# Fire Service Issues Warning On Bonfire Dangers

With the annual bonfire night quickly approaching Dungarvan Fire Brigade has advised the public to take particular care that bonfires are properly supervised. And, they advised that all bonfires should be located appropriately to ensure no nuisance or disturbance is caused to residents living nearby.

In recent years, houses in one estate in Dungarvan were covered in dense black soot due to the close proximity of a large bonfire.

However, the numbers of serious disturbances as a result of the annual Halloween celebrations have been relatively low in the area. And Waterford County Council's Environment Section said they will not interfere with community-type bonfires provided there are no safety fears and depending on the type of the materials burned.

"Safety will be the first priority and second to that will be environmental concerns," Environmental Officer, Dan Touhy said.

Burning of all substances outdoors requires a permit, and the Fire Service is required to put

out a fire when called by the Environmental Service. However, Mr. Touhy said account will be taken that it's traditional to light Halloween bonfires.

### SAFETY

Advising the public on safety, Assistant Chief Fire Officer with the Dungarvan Fire Brigade, Des O'Brien said problems are mainly caused when bonfires are located inappropriately, by the setting off of bangers, fireworks and crackers, and by the burning of tyres.

"Bangers are one of the most dangerous items that turn up at this time of the year," Mr. O'Brien said.

"Sometimes they don't go off immediately. People pick them up in their hands and they then go off."

The result of a banger or firework going off while being held can be horrific, including the loss of fingers.

According to the South Eastern Health Board burns and other injuries as a result of fireworks are common although they couldn't confirm the number injured last year.

### RESPECT

Mr. O'Brien advised people lighting bonfires to: "Pay due

respect to neighbours and other people when lighting bonfires. Make sure they are not close to any other buildings and that smoke will not cause a disruption to them."

"Pay due respect to animals. Setting off crackers or fireworks could cause damage to a farmers livestock. They could be frightened by the noise, run away and maybe injure them-

selves. The same applies with domestic animals."

"Do not under any circumstances use petrol to light the bonfire," he warned adding that only competent people should light the bonfire.

### CAREFUL

Mr. Tuohy said provided the location and materials are proper they will not get involved.

## Two People Escape Serious Injury In Cappagh Crash

Two occupants of a vehicle, which struck a ditch while trying to negotiate the turn off to Modeligo from the Black Hill road near Cappagh, were rushed to hospital over the October bank holiday weekend.

The single vehicle accident occurred at the tight turn-off from the Cappagh-Clonmel back road on to the Modeligo road.

The vehicle struck a ditch as it attempted to negotiate the bend at around 6 o'clock on Sunday last.

While the two occupants were rushed to Wa-

terford Regional Hospital for treatment of their injuries, their injuries were said not to be life-threatening.

Both persons were said to have sustained the injuries after striking the front windscreen when thrown forward in the accident.

Fire Brigades from Dungarvan and Cappoquin, members of Dungarvan Gardai and the emergency services attended the scene.

The Black Hill road was also closed for a number of hours while the road was made safe and was opened again shortly before 8 o'clock.

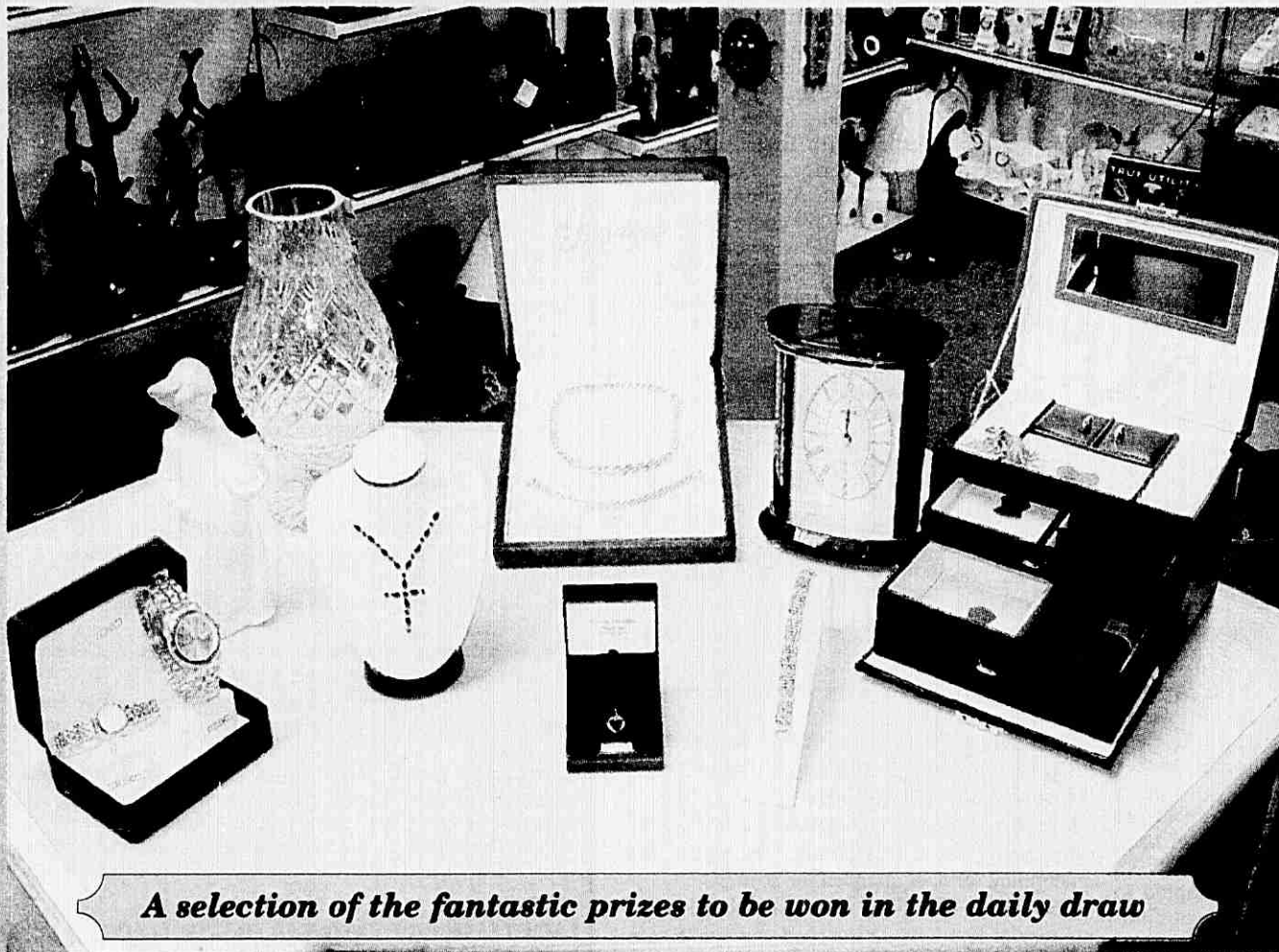

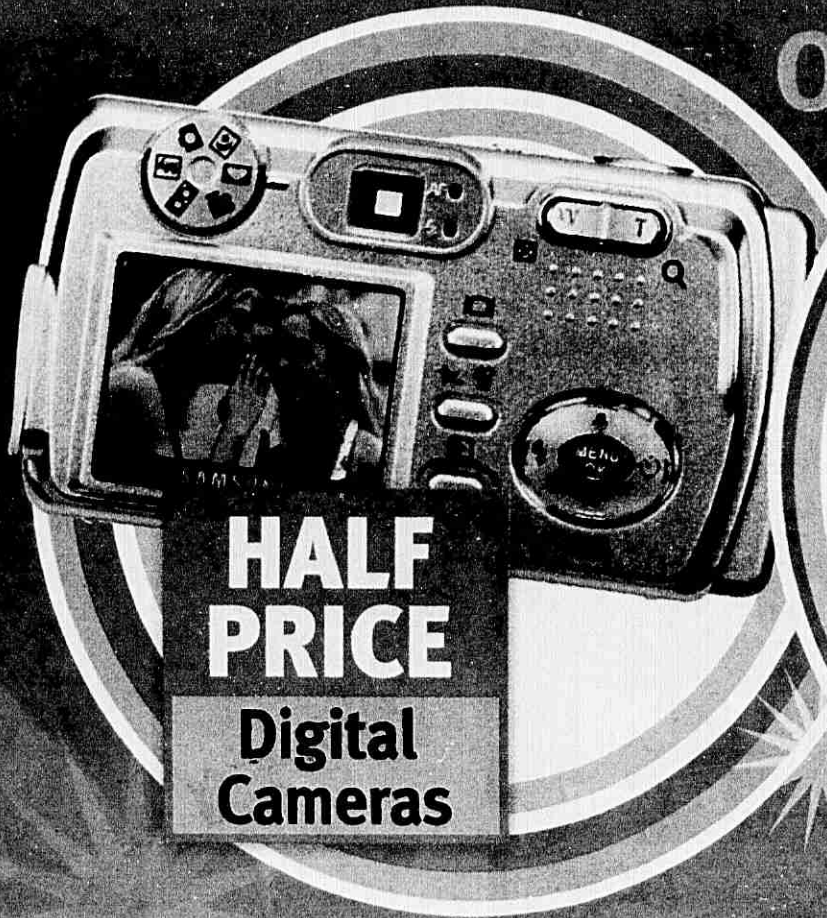

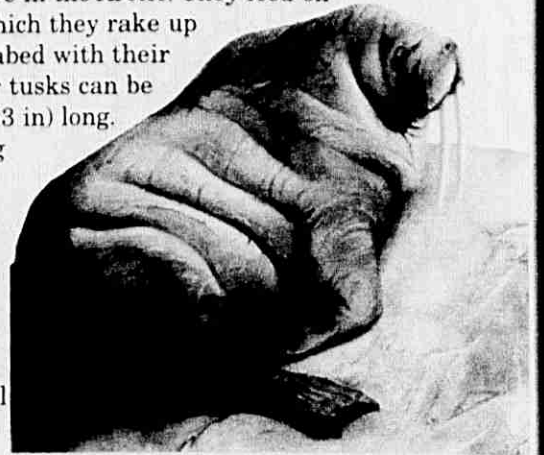

## Seals and Walruses

Seals are a large group of marine mammals made up of three families – earless seals, eared seals (which includes sea lions) and walruses. Earless seals get their name because they have no obvious external ears. You can easily tell a male walrus by its very large tusks.

**WALRUSES USE THEIR TUSKS AS CLAWS**

Walruses live in the Arctic. They feed on shellfish, which they rake up from the seabed with their tusks. Their tusks can be up to 1 m (53 in) long. Their strong teeth can break even the hardest of shells. They also use their tusks as claws to pull themselves up onto the



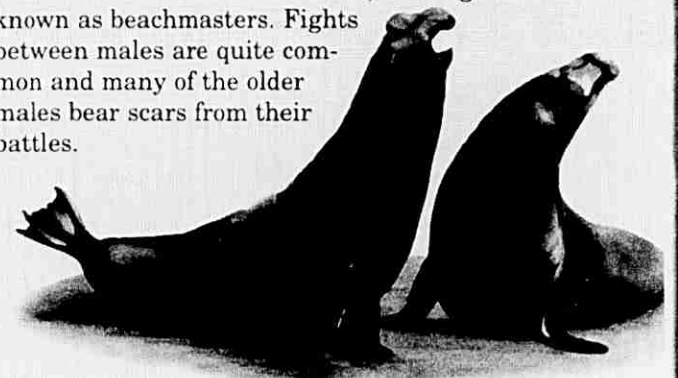
ice. The name 'walrus' comes from the Dutch word walvis, which means 'whale fish'. The walrus is related to the seal.

**WALRUSES LIKE SUN BATHING**

Although walruses use their tusks when fighting, they are normally gentle animals – in spite of their formidable appearance. Walruses like to gather together in large groups on land. During warmer weather they enjoy basking in the sun, but when it gets cold they huddle together to keep warm. Herding together also helps to protect the weaker members of the group from any predators. They will not usually attack a person unless provoked, but they will band together to attack and kill a polar bear that is unwise enough to attack one of the herd.

**ELEPHANT SEALS CAN BELLOW**

The elephant seal is the largest seal in the Antarctic. It is about 5m (16ft) long and weighs a massive 2,267kg (5,000lbs). It gets its name from its unusual swollen nose. During the breeding season the largest male collects a group of females and bellows at other males that come near. Because of this habit, the large bulls are known as beachmasters. Fights between males are quite common and many of the older males bear scars from their battles.



**DID YOU KNOW?**

- Some seals are able to dive to depths of over 250m (800ft), and can stay underwater for more than 30 minutes.
- The walrus gets its name from a Swedish word meaning 'whale horse'.
- The Inuit used the ivory tusks of the walrus to make tools.
- An elephant seal weighs almost twice as much as a hippopotamus!
- Each of a crab-eater seal's sensitive whiskers is connected to about 1,200 nerve endings!
- Sailors' tales of mermaids – half-woman, half-fish – may have been started by sightings of seals.

## No Large Scale Illegal Dumping In County Claims Co. Director

Director of Services with Waterford County Council, Denis McCarthy said he is confident no illegal dumping out of the ordinary is taking place in the county area.

A number of consignments of waste, originating from Waterford City have been found along the border county in recent months. And dumping to a large scale was also occurring in Co. Wicklow. But Mr. McCarthy said all the waste operators in County Waterford were all properly licensed and he

was confident the same situation is not happening.

Mr. McCarthy, replying to a question raised by Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) at the County Council's October meeting said a number of checks are in place, including the use of inspectors who travel around the county, and the issuing of permits to waste operators.

There was no large scale dumping that he was aware of, he said, although small scale dumping is happening to the same extent as happens in every county.

# COOKERY CORNER

## Pork & Camembert

**Cooking: 15-20 minutes**

This unusual recipe with apricot sauce needs to cook at 200C, gas mark 6.

