FLYNN REPORT

According to the first report from the Implementation Committee, fifteen Government departments would be the first to relocate outside Dublin.

This would involve twentyone projects in twenty locations, nearly 3,500 jobs and the transfer of eight headquarters.

The remaining thirty-three locations are to be included in a further report next Spring. This is understood to include the 199 to 210 civil and public servants from the Ordnance Survey of Ireland agency, which

are to decentralise to Dungarvan.

The report also contains a schedule showing "indicative" construction start and completion dates for the procurement of office accommodation in the first twenty-towns.

All except four of these projects would get underway in 2005 with eight projects to finish in 2006, nine in 2007 and

four in 2008.

Minister, Martin Cullen, a member of the cabinet subcommittee on implementing decentralisation, acknowledged that work remains to be done on fully implementing the plan.

FLEAS AND LICE

There are almost 2,000 different types of flea. Adult fleas feed on the blood of animals. They pierce the skin with their mouth and then suck up the blood. Because of this, several types of flea can transmit diseases. The most famous case of a disease being transmitted by rat fleas was the Black Death, or bubonic plague, which wiped out much of the population of Europe in medieval times.

Fleas Are Fussy Where They Live

A flea will lay some 300 to 500 eggs in the fur of



another but most prefer just one particular type of host. The human flea has the Latin name Pulex irritans, meaning 'irritating flea', because its bite produces irritation. In hygienic conditions the flea is more likely to live on pigs rather than humans. Most people who are bitten by a flea are actually bitten by cat or dog fleas.

Fleas Are Champion Jumpers

Fleas have three pairs of very strong legs, which are used for jumping. A flea is capable of jumping over a hundred times its own height. The flea that lives on human can jump up to 20 cm (7in) high and a cat flea even higher, up to 34 cm (13in).

Some Fleas Lay Their Eggs In People's Feet Most fleas do not stay for long on human kin, but the jigger flea, found in Africa, the West Indies and the southern United States, is an exception. The female jigger flea burrows into a person's foot to lay its eggs.

Lice Suck The Blood Of Humans

Lice are small, wingless insects that such blood for their hosts. There are two main types, the chewing lice that live mainly on birds and the sucking lice that live on mammals. As well as causing irritation to humans, lice can also transmit typhoid and other diseases. There are two types of human live, The body louse lives on clothing and the head louse lives in head hair on which it lays its eggs, which are known as nits.

Did You Know?

- A flea can jump 200 times the length of its own body!
- In the 14th century, fleas helped wipe out a quarter of the human population of Europe, by spreading the plague known as the Black Death.
- When a rabbit becomes pregnant, so do the fleas on its skin!
- When Thomas a Becket's robe was removed after his murder in Canterbury Cathedral, England, the lice 'boiled over like a water in a simmering cauldron'.
- Victorian showmen ran flea circuses, in which tethered fleas rode chariots and bicycles, walked tightropes and fought sword fights.
- Soldiers in the trenches in the First World War were infested with lice, which spread a disease known as trench fever.

One of the first issues the new county chairman in Waterford needs to address is the inclusion of W.I.T in the county championship. It is a farcical situation which is clearly emphasised by what happened in the Dublin county championship this year.

Ballyboden St. Endas is one of the most progressive clubs in the country and in the last 25 years have succeeded in bringing hurling to an area of Dublin where little or no hurling was played. They have developed under age structures and are the coming team at underage hurling in Dublin for the last 6 or 7 years. Practically all of their current senior panel are indigenous Dubs who have come through their under age ranks. They have never won a senior title and were denied their first this year when U.CD. beat them by 7 points. Ballybodens hurling manager Paudie O Neill is understandably angry over the situation and is quoted in the Irish Independent By my calculations UCD used 41 different players in this year's Dublin championship. "
What are the GAA authorities

in Dublin and Waterford at? Sure a fool could see that this is an iniquitous situation. UCD or WIT can call on unlimited playing resources from all over. In some cases students are conveniently slotted into some "basket weaving" or some such spurious course to make them available

It is a disgrace what happened to Ballyboden who represent real hope and a future for hurling in Dublin. Look what it would do for Dublin if they had the opportunity to take on James Stephens and maybe win a Leister or All Ireland club title. Thanks be to God the Village defeated the College on Sunday and Babs Keating the UCD manager can whinge all

he likes. Paudie O Neill makes an interesting point when he says that the college players should have to declare at the start of the year. Club or College. It goes against the whole ethos of the game that players can compete like some kind of mercenaries in the championships of different counties.





