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Red Tape, Spiralling Costs **And Growing Delays Face €46m Sewerage Scheme**

Councillors demanded to meet the consultants behind a 46.2 million euro sewerage scheme and will press Minister for the Environment, Dick Roche to speed up the stalled scheme after it emerged the project remains mired in red tape, spiralling costs and growing delays.

The project, which would provide Waste Water Treatment Plants in Tallow, Cappoquin, Ardmore, Stradbally, Kilmacthomas and Ballyduff/Kilmeaden is at least 3 years behind target and 2 million euros over budget.

A delegation of councillors now plan to meet the Environment Minister next March and discussion with consultants is also scheduled, Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

Senior Engineer, Pat Mc-Carthy said the best estimate for the completion of the Waste Water Treatment Plant is March 2009 - increasing fears that development in the seven towns will continue to be stalled.

Costs have also continued to spiral with latest figures 2.2 million euros above an initial

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estimate of 44 million euros, the council heard.

CONSULTANTS CRITICISED

With frustration mounting, the consultants, the Department of the Environment and Waterford County Council all came under fire.

Fianna Fail councillor, Pat Daly, said the consultants had "a lot to answer for" in regard to the delays.

"I don't believe the council is

to blame. But I do think the consultants have to be pushed more to get this moving for-

Childcare Proposal of Dungarvan Development Project To Be Re-appraised

On Community, Rural and Mr. Lavelle had informed on Community, Rural and Gaeltacht and Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea has been informed by Ms. Maura Keating, Programme Manager, Area Development Management Limited following his representations in relation to the application for capital funding from Dungarvan Community Development Project under the Equal Opportunities Childcare Programme (EOCP) 2000 to 2006 that the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform informed the Dungarvan Community Development Project in December that their project has not been prioritised for immediate funding at this time and will be re-considered in the future.

This application will be reappraised by ADM in the context of the following:-

 Additional capital funding that was announced by Minister for Justice, Equality and Law Reform in December.

 Cash flow review of EOCP Capital Programme and review of the availability of childcare at local levels being undertaken by the Department of Justice, Equality and Law

Project co-ordinator Cllr. Teresa Wright, Dungarvan Community Development Project has stated that Dungarvan CDP works within the community of Dungarvan and its hinterland. At present Dungarvan CDP runs a Community Playgroup in one of the local housing estates. This Community Playgroup offers parents both men and women the opportunity to access further education and training.

Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee at its January meeting proposed a resolution of support for the childcare facility at the Presentation site being developed at Mitchell Street, Dungarvan.

In Praise of Porridge

It is no secret that a bowl of porridge provides a warming and nourishing breakfast on a cold morning, but did you know that the humble oat is one of the most useful and nourishing medicinal foods you can eat? Rich in vitamins and minerals,

particularly vitamin B complex, silica and calcium, oats (Avena sativa) were traditionally fed to horses to increase strength and stamina. They have a similar

effect on humans and are particularly useful during periods of stress, exhaustion or convalescence from illness.

The nutritional properties of oats affect the whole body, but the nervous system in particular seems to benefit from their restoring and strengthening powers. They are supportive during times of stress (such as when preparing for exams or facing challenges at work) and they are fortifying during times of recovery. Used long term, they relieve fatigue and lift the spirits. Oats are very helpful during withdrawal from various drugs such as nicotine, alcohol and prescription medicines, and are extremely useful for various conditions affecting the nervous system, such as depression, multiple sclerosis and M.E.

Oats have a low glycaemic index (GI). In other words they release their energy slowly, which keeps blood sugar levels stable and helps to reduce hunger pangs and sweet cravings. Oats are also low in gluten, a protein found in other grains such as wheat, which many people in this country do not tolerate very well. They contain soluble fibre which keeps the digestive system healthy and reduces the amount of cholesterol absorbed from food.

Oats are very beneficial for the skin, and are even suitable for very sensitive skins. Oatmeal soaked in water makes a very good and cost-effective face mask: The vitamins and minerals nourish and soften the skin, while the fibre gently removes dead cells, revealing a beautiful complexion. A handful of oats tied in muslin (or an old pair of tights) and hung under the hot tap while running the bath benefits the skin of the entire body. It is soothing and healing for adults and children with conditions such as eczema and psoriasis.

To benefit from the healing powers of oats, experiment with using them in your skin-care routine and try to include some in your diet every day. Porridge makes an excellent start to the day in winter, and can be made more interesting by adding some honey, a pinch of cinnamon or some grated apple. During the summer months, try an oat-based muesli with added fruit, nuts and seeds. During the day, oatcakes with a variety of toppings are a healthy alternative to bread, and oat flapjacks provide a tasty treat.

Unfortunately, people with coeliac disease are generally unable to tolerate even the small amount of gluten which is present in oats. For these individuals and anyone who dislikes the taste of oats, tinctures or juice made from the straw are gluten free and available from most pharmacies and health food shops. So for good health and happiness, make sure you are getting your oats

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
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

Brains And Nerves

he brain is the control centre of the body. It is a complex organ. It receives messages from the senses, sends instructions to the muscles, regulates the bodily functions and, in fact, controls everything a person does. The main parts of the brain are the cortex, which controls thinking and the senses, the cerebellum, which coordinates movement and balance, and the medulla, which controls involuntary activities, such as breathing.



THE BRAIN LOOKS LIKE A WALNUT

The brain is soft and greyish pink, and its surface is wrinkled, rather like a walnut. The adult human brian is about the size of two clenched fists and weights about 1.5kg (3lb).

