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Lismore Residents Concerned Over Private Water Supply

Twenty-five households in Lismore have been told to boil their water after an amount of E. Coli and Coliforms bacteria was found to be present in a private water source.

Health officials described the water as "unfit for human consumption" while the Manager of Lismore Castle, Mr. Penruddock confirmed that there was a problem with the supply and urged householders to boil the water.

The twenty-five houses were all either bought or leased from Lismore Castle estates, and it's believed the contaminated water supply also affects the castle itself.

Mr. Penruddock said he

hoped a new chlorine treatment plant would be in place by the end of the week, but acknowledged that a number of houses would not be part of this scheme.

One of the householders - retired auctioneer and Florida publican - John Sadlier said when he took out a 12-year lease on his home he was not informed of any problem with the water supply.

"The first I heard that there

was a problem with our drinking water was last year when I was told for a short time to boil our water before drinking it as it was contaminated with bacteria."

"I presumed this was a temporary problem, but recently I received a call from the Castle Estates Manager, Mr. Penruddock, saying that the water was again unsafe to drink."

According to residents, recent water quality tests carried out

by the Environment Health Officials revealed dramatic increases in E. Coli and Coliforms.

Mr. Penruddock confirmed that there was a problem with the water supply.

"It is unfit to drink at the moment," he said. "Our private water supply is not good."

He said a chlorination treatment plant should be operating by the end of this week, but this

WIND FARM WOULD GENERATE ELECTRICITY FOR 15,000 HOMES — DEVELOPERS SAY

Hibernian Wind Power Ltd hope to lodge a planning application for the construction of a multi-million euro Wind Farm development, based in the Cappoquin area, in the next four to six weeks, it has emerged.

The Wind Farm is proposed to include eight giant wind turbines and would be located at Woodhouse, Cappoquin.

Hibernian said the Wind Farm would have the capability of generating electricity for 15,000 homes in the county.

However, the Wind Farm, whose turbines would have blades 40 metres in length, is expected to meet stern opposition among some local residents.

Already, a number of applications for Wind Farms around the county have been turned down amid concerns that the farms would be a blot on the landscape.

But, John Quann of Hibernian said the company will take on

board concerns raised by the public before it submits its plans. And the developers are to hold a public information day in the Community Hall in Aglish next Wednesday to give people a chance to see what's planned.

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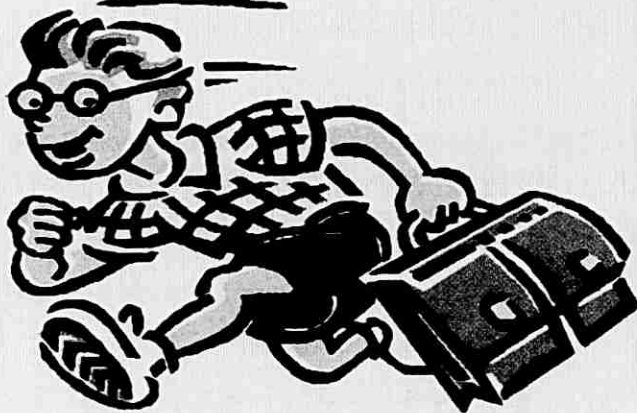

CAPPOQUIN
From Charles Smith's **History of Waterford 1746** (Continued from last week)
"To the south-east of Lismore lies the Deepark, being a large tract of 1192 acres well enclosed. A vein of iron ore runs through the middle of it which makes the soil very sterile, being unfit for

pasture or tillage and produces little naturally, except Irish furze, which takes root to a vast depth. To the east lies New Affane, remarkable for large orchards, and considerable plantations of fruit trees; between which and Tooreen, lies the castle of Norrisland, which though called a castle, is no more than a house of defence, said to be built by the Greatrakes's. Tooreen, the seat of John Reeves Nettles, Esq., was formerly a castle, the proprietors of which were the Roches, persons extremely active in the Irish Rebellion, and for which they justly forfeited this estate. The house is situated on the W. of the river, leading to which is a long and beautiful avenue large elms. There are some of these trees here of a considerable height, and the avenue I mention is near a mile long. This gentleman has large tracts of orcharding near his house, and makes yearly considerable quantities of cyder, liquor which this part of the country is famed for. The red-streak of Herefordshire, brought over here by this gentleman's grandfather, thrives extremely well in this soil.

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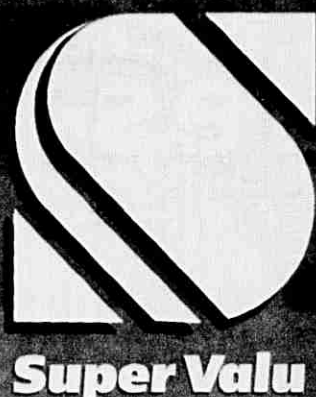
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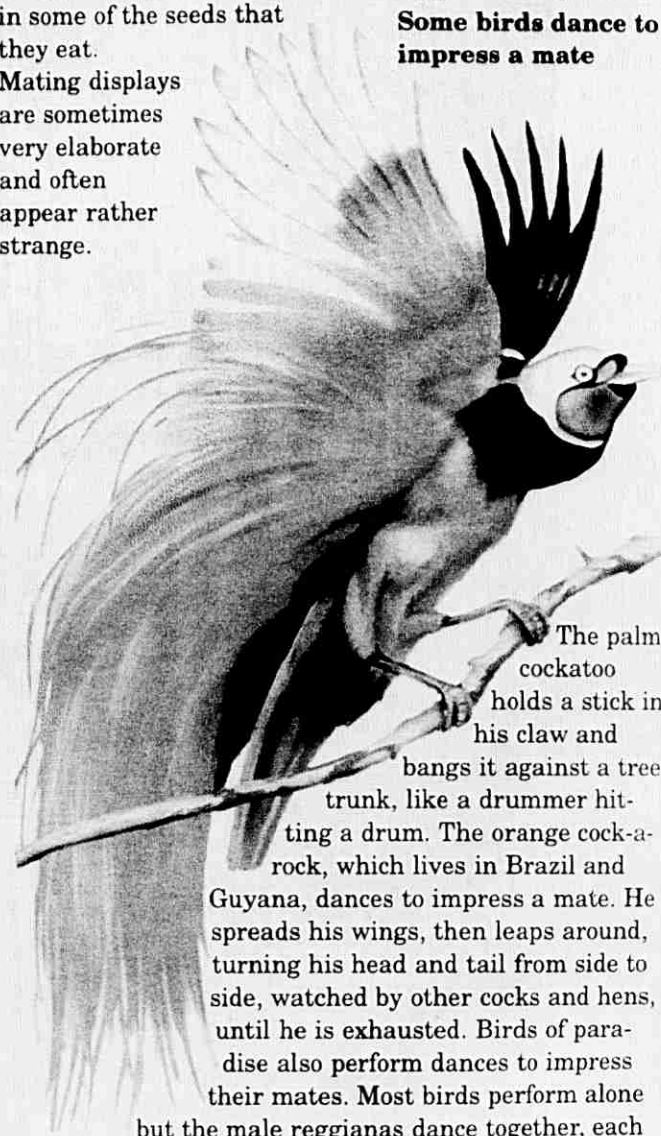

COLOURFUL BIRDS

Rainforests are full of vividly coloured birds. There are over 300 species of parrots in the tropical and sub-tropical forests of the Americas, Asia and Australia. Parrots, believed to be the most intelligent of birds, include macaws, cockatoos, lovebirds, parakeets and budgerigars. Fruits, nuts and seeds are the main foods of the parrot family because their strong beaks are specially suited to cracking open shells. The largest member of the parrot family in the hyacinth macaw. Many macaws eat clay. They probably do this to counteract the effect of poisons in some of the seeds that they eat.

Mating displays are sometimes very elaborate and often appear rather strange.

Some birds dance to impress a mate



The palm cockatoo holds a stick in his claw and bangs it against a tree trunk, like a drummer hitting a drum. The orange cockatoo, which lives in Brazil and Guyana, dances to impress a mate. He spreads his wings, then leaps around, turning his head and tail from side to side, watched by other cocks and hens, until he is exhausted. Birds of paradise also perform dances to impress their mates. Most birds perform alone but the male reggianas dance together, each trying to outdo the performance of the other.

Budgerigars are natives of Australia. They are members of the parakeet (small parrot) family. In the wild, they are mainly green and yellow in colour.

Hummingbirds hum with their wings

The hummingbirds of North, Central and south America are so called because their wings beat so fast they make a humming sound. The speed of their wing beat enables them to hover in front of flowers. As they hover, they insert their beak into the flower to gather nectar, which is their principal food. The largest of the hummingbirds is the giant hummingbird of the andes, which can be up to 22cm (8 1/2 in) long. The male bee hummingbird is the smallest bird in the world, measuring just 5cm (1/4 in) from the tip of its beak to the end of its tail.

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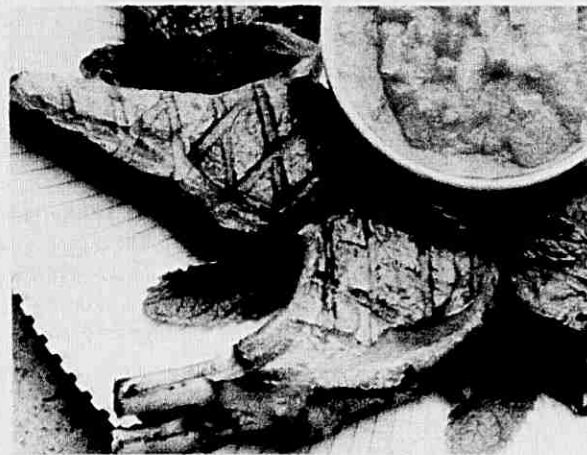

