Last Wednesday night in Dungarvan's Park Hotel, family, colleagues, elected representatives and friends celebrated the retirement of Waterford County Manager, Donal Connolly, who was bidding farewell to the Civic Offices after ten years as the County's chief executive and forty-two years in the public service.

Amongst the attendance were his wife, Mrs. Cathy Connolly and his eight children and their partners, his mother Mrs. Mary Connolly, his uncle Mr. Michael Kiely, as well as the Mayors of Co. Waterford and Dungarvan, members of both bodies, members of the Oireachtas, staff of the authorities under his jurisdiction, fellow Co. Managers from other Counties, representatives of state authorities and former colleagues from around the country

Glowing tributes were paid to his work in his many years of public service in six counties by the Minister for the Envi-

ronment, Heritage and Local Government Mr. Martin Cullen, T.D.; the Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. John Carey; the Asst. Secretary of the Department of the Environment, Mr. Michael Canny, the Chairman of the County Managers Association, Mr. Willie Soffe, Ms. Mary Tully on behalf of the State Services and the Fire Services Council of which Mr. Connolly is Chairman; representatives of private enterprise and the staff of the Councils.

On his last day of service on the previous Friday, staff of the various services in the Civic Offices had gathered to pay their own tributes and thank him for the contribution he had made to local government gen-erally and to Waterford in particular in his capacity as County Manager.

MAJOR NATIONAL RETAIL CHAINS IN THE PIPELINE

Two major national retail outlets, including a top brand fashion chain, are expected to open in the new 8-million euro retail development between the Dungarvan Shopping Centre and O'Connell Street in late October or early November.

Developer, Shane Houlihan said deals are very close to completion with the multiples, and he should be in a position to release the names in the next

two to three weeks.

The start of construction follows Dungarvan Town Council's decision to grant permission for the development of a walkway and buildings on numbers 6,7 and 8 O'Connell Street. Planning permission which is subject to seven conditions brings the epic three and a half year long planning saga to a successful conclusion.

The development will level

the streetscape, while the buildings themselves will be in keeping with the "traditional" look of O'Connell Street.





BUTTERFLIES AND MOTHS

There are over 100,000 species of butterflies and moths, some of the most beautiful insects in the world. Among those found in rainforests are the brilliant blue Morpho butterflies of South America. The Dardanus butterfly of Africa has a vast array of

colours. Some of the most spectacular butterflies are the swallowtails of the African rainforest. Swallowtails are also found in other areas of rainforests, such as in South Africa.

Some Butterflies Have Eyes On Their Wings

Some butterflies escape predators with 'flash colours'.

The uppersides of their wings are brightly coloured, but they appear quite dull at rest, with their wings closed. When they open their wings, the sudden flash of colour is often enough to startle their enemy. Often this flash is backed up by large 'eye-spots' on the wings, to frighten the predator.

The Smallest Butterfly Lives In South Africa
The Queen Alexandra birdwing of New Guinea is the
largest butterfly. It can have a wing span of over
280mm (11in). The smallest butterfly is the dwarf
blue of South Africa with a wing span of just 14mm
(1/2 in).

Feast From The



Tasty Meatloaf, Australian **Style**

Ingredients:

Serves 8

1/2kg ground lean beef 1/2 cup water

1 onion - finely chopped 1/2kg sausage stuffing 2 x 15 ml sp vinegar

1 x 15 ml sp parsley - time until smooth but firm. chopped

1 cup breadcrumbs

1 x 15 ml sp instant coffee Bake 30 minutes at 375°F.

1 beaten egg

1/2 cup tomato ketchup 2 medium onions

chopped 1/4 cup brown sugar

1 cup crushed clove

Rich and **Sweet Cherry** Bread

Ingredients:

Makes 10

1 packet active dry yeast 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour

1/3 cup sugar

3 eggs 3/4 cup warm milk

2/3 cup butter 1 x 5 ml sp salt

1 x 5 ml sp almond flavour-

Method:


Soften the yeast in warm milk. Beat in one cup of the flour. Cover and let rise until double in bulk, about one hour. Cream together the butter, sugar and salt until smooth and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Stir in flavouring, then remaining two cups of flour. Add yeast-raised sponge, blending well. Pour into greased 22cm spring-form tube pan or 22cm angel food

cake pan. Let rise until triple in bulk. Bake in moderate (375°F) oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Remove from pan; cool on rack. Prick ring with fork. Place ring on large serving plate. Baste with warm cherry rum sauce. Just before serving, arrange glazed cherries over ring. Fill centre with scoops of vanilla ice cream, if desired.

