Town Council Refuses Permission for 125 **House Development**

Dungarvan Town Council have refused planning permission for a large housing development, proposed to comprise of 125 houses and planned for a site in Monang, Dungarvan.

Town Engineer, Dan O'-Donovan, speaking at last Monday nights meeting of the local authority, said there were a significant number of problems with the application.

It's understood that the developer, John Queally of Coolagh, Abbeyside, had considered appealing the decision to An Bord Pleanala, but it's now more likely that he will resubmit an altered application.

The residential development was to include three and four bedroom 21/2 storey houses, access roads, carparking, landscaping and open space on a 3.16 hectare site.

But the Town Council considered the development to be too dense and that the provision of terraced housing with either no or inadequate access to the rear garden would constitute unsustainable planning.

It also considered that the provision of private amenity space would be below acceptable norms for the area, that it would have a lack of variety in its design and that the provision of green space was below the minimum levels that are acceptable for a housing development.

The original proposal for the development, which would be to build 125 21/2 storey houses would be totally out of place with the present developments on the Monang road," Mayor of Dungarvan, Michael O'Riordan

"It didn't fit in with the environment out there. If the concerns are addressed in a new application then I wouldn't see a problem with the develop-

A controversial Draft Travellers Accommodation Plan, which recommends that three new halting sites should be built around the county, has gone through the first phase towards its adoption at the end of next April.

The draft accommodation plan, which must go through a comprehensive review and submissions process before it is adopted, recommends one halting site be built in each of the west, east and greater Dungarvan areas.

The plan includes the Dungarvan Town Council area, but it's understood that a site adjacent the N25 and outside the urban area may be put forward rather than increase Shandon Halting sites capacity.

The draft plan, which will cover the period 2005 – 2008, makes provision for both housing needs and sites for caravans including transient sites.

THREE HALTING SITES

Under the draft plan, a second site would be built adjacent to the national secondary road between Dungarvan and Tallow, and a third adjacent the national primary road between Leamybrien and Butlerstown.

Indigenous travellers, who have been in an area for a set number of months, would be given priority for a bay at the halting sites.

However, the draft plan also acknowledges the problems caused by the annual influx of travelling families to the county over the summer months, and says that without the provision of transient sites it is virtually impossible to deal with the problem.

ANXIETY

"The encampments established by these families can be a cause of anxiety to members of the settled community in the locality," it states. "Because of their general location and the lack of basic facilities, traffic, hygiene and litter problems are normally associated with these encampments."

"Having regard to the present legislation, ruling of the Courts and the lack of transient sites in the county, it is virtually impossible to deal with the situation unless the council is in a position to offer alternative facilities to these transient families."

"It is essential, therefore, that the transient sites identified in this programme are provided if the problems associated with these unauthorised sites are to be eliminated or reduced."

LAND FOR CPO

However, as yet, the sites proposed are located in general areas, and no specific site has been identified. Once a site is identified the council will seek to reach agreement, but if none can be reached it may require a Compulsory Purchase Order.

Speaking at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. James Tobin (FF) asked that the elected members be informed immediately once a site is selected.

However, when sniggers were heard when the councillor was informed that he would "know when a site was identified" Sinn Fein Cllr. Brendan Mansfield said the issue wasn't a laughing matter.

"I don't know what you're laughing at. Everyone deserves a home. These people have as much of a right to a home as anyone else. This is an issue that needs to be addressed."

But, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) accused Cllr. Mansfield of "lecturing" to the councillors.

"We've had enough of people lecturing to us about travellers rights. It's time we started talking about travellers responsibilities."

The Draft Traveller Accommodation Plan will go on public display before the end of this month.


KING OF THE POLAR ICE

The scientific name for a polar bear is Ursus maritimius Ursus means bear and maritimus means sea, so the polar bear is really a sea bear. This is not surprising as polar bears are superb swimmers and have been seen as far as 320km (200mi) from land. The average adult male bear measures some 2.4m (8ft) from nose to tail. They can weigh as much as 408kg (900lb), about the same as five adult people!



