Cancer "Cure" Sign Removed

A controversial "cancer care" sign on the Youghal Road, which claims the cures sold in a roadside pre-fab cured CJ Haughey and others of cancer, was removed Monday last after becoming the centre of contro-

A spokesman for Waterford County Council said the sign was removed on Monday before local authority officials and Gardai approached the man over the matter.

"The new sign came to our attention over the weekend. The person was spoken to about the sign and was reminded of his responsibilities,"

spokesperson said. The roadside 'practitioner,' who has been accused of prying on the ill and desperate, erected the new sign after the removal of a previous sign that promised a cure for cancer for

100 euros.

The new sign caused a fresh wave of revulsion in the past week, and has prompted one local councillor to call for new Bye-laws to be drafted to deal with the issue.





From the Turning of the First Sod to the Last Lick of Paint

Working is nearing completion on the new Shopping Centre Complex in Dungarvan. Soon the last lick of paint will be applied and the town will be able to reap the benefits of the long awaited centre.

Construction started back in July 2003 but long before that first sod was turned, much work had already gone into the development. It took eight months alone for the necessary demolition work to prepare the site. That, of course, is one of the most disruptive of stages in any development and project developers Clancy Construction are quick to acknowledge this. Everything in their power was done to minimise the problem and they sincerely apologise for any inconvenience caused. They would also like to extend their gratitude to everyone in the locale for their patience and understanding.

From then work continued on schedule, due in no small part to the sterling efforts of the Project Manager Noel Bransfield and Site Foreman Milo McGrath, and now Dungarvan can look forward to it's new 28 unit shopping facility.

The 45,000 square feet centre was designed by Waterford based architects Fewer, Harrington, Lawlor & Associates and, as is suggested by their ex-

cellent reputation, it will have a very modern, contemporary feel. Along with anchor tenants Dunnes Stores, the centre will have a variety of other retail outlets and restaurants. To further enhance the shopping experience, as well as cementing it's place within the local community, the centre will house a crèche and a medical centre.

One of main fears encountered by developments of this size is the disruption it will cause to the locale. To allay these the developers, Clancy Construction, have taken a two pronged approach. The first was to include a 500 car parking-lot, which will ensure that local residents are not inconvenienced by shoppers from outside the area. The second was the provision of a professionally landscaped civic area. This area was designed specifically with the local residents in mind. It will be tended on a regular basis and aims to provide a nice, scenic spot for locals to relax.

Local support has been tremendous,' stated Billy Clancy, the driving force behind the project. T've had letters of support arriving on my desk on an almost daily basis. This, in itself, has been very gratifying but, more importantly, I think the centre is going to be a huge boost for the local economy.





BATS

There are almost 1,000 species of bats living all over the world except polar regions. the rainforests of India, Burma, Madagascar and other tropical and sub tropical regions are home to many types of fruit bat. Species, such as the leaf-nosed bat and vampire bats are found in South American rainforests. Bats are the only mammals that can fly. A leathery membrane stretches over the bones of their arms and hands, which are adapted to form wings.

Vampires Curl Their Tongues To Drink Blood


The vampire bat lives in rainforests in South America. It lands on the ground near its victim — usually a cow or a horse — and then walks towards it on all fours. It cuts a piece of skin from the victim with its teeth and then curls

its tongue into a U-shape, so that the blood runs into it. Sometimes the bats take so much blood that they have difficulty flying afterwards.

The victim does not lose so much blood that it is weak-ened, but there could be a danger of infection from the wound.

BATS EAT FISH

Some bats actually catch and eat fish. The appropriately named fishman bat, which lives in the mangrove swamps of South America and the West Indies, swoops near the surface of the water to scoop out a fish in its long, sharp claws. They can also catch insects in their claws. The fish-eating bat of Northern Mexico also catches fish in the same way.



A Bat Can Build A Tent

Because it flies by day, the tentbuilding bat needs a way of sheltering from the sun. It does this by making a tent from fan-shaped palm leaves. It bites through a leaf until part of it callapses. The folded leaf provides an effective shelter from which the bat can fly to find food.

DID YOU KNOW

- The bat is the only mammal that can fly.
- Bats have such good ears they can hear in insects wings beating.
- A bat may make up to 200 shrieks per second, so that it can guide itself by the echoes.
- A vampire bat's teeth are so sharp it can bite and suck blood without its victim noticing.
- In the seventeenth century, people in Europe dug up graves looking for vampires.

Chicken Kebab

THIS delicious and warm ing meal is best served with rice and salad.

Preparation: 3 hours Cooking: 25 mins Ingredients

(Serves 4)

- 1.5kg chicken pieces 2 onions, finely chopped 50ml oil
- 1 x 5ml sp dried thyme
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 x 5ml sp paprika freshly ground black pepper
- 4 small courgettes
- 4 small tomatoes

REMOVE skin and bone from chicken pieces. using a small sharp knife. Cut meat into 2cm pieces. Place in a bowl with onions, oil, thyme, crumbled bay leaf, paprika, salt and pepper. Wash courgettes, trim ends and cut into 1cm pieces. Add to marinade and marinate for two to three hours.

Preheat grill. Drain chicken and courgettes, reserving marinade.



Peel tomatoes and cut in half, remove the seeds. Thread pieces of tomato, chicken and courgette alternatively onto four skewers,


dividing ingredients evenly between them.

Place on grill rack, brush liberally with marinade.

Sprinkle with a little paprika.

