Crystal To Shut Plant And Axe 400 Jobs

UNIONS TO FIGHT CLOSURE PLANS

The nightmare scenario came to pass last week as Waterford Crystal announced the closure of its Dungarvan plant with the loss of almost 400 jobs.

Despite months of speculation, last Wednesday's decision, announced to workers at a special meeting in Lawlors Hotel, was a hammer-blow to the entire community, and was greeted with a mixture of out-

rage and devastation by the workforce.

Hopes that short-time working, and other cost-cutting measures, would be rewarded with investment in the plant, were completely shattered by the company's decision. Business leaders are also bracing themselves for the massive loss to the local economy. Chamber of Commerce president, Ann Marie Rossiter estimated the

loss to the town at twenty million euros and urged the IDA to work quickly to find a replacement industry.

Workers, many of whom had

spent their entire working-lives at the plant, were left to wonder what the future holds when the doors shut for a final-time this summer on what was Dungarvan's most prized manufacturing asset.

Its closure marks the passing of Dungarvan's last major manufacturing plant and the axing of four hundred well-paid jobs is regarded as the worst employment catastrophe to hit the town since the closure of Waterford Foods ten years ago.

Chief Executive, John Foley said the company had no other choice, but to take the "very sad and very regrettable"

Draft Development Plan Not Prejudiced By Garda Probe

The draft County Development Plan has not been compromised or affected in any way by the Garda probe into alleged staff misconduct.

County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer gave the assurance at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council. He also insisted he would not comment further on the matter until the investigation is finished.

His remarks came after Sinn Féin councillor Brendan Mansfield proposed to suspend standing orders to discuss recent media coverage of the controversy. Fine Gael councillor Damien Geoghegan also believed questions needed to be answered by the county manager.

He said serious allegations

were made in a Sunday newspaper, but the article had raised two important questions.

These were: Was an officer of the local authority under instructions not to deal with planning applications and other related matters from certain developers? And, secondly, why weren't councillors informed that a problem had arisen in the planning section of Waterford until an e-mail was sent saying an investigation was underway?

In the heated exchanges which followed, Fianna Fail councillor, Kevin Wilkinson asked the county manager what penalties are in place for councillors who make unfounded allegations against members of staff.

A number of other council-

lors also backed the staff of the council.

Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. John Carey (FG) warned that staff fear they are all being "tarred with the one brush."

In his twenty-six years as an elected representative, he went on to say, he has never had cause to say a bad word about anyone - "from the county manager to the lowest clerk."

Fine Gael councillor, Nora Flynn said certain insinuations about the elected members were made on local radio earlier that morning.

She said it was insinuated that members of the council were not doing their jobs to stop this happening.

The Cappoquin-based councillor said anyone with infor-

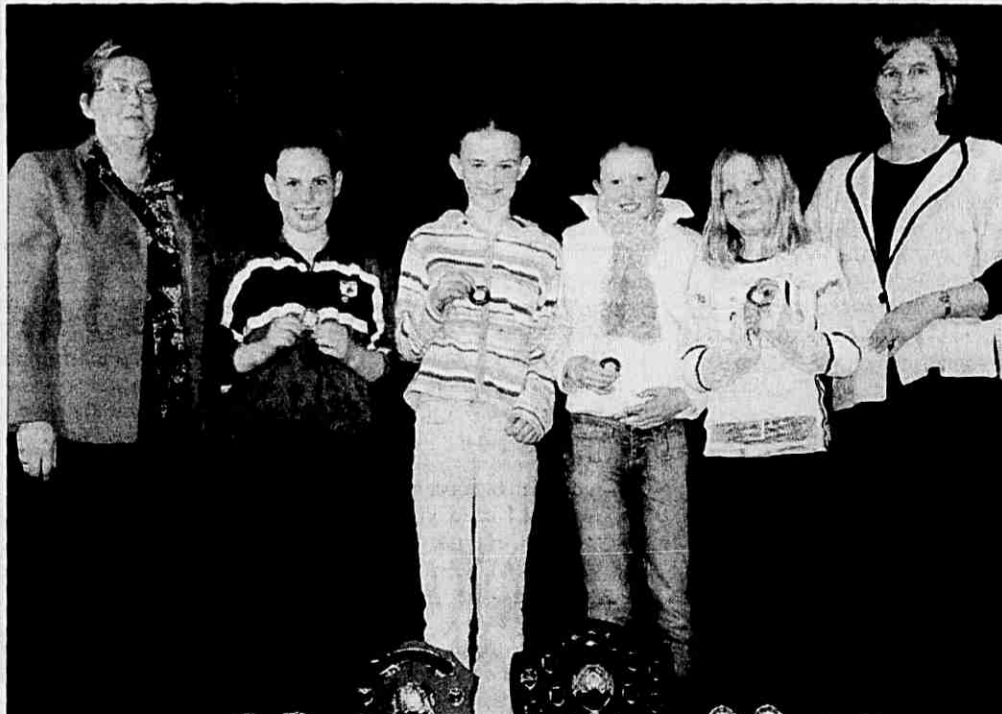

Bridge House Ideal For Ordinance Survey Offices

The Office of Public Works is being urged to rent Bridge House in Dungarvan for the Ordnance Survey of Ireland which plans to relocate to Dungarvan under the Decentralisation Programme.

Labour councillor Billy Kyne urged for Dungarvan Town

Council to take a more proactive approach in moving forward the decentralisation programme. He said Bridge House has been on the market for some time.

Bridge House is viewed as an ideal location for the office, and is on the market since an I.T. firm moved its Headquarters to

Cork City.

Cllr. Kyne said the staff of the OSI are in favour of moving to Dungarvan and asked that the town council do everything in its power to speed up the process.

Town Manager, Denis McCarthy said the decision is ultimately the OPW's.

"The staff may be keen but it's up to the Office of Public Works to decide."

Nothing new was heard from the OPW regarding Dungarvan since Phil Flynn's retirement as chairman of the Implementing Body. However, Dermot Gleeson has recently been appointed as the new chairman.

Chronic Fatigue Syndrome

Can you imagine what it feels like to wake up the day after running a marathon, having slept for just an hour or two, and with the worst hangover of your life? Now imagine feeling like this all day, every day for no apparent reason. Chronic fatigue syndrome, or ME, is a highly complex condition. The most common symptoms include fatigue, headaches, sleep disorders, poor concentration and memory, muscle pain and weakness, gastrointestinal disorders, recurrent infections, intolerance to alcohol, and disordered temperature regulation. However, sufferers can experience any of a very long list of other possible symptoms. It is often thought of as a new disease, but it has been described in medical literature under different names for at least 300 years.

