## Vandalism Plagues Dungarvan Estate

Dungarvan Town Council is to meet with Superintendent Michael Blake to voice its concern about an ongoing problem with anti-social behaviour in areas around the town.

It follows a litany of problems with late-night drinking and vandalism in various areas including Walton's Park, which continues to be taken over at night by large groups of youths, the Town Council heard at its Monday night meeting.

### TOWN COUNCIL TO MEET SUPERINTENDENT ON ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

The CBS Board of Management are also seeking a two-metre extension to their wall to stop youths drinking at night and discarding cans in the school field.

According to one councillor CCTV security is needed for the elderly residents of Cois Tra in Quanns after a recent burglary, while in a separate incident the grave of a prominent Garda was desecrated at St. Mary's Parish Graveyard.

In Childers Estate one resident was so concerned about continuous anti-social behaviour and crime in the estate, he contacted the local media to publicly air fears about the escalating number of incidents over the past few months.

#### VANDALISM

The resident of the council estate, who contacted the Dungarvan Leader last week, detailed a number of vandalistic

attacks in the past few months.

The man, who has lived in the area since 1974, said after the recent attacks on his property, he was forced to spend hundreds of euros installing a CCTV camera and sensor lights to safeguard his home from the small group of vandals.

"It's the worst I've seen things here," he said.

In a list of vandalistic attacks since early May, he claims vehicles have been burned out, tyres slashed and windows of houses and cars have been smashed.

The resident, who asked not to be named, said his own car

## 150 Seat Theatre Is Centre Stage In Council's Plans

### COUNCIL TO SEEK FUNDING FOR TOWN HALL PROJECT

Dungarvan looks set to have its first custom built theatre for a number of years after the Town Council approved plans to develop a 150-seat theatre in the Town Hall in Friary Street.

The development, which is dependent on securing one million euros in funding, was welcomed unreservedly by members of the Town Council at the July meeting.

Designed by consultants, David Kelly Partnership, the

project would include new dressing rooms, stage and seating and other facilities on the first floor, while the Dungarvan Museum would continue to occupy the ground floor and be provided new offices on the second floor.

It would be Dungarvan's first single purpose theatre since the Friary Hall fell into disrepair and out of use a number of years ago.

Welcoming the plans, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) called for the

"net to be cast as wide as possible" to secure funding from arts bodies, and semi-state bodies.

"I would support this unreservedly and I hope we can move on this relatively quickly," he added.

However, along with developing the theatre, the Town Hall will need considerable remedial work to bring it up to standards, according to Acting Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty.

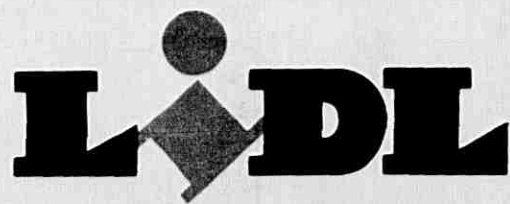

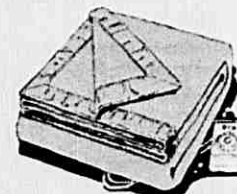

### CHARLES SMITH 1715-1762.

LISMORE page 52-53.

"A traveller at present would hardly take this town to have been a University, Bishops See, or much less a city. Instead of its ancient lustre, the Cathedral, the Castle, and a few tolerable houses intermixt with cabbins, are all that now appear. It has all the privilege of being a Borough, and sends two members to Parliament and the electors as in many other Boroughs of this fort are called Potwallopers. The Nave of the present Cathedral seems by its structure to be of no great antiquity, having been built long since the Choir, which part appears to be very ancient ... the stalls, seats and galleries are but of a late standing, as are the throne and pulpit, which are both well carved. In this church there are no monuments of antiquity, except the sides and cover of an ancient Tomb, of one McGrath buried here in the 1557".

## Seven Objections To Ballinacourty Development

 Further to last week's report on the proposal to construct 90 holiday cottages and a 3-story 4/5 star hotel at Kilgrovan, Clonea, we have been informed that a total of seven objections have been lodged with An Bord Pleanála.

The Clonea Concern Group; Michael Morrissey, Kilgrovan; Kilgrovan Estates (a Dublin based management company for a number of holiday homes in the area); a third-party appeal submitted by Desmond Barry Architects on behalf of John and Mary Corcoran and David and Geraldine Magnier of Kilgrovan Park; Ann Marie Delaney of Monrath House, Co. Laois; Clonea Beach

Awareness Group, and Tim and Carrie Foley of Bronte House, Ballinacourty have all appealed the grant of permission. The detailed appeals include objections from two groups based in the area. In their objection, The Clonea Concern Group say that if the development proceeds it will

have a "significant adverse effect on the area" due to the overall nature and scale of the development, and would cause the "urbanisation of what is a quiet rural area." Visually the scale of the development would be obtrusive, they say. A second group, the Clonea Beach Awareness Group, are objecting on a number of grounds, including that a large number of planning applications for the area have been refused in the past. And they claim an agreement to buy an old railway spur between the CIE and the developers, Greenburch Ltd is contrary to a Ministerial order. Meanwhile, Tim and Carrie Foley oppose the development on a number of grounds. Included in these is the lack of a proper road into the development, and that the development is premature and unsustainable. They also claim the development is an incorrect interpretation of its zoning, is inconsistent in light of previous refusals and is being driven by tax incentives. Developers and planners reports have also been ignored, the objection claims. The developers say the new hotel and holiday home development would cost in the region of 52 million euros to construct, and would create around 110 full time and 43 part time jobs.

# Healthy plants keep air clean

LOOK after your house plants - and your house plants will look after you. Carefully positioned pots of greenery around your home or office may make the place look better. They probably make it feel better.

All this is hardly surprising, because scientists have discovered that indoor plants act as highly efficient air filters, working round the clock to create a healthier atmosphere for you to live or



work in. That favourite aspidistra or humble spider plant works like a miniature version of the Amazon rain forest - absorbing pollution and harmful gases and pumping out a supply of fresh, clean air. Whether the problem stems from cigarette smoke or invisible emissions from a computer or photocopier, bad air can be harmful - causing skin complaints, allergies and headaches. Experts believe "sick building syndrome" - a tendency towards illness and lethargy suffered by workers in some offices - is due to poor air and can be treated by carefully-selected indoor plants. Plants work in different ways - and some are more effective than others. The spider plant is one of the best. Tests have shown that in 24 hours it can clear the air around it of 96 per cent of harmful carbon monoxide and 86 per cent of formaldehyde. Rubber plants, parlour palms, yuccas and ferns all make a contribution to a better atmosphere. A good garden centre or indoor plant specialist should be able to offer advice on what is best for your particular environment. But indoor plants do need special attention. Maintaining healthy plants indoors can sometimes be difficult - central heating and draughts all take their toll and a plant that is too hot, cold, moist or dry is likely to suffer. Here are some tips on how to treat common ailments:  
**Brown leaf tips** - Look for white, crusty salt on soil surface, pot edges and stems.

Correct by re-potting in fresh soil or watering thoroughly once each month. Very dry air will cause tip browning. Spray daily with a fine mist. Plants that are pot-bound also develop brown leaf tips.  
**Spots on leaves** - Water-soaked spots, sometimes with a yellow halo, may be caused by bacteria or fungi. Remove and destroy severely affected parts of the plant, avoid splashing water on the foliage since this spreads the micro-organisms causing the problem. Provide good air circulation. Many tropical plants develop spots on foliage that is old and ready to be dropped. This is normal. Pale white or grey spots may be caused by too much light or heat. Brown corky spots or lumps can be caused by too much water, especially during cool weather. This is common on geraniums and many succulents.  
**Leaves drop off** - Many plants drop leaves when there is a sudden change in temperature, light or humidity. Exposure to gas may also cause leaves to drop, as do insect infestations and lack of water.  
**Wilting** - This means the plant is not able to replace the water lost by evaporation and transpiration. To determine the cause, examine the roots. Over-watering causes the roots to die from lack of air. Look for wet, saturated soil caused by lack of drainage. Provide proper drainage and reduce watering. A pot-bound plant may not have enough soil to hold the water it needs. Correct by re-potting in a larger pot. Fertilizer and minerals from hard water will accumulate in soil and cause root damage and wilting. The best solution is to re-pot.

## THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

**Lift tulip and hyacinth bulbs**  
Tulips and hyacinths will now have completed their growth and can be lifted and cleaned. Lay the bulbs in shallow trays and stand them in a dry, cool, airy place, but not in full sun. Dead tops can be removed.  
**Spray potatoes**  
Do not wait until disease attacks your potatoes. Spray them now with Bordeaux mixture. The potato blight disease is common and some plants are likely to become infected unless you take this precaution.  
**Sow carrots**  
A small sowing of carrots made now is often justified, especially if the season happens to be a bad one for carrot fly. This fly does all its damage early in the summer, and seedlings from a July sowing usually escape. Sow stump rooted or intermediate varieties.  
**Complete thinning of apples and pears**  
Now is the time to complete the thinning of apples and pears. Reduce the fruits to one, or at most two, per spur.  
**Finish planting celery**  
All remaining celery seedlings should now be planted out in the trenches as soon as possible. The last plants to be dealt with will be those from the April sowing in a frame.  
**Mulch and spray runner beans**  
Runner beans will benefit from a fairly thick mulch of well rotted manure spread on the ground for a distance of at least a couple of feet on either side of the row. When the plants begin to flower, spray them every evening with tepid water. This will help the flowers to "set" and so ensure a good crop of beans. Keep this up all through the month and on into August.  
**Spray apples against Codlin moth**  
Repeat an application of one or other of the sprays recommended by the manufacturers and used in June.

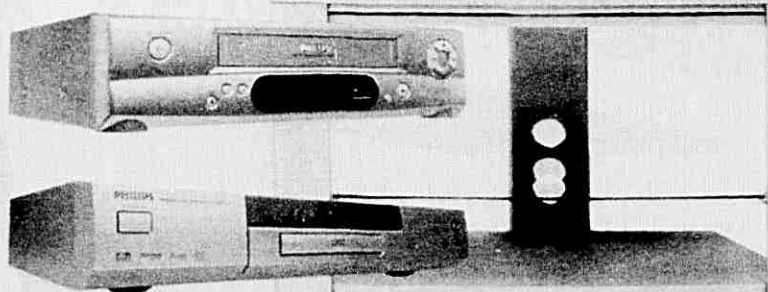

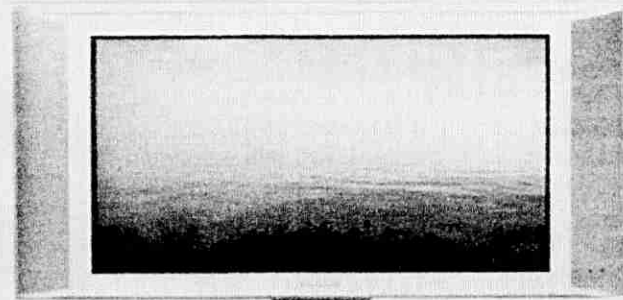

# Mindless Vandals Desecrate Garda's Grave

The desecration of the grave of a well-respected Garda was greeted with outrage in Dungarvan last week.

Mindless vandals destroyed a headstone along with most of the paving around the grave of

Pat Noctor in St. Mary's Parish Cemetery late on Monday night of last week.

A steel cross was uprooted from a nearby grave, and used in an attack that has shocked and sickened the community, and distressed the late Garda's

family and colleagues in the Dungarvan District Area.

A juvenile liaison officer with the Dungarvan Gardai, Pat Noctor, was one of the best known and most popular Gardai in the area until his death from motor neuron disease. Be-

cause of the high regard he was held in throughout the community, and his deep interest in sport, his garda colleagues launched the annual Pat Noctor Young Sports Star Awards scheme following his death.

Supt. Blake described the desecration of his grave as being the "lowest of the low."

"Even the most hardened individual cannot be but saddened by the desecration of the grave of our late colleague," he said. "And I am making an urgent appeal to members of the general public to give us their full co-operation and assistance in our efforts to bring those responsible to justice."

Supt. Blake extended his regret to the Noctor family "at this very distressing time."

The late garda's son, Ian, a radio presenter with Today FM, said his mother and other family members were shocked that such a thing could have happened.

"We are particularly saddened that people would single out for destruction the grave of a man who dedicated himself to the people of Dungarvan and to the Garda Síochána in the way my father did," he said.

Mr. Noctor said the family had no idea why it should have happened. "My father was held in very high esteem by the people of Dungarvan. Whenever we return there we are always proud of the reaction there is to his name."

# COOKERY CORNER

## Ham and asparagus

Preparation: 20 min  
Cooking: 10 min

A TASTY supper dish for the family this summer – little pastry parcels with a ham and asparagus surprise inside!

**Ingredients:**

- (serves 6-8)
- 4 medium sized ham steaks
- 4 sheet-ready rolled shortcrust pastry
- 2 x 5ml sp prepared mustard
- 8 thin slices cheddar cheese
- 440g can asparagus spears, well drained
- Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste
- Oil for deep frying.

**Method:**

CUT each sheet of pastry in half, so you end up with eight strips of pastry. Cut the ham steaks in

half. Fill a large pan or deep fryer two-thirds full with oil. While the oil is heating, prepare the parcels. Place a ham steak half on one strip of pastry. Spread ham steak with mustard. Top with a slice of cheese and two asparagus spears. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Brush the edges of the pastry with a little water. Fold the pastry over the ham steak to form a parcel. Seal the edges by pressing all around with a fork. Repeat with the remaining pastry and ingredients. You will end up with eight parcels in all. Place the parcels seam-side down in the hot oil. Fry until they are golden brown and crisp. Using a metal fish slice turn over and fry until golden brown on the other side – about two minutes' frying time for each side. Serve with a crisp green salad.



## Spicy lasagne

**Ingredients:**

- FOR THE SAUCE:**
- 1 x 15ml sp dried oregano
  - 1 x 15ml sp olive oil
  - 1 bay leaf
  - 225g chopped onion
  - 1/2 x 5ml sp dried crushed red pepper
  - 150g peeled carrots, diced
- FOR THE LASAGNE:**
- 2 x 15ml sp minced garlic
  - 15 lasagne sheets
  - 200g lean minced beef
  - 750g ricotta cheese
  - 150g spicy Italian sausage, skinned
  - 125 g grated parmesan cheese
  - 1 700g can chopped tomatoes
  - 250g frozen chopped spinach
  - 2 tbp tomato pure
  - 2 large eggs
  - 50 g chopped fresh basil
  - 500 g grated mozzarella
  - 1 x 15ml sp golden brown sugar

**Method:**

**FOR SAUCE:** Heat oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add onion, carrots and garlic and saute.

Add beef and sausage; saute until cooked through. Add remaining ingredients, cover and simmer until sauce thickens. Discard bay leaf and cool.

**FOR LASAGNE:** Preheat oven to 350° F/175° C. Cook lasagna sheets in boiling salted water for about 7 minutes. Drain and cover with cold water. Combine ricotta and 3/4 parmesan cheese in a bowl. Mix in spinach and season. Mix in the eggs. Drain pasta and pat dry. Spread a layer of sauce in the bottom of a 33x22 cm glass baking dish, then a layer of lasagne sheets, overlapping to fit. Then 1/2 the spinach mix, 1/2 the mozzarella and 1/4 of the sauce. Repeat layering, end with sheets of lasagne. Sprinkle remaining cheese evenly over the top. Cover with foil, bake for 40 minutes at 400° F/200° C. Uncover and bake for a further 40 minutes. Allow to stand for 15 minutes before serving.

## Hazelnut and almond fingers

**Ingredients:**

- Makes about 30
- 200 g plain flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 175 g sugar
- 100 g ground hazelnuts
- 100 g butter or margarine
- 1 egg yoke
- 25 g ground almonds
- 25 g flaked almonds

**Method:**

SIEVE the flour and baking powder into a bowl, and make a well in the centre. Break the egg into the well and add the milk and half the sugar before mixing together. Add the remaining sugar, the ground hazelnuts and butter or margarine, cut into small pieces, and mix quickly to form a dough. Chill for 20 minutes. Form the dough into small fingers. Brush with the beat-

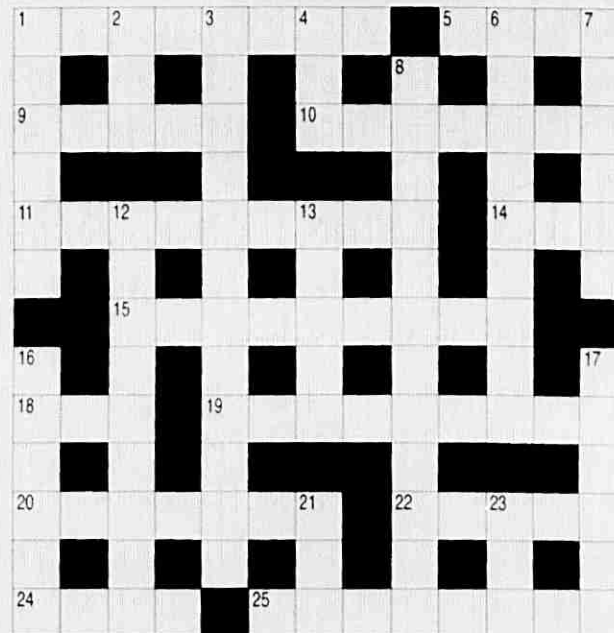


en egg yoke and roll in the ground and flaked almonds. Put the coated fingers on a greased baking tray and bake in a pre-heated moderately hot oven 200° C/400° F, Gas Mark 6, for 12-15 minutes or until they are firm and lightly browned.