Grill for 20 minutes or until chicken is well cooked, lowering heat to moderate after five minutes and turning skewers to cook evenly.

Marrow Casserole — firm and tasty

MARROW has such a high Peel and cut them into water content that it loses rough chunks, discarding all most of its flavour if steamed the seeds as you do so. or cooked in water. Check out the recipe below, and serve up firm, tasty marrows on your dinner table...

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 30 mins Ingredients (Serves 4-6)

1 young marrow

bulous Ferns Fern species and varieties

Ferns are fabulous and fascinating. In damp, shaded areas where few other plants will thrive, their foliage is a real mood enhancer. At the edge of ponds or along stream sides they are perfect. In woodland settings, the simple, elegant symmetry of their fronds looks just right in the dappled shade of this time of year. There are also ferns suited to drier locations.

The Shuttlecock or Ostrich fern (Mattueccia struthiopteris) is a great starting point. Like many fems, this is deciduous, dying back in autumn (often with beautiful colour effects) only to re-



emerge with erect, curled fronds in spring. The erect arrangements of fronds that resemble a Badminton shuttlecock and reach a height of approximately 1.7m and a spread of approximately 1m. This plant spreads by rhizomes and will establish separate plants 10 or 20cm away from the original parent. This fem is able to thrive in a variety of situations, from shade to a waterside location or a damp border. The Sensitive fern (Onoclea sensibilis) produces longstalked fronds that arise from the ground individually. It is sensitive mainly to excessive sunlight, so be sure to plant it under the protection of trees. whether in a woodland-gar-

den or a damp, shady border. Fronds of this fern are about 60cm, but it will spread horizontally, again by rhizomes. The Flowering fern (Osmunda regalis) is another damp and shade lover. Growing to 2m in height, this one has a number of interesting features to look out for: tips of fronds are rounded, in summer some fronds (the partially fertile ones) have tasselled tips which are covered by brown, spore-bearing structures (sporangia). The fronds also turn yellow or golden brown in autumn. For each of these ferns, neutral to acid, humus rich soils are ideal. Each of these mentioned is fully hardy. Not all ferns need damp and shade. The Holly fern or Shield fern (Polystichum) prefers drier conditions and is a great choice if your soil is very well drained. It still likes the shade. This is an evergreen and crowns of the plant will benefit from protection from excessive wet in winter. The Soft shield fern (Polystichum setiferum) is a real beauty with its soft, evergreen fronds and is a great choice for a fernery or rock garden. Height and spread in this case are approximately 1.2m and 90cm respectively. Ferns are an ancient form of plant life that has evolved only gradually over the millennia. Still reproducing by spores rather than seeds, it is not too difficult to believe that ferns are a hangover from the days of the dinosaurs. Justly popular among gardeners, a wide selection is available, each offering different effects. Why not make it a summer project for your family to find out about ferns and plant a mini-femery-somewhere in your-garden?







TRAD ARTS PLAN TO BE LAUNCHED AT FLEADH

Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann will launch one of its most radical and comprehensive initiatives, since its foundation in 1951, at Fleadh Cheoil na hÉireann in Clonmel. The new Development Programme has taken three years to construct involving 10 working groups – practitioners, academics and organisers in the field of traditional arts – who consulted with interested parties at home and abroad.

The Programme, which envisages eight Regional Development Teams and Resource Centres, will have a strong education and community focus. The total capital and operational cost for the 5-year programme will be €25m. At present Comhaltas invests €12m annually, from its own resources, in its cultural programme at home and abroad. It also has 16 cultural centres throughout the country.

Comhaltas is now organised on four continents and provides services to up to 2m people each year.

This year's Fleadh Cheoil will return to Clonmel for the second year in a row from the 27th to the 30th August. There will be over 10,000 performers and an attendance of 250,000 is expected. The Fleadh will be preceded by Scoil Eigse – the Summer College of traditional arts – which will have up to 800 up-and-coming musicians and singers who will receive tuition from the "masters".

Minister Eamon Ó Cuiv, T.D. will be Guest of Honour at the Official Opening of the Fleadh which will generate over €20m for the region.

Dr. Tomás Ó Canainn, the well known uilleann piper and leader of the group Na Filí, composer and author, has been selected as Ard-Ollamh for Fleadh 2004. Last year's recipient of the award was Dr. Michéal Ó Súilleabháin.



Crowds Flock To First Clonmel Country Festival


Over 12,000 people flocked to Clonmel Race Course for the first Clonmel Country Festival last Saturday & Sunday.

In last weeks notes we looked for information on the ship De Wadden. Well the good news is we got it with photo-

We now know the De Wadden was launched at Waterhuizen, Holland in 1917, she was a 3 masted auxiliary engined schooner. Her length was 117 feet with a 25ft beam and a 10ft draft. She came to Arklow ownership from Amsterdam in 1922. We have a nice photograph of the crew who sailed her in 1927. She was sold to Scotland in 1961. She was acquired by the Merseyside Maritime Museum in 1984. She can now be seen at Graving Dock No. 2, Conservation area, Albert Dock, Liverpool where she proudly stands following refurbishment to her original rigging.



Alternatives to Grass Silage

Some farmers may consider ensiling some cereal crops. There are a few ways of doing this.