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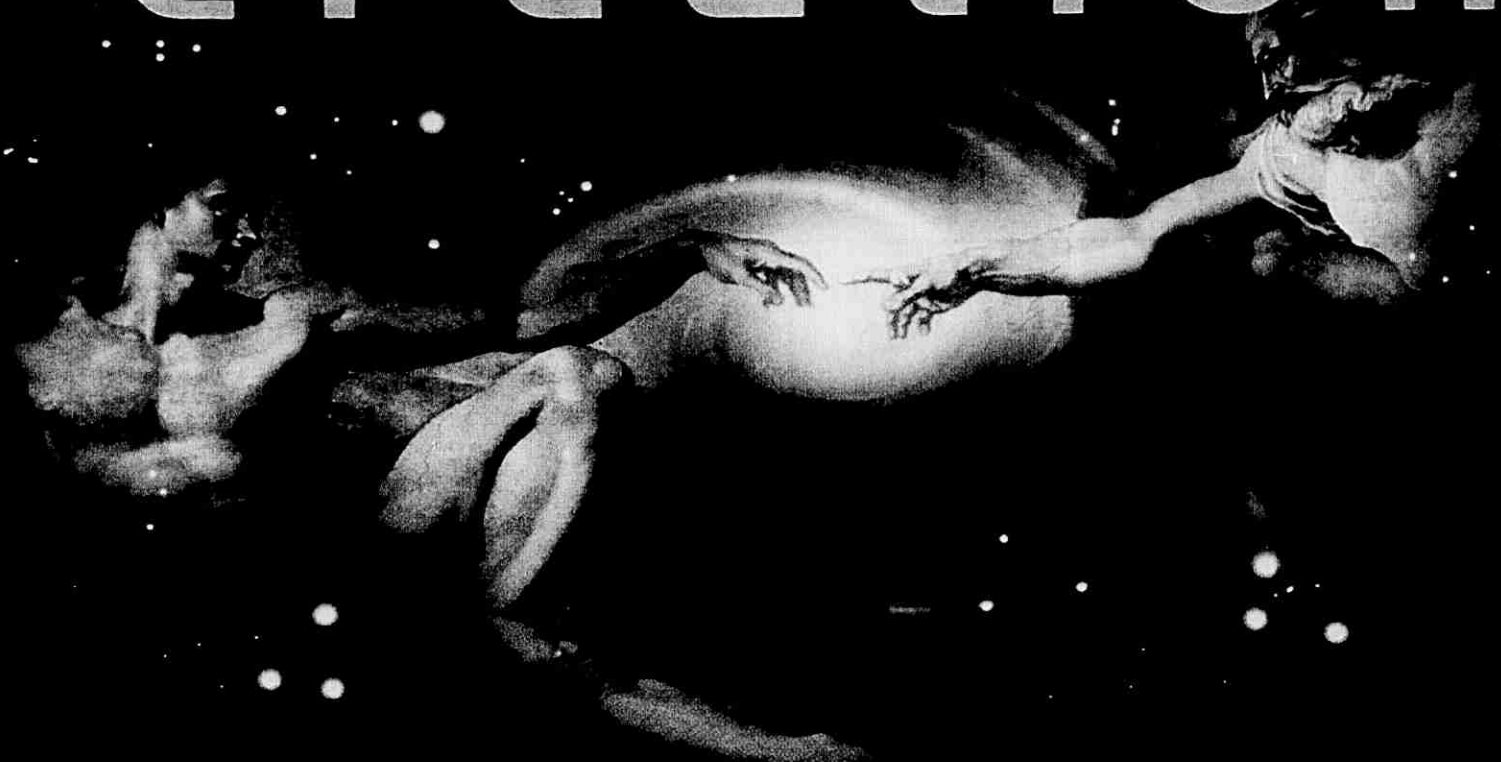
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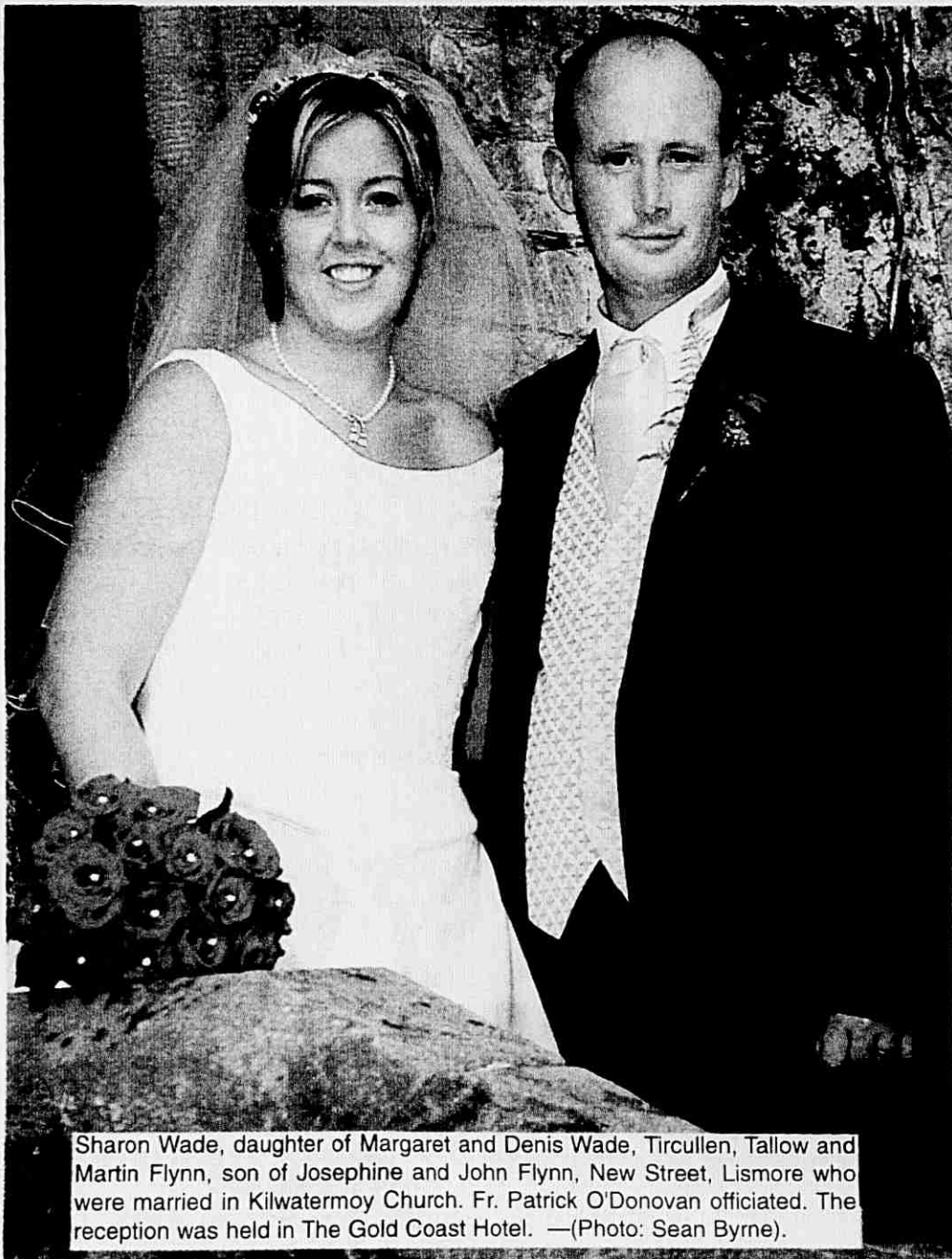

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Translation of Draft Co. Development Plan Nears Completion

The translation of the Draft County Development Plan is expected to be completed shortly and is expected to go on public display in two or three weeks time.

Publication of the Draft Development Plan, which was put forward for public notice at Waterford County Council's July meeting, was delayed because of the shortage of translators available to translate the document into Irish - leading to criticisms about the process.

Once the translation is completed and the public notice is published, the public will then have a ten-week period of consultation.

It's expected that those who already made submissions for re-zoning will be joined by many others who have aspirations to re-zone land.

However, it's not expected that the Draft procedure will be completed before January and while the process is being managed by Director of Services, Denis McCarthy, it's expected to be the first major issue facing the incoming County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer.

Pro-Active Approach Needed To Tackle Anti-Social Behaviour

Cllr. Brendan Mansfield has called on the Dungarvan Gardai to take a more proactive approach in tackling the growing Anti-Social behaviour problem in the town.

Renewing his call for more Gardai on foot patrol around the town, he called for more high profile policing and again called on the Government to fulfil its pre-election promise to deliver an 2000 extra Gardai.

He also said that he was pleased to see that other councillors have taken his idea of meeting the local superintendent on board.

"At first some of the other councillors seemed to be very hesitant towards the idea, but now I think that everyone realises the growing seriousness of the problem," he said.

He went on to describe the National Garda figures released last week as alarming. Statistics from Operation Encounter show that between August 2003 and February 2004 36,193 public order offences were detected.

The Garda Representative Association said confronting public disorder seemed like an endless battle for rank and file

officers, and on average 200 incidents a day took place.

Cllr. Mansfield said he believed that public order will be a recurring problem and is part of a wider societal problem, influenced by unprecedented affluence among young people and a fall in supervision and control of young peoples behaviour.

The Sinn Fein Councillor said there is a heavy onus on the Government to deliver on its pre-election promise to recruit 2000 extra Gardai.

"It's not good enough for Minister McDowell to say he will implement the pledge over the coalitions term of office. The coalition is already halfway through its life span and there is little sign of progress. The Government should stop coddling the public and honour its pledge to recruit the extra Gardai it promised."

"The law-abiding citizens of Dungarvan have had enough of the recent spate of vandalism and anti-social behaviour. A small minority can not be allowed make peoples lives a misery. It simply cannot be tolerated."

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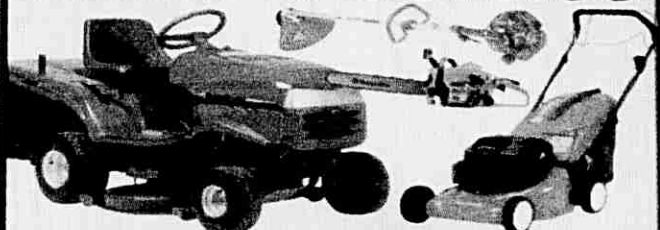

Cool Cucumbers Like Steamy Heat

CUCUMBERS, the Roman scholar Pliny said were "a wonderful favourite" with the Emperor Tiberius, who ate one every day. Centuries later, Dr Samuel Johnston said: "A cucumber should be well sliced, and dressed with pepper and vinegar, and then thrown out as good for nothing."

Thankfully, not everyone agrees with Johnson's point of view. Cucumbers have been grown for thousands of years and probably come from northwest India.

There are two types of cucumber. Outdoor or ridge cucumbers are characteristically rough-skinned, spiny and can be grown outdoors. Greenhouse or frame cucumber are smoother and grow up to 12 inches long and, as the name suggests, need the protection of glass.

Although they are both considered essential for salads, tomatoes and cucumbers do not happily share the same greenhouse. Both like warmth, but the cucumber prefers steamy heat, which would be disastrous for totatos.



Cucumbers: People either love them or hate them.

The amateur gardener will probably do better to leave the greenhouse to tomatoes and grow cucumbers under frames, heated or cold and cloches. If space in the garden is limited, cucumbers can be grown up cane wigwams, but you must remember to keep tying in the plants as they will easily become tangled and difficult to deal with.

Train the main stems up a single cane and remove all the tendrils and side shoots.

Which ever method of growing is used, it is a good idea to select an all female F1 variety because it will mean a lot less work..

If not, all the male flowers that appear must be removed as soon as possible. If they pollinate the female flowers (the ones with a tiny cucumber behind them), the fruit will be bitter.

Grow bush and trailing types in mid-spring in the greenhouse, putting two seeds on their side to avoid rot in a 7.5cm pot. If both germinate, thin to one seedling. Plant out bush varieties in late spring under cloches 45cm apart. Plant trailing types 1 metre apart.

You can always sow two seeds of either type at similar spacings outside in late spring after the danger of frost has past, again thinning to one seedling. Cucumbers need a lot of attention. The soil must be kept moist, but not waterlogged, and the atmosphere humid. Shading may be needed to prevent the temperature in the frame or cloche getting too high.

With the F1 varieties, the cucumbers grow from flowers that appear where the leaf meets the main stem, so there is no real need to pinch out except to control the eventual size of the plant.

If you grow traditional bush or trailing varieties in frames, when the plant has six leaves, pinch out the growing point. When laterals appear, select the best four and lightly peg them down, one towards each corner of the frame. Pinch out the growing shoot of these laterals when they near the corners. Under cloches, pinch back just above the fourth leaf. Keep two laterals to train in opposite directions along the cloche run.

After this, in frames and under cloches, non-fruit bearing shoots are stopped at the fourth leaf. Fruit-bearing shoots are stopped two leaves beyond the developing cucumber. A liquid feed should be given to plants once a week when their fruits begin to develop.

From July onwards, pick the cucumbers before they get old and large. Small young cucumbers taste much better and regular harvesting encourages the plant to go on producing fruit. - at least two a week!

This Week In The Garden

Sow schizanthus for spring flowering

Sow now in order to have really large schizanthus for spring decorations in the greenhouse or conservatory. Sow seeds thinly in well drained seed boxes using a seed compost and germinate in a frame. The cooler the conditions the better.

Sow winter spinach and spinach beet

Choose a sheltered place and make a sowing of prickly-seeded spinach to stand the winter. Sow the seed thinly in drills 2.5cm deep and 30cm apart. You can make a sowing of spinach beet now for use in winter and spring. This useful variety of beetroot is grown solely for its leaves, used as a spinach substitute.

Start to gather mushrooms from outdoor beds

If you were able to make a mushroom bed in the open in July you should examine it now for the first mushrooms. Gather the buttons (young mushrooms) as they form. The bed should continue well into the autumn.

Make new strawberry plantations

Strawberry runners pegged down early last month should have made good roots and can be severed from their parent plant.

A few days later, lift them carefully and plant them in new beds.

Choose a good open position and soil that has been deeply dug and well manured. Plant 30cm apart in rows 60cm apart.

Pick and summer prune apples and pears

During this month and through September you should continue to pick apples and pears as they ripen. Continue to summer prune the trees but strive to complete the work by the end of the month.

Treat vines

Vines, indoors and out, will be in various stages of growth. Early vines from which you have gathered the crop should be ventilated freely and sprayed with water if there is any sign of red spider on the leaves.

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County Left Out Of After-Hours Patients Service

Waterford Passed Over By Department Of Health -Deasy

Waterford City and County is now the only area in the South East region that hasn't received funding for CAREDOC - the after hours service for patients with urgent medical problems who need to contact a doctor after surgeries close.

