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Marina Plans Dead In The Water

Dungarvan Town Council's efforts to develop a 100-berth marina in Dungarvan Harbour have gone 'back to the drawing board' after submissions from two British-based developers were rejected.

It's understood the elected members expressed dissatisfaction with the "land-swap" element of the plans at a meeting held behind closed doors prior to the September monthly meeting.

"The proposals we were looking at really hadn't got the support of the elected members," Brian White of the County Development Board said. "The members felt the plans would impact too much on the existing Town Park."

While the council was willing to consider including a parcel of land in other locations both of the developers, R&C Reclamation and HG Construction, ruled this out as it wouldn't return the same profits as a development on Walton Park.

"It's still a priority objective of the council that a marina be provided. But we have to look at alternatives to the proposals that we had," Mr. White said.

PROFIT

The tendering process for the ambitious project started late last year, and three submissions were received. While one was ruled out as unfeasible by Kirk McClure Morton last March, all the developers intended to finance the marina from residential and commercial developments on or close to

Walton's Park.

However, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG), argued that allowing apartments to be built on Walton's Park would have been unforgivable.

"At this stage the development of a marina by a private developer is a non-runner if it involves building on Walton Park," he said. "The cost to the council and the people of the town would be too-high, I believe, if we allowed an apart-

ment block to be built on Walton Park."

"After all, this is an amenity area for the people of Abbey-side and Dungarvan and so to allow it to go ahead would, I believe, be seriously detrimental in the long-term."

"We have seen quite a number of apartment developments go up over the past decade and not all have worked out as well as the council would have hoped. The poor design of the

apartments at the Lookout being an example of this."

"At this stage, the council just couldn't afford to get it wrong," he added.

"I wouldn't totally rule out the idea of a marina as we may yet see one developed in another part of the harbour, but right now I believe a marina involving the development of Walton's Park is off the agenda. It would be unforgivable to de-

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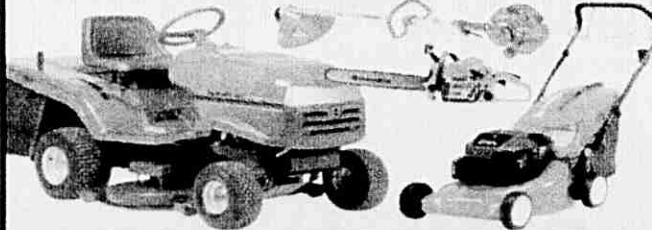


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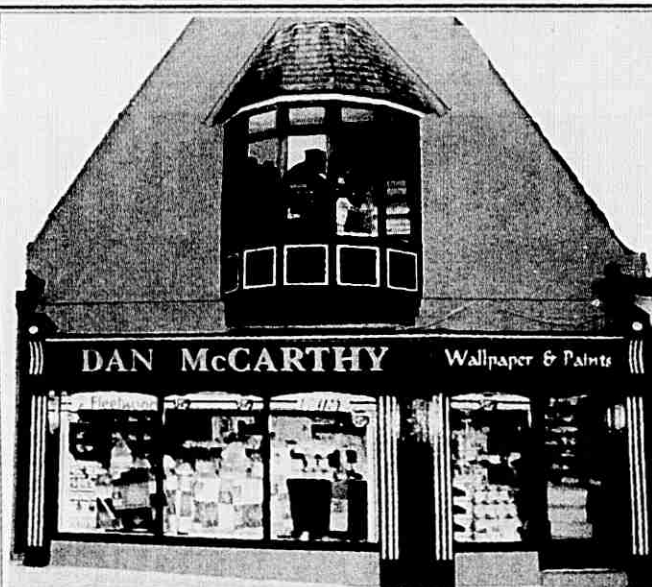

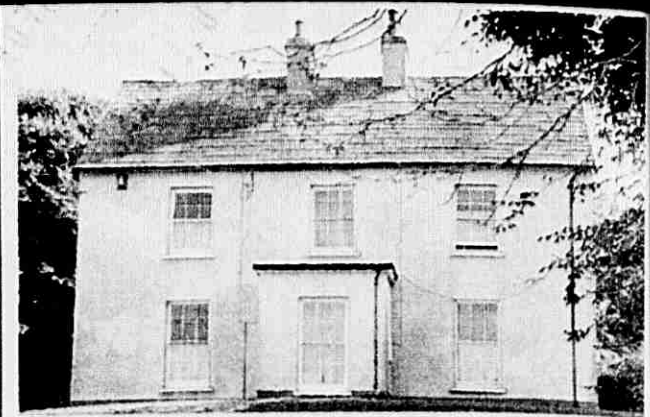
DUNGARVAN CAMERA CLUB

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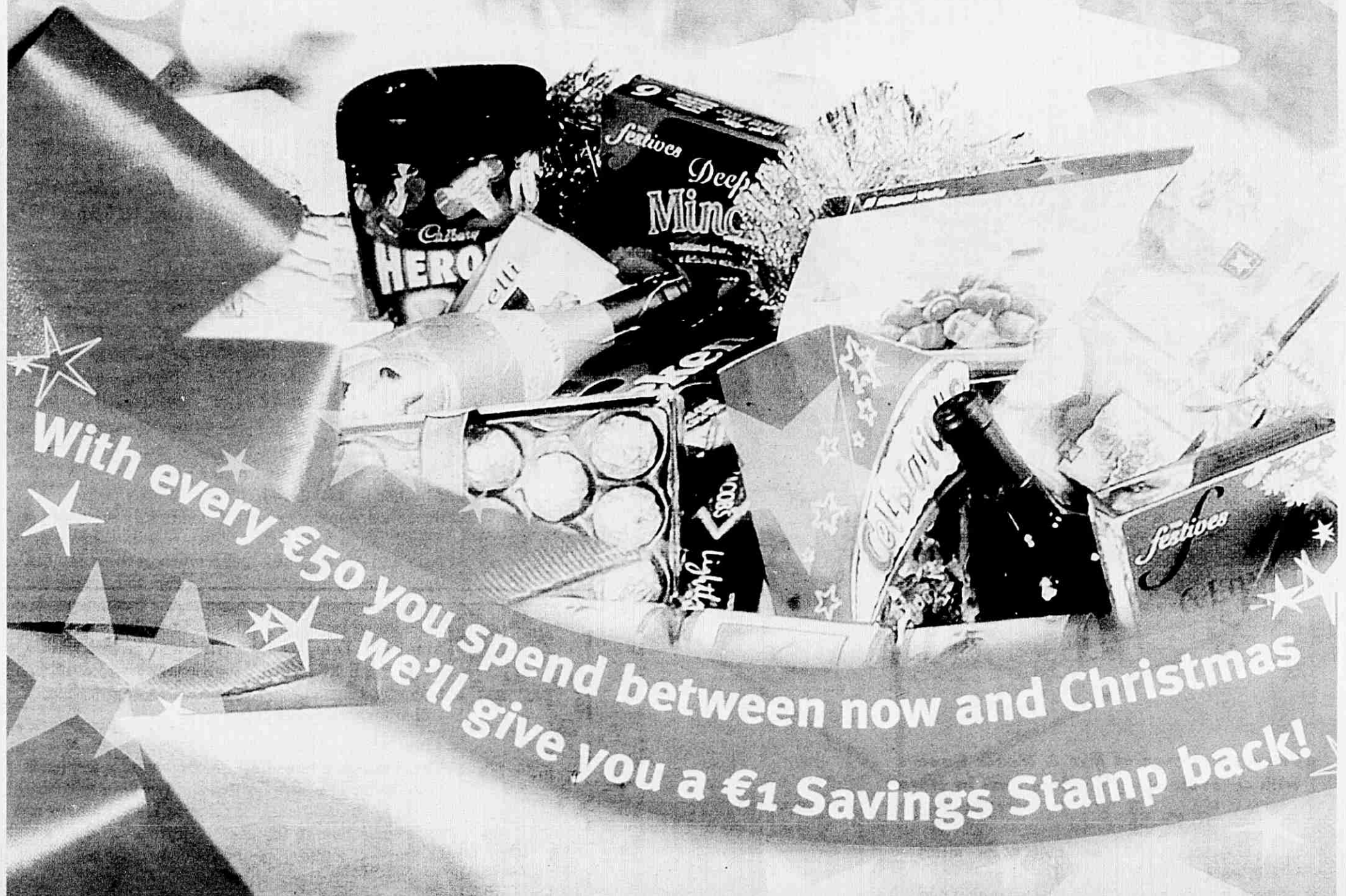
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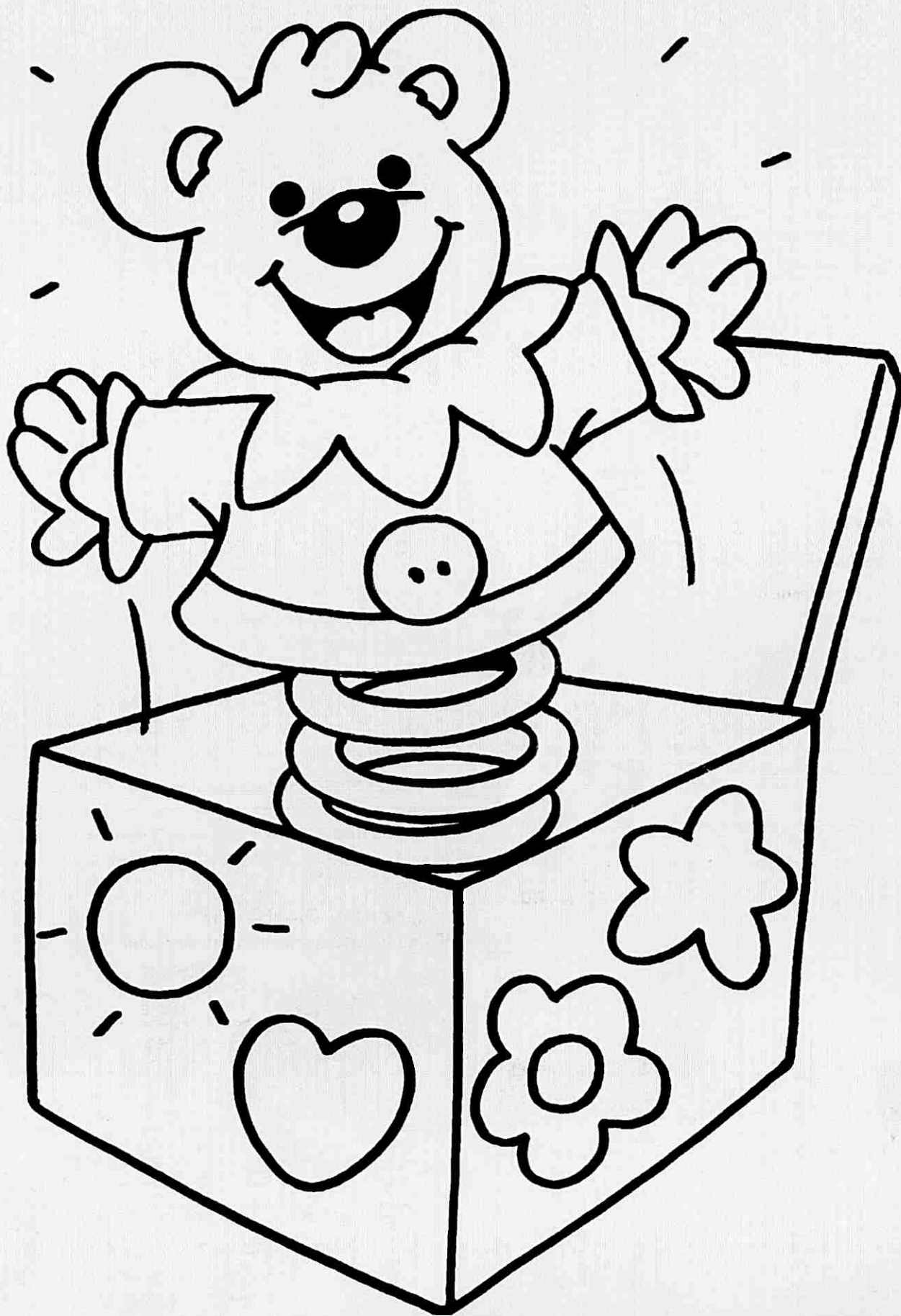


