Sinn Fein Cllr. Reveals Details Of Committee Meeting

Waterford County Council discussed proposals to increase the brown bin charge, cut back on collections, introduce a flat refuse fee and privatisation - at a behind closed doors meeting on Monday last.

Details of the meeting - which was off-limits to the public and press - were revealed by Sinn Fein councillor, Brendan Mansfield.

He said he was making the proposals public after discussions with local party leader, David Cullinane - a Waterford City Councillor.

Sinn Fein councillors on the city council have already succeeded in stopping meetings from being held in committee.

The four proposals shown to councillors were:

- Increasing the price of the Organic Brown Bin tag from 7.50 to 8 euro
- Cutting back on collections - which would result in two refuse collection lorries being

taken off the road - one large and one small lorry - and reverting to the collection of the brown bin every 3 weeks.

- A flat fee system consisting of each household paying an annual fee of 35 euro as well as a tag for their bin.
- Privatisation

HEATED DEBATE

The decision to hold the meeting 'in committee' followed a heated debate during the ordinary business of the council, at its June monthly meeting.

Cllr. Mansfield was opposed to the meeting being held in committee, but on a show of hands, his proposal was round-

ly defeated.

"I do not feel it would be in the public interest to keep this information to myself. Sinn Fein will not be sucked in or become part of any cosy cartel," he said.

"The elected representatives were informed by the County

Manager that if information from this meeting was given to the media, that he would take a very dim view of it and in future may make decisions without consulting with any councillors. Sinn Fein view this as a derogation of responsibility.

Lismore Mayor In Shock Resignation

AHEARNE RESIGNS FROM FF OVER RADIOTHERAPY

Fianna Fail was left reeling by the shock resignation of Lismore Town Councillor, Peter Ahearne from the party last week.

Cllr. Ahearne, a member of Fianna Fail for 30 years, issued his resignation at a meeting of Lismore Comhairle Ceantair on Saturday, citing disillusionment over the failure to provide a Radiotherapy Unit in Waterford Regional Hospital.

In a brief statement at Monday's meeting of Lismore Town Council, Cllr. Ahearne also blasted the Minister for

Transport, Martin Cullen for his refusal to meet a deputation from the Cancer Care Alliance, and his 50 million euro spend on the shelved plans for electronic voting.

"I think it is very bad when the Minister for Health would not meet a deputation of people from the county.

"But what is worse still, is when our own Minister, Martin Cullen, would not come out of his office to meet them.

"It should have made no difference what group they were from - whether they were from Fianna Fail or Fine Gael or

whatever - they were from the county and they were from Waterford City. For a Minister from this county, that he would not meet them, was unbelievable."

In a further parting shot directed at the Waterford Transport Minister, Mayor Ahearne

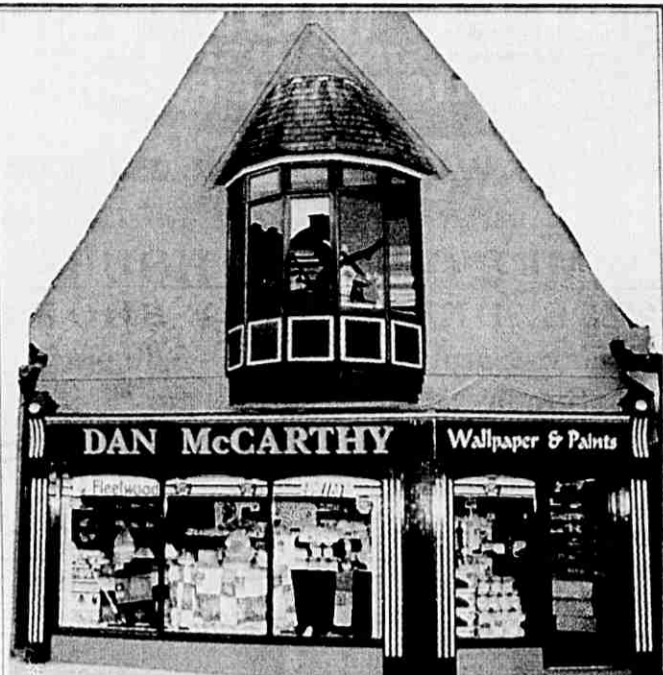

Council Steam Ahead Railway Line Development

A new strategy implemented by the County Council aims to increase tourism by making the county the walking capital of Ireland. The main aim of the strategy is to complete the purchase of 45kms of railway track between Dungarvan and Waterford City from CIE and transform it into a European-grade walking and cycling route.

While a deal was close on a number of occasions since the CIE board agreed to hand it over in 1999, it has remained stalled.

But, the council say these delays are finally being resolved, and hope the development will be underway by the end of this year.

The Waterford Leader Partnership and Fáilte Ireland have also pledged funding.

"As a direct linear route, there will be a limited need to provide and maintain signage, and most of the signage will concentrate on points of access and egress, re-assurance, community loops, and relevant services in close proximity to the trail," the report says.

"Due to the remoteness of much of the trail, loose furniture will be kept to a minimum and any investments will be as vandal-proof as possible.

"As there are occupied Railway Cottages at most of the level crossings...these, or others near the trail, could well see the potential of developing accommodation or food services."

Up to 168,000 tourists visit Ireland to hillwalk, spending 115 million euros every year. Very little of this comes to Co. Waterford with the vast majority gravitating towards the west and south west regions.

"At a time when more and more farming families are looking to alternative on-farm and off-farm enterprises to supplement their incomes, the walking tourist has significant potential. This is especially true in areas such as accommodation, food & drink, transport and guiding," the strategy says.

The council also hopes to make use of the Suir Valley Railway -

described the amount of money spent on electronic voting as a disgrace.

"To spend the amount of money which was spent on electronic voting - 50 million euros - and for it then to be scrapped completely a few weeks before the general election and spending more money storing this equipment, when it should have been put towards the radiotherapy unit, is a disgrace.

"Especially, when you think of the families from County Waterford and from Waterford City who are forced to travel up and down to Dublin for just three minutes of radiotherapy treatment when they get there.

"And I know what I'm talking about," he added. "I, myself, last year, had 37 days of radiotherapy treatment at Cork University hospital.

"I was one of the lucky ones. I am only 40 minutes from Cork, whereas people are travelling three hours up to Dublin, on buses, in cars, on trains, getting connections. And it's very hard on these people and on their families."

"Those are some of the reasons, I'm not going into more at this time."

However, speaking to the Dungarvan Leader, he said recent changes to the running of Comhairle Ceantairs had left him no choice but to resign.

Cllr. Ahearne was chairman of the local party machine, but was forced to step down from the post at Saturday's meeting due to rule changes - even though he had six months of his term left.

The move is understood to have prompted his resignation from the party itself.

Meanwhile, his decision to leave the party which he fondly says he "grew up in" and in which he has many "good friends" and people he "respects and admires" is the latest blow to a party which suffered devastating losses at the last local elections.

It also throws the council's upcoming Annual General Meeting into the balance, leaving Fianna Fail with just three members on the Town Council - the same number as Fine Gael.

And Councillor Ahearne warned, "no one is guaranteed my support" at the AGM when the new Mayor is elected.

Fianna Fail had the support of Labour councillor Mark Khan last time out. But he will be absent on business in England when the vote takes place on Monday 27th of June - as will Fine Gael councillor Orla Russell - leaving party strategists of all hues poring over the numbers for the key election - which only a weeks ago - Fianna Fail must have believed a formality, but now, increasingly appears likely to be a lottery.

Resurfacing Of Lackenfaune To Be Carried Out

Lackenfaune road will be fully resurfaced in the next two or three weeks, Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

Lackenfaune was left in a virtually unpassable condition after development work in the area, leading to strong criticism of the developers from both the elected representatives and County Engineer John O'Flynn.

Fine Gael councillor, Pat Nugent, welcomed news that the road will be permanently re-stored in the next few weeks.

ties by the County Manager."

It's the latest leak of information from the council and follows on from the controversy regarding a leak of a presentation to a local newspaper last week.

The presentation was given to the council's Environment SPC on Tuesday last, but despite instructions to keep it confidential,

it was apparently leaked to a local newspaper within hours.

Member of the SPC, Labour councillor, Teresa Wright blasted council officials, claiming the executive was the source of the leak.

Calling on the person to stand up and take responsibility, she said the executive were content to leave councillors "backbite" and blame one another.

"To say that the information was leaked by members of the SPC is very wrong," Cllr. Wright said.

Her comments followed a stern warning from the Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. John Carey about the route the council is taking.

Saying it was an issue about trust and confidence, the Mayor said it was the second or third time instructions to keep documents private was ignored.

"We were given this document and asked that it be kept private," said the Mayor, warning members about the "sad road" the council is taking in relation to leaking information.

"I was contacted about information but I refused to comment because I was asked to keep the information private," he said.

Fine Gael Councillor Paudie Coffey said confidential and sensitive matters would be discussed in committee and no decision would be made until it is discussed again in the public arena.

"The council officials view the information given during the presentation as sensitive, Sinn Fein views the information as vital," Cllr. Mansfield responded yesterday, adding that he'd promised transparency when elected.

Council Accused Of Double Standards In Planning

A Fianna Fail member of Lismore Town Council stayed away from the opening of the new County Library facility recently in protest at the double standards applied in the construction of the building.

The new library headquarters are located at the back of the Monastery building which houses the council's area office and the chambers of Lismore Town Council.

They were opened by the Minister for the Environment, Dick Roche two weeks ago.

However, Cllr. Jimmy O'Gorman said he deliberately stayed away as the council didn't follow its own regulations - which it strictly applies, to other developers.