Deputy John Deasy, who has asked a number of Dail questions and written to the South Eastern Health Board on the matter, said: "Waterford has been left out of the equation again. When I asked the Minister about this he says it's the health boards responsibility. I've also asked the health board and they say they haven't been funded by the department. I tend to believe the health board."

In a response to Deputy Deasy's Dail question in January of this year, Minister for Health, Micheal Martin said 3.492 million euros had been allocated towards the service. But, last month, the South Eastern Health Board said funding to enable the service to expand into Waterford was not included

in the Boards letter of determination by the Department of Health and Children in 2004.

"The responses are contradictory," Deputy Deasy said. "For some time the Minister of Health has indicated that funding would be made available to Waterford but we've seen nothing. At the same time he has no problem telling the media he has put 46 million euros into co-operatives and that 23 out of 26 counties are now covered. Waterford has been completely ignored and now the Department is passing the buck to the South Eastern Health Board."

Local family doctors have argued that CAREDOC would alleviate overcrowding at Waterford Regional Hospital, especially at the Accident & Emergency department. Up to one third of initial contacts would be triaged out with telephone advice, a further one-third would be directed to the main centres to be seen by a co-op doctor and a remaining one third would be referred directly to the hospital if the CARE-

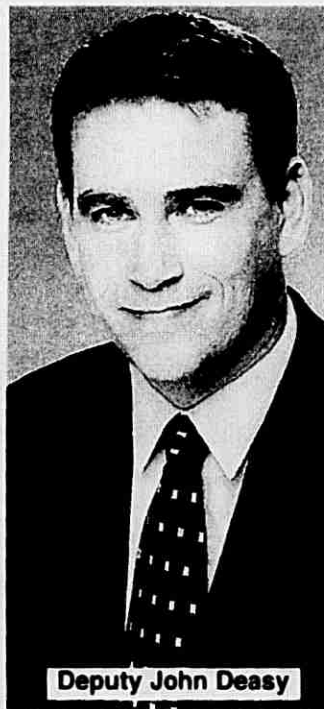
DOC service was funded.

"Family doctors have also pointed out that there is a manpower crisis affecting general practices, especially in rural areas. They have argued that it is practically impossible to attract younger GP's into these areas mainly because of the after hours commitment involved."

SERVICE

Recent surveys show the CAREDOC system had a 99% satisfaction rating with its patients. The services works as follows: Patients with urgent medical problems contact a central number. A receptionist at the CAREDOC call assessment centre then takes the patients details. A telephone triage nurse rings the patient back and gives advice to the patients, or if necessary organises appointment times for the patients to be seen at local treatment centres or arranges an immediate home visit if necessary.

Deputy Deasy added: "Doctors are beginning to feel stretched as it is. This system

would make the Waterford area more attractive to young GP's, it would ease the strain on staff at WRH and it would immediately improve the general health services, especially for elderly patients. For relatively little money, it would account for a huge improvement for the health service in Waterford."

COOKERY CORNER

Have a 'fun do' fondue

The swiss are well renowned for their tasty cheese fondues but over here they have been regarded as somewhat 70s. Not any more!

The humble cheese fondue is an ideal way to combine good food with a social occasion.

Follow this authentic Swiss recipe and give your friends a meal to remember.

Ingredients:
(Serves 4)

- 1 large clove of garlic
- 250ml of dry white wine
- 300g of Swiss Emmenthal cheese, grated
- 300g of Swiss Gruyère cheese, grated
- Juice from half a lemon
- 1 tbsp of cornflour
- 60ml kirsch
- Pepper
- Nutmeg
- 1 large white loaf cut into cubes

Method:

Peel the garlic and rub vigorously on the inside of

the saucepan, then chop into small pieces.

Pour the wine into the saucepan and bring to the boil. Once the wine has boiled, turn heat down to simmer and add cheese and lemon juice. Stir continuously to prevent lumps from forming.

Dissolve the cornflour in the kirsch and stir until smooth – add this to the cheese mixture.

Add the chopped garlic and season with nutmeg and pepper, continue to stir until the mixture is smooth.

Transfer the mixture from the saucepan to your fondue pot. Then all you have to do is light the flame and let the fun begin!

Remember to stir the fondue mixture occasionally to keep it smooth

■ **Healthy option**
Use mozzarella instead of one of the Swiss cheese and substitute apples, pears and grapes for half of the bread.



CHEESE FONDUE: cooks tips

- **Serve a dry white wine with your fondue – it will help to digest all that cheese!**
- **Put a little kirsch in a bowl to dip your bread into – it adds flavour and a kick to your meal.**
- **As well as dipping bread into your fondue, you could also try a variety of French meats and sausage (these can be found in all good supermarkets).**
- **Why not try grapes as a contrast?**
- **The best bit of the fondue is the cheese that has welded itself to the bottom of the pot. It tastes just like toasted cheese and is delicious!**

Hot fudging it!

TRY this delicious recipe for hot fudge pudding.

Ingredients:
(Serves 6)

- 175g dried apricots
- 2 500g cartons fresh custard
- 600ml milk
- 300g sweet bread (eg brioche)
- 75g butter, softened
- Grated rind of 1 orange
- 200g chopped fudge
- Caster sugar to dust

Method:

Soak the apricots in boiling water for at least two hours. Stir together the custard and the milk.

Cut the bread into 5mm thick slices and spread thinly with the butter, then cut into quarters.

Grease a two-litre shallow ovenproof dish and pour a

thin layer of the custard to cover base.

Meanwhile, drain and roughly chop the apricots then mix with the orange rind.

Make your pudding by arranging alternate layers of bread, apricots, fudge and custard until you reach the top of the dish. Finish with a layer of custard. Then leave to soak for about an hour.

Preheat the oven to 180° C/350° F/ gas mark 4.

Dust the top of the pudding with the castor sugar. Place the dish into an roasting tin and fill the tin with enough hot water to come half way up the side of the dish. Cook for one hour or until the custard has set and the top has turned a rich, brown colour.

Mouth-watering savoury scones

HASSLE-free gourmet savoury scones – they melt in the mouth!

Ingredients:

Serves 8

- 450g self-raising flour
- 1 x 5ml sp baking powder
- Pinch of salt
- 1/2 x 5ml sp mustard powder
- 2 x 15ml sp fresh chopped dill
- 180g butter
- 2 medium eggs, beaten
- 120ml milk

Method:

PREHEAT the oven to 230° C/450° F/gas mark 8.

Sift the flour baking powder, salt and mustard powder, then stir in dill. Rub in

the butter. Add the eggs and enough milk to form a soft dough. Knead lightly on a floured surface and roll to 2cm thickness.

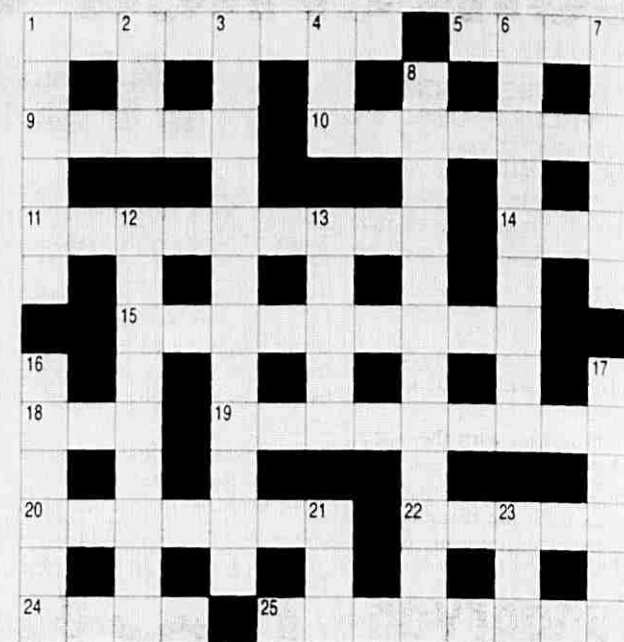
Using a 7.5cm plain cutter, cut out eight rounds (roll trimmings again as necessary).

Arrange on a baking sheet. Bake for 12 minutes or until the scones are golden and risen. Leave to cool on a wire rack before splitting.

The scones can be served as sandwich type bites (with a top and base) or open, with the fillings on display.

will only solve the problem for around one-third of the twenty to twenty-five houses affected. "Over the years one or two houses have been sold off," he said. "Some on long-term leases and other as freeholds. We can only get the chlorination plant to work for the properties on this (the castle) side of the river because the chlorine has to be in contact with the water for twenty minutes or so. Otherwise it isn't going to kill off the bugs. And the distance between the houses means that it

won't be possible for it to work. So, we're going to have to think of some other system for our tenants, and the people on the other side. It's a problem."

Those who bought properties from Lismore Castle estate over the years will have to sort the problem out themselves, he said.

However, residents on the far side of the estate say they're concerned about the health affects of the water supply, and

insist that the answers they've received aren't adequate, and demanded the immediate installation of a treatment plant to deal with the problem.

"A proper treatment plant should be installed there without delay," Mr. Sadler, and his near neighbour, Mr. Paxton said.

Environment Health Officers said results obtained on private tests cannot be disclosed. If E. Coli and a high count of Col-

iforms were found in a water source, however, they said the water would be unfit for human consumption.

"It would be unusual that there's a private water supply not part of a grouped water scheme. If a dwelling supplied by a private source is close enough to a public mains then it may be possible to connect, but if it's further out then they may be entitled to qualify for a grant to treat the water."

Deputy Ollie Wilkinson (FF) welcomed the news that Dr. Slevin is to stay in Cappoquin.

It followed concerns that he was to leave for a practice in Lismore, and wouldn't be replaced by the South Eastern Health Board.

The concerns were raised when the South

Eastern Health Board announced that if a doctor left or goes in the future that it would not be advertising the position.

"We could not accept that in Cappoquin," Deputy Wilkinson said. "There's a very big rural hinterland and we felt this area needed to be served by two doctors, and we would have to fight to get that situation rectified."

"But, for the moment, we welcome the fact that the doctor is to stay."

€43,658 For Gaeltacht Accommodation Roads

Deputy Ollie Wilkinson has welcomed the announcement by Minister for Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs, Eamon O Cuiv, that 43,658 euros has been granted under the Scheme for Accommodation Roads in the Waterford Gaeltacht.

This grant has been sanctioned to carry out work on the county road D7 between An Rinn and An Seanphobal. This work will be carried out in co-operation with the County Council on a fifty fifty basis.

The Minister also said that this type of investment demonstrated the Governments commitment to providing proper infrastructure in rural and Gaeltacht areas thereby providing options for people to remain in their own communities.

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Marie Reilly - Medical Herbalist

Marie Reilly, the first practicing Medical Herbalist in the South East, has begun a consultative service at Mari Mina Pharmacy in Lismore.

Advising on herbal remedies, health food and on general lifestyle, Marie will be in Mari Mina every Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon.

By the end of September, she also hopes to have started her own practice in Ferry Lane in Lismore with consultations by appointment.

"The first consultation usually takes about an hour. During that hour we'd discuss the condition they need treatment with. Then I would ask them quite a lot of questions about their medical history and their lifestyle."

"Sometimes they would also need a physical examination, and, those things are pretty much as they would expect from their doctor."

Some patients may need blood tests, requiring them to visit their GP. But, for others, the selection of herbs suited for that person and their condition can achieve discernible health benefits.

"Prescriptions are normally of 4 to 7 herbs that are uniquely picked for that individual person," she said. "So that rather than having something off the shelf, a generic production, they've got a mix of things that are specifically made up for them and their problems."

"It's very effective," she added. "Some people experience a complete alleviation of their symptoms whereas other people with more long term chronic health problems almost always experience real and definite benefits even if they can't take the problem away completely."

Medical Herbalists

Medical herbalists undergo comprehensive training similar in length to orthodox doctors - normally studying for three to four years to obtain a degree and two more years in herbal science.

All Medical Herbalists in Ireland belong to the UK's National Institute of Herbalists, which enforces a Code of Ethics, and to the Irish Institute, ensuring high standards among the 20 recognized Medical Herbalists in this country.

And the popularity of properly regulated alternative and complementary treatment is being more and more endorsed by scientific research, and backed by segments of the orthodox medical profession.

