

Cllr. O Riain urged for more Gardai to be redeployed from their desk jobs and put back on the beat around the county.

These robberies are taking place in the light of day and not under the cover of darkness," he said.

"And the reason for it is that not enough Gardai are stationed in places where they used to be stationed."

Gardai last week said a breakin at a Cappoquin factory, which netted a gang an estimated 20,000 euros from a safe, was one of a number to have been carried out in the area recently.

The gang was said to be targeting vulnerable businesses in West Waterford and East Cork.

Effectiveness Of Cushcam Safety Measures To Be Monitored

Chief, Michael Tobin has said additional safety measures at Cushcam Cross will be put in place if the current package of measures planned for the junction fails to reduce the number of accidents.

The NRA agreed to put in place a 40 mph speed limit, a safety barrier and additional signage, last month. But criticism was levelled at the Authority's for opting not to spend the 900,000 to 1 million euros necessary for a complete reconstruction of the deadly stretch of Dungarvan to Waterford road.

A complete reconstruction was the favoured choice of both Waterford County Council and

local residents in the area.

However, in a letter to Deputy John Deasy, Mr. Tobin said the authority will monitor the success of the new measures and examine if more needs to be

"The authority has requested Waterford County Council to prepare design proposals for speed control measures at this location," the NRA chief said. 'An Garda Siochana has informed the council that they will enforce speed restrictions approved by the Authority."

These measures are scheduled to be implemented as soon as all the statutory approvals are received, he added.

"It is the intention of the Authority and Waterford County Council to monitor the situation after these proposals are implemented. If there is no improvement in overall road safety, then additional measures can be considered."

Figures show that throughout this year, an horrific trail of destruction has occurred at the road including five serious road traffic collisions, one non-serious road traffic collision and three material damage only traffic collisions

The figures also show that 12 people have sustained injuries arising from the accidents and

that twelve vehicles were involved. Half the accidents were single vehicle accidents while one drunk driver was arrested.

Speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, Deputy Deasy gave the NRA statement a cautious wel-

"It's positive in the sense that

they are looking at the junction seriously," he said. "They've confirmed that they will approve the 40mph speed limit for the road and will monitor it and bring in further measures at it if there are no appreciable improvements. Something had to be done and we have to wait and see if these improvements make any difference in the next

ANTS AND TERMITES

Ants and termites are insects that live in large colonies, each of which has a queen who lays all the eggs.
Although both termites and ants look similar, and termites are often

called 'white ants', they are from different classes of living things. Termites are, in fact, more closely related to cockroaches than to ants.

Termite Mounds Are As Strong As Concrete

Some termites build enormous nests on the ground. They take pieces of soil, and glue them together with their own droppings and saliva. Some termite mounds can be over 6m (18ft) high and 4m (12ft) in diameter, the outer structure of which is as strong as concrete. Inside the mound there is a complicated system of corridor and chambers, all of which have a form of air conditioning keep them cool.

Some Ants Are Soldiers

Soldiers ants, found in parts of India, Africa and South Am

Africa and South America, 'march' in long, wife columns feeding on small animals as they go. Even large animals will run away when the ants advance, and if they enter a house they will strip it clean of insects and vermin, which makes them quite welcome in some villages.

Soldiers Defend Termites' Nests

Many termite special keep 'soldiers' to defend the nest from ants who like eating the soft, juicy bodies of termites. In some species the soldier termites have large heads and large, strong jaws and in others the soldiers have a hollow projection on the head which squirts a sticky fluid at the ants to disable them.

Leaf Cutter Ants Grow Their Own Food

In some parts of South America, leaf cutter ants cause a lot of damage to crops. They cut small pieces from leaves, which they carry back to their nest. The leaves are chewed into a mulch, which is used to grow fungi. The ants love to eat the fungi.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The mighty ant can life up 50 times its own weight
- Slave-maker ants steal the young of other ants and raise them as slaves!
- Some honey pot ants are used as storage tanks by their comrades, who pour food into them until they are enormously swollen!
- Compass termites build their gigantic mounds so that the long sides faced perfectly to east and west!
- In one of Aesop's Fables, called the Ant and the Grasshopper, the ant survives the winter because it works so hard during the summer.
- The Roman writer Pliny believed that in India there was an ant the size of a wolf, which mined gold!