**Top tip:** Keep the butter in the refrigerator and then grate it for easier mixing.

Wholefoods such as pulses and beans are filling and there are many varieties to experiment with. It is easier to digest than meat.

If you find it hard to eat fruit, blend several pieces into a smoothie.

## Funding Not Available For Maoil a'Choirne Lights

No funding is available for public lighting near a housing development in Maoil a'Choirne, Waterford County Council say.

Following representation about the matter by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab), Director of Services, John O'Flynn, said the area is not included in the public lighting programme for the period

2004-2006, which was approved by the council earlier this year. However, Mr. O'Flynn said he has investigated the matter as a housing development is proceeding there.

Planning permission for the new development includes public lighting at the entrance of the development and within the development itself. When completed this will leave a gap of 130 linear metres from the end

of the existing public lighting system, and for this gap to be filled two lighting columns would be required at a cost of around 3,000 euros.

He said the council is presently awaiting loan approval from the Department of the Environment to proceed with the new three year programme, but as the area isn't included, he said no funding is available to carry out the lighting.

# WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL SNIPPETS

## SAFETY BARRIER FOR CUSHCAM CROSS

A safety barrier will be put in place at Cushcam Cross on foot of mounting concerns about the safety of children attending Garranbane National School.

The barrier will be put in place before the start of the new school year as an immediate safety measure at the accident "black spot."

The section of road has been the scene of a number of serious accidents in the past few years and a renewed campaign to take some safety measures started after an artic-truck jack-knifed and overturned when coming down the Pike Hill, ending on its side near the school.

At the July meeting of Waterford County Council, Director of Services John O'Flynn said a 30,000 euro crash barrier would be erected near the school.

Raising the issue, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) called for immediate action to be taken. He also said his party colleague, Deputy Brian O'Shea had

written to the National Roads Authority (NRA) and was informed that two proposals are currently with Waterford County Council concerning the N25 at Cushcam Cross.

The first proposal requires a complete new junction arrangement at Cushcam, which would be a costly option due to the land acquisition requirements. The second involves the improvement of the junction south of Cushcam, and to close off the side roads at Cushcam to prevent turning movement.

But while the NRA say they're presently awaiting correspondence from Waterford County Council to determine their preferred course of action, Mr. O'Flynn said this was with them for the past three years, and it was up to the NRA to make a decision not the council.

He said the council's preferred option would be for a complete new junction.

Cllr. Kyne said immediate action must be taken, and then the long-term solutions could be considered. He said the council needed to be very much on the ball when dealing with the issue.

## Concern Over Condition Of The Pond

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) voiced concern over the condition of The Pond and Sexton Street after sewerage works in the area.

The works were carried out for the Wastewater Treatment Plant system.

Cllr. Kyne asked that the council deal with the issue with a firm hand, and keep an eye on the area.

Director of Services, John O'Flynn responded that the council had told the contractors to finish the work by the end of the previous week. He said The Pond was left in a dreadful condition, and the contractors would be warned that they must improve it. He said he wasn't sure about the condition of Sexton Street at the moment but would look into it.

## Draft County Development Plan To Go On Display

The Draft County Development Plan is to go on public display for a statutory period of ten weeks to allow for written submissions and observations.

Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Denis McCarthy said after submissions and observations have been received, a report will be prepared and presented for the consideration at a future meeting of the council.

The laborious two-year process in drawing up a new County Development plan began twelve months ago when a notice of intention to review the plan was published.

This notice invited submissions and observations from the public and interested parties, and a document relating to relevant planning issues was also published to help stimulate discussion and debate on the review of the County Development Plan.

During this period, a series of public meetings were held in Tramore, Dungarvan, Lismore and Portlaw to outline the statutory procedures and to assist the public in making submissions and observations.

A total of 107 submissions and observations were received, Mr. McCarthy said, and a report on these was submitted to the council in last October. It was agreed by members to proceed and prepare a Draft County Development Plan.

During this latest display period, a series of meetings, at Area Committee and SPC level will be held to obtain the member's views and comments relating to the proposals contained in the Draft Plan.

Responding to a question from Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab), Mr. McCarthy said those who submitted at the initial stage would have to resubmit to be considered in the Draft Plan. Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) called for the council to write to all those who submitted before, informing them that they must resubmit to be included.

## Crackdown On Littering Smokers

Spot checks will continue outside pubs, and warning notices have already been sent to publicans urging them to keep the pavements outside their premises clean in the wake of the smoking in the workplace ban.

Denis McCarthy, Director of Services with Waterford County Council, was responding to a question from Cllr. James Tobin (FF).

Cllr. Tobin asked whether the publican or the person doing the littering would be fined if a cigarette butt was thrown on the ground.

Mr. McCarthy said there is a legal requirement on a publican to keep the pavement outside their premises clean and tidy. But a person caught littering would be fined also.

## Council Agree To Transfer Land

Two small parcels of land in council ownership were transferred for a nominal fee. Ownership of an area of 0.031 ha in Barrack Street in Cappoquin was transferred to James and Eileen Doocey, who live at Barrack Street for 1 euro and legal expenses accrued.

The second transfer was for the ownership of 1.1 acres of land at Shandon in Dungarvan to Eircom Ltd.

The transfer was necessary due to a mapping error, which occurred previously between Eircom and Waterford County Council when a large sum of land was transferred in error.

Eircom are to pay Waterford County Council 10 euros and legal expenses.

Both proposals were passed unanimously.

## COUNCIL TO PROCEED WITH CAPPOQUIN PLAYGROUND PLANS

Waterford County Council is to proceed with plans for a playground in Cappoquin. Director of Services, Peter Carey said a local committee has been formed and fundraising is under way at the moment.

In accordance with Part 8 of the Local Government Planning & Development Regulations 2001, a public notice of the proposed playground in Cappoquin was advertised in April, and the public had an opportunity to make submissions or observations up to the 2nd of June.

However, no submissions or observations were received and they are now to proceed with the playground as proposed.

The Council unanimously passed the proposal.

## Sinn Fein Cllr Warns Of "Time-Bomb"

Newly elected, Sinn Fein Cllr. Brendan Mansfield expressed concern over the major increase in off-road dumpers seen on the county's roads, and called for a review of the regulations governing their use.

He said the off-road dumpers caused serious damage to roads and are a danger to other road users.

The license classification for dumpers also allows 16-year-olds to drive them, and he said figures for breaking distances for the vehicles while carrying a certain load were not known.

Cllr. Mansfield went on to warn that the dumpers are a time-bomb on our roads with 45 accidents already involving dumpers and 8 in the Waterford/Kilkenny area alone.

Cllr. Tom Higgins, (FG) agreed saying the vehicles cause an awful lot of fright to people in the way some are being driven.

Director of Services, John O'Flynn said a review is carried out every six months, and a review was carried out in May. This process was advertised with a closing date of the 30th of June. Eight submissions were received and permission was extended by three months.

He said a lot of issues were involved, including employment. He said it wasn't cut and dry, and he said the council will be looking at all those issues.

## Waterford County Council Going For Brown Gold

Waterford County Council will introduce the latest element of their Waste Management programme to all their customers starting from 13th September 2004. The introduction of the Organic Brown

Bin Collection for householders in County Waterford is a further component in the ongoing improvement of waste management in the county. According to Denis McCarthy, Director of Planning, Environ-

ment and Emergency Services, "the participation by householders in the Brown Bin Collection will increase the recycling rates in Waterford from 29% to 59%. This will place Waterford County Council in the top tier in recycling figures in the country."

Over the coming weeks, Waterford County Council customers will receive a free 140 Litre brown bin. A full information pack on this service will be placed inside each bin and customers are asked to carefully read this prior to the first collection date in September. It is also important the prepaid registration postcard is returned to Waterford County Council on receipt of the Brown Bin. Once details are received, customers will be entered into a draw for Free Refuse and Brown Bin Collection for a year.

"The introduction of the new brown bin means that food leftovers and other materials that rot (biodegrade) like meat, fish, breads, cakes, paper napkins, grass clippings and cut flowers will be turned into compost (through the monitored composting programme in Waterford City) rather than being sent to landfill," added Environment Education Officer, Ann-Marie Kenna. "The success of Waterford County Council's commercial composting programme allowed us to develop a similar programme for domestic householders. Over 50 businesses around Dungarvan, Ring, Tallow, Lismore and Cappoquin are now participating in this scheme."

Denis McCarthy wished to pay tribute to all Waterford County Council customers stating "the success of our waste management programmes can only be sustained in partnership with each household and the involvement to date is most appreciated. I look forward to continued participation to achieve the high standards of waste manage-

# REGISTRATION OF QUARRIES

Section 261 of the Planning and Development Act 2000, which relates to quarries has commenced with effect from 28th April 2004.