**INGREDIENTS:**

(serves 2)

- 2 x 100g pork escalopes
- 50g Camembert cheese
- 1 x 15ml spoon plain flour
- Salt and black pepper
- 1 egg, size 3 beaten
- 50g fresh breadcrumbs
- 2 x 5 ml spoon paprika.

**Sauce:**

- 4 x 15 ml apricot jam
- 150ml white wine or orange juice

**Method:**

Place escalopes on a board between two pieces of clingfilm, flatten with a rolling pin. Cut the Camembert into two even pieces and place a piece of cheese in the centre of each escalope.

Fold meat around cheese. Mix flour and seasoning and use to coat pork and cheese parcel. In a bowl, mix breadcrumbs and paprika. Dip meat in the egg and coat thoroughly in breadcrumbs. Place on a baking sheet. Cook in a preheated oven for 20-25 minutes until golden.

In a saucepan, combine apricot jam and wine/orange juice. Bring to boil and simmer, uncovered, until sauce has reduced and thickened. Pour sauce over pork. Serve with new potatoes and selection of vegetables.



## PARTY FRUIT PLATTER

**Preparation: 20 mins.**

AN easy, no cook snack ideal for the family. The dip brings out the flavours of the juicy fresh fruits.

**INGREDIENTS:**

(serves 6)

- 2 large oranges, peeled
- 1 peach, stoned and sliced
- 1/2 watermelon, made into balls
- 1/2 cantaloupe melon, peeled and cut into small wedges
- 1/2 honeydew melon, peeled and cut into small wedges
- 225g seedless green grapes
- mint sprig to decorate

**The dip:**

- 100g low fat soft cheese
- 300ml Greek style yoghurt
- 1 tspn finely grated lime

- rind
- 2 tblspns reduced sugar marmalade
- 2 tspns crystallised ginger
- 1 tspn finely grated lemon rind to decorate.

**Method:**

Divide oranges into segments. Arrange orange segments and other prepared fruit on a large serving plate. Garnish with mint. Cover plate with cling film. Chill until required.

For the dip put cheese into a mixing bowl.

Beat with an electric mixer until very soft and fluffy.

Beat in yoghurt, lime rind and marmalade until smooth and blended. Chop ginger and stir into mixture.

Spoon dip into bowl. Cover with cling film. Chill for one hour. Garnish with lemon rind.

Serve with the fruit.

## Layered Fruit Sundaes

**Preparation: 15 minutes**

Prepare this mouth watering layered dessert in tall glasses for a professional look.

**INGREDIENTS:**

(serves 4)

- 290g can raspberries in apple juice
- 100g strawberries sliced
- 2 kiwi fruit, peeled and sliced
- 500ml tub of soft vanilla ice cream
- 12 raspberries
- 4 mint sprigs to decorate

**Method:**

Drain raspberries and reserve 2 tblspns juice from can.

Mix with a fork until smooth and runny.

Using a spoon, press raspberries through a fine sieve into a small bowl.

Discard seeds. Stir reserved juice into puree.

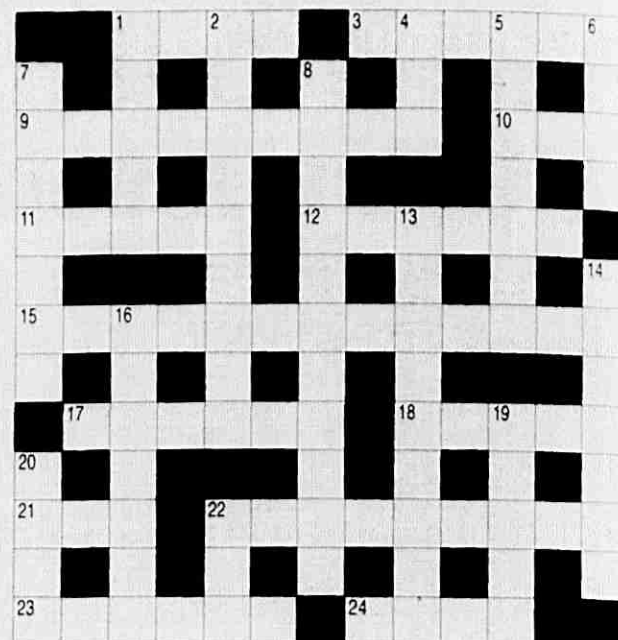
Divide 50g of the sliced strawberries between 4 tall dessert glasses. Put half the sliced kiwi fruit over the strawberries. Spoon 2 scoops ice cream into each glass.

Drizzle raspberry puree over ice cream. Put remaining strawberry slices, kiwi fruit and raspberries around the side of the puree.

Decorate with mint and serve.

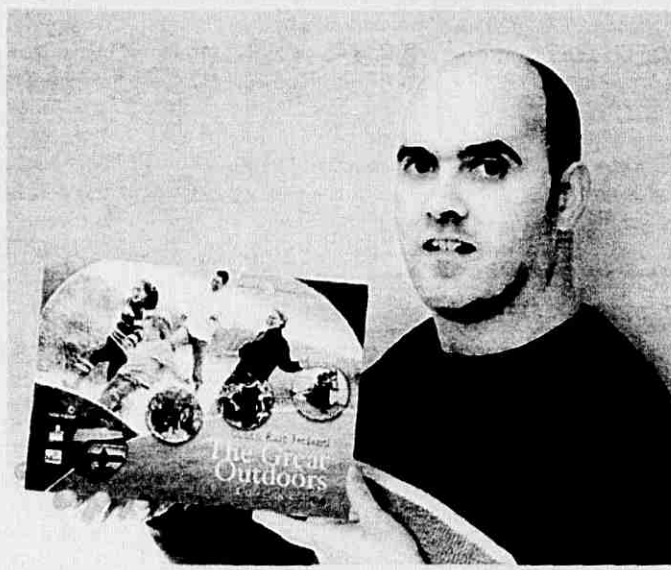

# Jobs to Tackle in the Autumn

Experts always say that autumn is an ideal time for gardening, but what they really mean is that it is time to take stock and prepare for the year ahead. Most of the priority tasks for your garden in the autumn should revolve around putting the garden to bed. But if good weather persists, keep on planting and building to save yourself time in the spring. Roots are still actively growing to store nutrients and water for winter survival and spring growth. The soil is warm and moist, making it an ideal time to work with outdoor plants. Spend a bit of time working on each of your plants before the winter freeze-up. Remove any weeds which have invaded the soil near or even over the top of a perennial. Weeds often invade early flowering perennials which die back in the summer. If left unchecked, weeds such as dandelions or burdock will kill the perennial underneath. Surround each perennial or shrub with a generous supply of compost - this will add organic matter to the soil. Bonemeal or a high phosphorous fertiliser can also be added with the compost. How much to cut down dead flowers and stems is mainly a matter of taste. Some dead flower stalks are attractive when left and allowed to show through the snow. Ornamental grasses, hydrangea, rudbeckia and mullein are a few examples of plants which should be left uncut. Never cut any perennial right down to the ground level - leaving a few inches of stubble will help to attract snow cover which will protect and insulate the roots. Trees, shrubs and perennials can all be planted in the autumn. Garden centres often sell these at a discount to

avoid the expensive overwintering procedure. It is also the time to check all tree ties and stakes before the winter storms and renew or repair any as necessary. Transplanting and dividing plants is best done in the autumn. The soil is generally easy to work with and the active root growth of the plants will quickly repair any root injury which occurred during the digging process. The equipment you need when dividing and transplanting includes a sharp spade or shovel, tags to mark the plants and a wheelbarrow full of compost. Place a compost and soil mixture in the space left after you remove or divide a plant. Use the compost to improve the soil in the new area where you are planting. Place a tag where you have moved a plant to since you may not remember that you put it there in the spring. Bulbs can be planted as you divide and transplant perennials. Consider the flowering time and colour of the perennial and plant a bulb which would be a good companion to that. Evening primrose, a rapid spreader in need of constant dividing, can be under-planted with crocus or daffodils to give an early flower show. The primrose leaves will then disguise the foliage of

the bulbs after they have ceased flowering. Ornamental onions are perfect companions to peony or artemisia. It is very important to mow the grass short for the final cut of the year. Long grass will promote a disease called snow mould, as well as provide a likely habitat for mice, voles or moles, who can cause damage to your garden. Short grass combined with a late season application of fertiliser will do an excellent job of guaranteeing you a healthy lawn next spring. While you are tidying up, don't forget to clean out debris from under hedges and compost any fallen leaves for leaf mould.



## This Week In The Garden

**Protect your outdoor chrysanthemums**  
If any of the early-flowering border chrysanthemums are still flowering well, it is advisable to rig up a temporary shelter over them. Drive a few strong stakes, about 1.5m in length, into the bed at convenient points, and join them across the top with horizontal bars nailed or tied in position. Throw some fleece over them on frosty nights, making it secure at the corners with string. It does not take much to keep off light frosts capable of ruining the flowers and buds.

**Pot on cinerarias and stocks**  
Cinerarias sown during the third week in June are likely to be in need of a move into larger containers. Give them 13cm pots and the same compost as before, but a little coarser in texture. You can keep them in a frame for a few weeks if you're careful to close it up early in the afternoon and cover with sacks on cold nights, but they will soon have to go into the greenhouse.

**Pot a final batch of freesias**  
This is the time to make a last potting of freesias to flower in the spring. Place six corms in a 13cm pot in John Innes No.1 or a peat-based potting compost. Bury the corms 2.5cm deep then stand the pots in a frame. Water moderately, shade from direct sunshine. Use the lights at night for there will be an increasing danger of frost from now on.

**Plant spring cabbage**  
Plant as many spring cabbage seedlings as possible. If you made an August sowing and there are seedlings left after the middle of October it is best to leave them undisturbed until February.

**Complete earthing up of late celery and leeks**  
Complete earthing up of celery as soon as possible. Sometimes rust appears on the leaves. Prompt removal of affected plants, followed by spraying with Bordeaux mixture, will keep it in check. Leeks should also be earthed up for the last time. The longer the length of fully blanched stem obtained, the better.

## Fire Service Issues Warning on Bonfire Dangers

"If there is not an issue with the type of materials being used or the location of the bonfire then we don't tend to interfere," he said. "Every one is different and we take them separately. But in principal if it's not interfering with the adjoining property or there's not an issue over the particular type of material being burned then we don't get involved. If it's a council estate and it looks like there's an issue with safety then obviously we will get involved with that."

Meanwhile, the National Parents Council said each year about 20 children lose part of a hand or a finger due to fireworks.

"Bonfires need to be carefully supervised by adults in safe places away from electric wires and houses. It seems obvious not to put dangerous or explosive objects in bonfires, but every year there are bonfire accidents," the parents council added.

## Oncology Group To Advise On Private Referrals

The National Radiation Oncology Co-ordinating Group will develop guidelines on funding public patients for referral to private radiotherapy centres, Minister for Health, Mary Harney said.

Responding to a Dail question from Deputy John Deasy (FG), the Minister said the Group comprises clinical, technical, managerial, academic and nursing expertise from different geographical locations.

"I expect the application of these guidelines to inform the funding of any such referrals referred to by the Deputy," she said.

The group will advise on quality assurance protocols and develop guidelines in relation to the referrals to private hospitals.

The issue of public patients requiring private referrals arose after the failure to locate a radiotherapy unit at Waterford Regional Hospital. A private hospital proposed for Waterford City plans to provide the service, leading to calls for funding for public patients to attend the hospital rather than being forced to endure long journeys to Cork and Dublin.

## Lisfennel Safety Project To Start This February

The transfer of land at Lisfennel Close, which is critical for a road safety project, should have completed its legal formalities by the end of last week.

Raising the issue, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) asked a series of questions about the status of the legal work, which had been promised by the former County Manager to have been completed a number of months ago.

However, due to holdups, at time of the October monthly meeting, only an informal agreement with the owner of the land concerned could be reached. But Joe O'Flaherty, Town Clerk with the local authority said legal representatives

had been appointed and they hoped to have the agreement formalised by the end of last week.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan said he had been given a commitment earlier in the year that work would have commenced in September and asked how long this matter would be allowed to drag on for.

"It's already dragged on for 5 years," he said.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan also expressed her concern about the delays, saying the development was to start in September, which is a quiet period of time for the business concerned.

Mr. O'Flaherty agreed that it had

dragged on but again said in 48 hours they hope to formalise the agreement and if nothing unexpected occurs, then work would start by the end of February.

That would be the first phase he said. The second phase would involve a few more houses but is hoped to be started on by the middle or end of next year.

"I understand the frustration but it only came under my remit since the last meeting."

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan suggested that the work start at both ends and that it can be concluded in the centre - a suggestion which was supported.

## SINN FEIN CLLR. CALLS FOR RETURN OF COLOMBIAN 3

The three Republican activists held for a number of years after travelling on false passports into territory held by the Marxist FARC rebels in Colombia should be immediately released from prison and given safe passage home, according to one local councillor.

Sinn Fein Councillor Brendan Mansfield proposed that Dungarvan Town Council write to the Colombian Ambassador to ask for the men's release.

However, the notice of motion did not receive a seconder because, among other reasons, that there is no Colombian Embassy in Ireland.

The Mayor of Dungarvan, Michael O'Riordan gave a warning at the beginning of the debate about the forwarding of notice of motions that regarded national or international issues rather than local ones and called into question the relevance of the motion to the council.

Cllr. Mansfield said there were parallels between the situation now and those of the Birmingham 6 and Guildford 4 when there was a similar feeling of antipathy.

"We are not looking for a lecture," Mayor O'Riordan angrily hit back.

However, Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) asked that a debate be heard and concluded.



