

Transport Minister Addresses Chamber Of Commerce

Transport Minister, Martin Cullen dampened hopes that Waterford Crystal will reconsider shutting-down all manufacturing operations at its Dungarvan plant, saying there is no indication of a rethink by

Addressing a meeting of Dungarvan & West Waterford Chamber of Commerce, Minister Cullen said Dungarvan needs to refocus its attention to attract in new business.

The meeting was held in the wake of Crystal's decision to

shut the plant and axe nearly four hundred jobs in Dungarvan - a decision that's likely to result in the loss of up to twenty million euros from the town each year.

"People are trying to find ways and means of keeping Waterford Crystal open and manufacturing in Dungarvan," the Transport Minister told the gathering of business interests at Clonea Strand Hotel. "That is as admirable as it is understandable. But I don't see any indication from the company (Continued on Page 21)

Lack Of Services Hampering Tallow's Development

100 Gather At Tallow Business & Traders Association Meeting

A delegation from Tallow Business & Traders Association will meet with Waterford County Council officials to raise concerns about the lack of basic infrastructure, the leakage of business to other towns and other issues which are hampering the development of the West Waterford town.

Over one hundred people gathered at the associations meeting in St. Patrick's Hall on Monday night last, including Deputy Ollie Wilkinson and local councillors, James Tobin, Nora Flynn, Kevin Wilkinson and Declan Doocey to discuss the issues.

Serious concerns were raised

about the delay in providing sewerage treatment - a service first promised in 1974.

More recently hold-ups and red-tape have further delayed the vital infrastructure until 2008 or 2009 at the earliest with Lower Convent Street among the areas worst hit.

Poor water quality, car parking and concerns about traffic in New Street - which is causing a danger to children at the school - were all raised during the meeting.

"This meeting, which was organised just within the last week, had taken the townspeople by surprise," said Chairman of Tallow Traders and Business Association, Maurice Barry reacting to the large turnout. "And it must be a hugely significant marker that the town is willing to stand up and not accept these outdated services."

Local councillor James Tobin said the meeting was very constructive.

"Ninety percent of the people there, were very concerned about the town. We hope to keep what businesses we have in the town and keep them open and support them."

Around twenty-businesses have been lost to Tallow in the last twenty years, and were never replaced. Cllr. Tobin said unless local businesses are supported, this will continue.

Herbal help for the older generation

The month of May is known in Irish as Bealtaine, which also gives its name to a festival celebrating creativity in older age. The festival is organised by Age & Opportunity who have lined up a series of events across the country throughout the month of May. To mark the occasion, this week's article focusses on health issues affecting older people.

A variety of chronic disorders such as joint problems, heart disease, respiratory problems, and digestive upsets are much more common in people over 65. Older people are also more likely to suffer from a number of different problems at the same time. To complicate things further, the problems experienced by older people are often due to a combination of several different causes. Most older people I talk to feel that a certain amount of suffering goes hand in hand with getting older, but fortunately this doesn't always have to be the case.

Herbal medicine is a holistic from of treatment which means that it looks at the whole picture instead of just focussing on a particular group of symptoms. It is therefore ideally suited to the complex pattern of illness experienced by many older people. Herbal medicine offers safe, effective treatment for many conditions commonly experienced by older people, including some for which no safe or effective orthodox treatment is available. For example, Ginkgo biloba has been shown to be effective in the treatment of dementia. Medical herbalists also offer detailed advice on dietary and lifestyle measures which are important in the prevention and treatment of disease.

In addition to health issues, the ageing process may also give rise to other problems such as reduced income and loss of independence or companionship. Many doctors now have limited time available to spend with patients and may not be knowledgeable about the range of complementa-

ry treatments available which could improve the individual's quality of life. Medical herbalists provide space for the individual to discuss these issues and offer treatment which can reduce the emotional and physical impact of such stresses. In the case of individuals already receiving necessary

orthodox medical treatment, there are many ways in which herbal and orthodox medicine can work together successfully. For example, many herbal medicines exist which increase the effectiveness of drugs or which help to support the body during drug therapy or surgery. Herbal medicines may also be used to treat the side effeets of orthodox medicines.

Older people are generally more prone to adverse reactions from orthodox medicines. Interactions between different drugs are also a common problem among older people, many of whom are taking numerous different medicines at the same time. Herbal medicine is a more

gentle form of treatment which also improves body's ability to deal with pharmaceutical medicines. In some cases, herbal medicines may be used to help reduce the dosage of, or discontinue the use of orthodox drugs in consultation with the pa-

tient's doctor. When using herbal medicine in combination with orthodox medicine it is important to anticipate possible interactions and qualified medical herbalists are well trained in this area. If you, or someone you are close to has health problems and if you feel

there is room for improvement, herbal medicine can help to provide a much better quality of life.



Old Iron Gates

This week's illustration is of a pair of iron gates that I might have passed without noticing until a few weeks ago. Then I started to learn that pre-war iron gates have disappeared from most of Europe. John O'Neill, of the Centre for Traditional Skills in Lismore wrote to tell me that in almost every European country, but not in neutral Ireland, such gates were taken away during the wars, especially in the 1940s, to be melted down for guns. A story goes around that all the collected railings and gates rusted away in great heaps, as they were quite useless for arms-making. Manufacture of these gates apparently started in earnest in the mid to late 19th century, after the repeal of the penal laws and the coming of the Land Acts and a more broadly-based land ownership. They reflect pride in farm-ownership, that grew after generations of main-

Many hedge gaps in Co. Waterford contain broken scraps of beautiful iron gates that have not been valued as they deserve. People often throw aside the old gates while widening an existing entrance to accommodate today's huge farm machines, rather than opening a new entrance elsewhere.

At one time many villages would have had a blacksmith capable of turning out farm gates with skill, imagination and style that are altogether missing from today's mass-produced tubular gates. The low-carbon iron used in the 19th and early 20th century is still available, but much more expensively than is mild steel. Mild steel can be used but has different properties and does not age in the same way. Perhaps a renewal of interest in traditional ironwork will increase demand and bring down the price of the traditional material.