THERE ARE BILLIONS OF NERVES IN YOUR BODY

The brain and the spinal cord are known as the central nervous system. The spinal cord is made up of bundles of nerves, rather like wires forming a cable. From here, thousands of millions of nerves go out to all parts of the body, to form the outer nervous system. The purpose of the nerves is to transmit messages to an from the brain at a speed of around 320 kph (200 mph) None of the nerve cells are long enough to reach all parts of the body, so they are linked together in chains. Messages are transmitted electrically along the nerves, and then chemically from one nerve cell to the next.

YOU DON'T HAVE TO REMEMBER TO BREATHE

The central nervous system controls actions that are done deliberately. There is a separate nervous system called the autonomic system, that looks after all those actions that are not controlled by conscious thought. These include digestion, breathing and the pumping of the heart.

€400,000 Bill For Refurbishment Of Council Offices

Opened to much fanfare in March 2002, the former CBS Monastery in Lismore - now home to the local Town Council has undergone almost year long refurbishment and safety work costing well in excess of 400,000

Construction work on the impressive 19th Century building, which was closed to the public, elected members and staff for most of last year is due to finish

The refurbishment is part of a 2.15 million-euro contract undertaken by the Thurles-based firm, Clancy Construction

While 1.75 million of this contract includes work on the new County Library Headquarters part of this figure - thought to be several thousands - will go on top of the €400,000 for work in the existing building bringing the final bill close to half-a-million curo.

With the area offices virtually a construction site, local authority staff work from a portocabin in

the small car park outside. Scaffolding is in place across the façade of the building; and, inside, many of the walls have been stripped of paint and, wires hang from the ceiling of the council chamber, where the local authority resumed their monthly meetings recently.

The work is set to cost double the figure the council initially paid for the building in 2000.

However, Fianna Fail Town Councillor, Bernard Leddy defended the cost, saving it was pri-

vately known that a lot of refurbishment work would have to be

I think even when we moved in first, privately it was said that there would be a considerable amount of reconstruction work that was going to be done but they weren't going to do it imme-

"It was a monastic building, and now it's a public building for use by the county council so there was quite a bit of change of use.

"We were told at the time that there would be quite a bit of reconstruction and certainly the roof needed more work done to it." He said the historic building also had to be kept in public

We were all delighted when they bought the monastery building when it was up for sale because there were two or three other people interested in it. So. at least, with the county council buying it, it will be preserved for the public use of the people of the town rather than it going into private hands, which some of us were a bit concerned about.

But the county council knew they were going to have to spend quite a bit of money just in simple change of use and reconstruction of a building of that age. It's a 135/140 years old building. It needs maintenance all the time.

"They were saying the roof needed doing anyway. And, I wouldn't begrudge what was spent on that, because it will be a brilliant building for the people of the town anyway. Maybe they could have bought it, and then did the work and let people in. but they wanted to get the offices

Ironically, work is expected to finish on both the Town Council offices and the Library on the second anniversary of the building's official opening.

Man Who Displayed **Cancer Cure**

a busy road, claiming he cured former Taoiseach Charles Haughey and RTE's Tommy O'Gorman of cancer was convicted of two assault charges and fined under the Litter Act.

The court heard how Thomas Walsh of Boherboy, Grange assaulted a Litter Warden and a garda officer when they attempted to remove the sign from the Waterford to Cork road.

Mr. Walsh, who resides in a mobile home midway between Youghal and Dungarvan was before Judge, James McNulty at Dungarvan District Court on Wednesday last on charges of assaulting a Waterford County Council litter warden and a garda officer on separate occa-

The court heard that in the incident involving the litter warden. duced a much larger knife to the garda officer threatening to cut

Mr. Walsh denied all the allegations. He said he had told both parties to get off his property.

Waterford County Council litter warden Patrick Tobin told the court he went to Mr. Walsh's place of residence on September 21 last to serve him with a final notice under the Litter Act in respect of displaying the offending sign on the public road.

The defendant became aggressive and produced a pen-knife which he thrust in his direction.

Garda John O'Dwyer told the court he visited Mr. Walsh on October 15th after receiving a report that the offensive sign was again on display. When the defendant saw him he threw the sign in over his gate.

A sixty-seven year-old man Mr. Walsh brandished a pen-knife "Walsh told me to 188k off and who placed a sign, on the side of and thrust it at him, and he pro- also gave me the V-sign," Garda O'Dwyer said. "I then left but returned ten minutes later to find that the sign was back on the roadside. I went to speak to him but he responded "f**k off you pig" and "f**k your mother."

Garda O'Dwyer said Mr. Walsh then produced a large knife and threatened to cut his throat.

Mr. Walsh denied even having the knife, which was produced in court and said it was he who was assaulted by the gardai.

Judge McNulty convicted Walsh on both assault charges and said he would remand Mr. Walsh on bail to October 7. He was fined 100 euro under the Litter Act and ordered to pay legal costs of 550 euro.

The court heard Mr. Walsh has previous convictions for assaulting a garda, harassment and



Delicious Gammon

IF you want to prepare a special meal for the one you love, try this simple but tasty dish

Ingredients:

(serves 2)

- 1 tbs wine vinegar 2 tbs vegetable oil pinch sait ground black pepper
- 1 tsp made mustard
- 2 gammon steaks 1 small can button mushrooms
- 1 tbs finely chopped pars-

Method:

MIX the wine vinegar with 1 tablespoon of the vegetable oil, the salt, pepper and mustard.

Trim the steaks and snip the fat around the edge to prevent the gammon curling during cooking. Spread the mixture on both sides of the gammon

and leave for an hour.

Heat the rest of the oil in a heavy frying pan.

Remove the steaks from the marinade and, without letting thje marinade drain off, cook then in the hot oil for 5 minutes on each side, until



the fat is brown and crisp. Remove from the frying man and keep

Drain and slice the mushrooms and add to the pan with the leftover marinade and the parsley.