Baby Bears Are Born Under The Snow

Polar bear clubs are born in the depths of the Arctic winter. At the end of the year the mother gives birth to one or two cubs. To keep them warm, they are born in a den dug into the snow where they stay for about three months. At birth the cubs are no bigger than rabbits, weighing less than 1kg (2lb), and are very weak. By the time they emerge from the den they weigh about 10kg (20lb) and can fend for themselves.



Gulls Stay Close to Polar Bears

As a general rule, a polar bear is an animal to be avoided. But there is one creature that makes a point of being close to polar bears. This is the ivory gull, a pure white bird that lives in the Arctic. It follows polar bears, so it can feed on any scraps of food left by the bear.





Berried Treasure with species and varieties of Pyracantha, Berberis and Cotoneaster

With names like Firethorn and Barberry these plants can't fail to grab attention. Plants producing berries such as Pyracantha (Firethorn), Berberis (Barberry) and Cotoneaster provide a real treasure trove of options for the gardener. There are lots of berry bearing plants to choose from in your local garden centres and nurseries. This selection will help you in spring. get started on your search without resorting to an old pirate's map with

an 'X' marking the spot! Some Pyracanthas will produce enormous crops of brilliant berries providing an outstanding seasonal spectacle. For really striking effect consider putting two together. Pyracantha 'Soleil d'Or' will be laden with deep yellow berries from autumn onwards. Pyracantha 'Mohave' will put on a superb show of red berries to match. These plants can look great planted together on a shaded house wall or over a doorway. The seasonal colour and interest from this pair is nonstop. Being evergreens, Pyracanthas keep their leaves all year round; in

spring both 'Soleil d'Or' and 'Mohave' bear tiny white flowers followed by their showy berries. Pyracanthas are especially striking on grey winter days when the berries are still present on many of the varieties. Another bonus is that they can attract birds for nesting and food. Imagine having your own tuneful blackbird nesting just outside the kitchen door

Barberry or Berberis is another of the berried treasures which are functional as well as beautiful. Some varieties are especially suitable for informal hedging and look stunning whilst providing a vandal resistant hedge. Berberis Darwinii again offers excellent value for money in terms of the varied interest it provides year round. This vigorous, arching evergreen shrub has spiny stems and glossy dark green spiny leaves. In mid to late spring you'll be able to enjoy a profuse show of small dark orange flowers. In autumn, blue-black berries follow. Berberis Darwinii can grow to an approximate height and spread of 3m.

You can also use Berberis Thunbergii 'Rose Glow' for barrier hedging or as an addition to a shrub border. Growing to an approximate height and spread of 2m, this compact, deciduous shrub has red-purple foliage and red berries. It can be used to good effect as an imaginative contrast to the shades of green foliage that tend to form the backbon of most shrub borders. Cotoneaster is a favourite right around

the country and as a hardy, low maintenance shrub, it's hard to beat. If you are looking for a quick hit with an abundance of colour especially in autumn, then seek out Cotoneaster X Waterii 'John Waterer'. This is a fast growing evergreen shrub reaching an approximate height and spread of 5m. Great in a shrub border, this plant will cope in most soils and do well in sun or semi-shade. Plants with berries provide a lot of visual appeal, as well as a range of additional benefits described above. Autumn is the perfect time for planting, so why not get out and start treasure

hunting soon?



The area has seen a number of large-scale developments over the past few years, including McInerney's housing development.

Orchard Deputation To Discuss Green Removal With Council

A deputation of residents from the Orchard Estate in Dungarvan is to meet with the Town Council prior to the November sitting of the local authority to discuss the thorny issue of the removal of the estates green area to make way for a new link road.

Dungarvan Town Council plan to construct the link road from the Youghal Road to Wolfe Tone Road. The planned new road would also

service the development of land behind the small-enclosed estate. However, residents have fought a

However, residents have fought a fierce rear-guard action against the plans.

At Monday's meeting of the Council, Town Engineer, Dan O'-Donovan revealed that the new Transport Minister, Martin Cullen has sought copies of the planning file. It is understood that residents of the Orchard lobbied the Minister about the issue.

