O Céilleaçhair Secures Second Údaras Term

BY KEVIN KIRRANE

Fiachra O Ceilleachair retained his seat on Udaras na Gaeltachta, securing his second five-year-term on the second count on Sunday last.

The Labour councillor secured 416 votes, exceeding his vote in 1999 to top the poll, ahead of a strong challenge from Independent, Micheal O hUallacháin, Pádraigin Ní Chadhla, the Fine Gael candidate and Brid Nielsen of Fian-

Turnout was again strong in the Ring/Old Parish area with 886 out of a total electorate of 1,263 casting their ballots.

The 70% turnout was again one of the highest in the seven Gaeltacht areas in the country.

The counting took place in Halla Pobal na Rinne, beginning at 9am and the counts, overseen by Waterford County

Council and Returning Officer Jack Lillis were announced before 10:15am, in the presence of a TV camera crew from

With the increased electorate in the Ring/Old Parish area the quota was set at 439 and with no candidate reaching the figure, a second count was need-

With the distribution of Brid Neilsen's ninety-six votes, Cllr. O Ceilleachair exceeded the quota on the second count, becoming the first of the seventeen Udaras members in seven counties to be declared elected.

It was the first occasion in the history of Irish politics that a Labour Party candidate has won two single seat elections in succession.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says, however, that party politics should not be and are generally

not important in the Údaras adding that his support was very widespread and was based primarily on his hard work and

suitability for the position. Since being elected in 1999, he says he has remained accessible to constituents and been effective and discreet whether pushing matters of public interest or dealing with items of individual interest to people in Ring and Old Parish.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says his campaign was positive, and focused exclusively on his own record and ability.

Herbs for Babies and Children

WHY CHOOSE HERBS ?

Many parents are concerned about the effects of orthodox medications on young children. Frequent use of drugs such as antibiotics, steroids and laxatives can be associated with short and long term side effects together with reduced effectiveness over time. Herbal medicine provides a safe and effective alternative which minimises side effects and helps to address the cause of ill health. Herbal medicine also reduces the reliance on pharmaceutical drugs and ensures that these are more effective at times when they are really necessary.

The herbs described in this article are safe remedies which can be used at home for many common childailments. However, if symptoms persist, or fo more serious complaints such as asthma, eczema, measles, mumps, whooping cough, gastric reflux, diarrhoea, recurrent infections or effects of vaccinations please consult a qualified herbalist.

TREATING COMMON CHILDHOOD COMPLAINTS

- · Chamomile or lemon balm tea.
- Sleeplessness
- Chamomile tea before bedtime.
- Warm bath with an infusion of lavender and chamomile flowers
- · Passionflower tea or tincture is useful for children who experience nightmares.
- Establish a bedtime routine and avoid caffeine-containing drinks.
- Hyperactivity
- Chamomile or lemon balm tea.
- For older children make sure the diet is rich in oats, fish oils, and foods containing B vitamins such as bananas, meat, fish, dairy products and fortified cereals. Breast-feeding mothers can include these in their own diet.
- Avoid all food containing additives, refined sugar and caffeine.

· Chamomile or lemon balm tea.

Breast-feeding mothers can drink fennel tea which increases milk flow and calms the baby's digestion through the milk

· Attend baby massage classes which are very useful for helping to relieve colic.

- Colds, coughs and feverishness
- Elderflower tea reduces fever, clears mucus and and boosts the immune system.
- Thyme tea (with honey for children over a year)
- is expectorant and antiseptic.
- Echinacea helps to boost immunity.
- · Vitamin C, found in fruit and vegetables, is important for fighting infections.

.Skin rashes, injuries and infections

- MCPP, MIIMH, DipCoun

 Chamomile infusion as a wash for sore or broken skin such as cuts and nappy rash.
 - Calendula ointment for cuts and sores.
 - Hypericum ointment for painful injuries such as fingers shut in

 Arnica cream for bruises and swellings on unbroken skin. For babies, give 4 - 6 teaspoons of herbal tea on a spoon or add to the feeding bottle 3 - 4 times daily or as required. For older children, a quarter to half a cup can be drunk alone or added to juice 3 - 4 times daily or as required. Alternatively add 1 - 2 cups of

A chamomile bath before bed is particularly soothing. Herbs such as Echinacea for children are available as drops from health food shops and pharmacies. Follow the directions on the bottle or consult a herbalist if you have any questions.