Plaque Erected To First Lady Of Song

A commemorative plaque marking the birthplace of Mai O'Higgin's, Dungarvan's first lady of song, was erected by Dungarvan Town Council, the Museum Society and the Millennium Committee recently.

Unveiled by Mayor of Dungarvan, Michael O'Riordan, the plaque to Mai is only the second marking the birthplace of one of an honoured native of the town – the first being for the world-famous physi-

"We have had difficulties and delays in getting the plaque up on the wall of Mai's old home, but finally, thanks to the co-operation of Mitch O'Brien and Jim Healy, the plaque is now safely in place." "On behalf of the council and the people of Dungarvan, I would like to again thank and pay tribute to Mai and the work she has done and for all she has achieved in promoting Dungarvan and helping to spread the name of the town and the county worldwide in the most positive way."

The council honoured Mai with a Civic Reception some years ago, and a tree was planted in her honour in a ceremony recently. Mayor O'Riordan said it was only fitting that her great contribution should be acknowledged in every possible

"There are very few towns which can boast a well-known song all of their own and indeed, when visitors come from aboard, they find it difficult to believe we have a song for Dungaryan, that it is known nationally and that it is played on radio stations from Chicago to Sydney," he said

"But that is just one of Mai's many achievements. She is also an accomplished poet with a huge body of work to her credit, some of which is available in her own book of selected work."

Mayor O'Riordan later presented Mai O'Higgin's with commemorative watch to mark the occasion.

Rustic Pork Je

THIS is a deliciously different and cool in cold water. lunch or supper dish and is perfect if you have any left over roast pork.

As it is prepared well in advance, it is ideal if you do not know the exact time when hungry guests are due to arrive, or if you don't want a day out

Ingredients:

(Serves 64) 600g sliced roast pork 2 eggs

100g frozen peas 1 small can of button mush-

2 pickled red peppers 4 cooked carrots

2 dill pickles

50g gelatine

1 litre stock

2 tsp vinegar

10 black peppercorns 1 jar pickled small corn cobs (optional)

salt Method:

HARD-boil the eggs for at

least 10 minutes, then drain

Cook the peas in boiling water for about 3-4 minutes according to the directions on the packet. Drain and refresh

under cold water. Drain the corn cobs if used, and the mushrooms. Slice the mushrooms and peppers thinly. to slave over a hot stove after Slice the carrots and dill pickles with a fancy cutter if liked to give a fluted effect.

Soften the gelatine in a little cold water.

Heat the stock and add the softened gelatine, allowing it to disolve completely before adding the vinegar and pepper-

Allow to cool until on the point of setting.

Shell the eggs and slice. Arrange slices of the sliced roast pork with the egg, corn cobs if used, mushrooms, peppers, carrots, pickles and peas attractively in a serving dish. Pour over the cooked stock carefully and allow to set for 5-6 hours in a refrigerator. Serve with French bread.



Tasty bean soup

Ingredients:

4 servings 350g dried haricot beans 50g bacon rashers

2 onions

4 tomatoes

3 tbs chopped red pepper

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp celery salt

1/4 tsp white pepper

Method:

RINSE the beans in cold water, and leave covered with water in a saucepan overnight

The next day, add a further 500ml to the beans, cover and cook until softened. Dice the bacon finely. Peel and chop the onions.

Heat the diced bacon in a pan together with the onions and fry until golden brown.

Add the peeled and chopped tomatoes, red pepper and seasonings. Simmer for 5 minutes.



Then stir into the cooked beans and liquid. Check the seasoning before serving with warm French bread. Tip: If time is short, canned haricot beans may be used in place of the dried ones. Add them with the tomatoes and red pepper with sufficient liquid from the can to make a soup consistency.

Cherry Pudding

Ingredients: 4-6 servings 100g castor sugar 500 ml milk

12 slices bread, crusts removed

1 425g can of stoned black cherries, drained

4 eggs, separated juice and grated rind of 1 lemon few drops vanilla essence 250ml double cream

Method: DISSOLVE a quarter of the castor sugar in

3 tbs icing sugar

half the milk. Dip the bread slices in the milk mixture so they are saturated, but not soggy and falling apart.

Grease a baking dish and sprinkle with another quarter of the castor sugar. Arrange half the bread slices in the dish and lay over the cherries, reserving a few for decoration. Cover with the remaining bread. Mix the egg yolks with the


remaining milk, lemon juice

and rind, vanilla essence, remaining castor sugar and cream./

Whisk the egg whites until stiff, then fold into the yolk mixture. Spoon over the baking disk.