Section 261 of the Planning and Development Act 2000 introduces a new system of registration for all existing quarries (except quarries which obtained planning permission since 28th April 1999). Under the registration system quarry owners/operators must supply full details of their operations to the planning authority including information on the area of the quarry, the material being extracted, the hours of operation and the traffic, noise and dust generated by the quarry, by 27th April 2005. Quarry owners/operators are requested to contact the Planning Department, Waterford County Council to discuss how to register and obtain the appropriate form for completion.

**Any quarry, which has not obtained planning permission since 28th April 1999 is obliged to comply with section 261, failure to do so before the 27th April 2005 will result in the quarry becoming unauthorised development regardless of its previous status.**

Following registration, Planning Authorities may where necessary introduce new or modified controls on the operation of certain quarries or may, in certain cases, require quarry owners/operators to apply for planning permission and to submit an Environmental Impact Statement.

The Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government has published Guidelines to Planning Authorities on Quarries and Ancillary Activities, which offer guidance on planning for the quarrying industry, through the Development Plan and determination of applications for planning permission. While the Guidelines are primarily addressed to Planning Authorities, it is intended that they will be of assistance to owners/operators of quarries to which section 261 of the Act applies. The guidelines are available on the Departments website- [www.environ.ie](http://www.environ.ie) - and for purchase from the Government Publications Sales Office.

**APES**

There are four types of ape: gorilla, chimpanzee, gibbon and orang-utan. The gorilla is about the same height as a man but has longer arms and is much heavier and stronger. When distributed, they put on a ferocious looking display of chest beating and charge forward. This behaviour is all bluff, and intended to frighten the intruder. Gibbons live in the forests of South-east Asia. They spend much of their time in the trees, using their long arms to swing from branch to branch. The shy orang-utan, whose name means ‘man of the woods’, lives in the rain forests of Borneo and Sumatra. This second largest member of the ape family is reddish-brown in colour and lives mainly on fruit.



**Chimpanzees Live In Family Groups**  
 Most of the ape family are found in the forests and jungles of Africa, South America and Asia. Chimpanzees live in family groups in the rainforests of central and west Africa. They live on fruit, leaves and roots. They also enjoy ants, when they find and ants' nest.

**Apes Use Sticks As Tools**  
 Apes are very intelligent. They can work out simple problems, and they can use their hands and feet quite skilfully. A chimpanzee will use a stick to get to out-of-reach fruit or insects, spider monkeys use sticks as weapons, throwing them at any potential threat, and the orang-



utan will often use a large leaf as an umbrella  
**Did You Know?**  
 A gorilla weights 3,000 times more than its fellow primate, the pen-tailed tree shrew. Chimpanzees, gorillas and orang-utans have been taught to use sign language. Chimpanzees in the wild chew medicinal plants when they are feeling poorly. The ancient Greek philosopher Galen of Pergamum wrote: ‘The ape is likest to man in viscera, muscles, arteries, veins, nerves and in the form of bones.’ The first ape to be dissected, a chimpanzee in 1699, is still in the British Museum. People were outraged when Charles Darwin suggested in 1859 that humans were descended from apes.

# FARMING LEADER

**SHEEP**

**Ewe Condition**

There are only 14 weeks between weaning and the ewes going back to the ram. Take away the 2 weeks for drying-off and that leaves 12 weeks at most for thin ewes to gain body condition.

**Target:** about 70% of the ewes should be condition score 3.5 or better going to the ram.

One of the findings from the farm research project (TET) last year was that only about 50% of the ewes reached this condition target.

Ewes in poor condition going to the ram will generally be in poor condition at housing and poorer condition at lambing resulting in

- poorer litter size (ewe condition on the TET farms was about 0.5 units under target resulting in 0.05 less lambs per ewe being weaned)
- increased lambing spread
- increased lamb losses
- generally a higher labour input around lambing time.

One unit in ewe condition score is around 12kg liveweight. Thin ewes (CS 2.0/2.5) will require up to 10 weeks to gain one condition score unit (i.e. to reach 3.0/3.5)

Management after weaning should be based on the following principles

- Ewes in good body condition (CS 4+) can be "tightened up" to lose some condition
- Ewes in average condition should maintain weight
- Ewes in poor condition (CS 3 or less) should be put on good grass with those at CS 2/2.5 being given this grass from weaning. It is much easier to increase body condition now with good grass than later in the season.

Thin ewes that do not improve in condition over an 8-10 week period should possibly be culled.

**Replacement ewe lambs**

Since the dry hogget rule came in some farmers have been buying "tail-ender" ewe lambs, claiming the premium and selling them as good quality??? hogget ewes the following year. Some recent research from Scotland shows that lambs that are underfed /stunted in early life have poorer lifetime reproductive performance - confirming what many serious sheep farmers have noticed over the past number of years.

Ideally ewe lambs should be tagged at birth and then selected on daily gain (taking into account whether single / twin) at or around weaning. In the absence of tagging at birth the next best is to select on the basis of weight. Do not wait until September / October (when lambs with potential have been sold) to select replacements.

Replacement rate should be at least 20% of the breeding flock. The replacement rate in some flocks is insufficient resulting in too many old ewes being retained.

**Plan to Reseed Grassland**

**When to Reseed?**

About 50% of total reseeding is carried out in the autumn. This time of year is particularly suitable for reseeding on dairy farms as there is more than an adequate supply of grass available for grazing and the demand of the herd is decreasing unlike beef farms. Stocking rate is lower in autumn than spring since little or no land is being cut for silage. August is the most suitable month in autumn for sowing grass seeds. If clover is being incorporated and is considered important, then reseeding should be completed before the third week of August at the very latest. Clover needs to be sown early as it takes about 8-10 weeks (twice as long as grass) to establish properly. In addition the threshold soil temperature for growth is much higher for clover (8oC) than for grass (6oC). A rule of thumb is that all reseeding should be completed by September 15th. This date can vary from year to year and from place to place. In upland exposed areas, where winter comes early or in heavy wet soils, reseeding should be completed earlier. Reseeding early allows the seedlings to commence tillering before the onset of winter. In late sown crops, tiller density can be low in spring resulting in a more open habit of growth and poorer grass availability. Ideally reseeding should be completed sufficiently early in the autumn to allow for grazing before the onset of winter.

In next week's notes I will describe some of the reseeding methods which can be used.

## IFA Calls on Minister Walsh to Reject Sugar Reform Proposals

The representative of Waterford IFA's Sugar Beet Section James Coughlan has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to reject the EU Commission proposals issued today on the reform of the sugar sector and ensure the future viability of sugar beet growing in Ireland.

The proposals provide for the reform to begin in 2005 instead of 2006, as provided for under the current regulation.

Members of IFA Sugar Beet Committee joined European beet growers from Spain, Portugal, Italy, Finland and Greece in Brussels recently to protest at the Commission's proposals.

"The proposals which provide for a 25% beet price cut in 2005 and 2006 and the 37% cut in 2007, along with a European quota reduction of 2.8m tonnes or 16% over 4 years, are draconian and will drive Irish beet

growers out of business", said IFA Sugar Beet representative James Coughlan.

Mr. Coughlan pointed out that "Ireland's regional allowance worth €1.90 per tonne of beet is not included in the proposal. We are not accepting this and demand that this portion of our

beet price is retained."

He concluded: "The proposal to merge the A&B sugar quota across Europe is totally unacceptable to Irish growers. It will dilute our price disproportionately as our B sugar quota, at 10%, is smaller than many other countries."

## National Policy to Support Local Ownership of Wind Farm Projects Needed - ICMSA

National policy must be amended in order to provide the correct support environment for community based wind farm projects, according to Mr. Tommy Cooke, Chairperson of ICMSA's Rural Development Committee.

"I have been very encouraged by the findings of a recent report commissioned by the Western Development Commission (WDC) entitled 'To Catch the Wind: The Potential for Community Ownership of Wind Farms in Ireland'. This report clearly demonstrates the value added to rural communities by local ownership of wind projects. However, it makes clear that although Ireland has possibly Europe's best wind resource, that potential is not being capitalised upon. This regrettable fact is due to a combination of factors, but may be chiefly blamed on incoherent and shortsighted national policy. This situation has to change".

"Communities in the West of Ireland in particular could benefit enormously from wind farm development. I believe that national

policy should actively encourage wind farm development particularly in the South and West. Those living in communities in which wind farms are going to be built should be offered the opportunity to invest in those farms. In this way, wind farming can serve a social and local economic purpose as well as being a source of renewable energy".

Mr. Cooke continued: "The recommendations outlined in the 'To Catch the Wind' Report are to be welcomed. In particular, ICMSA believes that the time is now right for the establishment of a Renewable Energy Partnership Advisory body, which will make recommendations on the formulation of national policy in this area. There is an urgent need for such a group, but its usefulness will only be measured by the involvement of community renewable energy groups. If these local groups are not involved at the very highest levels then, frankly, the advisory groups will simply end up representing the same interests that have already demonstrated a failure to grasp the potential."

