

"Rat Run" Road Through Senior **Citizens Estate Rejected**

DILEMMA FOR PLANNERS AS CONTROVERSIAL PLANS SHOT DOWN

Controversial plans to build a two-way road through the centre of a Senior Citizens estate were rejected by members of

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Dungarvan Town Council at

last Monday's meeting.
Councillors rejected the proposal to put the plan on public display, saying that to allow a two-way road to slice through the centre of the recently opened St. Brigids Well Housing estate was unacceptable.

It's understood planners will now have to go back to the drawing board to design an alternative and acceptable plan.

However while the elected members asked for a redrawn plan to be presented to the December meeting, it's understood there will be serious difficulty finding an alternative route and an alternative may even prove unfeasible.

CONNECTION

The 'inner link road' was proposed to connect the new Shopping Centre road with the bottom of Wolfe Tone Road before going through the Orchard Estate and finally connecting onto the Youghal Road.

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

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
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
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Bord Pleanala Rules Against Multi-Million Hotel Development

Hotel Development Would Have Adverse Impact

An Bord Pleanala overturned planning permission for a multimillion euro hotel and holiday home development planned for Kilgrovan, Clonea, ruling that the development would have an adverse impact on a visually vulnerable coastal site.

Developers, Greenbirch, initially planned to construct 166 holiday homes, a three-storey "Spa" hotel and an apartment block on a site which is around 500m south of Clonea Strand Hotel and bounded by Ballinclamper and Kilgrovan.

However, there was significant local opposition to the develop-

Corcoran/ D&G Magnier all submitted appeals against the development.

RULING

While agreeing the development didn't contravene the intensive tourism zoning, and the use of the Old Railway Line wasn't in contravention with the Dungarvan & Environs Land Use Study Plan, the Inspector overturned permission on three

An Bord Pleanala found the development would have:

- · an adverse visual impact on the landscape quality and the character of the area
- adversely impact a coastal zone where more stringent development control standards apply
- and, it would cause a traffic hazard due to its scale and the standard of the local road net-

PLANNERS HAD CONCERNS

Waterford County Council had controversially granted the development planning permission earlier this year, subject to twenty-four conditions after the developers substantially altered their plans on a number of occa-

However, despite the changes, the Council's Planners Report, which recommended conditional permission expressed several concerns.

The report expressed concern over the high density of the development especially the block of apartment suites, over the potential use of the holiday homes as permanent dwellings and at the speculative nature of the development." However, the local authority granted permission at the start of June.

APPEALS

A total of seven appeals, including from local community groups were lodged on a number of grounds.

These included that the zoning of the land was never intended for high density residential purposes, was not adjacent to an established settlement node as required by the Development Plan, was an unsustainable tourism product and that there was a strong probability the holiday homes would be sold on.

They also said it would have an adverse visual and environmental impact and that it represented the urbanisation of a rural area. They said it would be unsustainable in terms of its lack of physical infrastructure and facilities - acting as a detriment to the local community and that it would be premature given the poor road network and the absence of improved water and sewer facilities.

The appellants also argued that road access is poor and wouldn't be able to cope with increased traffic levels, that the old Railway Line shouldn't have been sold directly to the developer and was earmarked in the Dungarvan & Environs Land Use Study Plan as an amenity area.

They went on to say that due to the location and scale of individual units, the residential amenity of the existing dwellings would be compromised.

RESPONSE

In response the developers, said the site is zoned for intensive tourist uses in the Dungarvan Environs Land Use Study Plan and questioned the relevance of the appellants interpretation. The developers said the Railway line is neither zoned nor reserved for an amenity walkway; they said the appeal site is located within a normal landscaped area, the development would not place unsustainable demands on existing and planned infrastructure, is situated in an established tourism area and that the nature, scale and density of the development was consistent with proper and sustainable planning.

They also made points on protecting the architecture . EIS studies, on water supply and storm water disposal. The seawater in the hotel's spa and its discharge, they said, would be subject to the granting of a foreshore license

FINDINGS

The Bord Pleanala Inspector found that "none of the proposed uses directly contravenes the (intensive tourism) zoning objective for the area.'

While noting the opinion of a former Senior Planner in the Clonea Beach Awareness Groups appeal, he said the Dungarvan & Environs Land Use study allows for the type of development planned. He also found that the settlement nodes referred to by the appellants related to residential development and not to a tourism related development.

He also rejected the appellants comments on the use of the Old Railway Line.

But, he found the layout of the development was "very cluttered" and the design of the holiday homes "quite poor" and "lacking in originality" while the hotel and apartment suite complex "appear very monolithic.

