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
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
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


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Ballymac' Housing Development Granted **Permission**

By Kevin Kirrane An Bord Pleanala has granted planning permission for a fifteen-house development at the rear of Deerpark View estate in Ballymacarbry.

Developers Ryan and Guiry Ltd plan to develop single and two storey houses on a 3.12 acre site behind Deerpark View.

They also propose to provide three affordable houses to the local authority or make a financial contribution.

However, the development was appealed to the national planning appeals board by a local resident who feared the elevated nature of the development would constitute an eyesore in the picturesque village.

Granting permission, the planning inspector reduced the number of houses in the development by one to fifteen, saying that due to the location of site one, it would seriously injure the residential amenities of the adjoining dwelling in Deerpark View.

But, he found that the proposed development would not seriously injure the visual amenities of the area or the residential amenities of properties in the vicinity of the site. The development would be acceptable in terms of traffic safety and convenience and would therefore be in accordance with the proper planning and sustainable development of the area

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Residents Concerned At Lismore **Developments** Scale

A number of Lismore residents and a community group have expressed serious reservations about the scale of a new housing development planned for Station Road. The residents say the fifty-one house development would create further traffic congestion and its design is not in keeping with the rest of the Heritage Town

Planned by Co. Wicklow firm, First Net Developments, the housing development would be set on a 2.36 ha site bordering Station Road and New Road.

However, a number of local residents have made submissions to Waterford County Council expressing concern at its scale.

And in a separate submission, Lismore Concerned Residents Association say the development would add at least 100 cars to an area already congested. The absence of a shop and what they claim are drainage problems with the site, are also, the association says, grounds for concern.

An Taisce, meanwhile, argued that: "The nucleus of Lismore should be protected, and urban sprawl should not be allowed."

Lismore Town Council have also become involved in the debate. The Town Council has requested a meeting with a planner from Waterford County Council to discuss a number of issues before a decision is made on the development

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

Dungarvan-Based Century Homes Are Awarded €5.5m Contract To Build 300 Affordable Homes

An alliance of nine housing associations in the North East of England today announced that it has selected Dungarvanbased Century Homes, Europe's largest timber frame home manufacturer, for a 5.5 million contact to build 300 new affordable homes over the next two years.

Gerry McCaughey, CEO of Century Homes said: "Winning this flagship social and affordable housing contract demonstrates Century Homes ability to deliver the highest quality homes anywhere in the World, and will help us to develop an even stronger market presence in England."

"This dynamic alliance shows how a group of forward-thinking housing associations can unite to drive efficiencies in construction," he added.

The alliance is the first of its kind in Britain, and has been created in line with the British Housing Corporation's 'partner' programme to meet their Government's 'drive for efficiency' [1] house building agenda.

The partnership chose Century Homes' modern method of precision-engineered timber frame construction after a competitive tender. Century Homes' innovative construction methods enable core elements of the 300 houses to be manufactured in a highly automated factory environment offsite, cutting the build time in half compared to erecting masonry houses.

Under the terms of the deal, Century Homes will erect homes in the North of England across Darlington, Easington, Durham, Thornley, Stanley, Gateshead and South Tyneside and will include a wide range of house types.

The alliance brings together three housing association partnerships including Northern Partnership Homes, NEET and Nomad Housing Group, all with approved partner status endorsed by the British Housing Corporation. 'Partner' status was introduced by the Government to speed up the building process and create

greater efficiency in the procurement of social and affordable housing.

lan Prescott, development director and deputy chief executive of Nomad Housing Group commented "The three housing association partnerships are currently delivering around 70% of all new affordable, local needs housing currently being developed in the North East. Together we are in the

process of delivering around 1,300 new homes across the region. By coming together as a consortium we are able to offer Century Homes a scale of business that has allowed them to offer a very competitive price on a high quality product. This initial contract for 300 homes is hopefully the start of a long term mutually beneficial relationship with Gerry McCaughey and his team".

GOAL Says Thanks

I would like to take this opportunity to express my profound thanks to readers for their extraordinary generosity to GOAL's South East Asia emergency appeal.

On a recent visit to the affected regions with the Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dermot Ahern, I saw first hand the destruction left behind by the tsunami. Entire villages have been wiped out. Traumatised children will endure nightmares for years to come about the wave that destroyed their homes and families.

These essential donations are now helping our aid workers (GOALies) to rebuild communities in Southern India, Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Andaman Islands.

The dedicated teams of nurses, doctors, accountants, logisticians and engineers began by clearing the debris and undertook the harrowing task of retrieving bodies from the beaches. GOAL is providing food and non food items (blankets, sleeping mats, soap, cooking utensils and containers), as well as shelter, healthcare and counselling to hundreds of thousands of people who have lost everything.

In Sri Lanka, the US Government asked GOAL to take the lead in constructing 2,500 temporary shelters. Our GOALies are also working with fishermen to repair and replace broken fishing nets.

In India, GOAL's community kitchens provide more than 11,000 with three meals a day and in the worst affected areas of Indonesia, our medical team is administering immunisation programmes to prevent the spread of disease in the relief camps.

GOAL believes in keeping its cost base as low as possible, and is proud to have kept administration costs at an average of 5% over a 27 year period. Once again I would like to thank anyone who has contributed in any way to GOAL's work in the tsunami affected regions.

