Miracle Escape After Crane Crushes Hair Salon

STAFF AND CUSTOMERS SHAKEN BUT UNINJURED BY TERRIFYING ACCIDENT

Customers and staff at a hair salon in O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, miraculously escaped injury after a crane, working on the multi-million euro shopping centre, toppled over, crushing the roof of the single-storey building.

Two customers, the proprietor, Nicola Dee and a member of staff Annie Power were inside New Images salon when the accident happened shortly before 3.30pm. They dashed to the safety of the street and were shaken and shocked by the terrifying incident.

"Thankfully no one was injured or worse," Ms. Dee said

shortly after the incident. "That's the important thing."

"All I can think of is that we are lucky to be alive," she said.

The crane, owned by the Southern Forklift company, was lifting a slab of concrete when it lost control. The massive jib plunged down onto the roof of the small salon and gouged a hole in the roof.

Overhead ESB cables were also ripped down by the jib, leaving businesses and the surrounding estates without electricity for two hours.

Owner of the Spar supermarket, John Walsh, whose premises are across the road from the

salon, witnessed the terrifying incident.

"I first saw the jib and then it just crashed into the premises," he said. "It was the most frightening and terrifying sight of my life."

He immediately ran across the road to call the owner and customers out, but as he did, he saw all four women come running from the salon.

"It is a miracle, nothing less, that no one was killed," Mr. Walsh said.

An investigation into the accident will take place, developer of the shopping centre site, (CONTINUED ON PAGE 15)

Arts Centre Exhibitions

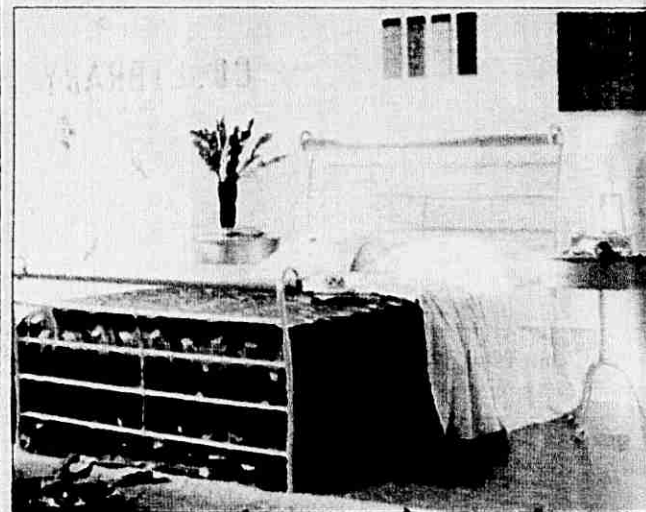

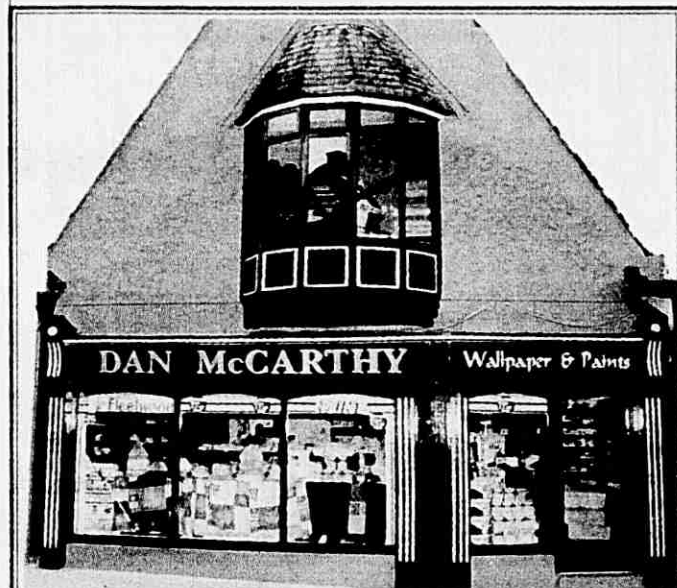

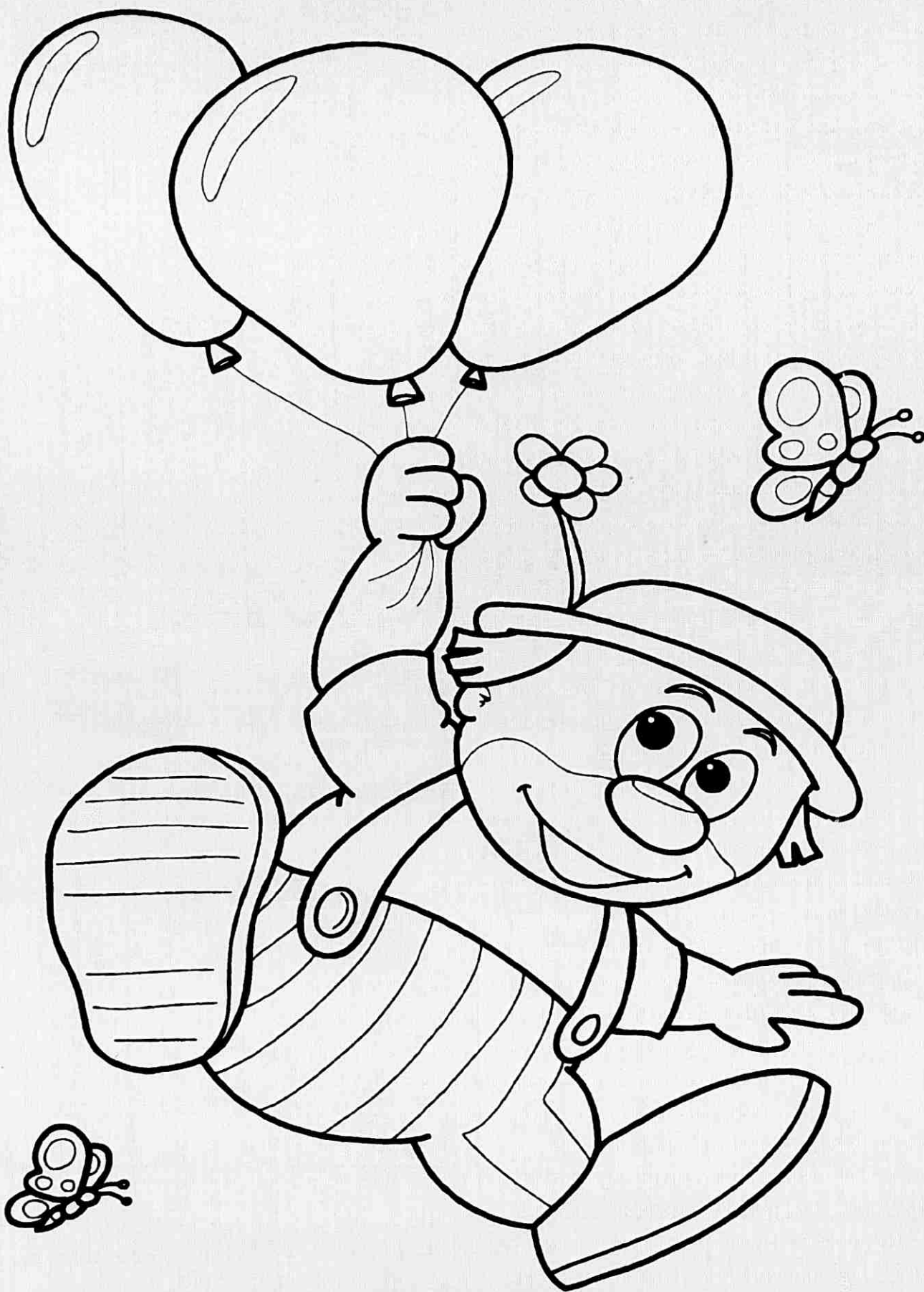

TWO TYPES OF CAMEL

The Arabian camel has just one hump and lived in Arabia and North Africa. The smaller Bactrian camel has two humps and comes from Central Asia. Arabian and Bactrian camels can interbreed. The offspring of a male Bactrian and a female Arabian are in great demand as they are especially strong animals. The offspring have only one hump.

A Camel Is Protected From Sand And Sun

A camel's head is designed to protect the animal from the sand. The eyes are almost like slits, and protected with heavy eyelids and long eyelashes that interlock to keep grains of sand out. The nostrils are also like slits, and can even be closed to keep out the sand. A camel's ears are small for such a big animal, and protected by a thick covering of hair. Sand does not bother a camel and neither does the sun. The lower parts of the legs are covered with thick skin, which helps protect them from the sun's heat, and the roughness of the sand.



Llamas Are Bad Tempered

The llama is related to the camel, but it is much smaller and does not have a hump. It does, however, have the camel's bad temper! Like the camel, the llama is used as pack animal. It has been used as a beast of burden in mountainous areas by the South American Indian people for over 1,000 years.

Camels Do Not Store Water In Their Humps

Many people think that a camel's hump contains water but that is not true. It actually contains reserves of fat, which the body uses when little food or water is available. As the reserves are used up, the hump gets smaller.

Camels can go without water for long periods. Their bodies are adapted in several ways to enable them to do this. They have very few sweat glands, so little moisture is lost through perspiration, and they do not produce very much urine. Another adaptation that helps them is their ability to close their nostrils as this prevents water loss through evaporation. Camels do, of course, still lose water, but they can lose up to a quarter of their body weight without harm. A person could not survive such great amount of dehydration. A camel's body returns to its normal shape after just ten minutes drinking.



DID YOU KNOW?

- Camels dung is so dry it can be burned as fuel almost immediately.
- Camels originated in North America about 40,000,000 years ago!
- Some ancient peoples made their living by camel trading.
- Among the Teda people of the Sahara, a young man traditionally has to prove he is fit for marriage by stealing a camel.

New County Manager Committed to Making Waterford an Attractive Place To Live and Work

At Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council, the appointment of Mr. Ray O'Dwyer as Waterford County Manager was confirmed.

The new County Manager, a native of Cork, has been a resident of County Waterford for twenty years. Mr. O'Dwyer has considerable local government expertise having previously worked with local authorities in Cork, Waterford and Tipperary, in a variety of managerial and professional posts.

Mr. O'Dwyer is enthusiastic about his new role. "The timing of my appointment could not be more opportune," he states "The election of the new Council, together with the commencement of the review of the Council's Corporate Plan provides an opportunity to put in

place a blue-print setting out how we, as a local authority, will move forward over the next five years."

He has confirmed his commitment to developing the county's economy, society and environment and making Waterford an attractive place in which to live and work. He is fulsome in his praise of the manner in which the county has developed under the stewardship of Donal Connolly and expresses particular pleasure at the achievement of Lismore, a town with which he has close links, in the National Tidy Towns competition. "This is a fine example" he states "of what can be achieved when the local authority and local community join forces. It is my intention to foster this community spirit which is also very much in evidence in other

towns and villages throughout the county."

Numbers Intending Dungarvan Move Up But Figures Still Fall Short

Sixty-two public and civil servants intend to relocate to Dungarvan to work in the Ordnance Survey of Ireland office, according to figures released by the Office of Public Works on

Friday last.

Forty-seven civil servants and fifteen public servants have applied to the Central Applications Facility to take up jobs in the OSI in the town.

The figure is an increase on

the 42 who applied during the first phase of the Flynn decentralisation implementation plan in July.

However, the figures remain worryingly short of the 199 places vacant at the OSI.

According to a spokesperson in the Office of Public Works, only 14 of the 62 who have applied currently work in the Governmental agency.

However, the outgoing Minister for Finance, Charlie McCreevy described the level of interest across the civil service as "hugely encouraging". He said over 9,000 individuals have registered with the CAF - an increase of 60% since July.

"Today's figures serve only to demonstrate that the Government was correct to proceed with such an ambitious programme. Notwithstanding consistent criticism from certain quarters, the level of interest shown in today's figures will further deepen the Government's resolve to implement this programme."

Serious Blow As Software Company Relocates To Cork

A Dungarvan-based software firm has announced that it will relocate to Cork City before the end of this year.

LET Systems, which has been

located at the former Glanbia offices since the nineties and was founded by the local entrepreneur, James Hyland, will move its operations and its 52 jobs from the town.

The company cited access to the airport, the lure of the cluster of technology firms and the availability of skilled personnel as the main factors behind the move.

Director of Communications and Enterprise with Waterford County Council, Brian White said the news is disappointing but believes Dungarvan is well placed to attract other industries.

"They found Dungarvan was the best place to set up to grow their business because Dungarvan is an excellent town to do business in. It was one of the first towns in the country to have broadband."

He added: "Dungarvan still has a good range of services. It's a great location. There's plenty of Business Parks and facilities here."