Health Tips from "RemedieS"

The greater celandine (Chelidonium majus), a valued plant of the Old World herbalist, is now grown in wild gardens. A member of the poppy family (Papaveraceae). it has poisonous orange sap, coarsely toothed, divided leaves, and four-petaled yellow blooms about 2.5 cm (1 inch) across. It was formerly known as wartweed for its reputed power to remove warts.

Warts are caused by an infection of the skin by the human papilloma virus. This infection causes cells in the skin to multiply, giving rise to the characteristic lump seen. Verrucae are simply common warts found on the feet. Celandine contains alkaloids with anti-viral activity. One of these, Benzophenanthridine, has been shown to possess the ability to damage and kill wart viruses. Another, known as Chelidonine, slows down the proliferation of infected skin cells.

'Golden Conifers' with golden species and varieties of Cryptomeria, Thuja and Pinus

Exciting colours and stylish forms can be yours with 'Golden Conifers'. As the beauty of the autumn leaves begins to give way to the tracery of winter branches, ornamental conifers really come into their own. They give the garden important solid features and reaches a height of 1-2m. Another by planting species and varieties with White cedar, 'Golden Globe' has lots to unusually coloured leaves you can get maximum value from their structure and form.

Most of the golden conifers available in this country are dwarf varieties which makes them highly adaptable for use in smaller gardens, or in areas of special interest such as rock gardens. In these situations they can provide colour and interest, especially when many other garden plants are dormant. The leaves of some take on a bronze tinge in winter which is an added colour bonus and all will look fabulous encrusted with hoar frost or dusted with a covering of snow.

Here are a few species and varieties that deserve a special mention. From the family of the White cedar, Thuja occidentalis 'Rheingold' is highly valued for its golden-yellow foliage. Added colour bonuses include the fact that foliage is pink-tinged when young and turns bronze in winter. 'Rheingold' offer as a plant for a rockery or small garden. A spherical, dwarf shrub, it has bright golden foliage and grows to an approximate height and spread of 1m. If you're looking for a tree with a columnar-conical form to fulfil a particular garden design theme, look out for 'Stoneham Gold' (Thuja plicata). This tree is slightly bigger than the others so far, achieving a height and spread of about 2m at maturity and has a rounded, irregular growth habit. From the family of the Japanese cedar (Cryptomeria) 'Elegans compacta' is an attractive conical shrub that has dark green juvenile foliage which turns bronze in winter.

No survey of golden conifers would be complete without a mention of Scots

pine (Pinus sylvestris) 'Gold Coin'. This slow growing shrub sports intense golden foliage and achieves a height and spread of approximately 2m.

Grow these conifers in deep soil with good drainage. They will do best in sheltered, sunny positions. Japanese cedars will tolerate chalky soils and are happy in partial shade. Thujas need shelter from cold drying winds. None of these conifers require regular maintenance, being slow growing and small. If they do need a trim to keep them in shape at any point, spring or late summer are

The golden conifers have lots to offer the gardener and garden designer in terms of their colour, form and ease of maintenance. They work beautifully alongside heathers or in rock gardens as accent plants. Trees with geometric shapes can provide formality and structure all year round.





The base of this tower is 45 feet in circumference or about 15 in diameter. The roof is pyramidal, being of stone, very-well cut and closely jointed together, well plas-tered within-side from top to bottom, being as white and fresh as if it were newly done. 4 beltings into stories divide the whole, with a window to each. On the top a kind of cross like a crutch, still remains. This is at present one of the most entire of these kinds of towers in the kingdom, and the only one of Anyone wishing to donate pho-tos, postcards, documents, bill-church-yard is the Dormitory of St. Declan, being a small low house not long since roofed and slated at the expense of the late bishop Mills. In this place they show a skull as they pretend, of this saint,

Ó Céilleachair has long argued that people in Ring and Old Parish have little difficulty with single site or smaller scale residential schemes, whatever about the sceptre of larger developments in excess of 40/50 units together. He says the latter scenario, initially practical under the 1999 County and 2001 Local