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

Inquiry Clears Cullen Of Wrongdoing

"Nothing Improper In Award Of Contract" Report Finds

Minister for Transport, Martin Cullen was cleared of wrongdoing in the awarding of contracts to Monica Leech Communications, a Waterford-based PR firm.

Welcoming the Quigley Inquiry's findings, Minister Cullen said each of the claims made against him had been comprehensively rebutted by the facts published in the report.

The report's publication follows weeks of speculation surrounding the Minister's future after he was embroiled in controversy over the award of around 300,000 euros worth of consultancy contracts to a political supporter.

However, the Quigley Report found Minister Cullen didn't break any guidelines and operated to the norms of practice.

EXAGGERATION

Welcoming the findings, Minister Cullen said the facts are now there for all to see. "Throughout this controversy," he said, "there has been a consistent pattern of exaggeration and distortion. Each of the claims made is comprehensively rebutted by the facts as now published

"During this controversy," the Minister went on to say, "I decided on a policy of not commenting on every story and refusing to get dragged into responding to every comment. I have always known that I behaved properly and that the public interest was not damaged in any way.

"I am satisfied that the depth and rigour of this inquiry is clear

"As I have done for the past two months. I will continue to concentrate on my work as Minister for Transport

INQUIRY

The Quigley Inquiry was launched last December into contracts awarded by the Office of Public Works and the Department of the Environment - mainly covering the period from 2001 (when the first contract was awarded to Mrs. Leech), up to the largest contract which finishes next week.

In 2001, as the then Minister for State with responsibility for the OPW, Martin Cullen "suggested" to Department officials that Monica Leech would be suitable for a six-month PR contract.

At the time, the multi-million euros North Quay Project was being launched in Waterford City, and "an extra pair of hands" was required by the OPW in Waterford, Minister Cullen suggested Monica Leech as she had expertise in the field and many contacts in the city

FOLLOW ON CONTRACTS

When the six-month contract finished, two further "follow-on" contracts were awarded by the OPW to Mrs. Leech at a time when Minister Cullen was appointed Minister for the Environment. But, said the report, no evidence of Minister Cullen's involvement in either of these follow on contracts was found.

ENVIRONMENT

"Very shortly" after Martin Cullen's appointment as Minister for the Environment on the 6th of June 2002, the report says, he "made it clear" to Senior Management he needed professional communications and PR advice available to "deal with policy issues facing him and the department"

After discussing Public Procurement rules with officials, the minister suggested the Department write to Monica Leech Communications "to submit a quote." In this case, a single tender was allowed as it was deemed "a matter of urgency.

A rate of 650 euros a day was agreed, and a six-month contract was signed on 9th of July, dealing mainly, but, not exclusively, on the Waste Awareness Campaign, the National Spatial Strategy, E-Voting, and the National Inventory of Architectural Heritage

GUIDELINES

As the first contract was about to end, the Head of Corporate Services sought approval to invite tenders for a new one-year contract. And, because of the contract's size (Mrs. Leech has been Taoiseach warn Ministers of the paid 256,806 euros to date) guidelines say 5 firms should be invited to tender. Instead, just three -Monica Leech Communications hiring of consultants.

and two major firms - were invited to tender quotes. According to the Department, these firms were the only ones in a position to supply the required service.

A marking system to weigh up the respective tenders was introduced, and Mrs. Leech, whose rate increased from 650 to 800 euro a day, was contracted. Officials responsible for her appointment said they were "not influenced" by the Minister's suggestion of Mrs. Leech for the first contract and "no pressure was brought to bare on them"

Beyond discussing policy requirements, the Minister said, he played no part in the process. The Secretary General believed the Minister's suggestion "did not cross the line.

The Quigley Report also found "no breach of norms and practise involved." He said the amount of money involved was "not excessive" for a consultancy

Anxiety also triggers hot flushes so try to reduce stress levels if possible.In the time leading up to and during the menopause, many women experience a variety of other distressing symptoms such as heavy periods, depression, anxiety, insomnia and exhaustion. These symptoms can

all be effectively treated using the right combination of herbs. Following an in-depth consultation with a herbalist, several herbs are selected on the basis of each woman's unique symptom picture and blended in an individual prescription. Rather than waiting until symptoms appear, it is advisable for any woman in her forties to begin to incorporate helpful strategies into her diet and lifestyle. This will ensure measures are in place to reduce symptoms when hormone levels start to decline. It is also important to eat a healthy diet, to get enough exercise, and to have your cholesterol and blood pressure checked on a regular basis. These simple measures will help to prevent heart disease and osteoporosis. For those considering coming off HRT, it is preferable to reduce the dose slowly under the guidance of the prescribing doctor. Herbal treatment should be commenced six to eight weeks before starting to reduce dose of HRT.



Health Tips from "Remedies"

SAW PALMETTO

Saw Palmetto is considered by herbalists to be the prime remedy for prostate problems. Sabal serrulata or Serenoa repens is a small palm with fan-shaped leaves. The fruits are dark red and used medicinally.