Stir around to absorb the sediment and heat the mushrooms. Arrange the gammon on a serving dish and spoon over the mushroom mixture. Serve with creamed potatoes and

Cheesey potatoes

Ingredients:

8 Servings

- 8 even sized potatoes
- 2 tsp salt
- 100g cottage cheese 2 tbs chopped chives
- 1 tsp white pepper
- 50g butter
- 2 tsp coarse salt 1 tsp paprika pepper

Method:

WASH the potatoes and cook in their skins in boiling, salted water, until tender. Drain and cut each potato in half.

Using a spoon, scoop out the inside of the potatoes carefully and mix with the cottage cheese, chives and butter to form a smooth mixture.

Fill the empty jackets with the mixture and place the two halves of the potato back together;

Place on a baking tray, sprinkle with the coarse



salt and paprika. Bake in a moderate oven (180C/350F, Gas mark 4, for 10 minutes. Variation: In place of the cottage cheese use crumbled blue cheese and omit the chopped chives.

If preferred the potatoes may be wrapped in foil and cooked in the oven instead of being cooked in boiling water.

Rum savarin for special occasions

THIS delicious dessert is very easy to make and is perfect for any special meal.

Ingredients

6 Servings 350g flour 20g fresh yeast 250ml lukewarm milk 4 eggs 150 g sugar few drops vanilla essence 1/2 tsp salt 150g butter, softened 2 tbs dark rum 2 tbs white wine 1 x424 g can cherries, drained

150 ml double cream

Method:

BUTTER and flour a plain 23cm savarin mould. Sieve the flour into a bowl, make a well in the centre and add the yeast mixture with the warm milk. Leave for 15 minutes.

Whisk the eggs with 40g sugar, stir in the vanilla essence, salt and the softened butter. Stir into the yeast and flour to form a dough. Leave for a further 10 minutes


Pour the dough into the salarin mould, until half full. Leave the dough in a warm place for 30-60 minutes, until it has doubled in volume. Bake in a hot oven (220C/ 425F, Gas Mark 7) for 40 minutes. Turn out and cool on a wire rack.

Place the rum, white wine, 150ml water and the remaining sugar in a saucepan and bring to the boil.

Pour carefully over the savarin until all the syrup has been absorbed. Arrange the cherries in the

middle of the savarin. Whip the cream until stiff and pipe small rosettes around the savarin.

BALLYDUFF DRAMA GROUP LAUNCH "BLACKWATER ANGEL"

In its first sallies at defending its All-Ireland crown, Ballyduff Drama Group opens its run of "Blackwater Angel" by Jim Nolan in St. Michael's Hall, Ballyduff on

next Wednesday, February 23rd. A little over twelve months ago. Ballyduff Drama Group won the highest theatrical award available in Ireland for amateur groups winner of the Ericsson Trophy in Athlone as the presenters of the Best Play at the All-Ireland Drama Finals. First win for any group in Waterford, ever! Only fourth win in over half a century for a Munster Group! When you have done all that has to be done, what do you do next? When you have won the highest accolades, what do you try and achieve then? The answer is: exactly the same again, but only better. And with different challenges and with different artistic ambitions.

But he was no simple "son of a seventh son" or a "setter of bones" or a flyby-night quack. Greatrakes' fame was such that thousands were known to queue at his Castle gates at any one time clambering for his touch, that he was summoned to the most aristocratic seats in the British Isles, that he attended at court no less a personage than King Charles II and that some of the most learned scientists of the day examined his gift for its wondrous and miraculous nature.

But the weight of his gift and the expectation, which it bore, could destroy his life - thousands of people screaming at his gates for his healing and he unsure of his ability and the true nature of his gift. Torn between the will to save the damned and his craving to escape damnation himself.

Last year's winning director, Brendan Dunlea, is once again at the helm. 

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ROCK gardens are ideal for every garden - they are easy to maintain and look fantastic too.

In a small garden a rock garden will make innovative use of space,

whereas in a larger area it will break up large expanses of grass or flower beds.

They can be as creative or as basic as you like, and even if you are an expert at killing every plant in your garden - rock plants will serve you

Many of the brightest and showiest rock plants are the easiest to grow. Unless you are an alpine enthusiast, go for the cheap and cheerful option when buying plants. But first you need to build your own rock garden.

You can go out and buy rocks from a garden centre or other stockist, or you can get them from friends and family.

Choose the area you wish to use, and place all the rocks at different angles. Try to make the grain of the rock follow the slope you are creating.

Add more layers of rock as you build up the mound, filling in cracks and hollows with soil.

Be careful when lifting large, heavy pieces of rock - you may need help to



position them

Plant in the crevices and pockets so that the plants can tumble over rocks as they grow. Water well and keep the area moist until the plants are well established. If you do choose the not-so-hardy plants, try to separate them from areas which might get a bit of a bashing, as well as from pets and children - and even the

weather.

Use plenty of tough shrubs around the edge, such as hollies, berberis and box.

Make sure a rock garden has a few dwarf conifers or shrubs to give it some structure in

Avoid too many rampant rock plants, such as aubrieta, otherwise delicate alpines may be swamped.

This week in the garden

Prune flowering shrubs and clematis

Flowering shrubs such as - hydrangea paniculata, spiraea japonica, SS douglasii, menziesii, salicifolia, holodiscus discolor ariaefolius, sorbaria aitchisonii, SS arborea. SS sorbifolia, tomentosa, tamarix pentandra, hypericum moseranium, willow trees and cornus alba - need to be pruned now.