Much of the current research into chronic fatigue syndrome seeks a specific cause such as a virus, but so far this research has not reached any clear conclusion. This may be due to the fact that chronic fatigue syndrome is a very complex condition which results from the interaction of several different predisposing and triggering factors.

The most important factor in the development of chronic fatigue syndrome seems to be stress. This not only refers to mental or emotional pressures but also to events which place physical demands on the body. People who develop chronic fatigue syndrome often experience very high levels of stress for long periods before they become unwell. This may be due to a long illness, overwork or excessive exercise, poor eating habits, or a stressful home or work environment. Many sufferers are highly ambitious and dedicated people who tend to keep going despite feelings of exhaustion.

In this state, the body is less able to cope with additional stressors such as viral infections, exposure to toxins, or severe

shocks, which can then trigger ME. It is not just the virus or other triggering factor that causes the illness, but the inability of the body to deal with it effectively. The result is a malfunction of the control systems of the body, particularly the nervous, immune and endocrine systems. The type of malfunction which occurs varies from person to person and therefore the symptoms also vary.

Because of the complex nature of the condition, successful treatment of chronic fatigue syndrome consists of a holistic range of therapeutic interventions aimed at restoring and protecting the system from the negative effects of stress, promoting rest, and addressing the variety of symptoms experienced by individual sufferers. Above all, treatment must be individually tailored since everyone is affected differently.

Adaptogenic herbs such as Siberian ginseng are very useful for improving the response to stress. They also improve energy levels and immune function. Depleted adrenal glands can be nourished with herbs such as liquorice, and nervous system malfunction can be corrected with herbs such as vervain. If necessary, antiviral herbs such as St John's wort or calendula may be included. Other remedies can be used to treat the individual symptoms. For example, there are lots of herbs which help to relieve headaches and muscle pains, to treat digestive upsets and infections, to improve memory and concentration and to promote sleep. Dietary advice and nutritional supplements are also important aspects of treatment.

It can take a long time to recover from this devastating illness, but for many sufferers an important first step is to find someone who can recognise the reality of their illness and offer a light at the end of the tunnel.

At Unicare Pharmacy we see ourselves as part of the overall healthcare system and believe we have an important responsibility to our customers to look after their general wellbeing, part of which is helping and advising customers on how to protect their skin. As part of this new programme customers will receive tailored and accurate advice regarding the dangers of ultra-violet radiation, sunscreen use, and skin cancer prevention."

The most recent statistics from the National Cancer Registry show there were 5,596 new cases of skin cancer in Ireland in 2001. There were 401 cases of malignant melanoma, which is the least common but most dangerous form of skin cancer and 5195 cases of non-malignant melanoma. 80-90% of all cases of skin cancer are caused by the UV rays of the sun, which are present even on a cloudy day in Ireland. Damage to the skin by the sun is permanent, it also builds up - damage to the skin in one year is added to damage done in previous years.

"It is necessary to protect ourselves so that we can enjoy the sun without damaging our skin," said Anne Marie Broderick manager of the Unicare Pharmacy in Dungarvan. "The pharmacy is often the first place that a person will go to get sun protection advice and it's essential they get the right advice. This is why we are supporting the Irish Cancer Society in this important programme."

Welcoming the initiative by Unicare Pharmacy, Anita Murphy from the Health Promotion Department at the Irish Cancer Society said "This initiative by Unicare Pharmacy provides a framework for adopting a systematic approach to sun protection among the public. It also promotes good practice and we are confident that it will go some way in helping to change the attitudes of the community towards sun protection and reinforce positive health messages."

Crystal To Shut Plant And Axe 400 Jobs

decision. He said it could no longer afford the substantial investment needed.

He warned that rising costs, two under-utilised crystal plants in Waterford, disastrous dollar-euro currency fluctuations and a difficult market-place, left the firm with no other alternative.

Workers, however, were furious at the way management handled the shutdown saying they were told a new furnace was going to be built and that the factory was doing okay. One former shop-steward said the workforce did everything possible to make the plant more productive.

"This is our thanks, it's just disgusting," he said.

UNION TO FIGHT CLOSURE

Walter Cullen, of the largest trade union at the crystal plant, the AT&GWU said they do not accept there is an economic necessity to shut the plant, while Waterford Council of Trade Unions (WCTU) condemned the "mass redundancies."

Cataloguing the series of broken commitments made by the company, Mr. Cullen said: "We had been given a commitment as far back as 2003 that we would be fully involved in developing the best possible environment for developing the tank furnace in 2005. They reiterated that commitment again in September 2004 when we agreed to a programme of short-time working. At that stage, there was a commitment that a decision would be made on the tank furnace by December 2004.

"They deferred and deferred a decision from that time on," he said.

He described the closure as "an exercise in returning the company to profitability, to secure the directors salaries, expenses and benefits."

WCTU President, Tom Creedon also condemned the decision saying management had "utterly failed to respond" to the financial crises, but it is the workers "who are being made to suffer while those at the top who made the mistakes continue to receive huge salaries."

CATASTROPHIC

Local representatives, meanwhile, warned of the consequences on business in the entire area.

Fine Gael TD, John Deasy said: "Four hundred jobs are being lost in a town of approximately 8,000 people, equivalent to 5% of the population of the town.

"This is absolutely devastating to the local economy, as these were well-paid jobs which helped to support a lot of other jobs in the immediate area.

"The entire county of Waterford is being hit by the combined job losses in Dungarvan and Waterford. We have two Government TD's in the constituency, one of whom, Martin Cullen, is a Minister. Dungarvan has been continually prom-

ised additional jobs through decentralisation, and it was announced some years ago that Ordnance Survey Ireland would be relocating to Dungarvan. That now seems like a distant memory.

"It's time for Minister Cullen and Deputy Ollie Wilkinson to step up to the plate regarding inward investment in the Dungarvan area."

SHOCKING NEWS

Labour Party TD Brian O'Shea said the Waterford constituency needs a specific strategy to ensure that those, who are facing unemployment, are trained to find their way back into the workforce.

"It is up to the Government to do everything it possibly can to minimise the economic damage these job losses could cause the

wider area."

Minister Martin Cullen said the announcement is a real body blow. "My thoughts are with the workers, their families and the communities of Dungarvan and Waterford. The task now is to find alternative employment and training opportunities for those affected, particularly in Dungarvan."

EMERGENCY MEASURES

Deputy Ollie Wilkinson, meanwhile, met with County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer on Wednesday last to discuss what can be done to replace the 485 jobs lost in the Dungarvan and Kilbarry plants.

"The acclaimed Waterford Crystal brand has a reputation for excellence. This has undoubtedly developed from the

dedication and excellent craftsmanship of the company's employees. Their efforts must not go to waste and they must be employed in an area that matches their skills and experience.

