State Owned Land In Ring Gaeltacht Remains Undeveloped

Frustration and disappointment is being caused due to the failure to develop and utilise state owned lands in the Ring Gaeltacht.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab) who has recently been elected as the Chair of the Munster Regional Committee of Udaras for the second time since winning a seat on the body, urged the state agency to publish a full plan for the utilisation of unused land at Baile na nGall in Ring.

FRUSTRATION AND DISAPPOINTMENT OVER DELAYS

"It has remained a matter of some frustration and disappointment locally that lands purchased by the state authority in Ring over 15 years ago have remained undeveloped, whilst adjoining holdings on each side

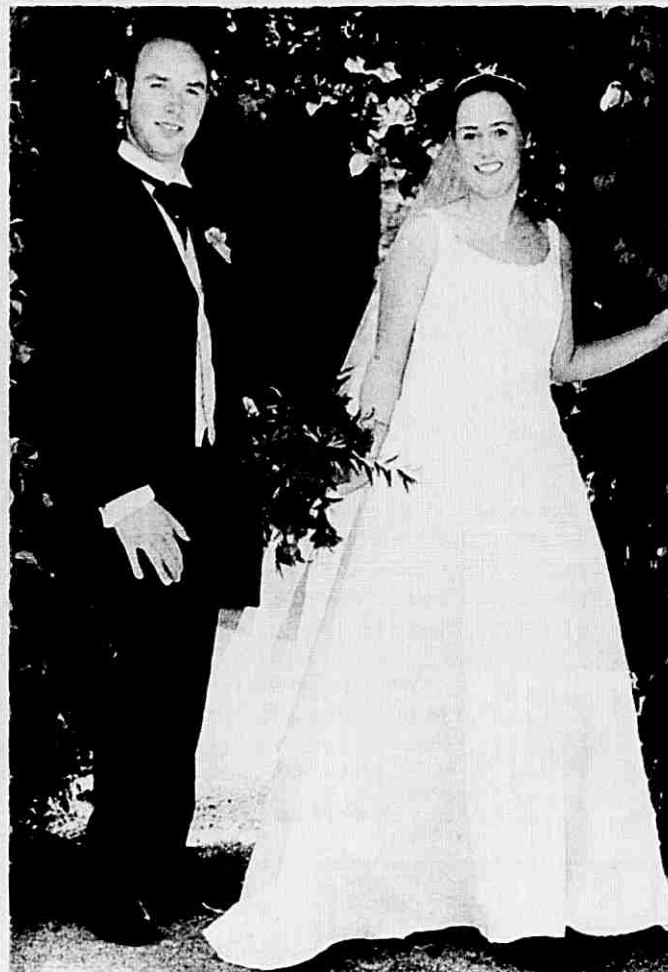
of the Dungarvan/Helvick road have been the focus of commercial and residential growth," he said.

"With as much as a 20% cut-back in Government funding normally available to the Udaras over the last two years, a previously agreed plan for a development of craft enterprise units in one portion of the land in Baile na Gall had to be stalled. Progress in respect of the two other portions on each

side of the main road between Crossaire an Fhiodora and the Ollmhargadh Spar was also subsequently held up".

Cllr. O Ceilleachair said that he now understands that the Udaras and its auditors through a planned disposal of assets throughout the Munster Gaeltacht regions expect to earn as much as 2.9 million euros in additional revenue over the next year.

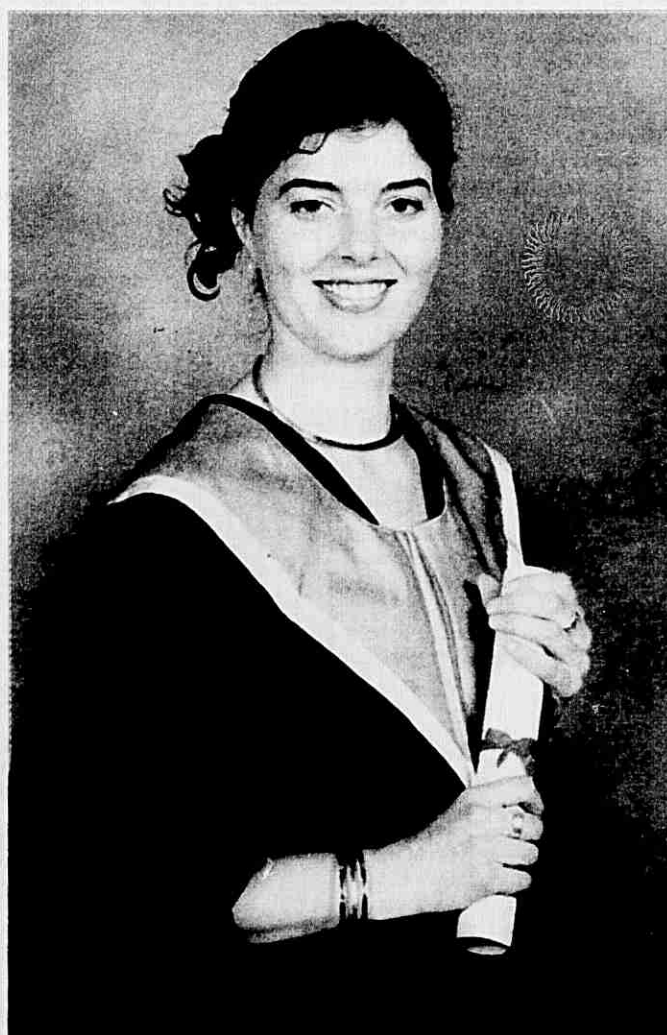

Dungarvan Family Plan €8 Million Transformation Of City Hotel

The Flynn family, who own the Park Hotel in Dungarvan and the Old Ground in Ennis are planning an 8 million euro investment to transform Cork's historic Imperial Hotel on the South Mall.

John Flynn, who acquired the hotel five years ago, said the considerable investment was a "vote of confidence in the revamped city core, with major improvements coming along on our doorstep on Oliver Plunkett Street and Patrick Street."

The hotel's new elements will include a 3 million-euro five star spa centre. The spa will include 11 treatment rooms while the addition of 36 new beds.

Copper Coast Heritage Week - Ice Fire and Water Tour

Celebrate Heritage Week this year with an "Ice, Fire and Water" tour of the Copper Coast on Sunday Sept. 5 followed by a visit to an archaeological excavation on Sunday 12th September.

John Morris of the Geological Survey of Ireland is leading the tour. The trip will demonstrate how earth forces such as volcanoes, oceans, deserts and ice sheets have combined to create the rocks which provide the physical foundation of the natural and cultural landscape of the Copper Coast Geopark, Co. Waterford.

The tour will visit four sites along the coast, starting at Killyfarrasy Strand car park at 2.30pm and finishing at Ballydwane. The trip will take about two hours and participants should come with rain gear and good walking shoes. No site is more than 700m from parking spots, though some sections will entail walking along beaches, which are not wheelchair accessible.

The following Sunday, there is an opportunity to visit the archaeological dig at Tankardstown, Bunmahon.

As part of the Copper Coast Geopark project The Department of Archaeology at University College Cork have been undertaking an archaeological dig on the site of Tankardstown Engine House complex. Tankardstown is one of the few surviving remnants of the intensive copper mining operation that took place in the area. The Cornish engine house pumped the mine to a depth of a quarter of a mile. The aims of the dig are to investigate the subsurface of the area prior to conservation work and to follow up anomalies discovered from previous geophysical investigations by Kevin Barton.

The Mining Heritage Trust as a partner with the Geopark Interreg project have organised an open visit to the dig at 2.30pm on Sunday 12th of September. Flor Hurley, Lead Archaeologist will be on site to show and explain the work undertaken. So if you have an interest in seeing what an archaeologist does this is an excellent opportunity to meet one "hands on" and learn a little about industrial archaeology and the mining history of the area.

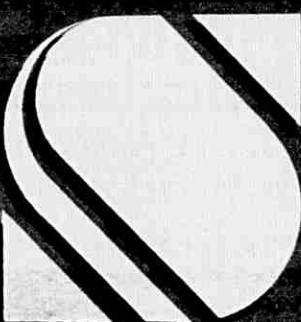
Moynihan's Honey

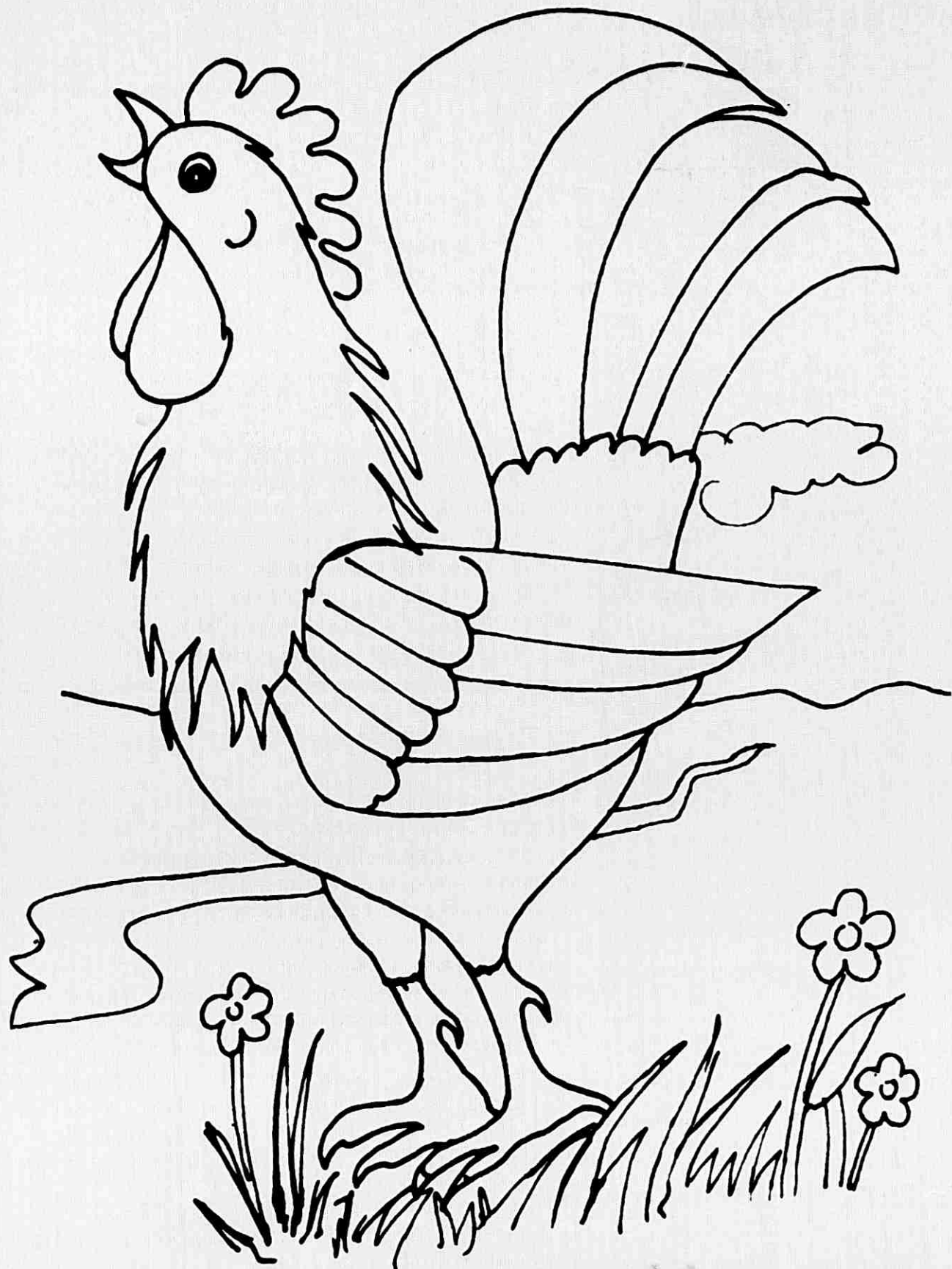

KEEPING COOL IN THE DESERT

Many desert creatures avoid the extreme heat of the desert because they are nocturnal. Rats, mice, foxes and some frogs and birds come out only at night when the air is cooler. During the day, they keep cool in burrows or hidden under rocks and stones.

A Ground Squirrel Uses Its Tail As A Sunshade



Ground squirrels live in extensive underground burrows in the deserts of North America and South Africa. Like all members of the squirrel family, the ground squirrel has a long, bushy tail.

When it goes out in the sun to search for food, the animal fluffs out its tail and holds it over its body to act as a sunshade. In fact, the name 'squirrel' comes from the two Greek words skia, meaning 'shade' and oura, mean-

ing 'tail'. Ground squirrels are very social animals, so when they meet one another they 'kiss' briefly and give a hearty flick of the tail.

Huge Ears Keep The Fennec Fox Cool

One unusual burrowing creature is the fennec fox, the smallest member of the fox family. During the day it stays in burrows, which it digs in the sand, and comes out at night to hunt for small birds, rodents and lizards. The outstanding feature



of the fennec fox is its ears which are huge compared to the rest of its body. Its ears are 10cm (4in) long whereas its body (excluding the tail) is only 41cm (16in). The ears radiate heat which helps to keep the fennec cool.

Lizards Move In And Out Of The Sun

Many reptiles, such as snakes and lizards, live in deserts. Because they are cold blooded (and cannot control their body temperature), they have to constantly move in and out of the sun, so that they don't get either too hot or too cold. A desert lizard will bask in the sun during the morning to warm up. At midday, when the sun is at its hottest, the lizard will find some shade to keep its temperature down. Towards evening, it goes out into the sun again.

DID YOU KNOW?