USES: Enlarged prostate, Benign Prostatic Hypertrophy

HOW IT WORKS: The condition of an enlarged prostate is commonly found in men over the age of 50. This enlargement is the result of the cells in the prostate becoming more sensitive to circulating hormonal levels in the body. Cells of the prostate enlarge, which in turn cause the whole gland to increase in size.

Saw Palmetto inhibits enzymes at the level of the prostate cells, reducing the action of hormones. This is a local effect, confined to the prostate gland.

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

velop their career and skills both lated. A number of years experience in an early years setting is required. The course co-ordinator, Ms. Antoinette O'Brien, is delighted with the way the course is going, and impressed by the high standards shown by the students.

Community Care Course

We introduced another course this year called Community Care which trains students to help care for people in society. Course coordinator, Janet Dunphy, enthuses about this course and says that this course is of great benefit to those

Tralee and numerous other Third Level Institutes. The duration of this course is one year, it involves three class contact days and oneday work experience per week. The work experience is chosen by the student so he/she can gain experience in the area that suits them, e.g working with the elderly in the hospital, as a special needs assistant in school, etc.

Beauty Therapy

The third area of care brings us to the two year Beauty Therapy course. This course, since its inception continues to attract ever increasing numbers and this year we experienced our biggest demand ever for places on this course. Carmel Horan, who co-ordinates year one of this course says "The essence of the course is the fulfilment and enjoyment our students attain in training. The high standard of Beauty Therapy this course offers has been the subject of praise by the interna tional examiners". 

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NEW FARM HEDGEROWS

New stockproof hedgerows are valuable additions to farms, wildlife and the countryside. Planting time is from October to March. Autumn is best in free-draining ground, spring in heavy soil. Over 5,000 farmers have chosen to plant up to 300 metres of new hedgerows as part of their REPS 3 plan, A further 4,000 will rejuvenate hedgerows, which may also involve in-planting. Half of this work must be completed by the end of the second year, with the remainder completed by the end of the fourth year.

Choosing species

Native species, adapted to Irish conditions benefit wildlife more. Thomy species such as whitethorn or blackthorn are essential for a stockproof nedgerow. A variety of species provides a varied food supply throughout the year for more wildlife, so include another nedgerow species approximately every metre, such as holly hazel, spindle or guilder rose. Climbers such as dog-rose or woodbine can be included. These survive routine trimming, but other tree species such as crab apple, birch, wild cherry or oak, should be included only where they will be allowed to grow up and mature and are NOT topped when trimming the hedgerow.

Planting

Avoid waterlogged soil and very wet or frosty weather. Cultivation before planting is essential for optimum growth. Digging in well rotted Farm Yard Manure encourages growth, but also weeds. Two to three year old plants are suitable. Bushy, healthy roots and thick lower stems are more important than height. Roots must be kept moist before and during planting to avoid drying out and dying. Plant to the same depth as plants were previously planted and firm in.

Allow up to eight plants per metre. A staggered double row is preferable with plants 250mm apart and 300mm between rows. A single row at 300mm spacing may be adequate, if well maintained.

Maintenance

Water in dry weather. Control competing vegetation. Fence of livestock using temporary fencing. Consider livestock reach and future access for machine trimming. Rabbit-proof fencing may be required.

Plant only the length of hedgerow that can be maintained

The eProfit Monitor

Teagasc has developed a financial analysis programme known as the <u>eProfit Monitor</u> whereby farmers can get a detailed breakdown of their farm business.

With the demise of the premia-driven farming output and the advent of the Single Farm Payment, it is more essential than ever that farmers have a very good financial analysis of each of their farm enterprises. Farm planning and decision-making will have to be based on financial analysis.

Profit monitors have been widely used in the dairy sector for the past number of years. In Co. Waterford 35 drystock clients completed profit monitor for 2003. These clients then used this information in planning the future of their businesses in the era of the Single Farm Payment. Each year they will continue to track their progress through profit monitor. Teagasc envisages that there will be a huge uptake by drystock farmers over the coming years.

The new eProfit Monitor is an online financial analysis programme available to all Teagasc clients via the Teagasc Client site.

The focus of the Monitor is the analysis of the most recently completed production year. Data can be entered and the analysis viewed on-line.

The reports will give the farmer a detailed financial breakdown of the business and will look at each enterprise separately as well as the farm as a whole. The farmer can compare his figures with Teagasc target figures for the enterprise. The figures can also be used for discussion purposes and for benchmarking the business performance. The eProfit Monitor analysis is carried out on farms on a yearly basis and each year can be compared with the next. It will keep the farmer informed how any changes in his farming system are impacting on farm profitability.

LAST MONTHS OF PREGNANCY: You must feed a pre-calving mineral.

2-3 oz per cow per day

Shake this amount on the silage 2-3 times per day.

This is important so that all cows get their chance to eat it.

Cubicle, and yard hygiene are critical at this stage because the dry cow antibiotic protection is coming to an end:

Exposure to muck now will result in mastitis pre-calving or just after calving.

Clean cubicle bed each day and dust with lime, sawdust, paper or

Scrapers must operate more frequently now. There is no point in asking for mastitis problems by having too much muck around the place.