Cllr. Michael O'Riordan

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair also of Labour said he had three points on the notice of motion: firstly that the men travelled on false passports, secondly they were found not guilty of terrorist charges but that the Colombian Government was appealing the decision, and finally that there is no Colombian Embassy in Ireland.

However, he said he would support the expedition of the appeals process.

Cllr. Kyne said he would support an amendment to the notice that the Town Council doesn't support Irish citizens travelling on false documentation to countries undergoing internal strife to the point of Civil War.

"If that amendment was added then I would support the spirit of the motion."

However as no seconder was forthcoming the notice of motion and the amendment was lost.

## TEMPORARY BUS STOP NOT TO BE PERMANENT

The temporary Bus Stop on the Causeway in Abbeyside would not be a favoured location for a permanent stop, the Town Council heard.

Cllr. Fred Forsey (FG) called for the Causeway to become permanent once the new shopping centre development opens.

The bus stop is currently on the Causeway while the sewerage works are carried out outside the Civic Offices, which have closed the road.

However, the proposal was met with significant opposition from other members of the council.

Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab) said the Causeway is the town's most scenic view for people coming into

the town and it must be protected.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) was also against the plan, saying that she would be relieved when the bus stop is moved away from the Causeway again as there are a lot of children waiting in groups for buses on the busy road.

"I'm only glad it is temporary," she said. "A shelter would only take away the view of the water."

While the temporary stop won't become permanent, the two barrels alerting people to the location of the stop should be removed, according to Cllr. Kyne.

Cllr. Kyne said the barrels are unsightly and it wouldn't take much effort to attach a sign to the lamp-posts nearby instead.

## Double Yellow Lines At Davis Street

Dungarvan Town Council has agreed to put double yellow lines on the street where the front door of an elderly resident's house was constantly being blocked by cars parking in front of it.

The situation - highlighted in the 'Dungarvan Leader' a number of weeks ago - was the result of there being no footpath on the street.

Both the elderly man, who is blind, and his carer have often been blocked from gaining access due to the thoughtless actions of motorists who have parked right outside his door.

Dan O'Donovan said the yellow lines would hopefully stop the situation occurring in the future.

While Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab) warned that it might cause a precedent Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty assured the council that this wouldn't be the case.

## Council To Send NRA Letter On Spring Roundabout

Dungarvan Town Council is to write to the National Roads Authority to seek to put safety measures in place at the dangerous Spring Roundabout.

The five exit roundabout was said to be a danger to people from Dungarvan and to people passing through the town.

Cllr. Teresa Wright (Lab) asked why no action on cutting back the hedge at the roundabout had been taken.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab) added that a five-exit roundabout is unsafe but said despite assurances that something would be done, "we hear tonight that we are back to square one."

Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Indp) said the NRA was to discuss the Spring roundabout during the discussions on road improvements at Cushcam and at the Burgery.

"Two things need to be done," Cllr. Geoghegan said. "The hedge needs to be cut back and extra signage needs to be put in place to warn drivers in advance."

The Labour councillor said the church is a very important piece of local heritage and he proposed putting in place a sign to identify it, and to tidy it up and make it structurally sound.

He said the church is a listed building and should be protected.

Town Engineer Dan O'Donovan said the matter has been discussed with the Office of Public Works and they are aware of it.

Cllr. Brendan Mansfield has called on CIE to run an 8am bus service to Waterford to cater for the ever increasing number of young people from Dungarvan attending third level courses at WIT.

Cllr. Mansfield (SF) said the current 7.30am service was unsuitable for college students as the college isn't even open when they arrive. He said the situation was even worse for those attending college in Cork City.

One person who contacted him about the issue missed three or four lectures a week because the bus arrived well after the college started.

He said it would be well worth writing to Bus Eireann asking for a better service for those attending third level courses.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF) supported the motion and said she would bring the matter up at a meeting of the WIT.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) said he would like to support the motion, but the likelihood of receiving a good response from Bus Eireann was remote considering the failure of the semi-state body to put in place bus shelters at the Spring despite numerous requests.

The motion was also supported by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab) who said accommodation is one of the major costs facing students and said a direct link with the college would be a good selling point when trying to attract new industries.

AGRICULTURE AND FOOD DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

**SINGLE PAYMENT SCHEME**

The vast majority of farmers have received their provisional entitlement certificates from the Department of Agriculture at this stage. Those who applied for force majeure, applied as new entrants or farmers who did not send in an area aid form in the reference period may not have received their certificate yet. If you are not satisfied that all of the details on your provisional entitlement certificate are correct or if your circumstances have changed. Use one of the following forms to query your entitlements.

**Force Majeure:-** If your entitlements have been reduced due to death of farmer, long term professional incapacity of farmer, severe natural disaster which gravely affects the land, accidental destruction of livestock buildings or an epizootic disease affecting all or part of the farmers livestock you must apply before October 29th.

**Force Majeure - Dairy Premium Scheme:** Farmers who hold a milk quota and who consider that their milk quota and who consider that their milk production during the 2004/2005 milk quota year was adversely affected by force majeure/exceptional circumstances (listed above) must apply on this form to have their case considered. If successful they will be given permission to temporary lease the non - utilised quota and be eligible for the decoupled dairy premium on the entire quota.

**Single Payment Scheme (scission):-** This form is for farmers who divided their holding (scission) during the reference period or prior to 15 May 2005 into two or more holdings. Entitlements will be calculated on a pro rata basis under the same conditions as the farmer farming the original holding provided:-

● one of the farms, following the division of the original holding must be controlled by at least one of the persons who controlled the original holding;

or

● the division of a holding resulting in at least one new holding where the original farmer remains in control of the remaining part of the holding. Closing date is October 29th.

**New Entrants/Inheritors:-** This application form should be used by farmers who commenced farming during the reference period (2000/2002) and/or farmers who inherited all or part of a holding from another farmer who was in receipt of direct payments during the reference period in relation to the establishment of entitlements.

Closing date October 29th

**No Area Aid Application during reference period:-** Farmers who were not required to submit an area aid form during the reference period (2000/2002) and now wish to have their entitlements based on their forage area farmed during the reference period as the area declared in 2004 was greater should apply using this form. Closing date not later than 4 weeks from the date of receipt of statement of provisional entitlements.

**Partnerships/Mergers:-** Farmers who entered a partnership/merger shall have the entitlements established on the basis of the reference amount and number of hectares relating to the original holdings. The merged holding must be controlled by the farmers originally managing the holdings prior to the merger or originally managing one of the merged holdings. Closing date November 12th.

**Review Form:-** There is also a form available for farmers who want the information on the statement of provisional entitlements reviewed by the Department of Agriculture. Specific reasons why a review is being requested, must be given.

**Changes in Personal Details:-** If the personal details (name, address, PPS no., date of birth etc.) on your statement of provisional entitlements are incorrect, you may have the details amended by completing this form. Closing date October 29th.

**Change in legal status:-** This application form is for farmers who changed their status from a natural person to a legal person (e.g. limited company) or vice versa, or where changes have occurred in the legal status of a legal person and wish to transfer the single payment entitlements to the new legal person. Closing date Friday November 12th.

**FARMING LEADER****IFA PRESENTS NEW FARMING AGENDA TO GOVERNMENT IN ITS 2005 BUDGET SUBMISSION****CONSOLIDATION, SCALE, EFFICIENCY AND ENVIRONMENTAL INVESTMENT - KEY TARGETS**

At a recent meeting with Finance Minister, Brian Cowen, IFA President John Dillon pressed the Association's case for important changes to the Capital Gains Tax and Stamp Duty Codes to enable farmers build their productive capacity to compete post the Fischer CAP Reform, and EU enlargement.

He said: "In our 2005 pre-Budget Submission, IFA is calling for Government action to encourage farmers to consolidate their holdings and achieve the scale they need to compete, not just on a national and European scale, but also on world markets. It is a national imperative that we encourage farmers to maximize their efficiency through attaining a farming structure that is efficient and has the necessary scale to compete."

"Almost 30 % of Irish farmers are in four or more separate parcels of land. Just 28% of holdings are in a single parcel of land. This level of fragmentation increases costs and inefficiencies within farming, and is unsustainable in the highly competitive post CAP and WTO environment we now face."

Mr. Dillon said that IFA has urged Minister Cowen to introduce a targeted re-investment relief from Capital Gains Tax and to extend Stamp Duty Relief to allow committed farmers achieve this goal. He said: "As the Government has taken the lead in the modernization of the Irish industrial and services sectors, a similar approach is essential to maintain a viable agricultural and food industry to underpin the 300,000 jobs on farms, in food processing and the service industries in rural Ireland."

Mr. Dillon said that Irish farmers must also spend substantial additional funds in environmental protection, with the imminent introduction of a Nitrates Action Programme which will require farmers to provide for further increases to animal manure storage on farms. A very conservative estimate of this cost is in excess of 1 billion - money that is simply not available within farming itself.

He said that IFA is pressing for a once-off accelerated Action Programme to implement the Nitrates Directive. This should include a significant increase in farm grant support for environmental investment, with an increase in grant aid up to 75% and an accelerated write-off of environmental expenditure against income during the period of the first Nitrates Action Programme.

IFA Farm Business Committee Chairman, Eddie Downey, said that IFA has sought an increase in the farmers' VAT refund rate to 5.3% and an increase in personal tax credits for all tax payers following the freezing of tax credits for the past three years.

He said: "IFA will not accept any sectoral increase in tax credits to some, but not all, tax payers, through increases in the

PAYE tax credit in this years Budget."

Mr. Downey said that IFA also urged Minister Cowen to deliver on the Government's commit-

ment to reduce animal disease levies on farmers to their pre-Budget 2003 level. He said this requires a reduction of 5 million, which is less than the 6

**IFA Says Single Farm Payment Deductions Must Be Kept To a Minimum**

IFA National Livestock Committee Chairman John Bryan has restated the IFA position that deductions from farmers' Single Farm Payment entitlements must be kept to a minimum and must not exceed 3% before modulation.

Mr. Bryan said farmers are very strong in the view that decoupling must not impose excessive cut backs on their premium payments. "Farmers are demanding that the percentage deduction for the National Reserve and all other linear cuts must not exceed 3%."

Mr. Bryan said in addition to the 3% deduction for the National Reserve and linear cut, producers face a further cut for modulation increasing from 3% in 2005 to 5% in 2007.

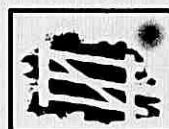
"The means by 2007, producers will encounter an 8% cut in their direct payments. Taking account of the 5,000 franchise on modulation where no deduction applies, a producer with direct payments of 14,000 p.a. is facing an annual cut of 870 on their direct payments. Under no circumstances can these deductions be allowed to increase as direct payment make up over 100% of net farm income in the majority of circumstances."

**BOVINE TB AND BRUCELLOSIS ERADICATION SCHEMES 2004/2005 HARDSHIP GRANT**

1. The 2004/2005 Hardship Grant eligibility period will commence on 1 November 2004. It is designed to alleviate the costs difficulty of some owner/keepers whose holdings are restricted on foot of a herd re-test and where animals are retained and fed during periods of restriction. Potentially eligible owner/keepers must meet certain conditions including requirements that they (i) must not have any income from milk sales, and (ii) must not have any off farm income. The Grant may provide eligible owner/keepers with a payment of up to €250 per month for a period not exceeding 4 months within the period 1 November 2004 to 30 April 2005.
2. The specific eligibility criteria attaching to the Hardship Grant are outlined in the terms and conditions document which will accompany the application form ER97. Potentially eligible owner/keepers will be issued with the terms and conditions document, important notice and application form ER 97 by the District Veterinary Office. Supplies of the relevant documentation will also be available at District Veterinary Offices.
3. The onus is on potentially eligible owner/keepers whose holdings are or may be restricted at a re-test at 1 November 2004 or during the period 1 November 2004 to 30 April 2005 to ensure that they obtain and familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions document and application form ER 97. **The onus is on the owner/keeper to apply for a Hardship Grant.**

**Note:**

Owner/Keepers who received Hardship Grant payments in respect of a previous cycle of the Hardship Grant Scheme can qualify for a Hardship Grant during the current eligibility period 1 November 2004 to 30 April 2005 provided they meet all the eligibility criteria for 2004/2005 Hardship Grant.

# THE BALLYRAFTER CENTRE LISMORE



The Autumn League Final for horses at The Ballyrafter Centre, Lismore last Saturday proved an all girl affair, with Noreen Quealy, Ballinamult and Jennifer Lalor, Clonmel scoring doubles and the other final going to Michelle Griffin, Kilgobnet. Several riders remarked how desperately competitive every final was, so nothing was handed out lightly.

Michelle Griffin and her great partner "Lord Windermere" took every short route possible in the 0-90m final and could not be caught with 32.75 on the clock. Anita Hegarty, Castlelyons got close with the four-year-old "Juan Time" by Don Juan de la Bouverie in 34.47 and local rider Sibylle Knobel and "Furzknock Fairy" slotted nicely into third. Alice Fitzgerald, Youghal and "Glenlickey Rose" took the leading horse award with a maximum score in the League. The 1-00m final turned into a proper battle between Noreen Quealy, Fintan Hunt, Cork and Gemma Phelan, Cappagh. 12 horses went through to the jump-off but it was the last three in who decided things. Noreen and "Barracree Carlton" by "Minstrel Bouncer" shot round in 30.77 then Fintan had a real go with "Mount Falcon Beau" who is part bred trotter but he had to go round the penultimate fence and came home in 33.39. Gemma with "Barnastook" just a four year old by "Clover Dubh" also missed the last turn, the lovely bay showing his inexperience but took third in 35.33. Cecil Gormley, from Corbally in Limerick took the leading horse trophy for her own "Blizzard Beach".