As Lismore is a heritage town, stone walls must be replaced when taken down during construction work.

But the developers of the County Library failed to do so - replacing the wall instead with a red metal gate.

He said the decision to re-

move the stone wall was the latest evidence that the county council was ignoring the wishes of the elected members of Lismore Town Council and was engaged in double standards.

"Whoever was responsible should be taken out of Waterford County Council and transferred to the television programme 'Bob the Builder,'" he said.

"I have no problem being overruled as long as we are involved in the planning process - that's democracy. But where I do have a problem, is where people come in and ride roughshod over us."

Cllr. O'Gorman went on to call on the County Manager to visit Lismore to discuss the issue, and said he would raise the matter every month until it is rectified or his term ends.

Cllr. John Heneghan, Fine Gael, said the plans should be rechecked to see if the developers complied with them.

A report on the development will be before the council at the next monthly meeting.

Tallow Sewerage Scheme Being Held Back

Tallow Sewerage Scheme is being held back by other towns in the 'seven village' block scheme, according to Fianna Fail councillor James Tobin.

Although Tallow and Cappoquin Sewerage Treatment Plants could go-ahead straight away, funding will only be released on a block basis for all seven villages.

"Doesn't it make sense for Tallow to go ahead now and for work then to proceed on the other towns when the problems are cleared there," Cllr. Tobin said at Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

"It doesn't make sense for Tallow to be held up by other towns."

Plans for WasteWater Treatment plants and Collection systems for both towns went on public display and submissions have been received.

John O'Flynn, Director of Services, reported that very few difficulties are anticipated with construction and operation of the schemes in both towns and recommended that the proposal be proceeded with.

The plants in Tallow and Cappoquin will be capable of catering for populations of 2,557 persons - catering for a growth of the town over the next 20 years.

Ray O'Mahoney of the Sanitary Services section of the council, said the Department agreed to the development on a block basis, and will only release funding when all the towns are ready to proceed.

Construction is expected to be completed by October 2009 at the earliest.

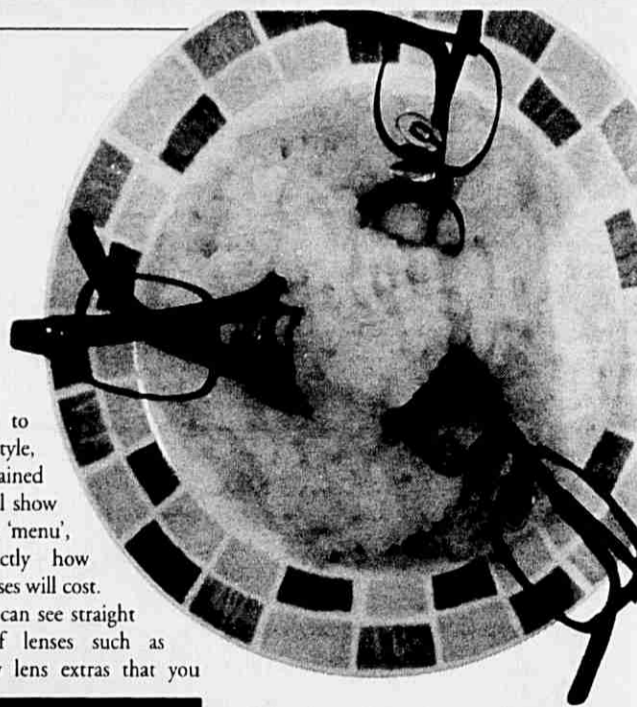

Five New Green Flags Proudly Flying Across Co. Waterford

Recently, Bunscoil Bothar na Naomh, Lismore, Scoil na Croise Naofa, Stradbally, Clonea Power NS, Rathgormack NS and Kilrossanty NS visited An Taisce's head quarters in Dublin to collect their Green Schools Award for their work in sustainable waste management practices.

Mr Trevor Sargent, TD, and leader of the Green Party, complimented all the Co Waterford schools on their achievements and highlighted some of the projects the schools were involved in to achieve their Green Flag award, including composting, litter reduction in their school grounds as well as actively promoting and implementing the 3Rs (reduce, reuse and recycle) as part of their daily lives. He also spoke of the new Arklow off shore wind farm which was inaugurated on the same day as the Co Waterford schools collected their Green Flags.

Green-Schools is an international environmental education programme, designed to promote and acknowledge whole school action for the environment. Green-Schools offers a well-defined, controllable way to take environmental issues from the curriculum and apply them to the day to day running of a school. This process helps students to recognise the importance of environmental issues and take them more seriously in their personal and home lives.

Waterford County Council Environment Education Officer, Ann-Marie Kenna, stated "the 5 schools that are here today started their Green Schools journeys

over one year ago - a journey that may have proved interesting and challenging, however, with determination, they achieved their goal of becoming a Green School. There now are 17 Green Flag schools in County Waterford - and 2 of these are Secondary Schools (St Declans in Kilmacthomas and Stella Maris Secondary School in Tramore). Next year, these schools will continue on their Green Schools journey by studying energy consumption in their school and identify how they can become more energy efficient."

"There are many benefits to schools to get involved in this programme" added Ann-Marie, as "the Green-Schools programme can help schools to: improve their environment, reduce litter and waste, reduce fuel bills, increase environmental awareness, involve the local community, gain local publicity and create links with other schools in Ireland and abroad."

Green-Schools is run by An Taisce in co-operation with Waterford County Council. Green-Schools is an initiative of FEE - Foundation for Environmental Education and is referred to internationally as Eco-Schools. At present there are 28 countries operating the programme in Europe and beyond. In Ireland there are currently over 1800 Primary, Secondary and Special schools participating in the programme, that's over 44% of all schools in the country! 435 schools have implemented the programme successfully and have been awarded the Green Flag.

"A Visit With Virginia" To Play In Cappoquin ONE-WOMAN PLAY OPENS IN ARTS CENTRE

The life of Virginia Woolfe is the subject of a one-woman play to open in Cappoquin Arts Centre on Thursday.

Written and performed by Martha Furey, "A Visit With Virginia" tells the tragic story of one of the 20th Century's greatest feminist and modernist writers.

It's will be Martha's second visit to the area. Last year, she enjoyed great success with the play at the same venue.

"It's almost like a docu-drama," Martha said of the play. "It's very dramatic. It's in costume and it has the Victorian-era set."

Virginia Woolfe was best known as the writer of 'Mrs. Dalloway' and 'To The Lighthouse' and as a member of the Bloomsbury Group - a powerful group of intellectuals and artists. But her own life was perhaps as dramatic as anything she herself had written.

Her life was marred since age thirteen by depression and almost yearly nervous breakdowns. Although enjoying success as a writer, and married to a loving husband, she continued to go through the gamut of manic happiness to depression until her suicide in 1941.

"This play shows Virginia reviewing her life, her struggles with depression and all the things

she did that were good, and those things that caused confusion. I think everyone can connect with the struggles she went through in some way.

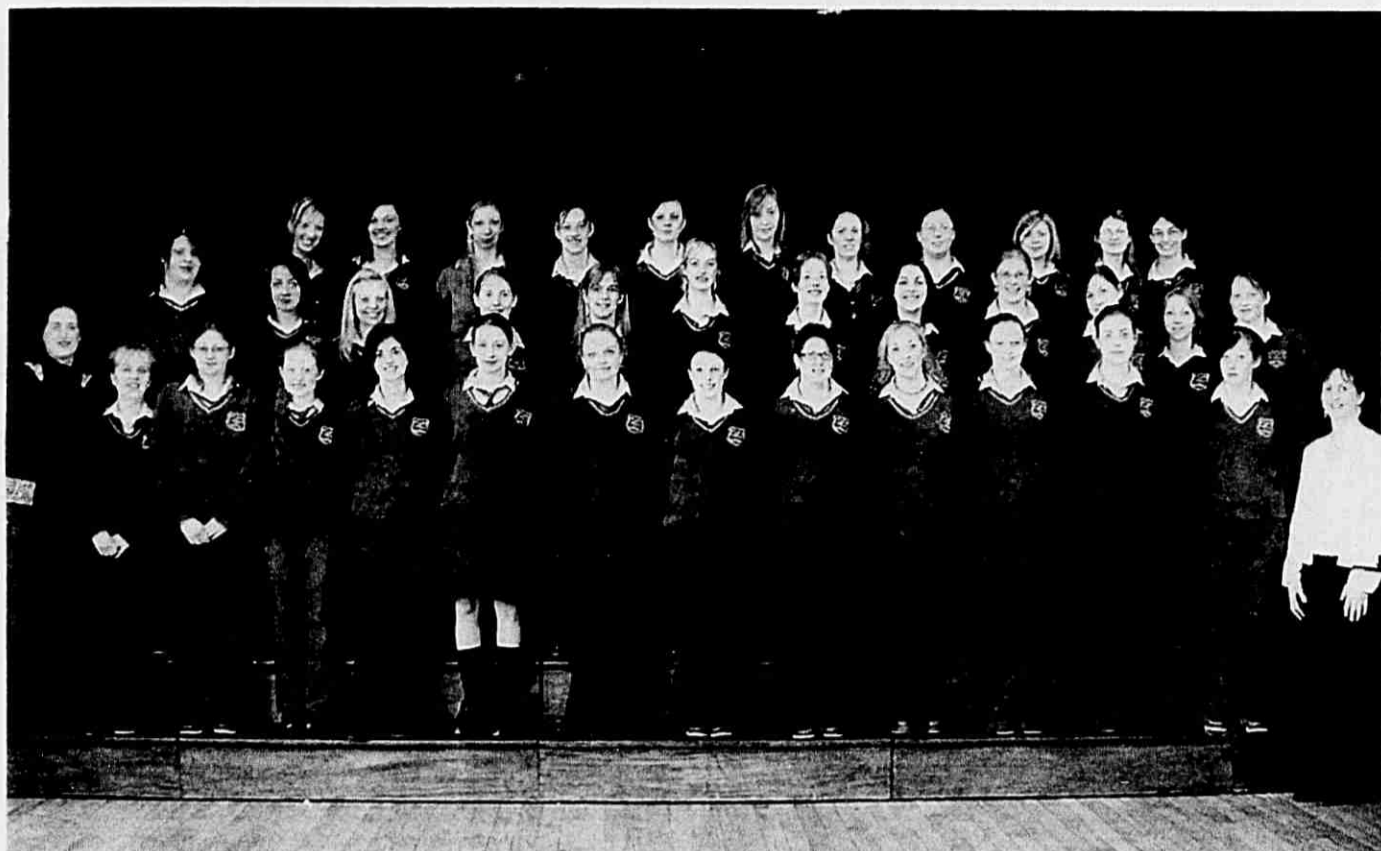
"I'm really interested in the link between creativity and her struggles because I know a lot of creative people have a depressed character. So I find it really interesting to see how creativity really can substitute for whatever is missing in that persons life, and give them something to look forward to.