Closure of Carlow Sugar Factory and Loss of Jobs Severe Blow to Ireland's Manufacturing Base Addressing the IFA nation - IFA President John Dillon

Addressing the IFA national protest against the closure of Carlow sugar factory on Tuesday, 25th January, IFA President John Dillon rejected Greencore's unwarranted decision to shut the factory after 80 years, saying it was a stab in the back for beet growers and workers in the plant.

Over 3,000 beet growers and other farmers, workers in Irish Sugar, hauliers and farm contractors, trade unions and politicians and members of the wider community attended the protest through Carlow town today which ended at the gates of the

Carlow Sugar factory.

"The Irish sugar industry faces its greatest ever challenge in the EU sugar reform and WTO negotiations. IFA is fighting a major battle in Europe against EU price and quota cuts. It's a fight for the survival of beet growing and processing in Ireland," the IFA President said.

"Beet growers are outraged that Greencore has damaged our case in Europe at this critical time and are appalled that Greencore is shutting down a profitable plant." The IFA President called on the Government to take strong action against the Greencore monopoly. "I want you to change the law to make farmers owners of the Irish Sugar quota, and to stop Greencore from further asset stripping.

The quota is the property of beet growers."

The Chairman of IFA's Sugar Beet Committee Jim O'Regan addressing the protest in Carlow said "Greencore's decision is a body blow to beet growers, to workers, to the town of Carlow and to the community in

the south-east."

"The Carlow sugar factory is a profitable plant. It made at least 10m profit for Greencore last year. There is no reason why it would not make the same profit this year."

"We hear about a proposed site for a rail depot in Bagenalstown, but Greencore has not even applied for planning permission."

"He warned Greencore that farmers will not pay the extra cost of up to 5m to transport beet from the Carlow factory area to Mallow."

DILLON SAYS NOT AN INCH ON NITRATES ACTION PROGRAMME

IFA President, John Dillon, has told Minister Dick Roche and Minister Mary Coughlan that the Irish Government must not give even one inch on the Irish Nitrates Action Programme that has been formally submitted to the EU Commission, following the recommendations of Denis Brosnan.

Speaking following a meeting with the two cabinet Ministers dealing with the Nitrates Directive, the IFA President said:

"Any step back by Government from its full and committed support for the Irish Action Programme will be rightly seen by farmers as a damaging capitulation and sell out by the Government of Irish agriculture. There must be no giving in to demands to unravel the Irish Action Programme as submitted."

Mr. Dillon stressed that IFA met with Teagasc Heads of Research who have confirmed again that the Irish Action Programme is soundly based on scientific research under Irish production and weather conditions, and represents the right balance between the protection of water quality, and the costs on Irish agriculture.

Mr. Dillon said that Denis Brosnan's intervention and recommendations had brought an objective basis to the Irish Action Programme. He said that the IFA had already compromised to help Mr. Brosnan produce a balanced Programme that all stakeholders had bought into. He accused the EU Commission of bad faith in its dealings and negotiations on the Irish Action Programme.

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





Plants to make you go mn

A good garden is like a fine wine - it should have a good nose. But how do you choose the right scented plants for your

The fragrance in a garden is absolutely essential - it's what lures you outside to enjoy the hot summer days, adding just that little extra magic to an already beauti-

With winter in full-swing, hot summer days may seem like a lifetime away - but now is the time to decide what to plant for next

Blooms and foliage, warmed in the sun to release perfumes, are something that no garden should be without

The smell of a single plant can catapult you back in time, reminding you of moments, places and people

Try cramming a little thyme into the cracks in between paving slabs - a monster sized scent is released when the tiny herb is crushed underfoot.

There are a whole host of other herbs which are worth using in the same way rosemary, bay leaves and lavender all smell good enough to eat when crushed. By planting climbers such as jasmine and

honeysuckle, scent will be wafted as close to your nose as possible.

Make sure you plant them where you will reap the most benefit - such as outside your front or back door, and hanging from pergolas and around seating

Climbing annual sweet peas are a great way to inject scent into a garden without being too permanent - grow them up fences to achieve that country cottage garden look

You can't mention perfume without mentioning roses.

There are many types of climbing rose, so it's all comes down to personal choice - some of them are heavily scented and others have a delicate per-

And don't forget shrubs! They are great during the winter, for letting you know that you garden is alive and well snatch a whiff of the gorgeous arcococca hookeriana var dygna, or of Viburnum x bodnantense. Then of course there are the spring and

summer bloomers.

The starry pink and white flowers of

Daphne x burkwoodii in spring are so small that it's hard to believe they can release such a huge scent.

Lilacs welcome us to the summer with crowded heads of pink and mauve flowers.

With a little imagination, and a bit of shopping, you can add pockets of perfume all around your garden.

Exploit their perfume by positioning new plants in spots that will be hot and sunny during the summer so that flowers will warm up, intensifying their smell



THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Start begonia and gloxinia tubers

If you own a well heated greenhouse you can start tuberous-rooted begonias and gloxinias into growth. The begonias can be managed in a temperature of around 13°c, but a little more is advisable for the gloxinias.