Noreen Quealy was having super finals but it wasn't over for this 16 year old yet. Taking her sister Caroline's amateur campaigner "Barracree Crystal" first of 7 in the 1-10m final she went full pace and put extreme pressure on those to follow, Lorcan Hennessy, White's Cross with his 6 year-old stallion "Ballynoe Night Cruise" by "Cruising" jumped superbly throughout and just a touch off the last fence meant four faults but in the quickest time which secured him second when a similar fate affected the others. Kate Morrissey, Dungarvan was a very credible third with "Kilgrovan Lad" which the 15 year-old schoolgirl has produced herself and Sally Lonergan, Dungarvan won the award for the leading horse with "Beechgrove Hazel" but missed the final due to the Young Riders class in Millstreet.

Jennifer Lalor took the 1-30m final on "Euro Blade" from Sean Kelly, Watergrasshill with his stallion "Rineen Clover" by "Clover Hill" and the leading horse award was won by Niamh O'Connor, Kilbrittan and "Bawnea M & M. Jennifer also won the

1-20m final with David Murphy's "Rosshaven Rhia". Stevie Keane, Kereen with Margo Harty's "Young Ilvico" set the pace of 44.98 but then Sean

Walsh, Ballincollig and the lovely mare "Enigma" by "Viking" took fractions off to go ahead in 44.83. However Jennifer had the chestnut mare flying and taking a real chance at fence 9 flew home the winner in 42.52. Noel Walsh, Fermoy had secured the leading award for "Diamond Beach".

The Castle League Finals held on Thursday evening were tremendous fun. The first final of the evening for new pony riders was fantastic and these little ones from as young as seven rode brilliantly. Sheila and her family were parishioners of St. Peter's Church for the last thirty-six years. During that time, Sheila was very involved in parish activities and worked in the school cafeteria for a number of years. She also worked at the Andrus Retirement Home in Hastings on Hudson, NY. Sheila had a wide circle of friends in the U.S. and in Ireland with whom she always kept in touch, especially at Christmas and at other special occasions. A lifelong member of the County Waterford S.P. & B. Association, the Waterford Hurling and Football Club, and the Rangers Gaelic Football Club, Sheila gave of her time unselfishly and was a tireless supporter of all the clubs' activities. It is with deep and sincere regret we record the death of Mrs. Mae O'Shea-Curran (nee Roles), Elmpark and late Plunket Tce., Clonmel which sad event took place at south Tipperary General Hospital, Clonmel, recently. She will be remembered especially for her cheerful, friendly disposition and her selfless devotion to his family, with whom she had such a happy rapport over the years. Her passing too, evokes memories of her impeccable sartorial taste and of course, her deftness with the sewing needle which, no doubt, was inherited from her grandfather, who was a well known tailor. She was daughter of James and Margaret Roles, Knocklucas, Old Bridge, Clonmel. She had one sister and three brothers, all of which were Stone Masons, like their dad who had the distinction of building the Liam Lynch Stone Monument on the Knockmealdown Mountains back in the 30's. Despite the straitened circumstances of the times, Mae stayed on in school to do her Leaving Certificate Exams in the hope of pursuing a career in nursing but, unfortunately, due to circumstances it wasn't to be. She subsequently married David Curran from Barrettstown, Fethard, who was a plasterer and a part time fireman with South Tipperary County Council. David passed to his reward at a young age, leaving his wife on her own to look after five children. A resourceful person, Mae decided to use her God given talents and started sewing for people in order to make ends meet. Some years later she married Mikey O'Shea a widower with two children, and from her marriage

to Mickey they had two children. Her life revolved around her family and children from both marriages, whom she loved to bring them to Tramore on the train and bus, as well as taking them on long walks and picnics. She even camped with them and they had a mobile home in lovely Bonmahon which gave them much pleasure.

Sadly Mickey passed away leaving her once more a widow, and two years later she had the heartbreak of losing her son Michael in England at the age of 42. She, also had to endure the tragic death of her stepson John. Her sewing skills were well known in the locality, where she was so much in demand, not alone by neighbours, but by such as the Medical Missionaries of Mary, Sister Joachin and by the priests of the parish. A great knitter too, her fairishes and kilts were always particularly admired. Her children, too, they were thrilled to be given little jobs by their mother in the preparation of the ingredients for her delicious mouthwatering buns, tarts and apple dumplings for which Mae was renowned. They too listened wide eyed to their mother recounting stories from her childhood in Knocklucas and telling them about the arduous, daily chores she had to do, like carrying buckets of water from the well some distance from the house. The family have the consolation of having such memories of a wonderful mother, whose main interest in life was their welfare. Her departure has left an aching void in their hearts, but they are so glad she had such a full life surrounded by a loving family.

Hospitalised for a month in South Tipperary Hospital, Clonmel, her family members were with her day and night. Her remains were removed to S.S. Peter & Paul's Parish Church where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Colm O'Brien C.C. ## From Charles Smith's History of Waterford 1745

### Decies Within Drum

Part of the parish of Rineogannah is well cultivated, particularly that which lies contiguous to the harbour of Dungarvan, the sides of the hills being tilled to the very top. Especially on the north side, the S. side being coarse bog, is unfit for culture, only according to turf, except a few tracts near the sea, which are mostly pasture. The fertili-

ty of this range of hills on the N. side holds, through their extent in this county, affording not only barley, oats and potatoes, but also wheat in considerable quantities, which is in a great measure owing to the excellent manure of sea-sand taken up in the harbour of Dungarvan. The parish church is here, as in most other places, in ruins, it is, together with a well near it, dedicated to St. Nicholas and is much resorted to by those of the Church of Rome on the patron-day of that saint. At Killunkart are the remains of an old building, said by tradition to have been an house of the Knights-Templars; though it seems not to have been any other than one of their manor-houses, which they had dispersed up and down for the better collecting of their rents.

### Ardmore

It lies shelving upon the point of a rock, and on the Patron-day of this saint, great numbers creep under this stone three times, in order (as they pretend) to cure and prevent pains in the back. This stone, they tell you, swam miraculously from Rome, conveying upon it St. Declan's Bell and vestments. Near this church is a well dedicated to the same saint, to which, as well as to the stone, many miraculous virtues are attributed by the superstitious people. The other church stands a mile N.W. of the former, and by its appearance, seems very ancient. There is a handsome Gothic arch still remaining, which separates the body of the church from the chancel. The pillars supporting it are somewhat more massive than those of the Tuscan order, their thickness denotes the antiquity of the building. The chancel only of the church is roofed, and divine service used therein. On the W. end of the church are the remains of some figures, venerable for their antiquity, done in Alto Relievo, in freestone, the whole appears to have been the epitome of the history of the Old Testament, and seems to have been properly contrived to instruct the ignorant natives in those dark ages in the principles of the true religion. A round tower stands near this church, above 100 feet high, excellently well built of hewn stone. It has, no doubt, been used for a belfry or steeple, there being towards the top, not only four opposite windows to let out the sound, but also three pieces of oak still remaining, on which the bell was hung. There are also two chancels cut in the cill of the door, where the rope came out, the ringer standing below the door without side.

# Dungarvan Educate Together school a step closer

Following a well attending information meeting at which great interest was expressed in this educational initiative the proposed Educate Together school for Dungarvan moved a step closer to becoming a reality. New committee members were recruited, members of the Dungarvan Educate Together association were signed up and the next phase of getting this school off the ground was announced.

Paul Roe, Chief Executive of Educate Together the representative organisation for multi-denominational education in Ireland, addressed the meeting and outlined the vision of Educate Together for a society where those of all cultures and denominations were welcome and equal. He talked about the core principles of Educate Together, which are:

1 Understanding other cultures, values and religions is a cornerstone of education. Every child will be respected and have equal rights of access to the school.

1 Children learn with and from other children. Boys and girls will learn together.

1 Education should be fun, about working together and about helping every child get the most out of themselves. Children can learn in lots of ways, not just from textbooks.

1 Parents are really important and have a huge range of skills that can help in running the school. Parents and teachers run the school together, with respect for the professional

role of the teachers.

Paul spoke of the changes that will take place in Irish and global society and said that we, in Ireland and Dungarvan, need to prepare for these. He said that Educate Together was about offering choice and that what made Educate Together schools different was not that they had a curriculum that was different or that its teachers were funded or trained in any different way to other schools but it was that they operated from a core ethos of inclusiveness and did not concentrate on one particular set of beliefs.

It was also stated that Educate Together schools are non-fee paying National School operating under the direction of the Department of Education and not private schools as is sometimes mistakenly believed.

In concluding the meeting Martin Fitzgerald, committee member with Dungarvan Educate Together, announced details of the next phase of the getting an Educate Together school for Dungarvan. He said that a pre-enrolment process would now take place. The pre-enrolment process involves parents indicating an interest in their child attending the school. This information is then used by the Department of Education and Science to decide if funding for the school will be made available.

Pre-enrolment will take place in the Park Hotel, Dungarvan on Sat-

urday 6th November at 10.00 a.m. - 2.00 p.m. Parents are invited to pre-enrol their children on that day and/or get more information about Educate Together. Parents can feel free to bring their children along on the day. Martin Fitzgerald added that the actual process of pre-enrolling will be quiet short but the opportunity to talk to like minded parents would also be provided for those who wish to do so.