Area Development Plans, has appeared less likely since the debate surrounding the adoption of those strategies. Now, however, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says maps in the draft of the next plan relating to the four "settlement" units clearly state that planning applications of any type on the majority of lands therein will only be entertained subject to what the Council calls "genuine housing needs" criteria.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says the "genuine housing needs" criteria, which to date has been applied in the larger parts of both parishes lying outside of the four defined "settlement" units, is in his view a "disaster". This criteria, says Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, largely dictates that sites can only be used, bought or sold for houses in exceptions where the beneficiary is either a relative, a de facto "local" or is specifically employed in the parish and not in Dungarvan or anywhere else. This approach, in his view, is too restrictive, permits no balance and also negatively impacts on existing Ring/Old Parish residents who may want to develop a

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair also says the new draft plan, which is available for viewing on the County Council, s website, is riddled with "mistakes, contradictions and impracticalities" in respect of Ring and Old Parish. Lands newly proposed for "primarily agricultural" uses in more than one instance, according to Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, are either already built on or have been the subject of planning applications something which may yet have legal implication, in his view. Nine acres owned by Údarás na Gaeltachta in Baile na nGall are given three new distinct zonings in the draft, including a "parkland and amenity" designation and none of which accord to the statutory obligation of developing the land for enterprise pur-

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair argues it should be possible to have planning on its, merits for Ring and Old Parish, where the improvement urgently required to local infrastructure (particularly water supply and upgrading of sewerage treatment), due regard to the natural development of rural communities and the maintenance of the Gaeltacht status are taken into account stitutionally, explication of amenals



LATE VERY REV **CANON WILLIAM** PHELAN (1918-2004)



The death occurred recently of the Very Rev. Canon William Phelan, No. 11 The Orchard, Dungarvan. Canon Phelan was the son of the late Thomas and Mary Phelan (nee Flynn), of Carriganure, Kilmeaden, Co. Water-

He was born on the 26th September 1918 and was educated at Ballyduff National School, Mount Sion Secondary School, and Mount Melleray Seminary. In 1937 he entered St. John's College, and a year later he transferred to Maynooth College where he spent the next seven years studying for the Priesthood. He was ordained on the 17th June

He spent the first six and a half years as a curate in the parish of St. Lawrence's, Byker, Newcastle on Tyne, where he made many friends, contacts which he maintained for the rest of his life.

On the 11th November 1951 he was appointed curate in St. Patrick's, Waterford. On the 16th January 1953 he was appointed to the parish of Grange and Ardmore, during his time in Ardmore he played an active role in the revival of the GAA there. His next appointment was to the parish of Ballybricken where he spent the next two years. In 1959 he was appointed to the parish of Crooke where again he was involved in the reorganisation of the GAA and the starting of the Pioneer Association there.

In 1968 he was appointed curate to Cahir, Co. Tipperary, where he spent eleven very happy years. During his time there he was involved in almost every organisation from the Community Council to the Lourdes Annual Pilgrimage. It was during his time in Chair that he underwent major surgery, and he often spoke of the kindness and support of the people there during his recovery.

On the 7th February 1979 he was appointed Parish Priest of Stradbally, he had a great love for this parish as his mother was born in Faha, and the person who had probably the greatest influence on his life his uncle Fr. Willie Flynn was buried there. During his time there he was involved in the renovation of Stradbally Church.

On the 15th July 1986 he was transferred to the parish of Cappoquin. He spent nine very happy and rewarding years there. A great honour was bestowed on him there in 1992 when he was appointed to the Cathedral Chapter and made Canon Phelan.

Following-his-Golden Jubilee

Mass on the 23rd June 1995 he retired to his new home in Dungarvan where he had lived until May of this year. He spent the last few months in the care of the Padre Pio Nursing Home in Cappoquin where he died on the 23rd

His remains were removed from Walsh's Funeral Home, Cappoquin on Monday evening with a guard of honour being provided by Passage and Ardmore GAA clubs. His remains were received at Cappoquin Parish Church by Bishop William Lee and by many other priests from the diocese. 



TILLAGE:

2005 Cropping Decisions

Very difficult decisions as regards crop choice will have to be made in the coming months. The gross margin of all crops has taken a different complexion now that area aid is not included. All cereal crops must return a good yield in order to return a positive gross margin. Table 1 gives the yields needed to break even (where all grain + straw sales equal input costs including machinery) on cereal crops. Table 1. Cereal yields to break even and yields needed to return a gross margin of 100/ac

Of course, to break even is not good enough, as a surplus is needed to pay for fixed costs, land rental and also for profit. Fixed costs include land maintenance, interest on loans, ESB & telephone etc. These costs have to be carried on all land farmed for the year even though no crop is sown.