Residents say they fear the removal of the green, and the change in the direction of traffic flow, will endanger children living in the estate and claim that they were never informed at the time of buying their homes that a major road would run so close-by.

However, according to officials in the Town Council, the planned road was in the Town Development Plan, and the Orchard was built in such a way as to facilitate the construction of the new link road.

Asked by Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab) about construction, which started recently close to the estate, Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty confirmed that it would not encroach on the estate before they have further discussion with the residents

COUNTY ENGINEER STANDS OVER CRITICISM OF SEWERAGE CONTRACTORS

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said he was standing over the criticism he levelled at the sewerage contractors for the quality of resurfacing work they have been carrying

Mr. O'Flynn described as "appalling" the standard of road restoration work and repeated his criticism at a re cent meeting of Waterford County Council.

Responding to concerns from local residents in the Clonea area about the number of potholes left behind after laying pipes for the new Dungarvan Wastewater Sewerage Scheme, Mr. O'Flynn agreed to raise the concerns

with the contractors.



Cllr. Tom Higgins (FG) said people in the area are extremely concerned about the state the road has been left in.

Sewerage Delays Hindering Development In 7 Villages



Delays to the long-awaited seven-villages sewerage scheme are hindering development in the locations where the scheme was to be

According to Director of Services, John O'Flynn, the scheme will not enter the next stage of the process until the middle of next year at the very earliest.

However, he confirmed that only the wastewater treatment systems will proceed on an en-bloc basis.


The collection and delivery systems for the seven-villages will be taken separately in a bid to speed-up the long-overdue commencement of the schemes to towns that include Kilmacthomas, Tallow and Cappoquin.

However, it's understood that the process could be delayed even further by the need to apply for a foreshore license in all the 'villages' with the exception of Kilmacthomas.

Cllr. James Tobin (FF) said that he had believed from the very beginning that taking the seven villages together was a mis-

The result was a delay, he said, which has left towns like Tallow behind.

Cllr. Tobin went on to blame the designers and consultants



which affected a wide area of Tallow would only be cured by the introduction of the sewer-

Cllr. Ciaran O Riain (FF) asked about the 300 million euros, which reportedly hasn't been sought as funding by local authorities. And he

Clir. Ciaran O asked for an explanation as to Riain how this had happened.

Cllr. Nora Flynn (FG) added that the situation in Barrack Street in Cappoquin had become so bad that people were now talking about taking legal action to have the matter addressed.

One local authority household was said to be taking legal advice over the condition they were being housed in. The problem she said



was due to the delay in constructing the sewerage scheme. She said when she was invited to the house the smell from the backed up pipes was "overpowering" and "stomach-turning."

The delays are hampering everyone, she added, and the situation was one of dire urgency.

Director Of Services, John O'Flynn detailed some of the red tape the council has had to traverse to forward the project. He said when they advertised it initially one company was selected as the most suitable consultants. But they were forced to re-advertise under the Public Procurement rules delaying the project for another six to eight months. At the end, the same company was selected.

He said at best the next phase of the plan will be forwarded by the middle of 2005.

More Housing Units Planned For Knockanore

Two more houses are planned for a site at Knockanore, Tallow, according to Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Peter Carey.

Two local authority houses are nearing the completion of the Design Stage, Mr. Carey informed local councillor, James

He also said two other houses are now planned for the vil-

Mr. Carey went on to say that the council is looking to expand its housing stock in other locations around the county. But this is dependent on finding sufficient land banks.

Meeting To Discuss Ardmore T-Flag

Progress on resolving the T-Flag issue in Ardmore will be discussed in committee by members of the Dungarvan Electoral Area.

The controversy surrounds the railing off of the T-Flag by a landowner, who fears that the liability would fall on her if the walk was opened. Whether there is a right of way and questions of access to the T-Flag are also bogged down amid legal wrangling.

Raising the issue at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Brendan Mansfield (SF) asked what progress has been achieved.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy said the matter will be discussed at the next area meeting. It was intended to discuss the matter previously but it was omitted from the agenda.