"And as everybody knows Dungarvan is undergoing a major retail shake-up. I think it is a setback in the short-term but it doesn't take away from Dungarvan's competitiveness in the long-term."

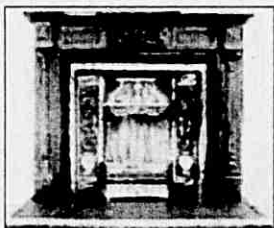

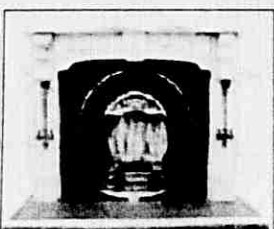

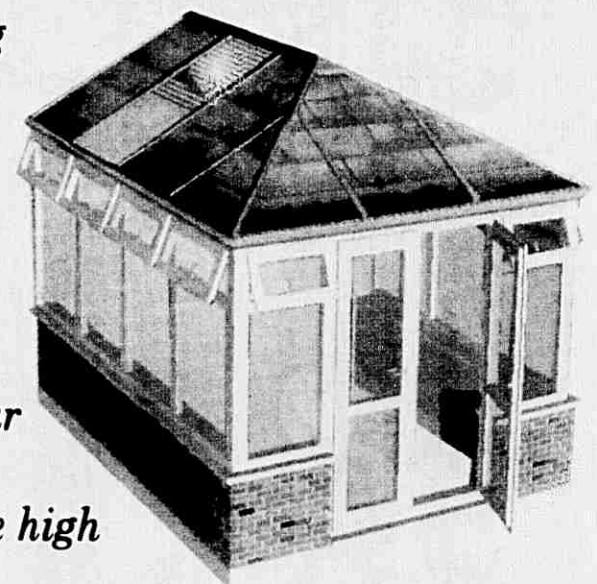

COOKERY CORNER

A taste of Thai

Want something tasty and different for dinner? Stretched for time? Here's the answer - a quick and easy recipe for Thai green curry.

Ingredients:

- (Serves 2)
- 2 chicken breasts
- Grated zest and juice of one large lime
- 150ml tinned coconut milk
- 1 dessert spoon of olive oil
- 1 green chilli, deseeded and finely chopped
- 1 dessert spoon of Thai green sauce
- 4 heaped tbsps of finely chopped fresh coriander leaves
- 4 spring onions cut lengthways into shreds

Method:

Marinate the chicken breasts in the lime juice for at least an hour.
Heat the oil in a wok. Cut the chicken into cubes and add to the wok. Stir-fry for about 4-5 minutes until golden.
Add the chopped chilli and stir for another minute. Then, add the coconut milk, fish sauce and half of the coriander and spring onions to the mixture.

Cook for another five minutes or until the chicken is cooked all the way through.
Pour the curry into a bowl and sprinkle the remainder of the coriander and spring onions on the top.
Serve with fragrant rice and plain naan bread.

Lots of crunch in this easy dessert

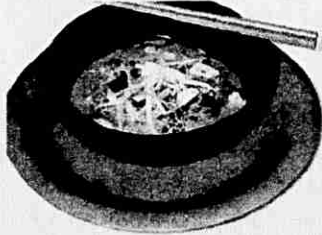
This cheesecake style dessert is not only delicious, but is also very simple to make.

Ingredients:

- (Serves 6)
- 175g of ginger biscuits
- 75g almonds, toasted
- 50g butter, melted
- 2 397g cans of condensed milk
- 568ml carton of double cream
- Grated rind and juice of 4 large lemons

Method:

Lightly brush an 18-20cm loose-bottom baking tin with margarine and line with non-stick baking parchment.
Crunch the biscuits into small, rough pieces (or alternatively put them into a food processor for about a minute).
Add the butter to the biscuits and combine until all of the



biscuit crumbs are covered. Then, press the mixture firmly into the bottom of the tin and chill for at least an hour.
While the base is chilling, pour the condensed milk into a bowl and stir in the cream. Add the lemon rind and then the lemon juice a little at a time, stirring constantly. You will notice that the mixture will thicken dramatically.
Pour this mixture over the base and put into the fridge to chill overnight.
Decorate the top with the almonds and some grated lemon and lime rind.

Tasty mushroom and pea korma

A VEGETARIAN feast - five minutes until onions are soft and golden.

Ingredients:

- Serves 4
- 3 x 15ml sp vegetable oil
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2cm square of ginger, chopped
- 3 plump cloves garlic
- 1/2 x 5ml sp turmeric
- 1/2 x 5ml sp chilli powder
- 2 x 15ml sp ground almonds
- 115ml sour cream
- 115ml water
- 350g assorted mushrooms
- 120g green peas
- 1/2 x 5ml sp salt
- 1 x 15ml sp garam masala
- 1 x chopped coriander
- 1/2 x 15ml sp chopped mint

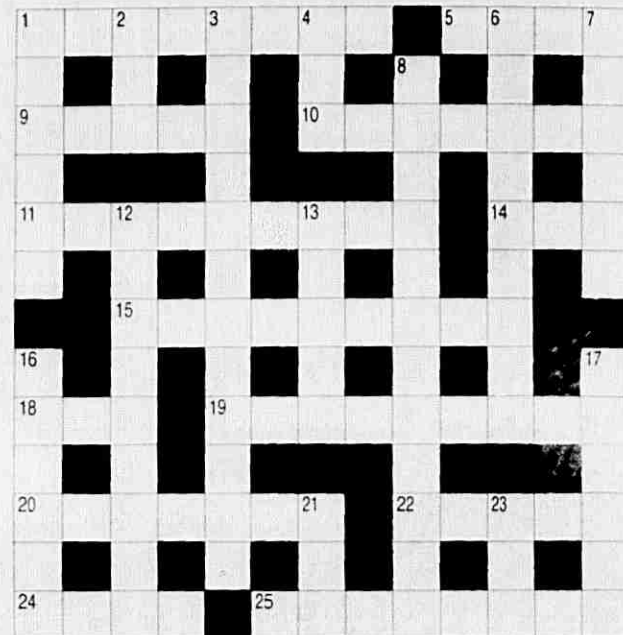
Method:

HEAT the oil in a heavy-bottomed 20-23cm pan and sauté the onion very gently over a low to medium heat for about 15 minutes, stirring to prevent sticking, and adding 15ml of water every

five minutes until onions are soft and golden. Meanwhile blend the ginger and the garlic in a food processor for 30 to 60 seconds until puréed.
Add the purée to the onions, stir in and sauté for five minutes. Add the turmeric and stir for a minute.
Add chilli powder and sauté for another minute, continuously stirring. Add almonds, sour cream and water and bring to the boil.
Turn down the heat and simmer for 2-3 minutes until the mixture thickens. Add the mushrooms and cook for five minutes before adding the peas, and then continue to simmer until they are cooked. Bring to the boil, sprinkle on the garam masala, coriander and mint, cover, turn heat down to low for a couple of minutes, then turn off the heat and keep the pan covered until ready to serve.

No Name Club Coming To Dungarvan

After a lapse of over twenty years, a branch of the No Name Club is to be set up in Dungarvan to serve the needs of young people in the fifteen plus age bracket. This comes as welcome news, not only for young people themselves, but for parents, teachers and community leaders who are aware of the great necessity for such an outlet for the energies of young people today.

The need for such an outlet for that age group has been well established in the town and this new initiative should come as good news to the mid to late teens who feel they would like to socialize regularly with other members of their age group.

Established over twenty-five years ago, the No Name Club is a voluntary organization working around the country providing an alternative to the pub culture for young people.

There was such a club in Dungarvan for a short period in the early Eighties, but now a new club is being established by an adult committee meeting since last January.

This Committee has had

training sessions with the National Group under the leadership of founder, Eddie Keher, former Hurling All Star. Young people who join the Club will learn that they can make friends, enjoy social outings and have good fun in a friendly atmosphere, without the use of alcohol. Currently, there are thirty such clubs around the country.

No Name Clubs are about the local community coming together to provide a positive alcohol-free environment where young people can meet and socialise.

The Dungarvan Club will be aimed at the Transition, Fifth and Sixth year student, or fifteen to eighteen year age group. The first task of the adult committee will be to recruit twenty to thirty young people as hosts and hostesses. With training, this group will be the Youth Committee of the Club who will decide, with the help of the adult group, what activities to plan for their age

group in Dungarvan.

In No Name Clubs around the country, thousands of young people from the senior cycle of Secondary Schools have been hosts and hostesses and have enjoyed the experience greatly. Activities range from Discos, cabarets and outings, to entry in national competitions. One difference of the club from other youth organisations is that the activities are open only to the older teenage group. This has proved very important in the past and will be a strong factor in the success of the Dungarvan experience.

The Dungarvan Adult Committee is made up of parents, teachers, Gardaí, clergy and

others involved in Community Groups. The Committee has already been in contact with the local secondary schools and over the next few weeks, they will be recruiting hosts and hostesses on whose talent and energy will rest the success of the Dungarvan initiative. Recruitment will be by application form which are available in the schools or from the Parish Office (42374) where those interested should make the initial contact.

With young people in desperate need of somewhere to go with positive activities available, there is no doubt that this new initiative is badly needed in Dungarvan and is destined to succeed.

Options Exhausted In Bid To Reinstate Knockmeal Bus Service

TD'S TO BE LOBBIED ON ISSUE

County Waterford VEC has exhausted all the options open to them in the attempt to reinstate a bus service for students who wish to travel from Knockmeal near Ballymacarbry to Clonmel to attend secondary school.

Speaking at a recent meeting of the Vocational Education Committee, Chairperson Mary Green said the issue cannot be rectified internally.

Proposing a motion asking that all the TD's in the county be written to about the matter, Cllr. Green described the Department of Education's decision to use "outdated" transport boundary catchment areas to decide on bus routes as "ridiculous." Due to the transport boundary, students in Knockmeal are in the Cappoquin/Lismore area despite the fact that those schools are 25 miles away.

"I've received numerous calls from parents of students who are every upset by this," CEO of the County VEC, Paddy Lavelle said. However, Mr. Lavelle said he has exhausted all the options open to him and it's a matter for the Department of the Environment.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Start planning a stunning border

A BORDER is a perfect place to create a showcase for your favourite plants – whether you're revitalising your existing garden or creating a new one from scratch. Almost every garden has at least one border, often running the entire length.

In most cases it is the single most important feature, and with special care and attention can give a breathtaking display, and now is the time to start planning for next year. The secret of a stunning border is good planning – and like so many other aspects of gardening, the starting point is the drawing board.

Sketch the border using accurate measurements of size and shape. Long, straight edges will create a formal, classical look – while curves will give a more relaxed, cottage style. Each plant forms part of a jigsaw and so the way they are placed together is key to whether the end result is a success. It is a good idea to place plants of a contrasting shape and texture together, so even when they are not in flower their foliage ensures the border still looks attractive. Plants should also be chosen for their flowering time, since the combined effect should be a display that lasts from late spring throughout the summer and into early autumn.

And remember that in winter most hardy perennials die back and a border can look barren and uninteresting without evergreen shrubs or winter flowering plants to give it

height and colour.

A huge variety of plants are available at garden centres and expert staff should be on hand to offer advice and tips. If you take along a sketch plan and explain the location they may even help you plan your border.

Here's a step by step guide:

1: Choose a theme and stick to it. A cottage border is ideal as it can feature a rich variety of colourful plants that can easily be added to. Some gardeners like rose borders, while a border comprising exclusively of annuals can make a spectacular display.

A good combination is a border made up of bulbs, shrubs and perennials to give a year round display.

2: Grade plants according to height. Generally the taller ones go at the back and the smallest at the front – but the occasional tall, bushy plant at the front will add extra interest.

3: Add height by growing climbers on tripods, frames or other ornamental features – such as a wooden obelisk or a statue.

4: Choose foliage as well as flowering plants. Interesting leaves last

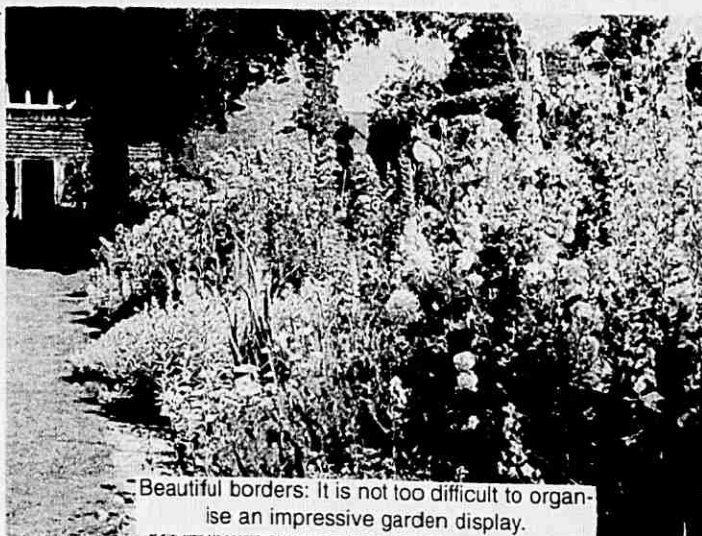
longer than flowers and make an excellent contribution to the overall display.