Cherry rum sauce: Drain one can of cherries. Reserve cherries. To cherry juice add enough water to make two cups of liquid. Combine cherry liquid and two cups sugar in saucepan. Boil for 5 minutes. Remove from heat, cool to lukewarm and add two tablespoons rum or 11/2 teaspoons rum flavouring.

Glazed cherries: To the cherries, add 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup corn syrup, and 2 or 3 drops red food colouring. Heat until sugar is dissolved.





Dungarvan Leader Gardening

It's the apple of everyone's eye!

Apples are as old as man. Many fascinating stories involve them - wasn't it an apple that tempted Adam in the Garden of Eden?

The apple probably originated in central/southwestern Asia. and the earliest writings of Egypt, Babylon, and China mention the apple as far back as the 4th century BC.

These early apples were probably small, like wild or Munch bunch: Pictured are the James Grieve variety, noted for their excellent flavour.

Apples were introduced to Britain during the Roman invasions in the 1st century BC.

Apples are traditionally grown on large trees, but if you only have a small garden, don't worry!

> Tree sizes have been considerably reduced thanks to the dwarf and miniature varieties that are widely available. Apple trees can also be trained into almost any shape. Fan-shaped forms are particularly useful for growing against walls and fences.

> The many types of apple tree ripen anytime between midsummer and late winter, but we usually associate autumn with apple-picking time.

For a tree to flower, it must be subjected to at least 900 hours below 7°C (usually

provided by the winter sea-Apples tend not to be grown

successfully in tropical regions because they don't get enough chilling. When you are planting, check first how big the tree can grow to, and make sure that it has enough space to develop. A sunny, sheltered site is essential for good crops. Walls for trained fruit should be in full sun.

Apple trees will grow in most well-drained soils. But the more dwarf and miniature varieties prefer more fertile

Keep up a regular maintenance programme to make sure your trees stay healthy and produce lots of apples. Feed and mulch as needed make sure you read the instructions for the variety of tree you have purchased, and follow them.

Blossom and fruit thinning are annual tasks needed to produce lots of fruit every year. Check the tree regularly for signs of pests or diseases.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN Prick out perennials and biennials

Perennials and biennials sown in June will be in need of pricking out into a nursery bed. This should be in an open position except for violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthuses, which grow more quickly in partial shade. The ground must be well forked and reasonably rich but not recently manured with dung. Get the seedlings up as carefully as possible (if the ground is dry it is best to give it a good watering the day before you intend to move the seedlings).

Peg down strawberry runners

The runners of strawberries are most conveniently propagated by pegging them down into pots of compost sunk into the ground. When rooted they are easily transplanted.

Protect vines from mildew

Thinning of the fruits will now become general with outdoor vines. A thick mulch of well rotted manure spread over the border will help the vines a lot at this time of year. If there is the slightest sign of mildew. dust the foliage and fruits with flowers with sulphur or spray with benomyl and repeat every two-weeks.

Plant winter greens

Plant out all manner of winter green crops as you clear the ground of early crops such as dwarf peas, early potatoes and the first sowings of turnips and salad vegetables. As far as possible, choose showery weather for this work. If July is persistently dry, push on with the planting and then water freely for a few days.

Cut off faded flowers

From time to time during the month of July you should examine all the flowering plants in the garden and remove any blooms or flower spikes that are so faded as to be no longer decorative. This will allow the plant to generate more.

Trim hedges

Trim evergreen hedges and topiary specimens as necessary to keep then neat and tidy in July.



In response, Acting Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said a six foot wall would be constructed on the boundary with the Orchard, but will need to be set back in places to comply with sight distance requirements.

A mini roundabout will be constructed at the junction of Mitchell Street and Wolfe Tone Road also, which will reduce speeding and assist pedestrians crossing. But, it's proposed to examine the parking problems at Florries separately.

A roundabout was considered at the Youghal Road junction, however the width of the Youghal Road does not easily lend itself to the construction of a roundabout at this location. It's proposed to put in ghost islands and turning lanes instead.