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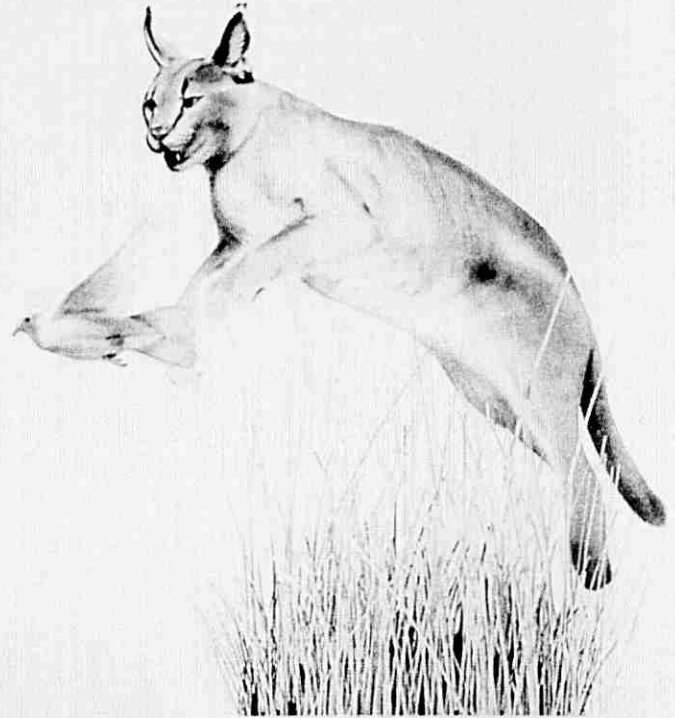

DEADLY HUNTERS OF THE DESERT

The caracal, sometimes called the Persian lynx, lives in the deserts of North Africa and Western Asia. One of the striking features of the caracal is its long, tufted ears. It hunts mainly at dusk, and its prey includes birds, reptiles, sheep, mice, goats and deer. It is a superb runner and can even outrun the swift gazelle for a while.



The caracal has an unusual way of hunting birds. It springs high up into the air to catch a bird in flight. It can leap 2m (6ft) from the ground and can even kill a large bird, such as an eagle, with a swipe from its strong paw.

Cheetas Are The Fastest Animals

From standing still a cheetah can reach a running speed of 70kph (43mph) within two seconds. It has a top speed of 96kph (60mph), making it the fastest animal in the world. The cheetah is also known as the hunting leopard, and it has been trained by people for hunting, for a very long time. Hunting with cheetahs was once a popular pastime of Indian princes.

Jackals Steal Meat From Lions

Another fearsome desert hunter is the jackal. Jackals are members of the dog family and work as a pack when hunting. Jackals are found throughout Asia and Africa. They spend much of their day hiding in the undergrowth. In addition to hunting for food, Jackals will eat carrion or the remains of animals killed by the big cats. Jackals also steal meat from lions. One jackal will distract the lion while another quickly drags the meat away while the lion is not looking. The jackal pack then enjoys their stolen meal together later.

The Cat That Uses Camouflage

The sand cat makes full use of camouflage when it is hunting. The cat's fur is a sandy colour with dark markings on its head, legs and tail. This makes it hard to be seen in the deserts of Africa and Asia that are its home. Keeping its body close to the ground, it can stalk animals, such as gerbils, without being seen, pouncing on its prey at the last minute.

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A NICE CUP OF TEA

The medicinal value of the country's favourite brew

The tea we are familiar with comes from the chinese herb *Camellia sinensis* and has been drunk in China for over 3,000 years. The leaves of the plant are dried and fermented to make black tea. Green tea, which is becoming increasingly popular, is made from the unfermented leaves of the same plant and has a lighter taste.

Tea plays a central role in the lives of many Irish people, but not many people are aware of its medicinal value: It contains antioxidants which help to protect against inflammatory conditions such as arthritis, heart disease, strokes and cancer. It also contains caffeine (in smaller quantities than coffee) which provides a gentle lift when one is feeling weary.

However, as with many of the good things in life, tea is something which should be taken in moderation only: the caffeine content of tea, which may be useful as a pick-me-up during the day, can also cause sleeping problems if drunk to excess or taken too late at night. Tea is also a diuretic which increases urination: another way in which it may interfere with sleep! People who drink a lot of tea during the day may find themselves waking up in the night to use the toilet, and loss of too much fluid can lead to dehydration and headaches.

Tea also contains high levels of tannins, the substances used to tan leather and make it tough and impermeable. Tannins have a similar action on the lining of the gastrointestinal system, forming a protective barrier (just think of the film that forms on the inside of the teapot or cup!). This can be useful in cases of diarrhoea where a cup of black tea helps to protect the lining of the gut from irritation, thus reducing intestinal activity, but it can also cause a number of problems:

The reduced intestinal activity may cause constipation in susceptible individuals. Drinking numerous cups of tea throughout the day, particularly at mealtimes, also reduces the absorption of many important nutrients such as vitamins, iron and protein. Reduced absorption of vitamin B1 (which is essential for the nervous system) can lead to muscle weakness, while reduced absorption of iron can lead to anaemia.

The custom of adding milk to tea reduces the risk of such problems as it neutralises some of the tannins, but it would be wise to limit tea drinking to one or two cups per day between meals, particularly in cases of illness or pregnancy. Most herbal teas such as dandelion, nettle and chamomile are packed full of antioxidants but are low in tannins and therefore offer an ideal alternative for those who drink a lot of tea throughout the day.

 velop apartments on Walton's Park."

100 BERTH MARINA
 R&C Reclamation of Durham and HG Construction Ltd of Hertfordshire lodged submissions to construct a 100-berth marina.

R&C Reclamation were planning to construct the marina at the north side of the harbour, and to reclaim land in two areas - in the north and east side - and on the river close to the council offices.

To finance the project, they proposed an "unspecified" development between Walton Park and the reclaimed land, and another unspecified development on previously reclaimed land now used for car parking close to the council of-

ices.
 HG Construction, meanwhile, proposed to construct a marina close to the Causeway, and fund it through a land exchange.

The development would have involved approximately 48 apartments in a three-storey block on Walton's Park close to the Tennis Club.

After the rejection of the two submissions, Mr. White said the Council would now look at alternative ways of generating funding for the project.

Meanwhile the decision to hold the meeting "in committee" was criticised by Cllr. Geoghegan who said the public had the right to be informed about an important issue.

House Prices Rise Beyond Critical — Mansfield

Sinn Fein Councillor, Brendan Mansfield lashed out at the Government for what he claims is its continuing failure to curtail spiralling house prices.

Making his comments in the wake of the leading economist, Jim Power's prediction that costs will rise by a further 10% this year the Sinn Fein county and town councillor claimed that the situation has gone beyond critical and is now in the stages of lunacy.

"Just recently it was revealed that 40% of borrowing last year (80 billion euro) could be put down to mortgages. Irish people are already up to their eyeballs in debt. If house prices rise by a further 10% as the economist has predicted, I can't imagine who will be able to afford a house in Ireland."

"The Government needs to get a handle on the housing market. People in Dublin on an average wage of roughly 27,000 euros are expected to come up with 311,000 euros for a new house, or 362,000 euros for a second hand house (Government figures)."

Cllr. Mansfield went on to call on Charlie McCreavy's successor as Minister for Finance to reinstate the First Time Buyers Grant.

"Then the Government should tackle land speculators and 'rip-off' property developers. Local authorities must receive increased and sustained funding to provide housing with a target of supplying suitable accommodation within two years for 70% of applicants on the waiting lists.

"And finally the Government must enshrine the right to housing in the constitution. Sinn Fein is committed to leading the charge against the Government's inadequate and incompetent policies on housing."

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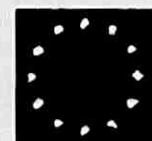

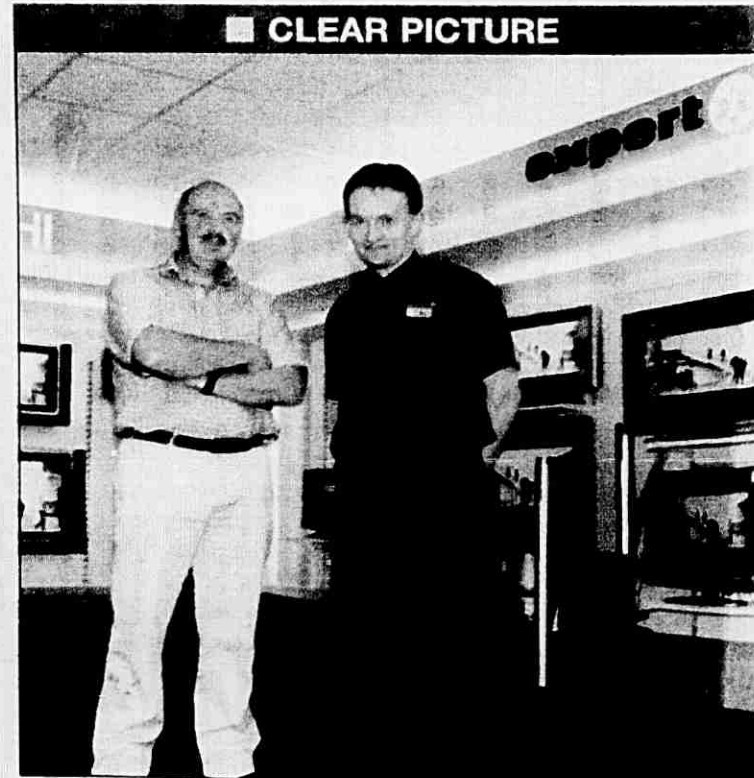

Old Parish Road "A Constant Peril" For Motorists

The Department of Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs has again been pressed to aid Waterford County Council in funding realignment works for one of the main routes linking Ring and Old Parish.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair (Lab) said the bends between Crossaire an Fhíodóra and Páirc CLCG Uí Shíocháin on the Baile na nGall to Old Parish road are "acute to the point of being a constant peril" to pedestrians and motorists.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, who previously contested the Community, Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs

designation of the main Dungarvan to Heilbhic road as the only "strategic" route in the Waterford Gaeltacht, said such a singular designation leaves the council short on funds.

He added: "Some eur1.5 to eur 2 million in co-funded works, between the Dept. of Community, Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs and the local authority, will have been spent on the

main road from Maoil a Chóime to Heilbhic.

"The section from Crossaire Mhollaí to Meanscoil San Nioclás has seen great strides in terms of new pavements and, what some may regard as exceedingly generous, the provision of new public lighting. This, whilst other parts of the parish go unlit."

Road widening from Crossaire an Fhíodóra onwards has also proceeded at Baile Uí Raghallaigh.

"At the same time local children continue to come and go throughout the year to the Gaelic field, negotiating treacherous bends whose removal are apparently beyond the resources of Waterford County Council," Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair said.

"I look forward to my next opportunity, in my role as an Udarás Board member for the area, to meeting the Minister for Community, Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs Eamon Ó Cuiv TD. I will be reminding him of the necessity, as I see it, of spreading dividends more evenly for roads in the Ring and Old Parish areas."

Plans For New Roundabouts On Display

Proposed new roundabouts at Devonshire Bridge and the Civic Offices in Dungarvan have gone on public display and are open to submissions and observations, the local authority heard.

A decision on the plans is due in mid-October, when all submissions are received

and a report is drawn up by the Town Clerk and the County Manager.

"The latest date for submissions and observations, relating to the proper planning and development of the area is 5pm on the 15th of October, 2004," Acting Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty informed the members.