5: Check the plants are suited to the location. Some prefer sun, others shade – and soil type can be crucial.

Most plants prefer a bright, sunny position but if you have a shady patch, ferns, hostas and hydrangeas are ideal.

6: Stick to a colour scheme – just like decorating a room. A border requires a theme to give it an attractive and unified appearance and it is important colours complement one another.

7: Plant similar plants in a group of three or four to create a stronger effect.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Sow hardy annuals

Some of the hardy annuals can be sown outdoors now which will stand the winter and flower in May and June next year. Sow them thinly where they are to flower and cover lightly with soil. Thin the seedlings to 8 or 10 cm apart as soon as they can be handled, but leave any further thinning until March or April. Among the best varieties for sowing now are alyssum, calendula, clarkia, candytuft, cornflower, larkspur, godetia and cardinal poppies.

Sow annuals for the greenhouse

Many annuals make excellent pot plants for the cool greenhouse. If sown now they will start to flower in early spring and continue until May. Sow thinly in well drained seed trays and germinate in your unheated greenhouse or frame.

Plant anemones

Make a first planting of anemones. If these are put in successional batches, it is possible to extend the flowering season. The tubers should be planted 8 cm deep and 15 cm apart.

Pot up more freesia

Make a potting of freesia corms. If these are placed in a frame, and protected from frost with lights but no attempt is made to force them, they can be brought in to a warm greenhouse a few at a time from November onwards and will supply flowers through to early spring.

Pot on primulas and calceolarias

There may be quite a lot of potting on to be done if growth during late summer was good. Greenhouse primulas from the April sowing should be about ready for their final pots, while the June sown primulas are also likely to need potting singly into 8 cm pots of John Innes potting compost No. 1.

Pot hippeastrums

Pot specially prepared 'Christmas flowering' hippeastrums, one bulb in a 10-13 cm pot of John Innes potting compost No. 1 and put the pots in a light room or greenhouse.

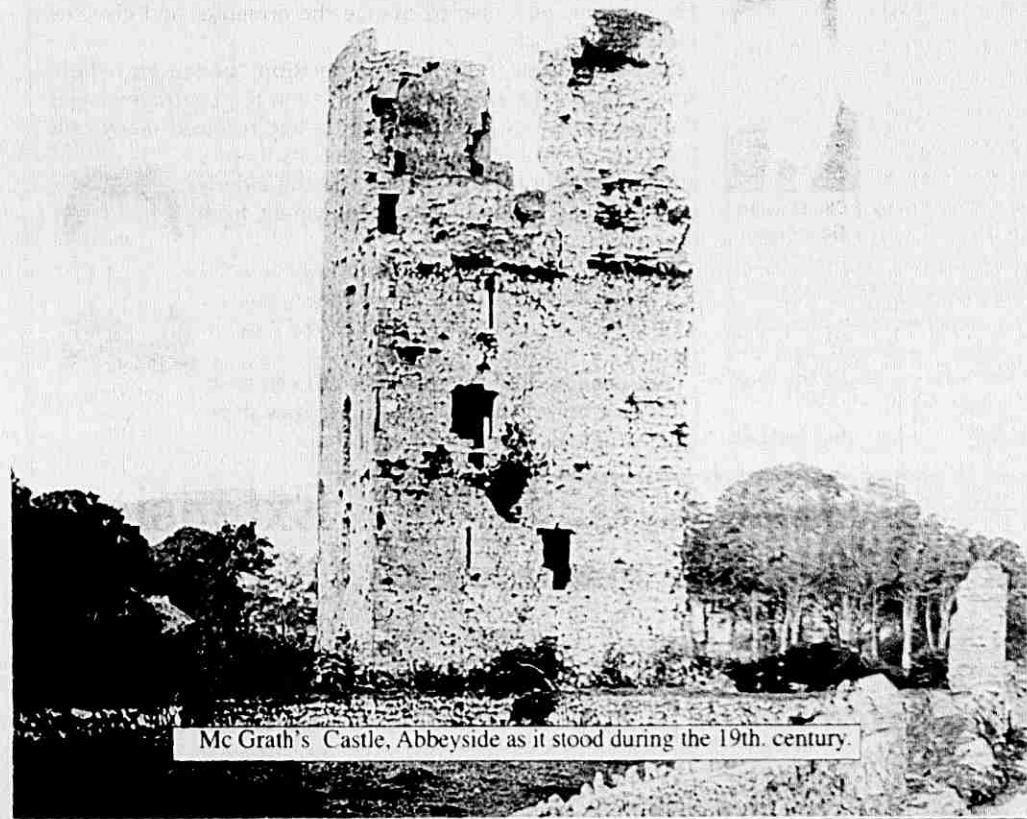

Abbeyside Topics

OUR LOCALITY

Abbeyside Castle. The Castle was built by Donal McGrath in co-operation with the O'Briens of Comeragh in the 12th century. These are the same families who donated land nearby to the Augustinian's for the building of the Abbey. McGrath's

Castle as it was called is now completely demolished, but some photographs remain as il-

ustrations of the structure in its varying stages of decay. The Castle was built as a family residence and not as a structure for defence. The building was a lofty square one and judging from its great height it must have been intended by its owners to be a landmark in the locality. Certainly, the people who lived in this prominent structure regarded themselves

as being people of great importance.

At the time the Castle and the Abbey were built it is known that the surrounding area was heavily wooded. In 1746 the castle was in perfect condition and this fact is recorded by Charles Smith in his book "The Ancient and Present State of the County and City of Waterford" (more next week).

Contractors Restoration Of Roads "Appalling"

SAYS CO. ENGINEER

Contractors laying sewerage pipes for the Waste Waterford Treatment System have carried out "appalling" road restoration work, according to Director of Services, John O'Flynn.

Constant criticism has been levelled at the sewerage contractors for the condition they've left roads in around Dungarvan since work began.

Mr. O'Flynn said he fully agreed with the criticisms of a number of councillors who complained about work on several roads.

He added that the contractors haven't "covered themselves in glory" while "the road restoration work is appalling."

Mr. O'Flynn said the matter was raised with the contractors "ad nauseum" but he would again take the latest complaints up with them.

These included complaints about the Clonea Road, the Pond, Sexton Street and other areas - some of which have been fixed in the interim.

"We will keep after them," Mr. O'Flynn told the elected members.

Cllr. Brendan Mansfield (SF) said local residents on the Clonea Road are angered by the state the road has been left in, and listed other roads where problems have arisen.

He said these roads were left in a "terrible condition" and argued that there had been a total lack of supervision of the work. The onus is on the County Council to supervise the work and ensure it was carried out to a good standard, the Sinn Fein councillor said.

Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab) highlighted similar problems, saying she knew of one instance where proper signage informing people about the road works was not in place.

"A good speaking to to the contractor might not go amiss," she added.

Meanwhile, Waterford County Council and the National Roads Authority is unlikely to foot the bill for remedial work on the Percy Kirwan Bridge. Due to water seeping into the joints serious problems have arisen and the bridge has been coned off. Mr. O'Flynn said the contractors - a French firm - who carried out the work don't seem to be able to agree on how it should be fixed and when remedial work can be carried out.

"It is dangerous at the moment, and we are anxious to restore it," the County Engineer said.

COUNCIL PASS MOTION SEEKING RE-INSTATEMENT OF PRESENTER

Waterford County Council passed a motion seeking the re-instatement of a popular DJ to Waterford Local Radio's Guaranteed Irish Show.

A petition, signed by a number of well-known local and national politicians, local residents and GAA figures has already been gathered to protest the decision to axe John O'Shea from the show.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) criticised the decision, saying the show is extremely popular with older listeners.

"WLR FM needs to bear in mind that the L in their name stands for local. They seem to have forgotten that," he said.

The decision to remove Mr. O'Shea from the show prompted several meetings with management at the station, and the GAA County Board are also believed to have discussed the matter.

However, station management said they based the decision

on market research. The station say their reach fell from 7 to 1% and they now plan to change the presenter and give the show a new time-slot.

Cllr. Ger Barron (Lab) said the decision "beggared belief" while Cllr. Pat Daly (FF) said it was time the controversy was discussed on the station. He said he had received many calls from people from all ends of the constituency and the people to suffer would be the elderly isolated people who got such enjoyment from the show.

However, one local councillor voiced support for the station. Cllr. Nora Flynn (FG) said the local station is a commercial station, not a public station.

"I've been assured the show hasn't been axed. I, for one, am willing to listen to the new show, and I would ask that it be given a chance."

Decision Due In October On Stradbally Houses

A decision on a planning application for 108 houses in Stradbally will be made at the start of October, according to Director of Services, Denis McCarthy.

The application for a 6 hectare site near High Street in the village was lodged by developer, Denis Lehane, on the 9th of August and includes a number of different house types including two-storey detached houses, one and a half storey semi-detached houses and terraced houses.

Cllr. Ger Barron (Lab) raising the matter, said the site was zoned residential in the present development plan, and was also presently zoned residential in the Draft County Development Plan.

However, he said there are concerns over the size of the development, which could stretch the services and infrastructure including water and sewerage services of the small seaside village. These services he said were barely adequate.

"These things must be taken into consideration," he said. "I think overall there has to be concern about the size of the development and the pace with which it would be built."

Mr. McCarthy said the council would share many of the same concerns. The developers have applied to build a temporary treatment plant, which under departmental rules the local authority is obliged to take into consideration for an interim solution. He said the council will take into account the concerns raised.

Cllr. Paudie Coffey offered his sympathy to the Tobin family on behalf of the Fine Gael grouping.

PLANS PROCEEDING ON KILMAC' SITE

Waterford County Council will send a report on its plans for the Old Mill Site in Kilmacthomas in accordance with Part X1 of the Planning & Development Regulations.

Director of Services, Peter Carey said they compiled a comprehensive proposal, which initially included the construction of a Fire Station.

Mr. Carey said there is also a wider proposal involving the acquisition of the Old Barracks and the demolition of the building.

However the building is listed and under Local Government rules the council is required to inform the Department about the plans.

He said the council believes it has the backing of the community for the demolition and for its wider plans for the site.

BRIDGE SAFETY FEARS FORCE WALK'S CLOSURE

Waterford County Council was forced to close the picturesque Glenshalane Walk over safety fears about the two wooden bridges. A sign warning of the temporary closure was also removed but the council is working to re-open the popular trail, according to Director of Services, John O'Flynn.

COUNCIL TO TAKE UP BIN COLLECTION SLACK

Waterford County Council will attempt to collect along the routes where private operators have ceased to collect.

A number of private operators have ceased their collection services recently with the latest to stop being a private operator in Ballinamult.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy said the council will attempt to take up the slack and said there may be some scope to increase the number of collections.

"We will increase our services to full capacity," he said.

Mr. McCarthy said he will inform councillors of the areas that will be taken up in the next few weeks.

Extension Of Caredoc To County Needed

Members of Waterford County Council called on the Department of Health to extend the Caredoc - the after hours service - to the County.

Cllr. Tom Higgins (FG) said Waterford remains the only county in the South-East region without the service.

He said the service has proven extremely popular in other areas with one survey showing a 99% satisfaction rating. The service also doesn't cost an arm and a leg, the Dungarvan based GP said.

In a letter to the local authority, the South Eastern Health Board said it was unable to get the 1 million euros per annum necessary from the Department of Health to extend the service into the county.

Cathal O'Reilly, manager of the Primary Care Unit of SEHB, said they supported the extension of Caredoc into the county.

The service commenced in 1999 in Carlow and was extended over time to Kilkenny, South Tipperary and Wexford. He said when Waterford is brought on stream, they will have full coverage of the region.

"The main blockage towards the extension to County Waterford is funding," he said. "An additional 1 million euros approx. per annum is required but unfortunately we have been unable to secure this level of funding from the Department of Health and Children to date. We are hopeful it will be included in the estimates process."

Minister of Health, Micheal Martin's private secretary wrote to the County Council, saying the matter is receiving their attention.