# DUNGARVAN CAMERA CLUB

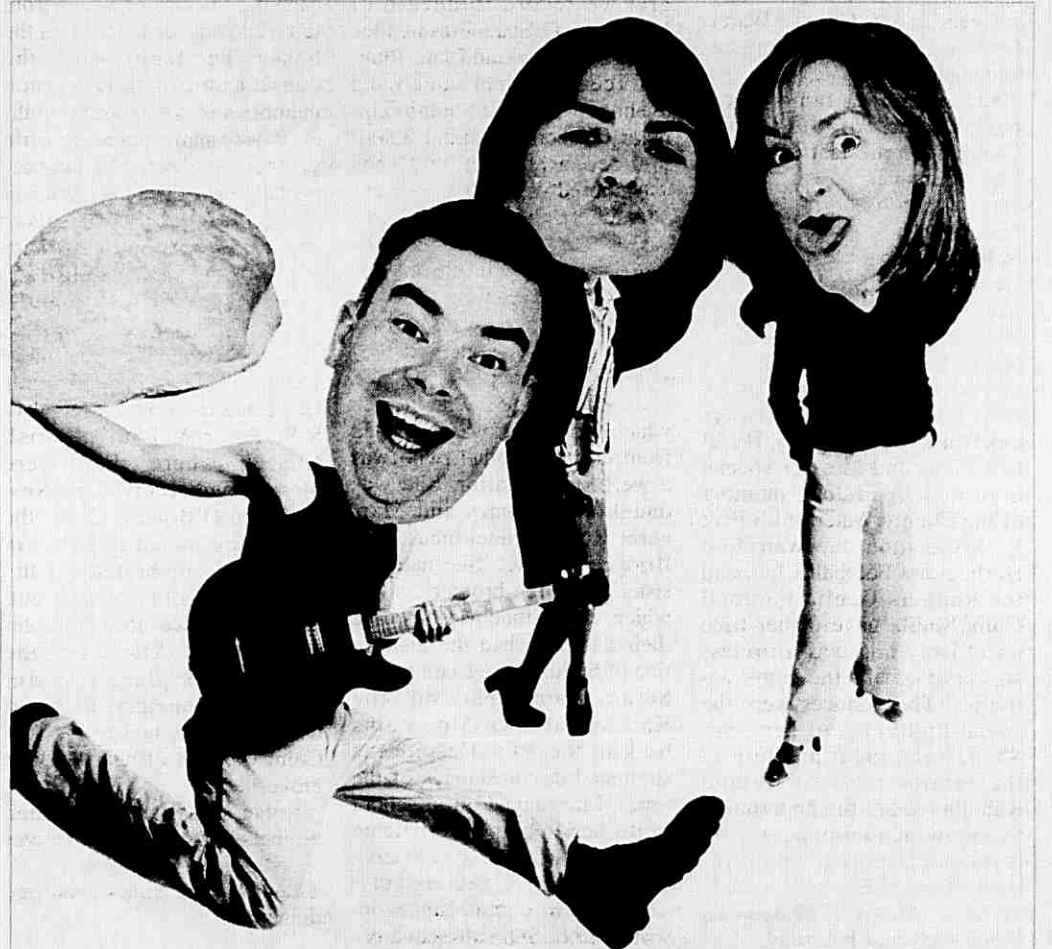

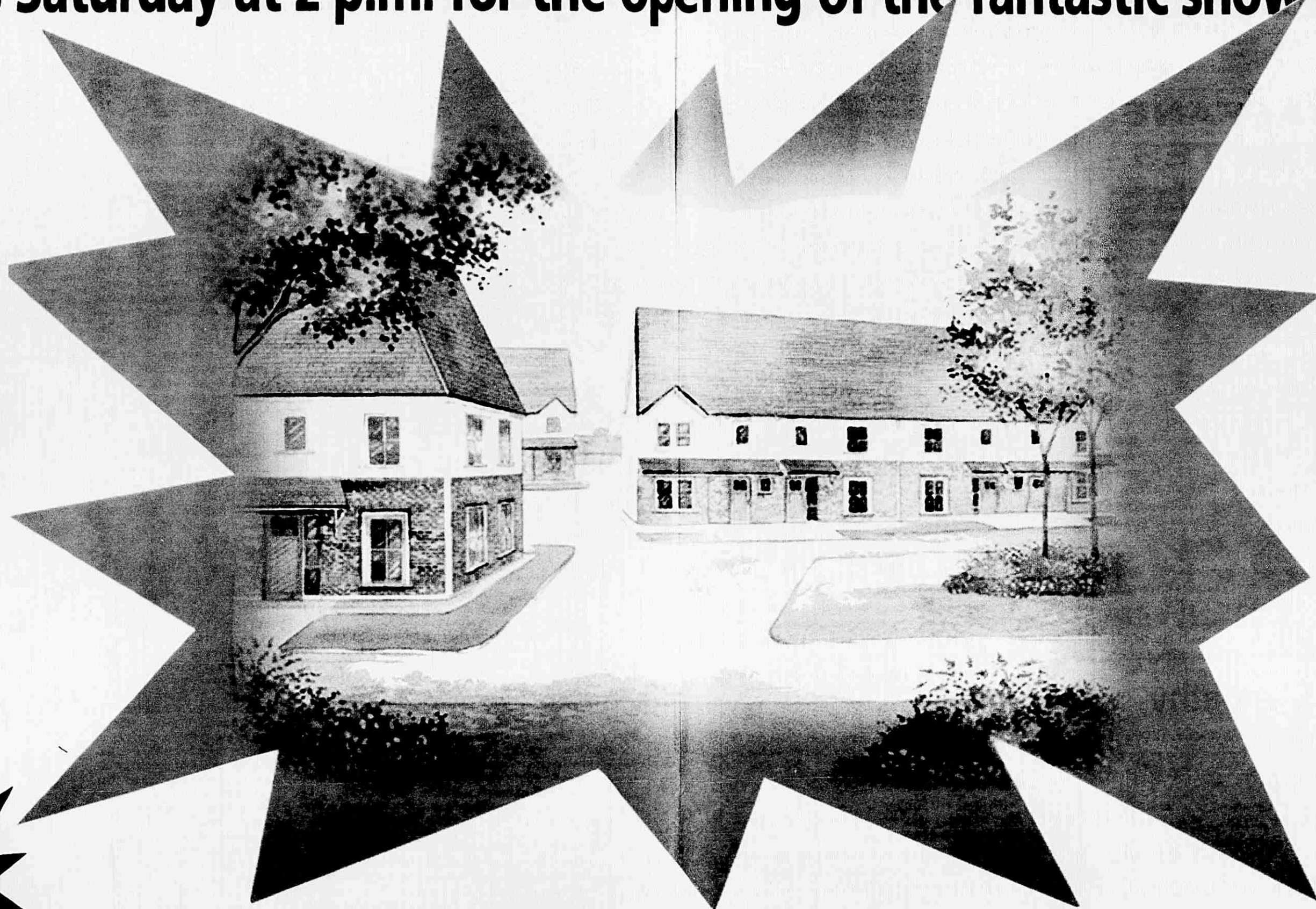

# KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

**QUESTION**

I am applying for a Fuel Allowance under the National Fuel Scheme. If I am eligible for it how much will I receive?

**ANSWER**

The National Fuel Scheme, operated by the Department of Social and Family Affairs, is intended to help people who are dependent on long term social welfare or health board payments as their sole income and who are unable to meet their heating needs.

Under the scheme people who qualify for the Fuel Allowance receive an extra €9.00 per week. If you qualify for the basic Fuel Allowance you may also qualify for an extra €3.90 per week for smokeless fuel, but only if you live in an area where there is a ban on smoky coal.

The €3.90 may also be payable to those receiving Disability Benefit or Unemployment Benefit/Assistance for at least 13 weeks and to those receiving Family Income Supplement, who do not qualify for the basic allowance.

In order to qualify for the Fuel Allowance you must satisfy a means test. You and the members of your household cannot have more than €50.79 per week in combined income above the appropriate maximum Irish contributory pension/benefit rate or savings/capital of €41,901.36 or more above it. For example, someone without any savings receiving a Widow's or Widower's Contributory Pension of €140.30 per week should qualify if his/her weekly income does not exceed €140.30 plus €50.79 i.e. €191.09.

However, if you are already on a means tested payment you will not be subject to another means test for the Fuel Allowance. Where two or more people living in the same household would qualify for the allowance, only one allowance will be paid.

The allowance is paid for 29 weeks from the first week in October to late April. If you think you are eligible you should apply immediately as the allowance will not be backdated if you apply after the start of the heating season. Application forms (NFS1) are available from any Post Office or your local Social Welfare Office. Further information is available from the Citizens Information Centre below.

# DISABILITY AWARENESS MULTIPLE SCLEROSIS

**What is Multiple Sclerosis?**

The disability Multiple Sclerosis is a chronic neurological condition that affects the nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord. In MS misguided cells of the central nervous system destroy areas of myelin, (myelin is a fatty substance that insulates the nerve fibers and facilitates the smooth transmission of high speed messages between the brain, spinal cord, and the rest of the body). This leads to formation of plaque and the eventual build-up of scar tissue (sclerosis) at the site. The scar tissue tends to form at various locations; this is why the disease has been termed Multiple Sclerosis.

**What causes Multiple Sclerosis?**

Although the cause of MS still remains unknown, researchers are continually learning more about the disability. Many believe that MS is an autoimmune disease that results when the body begins to attack its own tissue. Normally, the immune system works by recognizing foreign invaders and producing its own cells to counteract or defend against attacks. In MS, the immune system is disrupted as the body incorrectly identifies itself as an invader and begins to attack its own cells. In the case of MS, the body no longer recognizes myelin as its own and then declares war on this sensitive nerve tissue.

**What are the Symptoms of Multiple Sclerosis?**

The symptoms of MS present themselves in a variety of ways, they can be mild or severe, short-lived or longer lasting and they often emerge in different combinations. The disability is often characterized by intermittent periods of relapse, followed by partial or complete remission. Some people with MS show little or no progression of symptoms after the first attack, while others suffer a rapid progression of the disease that can result in severe disability.

Some of the symptoms of MS are as follows:

- Visual disturbances
- Muscle weakness
- Sensory disturbances
- Speech difficulties
- Cognitive impairment (memory problems, difficulty in concentrating etc.)

**Treatment for Multiple Sclerosis**

At present there is no known cure for MS or any known prevention, the primary focus of everyday care is aimed at managing the symptoms and to stabilize the progression of the disability. The most frequently prescribed treatments for MS are aimed at modifying the immune system response and reducing inflammatory effects.

Researchers continue in their efforts to find new therapies that will affect the overall course of MS, there are a variety of drugs available to aid in controlling the symptoms of MS. (This article is to make people aware of different disabilities, and is information only; it is not a replacement for professional medical advice).

# "Lutheran" Vespers In Lismore Cathedral

For the Protestant of the Lutheran tradition, 31st October is Reformation Day. On that day in 1517 the Augustine monk Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany, criticising a number of abuses in the Roman Catholic Church of his day. As the next day would be All Saints, he could be certain that his theses would not go unnoticed. Within a few years Luther had followers all over Europe. The movement he started eventually resulted in the foundation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, still prominent in many parts of Germany, the Scandinavian countries and elsewhere.

As next Sunday will be 31st October, Choral Evensong in St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore, will be dedicated to these events. The service will mainly follow the order for Evening prayer of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America, but also contain elements from the Vespers liturgy of the German Lutheran Church. Nearly all of the service will be sung, either by the Dean, the Very Revd William Beare or by St. Carthage

Singers, the choir in residence of the Cathedral and the congregation.

Martin Luther was a very musical man and very ecumenical in his musical approach. The first collections of 'Protestant' sacred music in Germany contained many works by Roman Catholic composers. One of these compositions will be sung in the Lismore service: 'Come to me all ye that are heavily laden' by Arnold Von Bruck, who lived c.1500-1554. Von Bruck was a priest and gained fame as musical director at the court of the Austrian emperor Ferdinand I. Cathedral organist and choirmaster Jan Van Putten will play some organ chorales by Ernst Pepping, a post romantic German composer (1901-1981).

A lot of work has gone into the preparation for this service. All who are involved are very happy with the result. This 'Lutheran' sung Evening Prayer commences at 5:00pm next Sunday. All are welcome to take part, to sing or just listen.

## New Rural Social Scheme Announced To Benefit Farmers & Fishermen In County Waterford

The Minister for Community, Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs, Mr. Eamon O Cuiv, recently announced the guidelines for the new Rural Social Scheme (RSS). The aims of the RSS are to provide income support for farmers and fishermen who are currently in receipt of long term social welfare payment or those farmers who are on FAS CE, or have completed their time on a FAS CE project and to provide certain services of benefit to the rural communities. The type of work to be undertaken by each farmer or spouse under the RSS are likely to include the following:

- Maintaining and enhancing waymarked ways, agreed walks and bog roads.
  - Energy conservation work for the elderly and the less well off.
  - Village and countryside enhancement projects.
  - Social care and care of the elderly, community care for both pre-school and after-school groups.
  - Environmental maintenance work - maintenance and caretaking of community and sporting facilities
  - Projects relating to not for profit cultural and heritage centres.
- Any other appropriate community project identified during the course of the scheme Each farmer or spouse will work 19.5 hours a week for one year and this will be reviewed at the end of the first year. To be eligible to participate in the RSS you must be in receipt of Farm Assist or have a herd number and be in receipt of one of the following allowances;
- Unemployment Assistance
  - Unemployment Benefit if previously on CE
  - Disability Allowance

The same guidelines applies to self-employed fishermen whose fishing boat has been entered in the Register of Fishing Boats or have been issued with a fishing license for fishing for salmon at sea. Should a farmer be deemed eligible for the RSS but does not wish to participate in it, a dependent spouse can take the available place. # County Waterford Walking and Walkways Strategy

Let us make County Waterford the Walking Capital of Ireland! As part of the development of the above work, there will be a series of public meetings in each of the five electoral areas over the next couple of weeks. During the development of the Economic, Social and Cultural Strategy for County Waterford, 2002-2012, Walking was one of the areas which was seen as having the potential to attract more visitors to the County while also being of major benefit to the communities of the County in terms of health and well-being.

As a result, a very-well attended and positive meeting of the main interested parties was held in Dungarvan recently with the decision to have a number of consultations over the next month or so in order to have this strategy in place before the end of the year. It is well recognised that County Waterford is one of the most scenic counties in Ireland with its mountains, valleys and coastline. Equally, it has a tremendous diversity of ecology and environment. A person can best understand and appreciate this beauty and diversity when walking or cycling through it. At a time of growing interest in formal and informal walking, when visiting walkers contribute significantly to local economies, when obesity is becoming more and more a health problem and when greater urbanisation brings people further away from nature, it is appropriate that this work should be done in consultation with local communities.

In 2003, almost 170,000 visitors to Ireland engaged in hiking and hill-walking. More again engaged in strolling around our towns, villages and parks. It is an activity that is more important than any other, including golf, and more than twice as important as angling in terms of participation. More and more participants, though, are not specialist walkers (i.e. people who come to Ireland specifically to walk) but rather people who come on general holidays and then participate in walking as part of the holiday. They prefer short low-level looped walks of about 3 hours duration. Many of our own citizens, though, use these walks as well. Good for them, good for us!!

We know that there are many community walks around the County. We also know that there are other walks which could and should be developed. We also know that they could have greater multi-purpose uses for such as cycling and horse-riding. But we also know that, at times, there are access difficulties which need to be addressed, there is no common marketing of these walks and there is no common plan for their development, management and maintenance. What we do know, though, is that there is very little friction between landowners and the walking community. It is vital that it stays that way and so, we need to deal with issues like insurance, indemnity and local economic gain. These are just some of the issues which these meetings will address.

# Juvenile G.A.A. News

## Who won what during 2004 Bord na

In the next few weeks the guessing will start as to who will be named the hurlers and footballers of the year at adult and underage levels as well as to which club will be announced as club of the year at the County Adult Competition.

No such awards are presented at juvenile level where the emphasis in many cases is on participation and enjoying the games. However in most cases winning is important and those who won competitions over the past twelve months have to be congratulated.

If in West Waterford there was a competition to find a Club of the Year, who would win it. In 2004 there would be many clubs in with a shout of winning it. I am not going to come out and say which club should win it.

I believe when you are picking such awards consideration should be made for the amount of players the club has to choose from at each level. The size of the area that clubs pick their players from should not be taken into consideration. Often the case might be that clubs would be picking their players from large areas but the reality might be that in that area there is a small population. On the other hand clubs may have a small area to choose their players from but have a very big population to choose panels of players from.

In this weeks notes I will go through all the clubs and include what each club has achieved. Some clubs won a lot of silver-wear, others won none but when things were taken into consideration their achievements might be equally as good if not better than the club which collected a lot of silver-wear. When highlighting the success of the clubs in West Waterford, St. Patrick's and Naomh Brid have been put together as have Fourmilewater and Nire.

### Ballyduff Upper.

Ballyduff as everybody knows are one of the smallest clubs in West Waterford, bounded on two sides by Cork clubs and on the other sides by Cois Bhride and Lismore/Ballysaggart Og. In recent years the club has during the summer months experienced problems fielding teams due to family holidays etc. They have been playing mainly in division three competitions which are thirteen a side and in these competitions have been reasonably successful.

This year Ballyduff reached the semi finals of the under 12 hurling division three championship where they were beaten. In under 16 hurling they reached the semi finals of the county championship where they were beaten by Stradbally. The same team reached the final of the Western Championship where they took on An Gaeltacht in a repeat of the final twelve months previously.

In 2003 Ballyduff had a run

away victory, but in 2004 had just the minimum to spare over the club that they have become great rivals with over the past two or three years.

### Cois Bhride

In a short space of time since the Cois Bhride club was formed following the amalgamation of the juvenile Tallow and Shamrock's clubs, a great deal of success has been achieved and both adults clubs will be hoping that this will result in success for them in the years ahead.

In 2004, Cois Bhride retained the West and County Under 11 division two hurling titles that they won in 2003. In the Western Final they beat Brickeys in the Final at the Tourin G.A.A. Club Grounds and in the County Final in a repeat of the 2003 final they defeated Clonea at the first time of asking.

In under 12 football Cois Bhride won West and County division three football titles. In the west they defeated Affane at Ballysaggart and in the county final they beat Sacred Heart at Fraher Field. In under 12 hurling Cois Bhride reached semi finals of the division one competition before exiting the competition.