- About 5,000 species of animal live in the desert.
- More than half of all desert animals keep cool by living underground.
- When there is severe drought, some desert lizards do not reproduce.
- Some deserts are growing steadily larger. This is known as desertification.
- People in the deserts of Mexico often include grasshoppers in their diet.
- The burrowing owl has learnt from the creatures around it, and is one of the few birds to nest in a burrow.

An exciting new accredited in-service course for local primary entitled 'Teaching and Learning in Geography: Investigation and the Local Area' was all about helping teachers make sense of these changes. Teachers from across the county attended the course run by St. Patrick's College, Drumcondra but based at Abbeyside Na-

tional School. Each day of the course involved trips out to consider how our local area could be used in geography: The first day focused on the school grounds, which can be used to study topics like weather, water and the environment. The area around the school is also great for examining important ideas in geography like changing environments or decision-making. Teachers on the course all realised the potential of their school grounds for geography and other subjects.

The next morning was spent looking at local natural environments with a visit to Clonea Strand. By the end of the day the teachers on the course had planned great activities for all different classes based on local beaches and rivers.

The next morning was spent in town, considering the opportunities for fieldwork in a town. Again various activities were planned from examining different shops with Junior Infants to investigating traffic management with 6th class.

Ann Marie Kenna of Waterford County Council talked to the group about the EU Green School Project on Thursday. The rest of the week was spent looking at other types of activities that could be used in the primary classroom, with an emphasis on developing children's investigations and thinking skills. There was also the opportunity to look at some of the interesting research that has been carried out with primary children in geography. The week ended with a fascinating trip around the Dungarvan Shopping Centre site with Billy Clancy.

Awareness Campaign To Tackle Migraine In The Workplace Launched

It's a really busy week at work. You have 2 major project deadlines this week, an important meeting on Thursday and a presentation to give on Friday. You're thriving on adrenaline and are actually ahead of schedule. Then just as you're putting the finishing touches to the report you're working on, you lose your vision on the right hand side. You can only see half the page in front of you. Soon, zig-zag lines obscure what little you can see. As pins and needles spread from your tongue to your right cheek and then down your right arm, you start to panic. The last thing you need this week is a migraine.

A colleague asks if you are okay but the simple sentence 'I'm getting a migraine' comes out slurred and contains words that make no sense at all. After 20 minutes the vicious headache and vomiting kick in and all you want to do is lie down. Even by the next day you physically cannot go into work. So much for being ahead of schedule.

With an estimated 200,000 migraine sufferers in the Irish workforce, experiences like this are relatively common according to the Migraine Association of Ireland. The Association is highlighting the impact of migraine in the workplace as part of this year's Migraine Action Week, which begins on September 13th.

The severity of this impact is reflected in the fact that 92% of Irish sufferers say that attacks affect their performance at work, with 39% severely affected. In addition, the average sufferer loses 2 days per annum from work and the equivalent of another 4 days in reduced effectiveness due to migraine. In fact, more than 1 in 3 sufferers miss more than 5 days from work each year because of it.

"Migraine is a huge problem in workplaces all over the country," according to Peter Murphy, Chief Executive of the Association. "From a migraine sufferers point of view, their performance will suffer and in the long term, people with severe migraine often see their career progression hindered if they are not in a migraine-friendly work environment."

In fact, the unemployment rate in severe migraineurs is 2-4 times greater than average. However, the problem also seriously affects employers. Migraine is responsible for the loss of at least _ million working days each year in Ireland costing the economy millions of euro.

"Our awareness campaign aims to help both employers and employees understand migraine better. Migraine can be managed. Reducing its impact in the workplace benefits everybody," says Peter Murphy. "Increasing understanding between migraine sufferers, their employers and colleagues, combined with improved migraine management, will lead to a healthier and more productive workforce"

"Our advice is that if migraine is affecting your work, you should see your GP and explain the impact that it is having. Your GP can work with you on a treatment plan to help. People can also contact the Association to find out more about migraine and what can be done to control it."

"On the other hand, employers also need to be aware that by helping migraineurs and encouraging them to manage their condition, they will reap the benefits of increased productivity, less absenteeism and a more positive workplace environment"

The Migraine Association has produced two new publications to help raise awareness of the issue. "Managing Migraine in the Workplace - your toughest job" is aimed at helping migraineurs manage their migraine better in the workplace, while "Migraine in the Workplace - get the full picture" aims at educating employers about migraine and outlines how small and inexpensive changes within the workplace may have a dramatic impact on reducing its impact. Both guides are available free of charge by contacting the Association.

The Migraine Association will also host information days in the Prince of Wales Hotel, Athlone on Saturday September 11 at 2.00 pm and in the Holiday Inn, Letterkenny on Sunday September 19 also at 2.00pm. Places can be booked in advance by calling the Migraine Helpline at 1850 200 378 (local call rate). The seminars are supported by an educational grant from A.Menarini Pharmaceuticals.

National Evaluation Recommends Continuation Of Rural Transport Initiative

Area Development Management Ltd, who manage the Rural Transport Initiative on behalf of the Dept. Transport, commissioned an evaluation of the project over the 12 month of 2003 by Fitzpatrick Associates. The report was completed in July and has now been forwarded to the Department of Transport for consideration.

NATIONAL RESULTS AND RECOMMENDATION

In all over 305,00 passenger trips on 42,000 services were recorded by groups, with usage increasing throughout the year. 16,000 rural residents directly benefited from the services. These are significant figures given that the majority of initiatives did not commence operations until midway through the year. Associated costs per beneficiary, that is the cost of providing transport services to those rural residents that have availed of the service is estimated at €250.00 per annum or €5.00 per week.

The evaluation noted that the main impacts of the services were that they targeted those most in need, improved access to public transport by providing door-to-door services, improved access to other public services and promoted independent living, along with improving the quality of life for those more isolated residents of rural areas. The main recommendation is that the initiative should continue to be funded as a pilot project to the end of 2006. This would bring it in line with the end of the current phase of the NDP and allow

projects to experiment in developing sustainable services as well as allowing time to promote greater use of the services.

Some of the problems highlighted in the report were

- People not aware of the services
- People unwilling or unable to change their existing travel arrangements
- People not aware that services can be used by anyone
- Difficulty in attracting

young people to use the services

● Difficulty in linking with other public services SERVICES IN COUNTY WATERFORD

Waterford Rural Transport launched the first of 12 services in May 2003 and in all had 4,610 passenger journeys carried on a total of 653 services. Commenting on the report, James O'Donoghue, co-ordinator of the project said that Waterford Rural Transport is very happy with the results and are anxiously awaiting a decision from the Department on the immediate future for the initiative. Ultimately, continuation of the initiative in Co. Waterford will be determined by the number of people using the services.

While the majority of the services are extremely well supported, there are some that are not.

"We are particularly looking at the very low use of services from the Clashmore area and considering moving the service to other areas in the County that are not currently covered. We would also like to see greater use of the services by young people. In fact our Saturday services were planned with young peoples needs in mind, with the cost to students for a return journey just 2.00. However, to date the up take has been disappointing. The notable exception is our service from Aglish and Villierstown to Dungarvan on Saturday, which has from the start been extremely well supported by young people from these areas".

INTERNATIONAL CAR-FREE DAY

As part of European Mobility Week and other world-wide

initiatives, September 22 has been declared International Car-Free Day. The thrust of this initiative is to bring home to people the need to consider alternatives to the private car as our favoured mode of transport. By way of supporting the initiative and promoting use of our services, Waterford Rural Transport will operate additional services to Dungarvan on the day. COOKERY CORNER

Deliciously different Sunday leg of lamb

TRY out this deliciously different way to roast your Sunday leg of lamb.

Ingredients:
(Serves 6)
1.5kg leg of lamb
30g butter
1 tbspn olive oil
500g onions, sliced
1kg potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced
salt and black pepper
2 cloves garlic, thinly sliced
1 beef or lamb stock cube
1 cup hot water
Parsley

Method:
Heat the butter and oil in a frying pan. Add the onions and cook them gently until they are softened and just starting to colour. Place the potato slices in the bottom of a roasting pan. Spoon the onions over them. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

Make small incisions around the bone and under the skin of the leg of lamb and insert the garlic slices. Place the lamb on a rack over the potatoes and onions. Season it with plenty of salt and freshly ground pepper. Dissolve the beef or lamb stock cube in a cup of hot water and pour it over the potatoes and onions. Roast the lamb in a hot oven (220°C) for the first 20 minutes and then lower the oven temperature to moderate (180°C) and cook for another hour. The lamb may be cut into thick slices, arranged on the bed of potatoes and onions, sprinkled with chopped parsley and served in the dish it was cooked in so that you don't lose the juices. Serve with plenty of mint sauce and your choice of green vegetables.



Red pepper and almond soup

THIS delicious soup can be made in large quantities and frozen for up to three months. Serve with a lightly toasted sliced baguette.

Ingredients:
(Serves 8)
6 red peppers, quartered, cored and deseeded
90ml olive oil
2 onions, peeled and chopped
Orange rind, finely grated
100g ground almonds
1 litre of vegetable stock
salt and pepper
1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed
200ml crème fraîche
Toasted flaked almonds
basil leaves, freshly chopped

Method:
Place the peppers on a foil-lined grill rack, skin-side up, and grill for 15 minutes or until charred. Pop them into a plastic bag

and leave to cool for 10 minutes, then peel off the skins. Heat the olive oil in a saucepan. Add the onions, orange rind and almonds, then stir gently for about 5 minutes until the onions are soft and the almonds are beginning to colour. Add the peppers and stock, then cook the soup gently for 5 minutes. Leave to cool, then blend until smooth. Season to taste. To freeze, transfer the soup to a freezerproof container, leaving at least 1cm space at the rim. To thaw, transfer to the fridge 24 hours before serving. Mix together the garlic, crème fraîche and seasoning. Reheat the soup, then scatter with almonds and basil.

Hot breakfast at any time of day

MAKE sure all the components of the all-day breakfast are ready to be served together on a hot plate, accompanied by freshly-made toast, a glass of fruit juice and a cup of tea or coffee.

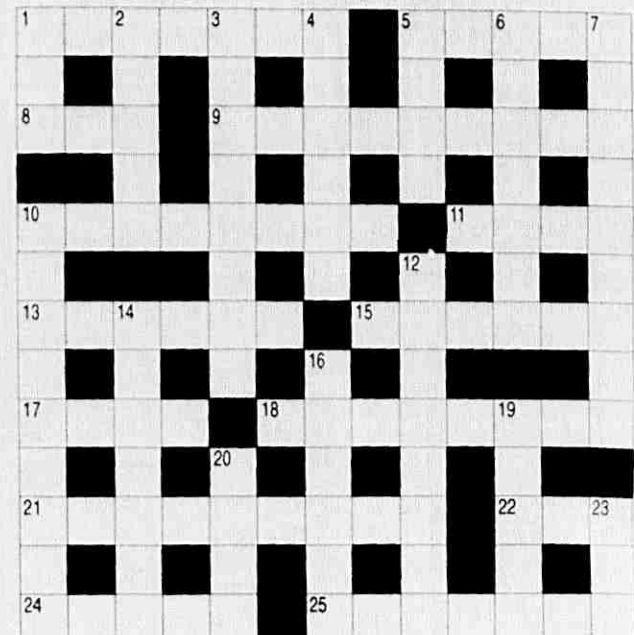
Ingredients:
(Serves 4)
8 sausages
8 rashers of bacon
4 eggs
4 medium tomatoes
12 small mushrooms, wiped
A little oil

Method:
Grill the sausages on a grill pan under a medium preheated grill or in a preheated oven at 200°C/400°F/gas mark 6 for 15-20 minutes, turning occasionally. Ten minutes before the end of cooking the sausages add the bacon, tomatoes

and mushrooms that have been brushed with a little oil. Turn frequently. Put a frying pan of hot, slightly salty water on to simmer over a gentle heat. Break an egg into a cup and carefully slide it into the water. Repeat this with the other three eggs. Gently poach the eggs for 2-3 minutes. Carefully, using a slotted spoon, lift out the eggs and allow to drain on crumpled up kitchen paper. Keep hot. Place the sausages, bacon, tomatoes, mushroom and egg on to hot plates. Serve with mustard, tomato ketchup, brown sauce or Worcestershire sauce. Garnish with a sprig of parsley. If using vegetarian alternatives to sausages and bacon, follow pack instructions.