The intention to develop the car park was put on public display and one submission was received from Colette O Connell and Otteran O Mahony of 4 Davis Street, Dungarvan.

The submission asked that the number of disabled spaces be increased from 6 to 10, and stated that it was odd that the local authority wished to overturn a decision of An Bord Pleanala to limit the number of spaces to 30 and that this may bring the appeals process into disrepute.

However, Acting Town Clerk, Joe O Flaherty said the Town Council has discussed the level of car parking for people with special needs with the PWDI and they are happy that 6 spaces is more than adequate for a car park of this size.

He said the public consultation process the council has just completed gave the public adequate opportunity to air any objections they had in regard to the development of the car park so he did not feel the appeals process had been brought into disrepute.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan, (FG), welcomed the development, and commended the council for consulting with the PWDI before taking a decision.

Major Projects Must Have Clear Timeframes



Councillor, Billy Kyne (Lab) has called for a much clearer priority system when dealing with road and other infrastructure projects and for clear start and completion dates for individual projects.

He said at present, very important projects are discussed and queried at council level but no clear timeframe is given. And a number of projects are at best delayed and have an unclear schedule.

He said these include the acquisition of land at the Eden Garden Centre, long awaited road and pedestrian improvements at the Pinewood, Monang area, the new Cloneety link road, another link road between Tournore and the New Line, and traffic control issues in a number of areas including from the Friary College to Crotty's Corner.

"There are other priorities," he continued. "The slowing of traffic in several locations, better signing and the replacement of parking squares in areas like Gratten Square."

"The only way to balance the short, medium and long term projects is to prioritise and agree them at Town Council level. When that is done the County Council has to be able to give firm start and completion dates. Only then will the Town Council be actually taking control of projects instead of having an ever expanding wish list."

He added that the Town Council should develop a best practise policy for Engineering, Planning, Infrastructure and other projects by liasing with the County Council and the National Roads Authority.

"The present system of sharing the Engineering functions for planning is not best practice. Dungarvan needs a full-time engineer to do the day to day business of the Town Council."

The schedule for 2004/05 includes the first phase of the Cloneety link road, and road widening at Lisfennel, which is to start in 2004. Also included in the road works programme are three roundabouts at the Fire Station, Council offices and the Causeway Bridge.

He said by focusing on projects in this way priorities will be clear and time frames should have the resources from the County Council and Central Government to be delivered.

Acting County Manager, Paul Clerkin, said he will investigate whether it would be possible to update the council on progress on a monthly basis, and said Dan O'Donovan will resume being the full-time engineer sometime in September.

Hoose & Worm Control in Suckler Calves

Farmers generally dose suckler calves in July or August against hoose and stomach worms. At this time of the year the calves are eating more grass and the intake of worms may be higher. The present moist weather is very favourable for an increase in worm count. The one treatment is generally effective against stomach worms and hoose. The earlier (in July) the treatment the better as it breaks the build up of worms in the grass. If conditions remain favourable (warm moist weather) there may be a need for a 2nd treatment in late August.

Weanlings that have suffered damaged lungs as a result of hoose and more prone to pneumonia in the Autumn and

Management of Suckler Calves

From now on, suckler calves will be getting an increasing amount of their energy intake from grazed grass. Intake of grass can be increased by forward grazing by the calves. In a paddock situation the electric wire can be raised sufficiently to allow the calves to pass through to the next paddock. In a field situation, a specially adapted gate (which can be moved from field to field) is used to allow the calves to pass through. Forward grazing of suckling calves especially the earlier born calves, can significantly reduce the costs of concentrates before the Autumn sales. It also helps to take the stress out of weaning.

Methods of Reseeding

RESEEDING

There are essentially two methods of reseeding. The conventional method involves ploughing, however in many areas it is not possible to plough because the ground is too stony, soil too shallow and topography too steep or there is no tradition of ploughing. Minimal cultivation techniques enable reseeding to be carried out without ploughing.

