trace of bitterness. He does not however back down from 'calling a spade a spade' and his language is expressive and colourful at times. The tragic life of his brother Jim is recalled with sensitivity and honesty.

Many Dungarvan people will also remember Michael's brother Ned who was a well known character who passed away a few year ago.



His early life at Ballinacourty is of particular interest and many old characters are remembered. The book also features a number of old and interesting photos of early life at Cappagh.

# Sisters of Bon Sauveur

July 2004 marks the Centenary of the Sisters of Bon Sauveur in Carriglea. This historic and momentous occasion celebrates the achievements of the Sisters since their arrival in 1904. The greater West Waterford region is acutely aware of the tremendous work done by the Sisters and Staff in Carriglea to-day but not many are aware of the length of service given by the Sisters to the people of this area. The story of the Order and the development of their Services in Carriglea is a fascinating one.....

In 1889 two Sisters, one of whom was Irish, came to Ireland to seek a premises to start a Foundation. Bishop Sheehan, the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore visited the Mother House in Caen in 1902, on his way to Rome, and invited the Sisters to come to the Diocese. The following year in 1903, Bishop Sheehan, prompted by the charity and care towards the mentally ill that he had witnessed while visiting with the Sisters in Caen, wrote officially, requesting the Sisters to open a Community in his Diocese. In 1904 several premises were looked at, but on the advice of Bishop Sheehan and the legal aid of Mr. Keane, solicitor in Dungarvan, 'Mount Odell Demesne' was purchased. It was found suitable for both a convent and a small psychiatric hospital.

At the time of its purchase by the Sisters of Bon Sauveur, Carriglea was owned by the O'Dell family. The O'Dell family was well

established in the Dungarvan area around Ballintaylor and Carriglea. The O'Dell family who subsequently lived in Carriglea originally lived in O'Dell Lodge in Ardmore. On February 24th 1904 the deal to purchase the Carriglea estate was signed and sealed.

On May 26th 1904, Mother Delaitre and Sr. Spillane arrived in Waterford by boat. On the morning of June 23rd, five more Sisters arrived in Waterford from the Mother House in Caen. September of that busy year saw the official opening of the "Maison de Sante (psychiatric hospital). There were twenty places available under the medical supervision of local doctor, Dr. Morrissey. On September 7th, the first admission was received and by the end of the first year, all twenty places were filled. Patients came from all over Ireland which clearly indicated the need that existed for such a service.

In 1914, the first Irish girl entered the Congregation in Carriglea; Sr. Sara Mc Elroy from Co. Meath. On May 11th 1919, Mother Spillane who had been professed in France, was appointed as the first Irish Mother Superior. 1922 was a very important year for the Congregation in Carriglea in that the first Irish Sister, Sr. Sara Mc Elroy was professed. The years passed

quickly and Carriglea was a place of great development.

1939 saw the outbreak of World War Two. Sr. Eileen Mc Carthy and Sr. Margaret Phelan, who had entered the Congregation in 1938, found themselves caught in France as novices. They made their first profession in Caen in 1942 and only returned in 1945. In 1940, news of the war advancing was received with great sadness by all in Carriglea, but especially by the French Sisters. Their sadness was clearly conveyed in the annals as they wrote of the absence of contact with loved ones back in France. The summer of 1944 began with D-day, June 6th, and had a dramatic finale in the bombardment of two of the Congregation's Convents; at Pont L'Abbe and St. Lo. The important role played by the Bon Sauveur Sisters in evacuation was even documented in the Irish Independent.

Carriglea was always at the forefront of new initiatives and developments and in February 1947, electricity from Ardnacrusha was installed.

In April 1948, the Sisters held their first Garden Fete. The proceeds were earmarked to fund the erection of the Lourdes Grotto which was completed for the Marian Year of 1950. The hand

embroidered crafts, lucky dip, wheel of fortune, with all kinds of prizes, provided enormous entertainment for all who attended: Ice cream, a real rarity of the time, was also available at the Fete. The Fete was a tremendous success and the Annals devoted a full page to the wonderful memories this day bestowed. Locals recount of the wonders of the day, the starched white socks and shoes of those children in the procession, the smell of polish in the main building, the voice of Fr. Murphy that echoed across the fields, the baskets of flowers the children wore around their necks, and the highlight of the day in the minds of those who were children at the time was the flavoured milk given to them by the Sisters!

The 1950s saw dramatic changes on the farm and the development of a very progressive poultry farm under the instruction of the poultry instructress, Ms Mullins.

September 8th 1954 was a historic day in Carriglea. It marked the official Celebrations of the Golden Jubilee. This was an important milestone in the history of Carriglea and was even mentioned in the national newspaper. 1957 was a momentous year for Carriglea as it was in that year the Congregation opened a sec-

ondary school. It was located in, what is now, St. Mary's. The students completed their public exams in the Presentation School in Dungarvan. It was closed in 1966 due to the reducing numbers of students.

1959 witnessed the opening of the Formation House of Religious in Ireland, which meant that novices no longer needed to undertake their religious training abroad. Sr. Maureen Mc Carthy was nominated as the first Mistress of Novices. Seven young ladies, dressed as brides, received the habit of the Bon Sauveur Order. Among these Sisters, are some very familiar names to us today — Sr. Mary Theresa Lyons, St. Teresa Jennings, Sr. Johanna Walsh and Sr. Nora Leonard.

In 1960, the first Bon Sauveur missionaries went to Madagascar. Five Sisters were sent to open this mission. Today, Madagascar is a developing missionary field with a growing number of young Madagash Sisters in a number of Bon Sauveur Convents in this great island. One of the houses in Madagascar was co-founded by Irish Sister, Sr. Touhy. This year sees the opening of a Centre for people with special needs in Ilaka. We look forward to having the Madagash Sisters and the Sisters from Wales, Spain, Italy, Korea and of course, the French Sisters to join in the Centenary Celebrations.

# Centenary 1904-2004



In 1962, the first seven Irish Sisters to have completed their formation in Carriglea, took their vows of poverty, chastity and obedience.