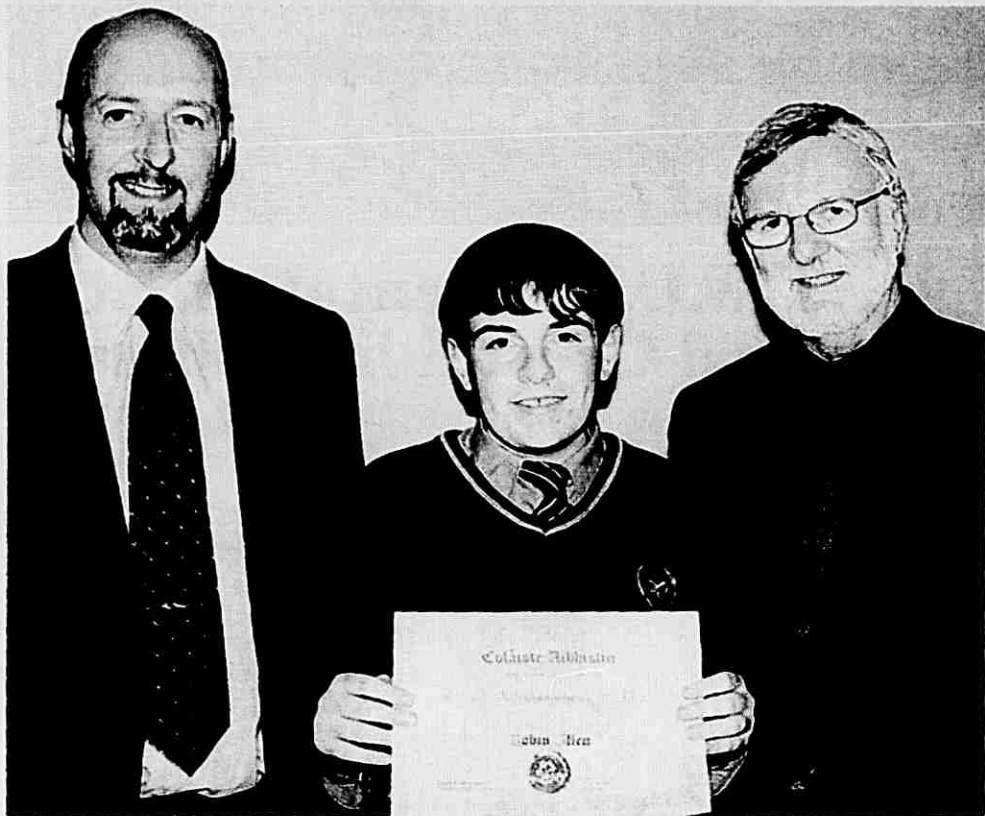



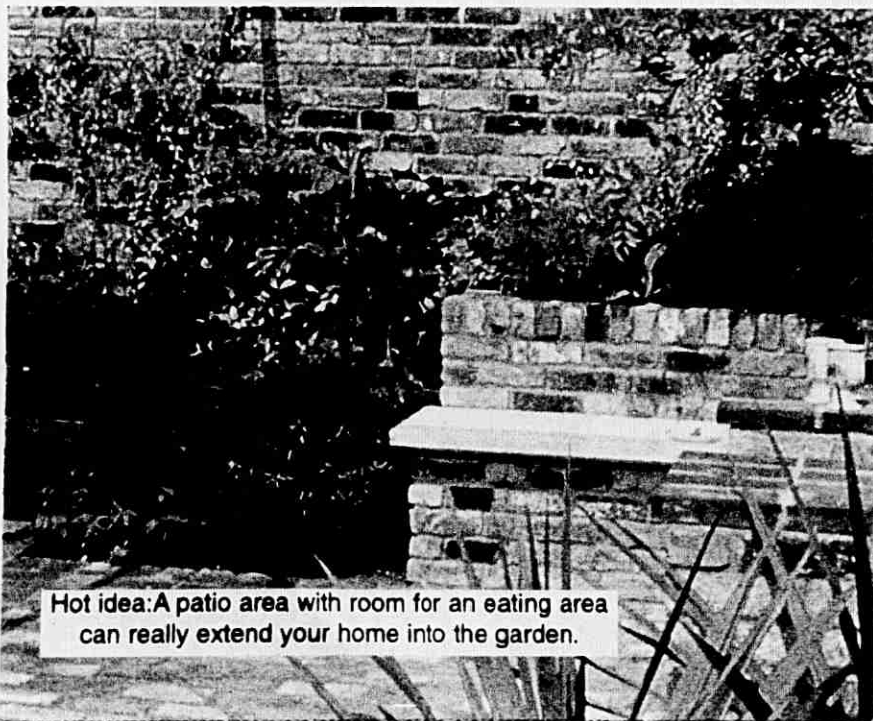

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Patios make life more relaxing

WHEN it comes to paving your way to a perfect garden – you can't beat building a patio. All through the summer it can act as an extension to your home, an outdoor living room that can be beautifully furnished and decorated with planters and pots. It is an ideal site for holding a barbecue, basking in the sun or relaxing over a cool drink during the long, hot evening. And in the depths of winter a patio can still be extremely valuable; it's an area of garden you can use even when the lawn is too waterlogged to walk on.



Hot idea: A patio area with room for an eating area can really extend your home into the garden.

Patio is the Spanish name for courtyard and originally referred to open, paved areas at the centre of Mediterranean villas. The modern version can be found in the gardens of more and more homes as al fresco living becomes more attractive and now is the perfect time to start planning yours for next year. Building a patio is relatively simple although it can take time and involve hard work moving and levelling slabs. But the end result is worth all the effort, opening up a whole new aspect of outdoor life. The site should be chosen carefully, and you should start looking now for where you would like it situated – do you want to make the most of the summer sun, or would you like a little shade? The area immediately outside your house is an obvious location, but if the house is surrounded by shade you may need to look elsewhere. Privacy and seclusion are also important since you ideally want to create an intimate atmosphere where you can relax in peace without being overlooked. While a fence may do the trick, it is also possible to be more creative – using trellising and arches to provide a shield that can be softened and coloured by climbing plants. A built-in barbecue makes the ideal finishing touch and has the advantage that it is always in position, ready to use on the spur of the moment when you decide the weather is right to invite the friends round and cook al fresco. But providing you have the storage space a portable barbecue can be just as good, with the added advantage that it can be moved around – so it doesn't occupy the sunniest spot or send smoke wafting through your guests.

This Week In The Garden

Prune rambler roses
Most rambler roses will have finished flowering and may be pruned. If they have made a lot of new growth, much of it from near ground level, you can cut out all the canes that have flowered. But if there is not much young wood you will have to keep the best of the old and simply remove that which is obviously worn out or diseased. If you have to do this you must be careful to cut back all faded flower trusses. Weeping standard roses are pruned at the same time and in a similar manner. After pruning, train long shoots round the umbrella-shaped training frames, which should be securely fastened to the stakes supporting the plants.

Lift main crop carrots
Lift the main crop carrots sown in April. If they are left in the ground any longer the roots might begin to crack. Dig them up carefully with a fork, cut off the tops and store the roots in a heap in the shed or cellar, or other frost-proof place. They will keep better and be less likely to shrivel if they are covered with sand or a dry peat substitute.

Lift main crop beetroot
The main crop of long beetroot sown in May should be lifted and stored at about this time. Twist off the tops without injuring the skin of the beetroot in any way and store them in a cool shed.

Prune loganberries
By now loganberries will have finished fruiting and they should be pruned as soon as possible. Cut out to the base of the plant all canes that have borne fruit and train the young canes to the wires in their place.

Continue to pick apples and pears
Keep a close eye on apples and pears and continue to pick them as soon as they are ripe. With certain varieties of pear, such as Beurre Hardy, it is even advisable to pick a little before they are ripe and to complete the ripening process in a dry, fairly warm shed or room.

After a pretty hectic year of activities - both indoor and outdoor, competitions, exhibitions and outings, autumn is fast approaching and the 2004/2005 season will get off to a lively start at the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Tuesday evening September 7th at 8.00 p.m. sharp. New members are always welcome, whether beginners or advanced. Internal competition same night will be for enprints in colour or monochrome depicting 'Darkness without Flash'. The usual quarterly competition for 10x8 or 8x12 enlargements in colour or mono same night must depict - 'Smell!!!' Generous prizes for the latter especially.

The club now has quite a few members who are eagerly and successfully turning out unique digital images, as could be seen at the August exhibition in An Leabharlann. Currently in

vogue is the production of panoramic views, made from as many as six separate prints, also composites or montages constructed from a variety of related images. This may well lead to an additional night per month for digital workers.

The competition season also comes in with a bang in September, with some important regional and national events drawing closer rapidly. Notable amongst these is the Mazda Annual Print and Slide of the Year Competition at which some of our members have been quite successful, with no less than four members being amongst the finalists from approx. 2,000 entries at Balbriggan last January. This is preceded by the Southern section of the Irish Photographic Federation's annual inter-club league competition, and will be hosted as usual by the SACC - Southern Association of Camera Clubs, a federation of 14 or more clubs in the Munster and S.E. area. Then there's the quarterly RTE Weather photo competition to be on the lookout for. Local members were successful in this important competition on two occasions within the last year. There are many more, which will be announced from time to time. In addition, the IPF Annual Year Book is eagerly awaited, where some members may be lucky enough to have their work published. The work of two locals was included last year.

The club's web site has now been running since early in the year and shows approximately 200 messages from individual members, including the committee, to all others - a great way of communicating, whether one is announcing an event, photographic items for

sale, technical information, or whatever.

A large selection of members' work is on display, including competition winners, records of outings, etc. This site is presently open to members only. The pictorial section may be available to the general public at some time in the future.

The future of the club is this season, in no small way, guaranteed to be more successful than ever, thanks to generous sponsorship from Murray's Pharmacy - Fuji Digital Image Service at 41 The Square, Dungarvan. A further gesture from local business will be the opportunity of extra large permanent gallery space for framed prints, which will be announced at next club meeting. Strange Activities At Tankardstown Engine House

STUDY OF SITE BY GEOPHYSICISTS AND ARCHAEOLOGISTS

Any one driving along the coast from Tramore to Dungarvan may have noticed strange activity at the ruins of the 19th century Tankardstown Engine House just outside Bunmahon. The site is the object of intense scrutiny by groups of both Geophysicists and archaeologists.

Over the next few weeks both will be completing a study of the site in preparation for the conservation of the building. Tankardstown is one of the few surviving remnants of the intensive copper mining operation that took place in the area. The Cornish engine house pumped the mine to a depth of a quarter of a mile.

The team of archaeologists led by Flor Hurley just started this week and as Flor pointed out -they have only scratched the surface yet and are still digging". In association with The Copper Coast Geopark visitors are welcome to visit and meet Flor's team at 3pm on Thursday 26 August and on 2 and 9 September. In addition on Sunday September 12th at 2:30pm there will be a final opportunity to tour the site.

So if you have an interest in seeing what an archaeologist does this is an excellent opportunity meet one "hands on" and learn little about industrial archaeology and the mining history of the area. Once the archaeologists have completed their investigation of the site, conservation of the site can start and plans developed for a viewing platform made.

The development of the viewing platform is just one of the projects planned by The Copper Coast European Geopark over the next year. The Copper Coast was awarded the title of European Geopark in 2002. The title is awarded only to areas with geological heritage to European significance and only sites of genuine quality are accepted.

The Copper Coast Geopark is one of 17 designated Geoparks in Europe and the only one in Southern Ireland. This area has for a long time been recognised as special by local people as evidenced by the work of Copper Coast Tourism whose tireless and sometimes thankless work directly led to the Geopark award. Through partnerships, established through the Geopark European Network, with Marble Arch, Fermanagh and Vulkaneifel, Germany a successful application was made to the Interreg Programme for funding to support the development of all three parks. Apart from the Tankardstown project The Copper Coast European Geopark has opened a permanent office in Bunmahon, and a geologist, Sophie Preteseille, has been appointed to undertake further research.

The Geopark is committed to continue to support the work the communities in the area have initiated to promote the natural heritage in a sustainable and responsible manner and to play an active role in the economic development of the area by raising the profile of the European significance of the heritage and the development of eco-tourism.

FROM CHARLES SMITH'S HISTORY OF WATERFORD 1746.

(Continued from last week)

The first plantation of fruit trees in this part of the country were in a great measure owing to the industry of the English, brought over and settled thereabouts by the first Earl of Cork, which is not the only lasting benefits this country enjoys by means of that truly great man. And it is said that the first Cyder made in this country was at Affane, by one Greatrakes who came over upon the settlement of Munster.

The next parish to this of Lismore is Mocollop where there is little remarkable, the whole being rough and mountainous. On the verge of this parish lies Araglin, noted for its iron-works. They are at present erecting forges for the making of bar-iron, having only hitherto carried on the manufacture of cast-iron, which will be of great advantage to this part of the country. The glin here is

very pleasant and romantic and near it are the ruins of an ancient castle that together with the iron-works, contribute to the composing such a scene.

The next parish after there is that of Tallow. The town of Tallow was erected into a Borough at the request of the first Earl of Cork; and the charter of incorporation bears date 10th James I, by which the liberties of the Borough were to extend a mile and a half round the church in every way. The first Sovereign and Recorder were nominable by the Earl of Cork and the charter enabled them to elect two Burgesses to serve in Parliaments. The jurisdiction of the Sovereign and Burgesses is gone into disuse, but the town as yet continues to return 2 members to Parliament.

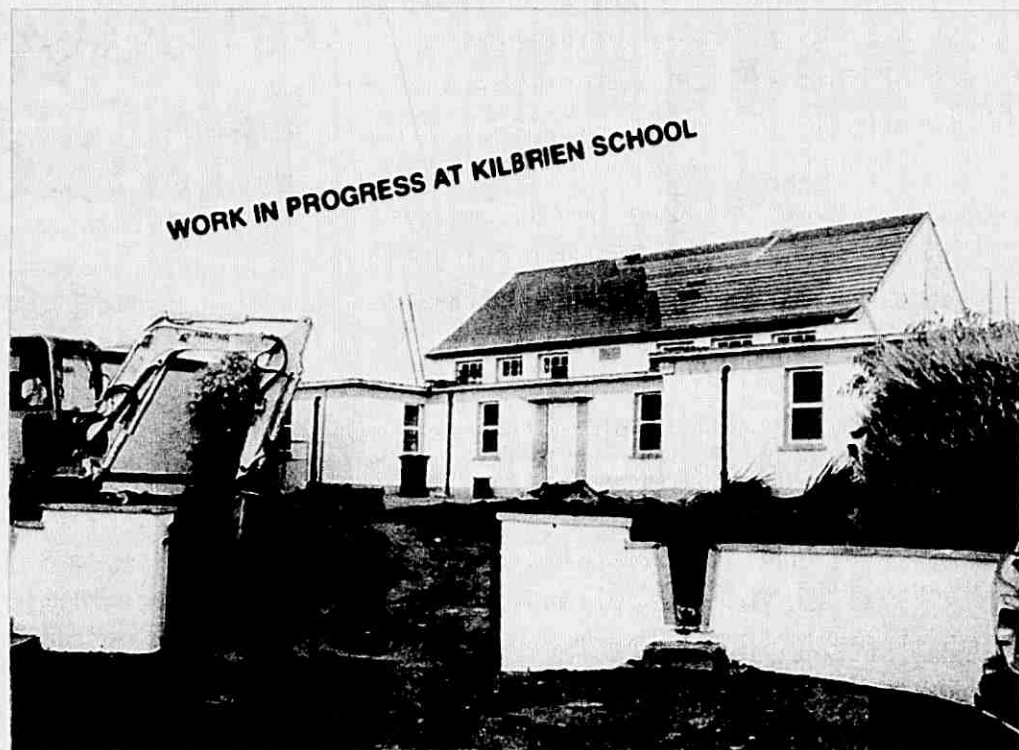

The Stormy Petrel of Gaelic Scholarship

The Rev. Dr. Richard Henebry (1863 1916)

A LECTURE BY JULIAN WALTON

"The Rev. Dr Richard Henebry (1863-1916) was one of the most colourful and controversial pioneers of the Irish revival. A native of Portlaw and a teacher at Ring College, he was UCC's first Professor of Irish and masterminded the earliest known sound recordings of traditional Irish music." He is the subject of a lecture which will be delivered by Julian Walton at Dungarvan Library on 7 September at 7.30 p.m.