If the two have to be grown in the same greenhouse. the extra warmth won't harm the begonias. Prepare some deep seed trays with good drainage in the bottom and add a layer of moss peat. Set the tubers next to each other and cover with an extra layer of peat. Make sure the peat is well soaked before using it to plant with as dry peat is very hard to get wet. Sow tomatoes for an early crop

If you want a crop in June sow tomatoes now. This does mean your plants could be over a metre high by May. Sow in well-drained seed boxes and germinate in a temperature of 16-18 C.

Tomatoes will not grow if allowed to get cold so you could cover them with glass and paper. Keep the soil well moistened but not sodden.

Sow exhibition sweet peas

If the peas were not sown in a frame in September they can be sown in pots now. A warm greenhouse will be needed for germination but it need be no hotter than 13°C. Sow about five seeds in each eight centimetre pot of compost.

Complete fruit tree pruning

Fruit tree pruning should have been done in November or December but if it has to be, it can b€ done in January - the sooner the better. Leave pears and apples till last and tackle the softer fruits first Ventilate fruit trees and vines in greenhouses

DECLARE SOLOGHEADBEG A NATIONAL MONUMENT

The Chairman of Sologheadbeg Commemoration Committee has called on the Government to preserve as a National Monument the Ambush site at Sologheadbeg where the first shots of the War of Independence were fired on January . 21st 1919. Mr. John J. Hassett of Thurles, Co. Tipperary, Chairman of the Sologheadbeg Commemoration Committee said it was unbelievable that the site was not long ago declared a National Monument. The Ambush was one of the most historic events in the history of the 20th Century in Ireland, I would like to see the gate piers from where the shots were fired, preserved and also the hedges and ditches on the one acre site. The place could be a meeca for History students and tourists, and it would not be a costly process at all, said Mr. Hassett who is National President of the Irish Bardic Association. The first shots in the War of Independence were fired on January, 21st 1919, the day the first Dail Eireann met. by Sean Tracey, Deputy officer commanding the Ambush party. which also included national figures as Dan Breen later to become a T.D. and Seamus Robinson O.C. said Mr. Hassett.

On Sunday last the 86th Annual Commemoration was held, the parade was led by the Sean Tracey Pipe Band of Moycarkey/Borris. The speaker was Mr. Sean Kelleher, secretary of the Kilmichael and Crossbarry commemoration. Paddy O'Dwyer sang Tipperary So Far Away in memory of the late Sean Tracey who loved music and played the fiddle. The keeper of the Irish Republican Brotherhood seal of National Sovereignty, Mr. Billy Maguire of Askeaton, Co. Limerick brought the seal to Sologheadbeg on Sunday.

Feast Of Saint Blasé (Martyr) -February 3rd

Saint Blasé devoted the earlier years of his life to the study of philosophy, and afterwards became a physician. In the practise of his profession he saw so much of the miseries of life and the hollowness of worldly pleasures, that he resolved to spend the rest of his days in the service of God, and from being a healer of bodily ailments to become a physician of souls. The Bishop of Sebaste, in Armenia, having died, our saint much to the gratification of the inhabitants of that city, was appointed to succeed him. Saint Blasé at once began to instruct his people as much by his example as by his words, and the great virtues and sanctity of this servant of God were attested by many miracles. From all parts the people came flocking to him for the cure of bodily and spiritual ills.

Argicolaus, Govenor of Cappadocia and the Lesser Armenia having begun a persecution by order of the Emperor Licinius, our Saint was seized and hurried off to prison. While on his way there, a distracted mother, whose only child was dying of a throat disease, threw herself at the feet of Saint Blase and implored his intercession. Touched at her grief, the Saint offered up his prayers and the child was cured and since that time his aid has often been effectually solicited in cases of a similar disease. Refusing to worship the false gods of the heathens, St. Blase was first scourged, his body was then torn with hooks, and finally he was beheaded in the year 316.

There is no sacrifice, which by the aid of grace, human nature is not capable of accomplishing. When Saint Paul complained to God of the violence of the temptation. God answered "My grace is sufficient for thee, for power is made perfect in infirmity"

They reared fourteen children, all of whom had such happy memories of Baron Park, where the family are so highly respected and where they had so much fun playing on the 'Green' with the neighbourhood kids. The family too, wistfully recall the wonderful camping holidays in Clonea and Bunmahon, spent with their parents, remarking that their mother never lost her sense of adventure right up to the end. And, Nellie and Mick always looked forward to travelling to the Galway Races together. A great mother, Nellie was very skilful at knitting and sewing, her family commenting that her intricate fairisle patterns were particularly admired and she was a dab hand they said at turning and converting material into lovely outfits for them.

West Side Story Is A **Wonderful Success**

West Side Story is regarded by many as the greatest musical ever. but it also one of the most challenging in musical terms. It is a tribute to all involved in this joint Ard Scoil na nDeise-CBS production that their version of this all-time classic surpassed everyone's expectations, belying the east's tender years and amateur status. From the moment the show opened with a gang of streetwise teenagers twitching restlessly in a playground park, the audience was transported into the seamy world of 1950's Manhattan. A powerful storyline, brilliant songs, innovative choreography, perfect casting and top-drawer acting combined to make this a vibrant, truly memorable show. The pace of this production never slackened for a moment and the audience was simply entranced from the show's finger-clicking opening to its poignant finish.