Stems made last year should be cut right back to within one or two joints of older wood. With some larger specimens, a few longer branches could be left at three-quarters length to make up the main framework of the plant. Pot annuals for the greenhouse

If you were able to sow annuals in September for flowering in the greenhouse in the spring it is now time to pot them in 13cm to 15cm pots.

According to the growth they have made, pot them in a suitable container using decent potting compost and stand the plants close to the glass to encourage sturdy growth.

Sow broad beans under glass

Sow broad beans in boxes or pots this week - but do not scatter the seeds haphazardly.

Set them out 5cm away from each other in all directions and cover them with about 2cm of soil. Germinate in a well-heated greenhouse or frame and protect from the frost.

Sow lettuces, culinary peas and cauliflowers If you want to have lettuces to hand very early this year make a planting of the cabbage variety this week. Plant the seeds in boxes and place in a warm greenhouse to germinate. Keep the temperature steady at around 13C.

You can also sow peas for an early crop - sow and germinate in the same way as the lettuces.

Cauliflowers should be grown in a greenhouse at around 13C to 16C. Sow them as thinly as possible in very shallow holes

Roundabout **Planned At Clonea Road Junction**

Waterford County Council plans to put a roundabout at the junction between the new realigned Clonea road and the existing coast

The local authority had planned to use a staggered junction between the local road L3011 from R675 Coast Road to Clonea Strand. But, Director of Services, John O'Flynn proposing that the new plans go for public display, said during the Compulsory Purchase Order process it was found that a roundabout would be more appropriate.

Meanwhile, it was confirmed that tender documents for the Kinsalebeg Realignment will be ready this month. Construction is expected to start at the end of the summer.

For Adult Education

Co. Waterford VEC administers a small fund each year to en able a very limited number of adults attend accredited undergraduate courses in recognised third level institutions. The funding is made available to the VEC fro m the Department of Education and Science.

The aim of this scheme is to provide accredited training for low income adults, who cannot attend full-time third level courses, for which there are no other funding sources. Specifically applicants are expected to pursue a course of training, which will enable them to enter the employment market.

Adults who require higher level initial education and training to enhance their employment prospects in line with the Government's sectoral employment priorities and who are entering third level education for the first time are eligible.

- Over 23 on January 1st of the year of application
- Be first time undergraduates
- Have been ordinarily resident in the administrative area of the VEC from October 1st of the previous year. (Evidence of the utility bill in the name of the applicant will be required.)
- Satisfy the income limits for third level and PLC grants eg less than the current income limit of 33,890 (subject to confirmation of current year's limits)
- Students who have completed a diploma level course may be considered for a scholarship, where they gain admission to a degree level course.
- Persons on disability payments, who cannot reasonably attend a third level college full-time and whose chosen course will train them for a place in the workforce.

Students have in the past attended courses in WIT and NUI Cork or through Oscail and the Open University. Full rules and regulations on request.

THE LATE THOMAS R. MOLONEY



The news broke at about 10pm on the night of January 4th. Tom Moloney had gone to his eternal reward. This sad news spread quickly through the combined parishes of Knockanore, Glendine, Kilwatermoy and beyond, where Tom was known and loved. Feelings of sincere sorrow and regret were experienced by his neighbours and many friends, by his nephews and niece, but especially by the Baldwin family, Killeenagh, with whom Tom had a special

relationship for over 60 years. Affectionately known as Tom Dick, he endeared himself to all

through his many fine characteristics and especially through his unique sense of humour and abiding wit. His passing has left a void in the community and in the lives of many individuals. Tom, who had reached his 81st

year, was born in Ballyphilip.

Knockanore on August 13th

1923. The middle son of a fami-

ly of five, he had three brothers -John, Richie and Willie and one sister, Nora. Tom was the last surviving member of that family. Leaving the National School at twelve years of age he entered the "school of life" where Tom discovered his many talents and abilities. He equipped himself with life skills and knowledge and learnt to rely on his own resources. His first venture into the adult world at that tender age was at his uncle's forge, Russell's in Moorehill, where he joined a long line of tradesmen as a blacksmith. Here, he mastered his craft and was one of the few men who could shoe a horse with either hand. Tom was a fast learner and with the coming of electricity he readily adapted to changing times. He became a skilled welder and his handiwork can be seen throughout the parish and surrounding parishes, in the grounds of The Church of the Sacred Heart, Knockanore, and even on the altar there. There was a poignant

In the early '40s, Tom went to reside at Baldwins in Killeenagh. On the instructions of his father he came initially to help save the harvest of 1942 and his first job was stacking oats. Although still a teenager, he had a talent even for this job and Jim Baldwin often said that he never saw a better man to make a "knee stack". Tom liked it at Baldwins, the Baldwins liked having Tom and the rest is history. He followed the thresher with Tom Baldwin through the decade and learnt the tricks of the trade from Bill Collins and Din Aherne who were noted for their skills in this field. Around this time, Jack Baldwin and Tom became close buddies. They shared their talents and were involved in many and varied ventures together. It was only fitting that the last function Tom was able to attend in Knockanore before his final illness was Jack's funeral

the Narration of the Gifts.

Never a man to idle his time, Tom's next venture was into the building trade where he joined forces with Con Donovan of Dunmoon, Iom believed in building things to last and to achieve this he would use a bolt where another tradesman would use a nail. Unlike the disposable age of today, he was a true recycler, even before the word came into vogue. Tom was a great improviser. He always found a way and whether it was in building a barn, modelling a tool or a farm implement, he found a use for materials which today, sadly, would be disposed of.