This lecture is the first in the new season of lectures, which are organized by Dungarvan Museum Society. It comes on the heels of the Dr Henebry Exhibition which was featured at the Museum quite recently and created much interest. The lecture will also coincide with Heritage Week. Over the past few years the Museum lectures have generated great interest and are attended by a cross section of society. It is also rewarding to see younger people taking an interest in the lectures.

Historian, genealogist and broadcaster Julian Walton is probably one of Waterford's best known people. To most he is known as the voice behind *On this Day*, which is featured several times each day on WLRFM Radio. He has worked extensively on Church of Ireland archives in Waterford Cathedral and on the diocesan libraries of Waterford & Cork. He has spoken on a variety of historical subjects at many venues over the years. His keynote address, & talks for the Irish Genealogical Congress boasting such titles as *17th century land records: how they inter relate*, *State papers of Ireland 13 17th century*, have all been converted to Audio tape and are available for purchase. His book on *The Royal charters of Waterford*, is not the only publication that bears Julian's name; it can also be found in many historical and genealogical publications that have emerged over the years.

Julian Walton is also a very good friend to Dungarvan Museum Society; he has spoken to the Society on many occasions and has been involved in several projects over the years. When asked to speak on this occasion he was a little taken aback, perhaps the words *Enot* again, may have sprung to his mind. But Julian Walton is always a most welcome speaker and his many fans in this area eagerly await his return visits. So, make a date for Tuesday 7 September at 7.30 p.m. at Dungarvan Library, and as always, all are welcome.

Village May Be Doubled With New Housing Development

Developer, Andy Hally has submitted further information about his plans to construct 94 new houses on a site adjacent to Aghish.

The development would more than double the size of the village, and objectors claim the development would swamp the existing population and would be too large for the water and sewerage services.

The village, which is currently home to about 75 houses, would see ninety-six houses going ahead if permission is granted - the largest single type would be 68 semi-detached two storey houses.

However, three conservation groups have opposed the plans, which were first lodged last March. An Taisce, the Heritage Council, and the Southern Regional Fisheries Board have all questioned the size of the development.

Following concerns from the council's sanitary section, the developers lodged further information this month and upped

the total number of houses from 89 to 94 on the ten-acre site.

CONCERNS

In an inter-office memo from Jimmy Mansfield of Sanitary Services, a number of concerns were raised about the development, which "would have to be addressed before the council would consider granting planning permission".

These included the lack of a pre-planning discussions, and "several infrastructural difficulties to be overcome."

While the area is zoned residential in the current County Development Plan, the memo adds, the draft County Development points out that the public water supply has a limited spare capacity.

The memo says that any development over 20 houses

would entail a necessity to upgrade the public water supply and although a new sewerage scheme is proposed for the village under the Service Initiative, the parameters of the design means that this was based on a density of 4 houses per acre for zoned land.

"A development this size and density (9 per acre) will completely use up the capacity of the plant and will deprive the balance of the zoned land of sewerage service," the memo says.

"The sanitary service has pointed out that the village has a modest water supply serving about 75 houses plus some commercial properties. They feel anything over 25 houses in the next five years is unsustainable."

FURTHER INFORMATION

In their further information, the architects say that it's envisaged that on granting permission that a maximum of around 15 to 20 houses will be constructed each year.

"This will be dependant on the demand for houses in the area," Damien Dillon said, "but we would not expect the demand would exceed those figures."

He said it is also intended to commence construction on the eastern end of the site and progress westwards to completion. He added that the Sanitary Services section say that construction on upgrading the sewerage system should commence in September and is expected to be completed in March 2005.

"We would not expect to have the first houses connected to the main sewers until after this date. We would propose to carry out the works to provide the new borewells when the number of new houses completed reaches such a number as would mean the existing supply is not capable of serving it."

A decision on the planning application is expected in the next few weeks.

Outer Bypass Study To Assess Northern Route

STUDY TO ASSESS IMPACT ON RARE KILLARNEY FERN

An environmental study assessing the impact of the Dungarvan Outer By-pass being located north of a rare and protected species of fern will be carried out by RPS - a group of environmental consultants.

The study, costing between 98,000 and 120,000 euros, will be funded by the National Roads Authority and will take place over a period of around 14 to 18 months, the Dungarvan Leader has learned.

It's now understood that just two options for the proposed Outer Bypass are open to selection, and if the northern route is deemed to have an adverse impact on the Killarney Ferns, the remaining 'preferred' route will be selected.

Labour Councillor, Billy Kyne confirmed that Waterford County Council, the National Roads Authority, and the Department of the Environment recently held a meeting in relation to the Environmental Study to be carried out by the environmental consultants, RPS.

Waterford County Council were represented at the meeting by County Engineer, John O'Flynn and Cllr. Kyne confirmed that the RPS has explained its position and its specification have been given in submission form to the Department of the Environment.

According to Vincent O'Connor of Waterford County Council,

the study has now been sanctioned.

"The study will assess the area where the Killarney Fern is, and the possible impacts on the fern itself of this Northern route being constructed."

"It's been agreed that the study will be carried out and on the basis of that study it will be decided whether to actually construct the northern route or whether it will have an adverse impact on the Killarney Fern," Mr. O'Connor said.

The latest study follows the controversy over the route for the Dungarvan Bypass after the discovery of the Killarney Fern in the Glendine Valley, which is one of just ten known sites for the fern in the country.

Three northern routes for the Outer Bypass were ruled out as a result of the discovery, amid fears that failing to screen them out of the process could see the project being shelved or mired in a legal dispute.

The three Northern routes may have saved up to 8 million euros due to lower building costs and were rated highest on a criteria that included impact on dwellings and landholders.

Speaking about the recent development, Cllr. Kyne said: "Clearly whichever route is picked it will have an impact on residents and householders and farmers in the area. Everybody awaits the outcome with great interest and, without doubt, some trepidation."

Dairying

Milk Protein Advice for September

- Target for September – 3.50 to 3.70%
- Protein content during September will be influenced by grass quality, grass quantity, cell count and amount of water in the milk.

Grass Quality

- Varies greatly
- Paddocks under-grazed and not topped during previous rotations should be topped after September rotation.

Grass Quantity

- Grass demand will exceed grass supply on most farms by mid September
- Supplementing with silage will have no benefit in terms of milk production and will tend to reduce milk fat and protein content.
- Supplementing with 2 kg meals per day will increase milk production while protein content will be maintained and milk fat content will be reduced.
- Other options include - reducing stocking rate, drying-off some cows.
- Applying fertilizer N after **September 10th** will have no effect on grass supply

Cell Count

- Generally increases in the autumn
- Compared to "normal" milk, "mastitis" milk can have a lower protein content (reduction of 0.05%).
- Dry off low yielding cows (less than 1.5 gallons/day)

Water in Milk

- Volumes of milk are falling
- If the same volume of rinse water is entering the tank as in May, the proportion of water in milk will be greater.
- 2 per cent added water can reduce milk protein content from 3.50% to 3.43%

Remember an increase of 0.1% in milk protein content can add 0.67 cent per litre to farm profits.

Influencing 2004 and 2005 Fertility

- Are in-calf heifers and weanling heifers on course to reach target weights at housing (1st November).
1. Heifers that calf down at target weight have a better six-week in-calf rate than lighter or heavier heifers. In many herds, 10-20% of animals can be below this target weight. Feed 2kg meal (barley or pulp) to heifers weighing less than 420 kg on Sept. 1st with good grass. (new line)
 2. Heifers that are heavier at first mating become pregnant more quickly at that mating, relative to lighter heifers. Feed 2kg meal (barley or pulp) to weanlings weighing less than 160 kg on Sept. 1st with good grass. Avoid excessive growth rates (greater than 0.75 kg/day) especially for lower mature weight dairy replacements. The overall protein content of the diet should not exceed 17% (on a DM basis).

Jobs for September

There are a number of essential jobs that should not be overlooked during the next couple of weeks.

Silage Analysis

Get your silage analysed now in order to have the results back in time to plan your winter feeding programme. Without this analysis it is difficult to decide on target finishing dates, feeding levels and the type of meals that need to be purchased.

Tetany Control

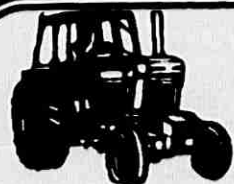
The month of September is always associated with increased cases of grass tetany. This disease kills more suckler cows than any other disease. Magnesium supplementation needs to be put in place immediately. The best options for this include home-made licks using molasses, adding Mg to the drinking water or even feeding a small amount (0.5 to 1.0 kg) of high Mg concentrate per day.

Census Sums

Three of the five extensification census dates have now passed (7th March, 30th May and 25th July). Do your sums now on how many cattle you can have on the farm for the 4th and 5th dates. After the fourth date passes it will be very difficult to reduce your average LU's for the year without a having a significant drop in numbers on the fifth date.

FARMING LEADER

Farmers Protest Against Beef Price Cuts By Meat Factories

Speaking at the cattle farmers' protest outside the Kepak meat plant in Athleague Co. Roscommon recently, the IFA Deputy President Ruaidhri Deasy warned the meat factories that there would be a major backlash by farmers against unjustified cattle price cuts. He said "under the new decoupling policy from next January, unviable prices will lead farmers to cut cattle production, which in turn will wipe out factory business."

Mr. Deasy accused Kepak Athleague of being the "leader of the pack" in driving down prices this week with their lower price quotes. "There is no justification for these price cuts. The factories have cut prices by 22c/kg (8p/lb) or 73 per head over the last 6 weeks without any reduction in market returns. Farmers cannot make a reasonable income from beef cattle at these prices."

In a stern warning to the meat factories to stop the price cuts, Mr. Deasy said "by continually cutting prices and eroding farmers' incomes, the factories are sending a clear message to farmers to cut back on beef production, which in turn will see factory business disappear."

The IFA Deputy President said "beef markets are extremely strong, particularly prices in our main export market in the UK, which will take 250,000t of Irish beef this year. UK prices are the equivalent of 3.08/kg (110p/lb) for R grade steers and 2.97/kg (106p/lb) for O grades steers. These prices are 45c/kg (16p/lb) or 150 (£117) per head above Irish prices."

"The price gap between UK and Irish cattle prices has widened dramatically over the last few weeks and has doubled compared to this time last year, as the factories cut prices to Irish farmers to increase their own margins."

Mr. Deasy said "the factories must stop the cattle price cuts, otherwise they will destabilise the UK beef market and seriously damage livestock farmers' incomes."

The IFA National Livestock Chairman John Bryan said with decoupling farmers would only produce beef at a worthwhile price over the cost of production. He said, "With farmers now deciding on their response to decoupling, the factories are very shortsighted in cutting prices against strong market trends."

Mr. Bryan said "the factories cannot justify the price cuts. The UK market is exceptionally strong. The EU beef market has a deficit of 350,000t of beef this year."

Shanahan Warns Growers Not To Sell Grain Short As Prices Are Hardening

Waterford IFA Grain Committee Chairman Bill Shanahan has warned growers with dried grain not to sell it short as prices continue to harden.

The Grain Chairman said "new crop grain supplies in the UK and Ireland are tight as worsening weather conditions has taken its toll. Physical supplies of wheat in particular are scarce and as a consequence, both barley and wheat prices have risen by 2 to 4 / tonne in the last number of days."

Mr. Shanahan said "UK ex farm spot prices rose to stg£70 / tonne (104 / tonne) as only 30% to 35% of the UK wheat harvest has been cut to date. Imported wheat landed in Belfast is trading at stg£87 / tonne (129.30 / tonne) collected ex port. Spot prices for Irish grain lifted by 2 to 4 / tonne this week, with 120 to 124 / tonne on offer for wheat and 118 to 122 / tonne on offer for barley on a collected ex store basis. In addition, there is strong demand for grain for crimping and caustic treatment from livestock feeders. A lot of grain, particularly wheat, is being traded into the North from the North East direct to livestock feeders."

The IFA man said "a number of major traders and buyers are actively talking down the price and attempting to source grain off individual dried growers at prices of 2 to 3 / tonne below the going market price."

Continuing, the IFA man said "many of the independent merchants who purchased green grain have indicated privately to growers that they will pay up to last year's price for barley this harvest but they have come under pressure from some of the larger buyers in the trade to hold back on issuing a price."

Concluding, Mr. Shanahan said "this is a very shortsighted position by some of the major players. Unless growers achieve a price that covers the cost of production and returns a margin to the business, they cannot keep going. 2004 will be a watershed year for the industry if the outcome of this harvest is negative."

SOUTHEAST ICMSA NEWS

Beef Price Cuts Not Justified

John O'Leary, the Chairperson of ICMSA's Beef and Cattle Committee, has stated that the drop in beef prices over the last few weeks is totally unjustified as prices are increasing or stable in other member states. The present situation, said Mr O'Leary, does not bode well for the future under decoupling.