Stephen Sondheim and Leonard Bernstein transformed Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet" into a modem day gang war epic. This is a musical that addresses the realities of life in a New York gherto: the frustration, the bigotry, the racism and the violence. While this Ard. Scoil-CBS production could have stood on its musical merits alone, it was not just about music and dancing - it also effectively conveyed the drama and tragedy of the compelling plot. Indeed it was the strong blend of drama, dance and music that made this show particularly engag-

The audience was transfixed from the moment the orchestra struck up the show's overture. Everyone is familiar with West Side's story masterful score and the orchestra certainly did it justice. The set brought us into the menacing world of the West Side's backstreets. The tence symbolised the enclosed, confined nature of this urban ghetto, while the graffiti-covered wall reflected the anger and disillusionment of the young people trapped in this grim and dangerous world. The set worked particularly well, being designed to facilitate free movement from one scene to the next without the interruption of curtain closings and scene changes. Drab colours suggested the sense of hopelessness underlying the anger ofthe rival gangs competing for territory and respect. The Drug Store was a functional murky brown, while the bridal shop was a gaudy green. The lighting helped to create the show's distinctive atmosphere, which at times is dark and sinister

The fact that the cast was composed of teenagers as opposed to young adults heightened the sense of tragedy because we saw the characters as innocent victims of a world over which they had no control. The two weeks spent casting this show was clearly time well spent because every character was perfectly suited to his/her role. The American Jets were portraved as individual characters, not just as a solid mass of disaffected youth. Maurice Dunford was simply excellent as Riff, the leader of the Jets, while James Corcoran (Diesel), Christopher Daly (Baby John), Shane Collender (A-Rab), Donal Cregan (Action), James Ryan (Big Deal) and Scan O'Hare (Snowboy) all came across as very distinc tive characters. Ciara Mulcahy (Anybodys), April O'Brien (Velma) and Niamh O'Donovan (Graziella) were wonderful as the Jets' girls. The Puerto Rican Sharks were led by Ross Stack who looked and sounded the part of Barnardo, the ethnic gang leader. The other members of the Sharks were Stephen Collender (Chino), Eddie O'Connor (Pepe). Kristian Cowming (Indio). Kieran Harty (Luis) and Gerard Mc-Grath (Anxious). All acquitted themselves admirably. The Sharks' girls, Deborah Whelan (Anita), Mary Ryan (Consuela) and Lucy Collins (Rosalia) slipped into their roles with the case of seasoned profes sionals, always looking comfortable on stage. John David O'Connell played the part of the overworked Officer Krupke, while Cian Whelan did first class job portraying the big-

oted, soul-dead Lieutenant Schrank. Bill's Foley aged dramatically to play the role of the frustrated Doc to perfection, while Matthew Kavanagh was an engaging Glad Hand. The Girls Chorus also contributed in no way to the success of this top lass production

Of course, the doomed romance between Tony (Jets) and Maria. (Sharks) is at the heart of this tremendous show. David Flynn and Odharna O Donovan were both magnificent in their respective roles, underlining their abilities as both actors and singers. From the beginning the audience could sense the chemistry between them and in the Balconv Scene they exuded the passion of a modern day Romeo and Juliet. Looking at the show as a whole, one could not but be hugely impressed by the quality of the entire east's acting and singing abilities. Their remarkable talent and incredible hard work deserved the thunderous applause they received at the end of each of their six nightly performances. This was a show that was professional in everything but name, and indeed no one who saw it will be surprised if some of our young stars find themselves in some professional production at some Point in the not-too-distant future. Most importantly, all of the students involved in this show have gained hugely from the discipline that such an undertaking imposes. Their participation in this production will have incalculable benefits in terms of their broad

personal development. This show simply pulsated with emotion. At times the menacing atmosphere was palpable. On occasions the show was a spectacle of joyous colour and movement with "America" really getting the feet tapping. Of course there were also some wonderful humorous scenes. Besides the amazing dancing (Eddie should audition for "Saturday Night Fever 2"), the gym scene was memorable for Matthew' grin-inducing contribution as Glad Hand, while the Officer Krupke scene simply brought the house down thist how did Shane hit those impossibly high notes?). What are the new Medical Card income guidelines for 2005? **ANSWER**

The Medical Card income guidelines are updated in January each year. It is expected that about 30,000 more people will qualify for the full medical card as a result of the changes to the income guidelines for 2005. The health boards have discretion to award medical cards to people who have a serious illness or disability even if their income is above the guidelines.

The new income guidelines, effective from 1st January 2005, are as follows:

Medical Card Income Guidelines from 1st January 2005 Weekly income limit (gross less PRSI deductions)

Age	Single Person Living Alone	Single Person Living with Family	Married Couple
Up to 66	€153.50	€136.50	€222.00
66-69	€168.00	€144.50	€248.50

Allowances for first two dependent children under 16 years €31.00 per child, over 16 years €32.50 per child. Allowances for third and subsequent dependent children under 16 years €34.00 per child, over 16 years €35.50 per child.

Allowance for dependant over 16 years of age and in full time third-level education that is not grant-aided €65.00. Allowance for (rent, mortgage) excess over €26.00 per week. Allowance for cost of travelling to work in excess of €23.00 per week.