In the '40s and '50s rabbit trapping was a big business in rural Ireland and a means of livelihood for many. Resourceful as ever, Tom equipped himself with as many as two hundred traps and no rabbit from Dunmoon to Newport escaped the onslaught. Night after night with his flash lamp and stick, Tom

traversed the hills and dales for miles around

Truly a man of many talents, Tom was a man of great character He was steadfast, faithful caring and true to his own convictions. He was a man of his word and was ever ready to lend a helping hand. He befriended many families helping and supporting them in all sorts of ways and never counting the cost. He will be missed and remembered with fondness and affection.

For the last number of years Tom's abode was Saint Carthage's Rest Home in Lismore. Here, he had the best of both worlds as he drove his 'van' out to Ballypliilip every that ever came. Moss Donovan. day returning in the evening. In this way he kept in touch with his own locality, the area he knew so well. He was truly the local historian and there were few who knew the history of the parish and especially its graveyards better than he.

For many Tom will be remembered for his fun and humour, for his stories and the way that he told them. He liked nothing better than sitting by the fire on a winters night relating tall tales, telling yarns and jokes and scaring everyone with his terrifying ghost stories. An avid reader, he was a highly intelligent, self-educated man. He read everything he could lay his hands on until his latter weeks when his health began to fail. He once said that he read everything except Shakespeare. However, he liked nothing better than a good western and his favourite character was the outlaw James Green alias Sudden. His final chapter came from a prayer book. Sadly, he couldn't read this one himself. This book was being read to him by the Chaplain of Waterford Regional Hospital on Tuesday January 4th when at 8.05pm, the Good Lord called

RETHINK ON STAMP **DUTY INITIATIVE**

Mr. Eamonn Halpin, Chairperson of ICMSA's Taxation Committee and member of the southeast committee, speaking after the publication of Finance Bill 2005, cautiously welcomed the Stamp Duty Initiative, which was introduced in the Budget 2005. Mr. Halpin commented that it was a progressive initiative, which would benefit some Irish farmers. However, Mr. Halpin went on to express his association's dissatisfaction that the Stamp Duty Initiative could not have been extended to all farmers who wish to consolidate their holdings and not just confined to those who are engaging in a land swap. Mr Halpin called on the Minister to rethink this initiative and amend where appropriate, if it is to have the desired impact on land consolidation.

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CALF REARING

Minimise the Risk of Calf Disease

When a calf is born it has no immunity against disease. However, nature provides immunity through antibodies in colostrum. As the young animal becomes exposed to infections, its own immune system begins to develop a defence system against the diseases in its environment. In the first few months of life, the calf depends a lot on the maternal antibodies acquired via the colostrum. The ability of the calf to absorb antibodies declines rapidly over the first 24 hours of life. At birth the absorption of antibodies is almost 100% but 12 hours later it is down to 50% and at 24 hours it may be as low as 10%. This shows the importance of early and adequate intake of colostrum so as to provide a high concentration of antibodies in the calf's bloodstream. The normal recommendation is to feed 2 litres of colostrum in the first hour or so after birth and a further 2 litres in the next 4 - 6 hours.

Colostrum combats disease in two ways: the first is as described by supplying antibodies into the bloodstream to protect against infections; the second is by providing local protection in the intestine. Therefore although absorption has almost ceased when the calf is 24 hours old, colostrum continues to be beneficial for several more days. Therefore, dairy farmers who would have a continuous supply of colostrum over the calving season should continue to feed it to calves for the first 2 to 3 weeks of age.

Quality

The highest level of antibodies is found in the first milking and levels decline rapidly in subsequent milkings. The levels are lower in high yielding dairy cows and in heifers than in mature suckler cows. A short dry period lowers colostrum quality as does mastitis. Poor nutrition pre-calving can also reduce colostrum quality and quantity. Some beef cows may not produce 4 litres of milk in the first 4 hours but the better quality should make up for the lack of quantity. Purebred beef heifers may have a very poor supply so a supply of frozen colostrum to supplement the heifers supply would be useful for the first day or two.

When needed most suckler farmers get a supply of frozen colostrum from a neighbouring dairy farmer. A better quality colostrum, with antibodies specific to your farm, can be got by milking some of your own suckler cows immediately after calving. The two litre plastic milk container is useful for storing about the right amount. It can be safely thawed by placing in a basin of warm but not hot water.

Assisting Calves

Weak and traumatised calves need assistance to suckle or may have to be artificially fed. Even some healthy calves sometimes do not suckle without assistance. Limousin and Angus breeds are generally faster to their feet than Charolais.

Calves are slow to suckle cows with large teats or hanging udders. The level of antibodies falls by 50% between the first and second milking. It is best that calves suckle from all four teats initially but if assisting a calf make sure it gets colostrum from at least 2 teats.

The Link between Nitrogen Use and Stocking Rate

Nitrogen is the engine that drives Irish agriculture. Without it, our competitive edge and our ability to further reduce costs in the post Fischler era would be severely curtailed. However, nitrogen use has received an amount of negative publicity in the recent past, and no one can condone the overuse of nitrogen fertiliser.