Finance Minister Brian Cowen said details are being finalised on the purchase of a site - a move which could pave the way for the decentralisation of two hundred civil servants to Dungarvan.

But interest among Civil Servants in the OSI continues to be low. According to figures from the Central Applications Facility, just fifteen internal applications and 47 external expressions of interest from staff outside the OSI have been made.

Funding Boost To Aid Crystal Workers

Enterprise Minister, Micheal Martin has agreed to boost the County Enterprise Board's coffers in a bid to help Dungarvan Crystal workers if and when they are laid off at the end of this summer.

Three-hundred and ninety workers are expected to be made redundant when the plant closes in the next two or three

for help.

"I've spoken to Ray O'Dwyer already," Deputy Deasy added. "I've spoken to the County Enterprise Board. I've also asked them to go to the workers now. I've asked them not to wait any longer and to let them know what's available.

"This can be done either by putting together seminars, helping people identify business options or 'start your own business courses' or through 'one-on-one' ad-

"The cost can be borne by the County Enterprise Board or other agencies. But it is necessary that the requisite funding is in place for the demand which will be laid on the Enterprise Board in the coming year,' Deputy Deasy said.

Last year, the Enterprise Board created approximately 47 jobs, and dispersed grants of almost half-a-million euros.

Davitts Quay Pedestrianisation Plans Deferred

Dungarvan Town Council has deferred plans to pedestrianise Davitts Quay over the June Bank Holiday weekend.

Members of the council and officials, who met in committee on Monday night to discuss the issue, are instead to meet with businesses on Davitts Quay.

Half of the businesses are believed to have expressed concern about the plans, Cllr. Ann Marie Rossiter of Fianna Fail revealed at the May monthly meeting.

Now, a meeting will be held between the council officials, Mayor Michael O'Riordan, the businesses involved, the boat fears.

and what problems they think will arise.

Shopping Centre To Cut Parking Spaces

Dungarvan Shopping Centre is to cut the number of parking spaces and change the layout of Block F of the multi-million euro development.

In a permission granted recently, Lavine Ltd - the owners of the shopping centre – will relocate the proposed ESB Sub-Station, reduce the number of parking spaces by six and double the number of apartments from 10 to 20.

The height of the building will also be increased.

Block F, under construction at the moment, includes the cineplex and a mixed use building, comprising 5 retail units on the first floor and 20 apartments.

Twenty of the twenty-one parking spaces will be designated for the apartments.

Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan said the developers are already providing fifty more parking spaces throughout the entire development than they are required to do.

Replying to a question from Labour councillor, Billy Kyne at a recent meeting of the Town Council, he said even with the reduction they are still in excess of requirements.


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Lorries Using Fr. Twomey's Road As 'Rat-Run'

Lorries are using Fr. Twomey's Road in Dungarvan as a 'rat-run' onto the Youghal Road, according to Fine Gael councillor, Damien Geoghegan.

Cllr. Geoghegan, who was speaking at the May meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, said one of the speed ramps on the road was removed during sewerage works. A second speed ramp is in such bad condition that drivers cannot see it until they are on top of it.

"I don't know why they are using it as a short-cut," he said. "But they've created a "rat-run"

through Fr. Twomey's Road."
While accepting that residents are very concerned about speeding traffic, Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan said the only way to prevent it is to stop Fr. Twomey's from being an access road.

He went on to reiterate his position that speed ramps are not suitable for urban areas.

Meanwhile, the traffic "is absolutely flying by" between the Cinema and the Beeches in the town, said Labour councillor, Teresa Wright who called for a pedestrian crossing to be put in

place.
"There are elderly people living there, and they're finding it impossible to cross the road because the traffic is absolutely flying by," she said.

Town Engineer, Dan O'Donovan said a roundabout is planned at the bottom of Wolfe Tone Road, which may ease the problem.

Lackenfune Is Worst Road In Dungarvan

More criticism was heaped on the developers of an estate on the outskirts of Dungarvan for reducing Lackenfune Road to an "incredibly bad state."

Though not in the Town Council area, Labour councillor Fiachra O Ceilleachair said the disgraceful and incredibly bad state of the road needs to be addressed.

Describing it as the worst road in the Dungarvan area, he called for both Town and County Councils to keep the pressure on the developers.

"I would urge that whatever we can possibly do is brought to bare on the developers," the Labour councillor said.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG), who raised the issue at a recent meeting of the county council, agreed.

He also pointed out that the County Engineer issued a stern warning to the developers about the condition of the road.





Eastern European **Properties Seminar**



Increased interest in non-EU states such as Bulgaria, Croatia and, to a lesser extent, Romania is also notable. The questions posed by property investors remain unchanged however since last May - looking East, which location is going to offer me the best return, and at what risk to my hard earned cash? What of the Irish property market - is there any place for Irish investment property in a growing portfolio?

Eastern European Properties, a local Dungarvan based overseas property firm, is presenting a seminar in Cork Silversprings Hotel over the weekend of 28th and 29th of May - and will attempt to address these questions. Speaker, Ronan Campbell, is based in Budapest, has lived there for over 7 years, and has made a study of the property markets of Europe. His seminar has received wide acclaim and Campbell recently participated in The Investor Property Think Tank, which brought together key players in the Irish investment market to plan strategies for Irish investors.

So how do Irish investors plan how to avoid the pitfalls and choose the best location for investment? In coming to a decision on where to invest in property today Campbell stresses the importance of understanding the forces which bring about changes in the market.

Campbell suggests it is useful to use GDP per capita to indicate the strength of an economy. In those countries with low GDP per capita property prices should be in the region of 1-2 times the GDP per capita rate - low GDP countries include Bulgaria and Montenegro for example. Hungary, Poland and Czech Republic

come next as the better off accession states here we should see prices up at 2-3 times GDP per capita.

Finally we can look at advanced economies, Spain, France, Cyprus to name a few, where we should see prices at 3-4 times GDP per capita. There are exceptions, Ireland being one, where prices are closer to 6-7 times GDP per capita. An analysis of this data will suggest that Ireland holds few opportunities for the property investor whilst other developing markets seem overpriced - although at first glance may seem to hold opportunities. This study is not definitive - other factors such as interest rates, mortgage market and currency should also be taken into consideration.