In under 13 hurling Cois Bhride played Naomh Brid at Ballysaggart during the month of August. Here victory went to Cois Bhride.

In under 14 football the club reached the division three semi finals of the championship, in hurling at the same age level they reached the division two semi finals of the county and western championship before exiting the competition.

In under 16 football Cois Bhride reached the semi final of the division three championship but were beaten by Ardmore.

### Lismore

Lismore over the past few years have put all their efforts into hurling. Each year they contest a number of divisional and county semi finals of Bord na nOg competitions in hurling and 2004 was no different.

In under eleven Lismore won the Western division one ground hurling championship beating Abbeyside at Kirwan park in Touraneena. They played De La Salle in the County Final but were beaten.

In under 12 they beat Dungarvan in the Division one Championship Final at Cappoquin but in the county final had to give second best to a very good Ballygunner side. Moving up a grade to under 13, Lismore reached the division one semi final where they were beaten.

In under 14 they reached the Western Feile Final but were beaten by Dungarvan. The same opposition beat them in the division one final of the Western Competition, and in the county under 14 hurling championship they reached the

semi finals of the division one championship.

### Cappoquin/Affane

In recent years all the success at juvenile level within the Cappoquin/Affane Club has been with the small ball, but in 2004 the club was most successful when using the big ball.

In under 12 football Affane reached the division three final of this years championship but were beaten by Cois Bhride at the Ballysaggart G.A.A. Club Grounds.

In under 13 hurling, Cappoquin reached the final of the Mick Fitzgerald Cup, but on the day had to give second best to a good Dungarvan side.

In under 14 football Affane won the Division three Western Final beating An Gaeltacht at the Geraldines Club Grounds at Aglish by two points, but in the county final had to give second best to Ferrybank at Fraher Field. In hurling Cappoquin reached the semi final of this years Western Under 14 hurling championship.

At under 16 level, to many their was surprise when Affane asked to be placed in with the top clubs at football. Affane reached the division two semi final where they were beaten by Stradbally. In under 16 hurling, Cappoquin reached the semi final stages of the Western Under 16 Hurling division one championship

### St. Olivers

Falling numbers within the area has meant that St. Olivers are now playing in the lower grades of most championships in recent years but are still reaching their fair share of semi finals and finals of Bord na nOg competitions at divisional and county levels.

At the Geraldines Club Grounds at Aglish St. Olivers won the division three final of the under 11 ground hurling championship at divisional level beating Ardmore in the final. In the county final they took on Ferrybank but were beaten on the day.

In under 12, St. Olivers reached the division two final of the hurling competition where they played Naomh Brid at Cappoquin. This was a very good game of hurling which Naomh Brid won. In football St. Olivers reached the three semi final of this years championship.

At under 13 hurling in division three just two teams remained in the competition when the time came around to play the fixtures. This resulted in a straight final between St. Olivers and An Gaeltacht which was won by St. Olivers.

In under 14 hurling St. Olivers were knocked out of the division four county championship at the semi final stages of the competition. In under 16 football St. Olivers

reached the division one western semi final where they were beaten by their neighbours, Clashmore and in hurling reached the semi final of the Western Division One championship, and at the time of putting these notes together some weeks back, could be still in with a chance of playing a division one final against St. Olivers.

### Clashmore

Over the past few years, some great work has been done to promote juvenile hurling and football in the Clashmore and Kinsalebeg areas. This work is starting to pay off at all age levels from Primary School level up as the clubs and school's in the area have been contesting a number of divisional and county finals at juvenile level over the past three or four years.

This year saw Clashmore contest the division two final of this years under 12 football championship but were beaten by The Nire. In under 14 hurling the club had a very good year during 2004. In the Western championship they were beaten by Brickeys in the division two championship final and in the County Division Three Championship Clashmore reached the final where they were victorious over St. Mary's.

In under 16 football Clashmore reached the semi finals of the division three western championship and in football Clashmore reached the division one championship final but were beaten by Ballinacourty.

Staying with football but moving down a grade to under 14, Clashmore reached the Feile Peil Og Championship divisional final but were narrowly beaten by eventual county champions The Nire.

### Ardmore

Like so many other clubs in West Waterford in recent years, Ardmore are struggling with numbers and as a result are unable to take part in the highest grades of hurling and football which every club strives for.

However to their credit with their limited numbers, Ardmore still take part in as many competitions as is possible, and in 2004 they have collected some silver-wear for the first time in a few years at juvenile level.

In under 11 hurling Ardmore reached the division three final of this years Ground Hurling Competition but were beaten by St. Olivers in front of their own supporters at the Geraldines Club Grounds at Aglish. In under 12 football Ardmore reached the division three final of this years football championship before bowing out of this years championship.

At under 16 level, Ardmore had a very good year. In football Ardmore took on Killorossanty in the Western

Division three final. Here Ardmore were to prove victorious and went on to play Roanmore in the county final but on the day had to give second best to the city side.

In hurling at under 16 level, Ardmore qualified for a division four county final where they took on St. Saviours at Fraher Field. For much of the game the sides were fairly even but in the end Ardmore ran out comfortable winners.

### An Gaeltacht.

Like their neighbours up the coast, An Gaeltacht over the past few years have taken part in Bord na nOg Competitions in the lower divisions. An Gaeltacht has not left the small numbers affect them as they have reached a number of finals at juvenile level at divisional and county stages particularly in thirteen a side competitions

In under 12 hurling, An Gaeltacht reached the division three final of this years championship but were beaten by Killorossanty who went on to play Butlerstown in the county final.

In under 13 hurling, An Gaeltacht and St. Olivers already stated were the only teams left in this years division three competition by the time the fixtures came to be played. An Gaeltacht in the final were beaten by St. Olivers.

In under 14 football An Gaeltacht reached the division three final of this years championship where they played Affane at Aglish. An Gaeltacht were beaten in this final by two points but there are those who feel that An Gaeltacht were unlucky not to win as they played the better football on the day.

In under 14 hurling An Gaeltacht reached the division three final of the divisional and county championships but were beaten in both. In under 16 hurling An Gaeltacht reached the division three divisional and county finals. Just like the under 14's defeat was the clubs lot in both, beaten by Stradbally in a brilliant county final and by Ballyduff in an equally entertaining western final.

### Brickeys

Like so many other clubs in West Waterford over the past number of years, Brickeys have but in a tremendous amount of work with their juvenile players in the hope that it will bring success at adult level in the years to come.

2004 has been another good year for the Brickey's Club. The highlight will possibly be winning titles at Minior and under 21 levels but at juvenile level, success was also achieved.

In the under 11 ground hurling competition, Brickeys contested the division two final against Cois Bhride at the Tourin G.A.A. Club Grounds. Cois Bhride won this final by a very 'small' margin. In under

12 football Brickeys reached the semi final stages of the division two championship before exiting the competition.

At under 14 level in hurling the club won the division two western final beating Clashmore in the final and reached the semi finals of the county championship. In football, Brickeys reached the division one semi final of the championship where they were beaten by Nire and in the Feile Peil Og Competition they also reached the semi final stage of the competition.

At under 16 level, it was another good year for the team in Black and Amber. In football they played the Western and County division two finals winning both. In hurling the team reached the semi finals stages of the division two county championship where they were beaten by Passage, and in the western Championship they recently played Dungarvan in the division two final where they were victorious by three points.

### Dungarvan

Some years back when Dungarvan were losing players annually to other clubs and asked as a result to be allowed to move down in most championships from division one, a number of clubs were against the idea.

Dungarvan at the time argued to allow them to move down from division one for a year or two would allow them to regroup. Since then, Dungarvan have done tremendous work at juvenile level and are now back winning division one titles in football and hurling in division one level.

2004 was a very good year for the old Boro as they contested Bord na nOg finals at all age levels with the exception of under 11.

In under 12 Dungarvan reached the division one hurling western final but were beaten by Lismore at Cappoquin. In football the Old Boro again reached the division western final where they played and beat their neighbours from across the harbour, Ballinacourty. In the county final they played De La Salle where they were very unlucky to be beaten.

In under 13 hurling, Dungarvan travelled to the Corner Stone venue to play Cappoquin in the division one final of this years championship. Dungarvan returned home with the Mick Fitzgerald Cup winning the game by seven points.

In under 14, Dungarvan had a very good year. In hurling they beat Lismore in the Division One final of the Western Championship and beat the same opposition in the final of the Thomas Scanlon Cup but were beaten by Ballygunner in the County Feile na nGael Final. In the County Division one championship Dungarvan reached the semi final stages of the championship.

## nOg football & hurling Competitions

In football Dungarvan beat Nire in the western division one final and in one of the games of the year, Dungarvan were beaten by Gaultier in the county final by a single point. In the Feile Peil og competition Dungarvan were knocked out of the competition at the semi final stages of the competition.

In under 16 football Dungarvan reached the semi finals of the division two western championship, while in hurling they were beaten in the county division two final against a brilliant passage side and recently played Brickeys in the division two final of the western championship but were beaten by three points.

### Abbeyside/ Ballinacourty.

Over the past few years, Abbeyside/Ballinacourty have the most impressive record of all the clubs at juvenile level at divisional and county level as they have won a number of division one divisional and county titles at all age levels.

While not as much silverware as other others has been won over the past twelve months as in recent years by the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty Club, their achievements over the past twelve months have been impressive.

In under 11 ground hurling, Abbeyside were beaten by Lismore in the division one final at Kirwan Park in Touraneena. In under 12 football Ballinacourty reached the division one final of this years championship but were beaten by Dungarvan.

In under 16 Ballinacourty won a western and county division one football double beating Clashmore in the Western Final and De La Salle in the County Final. Abbeyside reached the division one semi final of the County hurling championship where they were beaten by De La Salle and are into a Western Division One final. As these notes are been put together their opponents are not known.

### Stradbally

Over the past few years Stradbally has played away their juvenile games but failed to reach many divisional or county semi finals or finals. This year when Stradbally won the County Division Three hurling finals not many would not have been delighted for them.

In the final they played An Gaeltacht in a hugely entertaining game at Fraher Field. The outcome of the game was in doubt until the very end as both sides really gave it their all. The highlight of the game was a tremendous point scored by Nicholas Drohan running toward the goal at the road end of the field from out near the stand.

Stradbally reached the Division two final of the divisional football championship but were beaten by Brickeys. They also reached the division two semi

finals of the western under twelve and fourteen football championships.

### Kilrossanty

A club working away quietly and getting results in recent times have been Kilrossanty. 2004 saw Kilrossanty contest a number of divisional and county finals with the highlight been capturing a county under 14 football county final.

Over the past few years a small but very dedicated group of people within the Kilrossanty club have done tremendous work to promote hurling in a traditional football area. This past year saw Kilrossanty capture an Under 12 hurling division three final and go on to play in the inaugural county finals where they play Butlerstown. Victory went to Butlerstown in the final after a replay.

In football Kilrossanty contested the division one western semi final but were beaten by Ballinacourty at under 12 level. In under 14 football, Kilrossanty beat St. Patrick's in a very good division two western final and then beat Mount Sion in the County Final.

In under 14 hurling Kilrossanty played the Divisional under 14 hurling division three final and the county division four finals both against Fourmilewater but defeat was their lot in both games. In under 16 football Kilrossanty were beaten in the divisional under 16 football division three final against Kilrossanty.

### Naomh Brid/ St. Patrick's

Two years ago St. Patrick's and Naomh Brid decided to assist each other from minor level down because both clubs on their own were finding it increasingly difficult to field teams on their own.

Two years in the decision to assist each other seems to be working well as the combined clubs have contested a number of divisional and county finals which if they were on their own could not have achieved.

The highlight of 2004 for Naomh Brid and St. Patrick's was winning the under 12 division two county hurling final beating Passage in the final. This was a first hurling county final win for Naomh Brid and also for a first juvenile county final win for the club. Before playing the final, Naomh Brid had beaten St. Olivers in the Western Final.

At under eleven level Naomh Brid were beaten in the division one semi final of the western under eleven ground hurling competition and St. Patrick's in under 12 football reached the division one semi final where they were beaten by Dungarvan.

In under 14 football St. Patrick's after a very poor start to the campaign did enough to win a place in their remaining games to win a place in the division two semi final and west-

ern final where they were beaten by Kilrossanty.

In hurling Naomh Brid reached the semi finals of the county under 14 and 16 hurling division three championships where they were beaten by Clashmore and An Gaeltacht respectfully and also played Brickeys in the division two semi final of the western under 16 hurling championship.

### Nire/Fourmilewater

2004 started on a very sad note for the Nire and Fourmilewater clubs with the sad death of their star under 16 player Shane Gleeson in a tragic accident. Over the years the two clubs have produced some many fine players, but to many the best of them all was fifteen year old Shane Gleeson who in the eyes of many was destined to be one of the finest duel players this county has ever produced.

2004 on the field of play was a very good one for the two clubs. In football the Nire captured the western division two championship when they beat Clashmore in the divisional final but were no match for a very strong Tramore side in the county final.

Those that wore the colours of The Nire in under 14 football in 2004 will remember it for a long time. They beat Clashmore in the Western Feile Peil Og Final and went on to beat De La Salle in the county final. This win meant that the club would be making the long trip to the Co. Tyrone to represent Waterford in this years National finals. The club did tremendously well, winning two of their three games in the national finals.

When the divisional championships were played The Nire reached the semi finals where they had a win after a replay over Brickeys but were beaten by Dungarvan in the Western Final. In under 16 football the Nire reached the semi final stages of the championship where they were beaten by a very good Ballinacourty side.

In hurling Fourmilewater also had a very good year. At under 12 they were beaten in the division two semi final of the championship. In under 14 hurling the club had a very good year. They beat Kilrossanty in the divisional division three final and beat the same opposition in the county division four final.