The question all farmers have to ask themselves of all cropped fields is; has the field produced a positive gross margin every year over the last three years? If all fields have positive gross margins, then it is worth looking closely at individual fields and ask did all the areas within that field give a positive gross margin? If wet spots, dry banks, compacted areas etc., of the field are holding back yield then don't plant them. By excluding these areas the yield per acre of the sown areas will increase therefore produce a better gross margin for the sown areas. The sown and unsown areas can still be used to claim the Single Farm Payment.

SOIL TESTING

Growing a cereal crop without a soil analysis is like driving in the dark without lights. Teagasc Johnstown Castle indicates that up to 1/3 of soils are seriously deficient in lime for tillage. Over 1/3 of soils are seriously deficient in the trace elements, copper, zinc or manganese. P and K levels are still at seriously low levels in about _ of soils but a further _ of soils have high levels of P and K and will grow grain crops without P or K for a number of years. An S4 soil test provides a scientific basis for successful and profitable tillage farming providing the basic analysis of pH, lime requirement, P index and P requirement, K index and K requirement as well as the trace elements important for tillage crops.

SHEEP:

Sheep Profit Monitor

Preliminary analysis of 41 flocks that completed the eProfit Monitor for 2003 shows that there is a huge range in output, stocking rate and profitability across sheep farms

Farms ranked in the top third (based on gross margin excluding

- Higher stocking rate (10.9 ewes/ha vs 7.8)
- Higher weaning rate (1.55 lambs / ewe vs 0.95)
- Lower variable costs (41 /ewe vs 45)
- Lower fixed costs (38 vs 46)

Output (in terms of stocking rate and number lambs reared per ewe) is the major determinants of profitability per hectare.

About 50% of the difference in output between the top and bottom third was due to a higher stocking rate. A further 40% was due to an increase in the number of lambs reared.

The results show that sheep farmers, if they do not want to dip into their SFP (Single farm Payment) have to concentrate on

The top group made a profit of 30/ ewe (excluding premia), while the bottom group made a loss of 30/ewe. Basically, premia contributed 30/ewe to flock maintenance in the bottom

There was an increase in gross margin of about 8 per ewe for each 0.1 increase in rearing rate.

Reality — in the absence of premia, weaning about 1.2 lambs /ewe is breakeven when replacement cost, variable and fixed costs are subtracted. This still does not leave any return from production for your work.

Flood Relief Scheme Not Until The End Of 2005

Flood Relief Scheme won't start until the end of next year at the earliest, Minister Tom Parlon stated when he paid a visit to the flood stricken town of Clonmel last weekend. He said Clonmel was to the fore front with the Office of Public Works as a priority for a flood relief scheme. He was due to ask the cabinet on Tuesday, 2nd November, to approve a compensation package to householders, which he said might amount to E10,000 per house. He said the scheme is likely to be administrated by the Red Cross and to apply to between 300 and 350 households in Clonmel and other flooded towns. The flood waters were raging as the Minister spoke on

nesses in the town flooded after the River Suir burst its banks. There was traffic chaos in and around the town, worsened by the River Anner also bursting its banks. Waters rose to higher levels than the last flood two years ago, devastating buildings in the Old Bridge, New Quay, Davis Road, Parnell Street, O'-Connell Terrace, Coleville Road and the road from the Finger Post to Pollards and many other areas. This badly needed Flood Relief Scheme is now expected to go on display for the public to make observations on it in January but won't commence until the end of next year. When Minister Parlon originally announced the new scheme last April, he promised Friday, 29th October, with an to spend E1 million this year on

Work has begun at O.P.W. headquarters on the development of the warning system but the clearing of streams and culverts has been deferred, to be included with the main scheme. Meanwhile householders and businesses have begun the long clean up operation with costs expected to run into huge figures as furniture, stock and other goods will have to be thrown out and the ground floors of many buildings to be completely redecorated.