"We must now unite with business groups and employee representatives to redress the imbalance created by (Wednesday's) devastating announcement. My thoughts are with them and their families, and I will do all I can to help drive the effort to secure new local investment," said Deputy Wilkinson.

BADLY REWARDED

There was also criticism of the way the company has handled the situation. Labour councillor, Fiachra O Ceilleachair said the co-operation of employees in cost-cutting measures, such as short-time working, in recent times had been badly rewarded by the company's announcement.

He said other avenues to benefit the plant are not being prioritised by Crystal management in advance of negotiations, which he said, runs contrary to spirit of partnership of Irish industrial relations.

DEEPLY SADDENED

Bishop of Waterford & Lismore, Dr. William Lee described the closure as a severe blow to the people involved, their families and the local economy.

"During this difficult time, I am praying for everybody and especially those whose livelihoods are directly affected by this decision. I would now ask the private sector, and relevant state agencies, to prioritise Dungarvan and Waterford in terms of offering new employment opportunities to this great workforce, whose reputation is known around the world."

PUBLIC APOLOGY SOUGHT

Meanwhile, the AT&GWU demanded a public written apology from Fianna Fail Deputy Wilkinson for "publicly insinuating" the unions members were "not living in the real world" on WLR on Sunday last.

"Our members live in the real world every day of the week," Sean Kelly, regional organiser with the union responded, "and while we had to listen to Mr. Wilkinson's patronising and condescending ducking and diving on WLR, 500 glass factory workers jobs are under threat; negotiations with the company have just begun and I can assure Mr. Wilkinson and his fellow travellers that such idle and useless comments as we had to listen to from him on Sunday are most unhelpful to the negotiations; not alone to the Glass Factory workers but to workers throughout the county."

mation should go to the gardai rather than make insinuations about staff or members.

Cllr. Flynn's comments were directed towards to Cllr. "I will make no further comment on it as it could be prejudicial to the investigation. I have also indicated to my staff that they should make no further comment.

"You can ask me all the questions you like, but I won't change from that position," he added.

Special Speed Limit Approved At Cushcam

Bye-laws, reducing the speed limit on one of the most notorious stretches of road in the county, were approved by Waterford County Council on Monday last.

The twenty-three elected members gave their unanimous backing to plans to reduce the speed limit from 100 kph to 60 kph (40mph) on a stretch of road which has claimed a number of lives in recent years.

The special speed limit ex-

tends between a point 110 metres west of its junction with the Wood Road in the townland of Cushcam for a distance of 1,870m to a point 90m south of its junction with the Old Pike Road in the townland of Gar-ranbane.

The new speed limit comes into operation on the 1st of July.

Already barriers in front of Gar-ranbane NS have been put in place as part of a package of measures aimed at reducing the carnage on the road.

MAJOR DISAPPOINTMENT WITH FIRE SERVICES CAPITAL PROGRAMME 2005 FOR WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Waterford Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea has expressed deep disappointment with the treatment of Waterford by the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government in regard to the Fire Services Capital Programme 2005.

Deputy O'Shea has put down 3 questions to the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government, Mr. Dick Roche T.D. asking why no application was made to Waterford County Council in the Fire Capital Programme 2005 in respect of Fire Station Development Projects. In this regard Tallow, Dungarvan and Portlaw are awaiting approval.

Deputy O'Shea stated the problem in Tallow has been ongoing since 1991. Deputy O'Shea further asked the Minister when documentation awaiting approval in his Department since last October in regard to last year's approval

for Waterford County Council to purchase one new fire vehicle will be dealt with and if he will make a statement on the matter.

All too often the fire service can be taken for granted but we should never lose sight of the enormous contribution that the fire service makes to the quality of life in our County in so many, many different ways.

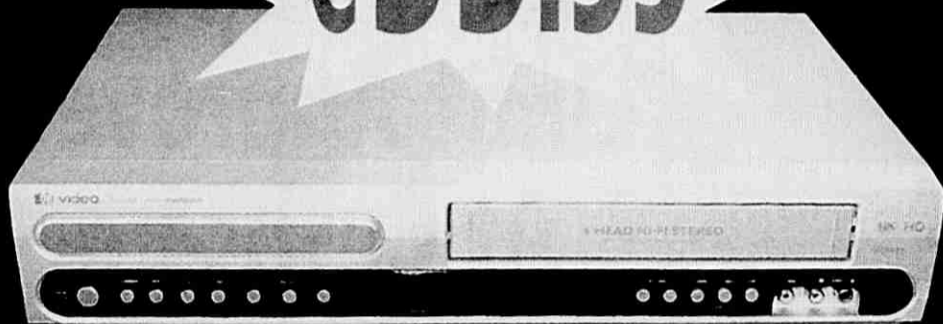

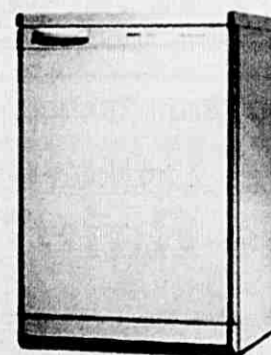

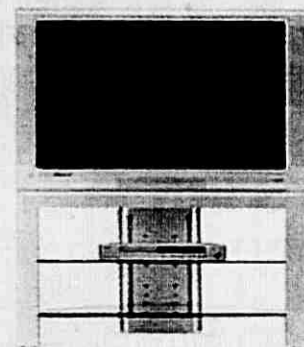

It would be the first "Educate Together" school in the county. The school would work on four principals - it is multi-denominational, democ-

COMING TO OLD PARISH

“Poor Beast in the Rain”

When I moved from Dublin to Old Parish, one of the questions asked by Dublin friends was - what did I miss about Dublin? This was awkward because at first I didn't know what to say to them. But when the question was repeated for the tenth time, I decided I had better come up with some kind of answer. So I told them that what I missed was the Gate Theatre. Yes, that was my answer, even if it was not perhaps the one they were expecting! Of course, I had very fond memories of this beautiful theatre and the wonderful productions of the Oscar Wilde plays and the hilarious Alan Ackbourne comedies. Not that all nights in Dublin theatre worked. I went to see the beautiful and wondrous Marianne Faithfull in Brecht's "Threepenny Opera" and left at the interval. Even with Marianne Faithfull, I found it totally indigestible!

When Declan Terry told me that he was considering a production of a Billy Roche play, "Poor Beast in the Rain", I remembered another night at the theatre in Dublin when again I had considered leaving at the interval. I had gone to The Peacock to see "The Cavaladers" by Billy Roche and half way through the first act it just wasn't working for me and I had

decided I would make my escape at the interval. And then, seemingly out of nowhere, the whole play came together and took off. I was captivated and at the end of the night left the theatre knowing I had seen something very special. It seems to me that Billy Roche is very much his own man, he goes his own way and has a very distinct way of looking at small town life in Ireland. He can be very funny and also very hard eyed in his portrayal of how things are. He tells stories which at first seem to consist of disconnected parts and then he unfolds the inter-relationships within the picture he creates. I am reminded of Rod Stewart singing the magical Tom Waits song, "Downtown Train". The notions in the song seem disparate, yet they come together in a poetic story that leaves you with a sense of wonderment.