"It's also a funny play at times because Virginia had a great sense of humour. I think there's something in it that everyone can connect with and enjoy."

Based in Carrigtwohill, Co. Cork, Martha has performed one-woman plays throughout Ireland and America for almost twenty-five years, twice earning four stars at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival along the way. Satellite Radiotherapy Unit At WRH Under Review

The question of networked satellite locations for radiotherapy services will be kept under active review, Tanaiste and Minister for Health, Mary Harney informed Waterford County Council.

The Health Minister was responding to Waterford County Council's call for full radiotherapy facilities in Waterford Regional Hospital.

In a letter to the June monthly meeting of the local authority, she said: "The Government's policy on radiation oncology is

based on the report on 'The Development of Radiation Oncology in Ireland.'

"The Government is committed to making the full range of cancer services available and accessible to cancer patients throughout Ireland. To this end, considerable investment in radiation oncology facilities will be provided in the coming years."

She said the Government remains "open to the provision of a 'satellite' radiation oncology unit in Waterford."

But while they are determined

to deliver enhanced services for the whole population "as soon as possible" and keep the question of networked location under active review, she said there is "unanimity about the urgent need for significantly enhanced services in the major population centres of Dublin, Cork and Galway."

"The immediate developments in Cork and Galway will result in the provision of an additional five linear accelerators," according to the Tanaiste's statement. "Five additional consultant radiation oncologists are being recruited for this service. "These developments will significantly improve access to radiotherapy for patients in the South East and

throughout the country."

The National Radiation Oncology Co-ordinating Group has also been established and will advise the Government on improving access, and quality assurance protocols and guidelines for the referral of public patients to private facilities.

"The NROCG is currently developing a National Radiotherapy Network for Radiation Oncology services. Arrangements are being made to install this technology at Waterford Regional Hospital which will enable the hospital to develop improved linkages with Cork University Hospital and St. Luke's Hospital, Dublin and reduce patient and consultant travel time."

Thermo-Auricular Therapy

Thermo-auricular therapy is an ancient form of treatment which is now gaining popularity around the world. It is a natural, herbal treatment which is particularly useful for many conditions affecting the head and neck region.

Thermo-auricular therapy is also known as Hopi ear candle therapy. It was first used by the Native American Hopi tribe of North America, and ancient wall paintings in the caves of the Grand Canyon depict the use of ear candles by shaman-healers.

A special filter inside the candle prevents any liquid wax or residue from the candle from entering the ear canal.

One end of the candle is lit and the other end is inserted gently into the entrance of the ear. This creates a gentle 'chimney effect' which draws excess wax and toxins out of the ear canal. Problems affecting the middle and inner parts of the ear, the Eustachian tube, pharynx and sinus cavities can be extremely difficult to treat due to their location deep within the skull. However, thermo-auricular therapy provides a natural, non-invasive, safe and effective way of treating these problems.

Thermo-auricular therapy is beneficial for most conditions affecting the ear, including excessive or compacted ear wax, hearing loss, earache, recurrent infections, glue ear, and pressure in the ears following air travel. It may also help to relieve symptoms of tinnitus and vertigo. Upper respiratory tract problems also benefit from this form of therapy, and include colds and flu, sinusitis, sore throats and tonsillitis. In addition it is a deeply relaxing and generally balancing treatment which helps to relieve headaches and migraines, and to promote clarity and concentration.

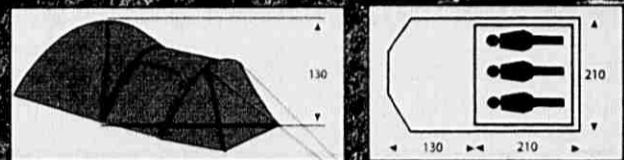

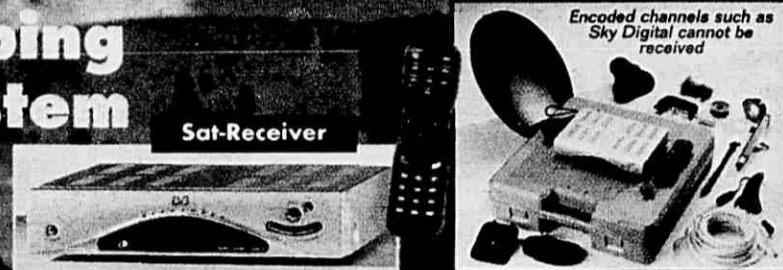

**Judge Refuses
Jurisdiction in EPA
Court Cases Against
County Council**

Judge William Hartnett refused jurisdiction on proceedings brought by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) against Waterford Co. Council and Waterford City Council on Friday last. The EPA were taking court action in relation to remediation works at the Tramore and Kilbarry landfills. The alleged charges related to breaches of conditions of the Waste Management Licences granted to the local authorities by the EPA and specifically to offences under Section 39 of the Waste Management Act 1996-2003.

In connection with Tramore landfill, the EPA alleges a failure to install infrastructure for the active collection and flaring of landfill gas and the alleged failure to cap cells to specification required by the licence.

In connection with Waterford City Council, the charges involved alleged offences in relation to leachate management, surface water run-off, groundwater management, capping of cells, monitoring infrastructure and landfill gas at Kilbarry Landfill.

On hearing details of the offences, Judge Hartnett outlined to the court that, based on the seriousness of the charges presented by the EPA, he was refusing jurisdiction. Judge Hartnett adjourned the matter until 2nd September 2005 to allow a file to be prepared for the Director of Public Prosecutions.

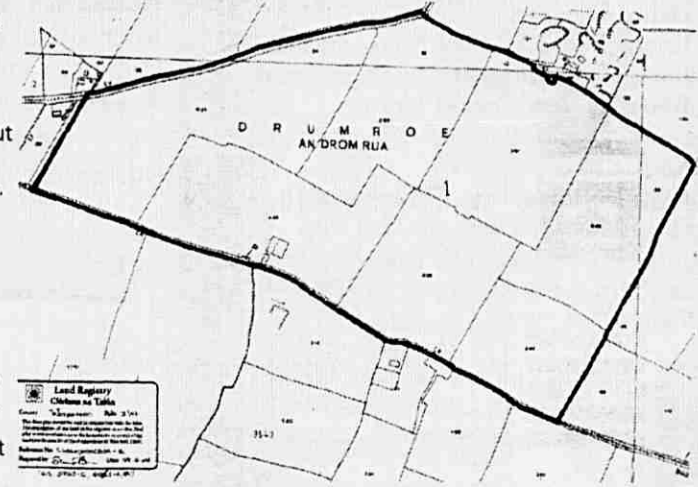

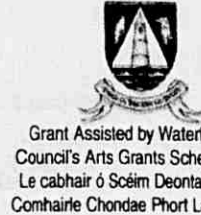

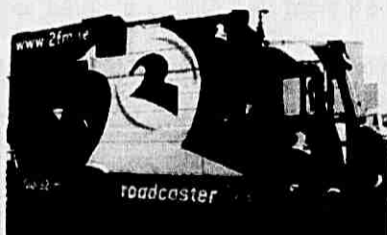

Clonkoskeran belonging to the Nugents, two miles to the east of this place, has but little remarkable, except the shell of a large house, built on the remains of an old castle, which was for many years the residence of this family. The small parish of Kilrush, which lies west of Dungarvan, seems formerly to have been a particle of it, as it is almost surrounded by it. The lands of both these parishes are well cultivated, and besides considerable quantities of corn, afford great plenty of potatoes, with which the markets of Dublin are yearly supplied, upwards of 18,000 barrels having been sent thither in one season from this place.

Gerard McCarthy also from Abbeyside was placed fifth with a most impressive 19 points.

A total of 11 images were submitted by 7 Dungarvan Camera Club members, the lowest score being a most credit worthy 14 points.

A delighted DCC Chairperson Karen Dempsey said "this was an excellent achievement by the membership, and is a landmark of the progress we have made as individuals and as a group".