Waterford TD On Mission To Install 24-Hour Waste Wardens

Wilkinson reiterates plea after Minister Roche's visit highlights waste management crisis

Waterford Fianna Fáil TD Ollie Wilkinson has reiterated his call for 24-hour waste war-dens to patrol dumping blackspots after a visit last week by the Minster for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, Dick Roche TD, highlighted the waste management crisis in the county.

Earlier this year, Deputy Wilkinson made a strong plea to Waterford County Council and Waterford City Council to appoint 24-hour waste wardens to patrol well-documented areas that have become bringcentres for mindless dumpers.

'In some areas, whole stretches of road have become the dumping grounds for plastic sacks of household refuse, mattresses, fridges, washing machines, sinks and cookers. Minister Roche's visit to Waterford highlighted the consistent problem with waste management in the county.

'He met the county manager, Ray O'Dwyer, to discuss the chronic shortage of landfill space in Waterford. It is an issue on which I am working closely with Minister Roche and others to resolve once and for all,' said Deputy Wilkinson.



He said Minister Roche had force their structural strength taken on board Mr O'Dwyer's recommendations to tackle the county's waste management problem and repair structural damage to Helvic pier in Rinn and the Cunnigar.

'I have now made funding for these projects a personal priority. Both require funds to rein-

and I will ensure that they remain at the forefront of Minister Roche's mind going forward. They are projects that must be tackled quickly,' said Deputy Wilkinson.

He said 24-hour waste wardens should be empowered to impose on-the-spot fines on

'the handful' of illegal dumpers, saying they cannot be allowed to ride roughshod over the natural environment.

'The public, too, must play its part in stepping up surveillance in these areas and report illegal dumping to the local authorities and to the media,' said Deputy Wilkinson.

Wilkinson's Report Sets Out Reforms For Farmers Early Retirement Plan

Waterford Fianna Fáil TD Ollie Wilkinson, who is a member of the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Agriculture and Food, has prepared a detailed report setting out key reforms for the early retirement scheme for farmers. His recommendations provide for the smoother transition of land from one generation to the next.

The early retirement scheme, which began operating in January 1994, was originally designed to encourage younger trained people to remain in rural communities by offering an attractive incentive to older farmers to retire from agriculture with good pension security. They would then pass their lands on to younger people by gift, sale or lease to set up in farming or to expand their own holdings.

But in his minutely researched report, Deputy Wilkinson reviewed anomalies in the scheme identified by the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Agriculture and Food and set out his recommendations to improve farmers' access to their pension entitlements and expedite the transfer of lands between generations.

Among Deputy Wilkinson's recommendations are:

- Index-link the scheme pension:
- Increase (or drop entirely) the limit of 200 income units (50,000) applying to transferors in certain circumstances to cater for changes in the farming sector affecting income and the security of the retiring party;
- Drop the 'off-farm' income limit of 100 income units (25,400) applying to transferees in the year before applying for the scheme;
- Keep the age limit for transferees at 45 for the entire scheme;
- Keep deductions consistent where the scheme overlaps with pensions payable under the social welfare acts;
- Improve interaction between the Department of Agriculture and Food and the Department of Social and Family Affairs to avoid overpayments when persons receive a both scheme pen-

sion and an old age pension. (Overpayments due to administrative errors should not be recouped from the recipient);

• Pay the scheme pension when the lessee delays signing the lease without good cause.

"It is my hope that this thorough review of the early retirement scheme for farmers will highlight its deficiencies and help inform any future policy changes that the Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mary Coughlan TD, may choose to make."

"I would like to acknowledge the submissions received from the Farm Retirement Group for Justice, Teagasc and the ICMSA. I believe implementing these recommendations would embolden our rural communities and eliminate some of the headaches caused by current deficiencies in the early retirement scheme for farmers. It is my hope that progress can be made quickly and I will be working to ensure we get results as soon as possible," said Deputy Wilkinson.