So you have done your homework, decision made, location chosen. This now throws up a whole myriad of further questions. What to buy - large or small, 1 or 2 bed, new or resale, city or beach front? Campbell suggests that you think not of what you are buying, but what you will be selling. His advice - do your homework and make your choice based on what you will sell in 5-10 years time - and ensure that you can sleep well in between!



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nouncement, a series of meetings with Enterprise Ireland, FAS and the Minister for Enterprise, Michael Martin along with other Government agencies took place. The County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer was also "excellent in emphasising to Minister Martin the problems the area now faces," the Waterford-based Minister said.

Although he believes the Dungarvan plant will cease operating, he urged Waterford Crystal to keep a presence in Dungarvan: "even if that is just to use it as a storage facility.

I have impressed on the company that it shouldn't lose its connection with Dungarvan," Minister Cullen said.

Serious criticism was, however, levelled at Crystal management. The plant, a group leader in Research and Development, was - unlike Kilbarry - profitable. According to a number of statements from the floor, management had failed to tap into the European market and cater for changing tastes.

Tom McHugh An Appreciation

Heartfelt sadness coupled with disbelief was the reaction at Helvick Lifeboat Station with the news of the untimely death of our beloved Station Honorary Chairman Tom McHugh.

Tom has been synonymous with the lifeboat since 1996 when he helped organise the setting up of the station which came back on service the following year. On that memorable February day in '97 when



Helvick received it's first lifeboat, an Atlantic 21, his address to the gathering including lifeboat crew, station committee, and Colin Williams Inspector of Irish Lifeboats, was inspirational. With his knowledge of the sea, his love for all things maritime, and his ability to turn a phrase as Gaeilge agus as Béarla, we knew the right man had been chosen for the position of Station Honorary Chairman.

A familiar figure on the quayside lending his support on every occasion, whether it was at crew meetings presenting his addresses in his usual inimitable style, or at fundraisers, McHugh was the mainstay on whom we all relied; his enthusiasm, willingness, courtesy and kindly manner has been outstanding. On Christmas Day 1997, Tom a keen swimmer, led the Dungarvan Lions Club supporters into the chilly winter water at Clonea Strand to raise funds for the Lifeboat. 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Teagasc helped over 1,200 Co. Waterford farmers to complete their single payment scheme applications before the May 16th deadline. Staff worked very hard to ensure that everyone who sought an

DAIRYING: Clover after silage

Dairy farmers in REPS or farming at a low stocking rate should aim to get clover into their pastures. This can easily be done without ploughing by applying 5 kg seed/ha mixed with 2_bags of 0-7-30 per ha using the fertiliser spreader immediately after first cut silage. Clover and fertiliser should be mixed in the fertiliser spreader in the field by pouring both in simultaneously and mixing with your hand. Do two runs to avoid misses. Apply slurry, spread no nitrogen for the remainder of the year and graze before covers get heavy.

BREEDING

If more than 35% of cows are repeating you have a problem with conception rates. Check your figure for cows served more than 28 days.

Heat detection become more difficult when less cows are bulling. Tail
paint or a vasectomised bull is essential from here on.

All replacement heifers should be inseminated by mid June

 Where a stock bull is introduced check the first 5-6 cows served after 18-24 days, as up to 1/3 of bulls are sub-fertile.

WATER

Milking cows could require up to 40 gals water per day. A flow rate of 3-4 gals/cow/hr. to troughs is required. Trough size should be approx. 2-gals/cow e.g. for 50 cows 100 gals, 100 cows – 200 gals, 150 cows – 300 gals. Pipe size typically one inch for smaller herds rising to 1_inches for large herds. Connection from supply line to tank should be _ inch pipe. If drilling a well, consider drilling in a high part of the farm so you will end up pumping downhill. Remember a 2.3ft rise in ground level is equivalent to one pound per square

SHEEP: Lamb growth

Twin lambs should gain about 300 g/day during their first 10 weeks, at the end of which they should weigh about 26kg (end May). The growth rate of March-born lambs invariable drops to about 220g/day (and much less on some farms) during June. This is a consequence of declining ewe milk yield and the lambs having to consume more grass the quality of which is also declining. This results in lower weaning weight and later drafting. A reduction of 35g/day in liveweight gain during June means a loss of 1 kg in weaning weight and a one week delay in average sale date.

In April and May when pasture is leafy it is safe to graze down to a stubble height of 4-5cms when rotational grazing. However during June the base of the sward is more stemmy and less severe grazing is more desirable. Grazing down to 6cms will help to maintain high lamb growth rate. In the case of set stocking pasture height should be maintained at about 7cms.

A practice that farmers should consider more is forward creep grazing. Allowing the lambs to creep graze ahead of the ewes onto best quality pastures or after-grass can have big advantages in terms of growth rate should there be a scarcity of grass during June. Lambs need to be trained earlier. Easy enough to do if the lambs are getting meal.

Selecting Lambs

Each year we come across midseason lamb producers, some with too many lambs in the 14-16 kg carcass weight range and others with lambs in the 23+ weight range. Both ends of the spectrum are undesirable as far as meat plants are concerned and both are losing money for farmers.

Lamb carcass quality can be improve by knowing the factory weight range and penalties and adopting the following procedure

	Example	Your farm
Set target weight range (kg)	17-21	
Expected kill-out	44%	
Minimum liveweight (kg)	17/0.44 = 38.6	
Maximum liveweight (kg)	21/0.44 = 47.7	

Essential - use a weighing scales and check it periodically for accuracy. The actual liveweight at slaughter will vary with the season - lambs have higher kill-out percentage pre-weaning than later in the year. Also, KO% is higher if meals are fed. Sex and lamb breed must also be taken into account. Females will finish 1- 2kg lighter. Assess all lambs for finish - level of fat cover.