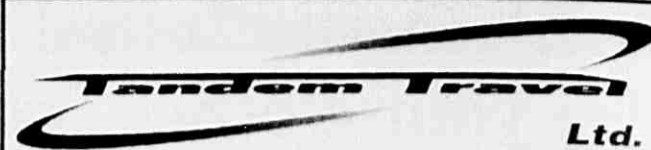

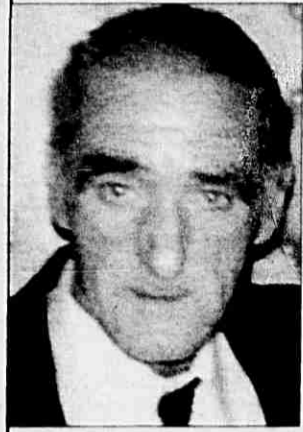

EXTRA GRANTS FOR CENTRAL HEATING

Councillor Kieran O'Ryan (FF), Knockalerheen, Ballymacarbry has received the following letter from Senator Peter Callanan, Seanaid Spokesperson on Agriculture and Food, which he has received from Mr. Noel Ahearn T.D., Minister For Housing and Urban Renewal.

I am pleased to inform you that I have today approved a further €8.96 million as part of this years central heating programme. This is the third round of approvals to date from the current years allocation. Details of the allocations now being issued to the twenty local authorities are attached. The €8.96 million now being made available represents 80% of the overall cost of the work of installing heating facilities in more than 1,600 dwellings. The balance of the cost will be met by the Councils from their own resources. The proposals now being approved are in addition to proposals amounting to almost €13million which I approved some weeks ago. The Councils principal focus will be to ensure that elderly and special needs tenants have central heating available to them by next Winter.

Application forms after local authorities have been requested and further approvals will be issued in due course. A total funding of €30 million for a National Central Heating Programme has been included in my departments estimates for 2005. I trust that the foregoing will be of interest.

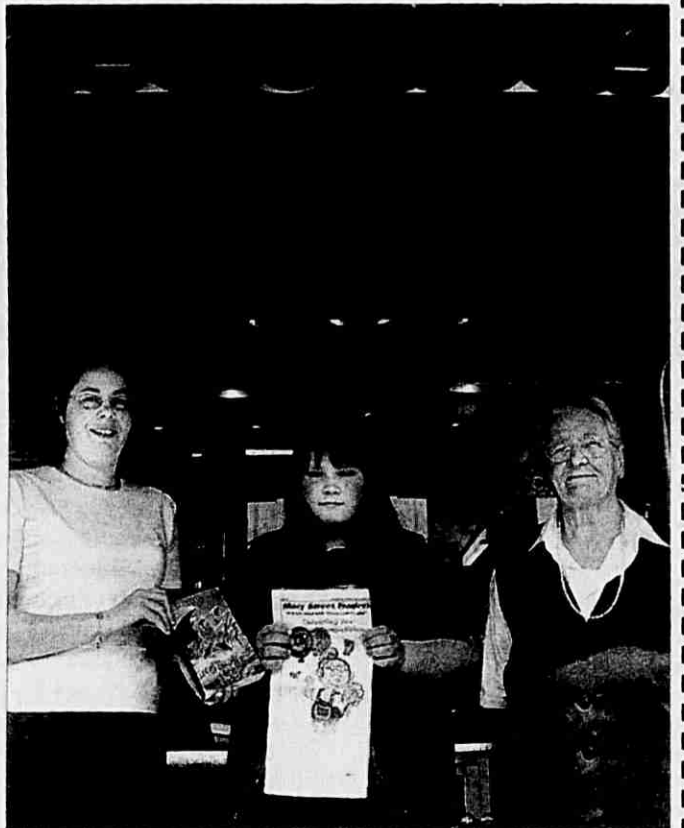

COOKERY CORNER

Serves 4

Ingredients:

2 large aubergines
10 tbsp vegetable oil
400g Farfalle pasta
1 x 500g jar Dolmio Chunky Roasted Onion & Garlic Sauce for Bolognese
2 tbsp chopped parsley
drizzle olive oil

Preparation:

1. Cut the aubergines in half lengthways and thickly slice. Heat the oil in a large frying pan until hot and then add half of the aubergine slices and tossing frequently fry the aubergines until golden brown. Repeat with the remainder of sliced aubergines.

PAN-FRIED AUBERGINES WITH ROASTED ONION & GARLIC SAUCE



GRIDDLED BEEF STEAKS WITH MEDITERRANEAN VEGETABLE SAUCE



Serves 4

Ingredients:

400g penne pasta
3 tbsp vegetable oil
600g thin slices of beef frying steak or 4 x 150g fillet steaks
1 x 500g jar Dolmio Chunky Mediterranean Vegetable

Sauce for Bolognese

2 tbsp cracked black peppercorns
50g butter
2 tbsp freshly chopped parsley
sprigs of flat parsley

Preparation:

1. Pour the contents of the Dolmio Chunky Mediterranean Vegetable Sauce into a saucepan and heat gently until piping hot.
2. Cook the penne pasta in a large pan of salted boiling water for 10-12 minutes or

5. Divide the penne pasta between serving plates and add the steaks on top. Spoon the hot Dolmio Chunky Mediterranean Vegetable Sauce over the steaks and pasta. Serve immediately garnished with sprigs of flat parsley.

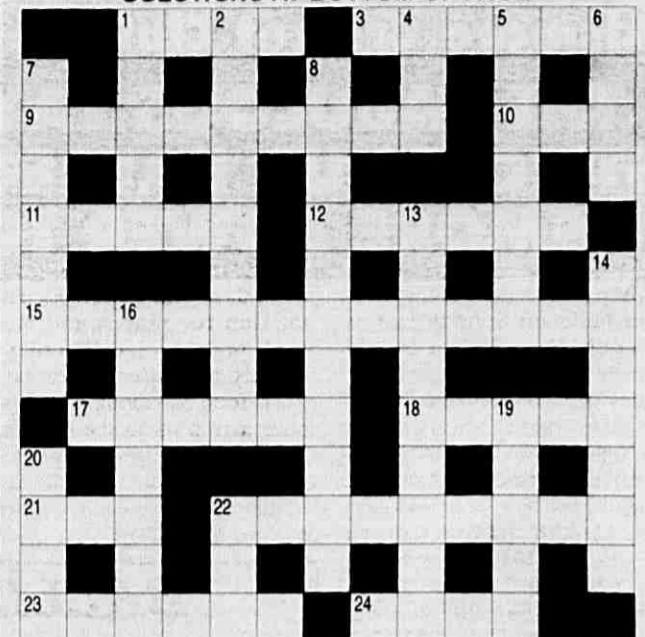

'PERENNIAL BEAUTY' WITH DIGITALIS, AQUILEGIAS AND ACHILLEA

The season for outdoor entertaining is upon us, the time when we can get full benefit from the 'outdoor room'. One group of plants, perennials, can help to deliver results that you can be proud of whilst still allowing plenty of deck-chair time. Perennials are so versatile that many will thrive in pots and containers on paved patios, balconies and roof gardens. Emerging every spring, they grow up quickly in the rising temperatures. By June many are already flowering, bringing joyful colour to borders, or anywhere they are growing in pots and containers. As well as beautiful flowers, many have attractive foliage too. If space is limited, it's important to choose plants that deliver in more than one way, or over a longer time-frame, resulting in maximum ornamental value. Our selection includes Achillea, also known as yarrow, Aquilegia (columbine) and Digitalis (foxglove). Dip into the wonderful tradition of the perennial border, mix with the best of contemporary design and enhance your garden this summer.

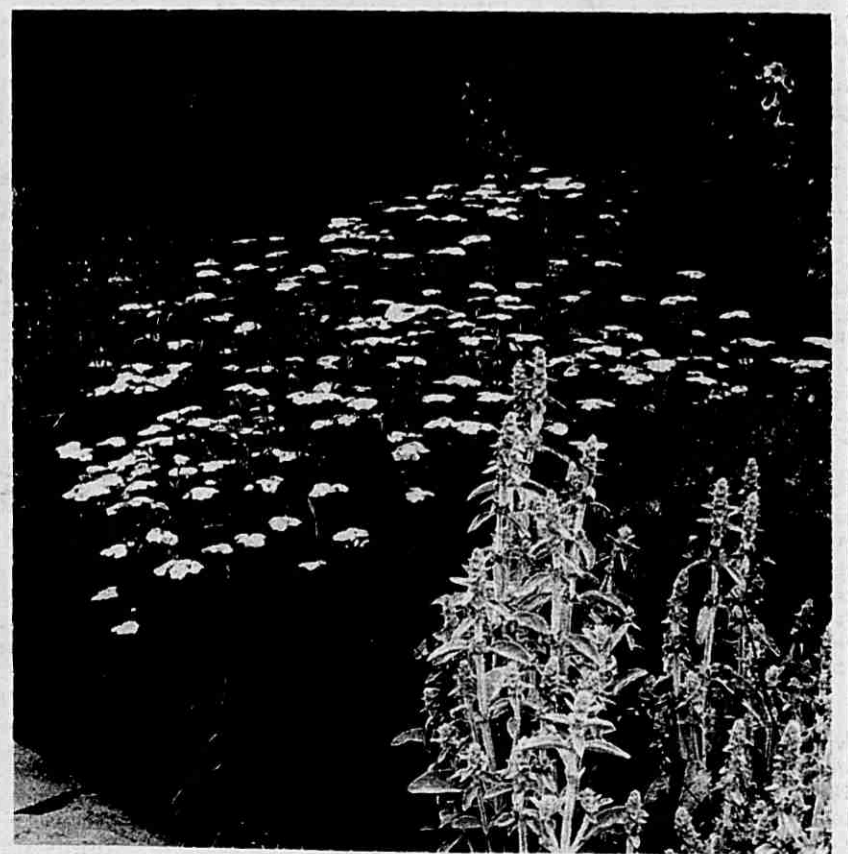
Achillea
These are perfect in wildflower or

rock gardens, their daisy-like flowers giving a naturalistic feel. Taller varieties are perfect for borders. Achillea offer a range of gorgeous colours from bright reds and yellows to blush pinks and soft whites - lots of choice for any garden whatever the colour scheme. There's an added bonus with Achillea too. They are some of the best perennials for cutting and drying so, if you're feeling creative, you can enjoy them inside or out! Look out for *Achillea millefolium*, a mat forming plant producing brilliant yellow flat headed blooms made up of many tiny florets. Their aromatic green-grey leaves add to their impact in the garden.