He added: "I find that the proposed three-storey hotel and apartment suite structures combined with the large number of dormer style holiday homes proposed would have a very significant adverse impact on the visual amenity of the area having regard to the coastal zone location.

Due to the scale and height of the development, he recommended the development be refused on the grounds that it would be "visually obtrusive" in a landscape "unable to absorb the scale of the development proposed.

He went on to say that while the projected traffic generated by the development was relatively low, "insufficient regard" was given to the "substandard road network.'

From an inspection he had carried out he also confirmed that it would cause a "traffic hazard."

Disabled Persons Fund Receives Grant **Boost**

Additional funding from the Department of the Environment for the Disabled Person Fund of 600,000 will clear some of the backlog for the successful scheme.

Tallow Plastics Plant Sold For €1.1 million

A major jobs boost is expected in Tallow after the sale of the former Flair Plastics Plant for an estimated 1.1 million euros.

A previous deal on the 67,000 sq ft plant on a 5.4 acre site fell through when a Munster fish processing firm was refused planning for change of use on the site.

Now, it's understood that the successful purchaser is a firm that makes timber furniture.

The plant was bought through agents in Cork City, who were unable to confirm the buyers name.

The new use is expected to give a jobs and local spending boost to the town's depressed employment base. The warehouse is in four bays, and the buildings include offices and services. Location is just off the N71, giving easy ac-

IMPRESS with this very tasty and surprisingly healthy dish that works just as well under the grill or on a barbecue.

Ingredients:

(serves 4)

- 4 boneless pork chops
- 3 heads chicory
- 1 bulb fennel 1 carton natural yogurt juice of 1 orange
- juice of 1 lemon 1 tsp sugar pinch each of salt and
- white pepper
- 2 onions
- 25g butter 75g cheese
- 50g dried apricots
- 100 liver sausage
- 1 tbs flour
- 3 tbs oil

Method:

TRIMand cut the chicory and fennel into strips.

Mix the yogurt with the orange and lemon juices, sugar, salt and pepper and spoon over the mixed chicory and fennel. Chill. Peel and chop the onions. Heat the butter

in a pan and brown the onion. Dice the cheese; chop the apricots and mix together with the liver sausage and browned onions. Trim and flatten the chops and spread with the liver sausage mixture and fold each chop in half, securing with a wooden cocktail stick. Coat with flour and brush both sides with oil before cooking under a moderate grill for about 10 minutes each side.

Chop the gherkin finely

and mix with the liver sausage. Chill until firm then form into oval balls and arrange around the oranges. Arrange slices of continental sausage between the liver sausage balls. Mix the mayonnaise with the parsley and spread over the ham slices. Arrange on the platter. Serve garnished with lemon slices, parsley and gherkin

Ingredients: 6-8 Servings 275g plain flour 1/2 tsp salt 1 tbs oil 1 egg 175 ml lukewarm water 8-10 cooking apples lemon juice 50g butter, melted 300 ml soured cream 2 tbs raisins 100g sugar about 150 ml milk icing sugar

Method:

Sieve the flour and salt into a bowl. Stir in the mixed oil, egg and water.

Knead to a dough and continue kneading for around another 10 minutes. Cover, leave in a warm place for 30 minutes.

Peel and core the apples.

Roll out the dough on a floured cloth then stretch it until very thin. Brush with the melted butter then with soured cream and top with the apple slices, raisins and sugar. Roll up the strudel, using the cloth to lift it and cut into portions to fit one or two greased baking travs. Brush with milk and bake in pre-heated hot oven at230° C/ 450 ° F, Gas Mark 8 for 40-45 minutes, until golden brown.


Slice thinly and sprinkle



Derelict
Houses

At a recent Waterford County Council meeting Cappoquin councillor, Nora Flynn (FG) cil moralled for action to be taken on derelict houses following the compilation of a preliminary register showing that twenty sites are deemed to fall into this category.

However, she said she thought far more derelict sites would be listed and said she believed there were far more than twenty derelict sites in the county. She also said the council doesn't seem to be able to fine people who leave their properties in a derelict state.

Cllr. Mary Green (FG) said people seem to hang onto their properties as long as possible, believing if it is not demolished then they can still sell it in the future.

 Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) said the council must take action, and not be afraid to levy fines.

Director of Services, Denis McCarthy said the reason 20 were listed on the register was because only towns in West Waterford and small urban centres like Villierstown had been included as yet.

He said the Department of Environment has also confirmed that it will allow the council to levy fines of up to 3% of the sites market value.