IFA Backs Campaign for Recognition of Farm Women Under Social Welfare Code

Waterford IFA Farm Family Committee Chairman, Mary Flynn, has lent the support of the Irish Farmers' Association to a major national campaign seeking proper recognition of women as workers in family businesses and on farms, and the role of women as carers, under the Social Welfare system.

"For too long, farm women have been disadvantaged under the Social Welfare Code where no regard is given to their substantial economic contribution to the running and management

After years working on the family farm, most farm women find that they have neither recognition, nor entitlements under the social welfare code. They have no entitlement to the benefit of a contributory old age pension on reaching retirement age. Nor can farm women avail of financial support from the State through maternity benefits."

An end to this insidious discrimination against women, and farm women in particular, is long overdue and must be ended immediately."

Mary Flynn said IFA unequivocally supports changes to the Social Welfare System which give farm women the recognition they deserve for their economic contribution and their role as carers.

IFA DEMAND PROPER AND FAIR TREAMENT OF FARMERS UNDER SFP INSPECTIONS

Waterford IFA Chairman Harry Gray says there's a major gap between the proper treatment of farmers and reasonable inspections, which the IFA could accept, and what's being proposed by the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Gray was speaking following a Charter of Rights Protocol meeting between IFA and the Department of Agriculture in Abbeyleix recently.

Mr. Gray said the Fischler commitment to simplification and freedom to farm was being rowed back by the Department of Agriculture with more red tape on inspections which he was not prepared to accept.

Mr. Gray said IFA was demanding advance notification of inspections, reasonable tolerance levels which takes account of normal farming practices, on-farm visits carried out by one Control Authority and a first payment in October in line with current procedures.

The Waterford IFA Chairman said through the efficient use of satellite technology and computerisation, the whole eligibility issue could be dealt with in the Department of Agriculture offices without the waste and inconvenience of farm visits and checking.







THE CATHERINE ELLEN

As a result of an ongoing program of archaeological research at the site known as the Purton Hulks Graveyard as situated on the windswept banks of the River Severn in Gloucestershire U.K., could I please request, via you readership, any information or family memories relating to the former Waterford built and registered schooner Catherine Ellen. This is required and would be most useful following the rediscovery of her decaying timbers within a collection of some 81 vessels that were deliberately run up on to the foreshore in order to afford protection to the adjacent Gloucester to Sharpness Canal

To date my research has established that the Catherine Ellen was originally built as a two masted schooner by Whites of Wa-

terford in 1862 and had the following specifications: 111 tons gross, 95 tons net, 79ft. x 21ft. X 10.5ft. deep. Following an active career and minor name change to Katherine Ellen, the vessel was bought and owned by the Moloney family, who were renowned Dungarvan ship-owners and were well known on either side of the channel possibly in the cattle trade to Bristol and the ports of the Severn Estuary. Furthermore, recent findings have indicated that the following Dungarvan & Waterford men

were employed on the vessel and subsequently went to sea in order to make a living before the mast:

Capt. Patrick Foley, Capt George Flynn, Mate John Kiely of Dungarvan, crewmembers Willie Murray, David Foley of Shell Cottage, John Pender, Primer Flaherty, P. Nagle, Michael Dwyer, Michael Kenneally, Michael Hally, Willie Terry, John Joe Young and William Coleman of Barrack Street, Dungarvan.

I would therefore dearly like to speak with any person who may be able to offer any information relating to either the vessel, her crew or cargos and would especially like to obtain any images of the vessel as to date I only have images of her following her demise to a towed barge in the Port of Bristol c. 1951 and just prior to her abandonment on the 7th August 1952.



Feeding The World

Food is something none of us can do without but the types of food we eat depends upon where we live, our beliefs and customs, our lifestyle and how rich or poor we are. Modern ways of growing food, new techniques to preserve it (such are canning and freezing) and faster means of transporting it (such as by aeroplane) have increased the variety of foods available to the richer countries.

RICE AND WHEAT ARE STAPLE FOODS

In many countries, for a lot of people, rice forms the stable diet—the basic food they eat each day. Rice is a form of grass. It is grown in flooded fields called paddies. In flat area the fields are given walls of mud to keep the water in, but in hilly area terraces are cut into the hillside and the water flows down through channels in the soil. Another type of grass is wheat, which is used to make bread, something that has been a staple food for thousands of years. Huge area of Canada, the USA and southern Russia are used to grow vast quantities of wheat.

KILBEG CREAMERY

With the success and development of the co-operative movement in the early part of the 1900's the need arose for this facility to become available to the farmers in the outling areas of the central Creameries, so the mushrooming of auxiliary or Branch creameries attached to and under the centre of same took place.

So it was in the general area of Dunhill, Kill, Ballyduff South Fenor West and Ballylaneen East and with this in mind a meeting was held in Kill village on Monday, 18th August 1924 to ascertain possible support for a Branch of Kilmeaden Co-op Dairy Society Ltd, to be erected in the area. There was a good attendance present and a follow up meeting was held after Mass on Sunday, 2nd November of that year. There was strong support from all farmers present and it was decided to go ahead with the project and have the new creamery in operation for the next milking season. At the monthly meeting of the elected committee of Kilmeaden Co-op Society Ltd, held on 12th December 1924 it was formerly ratified to build its second branch Creamery in the general Kill/Dunhill area. Over the Christmas period canvassing for shareholders for the new Co-op branch area continued. Kilmeaden Co-op General Manager Denis Murphy, Branch Manager Joe Kennedy and John Kiersey an elected committee member for the Carrols Cross Branch area, together with a representation of farmers from the new Branch area went on bicycles to the different townslands in the locality, canvassing support and selling £1 shares in Kilmeaden.

CO-OP

At the monthly meeting held at Kilmeaden on 20th January, 1925, 31 shareholders were formerly admitted into the society with a total of 836 £1 shares being subscribed for the new branch creamery area. A week later on 17th January a special meeting was held in the offices in Kilmeaden to organise a suitable site, to arrange builders, carpenters etc. for the building. The new branch area was represented at this meeting by Nicholas Fitzgerald, Ballinasisla, James Griffin, Carrickphilip and Michael Veale, Ballinagreegagh.