Aquilegia
These clump-forming perennials are ideal for light woodland settings or in herbaceous borders. For alpine varieties make sure ground is sharply drained and ideally situate them in a place that won't get too hot in summer. Look out for *Aquilegia chrysantha* with its eye-catching yellow flowers. *Aquilegia vulgaris* varieties are reliable and offer flower colours from deep vio-

let to pink and white. 'Nora Barlow' is a favourite, producing beautiful pink and greenish-white flowers on strong leafy stems. *Aquilegia alpina* produces attractive foliage and lovely blue flowers.

Digitalis
Foxgloves are real classics. Consider *Digitalis davisiana*, which will give you long stems of pale yellow flowers. *Digitalis x mertonensis* is a clump forming plant that will yield pinkish buff flowers and reach a height of 90cm. The garden centre will be able to suggest others that are particularly good for your region. Each of these is fully hardy and share similar requirements for fertile loamy soil, with adequate moisture but good drainage. Perennials do not normally require a lot of care, though some attention will be rewarded with improved performance. Tidy up at the end of the flowering season, cut back dead or withered shoots and weed at the same time. Water in dry spells, though a good mulch will minimise the need for this. Feeding in spring with bone meal or slow-release fertiliser will ensure a long and healthy life for your perennials.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I understand that Respite Care Grant is being extended to all full time carers. Can you please give the details?

ANSWER

The Respite Care Grant is paid once a year to certain carers of people in need of full time care and attention. In previous years it has been paid by the Department of Social and Family Affairs to those getting Carer's Allowance, Carer's Benefit, Constant Attendance Allowance or Prescribed Relative's Allowance. It has also been paid by the former Health Boards to those getting Domiciliary Care Allowance.

From June 2005 the grant of €1,000 will be paid to those getting one of the payments mentioned above as well as certain other carers providing full time care. To qualify, if you are not receiving one of the payments, you must be:

Aged 16 or over and ordinarily resident in the State
Caring for the person on a full time basis

Caring for the person for at least six months - this period must include the first Thursday in June e.g. 2nd June 2005.

Living with the person being cared for, if not, be contactable quickly by a direct system of communication e.g. telephone or alarm.

You do not qualify if you are working more than 10 hours per week outside the home, if you are getting an unemployment payment or if you are signing on for unemployment credits. You also do not qualify if you are living in a hospital, convalescent home or similar institution.

If you are caring for more than one person a grant is paid for each of them.

If you are receiving one of the above carer's payments you will be sent the grant automatically. If you are not, you should apply on Form RCG1 which is available from your local Social Welfare Office or Citizens Information Centre. If you are caring for more than two people you will also require Form RCG1(a). Further information on this and other carers' entitlements is available in the new edition of Comhairle's publication 'Entitlements for People with Disabilities' which is available from the Citizens Information Centre below.

Co. Council 'Ripping-Off' Businesses Say IBEC

Businesses in County Waterford are being "ripped-off" by the county council, according to a recent IBEC report.

Business have seen a 37% increase in the rate of valuation multiplier over the past five years, while over the same period inflation rose by 18.6%, the business and employers organisation said.

In the last five years, businesses paid almost 500m euro extra in rates, with the levels substantially varying across the county.

Now, IBEC say there is a dramatic and ever-growing burden of commercial rates on the business community.

"Income to local authorities from commercial rates have grown from 580 million euro in 2000 to well in excess of 1 billion euro in 2005," John Farrell, IBEC South East Regional Director said.

"It is understandable that many companies now view rates as a stealth tax given that they can raise irrespective of services provided, performance, value for money or inflation."

A nationwide league table published by the organisation shows a lack of consistency between local authorities.

The table shows Waterford County Council has the second highest valuation multiplier for the South East at 61.25 while Kilkenny at 45.62 has the lowest. This figure represents a 37% increase since 2000 - far outstripping the rate of inflation at 18%.

"Rather than assisting enterprises, local government has imposed charges which will damage the business sector as they are unsuitable, inequitable, punitive and lack transparency and value for money," Mr. Farrell said.

BEE NOTES

Something I have always had difficulty with is the idea that the beekeeping year starts in Autumn, just after the winter feeding. To my mind bees behave like many animals, but especially carnivores, in that they slumber and sleep after a good feed and should the weather get too cold they form a cluster in order to preserve the collective warmth (as baby penguins also do in the Antarctic, for the same reason). Hive activities tone down naturally. If our bees were as busy in December as they are in June they would wear out quickly and die young, which is okay in summer when the Queen is laying up to and over her own body weight and over in eggs daily but, as our Queen reduces her output to match, roughly, the input of pollen and nectar. I always thought that the Bee Year should start when the Queen begins to increase her egg production. Just like domestic fowl. Well this present year has convinced me that this would be impossible to determine so there is perhaps reason to stick to the "autumn/winter feeding" as the end and the beginning.



Way back there in early Spring, Alice, Tony, Clair and I were planning dates and times for the coming season's activities. When we came to fixing dates for our Apiary visits at Clairs in Cappagh we choose Wednesdays, not knowing then, as we do now, that in 2005 it almost always rains on Wednesdays in May from 7.00 p.m. onwards. It was a case of third time lucky after one postponement, then another, that on Wednesday 1 June we did finally meet in Cappagh and the show went on. As you all know well by now we are right in the middle of the swarming season. So it was appropriate that one of the procedures we were being shown was the Snelgrove System of swarm control. Space does not permit describing the procedure even in outline here (come along and see the results for yourselves on June 15) but it does require some additional equipment and a good memory as what step to take next. Clair herself reckons that it must be done at least three times before it becomes routine. There will be a whole lot of bees in these Snelgrove improved colonies come blackberry flowering time, which, for most of us represents our surplus honey crop - that is providing the weather holds.....! It was good to see some of our beginners in attendance and a good evening's instruction and participation in bee handling was there for all. Thanks to Clair and to those who turned up.

I mentioned swarming earlier. One thing to be mindful of is not to take a swarm that is either too small (which most of us would not do anyway) or one that shows visible signs of the varroa mite. When a colony reaches a very high level of infection then the mites fasten themselves unto the bodies of foraging bees, indeed all bees, and thus are in a position to relocate to another colony which are willing to accept them. This is the normal mode for the mite to spread and if left without the intervention of beekeepers the mite is estimated to have an annual spreading range of around three kilometres. A close examination of a few bees will show whether or not they are so far gone as to have mites on them. Others would say that if a big swarm appears anywhere then it in itself is a sign that the colony is strong and healthy, which means not varroa-free (a thing of the past in our locality, probably) but with acceptable amounts of the mite. All members, and other interested readers, could be helpful in monitoring all these feral (wild) colonies that they are aware of and passing on information to the Association as to how many are still active. This would not make for a scientific survey, but would give us an idea as to how widespread the varroa mite infection is amongst our wild bee population. I can say for the Lismore urban area that feral stocks seem to be wiped out entirely, but the same might not be true everywhere. Get back to the notes at the e-mail address below.

We still have gaps in our apiary visiting schedule after mid June. Please get in touch with Alice so that she can coordinate dates and times etc. Right now the books are fairly empty so there should be a good chance of getting your special date booked! The advantage of an apiary visit are many: free consultation from a panel of beekeepers, each with their separate advice to give, a willingness to get "stuck in" if any difficult jobs need doing and should anybody be despairing about the state of their bees.....well many heads are better than one. Even experienced beekeepers find that a visit will bring up something, like another way of performing some routine that makes more sense.

Our best wishes go out to our Chairman Tony Murray and his bride who recently were wed and are now honeymooning.

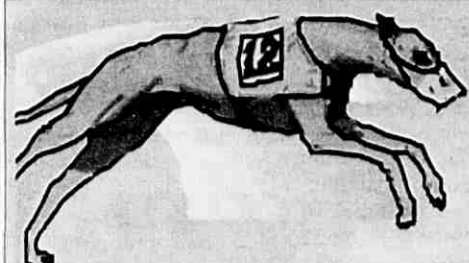

Dashing into an early lead on the fence Scallywag Zippy 5/2 was chased throughout by Molls Flyer but sticking to the task in hand Scallywag Zippy went on to triumph by five and three quarter lengths in 29.36.

Astons Girl made the early running in the fourth event but the Claire O'Brien owned Ballydurn Teddy (Fly Fright-Scallywagrunaway) 4/1 hit the front between the bottom two bends. After a slow start from trap one Rabbits Mile 6/4 was flying at the finish but Ballydurn Teddy held out by a head in 29.84.

Local trainer Mick Cronin sent out the very easy winner of the fifth contest as the G Renilson owned Jethart Mike (Fortune Mike-Pioneer Lass) 2/1 opened his account with a smooth all the way 29.45 success. In front from an early stage leading from Designer Buk Jethart Mike was never going to lose this event as he ran out a clear-cut seven lengths winner over Lleyton Girl.