RECENT DEATHS

TOM 'STYLO' O'RIORDAN



Little did we realise that the first day of September would herald the departure of Tom O'Riordan from this world of ours. Having not enjoyed the best of health for some time Tom passed away peacefully at Cork University Hospital. To say Tom was well known would in truth be an understatement, he was extremely popular within and outside the county and was held in high esteem. A man who was totally dedicated to the task in hand, sincere, loyal and upright were some of his calling cards in life.

Tom began his working life at Davy Cullinane's at Dromana for many years collecting milk for the Creamery at Cappoquin. He then was employed at Cappagh Lime, later to be known as J. A. Woods. For thirty nine years he was a valued member of staff at that concern, tasks trust upon his shoulders were always carried out with vision and in a most responsible manner. Later he joined East Cork Oil where for a decade he gave of his best, sadly illhealth brought the curtain down on his working years.

Most people who knew 'Stylo' will always associate him with his beloved Geraldine's. As a player he was an inspiring figure, often when defeat was staring the Ger's, 'Stylo' rallied the troops and the Aglishmen returned victorious. He won a Junior Football title in 1955, Hurling in the Intermediate Grade in 1966, Junior Hurling crown in 1976 a year previous saw him awarded Hurler of the Year at the age of 43 years. When Abbeyside/Ballinacourty had the official opening at the Old Pitch at the Burgery, 'Stylo' lined out with some of the greats, and as Tony Mansfield related he was at ease in such exalted company. Small in stature, but with the heart of a Lion, 'Stylo' was a charismatic figure on the playing field, truly his enthusiasm for the fray was infectious, his motivating influence made ordinary men perform extraordinary deeds. For several years he was honoured with club Presidency, when the club lotto was introduced one could pencil Tom in for the sale of 80 - 90 tickets which marked a nest egg of 35,000 euro for the clubs coffers which reflected Stylo's efforts to assist the club's finances. A fitness fanatic, he would go for a run before work, stand on his hands and proceed across the Geraldine playing field. For many years he trained the various teams and was an astute mentor in tactics and getting the best out of each player.

He loved to play cards, and fishing with his old pal Johnny

O'Grady was also keenly looked forward to. Twice he cycled to Dublin on behalf of M.S. Blessed with many good friends especially Pato, Paddy and Mick who were present for his final moments in Cork. When GAA folk gather to share and recall memories and incidents the name Tom 'Stylo' will be to the fore.

On June 7th 2003, Stylo celebrated his 70th birthday at 'The Elephant Bar', it was a complete surprise after weeks of plotting and 'lies'. Tom had the night of his life. Tom was a wonderful husband to his wife Mary who never wanted for anything, by whom he will be sorely missed. We extend to Mary, sister Margaret, brother-in-law Burny, Michael (nephew), niece Sinead, sister-in-law Eileen, Tony and May Hickey and family, his aunts-in-law Peggy Corbett and Kathleen Russell, his other relatives and very many friends our heartfelt sympathy on Tom's passing.

Reposing at the Kiely Funeral Home Rosary was shared by Fr. Lucey P.P. on the Wednesday evening. All through Thursday very many visited the Funeral Home paid their own respects, Fr. Lucey P.P. led all present in Rosary and prayers after which the Cathedral solid American Oak casket draped in the Blue and White and Tom's Geraldine jersey was brought to the waiting hearse for the final journey to Aglish, a journey that saw us stop in prayerful tribute at the crossroads near Tom's residence. As we neared the Geraldine's pitch club members shouldered Tom in relays to Church. Huge numbers stood in silence as Fr. Lucey P.P. assisted by Fr. Kiely P.P., Cappoquin, Fr. Fitzgerald P.P., Knockanore recited and blessed his remains. On Friday afternoon Fr. Lucey P.P. celebrated Mass in thanksgiving and in celebration for Tom's life, the lessons were read by Pato O'Brien, Sean McNamara, while Prayers of the Faithful were shared by Jim Joe Landers, Johnny O'Brien, Mary Masey, Maura Lombard and Tony Morrissey. Offertory gifts were brought to the Altar by Mick Tobin, Sinead McNamara, Johnny O'Grady and May Hickey, Johnny Longan (hurley), Jock O'Connell (mouth organ), Johnny Cotter (fishing net), Mickey Downing (a Geraldine flag), Feeney Mernin (football), Jimmy Downing (a sliotar), Tony McCoy (lotto tickets) and John Motherway (a deck of cards). Paddy Corkery detailed the significance of each in Tom's life. In Communion reflection a special thank you was given on behalf of the family followed by a poem read by Yvette Hickey.

God saw the road was getting rough,
The hill was hard to climb,
He gently closed your loving eyes,
And whispered peace be thine,
Two tired eyes are sleeping,
Two willing hands are still,
The one that worked so hard for us,
Is resting at God's will.

A fax sent by Fr. Paddy Osbourne was read by Johnny O'Brien while Paddy O'Brien's music which meant so much to Tom in life was deeply appreciated. Shouldered by club members Tom laid to rest in a grave

so beautifully prepared by Tom Curran and Ned Lombard. A graveside oration was given by Jack Cullinane while Fr. Lucey P.P. led all present in the graveside ceremony. 'Ar dheis láimh Dé go raibh sé'.

Months Mind Mass for Tom will take place on Thursday 30th Sept. at 7.30 p.m. in Aglish Church.

Long Wait For Money Is Over

South Tipperary General Hospital, Clonmel, it's long wait for funding has come to an end with the announcement by the Minister for Health Michael Martin that E3.8 million is to be provided to staff the new surgical unit. The unit is due to open in November and fifty four new staff will be provided next year. The Minister announced an E85 million package last week, which will see a number of hospital units opened and staffed. He also said these developments will provide modern health facilities, particularly in relation to cancer care, medical assessment units and accident and emergency departments. New day facilities, theatre and diagnostic capacity will result in improved patient flows through the hospital system and make better use of existing in-patient beds.

Health Centre At Last For Ballymacarbray

The South Eastern Health Board is to embark on the provision of a new health centre in Ballymacarbray. The Department of Health has given the South Eastern Health Board the green light to proceed with the long awaited project which will cost in the region of E350,000. The health centre will provide a range of accommodation such as doctors surgeries, treatment rooms, practice nurse accommodation, community welfare offices and waiting rooms. This is a positive development for community

services in Ballymacarbray and one that is welcomed by staff and patients. We look forward to this development moving forward as swiftly as possible and to welcoming patients to their new Health Centre said Peter Finnegan, Deputy Chief Executive Officer with S.E.H.B.

A Talk On The Life Of George Plant

Nollaig O Tabhra, author, journalist, lecturer, broadcaster and President of Comradh na Gaeilge, gave a talk for the Fethard Historical society on the subject of George Plant and his family in the Aymill Theatre on Friday night, 17th September. The talk included a tape recording of George's sister, Lily Plant, whom Nollaig O Tabhra interviewed shortly before she died in 1992. George Plant was born in St. Johnstown, Fethard, 100 years ago on the 5th January 1904. Following an incident, during which the teenage George and his brother were ill treated by the R.I.C., they joined the local branch of Fianna Eireann. During the Civil War, George was a member of the Third Tipperary Brigade and after the Civil War he emigrated to Canada, returning to Ireland in the late 1930's when he again became active in the I.R.A. In 1942 he was executed by the State in Portlaoise prison under controversial circumstances. His body was not returned to his family but was buried in the grounds of Portlaoise prison. Some six years later, on a change of Government, his remains were exhumed and brought to St. Mary's Church in Clonmel. People lined the streets as the cortege left Clonmel for the Fethard Road and for the reinterment in St. Johnstown Churchyard, Fethard, where a large concourse of people were present to pay their final respects. A few years later his colleagues erected a fitting memorial over his grave, where Republicans gather each Easter Sunday to pay tribute. The speaker, Nollaig O Tabhra, is undoubtedly the Country's most prolific writer in Irish. With several books on a wide range of subjects and history, politics, biographies to his credit, he is also an indefatigable journalist, articles and commentaries by him appearing regularly in Irish language publications, as well as contributions in English in several Irish and foreign newspapers and journals.

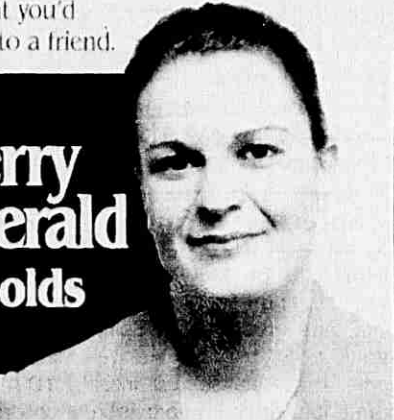

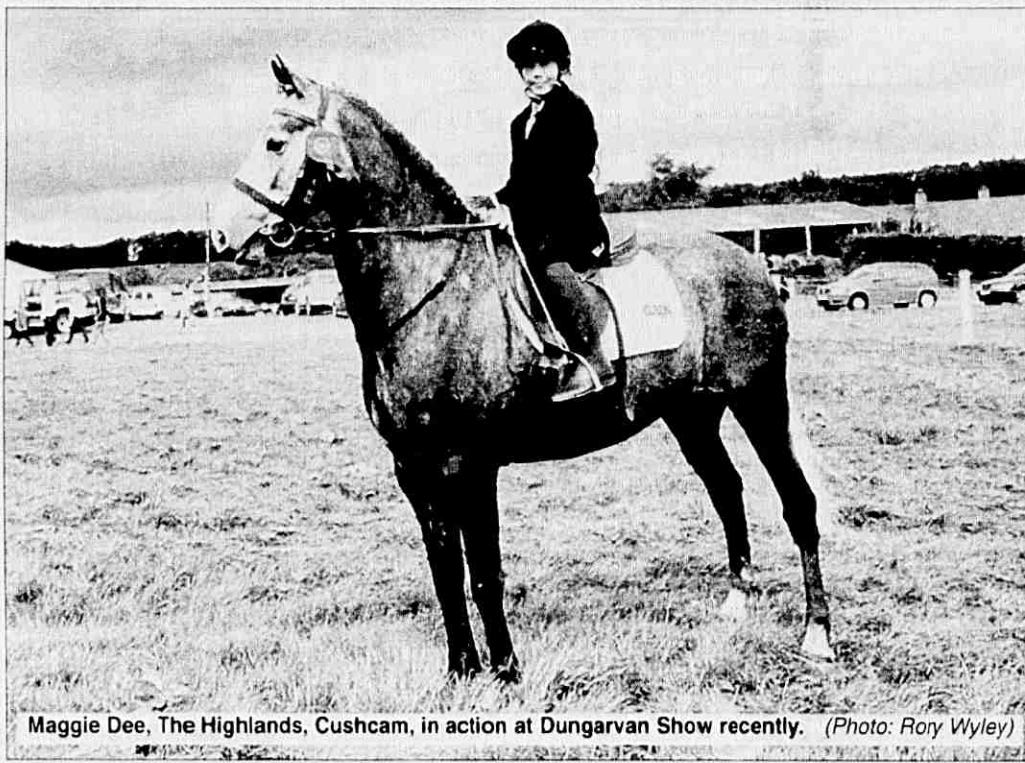

CBS NOTES

New Principal At CBS Dungarvan As Jim Ryan Retires

This school year marks a new beginning for CBS Dungarvan as we welcome our new Principal Ann Prendergast, to the school. Ann was previously Principal of Colaiste Ide in Dingle. Prior to this she taught at Middleton College for 22 years. However, her roots are in West Waterford and, as she pointed out at our first staff meeting of the year, her arrival at CBS Dungarvan represents a type of coming home for her. Ann is settling into her new role and looking forward to the challenges that come with it. Everyone in the school community would like to welcome Anne to the school and wish her well in her new position.

The man that Ann succeeds as Principal Jim Ryan, is synonymous with CBS Dungarvan. His decision to retire certainly marks the end of an era for the school. Jim was educated at the CBS, before returning to teach in the school in 1975. He became Deputy Principal in 1982 and Principal in 1988.

As a teacher of English, Jim had few peers. He achieved consistently excellent results in State examinations with his students and was renowned for his phenomenal work-rate and attention to detail. Beyond this, those that he taught testify to the wonderful rapport that he enjoyed with his students. His classroom discipline was not based on an authoritarian approach because his unrivalled knowledge and love for his subject, combined with his remarkable dedication to his students, commanded respect. Jim also loved the cut and thrust of debating, and coached the school's debating teams to many triumphs.

As Principal Jim played a central role in shaping CBS Dungarvan into the distinctive and respected educational institution that we have today. Under Jim's stewardship, the school maintained and enhanced its reputation for academic excellence and sporting success. While respected and admired for his firm approach to discipline, his firmness was always tempered by humanity.