"The current drop in beef prices cannot be justified. The markets for beef remain strong and there has been no downward adjustment in export refunds. In the last month, the price of steers in France has increased by 16c/kg (5.7p/lb), while the prices in England and Northern Ireland have remained stable. It should also be noted that the price in England is 37c/kg (17.0p/lb) higher than the Irish price, while the price in Northern Ireland is 15c /kg (5.3p/lb) higher. The price of cattle in Ireland has dropped by over 80 euros per head over the past month. At present prices farmers will not even retain the beef premium as income."

If reasonable margins are not there, it makes more sense not to be come involved in cattle production at all. If that were to happen, the repercussions for the Irish beef sector, including the factories, would be very serious. As the markets continue to be stable, the factories should undo the cuts in the price of beef and bring it back into line with other Member States."

Late Mrs. Madge Anderson

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mrs. Madge Anderson (nee Murphy), Cooleens Close, Clonmel which sad event occurred at her residence recently. She was a deeply religious person whose life revolved around her family. In fact it is true to say that the two main interests in her life were her family and her faith, both of which were extremely important to her and from which she derived so much satisfaction.

Her passing has left a void in the home, where she was there for her loved ones, always ready to provide a shoulder to lean on or, for that matter, to cry on whenever needed.

She was daughter of Eddie and Molly Murphy of 23 Garrymore, Clonmel, she was one of eight children, two of whom died in infancy. They were married in the late 40's, and lived initially in the Old House, No. 23 Garrymore, followed by a short time in Baron Park before taking up residence at 7 Garrymore where they reared seven children.

Settling down to looking after her family it became a labour of love with her, one of her sons recalling the appetising stews she used to make for which she was so well known, as well as her knitting for all of them. Another thing they wistfully reminisced about what for them at the time was a great treat, that of being taken occasionally to the pictures at night. She was a deeply religious person. She was involved in the Charismatic movement nigh on three decades ago, and in earlier years she was interested in the promotion of the Divine Mercy and she subsequently became a daily Mass goer. The pilgrimages to Lourdes, Knock and Fatima with the Meals on Wheels, were all such wonderful sources of satisfaction to her. Growing up in a happy household, the Anderson family, who hadn't the luxury of a car, enjoyed the frequent visits to Beechgrove on the Wood road which was as good as the seaside to them, and it was in the river there that their mother taught them how to swim.

A big blow to Madge was the death of her husband Jimmy some eleven years ago, but her close knit family were a great comfort to her as they encouraged her to continue getting out and about. She began to look forward to the card games at the local and Sunday nights with her friends in Fethard as well as the annual visits to the Gleneagles Hotel, Killarney.

MYASTHENIA GRAVIS

WHAT IS MYASTHENIA GRAVIS?

Myasthenia Gravis is a chronic disorder typified by weakness and rapid fatigue of any muscles under your voluntary control. This results from a breakdown in the normal communication between nerves and muscles. In moderate to severe cases, myasthenia gravis may cause difficulties with speech, chewing, swallowing and breathing as well as weakness of limbs. Research has shown this disability can affect people of any age, but is more common in women younger than 40 and in men older than 60.

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF MYASTHENIA GRAVIS?

The first noticeable symptoms may include difficulty speaking, difficulty swallowing, drooping eyelids, and double vision. Some people have nasal-sounding speech and weak neck muscles that give the head a tendency to fall forward or backward. These symptoms occur in about 90% of Myasthenia Gravis cases and are usually intermittent (i.e., come and go), and may disappear for weeks and then recur. Other symptoms include the following:

- Muscle weakness in arms or legs
- Fatigue brought on by repetitive motions
- Difficulty in breathing

HOW IS MYASTHENIA GRAVIS DIAGNOSED?

To someone affected by Myasthenia Gravis it means that symptoms vary according to the amount of activity undergone, the onset of infection or stress of any kind. As a result diagnosis by a GP is extremely difficult.

Blood tests can be carried out to determine serum levels of certain antibodies. Another way of testing is a neurological examination involving testing muscles and reflexes. A chest x-ray and a CT scan may be performed to detect enlarged thymus (an organ that produces cells involved in immune responses), which is common in Myasthenia Gravis.

WHAT CAUSES MYASTHENIA GRAVIS ?

Myasthenia Gravis is caused by a malfunction of the immune system, what causes this is unknown but it may have a genetic link. It may also be associated with other autoimmune diseases. Patients with family who suffer from rheumatoid arthritis, scleroderma, and lupus may have an increased risk for Myasthenia Gravis.

TREATMENT AND OUTLOOK FOR MYASTHENIA GRAVIS

Myasthenia Gravis is one of the most treatable neuromuscular disorders. The choice of treatment depends on several factors, including age, overall health, severity and rate of the disability. Some cases may go into remission and muscle weakness may disappear so that medication can be discontinued. With treatment, the outlook for most patients with Myasthenia Gravis is bright.

Top Psychiatrist To Visit Dungarvan

Dungarvan is set to play host to renowned psychiatrist, Prof. Patrick McKeon, Professor of Clinical Psychiatry, Trinity College, and Medical Director of St. Patrick's Hospital, Dublin.

Prof. McKeon, who is well known nationally and internationally for his work on the treatment of depression, will give a talk entitled Can You Beat Depression? in The Park Hotel on Tuesday, September 7th at 8 p.m. The lecture is open to the public and admission is free. It is organised by the West Waterford branch of Aware, the national depression support organisation, and coincides with Depression Awareness Week, which runs this year from Sept. 6th - 11th.

Prof. McKeon has carried out extensive research into the causes and treatments of depression and has published a number of articles and books on the subject. In 1995 he was the recipient of a Rehab People of the Year Award for his work in helping those who suffer from the illness.

Research shows that in the course of the average lifetime, there is a one in three chance of having a full-blown depressive episode, and a further 33% chance of having lesser degrees of depression.

Currently approximately 300,000 Irish people experience depression and, while treatment is readily available, only half of those who suffer seek help. In terms of defeating depression, Prof. McKeon believes that "depression, like any illness, can be overcome, but not through simply pulling oneself together."

Depression continues to be a major contributing factor in suicide. Recent figures show a 400% increase in suicide in young males, and depression is implicated in 80% of all suicides.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I think I may have overpaid tax three years ago. I heard new time limits have been introduced and wondered can I still claim a refund?

ANSWER

Yes you can.

The Finance Act 2003 provided for a new scheme to deal with claims for repayment of tax for PAYE taxpayers. Under the new scheme there is now a new general statutory right to repayment of tax. The repayment is subject to a claim being made within 4 years from the end of the period to which it relates.

There are transitional arrangements for the existing time limits for repayment the longest of which is 10 years. Under these arrangements you must make your claim for repayment for any year from 1994/95 to 1999/2000 inclusive on or before 31 December 2004.

Claims made after 31 December 2004 must be made within 4 years of the end of the tax year to which they refer. Therefore, a repayment claim for 2000/01 must be made on or before 5 April 2005 and for 2001 on or before 31 December 2005.

Further information on the time limits and on making claims for repayment of tax is available from your local tax office and from the Citizens Information Centre below.

CONTROLLING MOBILE PHONE BILLS ON HOLIDAYS

When you are travelling abroad a mobile phone is very convenient for keeping in touch with home. However, that convenience comes with a cost. Before you go on holiday do a little research and find the most cost efficient way of using your mobile phone.

1. Check first of all that your phone is roaming enabled.
2. Find out which network will be cheapest for roaming.
3. Remember that peak and off-peak call times on foreign mobile networks may differ from Irish operators - check.
4. Manually select the cheapest network to avoid roaming on an operator that charges more.
5. Text, don't talk - it's cheaper.
6. Pre-pay mobile customers pay more for roaming and may not be able to use their phone at all in some countries.
7. Best of all, keep your phone off. You're on holiday. Use your mobile only in emergencies.
8. If you really need to keep your phone on but you don't want to be charged for receiving calls, you can opt to divert all incoming calls to your voicemail.

Kosovo Families Receive Irish Heifers

On Wednesday, August 18th, Bóthar, the organisation that uses farm animals in development aid sent 67 in calf heifers to Pristina in Kosovo. The heifers from all over Ireland were gathered in Bulgaden, Co. Limerick before being flown out from Shannon airport early Thursday morning. People who visited the farm on Wednesday came from near and far to see the heifers been prepared for the journey to their new homes. Bóthar is pleased to announce that these heifers have arrived safely in Pristina and are now in quarantine waiting to be distributed to their new families.

This week Bóthar is celebrating its 13th Birthday. Established in 1991, Bóthar works with a group of partner organisations: the American HPI (Heifer Project International) and its European counterparts Heifer France, Heifer Netherlands and a UK group, Send-A-Cow. Bóthar is currently working in 19 different countries throughout Asia, Africa and Eastern Europe. There are heifer, goat, rabbit, bee, yak, camel, chicken, guinea fowl, fish and tree projects currently running in these different countries. A sheep programme is under evaluation at the moment for Eastern Europe.

This is the 10th airlift of Irish heifers to be sent to needy families in Kosovo since May

2000 to help alleviate the suffering and poverty. The conflict in the 1990's devastated the whole country and left thousands of people homeless and many children orphaned. Most of the country's livestock were stolen or killed during the unrest. Bóthar also supply A.I. straws, veterinary supplies, husbandry and fodder cultivation skills to these needy families. All recipient families are sufficiently trained in the upkeep of the animals and are capable in the provision shelter, and of hay and silage making. Each family must have these requirements in place before they can receive an animal.

One Irish dairy heifer makes such a difference to these families. Not only does the heifer provide them with nutritious milk to feed their family but it

also provides them with an income as they sell the leftover milk. This means a poor family can start rebuilding their home, farm and eventually send their children to school. As these heifers give birth, the recipient family has to 'pass on' the first born female to another needy family in the community. By this method the gift of an Irish heifer goes on and on. Eventually a community can become self sufficient. There is a huge sense of achievement and pride among these communities as they become self sufficient and their dignity begins to be restored.

Bóthar would like to thank our volunteers and all the people who donated money and heifers towards this airlift to Kosovo. We would also like to thank all the farmers who took

a day out of their busy schedules to bring the heifers to Limerick. Dozens of Kosovo families can look forward to a brighter future thanks to the efforts and kindness of the Irish people.

For anyone that would like to donate a heifer to a needy family, the next airlift will be in October. We are always looking for young goats for underprivileged families as well. Any cash donation would also be greatly appreciated to go towards our projects. There are thousands of families still awaiting assistance in many of our project countries and we need your help to provide them with a brighter future. 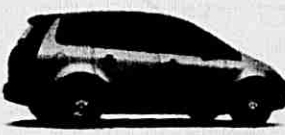

Condon, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, while the second one carries the words Bottled by W. English, Dungarvan."

One must say the roads around Abbeyside are in a deplorable condition. Strandside South is closed where pipe laying is in progress. It looks like repair work on the roads will commence during the school term which will make things awkward for parents bringing their children to school. An amount of work remains to be completed outside the entrance to St. Augustines College. All in all a very unsatisfactory situation.

OUR LOCALITY

It is interesting to note that the original plan for a bridge linking the town of Dungarvan to Abbeyside proposed building a bridge of five arches. However this plan was not accepted as it was considered too expensive an undertaking especially as elections had been held shortly beforehand. A Mr. Knowlton stated that it was more necessary to build houses in order to increase the number of voters. However Knowlton felt "that the bridge would be a great advantage to the Duke and suggests that the Duke's friends be allowed free passage but his enemies should pay a toll".

The building of the bridge remained a contentious and volatile political issue and eventually a bridge of 3 arches, the land arches each 49.6ft. span as originally proposed and the middle arch 80 feet would be sufficient for the river as mid-stream would then be about the middle of the bridge.

A Mr. Ware was hired to try and cut down on the costs of the bridge and the final plan proposed the building of the existing single arch bridge and a long Causeway connected to it. Mr. Ware states "in consequence of reducing the length of the bridge, it will be necessary to extend that of the embankment". Mr. Ware continues that there was a large Quarry in Abbeyside where he saw large stones being cut and the fact that such materials were available nearby would mean that the cost of building a causeway would not be too expensive.