A one acre site on the Kill/Dunhill border was purchased from the Power family, Kilbeg and it was hoped to have the new creamery in operation for the summer milking season. The Co-op committee awarded the building contract to William Power, Stonehouse (Willie the Mason), the roofing contract went to Michael Hayes, Waterford and all equipment was to be supplied by the Irish Agricultural Wholesale Society, Dublin.

On May 8th, 1925 at the monthly committee meeting James Griffin, Carrickphilip, John Power, Ballingarry, Nicholas Fitzgerald, Ballinasisla and Robert Murphy, Dunhill were elected as members of the committee and representatives of the new Kilbeg Branch area.

On Monday 11th May 1925 Kilbeg Creamery opened its doors for the first time when 22 farmers supplied 423 gallons of milk which was separated into cream and immediately delivered by lorry which was driven by Paddy O'Keeffe to Kilmeaden to be churned into butter, while 338 gallons of skim were returned to the producers for animal feeding. On that day no butter was sold but on the following day 2 lbs butter were sold on a contra basis. By the end of that same month the 34 suppliers were purchasing all their butter requirements from the branch. So 'Farmers Butter' almost became a thing of the past. The Co-operative Movement had taken root in the locality. Kilbeg creamery cost £1,000 to build and £1,000 to equip with machinery etc. It was owned, supported and managed by the farmers themselves. Co-operation in progress.

KILL GAA CLUB

John Flynn R.I.P.

The recent sad death of John Flynn of Caheruan sees yet another member of the Kill Football team of the 50's to pass to his eternal reward. John Flynn was a founder member of the present Kill GAA Club, when together with other players like the McGraths, Walshs, Powers, Caseys, Corcorans etc came together to reform the club in the late 40's. John was very proud of his long association with the club, and being one of its longest serving members.

As a young man he was a member of the panel of Junior Championship winning team of 1950 and played in all three games in the 1951 and 1952 senior county final clashes v Kilrossanty, of course wearing the black and amber jersey. He had a great affinity with these vertical striped jerseys, and it was his wish that the original jersey of the present club be the one to be placed on his coffin.

He was a very good racontour and club historian and often recalled the games of the late 40's, when after World War II there being no cars available, all horse drawn transport was used to carry the team and supporters to destinations like Dunhill, Fenor etc. John recalled great support for the team in those years, having reaffiliated after some years absence

One of only three players to span the decade from 1952 to 1962, John Flynn eventually captured his County Senior Football medal after the disappointments of '51, '52 and '58 when coming on, as a substitute in that years County Final in Fraher Field.

Fraher Field. As a mark of respect all games scheduled for the Kill GAA Pitch over the weekend of 14th and 15th May were cancelled, John being one of the driving influences in the clubs purchase and financing of its present playing field, which was opened on 31st July 1988 by the then President, the late John Dowling. The esteem with which John Flynn was held in the club was clearly evidenced when upwards of 50 club members stood as a guard of honour on the arrival of his cortege in the village and his coffin was borne to the church by his former playing colleagues and members of the present team.

BALLYDUFF COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Ballyduff Community Council met for the month of May on Tuesday 17th last. A large attendance ensured a busy evening with detailed discussions taking place on many local issues.

Fr. Michael Cullinan informed us that a meeting will be held in the school hall on the subject of drug awareness. Unfortunately rural Ireland does not escape the problems of more urban areas, and the intention of this meeting is to make parents of young children, and the public in general more aware of the problems facing young people today.

The subject of "CareDoc" which was discussed in length at our April meeting, once again became the focal point of the evening with many opinions shared. Since we last met, our Chairman PatJo Ahern has met with a supervisor of the organization, and while all of PatJo's questions were not answered clearly at that meeting, he went on to share the detail with us. As it stands at present, during operational hours, three doctors will be available in the system for the East of the co-op area including Waterford City and environs. Based on population, one doctor will cover the Western area which on the basis of the current G.P.'s in the CareDoc group will include a circuitous area extending from Dungarvan, Clonmel, Dungourney, and back almost to Kilworth in North Cork. The feeling among the grass roots who have to live with this system, is quite simply that this is not good enough. The general feeling in our meeting was that smaller rural villages and communities are becoming lost in a system over which they have no control. It has already been noted that mistakes have been made in locating "call-outs" late at night, while anyone expected to visit a clinic can expect to travel to Dungarvan, a distance of up to thirty miles from outlying areas. Many people are of the opinion that it may be safer to go directly to the nearest A&E units, which in the case of Ballyduff will be a minimum of forty miles to

On a proposal from the floor, PatJo Ahern is to schedule a meeting with community representatives from other local impacted areas, which will include Ballyduff, Lismore, Tallow, Knockanore and Conna. If all communities speak with a single voice then may be someone might listen!

PatJo then went on to thank Paddy Jim Feeney and his "Wren Girls" who since Christmas last have raised funds to purchase a defibrillator for the community. This vital instrument will soon be in place in a central location in Ballyduff and available in the case of Cardio emergencies.

Various subcommittees also made reports on their activities at present.

The recent "Smokie" concert was a huge success with a large crowd taking time out to forget about college fees, mortgages, troublesome teenagers and middle age. Through Smokies greatest hits, a delighted crowd cast their minds back to their younger years in the seventies and eighties when their only concerns were sex, drugs and Rock'n Roll. Well done to Pat Kenny on this one, and we are all waiting to hear what's next on the entertainment list.

We are pleased to report that the local G.A.A. group have agreed to fund and manage the construction of a dug out in the community field. This will be a great addition to the field and we thank the G.A.A. for taking the project on.