Preparation of Seedbed: Irrespective of any method of reseeding, the existing vegetation should be sprayed off with a glyphosate product. There are several of these products available. The original product and market leader is Round-up, however several analogues exist (different application rates) but all are cheaper than Round-up when a similar level of active ingredient is applied. Either a silage or grazing sward can be sprayed before grazing or harvesting. In a silage sward, spraying should be carried out 7-10 days before harvesting and in a grazing sward, the sward should be sprayed 5-7 days before grazing. This allows enough time for the active ingredient to be translocated throughout the plant to ensure adequate kill without adversely affecting the quality of the grass for grazing or cutting. In some instances (not all) a drop in milk production has been observed where cows were asked to graze the existing sward 5-7days after spraying. Perhaps other stock could be used to carry out this task if a problem like this was feared. If the sward is not grazed down tight enough, a mower or topper could be run across it. Where the existing sward is ploughed down without spraying, weed grasses e.g. scutch have great ability to regenerate and appear in the new sward. Spraying off also helps reduce the incidence of frit-fly attack in the new sward.

Soil Fertility

One of the reasons for the disappearance of ryegrass from pasture is poor soil fertility. Therefore it is pointless reseeding if inadequacies in soil fertility are not rectified beforehand. The exact quantities of lime and fertilisers can be gauged from a soil test. New seedlings are particularly susceptible to lack of lime and phosphorus. If the pH of the soil is low, the seedlings will not establish well. The ideal pH for the establishment of a ryegrass sward is 6.2 to 6.7. Phosphorus is essential for root development and therefore essential for sward establishment. Phosphorous is immobile in the soil, and if the small, young roots are to get adequate P, there must be an abundance of this element dispersed in the soil.


Phosphorous tends to remain near the surface. Reseeding is an ideal time to incorporate the P throughout the rooting depth of the plants by working the P into the soil with the harrow. The fertiliser recommendations for establishment at various degrees of fertility are given in Table 1.

Co-ops Must Hold July Milk Price

Speaking following a meeting with the Irish Dairy Board, Mr Dominic Cronin, Chairperson of ICMSA,s Dairy Committee, said that the Co-ops must continue to hold the price of milk for July.

Despite the difficulties with butter and SMP, other dairy products, particularly casein cheese and WMP powder, continue to perform well according to the Irish Dairy Board. These products form a large part of the processors, output and their continued strong performance should ensure that the milk price for the rest of July could be maintained at current levels.

In addition, the cuts in butter and SMP prices by the Irish Dairy Board only apply from July 20th onwards, so the Coops have absolutely no reason whatsoever to cut the July milk price.%c

Mr Cronin said that the cuts in butter and SMP were of some concern, but he warned the Co-ops against attempting to make farmers take the brunt of the cuts.

If Co-op margins come under pressure they must generate internal cost savings and improve their margins in that fashion, as opposed to simply trying to pass the reductions back to the farmers.%e

He was ordained in Waterford Cathedral on 6th June, 1948 and served in the diocese of Leeds before illness led to his death on 28th October, 1988 and is buried with his parents in Stradbally.

Mary O'Connell was chapelwoman in Faha between the two world wars. She had a brother-in-law killed in France in 1914. She came from Garranturton and a sister of her husband was married to Jack Power who was the gatekeeper at McGrath's Cross until the line was closed in 1972.

Mary O'Connell was godmother to Michael Hurley of Faha who was a member of the bi-centenary organising committee. She was one of the first people to be buried in Faha graveyard. The late Canon John Lennon gave her the choice of a grave anywhere she wished.

Mary Barry of McGrath's Cross is her only known relative still living in the area.

No Special Treatment For Returned Emigrants

Emigrants seeking to return home will not be afforded special treatment when looking for a local authority house.

A number of councillors at a recent meeting of Dungarvan Town Council highlighted the plight of the emigrants, who by sending money back home from aboard, had created the wealth of this country, but who now had themselves fallen on hard times.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) said he was aware of a number of people who wanted to come home but couldn't get on the waiting list for a council house. But, special treatment for returning emigrants was ruled out by the Acting Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty.

Mr. O'Flaherty said a housing need has to be established. but it's difficult to assess this need while the person was in England or elsewhere. He said the person would have to go the normal route of renting in the area first. He said he didn't think it would be fair that someone would "walk straight into a house" while others have been waiting on the housing list.

Negotiations Start With Fire **Station Contractor**

Negotiations with a contractor for the new Ardmore Fire Station have begun, a recent meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

A builder has been selected from the tender process, and after being referred to the Department of the Environment was granted Ministerial approval.