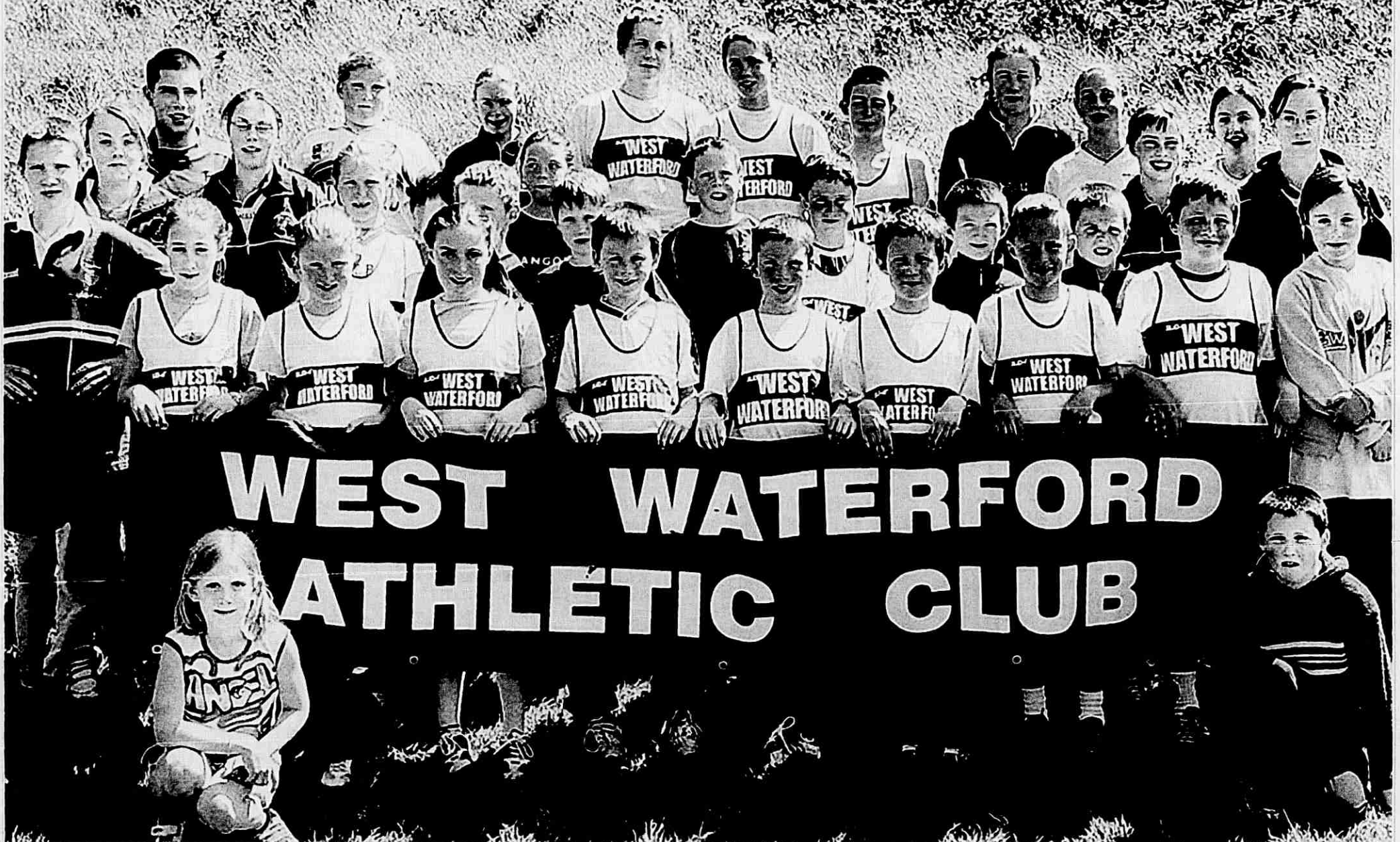

CLG TULACH AN IARAINN SPONSORED BY TALLOW AREA CREDIT UNION Tallow Club As Old As The G.A.A. Itself

Our club hurling history dates from the turn of the twentieth century but the club itself is older than this and may be as old as the GAA itself. The GAA was formed in 1884 and we know with certainty that Tallow fielded officially in competition in 1887. The gospel of hurling had not taken hold in Waterford at this time and there was no organised competition although it may have been played informally. I would welcome any information on this. In Michael Cusacks, Celtic Times Gaelic Games Newspaper dated April 25th 1887 there is an account of the football championship (there was only one grade) in Waterford. All the clubs in the county at the time are listed. Most are based in the east with Tallow and Dungarvan the only teams from the west of the county. This was April 1887 so we can assume that the club was in existence since 1886 or earlier. The club has a long tradition and distinguished history. Despite the wonderful success we have enjoyed down the years, facilities at the club grounds have not kept pace with changing times and modern requirements. To be honest our facilities are a disgrace and an embarrassment. All that will change. Already we have put in place a second pitch which will see its first game on Sat. 11 Sept., when the clubs U-12 hurlers christen it. Fencing, goal posts and ball stop nets are to be put in place. New club rooms which will incorporate two adult and two juvenile dressing rooms are to be built. The cost will be considerable but we're not so much at a cross roads but on a one way street. There is no turning back. The club needs to raise €100,000. Two committees have been put in place. One, chaired by John McDonnell will look after planning and design. Johnny Geary will chair the finance committee whose responsibility it is to raise the funding required.

It is a daunting challenge and I don't say that lightly. Friends of Tallow at home and abroad will be asked to dig deep to provide for the next generations. The buck can no longer be passed and our current committee is prepared to grasp the nettle. You will be hearing much more about this shortly so be prepared. Tallow needs you again!

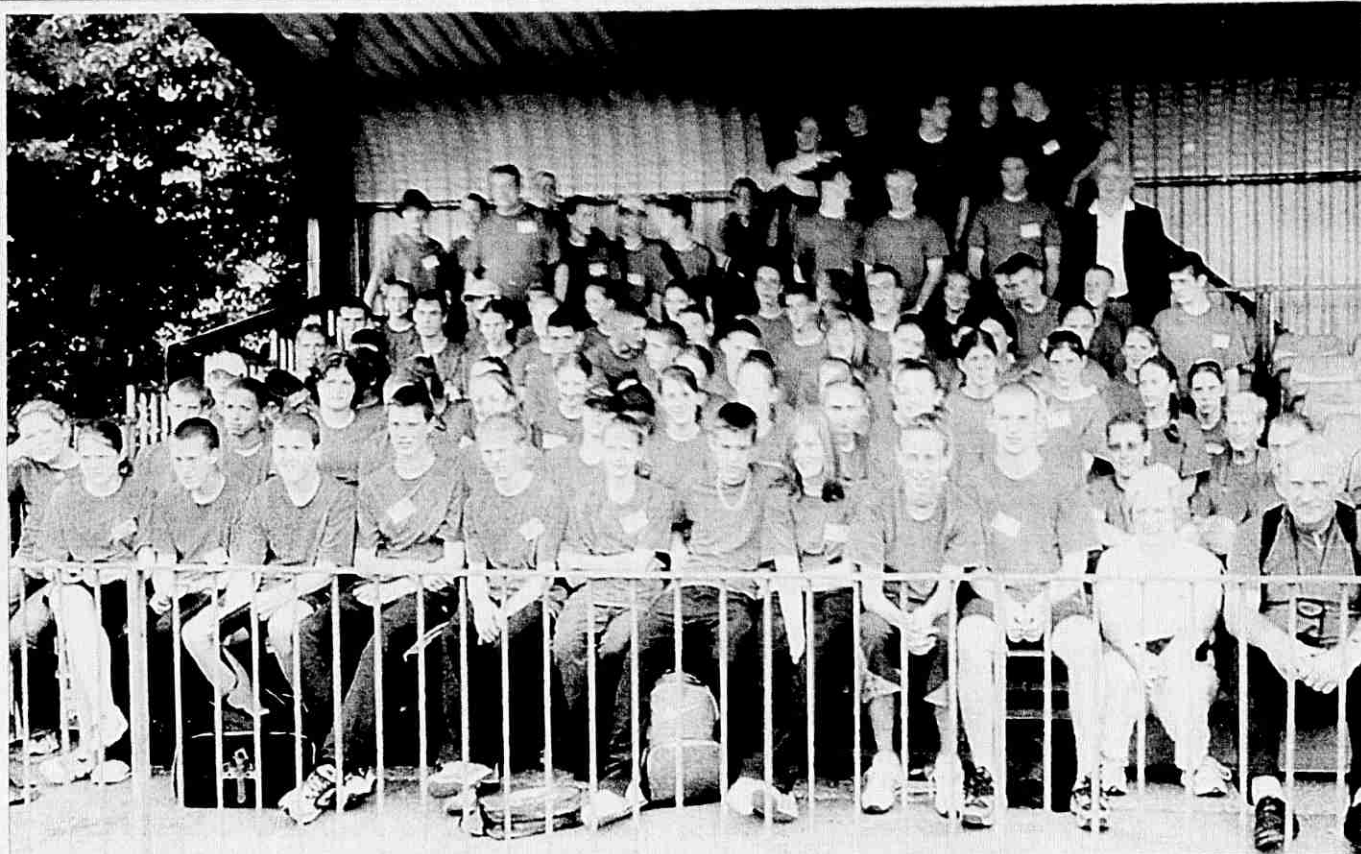

Tipperary took control of the early stages, but midway through the second half Clare stormed back into the game with a goal and successive of points. The holders of the competition Limerick will be defending their title this year. Also participating along with Waterford will be Clare and Wexford who have gladly accepted an invitation to participate following the withdrawal of Tipperary.

Usually this tournament is played in Kilmacthomas. However due to the redevelopment of the Kilmacthomas Club Grounds, the tournament has been moved to the Tallow and Ballyduff area. It is hoped that once the Kilmacthomas Club grounds are opened again the Tournament will be back to its traditional home.

Games at Tallow will begin on Saturday morning will begin at 11 am with games at Ballyduff starting half an hour later. The plate final of the competition will take place in Ballyduff at 4.15 p.m. with the competition final commencing an hour later. All going well the presentation of prizes should take place at around 6.30 p.m.

Over the years some of the finest footballers in the south-east and surrounding areas playing inter-county football today have played in this annual competition. Hopefully some of the players that will be in action in this year's tournament will go on to represent their counties in the years ahead at all levels. This competition gives players the first opportunity to play inter-county at the highest possible standard at an early stage in their inter-county careers. The place to be on Saturday if you have an interest in the development of football is Tallow and Ballyduff.

UNDER AGE ELIGIBILITY

Over the past few months I have been asked by several clubs to the rule in relation to the playing of players in under age championships. Last week looking at the local newspapers printed in Co. Tipperary I noticed that the Tipperary Bord P.R.O. Ed Donnelly had been asked about the same ruling and was asked to clarify it.

The rule in question is the one in relation to players eligible for the under 14 and 16 championships. The rule as it stands states that if a player is eligible to play under 12 hurling and football for his club this year, that player cannot play in an under 16 championship. The same rule goes on to state that if a player is eligible to play under 14 for his club he cannot play minor. If a player who is eligible to play under 12 and goes on to play under 16, then that player will be suspended for four weeks, and if the club that played the player wins the game, the win is taken off the club and awarded to the opposing team. The same applies if a player eligible to play under 14 plays in a minor game.

Some club officers and selectors are of the opinion that an under

16 player cannot play in an under 21 championship game or any other adult grade. This is not the case. A player as long as he is fifteen years of age can play in any grade from under 15 and above. However this is likely to change in the not to distant future.

BRONZE MEDALS FOR C.A.M.

The Cappoquin-Affane-Modeligo Under 13 Hurling Community Games team travelled to Mosney last weekend for the final stages of the all-Ireland community games finals. Cappoquin/Affane/Modeligo were the first Waterford team to come out of Munster in the history of this particular competition.

They travelled to Mosney on Friday last in high anticipation. In the semi final they came up against a strong side in Turloughmore from Galway in the semi finals on Saturday morning. Although defeated against the Connaught champions, the Deise and Munster Champions did themselves, the county and province proud at the north County Meath venue.