Along with a dedicated teaching staff, Jim ensured that the CBS provided a learning environment that was safe and orderly, but also friendly and supportive. In that sense he helped to create the distinctive culture or atmosphere for which the school is renowned. As the first lay Principal of CBS Dungarvan, Jim ensured that the school preserved its special ethos and remained true to the educational philosophy of Edmund Rice.

As someone with a great love of sport, and as a formidable sporting competitor himself, Jim delighted in the many successes of our hurling and football teams. He valued and supported all of the extra-curricular activities within the school being particularly enthused by our recent theatrical productions. As Principal Jim was himself actively involved in the extra-curricular sphere, coaching the school's golf teams to some wonderful successes, foremost among them victory in 1998 in a national schools' competition run by the Golfing Union of Ireland. Following this marvellous win, CBS Dungarvan represented Ireland in an international golf tournament in Sunningdale, England.

Jim was Principal of CBS Dungarvan during a period when the education system was undergoing dramatic changes on a number of fronts. He steered the school through these many changes, all the time ensuring that it maintained its traditions and unique identity.

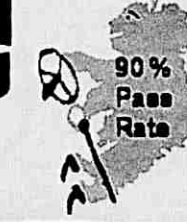

Lismore's All-Ireland Winning Tidy Towns Adjudicators Report

Overall Developmental Approach:

The assistance your committee is getting from Waterford County Council, your local Schools, Lismore Town Council, FAS, LEADER and indeed many other agencies is reflected in the wonderful appearance presented by Lismore on adjudication day. By identifying immediate projects as against future projects your approach to planning is most practical and indeed could be well copied by other centres. Thank you indeed for all the information sent with the entry form and for your plan. The map was most useful and the vast majority of items and places marked on it were seen.

The Built Environment:

The great beauty of Lismore is that it has successfully managed to combine the old with the new and in this respect all the public buildings seen last year and listed in last years report were again seen this year and have not failed to impress. The new Community School will be a fine building when it is completed. The new railing around the monument was much admired. Unfortunately the fountain near the bridge does need refurbishing and your comments in this respect have been noted. The bridge too is a wonderful asset and the lovely lamp standards show it off to perfection. Commercial premises have indeed improved very much and some lovely paint work was to be seen on adjudication day. The public toilets are being well maintained both externally and internally and reflect great credit on the caretakers. Walls throughout the town are a lovely feature and, in many cases, are greatly enhanced by hanging baskets of flowers. The presentation of these buildings and facilities reflects great credit on all who are involved with them in maintaining such a high standard.

Landscaping:

What a wonderful display. From the time the visitor approaches the town they are provided with the most wonderful display of trees, flowers and shrubs to be seen at any centre throughout the country. Splendid displays are to be seen on the approach roads from Cappoquin and Tallow, at both Churches, around the Monument, outside the Lismore Hotel, through every housing estate and street and into the smallest areas culminating with the magnificent Millennium Park which, once again this year, was a pleasure to visit. The presentation by business premises and individual households of window boxes, tubs of flowers and hanging baskets is to be applauded and baskets of flowers on walls and lamp standards were a joy to behold. The wonderful ambience of Lismore reflects great credit on your committee, your voluntary workers and your residents all of whom deserve the highest congratulations.

Wildlife and Natural Amenities:

Wonderful opportunities exist in Lismore for the observance of wildlife in the form of the canal, the Millennium Park, Lady Louisa's Walk etc. and, in this respect, your comments regarding the provision of a notice board on flora and fauna is noted. Do, however, try to provide a specific wildlife project which might, for example, involve your school children putting nesting boxes and feeding tables in the school grounds which would be a lovely attraction and hopefully it would also interest them in this subject. There may perhaps be someone in the locality like a school teacher or some other person who is knowledgeable on this subject who you might consult.

Litter Control:

The town of Lismore was litter free on adjudication day. This is a remarkable achievement for a town of its size. As the Adjudicator went around young children were seen doing a 'litter round' which, amongst other activities, probably accounts for the wonderful overall presentation. Congratulations to all concerned.

Tidiness:

A wonderful effort has also been made in this respect. The town was presented in a very neat and tidy manner. Where building is taking place some untidiness will naturally occur but this has been allowed for in the adjudication. Again, a wonderful effort by all concerned and a clear indication of their interest in the preservation of their living environment.

Residential Areas:

Again this year, all housing estates in the town were visited. New estates have added greatly to the stock of houses in Lismore and they, and their open spaces, are being well maintained. The town also has a wonderful stock of old houses - both individual and terraced which, with one or two exceptions, were presented very nicely. Most houses, particularly new ones, had lovely gardens in full bloom and were much admired. Those that had no gardens presented window boxes, hanging baskets and tubs of flowers to augment the splendid overall effort which has taken place. Because of the tremendous effort put in by all concerned it would be somewhat unfair to name any particular estate or house so the Adjudicator says - well done to all concerned.

Roads, Streets and Back Areas:

As already mentioned, approach roads are well presented, particularly those from Cappoquin and Tallow and set a lovely tone for the rest of the town. Road surfaces are quite good and pathways are being well maintained also. New pathways being provided in New Street were noticed. All this reflects great credit on your Local Authorities and they are to be commended for it.

General Impression:

What a wonderful effort by all concerned in the presentation of this charming town. The adjudicator was greatly taken with the way in which old and new buildings, landscaping, new and old houses parks and recreation areas can be brought together and to compliment each other in the provision of the wonderful atmosphere which prevails in Lismore. The adjudicator, yet again, looks forward to returning to Lismore next year to see even further progress.

Second Round Adjudication:

The Heritage Town of Lismore was presented to the highest of standards on Second Adjudication Day. It has made steady progress in the competition over the years and these efforts have definitely paid dividends! The Cappoquin side of the town affords the visitor a magnificent introduction to Lismore, with the riverside area running along beside the road and a magnificent view to the Castle beyond as one travels over the bridge. Items of landscaping such as the fountain in the Castle wall and those in the magnificent Millennium Park were in good working order on the day, creating an attractive display! The Heritage Centre was well maintained as were the buildings along the main streets of the town. The Mall area leading up to the Cathedral looked quite elegant on the day, and is quite reflective of the character of the town, which has maintained its unique heritage and charm. Lismore is always a pleasure to visit due to this very fact. It looked extremely well cared for on Second Adjudication Day so a hearty congratulations to all concerned!

From Charles Smith's History of Waterford 1746 (Continued)

The parish of Kilwatermoy is coarse and mountainous, except the more N. parts near the river Bride, and towards the Blackwater. The parish church now in ruins, stands about 2 miles to the S.E. of Tallow. About the same distance to the e. is Headborough, the seat of William Smith, Esq. pleasantly situated near the Blackwater. The small parish of Killockan has little in it remarkable. The Blackwater river being

here of a considerable breadth, makes a beautiful appearance, its banks on both sides, are scarce any other than lofty hills, shaded with woods, which in summer afford very entertaining landscapes. A little lower the river forms a considerable Bason, called the broad of Clashmore, on either side whereof, low marshy grounds called inches, just out in some places which being covered with grass, seem at a distance to be so many smooth verdant islands: Two miles below Headborough is situated the castle of Strancally built upon a rock directly over the river. From the castle through the rock to the river a passage was cut, of a considerable length and breadth, and pretty deep. This kind of cave (as tradition says) was formerly used by the tyrannical Earl of Desmond, as a prison for such persons who had the fortunes in this part of the country, whom he frequently invited to his castle to make merry there is a hole cut through the rock in the manner of a Portcullis, down which the dead bodies were cast into the river. One person by good fortune escaped who gave the government information and both cave and castle were demolished.

The G.A.A. Is Sometimes An Ass

Structures in the GAA be they at club, county, provincial or national level are meant to facilitate and promote the playing of our national games. This is not always the case and some-

times the labyrinth of committees and red tape hinder rather than help those of us working at under are level. Petty officialdom in the extreme that would be the envy of any Brussels bureaucrat.

We recently held a very successful U.12 hurling tournament in Tallow, bringing young lads from Cork, Waterford and Tipperary together to celebrate the ancient game. As we had been told often enough by our board and because I am a dutiful GAA citizen I decided to inform the relevant authorities. No problem I thought, a quick phone call or email. We notified the board in Waterford and were told because teams from outside the county were involved we would need to contact the Munster Council, no bother, just another phone call.

Finding out who exactly to contact on the Munster Council was the first problem. Anyway we eventually made contact and gave the details regarding the tournament as we knew them to be at the time. Anybody who has ever organised such and event knows how fluid the situation is. I probably made contact with more than a dozen clubs from five different counties with the final line up not confirmed until 2 days before the tournament. That's the nature of this business with teams having to withdraw because of fixture or other commitments in their respective counties. Then came the letter from Runai, Comhairle na Mumhan. I quote: "Before your request can be considered by Comhairle na Mumhan you must obtain and submit sanction (in writing) for the tournament from Coiste Chontae Portlairge and Corcaigh". If teams from Tipperary, Limerick or Clare were taking part sanction would have to be sought from these counties and also submitted. If teams from outside the province were playing we would have to go to Croke Park I assume. Just as well we didn't bring the lads from Tyrone (as originally planned) or we would probably have to send a delegation to the U.N. to get clearance.

The letter goes on to add insult to injury, "Please forward your cheque 20 euro which you should re-submit with the sanctions and particulars of all teams participating the dates of all games and the proposals regarding referees etc. etc." Are these people in the real world.

It was like applying for planning permission. We had to go out begging for sponsorship and this crowd wanted 20 euro of it for sending and idiotic letter. That's only a minor detail the real issue here is that organs of the association charged with promoting the game are only a hindrance. Tournaments were the bedrock of our games going back centuries before all these coistes and comhairles. If some sort of notification has to be given surely the system can be streamlined. One phone number or one email should suffice. The words of that Abbeyside Gael spring to mind "If there was a tractor outside the door this crowd would plough the field with a horse". It's no wonder clubs are ignoring this ridiculous requirement. Contrary to popular opinion I have no problem conforming to reasonable authority. Stupid authority is another matter.

At the weekend in Cork and this is the practice in most counties, they held four major Senior Football County quarter finals in Dunmanway, Macroom, Ballinascary and Paire Ui Rinn, the only ground with a stand, and none of these games were moved to Paire Ui Caoimh. If this was in this County they would more than likely try to play the four games in the Fraher Field because it suits the administrators, not necessarily the supporters and the excuse we will all get is that the field has a stand. Well a lot of supporters myself included, have no problem standing up watching a game.

Why was the Shamrocks/St. Mary's L.H.C. semi final and the Tourin/Dungarvan J.H.C. final not made a double header for Cappoquin. Was it not ideally located or is it because there is no stand, what a load of rubbish. Actually the Tourin/Dungarvan game should have been made a double header but our two boards could not come to a compromise, so they wanted to rip the genuine G.A.A. supporter off twice. We the G.A.A. are supposed to be an amateur organisation which was built on good will and the voluntary work of great people and that should never be forgotten. If there was no underage teams ten or fifteen years ago there would be no adult teams today, simple as that.

All clubs have an obligation to their County, which is only right, but County boards should appreciate and recognise this and not take it for granted, in major Hurling counties i.e. Kilkenny and Tipperary, it's the loyalty to the parish that is all important, where there can only be one club. 'The Bossman Ruling' does not work in those places, we have been told in this County the parish rule could never work. I don't know why it can't, is it just people don't want to change, and some people don't want to give up their All Ireland tickets, could this be the case.

As regards my own clubs decision on cancelling the Junior Hurling final in the Sportsfield on September 11th, my own thinking in hindsight was that it was not the wisest move ever made because all we did was deprive two teams, Tourin and Dungarvan, who had themselves geared up to play a Western final and who were really looking forward to the day. All I can say lads as an Affane/Cappoquin clubman is that no one in our club intentionally wanted to spoil your day, it was a decision that was made a bit hastily without much time. It is always easy to be wise after the event, but I can honestly say this to those Dungarvan and Tourin players that all Affane/Cappoquin GAA members did not want to spoil your day and if we did, we sincerely apologise.

THE COURSING SEASON IS UPON US

With the 2004/2005 coursing season almost upon us it affords us the opportunity to take a behind the scenes look at this sport which has come in for its fair share of criticism down through the years.

The History Of Coursing

The sport of coursing is long established as an integral part of Irish rural life and pastime. In 1916 the Irish Coursing Club otherwise known as the I.C.C. was founded to control and regulate the sport of Coursing in Ireland. Prior to this coursing in Ireland was controlled by a Sub Committee of the National Coursing Club in England.

In 1958 the Irish Coursing Club was reconstituted under the Greyhound Industry Act 1958, and Coursing was provided for under the Wildlife Act 1976. There are 92 affiliated coursing clubs and 39 associate coursing clubs in the Island of Ireland.