The long awaited Ardmore Fire Station is one of a number of capital projects underway at the moment for the fire service - although progress with two West Waterford stations remain stalled.

While outline plans have been prepared for new fire stations in Kilmacthomas and Portlaw, in Lismore a site that had been identified was found to be unsuitable and the alternative site is now being investigated.

Ministerial approval is also being awaited at present for a revised cost plan for a new fire station in Tallow.

The highest ever price tag for a County Waterford house, outside Clonmel was recorded last week, when a period home on three acres was auctioned for over E1.5 million. "Merlin' on the Coleville road went under the hammer last Wednesday in nearby Hotel Minella and after some lively bidding was eventually sold for E1.59 million. It was bought in trust by a solicitor, believed to be working on behalf of a well known local business family. The six bedroom house dates back to 1830 when it was built by Abraham Grubb, a member of a prominent Quaker family who were involved in the corn and butter markets and also in insurance. Mr. Grubb bought the lands in 1829 and subsequently built "Merlin' and it's out buildings.

Her husband who worked for a decade began his days at Michael Phelan's pub in O'Connell Street, then the gas works and Currans enamel ware factory, he was noted for the skill he had with his hands, he also served in the Defence Forces in Clonmel F.C.A. where he became great friends with members of the force from

Joe and Kitty were a close, united couple and went everywhere together. They both loved walking, preferring to stroll around the environs of the town, looking at buildings and developments that were going on, which never ceased to amaze her, brining to mind how it was when she moved into town over half a century ago. She loved to take her grandchildren to Marlfield Lake where they enjoyed feeding the swans. Gardening too gave her great happiness and pleasure tending to her flowers and shrubs.

Sadly her husband Joe passed to his reward some five years ago which according to her daughters was a big blow to her, they said she was lost him, as part of her life was gone. Some eighteen months ago as her health began to deteriorate and she needed constant medical attention, she took up residence in Greenhills Nursing Home in Carrick-on-Suir where she made many good friends, and where she was content, her family visiting her everyday. Late Mr. Sean Kennedy

Sean Kennedy, who died last week in Dublin was a prominent hurler and business man with strong Clonmel connections who managed in a rare procedure to combine his business acumen with his love of hurling and to earn a reputation which extended far beyond Tipperary where his hurling taken first flourished.

Born in Dublin in 1920 and lived for a short time in Rathmoley, Killeannaule while attending Thurles C.B.S. and winning the Harty Cup medal. The family moved to Clonmel where Sean joined St. Mary's Hurling club in 1939 and became the clubs leading player and administrator for the next six years acting in turn as Chairman and secretary. This was at a time when his father Pat (who had played for Dublin in the All Ireland final of 1906) was the Club President and his brothers Pat, Matt and Michael were becoming pillars of the club and

were to remain so throughout the 40's and 50's. Sean's involvement in the hardware business took him to Galway where he joined Erin's Hope, a club which consisted of non-Galway born hurlers who worked in the city. He soon came to the attention of the County selectors and found a permanent place on the Galway Senior team. In 1947 he was on the Connaught team which beat Munster in the Railway Cup final in Croke park

It was his business interests which brought Sean from Galway to Cork and then to Dublin where he joined Wavin Pipes Ltd (now known as Wavin Ireland) and became the company's marketing manager. Sean was involved in a big expansion of the company with new exports to Africa, Asia and South America. It was amid the expansion that he was pushing the idea of developing a hurley made of P.V.C, the thinking being that it would be unbreakable and would be less expensive than ash. Croke park was enthusiastic. No doubt Sean was also encouraged in this promotion by his brother-in-law, An Brahtair O Caithnia, whose book 'Sceal na hIomana' had traced the history of hurling from earliest times to 1880 in which he argued that almost every kind of wood grown in Ireland had at one time or other been used in the making of hurleys. So why not P.V.C. The company adopted the proposal and a prototype was developed and tested. The experiment, alas, met with little enthusiasm, experienced players saying that the fells of hitting the ball was not transmitted through P.V.C. in the same way as it was through the ash. On hearing of Sean's death, the vetran broadcaster Sean Og O Ceallaichain, recalled an amusing incident in the 1940's (which is recorded in his book) when he mustered a group of players to play for Monaghan in the Ulster Championships, an action which of course was less than ethical. The group included Kevin Matthews, the great Dublin goalkeeper, Sean Kennedy and his close friend Joe Butler (also a former St. Mary's hurler). Sean Og mused that the G.A.A. was not as transparent in those innocent times as it is today.