In the first semi final of the Tote Retention Graded Stake Rain King made a gallant attempt to lead all the way from trap two and while he held a commanding lead on the back stretch he failed to cope with the strong finish of the Stephen Bergin owned Oneforthelads this June 2003 son of Honcho Classic and Lemon Spirit justifying evens favouritism with a flying finish to beat Rain King by a length with a staying on The Other Angel just behind in third. 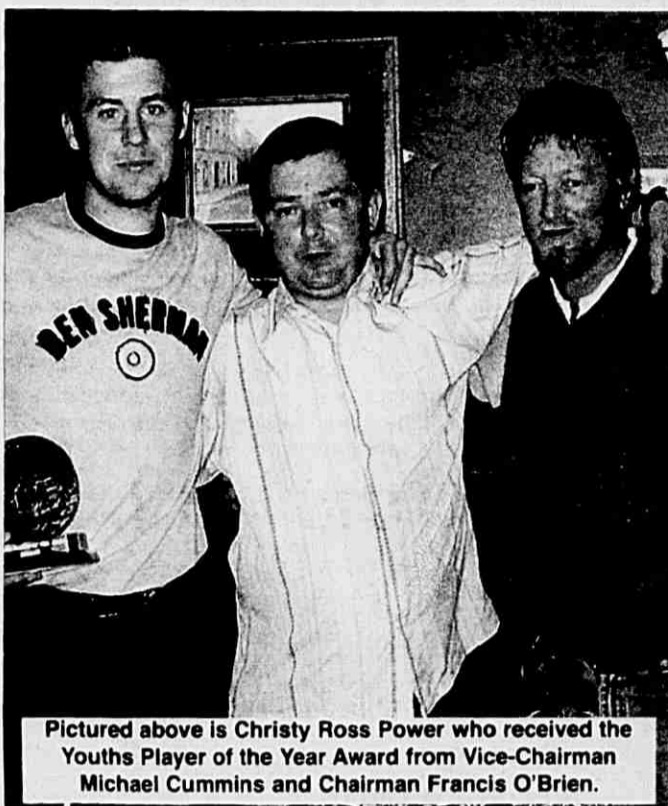

- All scores must be recorded using the hurley.
- puck outs are from the hand by the goalkeeper who must wear a distinctive colour jersey.
- All frees are to be taken as cuts off the ground, 65's are to be taken directly in front of the goal they are attacking. The 65 is taken 30 metres from the goal they are attacking.
- As in all Bord na nOg competitions all games in division one and two are 15 a side and games in division three are 13 a side.
- Goalposts are to be placed on the 20 metre line.
- Games are 15 minutes a side.
- All players must wear a full faced helmet in accordance with general G.A.A. rule.
- The emphasis should be on learning the skills and enjoying the game. Mentors are requested to ensure that those objects are achieved.
- Mentors have a responsibility to ensure teams do not inflict heavy defeats on opponents.

There was nationwide interest in the hurling and football Qualifier draws made at Pearse Stadium, Galway on Sunday evening last and members from all of the 25 counties, eight in hurling and 17 in football waited with bated breath for the draw to take place.

HURLING

The eight counties were drawn in two sections of four and the top two counties will qualify for the quarter finals.

In **GROUP 1** — Antrim, Laois, Limerick will be joined by Galway and in **GROUP 2** which is our group, Dublin,

Offaly, Clare and Waterford are the teams.

The organisers went further and fixed the sequence of matches, which will see Waterford play Offaly on Saturday next at a neutral venue.

Our match against Clare will also be at a neutral venue and we will play Dublin in Parnell Park.

There could be no complaints about how the draw was conducted as it was all open and transparent, but there was quite an amount of criticism of the decision to wait until Monday morning to put venues, etc. on the respective matches.

Members are justified in asking why the GAC did not meet on Sunday night to tidy up the fixtures programme for the weekend and give counties that little more time to get organised.

There has been mixed feelings around the county and the general consensus is that it might have been worse. It is good that we are avoiding Galway and Limerick.

If we win two of our three matches we will qualify for the quarter finals but it will be considerably to our advantage if we win all three since going top of our section would give us a quarter final meeting with Wexford, rather than against Kilkenny (presuming that Kilkenny defeat Wexford in the Leinster final).

Our match against Clare will also be a tough encounter, they having defeated us in the league in Dungarvan. We will feel confident of taking care of Dublin who have a home game.

Waterford v. Offaly

This will be an historical meeting of our counties since it will be the first ever meeting of the counties in a championship tie. The game is fixed for Carlow and will be played at 7.15 p.m. on Saturday evening in Dr. Cullen Park.

Waterford had been hoping for Thurles with Nolan Park as second choice and there is great disappointment at having to play the game in a venue where we have never before played hurling.

On Sunday last the Faithful

county were subjected to the "father and mother" of a hammering by neighbours Kilkenny in the Leinster semi-final. I have no doubt but that Waterford supporters who watched the game on TV will look upon them as "easy meat," so poor was their display. It was the biggest hammering they ever got in their intercounty history. The prudent observers will be inclined to agree that Offaly are not going to lie down after this and their hope and ambition will be to bounce back against Waterford and prove to their faithful supporters that "that was not the real Offaly."

In a first class challenge against a full Waterford team played in Killarney three weeks ago, Offaly were caught in splendid form and defeated us by 4 points. The message here is that we can afford to take no chances and I have no doubt but that on Saturday we will be at the receiving end of a "back lash" as Offaly players strive to redeem a lot of the lost pride that resulted from their awful mauling by the Cats in Croke Park.

The only championship meeting ever between the teams was at under 21 level back in 1992 when we defeated them in a thrilling replay to win our first ever Under 21 All-Ireland title.

Only players remaining from that team are Tony Browne, Paul Flynn and Fergal Hartley on the Waterford side and Brian Whelehan, who seems certain to turn out for the Leinster team, having missed out against Kilkenny on Sunday last.

Waterford are expected to field at full strength as after training on last weekend, there were no reports of injuries.

Second Half Fade-out By Promising Waterford

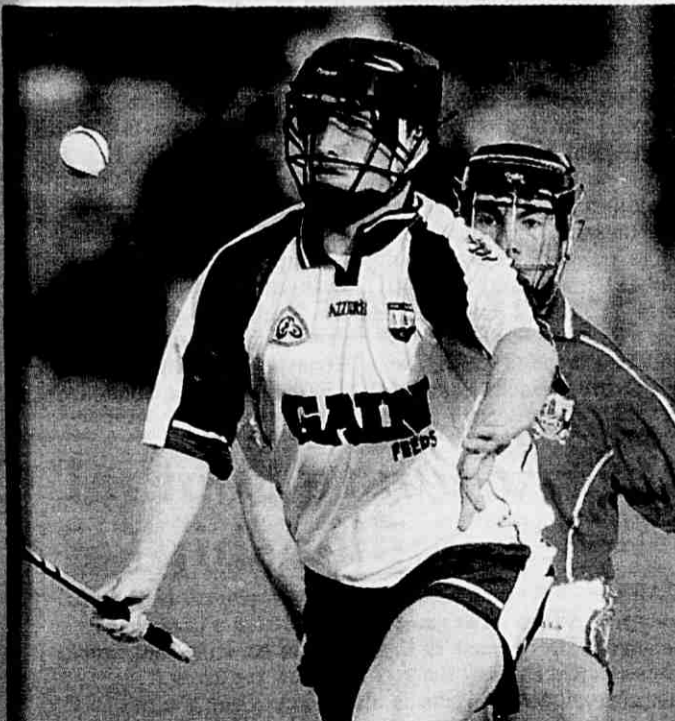

After an evenly contested first half which saw a mere two points between the sides at the break, Waterford improved in the opening ten minutes of the second half and after drawing level, went in front from a Mark Gorman point in the 40th minute.

But Cork substitute Ronan Conway brought the situation back level only a minute later and two minutes later the visitors went ahead and were never again headed. Then disaster struck when Stephen Sullivan goaled in the 46th minute and namesake Maurice Sullivan had Cork's second goal just on the 50th minute. At this point it was all over for Waterford who never looked like stemming the Cork resurgence. Our lads did keep on trying but their performance had obviously been affected and shattered by the two goals.

Conditions

Conditions were ideal with the venue bathed in sunshine and not a breeze to be felt by the 3,000 attendance at the game.

Both teams fielded as selected.

Cork opened with the game's top scorer, Maurice O'Sullivan in the 4th minute and a great point by Waterford team captain Mark Fives levelled the match in the 6th minute. Stephen Molumphy put Waterford in front with a neat score from play in the 7th minute and the visitors drew level when Maurice O'Sullivan hit his second point scored in the 10th. A pointed sideline cut accurately propelled by Michael Naughton put Cork ahead again and they were two points ahead when Dermot Dorris scored a good point. Aiden Kearney had a super point and Michael Naughton had another before Maurice O'Sullivan had a point to leave Cork with dou-

ble scores (0-6 to 0-3) in the 25th minute. Then coming close to the halftime break Gearoid O'Connor had a Waterford point to leave the halfway tally at 0-6 to 0-4.