"Herbs are very effective for a great many things," Marie said. "It could be useful for anything they're concerned about. If they are having treatment with their GP they can still come."

"People might be happy with the medication they're on from their doctor, but maybe they feel a bit more can be achieved. Maybe they feel the bulk of their symptoms are gone but there are a few things lingering. Herbs can help to increase the effectiveness of what they're already taking."

"Quite a lot of people are concerned about side effects of the

drugs they are taking and again herbs can help minimise those side effects, particularly of those taking lots of courses of antibiotics, people who've been taking steroids."

"For some people they either don't want the orthodox medicine available or there isn't anything available. For example pregnant women: theirs not much really available for them from their doctor. Women going through menopause: a lot of them don't want to take HRT or are coming off HRT and finding they've got symptoms - then herbal medicine can be very effective in dealing with those kind of things. And obviously with the training that medical herbalists have, we know when to say you need to go to your doctor if a condition requires further tests, and our training would also make us aware of which herb reacts positively with which drug and which to avoid."

HOLISTIC

Many people are also unaware that most pharmaceutical drugs were originally based on plant constituents - the main constituent has just been isolated, extracted and synthesized in a laboratory.

"Medical Herbalists are actually using the whole plant. The active constituent is still there but in herbalism we believe that the other constituents of the plant are very important in supporting it. It's as nature intended. You're going to get the whole package rather than just the one isolated thing."

Dungarvan Volunteer Returns From Moldova

Louise Earley from Bayview, Dungarvan, has just returned after spending two weeks working in an orphanage in Moldova with approximately 300 disabled girls, working for the Dublin based Irish Charity Outreach Moldova. Louise spent two weeks as part of a volunteer group travelling with the charity to Hincesti Orphanage for Girls in Moldova.

"Once we stepped off the bus in the grounds of the Orphanage we were immediately surrounded by a large group of girls, each of them delighted to see us, introducing themselves, and asking our names, speaking either Moldovan or Romanian," Louise said.

"Most of their own names end in an A for example Vera, Tamara, Ana and they had great difficulty pronouncing Louise but I got used to their attempts and despite the language barrier they were well able to communicate with us. After a few days it became obvious to us that all the girls wanted was attention and love which doesn't cost us anything to give."

The volunteers were given a timetable for their two-week stay and Louise was involved in classes ranging from Sport/Art/Dance/Physio and School. "We also spent time feeding and looking after the disabled and wheelchair bound girls. We spent two days out of the orphanage each week bringing a different group of girls to the beach, lake, amusements or McDonalds. These days out might be the only days this

year the girls left the Orphanage. Birthday parties were also held for the girls whose birthdays had fallen during the previous week."

"I would recommend travelling to Hincesti to everyone. It was a wonderful experience and I felt a bit lost when I returned to Ireland."

Louise urged others to get involved too. She said she herself works in a printing company and apart from her own family had no experience with children.

As with any charity donations are always welcome. If anyone

would like to donate clothing, toys for the girl's etc Louise would be delighted to pass them on to Outreach Moldova.

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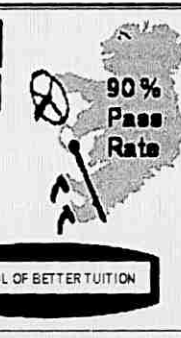

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

Can I claim tax relief for third-level tuition fees?

ANSWER

Yes you can, providing the courses are eligible. Tax relief for third-level tuition fees is available for the following courses:

- Approved undergraduate and postgraduate courses (full-time & part-time) in both private and publicly funded third-level colleges in the State
- Approved undergraduate and postgraduate courses (full-time & part-time) in publicly funded and duly accredited private third-level colleges in any EU member state
- Approved undergraduate and postgraduate courses (full-time & part-time) operated by colleges in any EU member state providing distance education in the State
- Postgraduate courses in certain private and publicly funded third-level colleges in non-EU countries.

Undergraduate courses must be of at least 2 years duration. Postgraduate courses must be for at least 1 academic year, but not more than 4 years, and must lead to a postgraduate award based on a thesis or an examination. Tax relief is also available for approved information technology and foreign language courses in the State resulting in a certificate of competence (not just a certificate of attendance) and of less than 2 years duration.

Tax relief is at the standard rate of income tax (20%). The maximum relief allowable for the academic year beginning on 1 August is €3,175. For the information technology and foreign language courses the relief applies to fees ranging from €315 to €1,270 maximum. The tuition fees must be paid by you on your own behalf or on behalf of your spouse, your child or someone for whom you are the legal guardian.

To date, 15,000 Organic Brown Bins have been distributed to householders around County Waterford and Dungarvan Town and it is anticipated the balance of Organic Brown Bins will be delivered prior to the first collection on 13th September.

Waterford County Council is delighted to introduce a special introductory offer of 5 per Organic Brown Bin lift. The price of the collection tag for the Brown Bin service was adopted in the 2004 Estimates at 6 per lift. This Special Introductory Offer of 5 per

Brown Bin lift will change from the 01 January 2005 to 6 per organic brown bin lift.

Waterford County Council is introducing the Special Introductory Offer of 5 per Brown Bin lift to acknowledge the commitment that householders in County Waterford have made to recycling as illustrated by achieving the recycling rate of 29% compared to the national average of 13%. According to Environment Education Officer, Ann-Marie Kenna, "the benefits of using the Organic Brown bin will be obvious - householders will be able to divert an additional 30% (approximately) of compostable / biodegradable waste from their refuse bin. This means that most householders will

place their refuse bin out less often." The Wheelie Bin charge will rise, as agreed, to 9 per lift in September.

Collection of Waterford County Council's New Organic Brown Bin will start from 13th

September. The collected material will be turned into compost through the monitored composting programme in Waterford City where the first batch of compost is expected prior to December 2004.

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Summer Camp Celebrates 21 Years

ers are second to none," she said, "and I thank them one and all."

"It is ten years now since we entrusted our special children to the Camp," she said, "and I am delighted to see some of them now return as helpers each year. They have been greatly enriched by their experience."

He wished the Camp every success in the future.

He recalled incidents over the twenty-one years and paid special tribute to all the members of staff and the student Leaders who had given such dedicated service to the Camp thereby ensuring the safety and enjoyment of the thousands of children who had spent their summers at the Sports Centre.

"The growth of Summer Camp," he said, "has been due to many factors, not least the availability of amenities close by. The use of the Park Hotel Pool since 1993 had been a major asset to the Camp and had been extremely popular with those attending," he continued, "and I thank the Flynn Family and the Park Hotel staff for their courtesy and patience."

He thanked the parents of the Children with Special Needs who had entrusted their children to the Camp, some of who had gone on to become Leaders and helpers there.

He said that the overall success of the Camp had been due in no small measure to the Leaders, the students of the time, who had gone on to successful employment and some of whom played a very significant part in community affairs.

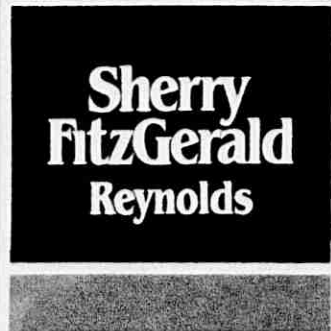
"Those Leaders now live in all parts of the world" he said, "and this is borne out by the apologies we have received from a variety of countries around the globe."

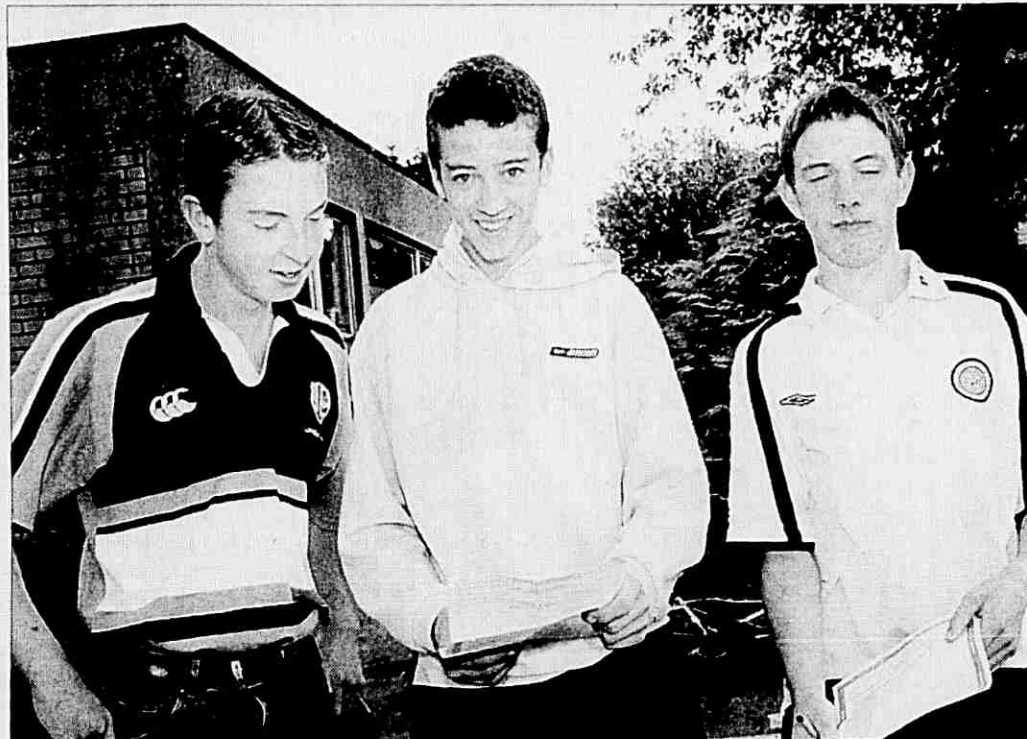


Top Marks For West Waterford Schools!

Last Wednesday the nail-biting wait for results finally came to an end for the hundreds of students in the locality who sat this years Leaving Certificate Exams.

And for schools in Dungarvan and the West Waterford area it was an extremely positive outcome for the class of 2004.

At Blackwater Community College in Lismore, with its first batch of Leaving Cert students, exceptionally good results were achieved.

"We're absolutely ecstatic with the results," Principal, Denis Ring said.

"Being the first years Leaving Cert's after the amalgamation and with the students having been one year in this school, and one year in one of the old schools, you could forgive them for finding it difficult. But, we're absolutely delighted. The results were excellent."

Leaving Cert students attending the Blackwater Community College also bucked the national trend in Math's and Science - with high results in both subjects.

Mr. Ring also said that no one attending the school would have to repeat.

"It's a measure that they have achieved their potential and from that point of view there's a great sense of satisfaction for everyone here."

Also reporting extremely positive results, Principal Pat Buckley of Colaiste Chathail Naofa said they were delighted with the Leaving Certificate results in both the Leaving Cert Vocational Programme and Leaving Cert Applied.

"The Leaving Cert Vocational Programme students excelled with most getting enough points to pursue the course of their choice. Many, of course, will also choose to return to college next year to pursue a post leaving certificate course leading to employment or further education," Mr. Buckley said.

"The Leaving Cert Applied results were of a high standard with many students getting merits or distinctions."

"I would like to thank the teachers for their professional and caring input in teaching the students during the year, the parents for their positive contribution and support and the students who behaved and worked so well throughout the school year."

"The results in the Post Leaving Certificate sector were of the highest order this year. The numbers of PLC students who successfully completed their courses and transferred into work was almost 100%."

The college also took the opportunity to announce that it is

running a new Post Leaving Certificate Course in Community Care, as and from September of this year.

Principal of Ard Scoil na nDeise, Ann Conway said students at the school achieved an extremely successful set of results. "Not alone did the 'high-flyers' do marvelously well, but girls who maybe wouldn't have been as academic and for whom the five or six passes would be a great achievement we had a number of those."

"We're really really thrilled about the results," she added. "We consider them to be outstanding results, and we're delighted with them."