Quantity depends on type of animal

The quantity of fertilizer N to apply for grazing depends mainly on the type of animal, the stocking rate, the clover content of the sward and whether the sward is old pasture or newly sown. However, a differential is now made between nitrogen for low yielding dairy cows (4,000 - 5,000 litres/year and feed 500kgs of concentrates) and high yielding dairy cows (5,500 - 6,500 litres/year and feeding 500kgs of concentrates). For the purpose of this article I will only deal with N application for the high yielding dairy cow

Proposing instead that where farmers sell land, or have a Compulsory Purchase Order issued to them, and reinvest the proceeds back into farmland, that those individuals must be exempt from stamp duty. Until these practical and sensible changes are implemented it was the opinion of ICMSA that very little land consolidation will

BRUCELLOSIS SITUATION IN COUNTY WATERFORD

Following several years when Brucellosis was at a comparatively low level, the incidence increased in 1996 and peaked in 1998 when nationally there were 1,081 new outbreaks and 6,417 laboratory posi-

To address the deteriorating situation, the Department introduced a range of measures from 1996 onwards including

- pre-movement testing
- intensified blood testing of the national herd
- cow monitoring at slaughter plants
- diagnostic improvements
- rapid depopulation slurry treatment

All of these contributed to reversing the upward trend from 1999. This improvement at national level continued in 2004 as the following data show:

SINGLE PAYMENT SCHEME - Closing Date for 2005 National Reserve extended to Friday, 18 February

Minister Coughlan has announced a further opportunity for farmers to make an application to the 2005 Single Payment Scheme National Reserve. The application period for the National Reserve was originally announced on 15 December 2004 with a closing date of Friday, 14 January 2005. That closing date was later extended to Friday, 21 January 2005. The closing date has now been extended to Friday, 18

SINGLE PAYMENT SCHEME - PPS Numbers

Minister Coughlan said this week that her Department is continuing its preparations for the introduction of the Single Payment Scheme this year. She said that in order to ensure that entitlements under this Scheme are established and issued correctly to every qualifying farmer, it is essential that the Department has the exact PPS Number (Personal Public Service Number) for each farmer. For the purpose of validating the PPS Number, the Department also requires the date of birth of each farmer.

In order to collect this important information and to avoid any unnecessary delays in issuing payments under the Scheme, the Department is writing to those farmers who have not yet submitted their correct PPS Number. She added that farmers who receive these letters should supply the required information on the form and return it to the Department in the FREEPOST envelope provided without delay. For

farmers who are not sure of their PPS Number, the letter will advise where they can find their correct number.

FOOD LABELLING

The Minister has announced her intention to introduce food labelling legislation which will give consumers a right to information on the origin of meat they cook in their homes or eat out.

EU regulations currently provide for a detailed labelling system for beef to be applied at retail level, which is over and above the general labelling provisions. These regulations do not apply at restaurant and catering sector level. The Minister said it is her intention to proceed with a legal requirement that country of origin must be displayed in respect of beef served on such premises. The legal options allowing for this development are being examined at present and any necessary legislation will be introduced as soon as possible.

On the food labelling issue in general, Minister Coughlan emphasised that her primary aim is to protect consumer interests and to ensure that the consumer is properly informed. Ireland is a major exporter of food and food products and indeed there are also considerable imports, so it is imperative that the same standards are applied to the labelling of foods in every sector and that there is a level playing field for the entire food industry.

Legislation covering the beef sector was already in place for retail outlets and similar measures were adopted for poultry. She said her Department and the Department of Health and Children are examining the legislative measures necessary to extend these regulations to sheepmeat and pigmeat. She added that both Departments are also exploring the necessary measures for extending the requirement to indicate the origin of all meat in the food service sector.

Pattern Plunged Into Crisis

It should be celebrating the thirtieth anniversary of its revival in a style fitting one of the longest running patterns in the country, instead Abbeyside Pattern is on the brink of cancellation.

Lack of community involvement in the pattern's organisation has left the future of the popular community festival facing short or even long-term cancellation, with the committee saying they'll pull the plug unless more people pitch in to help.

Revived in 1975, the Pattern has been an integral part of Abbeyside's festival calendar.

But, according to committee member Charmian O'Brien, the resignation of two committee members at their AGM and has left just seven members in place and the future of the festival in

The Committee has now been forced to take the step of holding an Extraordinary General Meeting in a bid to rescue the Pattern from cancellation.

We need ten people at least to organise this," Charmian O'Brien told the Dungarvan Leader. "It could be huge given a chance. But we don't have the numbers. If we get 10 or more interested (in joining the committee) we will probably have a

But the lack of involvement from the community on the Pattern Committee has made the prospect of the event's cancellation very real.

"Maybe it's time to let the Pattern go for a few years and let people see what they have lost.

A fundraising drive earlier in the year yielded a tiny return. Out of the 2,000 letters sent out to homes in Abbeyside and Ballinroad, just 34 envelopes were returned, and out of those two were empty.

"Every year people come up to us and say you should have done this or that differently," Charmian said. "And that's fine. But, come on the committee then, and help do things differently.'

"It's a pity we may have to leave it go. Especially as it's the 30th Anniversary. But if people don't want to get involved, then that's what we'll do.

Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan also expressed his disappointment.

"The committee is struggling with a very small amount of people expected to undertake a huge commitment every year."

Cllr. Calls For First **Boundary Extension Since 1855**

Lismore Town Council must wait for legislation to be introduced allowing for the setting up of a local Boundary Commission before they move ahead with plans to extend the bound-

If the Town Council goes ahead with an extension it would be the first time the boundary has changed since 1855.

Raising the matter, Fianna Fail councillor, Bernard Leddy said a number of developments now being built lie outside the boundary.

"We should look at taking those developments into account," he said. "They should be within Lismore Town Council's remit."

He said between 500 and 1,000 new houses will be built outside the town boundary, and the boundary should reflect how the town is in the 21st Century rather than how it was in the 19th Century.

Town Manager, John O'Flynn said even once legislation is introduced, Waterford County Council would also have to agree.

Arduous Process For Speed Limit Change

Lismore Town Manager, John O'Flynn listed the arduous process of public consultation ahead of the council if it wishes to change the speed limits around the county.

Responding to a question from Cllr. Orla Russell (FG) about moving the speed limit signs from Deerpark Road to the Town Boundary, Mr. O'Flynn detailed the measures to be undertaken to change the speed limits.