During these times patients will ring a central number 1850 334 999. A receptionist at the CAREDOC headquarters will answer this number and take the patient details.

A Nurse will ring the patients back and give advice to the patients, or if necessary organise appointment times for patients to be seen at local Treatment Centres or arrange a home visit if necessary.

AN APPOINTMENT TO SEE THE DOCTOR MUST BE ARRANGED BY PHONE BEFORE THE PATIENT ATTENDS THE CENTRE.

There will be four doctors on duty. These doctors will be based in the treatment centres and will be driven in cars equipped with all the most up to date medical equipment. These cars will be in constant communication with the nurse at the headquarters of **CAREDOC**.

It is intended to provide a high quality out of hours service for urgent cases. Where a patient contacts the service regarding a problem that can wait until their own doctor's surgery opens, they will be advised to report to their own doctor at the next routine surgery. In this way doctors will be free to deal with urgent cases promptly.

SUCKLER BEEF: Grass tetany

The biggest killer of suckler cows every year is grass tetany. Lush spring grass coupled with changeable weather is ideal to trigger this condition. Protection can be obtained by a number of different methods. Cows need at least 6g of magnesium per day to stave off the disease. However during tetany type conditions magnesium absorption can be reduced by half and even three times and therefore to avoid 'sub' - tetany it is recommended to allocate cows an allowance of 20g of magnesium per day.

1) Pasture Dusting with cal mag (50% mg) - (fine powder form not the granular form) need 10 - 15cm of grass for cal mag to stick to. Apply 17kg /Ha /week for paddocks or double that amount every second week if set stocking. It is a cheap and effective method costing10 - 15cent per day.

2) Feed Cal Mag with some carrier meal - Cal mag is 50% magnesium so in order to achieve an intake of 20g magnesium the cow needs to eat 40g of cal mag mixed with a small quantity of meal. Alternatively purchase a 'ready made' high mag nut from your local supplier. Cost can be high depending on the amount of meal that needs to be fed to achieve target magnesium intakes.

3) Water Medication - different types of products available. Generally 10% magnesium salts such as magnesium chloride and magnesium sulphate are used. Magnesium chloride is better than magnesium sulphate as it does not discourage intake and make the cows scour. Also available are liquid products like flomag, which may contain other minerals and trace elements in addition. For a 10% mg content cows need to have an intake of 200g/ day to achieve the recommended intake of 20g. Good control can be achieved provided that there is no alternative source of water available. Cost range from 12 - 30cent per day.

4) High Mag buckets - Intakes will vary leaving some cows at risk. Cost range 10 - 14cent per day.

5) Magnesium Bolus - Provides reasonable control during low risk periods. Depending on product type and frequency of treatment magnesium supplied will be less than _ of the recommended amount. Cost 20 - 40 cent per day.

The Breeding season

April will mark the start of the breeding season for many suckler herds. This year there is no suckler retention to justify keeping nonperforming cows. A late calving or barren cow is a cost that can not be justified. A few points to note:

1) Late calvers - continue to feed dry cow minerals to late carrying cows, as these are the ones you will be trying to bring forward. Feed them well after calving to avoid any body condition loss and get them cycling earlier. Consider removing the calves to twice a day suckling to get the cows cycling earlier or alternatively use a controlled breeding programme to kick start them cycling.

2) Heifers - are most under pressure as they are still growing, trying to go back in calf and rear a calf. Keep an eye on body condition an move fast if it starts to slip otherwise these heifers will be next years late calvers

3) Replacements - what is your replacement policy? Do you have one? A bull that has been bred to produce beef cattle will do little for you on the maternal side of the house. Consider using some Al in order to avail of some of the best maternal bulls available. This is a long-term plan, it will take three years before the potential replacements will enter the herd. So plan ahead now.

4) ICBF - will be launching a new beef index over the coming weeks. This will give each bull available through Al an economic index for various different traits. Use this information to help you select your herd sires.

5) Records - keep records of all heats and services so that you can spot problem breeders and deal with them promptly. Time is of the essence here as every missed cycle is costing you over 30.