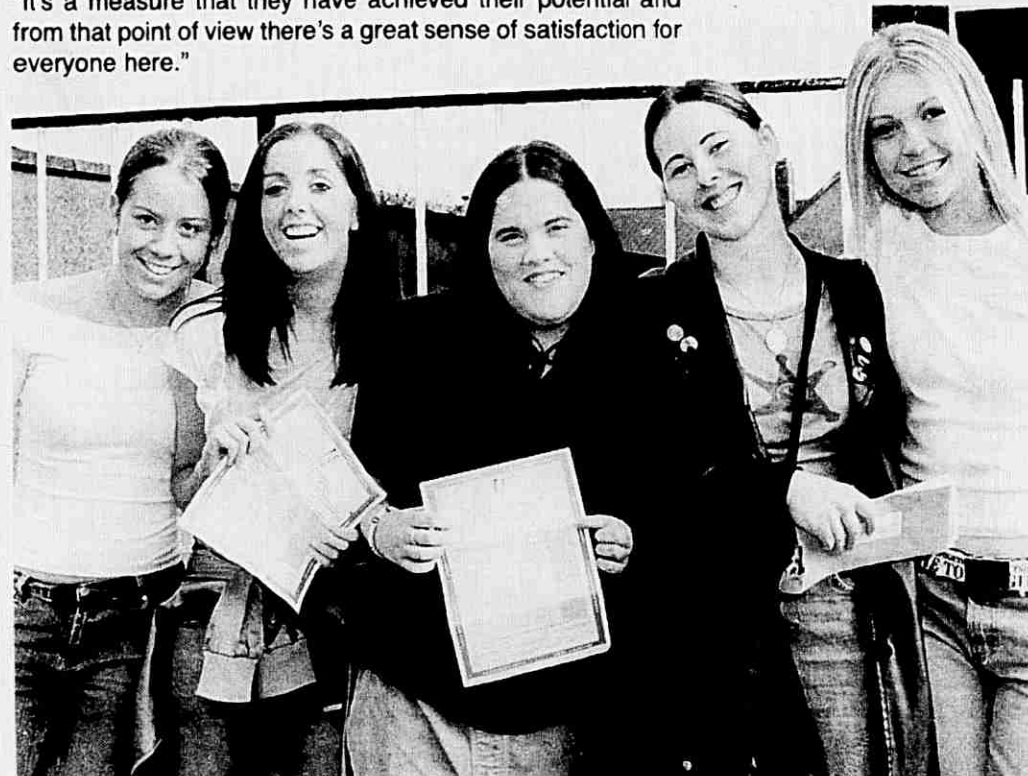
At one of the largest secondary schools in the area, excellent results were reported.

St. Augustine's College Principal, Fr. Moran said there was a sense of deep satisfaction in the Friary at the results, and a legitimate pride in the achievements of the class of 2004.

"At one end of the scale is a pupil with 590 points, while of the 136 pupils less than 3% failed in Mathematics - much lower than the national average of 17%," he said.

"Not one failed Irish, a subject which seems to be a cause of concern for parents groups this year."

Councillor Mattie McGrath (FF) Newcastle, Chairman of the South Tipperary County Council is calling on the management of Dairygold to pull back from the brink in relation to the closure of the pig slaughtering plant in Mitchelstown with the loss of 170 employees at the end of October and further blow with the closure of the processing plant in Roscrea with the loss of another 100 workers next month. Councillor McGrath is very concerned at the treatment meted out to what he describes as a very 'dedicated workforce' who have served Dairygold well over the years. "Surely they deserve better than that". Cllr. McGrath is extremely concerned for the future of farmers/pig producers who again have given loyal support to Dairygold and are being summarily dismissed along with their produce as from the end of October without giving any consideration or entering into any discussions as to where they might find alternative outlets for their produce past closure of Mitchelstown and Roscrea plants. In conclusions Cllr. Mattie McGrath feels it is a bit rich of the Chief Executive of Dairygold, Mr. Gerry Henchy, to be appealing for co-operation from the workers and suppliers of this late stage after he has wielded his axe with such vigor reaping such devastating consequences on the aforementioned work force and suppliers alike.

Late Mr. Johnny Kane

It is with deep and sincere regret we record the death of Mr. Johnny Kane, Baron Park, Clonmel. His death came as a severe shock to his heart-broken father Billy with whom he resided and with whom he enjoyed a happy relationship. His brother, sisters, nephews and nieces, too, are devastated by his untimely demise at the age of 52 years of age. His passing is also deeply felt in Baron Park evoking nostalgic memories for his neighbours, there, who remember him as a quiet, good humoured lad growing up in their midst whom they were glad to welcome back to the 'Park' following his sojourn away from home and where he returned shortly after the death of his mother some fifteen years ago.

Son of Billy and the late Kathleen Kane, Baron Park, he was one of five children. Johnny or 'Gingo' as he was popularly known was educated at S.S. Peter and Paul's N.S. and the High School, Clonmel. A lover of Gaelic football in those early years, he was on the under 15 commercials team who played in Croke Park in the 1960's.

Like his father, Johnny loved army life and was a member of the F.C.A. for five years attending camps in Youghal and Kilworth where he enjoyed the camaraderie and the craic. In the early 70's he went to England where he worked in a dairy factory. Following which he came back to Ireland taking up a position in Dublin with Crush International where he remained for some two decades returning to Clonmel shortly after the death of his mother, when he took up employment with Bulmers from which he subsequently retired due to ill health.

On his arrival back home fifteen or so years ago, he got immersed straight away in the activities of Clonmel Town Soccer club, his dedication and commitment being immediately recognised and he was appointed club secretary, a position he held for a decade and a half right up to the time of his death, at which time glowing tributes were paid about him by the Club PRO Muiris Walsh who remarked that he was undoubtedly their finest secretary ever.

According to his dad, Johnny, a single man, suffered many hard knocks, health wise over the years but he showed tremendous courage and resilience, never complaining, just getting on with the simple pleasures of life. He and Johnny were more than just father and son, he said, they were also pals who enjoyed each others company going regularly together to the local bar or to the NCO's Mess at Kickham Barracks as well as travelling around to the soccer and hurling matches. And, as he commented they had their routine in the home sharing the various household chores, Johnny's presence helping to fill the awful void created by Kathleen's death in 1989.

Outside the home and their mutual social activities, they had their own individual abiding, interests for which they were both noted; Johnny's involvement with Clonmel town and Billy's attachment to the local boxing club. It was also such a source of satisfaction to him that four of his nephews played with Clonmel Town.

What a blow it was to Billy, in particular to have his son, his buddy, snatched away from him in such a cruel fashion. However, Billy, a retired Battalion Sergeant Major of the 12th Batt is blessed with having such a loyal family who will be a great comfort to him as well as to each other as they face the lonely days together without Johnny who was such an integral part of their lives.

His remains were removed to S.S. Peter and Paul's Parish Church, Clonmel where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Pat Hayes C.C., S.S. Peter and Paul's. On the following morning, requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his eternal soul. The celebrant was Rev. Fr. Pat Hayes C.C. assisted by Johnny's former neighbour and friend Rev. Fr. Francis Lloyd C.C., Carrick-on-Suir, Clonmel Town F.C. who carried his coffin from the funeral parlour to the Church, provided a guard of honour on both occasions at which there

was a large attendance present giving testimony to Johnny's popularity and to the Kane family.

After Mass the funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery where he was laid to rest. Fr. Pat Hayes C.C. officiated at the graveside. To his father Billy, brother, sisters and many relatives we extend our sympathy.

Late Mr. James Ryan

It is with deep regret and sadness that we record the passing of Mr. James (Jimmy) Ryan, Tracey Park, Carrick-on-Suir on the 13th July.

His final illness came rather suddenly as he had been in good health into the Spring of this year and only in June was he hospitalised for a period in South Tipperary General Hospital, Clonmel before being transferred to the local hospital.

Jimmy was born in Wales in January 1917 but his mother took him to her home town Carrick-on-Suir in the following year where he was reared by his grandparents Jim and Nora Ryan in Greystone Street. He was educated in the nearby Mercy Convent and after leaving school, he emigrated and joined the British Air Force and served overseas for a number of years.

In 1937 he married Mary O'Connor from Portlaw who died in childbirth in 1960 leaving a large family, some of them very young and Jimmy's aunts Nellie and Maggie helped in rearing them.

In 1969 Jimmy married Margaret Power, Marian Ave, Carrick-on-Suir and they set up home in Tracey Park. Jimmy's working life in Carrick-on-Suir was at Plunders and Pollack where he was in employment until he retired.

Jimmy Ryan was a true gentleman in every sense of the word, always seeing the best side of his fellow beings. He was a wonderful conversationalist and could converse intelligently on a variety of subjects, ranging from sport to science and the solar system. Any T.V. programme about nature or life in general were viewed with great interest and in later years he was quite content tending his lovely garden or walking along the cottage quay with his buddies of former years.

He was a keen and dedicated sportsman in his youth especially boxing and hurling, however it was in his offspring that hurling prowess really came to the fore and six of his sons donned the Blue and Gold of Tipperary.

Most notably was P.J. who captained the County Under 21 team to All Ireland success and played centre field on the Senior County team for a number of years, winning two Senior All Ireland medals. Jimmy Junior joined his brother on the 1968 team that lost the All Ireland to Wexford. All the sons played a major role in the great Davin team of the 1960's that won two county titles and a Munster club title. Jimmy's daughter Mary was a useful camogie player. Jimmy himself did hurl for a short time with Davins and Tracey Park, his main hurling career with the Swans and in 1950 he played on the last Swan team to play in a Tipperary Senior County Hurling final when losing to Barrisoleigh. He was also on the losing side in the 1935 All Ireland Minor Hurling final when Kilkenny beat Tipperary. It was appropriate that a guard of honour from the Swan G.A.A. club accompanied Jimmy on his final journey.

On Wednesday evening his remains were removed from O'Dwyers Funeral Parlour, Carrick-on-Suir to St. Nicholas Parish Church where they were blessed and received. On Thursday morning, the feast of St. Henry, requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his eternal soul, the celebrant was Rev. Fr. Richard Geoghegan C.C. After Mass the funeral took place at St. Mary's Cemetery, Carrickbeg where he was laid to rest.

ABBEYSIDE TOPICS

OUR LOCALITY



The construction of Devonshire Bridge was financed by the Fifth Duke of Devonshire at a cost of £5,000. The work on the bridge from beginning to end was supervised by Jesse Hartley who was born in Pontefract, Yorkshire in the year 1750. He was the son of a stonemason bridgeworker. He worked on the Bridge at Ferrybridge, Yorkshire and his next work was Castleford Bridge, Yorkshire which has an inscription stone "Jesse Hartley Builder 1808". He came to the Abbeyside/ Dungarvan area to construct the bridge and Causeway in 1809 and remained here until 1818. While in Ireland Hartley married Ellen Penny, daughter of the Seneschal William Penny. (Seneschal = steward who superintended feasts and domestic ceremonies). Jesse Hartley is frequently mentioned in a series of Ledgers in the National Library, where he is mentioned as "Jesse Hartley architect." In relation

to the Bridge there is an entry in them - Dec, 25th, 1818 -G.B. Jackson on account of timber for Dungarvan Bridge:- £328. Another entry refers to the compensation given to tenants through whose property the new road from the causeway was constructed: Jan. 11th 1817 - "Paid sundry persons, half years rent due Sept. 29 1816 for giving up their houses and small plots of ground at Abbeyside where the new road leading from the Bridge now runs.

The Bridge as built is both graceful and striking in appearance. It is single arched and built of rusticated sandstone, all of which was imported from England. It has massive voussoirs (a series of stones shaped like wedges, with which an arch is constructed, the middle one of which is called the keystone). The keystone is a scroll keystone. The piers have rectangular panels with a cornice above, and over this is a small limestone panel. It is often said

that the foundations were made from blankets but whether this is an old wives tale or not it is difficult to tell. The scribe in his research into the construction of the bridge did not come across any reference to the matter of the blankets. The construction of the Bridge and Causeway were a massive improvement to the Abbeyside/ Dungarvan area. The Bridge was opened in 1816.

MONANG/ KNOCKATEEMORE DEVELOPMENT

With the news that there is an application before the Town Council to build 125 houses on land owned by Mr. John Quailly services will have to be improved along this area. At the present time the water main is just a two inch pipe and a larger pipe needs to be laid as far as Ballycoe Cross. Following that the road will have to be widened and new footpaths laid to ensure the safety of pedestrians in what will be a much busier road.

Whisperings From The Poor Man's Seat

Land adjacent to St. Augustine's Church, Abbeyside has been offered to the Parish for an extension to the graveyard. It will be interesting to see if this offer will be accepted.