He said a full report on the derelict sites will be discussed by the SPC on housing in the future. "Dungarvan Leader"

Snails and Slugs

Snails belong the a group of animals called molluscs, which also includes oysters. squids and octopuses. There are over 35,000 types of slugs and snails, which have evolved as highly successful animals that can be found both on land and in the water. A snail shell, which is made mainly of chalk, is a hollow cone around a central, hollow column. The snail's body is in a type of bag coiled up inside the shell with only the head and the bottom part (known as the foot) visible. To move, the snail slides along on its foot which gives off a slime to make movement easier, leaving behind a glistering trail as it does. A slug is basically a small snail without a shell, although some species do have tiny shells. Like snails, most slugs feed on living or decaying vegetation. The slugs with shells are meateaters, they eat worms, caterpillars and the slugs without shells.

Snails and Slugs Have No Teeth Instead of teeth, snails and slugs have rows of horny bumps on the tongue, known as a radula, which act like a file to break up the food. The number of bumps on the radula varies according to the species, and can be as few as 20, or as many as 10,000.

Sea Slugs Poison their Enemies
Sea slugs are not related to land slugs. As
they have no protected shell, they use camouflage or poison to defend themselves.

Giant African Snails Are Giant Pests

Minute snails, with a shell no bigger than a pin head, can be found in the hills of Malaysia and Borneo, but the giant African snail is the largest snail in the world, with a shell of up to 35cm (13in) long. Giant African snails are now found in other parts of the world besides Africa, and have become quite a pest. In the South Pacific Islands, for example, these giants were introduced by accident



DID YOU KNOW?

- Some snails have gills. Others have lungs.
- The Helix garden snail of 'escargot' is thought to be a great delicacy.
- Sea snails called cone shells inject harpoons into their prey containing enough poison to kill a human.
- Sea slugs eat anemones, then regrow the anemone's poisonous stings through their own skin and use them as 'second-hand' defences!
- Some clugs can climb trees, then 'abseil' down on a rope of slime!
- The Roman writer Pliny recommended using slugs as cures for sickness.

1650th Anniversary of the birth of St. Augustine

The Augustinian Order throughout the world is celebrating a special jubilee this year, the 1650th anniversary of the birth of St. Augustine. He was born in Tagaste, in that part of Africa, which is modern Algeria on November 13th 354. He was born into a world of change and political turmoil, a world that had much in common with our own. The observation of Augustine's biographer, Peter Brown, has a ring of modernity to it: 'The young people of the saints day began to favour long hair, took to wearing outlandish clothes and displayed signs of restlessness in the presence of their elders!' In his restlessness Augustine tells us in his well known work 'The Confessions', he turned in succession to philosophy, poetry, to what we could call today new age sects, the Manachees. He was baptized in Milan by St. Ambrose in 387 at the age of 33. He began his great work, 'The City of God', as a consequence of the sack of Rome by the Barbarians in 410. This was as catastrophic to the people of the day as 9/11 has been to our own times. Many pagans blamed the Church for the fall of Rome. As bishop, he worked hard to heal disagreements and divisions in the Church. After 410, other serious problems emerged. Refugees from Europe flocked to Africa via the port of Hippo. They showed up in sufficient numbers for Augustine to warn his flock to receive them 'with charity and with open arms'. These brought news of the devastation caused by the Vandals; the destruction of towns and villages, the looting of churches and monasteries, the martyrdom of their inhabitants. Many believed that civilisation was at an end. The people of the time were full of fear. They longed for 'the good old days' when Rome was great. 'You talk about the good old days,' Augustine asked his congregation in the basilica in Hippo, 'were the old days so

good after all? Good times, bad

time: were they good times when

Adam and Eve were expelled from

Paradise? Were they good days

when Noah and his family went

into he ark? Good times, bad times:

what makes them good? If you are good, the times are good, if you are bad, the times are bad!' Augustine died, aged 76, in 430, as the Vandals were actually besieging his own city of Hippo.

Here are some quotations from St. Augustine. Other quotes can be seen on posters we have put in the Friary Church to commemorate his anniversary.

"Whoever is in a position of power and takes advantage of it to have a good time, or to increase his wealth or to get personal honours, such a man is not a leader of people, but a servant of himself." [Sermon 46.2.2]

"Just as severity is eager to punish the sins it discovers, so love is anxious not to discover sins to punish." [Letter 211.1]

"You notice a beautiful tree with its thick foliage and abundant fruit and you admire it. If you are shown its roots, you don't find any beauty in them, but that's where what you so admire comes from." [Sermon. 44.1]

"Many become stupid by boasting about their brightness." [In Joan, 14.3]

"You arouse us so that praising you may bring us joy, because you have made us and drawn us to yourself, and our heart is restless until it rests in you".[Bk I.1]

This jubilee of Augustine's birth, is an opportunity for us Augustinians to do three things: to be thankful for God's blessings on our Order, to renew our commitment to our vocations and to pray for the people who continue to support us in so many ways.