In 1964, Mother Yvonne le Rolland was nominated Superior. She was a woman of tremendous vision and saw the need for the development of the Carriglea from a private psychiatric hospital to a centre which catered for people with a learning disability. Permission to do this was received from France in 1970 and was sanctioned by the Department of Health in 1970 also. This was a momentous occasion and heralded a new departure for the Sisters in their work in Carriglea.

1972 witnessed the formation of the Carriglea Fundraising Committee. Its purpose was to raise money for people with special needs, in particular, to give them the optional extras not provided by the Health Board.

Shepherd's Wood Lodge, our Workshop was built in 1976. It was officially opened by Taoiseach Charles Haughey, the following year. It was initially built as a Sports Hall but was later used to provide a workshop setting for residents and day trainees. It was subsequently refurbished in 1992 and in 1995.

1985 saw the opening of the first of many Community Houses in the environs of Dungarvan. A Community House was opened in Kyne Park. The residents subsequently moved to An Cluain and there are now six Community Houses in the town; two in Gael Gua, Kilrush, one in Silversprings, Avon-

dale, Friar's Walk and Boherard on the Youghal Road.

In 1986, Sr. Nora Leonard was nominated Superior. Sr. Nora continued what Sr. Rita had begun and has worked tirelessly to develop the Bon Sauveur Services into the successful, multi-faceted Service that it is today, providing invaluable service and supports to people with intellectual disability.

1991 was a historic year for the Sisters of Bon Sauveur Services in that the Mount Odell (now called Anne le Roy) Training Centre was opened at Kilrush, in Dungarvan town in May of that year. It is a vibrant centre of rehabilitative training and locals flock to the Euroroute Cuisine to sample the excellent food. The picture framing gallery and woodwork section are very well supported by the local community.

Sunrise House opened its doors in November 1998. It is a day service for young adults with very high support needs and contributes greatly in meeting the needs of local young people who require high support. On June 30th 2001, the new Shalom Unit was opened. The building of this Unit was funded under the National Development Plan. This residential Unit provides high levels of support to people with high support needs. Included in the fantastic facilities in Shalom were the Rhapsody therapeutic bath, hoist and booster pump that had been installed.

On November 12th 2001, Boherard Community House opened. This was a very significant event in that it was the first Community House

for males.

2003 was internationally the year of the Special Olympics hosted by Ireland, but in Carriglea, it was the year of our heroes where our athletes did their locality and country proud in their efforts. Everyone was involved, within the Service and Community and the wonderful community spirit was well documented.

To-day the Sisters of Bon Sauveur Services provide services and supports to almost one hundred and sixty service users. Day and residential services are provided that cater for the diverse needs of people with disabilities. The Service is visionary in meeting these needs and the wide variety of services available to those with disabilities is evidence of the valiant efforts of the Sisters and Staff. The Bon Sauveur Services provide day services on campus in Carriglea, rehabilitative training, sheltered work and supported employment in the Anne le

Roy Centre and Transition to Work, Davitt's Quay. The Services provide residential care on campus and also have six Community Houses in Dungarvan town. All of the achievements of Carriglea could not have happened without the unrelenting, dedicated support of the local people of Carriglea townland and the people of Dungarvan. Links with the Community are essential. Supported employment is a great success thanks to the support of local businesses. The success of other community links is evident in such initiatives as the Companionship Programme, Project Integration with local Schools, the Community Development Project and other such progressive initiatives greatly supported by the local community.

The events outlined here are only the tip of the iceberg and the Sisters have published a Centenary Publication which traces the development of the Order and Service over the last one hundred years. The Centenary Publication was launched by local historian Julian Walton at Carriglea on Monday last. A specially commissioned Centenary Limestone feature was also blessed and unveiled by the Sisters. 'A picture speaks a thousand words' and the photographs that have been discovered on this voyage of discovery have unlocked the door of many cherished memories. This Centenary Publication is available from the Anne le Roy Centre, Whyte's Corner, Grattan Square, and the Bon Sauveur Services at Car-

riglea. An exhibition of photographs and artefacts will run during the Centenary Celebrations and all are welcome to visit.

The last one hundred years have brought enormous changes to Carriglea and always, these changes have been fuelled by an unrelenting desire and dedication, on the part of the Sisters of Le Bon Sauveur, to improving the lives of people with disabilities.

## STRADBALLY NOTES

### New Sewage Treatment Plant

On Thursday last Stradbally Tourism and Enterprise visited Waterford Co. Council offices, and viewed the map dealing with the new sewage system in Stradbally. This scheme is part of a 20 year plan to deal with sewage in the village, at present we have a population of approximately 500 people, the new Council 20 year sewage plan will have a capacity for 1350 people. It is planned that the new system will take the sewage away from "The Cove" and pump it from a collection point, situated at the present public toilets to a treatment plant in the Ballyvooney direction, after treatment the liquid will be disposed of, into the sea off Ballyvooney.

Stradbally Tourism and Enterprise Development Group would prefer to see the new sewage system connected to the Dungarvan treatment plant in Ballinacourty but the council say it is too expensive. We do very much welcome the Council decision to take the sewage from the cove, both as for health and safety reasons.

The cove fresh and salt water is important for the local economy. The council are still working on this plan, and would expect to have it completed before Christmas 2004 It will then go on display in the County Council offices for 4 weeks ( we have requested that the maps are also put on display in Stradbally for an evening or at a suitable time, and have received a positive reply) then there will be a further two weeks for the public to make any written objections etc.

Stradbally Tourism and Enterprise Group chairman, Tom Hickey, believes it would be a good thing for local residents to keep themselves informed of the progress on this plan, to work with the council so that the final plan will deliver on what it promises, and to make sure that the work on the sewage is done in a way that is friendly to the people and environment of the area.