Clonmel Army Men For Liberia

Seventeen members of the 12th Batt from Kickham Barracks, Clonmel, left last week to begin a six month tour of duty in Liberia. They will spend Christmas carrying out vital peacekeeping duties in the war torn African country. One of the Army members going is Pte. Breda Moloney who is travelling to Liberia for the second time. She is a member of the medical team who served in Liberia for six months and is now heading off again. Of the 434 soldiers from all over the country, forty one of them are women. 160 of those troops are going on their first mission overseas. They will be under the command of Lt. Col Jim Long of Collins Barracks, Cork. Two officers, eight NCO's and seven privates from Kickham Barracks are going on this mission, they will be joining their comrades from Sarsfields Barracks, Limerick to make up the 92nd Infantry Battalion to form a quick response force in Liberia.

One of the adjutants going with the force will be Commandant Con Whelan, Kickham Barracks. He will be in charge of personnel for the six months. Much of Liberia is inaccessible and if there's a disturbance in an area, the soldiers will go in armoured cars to deal with it and spend periods of seven to ten days away from camp, being totally self sufficient for that time. Many of the dangers in Liberia stem from problems with hygiene and sanitation. There's a risk with malaria and the heat and humidity are difficult to cope with as Liberia is just five degrees from the equator. The Clonmel soldiers have been training for this mission, carrying out exercises in Kilworth Camp and in the Glen of Imaal.

Short-changing the Údarás is Short-changing Ring and Old Parish says Councillor

Údarás na Gaeltachta * the state body for the social and economic development of Irish speaking communities including Ring and Old Parish in West Waterford faces "grave difficulties" in its, basic operation due to strains on its, finances as a result of Government cutbacks.

That,s according to Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair, who is the elected Udarás Board representative for the Ring/Old Parish area. He was commenting following the November meeting of the body in Gweesala, Co. Mavo. which considered a detailed report on Udarás finances and implications for its, plans in the coming year.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair welcomed the unanimous support received for his motion at that meeting,

the Minister for Community Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs Eamon O Cuiv TD to meet with the Udarás Board to discuss the seriousness of the situation.

Although the Government,s recently published estimates for 2005 show a 19% rise in funds for the Dept. of Community Rural & Gaeltacht Affairs generally, and a 6% rise for Udarás na Gaeltachta in particular, Cllr. O Céilleachair says the reality facing those aiming to promote development in places such as Ring and Old Parish is starkly different.

Outlining a number of facts. which he says are outlined in audited financial reports with the Udarás, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said:

The record shows that the Udarás was given 42.6 million Euro in 2002 by the Government. that an invitation be extended to . For 2005, that figure will be 34.3

million euro. Whereas there may be different views over what should be prioritised now or in the past, my constituents in Ring and Old Parish will be losing out when a body central to the future of their communities is being cut back like this.'

"Unfortunately, one of the knock on effects is the further postponement of the development of nine acres of land for enterprise purposes in Baile na nGall, Ring. In addition, plans for small business units at Barra na Stuaic, Old Parish are also on hold. Job creation potential in either case is stalled to the detriment of the locality.

"I am determined to have this unfortunate set of circumstances addressed to the benefit of the people of Ring and Old Parish Ireland's smallest Gaeltact community. They wanted the

Figures Compound **Bad Year For Crystal**

SALES DOWN 10% IN OCTOBER

The half-year figures published by Waterford Wedgewood Plc gave little cause for cheer with the company dropping sales in "very challenging" trading conditions.

Crystal sales declined by 7.1% at constant exchange rates or 10.8% at prevailing rates. In financial terms, sales were down from 170m in 2003 to 158.4m. The company particularly suffered in the US partially due to a slide in the dollar.

However, Group Chief, Redmond O'Donoghue pointed out territories including Ireland, the UK and mainland Europe maintained or improved on the same period last year.


To address that John Foley, chief executive of Waterford Crystal has been given the extra responsibility for the Waterford business in the United States and he is now based in that market, from which he was giving renewed focus and energy.