Here in Dungarvan we remember and thank God for our years of ministry in the Friary and in our school, formerly on Main Street, now in Duckspool. In 1874 the Augustinians founded the school in Main Street. They started with 30 pupils. It was a boarding school mainly, with lads from all over the country and county. That school continues to flourish today out in Duckspool over 130 years later.

This jubilee offers us the opportunity to reflect with gratitude on our proud Missionary record. Many men who joined the Augustinians

from this area, have given their lives to working on our Missions in Nigeria, Ecuador, and Kenya. In later years the Sisters of Mercy came to share our mission work in Nigeria, and the Presentation sisters worked with us in Ecuador. We have much to be thankful for. We record also with great gratitude, the tremendous support our Missionaries have received from you their families and from the people of Dungarvan and

surrounding areas.
On 26th 27th November we will be having our annual sale of Work for the Augustinian foreign missions. This year the Sale of Work takes place in Lawlor's hotel.

We have a good tradition here in

Dungarvan. We don't have exaggerated feelings about ourselves. We have gone through times of abundance. We are now going through leaner times. Good times. bad times: what makes them good? If you are good, the times are good, if you are bad, the times are bad!" I conclude by asking you to pray for vocations to the Augustinian Order, so that what we have received ourselves may be passed on to the next and following generations. We pray also for the strength to be a positive help to those who search for God, that we may support them by our prayers, warm them by our love and confirm them by our conduct. - Fr. Flor O'Callaghan O.S.A.

BALLYMACARBRY NEWS

Contract Signed For €300m Road Scheme

The construction of the new dual carriageway from Cashel, Co. Tipperary to Mitchelstown, Co. Cork and the N24 link which will act as an eastern bypass of Cahir was described by County Manager Ned O'Connor as a scheme that would have an enormous positive impact on the economic and social development of the county. "It will unlock the huge potential for development of Clonmel and the other major urban centres in South Tipperary" said Mr. O'-Connor. He made his remarks when the contract for the design and construction of the new roads which are expected to be completed within the next four and a half years, was signed by South Tipperary County Council and a joint venture construction company of Roadbrige and John Sisk and Son. The scheme with an estimated overall cost of approximately E300 million, is one of the first in the country to be agreed under a new form of design and build contract, with the contractor involved at an early stage in the development of the design. The production of the preliminary design will be followed by the publication of an Environmental Impact Statement and Compulsory Purchase Order. An oral hearing will be held next Spring, and subject to approval by An Board

Pleanala. Construction is expected to start in early 2006 and be completed by the Spring of 2009 at the latest. The completion of both new roadways will signal a further major improvement of South Tipperary's roads network, following last months opening of the Cashel bypass. The Cashel to Mitchelstown dual carriageway will be approximately 38 kilometres in length. Funding for the scheme will be under the National Development Plan, with part funding provided by the E.U.

Mattie McGrath (FF), Newcastle, South Tipperary County Council Chairman said he was particularly pleased that the 3.3 kilometres long eastern bypass of Cahir would be of huge benefit in removing all heavy traf-fic from Cahir town. "Hopefully the people of Cahir can reclaim their streets" he added. Councillor Mattie Mc-Grath described the contract signing as a red letter day for South Tipperary, with probably the largest ever contract that may be signed in the Council's lifetime. Billy McEvoy, the County Council's Director for Roads, described it as an exciting time in terms of the new type of contract, which was a first for the county, and the sheer physical scale of the project for South Tipperary.

His death at the age of 60 years came as a severe shock to his wife Mary and family.

The news of his unexpected passing too, at such a relatively young age, has been received with much sadness by his neighbours and his many friends.

Noted for his abiding interest in horses, Jimmy as he was popularly known, served his time as a jockey in England, which was the beginning of a life long involvement with the sport of kings.

Second youngest of a family of five, three boys and two girls, he lived for five years or so at Powerstown Park Racecourse where his father, Mick was a well known jockey.

At the tender age of fourteen he went to England and was employed by Fergie Sutherland stables in Newmarket as an apprentice jockey. He stayed there for a number of years and rode in several races there. His brother Mick remarked humorously, that his greatest claim to fame was the fact that on one occasion he finished in front of Lester Piggott, which was one of his favourite reminisces. Coming home regularly on holidays, he enjoyed riding out with their father Mick, who had moved to Castlefield Stables in his native Mylerstown. Returning to Ireland in the early sixties, he continued to work with horses, firstly with Lord Waterford at Curraghmore, Portlaw and then with the Paddy Prendergast Stables at the Curragh.