## VINCENT DE PAUL TRIP TO KNOCK SHRINE

### POLL TOPPER McGRATH TAKES TOP COUNCIL POST

South Tipperary's biggest vote getter, Councillor Mattie McGrath (FF), Newcastle was elected Chairman of South Tipperary County Council last weekend. The Fianna Fail Councillor, who received 1900 first preference votes in the recent local elections, was elected to the post of Chairman as a result of a pact with Fine Gael. Councillor McGrath, a father of eight children, who runs a Plant Hire Business in Newcastle, he defeated Independent Councillor Christy Kinahan by eighteen votes to seven. Fianna Fail and Fine Gael members voted for Cllr. McGrath with the Labour, Independent and Workers and Unemployed Action Group members voting for Cllr. Kinahan. Councillor Derry Foley, Fine Gael was elected by the same voting pattern. It was a proud day for Cllr. McGrath whose mother Mary and other family members were in the chamber of the County Council to witness the event. Setting out his priorities for the year ahead the new Chairman said he wanted progress to be made on many issues including waste management, specialised educational services, rural transport, preservation heritage and culture and the need to streamline planning regulations so that the dream of those that want to live in rural Ireland can be realised. The new Chairman called on all of the members of the new council to embark on a new term with courage and belief in themselves as public representatives to be the very best public representatives they could be. The people of South Tipperary had put their trust in them all and their expectations continued to grow. He hoped to see programmes like Outreach, rural transport, the County Museum, the Arts and other initiatives started by their predecessors being continued and expanded. "I would like all of us to become better listeners so that we can fully understand the needs of our constituents who placed their trust in us. I would like to be able to look back some day and say that we all played our part in making South Tipperary a better place to live in", he said. He asked his newly elected colleagues to work together as a team, to go forward to the public with open minds and to be known as the Council that consulted with the people, instead of dictating to the people. Councillor McGrath was coopted onto the County Council in 1990. He failed in his bid to be returned in 1991 and was elected to the Council in 1999 and again in 2004 when he proved to be one of the top vote getters in the country. We salute this fine Councillor on the things he has achieved over the years and we wish him well in his new post.

## OFFICIAL OPENING AND BLESSING OF LISRONAGH CHURCH

The official opening and blessing of the newly renovated Saint John The Baptist Parish Church in Lisronagh was an historic occasion for the people of this parish. This Church was built in the late 18th century during the pastorate of Rev. Fr. McGrath. During the years 1852 to 1856 it was enlarged when Rev. Fr. John Power was pastor. The two side altars were added in the 1930's thanks to the generosity of Miss Marie Kennedy. In recent years the condition of the church had been deteriorating and it was obvious that major repairs were necessary. With this in mind Fr. Peter Ahearn P.P. who hails from Sliabh gCua country, called a meeting of parishioners in October 2000 and a committee was formed which immediately set about the task. After three years of investigating, planning and major fundraising Clancy Construction moved on to the sight in August 2003 and under the guidance of Peter Morrissey and associates began the huge task of renovating the church. During this time they were fortunate to have Lisronagh Hall for all their religious celebrations. The culmination of the skills of everybody involved was joyfully celebrated on Friday, June 25, when Most Rev. Dr. William Lee Bishop of Waterford and Lismore celebrated Mass and blessed the Church. He was assisted by Rev. Fr. Peter Fihearn P.P. and former Parish Priests Rev. Canon Paul Beecher P.P. who was translated to Cahir on the 4/6/81 and Rev. Fr. Sean Nugent P.P. who was celebrated to Clogheen/Burncourt on the 21/6/87. A large crowd of parishioners and friends from many parts were present. A representation of the community did the readings, prayers of the faithful and brought forward offertory gifts representing faith, past and present and remembering one of their committee members Tom Sheehan who sadly passed away a short time before the work was completed. The choir enhanced the occasion with some very meaningful hymns and Joe O'Donnell's rendition of Slievenamon after the final Hymn added to the celebrations. The night concluded with a very enjoyable function in Slievenamon Golf Club. They wish sincere thanks to everybody who made the whole thing possible and that includes so many people from all over who have worked and contributed in any way. They now have two beautiful churches in their parishes of which they can feel justifiably proud.

On Saturday 26th June some fifty people were taken from Ballymacarbry, Nire, Newcastle, Kilmonahan and Kilmacomma to the Shrine of Our Blessed Lady of Knock. The trip was organised by the local branch of St. Vincent de Paul. The bus left Ballymacarbry at 7.15 am in heavy rain, it cleared beyond Tipperary, then on to Limerick where a detour had to be made, the bus had to go by Broadford to O'Callahans Mills and over the Mountain to Tulla and then on to Gort, Co. Galway where a stop took place, then on to Clare/Galway for a breakfast at Brennans Restaurant after which all passengers had a new lease of life. On the way to Knock three rosaries were recited, the group arrived in Knock around midday. A beautiful day there of bright sunshine and a fresh westerly breeze. 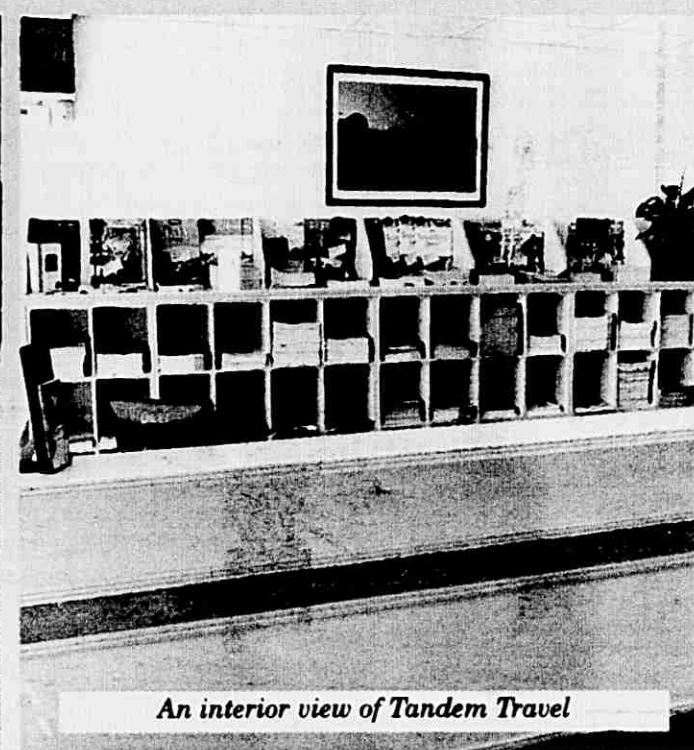

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

### QUESTION

I hope to start a course next September. Could you please tell me who is eligible for the Back to Education Allowance?