Sean Kennedy was a man who made his mark in business and in sport and his passing

He was laid to rest in Fingal Cemetery, Balgriffin not far from his home in Malahide.

(Continued from Page 1) a lot of disappointments with a refusal by An Bord Pleanala. But, I really felt that it would be a shame to have a step in the streetscape.

"To have a one storey in a two storey street would have been ridiculous," he added.

"I'm really pleased both for myself personally and for O'-Connell Street itself that with this decision we can do this job properly. O'Connell Street will benefit from it.

The overall 15,500 square feet project will create an estimated 40 to 50 jobs on completion. Already there has been considerable interest in the retail units, and together with the two major units the joint letting agents Moynihan & Curran of Clonmel and CS Tierney of Dublin are in negotiations with another 4 or 5 possible tenants.

While, the names of the multiples won't be released as yet a "very major" retail outlet will be taking a 4,500 square foot unit, and a major fashion retailer who, he says, is "very much a national name" will be taking a unit in excess of 2,000 sq

IMMEDIATE START

Mr. Houlihan also revealed that they hope to proceed with construction straight away.

"We have full planning permission, and we are proceeding immediately. We hope to have Block A - which we had planning permission for all along completed by the end of October or early November."



Western Under 14 Football Championship Commences This Monday

All Under 14 Hurling competitions in Waterford are down complete and the players who are eligible for Under 14 are now turning their attention to Football. This years West Waterford Under 14 Football championship begins this coming Monday night with games down for decision in two of the three divisions.

Games in the first round of this years championship sees Clashmore take on Nire at Clashmore and Ballinacourty take on Dungarvan at the Burgery in Division One.

In Division three, An Ghaeltacht play Ardmore in Ring and at Cappoquin, Affane take on Ballyduff. There is only four teams in Division two. Three games will not start until August 16th. In the opening round of game in the Division two championship, Stradbally play Kilrossanty in Stradbally and St. Olivers play St. Patrick's at Aglish.

As the County final is much earlier this year it is important that no club call off their games during the course of the championship. Under 12 Football

For all clubs in this years Under 12 championship, the first round of games in this years competition will take place on the weekend ending, July 31st. Just like in the Hurling championship there is a county final at stake for three teams that win the divisional championship. In Hurling the standard of play in this years competition was very high and hopefully when it comes to the football competition, the standard will be equally as high.

The top eight clubs are split into two equal groups. In each group the top two teams will go on to play each other in the Division one semi final with the other two teams playing the divisional two semi finals. This in effect means that all eight teams will contest a semi final provided of course that they play their three league games.

In Group one of this years competition, Clashmore will play Ballinacourty at Clashmore and St. Patrick's will play Brickey's at Bohadoon in the opening rounds of this years competition. In Group two, Nire play Kilrossanty at Ballymacarbry and Cois Bhride have home advantage over Dungarvan.

Division two also had two groups. The top two teams in each group will contest the semi finals of this competition. is one game that springs to mind. Over the years, the GAA have copied ideas introduced in other sports. Some of the ideas have worked, others are totally ridiculous. Maybe the GAA should take a look at the way rugby players and officials respect the referee and the decisions he makes during the course of the game. Maybe then we can come up with a penalty that punishes the offenders of those who abuse referees

Staying on the subject of referees, while filling in recently for the County Bord na nOg secretary, I was glad to see that the fruits of the work been done by Coiste na Reidhteoire is being paid off. It has been well documented in recent times that there has been a shortage of referees in Waterford to take charge of our games.

Thankfully this is starting to be addressed, and some new referees have come aboard to help the existing over worked referees that have served the clubs of the county so faithfully over the past few years. There is still some clubs who are not supplying referees to the various boards, but hopefully that they will be doing so in the not so distant future.

The days of when referees are asked to take charge of games without getting a proper course of refereeing and the rules of our games are long gone. Referees are now given good tuition in both. 