FIRST CUT SILAGE: Nitrogen for First Cut

April brings the closure of silage fields, where first cut is planned for late May. Final slurry and fertiliser applications are going out. Nitrogen: The amount of fertiliser nitrogen being applied to silage

swards is influenced by many factors, especially whether it is a new lev, the number of cuts taken each year and the amount of organic manure applied.

Slurry: It is advised to apply slurry produced on a grassland farm to the silage area. This replaces nutrients from where they were removed. The best time is for first cut to use nitrogen efficiently.

Rate for First Cut: The recommended rate of fertiliser nitrogen is 95 kgs per hectare. This assumes slurry has been applied for first cut at 33,000 litres per hectare, supplying 30 kgs of nitrogen. If it is not possible to spread slurry, apply 125 kgs of bag nitrogen. New swards respond to a further 25 kgs for four years after reseeding. Where one cut only is planned, the recommended rate is 85kgs, with slurry.

Where nitrogen was applied for early grazing, assume that thirty per cent of this remains available for first cut silage and adjust accordingly. Low potassium levels in silage swards are a concern. Increasing nitrogen levels to compensate is not economic or environmental

ICMSA Welcomes Announcement on Milk Quota Changes

nouncement by the Minister for Agriculture and Food of changes to the Milk Quota Regulations, Mr. Dominic Cronin, Chairperson of ICMSA's Dairy Committee, welcomed the changes introduced which he said will help to improve the operation of the Milk Quota Restructuring Scheme.

"ICMSA particularly welcome the decision relating to New Entrant/Parent Milk Production Partnership, which will permit new entrants priority access to quota until the combined total of the partnership reaches 500,000 litres (110,100 gallons). This decision is fully in line with the proposal put forward by ICMSA to the Department and successfully addresses a major anomaly.'

The anomaly to which Mr.Cronin referred was the regulation debarring a farmer with more than 350,000 litres (77,000 gallons) from participating in a partnership with their son or daughter. This was most unfair on farmers who were just above the limit and ICMSA put forward a constructive proposal to the Minister that would address this completely arbitrary cut-off point, while ensuring continued equity within the Milk Quota Restructuring Scheme.

"ICMSA welcomes the Minister's decision to address and resolve a major anomaly that existed in the Parent/Child Milk Production Partnerships," said Mr. Cronin.

"Many Aspects Of Cross Compliance Not Agreed Upon And Department's Information Seminars Are Grossly Premature" says ICMSA

The President of ICMSA, Mr Pat O'Rourke, has described the decision of the Department of Agriculture and Teagasc to hold a series of regional information meetings on all aspects of the single payment system, including cross compliance, as "grossly premature". Commenting on the day when newspaper advertisements appeared giving the locations and dates for these regional meetings, Mr O'Rourke said the Department appeared to have learned nothing about the dangers of attempting to foist a system on farmers about which there were still huge questions to be resolved.

'As recently as last Thursday, ICMSA was able to highlight 15 specific instances where the Department had told farmers that infringement would lead to penalty points, but which ICMSA was now able to demonstrate as mere 'tolerances', meriting only a notice, if that! Not for the first time, we seen the Department rush-

Speaking following the an- ing around to tell farmers how they can comply with rule and regulations, when the Depart-ment itself seems completely confused about the same rules and regulations. If they don't know - and on the basis of our negotiations in Abbeyleix last Thursday, I'm not sure they do - well then, how can they advise the farmers who will be attending these meetings?

I would beg the Department to actually work through their natural tendency to want to regulate Irish farming and try and get their approach and balance right. ICMSA has already informed the Department, in the clearest language possible, that we will not tolerate any rule that interferes with the legal rights of farmers to obtain the full single farm payment. We have already communicated to the Department the legal opinion we sought on the matter, which concluded that it is illegal for the Government to levy any penalties against a farmer's single farm payment without proving negligence on his or her part - and we would remind everyone that this is a very high level of proof indeed.'

Mr O'Rourke concluded by saying that ICMSA was absolutely sure of its ground and he predicted a great deal of confusion and confrontation for the Department, if it persists in trumpeting so-called 'information meetings', when, quite plainly, many details still need to be clarified.