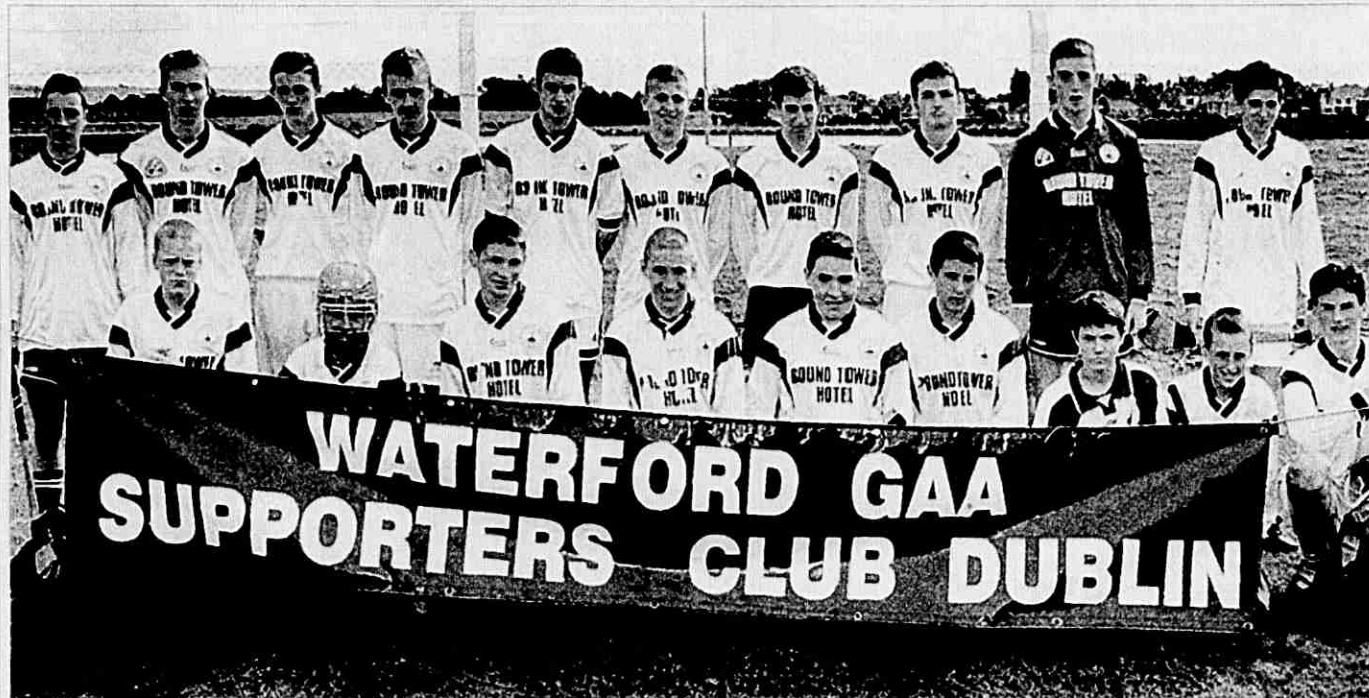

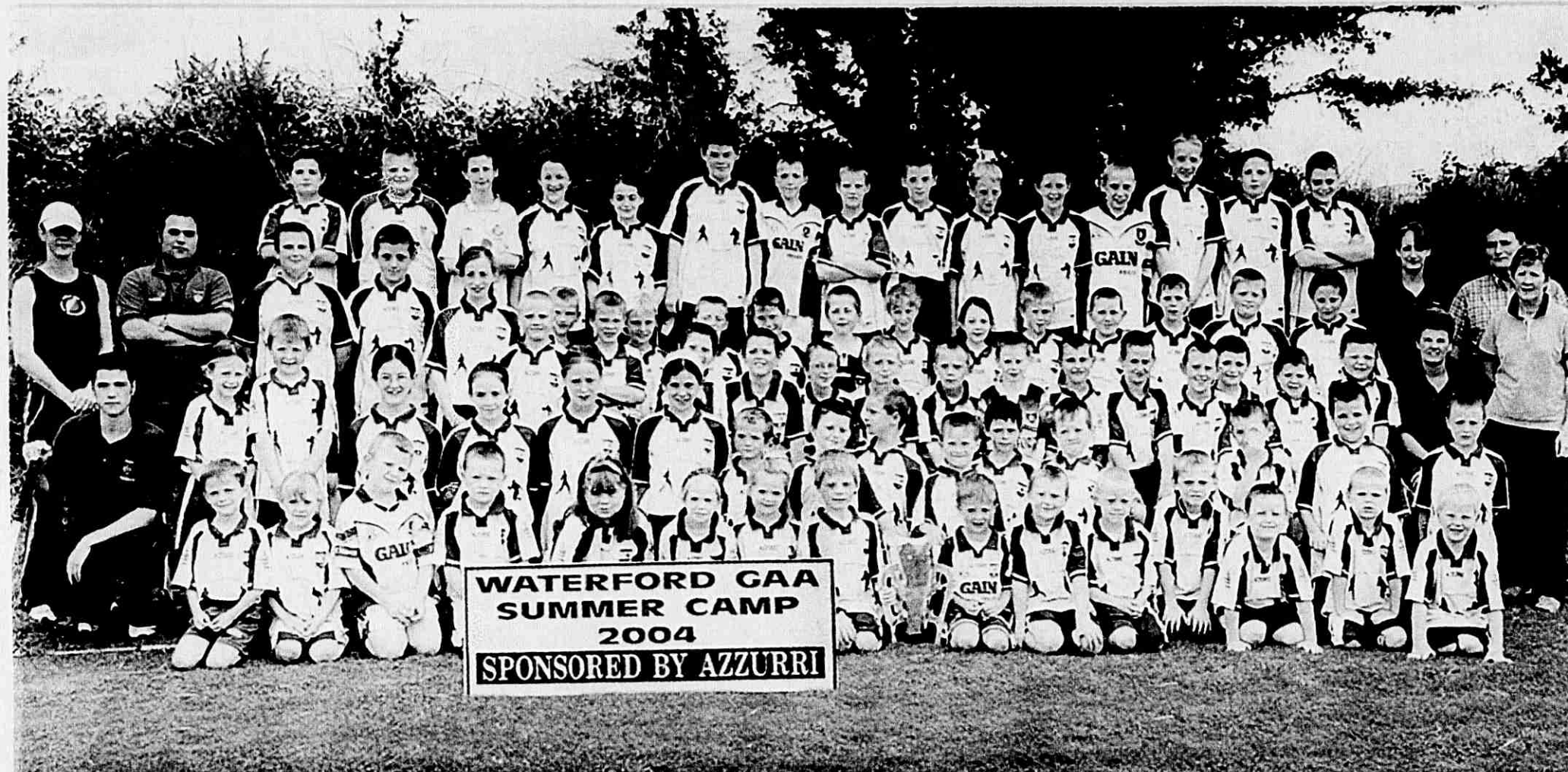

They may have gained some compensation here for their defeat by Dungarvan in the junior hurling championship.

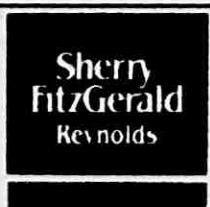

NORMA'S NIGHT

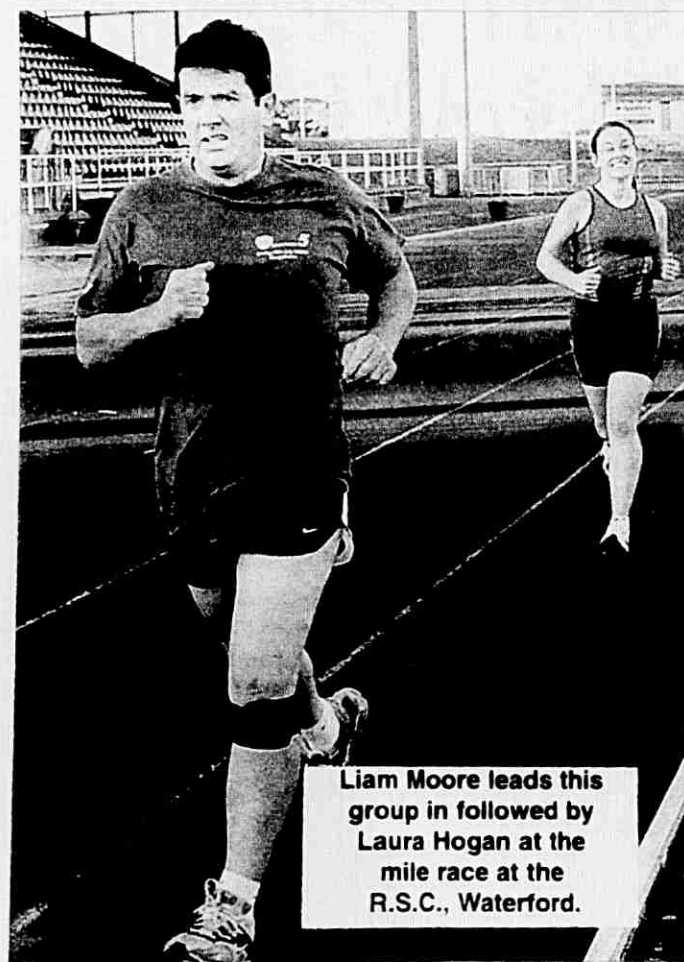

The 36 year old Korzeniowski, who was a guest of honour at our club some months back, took the title in an impressive 3.38.46 to beat Russia's world record holder Dennis Nzhgorodov, 3.42.50 into second place, with another Russian Aleksey Vogevodian, third in 3.43.34. This superb performance by Robert will in a small way give solace to Jamie Costin who as we know was to participate in this same event in Athens until his unfortunate car accident a week prior to the race. Jamie and Robert trained together for Athens and both were in the shape of their lives, as was proven with Robert's outstanding performance. For Jamie it was not to be, but hopefully there will be another day. The West Waterford man was ecstatic for his friend and mentor, who in Jamie's words "is not without doubt the undisputed greatest race walker of all time". Here, here, say all of us.

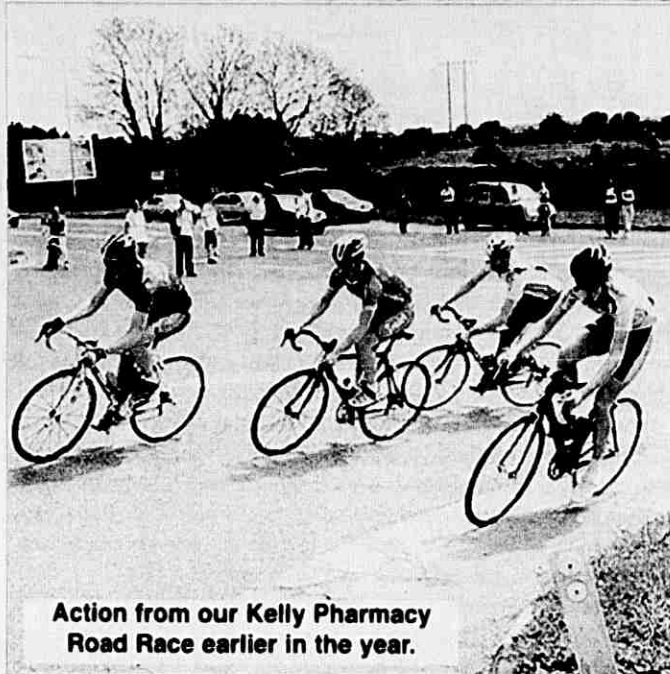
Narrow Triumph for Whyte, de Búrca & Tutty

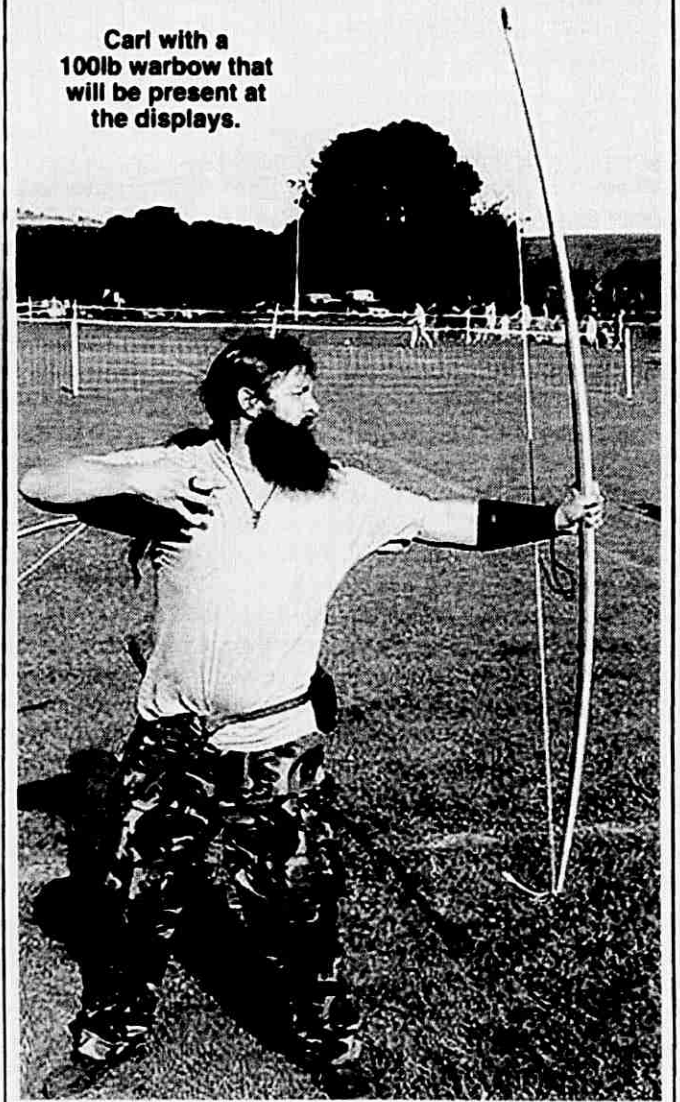

Dick Bailey Stages Rally 2004

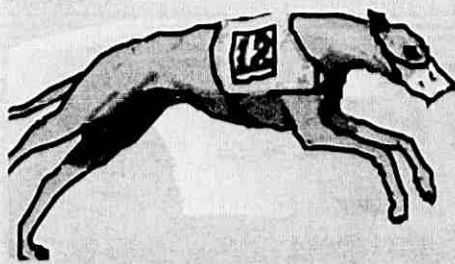
It is that time of year again when the roads of County Wexford reverberate to the sound of highly tuned, well prepared, and often cursed at by their owners, rally cars. The Crosbie Cedars Hotel, Rosslare, sponsors this event again this year. This has been a sponsorship partnership that has worked well for the last number of years, and continues this year. "The Wexford", as it is often referred to, has become one of the country's leading rallies. Its proximity to the U.K and its two-day format has made it one of the most sought after rallies for entries. This rally has come a long way since it's first running over thirty years ago.

This year's rally has a south county look to it as against last year's event, which had some of its course near to the County Carlow border. There are eight stages on the first day, Saturday 11th, with the field moving to the New Ross area of the county with a loop of stages in Newbawn, Camlin, Aughlare and Campile. This will be repeated a second time, after a service break in Ballinaboola, before returning to Parc Ferme in Rosslare.

The Sunday action brings the field into a more central county location, with a three-stage loop of Old Ross, Killegney and Galbally done twice round a service break in Ballinaboola. This is not the end of the action as the cars have one final sting in the tail, a one off stage in Tachumshine, before the short road section to Rally HQ in the Cedars Hotel. A lot will depend on how the field are placed coming in to this finale, with the possibility of it being a final stage shoot-out with the cars having no previous run to pace

them selves by.

Looking at the confirmed entries for the rally will make for interesting reading. The winner of the last six runnings of this rally, Eamonn Boland, will not be taking part this year, due to commitments on the world rally scene. However an interesting name has reappeared on the start list, none other than Stephen Murphy. The Carlow man came out of retirement this year and had a winning comeback in his local event. Whether he can come back where he left off after his five wins in this event remains to be seen. Another Carlow native that is making a welcome return to this side of the Blackstairs Mountains is Enda Nolan. Enda has been absent from the start list for nearly fourteen year. The last time that he was with us, he had RTE's Michael Lyster in the co-drivers seat, Michael having gone on to drive and have some good results in his own right. Overseas entries from regulars such as John Price, Pete Doughty and Steve Hendy and Irish entries from Noel Redmond and Donie O'Sullivan could make this in to one of the most open and unpredictable rallies of he last ten years or more. The fact that here is a minor distraction happening in Croke Park that Sunday should not stop the Wexford rally fans from turning out in their thousands. Let's hope the weather will oblige!

While she only goes to scales at 52 pounds Geneva Girl got the better of a back stretch tussle with a wide running Altesse Carlos and boxing on up the fence a determined Geneva Girl came home two and a half lengths clear of a running on Wilcox Del Piero.