In under 16 hurling Fourmilewater reached the division two semi finals of the divisional hurling championship where they were beaten by Dungarvan and narrowly missed out on a place in the county under 16 hurling division two semi finals.

### So Who Is It

There you have it. Who do you think would be club of the year at Juvenile level in West Waterford if such a competition existed? I for one would hate to have to make a final call on it

as some of the achievements by the clubs have been very impressive indeed.

### Star Players

During the past twelve months I have seen many players who is an award for juvenile player of the year existed who would have to be in with a very good chance of winning the award. Some of these players were in the last year of their juvenile playing career while others are just about to start off their playing careers in the various championships.

I did not say which club should win an overall award for Juvenile Club of the Year in Waterford if such an award existed, and likewise I am not going to say which player should be the overall Juvenile Player of the year if such an award existed. However I will mention just some of the players who have caught the eye of yours truly over the past twelve months or so.

John Gorman of the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty club is one player relay to catch the eye in recent months. John was part of the Colaiste na nDeise side that reached the final of the competition earlier this year. He also gave some very good performances in the colours of the Abbeyside/Ballinacourty Club over the past few years. In the Under 16 football semi final against Nire, John had a great game in mid-field scoring some very good scores. He repeated this in the County Final win over De La Salle.

Adrian Power is a player with a very bright future. Part of the Ballyduff Club Adrian is one of the best up and coming goalkeepers to come out of West Waterford in a long number of years. Injury at the start of the year meant that Adrian was not considered for the county minor team and the West Waterford under 16 team. He played in the county and divisional under 16 hurling championships helping Ballyduff to reach the semi final stages of the County championship and to winning the divisional championship, where he not only made some very crucial saves he also got on the scoreboard with a few well taken points.

Paul Murray of the Cappoquin/Affane Club is another player to catch the eye over the past twelve months. Paul plays Junior hurling and football with the Tourin club who have won the junior championship this year. He was one of the better under 16 and minor players with Cappoquin Club over the past year and also was part of the Colaiste na nDeise side that reached the Dr. Harty Cup Final, and is also part of this years team.

Cormac Curran of the Dungarvan Club is another player with a very bright future. He was part of the Dungarvan team that reached the county under 14 football county finals and was also involved with the Dungarvan under 16 teams that

played in divisional and county finals.

Padraig O Murchu of the An Gaeltacht Club had a very good year. He helped An Gaeltacht to a place in the division three final of the county under 16 hurling final where they played Stradbally. One the day Padraig played at full forward and gave an exhibition of hurling taking some very good scores. Over the past few years some very good underage hurlers and footballers have been produced within the An Gaeltacht Club. Padraig is another of these players that we will be hearing a lot about in the years ahead.

What a year Brian O'Halloran had for the Clashmore club and for his school, Kinsalebeg National School. Brian gave an exhibition of hurling in the County under 14 hurling division three final where he played a major part in Clashmore's win over St. Mary's. For Kinsalebeg National School in the West Waterford Primary School's Leagues, Brian was outstanding playing at centre field. His performances helped in no small part to helping Kinsalebeg winning school league titles in both hurling and football during the 2003-2004 school year.

Gavin Whelan of the St. Patrick's Club is another player with a very bright future. Gavin played a major part in helping Naomh Brid who were assisted by St. Pat's in this years underage championships win the county under 12 hurling championships at divisional and county level. He also played with the St. Pat's team that reached the division two western final of the under 14 football championship and also played some good games with Coolnasmeear National School.

Darren Guiry of the Nire and Fourmilewater Clubs also had a very good year. He was part of the Nire under 14 football team that travelled to Co. Tyrone to represent Waterford in this years Feile Peil Og Competition, and was also part of the Fourmilewater under 14 hurling teams that won divisional and county finals.

Michael Kiely and Eoin Kearns of the Naomh Brid Club are two ten year old players who relay caught the eye over the past few months. Eoin is a fantastic young up and coming goalkeeper. He played in goal for St. Mary's Touraneena National School in the West Waterford Primary School's leagues and for Naomh Brid at under 12 level. In these and in the other competitions that he played in Eoin put in many very good performances.

Michael Kiely at ten years old also caught the eye playing for St. Mary's Touraneena National School and for Naomh Brid over the past few years. Just Like his team-mate Eoin Kearns, Michael put in many top class performances over the past few years and is a player who is to look out for in the years ahead.

### ALL STAR NOMINATIONS

All young hurlers and footballers dream about representing their county at senior level at one stage or another and to be shown on television wearing their county colours at Simple Stadium, Pairc Uí Chaoimh and Croke Park. Some other dream about the day they win all star nominations and then receiving their All Star award. Some of the players mentioned above will have dreamed something in these lines.

In 2004, Waterford got lots of Television coverage and as a result eight players have been nominated for All-Star award when they are announced in a few weeks time. The eight players nominated are Eoin Murphy, Ken McGrath, Eoin Kelly, Dave Bennett, Paul Flynn, Dan Shanahan, John Mullane and Seamus Prendergast. The eight nominees are congratulated and wished the best of luck for when the All-Star's are officially announced.

It would be brilliant if all eight were to get awards. However I think if Waterford were to get three awards, everybody would be extremely happy. Ken McGrath was a revelation at centre Back this year. Many fine day Waterford supporters were shocked to see Ken at Centre Back this year but those who are following the hurlers with a long number of years will have known that Ken would not let anybody down when wearing the number six on his back.

Paul Flynn is extremely unlucky not to have won any all-stars to date. Paul has been playing senior inter-county hurling now with over ten years and in that time has but in some very good performances. In 2004, Paul put in some mighty performances, particularly in the semi final when so many other Waterford players did not play up to their full potential. Hopefully for Paul that 2004 will be his year.

Dan Shanahan is the third player I relay think could be in with a major shout of winning an all-star award in 2004. Who will ever forget the performances Dan put in for Waterford in the latter stages of the National league and in the Munster Championship. In these games, Dan put in some top class performances which many people stand up and take notice of the gentle giant from the Lismore Club.

### UNDER 16 HURLING

# County Board Meeting

P.S. O'Riain, Chairman presided at last week's monthly meeting of the senior board. The attendance was a little better than normal, due, I am sure to the expectation that a big debate on football would be found interesting.

It was a debate that nearly did not take place and the topic looked like being passed over when Timmy O'Keefe, Clashmore made his views about minor championships known. Obviously displeased with the way these championships are run, he said that a change was demanded.

Patsy Flannaghan, Tramore, acknowledged as being a football man to the core, gave his views in a lengthy contribution, during which he complained that football coaches are no longer going to the schools in East Waterford and he wanted to know why?

The debate was then opened up and there were many contributions from all sides of the room. Everyone seemed critical of the situation as it stands at the present, yet no one seemed prepared to suggest a remedy. The county chairman told delegates that the executive had a very constructive meeting with the officers of Coisde Peil and as a result of this he hoped that progress would be made.

Eventually it was decided that a one hour debate on the subject would be listed as an item on the agenda for the November meeting of the board ( the last meeting of the outgoing committee ) and that the football managers ( outgoing ) and the three juvenile boards would be asked to attend and give their views.

**Financial Update**

Treasurer Tony Morrissey gave details of gate receipts since the last meeting.

**Munster Council Report**

Council member Tommy Hennessey reported on the draws for the first rounds of the Munster championships in all grades up to senior. He said that dates and venues would be fixed by the Council after the senior draws are made.

**Central Council Report**

Details of the distribution of the qualifier moneys were given as follows, Senior football 40,000; Senior hurling 38,000 and Players Holiday fund, 20,000; Here it was pointed out that only one game was played by Waterford in the qualifier rounds by the footballers and the hurlers played in no qualifier game.

Delegates were also told that a grant is available for secretarial purposes if a claim for same is approved by Central Council

An outline of what is to happen at the special congress in Croke Park on next Saturday, was also given and here it was pointed out that changes are to take place in the Registration and membership and transfer rules and that about 40 changes are expected to be approved in the Club Constitution.

**Other Matters**

The excellent arrangements for the county senior hurling final were commented on and it was felt that the decision to have the substitutes sit in the stand, was a good one.

The chairman said that this will also apply for the football finals in Dungarvan.

Tommy Hennessey expressed his disapproval of the decision by G.A.C to defer the county football finals until the Monday Bank Holiday in order to avoid the F.A.I. Cup Final. He said

that here in this county we should do our own thing.

Tom Mooney, Kill was critical of the poor publicity given to our games by the local radio. He said that announcements about Gaelic games always seem to come last

Ann Hogan, Old Parish club has been appointed by the Munster Council to operate as Secondary Schools Liaison officer on a three year contract , following interviews had for the post. The meeting congratulated her and wished her well in her new appointment.

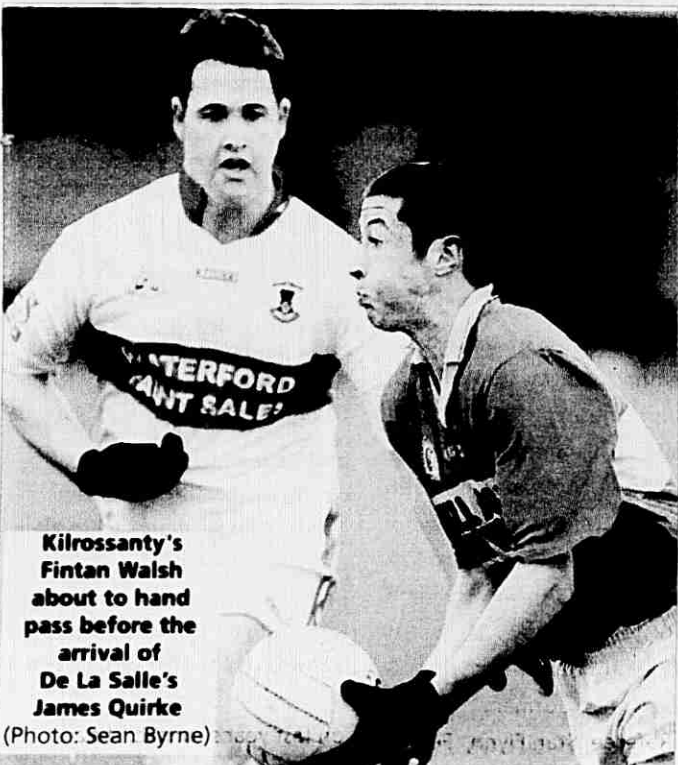

Hero of the game from the challengers point of view was Alan Lawlor who had the unusual distinction of scoring all the Nire's 8 points- seen from

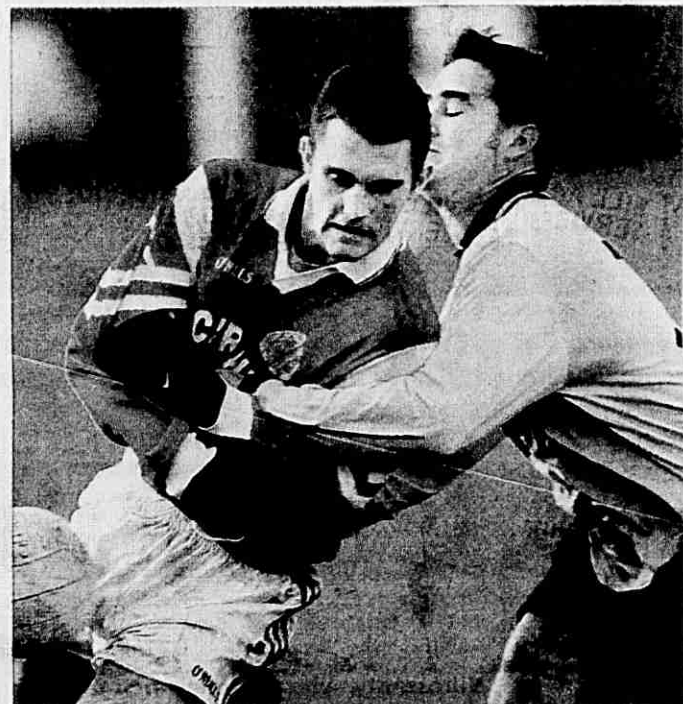
placed balls and the last which was the equalizer from play in the 57th. minute

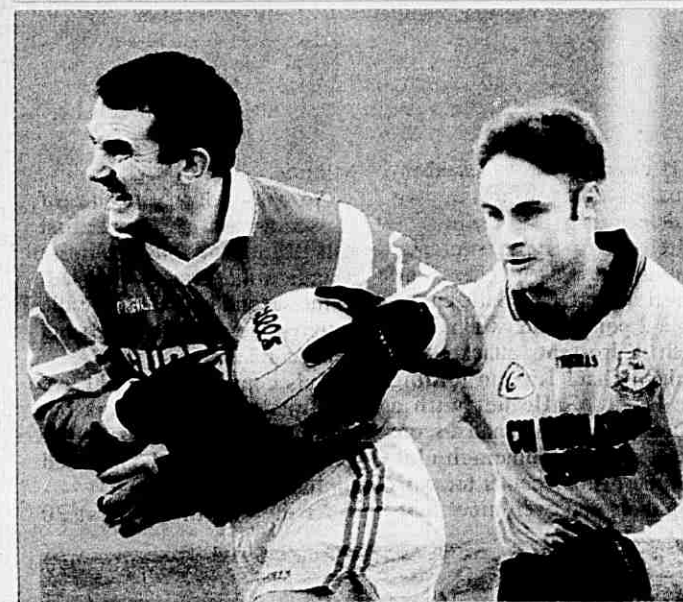

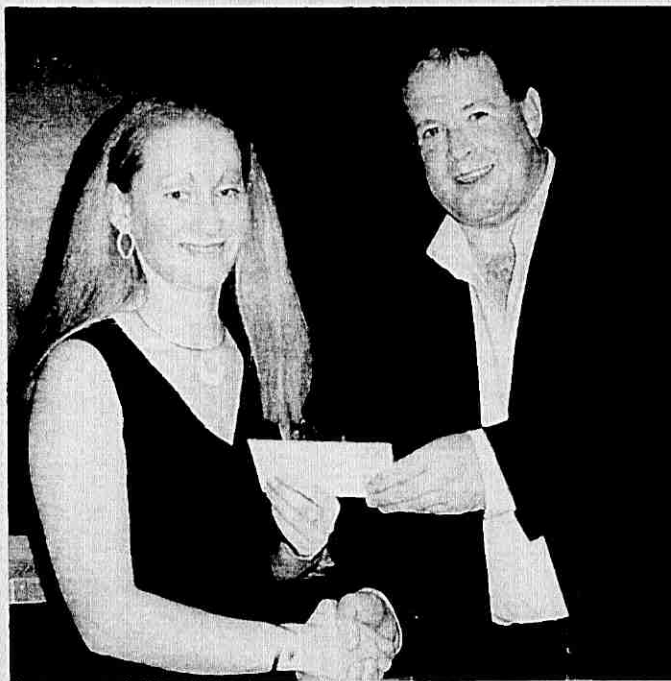

Yes, the Allrounder Sports Winter league is back in focus. On tonight Wednesday we kick start this years league with our registration night and run over the two courses chosen for this year's league, numbers will be