Approval of grant aid has been received from Waterford Leader Partnership Ltd. for the purchase of stage lighting for St. Michael's Hall. This is a joint project shared by the Community Council, the Comhaltas and Drama Committee. Again this will greatly enhance our facilities and it is hoped to have the system in place for this years Booley House season.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

Plant window boxes and hanging baskets May is the time to fill your window boxes and hanging baskets with their summer displays. Hanging baskets must be well lined with sphagnum moss or punctured black polythene to prevent the soil from washing through. Give all your chosen plants a good watering

after planting Plant out French Beans

You may safely plant out hardened plants. Choose a sheltered place and be ready to cover the plants at night with some garden fleece or newspaper should the weather turn suddenly

Plant the beans 15cm apart in rows 45cm apart. Thin out raspberry canes

Look at your raspberry plantation and reduce the number of new canes if they are very numerous. There is no point in having more than six canes per plant and these should be quite close to the clump.

Raspberries have a habit of sending suckers up all over the bed and unless you remove them it may be impossible to get between the canes to pick fruit later.

Feed plants in full growth

It is a good idea to feed plants that are growing fast now. Most herbaceous plants are making a big effort and many are forming their flower stems. Spring sown vegetables are growing quickly and need plenty of nourishment to produce a bumper crop.

Give plants a small topdressing of a compound, quick acting fertiliser and hoe it in.

Sow main crop beetroot

May is the time to sow the main crop of beetroot. For this you should choose a long rooted intermediate beet rather than a globe variety unless your ground happens to be very shallow. Sow the seeds in drills 2.5cm deep and 30cm

Preparation: 240 mins Cooking: 20 mins

SPICE up tea time with this deliciously different chicken dish - ideal for winter evenings or summer barbecues.

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 4)

1.5kg chicken pieces 2 onions, finely chopped

1/2 cup oil

1 tspn dried thyme

1 bay leaf

1/2 tspn paprika

freshly ground black pepper

4 small courgettes

4 small tomatoes

Remove skin and bone from the chicken pieces and cut into 2cm cubes. Place in bowl with onions, oil, thyme, crumbled bay leaf, paprika, salt and pepper.


Wash the courgettes, trim ends and cut into 1cm pieces. Add to marinade. Leave for three hours.

Delicious white Cheesy-topped chocolate treat

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 10 mins

CHOCOLATE mousse with chocolate sauce. Ideal with fruit or whipped cream.

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 6-8)

275g white chocolate

2 tblspns liquid glucose (available from chemists)

1 pint (600ml) double cream

Topping:

100g plain chocolate

120ml double cream

15g butter

Break up the white chocolate and place in an ovenproof bowl with the liquid glucose and one tablespoon of water. Carefully heat the bowl over a pan of warm-hot water and stir until the chocolate has melted.

Remove from heat.

Whip the cream until thickened and fold into the melted mixture.

Pour into serving dishes or wine glasses and put into the fridge until it sets.

For the topping: Carefully melt the plain chocolate with cream in a bowl using the same method as before. Cool the sauce and pour over mousse to serve. Ideal with seasonal fruits.

vegetable grill

Preparation: 25 mins Cooking: 15 mins **INGREDIENTS** (Serves 6)

3 carrots, peeled and sliced 1 cauliflower, divided into florets

225g small broccoli florets 75g frozen peas

Sauce

40g butter

40g plain flour

450 ml semi-skimmed milk

100g half-fat double Gloucester, coarsely grated

2 tspns Dijon mustard

1/4 tspn salt black pepper

METHOD

Cook carrots in boiling water for 3 minutes.

Add cauliflower, broccoli and peas. Cook for 3-5 minutes or until vegetables are just tender. Drain well. Put vegetables in a large flameproof dish, cover and keep warm.

Melt the butter for the sauce in a pan. Add flour and cook, stirring for 1 minute. Remove from heat and gradually stir in milk. Return to heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in three-quarters of the cheese, the mustard and seasoning.

Pour sauce over the vegetables and stir to coat. Sprinkle over remaining cheese. Grill under a medium heat for 5 minutes or until cheese is bubbling. Serve immediately.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION: Can you please give the new rates of payment for Child Benefit?

ANSWER: Child Benefit is paid monthly by the Department of Social and Family Affairs for each qualified child normally living with you and being supported by you. You must satisfy a habitual residency condition or be entitled to it under EU law. Generally, if you have been resident in Ireland, Northern Ireland, England, Scotland, Wales, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man for the two years immediately prior to applying you are considered habitually resident.

To qualify a child must be dependent on you and must also be: Under age 16 or

Aged 16, 17 or 18 and attending full-time education or a FAS Youthreach course or have a physical or mental disability.

The payment is generally made to the mother of the child. Where the parents are living separately it is paid to the parent with whom the child lives the majority of the time. If the child is not living with or being maintained by the parents, then it may be paid to the person who is caring for the child. From April 2005 the Child Benefit rates are as follows:

Child Benefit claimants paid by electronic methods receive the increased rate in full from April 2005. Those on book payments receive the increased rate through a special payment in May, backdated to April. Application for Child Benefit is made on Form CB1 for children under 16 years of age and on Form CB2 for a child aged 16 or over. With so many different types of mortgages on the market it can be difficult to find the right mortgage for you. It is very important that you shop around and get as much information as possible from each lender before you make one of the biggest decisions of your life.

The housing market has experienced many changes in recent years, none more obvious than the huge increase in prices. For most people the purchase of a house is likely to be the single largest financial commitment in their lives. If you are contemplating a mortgage, try to work out your budget before you approach a lending agency. Remember the lender is in the business of selling finance. Do not misrepresent your income and current commitments to put a particular gloss on

The question that you should ask yourself is:

- How much can I afford to pay back each month and not how much I borrow?
- If the lender refuses a mortgage then it is usually for a very
- Try to include in your financial plan some of the following: An increase in the current interest rates, a financial emergency - sickness, family bereavement, etc.

Remember:

Borrowing to buy a house usually makes good financial sense provided that you do not pay an over inflated price. There is little doubt that it makes more sense to borrow and buy, rather than to rent (unless the rent is very low!).