During his career in Ireland he worked with many great 'horsey' men as he used to call them, like the Kinane brothers, one of whom is father of famous jockey Michael and also with Christy Roche. Back in Clonmel in the late sixties, he married Mary English, a native of Marlfied, where his beloved mother, Chrissie Houlihan, came from. They resided in Marlfield for some time before moving to Elm Park, where they reared two children. Even when Jimmy wasn't working with horses he never lost his interest in them. Taking up employment in the steel fabricating industry in Clonmel, he spent some years working with Burke, Higgins, McNulty and with the late Nicholas Burke. Apart from his family and the horses, darts was another great love of his, and it gave him so much pleasure representing two local pubs at the time, the Parnell Bar (now the Coachman) and Paddy O'Gorman's (now Morans) in the Tipperary and District Darts League. According to his wife Mary, Jimmy also loved dancing and his feet were always tapping at home, whenever there was music on the radio or television and if the rhythm was lively enough, she commented, he would be waltzing around the kitchen. Even in more recent years, she said at weddings, socials or family occasions he would be the first person on the dance floor. For the past year and a half, he fought ill health courageously, getting out as often as he could for a walk in the vicinity with his dog 'Skip'. He was a familiar figure, too, of late in his garden cutting the grass and the hedges with his usual cheery word for passersby. Though Jimmy's death was sudden, his family are consoled in the knowledge that he slipped away peacefully in his sleep, at home.

His remains were removed to the Parish Church of St. Olivers, Clonmel where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. P. O'Leary, St. Olivers. Also present were Rev. Fr. O'Reilly I.C. and Rev. Fr. Fagan I.C., Ferrybouse

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
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

Legal Action To Be Taken Against Illegal Encampment

Cllr. Kyne called for legal action and said a log should be kept "on this and other unauthorised encampments" in the

"Residents are entitled to access their homes without hindrance, especially young children and pedestrians," he said. "I call now for immediate legal action to stop this unauthorised camping. The log should be put in place to improve the transparency of this process."

He claimed that if the same situation happened outside any other estate it would have been resolved earlier.

We have to be seen to go down the legal route. It is available to us and it would be a failure on our part if we did not go down that route.

RESIDENTS FEEL INTIMIDATED

One parent from the nearby Cluain Ard had earlier described how his family had been intimidated, and claimed their six year old son was hit on the back with a hurley.

"They're throwing things at the cars as they pass," the member of the local residents association said. "As much as anything else, it's a danger to themselves - it's an accident waiting to happen."

At last Monday's meeting, Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan said the council stands indicted for failing to move the encampment on. When the residents were moving into the council houses they were given a list of what they could and couldn't do as part of their duty of care. But the council has a duty of care to the residents and it is failing in carrying it out, he said.

Over the past two years, he said, the Advance Factory was wrecked and the Gaelic Field suffered when unauthorised encampments were in the area

"It's time we stopped the messing and got tough on this," Cllr. Geoghegan added.

Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan (Indp) said the situation hasn't been easy to resolve.

"An order has been served now and we have a commitment that they will be gone by Wednesday," he added.

TIME TO DRAW THE LINE"

Mr. O'Flaherty agreed with the members comments saying, "it's time to draw the line" and go down the legal route.

However, he said further unauthorised camping is not likely to happen in the area in the future as a Sesame School is planned for that area and this would take away the land that the group is now camping on.

Next years opening of the materials recovery facility in the advance factory would be a further deterrent to unauthorised

album, which will be recorded in Grace Lodge in Westmeath.

DVD AND NEW ALBUM IN

THE PIPELINE FOR GROUP

'We're doing gigs in Modeligo and another one in Wexford," Donnchadh said. "We'll be trying out a lot of new material. But it'll be a mixture. We'll have some of the songs and reels from the other albums

Those albums include the award-winning "The Road Less Travelled" - the first Danu album to feature the haunting vocals of Muireann Nic Amhlaoidh.

"This album is going to feature a lot more songs than any of the previous ones," Donn-chadh continued. "For one thing, it was for songs that we won the two World Folk Music Awards. And when you've got a singer as good as Muireann, it'd a be shame not to take advantage of that."

Co-producer of the new album, Gary O Broin is likely to join the group for the twonight concert. Gerry (Banjo) O'Connor, pencilled in to make a guest appearance on the album, is also expected to play in Modeligo.

DVD DOCUMENTARY

The release, shortly after Christmas, of a new DVD is another keenly anticipated venture from the Ring-based

Danu's live concert in Dublin's Vicar Street venue will be the centrepiece. But the Sean MacGoilla Chuda directed called One Night Stand - will also feature documentary footage of the band on tour in the US and Europe and back home in Ireland.