Damiens Champ 1/1 was backed to the exclusion of everything else in the second novice event but disaster struck at the first bend as Ballymarket Gem moved off the first turn and cannoned into the jolly who took a crashing fall. Meanwhile the Willie O Connor owned Finest Black (Top Honcho-Desert Belle) 2/1 set sail for home and getting every yard of the trip a strong running Finest Black went on to defeat Geneva Boy in a smart 29.11. The bad news to emerge after this contest was that Damiens Champ (Fortune Mike-Bean Uasal) suffered a career ending injury but the good news from trainer Perry Aylward was that the bitch was saved for breeding.

County Kerry owners Dan O Sullivan and Michael Farrell made the long journey up from the Kingdom to see their Glenlea Mike (Slaneyside Well-Leaders Gift) contest a novice sprint and their long trek was worthwhile as Glenlea Mike landed a gamble winning out in 16.69. Trained by former Waterford hurling net minder Jimmy Power Glenlea Mike 6/4 to 4/6 was led in the first couple of strides by Bramble Joy but quickly striking the front Glenlea Mike went for home. A green running Lissvigeen Boy struck into the back of the winner off the second bend but Glenlea Mike was soon back on an even keel to gallop on for a two lengths win over Lissvigeen Boy.

Thurles owner Noel Ryan sent out the very easy winner of the fourth contest as his Rudderless Ship (Hot Cruise-Code Claw) 1/1 to 4/6 made every yard of the running to oblige in a pleasing 29.22. Exiting trap two at a fair rate of knots Rudderless Ship held the early call over Knockarue Lucy and while Paw A Penny ran on for second spot Rudderless Ship kept on in good style to triumph by two and a half lengths.

Races five to eight inclusive were three second round heats (four to qualify from each heat) of the Kelly and Dollard, Electrical unraced stake.

Impressive first round winner Staley Vegas was a warm order at 4/5 in heat one but after missing his break the jolly and Safari Ranger were both hammered all the way to the opening turn. Meanwhile up front the early paced duo of Anna Livia (Droopys Vieri-Princely Lady) 3/1 and Lough Merry 4/1 locked horns to between the final two bends where Anna Livia eased her way to the front and despite a cracking run from Lough Merry Anna Livia opened her account by a length in a brisk 29.07. The winner is owned by well-known singer Bernadette Greevy and is trained in Waterford by Paul Kiely.

The P Band owned and Nick Turner trained Great Lakes (Droopys Vieri-Cactus Sophie) came in for some late support in heat two eventually being sent off the 6/4 favourite. A rails seeking Movealong Roy (T5) displayed plenty of early dash but Great Lakes was quick to take up a position in the leaders slipstream. Cruising into a back stretch lead Great Lakes quickly went for home and staying on nicely Great Lakes breezed in four lengths clear of Movealong Roy in a smashing 28.80.

The Paula and Colette Hoban owned Stage Joey (Spiral Nikita-Alias Stage) ran out a deserving winner of heat three in a much-improved 29.11 at the rewarding starting price of 5/1. Taking over in the lead out of the second bend from a front running Pay Out Point Stage Joey could not afford to rest on his laurels in the closing stages as Pay Out Point kept up his challenge only to taste defeat at the hands of the well built Stage Joey.

There was plenty of money floating around the ring in the eight race for both Brendas Beauty 5/4 and Tiffs Choice 1/1 but the Tony Rogers owned and Peter Brady trained Yes Sheila (Pacific Mile-Pretty Michelle) spoiled the party with an impressive trap to line success in a best ever 29.08. Displaying good early dash to make the first bend from a wide running Tiffs Choice Yes Sheila 3/1 maintained a steady gallop at the head of affairs and despite a flying finish by Brendas Beauty Yes Sheila was full value for her two and a half lengths success.

Whaah cut an early dash in the tenth contest but the Joe Mythen trained Killag Stove (Larkhill Jo-Whitefort Sal) dashed into the lead at the entrance to the backstretch. Whaah maintained his challenge in second spot throughout but there was no catching Killag Stove 2/1 who landed one or two tasty wagers en route to a length win over Whaah in 29.12.

Despite taking a hefty bump at the first bend in the final race of the night the Martin Butcher owned Saltee Tee Jay (Hotshow Ben-Saltee Nel) 6/4 showed plenty of guts and determination to win out in 29.45. A win for Saltee Tee Jay looked a remote possibility at the first bend as the early paced Sara Dara scampered clear of Ballybawn Vieri. Producing a delightful dash of back stretch pace Saltee Tee Jay joined issue with Sara Dara over the final two bends and staying on well Saltee Tee Jay came home a length in front of Sara Dara. The final of the Jimmy Fermcombe sponsored Mini Market,Thurles Open sprint was a thrilling affair last Saturday night and favourite backers got their calculations spot on with victory going to the Slip Syndicate owned and Peter Cronin trained Paulo Coelho (Roanokee Ciabatta) this 4/7 hot pot battling on with great conviction to oblige in 16.16. Pushed all the way by a determined Derwent Storm Paulo Coelho held his ground and despite being clipped from behind Paulo Coelho went on to beat Derwent Storm by half a length.

Before leaving last Saturday nights sprint final I feel I should make reference to the unsatisfactory situation whereby dogs drawn in trap one in a sprint in Kilcohan Park are at a distinct disadvantage regularly coming out three and four lengths behind the field. I purposely waited until after last Saturday nights final before commenting on the situation as the dog drawn in trap one in the final Initial Kee is a specialist sprinter who nearly always traps at least with the others but certainly not three or four lengths behind the field. I realise that this fault is not just a Waterford issue whereby dogs are at a disadvantage when either drawn in traps one or six in both sprint and standard distance races. I am no expert in this field but something will have to be done in order to allow all competing greyhounds an equal chance of winning.

With owners seeking races for a surplus amount of moderate greyhounds it was disappointing that only four went to traps

for the opening 525. In a one sided contest the once raced Lady Sunderlin (Kilmessan Jet-Bid You Joy) the evens favourite took a flyer from trap three to lead all the way in a fast 29.05. Owned by Des Kelly and trained by John Sauvage Lady Sunderlin went clear early on from Uncle Dinny before accounting for Sanna Cruz by seven and a half lengths.

In the second event the Sean Carroll owned Forge Hammer (Frisby Flashing-Go Arrow Go) 5/2 produced a career best performance to score in a flying 28.87. Leading out of the first turn from Wee Phantom Forge Hammer bounded clear to run out a facile ten lengths winner over Wee Phantom.

The final quarter of race three was a messy affair. The early paced Digidyhotdog shot clear of the pack but kept wide over the final two bends. A challenging Whitechurch Jack also stayed very wide as the M.D.M. Syndicate owned Evesham Belle (Honcho Classic-Careys Whiterose) 5/1 came through to inflict a one and a quarter lengths defeat on Silken Thomas in 29.08. Brendan Murphy trains the winner in County Carlow.

The Ann Roche owned Show Domino (Hotshow Ben-Domingo Star) the evens favourite turned the fourth contest over the 550 yard trip into an August procession as he led his rivals a merry dance from trap two and going clear of Rockshire Lucy Show Domino had little difficulty in dishing out an eight lengths beating to The Other Lily in a fast 30.05.

In a 730 yard contest Property Partner and Ballyheaphy Lass the evens favourite contested the lead for a long way but the Alan and Ann Marie Fox owned Sorcha Wasfa (Powerful Flash-Powerful Troll) 6/1 finished best of all to beat Property Partner by two lengths in 41.52.

The following two races were semi finals of the Maurice Jackson sponsored Waterford Plumbing and Heating Stake.

In the first semi final the lightly raced Janann (Larkhill Jo-Janet Stays) took control of matters on the run to the first bend to lead from a wide running Fyvush Finkel and Starlight Monbeg and saving ground on the bends the Patrick Dunne owned Janann 3/1 stuck it out to the bitter end to deny a fast finishing Fyvush Finkel by a length in an ultra quick 28.81.

In the second semi final the Charles Kavanagh owned Related Rumble (Smooth Rumble-Initial Success) 2/1 went one spot faster with a hard earned but deserved 28.80 victory. Led to the second last bend by Rather Glum Related Rumble cruised into the lead on the wide outside and while Brykat Lulu was noted doing all her best work in the closing stages Related Rumble was gone beyond recall scoring by four and a half lengths.

In a tightly graded ninth race Bonds Gamble and Cooladine Tag contested the lead to the penultimate bend but showing a fine dash of back stretch pace the Claire Clark owned and Paul Kiely trained Sauze Doulx (Top Honcho-Certain Gamble) 3/1 joined issue with the leaders. Cooladine Tag still held the call on the run to the winning line but Sauze Doulx produced one final thrust on the wide outside to get up close home for a short head success over Cooladine Tag in 29.10.

With the evens favourite Zip And Seal completely mistiming his break in the tenth contest Shelmalier Champ shot into a five lengths back stretch lead over Damaged Deck but it was all change up front in the closing stages as the Gerry Kiely owned Airmount Merry (Toms The Best-Airmount Unanus) 5/1 weaved her way through the field to record a three-quarter lengths success over a fast finishing Zip And Seal in 29.00.

Honey Rose set the early pace in the eleventh race over the 550-yard trip but Stage Spark forced her wide the length of the backstretch. 5/1 outsider Hesmene Notyours (Droopys Vieri-Shes Okay) took advantage of the situation to power into the lead on the fence before driving clear for a cosy five lengths win over Stage Spark in a good 29.99. Derek Kehoe trains the winner for Jennifer Wrigglesworth.

In the final race of the night the early paced Haliska Heir appeared home and hosed cruising into a clear back stretch lead but passing the halfway mark Haliska Heir simply put on the breaks. This handed the spoils to the P Band owned and Nick Turner trained Decoy Lakes (Roanokee-Ballinaboola Lil) this 6/4 favourite proving three lengths to good for The Other Bella in 29.04.

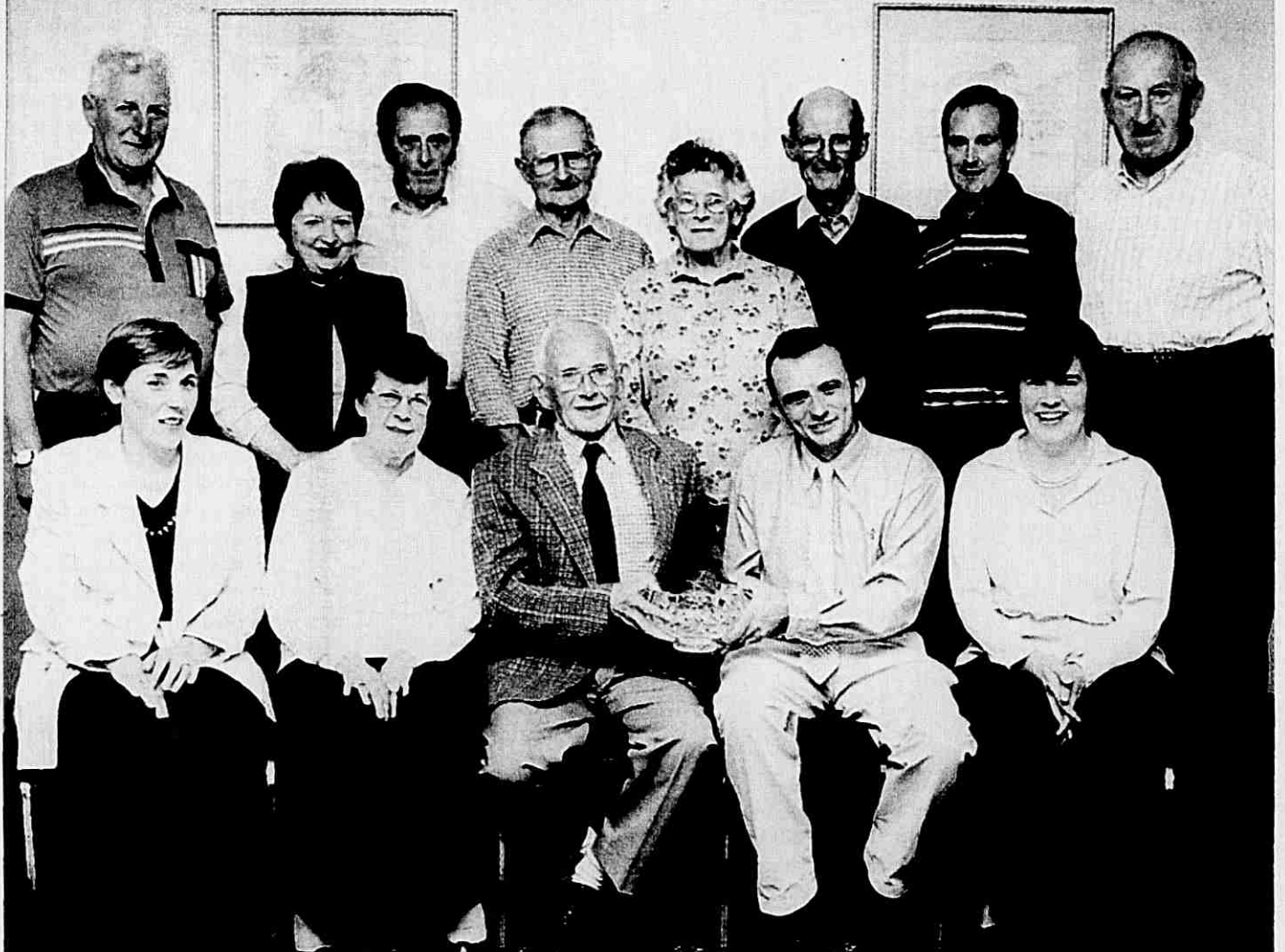

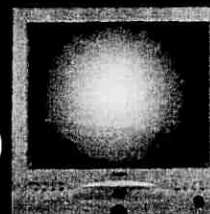