### ANSWER

The Back to Education Allowance (BTEA) is paid by the Department of Social, and Family Affairs (DSFA) to unemployed people, lone parents and people with disabilities who wish to do approved second or third level courses of education. To be eligible for the allowance you must be:

Aged 21 or over (24 or over for a postgraduate course) and for the previous 6 months (15 months for a third level course) have been receiving a social welfare payment such as Unemployment Assistance/Benefit or One-Parent Family Payment.

Aged 18 or over and for the previous 6 months (15 months for a third level course) (3 have been receiving a disability payment such as Disability Allowance or Invalidity H Pension (receiving Disability Benefit for 3 years).

Aged 18 to 20, out of formal education for 2 years, and for the previous 6 months (15 months for a third level course) have been receiving One-Parent Family Payment or Unemployment Assistance/Benefit.

An adult dependant of someone who is eligible may qualify if a Qualified Adult Allowance is in payment. Periods spent on employment schemes, training courses and in prison may count towards the qualifying period.

Courses you can attend include full-time second level courses certified by the Department of Education and Science (DES) or approved by the Further Education and Training Awards Council (FETAC), such as the Leaving Certificate or a Post Leaving Certificate course, and full-time third level courses approved by DES for its maintenance grant schemes or courses which have Higher Education and Training Awards Council (HETAC) recognition.

When you have been accepted for a course you should apply to DSFA for the allowance on Form BTE 1. You will be paid the allowance instead of your social welfare payment at a rate equivalent to the maximum of your current social welfare payment. If you were previously getting an unemployment payment, the BTEA will not be paid during the summer period between academic years. Those who had been receiving other payments will continue to receive the BTEA during the summer. Further information is available from the Citizens Information Centre below.

## MONEY MATTERS

### Holidays and Credit Cards

Credit cards have become a part of everyday life in Ireland, from paying for petrol, groceries, to entertainment. Paying for goods or services with your credit card may be cost effective, convenient and secure. It has become increasingly popular for Irish people to use their card when abroad. If you wish to use your credit card while on holiday, please bear the following in mind:

Obtain a PIN number for your card from your bank, which then can be used for the purpose of withdrawing cash. If your account is in credit withdrawing local currency may be cheaper than exchanging cash or buying travellers cheques.

Be especially careful of using ATM's or giving your Credit Card number over the phone in airports. Criminals have been known to note your personal numbers even from a distance. Ask about the availability of cash dispensing machines in the area you are visiting. Note that while many will be open 24 hours a day, some may be open business hours only. Observe your surroundings before using an ATM. If the machine is in an out of the way place or is poorly lit, go to another one. Shield the screen and keyboard so that anyone waiting behind you to use the ATM will not see your transaction. Once you have made your withdrawal put your cash, card and receipt away immediately. You can count it at a later stage.

If you are using your credit card to buy goods in a shop or in a restaurant do not allow it out of your sight. Go with the person to the credit card machine. Before you go on holiday check with your credit institution to determine the daily limit of funds that can be withdrawn.

## DISABILITY AWARENESS

### HEART ATTACK

#### What is a Heart Attack?

A heart attack (also called a myocardial infarction) occurs when an area of the heart is deprived of necessary oxygen-supplying blood, causing that part of the heart to be injured or die. Although heart attacks may appear to come on suddenly, the damage to the heart is usually progressive over many years. The pain that is associated with a heart attack differs from person to person. Many people describe it as a heavy pressure or squeezing sensation or stabbing feeling. At times the pain may radiate to the arm, jaw or back. The intensity of the pain is not an indicator of the degree of heart damage that may be occurring. Some people experience no symptoms during a heart attack.

#### What causes a Heart Attack?

A heart attack is caused by the formation of a blood clot on a cholesterol plaque located on the inner wall of an artery to the heart (coronary artery). Cholesterol is a fatty chemical, which is part of the outer lining of cells in the body. Cholesterol plaque is the formation of a hard, thick substance within the artery walls, which is caused by deposits of cholesterol in the artery walls; this process can happen over many years. Over time, the accumulation of cholesterol plaque causes thickening of the artery walls and narrowing of the arteries: a process called atherosclerosis. Plaque accumulation can be accelerated by smoking, high blood pressure, elevated cholesterol, and diabetes.

#### What happens during a Heart Attack?

The heart is a muscle that works like a pump. Blood receives its oxygen as the heart pumps it through to lungs. Once oxygenated, the blood then returns to the heart to be pumped to the rest of the body. After blood circulates through the body tissues, it is returned to the heart and the process is repeated. For the heart to do its job, it requires oxygen. There are special blood vessels located on the outside of the heart, called coronary arteries, which supply the heart muscle with oxygen. When one or more of these vessels becomes obstructed (usually from a clot that has formed in the vessel), blood cannot get through this area and into the heart muscle itself. Heart attacks can destroy different areas of the heart muscle, depending on where the blockage has occurred.

#### Diagnosis and Treatment

The initial diagnosis of a heart attack is made by a combination of clinical symptoms and characteristic electrocardiogram (EKG) changes. An electrocardiogram is a recording of the electrical activity of the heart, and can detect areas of ischemic heart muscle (muscle which is deprived of oxygen) or dead tissue in the heart.

Heart disease occurs to some degree as a natural result of ageing, there are several reasons, called 'risk factors'; some of these risk factors cannot be changed such as a family history of Heart disease, but other factors can be changed or at least controlled, these include:

- Smoking
- High cholesterol
- High blood pressure
- Overweight
- Not enough exercise
- Diabetes

# Comreg finds Eircom in breach again

Mr. Smith said that these bundled packages were designed to confuse consumers and that Comreg had a responsibility to analyse the various packages available and to advise consumers to the best value call

cost available. He said in such a scenario that IFA Telecom were quite confident that their call rates would show up as one of the best in the market place

IFA Telecom, a the farmer-owned telecommunications business, has signed 15,000 subscribers and is set to reach 20% of IFA's strong membership base in its first year of business.

### Grassland Management

The very good grass growth in May and June combined with a rather low stocking rate on many farms has resulted in fields being poorly grazed.

Grass deteriorated quickly after the 2nd week in June due to stress from water shortage. Now that the rain has come, ground moisture is back to near normal. All fields with old dead sward should be topped low as possible. Nitrogen can be applied - 1\_ bags per acre, depending on stocking rate.