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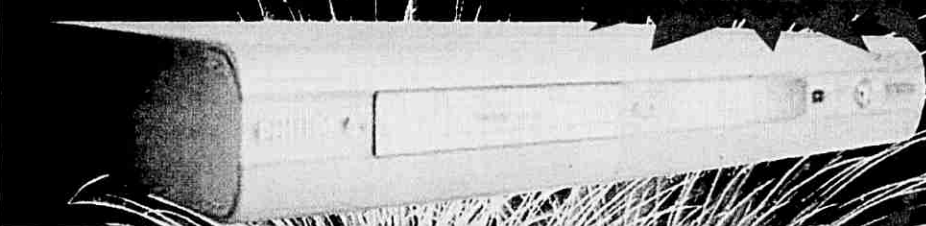

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Gardening is an easy language

If you are new to gardening you will have noticed gardeners have their own words and phrases. Sometimes it can sound like a different language, but to take the mystery out of "garden talk", here we are some of the most common terms.

Acid and alkaline - An acid soil is one that is deficient in lime, and an alkaline soil one that has enough lime. Most vegetables do well in a soil that is slightly alkaline.

Aphids - A general term for greenfly, blackfly, whitefly and the grey cabbage aphid.

Blanching - The practice of excluding light from the stems and/or leaves of a vegetable to improve the flavour.

Blind - A 'blind' plant is one without a growing point, sometimes the case among the brassicas.

Bolting - Vegetables run to seed before their time are said to 'bolt'. This sometimes happens with lettuce, particularly after transplanting in a dry period, and also affects beetroot and carrots.

Brassicas - The term for greens and Brussels sprouts. Swedes, turnips, kohlrabi and radishes are also members of the brassica family.

Catch crop - A crop grown quickly between the rows of a slower growing crops.

Compost - Manure made by the rotting of waste vegetable matter. The word is also used to describe a particular medium for seed sowing or potting.

Cordon - A method of training fruit, especially apples and pears, that keeps plants to a single stem.

Dibber - A steel pointed stick, 30cm long used for making holes for plants.

Drill - A narrow furrow, made with the corner of

a hoe, into which seeds are sown at intervals.

F1 Hybrid - A first cross of two plants that have been inbred to 'fix' certain desirable characteristics. In vegetables, F1 hybrids are usually of better colour and shape than non-hybrids, and are also more uniform in size. Seed saved from F1 hybrids do not usually produce plants with similar qualities.

Foliar feed - Feeding a plant through the leaves by spraying or watering with a proprietary solution

Green manuring - Growing a crop such as rape or mustard to dig into the soil to improve the humus content.

Humus - The dark, residual material of decayed vegetable matter or animal manures.

Liquid manure - This can be made by putting some manure in a hessian bag and suspending it in a tub of water. Leave it for several days, stirring it well, you should dilute it until it is the colour of weak tea.

Loam - Ideal garden soil - neither too clayey or too sandy.

Mulch - A layer of compost, lawn mowings, peat, well-rotted manure, bark chippings or black polythene put between rows of vegetables and border

plants.

Set - A small, immature bulb - an onion, for example - planted to grow on.

Spit - A spade's depth of soil. To dig 'one spit deep' is to turn the soil over to the depth of the spade.

Stopping - Halting the growth of a plant by pinching out the growing point. This is done with tomatoes when the plants have set as many trusses of fruit as are likely to ripen.

Tilth - Soil worked down to receive a crop. 'A fine tilth' is a soil that has been raked down fine and even.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Start to plant evergreen shrubs
From now until mid-October is the ideal time for planting hardy evergreen shrubs lifted from open ground.

You cannot do this if the weather is very hot or the ground is dry, but neither condition is likely to continue for long at this time of the year.

Plant firmly and stake all big specimens. Later on, if winds are very cold and drying, place temporary wind-breaks between stakes to protect the shrubs, particularly on the north and east sides.

Plant violets in frames
Violets growing outdoors since April should now be removed to frames for winter flowering. The frames must stand in a sunny and fairly sheltered position and be filled with good loamy soil to within 20cm of the glass. Plant the violet clumps almost touching one another. Water them freely, but do not close the frames yet.

Plant rooted carnation layers
Carnation layers pegged down at the end of July should be well rooted by this time. Scrape away a little of the soil and see how things are.

If there are plenty of fibrous roots around the cut area, sever the layers from the parent plants and a few days later lift them - each with a good ball of soil - and transfer them to their flowering quarters or pot them in 10-13 cm pots, place them in a frame, and plant them out next March.

Pick all tomatoes
Outdoor tomatoes are not likely to ripen any more on the plants now, so it is as well to pick all the fruits that are showing some trace of colour and stand them in a sunny window to ripen.

Absolutely green fruits can be made into chutney. The summer tomatoes under glass will be coming to an end and as every inch of greenhouse space is likely to be needed in the next few weeks, it is a good idea to clear these, treating them in the same way as outdoor fruits.

Dungarvan Shopping Centre Expected to Open in November

The multi-million euro Dungarvan Shopping Centre, which is expected to provide an injection of 125,000 euros in wages alone into the local economy is expected to open in the first week of November.

Giving an update on the development at a public meeting organised by the Chamber of Commerce, Managing Director of developers, Clancy Construction, Billy Clancy, said an opening date will be announced in the next few weeks.

While it was initially hoped that the shopping centre would open in mid-October, Dunnes Stores is to open four other shopping centres around the country and it would be unfeasible to open the centre in Dungarvan next month, Mr. Clancy said.

In a presentation, the Managing Director of the Thurles-based developers said the centre will:

- provide full and part-time employment for up to 300 people
- improve the physical environment of the town
- strengthen its economic base
- compete with new shopping centres in other towns
- provide variety and make Dungarvan an attractive shopping destination

"I've always taken the view that Dungarvan has a lot going for it," he added. "With the right approach that combines its tourism and shopping strengths, I believe Dungarvan can be a smaller version of Kilkenny."

Together with the main shopping centre, the four-screen cineplex is scheduled to open next July or August, a technology park is proposed, a site is

proposed for the location of the decentralised Ordnance Survey office, and urban housing will also be constructed.

However, the link road from the Civic Offices to the centre is not expected to be opened in time for the shopping centre, while the construction has started on the pedestrian link and fronting units from O'Connell Street.

Mr. Clancy said the shopping centre will stem the leakage of business from the town - which currently stands at around 60% - and attract in visitors from other areas.

NEW STORES

Manager of Dungarvan Shopping Centre, Tim Foley said twenty-eight stores will be opened with the shopping centre.

He said these will include national brand names such as anchor tenants Dunnes Stores, Eason's, Unicare, Cribbins Bakery, Sasha, Heartbeat City, Benetton, Sherry Fitzgerald and First Active.

While contracts for all the units have not been signed yet, Mr. Clancy added, "tremendous interest" has been shown.

"Dungarvan Shopping Centre will be marketed extensively around the region," Mr. Foley said. "This promotion will be centred very much on promoting the town of Dungarvan as well as the shopping centre."

THE THURLES EXPERIENCE

Director Of Thurles Chamber of Commerce, Tim Looby, earlier outlined the experience of Thurles when a shopping centre opened in that town, and advised existing businesses to be pro-active in marketing and modernising their properties.

Despite initial problems experienced by businesses outside

the centre in the first few months, the experience has been overwhelmingly positive. Over 4 to 5 million euros has been generated into Thurles, property values have greatly increased.

Mr. Looby said business in Thurles devised grouped advertising campaigns, and ran pricing promotions within their shops.

"Now businesses are trading

alongside the shopping centre and working together in promoting visitors and attracting business into the town," Mr. Looby said.

While Dungarvan Shopping Centre will be around 30% larger than Thurles he said Dungarvan has a big advantage over Thurles in that it is centrally located and will provide 600 parking spaces.

Update Given On Dungarvan Broadband Ring

CUSTOMERS CHARGED €7,000 DROP-CONNECTION FEE

Customers opting to connect into the new Broadband Ring in Dungarvan can expect to pay up to seven-thousand euros for a drop connection, Sales Director of E-Net Ltd, Ben McCahill said.

Speaking at a meeting hosted by Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce on Thursday night last, Mr. McCahill said to connect from a business to the ring would need a dig of a day's duration costing between 5,000 to 7,000 euros.

It's also assumed that businesses and residences in Abbeyside would be unable to

connect to the broadband ring. The multi-million euro project - one of twenty Metropolitan Area Networks around the country - was created by the Government in an effort to transform the telecoms market in Ireland.

Question marks have been repeatedly raised about the viability of the project as Dungarvan was the first town in the country with broadband and has one of the most modern internet services available through Cablesurf.

However, listing the advantages of the new system, Mr. McCahill said it will provide

open access to fibre, new products, distance independent pricing and a competitive free carrier market. The new network is also capable of carrying telecoms, internet, television, telematics and CCTV.

"Broadband is as vital to a site as roads, water or electricity," the e-net sales director said.

E-Net, a Limerick based company, will manage the marketing, maintenance and operation of the MAN's on behalf of the Irish Government, which Mr. Cahill said would provide 24/7 pro-active fault monitoring and management.

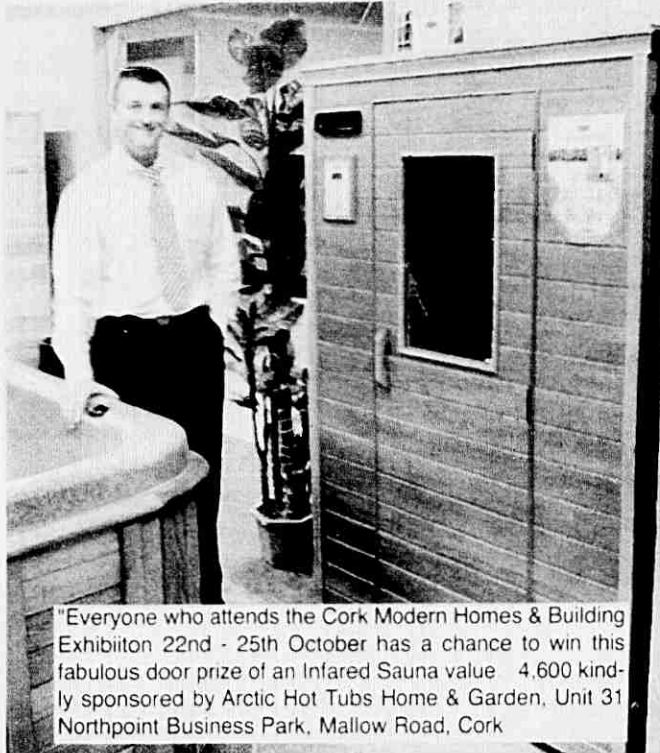

Dungarvan Is Tidying Up Its Act

Dungarvan's significant improvement in marks in the Tidy Towns Competition was warmly welcomed by members of the Town Council.

Marks increased from 228 last year to this year's total of 236 out of a maximum score of 300. However, a number of elected members urged for more community participation in the tidy town's effort.

According to the adjudicators who decide the total score on the basis of nine headings, the general impression was that the work carried out by the local authority is most impressive.

"However, it is equally important to get as much of the local community involved as possible."

They also mentioned that the buildings on the Square were presented to a high standard.

"There are some fine examples of traditional shopfronts and unusual plasterwork throughout the town. Of particular note were Robert Merry's and James Kiely's,"

the report said.

Acting County Manager, Peter Carey said an increase of 8 marks for a town of Dungarvan's size was significant. He complimented the staff of the local authority for their work, but pointed to the achievement of Lismore and the huge community effort behind the victory as the benchmark for all the county's towns and villages.

He said Lismore has over 200 voluntary litter pickers and those are the standards needed to make that remarkable achievement possible. He said the Town Council needs to look at the issues highlighted by the judges and work on them, and said in particular that it maybe the time to look again at the possibility of pedestrianisation of Davitts Quay.

Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said making strides in the competition is a "slow process". He said it was a challenge but further improvements can be achieved.

roundabout until a long-term solution to the difficulties being caused by its five accesses is found.

Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab) asked that the hedging be cut back as the views for motorists is limited.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab) said the problems are being caused because the roundabout is serving five roads. He called for the problems at the roundabout to be urgently addressed. He said with new housing developments in the area traffic will increase and the roundabout should be reduced to four roads to alleviate the problem.

Cllr. Wright said practical interim measures needed to be taken until a long-term solution to the problem is found.