Second Half

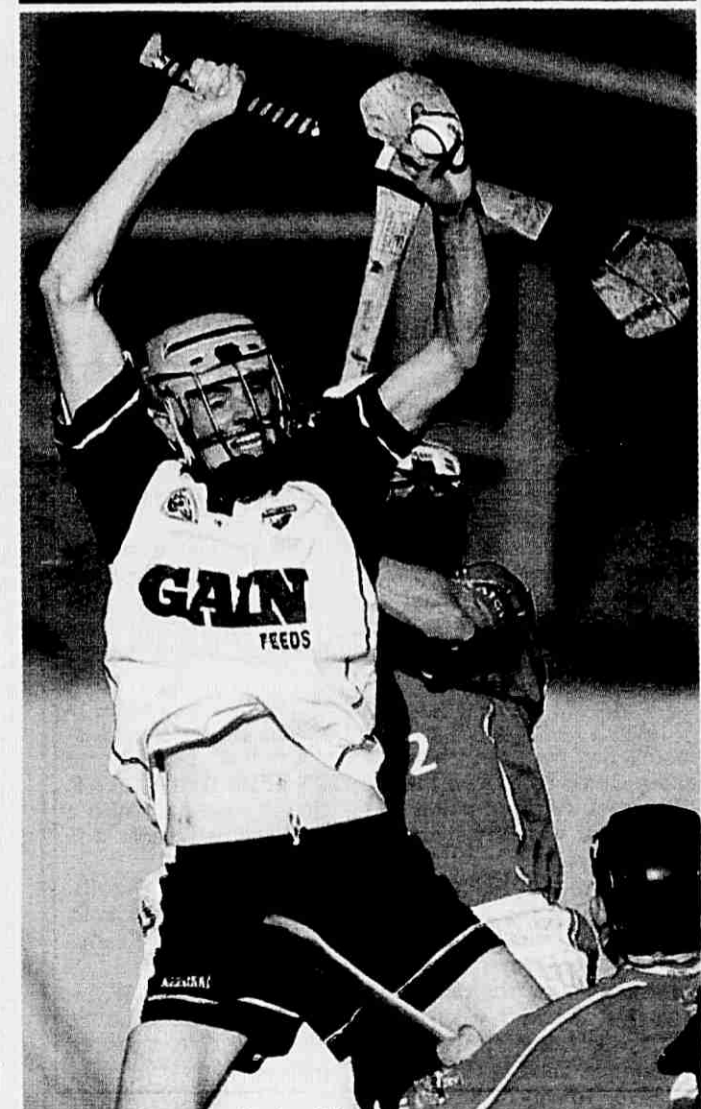

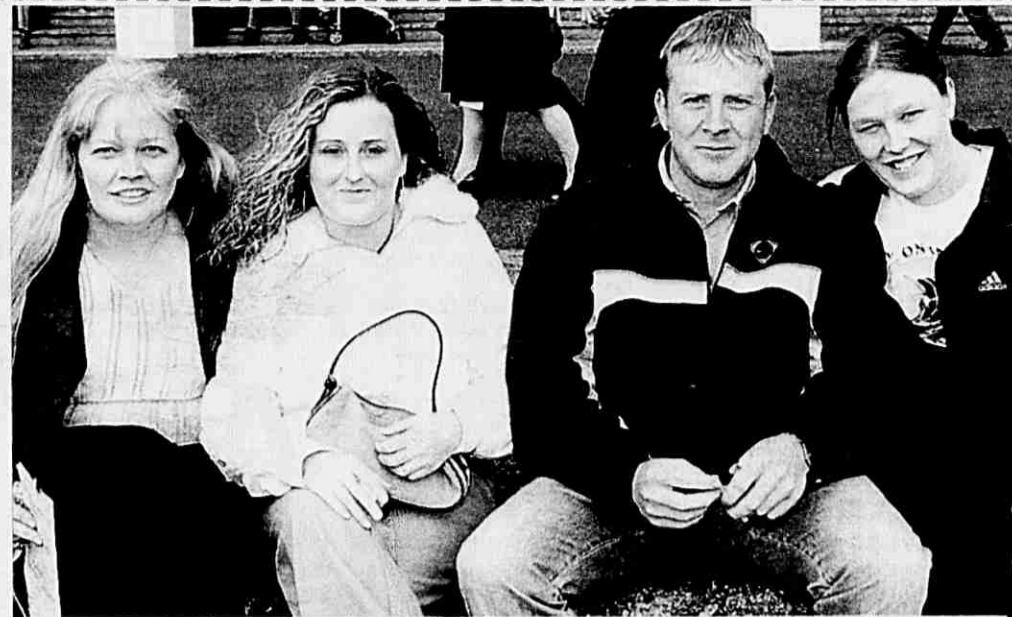

BALLYDUFF'S JOHN TOBIN WAS A TRUE CHAMP

John Tobin was born in Ballyduff, Lismore, Co. Waterford on November 29th 1847. He was 1.79m tall and weighed 81kg. Although he never competed in ICAC Championships, John Tobin would surely have been to the fore in the sprints in the early years of the championships. He retired without a National title on either side of the Irish Sea but remains nonetheless among the very best of Irish sprinters and among the best of his generation.

Tobin's athletic career began in 1865 when he ran a private match over 150 yards against a M. J. Hayes in Waterford. Hayes was a guest of Colonel Bushe, Glencairn Castle, Tobin lead from the start and won by five yards in 16.5. A year later on August 15th 1866 he won the 100y at Lismore Cricket Club Sports. He beat Hayes again and J. F. Porter and four others in a time of 11.25 — the ground being exceedingly heavy. At the same sports he won the 200y, the Vaulting match at 1.78m and the standing high jump with 1.43 mins. His training was moderate then — a good walk and a spin once a day. In October he won the 100y and the 150y hurdles at Tallow. On Boxing Day in Cork he won a 440y beating William McKenna champion of the 22nd Regiment in 58.0. He also won the 100y in 10.75 beating the Cork master John Keller.

In July 1867 Tobin had an unusual double at Queenstown-100y and 56lbs without follow-clearing 5.74 mins. It was as a result of that 100y that the great match him and Captain H. F. Marryatt of the 65th regiment was arranged. The date was October 26th the prize-£500, the distance 110y, the venue — The Navigation Walk Cork City. Training was under Mr H. Hayes of the royal artillery. Tobin was stabled at Mr. E. Earnes close to the walk for the five-week period prior to the race, the training regime was strict-up at 6 a.m. At walking exercise, took cold

baths and ran the distance every day with a pace man. No drink, save a glass of port at dinner, nor vegetables, one cup of tea at breakfast and there was meat three times daily. Marryatt also had a trainer-imported from England for the occasion. At 1.15 p.m. the pair came to the post, after several false starts, Marryatt was away best, at the 90y mark Tobin was in front and he won by 5 yards in a time of 10.5. The money last was an estimated £2,000. Besides the pecuniary reward the gentlemen of Cork presented him with a watch and chain and there were other prizes flowing.

The Cork club had two meetings in 1868 and Tobin's entry was refused-professionalism. He attended both however and at the second Sir John Arnott organised a 150y race-open to all-comers with a prize of (jewellery) valued at £7. There was ten entries and Tobin won through in a time of 15.75. The professional tag followed into 1869 and at Mallow he competed in the 100y under protest. Among those beaten were F. Fitzmaurice, Lieutenant Egan 22nd regiment, and E. Furlong, Fermoy, despite the heavy ground Tobin's winning time was good 10.5.

Tobin was back at Lismore on June 29th, he enjoyed success in the 100y 10.45, standing hop-step-jump 9.93 and the 56 lbs without follow 5.66m. A £5 wager with William Barnet for the 56 lbs at Lismore Sports the following week — this was the best of five trials and ended in Tobin's favour by 5cm — he throwing 6.20m. At Cahir on September 24th Tobin was the Master, taking the laurels in the 100y, 150y hurdles, 56 lbs and 200y hurdles for prize winners as well as the standing hop-step and jump with 10.01m.

Throughout 1869 and 1870 Tobin, Marryatt and C. H. Currey, son of the Duke of Devonshire's agent involved themselves in much private matches in the Cork

area. Despite losing considerably at the start in the 100y at Cork City Sports in April 1870 Tobin again beat Marryatt in 10.4. He also enjoyed success with the hammer-26.52. The college races in June, Marryatt and Curry had got up an affair between themselves in the shape of a private match, Marryatt missed the event altogether, Curry won the 100y and Tobin the open 100 y, again in the time of 10.4. At this time a doctor Bauchope of Edinburgh University had a commission out over any distance up to 440 y Curry took up the challenge, Race over 150y at Cork for a £200 stake. But Curry cried off much to the chagrin of athletic enthusiasts in Edinburgh and the London athletic club.

At the 1871 Queens University Cork Sports Tobin and Walsh of the anniversary tied twice for the 150 y, -in the third run off, Tobin had his man by a yard and a half when clocking 15.0. At the college races in June Bauchope was never in it and Tobin had Collett caught 20 yards from home, this being the open 100y. However, the judges had the tape at thigh high, which left Tobin confused, and Collett snatched the win by a foot in 10.0. This was Tobin's one and only defeat.

At Templemore in September, Tobin ran his last race-over 150 y. He moved to London shortly after and would have started favourite for the championships of 1872. At that time their was much squabbling over the amateur question and this was not to Tobin's liking. According to the Cork Consitution, he was the finest sprinter Ireland ever produced and I much doubt if he was not superior to any Irish professional that has crossed the channel. There was never one amateur that could lick him, besides his sprinting abilities, Tobin was also a capable jumper and had respectable performances in the weight throwing events. He really was a true champ and he came from Ballyduff.

Honour Bestowed On Brass Band For 130 Years Of Service

Dungarvan Brass Band was accorded a Civic Reception in honour of its 130 years of unbroken service to the town, last Friday.

Speaking at the ceremony, Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said that over the lifetime of the Brass Band, its members have played for six generations of Dungarvan people, played for celebrations, commemorations and marches; parades, protests and processions; elections, sporting victories and the visits of dignitaries.