Planning for extending grazing into the Autumn can soon begin. Careful planning of the farm grazing programme from August onwards will result in not only extended grazing into the Autumn but it also has major impact on early grazing next Spring. The resulting shorter Winter will have a big influence on costs.

### Meal Feeding at Grass

There is a debate this year regarding meal feeding at grass. This is due to the good supply of excellent grass to-date and the cost of replacement animals if required.

There is also the ongoing advice to farmers on the merits of reducing costs and the benefits of beef production from grazed grass. A change in the weather could influence this debate.

In general, cattle that will be slaughtered over the next 4 to 6 weeks will gain in terms of KO and grading as a result of meal feeding at grass. There may not be a big gain on liveweight gain. If under pressure, in relation to extensification, animals may be slaughtered a few weeks earlier. So be careful in doing your calculations for extensification purposes.

In late July into August, grass quality generally deteriorates and all cattle intended for slaughter before the end of the grazing season will benefit from meal feeding at grass. 3 to 4kgs. concentrates per day plus grass should support a growth rate of .8kgs / day or more until slaughter.

Where meals are fed at grass, the energy level is more important than protein. Rolled barley may be sufficient or a mixture of barley pulp and corn gluten would be very suitable.

### Management of Suckler Calves

From now on, suckler calves will be getting an increasing amount of their energy intake from grazed grass. Intake of grass can be increased by forward grazing by the calves. In a paddock situation the electric wire can be raised sufficiently to allow the calves to pass through to the next paddock. In a field situation, a specially adapted gate (which can be moved from field to field) is used to allow the calves to pass through. Forward grazing of suckling calves - especially the earlier born calves, can significantly reduce the costs of concentrates before the Autumn sales. It also helps to take the stress out of weaning.

### Dairying

Change the milking machine liners. Milking machine liners should be changed twice per season yet milking machine technicians say they only sell about 10% as many liners in mid-season as they do at the start of the season. Farmers who change their liners twice in the season get the price of the liners back many times over, in terms of extra milk and lower cell counts.

Research has shown that the expected life of a liner is 2500 milkings and that milk yield is reduced by about 5% using liners for longer. In effect, the liners under-milk the cows and under-milking tends to raise cell counts. Arrange with your milking machine technician to change the liners when they have done about 2500 milkings.

## Minister Walsh Announces Publication of Second CMMS Statistics Report on Cattle Population

### CMMS PROVING TO BE OF MULTI-USE

The Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr Joe Walsh TD, today announced the publication of the second CMMS (Cattle Movement Monitoring System) Statistics Report. This edition covers 2003 and is based on a snapshot of the CMMS database for 31 December 2003 taken on 1 February 2004. The report provides a statistical abstract of the considerable amount of data available from CMMS on the Irish cattle population of 6.6 million during 2003. For example, it shows that for the year there were 2.14m calf births, almost 1.5m mart movements, over 800,000 farm-to-farm sales and some 2.3m disposals.

Minister Walsh said that the CMMS is a central computerised database which holds data on the birth, movements and disposal of all cattle born or imported into Ireland. The recording of events associated with each animal is dependent on the co-operation of all of the industry in notifying these events promptly and accurately. In this regard, the Minister acknowledged the contributions made by individual farmers, mart personnel, local authority abattoirs, meat factories, exporters and knackeries in populating the database.

The Minister said that while the original purpose of the CMMS was to provide a comprehensive central database of the origin, identity and life history of cattle, the uses and value of the system have gone well beyond the original design. "The system is now routinely used for contact tracing for animal diseases such as TB and Brucellosis, cohort tracing

for BSE and to assist in the testing and certification requirements of a variety of schemes such as certification of beef for Russia, determination of age for BSE testing, etc. It has become an integral part of the ante-mortem process at factories and pre-export clearance for live exports. It is employed as a marketing tool for Ireland's beef export industry. It is also

used systematically for verification of livestock premium payments, the direct establishment of premium entitlements in some cases and the provision of ongoing data to farmers on the number and status of animals in their herds".

Minister Walsh said that further improvements to the CMMS were being made on an on-going basis. He expected

that as the database becomes even more accurate and with the addition of comparative data, CMMS data will make an increasing contribution in assisting the industry as a whole and individual segments in planning strategy and in managing their particular sector whether it is in breeding, production or corporate decision making.

**MUNSTER VICTORY TURNS TO SHEER SADNESS**

On Tuesday morning the search began again and by 9.30 am the Garda Sub Aqua team located the first of the two bodies and shortly after the second body was recovered. Both young men were taken to Boatstrand where they were brought ashore and consequently were sent to Waterford Regional Hospital, after prayers recited by Fr. Callinan and locals. This was truly one of the saddest weeks that has come to the rural areas of Bonmahon, Kill and Dunhill. A special thanks to our Rescue Services, The Bonmahon Inshore Lifeboat, The Cliff Rescue team, Gardai, the RNLI and anyone who helped in the recovery of the two bodies. Our community would like to extend its deepest sympathies to the Barry family and the Shannon family. Prayers were said for both lads at all Masses last Sunday. ### Felle na nGael