That's what I believe the forthcoming Aisteoiri an tSean Phobail production of "Poor Beast in the Rain" will do. After all the laughter, you will suddenly find that Billy Roche has skewered you through the heart from the unlikely setting of a betting shop. Town Theatre Faces €1million Funding Crux

Transforming Dungarvan Town Hall into a theatre would cost over 1million euros, Town Manager, Denis McCarthy has revealed.

The cost must be raised through grants, sponsorship and contributions. But, Mr. McCarthy told members there is a lot of difficulty in raising it.

Answering a question from Fianna Fail councillor, Ann Marie Rossiter at a recent meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, he said the Arts Plan mentions the provision of a theatre as an area the county council needs to improve on.

With the difficulties the council faces in raising the money, however, it's unlikely to theatre will be developed anytime soon.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan echoed the sentiments of other councillors when he expressed disappointment that the theatre would not be going ahead in the immediate future.

He requested that a theatre sub-committee, formed before, be reconvened so headway could be made on the issue.

Meanwhile, Mr. McCarthy said maintenance work will be carried out on the Town Hall in the short-term.

From Charles Smith's History of Waterford 1745. Dungarvan (Continued).

In 1689 King James granted a new charter to this town by which the Corporation was to consist of a Sovereign, 22 Burgessess, a Recorder and townclerk, these last to be appointed by the Chief Governor of Ireland, as also of three Ser-

jeants and a Water-Bailiff. But these privileges were not long enjoyed, for upon the coming in of King William the charters of King James being granted after his abdication became useless. Formerly the parish church was a large building with an high steeple, but the whole was demolished by Cromwell. It is at present rebuilt on the ground where the chancel of the old church stood. It is situated opposite to large bason, which was made by the sea's enroachment as is evident from the stumps of trees still to be seen. The banks of the churchyard are washed by the ocean at high water, and planted with trees, from whence may be seen a prospect of the harbour and the ruins of an opposite abby and castle which makes the place no unpleasant walk. This abby of Augustin Eremites, situated on the other side of the water, opposite to the town, was founded in the 13th century, and had the Earls of Desmond as its patron, who endowed it, are said to have been the Magraths, by whom the adjacent castle, with some lands contiguous were given. The O'Briens of Cumeragh were also benefactors to it. And it had besides, the rectorial tythes of this parish.

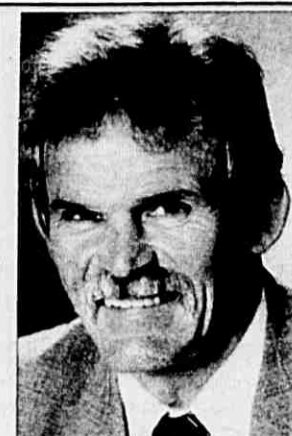

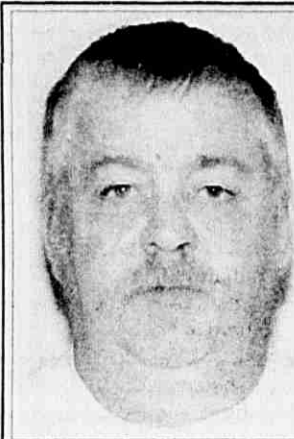

Memorial Stone to Honour Founding Members

Back in 1969 to encourage and enhance wild life in the area, a group of local men came together and created a man made pond. From those beginnings the Ardinnan, Ballybacon, Grange, Newcastle Gun Club, which remains strongly in existence today and the area now known as the Ducks Pond Wild Life Sanctuary in Kildandouge was formed. Unfortunately there are no known records held of the members going back to that time, some of those that are known to have participated are John Lonergan, Newcastle, Jamesy Duggan, Middlequarter, Johnny Ahearn, Kildangoue, Paddy Walsh, Lodge, Free Hackett Middlequarter, Ned Phelan, Lodge, Peter Butler, Gormanstown, Michael Condon, Knockballiniry, Jack Mulcahy, Cnocfaile and last but not least Phil O'Leary, Kildonogue, on whose land the pond was effected. On Sunday, 24th April 2005 in recognition of their great foresight and dedication, local Forester Dan Lynch unveiled a memorial stone in acknowledgement of all founding members. The stone, made from local red sand stone, was erected alongside the pond now a haven of natural peace and tranquillity and where many a rare plant grows plentiful. The stone was blessed by Rev. Canon Pat Delaney and he prayed for the men who had been instrumental in beginning the club and for the work they had undertaken. Ned Phelan and Free Hackett surviving members of the 1969 group were especially welcomed to the unveiling. Speakers on site were club Chairperson Robert Phelan, Dan Lynch, Area Manager Coillte, Michael O'Keefe, Chairperson of National Association Regional Game Council, Billy Bourke Nat-

uralist and Mattie McGrath, Chairperson of South Tipperary County Council. After the speeches all those attending were invited to a short walk of the surrounding area where our eyes were opened to the nature that encircles us every day but which we fail to see. Although wet weather had been forecast we were blessed with a lovely dry day, some of the ground under foot was wet but for the most part the softness of the moss cushioned our walk. The day concluded with refreshments in the Glenview Lounge, Goatbridge where Mary O'Regan, Chairperson of the Regional Game Council and Douglas Butler, Biologist spoke a few words. What was very noticeable throughout all the speeches is the high esteem in which the club is held and how much they put into maintaining our local nature reserves. Great praise was also bestowed on Dan Lynch and his predecessor Michael Hennessy for the way in which they have worked with the club down through the years. Words of thanks were also expressed to the local farmers who permitted the club to use their fields. We were also shown slides of members of the club who spent a day burning heather high up on the Knockmealdowns back in February. Part of the beauty of the pictures being the snow dusted mountain peaks in the background. Although a long day for the members it was obvious they were enjoying themselves whilst guaranteeing the future of the Grouse population. In summing up his talk Douglas Butler quoted the following words of King George VI Wild Life of today is not ours to dispose as we please, we have it in trust, we must account for it to those who come

after us. The club has asked to sincerely thank all those who attended, the above named speakers, local Councillors Michael Anglim, Liam Ahearne, Seanie Lonergan and Joan, Liam and Patricia of the Glenview Lounge.