## MONEY MATTERS

### FINANCIAL COMMUNICATION

If you have made that big decision to move in together or get married, try to sort out financial responsibilities while the situation is exciting, and new. Don't wait until a crisis strikes to work out who should be paying for what! Money is one of the major causes of a relationship breaking down and, if things go wrong, you could find yourself not only single again, but also in debt and homeless. Partners who ignore financial matters do so at their peril!

Examine your income and expenditure. Make a list of joint expenses - rent, bills, food, household expenses, evenings out etc. Decide how you are going to divide these. This is particularly important if one of you is earning more than the other. Remember relationships are based on trust and it is important that you can talk about money. Merge your finances gradually as the relationship become stronger. From the start however, you should have a joint account for ordinary bills like Food, ESB, TV Licence, etc. Make a decision on how much you are going to put into these expenses every month and arrange to pay it either by direct debit or some other reliable way. **Talking about money is almost important as saving it.**

If you have decided to rent a property together, register both names on the tenancy agreement. This will ensure that you both have equal rights to live in the property or to terminate the agreement.

All couples argue about money at some stage, but the two things, which really drive couples apart, are debt and overspending. Some people only resolve financial arrangements when they hit a crisis situation. **Remember to plan ahead and divide up all the financial responsibilities equally.** The key is to communicate about your financial commitments and the more the better. It is a process, which may take some getting used to, but it will help avoid those unnecessary arguments!

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

### QUESTION

A friend of mine from Northern Ireland is hoping to get work as a shop assistant in the south while still living in the north. Where does he pay his tax and social welfare contributions?

### ANSWER

Your friend may have to pay tax in the north if he has other income in the north, however, he will pay tax on the income from his job down here and not in Northern Ireland. **He will receive the full standard personal tax credits in the south provided at least 75% of his income is taxable here.** Under a Double Taxation Agreement with the UK he will not have to pay tax on the same income again in the north. If he is liable for tax on other income in the north he will receive a tax credit for the tax he has already paid in the south. If he has no income in the north he will not have to pay any tax there. He will also pay his Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) Contributions down here which will entitle him to certain benefits. He will need a Personal Public Service Number (PPS No.) which he can obtain through a local Social Welfare Office down here. He will require the following when he is applying for it:

- Current valid Passport or Birth Certificate (long form preferred) and valid photographic ID e.g. Full Driving Licence, Employment ID (with photo).
- Evidence of either work, social welfare claim, residency, tax liability or education history in Northern Ireland.
- Evidence of his address.

# DISABILITY AWARENESS

## MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY

### What is Muscular Dystrophy?

Muscular Dystrophy (MD) is a group of genetic disabilities, which are characterized by a progressive weakness and degeneration of the skeletal or voluntary muscles, which control movement. The main forms of Muscular Dystrophy are as follows:

**Myotonic, Duchenne, Becker, Limb-girdle, facioscapulohumeral, congenital, oculopharyngeal, distal and Emery-Dreifuss.**

One of the most common of these forms of Muscular Dystrophy is Duchenne, which only affects males and is more common in children. And Myotonic Muscular Dystrophy is another common form affecting adults, both males and females. This disability can affect people of all ages.

### What causes this disability?

Muscular Dystrophy is a disability, which is caused by a defect in the gene, which makes up the muscles. The defect can be inherited, the person with the disability can pass it on to their child or the child could be a carrier of the gene, but may never be affected by the disability themselves. It is also known to occur where there is no family history. Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy occurs because of a defect in a single significant protein in muscles called dystrophin.

### Symptoms and Diagnoses of Muscular Dystrophy

The symptoms of MD vary considerably, depending on which kind of MD the person suffers from. Muscle weakness is the most common symptom, and this also varies according to the kind of Muscular Dystrophy the person has. Diagnosis of the disability can be carried out by genetic testing, this will establish if the person carries the defective gene. There is no specific treatment for any of the forms of MD. Physical therapy to prevent contractures (a condition in which shortened muscles around joints cause abnormal and sometimes painful positioning of the joints), there are also orthopedic appliances used for support. In the later stages of MD respiratory problems may occur, and chest infections should be treated immediately.

### What is the Prognosis?

Because Muscular Dystrophy is a group of genetic conditions, the prognosis varies according to the type of MD and the progression of the disability. Some cases may be mild and over a normal lifespan, while other cases may have severe muscle weakness, functional disability with the loss of ability to walk and move around. Life expectancy may depend on the degree of progression. Research is being carried out to make Muscular Dystrophy better understood and to develop therapies that will hopefully help to prevent and cure the disability in the future. There is a National Organization that supports people with Muscular Dystrophy and their families. For further information regarding Muscular Dystrophy please contact Waterford Disability Network.

1. Introduction to our Faith: Arranger: Valerie Leo. Ballinroad Church was built in 1804 and stands in the townland of Garrynagreeragh West.
  2. The Castle: Arrangers: Anne Casey and Mary Kiely. It contained a model of the Castle surrounded by stones.
  3. Recreation - G.A.A., "Our National Sports": Arrangers: Mary Gorman & Maura Kindregan. The exhibit contained the blue and gold jersey of Abbeyside hurlers and the green and white jersey of Ballinacourty footballers.
  4. I.C.A. "It takes a woman!!!!": Arrangers: Bridget Broderick & Helen O'Connor. The 1st. guild was founded in 1970 and the current President is Mrs. Monica Dwane.
  5. Recreation --- Golf. Arranger: Mairead Maher. Dungarvan Golf Club originally began in the Cunnigar in 1929.
  6. The Lighthouse. Arrangers: Mary Gorman & Maura Kindregan. It was first established on the 1st. July 1858 and was built of local Limestone.
  7. Industry: Arranger: Bridget Drohan. Quigley Magnisite was opened in 1959 and at it's peak employed 144 people.
  8. "A continuation of our Faith": Arranger: Ethna Sheehan.
  9. The Beach - "Happy Days are here again." Clonea

10. Fishing "The Fisherman's Garden": Arrangers: Alice Houlihan & Dina Walshe. Shore Angling from Clonae Beach and fishing from the pier at the Gold Coast has proved many hours of enjoyment.
11. Recreation - Soccer. Arrangers: Mary Fraher & Helen O'Connor. Ballinroad Soccer Club was founded in 1971 and it's first Chairman was Raymond Cantwell. The clubs colours are green and white and their home ground is behind St. Laurence's Hall.
12. "After the Famine": Arrangers: Monica Dwane & Catriona Keating. The potato crop failed 6 times between 1800 and the Famine. It was most unusual for the crop to fail 2 years in succession. When the crop failed in 1845 farmers felt that things would be better next year. However, in 1846 the potato blight devastated the country and left many dead and others destitute. It was reported that over 40% of the Waterford Crop was lost.
13. St. Laurence "Our Patron": Arrangers: Ann Casey & Mary Kiely. St. Laurence is the patron saint of Ballinroad Church. He was born in Spain and was martyred in the year 258. We celebrate his feast day on August 10th.
14. Schools. Arranger: Valerie Leo. Ballinacourty N.S. was built in 1884 - 1885. It existed for 85 years before being amalgamated with Abbeyside N.S.
15. Recreation - Rugby. Arranger: Julieanne Morrissey. The Rugby Club purchased it's playing pitch in 1972 at Ballyrandle. The Pavilion was officially opened in 1981.
16. Recreation - Tennis.

Arranger: Mairead Maher  
 17. The Organ "The Bridal March": Arrangers: Maura Ryan & Mairead O'Sullivan. Music is closely associated with the various ceremonies that are held in the Church. Wagner's "Bridal March" is possibly one of the most wide-

ly played pieces of music.  
 18. Swags. Arrangers: Maura Grant & Mary McCarthy.  
 19. Pew Ends. Arrangers: Ann Keevers & Ann Mangan.

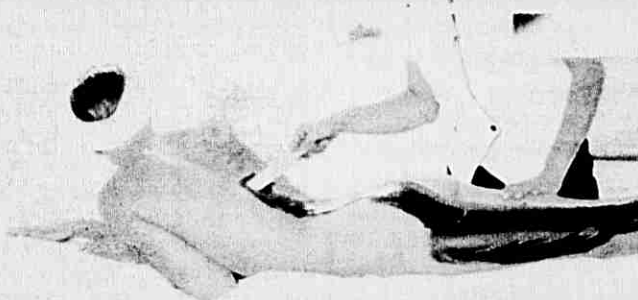

## RECENT DEATHS

### Late Miss Kay Caulfield

It was with deep regret that many people learned of the death of Miss Kay Caulfield, N.T., who passed away in her 92nd year in a nursing home in Co. Galway. She began her teaching career in Ballyporeen, Co. Tipperary before moving to Clonmel where she spent 36 years in the Sisters of Charity school. A person of great faith, she passed on her Christian values to her pupils by word and example. Because of the wonderful rapport she had with her class, she could speak to them more as a friend and advisor than as a teacher. Kay was a teacher par excellence, like many members of her profession, she loved to talk about her past pupils, and was proud of their achievements in all their undertakings. Those same past pupils loved and respected her and many of them kept in touch throughout her retirement. She enjoyed their many visits to Hillcrest Nursing Home. Kay loved teaching, she saw her involvement in the education of young people as the greatest of privileges, and the most sacred of trusts.