FORMER TEACHER **PUBLISHES BOOK ON RIVER BOATS**

Boats, Cots, Punts and Wherries, a book complied by Clonmel's Shay Hurley, a former school teacher at Touraneena for some years, and whose late mother was Molly Whelan, Glenanore, from the note books of Thomas Cuddihy, was launched at the Carrick Hotel last Thursday evening. 63 year old Thomas Cuddihy lived in Piltown, Co. Kilkenny. He built boats all his life until his death in 1944 among them the famous racing scull which he rowed to victory in the People's Regattas of 1910. 1911 and 1912. He also built a Clonmel single scull and a Clonmel racing scull. This project was undertaken by Shay Hurley as a member of the Workman's Boat Club in Clonmel and was initiated under the River Suir project to record, recover and exhibit material relative to the Suir river down the ages. To Shays knowledge this is the first book to record the present the specifications of a range of river boats used on the Suir. The book is published by Coracle Press, Ballybeg, Grange, Clonmel and will be distributed through Eason's and Cornerhouse Publications, Manchester. The book was launched by Michael Coady, Carrick-on-Suir.

Is there something in my life or in the lives of my loved ones that needs healing?


There may be memories, relationships, spiritual issues or physical ailments that cause suffering. We will consider each







KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question: I understand that there have been some improvements to maternity protection legislation. Can you please give the details?

Answer: The Maternity Protection (Amendment) Act 2004 which came into effect from 18th October 2004 allows, among other things, for women to end their maternity leave if they become ill, to postpone it if the child is in hospital and it provides for time off for both parents to attend ante-natal classes. The improvements are as follows:

The period of maternity leave that must be taken before the expected date of birth is reduced from 4 weeks to 2 weeks. The basic period of maternity leave remains at 18 weeks with an additional 8 weeks of unpaid maternity leave.

Expectant mothers can attend one set of ante natal classes without loss of pay (apart from the last 3 classes which are normally attended while on maternity leave). If an expectant mother is unable to attend one full set of ante-natal classes during her pregnancy due to circumstances beyond her control, she is entitled to time off work without loss of pay during one or more subsequent pregnancies to attend the classes she missed (apart from the last 3 classes).

There is a once off right for fathers to paid time off to attend the two ante natal classes immediately prior to the birth.

Maternity leave/additional maternity leave may be postponed (subject to the agreement of the employer) in the event of the hospitalisation of the child. The rest of the leave can be taken after the child comes out of hospital. Leave may only be postponed after 14 weeks maternity leave has been taken.

In the event of the mother becoming ill while on the additional unpaid maternity leave she may ask her employer to end the maternity leave. Her absence from work will then be treated the same as any employee's absence from work due to illness.

An employee's absence from work on the additional unpaid maternity leave will count for all employment rights associated with the employment just as if the employee has not been absent (except for pay and superannuation benefits.

Breastfeeding mother who have given birth within the previous 6 months have an entitlement, without loss of pay, to either a reduction of one hour a day in working hours or where breastfeeding facilities are provided by the employer, breastfeeding breaks totalling one hour. Time off work is calculated on a pro-rota basis for part time workers.

Local Woman Visits Volunteer Projects In Sri Lanka



Dungarvan woman Jenny Beresford recently visited i-toi's volunteer projects in Sri Lanka, and was astounded at the poverty in a country with so much physical beauty.

Volunteer travel and TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language) company i-to-i, also based in Dungarvan has a number of projects in Sri Lanka including community development, media, conservation and teaching.

Jenny was sponsored by BEAT 102103 FM, Centuary Homes and Clancey Construction (Dungarvan Shopping Centre) to spend 2 and a half weeks visiting i-to-i's projects.

"I visited a street school in

"I visited a street school in Bangor, Boys Orphanage, Convent Orphanage and Millennium Orphanage, the whole experience was a real eye opener." Jenny also mentioned that the Sri Lankan projects were always in need of more volunteers.

"The i-to-i volunteers that I met were fantastic, really interesting people from all walks of life, all of them were aged 18 up to 65 and they were all spending 2-3 months at their projects."

Jenny explained what life is like for the volunteers. "The accommodation at all the projects is basic but manageable and very clean. There is plenty to do at all the projects, but at night it is very quiet as people are not so social, so volunteers play cards or read in the evening."

She also said that on the weekends, volunteers can head to the beaches, forests or cities, and that there is something for everyone to do.

"The scenery in Sri Lanka is absolutely beautiful, its very rich and thick green. Then the coast is very contrasting with its white sand and palm trees."

She said that all volunteers should be prepared for basic facilities, culture shock and that it would be a very emotional experience.

"Sri Lankan people are very blunt, they say exactly what they mean, its quite refreshing. I was surprised that they dont wear shoes, but all have mobile phones. There are not much opportunities for young people, with children following in their parents footsteps."