LIVESTOCK FARMERS CANNOT AFFORD €90m **BEEF PREMIUM CUT**

IFA National Livestock Chairman John Bryan said livestock farmers cannot afford a special beef premium cut of up to 90m resulting from the 2004 special beef premium overshoot. Mr. Bryan said a financial hit of this magnitude will wipe out incomes on many livestock farms and the Minister for Agriculture Mary Coughlan T.D. must take immediate steps to redress the problem.

Mr. Bryan said the method of calculation for the special beef premium quota overshoot is flawed and must be challenged by Minster Coughlan at the highest level in Brussels.

The IFA livestock leader said it is totally unjust that livestock farmers are being cut back by up to 27m in their 21-month special beef premium, when the application at this level has not exceeded the national quota. Mr. Bryan pointed out that the national quota, which applies at the 10-month and bull premium stage is 1,077,458. He said our total application under the 21-month SBP stage is 1,023,000. Applying a 10% disallowance will reduce this application back to 920,000.

If the calculation results in a 15% cut on the 21-month premium, it will amount to 140,000 animals, costing Irish farmers 27m. This will reduce payments at the 21-month stage from 920,000 head down to 780,000 head. This cut is totally unjust due to the fact that we have not even reached the national quota of 1,077,000."

The IFA livestock leader said Minister Coughlan must urgently pursue this major flaw in the EU regulation on the beef premium calculation for the 21-month stage.

John Bryan said IFA has sought an urgent meeting with Minister Coughlan on the special beef premium problem and how the financial penalty can be minimised to farmers.

John Bryan said the reasons for the significant quota overshoot in the 2004 special beef premium application relate to the impact from the changeover to full decoupling and the fact that Ireland's special beef premium quota was cut by 200,000 head in 1996.

"Both of these factors are outside of producers' control and Minister Coughlan must make a strong case to Brussels taking account of these critical issues."

John Bryan said the quota overshoot in 2004 has been greatly compounded by the introduction of decoupling and this provides Minister Coughlan with a strong case to take to the EU Commission. He said the previous EU Commissioner Franz Fischler made it clear that no producer or member state should be penalised by opting for full decoupling. "A beef premium bill of 90m is a very severe penalty on Irish livestock farmers." He said Minister Mary Coughlan must pursue this issue vigorously with the EU Commission.

He said he would contact Mr. Billy McEvoy, South Tipperary County Engineer, as a matter of urgency to seek co-operation on this project. Councillor Green pointed out to the Council that the particular bridge was the only bridge passable during the severe flooding that took place around Clonmel last October. This bridge is widely used and the fact that it is so narrow that only one vehicle can travel over it at a time, has led to many accidents.

Cathaoirleach McGrath Welcomes New Doctors Only Medical Card

Cathaoirleach of South Tipperary County Council Cllr. Mattie McGrath (FF) Newcastle, in a statement has welcomed the decision by the Government to introduce a doctors only medical card. The Health Amendment Act, 2005 (second stage) was passed by the Seanad and President McAleese signed the Bill into law on Friday, 11th March 2005.

This new doctor only medical card will come into circulation next month, April 2005. This medical card initiative will enable up to 200,000 additional people to go to their G.P. free of charge. This will be of huge benefit to many people on low incomes who have enough to worry about if their child is sick and he feels they should not have to worry about the cost of bringing their child to a doctor. This new measure will alleviate that worry for many thousands of parents and it will make accessing G.P. services easier for many individuals and families who would be above the existing general medical card income guidelines.

A married couple with 2 children can earn up to €378 and they will be eligible to receive a doctor only medical card. Under the old scheme this couple would not have been eligible for a full medical card. Cllr. McGrath is now urging people to apply for these doctor only medical cards whether they feel they are eligible or not, because the medical card guidelines increased by 7.5% in the last budget and therefore there are a lot of people who are eligible for the full medical card whom are not even aware of it.

Late Mr. Johnny Blanche

It is with deep and sincere regret we pen the death of Mr. Johnny Blanche, Clarke Villas, Clonmel which sad event occurred after an illness of some duration at the Cottage Hospital Nursing Home, Irishtown, Clonmel. He was an inveterate practical joker who loved to engage in good humoured banter with all and sundry. Noted for his witty and clever retorts, his wife said he was a hard working family man, who was so handy around the house.