Extensive Further Information Needed On Stradbally Housing

Extensive further information and maybe even a resubmission of a planning application may be necessary before Waterford County Council will consider granting planning permission to a large housing development planned for

The scale of the housing development, proposed by Denis Lehane and comprising of 108 houses, has seen concerns being raised over the capability of the towns sewerage and water services to cope with it.



Cashel Bids Farewell To 7,000 Vehicles

Traffic through the centre of Cashel will be lightened by up to 7,000 vehicles a day, 1,400 of them heavy goods vehicles, since the towns by-pass was officially opened by Transport Minister Martin Cullen on last Monday week. The Minister was driven in style along the E30 million dual carriageway, the latest link in the improvement of the Cork-Dublin road at the head of a cavalcade of vintage cars. Minister Cullen was very pleased that his first Ministerial function was the opening at the Cashel by pass. The ongoing work he and his colleagues saw around the county was fantastic, he said as a rural T.D. from the South East, to be here for my first Ministerial function and see the major part of the Dublin-Cork road opened.

Welcoming the benefits the bypass would bring to the town and the business community, the Minister said people had the streets back now. There would be investment opportunities now that the traffic was removed. He congratulated the National Roads Authority and the

South Tipperary County Council on the project.

Cashel Town Manager Billy McEvoy described the opening of the bypass and the N74 link road, as a truly historic day for Cashel and South Tipperary. "We can, he said, take pride in a job well done" congratulating all those involved including the design and construction staff. The bypass was the first stretch of dual carriageway in South Tipperary and fitted in well with the landscape, Mr. McEvoy said Councillor Mattie McGrath (FF), Newcastle Cathaoirleach of South Tipperary County Council, congratulated Minister Cullen on his appointment and welcomed to Cashel. The road was blessed by Very Rev. Fr. C. O'Dwyer and Rev. Dean Philip Knowles.

Drivers on this bypass should look out for a public Art sculpture specially commissioned for it, entitled Na hArd Rithe by sculptor Orla de Bri. It consists of five six meter tall bronze male figures with mirror faces, representing the High Kings Of Munster, each wears a crown highlighted in gold leaf, tell the artistic story of the area. One depicts the Rock of Cashel and another a Cathedral Spire.

Sean Ua Treasaig Remembered

On Sunday last at Kilfeale Cemetery, Co. Tipperary, the annual commemoration on the death of Sean Ua Treasaig, one of the bravest, most resolute, and unselfish soldiers of our time passed away when he was shot dead by British forces in Talbot street, Dublin on the 14th day of October 1920. Sean, the name by which he was almost universally known, was a title sound as Huge Roe or Shane the Proud, he was born in Soloheadbeg, Co. Tipperary. The entry in the register is as follows "John Tracey, born February 14th 1895, child of Denis Tracey and Bridget Allis, baptised at Solohead on 16th February 1895 by Rev. J. Murphy C.C., sponsors Michael Allis and Kate Allis". His father died when Sean was very young and being an only child left in the care of his widowed mother whom he revered and adored. As a three year old he was taken to see the Fenian John O'Leary unveil the Kickham monument in nearby Tipperary town. From his early schooldays at the Christian Brothers he was a keen student of Irish and later a member of the Fianna Eireann.

Early in manhood he attached himself to the Irish Republican Brotherhood, and cultivated the fighting spirit which was inherent to his nature. Always a total abstainer, Sean was a tremendous athlete playing hurling and football, swimming and in early life a crack shot. During the election of 1918 he worked arduously, his great personal influence and convincing logic was largely responsible for the return of Pierce McCann, whose spirit preceded him to Heaven stilled by the tortures of penal life in Gloucester Jail. In the Autumn of 1919, Sean Tracey was a member of a rescue party involved in one of the most daring and sensational coups of the Troubles when Sean Hogan was freed from Crown forces at the small railway stations of Knocklong, between Thurles and Limerick junction. Two sergeants Wallace and Enright were killed outright. Soon after two members of the rescue party John Foley and Michael Meagher were captured taken to the Cork jail and hanged them. Seventeen year old Sean Hogan was a member of Tracey's own company and along time friends from boyhood. The following year 1920 while in Dublin with another Tipperary patriot Dan Breen, Sean Tracey was shot by British agents He was out and about on the morning of the 14th October. He called on some friends in the city, and just as he was leaving the premises of Hunter and Clancy in Talbot Street, he was recognised by a detective, and immediately pounced upon a large force of Military and Police. He never stood a chance as fire was opened on him from all sides, calm and determined, he fought his last battle, along and unaided, knelling in the street firing from two revolvers, and wounding five of his assailants. That he could escape was fruitless to hope and in the midst of a fierce fusillade, he fell mortally wounded, his body riddled with bullets.