I.C.C. Functions

One of the functions of the Irish Coursing Club is that it controls the sport of Coursing in the thirty-two Counties of Ireland. It has very strict rules and guidelines laid down for all coursing clubs under its control. These rules and guidelines are rigidly enforced by the Irish Coursing Club's Officials and Control Stewards who are present at all coursing meetings and are regularly reviewed by the Club and updated, as circumstances require. The Club licenses all those officials such as Judges, Slippers and Control Stewards.

Greyhound Exports

Greyhound exports, which are a multi Million Euro industry benefits from coursing breeding because the element of coursing breeding in Irish track dogs instils in them a greater instinct to hunt the artificial track lure. This is the principal reason that Irish bred greyhounds are in such demand in Great Britain.. It is significant that in recent times breeders in America and Australia are importing Irish greyhounds with coursing bloodlines to rejuvenate the chasing instinct in the bloodlines of their greyhounds, which has been dissipated since the banning of coursing in those particular countries.

Coursing bloodlines are present in the pedigree of 77% in major winners of track events in England and Ireland over the last ten years.

The Sport Of Coursing

Coursing may only take place between the months of February and September inclusive. This is to ensure that the hare is protected during the breeding season.

Coursing Clubs may not run more than 72 courses in any one day. Clubs must have a minimum number of hares before staging a meeting. The minimum number is 1 hare for every course to be run plus a surplus of 10. All hares must be released back to the countryside after each coursing meeting, under the supervision of a Control Steward who may be accompanied by an Officer of the Wildlife Service. It is not the object of a course to kill the hare indeed coursing is one of these field sports where those engaged in it do not set to kill what they hunt.

Since the muzzling of greyhounds in 1993 the average kill rate is a mere .005% of the total number of hares coursed.

Hare Conservation

The Irish Coursing Club gives financial assistance by way of grants to clubs in the release of hares back to the countryside from which they came at the conclusion of each meeting. Each hare is tagged on release so that it will not be used again in the unlikely event of being recaptured for another coursing meeting. There is formal veterinary involvement with all clubs prior to and during coursing fixtures in the interests of hare conservation. Coursing clubs take steps to ensure that the hare is protected from predators and from poachers throughout the entire year. The result of the conservation policies of the Irish Coursing Club and Coursing clubs generally is that the hare population is on the increase, which is against the trend obtaining with other species of our wildlife. Seminars on hare welfare including husbandry, habitat, population and medication have been organised periodically by the ICC.

Economic Benefits

Apart from its sporting and social attributes, coursing also plays an important part in the commercial life of the Country. Employment is given

to greyhound trainers and their assistants and to Veterinary Surgeons and their assistants.

Spin off employment is also given to manufacturers of specialised dog food, medicatiobns, tonics, collars and leads, greyhound covers and car trailers etc.

Hotels, guesthouses, bars and restaurants benefit from the influx of people to an area for a coursing meeting.

The ICC itself is a large employer and has a full time permanent staff of 41 as well as a significant number of part time employees.

What is A Coursing Meeting

The Sport of Coursing is strongly rooted in the rural tradition and forms part of the rich tapestry of Irish country living. Rural people in daily contact with nature consider the coursing of a hare by a pair of greyhounds as a natural occurrence. Our hunting tradition is one of the features of this Country, which attracts tourists in ever increasing numbers. People who have never attended a Coursing meeting and they are in the majority have a distorted view of what coursing is all about.

In Ireland there are two forms of coursing park or enclosed coursing and open coursing. Open coursing is where Club members on an organised basis go searching for a hare in the countryside and on finding it coursing it until it escapes from the dogs sight in its own environment when the dogs give up the chase. Park or enclosed coursing is where the hares are already gathered in an enclosure for some weeks prior to the coursing fixture. There the food and shelter are as close to the natural state as possible. They are given time to settle down and get to know their surroundings in particular the location of the all-important "escape". The aforementioned "escape" is an enclosure with openings large enough for the hare to get through but not for the dog. On the day of the coursing meeting the hares are collected at the opposite end of the field to the escape where they are kept. There experienced officials examine each hare. If these officials consider the hare to be unsuitable either because of its size or condition or for any other reason they keep it to one side or it is not coursed. When a suitable hare is selected the Slipper himself licensed by the Governing Body of the sport-the Irish Coursing Club makes his own judgement of the suitability of the hare. If the Slipper is not satisfied he wont release the dogs. When he is satisfied he decides how far to allow the hare up the field before he does slip the dogs. For instance in an average coursing field which would be 350 to 400 yards long a slipper normally allows the hare about 150 yards leeway before releasing the dogs. Thus the hare is usually a mere 50 yards from the escape when the greyhounds come close to it. The hare then jinks and turns at acute angles to elude the greyhounds. At each turn a hare gains a lot of ground on the greyhounds who because of their size cannot turn as quickly. The Greyhound nearest the hare when he turns first is awarded the course. When the hare goes through into the escape usually after a number of turns the course is ended. That hare is not coursed again. When that particular coursing meeting is concluded all the hares are tagged and released into the countryside. The ICC has very strict rules governing coursing and governing the management, treatment and release of hares back to the countryside after meetings. One of the myths fostered by the anti coursing people are that hares are transferred from coursing meeting to coursing meeting from the beginning of the season to the end. This is not true, indeed it is expressly forbidden by the rules of the ICC. Each time this claim has been made the ICC has asked those making the claim to substantiate it. This they have never done. After each Coursing meeting an official of the ICC forwards a report of the meeting to the Secretary of the ICC. In this report he details among other things the number of courses ran, the number of hares killed and the number of hares released. He reports on the quality of the hares and the standard of the coursing.

If for instance he were to report that a higher than average number of kills occurred the Governing Body would query the club concerned on its ability to stage a meeting and may even decide to withdraw the licence of that club.

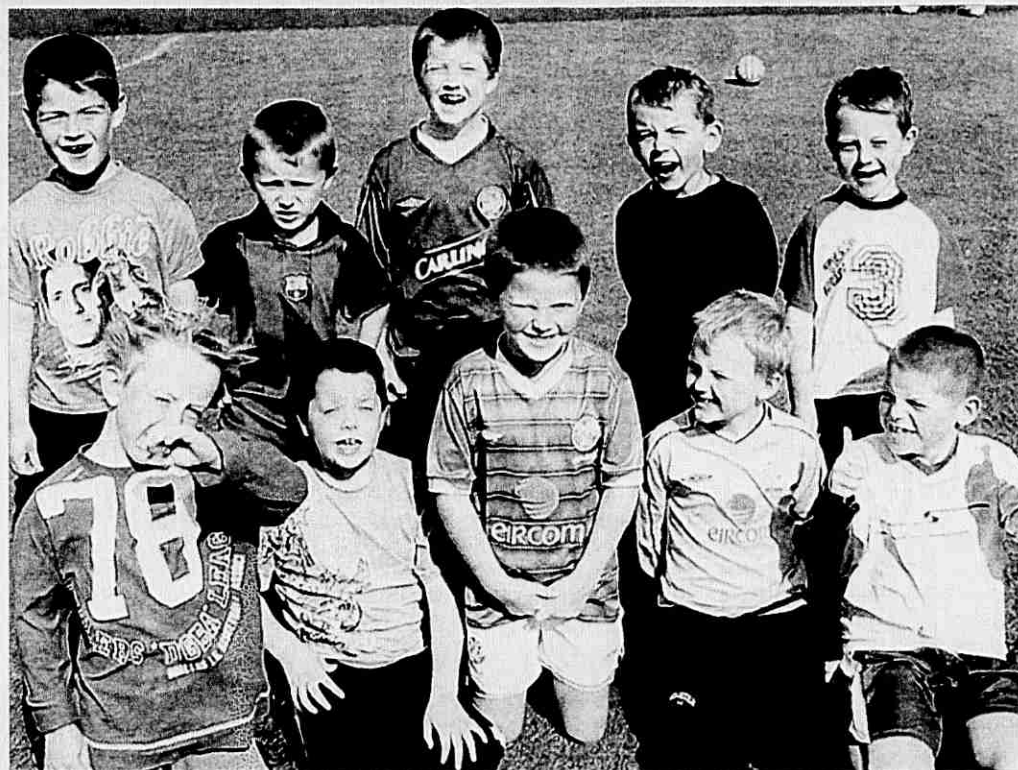

Brilliant Blitz A Great Success

EIGHT ANNUAL ROANMORE CHARITY HURLING BLITZ

The Annual Roanmore Charity Hurling Blitz took place on Saturday 4th of September in Pairc Ui Mhurucu and De La Salle, Cleaboy and was once again a resounding success. A total of eighty eight teams of young hurlers, aged eight and nine, participated in what is the largest single one day competition held in the country. The Blitz involves 1056 children all playing hurling, from 10.00 a.m. to 7.00 p.m. spread out over eight pitches. Divided into groups of four, the winners receive medals and all children receive crisps and lemonade.

The logistics of catering for such large numbers are daunting but with the co operation of both clubs and the huge number of willing helpers everything ran like clockwork this year again. Just to give an idea as to what is involved the following statistics are of interest.

Sixteen goal posts are assembled and dismantled, some are borrowed.

Eighty eight teams of eight and nine year olds take part.

One thousand and fifty six children.

One thousand one hundred packets of crisps and one thousand one hundred bottles of minerals are distributed free to the children.

Two hundred and sixty four medals are presented.

Ten trays of sandwiches were used.

Gallons of tea and coffee.

Two hundred and fifty programmes.

Twenty two referees assisted.

Eight field coordinators operate each pitch.

Seven volunteers sold tickets on the day.

Forty seven team pictures were taken.

Six hundred and seven goals and forty five points were scored

The Charity Hurling Blitz is in aid of Order of Malta Ambulance Corps., and we expect to raise over 2,000 for this worthy charity.

The work starts in June when invitations are sent out and with completed application returned the task of setting the fixtures falls on Liam Cheasty, who has to cater for clubs travelling with up to four teams. A fixtures programme is then sent to each team and it is on the day the real work starts.

As this was the eight annual blitz the apprenticeship has been well served and the number of people willing to help is quite astounding. This is the key to the success of this tournament, the army of willing helpers. There are too many to list, but all play a vital role equally important. The assistance of the De La Salle Club, Joey Carton and Alan Dillon in particular is gratefully appreciated. Thanks to Brendan

Juvenile G.A.A. News from The Deise County

County under 12 football Titles Go East

Despite the heavy rain that fell at times in the forty eight hours leading up to the Inaugural County Under 12 Football Finals last Saturday, Fraher Field was in prime condition for the players that took to the field in the division one and two finals.

The division three final was to have got the days proceedings underway at 11-00am, but following a death within the Sacred Heart Club, the game between Sacred Heart and Cois Bhride was called off and will now be played at a later date.

The proceedings did get underway shortly after midday with the meeting of Tramore and The Nire in the division two final. From the off the much bigger and more physical Tramore side were well on top. Inside the opening 60 minutes of the game, the Tramore players had forced The Nire goalkeeper into making a fantastic double save.

Tramore got their first score of the game on two minutes when they pointed a free. They went on to dominate the first half of the game as they took some good scores. The second half was the same as the first half. Tramore added some very good scores to their first half total. In the end they ran out easy winners but credit to The Nire players, they had a very young team who fought from the first to the last minute of the game. Had lady luck been on their side they could have added a few extra scores.

The division one final between Dungarvan and De La Salle was a much closer affair. We all have seen incidents where the better team on the day lost the game narrowly and this game was another one of these.

De La Salle opened the brighter of the two sides scoring two points inside the opening six minutes of the game. Dungarvan got their first score of the game midway through the first half to reduce the deficit between the two sides to just the minimum.

In the twelfth minutes of the first half, De La Salle made a very good attacking run up the left hand side of the field. The forwards for the city club who went for a goal at the end of the movement saw their effort brilliantly stopped by the Dungarvan goalkeeper. The backs for the Old Boro made sure that De La Salle from any rebound could not put the ball into their net as the goalkeeper picked himself off the ground by putting the ball out for a forty five. From the resulting placed ball the city side increased their lead to three points.

Two minutes from time, De La Salle did manage to put the ball past the Dungarvan goalkeeper to give the Eastern Champions a 1-3 to 0-1 lead. From the puck-out the Dungarvan team attacked the De La Salle goal, they went to pull the goal back but the De La Salle goalkeeper somehow kept the ball out blocking a well driven ball towards his goal. From the resulting rebound the Dungarvan attacking players blasted the ball over the bar. From the kickout it was now De La Salle who attacked the Dungarvan goal. They brought the ball up the full length of the field. At the end of the movement they scored what could only be described as a very soft goal just as referee Kevin Martin sounded his half time whistle.