FUNERAL MASSES

In future, all burials in Abbeyside will take place following the regular 10.00am morning Mass. Heretofore, a Requiem Mass was offered at 11.00am in the Church and the burial followed.

Strandside North Speedway

The speed limit signs near the roundabout are turned the wrong way around and this fact was brought to the attention of Town Council officials some time ago. However nothing has been done to rectify the problem. This is a problem that affects other areas as well. It seems the signs are turned around by pranksters during the early hours when almost everybody is asleep. Spanners are needed to loosen the bolts before the signs are turned around and the bolts tightened again. What is to be gained from such behaviour is difficult to imagine but the Town Council should rectify the situation as soon as possible as speeding motorists could cause an accident.

The first encounter was with a teacher from St. Mullins, Co. 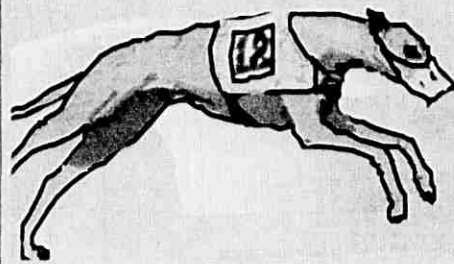

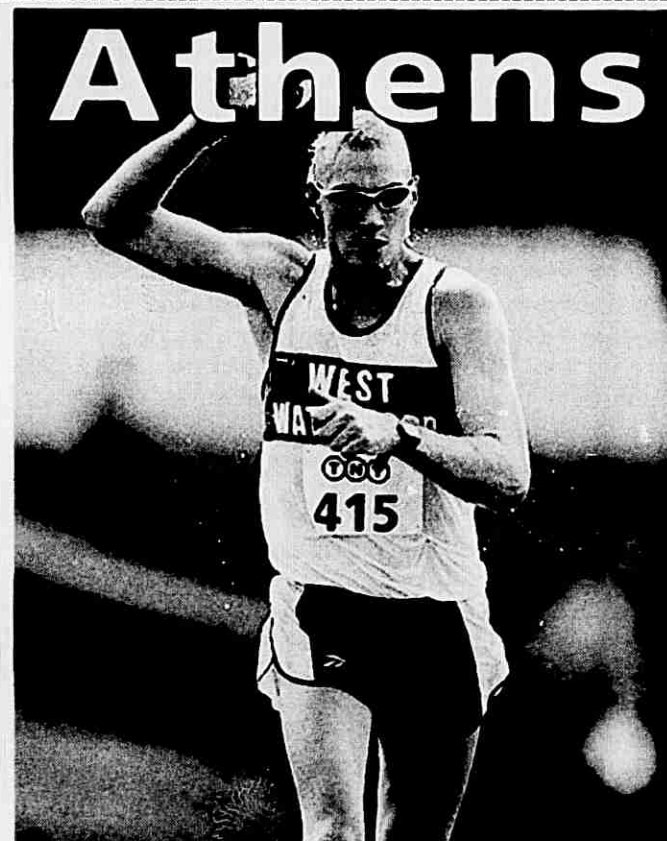

Life takes many twists and turns for everyone and Jamie Costin unfortunately is no different in this regard. An athlete of Jamie's talent, his commitment and dedication over years preparing for this one day how devastating it is for him and his family who have prepared for this day with him, for his coach Pierce O'Callaghan, for all of us at his club West Waterford A.C. a Club which is so proud to have Jamie Costin as one of its members. A young man who must rank highly when one talks of Irelands great race walkers, and for all in the world of athletics in general, one could not have foreseen anything like this happening.

While finishing his preparations South of Athens in Porto Heli for the 50k Walk which is scheduled for this coming Friday morning, Jamie was involved in an accident with a truck which has left him with a broken toe and a compression fracture in his back. Jamie was brought to hospital in Porto Heli and was later transferred to a hospital in Athens itself. He was then on Wednesday transferred back to Ireland by Air ambulance and is presently being treated at the Mater hospital in Dublin.

I called to see him over the weekend and as per his usual, found him in fairly good spirits considering his obvious discomfort and huge heartbreaking disappointment. It will take some time for Jamie to recover from his injuries but true to his fighting form and sheer determination he will win through. Even in the aftermath of his accident, his first words were "will I be able to compete next week". You can have no doubt but we will see him back to full health in time and we all know of his commitment and how hard he worked to get to Athens, and it's this determination to succeed which will help him make that full recovery. All that is left to say is that we at his club West Waterford wish him a speedy and a full recovery. and, of course, now our wish for the race on Friday is that Jamie's great friend Robert Korzenowski can go and win the gold medal in this his last competitive race. He will want to do it for Jamie, I know, and Jamie will be urging him on every step of the way.

DEISE ARCHERY CLUB NOTES

Roving Mark Shoot Cancelled

Due to the slightly inclement weather it was decided to cancel the latest leg of our roving mark shoot a new date will be decided on soon. The question of what is the difference between a Clout Shoot and a Roving Mark shoot was asked of me during the week I hope the following explains:

Clout, and Roving Mark Shoots

A clout Shoot is usually shot over a

large level area of grassland and is one of the most traditional and challenging shoots in archery. The target is set up anything up to 180 yards from the archers. Commonly 165 meters is shot for men, 125 for women. This target is a flag or a pole that should be highly visible. (The old English word for 'cloth' - a flag - is 'clout', hence the name of this type of shoot.)

Roving mark shoot differs from Clout

Shooting, where as clout shooting is shooting from one measured mark to another and then back again. Roving mark as it suggests is where a number of marks (in our case a number of flags) are placed at various lengths across an area of land. The land for a roving mark shoot doesn't have to be flat or open, in fact hilly terrain and trees provide the archers with more of a challenge.

Scoring in these events is quite simple actually A

rope is fastened to the flagpole and is walked around to describe a circle in order to score the arrows. The rope can be up to 7 yards long, making a target area of 14 yards across. The rope is marked in sections so the nearer ones arrow is to the flag the more points scored

Clout shooting probably evolved out of a need to train archers "to shoot to a length." The English were not disposed to willingly practice and maintain a degree of proficiency as is sometimes portrayed in verse and cinema. Without the compulsory weekend practice as was commonly dictated by law, skills necessary to successfully fend off aggression in defence of land and life were quickly lost. The English had to be forced to practice.

Soccer in its earliest form which had become popular was banned on Sunday's by Royal Decree to ensure that all males could practice archery. From these forced sessions clout shooting was developed as the means to mass huge numbers of arrows to a common point. Archers provided a primitive yet highly effective form of artillery and history would record in graphic detail it's effectiveness. During The Hundred Years War, the outcome of battles at Crecy, Poitiers and Agincourt would certainly have been different without the massed firepower of these ancient archers.

WATERFORD G.A.A. SUPPORTERS CLUB - DUBLIN BRANCH SPONSORED UNDER 16 HURLING COUNTY FINALS PLAYED AT FRAHER FIELD

On Saturday last in ideal weather conditions and played in front of a good attendance, the division two, three and four finals of this years County Under 16 hurling championship sponsored by the Waterford Supporters Club in Dublin were played at Fraher Field. On county final days, the officers of the Bords try and have everything as perfect as possible. For the recent under 14 and 16 hurling county finals the Bord have tried to improve things on previous finals. Heretofore clubs were asked to supply linesmen and umpires for the Bord to act as linesmen and umpires. Not the ideal situation in a county final. For the recent finals the Bord have appointed three referees to act as referees and linesmen for the day with Bord officers as well as John Jackson and Adrian Flanagan acting as umpires. This has been a huge hit and hopefully will continue to work in the future. The county Bord for as many as its finals as is possible tries to put together a programme for all patrons going to the

county finals. For patrons and those who report on the finals for the local papers and radio stations the programme makes it easier to identify players which is not always easy especially when the players are wearing full faced helmets. The programme for Saturday's county finals it has to be pointed out was made worthless by the clubs taking part on the day. Of the six clubs that played on Saturday only one club Stradbally lined out as listed with all the players wearing the shirt they were allocated. Changes before games made have to be made from time to time from a selected team on a programme. However if this is to happen, surly clubs should have the decency to get their players to wear the numbers they allocated to them when handing in the team. Credit must go to the Stradbally club for fielding as selected on the programme. Hopefully we will see all clubs line out in future as on the official programme. It must also be pointed out that on Saturday last, An Gaeltacht club

showed absolute disrespect to the Bord by not even providing a list of players for the programme. Another disappointing aspect of last Saturday's county finals at Fraher Field was the number of players who did not wear a helmet. I cannot see the point of any player going out onto a field to play a game of hurling, at any level without wearing a helmet. It may be argued that a good helmet costs a lot of money, but the question has to be asked which has the biggest value, paying out roughly E70 for a good helmet or the cost to a player who may not wear a helmet and as a result could pick up a serious injury to any part of the head. On Saturday last I counted one An Gaeltacht player who did not wear a helmet and two or three players from the St. Saviours club also. This cannot happen from January 1st 2005, as a motion passed at the annual convention in Killarney earlier this year makes compulsory for all players to wear a helmet for all hurling matches from minor level down from this date

If the standard of hurling played by Passage is anything to go by in this game, then it won't be too long more till we see Passage back contesting and winning county senior hurling finals. This was the fourth underage county final contested by Passage in a short few weeks. Busy Weekend For Juvenile Hurling Inter-County Teams

This coming weekend will see four of our Juvenile Inter-County Hurling teams take part in tournaments in Waterford, Cork and Tipperary. Waterford this year will have two teams taking part in the Under 14 hurling Tony Forestall/Sony Walsh Tournament at venues in Waterford City.

Further details of this years competition can be found elsewhere in this weeks newspaper. The county under 16 team will travel to Tipperary to take part in the Arrabawn Under 16 hurling competition which this year has been given All-Ireland Status by Croke Park. This means that whoever wins this tournament from now on will be the official under 16 hurling All-Ireland Champions. The Arrabawn Tournament is run each year by the Tipperary Co Bord na nOg each year since 1988 for Under 16 Inter-County teams.

In the history of the tournament only four counties have won it, Tipperary have won it seven times, (1988, 1989, 1990, 1994, 1995, 1997 and 2003), Galway have won the tournament six times (1991, 1993, 1996, 1998, 2000, and 2003), Kilkenny have won the tournament twice (1992 and 2001). Clare is the other county to win the competition, winning it in 1999. Waterford this year have been drawn in group 'D' along with Galway and Antrim. Waterford will play their group games at Borrisoleigh, which is about eight miles outside Thurles on the Thurles to Nenagh road.