Son of Richard and Marcy Blanche, Garrymore, Clonmel, he was one of six children, five boys and a girl. Sadly, Johnny was only nine years of age when his father died at the age of 42, leaving his mother to rear a large family on her own. A former pupil of St. Mary's C.B.S., he looked forward to getting out of school most days to take off across the fields with his pals, hunting rabbits, a past time he inherited from his father, a Wexford man, who enjoyed the sport when he was a boy in New Ross.

Shortly after leaving school he took up employment at Curran's Enamel Factory, spending six years there before joining Bulmers staff, starting at Dowd's Lane plant. In total he clocked up 40 years service with the company, where he was very popular and where he was known as "Johnny B", a nickname he got, deduced by his son Richie to differentiate between him and all the other Johnny's around. Needless to say, the highly esteemed Blanche family of which he was a member, were very much identified with soccer in Clonmel over the years, brother Richie, the sole survivor of that generation, still actively involved with Clonmel Town. Johnny also played hurling in his younger days and had the distinction of wining a South Tipperary Minor medal in 1950 with St. Mary's. His brother Paddy played for years with Clonmel United.

In 1960 he married Kathleen Fitzgerald from Albert Street, Clonmel, and having resided for five years in Queen Street they moved to Clarke Villas rearing nine children, five girls and four boys. Johnny inculcated a love of sport in his family, all of whom participated enthusiastically in many different games. His wife said that he encouraged them to fish even though he never fished himself. His brother Richie said it was ironic that Johnny's son Kevin, won an F.A.I. Cup medal with Clonmel Town in 1994 when they beat New Ross from where his grandfather came.

Nothing gave Johnny more pleasure than meeting his brother Tommy in Chrissie Shines where they regularly enjoyed a pint and the craic. It was to him a sad blow when Tommy died and of course Paddy's passing three years earlier upset him in many ways, as they were close. Suffering ill health himself, for quiet a long time, he still managed to get out and about. His sons were always ready to drive whenever he wanted to go. Despite having been in and out of hospital, he still maintained his sense of humour, endearing himself with his jolly manner, to nursing staffs, particularly in the Cottage Hospital where he passed away, his wife and family at his bedside.

Reminiscing nostalgically about their life together, Kathleen said that Johnny loved ballroom dancing and in earlier years they used to go frequently to the Collin's Hall, adding jocosity that she was lucky she could dance. Johnny will be missed by all who knew him and enjoyed his good humoured ways, but most of all, of course, his loss will be sorely felt by his wife Kathleen and family, round whom his life revolved.

His remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church, Irishtown where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Michael Joseph Ryan P.P. St. Mary's, where he celebrated the requiem Mass assisted by Rev. Fr. Robert Power C.C. St. Mary's and Rev. Fr. Brian Power C.C. S.S. Peter and Paul's. After Mass the funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery where he was laid to rest. Fr. Michael Joseph Ryan P.P. officiated at the graveside in the presence of a large concourse of mourners paying their final respects to a Christian friend.







By 2030 World Population Could Reach Nine Billion





THISis a quick and easy dish with a piquant sauce that just makes itself.

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

15ml vegetable oil

15g butter

1 medium onion, skinned and chopped

2.5cm piece fresh root ginger, peeled and finely grated

1 garlic clove, crushed

4 boneless pork loin steaks, each weighing 150g

1 red pepper, seeded and thinly sliced

45ml dry sherry

30ml soy sauce

150ml unsweetened pineapple juice

salt and pepper

Method:

Heat the oil and butter in a large frying pan, add the onion, ginger and garlic and gently fry for 5 minutes until soft. Push to one side of the pan.. Add the steaks and brown on both sides, then add the remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly together.

Cover tightly and simmer gently for 8-10 minutes until the steaks are tender and the peppers soft. Transfer the steaks and peppers to warmed serving plates.

Bring the remaining liquid in the pan to the boil and reduce for 2-3 minutes over a high heat. Spoon over the steaks and serve with boiled rice.



LEEK AND

THIS simple dish can be served as a first or main course and needs no other accompaniment except good crusty bread.