Fermented Whole Crop

Harvest at 40 to 45% DM for fermented whole crop. At this stage the grain will be at the soft cheddar stage. Above this DM grain will need to be cracked otherwise utilisation by the animal will be poor. Cutting height will depend on the quality of the crop and the desired feeding value of the whole crop. A 4 tonne grain crop should yield a forage with 25-30% starch, at a cutting height of 15-20 cm. Ensure that the forage is well compacted and preferably put a layer of grass silage on top of it to weight it down. An additive is not needed for preservation. An additive may have a role to play in reducing spoilage at feedout. However with good pit management there should be no need for an additive. A narrow pit is preferable to reduce aerobic deterioration.

Processed Whole Crop

Harvest at 70 to 80% DM for processed whole crop. Grains will be almost mature and hard to crack. A grain processor is necessary for harvesting this material. Processed whole crop can be harvested to yield a very high energy forage concentrate with lower fibre content by cutting the cereal crop just below the flag leaf. Alternatively by lowering the cutter bar the crop will produce more bulk and higher fibre. Additives are necessary for this material. Treat with a urea based additive e.g. Home N'Dry or an innoculant based additive e.g. Whole Crop Mill.

Crimping Grain

Crimping is the crushing and preservation of feeds with high moisture content. Suitable crops include barley, wheat, oats, maize, peas, beans, soya, rape and linseed. Harvest 3-4 weeks before conventional harvest date when the grain is 30-40% moisture. Conduct daily checks from 4 weeks before normal harvest. Avoid moisture contents below 30%. Crimping is only suitable for immature crops and not for mature wet crops. Straw can be baled conventionally after 3-4 days. Treat with an acid based or innoculant based additive. The pit should be compressed as much as possible. The grain can be stored at heights between 0.5 and 2.5 m. Narrow clamps work best. TILLAGE

Pre-Harvest Round-up

Applying pre-harvest glyphosate to a crop will give the most effective long term control of scutch, thistles, potatoes etc. Leaving glyphosate application until mid September will miss some of the shoots that did not emerge after the harvest. Crops intended for seed should not be treated. Apply the glyphosate when the moisture content in the grain is below 30% which coincides with the 'hard dough' stage of grain maturity. This will be 7-14 days before normal harvest date. Collect 20 grains from the centre of several ears. Press the thumbnail firmly into the grain and if the indentation holds on all the grains the crop is ready for spraying Target weeds must be green, actively growing and accessible to the spray.

CATTLE

Premia Countdown

There are less than 140 days to obtain the last of the Agenda 2000 livestock premia. Do your sums carefully and aim to optimise your final year of claims. Check your overall stoking density limit of up to 1.8LU/ha. Be aware of stocking rate over the year and the census dates and how you are fixed for the remaining census dates and extensification eligibility.

Remember that an overshoot is possible with Special Beef Premium and could result in a reduction in SBP and extensification payment for affected farmers. In the event of an overshoot, the penalty will only hit SBP applications that exceed 25 animals (i.e. bull premia, 9 month and 21 month steer premia in total). An overshoot is determined by the number of 9 month bull & steer applications nationally.

A crude estimate is that for each 1% overshoot of the national quota, there would be a cut in SBP and extensification of 1.33% in farms with over 25 applications in total. For example a 3% overshoot in animals applied on for first stage premium would result in a premia cut of 4% on all SBP & bull premium applications on affected farms or 9 per animal for steers eligible for high rate extensification on affected farms.

Animals that have SBP eligibility but can not be claimed due to 1.8 LU/ha limit should be sold when a good "market" premium is available over similar animals with no premium eligibility. Many farms that normally purchase weanlings & stores with premium eligibility have already used up their "claim quota" for 2004 & will not therefore be buying their usual number of eligible animals. The market premium for "one sub" animals does not appear as high this year as previous years.

GREEN BARLEY PRICES HARDENING

Waterford IFA Grain Committee Chairman Bill Shanahan has said that green barley prices are hardening, with a number of buyers indicating privately to customers that they will pay last year's price for barley this harvest, in an attempt to encourage growers to continue in cereal production for another year.

Mr. Shanahan said " 110 / tonne is being paid for contract feed barley at 20% moisture ex-clusive of VAT in the South East. Competition among merchants for barley has intensified in the last few days in the Wexford region. Growers are being actively canvassed for their barley and up to 105 / tonne is on offer for non-contract feeding barley at 20% moisture exclusive of VAT."

The Waterford Grain Chairman said "there is a growing realisation in the trade that many growers will not cover the cost of producing a tonne of grain even at last year's price levels of 102 - 104 / tonne at 20% moisture exclusive of VAT and that many growers are now subsidizing the production of grain either from their arable aid payment, high margin crops such as sugar beet and potatoes and / or contracting.'

The IFA man said "the introduction of the Single Farm Payment (i.e. full decoupling

from production) plus the restructuring option will allow farmers to assess the profitability of grain growing as a stand alone business and take the necessary business decisions. For many operators, it is clear that restructuring their entitle-

be necessary and that in some cases, growers who cease grain production will increase their net profit."

"For many wheat growers, the growing of second, continuous and latitude treated crops

ments onto a reduced area will is becoming marginal given the high cost of production and the associated risk factors. Proper rotation, quality land and a guaranteed minimum price are crucial in achieving profitable production," Mr. Shanahan said.

ICMSA Win Commission's Approval For Calf and Weanling Payment

mation that compensation for the loss in calf and weanling prices can be addressed under the Single Farm Payment National Reserve now being finalised. The President of the Association, Mr Pat O'Rourke, together with the General Secretary, Mr Ciaran Dolan, met officials of the Commission today, and after presenting ICMSA's case, were informed that Ireland could indeed allocate single farm payments from the National Reserve to calf and weanling producers, who presently are losing up to 175 for June 2004 born calves compared to May born calves.