Kay was born in Moycullen, Co. Galway into a farming family. One of seven children, she grew up in a home atmosphere which was sympathetic to all things Irish and traditional. After primary schooling she went to the All Irish Preparatory College in Tourmakeady on the shores of Lough Mask, and was trained in Caryfort College, where she had the privilege of being taught music by the late Vincent O'Brien, teacher and mentor of John McCormack. Coming from Connemara, Kay had a great command of, and love for the Irish language, history and song. Kay was a founder and life long member of Clonmel Cumann Gaolach which at that time organised scholarships to the Gaeltacht under the Coiste na bPaisti scheme, and also brought many prestigious lectures to Clonmel. When Feile Chluain Meala flourished, Kay trained her pupils in both choral singing and verse speaking, receiving the highest accolades from many distinguished adjudicators including Tomais Mac Anna, Eddie Golden and many others of Abbey Theatre fame. In this sphere also, schools drama was of great interest to Kay and her exacting work was rewarded in 1966 when the U16 drama group from the Sisters of Charity school won the All Ireland shield at the Gaiety Theatre, Dublin with a play called "Taibhsí sa Teach", having previously won two Munster finals and a runner up All Ireland award with a hilarious production of "Mar a mBiann Toit".

On the occasion of Kay's retirement she recalled World War 2 and its effects on school life in Ireland. There was a scarcity of fuel, paper and even chalk! The school had a number of refugee children from England, sent by relatives, to a

safer environment. When ever the fire siren sounded in town their faces would freeze in terror, until all was quiet again. Outside of school, Kay had many cultural interests including art, literature and poetry, and right up to her death she enjoyed nothing better than a deep discussion on current affairs. These interests were offset by games of pitch and putt, golf, cards and a visit to the bingo halls.

# Ballyneety Saga Takes Fresh Turn

## DRUMMYS URGE REJECTION OF "ILLEGAL" ESB APPLICATION

The Ballyneety brothers who won a four-and-a-half year battle against the location of two massive steel pylons close to their home are demanding the rejection of what they say is an "illegal" application from the ESB to relocate a powerline across their property.

Just hours after An Bord Pleanála ordered the semi-state company to remove the pylons at the centre of the controversy, the ESB lodged a planning application with Waterford County Council seeking permission to alter the route of the 38kV overhead line.

But the application to move the powerline across the boundary line of their property has outraged the elderly brothers, Frank and Monnie Drummy.

It's believed that if allowed to proceed two timber poles will replace the steel pylons but the powerline itself will be moved around 6 metres closer to the Drummy home.

And in a statement, they call on Director of Services, Denis McCarthy to return the "illegal application."

"We will be demanding that the Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Denis McCarthy return this illegal application from the ESB as we will be contesting this with vigour and will not allow the ESB to move an illegal powerline further into our property as the dwelling on the adjoining site does not seek retention and the powerline is unauthorised," the statement says.

If accepted, the relocation of the line would be the second diversion to facilitate the development of a private home on an adjoining site.

The latest twist in a saga that's already taken its toll on the health of the brothers follows the release of a damning Inspectors ruling recently.

In his report, the Inspector found that the diversion wasn't for the sole purpose of the electricity, but to allow the construction of a new dwelling. It also rejected the ESB's claims that the line hadn't been moved.

And the Inspector found that the ESB didn't seek planning permission to move the line as required and so the powerline is unauthorised.

It says the requirement to replace the wooden poles with steel masts arose from the construction of a dwelling in a location that contravened its planning permission.

"This unauthorised development necessitated either the relocation of the powerline or the upgrading of the support structures," it said.

Meanwhile, Director of Services, Mr. McCarthy said the ESB's new application hasn't been validated or processed as of yet, and so the council hasn't formed any opinion on it.

# Vandalism Plagues Dungarvan Estate

was vandalised, but after he traded it for a new car the vandals returned a couple of weeks later and attempted to set the new car alight with fire lighters. However, the car was saved after neighbours alerted him that the tyre was burning at 3am.

Other incidents have included a car being burnt-out in the estate, while a fourth had all four tyres slashed. A motorbike's tyres were slashed while another vehicle parked outside the Community Centre also had its tyres slashed.

Windows of a neighbouring house whose occupants had left were also smashed and boarded up by the Town Council in recent days.

"They are getting more saucy because no-one is doing anything about them," he said. "We know who they are, and the Guards know. These fellas are drinking on the street."

### WALTON'S PARK

Meanwhile, during the Town Council's July sitting, Cllr. Brendan Mansfield (SF) said Walton's Park has become a centre for anti-social behaviour in the Dungarvan area over the past number of months.

"Large groups have gathered in the area day and night to drink and to partake in other forms of anti-social behaviour. On occasions the Park has been strewn with empty alcoholic drink cans and other litter," he said.

Saying that the elderly residents were being intimidated, he added that he felt the fact residents of the town are beginning to see an amenity facility as a no-go area is an utter disgrace.

"That is why I feel that a section of hedgerow located between the main entrance to the park and the Takeaway be removed or altered so as to give a clear line of sight into the park, so those partaking in anti-social

behaviour have no hiding place."

He said the ostrich syndrome of hoping the problem will go away if ignored is not good enough.

He also called on the Town Council to formally invite Superintendent Blake to the September meeting to explain what the Gardaí are doing to tackle the problem and what councillors can do to assist them in this.

### COIS TRA

In a separate but related problem, Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab) said elderly residents in Cois

Tra are frightened after a recent break-in, and asked that security measures promised by the Manager would be immediately put in place.

She called for CCTV cameras to be installed and the replacement of the doors with a stronger door type.

"I was assured by the manager when I objected to this development going ahead that every measure would be taken to make this development secure for its elderly residents. It is now time that these assurances and promises are taken seriously and put in place," she

said.

### GARDAI

It was agreed to meet privately with Superintendent Blake to voice the council's concerns about Walton Park and the on-going problem of Anti-Social Behaviour in areas around the town.

Contacted by the Dungarvan Leader in connection with the concerns of the resident, Supt. Blake, said the Gardaí are investigating the incidents, and appealed to anyone with information about the identity of the perpetrators to contact them on 058-42370.

He said he will revert back to the council with a decision on this in the future.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) supporting the plans, said a town the size of Dungarvan should have a theatre. She said Dungarvan Drama Group are currently forced to put on performances at a local hotel, and a theatre would aid them considerably.

Dungarvan has produced so much acting talent, she said, and so much more could be attracted to take part with a custom built theatre.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) echoing the previous comments, also commended County Manager, Donal Connolly for his role in the plans, and said the theatre was a welcome facility for Dungarvan.

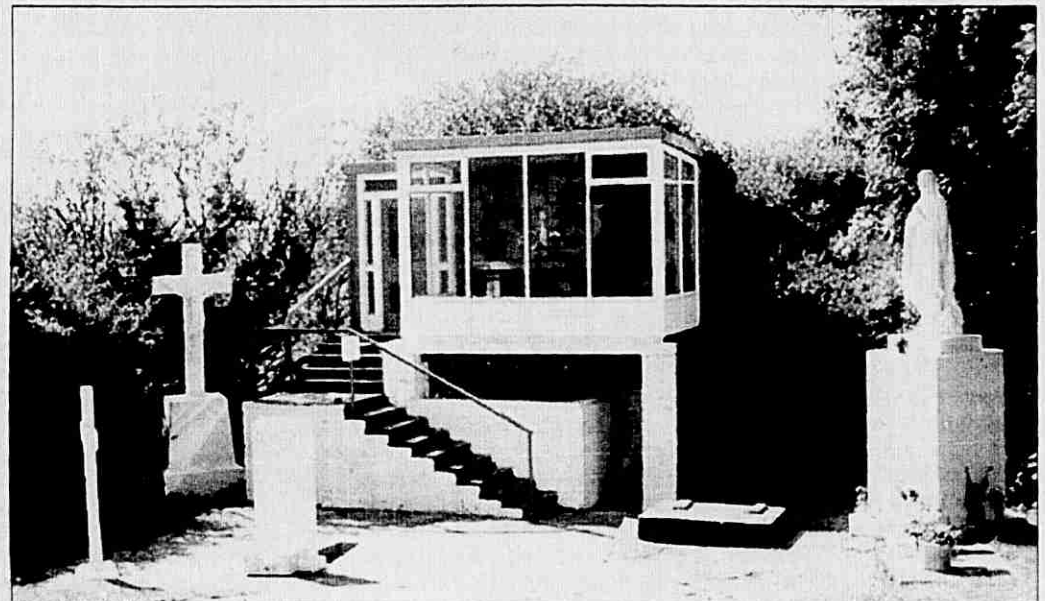
### Death Of Joyce Merrigan

# Munster Vice-President at Waterford IFA Co. Executive Meeting

Speaking to the monthly IFA County Executive meeting, Munster IFA Vice President, Donal Kelly commended Waterford IFA for their diligent and sincere effort in meeting the local County Councillors and Minister Martin Cullen, impressing on them the grave significance of the EU Nitrates Directive.