Sean Tracey sleeps under the green sod of the Republic that he served so faithfully, but his name and fame will never be forgotten by his countrymen to whom the ashes of Pearse, Plunkett and O'Rahilly are sacred treasurers. He was one of the Republic's greatest Irishmen and is revered in poem, song and story. There is nothing more stirring than to hear Dublin's balladeer Paddy Reilly singing "The Galtee Mountain Boy" which tells the tale of brave Sean O Treasaig. On last Sunday, Mass was celebrated in Kilfeakle Parish Church at 2:15pm where a large crowd attended. Then the parade led by the Sean Tracey Pipers Band from Maycarkery went to his grave where a rousing orations was delivered by Senator Labhras O Murchu, Director General Comhaltais Ceoltoiri Éireann:

> "When the night dew that falls, though it seemed it weeps, Still freshens with verdure the grave where he sleeps. And the tears that were shed, when they laid him to rest, Shall long keep his memory alive with the best".



We were accepted by IFAS the governing body for amateur astronomy in Ireland -at the Whirlpool Star Party Conference recently held in Birr Co Offaly. Some "DAS" members travelled for the weekend and attended a variety of talks and lectures given by some of the world most eminent astronomers and scientists. After the Annual Dinner an observing session was held in Birr Castle grounds viewing through some of the biggest scopes in the country. A most enjoyable and entertaining weekend was had by all and it is now on our "pil-

grimage" list! BLUE MOON—RED MOON!

Everyone has heard of a blue Moon, which is not blue, but refers to two Full Moons being visible in the same month. Whereas if you want to see a RED MOON read onon

Wednesday night the 27th to Thursday morning the 28th of October there will be a TOTAL Lunar Eclipse when the Moon enters the Earths shadow and in a matter of a few hours one can see all the phases of the moon. When the Moon is completely inside the shadow or Umbra the refraction of the Earths atmosphere with all of its various particles, casts a deep red hue onto the Moon. A truly magnificent sight.

This event happens from 2.14 am to 5.54 am on the morning of the 28th Oct. 
LISMORE TIDY TOWNS



Stradbally's Bid For Four-in-a-Row May Be Halted by The Nire



Kilrossanty Minors To Make History By Winning Their first County Title

This double header at Fraher field on Bank Holiday Monday is the highlight of the weekend programme here in the west, where a number of other important matches are also listed for decision.

While players may not be too pleased with having to abstain from socialising on the Bank Holiday weekend, patrons will be glad of having somewhere to go on the 'free day' and Board officers are confident that the experiment will prove to be a big hit

Football supporters are agreed that the two best football teams

in the county have emerged from the preceding rounds and that the clash between rivals, Stradbally who are plying for their fourth title in a row and the Nire who are bidding for their fifth title in all, will produce a memorable contest that will compensate followers for having to endure some very mediocre stuff in the games leading up to the final.

Two years ago these clubs met in the county final and after a most exciting contest the game ended all square with the champions, Stradbally scoring 3-8 and that tally being

matched on a 2-11 scoreline for

The replay was another rip roaring contest that saw Stradbally retain their title on an 0—12 to 0-10 final score.

Stradbally must hold the record for emerging winners after drawn encounters After the 2001 county final which finished on a score of 0-4 each with Rathgormack, Stradbally and their eastern opponents remained locked together after a further sixty minutes, but again the Reds survived after an extra time session.