"The Commission is quite clear", said Mr O'Rourke, "the relevant EU Council regulations provide a broad legal framework for Ireland to implement ICMSA's proposals to address the shortfall suffered by calf and weanling producers.

I am quite satisfied that the way is now open for the Minister to act and provide additional payments to those farmers from the Reserve. Not alone did we receive clarification that the regulation permits this, but Ireland does not even have to seek

ICMSA has received confir- the permission of the Commission in this regard. The regulations were written deliberately to allow the maximum flexibility for Member States so that disadvantages suffered by specific groups of farmers could be speedily eliminated.

In light of this clarification, there can be no confusion about the existence of any legal block to the problem of addressing the problems of calf and weanling producers and ICMSA expects the Department of Agriculture and Food to act speedily on this issue.

Dillon Warns Factories of Decoupling Backlash Over Cattle Price Cuts

The IFA President John Dillon has said (Thurs. 12th Aug) that there is growing farmer anger over the exploitation by the meat factories in cutting cattle prices. He warned the factories of a major decoupling backlash by farmers against price cuts with production cut backs which would wipe out factory business.

Mr. Dillon said there is no justification for the cattle price cuts from the meat factories and he accused the factories of manipulating numbers to get prices down. He said the factories have cut prices by 22c/kg (8p/lb) or 73 per head over the last 5 weeks, without justification or any reduction in market returns.

In a stern warning to the factories to stop the price cuts, Mr. Dillon said this is sending a clear message to farmers to cut production which in turn will see factory business disappear.

The IFA President said the facts on cattle prices are that beef markets are extremely strong and particularly prices in our main export market in the UK. He said cattle prices in the UK are extremely stable and have not come back at all. UK prices are the equivalent of 3.12/kg (111p/lb) for R grade steers and 3.01/kg (107p/lb) for O grade steers.

Mr. Dillon pointed out that the price gap between Irish and UK cattle prices has widened dramatically over the last number of weeks and has doubled compared to this time last year. "In July '03, the gap between Irish and UK cattle prices was 0.27/kg (7p/lb). Today this price differential has jumped to 0.42/kg (15p/lb), an increase of 73 an animal for the factories."

The IFA leader said with decoupling, farmers would only produce beef at a worthwhile viable price over the cost of production. He said, "With farmers now deciding on their response to decoupling, the factories are very shortsighted in cutting prices against the strong market trends".

Mr. Dillon said farmers must be extremely strong in their dealings with the factories and cattle agents on prices. He said farmers must demand full value for their stock and insist on payment on the day.

Closure of Galtee Slaughtering Facility a Major **Blow to Pig Producers**

IFA Pigs committee Chairman, Pat O' Keeffe recently said, "the announcement by Galtee management of its intention to close its slaughtering facility is a backward step for an already highly challenged sector." He described the decision as "unplanned and extremely poorly timed. It showed a serious lack of respect for the suppliers to the plant that has supported its development over the past two decades."

Mr. O'Keeffe, himself a significant supplier to the factory continued that: " It is not acceptable that a factory that was put there with large amounts of state aid in the late 80's would be allowed to turn it's back on this sector without giving it a second thought. It is clear that while there have been discussions on this issue with other processors and outside agencies, the Galtee management did not consider it necessary or worthwhile to consult with or forewarn it's suppliers who are also shareholders, before taking this drastic action.'

"I have called an open information meeting for producers and other industry personnel for 13th August in the Abbeyleix Manor Hotel, because of the serious impact this decision could have on the entire pig production sector in

Ireland. I have invited the Minister for Agriculture and other elected representatives as well as representatives from the other major processing companies to this meeting, so as they can for once understand the difficulties being experienced by this sector and the potential effect some of their actions or inactions are having on this sector.'

The pigs Chairman continued that: "The timing of this announcement could not be worse, pig supplies normally peak in the lead up to and after Christmas, so to announce that Galtee which slaughters 20% of the weekly national kill will close on October 31st, is simply not acceptable. The loss of Galtee's capacity will leave producers in a very compromised and uncompetitive posi-

"In order to avert any potential logjams in slaughtering capacity and to maintain producer confidence, I will be calling on Government Ministers and agencies to get involved at this stage. This will ensure Galtee maintains its slaughter capacity at least in the short-term or until a detailed analysis of this serious decision can be made. Following this meeting IFA will be meeting with Dairygold Chief Executive Jerry Henchy again next week," concluded Mr. O' Keeffe.

IFA Congratulates Commissioner McCreevy

IFA President John Dillon congratulated Mr. Charlie Mc-Creevy on being appointed to one of the more important portfolios in the Commission- the Internal Market.

John Dillon said: " The challenge of making the European market of 25 member states work more efficiently, and of making Europe more competitive on the world stage is a major one. I know that Mr. Mc-Creevy has the capacity to do a very good job there.'

DYSTONIA

What is Dystonia?