Mayor Michael O'Riordan (Indp) said a solution may be on the way from the National Roads Authority. He said he was aware negotiations were underway but he said he didn't want to pre-empt those discussions.

Nominations To Committees Decided

Dungarvan Town Council will be represented on four Strategic Policy Committees, which act as discussion bodies that "formulate policy" and make "recommendations" to Waterford County Council.

Cllr. Fred Forsey (FG) was nominated onto the Environment Policy Committee; Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) on

Economic Development and Planning Policy; Cllr. Ann Marie Rossiter (FF) on Housing and Community Services while Mayor Michael O'Riordan will represent the local authority on Cultural and Heritage.

Expenses for attendance are footed by Waterford County Council.

Meanwhile, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) and Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) will represent the Town Council on the Vocational Education Committee while the Mayors of Dungarvan, Lismore and Tramore Town

Councils will decide on a rota for representation on the County Development Board.

Meanwhile, planning permission has also been granted to McDonald's Restaurant for a free standing 'drive thru' restaurant off the N25 Cork Road in Dungarvan.

He said other people coming into the town didn't know where to get parking disc, and said the dispensers which indicate how long a car is parked in the area would be a better system.

BRILLIANT FACILITIES IN RETIREMENT VILLAGE

The Golden Meadows, Retirement Village at the Burgery, is well on schedule for an opening date in December 2004. On a 5 acre beautifully landscaped site it contains a 64 bedroom Nursing Home, 34 one bedroom apartments and 28 two bedroom houses. SECOND PROJECT

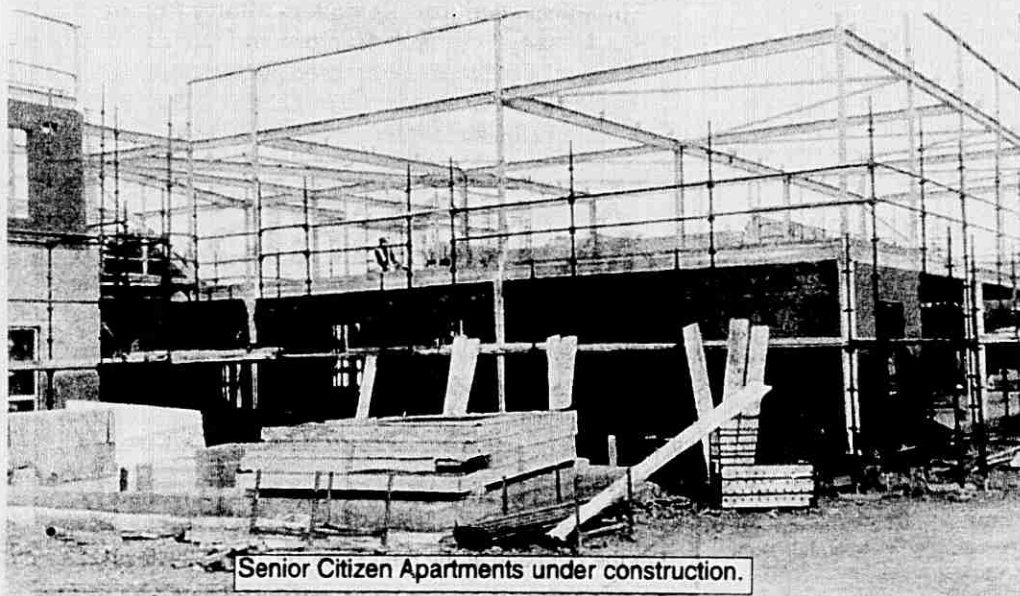

McGRATH'S CASTLE

Around 1900 much of the ancient castle of the McGraths had collapsed and by 1924 Edmond Keohan in his 'History of Dungarvan' states that the castle had almost entirely fallen away. In the late 1960's portion of the walls still stood erect but this ruin was declared dangerous and was completely demolished by the appropriate authorities.

Donal McGrath, the first owner of the castle is buried inside the ruins of the old Abbey located nearby and his tomb can be seen under the north window with his name inscribed on it.

Little is known of the McGrath's except that they had large estates in the Parish of Modeligo. The Castle of Sledy was built by Philip McGrath in 1628. The McGrath's were always very helpful towards religious orders and the family helped to establish many monasteries throughout the county. There is a highly ornamented tomb in Lismore Cathedral of which only part of the Latin inscription round it can be deciphered. However this shows it to be the tomb of John McGrath and his wife Katherine Thorne 1548.

Laura and Susan will be playing Roscommon, a county with a lot of titles in the girls game. Laura will be hoping to make it a double as she won the 40x20 title last May with Marianne Meehan. Susan is a good strong player and no doubt both will give a good account of themselves.

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DAIRYING

Feel that Body! There is only one way to be sure of the condition score of your cows and that is by handling them in a crush. Cows should be condition scored six times each year and now.

Early October is the time for the first one to ensure the body score (B.S.) next year is correct (3.25 per-calving). The herd target for drying off is 3.0, ranging from 2.75 to 3.25. Cows that are B.S. of 2.75 or less must be dried off early and/or fed meal to achieve target condition score at normal drying off at 7-8 weeks before calving. High yielding cows will find it extremely difficult to put on body weight in a short dry period and also these cows tend not to put on adequate body fat in late lactation because they divert the extra feed into producing more milk. Therefore, give thin cows 10-12 weeks dry period.

The benefits are great: (a) the cow is more resistant to health disorders, (b) milk yield will be 50-110 gallons higher next year, and (c) fertility will be 16% better.

You must handle cows and feel the fat cover on the pin bones, loin and ribs. Once your "eye is in" you will, with confidence, be able to visually score cows in the field. But make sure to act now with thin cows - it is vital.

Autumn Grass

Grass tetany control is necessary again as we move into October. If no concentrate is being fed, pasture dusting will be necessary.

Autumn Meals

It may come as a surprise to you that the best response to meal feeding of cows is achieved in the Autumn (not Spring or Summer when we waste meal). Therefore, if your quota position allows, feed 2-2.5 kgs of meal per cow per day, but feed 1-2 kgs more to high yielding cows. Because profit margins are increased by 0.203 cents per litre over total quota (€500 for 50,000 gallons) by milking on to the 15th December instead of drying off on 1st December, farmers should not feed meals now if it forces them to early drying off because of quota limitations.

CATTLE

High Quality Replacements Essential for Profitability

In the emerging new EU beef market, all cattle systems will at least have to cover direct costs from market returns. In the past, weaning production showed good market-based margins, but these were masked by a substantial element of premia payments rolled into the price of the male weanling. From 2005 onwards, weaning prices will be based on supply and demand in the market place and since the fixed premium element will be removed the issue of quality will come more into focus.

Up to now there was up to €540 available in premium payments over the lifetime of a steer regardless of its quality or meat-producing potential. Inevitably, calves, weanlings and stores will suffer proportionate reduction in prices to take account of the changed support payment system. Weanling and store producers will have to look again at costs and output value in order to mitigate the effects of removal of animal linked premia. One avenue that will be essential in this regard is the production of high meat yielding stock for the Continental market either sold live or as beef from accelerated finishing systems at home.

Other producers may decide on early maturing traditional beef breeds that require less labour and management and possibly lower production costs. In any case the next two years will be a time of analysis and decision making on drystock farms.

Selecting Breeding Stock

In recent years there has been a large increase in the amount of Continental blood in the suckler herd. Anecdotal evidence from Mart managers and farmers suggests that this is now showing up in the quality of weanlings offered for sale and there is also some evidence that the proportion of U & R grade is beginning to increase. However, in the move towards better conformation and growth rates, some maternal traits have been neglected.

Fertility, calving ease and milk yield have gone backwards. If maternal traits are not kept to the fore in selecting replacements then any improvement in individual animal value will be more than lost in lower weaning rate and weaning weight. Where replacements are homebred they should be the result of a plan that aims to produce crossbreds or progeny of a maternally tested sire. In the absence of a structured programme the alternative is to select breeding females from the weaning corp. Select as far as possible from cows that produce good weaning weights for age which reflects growth rate and milk supply in the dam. Selecting crossbreds should in general maintain fertility. Keep an eye on functional traits also such as feet and legs, udder and teat shape as well as the temperament of the dam, although in commercial breeding there is no guarantee that these traits will carry through to the daughters.

MAIZE: Maize Harvesting

Crops are much bulkier this year. Yields should be up following the good start crops got last May. Earlier sown crops on the better sites are now ready for harvesting. Other crops will need another 2-3 weeks. In any event there is not much to be gained by delaying harvesting beyond October 20th approximately.

Some crops are affected to varying degrees by Eyespot which withers the leaves. Severe Eyespot will prevent cobs from reaching their potential. Check your crop immediately as Eyespot can affect crops rapidly. If more than half of the plant is affected, the crop should be harvested.

FARMING LEADER

€100 - €103/t AVAILABLE FOR GRAIN

Waterford IFA Grain Chairman Bill Shanahan has said that a number of farmers who are finalising their accounts with merchants are receiving up to 100/t for barley and 103/t for wheat at 20% moisture exclusive of VAT.

Mr. Shanahan said "Individual deals are being done on moistures, transport allowances and additional payments to bring up the base price for wheat and barley to over 100/t. Merchants are fearful that many growers will scale back production if the physiological barrier of 100/t is not achieved. Already a number of growers have cancelled orders for winter barley seed, because the prices being paid for grain do not cover the cost of production".

The Chairman said "It is becoming abundantly evident to many growers at this stage that producing grain, particularly off conacre does not pay and that if farmers want to safeguard their single farm payments they may restructure their entitlements".

Standard Costings Under Farm Investment Schemes to Increase - IFA

Waterford IFA Rural Development Committee Chairman Rosemary Kennedy has said that following representation by IFA over the past number of months, the Department of Agriculture has now confirmed that the standard costings used to determine grant under the Farm Waste Management and Dairy Hygiene Schemes are being increased.

Mrs. Kennedy said that a costings increase is long overdue as the costs of building materials and labour has increased significantly in recent times due to

buoyancy in the building industry and general inflation. The increases range by between 10% and 15% for various items used to determine grant aid.

The Waterford IFA Rural Development Chairman said the new costings will apply from September 13th. The last costing increase was December 2002 and he called on the Department of Agriculture to more regularly update the costings as the grant aid does not in many cases represent the 40% grant rate available under the schemes.

SINGLE FARM PAYMENT MODULATION FUNDS MUST BE RETURNED TO FARMERS - DEASY

IFA Deputy President Ruadhri Deasy has said that modulation funds, which will be deducted from farmers' Single Farm Payments, must be fully returned to farmers through measures under the rural development regulations.

Mr. Deasy was speaking following a meeting with Department of Agriculture officials in Dublin today where IFA set out detailed proposals for the use of modulated funds through rural development measures for livestock, sheep, dairy and grain farmers. Up to 35m will eventually be deducted from the Single Farm Payment and it is vital that through matching Government funds farmers can benefit through practical farm schemes.

The IFA Deputy President said the IFA's target for livestock modulation funds is suckler cow producers which is the main element of the IFA livestock proposals with a particular focus on improving animal welfare.

At the meeting representatives from the IFA Dairy, Livestock,

Sheep and Grain Committees outlined specific details of each sectors proposals to the Department of Agriculture. Following today's meeting further detailed discussions are set to take place over the next two weeks to finalise specific proposals for each sector.

Mr. Deasy told Department of Agriculture officials that use of modulation funds is an opportune way to recognize the valuable contribution farmers make to the environment, animal welfare and food quality.

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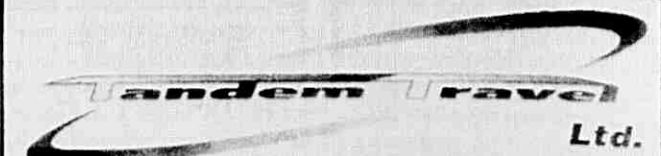

Homeopathic remedies are created through a very precise process called potentiation, in which the original substance is diluted many hundreds of times. So dilute are the final doses used in homeopathy that they are completely non-toxic and, therefore, safe for anyone to take, from children to pregnant mums to old folk. The remedies can also be safely taken alongside conventional medicine without interfering with them in any way.