Race Against Farming Waste

Waterford County Council is calling on farmers to get into the Race Against Waste and to reduce the amount of waste being produced on the farm. "Farmers have always reused and recycled and are ingenious at giving new life to old materials - many farmers already reuse empty containers, repair machinery and replace goods by recycling or adapting waste materials, but there's plenty more that can be done to improve waste management on the farm and to protect our environment," says Lorraine Fitzgerald, Programme Manager, Race Against Waste. "The local authority staff and services, backed up by the Race Against Waste local helpline and website, are here to support and advise farmers and household-

"The only way we can beat our waste problem is for everyone to work together to reduce, reuse and recycle at home, on the farm and at work," says Ann-Marie Kenna, EAO, Waterford County Council. "Farmers can prevent waste and reduce the amount of rubbish produced by doing simple things like reusing containers for feeding or cleaning, recycling waste oils and tyres and composting farm manure and organic household waste.

Here are some ideas on how to get into the Race Against Waste on your farm:

1. Many farmers are now switching to alternative enterprises to compliment farm incomes so why no look for new opportunities where environmentally friendly waste management and agriculture cross paths

a. Anaerobic digestion or 'biogas' plants

b. On-farm composting of organic wastes

c.Use of straw (or other residues) as an energy source

d. Growing energy crops.2. Waterford County Council provides 3 Recycling Centres in Dungarvan, Tramore & Lismore that accept wood, scrap metal, plastic and other materials, within driving distance of all farmers. Save materials that cannot be reused any more and bring them to your nearest Centre along with the household glass jars and bottles, cans, newspapers, cardboard, tetra packs and plastic bottles and bags.

Many farmers know that it is no longer acceptable to dump engine oil and filters and are now bringing them back to the garage or the local authority Recyclling Centre for recycling or safe disposal. Old batteries can create pollution unless they are gathered up and brought back to suppliers or recycling centres for safe recycling.

Next time you tidy up the farmyard think before you dump or burn old tyres or plastics. While it may seem like a cheap way of getting rid of waste, burning plastic, tyres and oils releases toxic gases that are bad for your family's health and your soil, not to mention the damage they do to Ireland's and your local environment. This practice is illegal and farmers are asked to contact their local

scheme of these materials. . Pallets can also be used on site for making composting boxes yet again, illustrating reusing rather than recycling.

3. Be careful with storage of old paints or chemicals and don't dispose of them improperly - The Dungarvan, Tramore & Lismore Recycling Centres all accept old paint cans as well as other household hazardous materials for recycling.

4. Request a farm plastics collection through the Irish Farm Plastic Producers Group

(IFFPG)

5. We have to get into the habit of stopping to think before we throw things away and always ask 'what else could this be used for?' For example, containers from animal feeds or protein supplements can be reused as a bucket. It sounds simple but all it takes is easy steps like this to reduce our waste.

6. Farm manure naturally breaks down to form a rich and user-friendly fertiliser that is increasingly in demand. The use of worms to speed up this process - vermicomposting - already happens naturally in many cases and this could be an opportunity to create some valuable fertiliser products using your farm waste. You can reduce your household waste by one third if you also compost all your organic kitchen waste such as fruit and vegetable peelings and hedge clippings.

FRIEDREICH'S ATAXIA

WHAT IS FRIEDREICH'S ATAXIA?

Friedreich's Ataxia is a slowly progressive disorder of the nervous system and muscles. This disability was named after the physician who first identified it in the early 1860's results in inability to co-ordinate voluntary muscle movements (ataxia). Friedreich's Ataxia is caused by degeneration of nerve tissue in the spinal cord and of nerves that extend to peripheral areas such as the arms and legs. It also affects upper and lower limbs, and the head and neck. There is also a particular loss of the sensations of touch and pressure in the arms and legs. Unlike some neurological diseases, Friedreich's Ataxia does not affect mental capacity. This disability usually appears between the ages of five and fifteen, but it can be present as early as eighteen months old. This disability is uncommon and is inherited, it affects both male and females and no race is immune to it. WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF FRIEDREICH'S ATAXIA? Some of the symptoms of Friedreich's Ataxia are weakness in the legs, unsteadiness in standing, difficulties in walking, speech disturbance, sensory impairment, and as the disability progresses some people will develop curvature of the spine (this is due to the muscle weakening and the person developing scoliosis). The most serious symptom of this disability is cardiomyopathy, when the muscles of the heart gradually weaken causing irregularities in the heart rhythm.

WHAT IS THE TREATMENT AND LONG-TERM PROGNOSIS OF FRIEDREICH'S ATAXIA?

Although there is no cure for this disability, many of the symptoms can be treated. Orthopedic treatment can alleviate scoliosis (curvature of the spine), physical therapy and orthopedic appliances can help with walking and standing. And it is important to remember that everyone with this disability is different, and the person may only have several symptoms, making a diagnosis very difficult, there is no way of knowing how fast degeneration will be. People with Friedreich's Ataxia can go onto lead full productive lives. If you would like further information regarding Friedreich's Ataxia, please contact this office.

Wilkinson Meets Martin and Cowen to Discuss **Waterford Job Cuts**

Waterford Fianna Fáil TD Ollie Wilkinson has said he is making every possible effort to bring fresh investment into the county after separately meeting the Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment, Micheal Martin TD, and the Minister for Finance, Brian Cowen TD, this week.

'On Wednesday morning, I met Minister Martin for his assessment of the devastating jobs cuts in the Waterford Crystal plants in Dungarvan and Waterford City. Has said it was clear we needed to focus attention in west Waterford because the scale of the job losses was such an enormous blow to the local economy there.

'Minister Martin agreed to open talks with State job-creation agencies in Waterford and to meet me again in two weeks to discuss progress. I will also be lobbying officials in these agencies in an effort to secure alternative jobs for Waterford Crystal workers and their families,' said Deputy Wilkinson.

He said his Fianna Fáil constituency colleague, Minister State agencies and Government for Transport Martin Cullen TD and Fine Gael TD Brian O'Shea also attended the Dungarvan and the wider counmeeting.

'Shortly after meeting Minister Martin, I met Minster Cowen, with the Waterford County Manager, Ray O'Dwyer, to discuss the Government's decentralisation plan. Minister Cowen said a site has been identified for Ordnance Survey Ireland and the legal formalities are being finalised with the landowner. It is our objective to make this project happen as soon as possible,' said Deputy Wilkinson.