Dystonia is a neurological movement disorder; this disability causes involuntary sustained muscle spasms, which can be extremely painful. This can affect various parts of the body and cause abnormal movements and postures. Dystonia can affect any part of the body including the arms and legs, trunk, neck, eyelids, face, or vocal cords and muscle contractions interfere with normal function. Early symptoms of the disability may include deterioration in handwriting after writing several lines, foot cramps, and a tendency of one foot to pull up or drag after running or walking some distance. Other symptoms that may appear are tremor and voice or speech difficulties. Birth injury (especially lack of oxygen at birth), certain infections, reactions to certain drugs, trauma, or stoke can cause dyston-

Around 50% of all cases of Dystonia have no connection to disease or injury and are called primary or idiopathic dystonia. There are several areas relating to primary Dystonia, these include the following:

- Spasmodic Torticollis this is the most common form of primary Dystonia (focal dystonia), this involves the neck, the muscles spasms causing the neck to twist to one side, and the neck may pull, turn or jerk.
- Blepharospasm this focal dystonia affects the muscles around the eyes and causing uncontrollable blinking especially in bright lights.
- Oromandibular Dystonia affects muscles in the jaw, tongue and mouth.
- Laryngeal Dystonia affects speech muscles of the throat causing strained or forced speech.
- Writer's cramp affected the hand and forearm, causing difficulty in writing.

Sometimes the Dystonia may be more widespread and this is known as Segmental and Generalised Dystonia most cases are idiopathic (meaning the cause of the Dystonia is unknown) this Dystonia is usually starts in childhood in one limb (often the foot). It can spread to involve other parts of the body, including the back, neck and arms.

What causes Dystonia?

Dystonia is a movement disorder, which need not involve any other functions of the brain, and the intellect, personality, memory, emotions, sight, hearing and sensation are normal in a person with primary dystonia. The symptoms of dystonia are due to malfunction of a small area of the brain known as the basal ganglia, which controls certain aspects of movement. It is believed that dystonia may be caused by an imbalance of the chemical messengers in the basal ganglia. Dystonia can also be caused by a gene inherited in a dominant manner; dominant means that each child of a parent who carries the abnormal gene has a 50/50 chance of inheriting that gene.

Treatment and Outlook for Dystonia

Dystonia is not a life threatening disability, but the more severe forms can have a devastating effect on a person's quality of life. Treatment is available to help relieve muscle spasms and pain, and alternative treatment such as acupuncture, could help to relieve the stress. Researchers continue in their efforts to find the causes and treatment of Dystonia. Research has focused on the basal ganglia (part of the brain), as this controls movements in the body, and where messages that initiate muscle contractions are processed. CAPPOQUIN From Charles Smith's History of Waterford 1746 (Continued from last week)

Ballygalane is pleasantly situated on the river, about a mile from Lismore. A little above the castle of Lismore on the opposite side of the river of Bally-Inn, the seat of Richard Musgrave Esq., the soil here tho, upon a very rising ground, is remarkably sandy, the gardens being scarce, any thing but sand, yet they produce all sorts of vegetables ... which is partly owing to an excellent exposure to the south.... A mile W. of Lismore on the river, are the

ruins of the castle of Ballygaron, said to be built by one Gay. It has no very ancient appearance, and seems to have been destroyed in the late wars. A mile further is Glanbeg, the house of Mr. John Jackson, seated at no distance from the river, adorned with good plantations of fruit and timber trees. Shian Castle lies about a mile to the S. of this place, by whom built is uncertain, but anno 28th Eliz. Maurice McGerrot McEn Eorla of Shian, was attainted being concerned in the Desmond Rebellion. Kilbree lies also on this side of the river between Lismore and Cappoquin, a castle here long since ruined, is said to have been built by King John, and a house has been erected on its foundation

Bringing together the cream of locally-grown produce and blending the familiar with the more exotic, the Farmers & Artisan Market located at Scanlon's Yard in Dungarvan is quickly becoming a popular draw for lovers of sumptuous cuisine of all varieties.

Its twenty stalls display products as diverse as Knockalara goat's cheese, Tim and Fiona York's organic tomatoes and lettuce and asparagus to Tara's handmade Passion cakes and triple chocolate chip cookies or the Naked Lunch's original Yankee Hot Dogs, lamb steak burgers and Illy's

The market strives to create a community atmosphere and, with this end in mind, the next few months will see buskers add a backdrop of music to the present sounds and aromas of sizzling blackpuddings and sausages.

Proprietors of one of the largest and most popular stalls at the market -'The Naked Lunch' - Louise and Eamon, say the reaction since they opened the stall has been very good.

The stall has a mouthwatering selection of delicious cakes, desserts, top-brand coffees, fruit juice drinks, bagels from Broadway Bagels, and the by-now already famous lamb burgers.

"We also went to the Dungarvan Agricultural show recently and the reaction was terrific. It gave people a chance to see what we have to offer. And we're quickly after gathering a regular clientele.

Joe and Eileen Condon, whose Organic Kill Beef all comes from their farm in Ballymacarbery report a similar popular reaction to their produce. The organic beef is lower in fat content as it comes from their own Galloway herd, which eats herbs and grasses other cattle don't.

"It's been going quite well," Mary, who was looking after the stall for the first time in Dungarvan said. "I understand that it has built up over the last few weeks. And the atmosphere here is very good, even with this... she added, indicating the unseasonal shower.

"Before that we had a restaurant so we are quite an established business, and everything here we've produced from scratch," she said.

Knockalara Cheese, which is based midway between Dungarvan and Cappoquin was established in 1990, and are members of the Farmhouse Cheese Makers Association of Ireland.