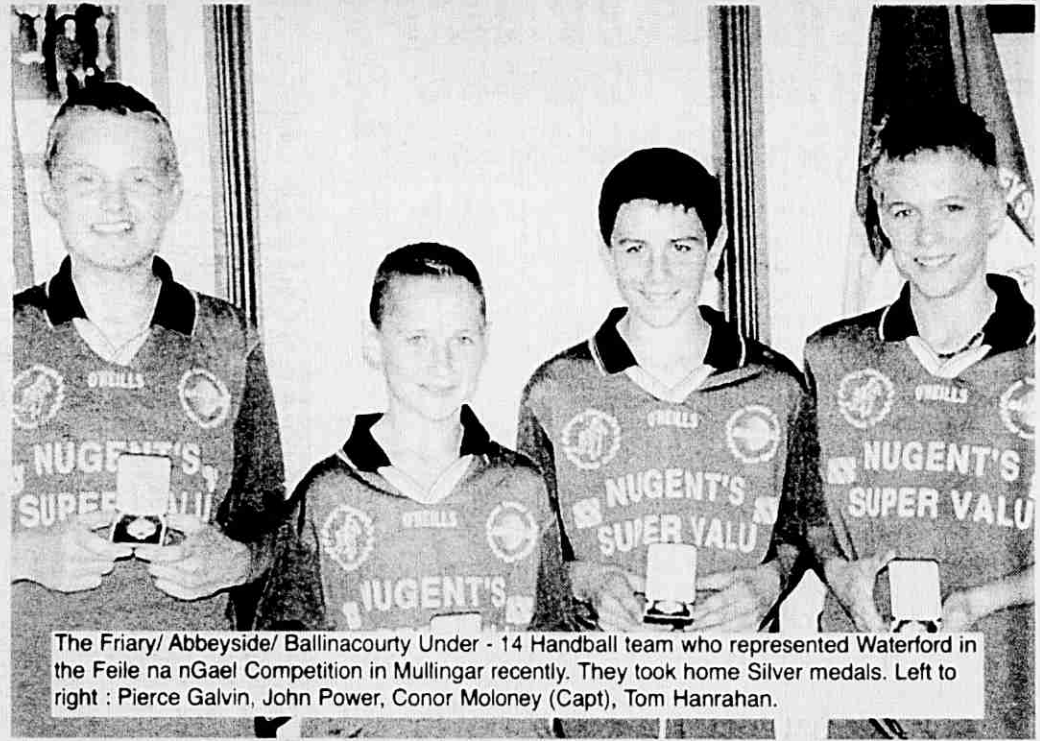

## HELMETS

Although not compulsory until next year for all juvenile hurling activities, club selectors and officials should as far as is possible insist that every player under their control wears a helmet for all hurling activities.

For whatever reason some underage players do not wear a helmet. I cannot understand why a player will not wear a helmet. The question has to be asked do players who refuse to wearing a helmet not see the danger of not wear a helmet. Wearing a helmet is not saying that hurling is a dangerous game it is only reducing the risk of picking up a serious injury to the head area.

All clubs should insist that all their juvenile players wear a helmet going out onto a field when playing hurling. As things stand referees do not have the power to stop a game for a player who do not wear a helmet, however they can convey to the player and his mentors that the player is not wearing a helmet.

From January 2005 as already stated all players have to wear a helmet. The vast majority of those playing juvenile hurling wear a full faced helmet without any fuss as they can see the benefits. Those that do not wear a helmet should start getting used to wearing one as from 2005 no players will be allowed to play a game without a helmet on. This is not a club, divisional board or county board rule. It is a rule that was passed at the National Congress of the G.A.A. at Killarney earlier this year.

# Sensational Victory For Waterford

**WATERFORD 1-7  
CORK 0-9**

Waterford captured its second piece of Munster silverware in the space of five days with a sensational victory over Cork in the Munster Junior Football Championship final at Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Thursday night last.

Cork went in as red hot favourites but from an early stage Waterford's intent was evident as they contested every exchange all over the field.

In atrocious conditions, both sides put on a game that had the 1,500 spectators on their toes right to the nail biting finale.

Both sides will reflect on missed chances at critical stages, and it was sheer backs to the wall stuff in the tense final minutes as Cork launched wave after wave of attacks.

Twice they came perilously close to snatching victory, but Waterford's massed defence held firm and they were that priceless point in front when the final whistle sparked off unrestrained Deise celebrations.

Early on, Cork looked the more purposeful side and raced into a two point lead inside six minutes with unerring frees by William Morgan and John Hayes. Kieran Whelan got the winners off the mark with a well-taken point on 10 minutes and it was nip and tuck from there to the interval.

The towering Paul Foley proved to be a hugely influential target man at full-forward where he caused the Cork defence endless problems, and it

was his point in the 27th minute that levelled the sides for the first time.

Enjoying the better of the exchanges as the half drew to a close, Whelan's superb point gave the home side a deserved 0-5 to 0-4 interval lead and set the scene for the fare that followed.

And what a second half. Players threw themselves unsparingly into the fray and it was all square by the three-quarter hour with substitute Pat O'Connell getting on the scoreboard for Cork within minutes of his introduction.

John Power brilliantly pointed Waterford back into the lead from a 50th minute '45' and then two minutes later came the score that ultimately decided the destination of the title.

Power was the goalscorer, brilliantly finishing after super work by sub Tony Kirwan and Emmet Doherty. That gave Waterford a vital four-point cushion, and try as they might, Cork fell short in their efforts to wipe it out.

Their most effective forward, Carbery Rangers clubman, John Hayes, pointed a 57th minute free and on the hour repeated the performance with a great score from play. Substitute Brain O'Sullivan's point 90 seconds into added time narrowed the deficit to the minimum, but despite continuing pressure they failed to penetrate against what, by now, had become literally a 15 man Water-

ford defensive phalanx. The final whistle sparked off mighty scenes of celebration from Waterford's second championship victory over Cork in five gloriously triumphant days for the Deise.