Danu have toured almost nonstop in the major cities in America, Canada, Japan, Britain and Europe as well as in Ireland

Asked why the group decided to take this decision so far in advance, Donnchadh said it was due to the group's heavy load of commitments (Danu are already booked to perform in New York on St. Patrick's Day in 2007) and the date gives them something to focus on.

"It's good to have something that you can focus on, and it's something that we can look forward to. When you're away on tour you do miss your kids and ramilies and you do want to be at home. So we'll be reducing the amount of gigs that we're doing. If people want us to play a gig somewhere then we'll look at that. But we'll be winding down in 2006 and winding down our gigs especially in America.'

"Rat Run" Road Through Senior **Citizens Estate Rejected**

CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE

The road would have sliced through no.'s 11 and 12 of St. Brigids Well - an estate designated for Senior Citizens.

Acting Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty said the road was contained in the Town Plan, and the residents of the estate were aware the road was to go through the estate when they were allocated the houses.

However, Labour Cllr. Billy Kyne argued that when the road was put in the Town Plan five or ten years ago the estate hadn't been built.

REELING

Members of the Town Council - reeling still from criticism levelled by the Orchard residents about the removal of the green area to allow for the inner relief road in that area - called for an amendment to the plan before it was put on public display - ruling out what they called "the rat run" through the Senior Citizens homes.

Where's the logic or the business reason in linking the busiest road in the town to O'-Connell Street through St. Brigid's Well?" Cllr. Kyne asked.

He said there was a danger

that in putting the plans on public display that people would think the elected members were in agreement with them.

PUBLIC DISPLAY

However, the new Town Manager, Denis McCarthy said what was proposed in the plans was contained in the Town

He said putting the plans on display would allow the public to make submissions on them, and didn't mean that members agreed with it.

Clir. Nuala Ryan (FF) warned that people could use the road as a short cut between the N72 and the Youghal Road, while Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair (Lab) said motorists using the road were unlikely to obey the speed limits on a wide straight road.

More criticism was heaped on the plan by Cllr. Damien Geoghegan. The Fine Gael Councillor argued that the inner relief road would work "quite well" without the road through St. Brigids Well and asked that the plan be amended.

NO PROPOSER

Amid heavy criticis, a proposer and seconder couldn't be found to place them on public

"We should be concerned with these plans," Cllr. Kyne argued. "Why should we advance them to public display when we are in disagreement with a fundamental part of it?"

"Five years ago there was no problem with the plans. It was fine because there was no housing estate there five years ago. If the plan was amended to exclude a road going through St. Brigids Well then I wouldn't have a problem with it. But as it stands I wouldn't support it."

ORCHARD ESTATE

Meanwhile, a deputation of Orchard residents met with the Town Council prior to its monthly meeting. It's understood a series of compromises were reached between the executive and the residents and the issue is regarded as resolved.

While 40-50% of the green will be removed, the council is believed to have agreed to put in place a number of safeguards including higher walls, screening, and trees to protect the estate from noise and the pedestrian access will be closed. The council hope to finalise details of the agreement in the next week.

SYMPATHY

"Miracle" Helvick Pier Survived Storms Says Co. Engineer

Director of Services with Waterford County Council, John O'Flynn said it was a miracle Helvick Pier survived the recent storms, which battered most of the coastal areas.

The pier needs substantial works to be carried out on it, and at the moment, only work to replace a chunk of the structure has been funded.

However, with last week's storm, significant damage could have been caused to the weakened structure. The pier escaped relatively unscathed, and the fact that

more damage hadn't been caused was a miracle, Mr. O'Flynn Mr. O'Flynn was giving a report on the damage, which oc-

curred throughout the county last week. While unwilling to put a figure on the amount of damage

caused, it's thought to run into millions of euros. Worst hit was the multi-million euro sewerage scheme

where a sea-wall was damaged, two rising mains were gouged open and all but 78m of the 580m long Treatment Plant outfall pipeline was damaged.

Only a small section of the outfall pipeline was protected by concrete. The remainder was anchored at intervals of 50 m and was dislodged in the storm.

The cost of the damage is estimated to cost up to 5 million

Meanwhile, a firm of expert restorers have been hired to freeze pack the water-damaged parts of the County Archives in a bid to restore them, while computers, telephone networks and electrical equipment in the Motor Tax Office were all damaged.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) said the Dept. of Marine's failure to provide any funding against coastal erosion last year made it questionable if any funding from the Department would be forthcoming.

"It would be scandalous it funding had to be diverted from the roads to coastal work."

Cllr. Paudie Coffey (FG), meanwhile, questioned a recent statement from Teagasc that no livestock had died during the recent flooding, saying that 100 lambs died at one farm he knew of between Portlaw and Carrick.