And while the dazzling array of different varieties of cheese can be



As well as the cheese, the stall also carries homemade tomato based relish, and an unusual seaweed tapish, which is a blend of seaweed, onion, pickle and olive oil and which can be eaten as a dip or on its own and goes particularly well with cheese.

"We've gotten a very good reaction," John says. "It's a new market, so ou have to give it time. But it's getting a great feedback from people, and it promotes locally produced and organic producers which is a very good

One of those local producers Tim York of Glenribbeen Organics, which is located between Lismore and Cappoquin, not only produces all the vegetables and fruits on sale at his stall, but is also running organic classes an introductory course to organic farming which runs once a month.

"We produce everything ourselves," Tim says. "We don't buy anything in. It's all organic and its all freshly picked."

Tim and his wife Fiona have been farming in Glenribbeen for the past six years. Before that they were located in Ballinavella, from where they produced their own wine.

Now, they grow a wide-variety of vegetables, everything between organic tomatoes to pinto peppers.

LOCAL GROWERS

Jimmy Morrissey, whose Ballinacourty Queens are already a perennial mainstay around the county, supplies his potatoes straight from his Ballinacourty farm out of which he has been operating for a number of years.

Jimmy said he's very pleased with the feedback he's been getting, and described the market as a great opportunity to sell his produce directly to the customer as well as to wholesalers.

With its ethos of providing everything for a customers weekly shopping

the market also has a stall devoted to apple juice and apple chutney which comes from Ireland's only organic orchard, which is based in Portlaw, Clashganny Organic Farm. Together with stalls selling freshly caught fish, another feature of the market is O'Flynn's Butchers - soon to located based in Tallow, and which supplies produce all over the Munster

"We have already gotten a lot of regulars who come back every week. We take pride in the fact that our produce is fresh. And we find here that we have a better contact with the customers and it works very well. People can come here to the market and buy all there weeks shopping in the one area, and it has a real community feeling. It brings everyone together and that creates a really good atmosphere."

One of the driving forces behind the Dungarvan Farmers & Artisan Markets, Siobhan LaTouche, has an impressive stand at the market, with a beautiful array of fresh organic vegetables, and fruit as well as eggs.

She said the market has been a really positive step forward for local business and producers.

"It's been great, really positive," Siobhan says. " Every week is getting better. Bigger and better. The main aim is to have something for everyone, and we'll be setting up chairs and having buskers so people can stay around and chat and have a coffee. It's a kind of atmosphere that you won't find in other places," she says.

"We're happy that the market will be a big success."

Dungarvan Farmers & Artisan Market is on every Thursday between 9.30am and 2pm in Scanlon's Yard Dungarvan, and is well worth a visit.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION: We have just returned from a package holiday in Spain. Unfortunately the holiday was a disaster as we did not have the hotel facilities promised in the brochure. Is there anything I can do about it in terms of making a complaint and getting our money back?

ANSWER: Yes there is. The Package Holidays and Travel Trade Act 1995 implements an EU Directive and gives you a certain level of protection should the package not be satisfactory or if the operator goes out of business. For you to benefit from this protection, your holiday should be a package holiday, sold at an inclusive price that covers a period of more than 24 hours or overnight accommodation and be made up of a combination of at least two of the following pre-arranged by the operator/organiser:

- · transport
- accommodation
- · other tourist services which account for a significant proportion of the package (e.g. golf/fishing).

You are entitled to compensation for financial loss that you have incurred as a consequence of relying on information given to you about your package holiday. Compensation may also be claimed for disappointment at the quality of the holiday.

If the brochure was inaccurate, or things went wrong during the noliday itself, you can look to the tour operator and/or the travel agent for compensation. Your contract must give you at least 28 days from the date the package ended to lodge your complaint. If your holiday is altered or cancelled you have the right to either a replacement package of similar or superior quality, a lower grade package plus compensation up to the cost of the original package or a full refund. Alternatively you can sue for breach of contract, though if cancellation was caused by factors beyond the organiser's control, or the minimum number for the package was not reached and you were given the required notice of this in writing, you will not be entitled to any compensation. MONEY MAI Controlling Mobile phone bills on Holidays

When you are travelling abroad a mobile phone is very convenient for keeping in touch with home. However, that convenience comes with a cost. Before you go on holiday do a little research and find the most cost efficient way of using your mobile phone.

- 1. Check first of all that your phone is roaming enabled.
- 2. Find out which network will be cheapest for roaming.
- 3. Remember that peak and off-peak call times- on foreign mobile networks may differ from Irish operators - check.
- 4. Manually select the cheapest network to avoid roaming on an operator that charges more.
- 6. Pre-pay mobile customers pay more for roaming and may not be able to use their phone at all in some countries.
- 7. Best of all, keep your phone off. You 're on holiday. Use your mobile only in emergencies.
- 8. If you really need to keep your phone on but you don't want to be charged for receiving calls, you can opt to divert all incoming calls to your voicemail.