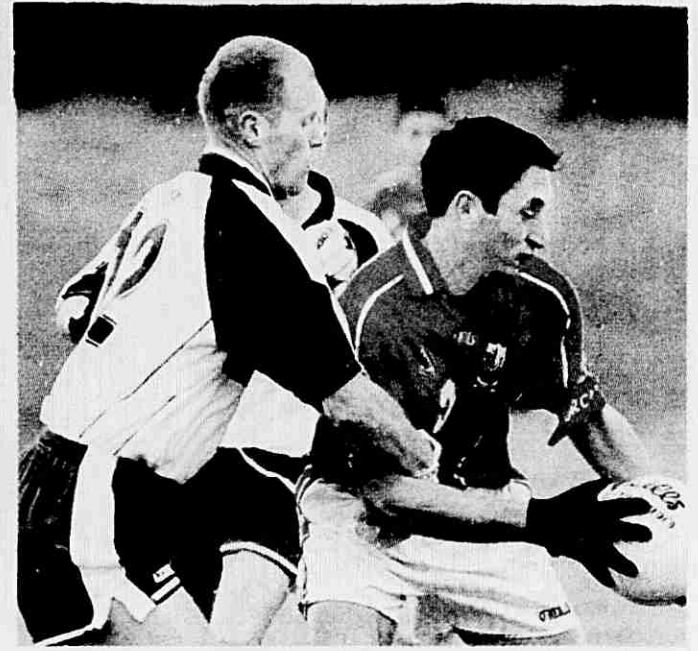

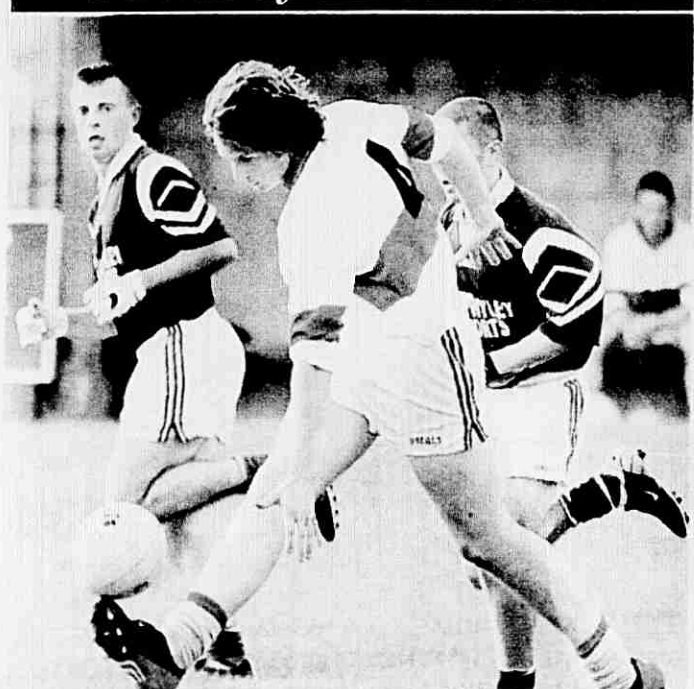

### SUNDAY MORNING LONG RUN

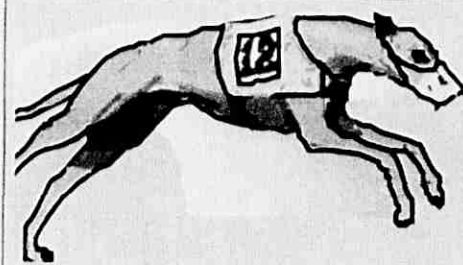

Bernadette's two winners arrived courtesy of the litter brothers Look Out Shaggy 6/2 and Brave Kewell 2/1 both being members of the October 2002 litter by Droopys Kewell and Charming Jill.

Look Out Shaggy was first into action in the second contest and after outpacing a fast starting Lassie Is Back into the first turn Look Out Shaggy enjoyed the proverbial Friday night solo up front to gallop well clear for a cosy seven lengths success over Lassie Is Back in 29.28.

Brave Kewell had to work much harder for his 29.53 victory in the fifth contest. The early paced Chase Me Charlie held a slender lead over Sparta Rebel and Brave Kewell running into the third bend and while Sparta Rebel hit the front in the home stretch Brave Kewell came back for more to get up close home for a neck victory over Sparta Rebel.

The winner is a February 2003 daughter of Jamella Prince and Little Vintage.

Fyvush Finkel set a hot pace from trap six in the third contest but the leader lost ground on the bends by staying wide. Fyvush Finkel led down the back stretch from Astons Girl and Hunts Wolf. As this contest wore on however the Brendan Farrelly and Noel Farrelly trained Dale Minnie (Spiral Nikita-Ladywell Pearl) 5/2 crept into the picture and railing economically Dale Minnie finished with a rattle up the rails to deny Fyvush Finkel by half a length in 29.65.

The Milo Lavery owned and Jude Hennessy trained Sadlers Jo (Rio Riccardo-Moat Jingle) was sent off the evens favourite to capture the fourth contest and in a one sided contest Sadlers Jo absolutely sluiced up in 29.31. Packing to much early dash for her rivals Sadlers Jo had this contest in safe keeping romping to a ten lengths win over the rails running Forge Hammer. Hopefully this success will prove a welcome tonic for the winning trainers mother Pauline who is currently a patient in Waterford Regional Hospital.

The Frank Hamm and Paul Barrett owned and Nick Turner trained Big Situation (Droopys Kewell-Karens Jewell) has really taken to sprinting and this even money favourite posted his second two bend success taking the sixth contest in 16.41. In control from trap rise Big Situation had matters in hand from an early stage coming home three lengths clear of Soup-starters.

Trainer Nick Turner whose main claim to fame aside from training greyhounds is hurling having put the sliotar passed Kilkenny Goalie Paul Hennessy on TV 3 went on to record a double in the final race of the night as Tommy Dixon's good servant Nikkis Tillie (Top Honcho-Monsoon) 6/4 came from behind to score in 29.14. After a moderate start Dysart Jo showed plenty of early dash to race by the early leader Oldinn Minie out of the second bend. Dysart Jo appeared well on his way to winning out but Nikkis Tillie made sound late headway to eventually outstay Dysart Jo by a length and a quarter.

The Kehoe family are finding Kilcohan Park a happy hunting ground of late and Siobhan Kehoe's Forest Jo (Larkhill Jo-Whitefort Jude) 7/4 ran a cracker to capture the seventh contest in a best of night 29.00. Kishlawn Kismet set a hot pace from the outset but working his way into a challenging position Forest Jo barged his way into a third bend lead to motor clear for an impressive four and a half lengths win over the early paced Kishlawn Kismet.

Kilkenny owner Seamus O'Neill saw his Coolside Joe (Larkhill

Jo-Sunray Suzr) 3/1 shed his maiden tag with a well-deserved 29.19 victory in the eight contest. Sparta Fizz set the early gallop but Coolside Joe cruised into a third bend lead on the rails. It proved all so easy for Coolside Joe from that point on as he ran out three and a half lengths winner over Sparta Fizz.

In a 730-yard marathon the Eric O'Mahoney owned and John O'Mahoney trained Eric Good Thing (Knockeevan Star-Itsabouttime) made every post a winning one to oblige in 41.43. Scampering into an early lead over Treanaree Lukey and Tontos Express Eric's Good Thing 2/1 had this race in the bag a long way from home simply romping to a five and a half lengths win over a staying on Loco Spice.