And the all-important question: does it work? Well, thousands of people in this country alone are claiming it does. Its popularity is certainly on the rise and the profession is increasingly being recognized and absorbed into mainstream healthcare throughout Europe.

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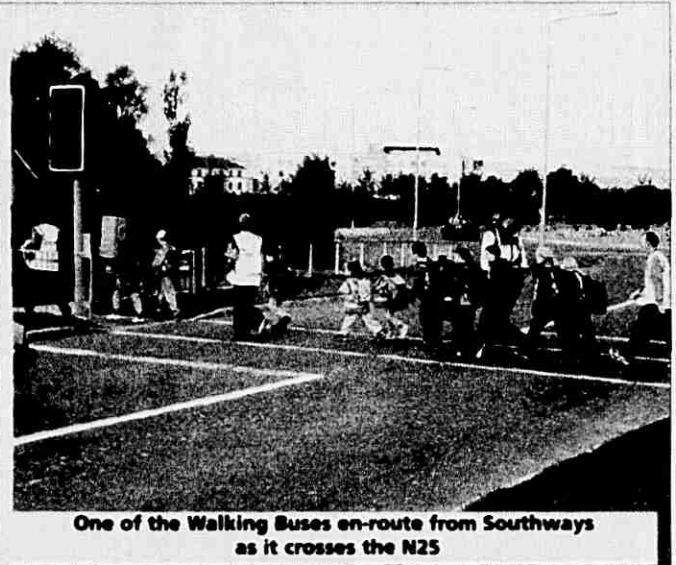


'Be Cool - Walk to School'

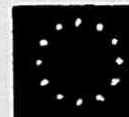

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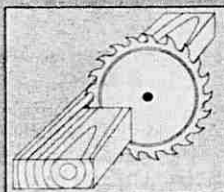
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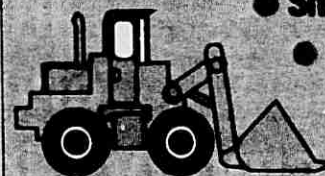

AN APPRECIATION JIM CARRIG 1932-2004

When we come to describe the life of Jim Carrig we use terms like honesty, integrity, a perfect gentleman, a great neighbour, a marvellous husband, a man of deep faith. He was all of these, but the two words uppermost in my mind are Community and Leadership.

Jim was a natural leader, and always led from the front, quietly and without fuss. From Creeves in West Limerick he went to England in the 50s, where both Jim and Peg were very active in the Irish Clubs. When they came to Knockanore in 1965 they immediately became involved in local community affairs.

Jim was a loyal follower of the GAA at all levels and supported Limerick, Waterford and the Shamrocks in good and bad times. The blue and white and the green and white flags flew in the front garden, the Limerick flag doubling as a Shamrock one depending on who was playing at the time. Jim was acting secretary for the Shamrocks at one time and until his death, was an active promoter of the club lotto.

In the early 70s when a guild of Muintir na Tire was formed in the parish with the help of Fr O'Byrne, Jim of course became involved, and over the years was

a key figure in the development of the association, at local, county and national level, quietly, no fuss. He served in every position in the local guild and then moved on to the Waterford County Federation of Muintir na Tire and spent many a long night driving to every local hall in the county and beyond trying to solve the problems of the world.

He then represented the county on the National Executive of Muintir na Tire and gained the respect of all his colleagues.

When the Blackwater Muintir Drama Group was formed from the Kilwatermoy Dramatic Society, Jim came in to his own, his acting skills and dedication to detail inspired us all and went a long way in bringing the group to an All Ireland Drama Final in Loughrea.

His sense of fun and comedy were legend and he was never stuck for a party piece. When Jim came on stage, you knew that the show was in safe hands.

In the early 70s the first Fete was held in Strancally and Jim helped to organise it, and he has been involved in every Fete since then.

For a time he served on the Promotion and Development Com-

mittee of Tallow Area Credit Union and in the past few years he had his own very popular programme on Youghal Local Radio.

A MAN OF MANY TALENTS

That is just a synopsis of his time in our parish, as during his life he was practically a reference point for nearly every activity which took place.

He was well known and respected over a wide area, and one particular "Bachelor in Trouble" from Kilrossanty would always greet me with...

(Tell me, and how is Carrig up there?)

On Sunday week last, Jim died as he had lived, quietly, no fuss.

He was looking forward to watching the All Ireland on the telly but as it turned out, I am sure that he had a better vantage point than any of the people in Croke Park.

May I take this opportunity to offer the sympathy of the whole community to Peg and to all his family and friends.

Jim is gone now but we know that he is in safe hands, and as long as those who knew him are alive, he will not be forgotten.

May the sod of Knockanore rest lightly on him and may he rest in peace.

"Whose Number Will Be Up?" Wonders Cllr.

With Thursday January 20th 2005 now set as the official changeover date of all speed limits signage from imperial miles to kilometres, a Dungarvan Town Councillor has expressed fears that a blunt alteration could lead to problems in built up areas and the outskirts of such towns as the one he represents.

Cllr. Ó Fiachra Ó Céilleachair says the present plans of the Dept. of Transport include a provision that all red rimmed "40" signs for a 40-mile limit be simply amended to proclaim "65" to demark a 65 kilometre zone.

In the absence of a strategy to introduce changes through dual mile/kilometre signage on a phased basis, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says there is potential for confusion and some resultant dangers on the roads.

Drawing attention to a subject he feels deserves more careful reflection, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said: "The UK have no plans at all to alter their signage to kilometres. It will leave Ireland as a unique right hand driving EU jurisdiction, where speed limits will be communicated only in kilometres. Effectively, the island will have two different systems of road usage. Ironically, political parties across the divide in Northern Ireland have united in criticism of the Irish Government's plans in this respect."

"Further south, where counties such as Waterford host a significant amount of traffic emanating from Britain, one must be mindful of the effects in store from the appearance of "65" signs instead of "40" ones from January next onwards on the ways in and out of Dungarvan. Take those at the Burgery, Duckspool, Kilrush and the Youghal Road as examples. Indeed traffic approaching those new "65" signs will continue and meet "50" signs (which would previously be ones for a 30 mile limit) at the likes of Western Bay on the Youghal Road and after the Kilrush roundabout on the way to Shandon and O. Connell Streets in the town. Quiet apart from indigenous traffic, how sure can we be that visiting traffic will convert the signage to forty and thirty mile an hour limits respectively?"

"A partnership approach between the Dept. of Transport, the National Roads Authority, road user representatives, the National Road Safety Council and the local authorities should inform the Metric Changeover Board as to how confusion could be avoided. The possibilities of transitional dual signage such as a sign for 40 miles an hour appearing in tandem with 65 kilometres an hour should be given some thought, or maybe even ensuring "K" appearing alongside a kilometre figure to leave less room for confusion could be looked at."

"I look forward to further debate on this matter."

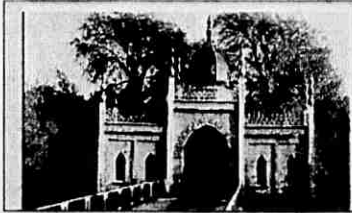

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WEST WATERFORD NOTES

TOM STYLO O'RIORDAN GERALDINES HURLING LEGEND LAID TO REST

One of Geraldines best loved hurling legends was laid to rest recently in his beloved Aghlish.

Tom "Stylo" O'Riordan of Ballingown, Villierstown died peacefully in Cork University Hospital. He had been in failing health for some time. Throughout Stylo's illness he and Mary were supported by a legion of excellent friends and work colleagues who kept vigil at his bedside until he took leave of us for his great eternal home.

Stylo, as he was affectionately known to everyone began his working career with Davy Cullinane in Dromana collecting milk and transporting it to Cappagh. From there he progressed to Cappagh Lime - John A. Woods where he gave 29 years of loyal service. He was a man who worked hard all his life but for him it was not hard work because he loved his job. He loved being out on the road and meeting people, he was always on the job, never missing an opportunity to make a sale. He never gave the impression of being in a hurry, he always seemed to have all the time in the world. Yet he always seemed to get the job done on time especially in latter years of his life when he worked with East Cork Oil. Here as in all his previous jobs, Stylo was loved and respected by those he worked with and for.

Stylo O'Riordan was a tour de force, a man of extraordinary energy, who first came to fame in the 1950's on the field of sport where he excelled. His courage, skill and speed combined with his positive and encouraging attitude contributed greatly to the team success over the next three decades. Here he was a large than life character who might have been small in stature, but in the eyes of his opponents, he was a giant. His passion for the game of hurling was evident in every game he played. He loved his native village and club, the Geraldines, with whom he won a Junior Football title in 1955, followed by Junior and Intermediate titles in the 60's and finished a very distinguished hurling career on a high note in 1976 when he was named hurler of the year when the Geraldines won the Junior Hurling title with their beloved Stylo on board. A most fitting end of a wonderful sporting career.

On and off the field Stylo was one of nature's true gentlemen, his warm and caring personality endeared him to everyone he came in contact with. He always radiated happiness and energy wherever he went. That was not to say that he was a soft touch, he was passionate in his beliefs and ways, he always managed to get his point across, then get you round to his way of thinking. It was just impossible to fall out with him!

Off the field Stylo remained active within the club. He was always on hand to give advice and was wholeheartedly involved in the development of

WEST WATERFORD CROSS-COUNTRY TRAINING

With the Cross Country season now coming into full swing West Waterford AC. Senior club have commenced cross country training at St. Augustine's College each and every Tuesday evening at 6.15 p.m. sharp. All are welcome to attend with a very encouraging start last Tuesday, when a large turn out was present. This training is under the watchful eye of Tony Ryan and he would love to see more come along where his expertise is always available. He will also have training schedules pacifically geared towards cross-country running for those interested.

WARM UP COOL DOWN

Some of the many questions asked are why warm up or cool down? What are the values of warming up and cooling down? How long should you warm up and cool down for?

One of the main reasons for warming up is that the body functions far more effectively and efficiently when the body is warm.

This means through jogging, and, or, a series of exercises, raising the body temperature so that the muscles can move more effectively.

Also that the muscles are warm enough to ensure that when the real running commences, that no damage such as pulling a muscle occurs.

Similarly the cool down is done to ensure that all the waste products are got out of the system and that the body temperature is lowered gradually.

This also has the desired effect of ensuring that the following morning, the athlete's muscles are not stiff and tight from the training session or competition.

Both the warm up and cool down are done at a much slower speed than either the training session or the competition the athlete is preparing to do.

By utilising both a warm up and cool down, the athlete is better prepared for the rigours of the competition or training session.

Otherwise, the athlete who does not utilise either a warm up or cool down may find that they are more prone to injury or that they cannot get to the pace of the competition or training session. Or that they find the start of each session hard work and or painful.

This is because they are too stiff and the body is not warm enough and therefore cannot respond or adapt quickly enough to the demands of the session or competition.

The session and competition being both dynamic and explosive will have an adverse effect if the body is cold and stiff. But not so if the body is warmed up and the jog has also ventilated the lungs and made the heart beating.

Therefore what the warm up is also doing is at a lower level simulating the demands of either the competition or training session.

The beauty of being a long distance endurance runner is that in a training session or in particular during training runs the athlete can incorporate the warm up into the training run. They can also use the last part of the training run as a cool down. In this way the whole session is maximised and valuable time is saved by incorporating the warm up and cool down. If the athlete wants, in addition to a jogged warm up, they can include exercises, but this will obviously add time to the training session.

The exercises that are incorporated would ensure that the major muscle groups of the body such as the hamstrings are fully stretched and warmed up ready for the competition or training session that lies ahead.

What length of time should an athlete take on either the warm up or cool down is really down to individual choice, and what suits the athlete best both physically and psychologically.

It is important that the athlete feels that the warm up has benefited them, as this will make them feel right mentally. Different athletes take much longer or shorter times than others to warm up and cool down.

While some prefer to incorporate them in the overall training run, others prefer to keep the three areas, warm up, training session or competition and cool down as three distinct and different phases.

Others, as previously stated, may include exercises in their warm up which may take place either before or after the warm up jog.