African Community To Benefit From Creamery

The closure of the Glanbia Branch Co-op in Newcastle, Co. Tipperary, after 90 years in existence, has saddened the local community, but will leave an African community E10,000 better off. The creamery shut it's doors for the last time in March and locals have decided to donate most of the E15,000 given to them in compensation by Glanbia to the Poor Clare Nuns in Lusaka, Zambia. Local groups in Newcastle are also benefiting from the Glanbia cash with Newcastle parish and Muintir na Tire each receiving E1,500. The Naionra and the juvenile G.A.A. club each receiving E750 and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul receiving e500. That left the local Glanbia committee with E10,000 to dispense and local farmers felt it would be better to give it to charity then divide it among the farmers. It will now be given to the Poor Clare Nuns in Zambia, an enclosed order who have a farm where they grow food for themselves and the many poor and needy people living around them. They have been farming for the past 30 years and need to reclaim more land for the bush and will use the money for the purchase of machinery to do that, and to purchase fertiliser to improve their farm. The E10,000 was presented on Monday night to Sister Lucy O'Brien who has local connections and is a member of the Missionary Sisters of the Holy Rosary.

She has been a medical doctor in Africa for over 50 years and recently go an honorary fellowship from the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland, an honour also bestowed on former President of Ireland Mary Robinson and M.E.P. John Hume. She was asked by the Newcastle committee to recommend a rural community which could benefit from the money, and she suggested the Poor Clares in Lusaka to whom she will be passing it on. John Egan, a member of the local Glanbia committee and also of the Glanbia Council, says that up to 10 people were employed at the heights of the creamery's activities in Newcastle when Milk was being processed on the site. But in recent years only one man was employed, and he has been transferred elsewhere in Glanbia's operation. The decision to close the Newcastle branch was he said 'a bit of a shock', however, Glanbia are still operating weekly deliveries to farmers in the area.

"There are less farmers around and they have less buying power. It's a pity, but that's the way rural Ireland seems to be

Newcastle Creamery has along and proud history, it was set up in 1914 when it was owned by the Ormonde family and four years later it was taken over by Cleeves and they were taken over by the Condensed Milk Company became the semi state dairy disposal Ltd. There was talk of closing at one stage but a local man Captain Perry, organised opposition and farmers bought shares in the company, paying five shillings for every cow they owned. Newcastle later joined up the creamery in Clonmel. Electric current arrived in the area in 1953 and a new premises was built in 1959. It was the first all electric creamery in the Country and was officially opened by An Taoiseach Sean Lemass. In 1967 Newcastle joined up with the South Tipperary Farmers Co-op and began to send the milk to Avonmore creameries. Six years ago that became part of Glanbia.

Late Mrs. Babby O'Halloran

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mrs. Babby O'Halloran (nee McCann), New Street, Carrick-on-Suir, which sad event occurred at Suirmount Nursing Home, Carrickbeg.

Deceased in her ninety sixth year, she was born on 1st February 1908 to James and Margaret McCann (nee Burke). Her father joined the British Army during the first world war and as her mother had died soon after Babby was born, she and her eldest sister Josie spent their early years with a family in Carrickbeg, who were paid to care for them.

Babby had not good memories of this period and eventually ran away and went to live with her aunt who had a shop in New Street, close to Town Hall. She recalled walking barefooted from Carrickbeg to attend school at the Presentation Convent. Her father was wounded in the Battle of Salonica and he also came back to live with his sister in New Street. Babby had much better memories of this time when she helped her aunt in the vegetable shop, and her father got a job as a baker at Walshe's, Templeorum.

She often spoke of the Civil War and the cross fire between the opposing sides with the republicans in the Barrack yard opposite the house and the Free Staters in the Town Hall. Later, she joined an organisation known as the "Blue Shirts" Mick O'Halloran, a British Army colleague of her fathers used to visit the house in New Street and through him Babby became friendly with his son Tommy and they married in 1934 in St. Nicholas Parish Church at 7:00am which was then the usual time for weddings. Her aunt gave them a portion of the house in New Street and they set up home there and reared a family of four, two boys and two girls.

Tommy was employed in the post and telegraphs and after a short period in Dublin, he was transferred to Waterford and he cycled to and from work every day. Following the death of her aunt, Babby extended the shop and sold cigarettes, sweets and chocolates and used to stay open until after dances in the Town Hall. She opened the first ice cream parlour in the town and became known as the "Queen of Knickerbocker Glory"

Her husband Tommy died in 1965 following which she took in borders, mainly teachers (female) for company. She loved foreign travel, and as two of her children emigrated and settled in America she crossed the Atlantic on at least twenty five oc-

In 1992 due to failing sight she retired from business which was then taken over by her granddaughter Bernadette Mulvaney. Babby took up residence in Suirmount Nursing Home, Carrickbeg where she was cared for until her peaceful passing. Removal took place from Walshe's Funeral Home on Friday evening to St. Nicholas Parish church and on Saturday morning, requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of her gentle soul. The celebrant was Rev. Fr. Richard Geoghegan C.C., Carrick-on-Suir/Faugheen, after Mass the funeral took place to St. Mary's Cemetery, Carrickbeg where she was laid

Residents Angered By Planned Removal Of Green

Council Say Link Road Was In Original **Application For Estate**

A green used as a play area by [By Kevin Kirrane children in The Orchard estate in Dungarvan is likely to reduced by over fifty percent as the result of a 16 year-old planning permission granted to the developers of the 12 house estate.

Residents say that a new link road proposed to be built between the Youghal Road and the Cloneety Road will severely damage the intrinsic value and nature of their estate.

And in a bid to halt the removal of a sizeable chunk of their green, they have held meetings with eight of the nine Town Councillors and members of the local authority's planning sec-

In a letter of protest to the Town Council signed by all the residents of The Orchard, they say the road will dramatically reduce the green area, and severely damage the nature of the es-

PROTEST

"This green," their letter states, "is used by our children as a play area and is secluded from external traffic.