## A Bizarre Nights Racing

It's difficult to know where to start on last Saturday night's action but on reflection we should take it from the top by reviewing the ten races in race order.

The opening 525 produced a three-way photo finish. Tinross Snowey cut an early dash but the leader could never shake off the attention of Babs Vieri and Elteen Cara. Kilruddery Dawn joined issue off the home turn and in an exciting finish the Gerry Connors owned and Tony Ryan trained Babs Vieri (Droopys Vieri-Tiger Tabs) 5/2 stayed on strongly to beat a fast finishing Kilruddery Dawn by a short head with Tinross Snowey the same distance away in third. Time 29.69.

The fun really started just before the second race as the five dogs were locked away in traps. The dog drawn in trap six Corach Blue who weighed in at ninety one pounds somehow managed to get his head under the bars of trap six as the lure was on its way to the starting traps so basically Corach Blue's head was out of the traps looking around for the mechanical lure to arrive. When the hare tripped the traps Corach Blue was left ten lengths behind the field. Release Wodger raced into a clear lead but Non Stop stayed on well to win out. While no enquiry was called seasoned punters knew that something was amiss. After a delay the race was declared void but pity those who are new to the game, as they had torn up their tickets thinking they had backed a loser.

The 525 traps were used for the third race but again they gave cause for concern with the bars moving on trap one just before the off. For the record the third race saw Backlikealight lead down the back from Inky Dinky but the Niall Threadgold and Karl Gostl owned Brendara Lisa (Cool Performance-Rapid Lisa) 5/2 finished best of all to beat Inkys Dinky by one and a half lengths in 29.91.

The stewards then wisely took the decision to dispense with the use of the 525-yard traps for the rest of this fixture. The relevant owners were asked to either run off the remaining races over the 500 or 550-yard trips and after a short delay agreement was reached on the distance of the remaining races. The owners in question on the night are to be commended as they cooperated one hundred per cent with the stewards to ensure that racing went ahead.

In the fifth contest over 500 yards the Martin Murray owned and Eamon Moore trained Murrin-town Boy (Pinewood Blue-Graystown) 6/4 outpaced the opposition on the run to the first bend to lead from Ballymarket El. This order of running remained unchanged for the duration of the trip with Murrin-town Boy deservedly winning out by two and a half lengths. Time 28.01.

It was back up to the 550 yard distance for the fifth race and in a one sided contest the Dick Cullinane owned Aghadown Fire (Larkhill Jo-Aghadown Phantom) defeated some better fancied opponents carving out a neat pillar to post victory in 30.67. Powering into an early lead over Ritas Lady and Wilcox Rascal

Aghadown Fire always looked comfortable up front dictating matters throughout for a three lengths success over a running on Property Partner.

Just touched off in his previous outing over this circuit the Terry O'Connor owned and Ned Murphy trained Terrys Boy (Droopys Kewell-Crefogue Plover) 5/2 ran out a determined winner of the sixth contest over 550 yards in 30.73. The winner did ever so well to push off a rails seeking Vintage Whiskey at the first turn. Terrys Boy kicked clear at this point and while the ageless Vintage Whiskey gave of his best in second spot Terrys Boy won a shade comfortably by five lengths.

The following two races were semi finals of the Paddy Power Irish Greyhound Derby Trial stake. Spinners Choice who ran in this years English Derby was all the rage in the first semi final and his supporters were on good terms with themselves as he clearly outpaced his rivals into the first turn. Spinners Choice was three lengths clear of the much-improved Seventh Gear running down to the third turn but as this 550-yard race wore on Seventh Gear began to eat into the favourites lead. Spinners Choice who may have needed this outing got very tired on the run home as the JJ Healy owned and Jim Scully trained Seventh Gear (Carlton Bale-Ollys Stary) 3/1 finished strongly to beat Spinners Choice by a length with The Other Arnie staying on well to claim third spot. Time 30.04.

The Joe Murphy owned Murlens Madrid (Larkhill Jo-Lemon Python) 2/1 has really matured with age and this April 02 whelp recorded a smashing sub 30.00 run capturing the second qualifier with ease. Noan Okee led to the first bend closely followed by Murlens Madrid and Darrigal Droopy. Murlens Madrid drove into the corner at this point and bumped Darrigal Droopy in the process. Murlens Madrid sprinted past Noan Okee on the back straight before stretching clear for a comfortable six lengths win over Noan Okee in a smashing 29.94.

Sean and Ray Jennings are really getting a sweet tune out of Draw Your Gun (Whitefort Judge-Roan Queen) and this 6/4 favourite blew away the opposition in the ninth race over 500 yards to post an easy 27.66 success. The early paced Seaview Lass made life difficult for the winner the length of the back stretch but having weathered that storm Draw Your Gun asserted over the final two bends to run out a four and a half lengths winner over a running on Bongo Flyer.

The final race of an eventful night was run off over the 550-yard trip and similar to the first contest of the night it produced a three-way photo finish. Gandis Runner, Savana Sahara and Tai Chi Melody had this race to themselves a good way from home and with all three giving their all on the run to the winning line the Raymond Waters owned and Dave Maltby Baker trained Savana Sahara (Larkhill Jo-Mythical Cracker) 3/1 stayed on the strongest to triumph by a neck from Gandis Runner with Tai Chi Melody just behind in third. The winning time was 30.54 and hopefully this winner will cheer up trainer Dave Maltby Baker who is awaiting an operation for a serious back complaint.

Newly appointed assistant Racing Manager Leonard Supple certainly had a baptism of fire on his first night in Kilcohan Park but to be fair to all concerned they salvaged Saturday night's card before it floundered on the rocks. Racing Manager Michael Higgins is die to return to the fold this week and a number of owners have asked me to convey their thanks to Brian Collins, Eamon Mackey, Barry and Finbarr Coleman, stipendary steward Michael Falvey Control Steward, Jim O'Donnell and all the staff in Kilcohan Park all of whom kept racing going during a difficult period. We all need to put the last month or so behind us and start to take Kilcohan Park back up through the ranks of the Premier division for the sake of all concerned.