Fifteen OSI staff have an to decentralise to Dungarvan and a further 47 civil servants have expressed interest in moving. 'I will continue to work hard on behalf of the people of Waterford and to intervene when bad news hits otherwise thriving urban centres like Dungarvan. We are unfortunately unable to stop firms taking commercial decisions that cause job losses but we do have a responsibility in Government to create the economic conditions that spur employment opportunities.

'I will continue to work with ministers to put those opportunities in place for the people of ty,' said Deputy Wilkinson.

When the well-placed Horetown Droopy was clipped from behind at the first bend Resident Guest sailed into a clear back stretch lead. To his credit Horetown Slippy went in hot pursuit of Resident Guest 4/1 but it was all in vain as Resident Guest went on to triumph by one and a quarter lengths.

The bookmakers reported holding disappointing takings on the Ace Compaction Open 300 sprint. The explanation is simple or is it. While Run For Alice is the Clonmel sprint track record holder the layers couldn't give the jolly away at 7/4 as the punters basically ignored this two bender .The reason being that the dog drawn in trap one is at a three lengths disadvantage the minute the traps go up and low and behold Run For Alice with a 16.08 return on his book was the second last dog to leave traps... All of this however should not detract from the winning performance of the Paddy Brennan owned and Paddy O Connor trained 5/1 outsider Prince Ping (Jamella Prince-Artic Gale) who ran an absolute cracker to triumph in 16.15. Darting over to the rails from his trap five draw Prince Ping railed beautifully around the two bends and despite a late rally by Run For Alice Prince Ping now a winner of eighteen races from thirty seven starts held firm to triumph by a length. In a rehash of the opening round of last season, Waterford Vikings extended their winning streak over former national champions Cork Bulls. Although the opponents and result were the same there was no further similarities to last year's

The Vikings got off to a flying start or perhaps it would be more apt to say a battering one. Playing against the wind and uphill, we knew we would have to work hard with ball in hand. Gathering the ball from the kick off, we set about doing this immediately. After two hammering drives from Dave and John up the centre, the ball was swung wide to Adam. With all the power expected of an AIL star, Adam galloped through three tacklers before rounding the full back with a hypnotic sidestep to touch down under the posts within two minutes of the start.

What ensued was to be a capsule of the rest of the match. Bulls smartly kicked towards touch where the wind and bounce enabled the ball to elude our winger and dribble out. 



The game was all that it aster when it resulted from a was ' cracked up to be' but from our point of view the result was a great disappointment as we as Munster champions surrendered our title to the defending All Ireland champions in a game that we might have drawn or even won.

Cork fielded just one short of their All Ireland side while Ken McGrath, off since the Kilkenny match in the league and Paul Flynn, also doubtful up to the start, took their places on the Waterford team which was otherwise as expected

McGrath played well but was still not able to give his full one hundred percent contribution because of the long lay off and Flynn while contributing a goal from play and six points from frees, was, to some extent, affected by his knee injury and his mobility was that bit limited.

Team captain Eoin Kelly had a superb first half and hit over some wonder scores from play. His display won him the man of the match accolade.

Brian Corcoran's contribution to the game in the early part of the second half, when he shot a great goal and a point, was a factor in shaping the Cork victory, but in fact it was Joe Deane's early goal which handed over control to the All Ireland champions at the start. At the other end of the field, one of our main 'hopefuls' John Mullane was so well 'policed' that he was left scoreless for the entire game. 



CRUCAHAIN **MOUNTAIN** RACE

SPONSORED BY BRIDGIE TERRIE'S

"This race is not for Wimps" or "Show Ponies"

The 5th Annual Cruachain Race takes place on Sunday next May 29th starting at 1pm from near the crest or highest point of the Mauma Road. The race is again kindly sponsored by Bridgie Terrie's pub and we are grateful to the Daly family for their continued support. Entries will be taken on the day at Bridgie's starting from midday. Prizes will be presented at Bridgie's after the race.

It is the third race in the Munster Mountain running championship and a big field is expected. I ran the course last week to check that the mountain was still there on a beautiful sunny day. The run brought to mind the motto of the Six Foot Track mountain marathon in Australia. That race traverses 45km of mountains and the motto emblazoned on the souvenir tee-shirts is "This Race is not for Wimps." I am sure they won't mind me borrowing their motto for the Cruachain Race because even though it is only 9km long it certainly would not suit anyone of a 'wimpish' disposition.

Thinking of Australia reminded me of another athletic category that Mountain Running would not suit. Anyone who has laced a running shoe regularly will have come across this type at some stage. He is the type of runner that can knock out fast 400m repetitions on the track on a balmy summer evening, with his chest stuck out and his wrists flicking disdainfully behind as he kicks off the final bend. Put the same runner however in a muddy field in December and he'll lose his spikes, his bio-rhythms will be off or he'll be "just too tired". He will drop out half way through and stop, hands on his knees with a pained "it's not fair" look on his face. In Australia this type of runner is known as a "show-pony" and while he is stopped feeling sorry for himself the Mountain Runner will come charging through with a contented grin on his face doing what he enjoys most. Lest anyone thinks I am denigrating all runners that can run fast - I am not. Great runners like former world mountain running champion John Lenihan who won last year's Cruachain race are as home on the hills as the track.

The Cruachain race starts near the Mauma road and drops over 3km down nearly as far as Deelish. The next 3km are uphill, not 'undulating' or 'challenging' or any other euphemism just uphill. Then there is an exhilarating 3km charge back down to the finish line. This is a tough race and anyone who finishes it will have the reward of a unique sense of achievement. Last year I published a roll of honour of the club members who have run up Cruachain to date. The feedback I got was that because they are such a modest unassuming bunch that the publicity embarrassed them - they were like rabbits caught in the headlights. Suffice it to say they'll be back again this year and would love to welcome newcomers to Mountain Running.

Everyone is welcome but maybe 'Wimps' and 'Show Ponies'

should stay at home and watch the hurling on TV.


NEW SEASON