Similarly, with the cool down, some athletes may incorporate exercises, in addition to the jog cool down, particularly if the competition or session has been quite strenuous.

This is to avoid the muscles stiffening up, so that it does not hinder or prevent further training in the days to come.

What therefore would be the recommended amount of time that is required for both an effective jog warm up and jog cool down?

A minimum time of 10 to 15 minutes should suffice for both of these phases. However, it is all down to individual needs and preferences. It is worth bearing in mind that the older we get the less flexible we become and therefore it is more important than ever that we ensure that the body is fully warmed up before commencing any strenuous exercise.

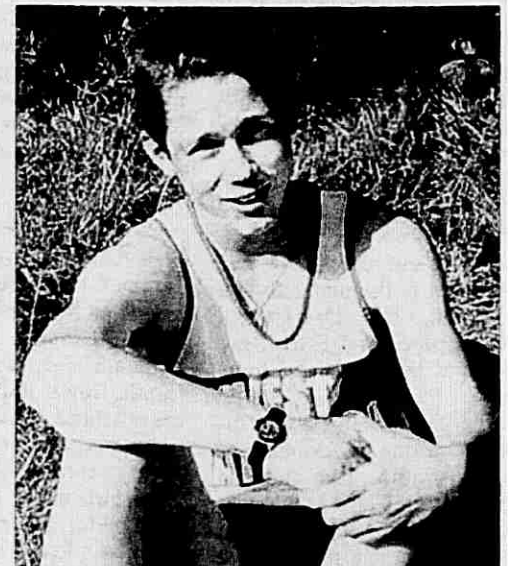
CONOR FRENCH ELECTRICAL SPONSORS JUVENILE LEAGUE

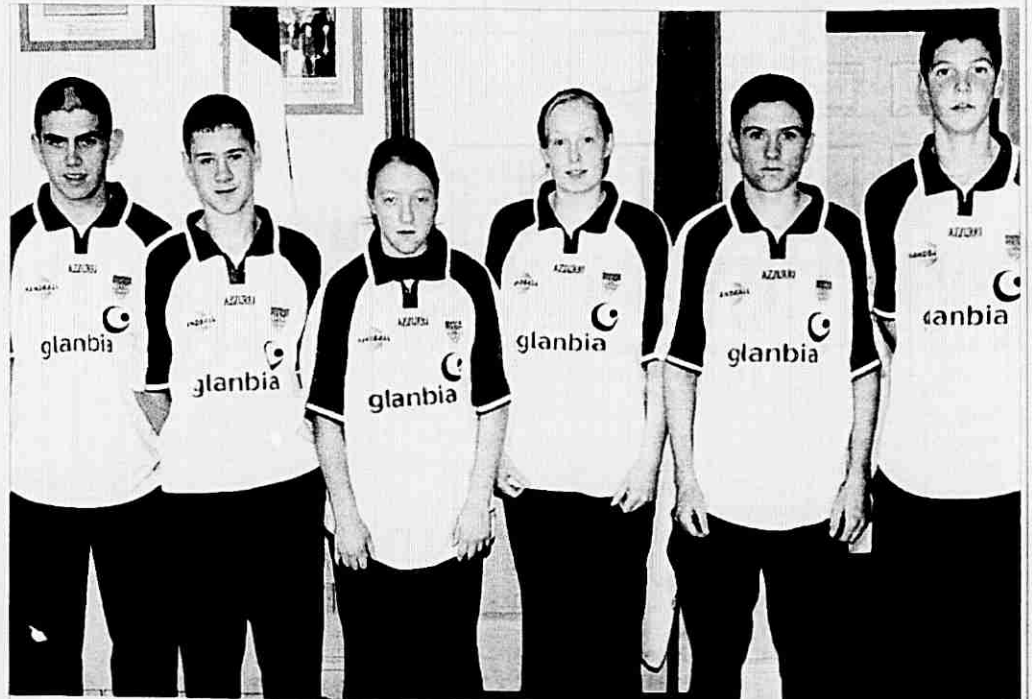

Dungarvan were disappointing, Brian Bannon, John Cass, Jamie Nagle, Wayne Flynn and Michael O'Mahony did best.

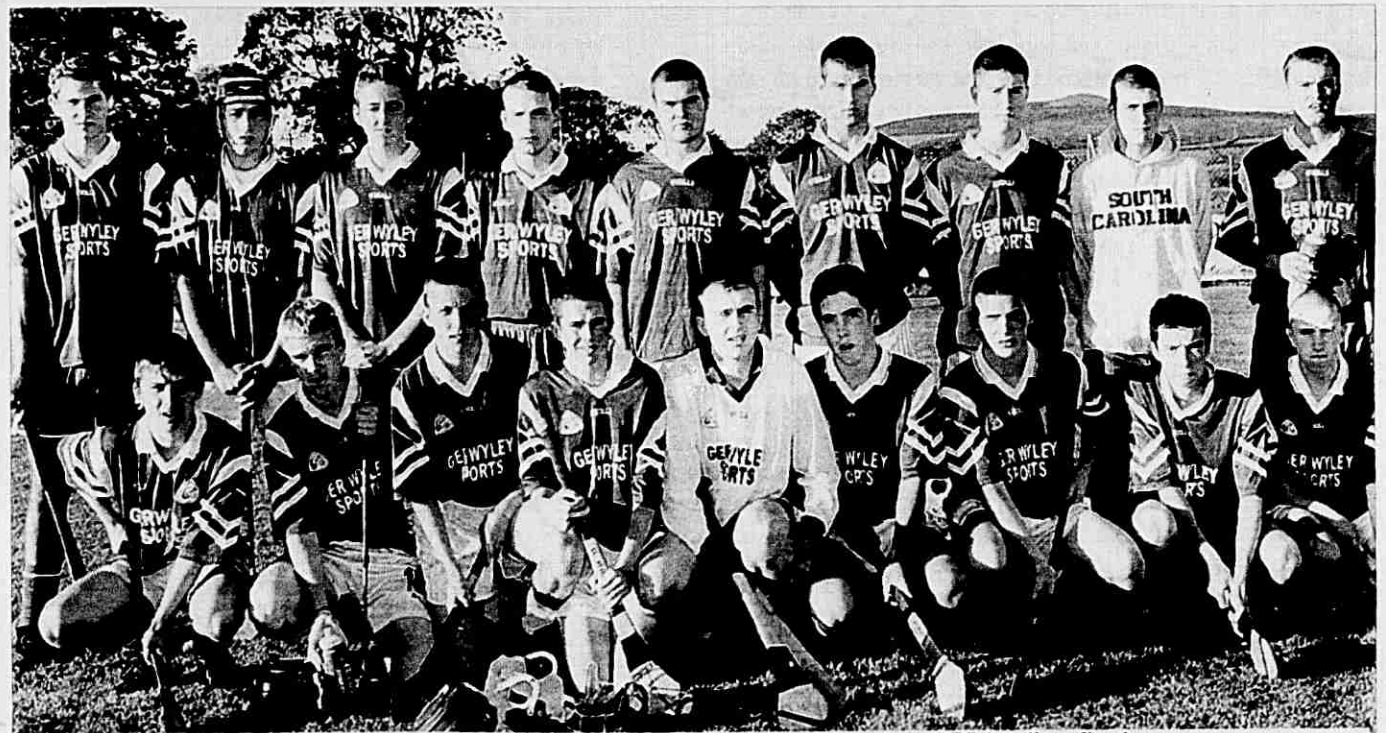

JUVENILE G.A.A. NEWS FROM THE DEISE COUNTY

County Under 14 Football Finals This Saturday At Fraher Field

This Saturday at Fraher Field, the combined Waterford City Credit Unions County Under 14 football finals will take place. The way this years championships have panned out over the past few weeks in the two divisional championships has meant that this year, we are going to see three names of clubs, that we have not seen go on the county under 14 football trophy's for a number of years do so, which can only be good for the future of football in Waterford, because as with all things if the same few names are going on the trophy year after year other clubs tend to loose interest in the competitions.

As these notes are been put together, the times and order the finals are going to be played have not been agreed upon. However supporters of the clubs taking part and others who may be interested in attending the county finals can catch times of the throw-ins on the Sports-news on W.L.R.fm on Saturday morning. It is to be hoped that John O'Leary will also get on to the stations Gaelic Games Programme on Friday evening at 6-30pm where he will be able to give out details of each of the games.

Gaultier have qualified for the division one football final from the East after they recorded a 2-5 to 0-4 win over De La Salle in the divisional final last weekend. They will be a very hard side to beat as they will be back-boned by players who had under 14 hurling county final wins with Ballygunner and Passage earlier this year. These two sides contained some very good players and when they pull on the green and yellow jersey of Gaultier instead of the red and black of Ballygunner or the red and white of Passage that they will show the same commitment and high level of skill.

As these notes are been put together, the Western Final has not been played, through no fault of the Western Bord na nOg Officers I must say, as the officers in the west of the county always try to give the clubs taking part in county finals at least two weeks between the divisional and county finals.

This year's division one championship in the West of the county ended in a very strange way. Both Dungarvan and Nire finished in joint top of the table finishing with seven points each from a possible eight. The other three clubs that took part in this year's division one championship, Ballinacourty, Clashmore and Brickeys all finished with two points each, so to see which club would join either Dungarvan or Nire in the semi finals a series of play-off games had to be fixed.

In the first of the play-off games Clashmore had a win over Ballinacourty, and then in the second play-off game Brickeys had a win over Clashmore, and so set up a semi final match with Nire who lost a toss of the coin with Dungarvan to see which club went straight to the Western Final.

On the day the semi final was fixed, some heavy rain fell over West Waterford. A decision was taken to call off the game, maybe a bit too early in the day, because as the evening went on, the rain cleared up and at the time the match was due to be played, it had completely gone. However as both clubs had been told the game was off, it would be wrong to have gone back to both clubs to tell them the game was going to go ahead.

The game was re-fixed for last Tuesday evening in Fraher Field, with the winners due to meet Dungarvan at the same venue on Friday last. However the best made plans never run smoothly, as at the sound of the full time whistle both sides ended the game inseparable. The two sides had to go back on Friday last for a replay and here it was Nire who came through on a score of 4-7 to 0-13, and so set up a semi final against Dungarvan at Fraher Field on Monday last.

To call the result of the Division one county final before the playing of the Western final is very hard. If Nire are in the final I guess it would only be fair to make them favourites to win the final, as they already have won the County Feile Peil Og competition this year as a result of which, they travelled to Co. Tyrone to represent Waterford in the Feile Peil National Competition. They played three games in Tyrone, winning two of them. The experience picked up in representing the county at the competition should stand to them.

If Nire were beaten in the western final, then it will make it that bit harder to pick a winner. Dungarvan would have to be in with a very chance. After-all if they beat a good Nire team

then they would have to be given a very good chance. On the other hand, I already have said that Gaultier will be back-boned by a number of players that played and won hurling county finals earlier this year with Ballygunner and Passage. Both clubs won their finals with considerable ease. If the players can transfer the skills they showed in winning county finals with the small ball to a county final with the big ball, then they have to be given a very good chance as well.

The division two final will see Kilrossanty take on Mount Sion. Mount Sion earlier this year played Ballygunner in the division one under14 hurling county final. On the day they played well but were well beaten by their rivals from across the city. They had some very big and physical players in the hurling final and I am sure that they will also be part of the football team. Mount Sion qualified for this year's division two county final after they beat Roanmore by the smallest possible margin last Saturday at Walsh Park.

In the County Final Mount Sion will take on Kilrossanty who defeated their neighbours from over the Comeragh Mountains, St. Patrick's on Monday of Last week at Fraher Field. Kilrossanty have some very good footballers in their team. When they played St. Patrick's, their half back line was out-standing and possible was the difference between winning and loosing the game.

Kilrossanty beat St. Patrick's by five points. They got off to a flying start in the Western Final racing into a six point lead inside the opening ten minutes of the game playing with a very strong wind at their backs. In the closing ten minutes of the first half St. Patrick's came more and more into the game and by half time Kilrossanty lead 1-7 to 0-3.