The other groupings are, Group 'A' Tipperary, Clare and Laois who play at Dr. Morris Park in Thurles, Group 'B' has Kilkenny, Limerick and Offaly playing each other at The Ragg, Group 'C' has Cork, Dublin and Wexford playing each other at the Thurles Sarsfields Grounds - Games are fixed for 10:30, 12:30 and 2:30 at each venue. The group winners advance to the semi finals which will be played at the Sarsfields club grounds and at Dr. Morris Park in Thurles. The two winners play each other in the final. Not forgetting the under 15's, they will be travelling to the Carrigdhoun tournament in Cork. 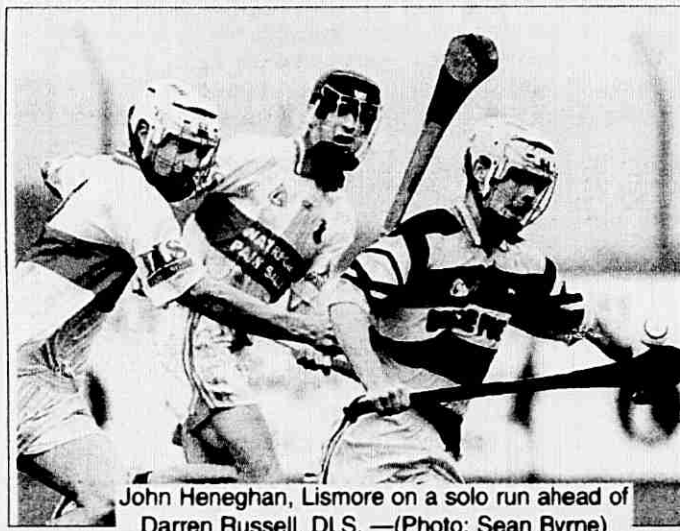