While the interim reports saw the group report a pre-tax profit of 8.9 m compared with a loss of 44.8 m for the same period

that crystal sales in most other last year, this included an exceptional profit from the sale of All-Clad - the US based premium cookware business. Operating loss for the period was 21.4m compared with 4.2 m profit for the same period in 2003.

"Trading since the end of the half-year has continued to be difficult," Mr. O'Donoghue said. "Sales in October were down 10% on the same period last year on a like for like basis (excluding All-Clad and currency movements), although indications on trading in November suggest some improvement."

Major Clean-up Operation as Local Aquaculture Group Removes 1,000 Disused Oyster Trestles for Recycling



Dungarvan's Co-ordinated Local Aquaculture moval of disused trestles is time consuming and Management Group (CLAMS) has announced the the industry has had to work around difficult successful removal of 1,000 disused and mangled tide and weather conditions prevailing in the trestles from Dungarvan Harbour for recycling and area. The recycling programme is now 50 per a further 20,000 trestles were realigned. The local ovster growers have put a major effort into this latest clean-up in the area and are delighted to announce they are one step closer to meeting and exceeding International best practice.

Dungarvan harbour is the largest area of oyster farming in Ireland. It produces approximately 1,200 tonnes per annum, with a first sale value of nearly 2.1million.

The removal of the 1,000 trestles represents 50 per cent of the overall programme and the CLAMS group are delighted to announce that 100 per cent will be cleared by early 2005. The need for the trestle removal and realignment is evidence of a coming of age of the industry in Dungarvan. The earlier pioneering efforts have now been superseded by a modern vibrant sector, which wishes to clear away structures from those areas that were found to be sub-optimal for oyster production or have become obsolete.

The Dungarvan CLAMS Group were established in December 2002 and since then have overseen a number of initiatives to ensure aquaculture in the area is to the benefit of all foreshore users. The re-, of its beautiful marine resource."

The local group recently undertook a significant beach clean-up in conjunction with Waterford County Council, and they will shortly announce the significant objectives they plan to meet in 2005.

Speaking after the removal of trestles, Donal Maguire, Chairman of the National CLAMS committee said, "Reaching the halfway mark in this ambitious programme is a significant milestone and the local growers and their CLAMS liaison officers, Mr Brian O'Loan of BIM and Mr Vincent Roantree of TMT, should all be commended for their efforts. The socio-economic value of the oyster industry and the good work of the Dungarvan CLAMS group is already well known to the local people of the area. Dungarvan is known for its top quality oysters and it will now also be known as the proud home of a responsible and sustainable aquaculture industry that is firmly established and is working hard to be in harmony with all the other legitimate users

The opening three contests were confined to greyhounds having their first race outing The first of these saw the Marian Heffernan owned and Perry Aylward trained In The Candy (Droopys Vieri-Fill Me In) 4/5 power clear from trap three and while Princess Noir raced in second place throughout there was only ever going to be one winner from a long way out as In The Candy cruised to an eleven lengths success over Princess Noir in 29.38.

The Darren Johnson and Gary Crouch. owned and Ian Seymour trained Amazing Rae (Droopys Vieri-Kinda Swell) was the market choice at 4/5 in the second novice race and she duly won in the expected manner in 29.48. After a slow start the favourite enjoyed a trouble free passage up the rails and when Jims Birthday moved wide at the first bend hampering Brooks Best Amazing Rae sailed into the lead on the fence before going right away for a comprehensive ten lengths defeat of Firelight Snap.

Macbeth shared favouritism with Square Over 6/4 in the third but both of these greyhounds were upstaged by the Maurice Burke owned Killotteran King (Hotshow Ben-Tinlough Julie) this 2/1 shot producing a no nonsense trap to line winning effort in 29.11. With Macbeth left stranded in trap four the early paced and rails seeking Killotteran King cornered in front of Square Over and with this order of running remaining unchanged for the duration of the trip Killotteran King went on to triumph by five lengths.

Returning after an eight months lay off the Eamon Henebery owned and Harry Boyle trained Duckys Hero (Millstream Lad-Lewagh Heather) 3/1 made a winning return to action with a pillar to post 29.10 victory. Dashing into an early lead on the rails Duckys Hero saw off the back stretch challenge of the slow starting but early paced Big Situation and when Aine Dubh was hampered in the home stretch Duckys Hero went on to beat a running on Tip Tornado by three lengths.