County Wexford trainer Deirdre Byrne was a happy camper in Kilcohan Park last Friday night as two of her runners came up trumps in tight finishes while her third runner was just beaten on the line. Deirdre's first success arrived courtesy of the Wolfman Syndicate owned Windele King (Judicial Pride-Bea Nukes Girl) this ex Ger McKenna trained runner capturing the second novice race down for decision in 29.61. Lord Jen came away running from trap five but showing good early pace Windele King 5/4 swooped into a second bend lead. Windele King appeared all set for an easy win but this was not the case as the appropriately named Like A Train finished with a rattle only to taste defeat by a neck.

Victory number two for trainer Byrne arrived in the show-case race of the night the final of the Donal Murphy Fencing Services Marathon Stake. The front running Prestige Dympna appeared home and hosed in this event powering clear early on but the Patrick Lyons owned Oldinn Tina (Judicial Pride-Clover Cailin) 3/1 always had the leader in her sights and timing her run to perfection Oldinn Tina a previous stake winner at Tralee came with a powerful late surge to poke her head in front virtually on the winning line to register a short head win over a gallant Prestige Dympna in a much improved 40.80.

Trainer Byrne looked sure to record a treble in the sixth contest as her Failtes Honcho dashed into an early lead on the fence but stalking the leader throughout the Jim Curran owned Quanns Egret (Mustang Jack-Brookside Matrix) 6/4 gradually reeled in the leader and finishing full of running up the rails Quanns Egret pounced close home to defeat Failltes Honcho by the minimum distance in 29.54. Indeed Dungarvan based Jim Curran was also enjoying a double on the night as the Peter Brady trained Quanns Best (Staplers Jo-Pretty Michelle) 3/1 to 2/1 came good on the night capturing a two bend dash this March 02 whelp getting the better of Sooty Belle in 16.48. Led out of traps by Daroma Tom Quanns Best assented his superiority on the run to the opening turn and quickly stamping his authority on matters Quanns Best came home three and a half lengths clear of Sooty Belle with a wide running Daroma Tom just behind in third.

The punters got off to a winning start in their eleven-race battle with the bookmakers as the well supported Carlow Lady (Honcho Classic-Pollerton Lass) made a winning debut for Carlow owner John Lambert and trainer Declan Byrne. Displaying plenty of determination rounding the first bend Carlow Lady took over at the halfway mark from the early paced Bramble Joy and despite coming wide into the home straight a strong running Carlow Lady won a shade cosily by a length and a half over Thirsty Widgeon in a pleasing 29.26.

Local trainer Jude Hennessy was on the mark in a graded sprint with the Jim Walsh owned Monmahogue Ned (Jamaican Hero-Monmahogue Rose) 2/1 doing the business in 16.47. Myella Snowy broke smartly from trap two but it didn't take long for Monmahogue Ned to make his way to the head of affairs and once in command this race proved easy pickings for Monmahogue Ned as he came home two lengths clear of a slow starting Inebriated.

In the fourth contest Sparta Rebel produced his customary dash of early pace but the ever-improving Tinlough Sue (Honcho Classic-Ta Failte Romhait) 5/2 was in his slipstream throughout. Biding her time the Paul Harney owned and Jim Scully trained Tinlough Sue waited for a gap to appear on the rails and when the split did arrive off the home turn Tinlough Sue joined issue with Sparta Rebel on the rails. In a ding dong struggle to the line Tinlough Sue came out on top by a neck in a fast 28.91.

The Philip Woodworth owned and Mary Buggy owned Derwent Storm (Staplers Jo-Dessies Pride) the evens favourite gave the sprint track record a rattle when capturing an above average Friday night two bend dash in a smashing 16.06. Powering into an early lead Derwent Storm

led from Chase Me Charlie and while the runner up certainly lost nothing in defeat a flying Derwent Storm kept up a blistering gallop up front to run out a three and a half lengths winner over Chase Me Charlie.

Steering a middle to outside course in the ninth race Gallows Miller set about making all of the running but despite being bumped at the opening turn the A Davis, L' Jones and Daniel Morris owned Fast Money (Jamella Prince-Little Vintage) 2/1 took over in the lead for trainer lan Seymour to gallop on all the way to the winning line recording a two lengths win over a running on The Other Pilot in a career best time of 29.26. The winner is only a February 2003 whelp and is shaping up nicely over four bends.