It is very important that those who are participating in this years league come along to registration night on tonight Wednesday. The league will start proper then next Wednesday November 03rd and each Wednesday evening at 7.15 p.m. until our customary Christmas break on December 15th, giving us eight nights before the festive season. We appeal to all runners taking part to please only cross Main roads where Stewarding is in place and to obey the stewards on the course at all times, they are giving up their time each Wednesday evening to look after our safety, very important to remember you must wear a proper bib, no one will be allowed to start if they don't have a bib. # After The Marathon

Well done to our members who completed the Dublin City Marathon last weekend. A full marathon report will appear in next weeks notes as we have to wait for a few days for a full list of results to be issued. However you may now be wondering what to do with all those miles you have under your belt. Well, the first thing is to have a rest.

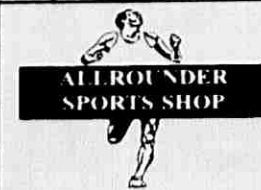
There are several reasons for this; the first is that muscle biopsies of runners taken immediately after a marathon have revealed that more than half of them have miniscule muscle cell damage. The other unwelcome news is that for about a month the immune system is depressed and the marathoner is a candidate for all types of infections. Increase vitamin C and zinc. Opinions on how long a rest to take, do differ. Professor Tim Noakes, the author of 'Lore of Running', suggests no training for a month. However, since runners can only go five days without training before endurance begins to decline (the rate of decline is rapid and can be measured by taking the pulse first thing in the morning before rising and again at rest mid-day), there's not much point in losing all that accumulated endurance by having a month off and virtually starting from scratch again and risking injury. A sound plan is to have five days complete rest, then, train every other day for a week; two days consecutively with the third off in the second week; three days together and the fourth off in the third week and resume normal training in the fourth week.

#### DON'T STOP NOW

Your endurance levels are now at their highest and you should capitalise on it as you have worked hard to get to where you are now. If you just stop running now all the hard work of the last few months could go to waste. The good news is that it is easier to keep your fitness level than start afresh from scratch. By cutting back on the miles and running at a faster pace it is possible to keep the fitness level right up there.

If you ran 4 times a week before the marathon then by cutting back to 2 or 3 times a week you can maintain your level of fitness with minimal effort. This will enable you to focus and plan your next race, as you already know that you are fit and ready for another challenge.

Planning the next race is important as it gives you a goal to aim for and another exciting challenge.

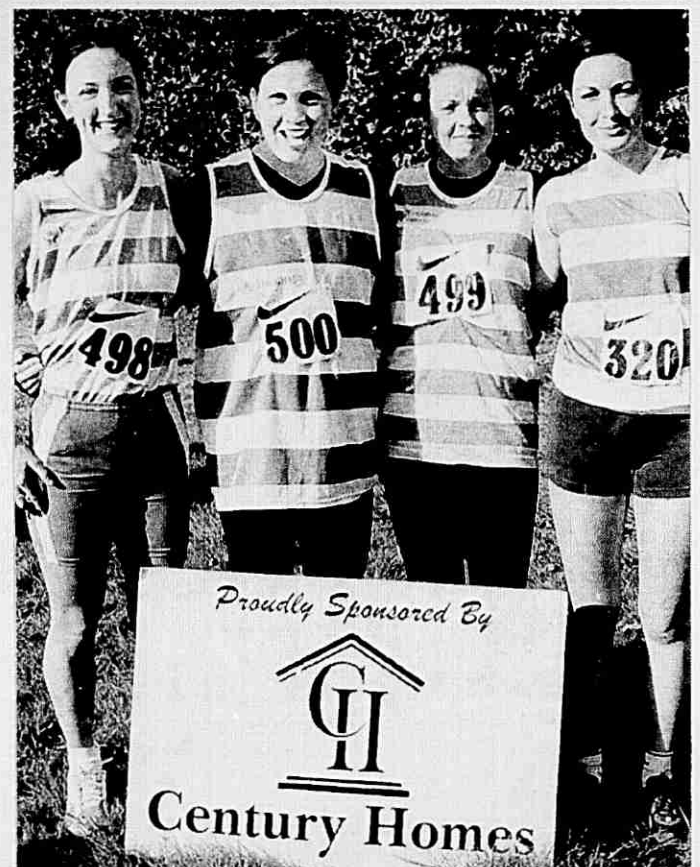

## Archery History

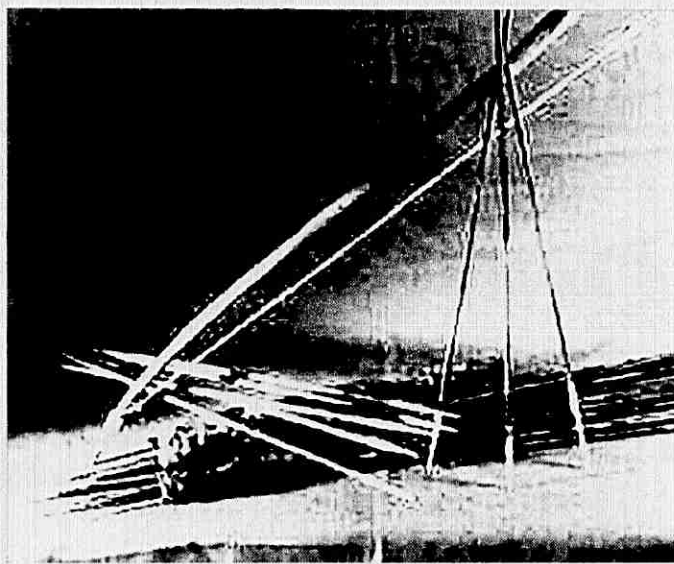
5,000 BC - the Egyptians use the bow for hunting and in warfare against the Persians 2,800 BC - The 'Composite Bow' first appears. The Egyptians further developed this type of bow. Made from wood, tipped with animal horn and held together with animal sinew and glue. The unstrung bow resembled a 'C' shape and required two people to string it. The bowstrings were made from 'catgut' obtained and made from sheep's intestines.

The arrows were extremely light and when used with the composite bow, could be shot 366 metres (400 yards) and the Armour of the day was no protection against such weapons.

The Egyptians used archers on the back of light chariots. These were organised into highly trained units able to quickly out-flank an enemy army with devastating effect.

Egyptian bow and arrows from approx 2,300 BC-1400 BC.  
Bow length = 62"-68" (160-173cm)

Arrows made from reeds with hard foreshafts 8" (20cm) long bound into the shaft with very fine linen thread then tipped with flint heads. The fletchings are 3" (7.5cm) long feathers glued to the shafts with shellac.  
Arrow length = 34"-37" (86-94cm).  
Arrow weight = 0.4-0.5oz (10-14gm)

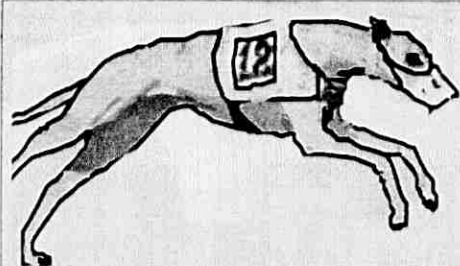

Victory number two for trainer Dunphy came in the shape of the well supported Kop End (Larkhill Jo-Springmount Dove) this 2/5 hot pot capturing the fourth contest in 29.54. After a slow start the favourite was bumped running around the opening two bends. Biding his time however Kop End held his composure as The Other Pilot made for home. Producing the better turn of pace however Kop End led going into the third bend before racing clear for a three lengths win over The Other Pilot in 29.54. Michael Kearns and Michael Blanchfield own the winner who is open to further improvement.

Trainer Frances O'Donnell recorded a nice priced treble courtesy of Ardfert Billy 5/4, Mauritius King 2/1 and The Other Arnie 5/2. The Noel Clifford owned Ardfert Billy (Split The Bill-Lizzie Fitz) showed that he was in a class of his own taking the third contest by a distance in 29.06. When his nearest rival Tomgar Jet was bumped rounding the first bend Ardfert Billy romped clear, for an eye-catching distance success.

An ease in grade was just what the doctor prescribed for the David Leung owned Mauritius King this December 2001 son of Lenson Lad and The Other Lucy coming from behind to capture the tenth event in a fastest of night 28.90. Led for three quarters of the trip by the early paced Tirlough Mick Mauritius King stayed on best over the final one hundred yards to triumph by one and a half lengths.

In the team contest last weeks leaders Loraine McCarthy's (T) team have dropped out of contention due to the fact that only one of their 7 runners competed.

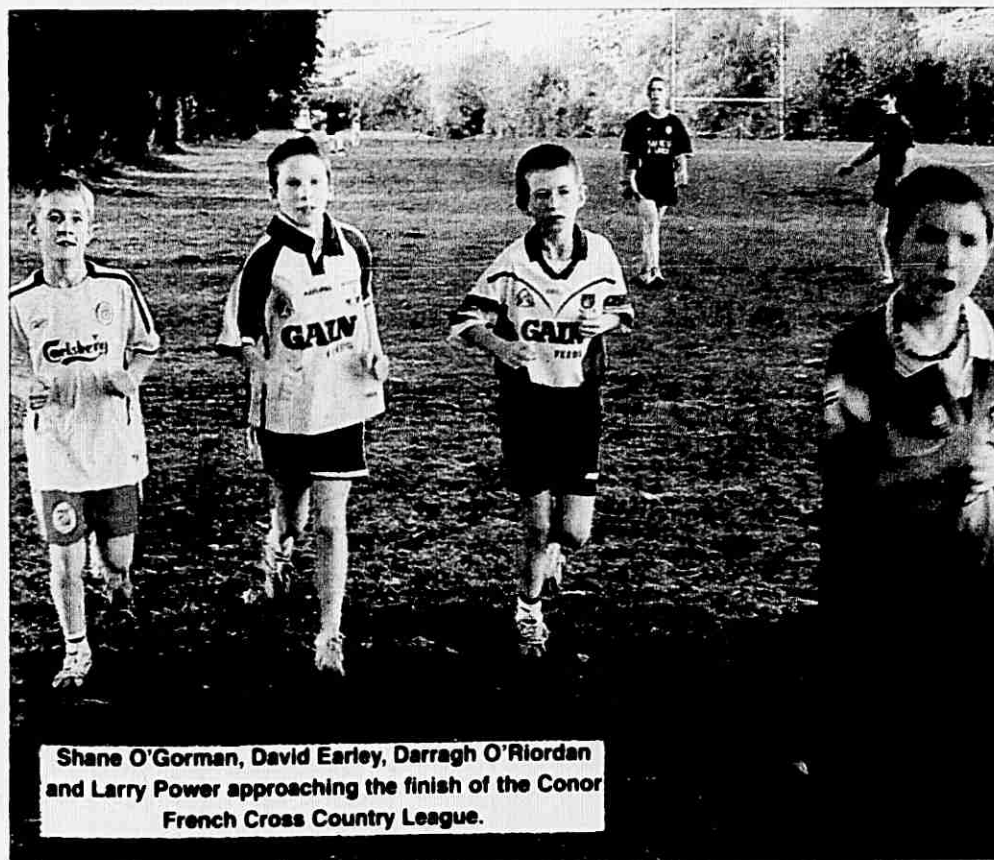

## Action to Be Taken On Hermitage Trees

A number of trees at Sheares Street at the Hermitage will receive remedial attention to remove deadwood and some dangerous limbs, Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan said at a recent Dungarvan Town Council meeting.

However, half the trees at Landsend will be removed as they are causing a danger.

The Town Council hired a tree surgeon on foot of concerns highlighted by Cllr. Nuala Ryan (FF).

Mr. O'Donovan said the report recommended minor works be carried out on the trees to

remove deadwood and the tops of some trees.

Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Indp) urged care when dealing with the trees, and asked that it be borne in mind that the council considered prosecuting a developer who knocked trees in the Hermitage.

"We must do everything in our power to protect as many trees as possible," he said.

However, in Landsend Mr. O'Donovan said it would be dangerous to allow 6 of the 13 trees there to remain as they were found to be unhealthy.

## Town Will Have Christmas Lights

Dungarvan won't be left in the dark this Christmas in a repeat of the Christmas Light fiasco of the past few years, Dungarvan Town Council heard.

In response to a call from Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) to begin work on providing the lights so a situation which occurred in the last few years wouldn't happen again, Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said they had held a meeting with the ESB about erecting lights in Gratten Square.