It is with deep and sincere regret we record the death of Mr. Thomas (Tommy) O'Dwyer, Pearse Park, Clonmel which sad event took place recently at St. Michael's Unit, South Tipperary General Hospital, Clonmel. Deceased in his sixties was a well known Saxophonist and Clarinetist who played around the country over the years with various dance bands, notably Mick Delahunty, The Cowboys, the River side Jazz Band, The Voxenaires and Pat Mac Duo. According to his wife Alice, music was his life, his interest in it starting when he was a young boy, growing up in Cashel where he subsequently got involved with Creo Jazz Band. Son of Davey and Margaret O'Dwyer, Cathal Brughra Street, Cashel, he was one of a family of nine, five girls and four boys.

After leaving school he joined the Army of Kichham Barracks, Clonmel, which was a happy and interesting phase in his life, especially over his period in the Pipe Band, and as a Medical orderly. In 1960 he married Alice Byrne from Oliver Plunkett Terrace, Clonmel and having resided in Mary Street, Garrymore and Plunkett Terrace, they finally settled in Pearse Park. They had a family of five children, three boys and two girls. A great source of satisfaction to Tommy was the fact that so many of his children were interested in music, three of them having been in Banna Chluain-Meala, his son Val playing the euphonium, Declan the trumpet and daughter Majella the Clarinet. On retiring from the Army in the mid 1970's having completed 21 years service, he took up employment with the Corporation outdoor staff and was popular around the residential areas of the town on the dustbin collections. For the past two decades Tommy neither drank or smoked, and ten years or so ago he took up running and cycling. He was a familiar figure of the Dr. O'Callaghan complex on the Cashel Road, where he enjoyed keeping fit.

A great husband and father, his wife said that when he wasn't working he spent most of his time at home where he loved to listen to music. Tommy was a man, she said, who believed in calling a spade a spade, his son Val remarking that you knew where you stood with him as he always spoke his mind. Seven years ago his health began to deteriorate which to a large degree curtailed his activities and he had to retire from the Corporation. But despite the fact that he was in and out of hospital, he still managed to get in short walks most days with his little Highland Terrier, 'Harvey', which gave him much relaxation. Alice and the O'Dwyer family are grateful to the Morton Street Day Care Centre for taking such good care of Tommy for four years or so, thereby relieving the burden, particularly on his wife, who looked after her husband so well. Saint Michael's, too, where he passed away, couldn't have done more for him they said.

His remains were received at the Church of the Resurrection by Rev. Fr. John and the Friary who also celebrated the requiem Mass on the next day. A guard of honour was provided by O.N.E. on the removal of the remains to the church. On the day of the funeral the coffin was draped with the tri-colour and carried by the Army who also provided a Guard of Honour. The burial took place in Saint Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel.

COOKERY CORNER

Pork cooked in milk

THERE are many variations on this original and excellent way of cooking pork.. The flavouring can be a simple sprig of rosemary, or a few chopped leaves of marjoram, basil or fennel, fresh from the garden. About 100g of mushrooms, sliced and sautéed in butter, can be added to the sauce at the end of the cooking.

Ingredients: (Serves 6)
 1 kg boneless leg or loin of pork, derinded
 1 garlic clove, crushed
 4 coriander seeds, crushed
 40g butter
 1.2 litres milk
 salt
 freshly ground pepper

Method:
 Ask your butcher for a piece of lean pork that can be rolled and tied into a sausage shape. Season the inside of the meat with salt and pepper and sprinkle with garlic and coriander. Roll up and tie securely with string. Melt the butter in a deep,

heavy based saucepan or flame-proof casserole dish into which the meat fits fairly closely. Brown the meat over gentle heat, turning to brown all the surfaces.

In another pan, bring the milk to just to the boil. When the meat has browned, pour the milk over it; there should be just enough milk to cover. Simmer gently, uncovered, for about 1 hour. Stir the skin that will have formed into the rest of the milk and continue cooking for 30-45 minutes, until the meat is tender and the milk reduced to about 250ml.

Lift out the meat, slice and arrange in a hot, shallow serving dish and keep it hot. Beat the milk remaining in the pan lightly and scrape the



juices from the bottom of the pan. It should be beige in colour, grainy in texture and creamy in consistency; if not cook for a few more minutes, taking care that it does not catch and burn. Spoon over the slices of port and serve hot or cold.

Tasty asparagus

THIS is an economical way of making a little asparagus go a long way. Serve as it is, this dish makes a good accompaniment for all white meats and poultry.

Ingredients (Serves 4)
 250g macaroni
 250g fresh or frozen asparagus
 250ml hot single cream
 salt
 freshly ground black pepper
 2 eggs, beaten
 5 tbs freshly grated Parmesan cheese
 1 tbs butter

Method:
BOIL the macaroni in a large pan of salted water, following the instructions on the packet
Meanwhile, cut the asparagus into 2cm lengths and parboil them in just enough salted water to cover until half done – 6 to 8 minutes in the case of fresh asparagus, only 4 minutes for frozen asparagus.
 Preheat the oven to 200C/400F Gas Mark 6.
 Drain the asparagus in a strainer held over the pot of boiling macaroni. Then drop the asparagus into a pan containing the hot cream and simmer for 2 minutes.
 Season to taste with salt and pepper. Cover and put aside.
 Drain the macaroni in a colander. Return it to the pan and stir with a wooden spoon over a low heat for a minute or two to evaporate any remaining moisture. Cool slightly.
 Mix in the asparagus and the cream followed by the eggs and 3 tbs of grated Parmesan cheese. Correct the seasoning. Pour the mixture into a well-buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with the remaining Parmesan cheese and dot with butter. Bake for 20 – 25 minutes or until the mixture has set and the top is golden and bubbling. Serve hot.

PANFORTE DI SIENA

THIS flat 'cake' with nougat-like texture, rich with candid peel, tasted nuts and spices, is a real delight.

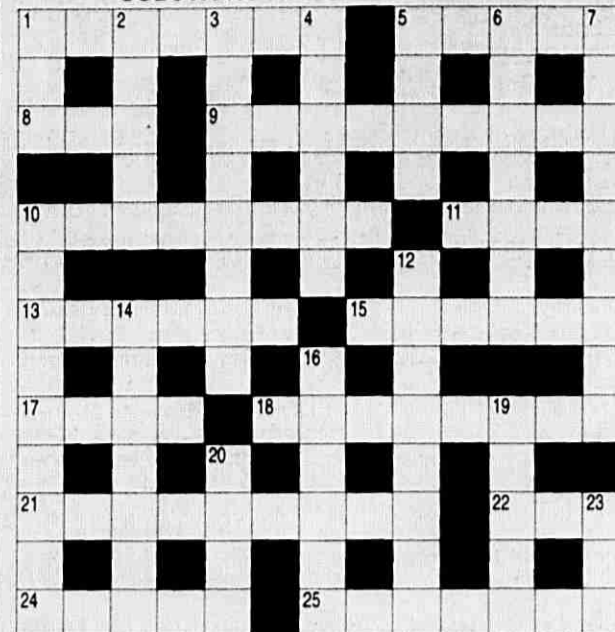
Ingredients: (Makes 8-12 pieces)
 75g hazelnuts
 75g blanched almonds, coarsely chopped
 175g candied peel, finely chopped
 25g cocoa powder
 50g plain flour
 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
 1/4 tsp mixed spice
 100g caster sugar
 100g honey