People aged between 16 and 25 years who are dependent on their parents are not entitled to a medical card unless their parents are eligible to hold a medical card.

Everyone aged 70 and over normally resident in Ireland is entitled to a Medical Card irrespective of income. This medical card is not means-tested. It covers the cardholder only and does not cover their spouse/dependants. If you do have a medical card because you are over 70, but your spouse is under 70 years of age, she/he can apply for a means-tested medical card. For example, where one spouse is aged 75 and the other 68, the means limits applying to the younger spouse are those of a married couple aged 70 -79 years.

IRISH FINANCIAL SERVICES REGULATORY AUTHORITY

One of the aims of Irish Financial Services Regulatory Authority (IFSRA) is to provide consumers with as much financial information as is necessary. Then armed with such information consumers can make an informed decision on their financial affairs. IFSRA sees its task as putting information to the consumer on an 'impartial' basis allowing people to make up their own minds.

A recent survey by IFSRA on the cost of motor insurance shows that motorists are being fleeced by some sectors of the industry.

According to the survey the cost of motor insurance can vary by an astronomical 500%.

In one example alone the IFSRA survey discovered that the cost of fully comprehensive insurance stretched from €1,100 to an enormous €6,000 between two different companies.

The recommendations from IFSRA are that consumers looking for motor insurance will benefit greatly by shopping around.

A survey on personal current account charges has also recently been completed by IFSRA. Both surveys can be viewed on wwwifsra.ie. The car insurance survey will be updated every 3 months and current account charges every 6 months. IFSRA also has a consumer help line 1890-777-777.

Given that IFSRA is an independent body, its surveys should be of invaluable service to the consumer in their pursuit of the best value for money.

FROM CHARLES SMITH'S HISTORY OF WATERFORD 1745 KILMOLSH

(Continued) The parish of Kilmolash ... is but of small extent; the soil of both is partly mountain, but towards the west tolerably fertile At a place called Bewley in this parish are the remains of a monastick building, but to what order it belonged is uncertain. Tradition will have it to be one of the Templars houses. Having gone through the several parishes of this Barony, I shall proceed to that of Decie without Drum. This is the largest Barony in the county. The most remarkable place in the parish of Affane is Drumana, the seat of the Earl of Grandison. The house is built on the foundation of an ancient castle which is very boldly situated on a rock over the Blackwater, the castle with all the furniture, being burnt down by the Irish, the present house was

erected to serve till a commodi-

ous one could be built.

In the house, besides several family portraits, is a St. Jerome exquisitely well painted as large as life by a masterly hand. The gardens are situated on the side of a hill, which hangs over the river, where is a noble Teras, affording a prospect up to Cappoquin. To the south the river is hemmed in with high hills covered with wood; at the foot of the garden is a neat bastian, the vaults under which serve for a boathouse. The adjacent deer park is a pleasant spot of ground. lying almost contiguous to the seat, at the north end whereof is an handsome lodge erected for the keeper. Through this park is a noble avenue, and round the seat are abundance of other plantations all in a flourishing way.

DISABILITY AWAKENESS CYSTIC FIBROSIS

What is Cystic Fibrosis?

Cystic Fibrosis is a genetic disability; it causes the body to produce abnormally thick, sticky mucus, due to the faulty transport of sodium and chloride (salt) within cells lining organs such as the lungs and pancreas, to their outer surfaces. The result of this is constant chest infections and malnutrition. The thick Cystic Fibrosis mucus also obstructs the pancreas, preventing enzymes from reaching the intestines to help break down and digest food.

What are the symptoms of Cystic Fibrosis?

The most common symptoms of Cystic Fibrosis are as follows: persistent coughing, wheezing or pneumonia, and excessive appetite but with no weight gain. There is a simple and painless test that measures the amount of salt in the sweat: a high salt level indicates that a person has Cystic Fibrosis.

What is the Treatment for Cystic Fibrosis?

The treatment of Cystic Fibrosis will depend on the stage of the disability and what organs are involved. One of the most common forms of treatment for Cystic Fibrosis is chest physical therapy, which requires vigorous percussion (using cupped hands) on the back and chest to dislodge the thick mucus from the lungs. Antibiotics are also used to treat lung infections and are given intravenously in pills or medicated vapors, which are inhaled to open up clogged airways. Cystic Fibrosis can affect the digestive system, and the body does not absorb enough nutrients, so people with the disability may need to eat an enriched diet and take both replacement vitamins and enzymes.

A person will have to inherit a defective copy of the Cystic Fibrosis gene, one from each parent to have the disability, when two carriers conceive a child, there is a 25% chance that the child will have Cystic Fibrosis, a 50% chance that the child will be a carrier and 25% that the child will be a non-carrier.

Research into Cystic Fibrosis:

The defective gene of Cystic Fibrosis was first discovered in 1989, and research into the disability has produced many new drugs that help to alleviate the symptoms association with Cystic Fibrosis. 

THE GAA A TIME OF CHANGE

The Gaelic Athletic Association was founded at a time of great change in Ireland and for its first 40 years or so, it was a case of slow but persistent growth. In its first decade, the fledgling organisation was fraught with difficulties, including outside opposition and inner divisions. Although the rise of nationalism aided the Associations ideals, the political climate was not favourable to its activities. Indeed the first few decades of the GAA spanned one of the most troubled periods of Irish history, agrarian unrest, political uncertainty, world war, rebellian and civil war. It wasn't until the mid 1920's that a degree of stability was established and at last an environment existed for the activities of the GAA to prosper.