The Terry Connor owned and Ned Murphy trained Terrys Boy (Droopys Kewell-Crefogue Plover) 2/1 tras full value for his 29.00 winning return in the tenth contest. The winner took over in the lead midway down the back stretch from the early paced Mystery Night and while The Other Lily made rapid late headway a determined Terrys Boy held firm to triumph by a length over The Other Lily/

The concluding six-bend marathon went all the way to the wire. Andys Friend poached an early lead and when the pack closed in on the leader over the final two bends Alices Best hit the front only to give best in the closing strides to the India Walsh owned Tinsley Bugs (Moyne Rebel-Mops Spark) this 3/1 chance finishing with a flourish on the wide outside to triumph by the minimum distance in 41.67.

Waiting patiently for a gap on the rails Seventh Gear came through on the inside of Go Ahead Honcho off the final turn and staying on nicely Seventh Gear won out by a length in a speedy 29.81. Heat two saw the well drawn Kilkenny Live make a brave bid to lead all the way and as the chasing pack came in contact with one another Kilkenny Live looked sure to succeed as he led into the home straight. After a slow start however the Ballydogers Syndicate owned and Derek Kehoe trained Charity Jack (Mustang Jack-Charity Amy) 5/2 began to work his way into contention on the fence and producing a lethal burst of finishing space Charity Jack struck late to record a last gasp length win over Kilkenny Live with a running on Stage Crafty the same distance away in third. Time 30.11 In a wide-open heat three-track newcomer Dance Eleanor (Larkhill Jo-Knockaun Wild) deservedly beat some betterfancied opponents scoring at the rewarding odds of 6/1 in 30.16. Meanwhile up front a fast starting Mind Henry (Roanokee-Miss Billy) dictated matters from Sparta Cleo and while the latter gave of her best in second spot the Anthony

Dance Eleanor dug deep in the closing stages to beat the

persistent Doyles Pride by half a length.

Cleere owned and Brian Mullan trained Mind Henry was not slowing down and this progressive 3/1 shot kept on dourly to record a length win over Sparta Cleo with a string finishing Mauritius King just behind in third. The winning time was an excellent 29.80 the fastest return off the four heats.

Local owner Maurice Jackson was present to see his well bred dog Valentia Lark (Droopys Agassi-Larkina) an October 2002 whelp open his account in the first contest this Pio Barry trained dog justifying evens favourtism with a sooth 29.23 success. In a battle of the "Larks" Coolstuff Lark cut an early dash from trap one but the always well-positioned Valentia Lark cruised into the lead on the outside at the entrance to the back stretch. It was plain sailing for the jolly from that point as he freewheeled to a two and a half lengths win over Coolstuff Lark.

In a graded sprint Black Punto led to the first turn where a wet blanket covered the entire field at that point. After a slow start the Bryan Walsh owned and highly consistent Princess Grace (Hilltown-Maryville Bride) 3/1 dashed into the lead to run out a two and a nalf lengths winner over the well backed Windgap Whitey in 16.65.

Brendas Beauty came in for plenty of support in the third race but she blew all hopes of a win with a tardy start from trap four. Meanwhile up front Early Daylight and Settle It locked horns throughout and after a titanic struggle for about five hundred yards the Helen Turner owned and Nick Turner trained Settle It (Jamella Prince-Lightening Lizzie) 3/1 came out on top by the minimum distance in 29.37.

The Philip Coleman and Patrick Stafford owned Bernards Mate (Trade Official-For Style) ran out an impressive winner of the fourth event this 6/4 favourite leading all the way win in a smart 28.93. Producing an eye catching dash of back stretch pace Sober Rampage eased his way into the lead near the third bend before lengthening his stride for a deserved two and three quarter lengths win over Gandis Runner.

In the concluding 525 the early paced Jewels Rocket was at the head off affairs from Darrigal Droopy but coming with a tremendous late dash from off the pace the Mike Furlong owned Bally Blue (Droopys Vieri-Bally Dawn) 4/1 powered home to nick it on the winning line by a neck from Jewels Rocket with Nikkis Tillie the same distance back in third. 



GREAT SEASON FOR BALLINROAD UNDER-14'S