Method:
 Spread the hazelnuts on a baking sheet and put into a preheated moderately hot oven (190C/ 375F, Gas Mark 5) for 5 to 10 minutes, until the skins split and the nuts are lightly toasted.
 When cool, run the brown skins off in a rough cloth and chop the nuts coarsely. Put the hazelnuts, almonds

candid peel, cocoa, flour, cinnamon and spice into a mixing bowl and stir well. Put the sugar and honey into a small saucepan, heat slowly until the sugar dissolves, then boil gently until a sugar thermometer registers 115C/240C, or until a little of the mixture dropped into a cup of cold water forms a soft ball. Take off the heat immediately, add the nut mixture and stir until well mixed. Turn into a 20cm flan ring lined with well-buttered greaseproof paper or non-stick parchment. Spread flat, making sure the mixture is no more than 1cm thick. Bake in a preheated cool oven (150C/300F, Gas Mark 2) for 30-35 minutes. Allow to cool, peel off the paper and sprinkle the top thickly with 2 tbs of icing sugar sifted with an additional 1 tsp of cinnamon. Serve cut in wedges.

BARN OWLS

The ghostly white form of a Barn Owl used to be a common sight in car headlights at night. While their drawn-out screeches often startled people on winter nights.

Barn Owls hunt by night for rats and mice. They nest in hollows like old trees, chimneys, castles and other ruins.

Twenty years ago these owls were to be found at a dozen or more sites around Waterford County and City. Today I cannot find a single nest.

Many factors seem to have led to the decline. Some are obvious like the repair or destruction of old ruins and the cleaning up of some farmyards that used to heave with rats and mice, and were good hunting places. Nest boxes in safe places can help but the conservation of rats and mice near farm buildings is not an option. Rat poisons both lower the numbers of owl food items and some can kill the birds themselves if they eat poisoned prey.

The decline in tillage crops, work against the Barn Owl population as the numbers of rodents fall in the fields as well as in farmyards. Meanwhile, the brown-coloured Long-eared Owls are doing quite well on a diet of Field Mice, and it is a bit of a mystery as to why this is so. The Long-eared species rears its young in old crows' nests in forestry plantations and hunts along the woodland edges. Perhaps the lack of nesting places excludes the Barn Owls and perhaps the type of vegetation favours the Long-eared Owl's hunting technique.

Until some demanding research is carried out in Irish conditions, involving radio-tagged wild Barn Owls that can be found at night and watched with night vision binoculars, we will never find out exactly what hunting conditions favour the Barn Owl. How and where can they catch Field Mice?

Research like this has been done on the continent and in Britain. There the problem was easily solved as the Barn Owls were hunting over long grass for Field Voles, small mouse-like rodents that have never reached Ireland. Conservation there involves a sympathetic regime of once yearly mowing or mowing only every two years beside canals and rivers etc—and not too near to busy roads where birds get killed by traffic. Perhaps research will point a way for the survival of one of Ireland's most spectacular and most fondly remembered rare birds.

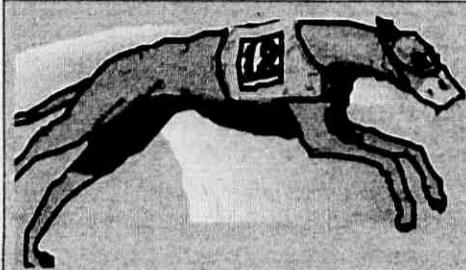

St. Flannans from Ennis beat St. Kierans from Kilkenny in the final of the Croke Cup last week as one of the curtain raisers to the Clare and Kilkenny National Hurling league Final at Simple Stadium in Thurles.

The Croke Park does not have a traditional venue for the playing of the final like other competitions do. Instead it is played at a venue that is seen as convenient to both colleges taking part.

The final has been played at Waterford venues in the past, the most recent been in 1988. The first time the final was played in Waterford was in 1970 when North Monastery from Cork beat Kilkenny C.B.S. at Fraher Field on a scoreline of 2-13 to 2-8. The referee on the day was John Maloney from Tipperary.

Four years later the final was again played at Fraher Field. This time it was St. Finbarr's from Farranferris and St. Kierans from Kilkenny that contested the final. Kilgobnet will gain confidence from this win over a club who had the Indian sign on them.

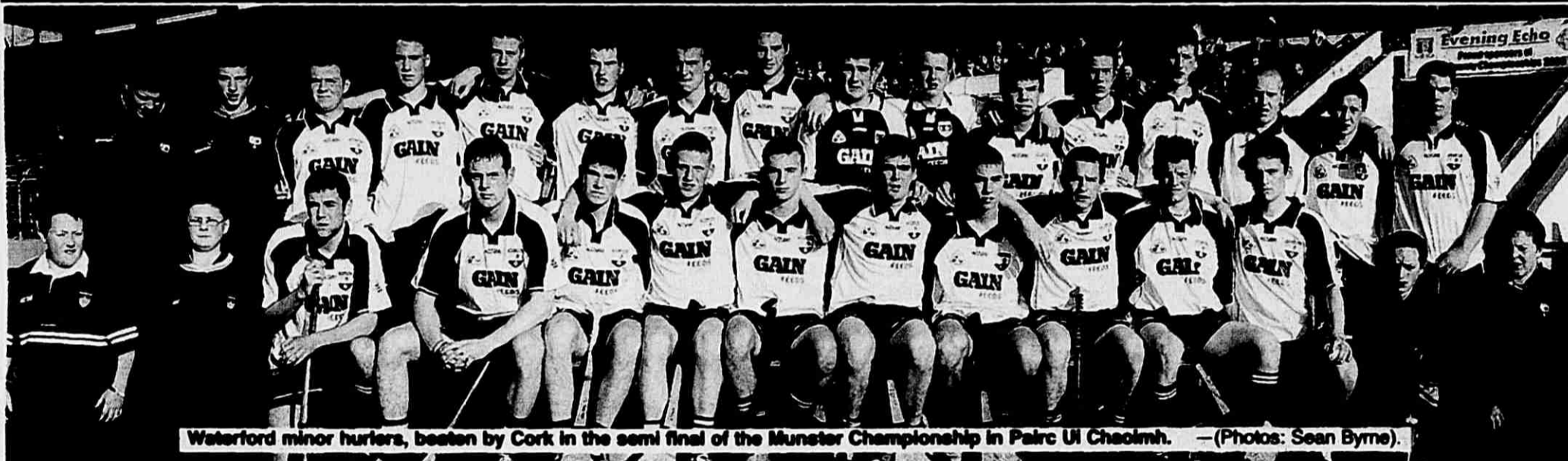

After a smashing start which saw them race into a 1-3 to nil lead after only 10 minutes, Waterford continued to stay in front and on top until the end of the first half which saw them 2-4 to 0-5 ahead and very deservedly so.