Ingredients

(Serves 4 as a first course) 8 thin leeks, trimmed 250ml boiling chicken stock 4 large slices cooked ham butter 2 tbs flour

125ml double cream 4 tbs grated Cheddar cheese

salt & ground black pepper 3 tbs fresh white breadcrumbs

Method:

ARRANGE the leeks side by side in a wide pan. Pour in the boiling stock and bring it back to the boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for 8-10 minutes, or until the leeks are tender. Drain and reserve the cooking liquid. Preheat the oven to 200C/400F, gas mark 6. Lay the ham slices flat on a board. Place 2 leeks in the

middle of each slice and wrap the ham around the leeks. Put the rolls in a single layer in a buttered shallow baking dish.

Melt 30g of butter in a saucepan. Blend in the flour and stir over a low heat for 1 minute to make a pale roux. Gradually add 125ml of the reserved leek cooking liquid, stirring vigorously to prevent lumps forming. Stirring constantly bring the sauce to the boil. Stir in the cream and, as soon as the sauce returns to the boil, remove from the heat.

Beat in half of the cheese and season to taste and pour the sauce over the rolled leeks.

Mix the breadcrumbs and the remaining cheese together and sprinkle over the sauce. Dot with small

pieces of butter. Bake the leeks for 30 minutes, or until thy are hot and golden brown on top. Allow the dish to rest for 10 minutes before serving.

RASPBERRY

USE fresh or frozen raspberries for this delightful dessert.

Serve the mousse decorated with whole raspberries and whipped cream.

Ingredients: (Serves 6) 15g gelatin 500g fresh raspberries or 750g frozen raspberries 250ml double cream

4 tbs castor sugar 4 eggs, separated 120g macaroons

Method: Dissolve the gelatin in 2 tbs of water in a cup placed in a pan of hot

water. put the raspberries in a blender and purée at high speed.

Line a strainer with cheesecloth or muslin and strain the purée through it into a bowl. Set In the top of a double saucepan, whisk the cream, sugar and egg yolks togeth-


Put the pan over barely simmering hot water and cook, whisking until the custard is thick and smooth

Stir in the dissolved gelatin and the raspberry purée and set aside to cool, stirring occasionally.

Whip the egg whites until they are stiff and fold them gently but thoroughly, into the raspberry cream mixture. Put the mixture into a serving bowl. Cover it and put it in the refrigerator until the mousse has nearly set. Meanwhile, crush the macaroons into coarse crumbs with a rolling pin. Remove the mousse from the refrigerator and fold in

the macaroon crumbs. Cover the bowl and return it to the refrigerator and chill for 4 hours, or until the mousse has completely set.

Flowering Trees with Malus, Amelanchier, Prunus Serrulata and Cornus kousa

April is the time for blossom and flowers on trees. It transforms the look of ordinary streets and makes them magical. Even as the blossom falls it looks like delicate snowflakes or confetti. There could never be too much blossom in spring! So many trees are flowering now that there's a wonderful range of ornamental trees to choose from. 

Scheme to Improve Collection Service to Farmers

Order your collection of farm plastics (sheet & wrap silage plastic) by completing the collection request form opposite. This new method of ordering a farm plastic collection will replace the older system of phoning in your plastic collection request.

Farmers will be informed when to expect a collection based on the first 4 digits of your herd number as this relates to your D.E.D. (District Electoral Division) number.

COLLECTION REQUESTS MUST NOW BE IN WRITING TO **GUARANTEE COLLECTION FROM YOUR FARM**

SMS text messaging will be the main method used to confirm that your request has been received and logged and it will also be used to notify you of your estimated time of collection. If no mobile number is available, the IFFPG collector will make an attempt to contact you by phone 2-3 days in advance of collection. There will also be a number printed in the Farmers Journal during summer months which you can text to find out when to expect a collection or you may also contact our free-phone number regarding such queries.

If you have less than the required minimum amount for collection, please store plastic and wait until you have the required amount unless requested to do otherwise.

Please note: Farm plastics (sheet & wrap) contaminated with other plastics or other foreign objects will not be collected. Ensure storage area has access for rigid truck.