In the second half of the Western final the leaders at the half time brake only got one score in the second half, a goal, against a goal and two points for St. Patrick's. However it has to be pointed out, that on the night Kilrossanty had a lot of chances to put much more scores on the scoreboard but on the night came up against a very good St. Patrick's goalkeeper in Eoin Dunford who made some saves that either of the goalkeepers that played in Croke Park on Sunday would have been proud of.

Kilrossanty as a traditional football club will have to be regarded as favourites to capture the county division two final. After winning the Western Minior and Under 14 Football County Finals in the space of a few days last week they would love to bring another trophy to the Lemybrien area of the county.

Mount Sion as everybody knows is a traditional hurling club and it grate to see them contest a football final. However, after seeing Kilrossanty playing against St. Patrick's and been very impressed with what the football they played under the guidance of Robbie Whelan, John Power, Harry Quinn and Pierce Whyte amongst other it is hard to see them been beaten.

The division three final sees Ferrybank take on Affane. Ferrybank is a club who works away very quietly on the other side of the Suir and every couple of years gets to contest a county final. They have some very good people over the team and for the work that they put in with the various teams it is nice to see their charges achieve success.

In the Eastern Final last week they beat St. Mary's having twelve points to spare at the end of the game. I saw St. Mary's play Clashmore in the division three county final earlier in the year. Although the St. Mary's club covers a large geographical area, their pick is rather small, but when they played Clashmore, I was very impressed with some of their players. I would have taught that St. Mary's would have won the game, but this was not to be as Ferrybank ran out winners on a scoreline of 5-3 to 1-3, and therefore cannot be a bad team..

Affane will provide the opposition for Ferrybank in the division three county final. Over the past few years I have gone on record in saying that Affane have a number of very good footballers within their club. I do not want to be critical of the Cappoquin/Affane Club, but I have to say that it is a pity that they don't put in the same effort in football as they do in hurling. This may be due to the fact that many who are involved in the juvenile section of the club are mainly hurling people. I am certain that if the same amount of work was put in with the big ball as it is with the small ball then I am certain that Affane would be capable of beating any football club in the county as

they always have some very good footballers.

In the Western Final, Affane had a two point victory over a fancied An Gaeltacht side at Aglish on Monday of last week. They went in at the break trailing An Gaeltacht by two points, but in the second half played some very good football and with more than a bit of luck on their side at the sound of the full time whistle were two points in front winning the game on a scoreline of 3-6 to 3-4.

After saying that Affane have some very good footballers I have to say that they will have to be favourites to win the division three county final. Our good friend Magoo, will I am sure be with the team on Saturday, and as everybody knows he is astute tactician as anybody on the line. Another thing in Affane's favour is that as the various championships advance players wearing an Affane or Cappoquin shirts are very hard to beat in juvenile football and hurling competitions.

G.A.A. NOTES

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

Disappointingly, less than half the affiliated clubs in the county had a representative at the September meeting of the adult board last week.

Paddy Joe Ryan presided and welcomed the delegates to their first meeting since July.

FINANCE

In his monthly report, County Treasurer Tony Morrissey told delegates that the total cost of all of our eight intercounty teams for the season had reached a record 326,000 euro. As the teams involved are active for only about 32 weeks or less per year, this works out at approximately 10,000 euro per week. There is sure to be more on this topic before the year ends. It does not include the cost of the county hurling team holiday to Capetown in January as this is being funded by the group who raffled the race horse and ran the race day event in Tramore during the August festival and which was a huge success. When delegates were informed that fines had been imposed on two of the county teams during the All-Ireland junior football final and also the All-Ireland SH semi final for breaches of match regulations, it was decided to pass the correspondence on to the relative selection committees.

FOOTBALL MATTERS

When asked about club reaction to the football selectors report to the July meeting, the chairman stated that the report was circulated to every club, but only one club responded. He said it was a tough provoking report and the response was most disappointing.

The whole matter of football in all four grades will be discussed at a special meeting of the county executive next week and submissions will be made to the October meeting. Coiste Peil will be consulted on the subject.

CAPPOQUIN VENUE

Ned Heffernan, Cappoquin delegate asked about the cancellation of the senior hurling fixture, Lismore v Tallow and its transfer to Fraher field. He said that the club had spent one thousand euro preparing for the game and it was a huge disappointment to have it moved.

The county chairman explained that the decision was not taken lightly and it was because of the incessant heavy rain and the uncertain forecast, that the game was moved by the GAC.

He said that if the club made a submission regarding the loss of revenue, the executive would look at it.

Hurling County Selectors

On the recommendation of the executive committee, the outgoing management group, Justin McCarthy, Manager, Nicky Cashin assistant coach/trainer, Seamie Hannon, Ballyduff and Kevin Ryan, Mount Sion, were reappointed for one year. The decision was unanimous.

The other hurling committees as well as all the football committees were not appointed.

PROGRESS REPORT.

The championship progress report from the county and divisional boards gave details of the satisfactory progress being made on all fronts. John Jackson gave a run down on the progress of football and hurling leagues and the situation here is most satisfactory.

CLUB PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

A communication has been sent to all club units within the county giving details of a Club pre-A.G.M. Course as well as a Club Planning and Development Course. These courses can take place at the club pavilion or at any suitable venue decided upon by the Club. It is proposed to hold these within the next couple of months.

Minor Championships

Two further finals were played during last week and the divisional board are now left with just the minor "B" football championship to complete.

The under 21 hurling championship involving Abbeyside and Tallow/Shamrocks is also to be played before the entire underage programme is completed for the season.

The input of Clashmore's Stephen Barron who scored all seven points must have earned him the man of the match tag.

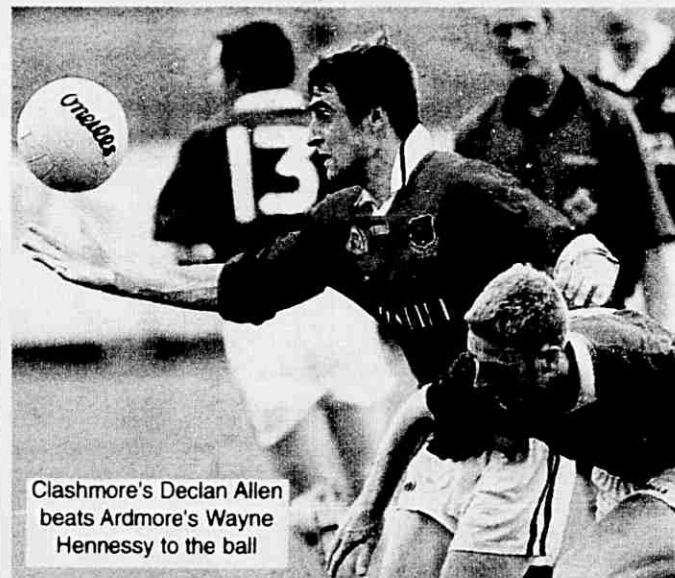

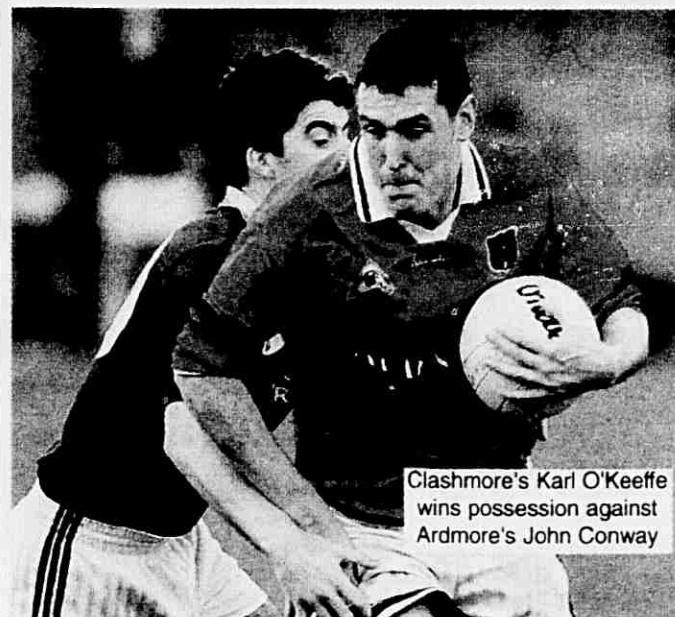

Lucky Ballygunner Snatch Victory in Explosive Semi-Final

**BALLYGUNNER 2-15
LISMORE 2-13**

It was a victory against a 12 man Lismore outfit who had three players including goalkeeper Brendan Landers red carded, all after 22 minutes of the second half when mayhem broke loose and the game seemed to be going out of control. Paul Flynn who had contributed 1-8 of his side's 1-11 at this stage was also sent off with a direct red card. The ill tempered outburst which was responsible for the stoppage, was by no means an isolated affair because as early as the 7th minute play stopped to allow referee Michael Wadding separate those involved.

At the point at which the four players were sent off, Lismore were leading by 2-12 to 1-11 and looked to be heading for a county final meeting with Mount Sion in two weeks time.

By the 33rd minute of the second half, Ballygunner had drawn level at 2-13 apiece and at this point and taking into account the imbalance in numbers, the explosive nature of the game and the need to restore peace, it was expected that the ref, would have blown the final whistle. No one,

least of all the 3,000 who watched and enjoyed the game, would have complained. Very many people felt that it was indiscreet of him to continue the match for a further three minutes, during which the numerically stronger Ballygunner side scored two late points to win them a victory by that margin.

Even at half time which went a full eight minutes over the stipulated 30, because of some bad conduct, it was evident that relations between the sides were strained. But few people expected that it would turn out like this.

Whatever the cause of the bitterness which fueled the ill tempered outbursts, Lismore were the big losers, having only 12 players as against 14 for the last 15 minutes and then losing by only 2 points.

Paul Flynn who was Ballygunner's man of the match was a huge loss, but certainly not nearly as great as the Lismore trio of Brendan Landers, Michael O'Sullivan and Michael Walsh.

When the final whistle sounded, the referee made a hasty retreat followed by an angry group

of players and some supporters, and officials. It was later learned that the referee had been struck in the melee.

There were complaints that not enough stewards were on duty in the field for the game. In the circumstances I cannot see how such a complaint could 'stand up.' As stewards on duty for a game would be there to direct patrons to their seats, etc., and to prevent people in the stands and elsewhere from gaining access to the playing pitch in the event of a 'flare up.' There was no such attempt by people in the stands to get on to the pitch. Stewards would have no role in getting involved otherwise.

It is true that there were too many people on the sideline and there looked to be many more than the 60 (30 each team) allowed under bye law. I saw and I am sure that very many other people saw an unidentifiable person from the sideline kick a 'body' during the final flare up.

REPORT

At least four members of the GAC were present at the game and witnessed the outbursts and they will now await the report from the referee before adjudicating on the whole affair. The members who missed the game will have the advantage of watching the video of the match as filmed by WLR.

THE GAME

There could be little complaint about the quality of the hurling and there were some super scores. Each side fielded at full strength with Dave Bennett and Paul Flynn being the top scorers, as expected.

The crowd of about 3,000 paid 10,628 euro to see the game and there was a great atmosphere about the place with the huge majority hoping for a Lismore victory that would bring the county final to Fraher field.

Lismore played with the strong breeze and within five minutes Dave Bennett had 3 points on the scoreboard, two frees and one from play.

In the 7th Minute the first skirmish took place and immediately afterwards, Paul Flynn pointed a Ballygunner free to level the match in the 10th minute.

John Heneghan pointed from play and Dave Bennett followed with a point from a free. A super point by Andy Moloney brought a response from Dan Shanahan. A point from play and two from frees all by Dave Bennett left Lismore five points in front by the 28th minute. Flynn reduced the gap with a pointed free before a Billy Cunningham delivery found the in-running Dave Bennett who scored the first goal of the match in the 31st minute.

A free awarded to Ballygunner in the 35th minute saw the ball end up in the net from a Paul Flynn 'rocket.'

After a further two minutes, John Heneghan had the ball in the Ballygunner net for Lismore's second goal to leave the halftime tally at 2-9 to 1-5 in favour of Lismore.