The start of the second half was a disaster with Cork scoring 1-2 within 3 minutes to draw level. The strong breeze also helped Cork who took control and scored a further eight points to

win deservedly in the finish.

Waterford were a totally different team in the second half being out paced and out foxed for most of the time.

In fairness to Waterford they were playing the Munster champions in their own ground and with several of the Cork squad having All-Ireland experience, holding them to five points was not bad in the circumstances.

Not all of the Waterford side

played to the form which they displayed in their three matches in Semple Stadium. It is good that the majority of the team (11) are still available again next year.

Waterford played with the strong breeze and in the 3rd minute full forward Craig Moloney had the ball in the Cork net.

Five minutes later John Galvin had a point that was added to with further points from Thomas Doo-ley and Craig Moloney to leave Waterford with a 1-3 to nil lead by the 10th minute against the reigning champions. It was not until the 14th minute that Cork got themselves on the scoreboard when wing forward Patrick Horgan scored their first point. They followed with scores by Cathal Naughton and Peter O'Brien.

Craig Moloney had his second point of the game in the 18th minute and Patrick Horgan brought one back for Cork who had now steadied and were more into the game, Adrian Power, brilliant in goal for Waterford saved twice from Peter O'Brien who had been moved to full forward from the centre forward berth.

At the other end, Thomas Connors whipped on a ground ball which had been lofted in by Shane Walsh from around mid-field and this goal put us into a 2-4 to 0-4 lead in the 30th minute. In time added on Peter O'Brien

pointed to bring one back for Cork, and leave the halftime score at 2-4 to 0-5 in our favour.

Second Half

As explained above, the opening minutes were a disaster and within four minutes our 5 points advantage at the break, had been wiped out.

An Eoin Murphy point was followed with a goal by Patrick Horgan in the second minute and a point per Peter O'Brien had the teams level in the 34th minute. Horgan pointed Cork into the lead in the 36th minute and now our uphill battle was in full swing. A Thomas Connors point in the 38th minute brought us level (2-5 to 1-8), but the next six scores all went up on the Cork side of the scoreboard and our two remaining points were hit by John Gorman in the 59th minute and Adrian Power (who had moved outfield from goal) in the 62nd minute.

And so ended our bid for a minor hurling title in 2005. In the overall, it was a fair good campaign with the team having played four championship matches.

Limerick who were a bit lucky to defeat Waterford by a point in a replay are now in the Munster final against Cork, they having heavily defeated Tipperary in their semi-final, also on Wednesday evening of last week.

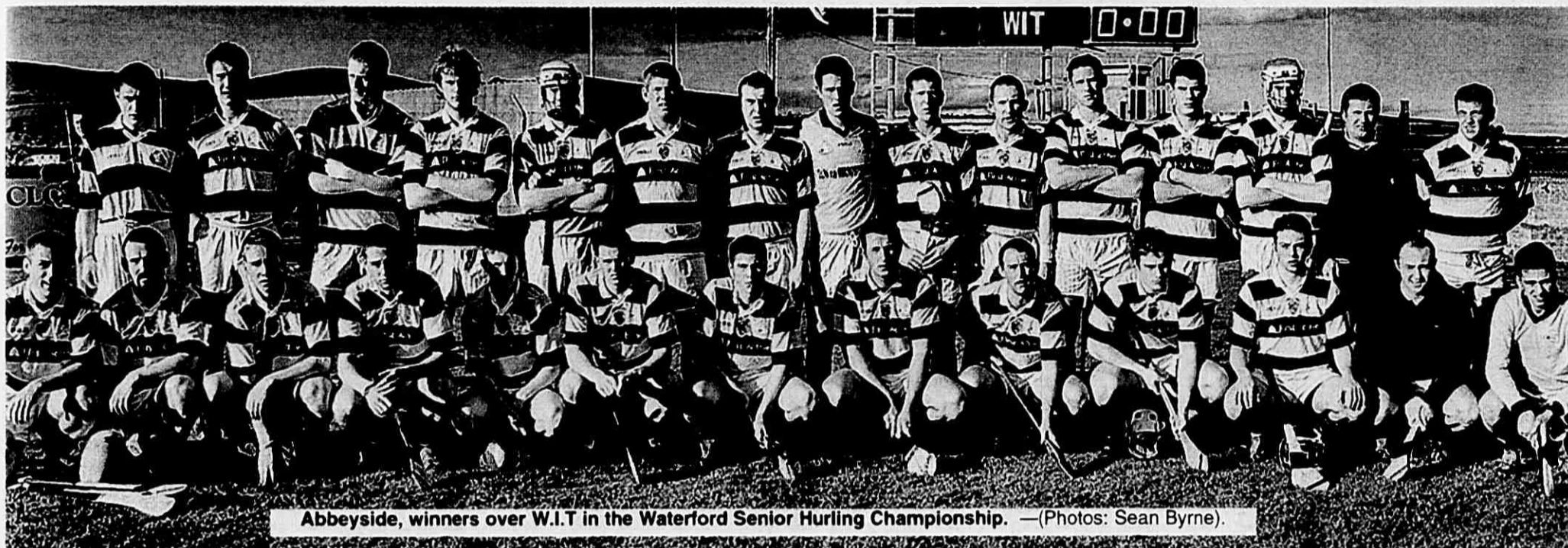
Waterford's John Gorman in possession against Cork's Ross Cashman

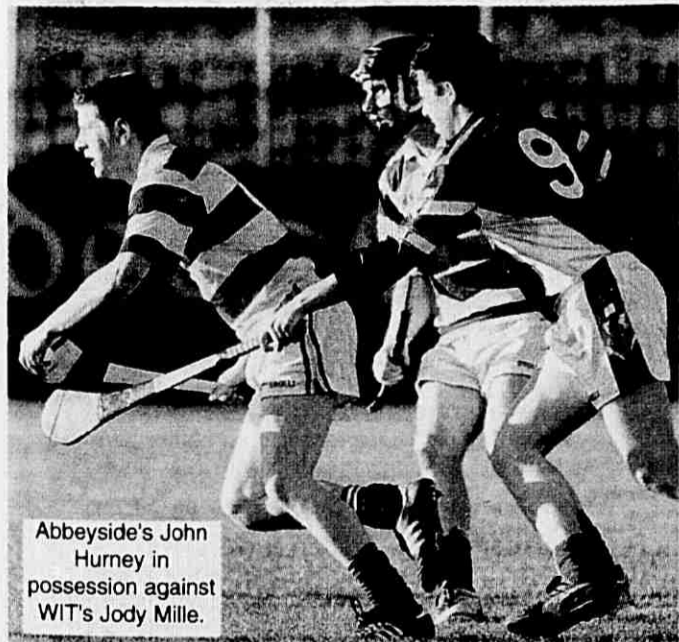
In the immediate aftermath of the game a club spokesman described this as their sweetest victory in over 26 years as it marked the club's first championship victory in this grade since 1979.