Under new statutory measures introduced, Waterford County Council has the power to change speed limits. But they must do this together with a lengthy public consultation process. He said the NRA and the Garda Chief Superintendent must also be informed. After this process is concluded, the matter must be brought back before Waterford County Council again for final approval.

Draft Guidelines also say other factors including house density in the area and the number of accidents must be taken into account.

He said there's an issue with speed limits in various parts of the county including the Clonmel Road and the Carrick on-Suir road. Mr. O'Flynn went on to say the council has yet to decide whether to change the speed limits on all the problem roads "in one go" or deal with each separately. Dealing with each road individually, he said, could result in the work of the council being taken over for months.



Standards Watchdog Clears Cullen

Transport Minister Won't Face Second Dail Inquiry

Minister for Transport, Martin Cullen will not face a second inquiry into the awarding of contracts to Public Relations Consultant, Monica Leech,

The Standards in Public Office Commission has decided against initiating a full inquiry after the commission announced it did not establish a "prima facie case" to warrant an investigation.

In a statement released on Monday evening last, Minister Cullen said: "I note this evening's announcement that the Standards in Public Office Commission, having considered the matter, has found that there are no grounds for an investigation. Taken together with the Quigley inquiry, all matters relating to this issue have been comprehensively examined by independent persons."

"I look forward to continuing to work hard in my role as Minister for Transport and to delivering on the many challenging and exciting policy initiatives under my responsibility."

The decision is said to have secured the embattled Transport

Minister's place in the Cabinet after he was also cleared of any wrongdoing by an independent inquiry run by the former Chairman of the Revenue Commissioners, Dermot Quigley earlier this month

The SIPO commission, chaired by High Court Judge, Matthew Smith, had deliberated for almost two months before announcing that it would not be pursuing the matter any further.

"The evidence before the commission did not establish a prima facie case which would have warranted an investigation within the terms of the legislation in question. In the matter which was the subject of the preliminary inquiry, the grounds for possible investigation by the Standards Commission could not extend beyond the scope of the relevant legislation," the commission said.

Its preliminary inquiry focused on sections of two pieces of relevant legislation, the Ethics in Public Offices Act, 1995 and the Standards in Public Office Act, 1995. And it examined the Quigley report and files from the Office of Public Works and the Department of Environment.

Advice was also sought from legal counsel.

Meanwhile, Ms. Leech's term as PR consultant to the Department of the Environment ended last week. The contract was said to have earned the Waterfordbased consultant up to 400,000 euro. Minister Roche announced that the position has now been scrapped.

FROM CHARLES SMITH'S HISTORY OF WATERFORD 1745. AFFANE (Continued)

Affane is famous for the best cherries in this country, or perhaps in Ireland, being first planted here by Sir Walter Raleigh, who brought them from the Canary Islands. Whitechurch parish is of considerable extent and gives title to the Hon. William Maule, who was created baron Maule of Whitechurch, and Earl of Penmure of Forth in the county of Wexford by Patent dated the 2nd May 1743. Ballintaylor, the seat of John Ussher Esq. is situated on the south of this parish about 3 miles south west of Dungarvan. The house was built by Sir Richard Osborne in 1619, as appears by a coat of arms cut in stone, fixed in an adjacent wall with that date. Here are considerable plantations of timber trees, (besides large adjacent woods) as oak, elms, wallnut, etc. as also the Arbutus, a tree which grows naturally in this kingdom. This and the Blackthorn thrive here, becoming considerable large trees, though accounted shrubs in most other places, which has been often known to happen through difference of soil, climate, and culture. The fir also flourishes in this place. This gentlemen, being curious in this way, has also nurseries of different kinds of Newfoundland spruce, a species which well deserves our notice, as affording a cheap and excellent drink, well known in that country by the name of spruce beer; is wholesomer and far preferable to most kinds of weak malt liquors, and would be of great service to the poor of this kingdom, was it known to them. A little above the house is an extensive prospect of the adjacent country and sea-coast. The gardens lie in slopes as the side of the hill, and are capable of being much improved; nor is water wanting to supply any beauty of that kind.

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





UNDER 16 FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP TO GET UNDERWAY SHORTLY

This years under 16 football championships gets under way on Sunday February 27th when Ardmore and Ballyduff meet in a division three game at the Ardmore Club Grounds. In this years division three championship there is only three teams taking part and as a result the three teams will meet each other twice. After the league section of the competition the top two teams will contest the Western Final. There will be no semi final in di-

Division, s one and two get under way a week later. In these two divisions the top team after the league section of the competition will advance to the Western Final with the next two teams in each division contesting the semi finals.

Over the past few years the under 16 football championship has been a very good one with very little between the top ten or eleven teams with very little also separating the teams in the lower division. This years competition is expected to be as equally exciting as in previous years.

Very little separates the teams in division one. Nire won the under 14 football division one final one final two years ago when they defeated Ballinacourty in a very good final played at Kirwan Park in Touraneena. Also in the shakeup will be An Gaeltacht who won the division three title two years ago at under 14 level, while the Brickeys should not also be ruled out as there is those out there who feel that they would more than have held their own in the division one competition despite loosing all their games two years ago in the division one championship of the under 14 cham-

Two years ago Ardmore were the second best team in the division three competition in the under 14 football championship. They will the favourites to win the competition two years on but St. Olivers and Ballyduff could make it tough for them.

GLEESON CUP

The Divisional and County Bord na nÓg officers met last Wednesday night at Lawlors Hotel. During the course of the meeting the following details were agreed in relation to this years Gleeson Cup under 16 hurling game between East and West Waterford in under 16 hurling.