The Nire who had to wait

until the nineties to win their first senior football championship (1993) when they defeated Dungarvan bidding for four in a row in a rainstorm in Cappoquin) have played in eight of the last twenty county finals and have won four, the last being in 2000 when they defeated Kilrossanty.

I cannot recall when they last defeated Stradbally but their record against the "Reds" over the past few seasons is not in their favour.

Two years ago when the Nire looked to be on course to defend their 2000 title, they were beaten by Stradbally on a 1-11 to 1-8 score in the semi-final. In 2003 the clubs met twice and Stradbally emerged victorious on each occasion, first by 3-9 to 3-6 and again in the county semi-final when the score was a decisive 1-11 to 0-6.

This record will install the Nire as the outsiders, a tag that will help them approach the county final in a more relaxed note. Although Stradbally talk about winning four in a row, what they really have in mind is a five-in-a-row to equal the achievement of their great team of the forties.

I have always held the view that past or present records or tradition rarely count when teams such as Stradbally and the Nire clash in a final.

All that matters is what happens on the day and I cannot see past meetings having a bearing on how these two teams will perform here at Fraher field on Monday next.

On known form there is very little between the side and there is no reason for believing that a slight change of luck will not turn the result around in favour of the Nire. I am not saying that it will happen, but it can happen.

A draw is just what is not needed at the present time with

the Munster club championship looming two weeks later.

Stradbally are most likely to name the side which defeated Ardmore as it is their policy not to change winning combinations.



Ahane who last won the Limerick county championship back in 1999, met Mount Sion in the opening game in the Munster Club championship in Walsh Park and were narrowly beaten and were not slow to express their disappointment with the result and with the handling of the match. They played this six days after winning the title in Limerick. People in Limerick believe that Ahane are a far better side now than in 1999, with a few of their players including Clem Smith and Sean O'Connor holding All-Ireland under 21 medals and the three Moran brothers, Ollie, James and Nial (all Tipperary born and related to well known Babs Keating), goalkeeper Finbar Mc-Carthy who may be the county team keeper next Spring, now bang in form. But Ahane have yet to win the Munster Club

In the stands a huge Waterford crowd will be 'rooting ' for Mount Sion. Ahane have announced that they will have splendid support also.



There is no training we can do at this stage which will make a difference come Monday so relax take it easy, plenty rest and eat well.

We have to spare a thought for one or two of our members who unfortunately, through injury, will not be competing on the day. We all know the disappointment injury brings when one is so close to their race target, but such is life they will have their day again. From all at the club we wish all those making the trip to the capital all the very best of luck. Don't forget to wear your club singlet we will have a lot of support out there

HOW TO PREPARE IN THE LAST FEW DAYS BEFORE A RACE AND HOW TO ACTUALLY TACKLE IT

Most runners at some stage in their life will want to test themselves out with a race. It's easy to talk about it but when you actually have to get on the start and put yourself on the line things become more difficult.

Physically you should be fine if you have trained hard enough and over a long enough period of time you WILL be able to cope with the distance. The hardest part will be the mental preparation and your brain telling you strange and conflicting things about how your body feels. The final few days before any race are the most important as they can decide whether you run really well or poorly. A lot of runners find it difficult to get the last few days correct as they either over train or talk themselves out of performing well. Think of race day as wages day. It should be time to collect what is owed to you and see what you have worked so hard to get.

Banish all thoughts about not being prepared, or being too tired and concentrate on what you have done and what you have achieved in training in the last few months. It is important to ease back and rest for any race, otherwise you won't get the best out of yourself and you could under perform. The final week before race day should be a gradual decline in mileage and an increase in rest, recovery and sleep. Not everybody likes to have a complete rest day before they race but it is important to ease back so your body does recover and physically gets ready to perform to new heights. Work backwards from race day and plan your last four to five days like a military operation. Arrange your travel and kit well before race day, pack your bags the day before and make sure you get a couple of early nights to bank some sleep

EATING THE NIGHT BEFORE THE RACE

Make sure you eat something you know is ok for you and you have tried and tested before race day. It is a good idea to experiment with foods during your build up. If something doesn't agree with you (and you will know it) then definitely don't eat it before the race. Write a list of good and bad foods so you don't have to think about what to eat when you are tired after a run. You can eat as much as you want to, but the day before race day it is wise to eat often but small amounts. It is just as important to stay hydrated as well, so make sure you drink plenty of fluids. You should drink around 4-6 ounces every hour that

you are awake leading up to your race. Try and eat more healthily in the final week and make a special effort to eat more vegetables and less fat.