"The people are so friendly and the country itself feels very safe to be in."

One project that really stuck in Jenny's mind was the covent orphanage project. The project

was so diverse, the children were aged 10 months to 15 years old. Volunteers can be working in a nursery one day and teaching classes the next."

"The kids at this orphanage looked up to the volunteers, they were engaged and happy, really responsive. It was amazing to be there and I would love the opportunity to go back."

Jenny suggests ideal volunteers for the projects in Sri Lanka should have an open mind, be flexible, to expect a relaxed atmosphere about everything (such as late buses) and to really find out alot about Sri Lanka itself before they go.

I-to-I is an organisation that runs volunteer placements in 25 countries. You can volunteer in several areas including teaching, conservation, community development, building and work experience placements. i-to-i also runs its own TEFL courses and an earning placement in South Korea.

FIBROMYALGIA

What is Fibromyalgia?

Fibromyalgia is a common musculoskeletal pain and fatigue disability for which the cause is still unknown. Fibromyalgia means pain in the muscles, ligaments and tendons (the fibrous tissues in the body). This disability was previously known as Fibrositis, meaning that there is inflammation in the muscles, but research has found that inflammation did not exist. Most people that have Fibromyalgia will ache all over, sometimes their muscles twitch and at other times they burn. Research has shown that women are affected more than men, and the disability will affect all age groups. At present there is no known cure for Fibromyalgia, and it is usually a lifelong disability. What are the symptoms of Fibromyalgia?

Fibromyalgia is association with pain, which can take various forms, such as deep muscular aches, stabbing or throbbing. The symptoms also include the following:

- Pain and stiffness of upper back, shoulders, neck and joints
- Sleep disorders
- Fatigue
- Chronic Headaches
- Irritable Bowel
- Facial and Jaw pain
- Numbness and Tingling in the hands and feet
- Clumsiness
- Chest pains

Difficulty with concentration and memory loss
 Some people may also be extra sensitive to weather

changes, noise, light and smoke.

How is Fibromyalgia diagnosed?

It can be difficult to diagnose Fibromyalgia, as it is not possible to diagnose the condition with blood tests or with x-rays. The usual way of testing for the disability is to consider the person medical history (this includes any history of widespread pain in all four quadrants of the body for at least three months). And another way of diagnosis is by pressing of the known tender points on the body.

What causes Fibromyalgia?

The causes of this disability are unknown, but there are many triggering events thought to precipitate its onset. An example of these triggering events may be an infection (viral or bacterial), an accident, rheumatoid arthritis or lupus. These do not cause Fibromyalgia, but they can awaken an underlying physiological abnormality that's already present in the form of genetic predisposition.

Treatment and Outlook for Fibromyalgia

Treatment includes reducing stress levels, and learning self-management techniques. Exercise and a healthy diet can help to manage pain, but most people with Fibromyalgia will know that certain daily tasks will make the pain worse, such as looking at a computer screen for long periods of time.

Some treatments such as acupuncture, acupressure, nutrition, relaxation, osteopathic manipulation, chiropractic care, therapeutic massage, or a gentle exercise program will help alleviate pain and stress. Other treatments that will help to alleviate the symptoms of Fibromyalgia are prescribed painkillers and medications that will help to improve the quality of sleep. Research over the past ten years has seen an increase in interest into this disability and there are studies being carried out to advance the understanding of Fibromyalgia.

Lismore Sets Example For Japan

Lismore, Ireland's tidiest town, is set to become an example to towns and cities across Japan as they become more aware of their landscape.

The Japanese Ministry of Land, Infrastructure and Transport introduced the 'Beautiful Country Planning Policy Scheme' in July last year. Under this scheme about one-sixth of Japans cities, towns and villages have enacted their own landscape conscious town planning ordinance. They have looked at Irelands Tidy Towns Competition as an example of how their country can become more landscape aware.