A gamble on November Girl 5/1 to 2/1 appeared likely to yield dividends in a six bend marathon as this lady flashed clear from trap one but with the winning line in sight the Steve Deal owned Scallywag Star (Band Of Stars-Leader Fen) 4/1 pounced close home to cause an upset by a length in 41.74. Kilcarrig Quarry was the 4/6 favourite and he finished a running on fourth after finding traffic problems throughout.

Kilkenny owner Phil Brennan sent out the 2/1 winner of the sixth contest as Birchfield Gold (Hotshow Ben-Goldies Friend) made every post a winning one in 29.35. Quanns Sunset gave chase out of the second bend and while Imacooperjim loomed up menacingly at the third bend Birchfield Gold shut the door firmly in that opponents face before beating a running on Toss Right by a length.

Having his first race back since July the James Phelan owned Jays Chieftan (Split The Bill-Jays Lassa) was certainly well primed for his comeback run and with his price tumbling from 5/4 to 4/6 Jays Chieftan left trap five like a scalded cat to land the seventh race in 29.36. Forging clear from trap five the early paced Jays Chieftain was

not extended when proving four and a half lengths to smart for Stephanavitch.

The ninth race went all the way to the wire. Birchhill Spirit and McCarthys Boy engaged in a battle royal up front for most of the standard trip bit joining in up the rails in the home stretch the Stacy Grace and Lulu O Brien owned and Mary Cleere handled Listrolin Kitty (Top Condition-Toker Leigh) 3/1 pounced close home to beat a wide running McCarthys Boy by the minimum distance in 29.29.

Running in the second qualifier for local owner Tom Kearney Avalon Supreme took an early bump as the rails seeking Vancouver Honcho made the long break for home. Regaining his composure however Avalon Supreme was back at the head of affairs between the final two bends before beating a running on Threerocks Saffy by two lengths in 29.19. Both winners are members of the June 2003 litter of Droopys Vieri ex Duhallow Lady and Newmarket County Cork based breeder Gerry Mangan made the long journey to Waterford to see both impressive winners land their respective qualifiers.

The final leg of the Paddy Gaffney treble arrived courtesy of the Buzz Syndicate owned Dalcash Okee (Roanokee-Mustang Susana) this 6/4 favourite producing a gutsy display to capture the first semi final of the Patsy McKiernon confined 550 yard event. Leaving trap three at a fair rate of knots Dalcash Okee was joined on the back stretch by the early paced Toriel but holding his place on the fence Dalcash Okee saw off that challenge to run out a two lengths winner over Brew Sir in 30.31.

The second semi final was a good result for the layers with the Jim Brady owned and Joe Bolton Lee trained Faythe Angel (Kilmessan Jet-Deenside Jet) causing a mild surprise obliging at odds of 6/1 in 30.68. Breaking well Faythe Angel gave way to the early paced Honey Sam but coming back for more off the final two bends Faythe Angel accelerated clear up the home stretch to beat Honey Sam by four lengths.

The first race at a benefit meeting in aid of Mullinavat GAA Club saw Tom O Neill's Noreview Star (Knockeevan Star-Catsrock Breeze) 2/1 drive up the inside of the pacesetting Resident Guest at the penultimate turn and despite the fact that this was only Noreview Star's second race the March

2003 whelp went on to beat Resident Guest by two lengths in 29.31.

County Wexford owner Jamie Jordan sent out the trap to line winner of race two as Archaton Lass (Frisby Flashing-Domingo Belle) 3/1 made no mistake leading all the way in a career best 28.91. Producing plenty of early pace to lead from Shangarry Tom Archaton Lass was always going to collect and despite a late surge by Newline Spice Archaton Lass kept going in fine style to triumph by two lengths.

Trying the 730 yard trip for the first time the Maureen Cullen owned and Nick Cullen trained Friday Harbour (Roanikee-Karens Jewel) 6/4 took to the longer trip like a duck to water and leading the opposition a merry dance from a middle draw Friday Harbour simply bolted up in a decent 41.06. Dairyland Shawne gave chase early on but it was all one way traffic up front with Friday Harbour dishing out a five lengths beating to a running on Related Item who cut through the field to grab the runner up spot.