Mr. Kelly stated that the measures proposed in the Government's initial Draft Action Programme to control and regulate farmers in regard to water quality are unnecessary, unworkable and unaffordable, and are totally at odds with the realities of Waterford farm incomes under pressure.

Mr. Kelly said it was of vital interest for the top 15,000 farmers in the country that only a workable directive is implemented and he emphasised the

fact that water quality in Ireland is continuing to improve.

Waterford IFA are very grateful to Minister Martin Cullen and Minister Joe Walsh for putting Denis Brosnan in charge of studying the situation and to make recommendations that will be agreeable to all parties.

He has given us until September to sort out the problem so hopefully an amicable solution can be arrived at between Waterford agriculture and the Department of the Environment.

The IFA man also covered the CSO's overstated national farm income by 20%, and stated that this is the reason why Minister Cullen's comments on agricultural incomes has been so far out of line in the recent past.

In conclusion, the Chairman Harry Gray thanked Donal Kelly for a very comprehensive and informative address.

Waterford will try to spoil their dream when we meet them on Saturday week.



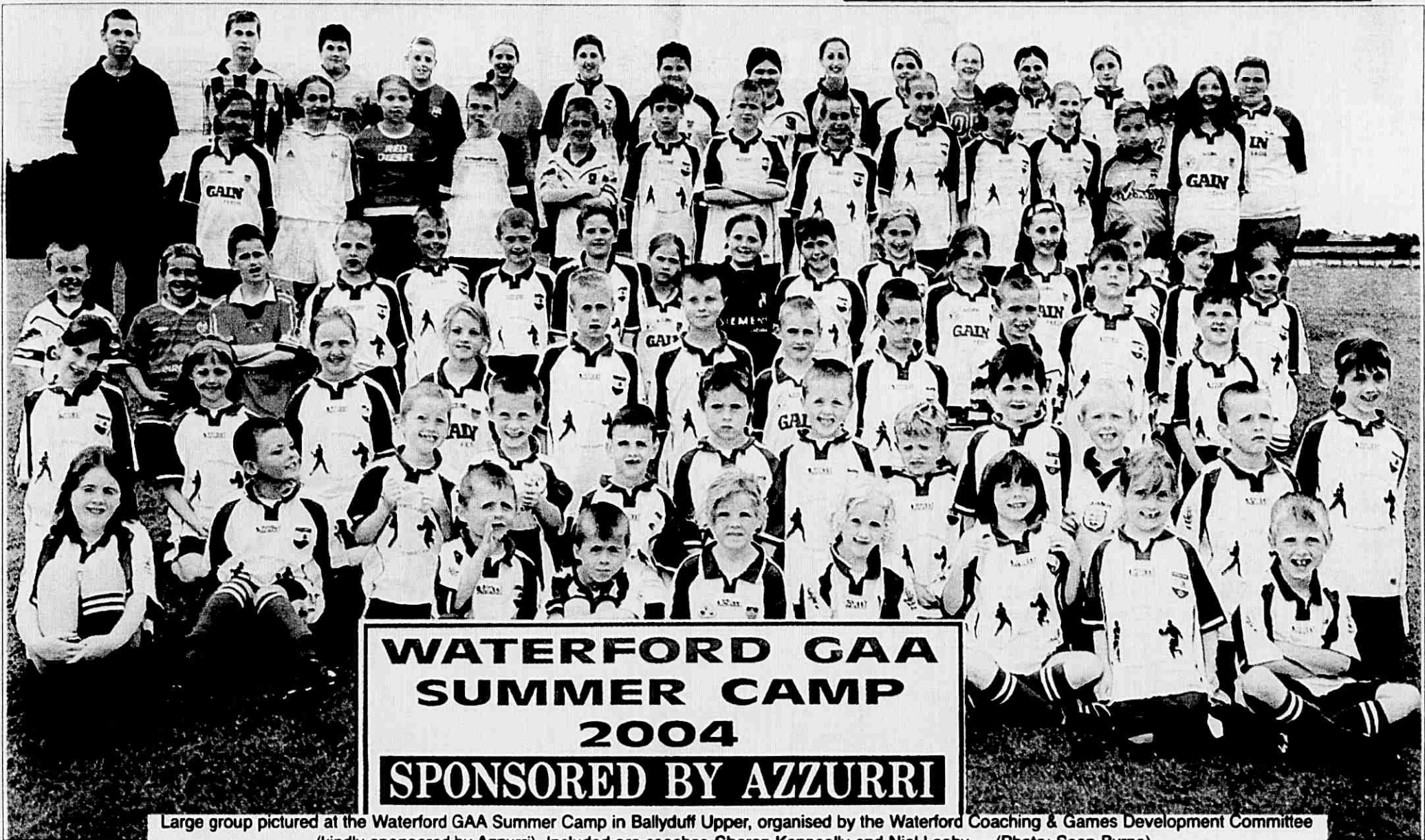

Rathgormack, who, following their big victory over Kill recently in the championship, are coming back into contention again, and will play John Mitchells at Portlaw on Sunday evening in the quarter final, and on Saturday at Fraher Field, Kilrossanty and Ardmore will clash in the semi-final of the same competition. Both matches will provide interesting fare.

**REFEREEING MATTERS:  
Statement by Central Council**

Over the past several weeks the practice of abusing referees seems to have taken a turn for the worse and hardly a weekend goes by without a referees being 'badgered', mostly by officials. Watching games on television exposes the extent that some officials, more particularly team managers, will go in abusing the man responsible for handling a game. Only last week a referee who handled a minor intercounty game was assaulted by a mindless 'hot head.'

The following statement was issued by Croke Park on Monday and is to be read at all county committee meetings as soon as possible:

"The recent unprecedented level of criticism and abuse of referees and other match officials by team managers and by County Officers and by others, means that all levels of the Association need to defend and protect our referees.

All Disciplinary Committees are being called upon to take stern and swift action against those who abuse referees by words or gestures, before, during or after games.

All officers have a particular responsibility to measure their comments/statements after intercounty games, since they have a duty to protect the referees and uphold the disciplinary structures in their own counties.

In addition, the following procedures are being spelled out

for the benefit of all:

No official, or team or a person associated with a team in any way, may contact a referee seeking clarification of the referee's report.

Any attempt to contact the referee shall be considered an intimidation of the official.

No referee or his family shall be approached at his home or work place with regard to the events of a game.

In all the above cases, the

same procedures shall apply with regard to all other match officials."

Team managers/Board officials who feel that they have cause for complaint can contact the Referee Administrator either in the county or in the province.

**COMMENT**

There seems to be a reluctance on boards at all levels to take effective action against offenders in this business and

readers will agree that the number of occasions on which members (players /officials) are brought before a disciplinary hearing, are few and far between.

Of course, I must say as I have so often said before, referees themselves are not blameless in this whole scenario either and while referees are neglectful in this regard, it is difficult for boards to take action.

**SPECIAL CONGRESS**

Central Council at their meeting on Saturday decided to hold a special congress in October to deal with the Registration Report which had been submitted by the special committee. Because so many of the proposals have to be approved as general rules it is necessary to hold a congress to have these enacted.

The passing of the report can mean changes in up to 40 general rules and result in big changes in the Club Constitution.

**Under 21 Footballers Play Kerry in Killarney**

On Wednesday of next week, Munster champions, Waterford travel to Killarney and will line out against the Kingdom in defence of our title. The pain of defeat felt by the then champions, Kerry when defeated by us on a glorious evening in Walsh Park last year, will be remembered here and an almighty effort will be made to reverse that result.

A defeat at home by Waterford in front of a big crowd of home supporters would be even more painful. Waterford with the same selectors and with a good number of last year's panel, will travel with the intention of beating Kerry. They have prepared well and have no problems about injuries, etc. so we have every reason to hope of qualifying for yet another provincial final this year.

The team will be published here next week.

**Waterford Crystal Presentation**

Last year, Waterford Crystal introduced an Awards Scheme whereby all winning captains of All Ireland senior football championships would receive a small replica of the Sam Maguire. This was an outstanding success.