Although enthusiasm was widespread for the GAA, participation in early competitions was minimal. The team 'All-Ireland' at this time was somewhat of a misnomer, with as few as three counties taking part in several of the early championships. As was necessary also with an evolving game, there were several rules changes in this period. As time went on, a fixtures backlog developed and was not resolved until 1924. Regular disputes and poor organisation along with transport difficulties and financial shortages added to the difficulties faced over these years.

Despite all the problems and obstacles, however, Gaelic games gradually took hold and found their base, right in the hearts of the people. With time, more counties participated and, as the excitement increased, the crowds that came to watch grew bigger and bigger.

USE OF HELMETS

At the recent West Waterford Bord na nÓg meeting clubs were reminded that as and from January 1st 2005 all players from Minor level down have to wear helmets when participating in hurling activities. Recently in the local papers in Tipperary, Tipperary Bord P.R.O. Ed Donnelly in his excellent notes included a number of criteria laid down in relation to the wear of helmets. Listed below is a short summary of what Ed wrote;

- Where hurleys an Sliotars are being used in training for teams where it is mandatory for players to wear helmets in games, helmets must be worn.
- The only helmets that will be approved and/or licensed by the G.A.A. are those that have been approved by a European noted body i.e. they carry what is known as a CE mark.
- 4. Players will not be permitted to take part in a game or training session when the helmet the player is using has been doctored in any way, i.e. the bars of the helmet has been cut or widened.
- All players are advised to wear helmets in particular Minor players taking part in adult hurling competitions.
- 6. Players should only wear approved/licensed helmets.

Experimental Rules

On Saturday last the Central Council decided by a very narrow majority to give the green light to the proposed new Disciplinary Rules as proposed by the Workgroup.

The amended proposals will allow a substitute on for a player who receives a Yellow Card. The substitute cannot come into the match until the next break in play and after he is given permission by the linesman and of course, the player who received the yellow card cannot return to the game. The issue of a second Yellow Card is now dispensed with.

A total of six substitutes will be allowed.

FOOTBALL

Players will be allowed to pick the ball off the ground, flick it to a tem mate and/or play it on the ground when running or in a standing position.

Players are permitted to play the ball away from the body or flick it to a team mate when lying or sitting on the ground or on their knees.

Players are not permitted to slide into the ball for the purpose of playing the ball away on the ground and players are not permitted to score when playing the ball on the ground with the hand.

THE KICK OUT

The goalkeeper shall use a plastic tee when taking a kick out after a score or after the ball goes wide.

If he does not use a tee in such circumstances, the referee shall award a throw up on the 20 metre line.

The whole exercise is designed to considerably reduce the amount of fouling and rough play. Throughout the experiment and up to last Sunday when the incidence of fouling was researched, it was found that the number of fouls and frees was considerably reduced. In the McGrath Cup final on Sunday last there were only 13 frees awarded in the first half. (This is about half the normal and it has been the pattern in several matches).

The experimental rules will apply throughout the league, commencing this weekend. The changes will have to be approved by Congress if they are to continue into the championships.

HURLING EXPERIMENT

The following additional proposals were approved for hurling.

A player who strikes a line ball directly over the bar without any other member of his team touching it, shall be awarded two points.

It is also decided that "to dig" an opponent in the ribs with the hurley or fist or to "tap" an opponents elbow with the hurley as he solo runs, will earn a Yellow Card.

REFEREES AGREE

All the intercounty referees who are qualified to handle intercounty senior championship matches were brought together at central venues over last week and having had the proposals outlined to them, were happy that the experiment would reduce fouling and increase playing time.

The changes will apply to senior intercounty only.

TRANSFERS

At the recent meeting of Western Bord na nOg only one transfer was applied for. This is an all time record low and the officers and everyone concerned are hoping that it is the start of a trend.

But not so in the Eastern Division of the juvenile bord where serious problems were outlined in a letter to last week's meeting of county bord na n-og by the Butlerstown club. This rural club with a very limited catchment area for underage players have alleged that players at juvenile level are being "poached' away from them by the bigger clubs. The players in this case are obviously the better players and their departure only intensifies the struggle for cubs such as Butlerstown to keep afloat.

New county bord na n-og chairman Eddie O'Shea pointed out that the general rule dealing with transfers left little room for the bord to take action in the matter, but he gave a firm undertaking to have the matter discussed with the adult board as a matter of urgency.

It is interesting to note in this regard that the minutes of the last executive committee meeting stated that it was the intention of the county chairman to set up a special committee to deal with all transfer applications in the county, with the committee including people from all boards.

NEW YOUTH OFFICER

Joe Cleary, popular treasurer of County Bord na nOg and a member of the County Development Committee was unanimously elected as county Youth Officer to replace Pat Grant who was recently elected county vice/chairman at Monday night's first meeting of the County Board. The new incumbent of the office will have to organise a delegation of four underage members to attend a Youth Conference in Croke Park next month.