SECOND HALF

Points by Paul Flynn in the 4th, 5th, and 6th, minutes helped to reduce the gap before Dave Bennett had Lismore's first score of this half in the 9th minute. Points from play by Shane O'Sullivan and Paul Flynn were followed with a '65' metre free conversion by Paul Flynn to leave just 2 points separating the teams in the 11th, minute. Scores by Dave

Bennett and Dan Shanahan helped Lismore recover their composure, but only momentarily as Ballygunner's onslaught needed two splendid saves by Brendan Landers to prevent a certain goal in the 17th minute.

Then with about 10 minutes of normal time remaining the game which was very exciting and tension filled, became a bit ill tempered with the referee having almost constantly to consult his subordinate officials to advise him on some off the ball incidents.

Michael O'Sullivan received marching orders a minute or two before the major row broke out and resulting in Michael Walsh, Paul Flynn and Brendan Landers joining him on the sideline.

This happened in the 22nd minute when the score stood at 2-12 to 1-12 in favour of Lismore. James Shanahan was replaced by John McGrath who took over in goal. This was a nail-biting stuff and the crowd very much on edge - probably as much so as the players.

With a minute of normal time remaining Gearoid O'Connor shot a Ballygunner goal to level the game and at this point the likelihood of a draw looked a possibility.

But the game went on and just on the 60th minute Lismore were awarded a free which Dave Bennett duly converted to regain the lead. Three minutes later Andy Moloney had a point to level the match again. But the game continued for a further 3 minutes during which Paul Foley and Tommy Power scored points to put Ballygunner into the county final against Mount Sion (and without Paul Flynn) on next Sunday week.

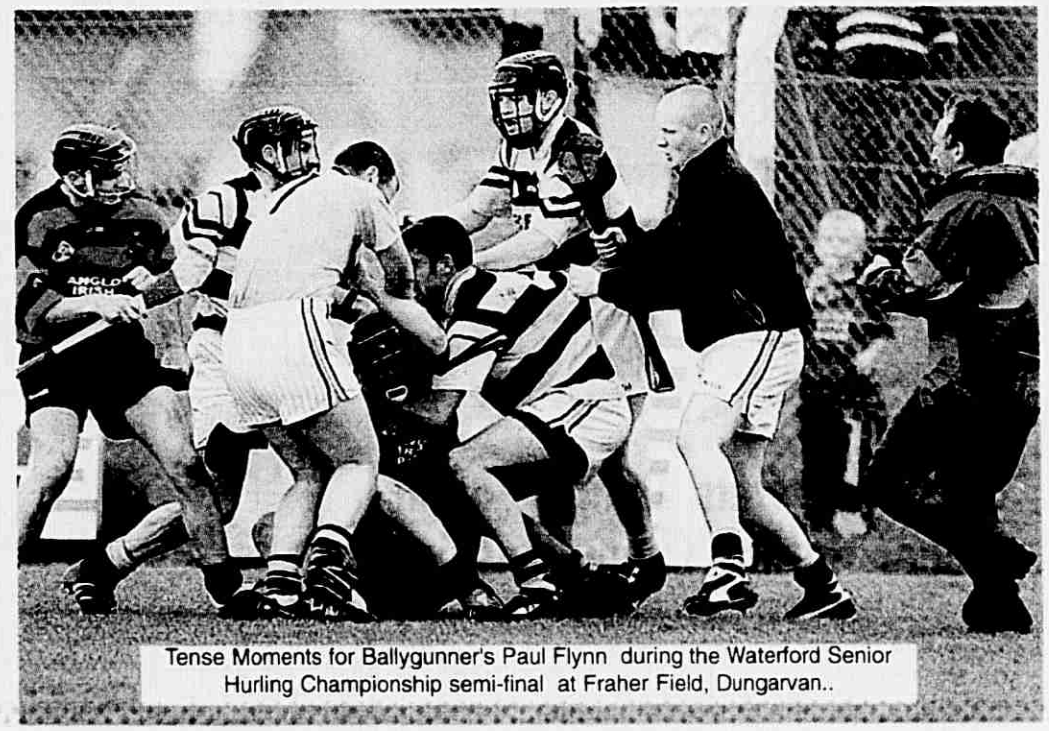

Ballinacourty who had won the title for the past three seasons and were on course for a fourth were odds on favourites to win again. In an earlier round they had trounced Kilrossanty.

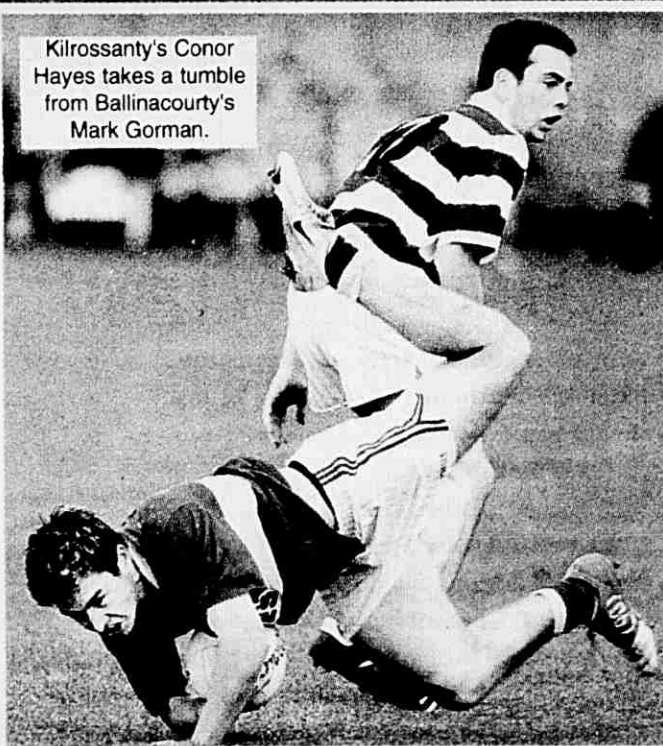
Playing against the strong wind, Ballinacourty were a point in arrears at half time (0-8 to 2-1). The second half was something of a nightmare experience after they had equalized.

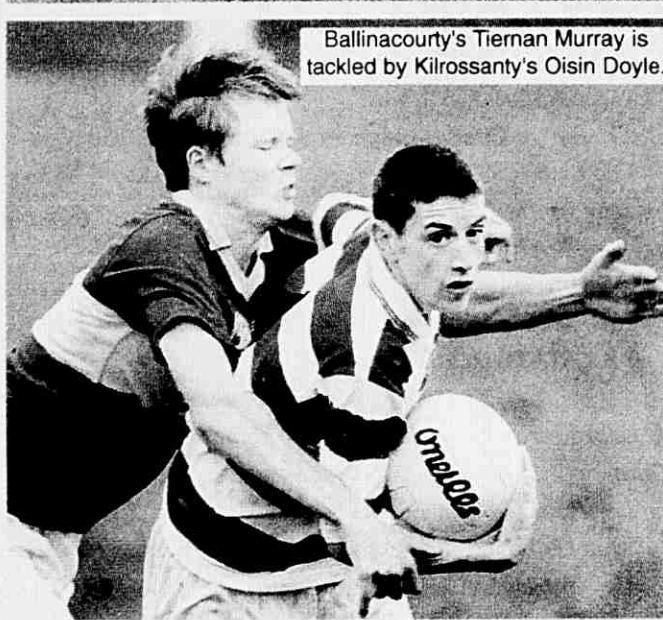
Kilrossanty's magnificent defence was impregnable and must take most of the credit for this deserved victory.

Ballinacourty's Tiernan Murray is tackled by Kilrossanty's Oisín Doyle.

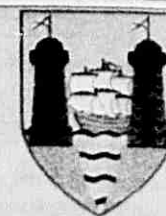

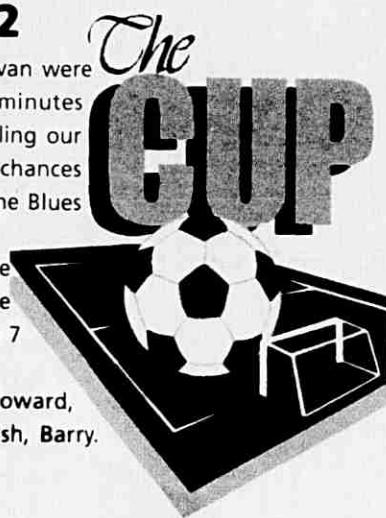

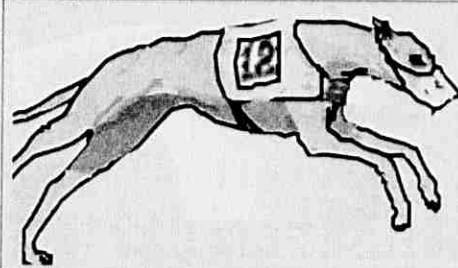

If anyone is interested in playing, contact Pat Keane as trials for the various teams will have to be held in the near future.

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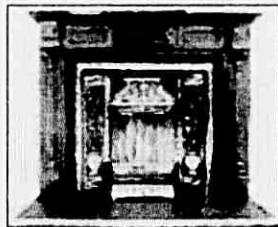
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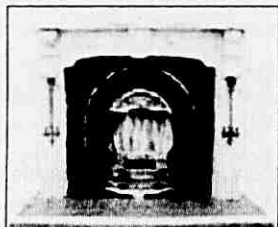
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New school for Dungarvan?

During the summer months a group of parents from the Dungarvan area have been involved in discussions with Educate Together the national co-ordinating and umbrella group for Educate Together schools in the country with a view to starting an Educate Together school in Dungarvan.

There are currently 31 Educate Together Schools based throughout the country catering for over 3,500 pupils and employing over 200 staff. Educate Together schools are based on the belief that children who "learn together live together" in a more harmonious and accepting way.

What is educate together?

Educate Together is a non-fee paying National School operating under the direction of the Department of Education following the Primary School Curriculum. The schools are based on four key principles

Understanding other cultures, values and religions is a cornerstone of education. Every child will be respected and have equal rights of access to the school.

Children learn with and from other children. Boys and girls will learn together. Education should be fun, about working together and about helping every child get the most out of themselves. Children can learn in lots of ways, not just from textbooks. Parents are really important and have a huge range of skills that can help in running the school. Parents and teachers run the school together, with respect for the professional role of the teachers.

WHO CAN ENROL?

This school is open to all children of primary school age, regardless of social, cultural or religious background. Generally, when an Educate Together School gets up and running there is an infant class and a second class for older children.

The Dungarvan Educate Together school is still at the planning stage. Some work has been done on exploring where the school could be based and on establishing an Educate Together association. The current ad-hoc committee is keen to involve parents that are interested in the idea and are inviting parents and members of the public to an information meeting to answer questions about the school and explore possibilities for moving the idea of establishing the school to the next stage.

The meeting will take place in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Thurs. Oct. 21st at 8.00-9.45 p.m.

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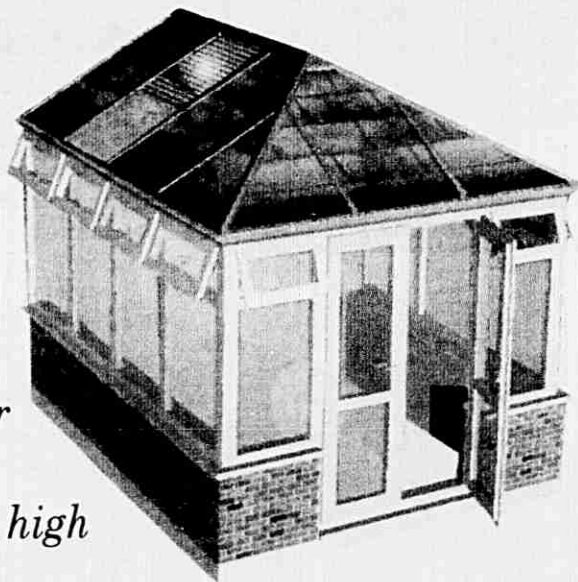
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PARTY IN THE PARK