This year they will do the same for hurling and with Waterford having won the Munster championship they feel it is an appropriate time to invite All Ireland winning captains in senior hurling to come for a presentation of replicas of the McCarthy Cup. The launch of the scheme takes place this afternoon at the Crystal Show Rooms.

**Two Munster Trophies**

For the first time in 56 years a provincial trophy in both hurling and football lay side by side on display at a County board meeting. The last occasion was back in 1948 and then there were 2 hurling, senior and minor as well as the Munster junior football trophy.

The first ever championship trophy won by a Waterford team was in 1929 when we won our first minor hurling Munster and All Ireland titles.

When Dungarvan's Erin's Hopes won out in Munster in senior football in 1898 there were no trophies on offer.

Conor Ryan, Fourmilewater, who is the reigning Waterford champion and who has represented us in the Munster final for the past four years, will once again be our representative when the finals are contested at the Thurles Race Track on Saturday next. The Waterford competition was held on Saturday evening last at Fraher Field and only three competed.

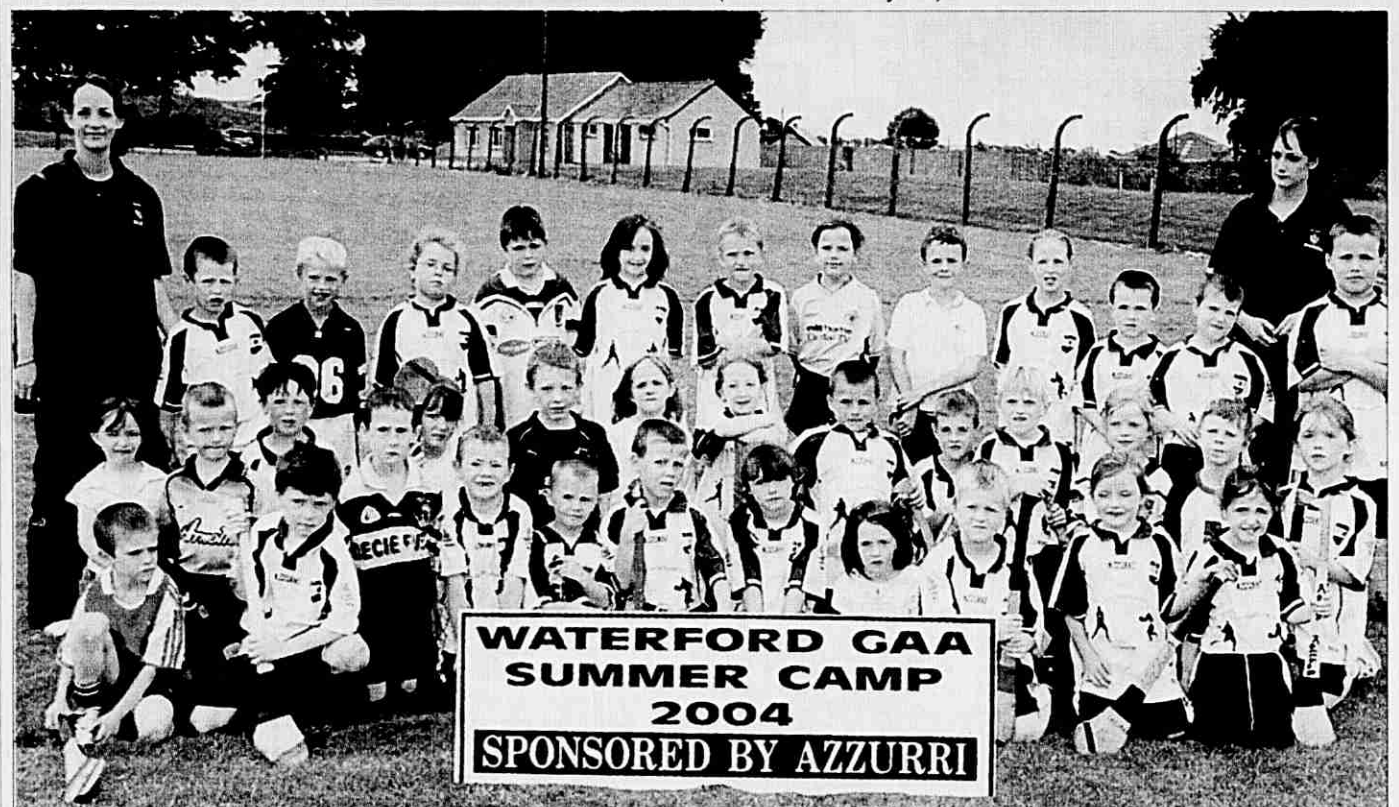
Before Kilkenny played Galway, Waterford had been installed as favourites to take the McCarthy Cup.

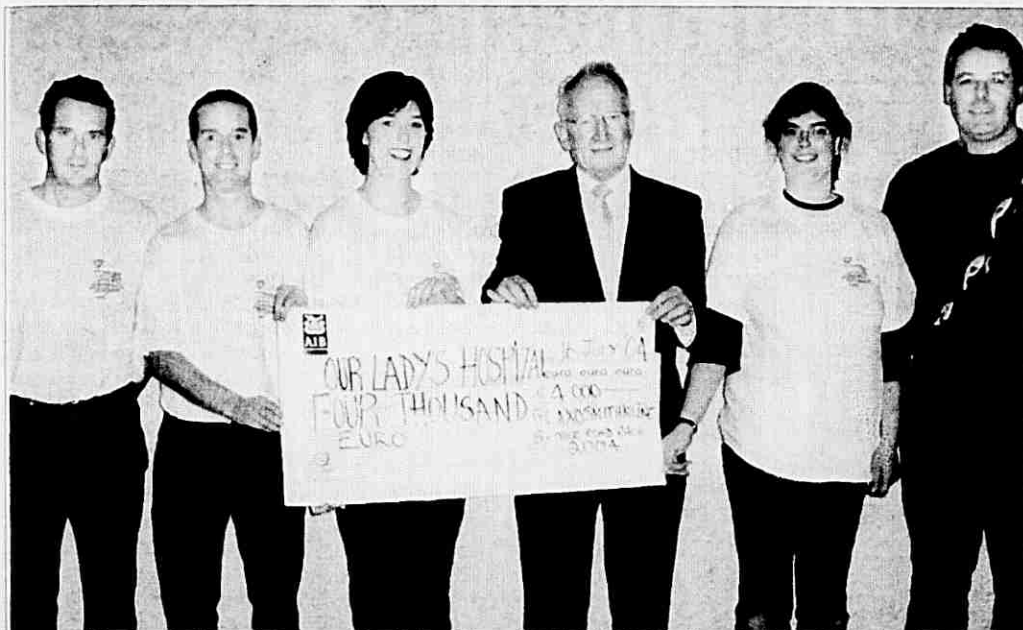

West Waterford's Martin Mc Carthy had another good race to take second here in 29.57, yet again another good sub 30 minute run from Martin, third over 40 was Davy Wade also West Waterford in 30.20. **International Success For David McCarthy**

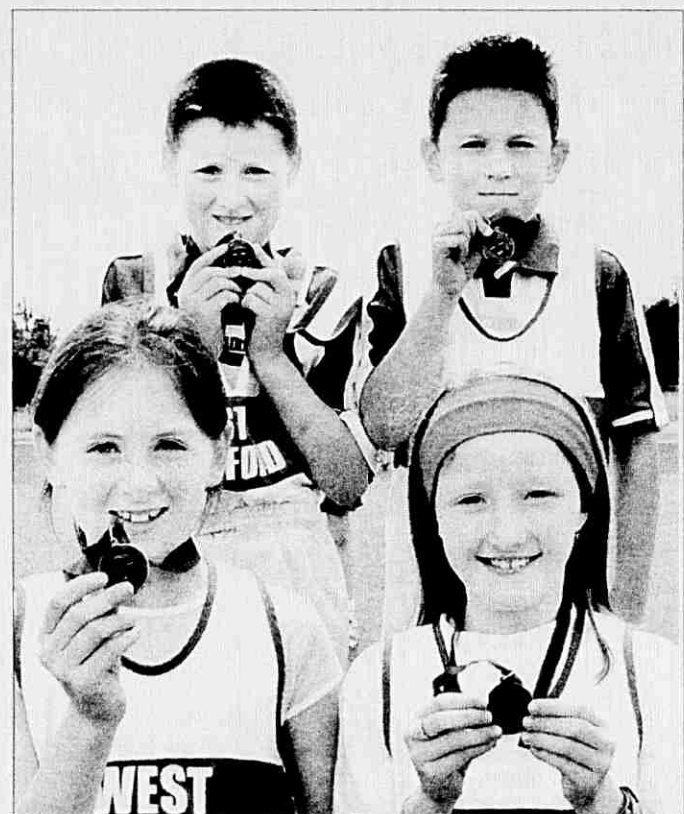