"...it has ushered in two new centuries and a new Millennium," the Mayor told an audience which included Deputy Town Manager, Paul Clerkin, Town Clerk, Joe O'Flaherty, as well as William Dee, Chairman of Dungarvan Brass Band and members and past members of the Band. "It has survived two World Wars, the War of Independence and the Civil War. It has come through economic difficulties, bad times, disasters and all manner of bad news and hardships.

"But it has seen the good times too, celebrated with the people of the area, played rousing marches, serenaded holiday-makers from the bandstand, and accompanied the successful and famous as they arrived in town to celebrate their victories and achievements," he went on to say.

FOUNDED

The first Brass Band was founded in 1875, under the patronage of St. Nicholas, an Augustinian. It was a Temperance Band, founded to give young men an alternative to the drinking culture, which was one of the difficulties of Irish society at the end of the 19th century.

As early as 1882, the band was winning in competition and took the 3rd prize at the national Exhibition of that year. This was followed by the winning of the Gisbourne Challenge Cup in 1909 followed by a procession of awards and prizes won over the years.

Mayor O'Riordan added: "Generations of young and not so young Dungarvan people have received a comprehensive training in music, which has stood them in good stead in later years, or in other towns, cities and countries of their adoption.

"They found themselves with a special skill and a key to a social and leisure door, which has been invaluable.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan thanked the present committee and members for what they have done for Dungarvan.

"We all have special memories of events where the Band performed and summer would not be summer without the

sound of brass and drums in our streets."

"Long may they thrive and continue to entertain and uplift us and enhance the quality of our lives here in Dungarvan," she said.

Adding his congratulations and thanks, Mr. Paul Clerkin, Deputy Town Manager said that some of the success of the Band could be attributed to the continual recruitment of new young members, which would ensure the future of the organisation.

FLAG BEARERS

Just last year, the band broke new ground by travelling to New York to take part in the St. Patrick's Day Parade.

Mayor O'Riordan said: "Dungarvan has been particularly fortunate in having a band of which we can be proud, a band which has carried the Dungarvan flag to many loca-

tions with great distinction and which has maintained the highest standard of discipline and musicianship throughout its existence."

He also applauded the successive Bandmasters, Conductors and Musical Directors for their unselfish service to the community including William Dee, Francie Kenealy, Jonathan Bulfin, Liam Walsh, Liam O'Mahony, Michael Hennebry and Michael Clancy as well as others who have gone to their heavenly reward, but whose legacy lives on long after them.

"This evening, they can add another page to their impressive roll of honour as they make history themselves. They can add this accolade, which is being bestowed on behalf of the people of the town, to the many trophies, and commendations they have for their musical achievements."

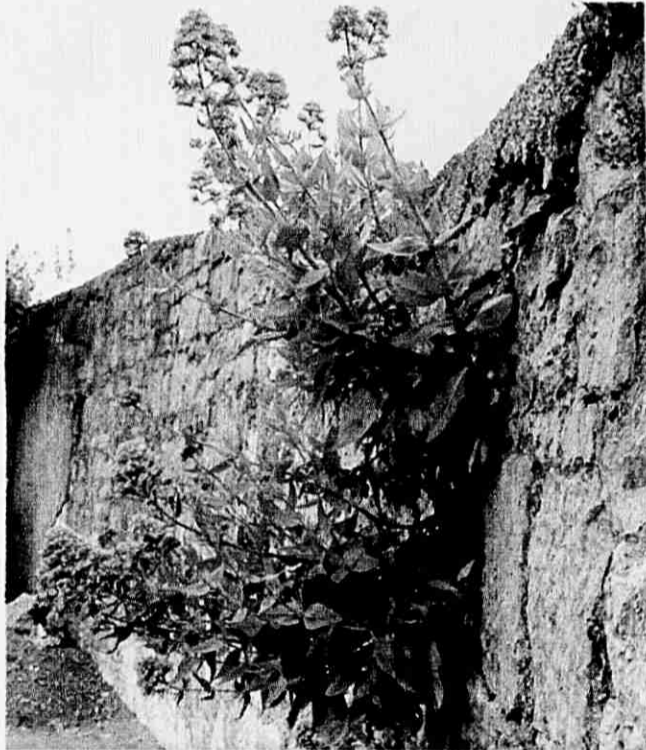

**WALL VALERIAN:
A PRETTY DESTROYER**

Beautiful flowering clumps of Wall Valerian *Centranthus ruber* are sprouting out of old walls all over County Waterford this month. These plants vary in the colour of their flowers with pink-mauve; red and white all quite common. This is a garden plant brought to north-western Europe from its native Mediterranean region to add colour to gardens. It has spread from gardens and grows untended in many places.

I admire this plant with mixed feelings as it certainly does damage the lime mortar of the old stone walls in which it grows. Plants grow in mortar only when water is getting into the wall and their roots break down the limestone like minerals in the mortar into soluble salts, that are either used by the plants or leached out by rain.

The result is a softening of the mortar with possible loosening of stones. The thickening growth of the Wall Valerian's white fleshy roots can slowly heave stones aside. Stones may even eventually even fall out, leaving gaps that destabilise the neighbouring stones. Repairs to old walls should always, of course, be made with suitable lime mortar, rather than with cement mortar, which is brittle and at worst, can make dampness problems worse.

It seems a shame to have to control such colourful plants.

Managing Grass to Maintain High Weight Gain

Liveweight gain in the first 80 days at grass can be of the order of 1.25 to 1.50 kg per day, which is of a similar magnitude to that of an all concentrate diet. This reflects the feeding value of quality spring grass and the ability of grazing animals to utilise it efficiently. This relationship between grass and animal performance changes significantly around mid June. There is the natural occurrence of inflorescence or grass going to seed and consequently a decline in digestibility. Then these seed bearing tillers die off and are replaced by new less productive tillers which explains why about two thirds of total annual grass production occurs before the end of June.

Also, at this time on the animal side there are changes in its growth potential. Over the winter yearlings and stores intended for grass normally grow at 0.3 to 0.7 kg per day which is well below their potential growth rate. It appears that their body metabolism adapts to the restricted feed intake in winter and becomes more efficient. Then when put on a higher plane of nutrition in the form of spring grass this efficient body metabolism continues for some time and boosts weight gain to partially make up for the restricted period. This effect is known as compensatory growth. By now the period of compensatory growth is almost complete. Furthermore, as cattle mature an increasing proportion of the gain is in the form of fat and since fat uses 2.25 times more energy per kg of gain than lean meat, as the animal becomes "finished" this will mean a lower weight gain per unit of energy intake.

Growth Rates

Maintaining satisfactory growth rates to the end of the season is a big challenge but one that is financially rewarding. If the average daily gain from turnout until now has been about 1.25 kg per day then the target from now until the end of August should be 1.0 kg per day with a reduction to about 0.8 kg per day from September to housing for cattle being finished indoors and at least 1 kg per day for cattle being finished off grass. A high seasonal gain on grass reduces costs significantly by reducing the requirement for meal feeding on grass or by shortening the indoor finishing period. For example, cattle that gain 200 kg in summer are to market about one month earlier in Spring compared with those that gain 170 kg, which is still a respectable performance from summer grazing. Remember it costs about 2 per day to feed a finishing bullock indoors on a typical silage and meal diet whereas the daily feed cost on grass is about 20 cent per day.

Keep Pasture Leafy

Over the next two months the main effort in grazing management should be to maintain a leafy pasture. In one cut silage systems all the grassland area will be available for grazing from mid summer onwards so there is a strong chance of oversupply. Continue to assess grass supply on a weekly basis and where there is an oversupply developing, stop using nitrogen. An excess of 20 days ahead of stock requires the removal of the surplus as baled silage (or hay if the weather is suitable). Even where supply and demand are fairly well balanced some remedial action to remove stemmy herbage is likely to be necessary. Topping paddocks in sequence as they are grazed out removes the stemmy seedheads and stubble and does not significantly affect the supply when growth is slow.

GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT

Save on Fertiliser costs by Establishing Clover

A demonstration of clover overseeding was held on the farm of Thomas and P.J. Mahony, Old Parish this week. Teagasc advisor Ruth Fennell told farmers that the N fertiliser bill can be reduced by 25 per acre per annum if full advantage is taken of new varieties of clover. Teagasc researchers Michael Healy and Aidan Lawless described the system of over-sowing clover into an existing sward developed in Solohead. Over-sowing of clover costs 15 - 25 / acre.

Key points on over-sowing clover into an existing sward

- Sow clover after harvesting silage/round bales (ensures open sward).
- Cut the grass as tight as possible.
- Ensure P and K and lime levels are adequate.
- Sowing should take place in May / June / July period.
- Apply clover seed with 0:7:30 or similar type fertiliser.
- Apply 5kg of pelleted clover seed/ha (2kg/ac).
- Use of 50:50 mix of clover seed e.g. Aran and Avoca
- Mix clover seed in the field with the fertiliser and only do 1-2 acres at a time. If the clover is mixed with the fertiliser in the yard, it will sink to the bottom of the spreader.
- Spread the mix up and down the field first and then across and back over the field on the second run. Start the second run where you finished the first run.
- Apply slurry if possible after sowing.
- Do not apply nitrogen for the rest of the year after sowing, as this will favour the grass.
- Hope for rain after sowing.
- Graze the field four weeks after sowing and graze as often as possible. Do not allow high levels of grass build up, as this will smother the clover.
- Ensure the field enters the winter as bare as possible.
- Graze in early spring.
- Apply Nitrogen fertiliser to the clover swards in spring rather than the summer.