Last week we welcomed Mr. Masami Ota, the principal researcher with the JAL foundation to Lismore. The JAL foundation works with the Japanese Government and Japan Airlines to conduct investigations and research into matters relating to aviation, tourism, the environment and landscape. As we showed Mr. Ota around Lismore we explained to him how our litter rotas work. He took this as an example of best practise in the area of community involvement. He said "that the citizens play the key role in landscape planning to make their own town beautiful and a pleasure to live in. In due course visitors will increase and communication will be born,

Mr. Ota went on to explain that in Japan the baby boomer generation is now around 55 and is almost at retiring age. He said "for them spiritual wealth is becoming more important than material wealth. This generation who are healthy, are starting to use their free time to participate in voluntary activities. Starting in your own backyard is an easy enough concept for anyone to understand and landscape conscious town planning could be a concrete way of volunteering. The landscape is something created by those who live there, a kind of cultural barometer."

Feeling very pleased with his visit and having picked up ideas from Lismore that he considered could be applied in Japan, Mr. Ota presented us with gifts of porcelain before departing for his home country. We will continue to stay in touch with what is happening in Japan and we hope to report on their progress in

An injury to Ian Duggan saw him come off with 13 minutes to go so we had a completely rearranged back four.



As mentioned last week we intend naming a Juvenile hurling team of the year, which will be selected from all our underage hurling teams from U.10s upto, and including U.16s. This is a new venture for the Club and one that I hope will be carried out on an annual basis.

The selection process will be based on individual performances that would be considered well above the average by an individual in his respective position. Each nominee, as listed below, has been picked in his normal and natural position and it is only this position that he can be selected for. What I'm really trying to say is that no player will be facilitated on the team in a position that he didn't plat in (like some of the All Star awards).

The other important consideration is the importance of the player's performances to his team in terms of winning or losing. i.e. how much he meant to his fellow players and what effect his performance had on them.

Having seen all the teams mentioned above during the year I expect to see a good spread of ages in the "team of the year" and it is intended to present the players selected with a memento on the night of our Juvenile AGM due to be held in early November.

Over the years we will build up a series of teams that will, in time, be the foundation for future adult teams. Given that there will be only 6 years at most between all the players selected they could very well be the first team to win a Senior Hurling Title for the Deise for a long, long time. Won't it be interesting to see what happens?

PAULA BOUNCES BACK

Paula Radcliffe bounced back from her Olympic disappointment in the most dramatic of circumstances when she won the New York City Marathon in the closest finish in the race's 35-year history.

The 30-year-old Bedford runner, who dropped out of both the marathon and 10,000m in Athens in August, beat the Kenyan Susan Chepkemei by just four seconds following a thrilling finish in Central Park.

An estimated crowd of 2.5 million lined the 26.2 mile course from Staten Island to Manhattan and were treated to the sight of Radcliffe re-establishing herself as the World's best female distance runner just 77 days after her meltdown in the Greek capital.

After running side-by-side, stride-for-stride with Chepkemei for the final five miles, Radcliffe finally launched a stinging kick 200m from the finish.

Radcliffe's time was 2:23:10 and victory means she has won all four of the marathons

ROVING MARK ROUND 4

On Sunday last we held another round of our Roving Mark Shoot. The conditions for this shoot were ideal and a good crowd made for a most enjoyable morning. With one shoot left after Sunday it was vital that those in the Hunt for the title of Roving Mark Champion picked up valuable points.

While the conditions were ideal the course organisers set out a really challenging course which kept everybody's score low for the day. After the first few marks it was clear that this round was going to be a closely fought affair. Stephen Dunford and Ben Brittain got off to a flyer and after three marks both Vinny O'Donnell and Michael Power had also joined in the hunt for top spot. Current overall leader Kevin Power however just wasn't out of the blocks and it wasn't until mark six until he registered a score. At the half-way point it was clear that today's winner was going to come from a breakaway group of five.

Michael Power on 15 Vinny O'Donnell and Ben Brittain on 12 Young Ryan Duggan who had scored a perfect ten on Mark No.5 and Stephen Dunford on 9 had left the rest of the pack in their wake. The terrain at this stage was causing some problems with arrows being lost in the ditches and briars indeed as we reached the end of the course some archers were down to two, one and in some cases no arrows in their quivers. As the Archers went into the Final Mark it couldn't have been closer Vinny O'Donnell and Stephen Dunford were tied on 19 with Michael Power on 18. This was it; the morning's shoot had come down to the final mark. This was a difficult shot over a line of trees to a flag that was close to a ditch. This is one where you undershoot you end up in the trees over-shoot and you end up searching in the bushes. Only one of the three leaders managed to score on the final mark. It was Vinny O'Donnell who, at this stage was down to two arrows, managed to get a vital

single point, to take the mornings honours.