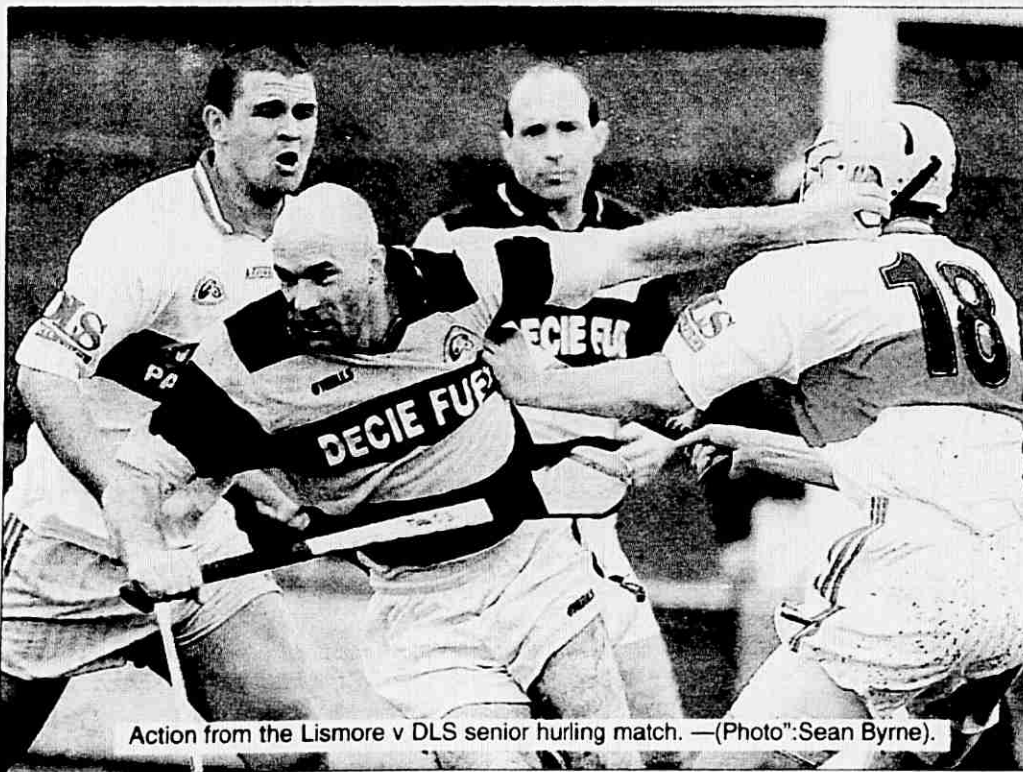

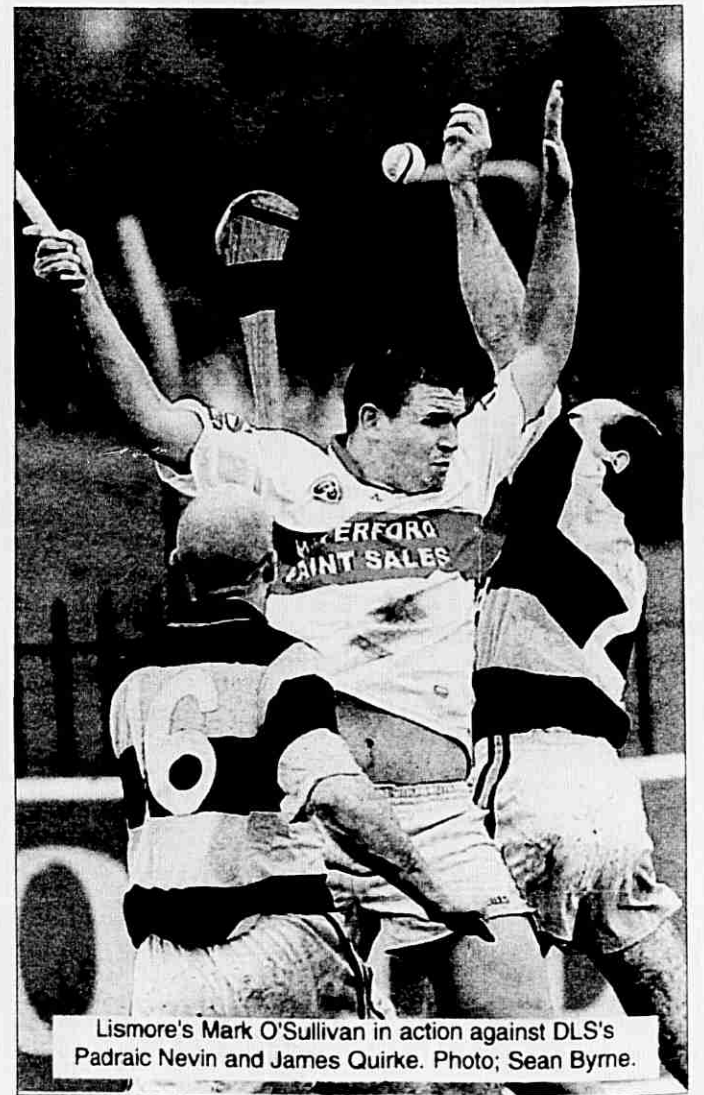

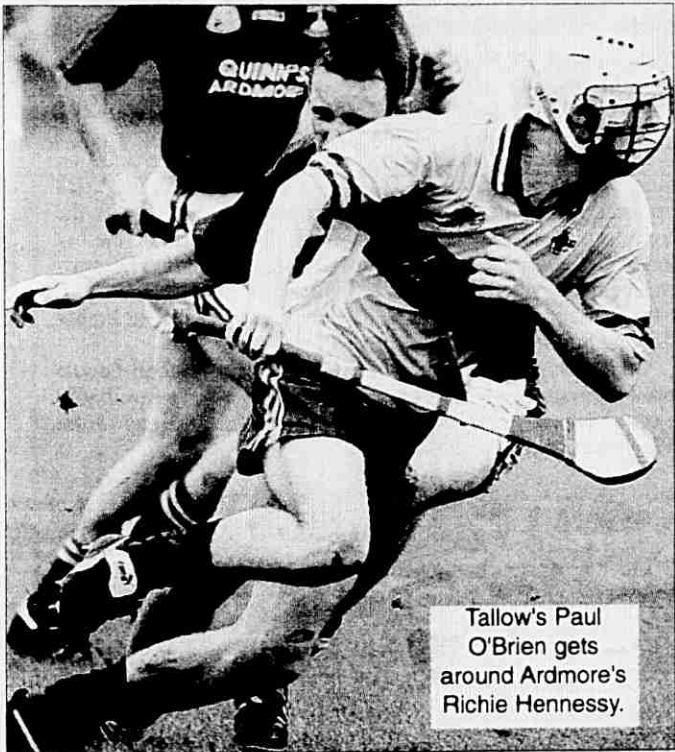

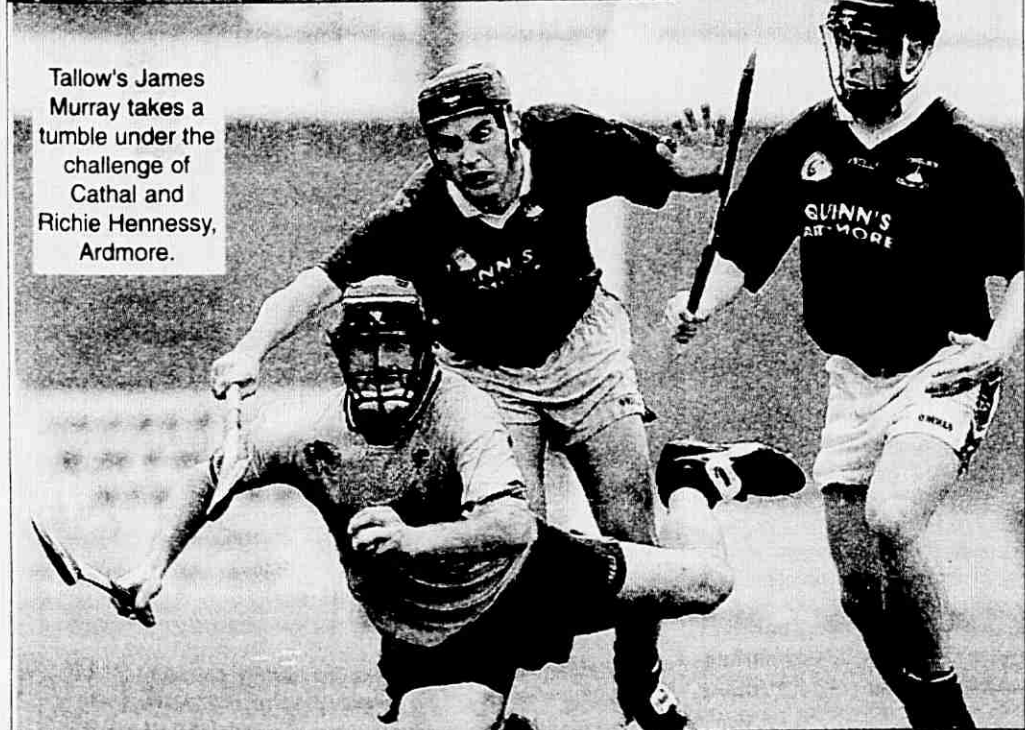

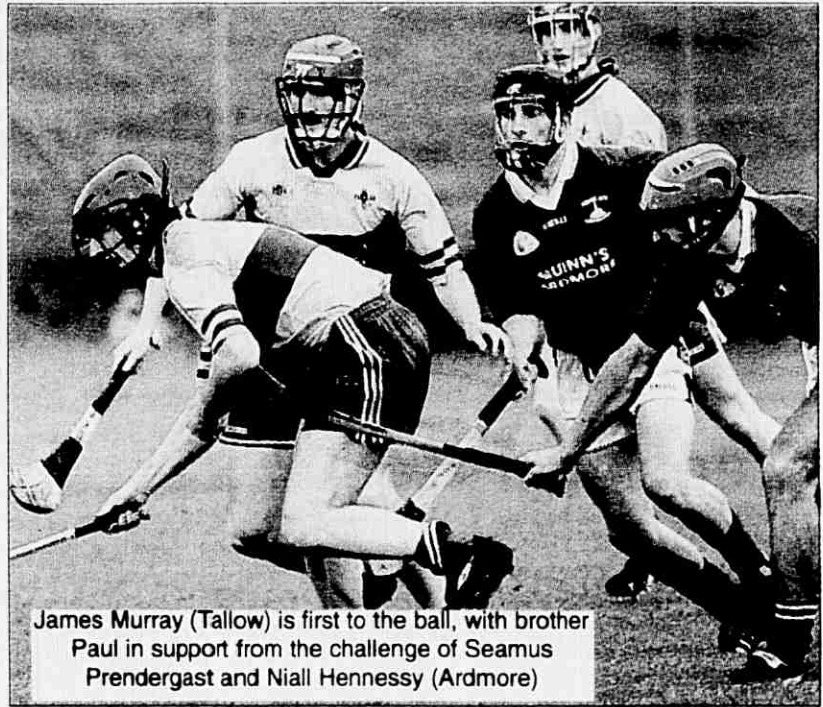

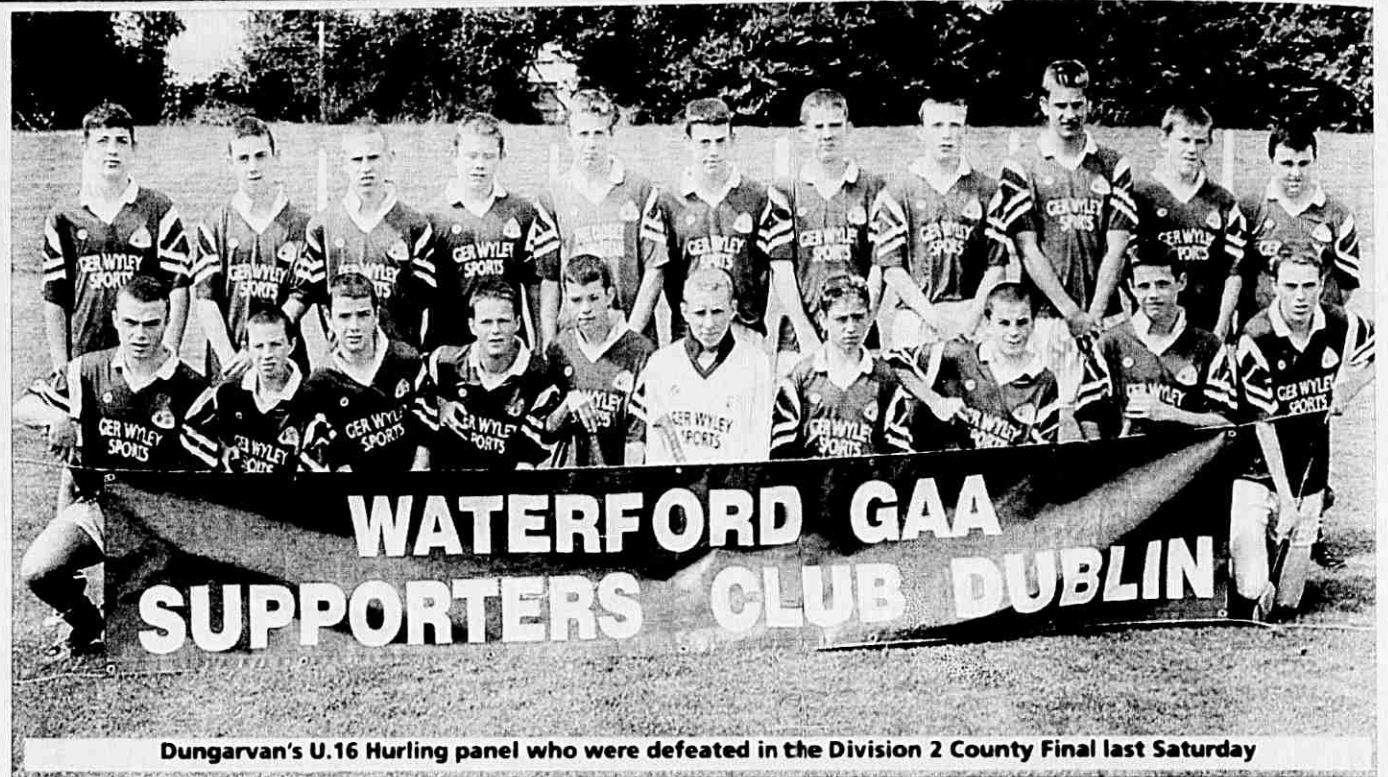

HOW TO CLAIM A HORSE

1. A claiming race is one in which a trainer may put a valuation on his horse and the weight carried by the horse is linked directly to that valuation.
2. Anybody is entitled to claim any horse that runs in a claiming race.
3. If somebody wishes to purchase a horse, the minimum price payable is the claiming price (i.e. the Trainers valuation)
4. Claiming price will appear in the race card on the day of the race.
5. Claims must be entered on a special claim form, which is available from the Registry Office at Horse Racing Ireland or the Clerk Of The Scales and lodged in the Claims box in the weigh room not later than ten minutes after the "winner allright" signal.
6. The Claim form must be placed in a sealed envelope.
7. If more than one claim is entered for the same horse the highest bidder will be deemed successful.
8. Any claim the documentation for which is incomplete or inaccurate is void.
9. When the successful claimant is announced, that person should immediately make payment in the form of a cheque for bankers draft to the Clerk Of The Course or the appointed deputy.
10. Cheques and drafts should be made payable to the Turf Club, cash is not acceptable.
11. The above is only a guide to potential owners. Detailed conditions can be seen in the Racing Calendar or obtained from the registry office.
12. Re completion of the claiming form.
 - A/ Ensure that your name and address is correct
 - B/ Ensure you fill in the amount beside the horse you wish to claim
 - C/ Ensure that you sign the Claiming form.
 - D/ Ensure that your witness signs the Claiming form.
13. In the event of the above details not been completed correctly, your claim will void.

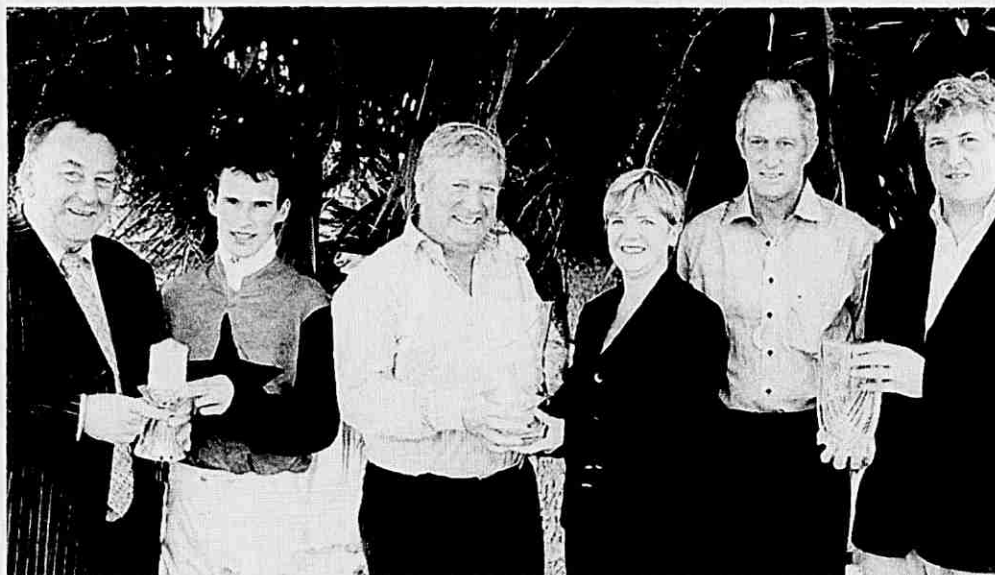
LARRY ON WINNING TEAM

Wheelchair Accessible Boat Launched In Cappoquin

PROJECT A FLAGSHIP IN IRELAND - Wilkinson

Minister of State, John Browne formally launched Ireland's first wheelchair-accessible fishing boat at Twig Bog in Cappoquin, on Friday morning last.

The Wheelyboat project, which was brought about through the efforts of the Cappoquin Salmon and Trout Anglers Association, was planned since 1998 when the fishing development plan was launched.

Earlier this year, the plans came to fruition when funding of 35,000 euros was secured and a MK11 Wheelyboat was purchased and delivered.

A 15 Hp electro start engine along with other equipment such as oars and anchors were also purchased. And the surfacing of the access road, a 120m extension to the existing slipway, wheelchair ramps, and a landscaping project that has successfully turned an area of scrubland into an attractive amenity area, has seen the three-phase project being hailed as great success.

At the launch at Twig Bog, Min-

ister Browne described the launch as a "step forward" for the provision of facilities for disabled anglers, and he hoped other associations and other areas seize on the idea.

He said facilities for the disabled is a subject close to his heart and he was delighted to launch a vessel that would allow the disabled to fish independently and to compete in fishing competitions on an equal basis as their able bodied compatriots.

He went on to laud the work and planning which went into the project and congratulated the committee of the club and Chairman, John McGrath, for following through on their vision.

WHEELYBOAT

The vessel, the Wheelyboat Mk 11, was specially designed to enable even the most severely disabled adults and children to enjoy waterborne pleasures and activities. Key to this is the boat's 3ft wide bow ramp operated by a ratchet winch.

When lowered onto the shore, the ramp provides easy access for

wheelchair users or others with mobility problems. It's a stable and spacious small craft, specifically serving the needs of disabled people afloat.

The Handicapped Anglers Trust has also actively promoted the use of the Wheelyboat, which they describe as a boon to disabled people of all ages whose lives can be enriched by the pleasures of water borne activity.

"It is hoped that the launch of the Cappoquin 'Wheelyboat' will provide a wake-up call to all involved in Irish Fisheries that they are failing the disabled community by not giving them easy access to one of Ireland's greatest assets - its rivers and lakes," they said.

FLAGSHIP PROJECT

Cappoquin based TD, Ollie Wilkinson said he was delighted that this first of its kind project was launched in the town.

"It is a very welcome development," he said. "I'm delighted that Cappoquin Salmon and Trout Anglers put their time and energy into this project."

"I think they deserve great credit for what they're doing generally along the river and particularly with this project."

"I think that this will be the flagship project for others to follow, and I'm sure we'll see more of these kinds of facilities now. The boat is delightful. I was very surprised when I saw it, and I was very surprised at the way the wheelchair people could manoeuvre it. They had no difficulty at all. It gives them great independence and that's to be welcomed."

SIGNIFICANT PROJECT

Fine Gael TD, John Deasy, who also attended the launch, said the fact that this is the first facility of its kind in the country is significant.

"It shows imagination and foresight on the committee's part that they would do something like this and go after these kinds of fund-

ing. Because it's so imaginative, it caught the attention of the people in the Department. That's what it takes sometimes."

"Occasionally you find that angling clubs do make submissions - some are successful, some aren't. In this case, it's a completely different project, and I think that's why they got the funding. For a person who's an angler and is disabled this facility will be second to none. The fact that you can go out on the water on your own, without someone who's not disabled - that's a fantastic benefit. That's what makes it great."

GREAT FACILITY

The wheelyboat will be available for disabled anglers, game and coarse fishing and pleasure boating, and it provides accommodation for two wheelchairs at a time. The CSTAA also announced a new disabled angler membership. The disabled angler associate fee will be the same as the current annual associate membership, and will give access to four miles double bank game and coarse angling.

"It's a great facility for people with disabilities to use this," Cllr. Kevin Wilkinson said, speaking after the formal launch and blessing. "And it's great for Cappoquin and West Waterford to be leading the way. It's a great achievement and it's a credit to the work that went on behind the scenes."

Cllr. Nora Flynn also lauded the achievement of the committee.

"A lot of thanks goes to the fishing club and Jeremy Nicholson and those people who backed this the whole way," she said. "That's what you need - the voluntary people to get involved and provide great backing all round. We're delighted and ever so proud with what's been achieved."

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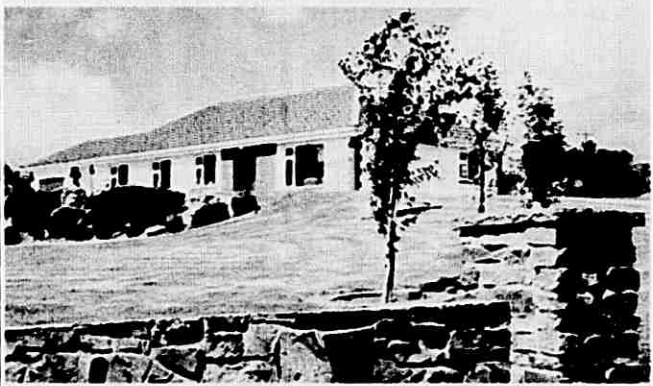

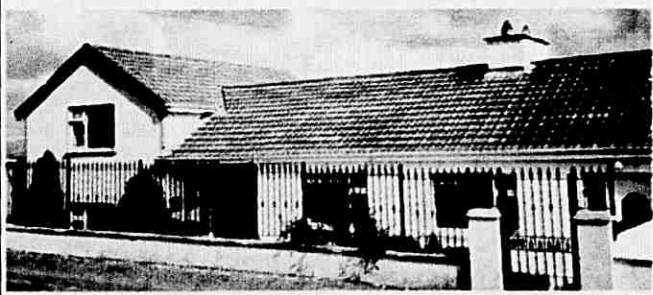

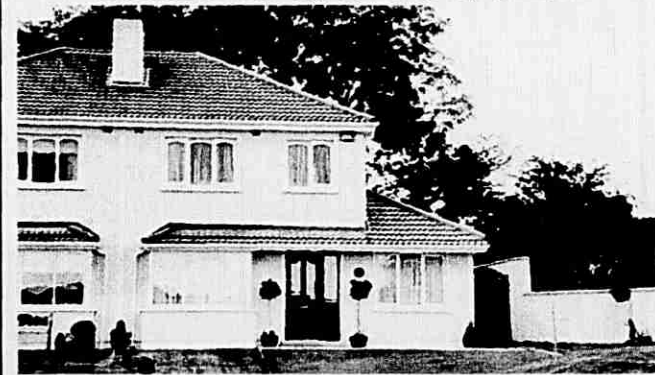