The second half of the game was all Dungarvan. They gave the De La Salle forwards very little chance to have a shot at goal, and when they did manage to get a shot in they failed to convert any of their chances. Dungarvan on the other hand, kicked five very good frees three of them from play and two from frees. Just before the full time whistle they were awarded a free close to the De La Salle goal. Been two points down, they decided to go for a goal. De La Salle crowded their goal in an effort to keep the ball out of the net. Dungarvan saw a powerfully taken free go narrowly wide after which the full time whistle was sounded.

On the day Dungarvan were beaten by two points. The telling moments of the game came between the 19th and 20th minutes of the first half. It was in this few seconds that Dungarvan saw a goal bound shot somehow saved and the rebound go over the bar, and from the puck out De La Salle brought the ball up field and got a second goal of the game.

Had the Dungarvan chance for a goal gone under the bar rather than over it, I am almost certain that they would have went on to take the title as it would have given them a massive boost going into the second half of the game. Dungarvan have some very good players coming through. They will know that if they can keep all these players together along with those in their very good under 14 team that in a few years time they will be back contesting senior football finals just as they were in the late 1980's and early 1990's.

After the game a few people I spoke to and some I overheard talking, spoke about the rules of the under 12 football competition. In both divisions both bords played different rules. In the west clubs played the three touch rule which has operated successfully for the past number of years, and games were played over 20 minutes.

In the east games were been played as 25 minutes a side games, and there was no three touch football. Instead a player if he was good enough could bring the ball from his own goal to the opponents goal and score. For the 2005 competition all bords, east west and county will have to sit down well in advance and have a full set of agreed rules drawn up and have them available for clubs at the first delegate meetings of 2005.

Another baffling thing at the county finals on Saturday was that after a goal was scored the ball rather than been kicked out by the team that had conceded the goal, was brought out to the centre of the field where it was thrown in between the players. I have been attending underage games for many years down and been part of the Western Bord na nOg since late 1998 and have never been at a meeting (be it at western or county level) where this rule was agreed at.

When I noticed this happening I had to look around to see if I was at Fraher Field attending the under 12 Gaelic Football County Finals or at the Melbourne watching an important A.F.L. league games between two of Australia's Football teams.

Full Marks to Abbeyside.

While I knew before last weeks Juvenile G.A.A. Notes From the Deise County were printed in the Dungarvan Leader that Abbeyside had been defeated by De La Salle in the County Under 16 hurling semi final at the hands of De La Salle at Lemybrien recently, I did not know that the Abbeyside team lined out without five first team regulars.

These five players were not missing because of injury or suspension, but because the players were involved with St. Augustines College in the Super Schools Competition. The fact that division one of this years under 16 hurling county championship ran well behind time has been well documented. Credit to the Abbeyside Club when they received their fixtures their players and selectors went out and played the games for whenever they were fixed without any complaints.

Furthermore when they received their semi final fixture they went ahead and played the game without five key players. I think if the Abbeyside Club had refused to play without these players nobody would have gone against what they were doing. Great credit must go to the Abbeyside club for playing the game. I only wish that other clubs would take a look at what Abbeyside have done. Some clubs if they are missing one player they look for a game to be called off.

Roanmore got the scoring under way with a goal from Kelvin Cleary. Ballygunner equalised almost straight away as it began to look that the two sides were inseparable. By the half time break Roanmore had added three points to their opening score while for the Gunners they added a second goal to go in at the break on the scoreline of Roanmore 1-3 Ballygunner 2-0.

Goals from Roanmore,s Gavin O'Brien and Sean Tyler were cancelled out by Conor McCarthy and Pat Cooke for the Gunners. It was again looking as if extra time would be required to separate the two sides. However Kelvin Cleary got his second and Roanmore,s fourth goal of the game to seal victory for his side.

Roanmore won the game on a scoreline of 4-4 to 4-0 and in doing so ended Ballygunner,s three years domination of this competition.

In the singles event Waterford were beaten in the under 15 singles final against Cork and in the under 14 boys doubles final were beaten by Limerick. Congratulations again to all involved and in particular to Br. Finbarr Spring who does tremendous work in coaching and promoting handball at St. Augustines College.

Lismore Have An Even Chance Against Ballygunner

There was a prospect of the games being played as a double header in Fraher field, but this will not now happen.

The Mount Sion versus Ballyduff East semi-final will go ahead at Walsh Park on Sunday at 1.30 p.m. and the other semi-final involving Lismore and Ballygunner at Fraher field on Saturday at 5.45 p.m. following the senior football losers group final between neighbours Clashmore and Ardmore.

This is by far the most interesting and attractive clash of the championship this year and since Lismore defeated Tallow two weeks ago, there has been quite an amount of speculation about the meeting of this pair.

Three weeks ago I would have rated Lismore's chances of beating Ballygunner as being poor to very poor. Their display against Tallow changed my mind. My thinking on the issue is also influenced by the fact that Ballygunner are not the hurling force that they were a few years ago.

Two years ago after Lismore

defeated Mount Sion in a replay of the semi-final, they met Ballygunner here in the county final and it was only in the concluding stages that the western challengers began to fade and the score of 4-12 to 1-16 did not do justice to Lismore.

Apart altogether from the fact that we here in the west have a vested interest in the result as a win for Lismore will guarantee the final in Fraher field, it would be nice to see a change and have the Mount Sion/ Ballygunner stranglehold on the title broken. Such a situation would invest more interest and excitement into the championship. Of course, it must be clear that winning here will only bring the victors to the county final.

Ballygunner who recently celebrated the completion of a massive redevelopment project, are celebrating the Golden Jubilee of their founding by Jimmy McGinn 50 years ago and have expressed themselves as being most anxious to be crowned county champions in

this special year

Here two weeks ago the Lismore backs played better than

they have played for a couple of years and if they can give a repeat performance on Saturday, then Ballygunner even with Paul Flynn, Billy O'Sullivan and Andy Moloney are not going to make the inroads that they have been making against other opposition.

Holding a team of quality hurlers such as Tallow to a point from play speaks volumes for Lismore's rock solid defence

The Line Out

Lismore are unlikely to change their line out from the one that faced Tallow two weeks ago. Brendan Landers will be in goal behind the back line of Michael O'Sullivan, Shane Kearney and Mark O'Sullivan. In the half line of defence we will see Michael Walsh, James O'Connor and Billie Cunningham.

Mattie Prendergast and David O'Connor will probably be in the middle of the field with Dave Bennett, Dave O'

Gorman and probably Paul Prendergast. Lismore will play James and Dan Shanahan with John Heneghan filling the number 15 berth.

Ballygunner are certain to change from their starting line up against Ardmore here some weeks ago and here it is certain that Fergal Hartley, Stephen Frampton and Billy O'Sullivan will be in from the start. With a 30 strong panel of players and the majority of these considered suitable for inclusion on the first 15, their line up is difficult to name in advance. As well as the above Tom Fives, Paul Foley, Colin Kehoe, Rory O'Sullivan, Niall O'Donnell Ray Whitty (goal), etc in their line out are all sure to be included.

This may yet prove to be the game of the championship and which ever side wins will pose a strong challenge to Mount Sion, if the champions overcome Ballyduff on the following day.

If Lismore play as well as they did against Tallow, they must have at least a 50/50 chance.

Mount Sion v. Ballyduff East

Most people regard the result of this senior hurling semi-final tie as being a foregone conclusion and that the reigning champions will score a very decisive win.

I suppose with their amazing record and fielding a team packed with top class players, we must expect such a result.

Ballyduff have a much different view of the situation and are expecting to cause an upset (like they have done on a couple of occasions already this year).

However, there is a gap in standards and this weighs heavily in favour of Mount Sion

who must be given a very strong chance of qualifying for yet another county final.

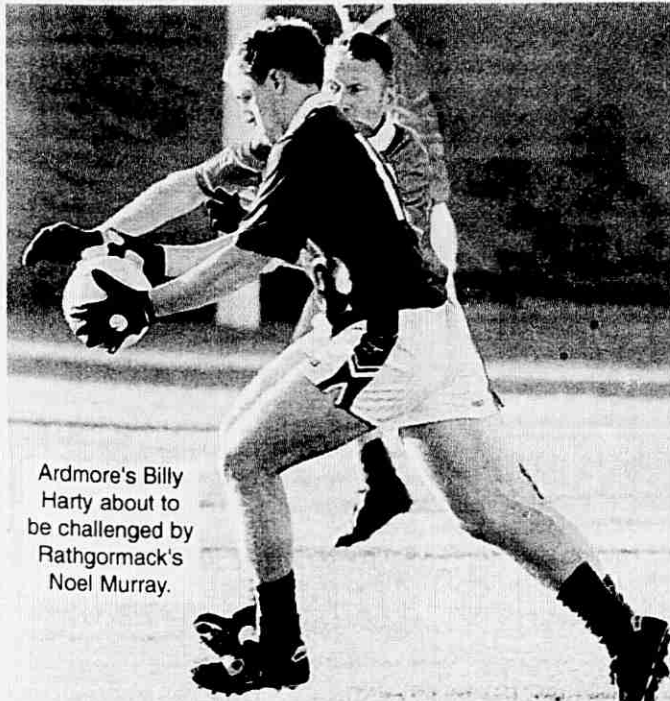

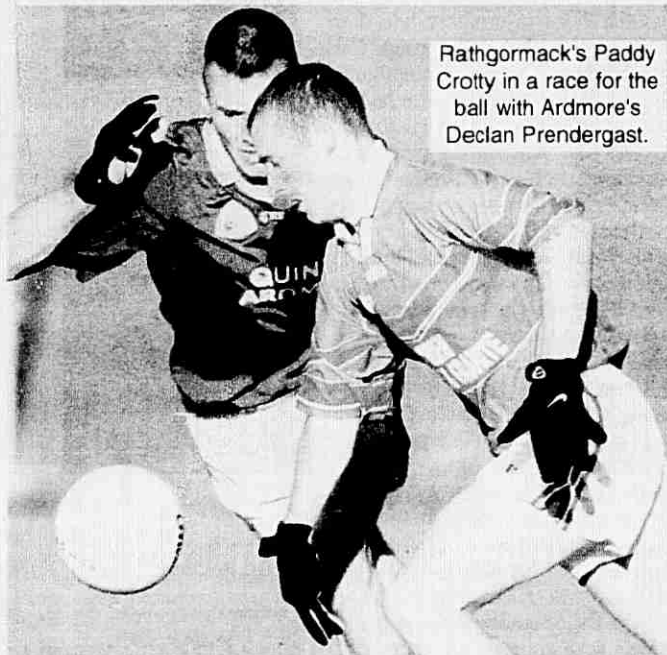

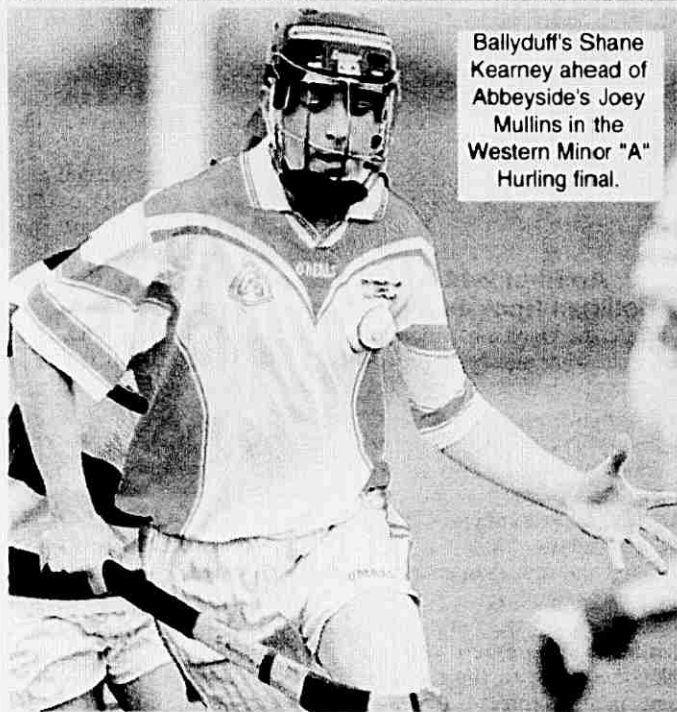

collection in the over 55 category. Ann Moroney took bronze in the over 45 category and likewise Helene Hayes took bronze in the over 50 category also.