They say the proposed new entrance to The Orchard is in their opinion a danger for children of the estate, and would prefer if the existing entrance to the estate remains open.

Thirdly the letter states that the volume of traffic on the new road "will be a severe problem for residents" due to "the acoustics being amplified as existing trees will be removed."

And they complain that the private nature and the intrinsic value of the properties will be "severely damaged if the road is progressed in its current form.

However, council officials say the link road with an expected start date of six to twelve months - is needed to relieve congestion at the Mitchell street junction, to service the 98 new Hollycourt houses in McCarthy's Land and to service the new Secondary School on the Youghal Road.

The officials also said, that in the developers 1988 planning application a portion of land was agreed to be transferred to the council once the road was ready to be built. Until the transfer, the developers agreed to landscape this area.

However, the residents pointed out that as permission was granted 16 years ago, and most of the residents have only lived in the estate for the past ten years they were unaware of the sizeable amount of the green to be removed.

MINISTERIAL INTERVENTION

URGED

One of the councillors involved in the on-site discussions with the residents, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) said he now hopes to take the matter up with the Minister of Environment, Martin Cullen, and is urging the Minister to intervene.

"I will be contacting the Minister of Environment, Martin Cullen, to

ask for his departments intervention to see if there is any third party consultative expertise that might reverse the present drastic proposals," Cllr. Kyne said.

He added: "While I would acknowledge that the residents always knew and accepted that a road was going in the vicinity and that it would have a negative impact with noise, they were never clear that over 60% of the green area would go in this proposal."

ALWAYS IN THE PLANS

When the original planning application for The Orchard estate was lodged in 1988, the estate was built in a way to facilitate the new road, and around 70% of the green was agreed to be transferred by the developers to the local authority when the road was to be constructed.

Number 13 in that application states that the developers would landscape the portion of the ground "reserved for future road development on the eastern end of the site.'

This landscaped portion makes up the bulk of the present green.

However, angry residents say they believed land on the opposite side of the tree lined boundary would be used for the road.

Instead the trees will be removed and a six foot wall will be constructed across at least half of the green. The boundary wall will also close off the present access and residents will have to access onto the new link road.

Residents also say the new layout will lead to an influx of pedestrians walking through the small estate to the new shopping centre site.

PUBLIC DISPLAY


Responding, council officials said the portion of the green to be taken as part of the road development will be minimized, and under this plan around 50% of the green is expected to be taken rather than the 70% agreed with the developer.

They say the development was on public display for four weeks from the 2nd of June and just one submission was lodged.

The link road formed part of our Town Development Plan prior to permission being granted for the houses," Acting Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said. "The road development formed part of the permission for construction of the houses and the proposal to construct the link road is in accordance with the Part 8 drawings which were recently advertised."

But we are endeavoring to minimize the encroachment onto the green area. However the final design of the road will be governed by maximizing road safety.'

The issue looks likely continue and is expected to be raised and debated at the council's next meeting in September.





Throughout all of last week there was an air of depression all over the county and such was the disappointment that you found in some cases that people did not want to talk about the game against Kilkenny in Croke Park, Many, of course, did want to talk about it and give their views about what hap-

One could fill a book with the diverse verdicts. Many people have viewed the video over and over and discovered little things that had been overlooked in the heat and excitement of the game and here were exposed new reasons why we lost.

I was happy to find that some readers agreed with my overview of the semi-final and which I wrote in the opening paragraph of my report.

I said that we lost because Kilkenny were a far more experienced team in Croke Park, they were much craftier than Waterford, they had Henry Shefflin and we did not have John Mullane. I stick with that. It is a tribute to the players and all concerned that despite these drawbacks, we still held them to a single score. A goal would have done the trick. Luck was just not on our side.

We are fortunate that all of our panel are available again next season and all will be that bit more experienced when we take the field for our opening national league match in February and when we begin our campaign in the new style championship in May.

UNLUCKY 13

It was our 13th senior hurling match in the league and championship combined and it was the only one which brought real disappointment. After the defeat by Galway in the league final, we did not have time to grieve as the first round of the Munster championship was coming up seven days later.

Throughout the league we got wonderful entertainment. Defeating Kilkenny at Nolan Park in February was a big thrill as was our defeat of Cork in Pairc Ui Rinn. We won each of thee by a single score. Our draw with Tipperary in Thurles was another wonderful occasion to celebrate.

In the Munster championship we defeated the best teams in the province. We gave Clare a lesson in hurling, we edged out Tipperary in a real thriller in the semi-final before relieving Munster champions, Cork of their title after a storming display with a 14 man outfit in a game that has been described as one of the best Munster finals ever played.

So, in the overall and while we did not achieve the ultimate we did have a wonderful season and have no reason for going into mourning. It is satisfying too, to see such a degree of maturity among the vast majority of our supporters who accept what ha been our lot.

We always have the few knockers who cry about the team not being good enough and about the money it has cost them to travel in support. They complain as if the team owes them something, We just have to live with those people. They are in every sport.

COUNTING THE COST

This season, now ended, we have played a record number of 34 intercounty matches in all 8 grades. For the first time in our history we have played, league and championship against 19 different counties and for our first time ever we have played against all five provinces, including Britain. The cost of this whole operation is already gone over the 300,000 mark and the final figure will be much more, I am sure.







For Passage, Ned Quinlan, Thomas Connors, Joseph Upton, Robert Phelan and Dermot Mason were among their prominent players.