YOUR RACE GEAR

Be prepared! Make sure you lay out your race kit, which you plan on wearing to race in, the night before the race. It is so easy to forget something on race day, so make a list to remind you of everything you need.

D-DAY!

Extra sleep won't help you now. Get up, eat, drink and get mentally prepared. Your body will function much better on the starting line if you have been up and active for a few hours beforehand. Stay away from fried foods and remember this is not a time to experiment! Bread and jam are a safe bet if you don't feel like eating anything at all.

DON'T BE LATE — THE RACE WON'T WAIT FOR YOU

It is advisable to arrive at least an hour before the start of the race. This gives you plenty of time to check out the start and get your bearings. Traffic is always bad on race day so take this into account. This advice goes for the toilet as well. There will always be a queue so be prepared and factor this in to your arrival time.

GET WARM AND STAY WARM

You will be nervous, but you still need to warm up. By getting your warm up started, it will focus your mind better and get you ready for the race, in addition to relieving some of your pre-race anxiety. Your warm up should not wear you out, so make sure you only do easy jogging, around 5 minutes will do and some light stretching to keep and stay warm.

IT IS NEARLY TIME TO GO.

Get to your start position early as there will be a lot of runners around you all heading for the same spot. When the gun is fired don't panic, try to contain yourself and keep the pace easy for the first few minutes, this may be forced on you by the sheer number of runners around you. If you start off too hard you may well be miserable for the majority of the race and may have difficulty finishing. Once you are into the race, settle in at a pace that feels comfortable to you and enjoy the scenery.

Think positive, you have worked hard for this so it's time to enjoy yourself and reap the benefits of all those hard training runs you have been doing. Best of luck to all.



3,300 BC - a 45 yr. old man dies on the Similaun Glacier in the Alps near the present day border between Italy and Austria. His preserved body is found on 11th. September 1991

After many years of research, "Oetzi" has revealed how he once lived

He was dressed in leather clothes with a grass waterproof cloak and shoes stuffed with grass as protection against the weather.

He also had a framed backpack, a utility belt containing tools, a quiver containing 14 arrows, a flint dagger and most amazing of all, a copper

The reason why the discovery of the copper axe caused such interest is that it pre-dates the generally accepted development of copper smelting by almost 1,000 years.

(So now the history books have to be revised.)

After detailed analysis of body tissue and hair, it was discovered to contain high amounts of copper and arsenic, which can only come about from prolonged exposure to copper ore and the smelting process. This indicates that he mined the copper ore, probably from ancient mines found 120km, to the South in Italy and then melted the ore in a furnace to create the copper axe.

His quiver had a protective flap to keep the feathers dry on the arrows. The wooden arrows were fitted with flint arrowheads. Some of his ar-

rows were shorter than the others and seemed to have been made by a right-handed person indicated by the direction of the thread used to tie on the feathers. The other arrows were longer and made by a left-handed person. Why he had two different lengths of arrows remains unknown.

One possible scenario on how he lived his life is that during the winter he would travel to the copper mines. There he would mine the ore and make copper axes, possibly to trade for other items. During the summer, he would take flocks of sheep up the mountain passes to graze, maybe using his bow and arrow to protect the sheep from wolves and also for hunting. He may have traded some arrows for one of his copper axes during his travels

More recent investigation of the body, a flint arrowhead has been found embedded in his left shoulder. Someone had shot him in the back with an arrow not long before he died.

It may be the cause of his death from loss of blood and hypothermia after fleeing from the person who had shot him.

This leads to the question of why was he shot at and by whom?