Urban Renewal **Programme** To Continue

The Urban Renewal Programme, which has brought great benefits to a number of towns around the county, is continuing on schedule.

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said the programme is a six-year plan and is presently proceeding on tar-

The next town to be targeted under the plan is Tramore.

Cllr. Paudie Coffey (FG), raised the issue, saying the programme has been of great benefit, including to towns like his own, Portlaw.

He also paid compliment to work on the programme

By-Roads **Around County Are A Disgrace** Says O Riain

Cllr. Ciaran O Riain (FF) described by-roads around the county as being a disgrace, saying the roads are so narrow there isn't even enough room for two cars to pass each other.

Every time two cars meet on back roads one of the cars is forced to reverse sometimes a long distance to allow room for the cars to pass, he said.

"The back roads are in a desperate state. We have to pay more attention to the County Roads.

Director of Services, John O'Flynn said Government funding from the Department of Environment for the county roads has been secured and will be spent on the county roads. He said there's some additional money for class three roads and for roads in the CLAR area.

Council May Buy Private Houses

Waterford County Council is looking at purchasing private houses in a bid to increase its housing stock, a recent meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

Raising the issue, Labour councillor, Billy Kyne said it was his information that the Dept. of Finance had sanctioned local authorities to buy private houses.

The move was being taken, he said, with a view to allocating them to suitably qualified applicants on the council's housing

Cllr. Kyne stressed the importance of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Town Council maximising this opportunity to draw Government funding to add to their housing

He particularly pointed out that they appoint tenants who might have individual special needs that could avail of single storey housing on health grounds, which he said would address an individual's difficulties and also realise this house type back into the council's housing stock.

However, Cllr. Kyne also cautioned against the increase of house prices due to the introduction of the scheme and said the council must purchase property right across the county.

Director of Services, Peter Carey said he was confident this notification had come from the Dept. of Finance and that the council's housing section will look at how to positively re-

He also acknowledged Cllr. Kyne's point that the council must be careful not to add to house prices in the utilisation of

The person with the slowest time each week is the first person to run the following week when the clock starts at zero. The fastest person each week is the last person to run the following week. His or her starting time is calculated by subtracting his or her finishing time from the slowest persons finishing time, likewise, everybodys starting time is calculated by subtracting their finishing time from the slowest persons finishing time. The starting times are rounded to thirty second intervals.

THE LEAGUE SYSTEM

The league is run on a points system - if you are the first to finish any night you accumulate one point. If you are the 100th runner to finish you accumulate 100-points lowest total of points is best. Each week your points are added on to your previous total of points. At the end of the league the runner with the lowest number of points is the winner. After Christmas both leagues are divided into several divisions to maintain everyone's interest in the leagu

THE TRICK

The trick is to run a little faster each week, but not too much faster. The faster you run, the longer you have to wait in the hall each week and the harder it will be to catch the other runners and score low points. THINK ABOUT IT?


189 COMPLETE 2.7 MILE RUN



CALL MADE FOR CHANGES TO BE MADE TO TIMING OF CHAMPIONS IF WATERFORD ARE TO BE SUCCESSFUL

At the West Waterford Bord na nOg Convention held at Lawlors Hotel in Dungarvan on Friday night last, Divisional Chairman Eddie O'Shea in his address to the small attendance that assembled for the annual meeting said that if West Waterford are to be successful in the Munster Interdivisional Hurling Championships which are held each year in and around the Easter Bank Holiday, the timing of the divisional hurling championships have to be changed.

The Chairman told the assembled delegates that although he was not present at the recent Gleeson Cup game between East and West Waterford a week previously he had heard good reports about the game and had been told that either of the two sides could have coped with any of the other divisions from the other Munster county on the day.

He went on to say that this was because that the players who had played in the game had in the weeks previous to the game had only finished playing the county under 16 hurling championship and the western hurling championship programme. It was pointed out that when the Munster Interdivisional championships are played the players are not playing competitive hurling at any level within the county and this was having an effect on the players.

The Chairman asked that delegates go back and talk to their fellow club officers and come back for the first delegate meeting of 2005 and agree to a request from the Bord to allow the under 16 hurling championship be played at the start of the year and in doing so allow the players be playing competitive hurling in the weeks leading up to the interdivision-

The outgoing chairman also pointed out in his address to convention that the only competition that the Bord has any problems with in finishing each year was the under 16 hurling championship. This he said was because clubs refused to play because they were missing a certain player or players. He also said it was because it is run off at a time when the under 14 football championship is drawing to a conclusion and clubs did not want to play in the under 16 hurling championship if they were in the knockout stages of the under 14 football championship.