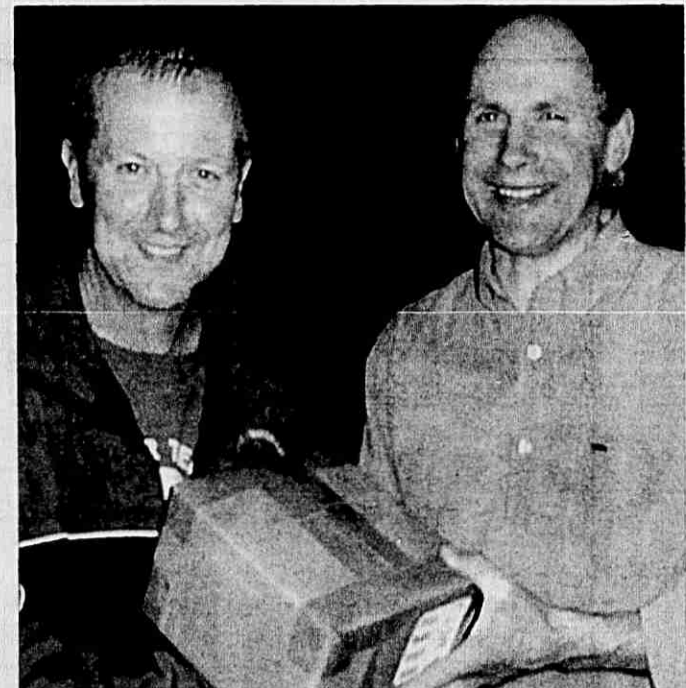

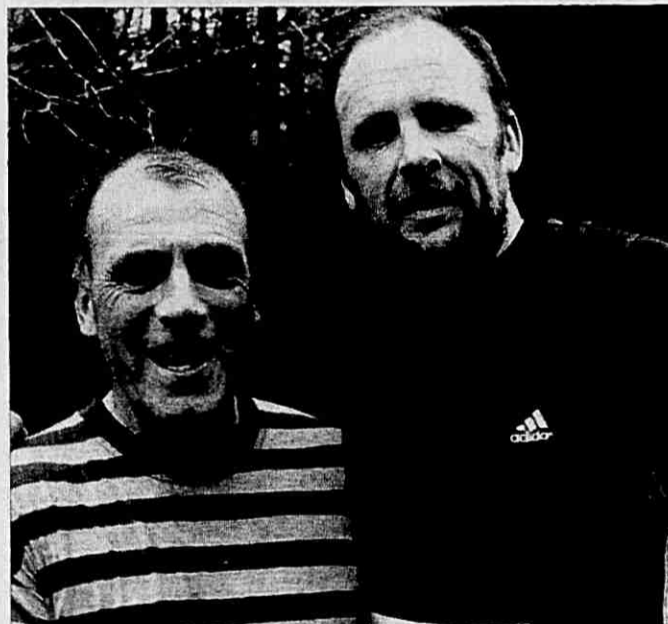

1500 - 1550 AD - The bal-

lads about Robin Hood "Lytell Geste of Robyn Hode". 'Robin and the Knight', 'Robin, Little John and the Sheriff', 'Robin and the King' and 'Robin Hood's death'. Maid Marion is not part of the original stories, but may have been added to later tales. 1508 AD - The use of crossbows was forbidden in England, to increase the use of the longbow.

1509 AD - Henry VIII, King of England, at age 18 proves himself an accomplished archer.

1510 AD - King Henry purchased 40,000 yew bow staves from the Doge of Venice.

1513 AD - Sept. 9th. 'Battle of Flodden', fought near Branxton, Northumberland. James IV, King of Scotland,

crossed the border on 22nd. August with an army of about 30,000 men supported by artillery. Thomas Howard, Earl of Surrey, gathered an army of about 20,000 to oppose him. Fearing that the Scots would retreat to the border, Surrey issued a challenge to James, who agreed to wait until September 9th. to fight. The battle began in the late afternoon. The Scots fought stubbornly, but the English 2.5 metre long bill (a staff ending in a hooked-shaped blade) proved superior to the Scottish 4.5 metre long spear and English archers proved decisive on the Scottish right. By nightfall the Scottish army was annihilated. James was killed, together with at least 10,000 of his men.

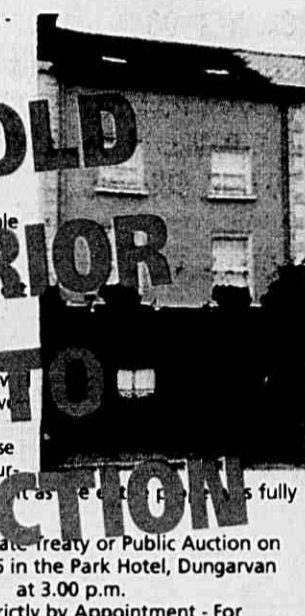

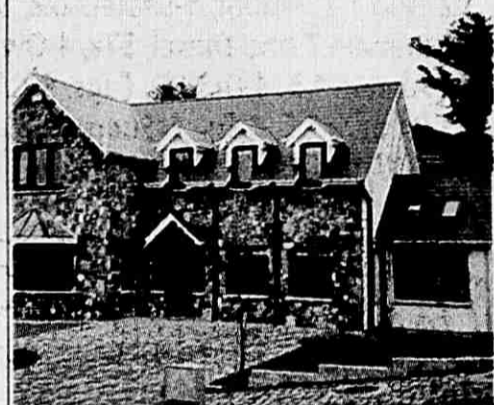

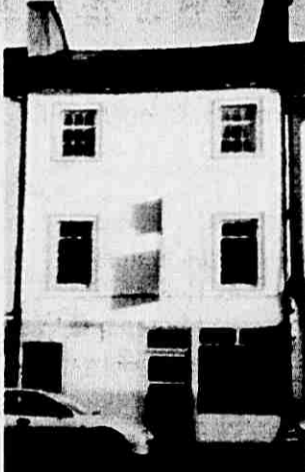