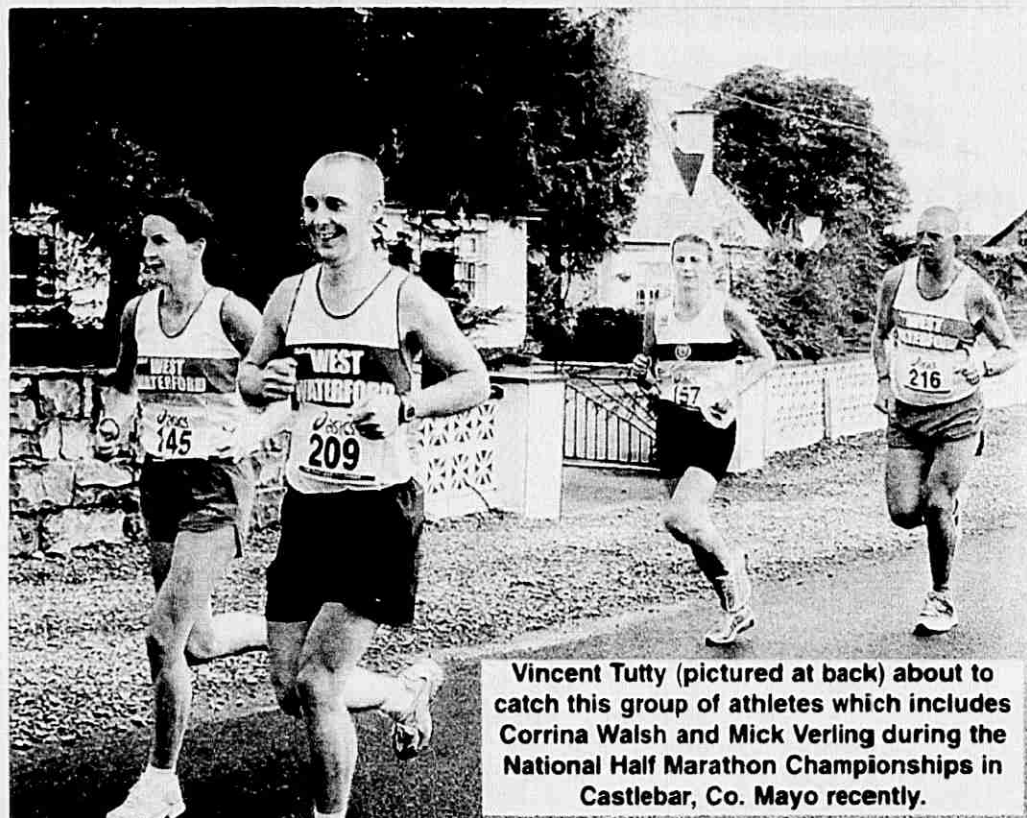
In the team awards West Waterford Ladies again did extremely well taking silver in both senior and masters.

WEST WATERFORD ATHLETIC CLUB NEWS

25th Dublin City Marathon

Many of our club members are currently in training for the up coming Dublin City Marathon and with this in mind over the next couple of weeks in our club notes we will take look at some of the aspects of the sport which would be of interest to those athletes. Firstly this week we take a look at the very important must do, but many of us don't do, well not enough anyway, that's proper stretching, and, of course this applies to everyone who goes for a run, whether a seasoned marathoner or a beginner.

STRETCHING

There seems to be an endless debate in the running world of whether stretching before and after a run is necessary or not. One camp suggests stretching avoids injury and protects the body from the harshness of the road, while the other camp believes stretching offers little benefits and in fact can actually cause injury.

So who's right? Well both camps are right to a point. Stretching, when done properly, can decrease the chances of an injury but if not performed properly, can actually increase your chances of an injury.

Stretching is one of the most important aspects of any training programme. It can protect the body from the severity of the road by reducing muscle soreness, risk of injury to muscles, joints and tendons and it can improve your athletic performance. Care should be taken when stretching - if you stretch too quickly the muscle can contract and increase tension, therefore, muscles should always be stretched slowly and

the stretch should be held for approximately 30 seconds, this way the muscle tension falls and the muscle can be stretched further.

When stretching don't 'bounce' the muscle! It's a common mistake but doing it can pull or tear the muscle you're trying to ease. Don't stretch if you feel tightness in the muscle or if you feel any pain or discomfort.

Stretching should form part of your training session, both before and after, your run. Whilst you may not get the same kind of enjoyment from it as running, the benefits from stretching correctly can only improve your performance.

Calf Stretch

Position your body about three feet from a wall and stand with your feet at shoulder width. Place your hands on the wall with your arms straight for support. Lean your hips forward and bend your knees slightly to stretch your calves.

Leg Stretch

From the previous position, bend forward to lower your body to waist height. Bring one foot forward with your knee slightly bent. Lift the toes of the front foot to stretch the muscle under the calf. Stretch both legs.

Back Stretch

Grip your elbow with the op-

posite hand and gently push the elbow up and across your body until your hand reaches between your shoulder blades. Gently push on your elbow to guide your hand down your back as far as it will comfortably go, stretching your triceps and shoulders. Stretch both arms.

Hamstring Stretch

Lie down with one leg straight up in the air, the other bent with foot flat on the ground. Hook a towel over the arch of the lifted foot, and gently pull on the towel as you push against it with your foot. Push gently only to the point where you feel your muscles contract. Stretch both legs.

Quadriceps Stretch

Kneel on your knees (without resting back on your heels). Lean back with your body erect and your arms to the side. Hold for 10 seconds.

Heel To Buttock

Stand on one foot, with one hand on a wall for balance. Hold the other foot with the opposite hand and raise the heel of the lifted foot to the buttocks (or as near as possible), stretching your quadriceps. Keep your body upright throughout. Repeat with the other leg.

Next week we will take a look at Warming up and Cooling down properly.

He also worked with inter-county football teams, the Leinster Rugby team as well as the UCD Rugby team. He is director of S.A.Q. in Ireland, a company which offers coach education packages to N.G.B.'s county boards, clubs and individual coaches who are engaged in all aspects of sport from Juvenile to performance.

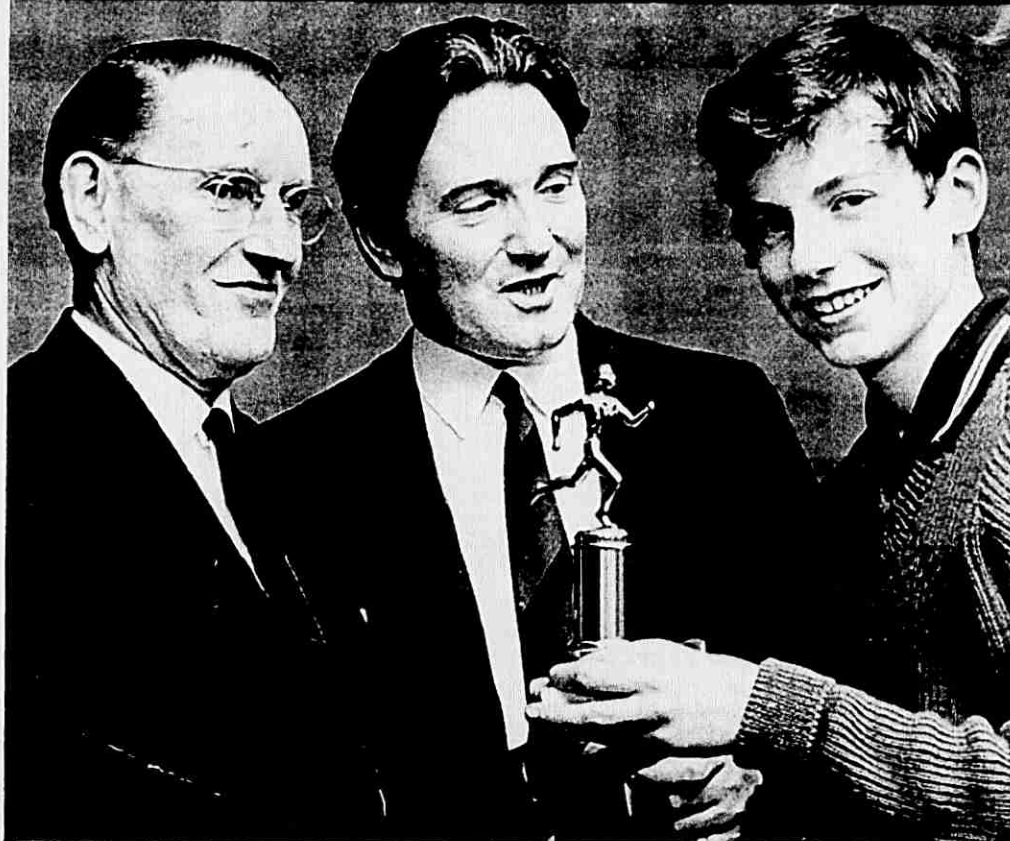

St. Augustine's Come Close in Sweden

St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan recorded another fine performance in European Superschools Competition when they flew to Sweden last week and took fourth place in this well established demanding tournament amongst some of the top colleges in Europe.

Taking part for the seventh time, they saw near neighbours Pen-Y-Dre High School from Wales just edge out Carluke High School from Scotland to take their first win in this tournament, with hosts Sweden in third place. The competition tests the ability of the participating colleges to field a team of ten boys and ten girls to perform across a range of disciplines. This was the closest fought contest ever, with just five points separating the first five teams and with every event in every sport being hotly contested. All participating athletes from St. Augustine's won medals, with some taking several, succeeding in a variety of sports, a sign of the broad strength of the College's sporting talent.

On Monday morning last as the party of twenty-seven descended into Stockholm Airport, they could see below the gold of the cornfields running beside rich swathes of green forest, with occasional white clouds completing a welcome tricolour for the Irish party. The students were accommodated in Uppsala, one of the oldest cities in Sweden, a former capital and a town of great historic importance and with a University of 25,000 students.

The competitors were housed in beautiful four bed holiday chalets with the best of Scandinavian cuisine from the adjoining Poseidon Restaurant in the enormous multi-discipline Sports Centre, keeping them well fed over the four days.

At the lavish opening ceremony at 8am on Tuesday morning, Deputy Director of Education, Mr. Ulf Gustin welcomed the assembled students and staff to Sweden and wished them successful competition with lifelong friendships and lifelong memories to follow. He spoke of his visit to Stockholm the week before, where he visited the monument to Government Minister, Anna Lind, who had been murdered just one year before in a terrorist atrocity.

"Anna Lind was a very open minded and open-hearted person" he said, "well liked and well respected wherever she went. She spoke loudly about democracy, freedom and independence and the right of all peoples to be fully respected as individuals, regardless of whatever country she was in, or who was listening".

He said that Superschools is an extension of that democracy and freedom and will help to work in that direction. The goal of the Elementary (Secondary)

School in Uppsala was to create international contacts and "Superschools is a great initiative to fulfil this goal".

In the competitions, Aimee Jordan, Kate O'Neill and Sinéad Reynolds got the College off to a fine start with silver medals and high points in the table-tennis, considered St. Augustine's weakest sport. The afternoon Basketball was eventually for them, a battle against the dominant French, but both the girls and the boys teams came out with Bronze Medals to leave the College lying second overall as the first day concluded. This was the start St. Augustine's needed, for they knew from experience that all teams are capable of garnering enough points to make a credible attempt at overall honours.

There was ample time for relaxation and getting to know the other teams after a substantial dinner in the Poseidon and with a 7am call and a long day of competition beckoning, no one was going to stay up too late.

Wednesday brought the rain and though it largely cleared for the soccer competitions in the Bjorkvallsollan School grounds, occasional showers always threatened but did not disrupt competition. The girls got off to a flying start with three straight wins over Pen-y-Dre (Wales), Ellis Guildford (England) and, much to France's Pierre et Marie Curie's surprise against their fancied French team.

On to the final against local girls Sweden, who have traditionally dominated this event and it was only a late opportunist goal which eventually gave them the gold and the extra valuable two points to the locals, leaving the Irish girls with welcome silver.

The boys were less fortunate and were not allowed to get into their stride until their third game when they comprehensively beat Pierre et Marie Curie to book a place in the play-offs. They emerged in fourth place, just out of the medals by a single goal, but pleased with the points reward.

Swimming was generally kind to St. Augustine's, for while the medal places stayed stubbornly out of reach, they recorded many fourth places to enhance their points placing overall.

Pat Moran was loud in his praise for the dignified and Disciplined manner in which all students conducted themselves from the moment they left Duckspool to when they arrived home on Friday evening. "They were a treat to watch" he said, "both in competition, in their social events and in the formal part of the Tournament. Once more our students have done themselves, their families, school and community proud".

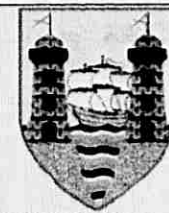