Eddie O'Shea in his address also paid tribute to outgoing chairman of the Adult County Bord Paddy Joe Ryan who has decided to step down from the position after ten years of loyal service. The chairman pointed out that before Paddy Joe became Chairman, the Western Bord na nOg Officers had huge problems obtaining Fraher Field for games, but since Paddy Joe took over the position things have changed big time and that now Fraher Field is made available to Bord na nOg and to the School's Bord's as often as is possible.

A call was made to respect referees during the course of the game was made by Eddie O'Shea last Friday evening. He told that each club had a responsibility to protect the referee of abuse of any sort during the course of any game. The need to have each player registered properly was also highlighted at the divisional Bord na nOg Convention last week. It was pointed out that as and from January 1st 2005, all clubs will have to register its players and members each year in accordance with the passing of a motion at a recent special national convention held

Chairman Eddie O'Shea finished his address to delegates at last Friday's West Waterford Bord na nOg Convention by asking those present to stand and say a silent prayer for Shane Gleeson, a playing member of the Nire and Fourmilewater clubs who died during the course of the year following a tragic accident. The chairman pointed out that in his time involved with the Bord he had the sad duty to attend the funerals of four young hurlers and footballers who died in tragic circumstances, Shane Gleeson (Nire and Fourmilewater), Thomas Scanlon (Cappoquin/Affane) and Pat Tobin and P.J. Rossiter (both An Gaeltacht). He said that when such tragedies occur it makes the results of hurling and football games of little importance.







Stradbally by their courage, commitment and football skill, had carved a place in history and for the second time in their history, had qualified for a Munster Club football final which they will play on December 5th.

The game itself was a tough encounter and had its few squabbles and as one Stradbally man told me on Sunday night "just because we were from Waterford they thought they could push us around, but we were not having any nonsense."

The result was earned the hard way and every one of the 16 players shared in shaping this wonderful victory. The outer line of defence will see the brilliant Tony Brown in the centre and Brian Flannery on his right and Kenny Stafford on the other wing.





In 2003, the British challenger Edredon Bleu (FR), trained by Henrietta Knight, rose to the occasion to record a thrilling victory, beating the previous years winner Beef Or Salmon into third place in an eventful renewal of the Clonmel Oil Chase.

This has been a very lucky race for Michael Hourigan in the past. Dorans Pride won this race on 4 consecutive occasions and what a servant he proved to be and Beef Or Salmon, running over fences for the first time, won this prestigious chase in 2002. According to Arthur, "it is very difficult to find suitable races, most ground is not a problem for him, and he was disappointing in the Munster National but definitely on board for next Thursday and in great form"

Arctic Copper (IRE), trained by Noel Meade is a definite contender in this race, as he came in second last year. Gillian O'Brien (Assistant Trainer), "he has come out of his race in Navan last Sunday in good form and is back to his old enthusiasm and is fit and well to turn-up for these big days". Arctic Copper came in second behind Moscow Flyer (IRE) last Sunday week in Navan.

Risk Accessor (IRE), owned by J P McManus and trained by Christy Roche sidestepped Cheltenham last weekend to run on Thursday next. Frank Berry, "He is in good form, missed Cheltenham to go there (Clonmel), ". Risk Accessor won in Listowel in September last and came second to Colca Canyon (IRE) in Limerick in October. Alcapone has also been put forward as a likely participant by his handler. Mouse Morris.

Henrietta Knight having had such success in this race with Edredon Bleu last year is together with her owner, Jim Lewis, keen to return this year with Impek (FR). Impek was third to Our Armageddon (NZ) last March at Cheltenham. He was beaten by a half a length by Cenkos (FR) in April last. Henrietta Knight, "The horse seems well at home, he runs better when fresh, we're hoping to get Timmy Murphy on board, this depends on Mr Johnson here in the UK, two and half miles around Clonmel will suit him well, this horse handles most distances, Mr Lewis is keen to return having enjoyed his win immensely last year"


FRANKIE QUINLAN R.I.P.

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


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No Plans To Change 'Outdated' School Catchment Areas

Minister for Education, Mary Hanafin has no plans to carry out a full review of the school catchment boundaries at present despite criticism from a number of parents and by Vocational Education Committee members who claim the boundaries are outdated.

In a parliamentary reply to Deputy John Deasy, Minister Hanafin said a "small number of requests" calling for a review of the boundaries were received by the Department of Educa-


She said these have been dealt with on an individual basis.

The boundaries were drawn up in the 1960's when the "Free Education Scheme" was implemented.

However, Co. Waterford VEC members and parents blasted the system as outdated and out of touch. In one instance children living closer to Clonmel and who attended the secondary school there were only offered a bus service to the secondary school in Lismore.

VEC Chief, Paddy Lavelle last month said he had exhausted all options open to him to bring the matter to a resolution.