The game will be a two legged affair with the first leg been played in the east of the county with the Sacred Heart Grounds in Waterford city the preferred choice of venue for the game. This game will take place on February 26th.

The returned game in the west of the county will take place on

March 12th, one week before the two divisional teams play their opening round of games in this years Munster Under 16 hurling inter divisional championship. Ardmore will be more than likely be the venue for the game.

The Gleeson Cup Tournament each year is of vital importance to the selectors of the divisional teams who are preparing for the Munster championships. Traditionally this tournament takes place at this time of the year but over the past few years this was not the case. Over the past few years the competition did not take place as a build up to the Munster competitions due to a series of unforeseen circumstances.

UNDER 12 FOOTBALL

A few weeks ago in these notes it was pointed out that this years county under 12 football final would take place in early May. This was the subject of much debate when the Western Club Delegates met with divisional officers some weeks ago.

Since then the decision has been taken to move the date for the county finals back to the second weekend in September a decision I am sure will be greeted warmly by most. When the county and western officers met at Lawlors Hotel last week the rules for this years competition were agreed and will be included in the county fixture booklet which all clubs will receive shortly.

It has been agreed that the competition will be run off as a three movement game. This basically means that a player can take two solo,s of the ball, or one hope and one solo of the ball, but must release the ball on or before the third movement. Failure to do so will result in a free to the opposite team.

This format has been worked in the west of the county with a number of years now and has been working well. In fact most will agree that the rules make games a joy to watch when they are played by two good teams with little between them ability wise.

It has also been agreed that all kick out,s following a wide ball will be taken from the hand from the end line and kick outs following a score will be taken from the hand on the 45 metre line. Both divisions can play the competition numbers wise whatever way they see fit but when it comes to a county final divisions one and two will be 15 a side and division three will be 13 a side.

UNDER 12 HURLING

Rules for the under 12 hurling competition were also agreed upon recently by county and divisional officers. It has been agreed that normal hurling rules will apply apart from the fact players cannot go on a solo run with the ball and players must use their hurley to take a score.

UNDER 11 GROUND HURLING

A clear set of ground hurling rules will be issued to all clubs when they receive their fixtures for the year. In the under 11 hurling competition players will not be allowed to roll lift or jab lift the ball of the ground and will not be allowed to catch a ball that is in flight. An exception will be made however for a goalkeeper who as in normal hurling rules must wear a distinctive colour top from the outfield players on both sides. It has also been agreed that players can kick the ball along the ground but like in under 12 must use the hurley to score. It has also been agreed that all games are 20 minutes a side.

HARTY CUP

Waterford, s interested in this years Dr. Harty Cup finally came to an end in Clonmel last Sunday when St. Colman,s College from Fermoy who in their team included two west Waterford players, Kenneth Kearney of Cois Bhride and Jamie Kearney of Ballyduff in their side went out of the competition at the semi final stages at the hands of Thurles C.B.S.

Thurles C.B.S. in this game were superb throughout the game and were fully deserved their 4-10 to 1-6 win. In the final Thurles C.B.S. will take on the current holders of the competition St. Flannans from Ennis who recorded a 1-9 to 1-4 win over St. Josephs from Kilmallock at Caherconlish.

If the holders of the title were to retain it this year they will have won the trophy for a record 21 times. This past school year a large number of players from clubs in Waterford played in this years competition. Congratulations to all who took part in the competition. CONFIRMATION NAMES

It has come to my notice that its confirmation time again and young sixth class pupils are racking their brains to find a Saints name that they can take. While picking a name is the easy part, the fear is, "Will the Bishop ask me questions about the Saint's name that I take" (Well it was when I was going to school) This week we offer you a solution. What better name to take than the Patron Saint of Archers, Saint Sebastian.

The history of Saint Sebastian is indeed an interesting one. St Se bastian was born at Narbonne, in Gaul, but his parents were of Milan, in Italy, and he was brought up in that city. He was a fervent servant of Christ, and though his natural inclinations gave him an aversion to a military life, yet to be better able, without suspicion, to assist the confessors and martyrs in their sufferings, he went to Rome and entered the army about the year 283. Sebastian commanded a company of the Praetorian Guard for the Roman Emperor, Diocletian. After his secret belief in Christianity was revealed, he refused to renounce his faith. The emperor ordered that he be bound to a stake and shot to death with arrows. He was left for dead after several arrows, but a friend discovered that he was still alive and nursed him back to health. Later he proclaimed his Faith from the steps of the Emperor's Palace. The guards were ordered to beat him to death with clubs and his body was thrown in the sewer. A pious lady, called Lucina, had Sebastian's body privately removed, and buried it in the catacombs at the entrance of the cemetery of Calixtus. A church was afterwards built over his relics by Pope Damasus, which is one of the seven ancient stationary churches at Rome,

Well seeing as there is no Saint Roy, Saint Rio or Saint Ronaldo. Saint Sebastian is an option and now you can impress the Bishop with his history.

1298 AD - Battle of Falkirk - English army defeats Scots. The English knights charged the Scottish archers, scattering them, then the English archers attacked the remaining army.

1307 AD - William Tell - because William refused to bow towards a hat placed on a pole as a sign of imperial power, has was ordered to shoot an apple off his son's head. (He was known as an expert crossbowman.) He succeeded in shooting the apple. The story of his feat also stated that he had a second crossbow bolt hidden behind his belt in case he failed and killed his son, he would have quickly reloaded and killed the official who had ordered him to shoot the apple off his son's head.

Aglish-based developer, Andy Hally, plans to build 89-houses on a sizeable site at the edge of the village.


The development will not include any social and affordable housing and will not go-ahead until a treatment plant is constructed in the West Waterford village.
